the Hillsboro Volunteer Fire Department for five years starting at the age of 15.

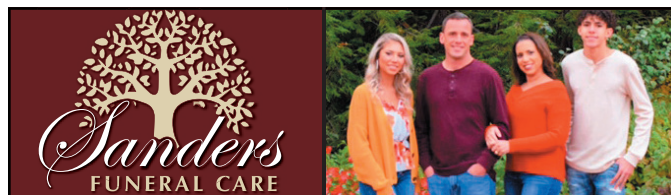
Adams will graduate with a criminal justice degree

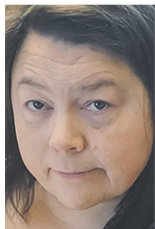

Judge deals blow to lawsuit against TikTok

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — An Indiana judge has ruled that downloading the free social media app TikTok doesn't amount to a consumer transaction under state law, dealing a blow to the state attorney general's lawsuit claiming the Chinese-owned video-sharing platform misleads its users about the level of inappropriate content and security of consumer information.

The decision issued last week denied the request from Republican Attorney General Todd Rokita for a court order preventing TikTok from stating on online app stores that it has "none" or "infr-

quent/mild" references to drugs, sexual or other inappropriate content for children as young as 12.

Judge Craig Bobay of Allen County Superior Court in Fort Wayne also ruled that state courts don't have authority over TikTok's statements to Apple's app store as both companies are based in California.

The lawsuit, which was filed in December, makes arguments similar to those from many state and federal lawmakers and government officials who have claimed the Chinese government could harvest U.S. user data from TikTok and use the platform to push pro-Beijing misinformation or messages to the public.

5-8 Roundup: Chargers and Mounties in softball action

Montgomery County in the forefront of SAC Baseball Race

Baseball in the Sagamore Conference has always been competitive year in and year out. This season is no exception. With two weeks left in the regular season the race for the SAC baseball title is thrilling.

Like most years Montgomery County will have a large say in the outcome. North Montgomery sits at 8-1 in the SAC as the Chargers are tied for first place with Tri-West. Despite a slip up last week to Western Boone the Crawfordsville Athenians are still in contention to defend their title with a conference mark of 6-3.

What the best thing is about all of this? Crawfordsville and North Montgomery will square off this week in what should be two fantastic ball games between two great teams.

Where to begin with the story lines that surround this two game set between these long standing rivals?

Let's start on the mound where I'd say both of these teams strengths lie. Junior Jarrod Kirsch and senior Cale Coursey will likely square off against each other on Tuesday. I'd bet for someone to find me a better pitching matchup across the state then that. Here's some numbers just to back up my claim.

Kirsch has been almost un-hittable this season posting a 6-0 record on the season. In 38.1 innings he's given up just 16 hits and four earned runs to the tune of a staggering .73 ERA. Oh and he's also fifth in the state in strikeouts with 71.

Coursey on the other hand is 6-1 on the year for the 10th ranked Athenians. In 45.1 innings he's given up 27 hits and allowed just 12 earned runs to a very impressive 1.85 ERA. The senior is third in the state in strikeouts with 76 on the season.

I encourage fans on Tuesday (if we get the Kirsch/Coursey matchup) to sit back and watch two sensational pitchers just do what they do.

That's not all that these two superstars do. They both are also pretty good with a bat in their hands. Coursey bats .449 on the season and is the SAC leader with 28 RBI's while being tied for second on the team with 10 walks and arguably even more impressive for the senior, just five strikeouts in 85 plate appearances. Kirsch is second on the Chargers with a .350 average from the lead-off spot. His patience at the plate is to be watched with 22 walks on the season and an on base % of .547 which is tops in the SAC.

That is just one storyline that awaits us when the Athenians (16-6) and

Chargers (13-7) square off. Let's dive into some more!

The Sagamore Conference has been dominated by Crawfordsville with CHS either sharing or winning the SAC title 16 times since 2000. Why do I bring up 2000? That is the last time that the Chargers stood atop the conference. North Montgomery not only has the Athenians left on their schedule, but

they also will end SAC play next week with two games against the team they currently share the top spot with in Tri-West. Friday will wrap up SAC play for the Chargers when they host county rival Southmont.

If the Chargers were to sweep the Athenians, they could all but end the SAC title hopes of their

county rival.

Crawfordsville doesn't have it easy next week to conclude SAC play when they take on a pesky Frankfort team who has handed both the Chargers and the Bruins their only SAC losses. They conclude SAC play next Friday when they travel to take on Lebanon.

My third and final (although they're might be 100 more) storyline in this county rivalry is simply this. Crawfordsville with Brett Motz and North Montgomery with Matt Voorhees not only are great friends, but they run their programs the right way. Nothing is taken for granted with both skippers as they both never let their teams get too high or too low. It's always about what is next in front of them. They both will have their teams prepared to the fullest for these two games, I have no doubt about that.

I'm thankful that I get the pleasure to interact with both of them frequently. They always make time for us here at the Journal and that is something that is not only appreciated by me, but by our entire sports staff.

In the end Tuesday and Wednesday should be another great chapter in this rivalry. I'm not going to make a prediction because honestly I have no clue how the two games will pan out. I do know this... it is going to be fun, exciting and down right entertaining baseball between two fantastic ball clubs.

Game one is set at Crawfordsville with first pitch at 6 while on Wednesday at North Montgomery they'll do battle under the lights with first pitch scheduled for 7 pm. I encourage all Montgomery County sports fans to come out if you can. You won't regret it.

Crawfordsville softball dug themselves too big of a hole in Monday's 13-2 loss to Lafayette Central Catholic. The Knights scored in every inning to pull away from the Athenians.

Cville was without the services of it's best defender and arguably their best hitter in freshman catcher Christina Susdorf and her presence was missed significantly as the Knights took advantage of some wild pitches from starter Olivia Hedrick and passed balls from Jessica Tribble who was thrust into the role.

In the first inning, it looked as if CHS would get out of it with allowing just a single run. However a pair of Athenian errors saw two more Knight's runs score. CC (9-9) added three more in the second, one in the third, three in the fourth and two in the fifth.

Crawfordsville got on the board in the bottom of the second thanks to an RBI single off the bat of freshman Molly Pierce. Pierce then scored the second run in the fifth off a single from shortstop Celeste Moore.

"We came out flat and just didn't seem focused from the get go," first-year Athenian coach Mackenzi Landrum said. "We've talked about all season that we're riding a roller coaster right now. It's about trying to stay at the top of it for as long as you can and not continue to fall down."

CHS was able to pick up its second win of the season on Saturday in a 13-3 road win at North Vermillion.

Cville (2-16) had four hits in the loss. Moore had a pair at the top of the Athenian batting order. Bailey Crane had a double while Pierce recorded the other Athenian hit. Landrum did still find positives in the loss.

"We were able to capitalize when we had runners on and runners in scoring position," she said. "When given the opportunity everyone did their job that we asked of them at the plate. Lily (Bridgham) laid down a very nice sac bunt to get runners over. The girls have embraced those roles that we've put them in and they know that if they do their job, us as coaches will be satisfied."

Olivia Hedrick got the loss on the mound for CHS. The freshman threw all five innings and gave up seven hits. Seven of her 13 runs were earned while she struck out one and walked four.

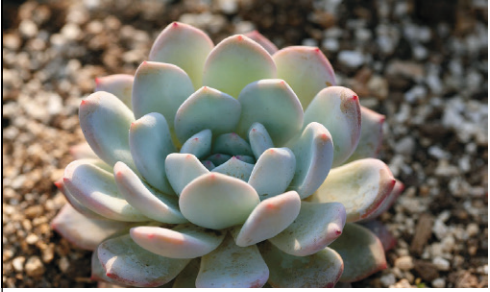
For the Knights, Lauren Johnson tallied a 3-3 night at the plate with three singles. Five other Knights got a hit with Julia Mazur, Kendal Rider, Clare Rausch, Sydney Renbeck, and Auna Silver each having one.

Crawfordsville will now get ready for two big Montgomery County and Sagamore Conference games as they'll host the North Montgomery Chargers (7-13) on Tuesday before traveling to North Montgomery on Wednesday. Landrum knows that her team already has a county win (15-5 over Southmont) on their resume and would love to add more against the Chargers.

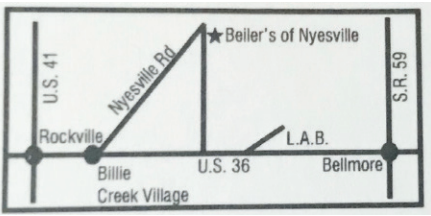

Seeing his clothes and belongings in our closets every time I opened the doors was painful. They were a constant reminder of what I’d lost.

After selecting a few meaningful items, I also began giving his belongings to close family members and then to charities. When my daughter became upset, I realized that we all process our grief in different ways. She wanted to preserve everything the way it was. Neither reaction is wrong.

And as for the SIL’s remodeling, I did exactly what she did. For me, it was a way to regain control of my life. My husband’s death was shocking and heartbreaking. Having a project gave me something to focus on other than my grief.

I would ask your readers to PLEASE cut some slack with those who are going through the grieving process. It’s a horrible experience. Each person has to survive it in their own way. Just because it isn’t your way doesn’t make it wrong. — CATHERINE IN MICHIGAN

DEAR CATHERINE: Thank you for your wise words. They are so true. Most readers who responded to that letter agreed with you. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: To “Unsure,” I say: Your sister-in-law lived with your brother every day of their married lives in the same house she still lives in. You were likely not an everyday visitor. When my husband died, there were things in our house I NEEDED to change, just so I could get through every day.

Our bedroom was number one. It may seem heartless to anyone other than a

spouse, but I could no longer sleep in the bed we had shared, in the room that was decorated in “his” style. I needed to make it solely my space; somewhere I could go to find peace.

Your sister-in-law is not disregarding your brother and his memory. She will always hold his memory in her heart, as you do. But living in that space likely requires her to make it less of a constant reminder of the love she has lost. — RUTH IN ILLINOIS

DEAR ABBY: I lost my husband seven months ago and began cleaning out his stuff almost immediately. Why would I want to look at his clothes every day? How does “Unsure” know her late brother’s marriage was so “good”? People thought that about mine, but it wasn’t.

Many of the changes to the house (painting, etc.) are things he and I had talked about, but he would never actually move on them. Changing artwork? Yes — not everything, but definitely some pieces I never really liked.

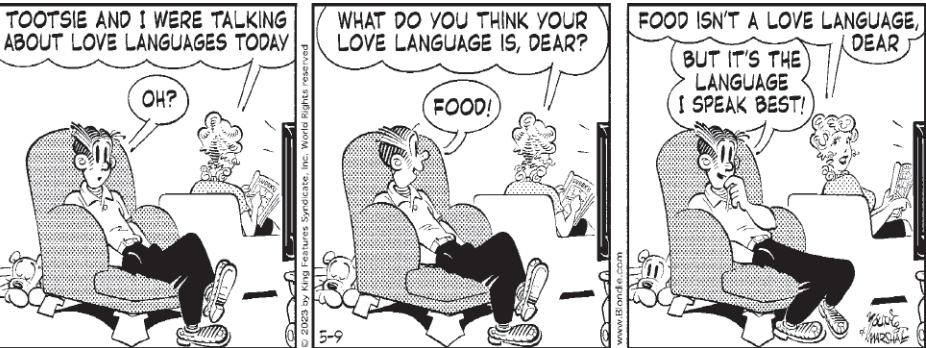

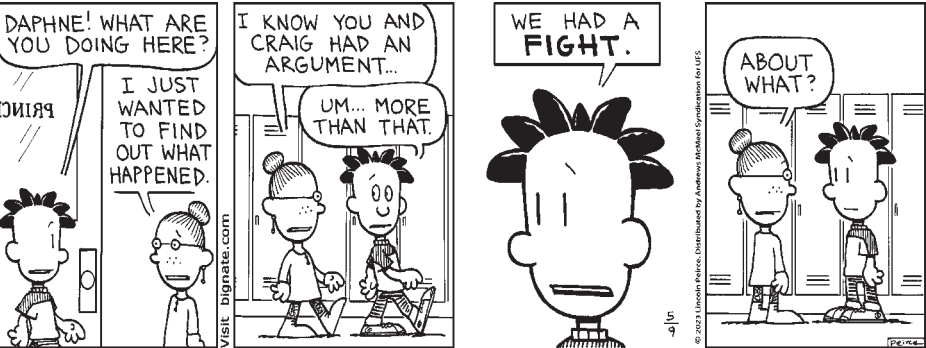

Will a computer ever match a human at bridge? Never! Although a computer counts reliably and remembers all of the cards, in particular the hidden-card and psychological elements make it impossible for a computer to play at an expert level.

Take today's deal as an example. If you wish to test yourself, cover the West and South hands. In the auction South has shown a balanced 13-15 points and 4-4 in the majors. Against four spades, your partner leads the club two, fourth-highest in principle. After winning with the jack, how would you continue?

True, it looks as though you stand no chance. Declarer seems to have 4-4-3-2 distribution with the spade ace-jack, the heart king-queen and the diamond ace. Even if you switch to a deceptive diamond nine, declarer will rise with the ace, draw trumps and cash four heart tricks, discarding dummy's diamond queen.

Sitting East was the Brazilian superstar Gabriel Chagas. He realized that the only

chance was to find partner with the heart queen and declarer with three clubs. At trick two, Chagas cashed the club ace. Then he switched to the diamond nine.

Now look at it from South's perspective. He thought that if he finessed in diamonds, West would win with the king and give East a club ruff. So South went up with the diamond ace, drew trumps and played a club to dummy's 10.

Imagine his shock when Chagas produced the queen and cashed the diamond king for down one.

A computer will never be able to find a deceptive play like that.

announce where he will be going when his contract ends June 30. However, he noted that he and his family will continue to reside in Crawfordsville.

Rex Ryker was then selected by the board to fill Bowling’s position. Ryker currently serves as the corporation’s assistant superintendent. He began his career with CCSC as a teacher at Crawfordsville High School, then served as assistant principal and principal at the middle school.

Ryker said once he became assistant superintendent, he began to think about a suc-

cession plan should Bowling choose to leave, and he was fortunate he would not have to look very far.

“I had dream team in mind,” he said. “Two people I thought or hoped would be with me, and they are both in this room today.”

Ryker recommended to the board that Brent Bokhart, the current Crawfordsville Middle School principal, be selected to fill the assistant superintendent’s position.

“He, as is evident, can lead in a positive, caring, collaborative manner to serve our students and staff,” Ryker said.

Bokhart came to CCSC in 2008 as a math teacher at CMS.

He and Ryker, who at that time was the CMS assistant principal, developed a personal and professional friendship while serving morning gym duty together. In 2015, Bokhart was promoted to assistant principal at the middle school. He introduced the staff and students to a school-wide behavior support program. In 2016, Bokhart became the CMS principal.

“There’s a reason he’s moved so quickly,” Ryker said. “He’s talented, he’s professional, he’s focused on learning, and I trust him both personally and professionally.”

Bokhart expressed his excitement for the new opportunity. Ryker acknowledged that the

role and expectations of the central office have changed over the years.

“The central office provides more centralized support for the development of teacher instruction and student achievement,” he said prior to recommending the hiring of Brittany Cooper as Director of Elementary Education.

Cooper previously worked for CCSC as a school counselor in 2013 at CMS. In 2016, she became the CMS assistant principal. She left the district in 2019 to become principal at New Market Elementary School.

Ryker praised Cooper as someone who can unify the

district’s preschool through elementary program to best serve students and staff.

“I’m honored to be back home and excited for this opportunity,” Cooper said. “I come from a family of educators, so it’s exciting to carry on that legacy.”

Steve McLaughlin, school board president, said the administrative changes taking place today underscore how important it is for school boards to hire administrators who can build great teams.

“Dr. Bowling hired all these people, and has created a legacy,” he said.

All the administrator changes are effective July 1.

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In other business, commissioners approved \$250,000 of their American Recovery Act funds to go toward a new project involving Shelly Drain. A long-time problem on the city’s east side, the drain has been studied for reconstruction. The county drainage board has a meeting at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday to hear results from the study.

Shelly Drain serves nearly 98% of the drainage in the eastern part of Crawfordsville, including the industry around the North S.R. 47 and East S.R. 32.

The estimated cost of the project is \$2.8 million.

If the drainage board elects to proceed with the project, there will be a public hearing in June.

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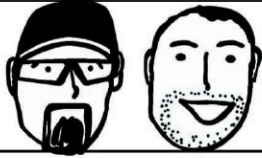
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Fifty shades of beige

Remember the beige craze of the 2000s? If you wanted to sell your house, you’d paint the interior walls of your house “bashful beige,” “autumn wheat,” “tasteful tan,” “totally taupe” or “burnt oatmeal.” Yes, if your house had 50 shades of beige, you’d sell your house lickety-split.

Now light gray is all the rage. No more bland sand! Bring on the “faded fog,” “shy shark” and “silver lining” shades. I don’t know how it happened, but light gray became the neutral go-to of the mid-2010s to the present day.

While neutral colors have pleasant, easy-for-real-estate undertones, they can come across as dull and boring. When it comes to language, there’s a term called “beige prose.” If you recall, I explored “purple prose” in the past. Purple prose is overly flowery language that uses tons of adjectives and words to describe something relatively simple.

Beige prose, on the other hand, is direct and is sometimes accused of being too plain. As a literary style, we have several notable examples.

I have to begin with my main man Ernest Hemingway, the father of anti-fluff writing. Instead of “beige” prose, he’d describe his writing style as “efficient and direct.” In Hemingway’s 1935 “Esquire” essay entitled “Notes on the Next War,” he writes, “They wrote in the old days that it is sweet and fitting to die for one’s country. But in modern war, there is nothing sweet nor fitting in your dying. You will die like a dog for no good reason.”

You’ll notice Hemingway is actually comparing the purple prose of the Victorian era with his own emerging style. No fluff here — just get-to-the-

point honesty from Ernie.

If you want a modern example of beige prose, look no further than Suzanne Collins, author of “The Hunger Games.” If you recall, I used “Twilight” author Stephenie Meyer as a modern purple prose-style writer. Meyer used an entire paragraph to describe vampire Edward’s sparkly skin. Katniss and Peeta, on the other hand, get the beige prose treatment.

“The Hunger Games” protagonist Katniss Everdeen describes her home life in a matter-of-fact way: “Sitting at Prim’s knees, guarding her, is the world’s ugliest cat. Mashed-in nose, half of one ear missing, eyes the color of rotting squash. Prim named him Buttercup, insisting that his muddy yellow coat matched the bright flower. He hates me. Or at least distrusts me.”

Other notable pro-beige prose authors include Jack London, Cormac McCarthy, Kurt Vonnegut and Charles Bukowski. While I agree descriptive purple prose has some useful applications, I lean toward beige prose to keep the plot moving forward; otherwise, I feel like reading a novel feels like watching khaki paint dry.
