Council approves software purchase for police-operated drones

The Katy City Council Feb. 27 approved the purchase of software that

enables the police department's drone program to broadcast a live video feed to police and other emergency management personnel, and improve safety of officers, first responders and the public.

In a memorandum to the council urging the purchase, Police Chief Noe Diaz wrote that the software would enable better allocation of resources and personnel

Ballots set for May 6 municipal, school board elections

Area voters will have plenty of choices to make in the upcoming May 6 general election. Here is an overview of who has filed for what office in Katy, Brookshire and Pattison.

City of Katy

At its Feb. 27 meeting, the Katy City Council voted to declare incumbent Council Memberat-Large Chris Harris and Ward B Council Member Rory Robertson elected, as neither drew an opponent. Harris is a public safety consultant. Robertson is a financial advisor.

The third council member who is up for election, Janet Corte, a retired IT manager, drew an opponent in Cara Bonin, a contractor.

Harris and Corte are the longest-serving council members. Both were first elected to twoyear terms in 2018 and re-elected to three-year terms in 2020 after Katy voters changed the city charter. Harris and Robertson will take office for their final terms in May, as will the winner of the Corte-Bonin race. Harris and Robertson will be serving their final term under term limits, as will Corte if re-elected.



Local boy expected to live after shooting

A 17-year-old male is being charged with aggravated assault following a shooting that occurred Feb. 28 in the 1000 block of Apache Falls Drive in the Cimarron subdivision, the Harris County Sheriff said.

Nathan O'Rourke, the 17-yearold, was with a 15-year-old friend, handling a gun, that went off and wounded the 15-year-old, Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said in a tweet. The 15-year-old was struck in the chest.

The 15-year-old was taken by LifeFlight to a local hospital, where he was reported in fair condition and expected to survive, Gonzalez said.

Fort Bend Sheriff's office arrests man for prostitution

Fort Bend Sheriff's Office Human Trafficking Unit detectives Feb. 23 arrested a woman on a prostitution charge at a massage business in the 25700 block of Westheimer Parkway.

The arrest came after detectives and the Fort Bend County district attorney's office investigated the business. The sheriff's office said Yan Yuan, 37, of Fort Bend County, was arrested, charged with prostitution and has been released on bond.

This case has been turned over to Fort Bend County Attorney's Office for further review.

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

Rivas, a 2009 graduate of Katy High, said he has had an interest in chess since childhood. By his own admission, he's "always been OK" at the game, which said he learned from his older brother.

When he joined the Paetow faculty, he learned he wasn't the only one with an interest in chess. But having a school chess team? That was another matter.

"We started out not having a sponsor for chess," Rivas said. "One of my kids asked me if I wanted to be a sponsor. I was reluctant at first, but he was persistent."

Rivas went for it. He asked other sponsors around the school and district how to go about becoming a team sponsor.

Chess players make a commitment just as their athletic counterparts do, Rivas said.

"I can't speak for other clubs, but our players practice after school, from 2:35-4 p.m.," Rivas

said. "They come in and they play." From his discussions with other sponsors, Rivas said, someone suggested holding a district chess tournament. Each team brought in its four best players. Include the sponsors, parents and volunteers, and suddenly the tournament became an event that, ideally, can become an annual thing. Perhaps it could expand beyond that, to include teams from other districts.

"As I was looking into it, it looked as if many ISDs have tournaments," Rivas said. Yet, contrary to what many believe, chess is not an elite game. Anybody can play chess, Rivas said.

"All they need is to be steered in the right direction," Rivas said. "It doesn't matter what kind of background or knowledge you have. It's a great game."

to better manage active scenes, whether they be disasters, looking for wanted, lost or missing persons and search and rescue operations.

"If there's a lost child, an elderly person missing from home, we can pop it up in infrared and we can get there before the helicopter does," Diaz said.

Speaking to the council at its meeting, Diaz said the purchase the council was being asked to make was just for software. Eventually, he said, new, more sophisticated drones would be needed, but not at this time.

"This is just a software," Diaz said. "We're getting way ahead of other police departments with this science. The software that we're purchasing allows us to track everything we use the drones for."

Diaz told the council that

the drone has about a threemile range because of nearby airports. He said police needed flight controller permission before using the drones, but such approval was regular. While discussing what the drones could do, the drone was actually in operation just outside City Hall. An officer was operating the drone and council members could see the live feed of City Hall, the Katy Harvest Plaza across the street, and local traffic. He said the drone was primarily for the city's business district, and also for Katy neighborhoods. A key difference of the new software, he said, was that the police can track data it could not in the past.

In his memo, Diaz wrote that the software integrates with the drones that the police already own. It maintains flight logs and all pertinent data that exceeds what the FAA requires. In this way, Diaz wrote, the department is relieved of potential liability in case of audit or accidents.

The contract is with Drone-Sense Software, an Austin-based company. Diaz said agencies around the state use the software. Diaz recommended that the initial contract be purchased through the police department's asset forfeiture fund.

"It's time for us to really step up and protect the community," Diaz said.

Katy ISD

Positions 3, 4 and 5 are on the ballot. Position 3 incumbent Ashley Vann, a longtime volunteer and board member, and Position 4 incumbent Leah Wilson, who is retired from the U.S. Air Force, are not seeking re-election. Position 5 incumbent Greg Schulte is seeking re-election.

Three candidates have filed for the position 3 seat. They are Bruce Bradford, a mortgage loan originator; Shana Peterson, who is retired, and Amy Thieme, a realtor.

Three candidates have filed for the position 4 seat. They are Erica Brettell, a stay-at-home mother; Morgan Calhoun, a stay-at-home mother, and Cicely Taylor, an education administrator.

In addition to Schulte, an engineer and business owner, two other candidates have filed for the position 5 seat. They are Mary Ellen Cuzela, a Katy ISD substitute teacher, and Shawn Miller, a professor.

City of Brookshire

The Brookshire city election features a rematch between former Mayor Eric Scott, who served from 2013-19, and incumbent Mayor Darrell Branch, who defeated Scott that year.

Position 1 incumbent Monique Taylor is unopposed in her re-election bid. Position 2 incumbent Lyndon

Stamps is not seeking re-election. Running for the seat are Tony McAnelly, a retired nonprofit executive, and Jimmy Sanders, a write-in candidate.

City of Pattison

The incumbents holding positions 3, 4 and 5—Robert McCallum, Seth Stokes and Randall Flowers, respectively—are not seeking re-election. Only one of the three races is contested.

For position 3, Ken Coulter, who is retired, is running unopposed.

For position 4, Wesley Sandy Buller, who is self-employed, is running unopposed.

For position 5, Daphney Kirby, who is a business owner, faces Princella Beckley Lazard, who is a bus monitor.

Royal ISD

Royal ISD trustee terms are decided in the November election. However, the district has a \$144 million bond on the May ballot for voters to consider.

For the past 19 years, we've observed each of her birthdays by throwing elaboratelythemed celebrations with designer cakes (usually featuring


"horsies"), multiple trips to the local party store and (sometimes) frantic do-it-yourself plumbing in the aftermath of a slumber party.

A memorial service will be held at a later date.




MARY RUTH HARRELL 1945-2023

In the event they wander, law enforcement has their information ahead of time and can track the individual's bracelet using the latest technology to bring them home safely.

The second session consisted of hypothetical scenarios where officers were put to the test on their capabilities using a receiver to find the missing subject during a practice search.

Seven Lakes is out to make history. The Spartans have set their sights high from the beginning of the season and have met their expectations every step along the way

From a district title, to an unbeaten district season, to getting further in the playoffs than the team did last year, Seven Lakes has found a way to keep reaching its goals.

The biggest challenge came Monday, as the Spartans faced Stratford in a matchup where the winner clinched a spot in the Class 6A Region III Tournament.

Seven Lakes once again found a way, as the Spartans came out 66-61 winners over Stratford, overcoming a stiff test and clinching

a spot in the regional tournament for the first time in 11 years.

"It's the best feeling, it's great," said junior point guard A.J. Bates. "For us to be able to get to this point and for us all to be together, it's just special. This was what we set out to do. We wanted to go and put our name in the record books and we've done that. But we want to keep making history."

It's the first time since 2012 that the Spartans will be making the trip to the regional tournament, and it's a team advancing that is already putting its named in the record books at Seven Lakes, as the win on Monday, the 34th of the season, set the record for the Spartans most wins in any season ever.

'This is just a huge accomplishment and



I'm so happy they get to experience this."

But the Warriors are used to a challenge, and they aren't about to stop believing in themselves at this point.





The Dash announced last week that they had signed Tompkins graduate Bárbara Olivieri to a one-year deal with an option for the 2024 season.





Houston loses to East Carolina, falls to third place in conference

In a battle for second place in the American Athletic Conference standings entering the final seven days of the season, East Carolina topped Houston 88-83 in triple overtime on Wednesday night in Williams Arena.

Senior Bria Patterson scored a career-high 27 points and set a school record by playing 54 minutes in the game while redshirt senior Britney Onyeje nearly tallied a double-double with 19 points and a career-high eight steals. Graduate Tatyana Hill registered her sixth double-double of the season with 10 points and 14 rebounds.

Plagued by five key players fouling out in the game, Houston (11-15, 8-5 American) scored just three points in the third overtime. The Cougars now lead the country by playing their fifth overtime game and they have played a nation-lead
