

# Mineola, Alba-Golden call school bond elections \$29.85 million for MISD includes new primary AGISD \$17 million plan features classrooms and gym

The Mineola School Board voted unanimously last Thursday night to ask the district's voters to approve a bond issue for \$29,855,000 to build a new school and create a career and technology center.

The election will be held on Saturday, May 7 in conjunction with school board and city council elections.

The biggest piece of the bond would be \$19.5 million for a new primary campus to be constructed on district land on Loop 564 east of Hwy. 37. It would house Head Start students up through the third grade

Another \$4-plus million would go to convert the current elementary school into a Career and Technical Education (CTE) center to serve the adjacent high school.

The rest of the bond would include a new auto mechanics shop, upgrades to other CTE program facilities, canopy upgrades and the associated soft costs and contingencies for construction.

Funding the bond would increase the district's property tax rate from 96 cents to \$1.20 per \$100 valuation.

Before approving the election order, which had a Feb. 18 deadline to make it onto the May 7 ballot, the board discussed whether the new school would be able to hook onto city of Mineola sewer.

Architect Perry Thompson said the initial plans include a septic system.

Superintendent Cody Mize said the district will need to have a conversation with the city about hooking onto nearby sewer lines and the possibility of annexing the property into the city. Some of the 126-acre tract is already in the city limits.

By unanimous vote, the Alba-Golden School Board called a bond election for \$16 million at Monday's board meeting. The measure will be voted on at the May 7 election.

Prior to the vote, Superintendent Cole McClendon briefed the board that the recommendation was the result of 12 months of work by the Facilities Improvement Committee.

The committee, McClendon noted, was unanimous in sending the recommendation to the board. The en- vide specialized services tire building project carries a projected cost of \$17 million with \$1 million coming directly from the school district fund balance.

The superintendent detailed the proposal as having three parts: construction of a six-classroom elementary school expansion, construction of a multi-purpose competition gymnasium and renovation of the career technology building.

Upon approval of the bond election, the board voted to retain the law firms of Haynes & Boone, LLP and Powell Law Group to proin connection with the issuance of public securities. The board received a training session detailing communications guidelines for school district employees and board members.

In other action, an election for two places on the school board was called and will also take place May 7.

### Alba sewing group wrapping children in love, quilts

A rainbow of colors adorned the pews of the Alba United Methodist Church last Thursday as Pastor Dee Bryant blessed the multi-color quilts headed, appropriately, to the Rainbow Rooms across Northeast Texas.

The 300 quilts were handpieced and quilted by the women of the church, who have had a quilt-sewing ministry for at least 20 years. Since 2009 they are responsi-

ble for 2,487 quilts that have been donated first to the Shriners and then to Scottish Rite hospital.

When the hospital stopped accepting cloth items during the pandemic and the ladies began looking for another recipient, they didn't have to look far from home.

The Rainbow Room in Quitman, which specializes in clothing and other items for children who have been removed from their homes by Child Protective Services, gladly agreed to accept the

beautiful donations.

The latest round of quilts was begun about 16 months ago. They range in various sizes to meet the needs of the smallest child up to teens.

Their variety of colors and themes covers the gamut.

As the ladies packed up the quilts for the drive to Quitman, they occasionally stopped to admire particular items one last time.

The quilters meet every Thursday morning at the

The election is May 7.

For three city of Mineola positions, incumbents Eric Carrington in Ward Two and Cassandra Sampson in Ward Three have filed, and Bobby Ryan has filed for the Ward One council seat.

Three candidates have filed for three Mineola School Board seats, including incumbent Glen Dossett, Todd Morgan and Janice Etheridge.

Three Quitman City Council seats are up, and incumbents Jack Robinson and Steve Glenn have filed, along with Todd Wright.

The Quitman School Board has two seats ups for grabs, and Brooke Rogers is the lone candidate thus far.

The Alba-Golden School Board also has two openings, and candidates are incumbent Dwayne Thompson and C.H. Campbell. Incumbents Tammy Kirk-

patrick and Bob Kraemer have filed for three seats on the Alba City Council.

# Lunday has been hitting all the right notes

In the world of barbershop quartets there is a phenomenon known as the fifth voice or overtone. The fifth voice is the harmonic joining of the four tones in a quartet which, when perfectly matched, create an actual fifth harmonic.

While those unfamiliar with quartets may have thought such a thing to be folklore or legend, it is not. Long-time quartet singer and Mineola resident Duane Lunday can attest to the reality of the fifth voice.

"When it happens it creates goosebumps all up and down my arms," Lunday stated. "The combination of the four tones must be perfect, and based on the science of sound, the number of vibrations per second of the individual voices must amplify each other."

His eyes lit up at recounting the event. "It is an amazing thing, when it happens," he added.

There are few more experienced quartet singers in East Texas than Duane Lunday. In fact, Lunday 's love affair with barbershop quartets

Although his talent for singing had been brought to the fore among extended family, it was at the Crozier Technical High School of Dallas where he took a serious interest in it.


There he was strongly influenced by choir director Joe Landreth. Lunday described Landreth as a mentor.



In 1976 he earned designation as the Barbershopper of the Year at the Town North (Dallas) Chapter of the Society, and in 1980 he was recognized for his service as president of the Southwest District. His years of service to the organization led to his 2014 election into the Barbershop Harmony Society Hall of Fame.

The three certificates and a plaque are precisely aligned on the wall of his home office. Lunday obviously draws great solace and comfort from a lifetime of memories from singing in a cho-



#### JEANENE RARIDON UPTON 1933-2022



Jeanene Raridon Upton was born on April 25, 1933 in Newton, Iowa to Letha Woods Raridon and Jack Allison Raridon and departed this life on Feb. 1, 2022 in Tyler.

Jeanene attended a one-room schoolhouse in rural Kellogg, Iowa in

her elementary years. She graduated in 1951 from Grinnell High School.

Jeanene married Thomas Harry Upton Jr. on April 25, 1952 in Newton. Shortly after marriage, the newlyweds headed to Texas to start their married life and family. They settled in Garland and raised four children.

Jeanene was very active in Bluebirds and Camp Fire Girls. She also was involved in the Garland Republican Women's Club and was a volunteer on local, state and national campaigns. She made sure her kids were exposed to books at the library from a young age. Every summer Jeanene loaded up the kids and dogs and headed to Iowa in a Ford station wagon. The family farm in Jasper County was a wonderful place for her kids to learn about country and farm living. Her grandfather, Sherman Woods, was everyone's favorite. Summers in Iowa changed us for the better. Even after all the kids moved away, Jeanene made her annual visit to Iowa.

In 1971, Tom and Jeanene purchased 48 acres of woods in rural Van Zandt County southeast of Grand Saline, which they named Sherman Woods. For the next two years, most weekends were spent at the "farm" working to build a new home. Jeanene and Tom, with their youngest two kids, moved to rural Grand Saline in the fall of 1973. Tom commuted to his job in Garland until he retired in 1990. The nearest Walmart was in Mineola – that was the place to shop. Mineola became the new hometown.

Jeanene lost Tom in 1993 after 42 years of marriage. She remained at her home on the farm. Several years later, Jeanene starting volunteering at the Mineola Memorial Library. She joined the board of directors and was the treasurer for many years. Whenever we called or saw Mom, she gave us the "library report." She was very proud of her volunteer work, especially helping with the monthly book sale. Jeanene also volunteered with the APET-SPCA Animal Shelter in Mineola. She especially loved the kitties.



# Lady Panthers lose season finale


Kennedy resulted in scores. Kennedy drove the lane for a second basket in the quarter.
