

## Executives give updates on local nonprofit group activities

Leaders from three local nonprofit organizations gave updates for their respective groups at a Dec. 6 meeting of the Katy Area Economic Development Council.

Tracey Brown is executive director of Amazing Place, which helps people who are suffering from dementia. David Brown is executive director of The Ballard House, which provides temporary housing for patients undergoing medical care and their families. Deysi Crespo is executive director of Katy Christian Ministries, which provides social services, including support for domestic abuse and sexual assault victims, as well as a food pantry.

The meeting took place at the Embassy Suites, 16435 Katy Freeway.

Tracey Brown said Amazing Place, which is governed by 16 churches, has programs for family caregiver support and for community education. While both programs are important, Amazing Place is working to educate the public about dementia.

"We offer a lot of caregiver education and support groups," Brown said, adding that Amazing Grace partners with churches to help identify and assist older

## Police investigating fatal shooting at children's hospital

## **CONTRIBUTED REPORT**

Houston police are investigating the fatal shooting of a woman and apparent suicide of a man at Texas Children's Hospital West Campus, 18200 Katy Fwy. The shootings occurred at about 2 p.m. Dec. 4.

The identities of the female victim and the man are pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

Houston police officers responded to a shooting in the parking lot of the hospital. There, they found a female inside the hospital with a gunshot wound. Hospital personnel pronounced her dead. A man was found unresponsive in a parked vehicle outside the hospital. He was pronounced dead with an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound.

A preliminary investigation indicated the male and female knew each other, and were possibly in a dating relationship.

The department continues to investigate the matter. Anyone with more information in this case is asked to contact the Houston Police Homicide Division at 713-308-3600.

## When's the best time of year to sell?



people who need help. Amazing Grace is working to develop its own facility. Presently, its local office is in The Hub, 5614 1st St., in Downtown Katy, But it is raising money for a new facility. Brown said \$12.2 million has been raised, with \$14 million being the goal for the groundbreaking. The overall fundraising goal is \$20 million, she said.

David Brown recently took over as executive director at The Ballard House, though he was a longtime director before taking on his new assignment. He described The Ballard house is a "home away from home" that has been around since 2006. He said it has offered over 66,000 nights of no-cost lodging for patients and their families.

Brown said The Ballard House has hired a live-in hostess, and is growing its volunteer base to support its guests even better. He said The Ballard House is en-

couraging more community groups to provide meals and asking more churches to provide worship and fellowship opportunities with its guests.

To support these activities, Brown said The Ballard House is asking businesses to support its mission

through sponsoring and attending fundraisers. Also, Brown said, The Ballard House is increased its grant writing activities to secure more funds. He urged the audience to remember corporate matches.

Crespo said KCM, founded in 1984 by nine churches during an economic downturn, has had an active year. Through October, she said, KCM's social services has helped 12,150 families. The food pantry has provided over 1.2 million meals to 6,861 households. She said this is about 1.5 million pounds of food and fresh produce.

The crisis center has also been active, providing crisis intervention to 1,714 domestic violence and sexual abuse victims, Crespo said.

In addition to the presentations, the Morton Ranch Choir, under the direction of choir director David Van Wyk, sang holiday music before the meeting.

model trees. Baker scoured the internet for other items. Many of the items came from hobby shops across the country. Most of the equipment is 60-70 years old, he said. But the equipment is compatible. The old parts are made to work with the new parts.

Some have donated financially to help Baker secure equipment. City Administrator Byron Hebert and his assistant, Lindsay Kerr, have also helped with a small budget, Baker said.

Baker said he comes in as often as he can when the museum is open to run the train. He said many parents who watch him operate the train are living vicariously backwards. He understands, he said, because he has done the same thing.

But living vicariously backwards and

operating the train are two different things. Baker said he does not usually let others operate the train because of the age and delicacy of the equipment.

Baker said Katy owes much of its history to railroads. Over the years, Baker said, Katy had passenger traffic on those trains. But now, thanks to automobiles and expanded freeways, the rail lines have gone by the wayside and most train lines go out of Houston parallel to US 290, or to Sugar Land.

"The MKT Railroad was the Missouri-Kansas-Texas line," Baker said. "Katy's name came from the train. It was a big train depot because of rice farming. That's what built Katy, oil and rice farming and the trains."

facepainting and stick horseracing.

A hall of history will discuss the community's German heritage. It will also feature local family history displays and a history of Pattison's incorporation. Longtime local residents will lead campfire talks, where they will share their memories.

States today. But Pattison enjoyed prosperity thanks to having a railroad.

According to the city website, the Pattison community was established in 1877. That year, the family of James Tarrant Pattison, for whom the community is named, granted the Texas Western Narrow Gauge Railroad a path

to incorporate. In January 1973, he said, Pattison voters elected their first council members and marshal. Allen Taylor was the city's first mayor, serving from 1972-1985. Garcia was been mayor since 2016.

"We want to remember what happened 50 years ago," Garcia said. "We're glad to be where we are today. I hope we can preserve some of our community and the rustic, rural way that we enjoy now."

Garcia said the area where the city of Pattison now sits has a history that goes back to the 1820s. Texas was

part of Spain then. Texas became part of Mexico when Mexico won its independence from Spain.

Stephen F. Austin, today remembered as the Father of Texas for bringing American settlers to the area during that time, created the San Felipe community about nine miles to the west.

Most Texans know the rest of the state's story, from the 1836 Texas Revolution to being a part of the United through their property. The Pattison family also donated land for the townsite. James Tarrant

The railroad closed its Pattison operation in 1899. At one time, Garcia said, Pattison was the second largest community in Waller County.



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

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## Decorative holiday symbols add to seasonal celebrations



Families around the world use decorative holiday symbols to add to their seasonal celebrations.

Decorating homes and other spaces is a major component of the holiday season. Holiday decorations often reflect celebrants' religious beliefs, and the following are some traditional holiday decor symbols for people of various faiths.

### Christmas tree: Christian or secular Christmas symbol

Few things evoke thoughts of Christmastime quite like a towering evergreen parked front and center in a home's picture window. Christmas trees are believed to date back to sixteenth century Germany. The custom ultimately arrived

in America when the country welcomed an influx of German immigrants. It is widely believed that various non-Christian cultures may have used evergreen plants indoors in celebration of the winter solstice, which suggests Christmas trees may pre-date Christian symbolism.



### Menorah: Jewish Chanukah symbol

Menorahs are seven-armed candelabras used in Jewish religious worship. To mark the Chanukah celebration, a special nine-armed hanukkiah is displayed for eight days and nights. A candle is lit each day to commemorate the miracle of oil lasting in the rededicated Temple after the Maccabees' successful uprising against the Syrian Greeks. The menorah typically is placed in a highly visible spot, such as the front window of a home or in a high-traffic living space.



## Kinara and Mishumaa Saba: Kwanzaa cultural symbol

The Kinara (candle holder) and the Mishumaa Samba (the seven candles) are symbolic of Kwanzaa. The candles and holder represent the Seven Principles, or the minimum set of values by which African people are urged to live.

## Baby New Year: Secular symbol

Baby New Year is a popular promotional symbol used to commemorate the dawn of a new year. The baby represents rebirth and may be traced back to the ancient Greeks or Egyptians.



Historians say the Greeks believed that their god of wine, Dionysus, was reborn on New Year's Day as the spirit of fertility. While people may not decorate with Baby New Year figurines, they do participate in "First Baby" competitions, which celebrate those infants born in the opening moments of a new year.

## Advent wreath: Roman Catholic, Anglican and Lutheran, among others, Christian symbol

The Advent wreath is used by various Christian denominations and draws attention to the weeks preceding Christmas. A new candle is lit on the wreath each Sunday at mass to prepare the faithful to receive the Lord Jesus.



## Nativity scene: Christian Christmas symbol

It's customary for nativity scenes to be included in Christmas decor schemes. The nativity depicts the birth of Christ and typically includes a manger, Mary, Joseph, shepherds, various animals, an angel, and the three visiting Magi. The infant Jesus also is included, though some people prefer to wait until the after the stroke of midnight on Christmas Eve to place Jesus in the manger. Live nativity scenes also are commonplace around Christmas. Saint Francis of Assisi is credited with creating the first live nativity scene in 1223.

The current exhibit closed Nov. 28 and will reopen Dec. 18, the first day of Hanukkah. Bible Seminary President, Dr. K. Lynn Lewis extends an invitation to gather at 5 p.m. on the porch of Grace Fellowship Church, 2655 S. Mason Road. Katy holds off C.E. King Tigers make third straight state semifinal

Katy withstood a haymaker on Friday. Katy had a gameplan coming into the Class 6A-Division II Region III Final to contain the King run game and the team's biggest threat in Keith Willis Jr., but King knew that Katy would be prepared and countered with something unexpected.

Instead of leaning on their workhorse like they had all season, King went away from him and instead attacked solely through the air, throwing a wrench into everything Katy had planned for.

But The Tigers weathered the storm, adjusted and attacked, like so many of the great Tigers teams have done, and in the end came out 56-34 winners, advancing to the Class 6A-Division II state semifinal. "We had a gameplan coming in, but they did the exact opposite of what we had planned for," said senior safety Johnathan Hall. "But we stayed calm with it — we know how good we are as a team and we got to halftime made the adjustments and then found a way to come out and execute in the second half to get the win."

The game couldn't have started in better fashion for Katy. Seth Davis took a handoff 69-yards for a touchdown on the first play of the game and then after Katy forced a punt, Davis took a handoff on the Tigers next offensive snap and ran in a score from 42-yards out to make things 14-0 Katy with less than a minute off the clock in the first quarter.

But King came right back with punches of their own. Denim Johnson ran in a nine yard score late in the first quarter to trim the Katy lead to seven before Rae'G Dailey took a punt return 89-yards for a touchdown in the second to make things a one-point Katy lead.

But Davis had the answer again, running in a 26-yard touchdown, and after King made things a one-point game again Davis ran in a 40-yard score to increase the Katy lead again before King once again trimmed the lead down to one point at half.

Davis carried the Tigers offensively throughout the night, carrying the ball 23 times for 293 yards and six touchdowns to lead Katy to the win.

"That kid is just a special, good football player," said Katy head coach Gary Joseph. "I think a lot of people are seeing that right now — you don't see people in a state

The applicant is storing natural gas in the Yegua Formation, Fulshear (Hillebrenner) Field, KST Katy Lease, amending Well Nos. 3, 8A, and 12. The Facility is located 2 miles in the southeast direction from Katy, in the Fulshear (Hillebrenner) Field, in Fort Bend County. The gas storage reservoir is located in the subsurface depth interval from 6872 feet to 7699 feet. The request in this application is to amend the permit removing the temporary exceptions granted grated by the RRC on Well Nos. 8A and 12. The temporary exceptions were granted regarding minimum packer depths on the referenced Injection wells. With the amended permit, the No. 8A well will be reclassified as an Observation well. The packer on the No. 12 well was lowered during a workover and now complies with the packer depth restrictions in the original permit. Enstor is not seeking to increase the size of the gas storage facility or to change the location of any surface facilities. ## Texans lose in Watson's return despite stellar defense

The Texans' defense stepped up on Sunday.

Houston's defense did everything it could to try and get the team a win in Deshaun Watson's return game to NRG, forcing two turnovers and limiting the Browns' offense every time they touched it throughout the game.

But as good as the Texans' defense was, the team's offense was equally as bad, and it ended with the Texans falling to the Browns 27-14, as the Browns handed the Texans their seventh straight loss.

The Browns did it all without scoring one offensive touchdown, as they scored two defensive touchdowns and a special teams touchdown on the way to a victory where the Texans' defense was severely let down by the team's other units.

"The story of the game was the turnover ratio," said Texans head coach Lovie Smith. "When you talk about non offensive touchdowns and they have three of them and two of them because of our turnovers, we have to protect the ball better. We had opportunities in the redzone and weren't able to cash in. Dameon Pierce played well, but we didn't do anything in the passing game. We have to do a better job as coaches because offensively, you can't win a game playing like that."

The first half was a struggle between two stagnant and struggling offenses.

Kyle Allen threw an interception on the Texans' first play from scrimmage, a ball that could have been caught but bounced in the air off a receivers hands. But the Texans' defense didn't allow anything out of it.

But the Texans stepped up to force a three and out, and on the Browns' next offensive possession, the Texans forced a fumble that immediately put the Houston offense in field goal range. The Texans' of-

fense put together a ten-play drive after that but was forced to settle for a 44-yard field goal as Houston took the lead.

The Texans' defense continued their strong play after that, forcing another turnover on the Browns' next drive, as Jalen Pitre intercepted a pass in the endzone, and the Texans' offense took the ball all the way down to the Browns 1-yard line but ultimately turning the ball over on downs without Dameon Pierce getting a touch at the goal-line.

The Texans' defense though, added to the lead on the next drive by forcing a safety on a Nick Chubb

But the Texans' offense continued to do nothing, punting on both of their next two possessions and the Browns took the lead when Donovan Poeples-Jones returned a punt 76-yards for a touchdown late in the second quarter, as the Browns led 7-5 at half.

Watson struggled in his return from an 11-game suspension, throwing for only 131 yards and an interception as the Texans' defense kept Houston in it for as long as they could.

The defense played well tonight," Smith said. "Whenever you can keep an NFL offense out of the endzone for a full game, especially

with the amount of firepower they have, it's a good performance. I like a lot of the things we did, taking the ball away and giving the offense second chances, but their defense outplayed even that today.

The third quarter started the same way the first half went, with the Texans' defense stepping up and the Texans' offense trying to give the game away. After forcing he Browns to punt, the Texans' offense took over at their own goal-line and Allen fumbled on a quarterback sneak, which Denzel Ward picked up and returned four yards for a touchdown as the Browns built a nine-point lead without the team's

offense putting up a point.

"Eventually we have to have some production on offense," Smith said. "You have to score points. We were good defensively, holding them and taking the ball away which is exactly what we've been stressing, to give the offense opportunities. But you have to take advantage of that offensively. We got in the redzone and had opportunities but we have to convert on those."

The Texans trimmed things down to a seven-point deficit on their next drive with a 35-yard field goal but the Browns' offense finally broke through with a score of their own on a 44-yard field goal to bring the lead back to nine midway through the fourth quarter.

And the Texan's offense sealed things in the Browns' favor on the next drive when Allen threw an interception which Tony Fields returned 16-yards for a touchdown to increase the Browns' lead to three scores

The Texans got a late score on a 6-yard pass from Allen to Nico Collins, but it wasn't nearly enough as the Texans could not do anything with it after.

Houston ended the day without just the one touchdown and only 283 yards of total offense. Things will only get more difficult as they travel to play the Dallas Cowboys next week before the Kansas City Chiefs come to Houston in two weeks.

'We have to continue to play," Smith said. "We're going to highlight the good things we did defensively but continue to get better and then offensively and special teams wise, it's not good enough and we have to raise our game. It's really as simple as that, we understand what the record is. We lost the game today but those are the type of things we have to emphasize each player has to look at how they played. It's just putting that together and being better."

That's where it all starts. Texas Tech almost won a national championship, Baylor did win it and Texas has always had a great program. TCU is growing too — there's just so many great coaching staffs and systems in our state."




The Cougars are competing in their 15th bowl game in the last 18 seasons – the most in the state of Texas in that span.
