Candidates announce plans to run in May elections

It's a new year – but still an election year, with important local positions coming up for a vote.

On May 3, voters will go to the polls to choose a mayor for the City of Katy for the next three years, and will select two trustees for Katy Independent School District's school board, who will also hold three-year terms.

Current Katy mayor William H. "Dusty" Thiele has announced his plans to run for re-election. Thiele, now retired from the Allstate Insurance Agency he owned for many years in Katy, filed the

appropriate paperwork with the city secretary on January 15.

Thiele, who did not draw an opponent when he initially ran for mayor, will face challenger Michael A. Payne, whose application lists his occupation as IT manager.

Current school board members Victor Perez and Lance

Redmon have also announced their plans to run again for the positions they now hold. Perez, board member in Position 1 since 2022 and presently the board president, is a retired chief financial officer who has been a commercial banker and

Inclement weather forces rescheduling of upcoming meetings

Forecasts of potentially hazardous weather – including freezing temperatures and possible snow – had local organizations scrambling to reschedule meetings after the winter storm's passage.

The Katy Area Economic Development Council (KAEDC), which was slated to hold its January General Assembly meeting on January 21, notified its members that the meeting would be rescheduled to February.

The Katy Independent School District's board of trustees had originally planned to meet for a "regular" board meeting on Tuesday, January 21, but moved the meeting to Monday, January 27 at 5 p.m. The meeting will take place in the board room of the district's education support complex at 6301 S. Stadium Lane in Katy. The board normally meets twice a month – one workstudy meeting and one regular meeting.

Royal ISD, however, said that, in spite of closure of its facilities and cancellation of activities, it would keep to its planned school board meeting on January 22 at 6 p.m. (after press time for this issue of the Katy Times). The agenda for that meeting includes the consideration and approval of naming for the district's newest campus, elementary school No. 2, among other items.

621 Area Code numbers coming Jan. 23

New Houston-area area code added in response to ongoing population growth

Responding to high demand for new telephone numbers in the greater Houston area, the Public **Utility Commission of Texas** has approved an additional area code for the region currently utilizing area codes 281, 346, 713, and 832. The new 621 area code will encompass the greater Houston metropolitan area and surrounding communities such as Baytown, League City, Missouri City, Pasadena, Pearland, Sugar Land, and The Woodlands, reaching from Harris County into Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Liberty, Montgomery, San Jacinto, and Waller

Katy Business Association disbands after 40 years

A Katy institution is no more. The Katy Business Association, a 40-yearold networking group which served 106 area small businesses at its end, has dissolved. The group was originally formed by Rosemary Nelson, the original owner of Cottage Door located in old Katy, and Patsy Jean Williams, a local Katy real estate broker, in 1984. Their vision at the time was to create a small organization where local Katy businesses could meet monthly and support each other,

said former KBA President Olivia Martin in a previous interview with the Katy Times.
But times change.

"As our membership grew and the needs



There are no sensory-friendly or relaxed performances for this show. There are also no student matinees. For more information, go to





of our business community evolved, we recognized the importance of creating a sustainable, impactful program," said Martin in an email to the Katy Times. "Joining forces with the Katy Area Chamber of Commerce was the clear solution—bringing more resources, greater opportunities, and longterm support for our members. The [Katy Business Association] board's decision reflects our belief that unity creates strength, and partnerships open doors to endless possibilities. This collaboration preserves the heart and legacy of the Katy Business Association while evolving into the Katy Business Alliance. Together, we're setting the foundation for a stronger, more connected business community."

On December 31, 2024, the KBA's board of directors sent an email to the organization's members, announcing the dissolution of the networking group, and its absorption into the Katy Area Chamber of Commerce as the "Katy Business Alliance." The email read in part:

"Dear KBA Members,

The Katy Business Association has been part of the Katy business community, fostering connections, providing resources, and cultivating fellowship among small businesses. Today, we are excited to embrace a transformative step forward, ensuring these opportunities continue to grow. In the spirit of John F. Kennedy's words, 'Change is the law of life,' we have thoughtfully decided to dissolve the Katy Business Association and transition into a dynamic partnership with the Katy Area Chamber of Commerce. This evolution will empower us to create a stronger and new KBA known as the Katy Business Alliance, offering enhanced resources, support, and opportunities that will drive even greater success for small businesses in our community!"

The email further outlined how the new entity would work:

• Monthly business luncheons will continue on the fourth Wednesday of each month, focusing on impactful business workshops to support member growth and success. Luncheons will remain open to all-membership will not be required, and attendance will be \$25 per person. Members will receive invitations to upcoming Katy Business Alliance luncheons and workshops beginning in January 2025.

 The logo of KBA will remain the same, with a slight modification to the name "Katy Business Alliance." The mission of supporting small businesses in Katy remains unchanged and is strengthened through this partnership, the email said.

The Katy Area Chamber of Commerce will manage logistics, registrations, marketing, and financials, allowing the KBA committee to focus on creating meaningful programming and workshops, the email said, with the current KBA Board of Directors transitioning to a KBA Committee within the Katy Area Chamber.

Current KBA members will receive prorated refunds for their membership dues at \$15 per month remaining, less credit card fees. Refunds of membership dues will be processed promptly, the email said.

The email also provided background on how the decision was made to disband the organization.

• On, December 18, the KBA board unanimously approved the dissolution of KBA as an independent entity and transfer of its remaining assets to the Katy Area Chamber.

• On December 20, the KBA board of directors sent a "Proposal for Dissolution and Authorization to Transfer remaining KBA Assets to Katy Area Chamber of Commerce," to all KBA Members with full transparency. Attached was a Proxy with the Deadline date of December 27, 2024.

• The Board received a total of 26 Proxy Votes from KBA Members, 25 Voted YES for dissolution and 1 vote for NO for dissolu-

"We are thrilled about this new chapter for KBA and what it means for our business community," the email concluded.

'The Katy Area Chamber has been looking for ways to support its community by giving everyone what they need most, time and money," said Katy Area Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Matthew Ferraro in a statement to the Katy Times. "In an effort to consolidate programs and/or duplicate memberships to multiple organizations, we are eager to find collaborative partners that have similar initiatives for the community so we can work to become a single, organized resource to advance the Katy area."

Ferraro said that the Chamber was approached by the KBA about an opportunity for long-term collaboration. The result of those conversations came to be a continued program of work, similar to what the KBA has been doing, Ferraro said, with no membership fee required to attend KBA events, and the opportunity to build on business networks with a more diverse audience to support business growth and development.

The KBA Committee will work together to produce the same content and environments that KBA members have loved for over 40 years, Ferraro said. With no membership fee required to attend the KBA programs, previous members of KBA will be saving roughly \$200 year, he said. The KBA programs will be open to the public and will allow Katy Area Chamber members to attend for the same price.

Portions of revenues generated from the KBA program will go to support business grants and future scholarships to be distributed through the Katy Foundation, the 501c3 extension of the Katy Area Chamber, Ferraro added.

Longtime members of KBA shared their support for the move.

"My perspective is I think it is time to move on and I am good with KBA becoming a part of the Chamber," said Patty Raske, who has been involved with KBA since its very early days. " I think they will bring positivity to the Chamber and great support."

"At first, I was really sorry and disappointed to hear that the KBA was going to dissolve," said former Katy mayor Skip Conner, who was honored by KBA in 2024 as one of its longest-serving members. "One reason the KBA started was that the Chamber changed its name and moved out of the City of Katy. The board was very thoughtful in its deliberations, excited about the association's future and the new partnership with the chamber. With a vote of 25 to 1, the majority of members agreed with the new arrangement. I can live with it."

Other KBA members did not respond with feedback to the Katy Times by press

presenters included Assistant Buildings Official Eli Fernandez, City Planner Rachel Lazo, Community Development Director Ian Clowes, and Executive Director of Public Works and Community Development Elaine Lutringer.

After the panelists were introduced, Clowes began presentation with an overview of the organizational chart for the city's development department, which includes the building and permits and the city planning department, with an explanation for each role. Then Lazo gave an overview of the development process for the city, which included a pre-development planning meeting, voluntary annexation, zoning, land use, platting, addressing, certificate of occupancy, permit/plan review and construction and inspections.

Lazo also introduced the city website, which she said "contained a wealth of information" as well as online maps and GIS tools available from the city which could be helpful in the development process. Other online tools available from the city include "Am I a resident?", zoning maps and zoning updates. She also said that the city is working on updating its landscaping ordinance to encourage tree preservation and to "maintain what we have in the city because we are very proud of that."

Lazo discussed the plans for a small entertainment district in the city, which was identified in the city's comprehensive plan and which will tie the city's attractions together and the "Target project" which will

bring the large retailer to Texas Heritage Marketplace. Although she discussed the Katy Court residential development, she said most development now taking place in the city is commercial.

City of Katy current development projects - including applications for certificates of occupancy, commercial projects and projects to be discussed in future public meetings - may also be viewed online, Clowes said.

Assistant Building Official Eli Fernandez gave an overview of the permits staff department and explained the "EnerGov" online permit application portal. Paper submittals are now no longer required in most cases, he said. Permit applications that are now live on the site include residential new construction, commercial electrical, residential electrical, irrigation (both residential and commercial), mechanical commercial, commercial plumbing, residential plumbing, pools, signs, and mobile food vendors. All permits are reviewed electronically and comments are sent back to the applicant via email, Fernandez said. The city is in the process of adding water and sewer tap applications and commercial building permits to the portal. The new technology has decreased permit review turnaround time from 15 to ten days, Fernandez said. The department has also recently extended inspection call in cutoff time from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The chamber plans to host similar sessions with city staff in the future, KACC President and CEO Matthew Ferraro said.

Starting on January 23, 2025, telephone customers requesting a new phone number in the 281/346/713/832 area code overlay region may be assigned a number beginning with 621. Whether they're requesting new service, adding a line, or in some cases, moving their service, customers who would have expected a number beginning with 281, 346, 713, and 832 will be assigned one with the new code.

Telephone customers should know the following key facts about the 621 area code overlay:

• Telephone numbers, including the current area code, will not change.

• The price of a call, coverage area, or other rates and services will not change due to the overlay.

• What is a local call now will remain a local call.

• Customers in the overlay region will continue to dial 10 digits for local calls within and between the overlay area codes, and 1+10 digits for long distance calls.

Customers can still dial just three

digits to reach 911 and 988, as well as 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, 711, or 811 if those are currently available in their community.

Telephone customers should continue to identify their telephone number as a 10-digit number (3-digit area code + 7-digit telephone number) and include the area code when sharing the number.

Customers should ensure that the accurate area code is reflected across their phone-related life, from any equipment that uses their phone number (i.e., automatic dialing equipment, wireless phones, PBXs, fax machines, internet dial-up numbers, speed dialers, call forwarding settings, voicemail services, medical alert devices, safety alarm security systems and gates, ankle monitors, etc.) to printed communications including websites, personal and business stationary and printed checks, advertising materials, contact information, and personal or pet ID tags.

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Pregnancy Help Center reopens with new name

Following a closure due to broken pipes and subsequent damage from flooding, the Pregnancy Help Center has reopened at 1450 E. Summitry Circle in Katy, near Westgreen and Park Row.

But the new year is bringing new changes to the nonprofit - including a new name. As of January 2, the facility began doing

business as Adira Clinic. "Adira" is a Hebrew word meaning "strong," according to a spokesperson.

"For 35 years we have been the Pregnancy Help Center of West Houston. As we look to the future, we recognize the need to adapt to remain relevant and impactful. The culture and landscape around us have evolved, and so must we, to effectively meet the needs of women today," said Executive Director Kelli McAnally in an

email announcing the change. "With our new name, Adira Clinic, we're focused on empowering women to choose life, especially by connecting with those who may be most concerned about the immediate, physical challenges of an unexpected pregnancy, We've found that our current name can sometimes discourage women from seeking our services, and we want to remove that barrier. Understanding that many women considering abortion see it as a healthcare decision, we are embracing our medical expertise and clinical approach to provide compassionate, professional care, and comprehensive support."

Through this transition, the clinic will continue to offer all its services free of charge, McAnally

McAnally said in the email. "We carry medical insurance, have two medical directors, employ licensed medical professionals, and adhere to all regulations under our Clinical Laboratories Improvement Amendments (CLIA) certificate."
