Trustee candidates share points at forum

Katy school board candidates expressed their opposition to STAAR testing and support for teacher pay increases Thursday at a forum sponsored by the Katy Area Chamber of Commerce and Raise Your Hand Texas.

The event was held at the chamber offices, 814 E. Ave. G. Justin Burdine, a former Fort Bend Independent School District trustee, served as moderator. Raise Your Hand Texas is an education public

policy group. Earlier this month Raise Your Hand joined with the district to ensure that district priorities would be a part of legislative discussion.

Two separate forums were held, the first for the position 1 candidates, the second for the position 2 candidates. The position 2 candidates were sequestered so as not to hear the responses from the position 1 candidates.

In the position 1 race, incumbent Duke Keller, an attorney, is seeking his second term. He has drawn four challengers. All

are seeking their first term on the board. Saki Krishnamurthy is an engineer and executive. Eliz Markowitz is an educator. Victor Perez is retired. Cicely Taylor is an educator.

In the position 2 race, incumbent Lance Redmon, who works in building material sales, is seeking his second term. He has drawn two challengers. Bonnie Anderson is an IT manager who is making her second bid for office. Patricia Haggard is a stay-at-home parent who is making her first bid for office.

All candidates but Krishnamur-

thy attended the forum.

Regarding the STAAR test, Anderson said kids are "so nervous they throw up" before they have to take the test, and said the state has spent millions to administer it.

Redmon said the test does not provide an accurate representation of student achievement and there are other ways to assess that. Haggard said why there must be some sort of accountability system, the district needs a ratings system that does not come from the test.

Among the position 1 candidates, Taylor said the district

needed some method that puts an emphasis on growth versus achievement. Keller said lower test scores could affect the local economy. Perez described the test as a "absolute sham" that was coordinated between school districts and the TEA.

Teacher pay and retention are issues facing school districts across the nation. Keller said the district has given pay increases of late but agreed that more must be done.

Markowitz said teachers were

Hodges reflects on Houston Community College's upcoming move to new facility

Next month, Houston Community College's Katy operation will move from its longtime location at 1550 Foxlake Dr. to a new, 24-acre tract of land at 22910 Colonial Pkwy.

Zach Hodges, president of Houston Community College's Katy campus, reflected on the growth of the Katy operation Tuesday morning at the Katy Area Economic Development Council meeting. He said the meeting was one of the last such meetings to be held at the soon-to-be former campus.

Hodges has a unique perspective on HCC's role in Katy's growth. He has been president of the college for the past 27 years. He said HCC's involvement in Katy began in 1978-79, when he met with the then-Katy High School principal to create a dual-credit program for the students there.

Katy-area voters to cast ballots in two elections on May 7

Katy-area voters are preparing to cast their ballots for two Katy Independent School District Board of Trustee seats in the May 7 election. But they, like voters across the state, will also be asked to vote in a separate state election to decide whether to adopt two proposed constitutional amendments.

The proposed amendments, written by State Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, deal with local property taxes. Proposition 1 is to benefit individuals with an over age 65 or disabled exemption on their homestead. Proposition 2 is to increase the homestead exemption by \$15,000.

Typically, state constitutional amendments requiring voter approval are on the November general election ballot. But a Bettencourt staff member said last week that extended legislative special sessions kept the propositions from receiving the needed approval in time for placement on the November ballot. As a result, they are on the next ballot, which is May 7.

In a statement describing the propositions, Bettencourt said many voters have found the ballot language to be confusing.

"I want to clarify what these amendments actually do," Bettencourt said. "Homeowners over the age of 65 will see their freeze values for school taxes actually decline, a.k.a., ISD property tax bills if Proposition 1 passes. Also, if passed, Proposition 2 will lower independent school district property tax bills by increasing the homestead exemption that will save money for the 5.6 million homesteads in the state of Texas."

Lance Redmon, who works in building material sales, is seeking his second term as trustee, position 2. He has drawn

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Sales tax holiday for emergency supplies slated for this weekend

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday and ends at midnight on Monday.

"Whether it's fires, freezing temperatures or tornadoes, severe weather conditions can strike at any time, so it is important that families, homes and businesses have the supplies they need to face these and other emergencies," Hegar said. "This tax holiday can help Texans save money while stocking up for emergency situations."

The comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save more than \$1.5 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, which was approved by the Texas Legislature in 2015.

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include:

H-GAC reminds residents to be aware of their rights under Fair Housing Act

The Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) recognizes April as Fair Housing Month and reminds homebuyers and renters to be aware of their rights under the Fair Housing Act.

National Fair Housing Month celebrates the passage of the Fair Housing Act, which prohibits discrimination in housing because of race or color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, or disability. President Lyndon Johnson signed the act into law on April 11, 1968 as part of the larger Civil Rights Act of 1968. The Fair Housing Act (Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act) applies to rental properties, properties for sale and mortgage lending.

According to the Fair Housing Act, real estate advertisements may not exclude anyone protected under the law. Sellers or landlords should make homes available, negotiate prices and provide the

same services for everyone listed in the Fair Housing Act. Also, mortgage lenders are required to follow the law when making loans, setting repayment terms, and appraising property. Fair housing rights ensure people can exercise their right to fair housing without threats, coercion, or intimidation.

In 2020, H-GAC developed the Regional Housing Plan to support local governments in the 13-county region in providing a range of housing options that will sustain the needs of the residents they serve. For more information, visit the website h-gac.com/regional-housing-coordination.

afraid of speaking up, but wanted to teach. She said 50% of first-year teachers drop out of the profession. Perez said the problem was that Katy pays its teachers less than surrounding school districts.

When it comes to recruiting teachers, Taylor said the district must become innovative in its recruitment practices to attract more teachers. She called for alumni engagement, where the district would reach out to former students looking to enter the teaching profession, enticing them to return home to Katy.

Among the position 2 candidates, Redmon, like Keller, spoke of the recent pay increases to teachers. Anderson said the district was top-heavy with management, and money should be reallocated towards more teacher pay. She said the district recently gave Superintendent Ken Gregorski a sizable raise.

Haggard, reiterating what Perez said earlier, said Katy pays its teachers less than surrounding school districts. As for retention, Haggard said that hiring teachers with experience is ideal but not realistic given the circumstances.

"It's not an attractive position coming out of the pandemic," Haggard said.

In those days, he said, Katy High School was the only high school in Katy. Today, Katy has nine high schools.

Yet while the campus is moving, some things will remain the same, such as HCC's partnership with the University of Houston. The new HCC campus will be across the street from the new University of Houston System campus in Katy. This partnership will enable students to spend their first two years at HCC, and then finish their studies at either the University of Houston main campus or the University of Houston-Victoria.

Such partnerships, Hodges said, enable students to "start in Katy and finish in Katy."

HCC has partnered with other programs as well. The Texas A&M-Chevron Engineering Academy at HCC enables students to pursue their engineering studies at less cost than if they were to spend all their time at the Texas A&M campus. According to literature provided by Chevron and the two colleges, a student could save as much as \$4,500 a semester in tuition and fees compared to taking 15 credit hours at College Station, leading to a savings of \$18,000 over two years.

HCC is also partnering with the University of Texas-Tyler for an associate of science and engineering science degree. In this program, students would earn their

degree at HCC, and then transferred to UT-Tyler's Houston Engineering Center, located on the HCC Alief campus. There, they would complete a four-year engineering degree in Houston.

The new Katy campus has room for two additional buildings, Hodges said. Yet while the program offerings are growing to meet the needs of a diverse and growing student body, Hodges joked that his new office will be 60% smaller than the one he now occupies. This can be problematic, he joked, when you have 27 years' worth of stuff in that office.

The new campus will be officially opened with a May 6 ribbon cutting.

two challengers. Bonnie Anderson is an IT manager who is making her second bid for office. Patricia Haggard is a stay-at-home parent who is making her first bid for office.

April 25 is the first day to vote early in person. May 3 is the last day to vote early in person.

Katy city voters would typically have an election in May, but the only position that was open, the mayoralty, is uncontested. Dusty Thiele, an insurance executive and former council member, will take the oath of office May 13. He will succeed Bill Hastings, who is retiring after one term in office.

The state and school board elections are not to be confused with the May 24 party primary runoff for both the Texas Democratic and Republican parties.

The runoffs enable Democrats and Republicans to decide their nominees for statewide office. Here's a listing of the contested runoffs.

- Household batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75.
- Hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300.
- Portable generators priced at less than \$3,000.

For purchases made online, delivery, shipping, handling and transportation charges are part of the sales price. If the emergency preparation supply being purchased is taxable, the delivery charge is also taxable. Consider these charges when determining whether an emergency preparation supply can be purchased tax-free during the holiday.

For example, if you purchase a rescue ladder online for \$299 with a \$10 delivery charge, the total sales price is \$309. Because the total sales price of the ladder is more than \$300, tax is due on the \$309 sales price.

Several over-the-counter self-care items, such as antibacterial hand sanitizer, soap, spray and wipes, are always exempt from sales tax if they are labeled with a "Drug Facts" panel in accordance with federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations.

Purchases that do not qualify include:

- Batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles.
- Camping stoves and camping supplies.
- Chainsaws.
- Plywood.
- Extension ladders and stepladder.
- Tents.

Appreciating the regular old flu

I recommend the seasonal flu — but please allow me to explain.

About a week ago, I felt suddenly rundown and weak. I just wanted to lie down.

I thought nothing of it at the time. My family is facing some difficulties at the moment, difficulties we all must face now and again — and all of us are getting beat down.

But it wasn’t just fatigue. Was it the big C, I wondered? Nope.

I’d never tested positive for having COVID-19. Did that dreaded virus finally find a way to feast on my blessed good health? Nope.

It turned out to be just a regular flu — but there was nothing regular about it.

A particularly nasty and highly contagious bug that’s spreading rapidly around my region, it turned out to be the worst case of flu I ever recall having in my life.

With the intense national — and global — focus on a deadly “novel coronavirus” these past three years, it’s easy to forget how deadly the regular flu is.

According to the CDC, which has always had a hard time pinning down the exact numbers, the flu has been killing anywhere from 17,000 to 97,000 Americans every year since 2012.

Healthline says the flu has caused at least “3.5 million flu illnesses, 34,000 hospitalizations, and 2,000 deaths” in the U.S. this season.

And I was among its victims. I went to the ER to make sure it

It was one of the best weeks of my life.

It’s a challenge all too common in affluent America: you can easily lose sight of how good you have it until you are reminded how bad things can get.

I recall filling my truck up for \$40 a tank not long ago — and now it costs \$70 a tank.

All I can think of as I stand there pumping is how hard I worked the prior few years and how I was able put a nice little buffer in my savings account to prepare for a rainy day.

Now I think of the 1% return my savings account is paying against the 8.4% inflation rate from last month — and the 9.6% rate it is going to be this month — and I realize how much I took for granted the low-low inflation rate we’ve been enjoying for several decades.

Having good health taken from you suddenly — but temporarily in my case, thankfully — makes me want to focus my energy on important matters, not trivial ones.

From now on I do not want to waste one fraction of a single second discussing politics on social media, but I do want to spend as much time as possible with my mom and dad as long as we have them to enjoy.

Every time I see them now — and I wasn’t able to do so at all the past week — I ask them a new question about their lives and other family members.

They are a fountain of wisdom and I want to capture as much of their experience and knowledge as I can while they are still able to share it.

And now you know why I recommend the seasonal flu!

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

Pattison plans household waste collection day for April 30

The City of Pattison is holding its second annual household waste collection day from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. April 30 at the Pattison Area Volunteer Fire Department, 2950 FM 359, in Pattison.

Mayor Joe Garcia said the event is funded by a grant from the Houston-Galveston Area Council and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

“Last year, we collected over 23,000 pounds of used tires, over 10,000 pounds of hazardous/non-hazardous paints, over 100 containers of pesticides, over 55 gallons of used oil and over 900 pounds of low-great electronics from over 130 participants,” Garcia said. “Around 40 volunteers supported our event last year.” Garcia said this year the city plans to increase the volume of hazardous waste and used tire collections.

Those making donations are asked to submit products in their original containers. Containers should be properly sealed and closed. No mixing or consolidating products. Products are to be transported in the trunk or bed of one’s vehicle. Those making donations are asked to remain in their vehicles, follow CDC guidelines and allow staff to remove the products from their vehicles.

Items accepted for donation include:

- Passenger, light truck, and 18-wheeler off-the-rim tires.
- Electronics such as gaming devices, phones, radios, laptop/desktop computers, keyboards, desktop printers, scanners and DVD players.
- Household chemicals and cleaners.
- Residential products labeled caution, warning or poison.
- Aerosols.
- Camp stove propane bottles.
- Fluorescent light bulbs.
- Paints, stains and varnishes—limit of 25 gallons per household.
- Household batteries.
- Used auto oil, filters, anti-freeze, transmission and brake fluid.
- Pool, lawn and garden chemicals.

The city said it reserved the right to refuse a particular item or items, but listed specific items that will be refused. These items are:

- Industrial, commercial or business waste.
- CRT monitors, TVs, floor standing copiers, printers and shredders.
- Water or fire damaged electronic equipment.
- Electronic equipment previously stored outdoors.
- Tractor/agricultural tires, or tires contaminated with dirt, leaves or other debris.
- Dioxins.
- Containers greater than five gallons.
- Explosives, ammunition or radioactive waste (smoke alarms).
- Medical or pharmaceutical items.
- Large gas or propane cylinders.
- Trash.

TXDOT continues to seek input for US 90 improvement project

The Texas Department of Transportation continues to seek public feedback on its proposed US 90 improvement project between Brookshire and Katy.

The department on Thursday afternoon held a virtual and public hearing on the project. Comments are still being sought, and can be provided by phone, comment card, email, or regular mail.

The project runs for about 10 miles from I-10 to FM 1463, with an existing right-of-way 100 feet wide. The road now has one lane in each direction, with eight-foot-wide shoulders and an open and closed drainage system.

Department officials have said US 90 must be expanded to improve mobility, particularly as the Katy and Brookshire areas continue their rapid growth. Officials have also said that crash rates on this segment of US 90 are higher than the average crash rates on similar roadways. The higher crash rates result in potentially

unsafe travel conditions and reduced mobility. The department’s proposal calls

for a 120-foot right of way between Donigan Road and Koomey Road, and between Kenny Street and FM 1463. This proposal calls for four 12-foot-wide travel lanes, two in each direction. It calls for 18-foot-wide raised median with openings, and a closed drainage system.

Under the proposal, the road would have a 12-foot-wide shared use path on the north side, and a 10-foot-wide shared use path on the south side.

The proposal calls for a 100-foot right of way between Koomey Road and Kenny Street is a 100-foot right-of-way. The proposal calls for four 11-foot-wide travel lanes, two in each direction. It calls for a 14-foot-wide center left turn lane, and a closed drainage system.

Under the proposal, the road would have a 12-foot-wide shared use path on the north side, and a 13-foot-wide shared use path on the south side. It would also feature a 10-foot-wide parallel parking lane.

The project has no start date because the funding has not been settled.

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Seven Lakes' historic season ends in state semis

GEORGETOWN — Seven Lakes set all kind of school records this season. The Spartans won a third straight district title, the first time the school had achieved such a feat. They got past the regional semifinal, a first for the program. Then they won in the regional final and clinched a state tournament berth for the first time in school history. “This whole season was an amazing feeling,” said senior left back Ty Koc. “I’ve been with this program for four years and this is by far just the most connected I’ve ever felt to a team. Jordan's run ends in state semifinal, but journey for group just beginning

GEORGETOWN— Jordan wasn’t supposed to be here.

down a Seven Lakes defense that likes to press high up the field.

The Spartans got a couple of good chances midway through the first half, and finally found the breakthrough in the 21st minute, when Abdullah Soliman got brought down in the box for a penalty, which Aidan Morrison stepped up to calmly convert.

"We played so well in the first half," Krueger said. "We controlled possession for most of it and we were making them chase the game."

Plano stepped up the pressure from there, as the Wildcats attempted to get back into the game. But Seven Lakes was able to respond and create chances of its own, neither team however converted as they went into the half with Seven Lakes holding a 1-0 lead.

"It's unfortunate the way this ended tonight," Koc said. "We had a bigger and better goal in mind. But at the end of the day, you have to look back at what we did this season and be happy. There was so much joy, we broke history and did things that this program has never done. We went into uncharted territory and I couldn't be more proud of my boys."

Things continued the same way through the start of the second half, as both teams went back and forth but struggled to create any kind of chances. But Plano continued to work themselves back into it and got the equalizer in the 60th minute, when Steven Wood sent in a cross from 35 yards out that Nolan Giles headed into the net.

Seven Lakes woke back up and as soon as the goal was scored pressed forward, trying to go back in front, but Plano kept countering and got their second in the 69th minute as Giles again scored, this time off a pass from Michael Rogers. And in the 77th minute, Rogers completed his hattrick off a rebound to make it a two goal lead for the Wildcats.

Seven Lakes tried to get back into things, throwing numbers forward, but the Plano defense, and Aidan Morrison trimmed the lead to one with two minutes remaining, but the Spartans couldn't find the equalizer before the game came to an end.

"I'm so proud of the way they fought back to get into it, it's the resolve and the resilience that these guys have had all year," Krueger said. "All it takes is a moment, and when you have a guy like Aidan Morrison, I promise you they hold their breath every time he gets a free kick. He's so selfless the way he played on the backline through these playoffs and that goal just shows what a truly special player he is."

The Spartans will graduate 12 seniors this year and they are part of a group that won three straight district championships. This was the most special season those seniors have had, but they also want it to be a stepping stone and they want bigger things for the underclassman.



nior catcher Kaylie Wyckoff. "Once we focused in and found the right mindset we discovered that toughness and it's really helped us."

It's the seventh straight outright district title for the Tigers, who have put together a 22-3 record and 10-1 district record so far this season. But it didn't always seem like an inevitability like in some years.

The Tigers actually started off district with a loss, the team's first district loss in eight seasons, the day after that game, the group got together and deciding to be better. And the Tigers have done just that, winning 10 straight games since that loss en route to the district championship.

"The biggest change was when we lost to Seven Lakes," said Katy head coach Kalum Haack. "I think it hit really hard with a lot of them because that was our first district loss in eight years. But I told them also that ballgame that it wasn't on them, it was on me. Since then, they have been a completely different team. They're hitting the ball, the defense is playing well and I'm just really pleased with how they've turned the corner since that game."

Katy's win over Taylor was a microcosm of how they've won all season, as they put together a strong offensive performance to go with dominant pitching and elite defense.

Katy put two runs up in the first inning, as Ashtyn Reichardt hit a sacrifice fly to get the Tigers on the

board before Cameryn Harrison reached on an error and another run scored.

Taylor held Katy at bay for the next two innings, before Katy got two more runs in the fourth, with an RBI double from Avery Porter and an RBI triple from Wyckoff and Katy got two more in the fifth from a Montgomery Henderson single and a Hailey Gore sacrifice fly.

"We were very impatient in our first few at bats," Wyckoff said. "We're not really used to seeing someone who is a bit slower with the ball but is very precise. We had to regroup and we realized that she will give you a strike eventually, you just have to wait. We had a lot more success once we did that."

The Tigers did the rest of their damage in the sixth to end the game. Erynne Castillo started the scoring by driving in Wyckoff before Henderson drove in a run with a single and Harrison doubled before Gore closed things out with an RBI single.

"We hit the ball really well all throughout the ballgame, we just hit it right to him," Haack said. "I told them after the game, you just keep doing the same thing you're doing and those hits will start to fall. We didn't really change up anything we did, we just have to keep hitting the ball hard. When it goes right to them, there's nothing you can do about it. I was really pleased with our defense pitching and how we hit, especially after

The win secures the one seed for Katy, who will play Morton Ranch on Friday before preparing for the playoffs.

"We focus on what we can control, and that's what we do," Haack said. "We work on certain aspects of the game so we know we'll be ready for anything anyone throws at us and that we can execute anytime we want to execute it. But playing in this district allows you to see all different styles of pitching and seeing all those things combined really helps us once we get to the playoffs because once you get there, you see a lot of the same thing."



Arjun Kumar and Ananya Sriniketh also made it to the regional tournament for Tompkins but weren't able to advance any further in good seasons for both.



chance just 13 minutes in, when their high press forced a bad turnover for Jordan, but Betancourt stepped up to make a save and keep things tied at zero.

Jordan got its first big chance off a set play on a free kick in the 26th minute. The initial ball went out wide, leading to a cross to an open player in the box, but the shot sailed over the bar. The two teams battled to a scoreless tie in the half, with Dripping Springs having the edge in possession but Jordan coming away with good chances as well.

Dripping Springs came out with relentless pressure to start the second half and Betancourt made multiple heroics to keep the War-

riors in the game.

In the 50th minute Betancourt had a man clear on goal, but made a save diving to his left to keep things tied before a second shot was blasted over the bar. Then two minutes later the same thing happened, but again Betancourt stepped up, making a leg save before the ball was cleared.

Betancourt ended the night with seven saves, keeping the Warriors in it until the end.

"He's had a big presence the whole season," Meekins said. "There were times in our district when we weren't the first team to have an opportunity and he would have to make the saves. He did that multiple

times tonight, he's just a guy back there that's a rock for us. He makes the big saves and he does all the little things that help us do well"

Dripping Springs continued to dominate the second half and finally found the breakthrough in the 72nd minute, when Adam Knutson found the back of the net by redirecting a cross when he was open in the box.

Jordan nearly found the equalizer in the 75th minute with a header off a free kick, but it bounced off the bar and the Warriors again had a chance with just over a minute left in the game. But the Dripping Springs keeper came up with a huge save to secure the Tigers' win.

"We battled," Meekins said. "We came back and had opportunities to tie it. We kept battling blocking and putting our bodies on the line. At the end of the day that's all you can ask your boys to do."

Jordan will join an extremely talented District 19-6A next season, and they know playing in games and environments like a state semifinal will help prepare them for the challenge.

"We're stepping into Katy ISD's 6A district next year," Meekins said. "Every game is going to be like one through nine. Every game is going to be a battle like that, so it's great to play that type of game — it shows the guys that they can play in that

type of game. Every game in district is going to be that or higher next year so it's important for our kids to see that. They grew up a lot these entire playoffs."

The loss stung for the Warriors, but they will get every member of their team back next year and the Warriors know they will do nothing but get better from here.

"We've already grown so much just this year," Betancourt said. "We didn't start great, but things eventually just lickered for us and our chemistry now is just unbeatable. Getting here, playing in this is just going to make us more confident and prepare us for success next year."




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
