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

## Traffic study recommends widening A1A, replacing Mickler roundabout with signal-controlled intersection

Town hall meeting on study to be held April 25

Widening A1A from two to four lanes from Mickler Road to ATP Tour Boulevard and from four to six lanes from ATP Tour Boulevard to Marlin Avenue are among the recommendations included in the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization's Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley traffic study, a draft of which has been posted online in advance of an April 25 town meeting to discuss the findings.

Available online at http://northfloridatpo. com, the draft report also recommends converting the roundabout at Mickler and Palm Valley roads to a four-leg, signal-controlled intersection as well as widening Mickler Road and the east-west segment of Palm Valley Road from two to four lanes. Other suggested improvements include constructing a new westbound off-ramp from Palm Valley Road to Roscoe Boulevard, and new sidewalks and bicycle lanes along Palm Valley Road.

Total construction costs of the proposed standalone intersection improvements are estimated to cost \$3.4 million, while the widening improvements are estimated at \$32.6 million.

Conducted to identify improvements to enhance traffic flow and safety on some of Ponte Vedra and Palm Valley's key roadways, the study analyzed current traffic counts, crash data and other traffic conditions and concerns, as well as anticipated demand in the area through 2040. According to the study, between 2011 and 2016 1,082 crashes occurred on A1A from Marlin Avenue to Mickler Road and on Palm Valley Road, Mickler Road and Roscoe Boulevard/Solana

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

Road. That includes seven fatal crashes, 285 accidents with injuries and 790 crashes that involved damage to vehicles. Rear-end collisions were found to be the most common type of accident on A1A, accounting for 52 percent of the total crashes.

More of the study's findings will be shared at the town hall meeting to be held Tuesday, April 25 at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall. The event will begin with an open house from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m., when attendees will have the opportunity to review project exhibits, ask questions, watch a video summarizing the project and provide written or verbal comments. A formal presentation will begin at 6:30 p.m. followed by a public comment period, with remarks limited to two minutes per person. The traffic study was sponsored by the Citizens Traffic Task Force (CTTF), which was founded in 2014 by a group of citizens and community leaders to gain consensus on how to address long-term traffic needs in the Ponte Vedra area. The report completes two years of research by CTTF in collaboration with NFTPO and its consultants, the North Ponte Vedra Beach Coalition (NPVBC), St. Johns County and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

"The results of the traffic study are only one step in the process for developing short- and long-term traffic solutions for the community," said Jim Sabo, president of the Ponte Vedra Beaches Coalition and a task force member. "This is a long journey that will need continued positive support from the community to have any results down the road. Decisions on how to go forward with improvements, timelines and funding are remaining issues that will need to be supported to be successful."

### **LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

Some many months ago, a group of men in Ponte Vedra began meeting to solve the traffic problems on Ponte Vedra Lakes Boulevard. They met with and found out from the MPO there was nothing much they could do. However, months later we find out this group and the MPO have come up with a larger traffic study for Ponte Vedra.

Lo and behold, didn't the MPO resurrect a 20-year-old study they tried to sell to Jacksonville, Neptune, Atlantic and Ponte Vedra Beach. We all said "NO" rather strongly; we did not want six lanes on A1A through our communities. Reminds me of the billboard people who didn't understand no, either. This traffic study group will be meeting with the Ponte Vedra community on April 25. What they came up with was to be a secret, I guess, but someone must have told their wife, so it's out. Their gift to us is six lanes and 10 lanes at the intersections, all down A1A. To fully picture this, I would like you to get a lawn chair and go sit by the intersection of St. Johns Bluff and Beach Boulevard. Since it is an intersection, it has 10 lanes. Sit there a few minutes to get the feel of it. We have several of these on A1A in Ponte Vedra.

In the 1980s, the MSD extended their control of zoning to about 300 feet west of A1A. They wanted to be sure to keep some control of how A1A would look in

terms of color and buildings, etc. We now have an overlay district down A1A past Mickler's, Palm Valley Road, Roscoe, 2010 out to US1. We all cared how we wanted to look.

Now some questions.

How dare they destroy the ambience of A1A just to get home 10 or 15 minutes sooner? We used to say, once you're over the ditch, slow down, you're home.

How dare they destroy the property values of those home on A1A? By at least 24 to 30 percent. Speaking of homes across the street, how about those off Solano, or in the Atrium, or the apartments, who walk across the street to Publix or off Corona, who walk across the street to the

school? What about them?

How dare they even think of creating an "ugly" right in the heart of Ponte Vedra?

To top it off, the men on this task force (it was all men, please note) all live as far from A1A as they could – in Marsh Landing, Old Ponte Vedra, Sawgrass, Players Club, Neck Road, Roscoe Boulevard – all hidden well away from A1A. No sense of community.

What a shame, paving over a lovely place like Ponte Vedra. What a shame!!

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# **Save Guana Now prepares for PZA, BCC hearings on Outpost property**

PVC attorney: residents have pressured county to 'change the rules'

Residents fighting the proposed development of The Outpost property gathered at the Palm Valley Community Association last week to prepare for upcoming county meetings at which the matter will be reviewed by the Planning and Zoning Agency (PZA) and Board of County Commissioners (BCC).

"This is our opportunity to be heard," said Nicole Crosby, co-founder of Save Guana Now. "We have a big voice, and there are a lot of us."

Save Guana Now is working to protect the 99-acre conservation property known as The Outpost that is located at the end of Neck Road and adjacent to the Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve. Ponte Vedra Corporation (PVC), a subsidiary of Gate Petroleum, is proposing to rezone The Outpost from Open Rural to Planned Unit Development (PUD) to build a 77-home subdivision there to be known as Vista Tranquila. The county expects PVC's proposal to come before the PZA within the next few months.

In preparation for the county meetings, Crosby and Save Guana Now co-founder Gary Coulliette discussed development of a video and press release, signage, t-shirts and bumper stickers to protest the proposed development. The organization's leaders also shared that their recent gala raised more than \$10,000.

### **PVC** lawsuit

Crosby also reported on a judicial hearing held earlier this month in which Judge Michael Traynor ordered PVC's proposal back to the county zoning application process. The court's decision followed a motion by St. Johns County to dismiss a lawsuit PVC filed against the county last fall

Crosby said the court's decision is a positive result, adding that PVC failed at "circumventing public input.'

PVC attorney Amy Boulris, however, contends her client has always wanted to move forward with a process that the county has stymied. In its lawsuit, PVC charged

that county officials failed to act for several years on the company's request for a routine administrative interpretation regarding the limits of the Conservation designation of The Outpost. After failing to receive a response to requests submitted in 2013 and 2014 - when PVC entered into a purchase and sale agreement with Dream Finders Homes - PVC filed a PUD zoning application in July 2016. The lawsuit charged that application also had not been acted upon within the typical time frame, and asked the court to force the county to act on its application.

At the hearing, county attorney Patrick Mc-Cormack argued that PVC's lawsuit was filed prematurely.

Boulris said the company had no choice but to sue because county staff consistently refused to process PVC's application under the county's current Comprehensive Plan because they claimed the Conservation designation was too ambiguous to apply. She said the county consequently requested the application be accompanied by a comprehensive plan amendment, but never specified the amendment they would propose.

"That simply was unacceptable," Boulris said

Boulris believes residents opposed to the development have pressured the county to "change the rules." Save Guana Now members claim development of the property would have a far-reaching impact on the environment and wildlife in the area, including migrating birds, threatened species and species of special concern. The group has also expressed concerns about potential pollution that could contaminate the waterways, as well as increased traffic on Neck Road.

After hearing from both parties, Judge Traynor decided to stay or suspend the case, meaning it will move forward through the normal county process. According to county spokesman Michael Ryan, PVC is now in possession of the county's comments on its application.

'The ball's in their court," Ryan said. Boulris agreed, and said PVC is in the process of responding to the county's feedback. Overall, she said, PVC is satisfied with the ruling, and stressed that Judge Travnor asked the county to commit to processing the application under the current Comprehensive Plan, and the county agreed to do so. The case will go back to the court if the application isn't processed accordingly.

"I think it was a very sage ruling by the judge that allows the parties to now move forward consistent with state law," Boulris said. "All PVC has ever asked for is a fair hearing in front of the county commission, applying the existing comprehensive plan to their application."

### How did vou begin vour career as a chef?

My first real cooking job was at the iconic Tony Luke's in Philadelphia when I was 18. I was a natural - I became a kitchen manager by 19 at another amazing shop named Benny's Steaks. By 22, I was a corporate catering chef, running a kitchen that did high-volume events. From there, I went to The Restaurant School at Walnut Hill College, taking a job as a sous chef with one of the instructors from Taiwan and doing everything from fine dining to music festivals for thousands of people. I then worked for Hilton hotels under chefs from Belgium, Germany, India, Korea and the Philadelphia area's chef of the year, eventually becoming the executive chef for their restaurant at 25. From there, I held positions in a Greek fusion restaurant, was the corporate executive chef for an international restaurant/caterer and as a personal/private chef for five years.

#### Flavor Palette's offerings include a diverse collection of international cuisines. How did you come to develop such an eclectic menu?

Coming from Philadelphia, I developed a great love and passion for very ethnically diverse cuisines. When I did my initial research of this area, I noticed that some of the flavors that I really enjoyed were not available. Combining the opportunity of creating distinction along with satisfying my tastes guided me to the development Flavor Palette!

#### You've been open in Ponte Vedra for just over a year now. What have you found to be the most popular items on the menu among local residents?

Well our number one seller has always been our halfpound ribeye cheese steak! Our customers definitely appreciate the high-quality product and understand why it costs a little bit more! Our consistent number two seller is the "Moroccan chicken pita," with preserved lemon-marinated chicken and tomatoes, almonds, golden raisins, Kalamata olives and harissa yogurt sauce. I was very pleasantly surprised that this dynamic sandwich sells so well! I thought I was reaching when I created it. Those are followed by a virtual tie between our madefrom-scratch falafel and our Angus Beef "Snappy Mac" burger topped with gorgonzola, sundried cherry relish, bacon and arugula.

### What are your personal favorite items on the menu?

My favorite sandwich on the menu is the "Philly Style" - Italian roast pork with broccoli rabe and sharp provolone on an Amoroso hoagie roll. It is my go-to comfort food from back home that just makes me happy. I would also have to say the Mezze platter: I just love the sampling of Mediterranean/Middle Eastern flavors.

### Do you have any plans to add new offerings to the menu?

Yes, I am always listening to feedback and evolving with the consensus. Starting next month and through the summer, we will be running two wraps that are very popular with my catering crowd - one being chicken salad with grapes, walnuts and lemon mayo; and the other being ham with gouda, granny smith apples and

arugula. As a special, all next month we will be offering "Totchos" – a fun spin using tater tots instead of tortilla chips with typical nacho toppings. We are also planning on bringing back dessert options very soon.

### Jacksonville City Council passes bill allowing golf carts in Duval County's portion of Nocatee

Golf carts may now be driven on the street across all Nocatee neighborhoods following the Jacksonville City Council's unanimous approval of a bill last week allowing the vehicles within Duval County's portion of the community.

"This bill really was a housekeeping bill more than anything," said Councilman Danny Becton of District 11, who sponsored the bill. "This policy already existed within the St. Johns County part of the community."

Roadways throughout the St. Johns County portion of Nocatee have long been designated as appropriate for golf carts, but that hasn't been the case for Duval County until now. Becton said by default city roads do not allow golf carts to be vehicles. Therefore, the bill was needed to ensure the Duval County portion is compliant in joining the rest of Nocatee as a golf cart community.

Construction plans for cart paths have already been submitted to the city and just require final approval. Once that happens, Nocatee Community Manager David Ray said, construction can begin immediately. Work is expected to be complete by the end of 2017.

"Our residents love the ability to travel around the community in their electric vehicles," Ray said. "Alternative transportation, including pedestrian walkways, bike paths and cart paths, are an important part of the Nocatee lifestyle."

Ray noted that pathways in both counties will be connected, with all leading to the community's amenities and shops in the Nocatee Town Center. Approximately 85 percent of Nocatee sits inside St. Johns County, he added, while the remaining 15 percent of neighborhoods on the northwest side of the development is located in Duval County.

The bill requires golf cart drivers to be at least 16 years old and hold a valid driver's license. Drivers can operate the vehicles with a learner's permit, said Ray, but they must be accompanied by a licensed driver. According to the bill, if the golf carts are driven at night, they must be equipped with headlights, tail lights, brake lights and turn signals. Golf carts without these features can only be operated during the day.

"With the passing of this ordinance, all of Nocatee is now an 'Electric Vehicle' approved community," said Ray. "The efficient and eco-friendly transportation is positive for the community and the city."

# Ponte Vedra students win pet alligator in annual 'Edugator' contest

When PVPV Rawlings teacher Betsy Wetmore announced the annual "Edugator" contest aimed at highlighting the importance of the American alligator, student Carter Magnano was ready.

The fourth grader had been looking forward to the contest after a friend won it five years ago by creating a homemade quiz show. With the prize in mind — a baby alligator that would reside in Mrs. Wetmore's class until the end of the year as a class pet — Magnano and his friends and groupmates, Lucas Laprade and PJ Wilkinson, hunkered down for months in preparation.

The result of the boys' efforts was a project equal parts unorthodox and creative. Leveraging their combined skills and the abundance of debris left behind by Hurricane Matthew, Magnano, Laprade and Wilkinson created a life-sized paper maché alligator and a humorous video that won them the contest sponsored by the St. Augustine Alligator Farm Zoological Park.

"The boys really have their own talents that they brought to the project and were completely willing to learn new things for the sake of it," said Elizabeth Paul, Magnano's mother and a volunteer history teacher at PVPV Rawlings. "I was so impressed with what they were able to come up with."

According to Paul, Magnano wrote the script, Laprade helped design the set and Wilkinson edited the video with the help of Magnano's older brother, Chase. All three boys came together to paint and plaster the alligator crafted from recycled wood and garbage left by the storm.

"I had a great time working with my friends to create a fun and informational project that showed how the American alligator is so important to the environment," Magnano said of the project.

"The contest inspired me to learn more." The boys were joined by their class-



### **Rice: THE PLAYERS Championship a boon to local economy**

THE PLAYERS Championship is more than just a world-class golf tournament, Executive Director Jared Rice told local business leaders last week. It's an economic engine that pumps millions of dollars into the local economy while showcasing Northeast Florida to a global audience.

"This is extremely important for our community," Rice said at a joint meeting of the St. Johns County/Ponte Vedra Beach and JAX Beaches chambers of commerce held at Sawgrass Beach Club. "Five years ago, 60 percent of our ticket purchases originated from within the fivecounty area. Today, 55 percent originate from outside of the five-county area. So, we are bringing quite a bit of out-of-town business to this community."

Yet as Rice prepares for THE PLAY-ERS Championship 2017 – his first since becoming the tournament's executive director – he remains firmly focused on one goal.

"We want to live up to and exceed the promise of being the best fan experience in the game of golf," Rice said. "We seek to maintain that level of excellence, of being best in class."

Rice shared some of the key pillars of THE PLAYERS' business plan, which include ensuring that the PGA Tour's "Fifth Major" offers the best field of competitors of any major tournament.

"Statistically, (THE PLAYERS) is the best field of golf, period," Rice said. "It is the best of the best playing each other at TPC Sawgrass."

It is also, he contended, the purest test of golfing ability. "The course was built to favor no one style of golf," he said. "You have to have every phase of your game working to perfection."

Adding to the Stadium Course's chal-

lenges are a number of major modifications and upgrades made since THE PLAYERS 2016, including the transformation of the 12th hole into a drivable par 4 - a change Rice said will add additional excitement to the back 9.

"The original vision of this course was that every hole would be a risk/reward hole," he said. "Now, the 12th hole can be an eagle, or a birdie, or something considerably worse."

While acknowledging the traffic woes that plague THE PLAYERS Championship each year, Rice noted that over the past seven years, the tournament has generated nearly \$50 million for local charities.

"That is life-changing giving and it is staying here in Northeast Florida," Rice noted before introducing 2017 Tournament Chairman Kevin English, who oversees the nearly 2,000 volunteers who staff THE PLAYERS, enabling the proceeds to be donated to local youth charities.

"Last year we raised \$8.5 million," English said, "and we're looking to make that \$9 million this year."

THE PLAYERS Championship 2017 will be held May 9-14 at the TPC Sawgrass Stadium Course.



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# Ponte Vedra High School to present 'Guys and Dolls' April 20-22

The Ponte Vedra High School drama department was running through a rendition of "Fugue for Tinhorns" from the musical "Guys and Dolls" when instructor Jason Nettle jumped onstage mid-scene, joining one student in a prop newsstand to give him advice.

Nettle's attention to detail isn't missed on the students as he encourages handfuls of the cast of 90 to interact in the background, walk by in pairs and talk "without really talking." His encouragement is contagious; tension leaves the teens' bodies and the scene resumes without a hitch as he takes his place back in the front row.

It's crunch time for the young cast, with opening night set for April 20. They've been rehearsing together for a little under a month – less than the time typically allowed for most high school productions, and clocking in early mornings and late nights to pull the show together. In spite of the pressure, the students are eager, and Nettle welcomes the opportunity to give them a taste of professional stage shows and encourage the involvement of more young people in theater.

"Most plays are rehearsed for six to eight weeks, but I want to teach them not only how to be in a show but how to do it in a professional way," Nettle said. "And I'm really excited to have a lot of guys involved this time around to eliminate the stigma of boys in theater – to just let them have fun and let them be."

It is only Nettle's third production with the department of some 200 students, but he's far from new to the theater game. The instructor brings with him theater experience from New York where he acted professionally for 12 years, and Jacksonville's own Alhambra Theatre & Dining. His students say Nettle's arrival has shaken up the school's drama department in ways they never anticipated as they prepare to present the 1950s musical. With the production of "Guys and Dolls," Nettle said he hopes to introduce the young thespians to pieces that contrast with the contemporary trappings with which they're familiar, while giving as many students as possible a chance to perform.

"It's my first year, so I'm really trying to get everyone involved," he said. "There's about 90 kids in the show and I'm trying to use them in different ways by introducing them to a musical of the Golden Age, which is something they probably haven't been frequently exposed to."

"Guys and Dolls" is a musical Nettle calls "an audience favorite," adapted from the film version starring Frank Sinatra and Marlon Brando as gamblers Nathan Detroit and Sky Masterson. In the musical, Detroit is quickly running out of options for a venue for his infamous craps games. In need of a \$1,000 deposit for access to a garage to host the game, Detroit faces mounting pressure from an increasingly strong-armed police force, the expectations of his gambler friends and the need to win a desperate bet he places with Masterson for the money: that the highrolling Masterson cannot woo the virtuous missionary Sarah Brown.

With the high school's production, Nettle is taking the work and suggestions of his young cast to heart. Audiences can look forward to choreographed pieces by student Kylie Giliberto, set design by Dylan Mathis and characters brought to life by Michael D'Aquila, Olivia Wolford, Madelyn Wells and Nick Dondero.

"Embodying these bigger than life characters, finding some sense of realism has no doubt been a challenge," said Dondero, who portrays Masterson. "But I also hope the same for this performance that I do for every performance – working with (middle school students) has kind of shown us what the next generation of drama students could look like, so I hope that another young person will be inspired."

The process has doubled as a learning and

bonding experience for a group still getting to know their new instructor, with students citing Nettle's tailored advice and fun approach to drama as sources of motivation.

"He genuinely cares about our growth and we're all so grateful to have him because this is definitely not the typical experience of a high school department," Wells said. "Watching it come together while everyone learns and grows and supports one another has definitely been the most rewarding part."

In the future, Nettle welcomes the opportunity to expose his students to more works from the Golden Age of musical theater, which he said set the foundation of his own aspirations as a young actor. But for the time being, he's happy familiarizing himself with his pupils and the stage that houses them.

"Since I'm fairly new I'm still learning the stage," he said. "But with a cast this young, what I push for above all is creativity – so I'm just having a ton of fun with this really great group of kids."

Ponte Vedra High School's production of "Guys and Dolls" will be performed April 20-22 at 7 p.m., with an additional performance at 2 p.m. on April 22. Tickets can be purchased from the school's front office through April 21 and at the auditorium box office for \$15 for adults and \$10 for students at the door.

# Ambrosia to perform at Alhambra Theatre & Dining

# 'Dreamgirls' spotlights girl group's rise to supreme showbiz success

When "Dreamgirls" made its Broadway debut in 1981, playwright Tom Eyen insisted the African-American female singing trio at the heart of his rags-to-riches story was inspired by the Shirelles, Marvelettes and numerous other Motown girl groups of the 1960s.

It's hard to believe, however, that Eyen had anyone but The Supremes in mind when he and composer Henry Krieger sat down to create "Dreamgirls," which premiered last week at Jacksonville's Alhambra Theatre & Dining. Anyone with more than a passing knowledge of The Supremes will see strong parallels between the true story of Florence Ballard, Mary Wilson and Diana Ross and the fictitious girl group The Dreams, who make it to the top of the music charts before romantic and professional rivalries tear the group apart.

Like the real-life Supremes – three Detroit teens who began their careers singing backup as "The Primettes" – "Dreamgirls" follows Chicago teens Effie, Lorrell and Deena, whose group The Dreamettes gets its big break singing backup for established star Jimmy "Thunder" Early. Under the management of smooth-talking Cadillac salesman Curtis Taylor Jr., The Dreamettes soon become The Dreams and rise from being backup singers to chart-topping artists in their own right.

But as with most rags-to-riches stories, fame doesn't come without a cost. "Dreamgirls" mirrors The Supremes' real-life drama, as soulful lead singer Effie is replaced by the beautiful Deena, whose lighter pop sound Curtis believes will appeal to a broader audience. The musical also follows the backstage romances that ultimately fracture the girls' once-close friendship, leading to the breakup of the original act. The only significant departure, in fact, from The Supremes' saga is that "Dreamgirls" gives The Dreams an emotional reunion and happy ending the real-life original trio never enjoyed.

Along the way, "Dreamgirls" offers a revealing look into the cut-throat recording industry of the time and the challenges African American artists faced in achieving mainstream musical success. When Effie's brother, C.C., writes a surefire hit song for Jimmy Early and The Dreams, the group is shocked when a Pat Boone-style white singer swoops in and takes the tune to the top of the charts. And when Curtis is able to book Jimmy into a Miami hotel that has never before presented black acts, he considers it a triumph – even though it means Jimmy must abandon his flamboyant style and act more like Perry Como than Little Richard.

While "Dreamgirls" lacks a list of well-known Broadway tunes, the Alhambra's production features a strong cast with the vocal talent to shine even on some of the less memorable numbers. As the troubled Effie, Melessie Clark shows real emotion on "I Am Changing" and the show's best-known song, "And I Am Telling You I'm Not Going." The male members of the cast also excel on songs such as "Steppin' to the Bad Side," and as Jimmy "Thunder" Early, David Berry is a standout. While Berry's performance as the outrageous lothario initially draws laughs, he imbues the character with depth, as over the years Jimmy struggles to adapt to the changing times, changing musical tastes and a new era in which women like Lorrell are no longer willing to settle for being mistress to a married singer whose star is on the decline.

Peter M. Jackson puts his rich, deep bass to good use as Curtis, who learns too late that his ruthless pursuit of his dreams – at the expense of everyone else's – costs him the only thing that matters in his life. For ultimately, "Dreamgirls" isn't about the singing group The Dreams; it's about the dreams we all hold for our lives and what – and who – we are willing to sacrifice along the way to achieve them.


