County teams face tough pre-season slates

Due to realignment, Wood County's five football programs have set

playoff season with six offensive and 10 defensive starters returning. The Quitman Bulldogs enter new territory with the wide ranging District 10-3A DII. The eight team district features the Bulldogs, Winona, Arp, Troup, Grand Saline, Frankston, Alba-Golden and Harmony. The Bulldogs open the season on the road at Cumby to take on the Class 2A Trojans, a team which went 7-5 last year falling in the area round of the playoffs. The Trojans have six offensive and eight defensive players returning this season. The Bulldogs, who are looking to reverse a four-year, 43 game losing streak, will also take on Scurry-Rosser and Union Grove before starting district play at Arp Sept. 28. Alba-Golden finished at 3-7 last year and have one of the area's top signal callers in Zane Smith who passed for over 1,200 yards last year and scored 14 rushing touchdowns. The Panthers will host county rival Hawkins Aug. 31 followed by another home

game with Big Sandy and a road trip to Honey Grove. The Panthers open district play Sept. 28 on the road at district favorite and state-ranked Harmony.

non-district schedules to fit their needs in preparation for district play. All of the county teams open the regular season Aug. 31.

Mineola and Winnsboro were both moved to District 8 3A DI where they will take on playoff favorites West Rusk, Gladewater and Tatum along with Sabine and traditionally tough White Oak.

Mineola will open the season against three Class 4A opponents, the first two at home against Wills Point and Canton followed by a road game at Farmersville, also Class 4A, and finishing the non-district slate at home against Class 2A DI Big Sandy. All of the Jacket non-district foes were playoff teams last year. The Jackets will have their hands full in the opener against a Wills Point team coming off a 6-5 Over at Hawkins, the Hawks will have 10 offensive and nine defensive starters coming back. The Hawks are in the six team District 10-2A DI with Price Carlisle, Alto, Big Sandy, Union Grove and Cushing. Hawkins has a tough early pre-season with their first three games on the road at Alba-Golden, All Saints (Tyler) and Beckville before getting home games against Linden-Kildare and Como-Pickton. The Hawks open district play at home Oct. 12 against Union Grove.

Winnsboro will take on Winona, Queen City, Paris Chisum and Highway 37 rival Mt. Vernon. The Raiders open at home against a talented Winona squad who made the playoffs last year finishing with a 4-7 record. Winona returns seven offensive and eight defensive starters from last year.





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

Alba-Golden Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Derek Smith is an absolute straight shooter. He makes no bones about the Panthers' goals for the 2018 gridiron season.

"We expect to make the playoffs. Our goal is the playoffs. Getting a number of wins is a good goal, but our main focus is to get this team to the post season," Smith said. "The coaching staff is working hard and our players are working hard with the playoffs as our goal. The new district will make things interesting because we don't know a lot about some of the teams."

"There is no reason we can't be one of those teams going to the playoffs. Like anyone else, we must stay away from injuries," Smith notes.

The new district has more teams. Harmony will be tough while Arp and Troup will have some speed. It's one of those districts where anybody is capable of winning on Friday night. I feel good about my kids



Memorial Stadium, home of the Mineola Yellow Jackets which opened in 1994. The stadium has artificial turf and a fine track facility too. The stadium has been the site of several playoff games over the years. The stadium is located at 1044 West Loop 564 just west of downtown Mineola.

One of the oldest stadiums in East Texas is Quitman's Bud Moody Stadium, opening in 1948 and seating 1,500. The stadium is grass turf and many improvements have been made over the summer to give the old stadium a beautiful facelift. The press box has been renovated and there have been major improvements to the

parking lot at the stadium. The old rock bleachers were part of an original Bulldog Field built for track. Another older Wood

County facility is Red Raider Stadium in Winnsboro. The 2,000 seat facility has been the scene of many battles with other Wood County schools as well as arch rival Mt. Vernon. The grass field stays in great shape year round and it is located at 409 Newsome just east of Winnsboro High School about two blocks west of Highway 11.

Ălba-Ĝolden's Panther Stadium opened in 1982 when Alba-Golden got their football program started. The stadium has bleachers on the south side of the field and it seas approximately 500 fans. The stadium is located on the north side of the Alba-Golden campus on U.S. Highway 69.

Lowrance Stadium opened in Hawkins in 1975 is located on the campus of Hawkins ISD. The 1,200 seat field is named after legendary Coach Robert Lowrance who is a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Quarterback Smith will have solid targets and run-ning backs in Tom Mitchell and Bodie Baker. Panther receivers include Matthew


good targets all around," the coach added. "Some of the best hands on the team belong to tight end Chris Chabuad."



Hawks ready to break out

Hawkins Head Coach Scott Evans preaches hard work pays off. The Hawks got a taste of the state playoffs last year turning a tough year around to make the post season after winning two import-ant district games. The Hawks put up a good fight in bi-district before falling 47-13 to a Rivercrest team who posted a 12-1 record.

Evans returns experience to the gridiron this season with 10 offensive and nine defensive starters back on the field for the Hawks. "We have some hard working young men who are looking forward to going back to the playoffs and this time get a win when we get there," Evans said. "We only lost three of the 22 starters from last year so most of our team is back."

The Hawks embark on their 2018 journey traveling west to Alba-Golden to take on the Panthers in the Aug. 31 season opener. They are in District 10-2A DI with Alto, Carlisle, Big Sandy, Cushing and Union Grove. After the Alba-Golden game, the Hawks will finish out their pre-season slate with games against All Saints (Tyler), Beckville, Linden-Kildare and Como-Pickton.

Evans believes his defense will be improved. "We have a good front six. We have some size and we feel like we will be solid against the run," Ev-ans noted. "We were in a lot of close games last year where we just couldn't quite get the win. We expect to win some of those close games this year. We were able to make the playoffs last year for the first time







Mineola Schools conducts a Little Spikers Program for grades three through six. During four afternoons in the spring Lady Jackets interact with the young students focusing measures and skills de-



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

Quitman Head Volleyball Coach Ashlee Lingo is upbeat about her team's opportunities this season. Most coaches would be worried about replacing three players who were all-region and all-state for the past few years, but Lingo is all about "reloading" and not "rebuilding."

Quitman's traditionally strong volleyball program has groomed their younger athletes to be ready to step right into varsity positions and not miss a beat. Lingo has returning and experienced seniors including outside hitter Madalyn Spears, and outstanding defenders Abby Dobbs and Emma VanBecelaere. Juniors Julia Simpkins (right side hitter), Jentri Jackson (hitter), Shelby Hayes add varsity experience from valuable court time last season as sophomores. Junior Madi Whitehurst adds strength at the middle blocker spot. Big things are expected from talented 6 ' 3" middle blocker Ava Burroughs who has already showed great promise in the early matches. Newcomers Lindsey Hornaday and Lucy Brannon are a pair of sophomore talents who play at the varsity level.

Once again, Lingo's squad is in the midst of a rugged pre-season schedule loaded with quality opponents like Class 5A schools Mt. Pleasant, Pine Tree, Whitehouse, Lindale and John Tyler as well as quality Class 4A schools Carthage and Van. The Lady Bulldogs showed early promise taking second place in the Van Tournament where they beat John Tyler, Liberty, Brook Hill JV, Mt. Pleasant and Paris before falling in the championship to Van.

Lingo believes the tough pre-season slate makes the team 'grow up' quicker. "We always play a tough pre-season schedule. You can't get better unless you play good quality teams who make you better," Lingo noted. "Our girls have done a lot of growing up pretty quickly. You can step up and continue to improve or things can go south fast."

The Lady Bulldogs compete in District 12-3A against Alba-Golden,

Mineola, Lone Oak, Rains, Edgewood and Grand Saline. "It's going to be a competitive seven team district so you have to beat three teams to get to the playoffs. With seven teams you get a couple of byes in there which I think helps everybody," Lingo explained. "Rains is always good and dropping down from 4A they are going to be tough. I think Edgewood is going to be really good. And you know Coach Everett and Alba-Golden will have to be reckoned with."

Lingo expects a lot from Spears. "Madalyn is an all around player. She is the 'it' factor. She can put the ball down from anywhere and he defense is incredible. Defense from my other two seniors (Dobbs and VanBecelaere) will be a key for us too," Lingo offered. "Lindsey Hornaday has surprised me. She has really stepped up for us so far. Madi Whitehurst is doing a good job. She missed a year playing volleyball but she is catching up fast."




offensive line has been a bright spot in the early practices. "Our offensive line play right now is different from last year at this time. We can really coach football and not just put together a system we hope works. The line knows we have the backs who can run with the football. They know if they do their jobs our backs will make plays happen. Our coaches have done a great job getting the linemen ready for battle."

Captain and offensive center Justin Blalock anchors the line while David Tarno, Hunter Gilbreath, Hunter Huggins

saw time under center last vear. Senior Medlin is a captain and the leader of the offense. Medlin has studied and done his homework on the QB position. Berry, a junior, showed off his speed and tough running skills scoring on a pair of long runs in the scrimmage against Hawkins Aug. 16. Medlin and Berry each brings specific skill sets to the position.

Sophomore Holland is difficult to bring down and displays the toughness Oakes is looking for in short-yardage situations. "It has been a big help to have Coach Vince Rapp coaching the quarterbacks," Oakes noted. "We can already see the difference at the quarterback position. It helps that our quarterbacks are getting more individual instruction."

Newcomer and running back Alex Wilson has been impressive in the early going. "Wilson is a great addition to our team. 

Coach Steve Pinnell has a career record of 127-84 at his alma mater. The Raiders are normally a playoff fixture, but must rebuild this season against a tough pre-district slate and district schedule. 
