Town approves annexation for Buc-ee's

LOXLEY — The town of Loxley approved a measure during a special meeting Monday, Jan. 28 to annex property for the Buc-ee's Travel Center, located off County Road 68 and the Baldwin Beach Express.

Two separate measures were brought before the

council during the Jan. 28 meeting, both were passed unanimously following a vote to suspend the rules for immediate passage of an ordinance.

First, the council voted to adopt Ordinance No. 2019-02 to approve annexation of property known as NW-BBC, which is property located on the northwest corner of the Baldwin Beach Express.

Next, the council voted to

adopt Ordinance No. 2019-03 to approve annexation of property owned by Buc-ee's Alabama LLC.

During its regular meeting on Monday, Jan. 14, the council approved a tax incentive agreement, contingent upon the establishment being annexed into the town's limits.

"We did not go after them," said Loxley Mayor Billy Middleton. "They approached us."

During the Jan. 14 meeting, Shawn Alves, attorney with Stone, Grenade and Crosby, that represents the town in legal matters, said that the agreement was "a standard tax incentive agreement that we have done in the past."

According to the agreement, within 30 days of annexation, the company agrees to a

While on a family rafting trip, David Seladones was swept downstream where his raft slammed into a tree near the bank, resulting in temporary loss of breath. While fighting to regain his breath, he lost control of the raft and in desperation, grabbed onto

FOLEY — A brown bag lunch presentation will be made at the Foley Public Library on Wed, Feb. 13 at 11:30 a.m. John R. Weaver II, a nationally known expert on masonry coastal fortifications, will present “Defending Mobile Bays – Forts Morgan & Gaines.” This particular presentation will detail the design and construction of Fort Morgan & Gaines. It will also cover the controversial history regarding the construction of Fort Gaines and will touch on the battles for these two forts.

Weaver is the author of the critically ac-

claimed book, *A Legacy in Brick and Stone: Coastal Defense Forts of the American Third System, 1816-1867*. This book is now available in a hardbound, full-color, greatly expanded Second Edition. Weaver has also written three book chapters and numerous technical articles related to the Third System of coastal defense. He consults with National Park Service and several state organizations, training staff and volunteers on fortification technology, and assists in the development of interpretive displays.

Weaver gives presenta-

tions around the country to both technical and non-technical audiences. He is currently working with Ravelin Films in the production of a series of television documentaries about forts of the 1816-1867 time period.

Let's stop unwanted telemarketing calls

"Sarah, can you get me Floyd at the barber-shop?" Such a request was typical of phone service in the 1950's and prior, not only for The Andy Griffith Show's mythical Town of Mayberry, but in communities throughout America. That was when operators used to manually connect callers with wires and a switchboard.

Now technology allows phone service over the internet, and cell phones have, in many cases, become the device of choice for consumers.

The evolution of telephone technology has benefitted society, but unfortunately, it has given rise to the unscrupulous who misuse digi-

tal technology to invade the privacy of telephone customers.

As a result, the Federal Trade Commission established the National Do Not Call list in 2003, and most states, including Alabama, merged their own Do Not Call lists into the national list.

The Do Not Call list continually changes with new registrants added daily. Its effectiveness relies upon telemarketers frequently updating their lists. The Do Not Call list may limit some telemarketer calls, but it is not the solution most hoped it would be.

Initially, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) handed

down fines to telemarketers when they identified abusers through caller ID information. These fines encouraged companies to comply. However, we now have an ever-increasing number of unwanted telemarketing calls, and it is apparent that many are blatantly ignoring the National Do Not Call list.

The violators often employ a technology called spoofing. This is the common name ascribed to the practice of electronically replacing a caller's true identification and number with a name and number of the caller's choosing. Unscrupulous telemarketers have seized upon spoofing technology to mask their identity and to deceive unsuspecting consumers. Spoofing

makes it extremely difficult for regulators and enforcement entities to identify abusive telemarketers and fine them.

Call blocking appears to be the path the FCC and state attorneys general are pursuing for limiting telemarketing calls. In November 2017, the FCC released an order authorizing telecommunication carriers to adopt advanced call blocking technology for combating unwanted telemarketing calls. The FCC order makes adoption of advanced call blocking technology voluntary for telecommunication providers.

Hopefully, Congress and the Alabama Legislature will consider legislation that ensures all telephone carriers adopt advanced call blocking technology for their cus-

tomers. Federal and or state legislation should also include a component to educate consumers on the call blocking technology available from their telecommunication provider.

Another issue that should be addressed is the limited collaboration between federal authorities, state authorities and the private sector for targeting abusive telemarketing practices. Future action at the federal level would ideally prioritize collaboration and cooperation between federal and state regulators, law enforcement and telecommunication providers to collectively identify and penalize unscrupulous telemarketers.

The FCC should also revisit the Do Not Call list. The list, as it now

exists, is ineffective. The FCC needs to either strengthen the Do Not Call list compliance or develop an entirely new approach to solve the problem.

My pledge as President of your Alabama Public Service Commission is that I will exhaust every effort in pursuit of such measures at the state and federal levels.

Speed limits, or mere suggestions?

I do a lot of driving both for pleasure and work. Often during a week, I will spend twenty or more hours cruising the highways. Most of it is enjoyable especially when I can get off the interstates. They seem to have become a lawless wasteland where obedience to the simplest laws of driving and courtesy are followed only by the minority.

I have told you of my penchant for speed, and I am no angel when it comes to following the posted speed limits, but there is a time and place for speeding, and it is not on an interstate highway where the traffic is bumper to bumper. Speeding has become the norm, making me feel endangered going the posted 70mph. Those obeying the posted limit have become a target for those wanting to go faster.

To combat this feeling of vulnerability, I have tried going as fast as eighty. It is better, but I am still subject to those going MUCH faster. On the way to Montgomery two weekends ago, in the rain, I was traveling in the left lane, the passing only lane, at 80mph. I watched behind me as a car was gaining on me rapidly. I moved into the right lane to allow that car to pass but being in a car with many more horsepower than they, I couldn't resist pulling in behind them and matching my speed to theirs. They were going between ninety and ninety-five, twenty to twenty-five mph over the posted speed limit.

To go 100 miles at 70mph, it will take you approximately 1hr and 26min. Going the same distance at 75mph saves you six minutes. Yep, only six minutes. At 80mph, you shave a whopping seven minutes off that to arrive in 1hr and 13 minutes. Blazing the same trail at 90mph, you have arrived nineteen minutes ahead of the time of the person traveling at 70mph. Hardly enough time to go into a fast-food place, order, eat and leave. Considering that, it doesn't seem worth it, does it? Yet we speeders blow past the obedient minority,

putting their lives in as much danger as we are choosing to put our own lives in. All to save nineteen minutes.

Borrowing from the movie, *Pirates of the Caribbean*, whenever non-adherence to the pirate's code

is observed, the standard answer is that the codices are, "More like guidelines". The same has happened to our speed limits. They are no longer limits, but mere suggestions, and a measuring stick by which your fine will be computed when you are caught.

I know that law enforcement agencies from the federal to the local are understaffed, underbudgeted, and overworked. They can't be everywhere at once, and there are more pressing crimes being committed than speeding, but I think enforcement of the limits is the only way to solve this. The trip to Montgomery wasn't just once, but another the next day. In that roughly 680 miles of highspeed travel, I saw only one police car, and it was assisting a car that had run into the ditch on the opposite side of the road.

I confess to my hypocrisy by calling for reformation of an act that I participate in, but when you are traveling I-10 east or west bound through either Mobile or Pensacola bumper-to-bumper at 70 with cars passing you at 80, it's only a matter of time before something bad happens. When you drive as much as I do, the likelihood grows. It can happen to you. If you are a member of the speeding majority, you are the guy everyone else is saying, "He's going to get killed," and that would be the ultimate limiting factor.

Supporting our military, repaying our veterans

One of the highest honors from my time in Congress has been the many interactions I've had with members of our nation's armed forces and our veterans.

Throughout the long history of the United States, countless Americans have served our country honorably in the military. Many made the ultimate sacrifice.

There is no greater way to say "thank you" to our fighting men and women and our veterans than by ensuring they are taken care of both during and after their service, with the most up-to-date weapons systems and funding to carry out their missions, and with commonsense solutions to veterans issues.

I am proud to once again serve on the House Armed Services Committee, Subcommittee on Seapower and Projection Forces, and Subcommittee on Strategic Forces. These are two important roles that directly impact the state of Alabama and our country.

My work on the Seapower and Projection Forces Subcommittee is important to the 4,000 people working at Austal shipyard in Southwest Alabama and the 2,000 Alabamians who work at Huntington Ingalls in Pascagoula, Mississippi. These two shipyards are crucial to the U.S. Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

My work on the Strategic Forces Subcommittee is crucial for Alabama as many of the missile defense systems are designed and built in places like Huntsville and Troy. Having of a strong missile defense program is obviously vital to the security of our entire nation.

Not only is it necessary to take care of our servicemembers while they are on active duty, but it is our responsibility to care for our veterans as well. A career of service never ends for members of the armed forces, and we cannot fail them.

One of the ways I am continuing to advocate for our veterans is by supporting policies that will

get them the benefits they deserve. For example, I am proud to support the Retired Pay Restoration Act to ensure all military retirees with service-connected disabilities get their military retirement and disability payments concurrently.

Currently, veterans with under a 50 percent service-connected disability rating have their disability pay deducted from their retirement pay, even though they are completely different benefits. I will continue to fight for this legislation until our veterans get all of their disability and retirement compensation.

I continue to fight for veterans who were exposed to the toxic herbicide, Agent Orange, during the Vietnam War. The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act allows the thousands of veterans of the Vietnam War who served in "blue-water" Navy posts off Vietnam's shoreline to receive benefits for this service connected disability.

And last Wednesday, I joined 20 of my colleagues in sending a letter to the Superintendent of Arlington National Cemetery and the Secretary of the Army to allow American flags to be carried by visitors in Arlington Cemetery.

It only makes sense that in one of the most sacred places in the United States Americans should be able to represent their patriotism openly and clearly through the display of an American flag. It is just a small way we can express our gratitude for those who paid the ultimate price for the freedom our flag represents.

Ensuring our service members can adequately defend and protect our nation both at home and abroad, taking care of our veterans, and honoring those who have given their all is the least we can do as Americans.

Alabama's role in the defense of our nation, both past and present, is something we should all take immense pride in, and I am glad to know that our great state is paving the way for a safer world and a stronger America.

Saying no to drugs at Stapleton Elementary

The DeBakey Drug Education Program vehicle stopped at Stapleton Elementary last week to teach fifth graders the dangers of drugs and vaping.

The DeBakey Drug Education Program vehicle travels to schools throughout five counties of southwest Alabama to educate children about the dangers of illegal

drug use and substance abuse. In addition to visiting public, private and parochial schools, the vehicle is available for community events and other special programs.

The idea for the program originated with the late Ernest G. DeBakey, MD, a prominent Mobile surgeon concerned about the effects of drug use on youth. Since it began in 1994, more than 100,000 students have participated in the program. Recognized by the American Hospital Association, the vehicle was the first of its kind in the country.

The 38-foot recreational vehicle, designed specifically for the drug education program, uses state-of-the-art technology, bold colors and engaging graphics to grab students' attention.



The interactive exhibit was designed by Peter Feher, a Mobile-based industrial designer also responsible for the My BodyWorks Health Gallery at The Gulf Coast Exploreum.

The multi-media program features a 12-person theater with three 42-inch flat-screen monitors for video presentations that run through the spectrum of drugs, abuse and effects. It gives students the opportunity to see, hear and touch displays. They view actual organs that show healthy and unhealthy samples of the heart, brain and liver. Six touch-screen learning stations kiosks engage them with interactive games, consequences of their choices and skills for saying "no."

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Kelly Clarkson is a nominee in the 61st Annual Grammy Awards, airing Sunday on CBS.

'Meaning of Life' could mean another Grammy for Kelly Clarkson

Kelly Clarkson has one Grammy nomination this year, and to her, it's the one that really counts.

Now a coach on "The Voice," the first "American Idol" is up for best pop vocal album for "Meaning of Life" at the 61st Annual Grammy Awards, which someone else with a "Voice" connection — Alicia Keys — will host from Los Angeles' Staples Center in a live-across-the-country CBS broadcast Sunday, Feb. 10.

"When I started making this album, this literally was my goal," friendly three-time Grammy winner Clarkson admits of her current bid. "I love dancing, but I don't do lots of choreography or pyrotechnics, so my (live) show is about musicianship and about the singer. Whenever I make an album, I want it to be really solid vocally, so it's always my favorite thing when I get nominated for it.

"I know most artists want album of the year or record

of the year," adds Clarkson, "and those are awesome and really incredible, but it's always amazing to get a vocal nomination when you're really striving for it. So much has been going on, I forgot when it was even being announced, but I'm very excited about it."

Others up for the best pop vocal album Grammy include Camila Cabello (for "Camila"), Ariana Grande ("Sweetener"), Shawn Mendes' (for his eponymous "Shawn Mendes"), Pink ("Beautiful Trauma") and Taylor Swift ("Reputation"). Clarkson is encouraging appreciation of everyone in the category — and, for that matter, the entire event — no matter who wins.

"It's hard to compare me and Shawn Mendes, or me and Kendrick Lamar," she reflects. "I think people get into this competitive thing that says, 'This person's better because they won.' Well ... no. I've been in the same category with the Beatles and Bonnie Raitt before and won, so

it has nothing to do with who's best. It just happens to be that the moment is that person's moment, for whatever reason."

Married mom Clarkson is anticipating potentially her busiest year yet: Her Meaning of Life Tour launched recently and continues through March; her third season on NBC's "The Voice" starts later this month; she's in the voice cast of this May's animated movie "UglyDolls"; and her syndicated weekday talk show debuts this fall.

"We took the longest vacation I've taken in a very long time for Christmas and New Year's," Clarkson says, "and my family and I were all talking about how huge 2018 was. Then my husband and I started going over the schedule for 2019, and I was like, 'Wait a minute. I think 2019 might kick 2018's a...!' It's a big year, and a lot of goals are being accomplished, which is really cool."

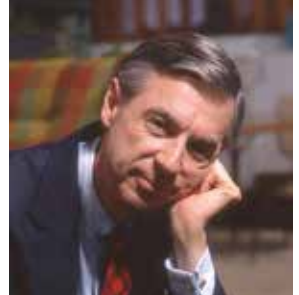

Jack Robertson's legacy of loyalty and basketball greatness

Visit Coastal Alabama Community College in Bay Minette, and you'll see plenty of evidence of Jack Roberson's accomplishments.

In 2016, the legendary Sun Chiefs basketball coach retired after 43 years on the sideline, leaving a trophy case full of significant hardware. He won 855 games and three state championships in a career that also saw him head the Physical Education department, teach golf and serve as athletic director for the college.

He's in most of the significant halls of fame for his profession and the campus basketball arena even bears his name, but when the topic of his success comes up, Robertson humbly directs the conversation to the hundreds of players he's coached over the years.

"I was just a very fortunate person to be in a situation here where we could recruit well," Robertson said. "I never scored a point, I never stopped anyone from scoring a point.

"You don't win the Kentucky Derby with a donkey, you've got to have good players."

Over the last four decades, he's coached plenty, and while he says every team he's ever led onto the court was among his favorites, many of Robertson's stories tend to gravitate toward his first team.

It was 1973, he was 26 and had just accepted his first college head coaching position. There were three sophomores on the team he jokes might have known the game better

than he did — Robertson was a formidable baseball player in college — but everyone stuck by him. Their loyalty to the Sun Chiefs, and their new coach, was a trait he respected and has never forgotten.

Several of those players were from Kentucky, where basketball is king like football is in Alabama, and Robertson says they still visit him every few years and fill his mailbox with cards every Christmas and Father's Day.

"The Kentucky boys have made a big influence on my coaching career," Robertson said. "They could have very well just laid down. But they took me in and they bought in."

Loyalty and character are the hallmarks of Robertson's career, first at Faulkner State and then in the inaugural season of Coastal Alabama Community College basketball. There were several opportunities over the years for him to further his career at a four-year program, but he never accepted the offers, which speaks to his not only being a loyal coach and employee, but a loyal man, too.

He's a native of Bay Minette, and grew up on his family's farm where his father grew soybeans and corn in the same soil Jack's grandfather successfully produced potatoes.

But, perhaps sensing the commitment of his three sons, Jack's father was adamant they never follow in his footsteps.

"My dad kept saying, do not farm," Robertson said. "He saw it was coming to an end."

So Jack turned to his love of sports and, fueled by his highly competitive nature, started coaching Babe Ruth league baseball after graduating from the University of South Alabama.

"I love sports, I love kids and I just always wanted to be around it somehow," Robertson said. "If they have a scoreboard, I like the sport."

And it was in that love that he planted the seeds of his own family legacy. And while Robertson, his lovely wife Patsy and much of their family still lives on the family farmland, it's on the court where that legacy grows.

His son Robby followed in his footsteps in more ways than one, first as a player on his father's squad, and then rising through the ranks with successful stints coaching at the high school level in Mobile and Baldwin counties.

And after an extensive search in the summer of 2016 following Robertson's retirement, Coastal Alabama President Dr. Gary Branch named Robby as the Sun Chiefs' new head men's basketball coach.

And yet, neither Branch nor the elder Robertson wanted a family torchbearer out of the new coach, they wanted someone who would lead the team as his own man. And that's what they got.

"He's a better coach than I was," Robertson said.

But his son will never downplay his father's influence on his career, regardless of how he continues to develop his own coaching style.

"I remember the joy

he had when he came home," Robby said. "He was always happy and enjoyed going to work.

He remembers family vacations revolving around the Sun Chiefs' away schedule, and how "we thought it was the best thing ever." He gives a lot of the credit to his mom, who ran the player hospitality room for years and took care of things at home so Jack could grow the program.

Robby's childhood is full of memories of his dad's players coming out to the house to swim, becoming like brothers to him.

"He and the players had a relationship outside of the floor that I thought was really cool," Robby said. "Then we'd watch them grow and go on to be successful and have families."

That connection is what inspired Robby to fulfill what he says was a dream and a goal he set as a kid one year at Christmas. Another dream comes true every time he's successful on the basketball court, and his dad comes down from the stands to give him a high five.

It's a proud moment for Jack, who chooses seats way up high so he can sit with his grandkids and watch the games. They call him "B-Ball," a title his oldest grandson — Jackson, named after his grandfather — came up with years ago.

Spending time with the grandchildren fills a lot of Robertson's time, whether its watching hoops, going to their place at the beach or just out on the family farm. So much so that he says he's not slowed down

a bit in retirement. He doesn't even play golf as much as he thought he would, although the fires of that passion will always burn.

His home away from home is Holly Hills Municipal Golf Course, where he's chased birdies and eagles since it opened in 1965. It's also where, for the last 23 years, he's hosted a father/son tournament on the Saturday before Father's Day, just to foster the connection between the two.

Robertson's been to the historic links in Scotland and even played the legendary U.S. Open courses at Pebble Beach in California with his younger brother a month after retiring. A few years before that, Robertson and a friend from Fairhope were on a team that won the state championship in a Fellowship of Christian Athletes tournament.

Of course, the way he tells it, he was just a guy benefitting from the other players in the group.

Despite his modesty, Robertson's accomplishments speak for themselves. Not only did he win three state championships — his last in 2015 — his teams were the runners up in three others, won 14 Southern Division Championships

and played in the NJCAA National Championship Tournament three times.

Longtime University of Mobile Head Basketball Coach Joe Nyland has known Robertson for 25 years, and said his friend has done much to foster the imprint of basketball in south Alabama.

"His program was always very stable and very, very good," Nyland said. "Watching Jack coach, I always felt sorry for the other team.

"When he got going on the sidelines, the game seemed to swing his way."

But what Nyland said he admired the most was Robertson's connection to his native town, and what he did for all the players who came through the Sun Chiefs program.

"Jack always did a great job of caring for his players," Nyland said. "At the junior college level, you're trying to get those kids on to the next level and he did a great job of that.

"And it was always a community event, every time you went to a game."

And it still is. Robertson, followed by his son, made sure the people of Bay Minette knew theirs was a program worth cheering for, having in-

Patriots win Super Bowl LIII 13-3

Many Super Bowls are remembered for their stellar performances that bring coaches and players to football immortality and the events that change the sport forever. For the sixth time in franchise history, the New England Patriots are Super Bowl champs after a 13-3 victory over the Los Angeles Rams. This is a Super Bowl that gave three big moments but highlights much of the

criticism that the game brought. Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick and quarterback Tom Brady won their sixth Super Bowl title as the Patriots tie the Pittsburgh Steelers with six Super Bowl wins. Going into this game, the Patriots and the Rams had different philosophical schemes that made two of the top scoring offenses in the league. Instead, this game was a grudge match of two highly

efficient defenses completely locking down the passing game and rushing game. This was a matchup where the defenses literally determined the championship. The New England Patriots' defense comes away with the better and more composed defense as they held the Rams' offense to 260 total yards and only 14 first downs.

The defense for New England had four sacks and seven tackles for loss in shutting down the Rams' offense. Former Alabama Crimson Tide Linebacker Dont'a

Hightower won his third Super Bowl title as he was great in zone coverages and creating pressure. He finished the game with two solo tackles, two sacks, and two tackles for loss. Linebackers Jonathan Jones and Kyle Van Noy each had a sack and a tackle for loss. Nose guard Danny Shelton was great at closing running lanes up the middle all night as the Rams had just 62 rushing yards from one of the league's best backs Todd Gurley. Stephon Gilmore had an interception.

The MVP of the game was Brady's most reliable wide receivers Julian Edelman with 10 receptions for 141 yards. His route running separated him from the Rams' talented cornerbacks Marcus Peters and Aqib Talib. There was never a moment where he caught the ball in two of the same areas on the field. Brady did well against the Rams' aggressive defense. He threw 21 completions out of 35 attempts for 262 yards and one interception. Rookie Sony Michel accounted for the game's only

touchdown and Kicker Stephen Gostkowski hit 2-of-3 fieldgoals for the Patriots. Overall, the Patriots offense accounted for 407 total yards and 22 first downs.

With Brady, Belichick, Edelman, Hightower and many of the Patriots' Super Bowl LIII winning team coming back for 2019, they will be competitors to try and get their seventh Super Bowl title for the Patriots' franchise. This would be first place overall in the number of Super Bowl titles over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Academy continues adaptive-sport training program in Bahrain

DAPHNE — The United States Sports Academy in 2019 is continuing its program to train physical education teachers and coaches in the Kingdom of Bahrain to better meet the needs of athletes with adaptive needs.

Academy national faculty member Marty Floyd recently traveled to the island nation in the Middle East for the third time for an extensive teaching stint for a post-secondary, non-degree certificate program in disabled and adaptive sport for the Bahrain Sports Federation for Disabilities (BSFD). This is Floyd's third visit to Bahrain to teach this program for the Academy since last year.

The Adaptive Sports program is a unique course of advanced study designed for coaches and physical education teachers who have or want to have experience working with athletes with varying degrees of adaptive needs. The program has a two-pronged approach that includes working with competitive athletes and developing inclusive

programs for recreational athletes.

A resident of Gulf Shores, Floyd is teaching courses related to sports coaching methodology, inclusive recreation services and nutrition and ergonomic aids to physical education teachers in Bahrain.

The program — which began last summer — has already shown signs of success in Bahrain. Two students from one of Floyd's previous groups have already begun working with Paralympic athletes through the BSFD, while two others are teaching Taekwondo skills to disabled athletes in Bahrain.

"The concepts presented in the daily lessons and practical activities provide a springboard to increased development as teachers and being able to provide meaningful activities to both the able and disabled students in their classes," Floyd said.

"While teaching about the nature of disabilities and their characteristics, we also immerse them into the real-life situations and barriers that the disabled encounter in their everyday lives.

Giving the teachers strategies to remove barriers and obstacles for the disabled and ways to remove the myths associated with the disabled has opened the minds and hearts of the teachers."

Floyd has more than 40 years of experience in the sport, education, training, leadership, instructional design and management fields.

"I am honored to be a part of this great program and to be a part of the United States Sports Academy," Floyd said.

"The Bahrain Sports Federation for Disabilities, under the leadership of Sheik Mohammed and many dedicated volunteers, has opened tremendous opportunities to allow Bahrainis who have disabilities to participate in recreation and competitive sports."

Floyd has worked in athletic and education administration since 1980.

"I found that students are the same, whether in the United States or Bahrain," he said. "They want to learn, they want to succeed, and they want to become better at their craft.

"I am honored to be a small part of the United States Sports Academy."

The program is notable because it marks the return of the Academy to Bahrain after a hiatus of several years. The Academy's involvement in Bahrain goes back more than 40 years to the beginnings of the Academy's international instruction, research and outreach programs. In 1977, the Academy worked with the Bahrain General Organization for Youth and Sports to develop a physical fitness test used to gauge the fitness of every school-aged child in that country, providing the first profile of youth fitness in Bahrain. A descendant of that test is still used today. For three years after, the Academy had full charge conduct of Bahrain's national sports effort including sports medicine and human performance research laboratory. Since then, the Academy has conducted numerous programs in Bahrain focusing on physical education in schools, fitness, recreation, youth sports, the Bahrain National

Olympic Committee, and fitness programs for police officers, among others.

Floyd is a consultant for the South Alabama Research and Inservice Center at the University of South Alabama in Mobile. Floyd previously worked as an associate scout for the Chicago Cubs baseball organization and as a certified trainer for non-violent crisis prevention. He has served as a baseball and softball umpire at the youth and high school levels and has taught hitting, pitching and fielding. He has also worked as an instructor for high school and middle school volleyball camps.

Floyd earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in special education from the University of South Alabama (USA), where he also earned a Superintendent/Principal Administrative Certification.

vested their entire lives in the community, and its growing hometown college. It was a goal he first shared with founding Faulkner State president Latham Sibert, who Jack reveres as the man who first took a chance on him, and then the following president Gary Branch.

Branch was a great partner throughout his career, Robertson said, especially as they fought to bring the state tournament to north Baldwin

County in the 1980s. And it has been a great event for the area every time it's come back — especially in 1991 and 2015 when the Sun Chiefs won the championship on their home court.

It's just more evidence of Robertson's dedication to the place where his roots grow deepest.

"I'm from Bay Minette, my folks are from Bay Minette, and I'm so competitive that the last thing I wanted was to not be successful," he said.

"God blessed me right here, and I was fortunate to be at the right place at the right time."

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STATE BOWLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

PELHAM — Southside-Gadsden High School edged Thompson by just three pins in the finals Friday afternoon to claim the Lady Panthers' third consecutive AHSAA State Girls' Bowling Championship at Oak Mountain Lanes.

Southside, coached by Zachary Blume, totaled 1,329 pins with Cheyanne Bohannon and Grace Ann Clontz posting games of 171 each in the traditional round of the Baker Format finals. Thompson, which totaled 1,326 pins, was led Jillian Hulsey's 188 in the traditional round. Her four-game traditional total (849) topped all bowlers. Southside's Grace Ann Clontz totaled 736 in her four traditional games.

Vestavia Hills won its first boys' state title in a close championship battle with East Limestone — winning by 35 pins. The Rebels totaled a 1,538 and the Indians had a 1,503 final score. The finals closed out the most competitive State Bowling Championship in its four-year history.

The Rebels used a balanced team effort led by Beau Reed, Boris Lu and Cameron Monistere. Reed rolled 219 in the traditional round of the final match and finished the day with an 827 total

in four traditional games. Monistere had a 233 in the final match. Lu finished totaled 763 in his four traditional games and Monistere had a 769. East Limestone's Austin Turner shot a 241 in the final round and had a four-game total to 827 to lead all boys' participants. Teammate Justin Lewis had a 213 to finish the day with a 746 total.

Thompson's girls got a big boost in the semifinals when Hulsey, a junior, rolled an AHSAA state record 289 in the traditional round as the Lady Warriors (1,434) moved to the finals with a 54-pin win over Sparkman (1,380). Hulsey had a spare on the first frame, then nailed nine strikes in a row and finished with a spare on her final roll to break the old mark by 11 pins.

The two teams also set a state record for Baker Format match — combining for 2,814 pins. The previous high match score (2,584) in the state tourney was set by Sparkman and Stanhope Elmore in 2018.

Southside-Gadsden and Sparkman combined for 2,597 pins in a North Regional match last week to set the overall mark heading into the state tourney and Sparkman's 1,308 – 1,305 win over Stanhope Elmore in the first round Friday eclipsed that mark

by 16 pins (2,613).

East Limestone (1,483), the North Region boys' champion last week, knocked off Hewitt-Trussville (1,460) in the quarterfinals by 23 pins in what was perhaps the top boys' single match of the day. The Huskies captured top seed on Thursday and finished second to the Pirates in the North Regional finals.

The girls' top match also came in the quarterfinals with Sparkman edging Stanhope Elmore by three pins — 1,308 to 1,305.

Hoover's P.J. Rudolph had a 267 in the quarterfinals for the top single game in the boys' Friday competition.

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City making progress to Honeybee Park improvements

ROBERTSDALE — Improvements to Honeybee Park are progressing with plans to have the full project completed in time for the city's Bicentennial Celebration, which is slated for 2021.

Jason Shipp with Adams Stewart Architects addressed officials at the Robertsdale City Council meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 22.

Sidewalks, which surrounded the park, have been taken out throughout the park and progress is being made to install new sidewalks designed to increase booth space for

the annual Honeybee Festival. Plans have been discussed to move the festival, which was traditionally held in October, to the first week of December to coincide with the city's Christmas parade and Christmas In the Park.

The city has also proceeded with plans to close Michigan Street between East Chicago Street and Alabama 59 Northbound.

The Robertsdale City Council awarded bids totaling nearly \$1 million at its meeting Nov. 5 for Phase 1 of the improvements. The council approved a bid of \$949,500 for the project, along with \$32,500 in administration fees and voted to

exempt landscaping fees of \$15,000.

Additional plans for park improvements include a pavilion to be located on the east side of the park, landscaping, additional parking and restroom facilities.

Mayor Charles Murphy said Adams Stewart has also presented a plan for the removal and relocation of the city's Utilities Barn. The area will be used for an amphitheater which will feature local entertainment, with additional parking and restroom facilities surrounding the structure.

In other business Jan. 22, the council accepted a letter of credit for Phase 2 of the Ridge-

wood subdivision.

City Engineer Greg Smith addressed council members at the Jan. 22 meeting, stating that final plat approval for the project, which consists of 12 lots at the north end of Ridgewood Drive, was approved by the city's Planning Commission on Sept. 24, subject to the developer providing and the council approving a financial guarantee of performance in the amount of 125 percent of the cost of the required improvements.

A section of the city's Land Use Ordinance allows for final plat approval without all the required improvements being in place if the

financial guarantee is provided, Smith said.

"This will allow them to go ahead and begin selling lots prior to the improvements being made," Smith said.

The developer has submitted an irrevocable standby letter for credit form in the amount of \$175,000 as a guarantee. The amount is based on the construction estimate provided by the developer from Bill Patterson Construction.

Also on Jan. 22, the council:

- Donated \$500 to the Robertsdale High School tennis team for travel and other expenses.
- Granted an ABC Li-

cense Approval Process for non-profits.

- Approved \$450,000 in resurfacing costs from Asphalt Services Inc., which will include \$65,000 for the resurfacing of the city's bike and walking trail.
- Approved the rezoning of property on Michigan Street from R-3 (apartments) to M-U (multi-use) which will allow the property owner to run a home-business from the property which was not allowed under R-3 but would be allowed under M-U.
- Allowed the city to apply for grand funding to help pay for sewer system improvements.

one-time payment to the town of \$50,000, along with annual payments of \$25 over a 20-year period.

In turn, the town will provide the company with a "tax-incentive payment" of 37.5 percent of the sales taxes collected by the company, and 25 percent of the fuel taxes collected by

the company.

The agreement also states that the company agrees to maintain 125 employees and a 12-month rolling annual average payroll of at least \$3.75 million.

In April of 2017, the town renewed a tax incentive agreement with Turner Furniture Co Inc., a subsidiary of the national furniture chain Ashley Furniture Industries, located in the

Loxley Industrial Park off County Road 49 and U.S. 90.

Initially passed in April of 2012, the five-year contract allowed the town to split tax revenues 50-50, with an option to renew for another five-year lease with a 60-40 split.

Following the special meeting, the council went immediately into its regular workshop meeting, during which

several residents of the Rosinton Community expressed their concerns about the annexation and continued fire protection in the area.

Several residents, calling themselves the Rosinton Heritage Association, were present at the meeting. Leigh Racine acted as a spokesperson for the group.

"We just want to make sure that what's being done is the best thing for the Rosinton community," Racine said, "and we want to have a voice in any future annexation that might involve the community."

Town officials insured residents that no further annexation in the area has been planned.

"We just want to assure all of you that we're not looking to do anything that will be harmful to anyone," said Council Member Katherine Breeden. "We want to do what's best for our

town and we're willing to work with anyone who has concerns."

Racine said the group had come together to form the Rosinton Landmark District and meets monthly to discuss concerns within the community.

A post dated Nov. 2, 2018 on the Rosinton Landmark District's Facebook Page, stated that the purpose of the group "is to help preserve our heritage and to have a voice in what happens in our community as opposed to no voice in our future."

Several members of the Rosinton Volunteer Fire Department also expressed concerns over fire protection and other issues involving the fire departments now that the property has been annexed into the town's limits.

"It is my understanding that the city does not run medical calls,"

said Rosinton Assistant Fire Chief Mike Tobias. "The Rosinton Fire Department does. We have already answered four calls (in the week since Buc-ee's opened). Are we no longer supposed to answer those calls?"

Loxley Fire Chief Tony Lovell, who is also the head of the Fire Chiefs Association for the state of Alabama, said that as of right now, Buc-ee's is still in the Rosinton fire jurisdiction, which is set by the state.

"We'll be happy to sit down with you and work everything out," Lovell said, "and we will continue to work together as we have always done to make sure calls get answered."

Lovell said the Loxley Fire Department is also working to build a second fire station in the area that will help solve some of the problems with answering calls.

the tree and held on for dear life.

"I was scared," he admits. "The water was moving really fast, I couldn't catch my breath and it was getting harder and harder to hold on. I didn't know what to do."

But his daughter, Sierra, knew exactly what to do. A 14-year-old freshman at Elberta High School, just months before Sierra had begun training with the Navy Junior Reserve Officers Training (ROTC) program at Robertsdale High School.

"Everything was going through my mind," she said, "but the only thing I could think of was that my father was going to drown and I had to save him."

After hearing her father's cry for help Sierra jumped into action, grabbing her father just as he lost the strength to hold on. Then after he lost consciousness, was somehow able to pin her father against the tree to prevent him from floating down river.

Eventually, her mother reached them and the two were able to hold on until another person on the river heard them calling for help.

"She didn't listen to

me when I told her not to go in after him," said Sierra's mother Elaine. "It was very scary not knowing which of them to save and thinking that I was now going to lose them both, but she told me that God would give her the strength to save her father."

On Wednesday, Jan. 30, Seladones was awarded a citation "for meritorious achievement while serving as a member of the Robertsdale High School NJROTC unit," from Commander M.J. Ladner, Area Manager for Area 8, which includes Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas and the Florida Panhandle.

"This is the highest honor that can be given to a cadet seaman apprentice," said Lt. I am writing this article with my "readers" perched resolutely on my nose. Over the last year, I've discovered that my arm is not long enough to hold my smartphone, book, or menu far enough from my eyes for me to focus on what I'm reading. My computer screen is yet another domain that has revealed the insufficiency of my eyesight. An unexpected and unfortunate consequence of wearing glasses is that a strange man with graying hair and deepening wrinkles has begun to stare back at me from the mirror. Along with a stubborn paunch, achy fingers, and married children, these signs are pointing inexorably in one direction: I am getting older. Getting older requires a variety of adjustments, and I've observed, as I've watched others make the journey, that some adjustments aren't so easy. One is the acceptance of our altered role in our own story. All of our lives, we are working to be the hero of our narrative. We acquire skills and experience, confront foes, win some battles, and lose others in pursuit of a worthy goal that, hopefully, will make the lives of others better. The hero-story is the one we like to tell over and over in movies and books, and we like to see ourselves in the starring role. You don't have to look hard, however, to find another ubiquitous set of characters in the hero's tale: there's

nearly always an older adult who has a major impact on the plot as either the wise advisor or wicked tyrant. Our stories are filled with kindly old wizards and vengeful old kings; generous fairy godmothers and outraged witches. The archetypal meaning is clear: every hero's concluding task is to let go of what he has gained in order to help the next hero on his way. For the one who accepts this role, there is a place of honor. For the one who rejects it, there is only one of two paths, the villain or the fool. So, a key question as you age is this: what struggling hero are you helping? What doors are you opening for others by the worthy sacrifice of your life before you die? Is there someone suffering because you're holding on to something that it's time to relinquish? Be a hero to a hero because some wise older guide once was for you.

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Landowners' help needed to count gopher tortoises

The Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries (WFF) Division and Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) are on an enlistment drive to help count one of the iconic species in Alabama's longleaf pine forests, the beloved gopher tortoise.

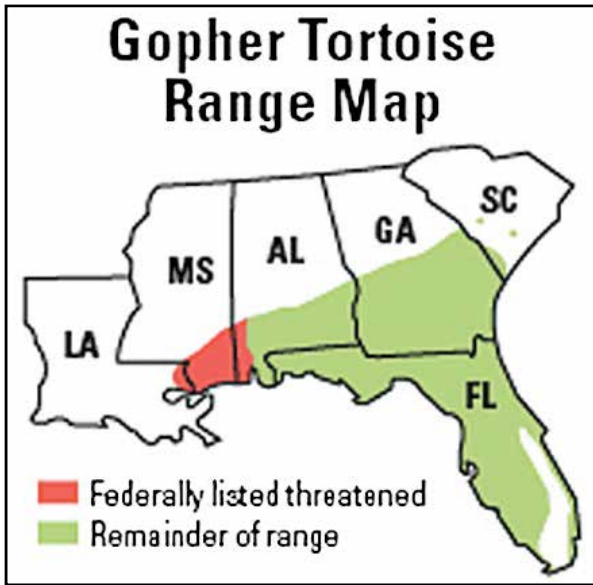
Considered a keystone species of the longleaf ecosystem, the gopher tortoise is crucial for the survival and health of a variety of animal species, including the federally threatened Eastern indigo snake. In fact, more than 360 species of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and invertebrates are known to spend all or a portion of their lives in either active or abandoned gopher tortoise burrows.

The reason the agencies must ask for help to estimate the population is that the vast majority of gopher tortoises live on private land in Alabama as well as throughout most of its range in the Southeast U.S.

The gopher tortoise is already listed as federally threatened in three Alabama counties – Washington, Mobile and Choctaw – and a decision on a possible listing as threatened in other parts of Alabama is expected in 2022. WFF, AFC and other partners are working together to determine if the population is large enough to preclude the gopher tortoise's listing as federal threatened.

WFF and the AFC teamed with other concerned partners to conduct a series of presentations in south Alabama to encourage landowners to participate in the survey program. These workshops were funded by the American Forest Foundation.

Program Coordinator, said the presentations focused on several issues, including whether gopher tortoises can be protected without further regulation.

"We have surveyed most of the public lands in Alabama managed by the ADCNR," Shelton-Nix said. "More than 95 percent of gopher tortoise habitat is in private ownership. So, there's pretty much nothing more we can do as a state agency to catalogue the population of gopher tortoises without private landowners stepping up. We have to know where gopher tortoise populations are and assess the populations to see what the status of the species is. We need to assess the populations on private lands. We discussed conservation efforts taking place across the range. We went over all the conservation efforts taking place in Alabama.

"The big take-home message is that we as state and federal agencies, and NGOs (non-governmental organizations), have done all we can do without private landowner help."

Different agencies are offering cost-share for habitat management – incentives for habitat management like prescribed burning. WFF,

AFC and other partners have secured grants to provide gopher tortoise surveys on private land free of charge. Several agencies and organizations offer technical assistance on improving habitat.

The verified gopher tortoise populations in Alabama are in the Conecuh National Forest and Fort Rucker near Enterprise, Ala. A follow-up survey is ongoing on Fort Rucker.

"Conecuh has one viable population and Fort Rucker has one," Shelton-Nix said. "Those are our largest, most contiguous blocks of land with high-priority gopher tortoise soils. It is likely there are others that have yet to be identified in Alabama, but we are working on it."

Gopher tortoises are mostly limited to deep, sandy soils that make construction of their burrows easier.

The preferred gopher tortoise habitat is open-canopy pine forests with no mid-story growth that allows light to reach the forest floor to promote an abundance of herbaceous ground cover for tortoise forage.

"A species that becomes reproductively mature that late in life, combined with high nesting and hatchling predation rates, creates a long lag time for a tortoise to contribute to a population," Shelton-Nix said. "In poor habitat, we see small isolated islands, like wildlife openings and roadsides, with only a handful of tortoises. Remember this is a long-lived species. As habitat quality decreases, tortoises will move to areas with food availability. They will survive, but they are not reproducing, therefore, not a viable population. That's why the social structure is so important."

The USFWS will consider the three Rs – representation, redundancy and resiliency – during deliberation on the gopher tortoise listing

status. Representation covers where it is important to have tortoises on the landscape factored with population level. Redundancy refers to multiple populations that are needed per unit to protect against unit-wide extirpation (local extinction). Resiliency refers to populations large enough to protect against extirpation by catastrophic events.

Shelton-Nix said owners who agree to participate should expect a site visit from biologists to determine suitable habitat.

"We have a limited amount of survey dollars," Shelton-Nix said. "We need to determine the percentage of suitable soils. We are looking for landowners with 50 or more burrows, so we can be efficient and get the most bang for our bucks."

If the property is deemed suitable for a survey, the WFF grant will cover the cost of a consultant to conduct a survey, using the Line Transect Distance Sampling method. Each burrow that is found is scoped with video equipment to check for the presence of animals, which helps determine density rate.

Shelton-Nix said the number of burrows doesn't translate to the number of tortoises.

"Each gopher tortoise can make three to five burrows," she said. "If someone has 10 burrows on their property, most likely they have two to three tortoises."

Shelton-Nix said 140 folks attended the four workshops with 30 landowners who were inter-

ested in being surveyed.

"We received great feedback," she said. "But we're still finding people who didn't know they are being considered as a threatened species. The gopher tortoise is a very charismatic species, and people who have them love their tortoises."

The exception are cattle and horse owners who are worried about the burrows.

"There are easy fixes around that," Shelton-Nix said. "If people call me, we want to help people find solutions to their problems. It is illegal to move them. Another thing unique about gopher tortoises is they have a homing instinct. If you move them, they're just going to try to go back home and may end up squished on the highway."

Ray Metzler, who is the AFC's threatened and endangered species coordinator, said the effort must overcome the concern from citizens when they hear, "We're from the government and we're here to help."

"We do have ways to provide the information to the USFWS without actually sharing names and addresses," Metzler said. "We can just tell them that Landowner A has 175 tortoises in Escambia County with a density of whatever. That's not intrusive and doesn't share any private information."

Metzler said the impact of the USFWS decision on the gopher tortoise can't be determined right now.

"We don't know if they (USFWS) would limit activities related to the

tortoise," Metzler said. "There might not be any impacts. We really don't know. The USFWS won't say until they review the information provided by the states to make the decision. Our goal is to keep it from being listed."

"We are trying to get more private landowners engaged in the process and hopefully allow us to come to their property and do a survey."

Metzler hopes to acquire more grant money for more outreach to the affected landowners later this year.

"Our first four meetings led to more landowners finding out about the need for this program," he said. "We've actually been on a few pieces of property that we didn't know existed, that have good habitat and have some tortoises. If we have a few more meetings, it might lead to a few more properties like that."

Although current research sets a viable population at 250 animals at a certain density, Metzler thinks support populations could have considerably lower numbers.

"You might have a support population at 50 tortoises," he said. "There's probably a lot more properties that have 50 tortoises as opposed to 250 at the appropriate density. And we need to find those properties."

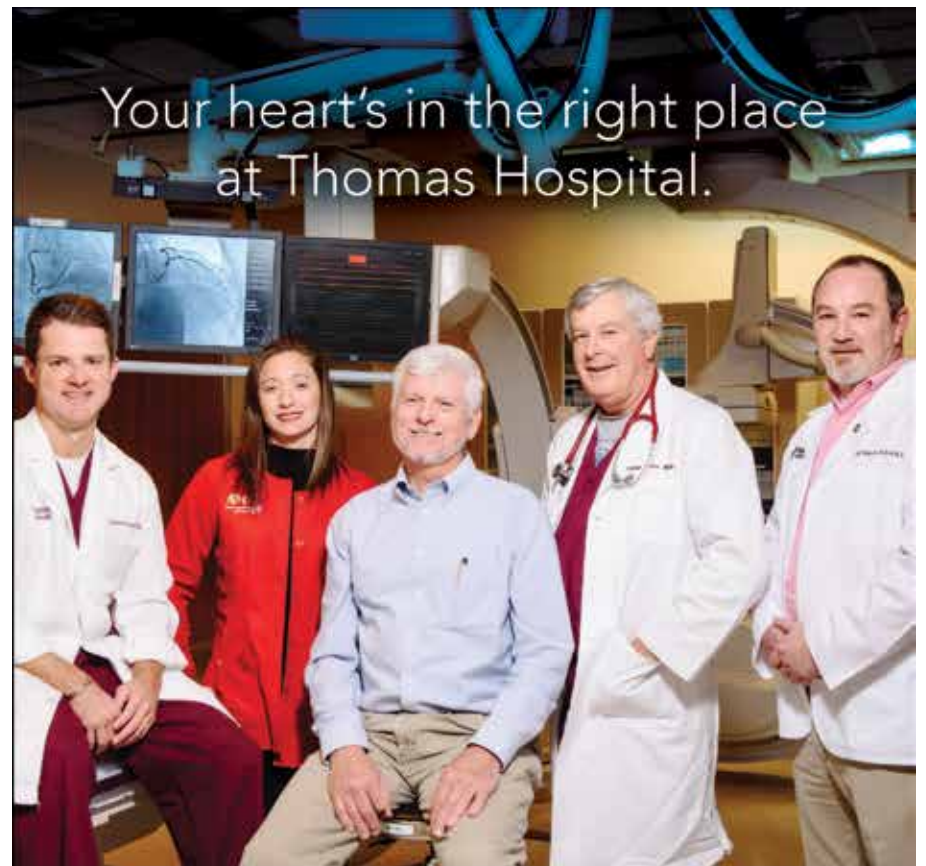

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1510 KNOWN AS THE PERSONNEL RULES, POLICIES AND PROCEDURES ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FAIRHOPE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF FAIRHOPE, FAIRHOPE, ALABAMA, as follows:

Section 1. The ordinance known as the Personnel Rules, Policies, and Procedures Ordinance (No. 1510), adopted 14 April 2014, together with the Personnel Handbook of the City of Fairhope, be and the same hereby is changed and altered in respect to the certain sections below: SECTION - IV. WAGE AND SALARY ADMINISTRATION

4.03. Employee Pay Rates

Employees shall be paid a salary or wage rate within the pay range of the job classification based upon the City's Compensation and Job Classification Plan. Generally, new employees will start employment at the minimum rate in the pay range for the job classification.

Commercial Driver's License. If an employee obtains a commercial driver's license ("CDL") at the request or with the permission of the employee's Department Head to facilitate current job performance or to qualify the employee for a job that requires a CDL, the employee will receive a one dollar (\$1.00) per hour pay increase.

City Building Inspector Certifications. City Building Inspectors will receive a fifty cent (.50¢) per hour pay increase for each approved certification the Building Inspector obtains (a maximum of two certifications within any one fiscal year, and a maximum of ten (10) certifications total).

Effective Date. If an employee obtains a CDL or a Building Inspector obtains a certification as described above before June 1 of any fiscal year, the pay increase shall be effective upon approval by the Department Head and notification of payroll. The pay increase for a CDL/certification obtained after June 1 will be effective on October 1 (i.e., the first day of the next fiscal year).

Pay increases are based on satisfactory job performance, including attendance and disciplinary record, and availability of funds. If an employee's Department Head recommends deferral of a pay increase because the employee's performance is unsatisfactory, the Mayor may defer a scheduled pay increase for a specified time or until the employee's job performance is satisfactory.

Silverhill Town Council passes water rate increase

SILVERHILL — At its meeting Tuesday, Jan. 22, the Silverhill Town Council amended its water rate ordinance raising rates to help pay for a water expansion planned for 2019.

At its Dec. 17 meeting, the council voted to post proposed changes to the town's water ordinance, which includes a \$1 increase for in-town and out-of-town customers, plus the addition of a \$25 service fee for each new water service requested.

The ordinance passed unanimously on Jan. 22.

Council members Jared Lyles and Wayne Gruenloh were not present at the meeting.

At its Nov. 19 meeting, the council voted to approve a more than \$500,000 general obligation warrant (GOW) to pay for the water expansion project.

The grant from the Alabama Drinking Water Finance Authority and the Alabama Department of Environmental Management will fund most of the project at an estimated cost of \$548,22.56, plus \$6,778.44 in capitalized interest and \$10,000 in finance expenses, bringing the total loan

amount to \$565,000.

Of that amount, the town will only be required to repay \$295,000. The rest will be paid by a federal matching grant.

The council voted to approve a resolution at its April 16 meeting to enter into an agreement with Civil Southeast regarding the running of 8-inch water lines and replacing of 2-inch waterlines along East Boulevard.

The project requires a loan from the town, with the first payment not due until January 2020. At earlier meetings, officials discussed

increasing water rates over a 2-year period to help pay for the loan.

Ordinance 451-01-2019 amends Ordinance No. 408, which was adopted July 7, 2014.

Included in the changes are increasing residential rates from \$21.79 to \$22.79 for the first 2,000 gallons for in-town customers; \$24.05 to \$25.05 for out-of-town customers. Additional rates will remain unchanged.

The ordinance also calls for the addition of the one-time service fee for new customers. The fee would not apply for existing customers.

The change also

adds that the town accepts credit card and debit card payments by phone and bank draft payments on the 15th of every month.

In other business Tuesday, Jan. 22, the council:

- Tabled action on a sponsorship for Silverhill Special Olympics pending information from Lyles, who was not present at the Jan. 22 meeting. At the Jan. 7 meeting, Nicey Jones with the Silverhill Elementary School Special Olympics addressed the council about sponsoring the eight students that

qualified to attend the Special Olympics this year. Funds from the annual Zombie Walk hosted by The Porch could be used for that purpose, officials said.

- Took no action on renewal of advertisement for the Robertsdale High School baseball team. "We just can't afford it right now," said Silverhill Mayor Tim Wilson.
- Approved minutes for the Dec. 17 meeting.

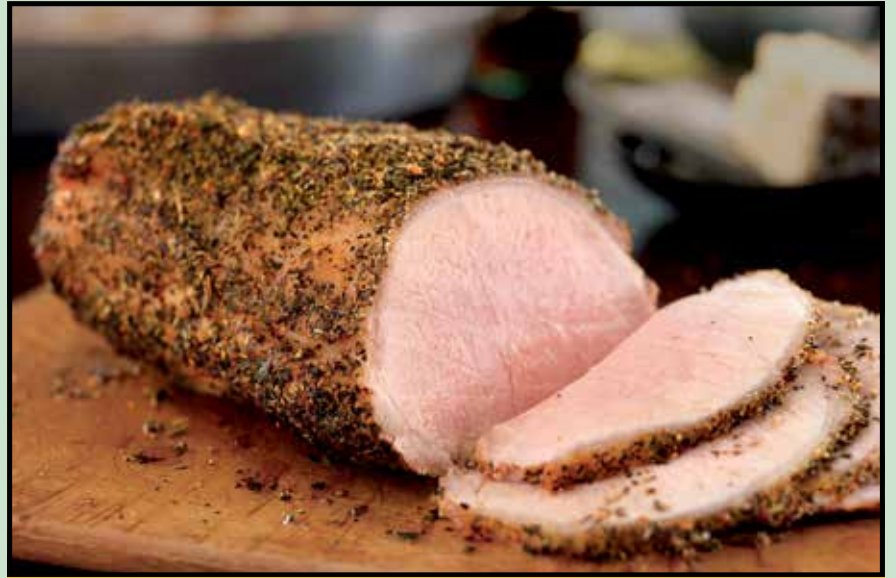
