CFD trained to safely care for relinquished babies

Across the nation, a person can give up an unharmed baby at a staffed hospital, firehouse or police station without fear of being arrested.

Under Safe Haven laws, the baby is placed up for adoption and the person who surrendered the child can remain anonymous — all in an effort to stop infant abandonment.

Nearly two decades after Indiana's law went into the books, Crawfordsville firefighters/EMTs have been equipped and trained on how to respond when a parent comes to the station with a baby they no longer want.

"Our goal will be to start spreading the information out in the community that there are choices and options for these young moms," said Karen Branch, executive director of the Montgomery County Youth Service Bureau,

which sponsored the training and supplies.

Firefighters/EMTs were trained on basic care from a representative of the National Safe Haven Alliance, a nonprofit that promotes the law.

Both stations received an infant care package containing a diaper, onesie and blanket and Safe Haven signs were posted outside the firehouses.

After a baby is surrendered to the station, the infant would be checked out at the hospital before the Department of Child Services begins the adoption process. The law covers infants up to one month old.

"We've never had anyone drop a baby off here before," fire chief Scott Busenbark said.

From 1999 to February 2018, more than 4,000 infants have been legally relinquished nationwide, according to the National Safe Haven Alliance, a nonprofit that promotes the law.

That figure is based on county and state reporting and may not represent the total number of relinquishments, the group stressed, since the federal government

Stricter setbacks proposed for CFOs

New confined feeding operations should be farther away from homes and businesses, a study committee recommends.

The 13-member panel that has spent three months reviewing the proposed amendment to the county's zoning ordinance finished hammering out changes Wednesday to rules dictating where future CFOs can be located.

Under some of the proposed revisions, farmers applying for a permit no longer have to show measures for reducing odor and storing manure. And neighbors would be given more time to protest if they oppose construction of a CFO.

The Montgomery County Plan Commission appointed the committee to make recommendations after tabling the ordinance in July. The group, chaired by commission member Ashley Adair, includes farmers, CFO employees, real estate agents and residents.

The proposed guidelines restrict new facilities to agriculture zoning districts on at least 40 acres of land. Minimum separation distances govern how far a CFO is built from nearby properties.

The committee voted to recommend extending the minimum distance to a quarter-mile, or 1,320 ft., from homes not located on the proposed site. The requirements would also apply to business and commercial buildings.

The original amendment set the minimum distance at 800 ft. from non-participating homes and business properties.

Road work to restrict traffic on South Grant

Traffic will be restricted beginning next week for construction on South Grant Street.

The Indiana Department of Transportation plans to close the northbound lane from Jernison Street to Wabash Avenue on or after Monday, city operations director Dale Petrie told members of the Board of Public Works and Safety, which approved INDOT's request.

Southbound traffic will flow one way from Wabash to Jernison during the project. The restrictions are expected to last through mid-December.

Petrie said patrons would still have access to Wabash College's Ball Theatre parking lot.

In other business, the board:

- Accepted a \$3,000 offer from JTC Enterprises to purchase the former Frances Wooden recreation center parking lot on North Grant Avenue.
- Set Halloween trick-or-

treating hours for 5 to 8 p.m. Oct. 31 in the city. A decision on blocking traffic on West Main Street is expected next week, and Mayor Todd Barton said the street would likely be closed as usual for Halloween.

- Granted a request from Wabash College to prohibit parking on both sides of Jernison Street from Will Hays Jr. Drive to Sycamore Drive from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. for football games on Oct. 19, Nov. 2 and Nov. 9.
- Approved a noise abate-

ment request from Beta Theta Pi fraternity on Saturday for a social event with live music.

- Re-approved an ongoing agreement for the American Red Cross to store disaster response equipment in the Elmore Street building.
- Granted city mowing requests for properties at 306 Scott St., owned by Diana McCullough; 1024 E. Chestnut St., owned by Janis Hart; and 704 Tuttle Ave., owned by ACM Vision V, LLC.

"We are not pushing college for everybody," said Sara Nicodemus, West Central Indiana Career and Technical Education Director. "We just want to give the students options."

This was the first year organizers held the event at the National Guard Armory. Last year it was

held at the Montgomery County 4-H Building.

Currently, only juniors and seniors can attend this event, but there are future plans to target younger students to help them with career development.

"We are trying to spark an interest by planting the seed for younger students so they can determine what classes would best suit them in the future," Nicodemus said. "It's really about awareness and exposure."

Furthermore, enrolling in a vocational class in high school, can earn students dual-credit and certifications from Ivy Tech Community College and Vincennes University.

AG helps launch JCAP to serve Fountain, Warren counties

Attorney General Curtis Hill announced Wednesday that Fountain County in western Indiana will receive a \$50,000 grant from the Indiana Drug Enforcement Association for the purpose of starting a Jail Chemical Addiction Program that will also serve neighboring Warren County.

The award is made possible through seed funding from the Office of the Attorney General, which also helps administer the grant process.

Through JCAPs, inmates with substance abuse issues are enrolled into quality long-term treatment programs that begin during incarceration and continue upon the inmates' release.

"The best correctional mod-

els not only penalize offenders for their crimes but also aim to improve their character," Hill said. "Through targeted services, we must address social, emotional, spiritual, educational, physiological and family issues. The JCAP model puts this philosophy into practice."

Fountain Circuit Court Judge Stephanie Campbell said she is eager to watch the JCAP program improve the lives of

local residents.

"Both Warren and Fountain counties are small rural counties that lack services for defendants suffering from chemical addiction," Campbell said. "The recidivism rate is disheartening and devastating. Through the JCAP program, we can help defendants begin recovery while in jail."

The grant will be used to pay for mental health, substance

abuse and individual services provided to inmates, she said.

Besides Hill and Campbell, other officials appearing at Wednesday's announcement in Fountain County included Fountain County Prosecutor Daniel Askren, Fountain County Sheriff Terry Holt, Warren County Judge Hunter Reece, Warren County Prosecutor John Larson and Warren County Sheriff Russell Hart.

Setbacks from neighboring yards would be less strict. The committee moved to suggest reducing the minimum distance to 200 ft. from the CFO's foundation to adjacent front, side and rear yards.

Montgomery County's zoning administrator would review or deny applications submitted to him based on a scoring system. The committee recommended taking odor abatement and manure management out of the scoring process.

Members removed the

steps "not because we don't believe that those management practices are important, but because of the enforcement burden placed on the zoning administrator," Adair said in an e-mail following the meeting.

"We determined it would be difficult to ascertain whether an operation was using any of these management practices effectively through spot-checking," she added.

The amendment also outlines steps for informing neighboring property owners about a CFO application. The applicant would have to send written notice by certified

mail to the neighbors.

Under the proposed changes, neighbors would have 30 days to file an objection, up from 21 days in the original text. Complaints filed within a mile of the proposed site would hurt the applicant's score, but multiple objections would not count.

Committee members want the commission to discuss the cap on neighbor objections.

Adair is scheduled to present the recommendations to the full commission during next Wednesday's meeting at 4 p.m. in the courthouse. A public hearing will likely follow in Novem-

ber before the board votes whether to send the amendment to the county commissioners for final approval.

Confined feeding operations are defined as facilities where livestock or poultry are confined indoors for more than 45 days per year. Facilities with larger numbers of animals are called concentrated animal feeding operations. Farmers must also obtain a permit from the state before construction begins.

Montgomery County has 13 active CFO permits, according to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

Getting thoughtful about thinking at CDPL

"Oui, yes — we can all read. Stories are great, but I want to know about your favorite thinker," said Adeline to me, a wide-eyed and now chagrined first-year student at St. Norbert College. Her question was, put a little differently, "What do you think about thinking and knowledge and ethics and reality?" These are questions my French friend's education system asked her to tackle and one that mine had barely prepared me to imagine. All French high school students take courses in philosophy,

and their national graduation exam has a philosophy component. The reason? In the education system's own words, "the curriculum aims at producing enlightened citizens capable of intelligent criticism." What a noble goal!

We inherit our posi-

tions on work, life, justice, morals, and ethics from many places: parents, mentors, literature and religion spring to my mind. Maybe you're interested in asking questions that delve deeper. How ought I behave? What does it mean to live well? What is the meaning of life? If that line of inquiry excites your mental faculties, then the Crawfordsville Public Library has a wealth of resources to help you.

A great place to launch your intellectual journey is with an overview such as Luc Ferry's *A Brief History of Thought* (109 Fer). Written in conversational and accessible language, Ferry will expose you to some of the greatest philosophical minds across a broad swath of traditions.

Continuing with an introduction (but you can start to narrow down using this resource, too!), consider accessing *The Great Courses* through RB Digital, one of the library's eContent providers. The *Great Courses* program offers an entire portal dedicated to philosophy. One course from Professor Jay L. Garfield of Smith College is a series of 36 lectures which serve as an overview to the following question: what is the meaning of life? Garfield explores this through various religious, spiritual, and philosophical lenses.

After an overview, it's time to dig into the good stuff! Maybe you'd like to read more from a particular philosopher. *The Examined Life* (190 Exa), while still an anthology, will give you

A good faith deposit ("Deposit") in the form of cash, wire transfer, or certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$30,000 payable to the order of the School Corporation is required to be submitted by the Purchaser not later than 3:30 p.m. (EST) on the next business day following the award. If such Deposit is not received by that time, the School Corporation may reject the bid. No interest on the Deposit will accrue to the Purchaser. The Deposit will be applied to the purchase price of the Bonds. In the event the Purchaser fails to honor its accepted bid, the Deposit will be retained by the School Corporation as liquidated damages.

Additional copies, at the Purchaser's expense, must be requested within five (5) business days of the sale. Inquiries concerning matters contained in the Preliminary Official Statement must be made and pricing and other information necessary to complete the Final Official Statement must be submitted by the Purchaser within two (2) business days following the sale to be included in the Final Official Statement.

If the Bonds are reoffered by an underwriter, the School Corporation agrees to amend and supplement its continuing disclosure undertaking (the "Master Agreement") in order to permit the Purchaser to comply with the SEC Rule 15c2-12, as amended to the date hereof (the "SEC Rule"). A copy of the Master Agreement is available from the School Corporation or municipal advisor at the addresses below.

The School Corporation has further agreed to comply with the Purchaser's reasonable requests to provide or disclose information and make appropriate filings which may be required in order for such purchaser to comply with the SEC Rule.

How to slow declarer's advance

PHILLIP ALDER

Newman's first law: "It is useless to put on your brakes when you're upside down." Paul Newman particularly loved Joanne Woodward, his seven children, acting and motor racing. Yesterday, we watched declarer zoom to the finish line in this four-heart contract by ruffing his low diamond on the board with the heart jack. But how could East-West have put the brakes on South's progress? Is it possible if West leads the club nine (or six)?

After West's minimum opening bid, North's takeout double and East's response, South bids what he thinks he can make.

Since declarer made four hearts yesterday by ruffing a diamond on the board, obviously the easiest way to defeat the contract is for the defenders immediately to play three rounds of trumps. Of course, that is easier said than done.

If West leads a spade (either the ace or a lower one), and his side shifts to hearts at trick two, that is also good enough.

But what about a club lead?

At first glance, that might not appear to be successful — but it is, if East and West are as skilled as Formula One drivers!

South wins the first trick, cashes his two top diamonds and ruffs his low diamond with dummy's heart jack. However, East overruffs with his heart ace and returns the club 10, the high card being a suit-preference signal for spades.

Declarer takes that trick and plays a trump, but West wins and shifts to the spade three. East wins the trick and gives his partner a club ruff. Vroom, vroom.

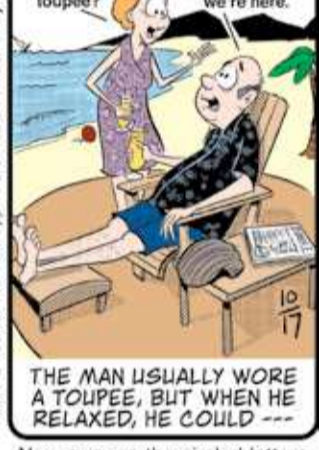

If you want to narrow in more, we've got Sartre (194 Sar), Bertrand Russell (192 R), Confucius (181.11 Con), Aquinas (230.2 Tho) Nietzsche (193 Nie), Aristotle (185 Ari), and so many more plus commentaries on their writings and thought if

you'd like a companion for the journey.

Lastly, maybe you'd just like something to put into practice. Consider Ethics in the Real World by Princeton philosopher Peter Singer (170 Sin) where you'll find 82 brief essays about some of our thorniest issues. Another of Singer's books, The Life You Can Save (362.5 Sin), is one of the most readable texts I've ever come across laying out a case for altruism and

a moral imperative for giving money to charity.

With these suggestions, I've only scratched the surface. If musings such as these set your mind along merry meanderings, then come visit us at the library for some resources to help you consider life's persistent questions!
