KISD board approves bonus for classroom teachers

The Katy Independent School District's Board of Trustees held a special board meeting on Tuesday, July 16 at 11 a.m. at the Martha Lopez Aki ECI Project Tyke Center, 6301 S. Stadium Lane in Katy to discuss and consider action on a one-time lump sum payment for classroom teachers. Board President Victor Perez has said in prior board meetings that the lump sum payment is part of the district's plan to retain classroom teachers.

But trustees differed on the

Katy mayor signs disaster declaration

In response to the impact of Hurricane Beryl, President Biden has approved a major disaster declaration for Texas, extending federal funding to 67 counties including Fort Bend, Harris, and Waller County for recovery efforts, according to a press release from the City of Katy.

Concurrently, Mayor William

H. Thiele signed a Declaration of Local State of Disaster on the morning of July 11 for the City of Katy, in order to enhance local response and recovery efforts combatting Hurricane Beryl's effects. This action enables Katy to potentially receive reimbursement, aiding in the city's recovery efforts and debris management following Hurricane Beryl, city staff said.





neighborhood. Please review the following guidelines to ensure a smooth and efficient process within the City of Katy:

Debris Preparation (stack separately by these categories)

• Vegetative Debris: stacks of tree branches.

• Fence Debris: Stack damaged fencing in sections no larger than 6' x 8'. Do not bind the sections.

Placement

• Place separated debris by the curb. Ensure it is clear of obstacles such as fire hydrants and mailboxes to facilitate collection. Keep it separate from regular garbage, which will be collected by Texas Pride as per your regular schedule.

Accessibility

• Do not block ingress/egress points, public walkways, or drainage outlets with debris for safety and access reasons.

Collection Details

• Starting July 16th (as the Katy Times was going to press for this issue), crews from Ceres Environmental were to begin collection Monday through Friday until all areas of the city are covered.

• The route will be strategic based on the debris contractor's assessment.

Regular Garbage Services

• Texas Pride Disposal services

resumed regular service on Monday, July 15th. Bagged vegetative debris (grass clippings/leaves/small branches) or bundled limbs should be placed with regular garbage.

Service & Collection Guidelines for Texas Pride Disposal

• Household Garbage: Place waste in the cart near the curb by 7 a.m.

• Heavy Trash: Each week, up to three bulky items like furniture or appliances can be placed next to the garbage cart.

• Yard Debris: Weekly collection includes up to 15 bags (not exceeding 35 pounds each) of yard debris. Branches should be tied in bundles (less than 2" in diameter and cut to 4-foot lengths), limited to 4-cubic yards per service day. Commercial tree services must handle their own limbs.






After almost three hours of spirited discussion, the board voted 5-2 to approve a plan that would reward classroom teachers at "benchmark years of service" at five, ten, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, 40, 45 and 50 years or service, including service outside Katy ISD. The plan, which includes classroom teachers only as defined by Texas Education Agency rules, would start with \$250.00 at five years of service, increasing by \$250.00 at each "benchmark" tier until the "25 years of

service" tier when payouts increase.

Perez said that the plan would cost the district about \$855,000.00 in its first year of implementation and would issue payouts to about 1154 of the district's approximately 7,000 classroom teachers. There is already \$775,000.00 allocated in the upcoming budget for a lump sum payout, he said.

Trustees Perez, Thieme, Cuzela, Morgan Calhoun and Lance Redmon voted in favor of the plan. Trustees Rebecca Fox and Dawn Champagne voted against the plan, saying that more information as well as more public input was needed.

The next board meeting, which is a workstudy meeting, is scheduled for July 22 at 5 p.m. at the Board Room in the Education Support Complex at 6301 S. Stadium Lane in Katy.

SEAT sends letter to more than 1000 Texas school superintendents

Students Engaged in Advancing Texas (SEAT), a student-led movement founded in Katy which demonstrates youth visibility in educational policymaking, delivered a letter on June 19 to more than 1,000 superintendents of Texas public schools to clarify federal legal guidance, to condemn Gov. Abbott's refusal to accept Title IX protections, and to urge districts to uphold their duty to support and embrace all Texas students.

The letter (available



Dear Superintendent,

June 26, 2024

We, the undersigned, are writing to express our profound disappointment and strong condemnation of the state administration's active refusal to accept Title IX protections as interpreted by the federal government and its releatless audacity to challenge the law in court at the express of the people of Texas. Enforcing Title IX is a necessary step to uphold the law's fundamental principle and within the spirit of its original intent.

Since its inception in 1972, Title IX has been a cornerstone of educational equity, designed to protect all students, not just eisgender girls and women, from discrimination based on sex. This federal law

"These protections under the Title IX reforms bring us one step closer to equality with our has played a crucial role in ensuring that every student, regardless of gender identity or expressio can pursue their education in a safe and inclusive environment.

The new guidelines were updated in order to clarify, and thus fully effectuate, the existing protections under Title IX, ensuring that all students, including transgender and gender expansive individuals, are shielded from the very discrimination that school districts and our state as a whole have pushed with increasing frequency and scope in recent years.

Recently, Texas has wasted taxpayer dollars on frivolous federal lawsuits aiming to narrow the scope of Title IX protections. Specifically, Texas is trying to sidestep Title IX nondiscrimination protections at the expense of LGBTQIA+ students, which defies the recent decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in *Bostock v. Chayton Countr,* 140 S. Cu. 1731 (2020), and the consensus among other federal courts, such as Whitaker v. Kenesab Unified School District No. 1, 858 F.3d 1034 (7th Cir. 2017).

cisgender and heterosexual peers. To try and block those protections shows that it was never about protecting the children, but protecting bigotry."

"For many trans youth, the friendships and community built in school are a sanctuary space," said Landon Richie, Policy Associate at TENT. "Trans students deserve to participate in school activities and foster community in schools without discrimination. Title IX has helped make this possible, and it's up to educators and administration to ensure trans students have a safe and open school environment by upholding Title IX."

"The ruthless attacks from Texas' anti-LGBTQIA+ leadership can never erase the powerful, beautiful existence of LGBTQIA+ people in our state. All Texans deserve to be protected from hate and discrimination wherever they are, but especially in the halls of our public schools where every child should be uplifted and supported," said Marti Bier, Vice President of Programs at Texas Freedom Network. "It is imperative that Texas superintendents obey federal law and updated Title IX guidelines, regardless of political pressure from leaders motivated by hate and cruelty. We're calling on every superintendent in Texas to refuse to let themselves become political pawns, and prioritize the safety of LGBTQIA+ students in our public schools."

A district spokesperson for Katy ISD told the Katy Times in a July 12 email that the school district had not yet received the letter.

FEMA offers aid for storm-damaged houses of worship

FEMA may provide funds to houses of worship and other private nonprofit organizations to help pay for emergency protective measures, debris removal and restoration of facilities damaged by the storms and flooding April 26-June 5 in Texas, the agency said in a June 26 press release.

FEMA's Public Assistance (PA) program may cover costs to repair or replace damaged facilities or provide funding for hazard mitigation measures during the recovery process.

• The house of worship must be owned or operated by a private nonprofit organization and have sustained damage caused by the storms.

• The facility must be open to the public.

• The application must include state and/or U.S. IRS documentation of tax-exempt status, pre-disaster charter and other documentation.

Organizations that provide non-critical services may be required to apply for a low-interest disaster loan from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) to be considered for Public Assistance grants. Grants may be available to these organizations for repair or replacement costs that SBA loans do not cover. These organizations can also apply to FEMA and the SBA at the same time.



Four Katy Tigers were named to this year's Blue Bell/Texas Sports Writers Association Class 6A All-State Team, with two being named first team all-state after a tremendous year for the Tigers.

Cameryn Harrison and Ashtyn Reichardt were named first team all-state, while Montgomery Henderson was named to the third team and Ella-Kate Smith was named an honorable mention on the team.

The four of them led Katy to its best season since 2019, as the Tigers went 39-3-1 this season, going undefeated with a 16-0 record in district play and making a huge run in the playoffs to make it to the Region III-6A Final.

Harrison had a 22-1 record on the mound with a .53 ERA on the year, striking out 232 batters in 119.1 innings while also batting .500 with 47 RBIs, hitting 10 home runs and scoring 28 runs herself.

Reichardt was the leadoff hitter and defensive anchor of the team and was also one of the biggest leaders on the team, helping the younger players both vocally and by leading the way with her actions. Both Reichardt and Harrison will join the Arkansas Razorbacks in the fall.

Hicks graduated from El Dorado High School and played college football at Grambling State. He turned that into an NFL career where he played for the Kansas City Chiefs, New York Giants and Cincinnati Bengals. Hicks was joined on the list by Katy native and University of Houston Running Game Coordinator and Offensive Line Coach Eman Naghavi. Naghavi, a Katy High School graduate who was a captain on the 2003

Tigers state championship team, has been coaching at the collegiate level for 14 years. He started his career at C.E. King as an offensive line coach before moving to McNeese to coach Offensive Line, eventually becoming a recruiting coordinator for McNeese. He then coached at the University of Louisiana Monroe as offensive coordinator before going to Georgia State to coach offensive line and then Tulane to coach offensive line, eventually moving to Houston in 2023. He was kept on staff after the transition from Dana Holgorsen to Willie Fritz.

He earned his degree from McNeese.

During his four years at McNeese, where he was named all-conference three times and led the team to a conference title in 2000, the team led the league in rushing offense twice and scoring offense three times. 

during his college career, serving as a team captain in 1992. He took over as athletic director in 2017 and had two years remaining on his contract.

There were lots of highs for the Cougars with Pezman at the helm. He helped the school earn a spot in the Big 12 and with the transition and the University of Houston basketball program has truly blossomed over the past six years. It was under Pezman that the Fertitta Center opened in 2018 and excluding the 2020 Covid season, the Houston basketball program has made five straight sweet 16 appearances.

But over the last year, things have been up and down for Houston athletics. The Cougars football team finished 4-8 this year and Dana Holgerson was fired after the season after accumulating a 31-28 record as head football coach and Pezman hired new Houston head coach Willie Fritz to the position. Houston has been very vocal about needing to generate more revenue for and through athletics as it remains highly subsidized through University and student fees, which may have been part of the decision to go in search of a new athletic director. 'It has been a true honor and privilege to serve my alma mater during a transformational period in

Rockets draft sharpshooter Sheppard third overall

The Rockets took care of one of their biggest needs and drafted a player with a special skill set last week with the No. 3 overall pick, taking Kentucky guard Reed Sheppard early in the NBA draft and getting a lock down shooter with tons of room to grow in the process.

"I'm going to come out every game and do whatever it takes to win for this team," Sheppard said. "It doesn't matter what coach needs or the team needs I will do it to the best of my ability and come in every day in practice with a positive mindset, work hard and I will

be the guy on the team that does whatever it takes to win."

Sheppard has a rare skillset and is regarded as one of the best shooters to enter the draft in years. Over his one year at Kentucky, the freshman averaged 12.5 points, 4.5 assists, 4.1 rebounds and 2.5 steals per game coming off the bench. He shot 53.6% from the floor and led the nation in 3-point percentage, shooting 52.1% behind the line and 83.1% from the free throw line. He was the only player in the country to have 145 assists, 80 steals and 75 three 3-pointers this season.

"I'm super excited to be here," Sheppard said. "I can't wait get here and call Houston my new

home. I just am ready to get the seasons started and be a part of this team. I'm excited and thankful to be here.

The Rockets already have lots of young talent and will add Sheppard to a core that already has Alperen Sengun, Jalen Green, Tari Eason, Jabari Smith, Amen Thompson and Cam Whitmore as players 23 years old or younger. If it were another player in the draft, Houston might have traded out of the pick, but the Rockets had their sights set of Sheppard if he fell to the third pick.

"In this case at the end of our process we had Reed as the best player in the draft by quite a bit," said Rockets general manager

Rafael Stone. "We thought he was the best prospect and he was the only guy we were really focused on. If he hadn't gotten to us we probably would have traded down or out of the draft, but when we had the opportunity to draft Reed we jumped on it."

The Rockets started Summer League this week and it will be a chance for Sheppard to start to prove himself to the coaching staff. This will be a team where it is hard to earn playing time right away, as fellow guards Fred Van Vleet, Green, Thompson and Whitmore all will be trying to prove themselves as well, but Sheppard is excited to get to work and start to prove himself early in the offsea-

"We are in a situation where we want to win but we are also developing young guys," said Rockets head coach Ime Udoka. "We want them to have a chance to get out there and get playing time. I want Reed to make it tough on those guys in front of him and on us as a coaching staff. I want us to have to make hard decisions because he is playing well. The guys are going to come in and get the playing time they deserve. The young guys are the core of this team and they're the guys who are going to elevate us and bring us forward and Reed is in that same situation to come in and compete and then guys will get what they earn."
