Hurricane doesn't keep **City Council** from meeting

It was business as usual for the Katy City Council, despite a category one hurricane moving through the area earlier in the day on Monday, July 8. A quorum was present, although Councilmember Dan Smith was absent.

Council held three public hearings for requested zoning changes:

• Approved a request by DNJ Houston Investment Partners I LTD, ET AL for inclusion of 5.803 acres in the City of Katy's extraterritorial jurisdiction. The property at 27735 Katy Freeway is the site of Vanguard Truck Centers which opened the 38,000 square foot full-service Volvo and Mack Trucks location on April 2,2018.

• Denied a request for a zoning change from "R-1" single family to "C-1" commercial

KISD sustains state financial transparency recognition

Beryl barrels through Katy area

Hurricane Beryl moved through the greater Katy area on July 8 as a category 1 hurricane, bringing over eight inches of rain and strong winds with gusts up to 75 mph. The storm made landfall near Matagorda Bay at about 4 a.m. Monday, and winds and rain reached the Katy area around 7 a.m., lasting until early afternoon. The intense winds damaged trees and created debris across the region while drainage systems were challenged by the rainfall. Beryl was downgraded to a tropical storm around 11 a.m.

The City of Katy issued various alerts throughout the day Monday, ranging from flood advisories and flash flood warnings to updates on trash pickup and city office closures and notification that the meeting of city council would take place as scheduled.

The recent storm also caused widespread power outages across the region, with over 2 million CenterPoint customers without power

for a 2.63 acre property located in the Firethorne/Spring Green area. Four area residents spoke against the change during public comments, stating that the property is completely surrounded by homes and that the commercial site would worsen traffic and endanger children at nearby school bus stops. The site was said to be planned for use as an ABA therapy center.

• Denied a request for vacating a portion of rightof-way at the intersection of T Street and Sanford Street. Councilmember Janet Corte, who said that she drove the area prior to the meeting, said that the city should maintain control of the property since it is used for drainage for the neighborhood. Councilmember Rory Robertson said that he saw no advantage to the city in giving up the property.

late Monday, according to CenterPoint data reported by broadcast outlets in the Houston area. As part of the Katy ISD's ongoing partnership efforts with local agencies serving the Katy community, Katy ISD coordinated with CenterPoint Energy to open up Rhodes and Legacy Stadium parking lots as a staging area for the CenterPoint trucks and crews supporting area response needs.

"We wanted you to be aware of this in case there were any concerns regarding the activity in the Katy ISD stadium parking lots this week," said a district spokesperson in a July 9 press release.

Many neighborhoods in the Katy area remained without power as of press time on Tuesday. The retail center in the 500 block of S. Fry Road, where a Target store and a Randall's Supermarket are located, was completely closed early Tuesday. Residents in the Cinco Ranch area reported that traffic signals in their area were not working.

Internet service was also spotty following the storm. Fidium Fiber issued this statement on Facebook on Monday: "Our Emergency Operations Center is deploying generators and backup power where feasible to restore services. If your service has been impacted, please visit our Support page https://bit.ly/4eT157w for troubleshooting tips." The statement also gave the customer service number as 1-844-968-7224 and advised that call wait times were longer than usual.

Suspect arrested on animal cruelty charges

On June 28, 2024, Fort Bend Precinct 1 Constable deputies responded to an urgent veterinarian clinic in Cinco Ranch to the report of an injured animal. Investigation determined that during an argument with his wife at his residence in Richmond, the suspect allegedly caused injuries to her Teacup Pomeranian. Video shows the suspect grabbing the dog by the rear legs and swinging the dog over his head, slamming the dog into a doghouse several times and then discarding the animal into the yard. The dog was pronounced dead at the veterinarian office. Pengfei Ji, 31 years old, was taken into custody by Precinct 1 deputies for third degree felony Cruelty to Animals and booked into the Fort Bend County Jail. "This just leaves me speechless", said Constable Chad Norvell. "I'm glad we were able to put him in jail and that he'll face justice for his horrendous actions."



The Texas Armed Services Scholarship Program (TASSP) is now open for application, according to the July 2 newsletter from the office of State Representative Mike Schofield who represents District 132 which includes a large portion of the Katy area.

The scholarship is designed to financially assist high school graduates who are working toward completing a baccalaureate degree and a current member of one of the branches of the armed forces; or are in the process of becoming a commissioned officer of any of the branches of the armed forces including:

- Texas Army National Guard
- Texas Air National Guard
- Texas State Guard
- United States Coast Guard

• United States Merchant Marine The recipients of the TASSP will

receive the lesser amount of either \$15,000 or "an amount not to exceed the student's cost of attendance less the total amount a student will earn for that academic year for being under contract with one of the branches of the armed services of the United States" (Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Student Loans).

Each year the Governor and Lieutenant Governor of Texas have the privilege of appointing two students, and every Texas State House Representative and Texas State Senator may appoint one



student, the newsletter said. The student must meet two of the following requirements:

• Be on track to graduate high school in a Distinguished Achievement Program or International Baccalaureate program.

• Maintain a high school GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

• Be ranked in the top third of the students' high school graduating class.

• Achieve an SAT score of 1070 or ACT score of 23.

"Our office requests all applications to be submitted by July 31, 2024," said the newsletter. 
Cinco Ranch led the way on the District 19-6A first team, placing six players on the first team after clinching a district title and going three rounds deep in the playoffs.

For the second team, Jordan's Nolan Dusek was named the catcher, Jordan's Luis Vera made the team at first base.







Two Katy ISD student athletes were named MVPs of the Class 6A Track and Field Super Elite Teams, with Tompkins' Jayden Keys being named the boys' MVP and London Jackson-Bray being named the MVP of the girls' team.

Keys, a Tompkins graduate capped off his high school career at the state meet in May, winning the Athlete of the Meet Award by taking gold in the long jump and 300-meter hurdles, while coming in second in the 110-meter hurdles. Katy's Jackson-Bray finished second in the 100-meter dash, also coming in fifth in the 200-meter dash at the girls' state meet to help earn the girls' MVP.

On the boys' side, Katy's Adam Carter, Mayde Creek's Elijah Ferguson, Jordan's James Ledbetter and Tompkins' Jhase McMillan were named to the boys super elite team.

Carter earned a silver medal at the state meet, while Ferguson came in third in the 400-meter dash, Ledbetter came in second in the 300-meter hurdles and Jhase McMillan medaled with a third place finish in the 200-meter dash.

For the girls, Katy's Elizabeth Brooks was the only other Katy ISD student-athlete named to the team with Jackson-Bray. Brooks came in fourth place in the 800-meter run at the state meet.

The Texas High School Coaches Association Super Elite Teams consist of high school players nominated by current members of the THSCA and the players must meet the award criteria to be nominated. The award recognizes student athletes across the state for their exemplary athletic achievement in their respective sport.


