



# Ponte Vedra Beach residents sound off on potential MSTU/BU for beach restoration

County Commission approves survey, initiates process

Some Ponte Vedra Beach residents are rejoicing this week after the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners (BCC) unanimously decided Tuesday, June 5 to take the first step toward the creation of a Municipal Service Taxing Unit (MSTU) or a Municipal Service Benefit Unit (MSBU) for the restoration of the area's beaches.

"I see no way not to do this — to initiate this process," Commissioner Jay Morris said at the BCC meeting.

Although the 5-0 decision did not officially approve an MSTU/BU, it did set the process in motion by directing the county to survey property owners in Ponte Vedra Beach as to whether they would support a special assessment to cover the "start-up costs" of a beach restoration project, totaling about \$1.2 million.

"As we know, the community in Ponte Vedra Beach has experienced extreme erosion along their coastline following Hurricane Irma and the nor'easters that followed," said Damon Douglas, project manager for the county. "We have been hearing from them, answering questions and listening for the past several months, and they have requested that we begin the process for putting together some kind of local funding mechanism to help them with a potential future beach restoration project."

While one resident questioned the commissioners on how much money taxpayers who do not live on the beach would be required to contribute, several others expressed their support for the creation of an assessment to restore the beaches, including Ponte Vedra Beach resident Lori Moffett, who spoke on behalf of Save Ponte Vedra Beach Inc.

"We are very encouraged by the steps that you're taking today," Moffett said. "We simply want what you've done for South Ponte Vedra. We want to create our own municipal district to eventually get an engineer on board and hired and the beach restored."

On December 19, the County Commission voted to approve the creation of MSTUs for the restoration of Vilano Beach and South Ponte Vedra Beach. As of yet, however, there is still no county-approved plan for Ponte Vedra Beach proper, and that is what Save Ponte Vedra Beach ultimately hopes to change.

According to a study performed by coastal engineering firm Olsen Associ-

ates, Ponte Vedra Beach has lost 135 feet of coastline since 1970. As St. Johns County's beaches are a key component of what draws tourists and homebuyers to the area, a failure to maintain them could be devastating for the county, Moffett contended.

"At the moment, as you probably know, property values in Ponte Vedra are spiraling downward, and the only thing that will reverse that trend is a renourished, wider beach," she said. "Otherwise, we're looking at a downward spiraling of property values to come, and that has dire consequences financially for the whole county."

Recently, Save Ponte Vedra Beach conducted its own survey to gauge the support throughout the Ponte Vedra community for an assessment to fund beach renourishment. Out of the more than 600 people surveyed, the organization reported that about 91 percent responded favorably to the idea.

While many local property owners may

support an assessment, however, Commissioner Jimmy Johns expressed frustration over the lack of details that had been provided to the BCC.

"I'm looking for ways to get government out of peoples' way so that they can protect their property, but if we have to participate in this process, then we need to clearly convey what the expectations are before running down this path," he said.

Commissioners Jeb Smith and Paul Waldron echoed Smith's concerns regarding the lack of information and costs. Morris, however, contended that more details couldn't be obtained until a survey had been conducted.

"We can sit here and analyze this until the cows come home or the beaches are gone," he said. "Let's start the process. ... If we sit here and argue about this, nothing's going to take place."

In addition to an MSTU or MSBU, another possible local source of funding that supporters of the Save Ponte Vedra Beach initiative are hoping to secure is a proposed 1-percent increase (from 4 to 5 percent) in St. Johns County's bed tax. Currently under county consideration, the tax increase could potentially yield more than \$2 million annually for beach renourishment if approved by the BCC. According to county officials, however, the date for the board's final vote on that matter is still pending.

Still, while the question of local funding remains uncertain, beachgoers and property owners may soon find some relief at the federal level. On June 6, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Water Resources Development Act of 2018, which, if passed by the Senate, would include \$15 million for beach renourishment in St. Johns County.

"The House passage of the Water Resources Development Act is a significant step toward vital investment in our nation's ports and waterways, as well as protecting our communities against natural disasters like we saw last year in Jacksonville with Hurricane Irma," Rep. John Rutherford (R-FL) said in a statement released last week. "This bill contains several important provisions that will invest in Northeast Florida, and I am proud to have voted in favor of it. I commend my colleagues in the House for recognizing the need to strengthen our water infrastructure and look forward to working with them in the future to further improve our communities."

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# MSD Board reminds community of upcoming elections

The Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District (MSD) Board of Trustees reminded attendees of its meeting Monday, June 11 at the Ponte Vedra Library that St. Johns County will hold elections this year for MSD seats 1, 3, 5 and 7.

According to the St. Johns County Supervisor of Elections website, current Board Chairman Gary Jurenovich is the only candidate for seat 1. Gordon Blalock and Mack McCuller have filed for seat 3, and Alva A. Hollon Jr. and Holly Kartsonis are currently uncontested for seats 5 and 7, respectively. Current Board Treasurer John Wegl and Trustees Murle Harrison and Greg Wong now hold seats 3, 5 and 7 respectively and have not filed for reelection.

The term for an MSD board member is four years, and the candidate must be a resident of the MSD. In general, MSD Board members meet once a month to provide management and oversight of safety, traffic, municipal services, beau-

tification and other areas that impact the MSD community and the well-being of its residents. Learn more by visiting the St. Johns County Supervisor of Elections website at www.votesjc.com or by calling (904) 823-2238.

The deadline for candidate filing is noon on Friday, June 22.

### Other items of interest

In other MSD news, Wegl said FDOT will soon be conducting a speed survey on the stretch of A1A from Mickler Road

to the GTM Reserve to consider decreasing the speed limit there.

In addition, Jurenovich suggested the board work with the community to develop a "MSD Vision" that outlines goals and projects for the next five, 10 and 20 years.

The MSD Board concluded the meeting by engaging in preliminary budget discussions for fiscal year 2018-19, which will continue at the next meeting on Monday, July 9 when the trustees set the millage rate.

# Hall kicks off campaign for Duval County School Board

Retired scientist Sam Hall formally kicked off his campaign for the District 2 seat on the Duval County School Board on Saturday, June 9, sharing his vision for the public schools with supporters at a backyard barbecue in Jacksonville Beach.

In addition to local residents, parents, and supporters, numerous current and former elected officials attended the event, including Jacksonville Beach Mayor Charlie Latham, Atlantic Beach Mayor Ellen Glasser, former Atlantic Beach Mayor Mike Borno and former Neptune Beach Mayor Harriet Pruette.

"I'm on the Neighborhood Accountability Board with Sam and I respect Sam very much — I can't say enough good things about him," said Pruette, who introduced Hall at the event. "Sam's heart is in the right place — in our community."

Hall told attendees that serving on the school board would be a natural extension of his nearly 25 years as a community education advocate working to not only protect children and teachers but also to enhance and expand the school board budget to better equip educators to teach the students in District 2. Hall, a native of rural Alabama, comes from two generations of educators, whom he cites as a

major reason for running for school board.

Hall said his experience serving on numerous community boards, including chairman of the nonprofit educational agency, The Bridge of Northeast Florida, offered him an opportunity to witness the success of both involving parents and collaborating with other social service agencies to improve student achievement, which is his key priority if elected.

Hall said, if elected, he would apply his extensive budgetary experience to the school budget while also prioritizing student safety. Hall's other priorities are training and retaining excellent teachers and administrators, educating the whole child through STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) and working to increase community involvement in schools.

"I have no ambitions to run for higher office (than school board)," said Hall, who is also a member of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach. "I just want to help children and make sure they get a good education. This is my way of showing my appreciation and gratitude for having a good public education myself."

Moderator Diane Scherff, along with emcee John Reardon, posed nine questions to the candidates, followed by questions posed at random by the audience, which were all answered to the apparent satisfaction of the crowd. A third contender for the office, John Ward, did not appear as he had previously declined the invitation to participate in the debate.

Costello is currently a dental surgeon, and formerly served in office as Ormond Beach commissioner, mayor and state representative. He was also an Air Force captain. Waltz is currently

a defense consultant, author and a Fox News contributor. He served over 21 years in the military as an Army Special Forces Green Beret lieutenant colonel in the Middle East and Africa, and in the Pentagon as defense policy advisor to Defense Secretaries Donald Rumsfeld and Robert Gates. Waltz also served in the White House as Vice President Dick Cheney's counterterrorism advisor.

Also at the Trump Club meeting, Dr. Michel Pawlowski, a member of the St. Johns County Republican Executive Committee, presented St Johns County Trump Club President Diane Scherff with a pin from Ronna McDaniel, chair of the Republican National Committee. The pin was awarded for two resolutions from the club: "a Voice of the People," which Dr. Pawlowski personally delivered to President Trump and other dignitaries, and for the hard work she and the club members have completed.

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# Lessons about money can be priceless gifts to children

Father's Day is almost upon us. If you're a dad, you certainly may enjoy getting cards and gifts, of course. But, over time, you will gain even greater satisfaction by what you can give your

children — such as some valuable financial lessons.

These lessons can include the following:

- Setting goals: If you are contributing to an IRA and a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan, explain how you build these accounts now, while you are working, so you'll have enough money to enjoy a comfortable retirement someday. And you can bring your children into the picture, too, by telling them that another financial goal is saving enough to help send them to college or to further their education in other ways.
  - Value of understanding the finan-

cial markets: You may actually be quite surprised at how interested your kids are in investing, especially the concept of "owning" companies through stocks and stockbased vehicles.

Depending on their ages, you might even want to show them the progress of your own investments and describe, in general terms,

how different events can cause the markets to rise and fall, especially in the short-term. You could even discuss the difference between the basic types of investments, such as stocks and bonds.

■ Putting time on your side: You might want to emphasize the importance of patience, and how investing is not a "get-rich-quick" scheme, but a process that requires decades of diligence and persistence. Let your children know that it's of great value to start investing as early as possible, so you can put time on

your side, giving investments a chance to grow.

Living within
your means: We all
know that you can't
always get what
you want. Stress
to your children
that you can't just
splurge on big
purchases whenever you feel like it,
because such behavior
can lead to bad outcomes.
Use concrete examples: If you

have a car that's several years old, tell your children that it would be nice to have a new one, but you simply must wait until you can afford it.

■ Paying debts on time: Tell your children that, no matter how good a saver you are, or how thrifty you try to be, you still have debts, such as your mortgage

payment, and it's important to pay these debts on time. You may not want to get too detailed about the consequences of missing debt payments — bad credit scores may not be that easy for children to understand — but you can certainly mention that if you're always late on payments, you might find it harder to borrow money when you really need it.

By sharing these principles with your children, you will, at the least, give them something to think about, and you may well find that you've helped start them on the path to a lifetime of making solid financial moves. And who knows? If they truly master the ideas you've taught them, one day they might give you some really nice Father's Day gifts.

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

# Cultural Center at PVB reveals potential plans for new arts center

On May 15, the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners approved Alta Mar Holdings LLC's plans to sell off the back 40 acres of the Oak Bridge Club at Sawgrass' golf course for commercial and age-restricted residential development. Thanks to that decision, staff at the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach may now see their hopes for a larger facility come to fruition.

"At the May 15 meeting, our reaction was all excitement," CCPVB Executive Director Donna Guzzo said. "We had over 25 people there representing Alta Mar from our center and promoting and pushing for that land sale so that, eventually, we could make our dream happen."

According to Art Hayden, president of the CCPVB Board of Directors, Alta Mar approached the nonprofit's staff two years ago to propose selling them the land on the course that abuts A1A between Swawgrass Village and the Summer House condos. As a result, the Cultural Center has been planning for some time now to construct a new facility on that land, but has been awaiting the county's final vote to move forward. Although an official agreement has not been signed with Alta Mar, approval of the development moves the Cultural Center one step closer to its new location, which would not only offer more space for the organization's many outreach programs, but also more visibility

"Our current building is behind Al's Pizza and we've had it for 20 years," Hayden said. "Nobody can find us, parking is bad and the building is inadequate for our needs. We currently service about 8,000 individuals out of this facility. With the new building, we believe the number will move to approximately 31,000 people."

In addition to providing parking for up to 140 vehicles, one notable feature of the new Arts Center at Ponte Vedra Beach would be its rooftop deck.

"We actually have a donor who has put a reserve on that space up there already," Hayden added. "We will have facilities for expanded exhibit space, along with seating and a kitchen, which will provide us with the capability of having banquets for up to 200 people — a lot of the stuff that isn't readily available very close to Ponte Vedra Beach, or the center of Ponte Vedra."

Designed by architect Mark Macco, who is also the president-elect of the CCPVB Board of Directors, renderings of the front of the 15,000-foot facility also feature a fountain with a rather sculptural overhang, seeming to hint at the building's artistic purpose.

"Arts are what separate a good community from a great

community," Macco said. "The iconic new Ponte Vedra Arts Center will not only improve the quality of life for the area's citizens, it will be great for local businesses."

Construction on the \$7 million project is expected to take about 24 months, and Cultural Center staff are optimistic that the process will be underway by the end of 2018

"We are super excited to make this dream a reality for many people in St. Johns County and the Beaches area," Guzzo said. "Having a new facility with visibility can only enhance our programming, especially bringing awareness to the Sound Connections Music Therapy program for children with special needs. It's a win-win situation for all."

# Cultural Center opens new art exhibitions

# How to conserve energy throughout summer

Proper maintenance of cooling systems is essential to saving energy and keeping utility costs down.

Energy bills tend to be high during the summer when many people crank up their air conditioners to combat the heat. For some households, higher energy bills might be stretching their budgets, while others might be looking for ways to reduce their carbon footprints.

Conserving energy can help homeowners save money and help the planet at the same time. And reducing energy consumption in the summer does not require men and women to sacrifice comfort in the name of conservation. In fact, various strategies can help homeowners and apartment dwellers reduce their summertime energy consumption.

- Stop cooling an empty home. A cool home might be the ultimate necessity during summer heat waves, but there's no reason to cool a residence when no one is home. According to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), operating thermostats more efficiently can help homeowners trim their cooling costs by as much as 10 percent. One way to be more efficient with thermostats is to keep the house warmer than normal when no one is home. Programmable thermostats can be set so air conditioning units turn on shortly before residents arrive home, ensuring the house is comfortable and no energy is wasted.
- Narrow the gap between indoor and outdoor temperatures. The DOE notes that the smaller the difference between the temperature indoors and outside, the lower cooling costs will be. While it may be tempting to set thermostats

to room temperature (68 degrees Fahrenheit) on days when temperatures reach 90 degrees Fahrenheit or above, that's an enormous temperature gap that will result in a high energy bill. Instead, the DOE recommends setting thermostats to 78 degrees Fahrenheit whenever possible.

- Open the windows at night. Daytime temperatures, particularly during the dog days of summer, may necessitate the use of air conditioners. But if temperatures drop at night, you can sleep with the windows open. This reduces energy consumption and saves money, and can be a great way to introduce fresh air into a home during a time of year when air can become stagnant.
- Do not set air conditioner thermostats at lower than normal temperatures when turning them on. The DOE notes that setting thermostats at lower than normal temperatures when turning air conditioners on will not cool homes any faster than setting them at typical temperatures. Such a strategy will only lead to excessive energy consumption and higher energy bills.
- Install ceiling fans. Ceiling fans can improve cooling efficiency in a home. According to the DOE, ceiling fans allow men and women who use air conditioners to raise the thermostats on their AC units about 4 degrees Fahrenheit without adversely affecting comfort levels. Men and women who live in temperate climates may find that ceiling fans are enough to keep rooms cool without the need for air conditioners.

# The key is balance

I recently read an article in the New York Times and observed the authors raising a point that the stock market has become increasingly concerned about in recent weeks, namely that the period

of low interest and inflation rates may be coming to an end. If this is true, what impacts are likely to be felt by investors and consumers, and what actions should you take to protect your future?

First, the two issues are not unrelated - the Federal Reserve has been raising the Federal Funds rate (the interest rate they control and the rate upon which all other interest rates are based) consistently over the last 18 months, both to gradually withdraw their involvement in and support of the credit markets and as a means of getting the inflation rate nearer their target rate of 2 percent per year. So, increasing interest rates cause the inflation rate to rise; therefore, the fact that they are both increasing is not unexpected it is planned.

Second, the stock market generally regards increasing rates negatively because higher interest rates dampen consumer spending (homes, cars, furniture, credit cards); higher inflation rates cause more money to be spent on necessities, leaving less for discretionary spending; and higher interest rates make fixed income investments more attractive relative to stocks. So, don't expect the stock market to react positively to this trend.

Third, higher interest and inflation rates means consumers will have less to spend because the cost of things is going up, as is the cost to finance purchases. This in turn can have a dampening effect on our economy as consumer spending slows, resulting in smaller corporate profits, leading to lower stock prices.

As with any change, the key here is balance — finding the right position on the teeter-totter (remember the teetertotter you once played on?) between

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
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# Pham named EY Entrepreneur of the Year Florida award recipient

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

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
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

research at Mayo Clinic's Florida campus. The JT Townsend Foundation continues to focus its efforts on helping children and adults living with disabilities receive adaptive equipment and resources to improve their lives. Since its inception,

the JT Townsend Foundation has helped 366 First Coast families with \$675,000 in assistance and adaptive equipment.

According to the Funk-Zitiello Foundation, Mayo Clinic researchers in Florida have developed new techniques for early detection of pancreatic cancer, which is the third-leading cause of cancer related death in the United States. The disease is often diagnosed in patients in later stages when it has spread to other parts of the body and is much more difficult to treat. Funds from the Champions for Hope 2017 Golf Classic directly addressed this challenge, supporting a Mayo Clinic team that is performing research to improve early detection.

For Funk-Zitiello Foundation Managing Director Judi Zitiello, who is a four-year pancreas cancer survivor, this is a personal experience.

"This year we focused on awareness," she said. "I wanted everyone to know the symptoms and that pancreas cancer is misdiagnosed 31 percent of the time based on a 2016 report. What typically was a cancer of 60-plus men and women is now striking all ages and genders and is expected to be the No. 2 cancer killer by 2020. This is why early detection is critical. With our help, Mayo is on the hunt for a minimally invasive test."

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
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
