**Bill requiring IEDC to disclose purchases advances**

An Indiana Senate committee voted unanimously Thursday to advance legislation that would require the Indiana Economic Development Corp., the state's job creation agency, to inform local officials before purchasing more than 100 acres in a county or municipality.

The Senate Local Commerce and Technology Committee voted 10-0 to move Senate Bill 295 from Sen. Brian Buchanan, a Republican from Lebanon, to the Senate floor. Buchanan introduced a similar bill last year but it never received a hearing.

Buchanan's district includes parts of Boone County, where the state began secretly amassing thousands of acres two years ago for a 10,000-acre advanced manufacturing site known as the LEAP Research and Innovation District. LEAP stands for Limitless Exploration/Advanced Pace.

## Bills to employ school chaplains, allow religious instruction move forward

Lines between church and state blurred at the Indiana Statehouse on Wednesday as lawmakers gave the go-ahead for two education bills that seek to increase students' access to faith leaders and religious instruction.

One proposal, House Bill 1137, would require schools to approve parental requests for students to leave school during the day for religious instruction. A separate measure, Senate Bill 50, could bring paid chaplains into Indiana's public schools. Both bills advanced from their assigned committees and now head to the respective chambers for further consideration.

"Quite simply, this just gives the parent more control over their student," said Rep. Kendall Culp, R-Rensselaer, who authored the House bill. "If the students can go off-site and learn character qualities, and become better students, they're going to have a greater experience in the classroom, and I think that's really important."

In the opposite chamber, Sen. Stacey Donato, R-Logansport, said her bill can help traditional school counselors who are struggling to manage large caseloads and increasing numbers of students in need.

"We are just trying to provide another tool for schools to help with the production of great students ... offering an option for a chaplain to come in and assist," she said.

**GUARANTEED TIME FOR RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION**

Culp's bill aims to tighten existing Indiana law that already permits students to leave school for up to 120 minutes a week for voluntary religious instruction, as long as it takes place off school property, and private transportation is provided.

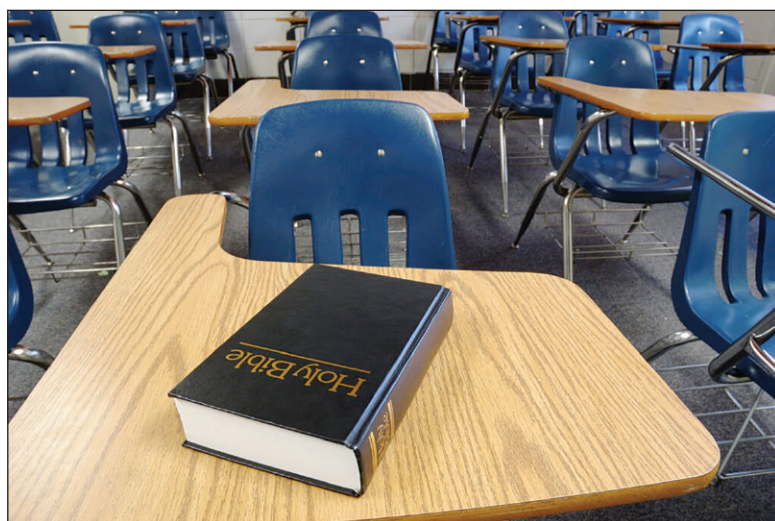

A 1952 U.S. Supreme Court ruling affirmed that "released time" programs are constitutional nationwide. As such, Hoosier parents can request religious instruction time for their child, but school administrators do not have to give approval.

Under the house bill, that "veto power" over the parent goes away, Culp said.

The bill — which passed unanimously — stipulates that when a parent of a public school student provides a written request, the principal "shall" allow the student to attend outside religious instruction that is organized by a church or religious organization.

The legislation also says a school principal must work "in a collaborative manner" with the parent to find the best time during the school day for a student to leave the school.

An amendment to the bill adopted Wednesday additionally clarifies that students who are habitually truant — those who have 10 or more unexcused absences — would not automatically qualify for religious instruction release. Students must also "be in academic good standing," though lawmakers said they could amend that language on the House floor to be more specific.

"I want to give kids this opportunity, for sure. But I want to make sure that they're not

behind — or contribute to falling further behind," said Rep. Bob Behning, R-Indianapolis, who chairs the House education committee.

Multiple organizations around the state — mainly Christian-centered — offer out-of-school curriculum for religious teaching, Culp said.

One of those, Ohio-based LifeWise Academy, currently serves more than 80% of elementary schoolers in north-west Indiana's West Central School Corporation.

"These programs emphasize character," said Dennis Guttwein, who serves on the district school board. "Teaching from the Bible — it is full of character that is sorely lacking in our society today. Things like honesty, humility, integrity, patience."

The program is now in its third year at West Central. Guttwein said students are allowed to leave school once a week, during a designated "library time."

Joel Penton, founder and CEO of LifeWise, said the program actively serves more than 300 schools across more than a dozen U.S. cities nationwide. Every week, nearly 30,000 public school students attend LifeWise Bible classes, he noted.

He emphasized that LifeWise is "entirely voluntary," and "zero core academic classes are

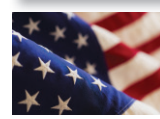

missed" by students who choose to attend.

When asked why the programming couldn't take place after school, Penton maintained that many students still need to catch the bus to get home, and others are already involved in after-school extracurriculars.

But Chris Lagoni, executive director of the Indiana Small and Rural Schools Association, said it's difficult to avoid disruptions in a school when dozens — even hundreds — of students are leaving for an organized program.

"We have to be careful. Let's say the Archdiocese comes to the table and says, 'Well, we'd like to offer our own program, and the local mosque comes forward and says, 'Well, we'd like to own our own program,'" Lagoni said in an example. "Looking down the road, how do you implement this when you're dealing with multiple entities that are

trying to get everybody to the table to agree upon a time that works and has minimal instructional interruption?"

Lisa Tanselle, general counsel for the Indiana School Boards Association, said the organization representing all 290 school corporations across the state is opposed to the bill.

"We want to preserve the academic day for students. That doesn't mean we are opposed or don't appreciate the value of religious instruction," she said. "This statute is designed to allow individual parents the opportunity to come to school officials and request release time for their students for up to 120 minutes. We believe that the current statute is working, and those requests are being accommodated for the vast majority of parents that make the request."

## SECULAR SUPPORT THROUGHOUT SCHOOLS

Testimony and discussion in the Senate educa-

tion committee proved more tense.

Donato said her bill aims to give schools "an option to add additional resources for emotional needs of students."

Chaplains can already volunteer at public schools. The measure makes clear they can be employed to provide "secular support" to students and school employees, given they have a master's degree in divinity, theology, religious studies, or a related field, as well as two years of "counseling experience."

Donato further emphasized that chaplains "must follow the same rules as school counselors," including mandatory reporting of child abuse — although the bill does not say so, explicitly.

ISBA executive director Terry Spradlin said the bill "is structured in a good way" to give school districts a "local option" to hire or receive chaplains as volunteers.

Representing the Indiana School Counselors

Association, Scott Carr said the group supports the proposal, but recommended additional language to ensure that chaplains who work with students are familiar with the developing brain counseling of adolescent children.

He pointed to similar bills that have already moved forward in states like Ohio and Texas.

Democrats held that could go against the wishes of a student or parents "who aren't on the same page."

Chris Daley, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Indiana, agreed, saying language in the bill that allows parents to direct a chaplain to provide religious counseling to the students "is a form of coercion outside of the school environment."

"That is a liberty issue that we do believe infringes on the constitutional rights of those students," Daley said.

# Wabash moves into tie for 1st with sweep of DePauw

GREENCASTLE — The Wabash-DePauw rivalry was on took front and center stage again on Wednesday at the Little Giants traveled to Greencastle for the second matchup with their arch rivals. Both teams came in at 6-3 in the North Coast Athletic Conference in what was a log-jam of five teams tied for second. During the game, thanks to an Oberlin upset over NCAC leader Wittenberg 77-67, the winner between the Tigers and Little Giants would move into a tie for first place. When all was said and done, the Little Giants walked out of Greencastle with a 69-61 win to earn a sweep over the Tigers. The win was also the sixth in the last seven meetings for Wabash.

Two players that made the win happen were juniors Vinny Buccilla and Noah Hupmann. Buccilla scored 14 of his team-high 15 points in the second half while Hupmann rejected shot after shot at the rim and ended with a career-high six blocks. Those six blocks come after he set a career-high last Saturday with five in the win over Oberlin.

“These two games against DePauw this season has been the best we’ve probably ever guarded them during my time here,” Wabash coach Kyle Brumett said. “We’ve held them to 61 points in both games and we finished off this one a lot better than when they were at our place. This rivalry is a tough game and they did a really good job on the offense boards with a

few of their guys. But when they did get those boards, we made it really hard for them to finish. I was happy with our physicality on that side of the ball.”

Buccilla who has had an up and down year for the Little Giants was glad to get back to what Wabash fans know he can be. When Wabash needed a spark on offense to begin the second half, it was Buccilla who had the hot hand and got them out to a comfortable lead. “It was tough sitting in that first half because I got into foul trouble, but my teammates just told me to come out an be aggressive in the second half,” Buccilla said. “I saw the first one go in and after that I knew things were going to start to roll after that. We needed this one bad and I’m glad that we pulled it out. It wasn’t just me out there, Noah had a huge game with his blocks, and Josh (Whack) knocked down

some big foul shots for us to seal it late. With us you have to pick your poison because we have so many guys who can score at anytime.”

For the game Wabash shot 20-57 (35.1%) from the field but the big difference was their threes compared to DePauw’s. 10-31 (32.3%) of the Little Giant threes found the bottom of the net with them also going 19-23 (82.6%) from the foul line. Wabash grabbed 40 rebounds in total and did a great job of only committing three turnovers. Along with Buccilla’s 15, Ahmoni Jones scored 11, Sam Comer 10, Rich Brooks and Josh Whack both scored eight , Avery Beaver seven, Gavin Schippert four, and Hupmann had two.

DePauw (11-8, 6-4 NCAC) was without the services of their second leading scorer in senior Grant Niego (11.5 ppg). Sam Jacobs led all scorers in the game for with 17 for the Tigers in the

loss. Kyle Lillwitz scored 12, Ronald Johnson 11, Reph Stevenson seven, Caleb Washington six, Grant Gohmann five, and Camden Brown three. The Tiger shot 24-62 (38.7%) from the field but only made half of the threes that Wabash did going 5-17 (29.4%). DePauw also made 11 fewer foul shots going 8-15

(53.3%) from the charity stripe. They grabbed 39 rebounds and only turned the ball over five times.

Brumett took time after the game to praise the play of Buccilla.

“People are going to have some fear when they see that he’s back to the old Vinny that we all know,” Brumett said. “Vinny is one of our

best perimeter guys too and he can lock people down out there. I think he got just a little too aggressive and that’s what led to some of those first-half fouls. His second half though is what we need out of him and what we expect out of him and what he expects out of himself.”

The stage only gets bigger for the Little Giants improve to 11-8 overall and now are tied with Wittenberg, Denison, and Wooster at 7-3 in the NCAC. Wabash welcomes Wittenberg to Chadwick court on Saturday looking to avenge a 75-62 loss earlier this season and keep atop the conference standings.

“We knew this was a big week coming in,” Brumett concluded. “We certainly didn’t want to look past this game but we’ve went on the road and won, it showed that we have some toughness in us. It’ll be a littler easier now to come back home to Chadwick on Saturday and get where we want it to be.”

The game at Chadwick court is slated for a 2 p.m. start

**DEAR STEPMOM: It is time to have an honest talk with your husband about this. When a sex offender is released from prison, there are**

**stipulations in place. One of them is being forbidden to live close to young, vulnerable children. Because your street is populated with them, David may not be ABLE to live with you. This is something you and your husband need to be communicating about as David's release draws nearer, because it will have an impact on your lives.**

DEAR ABBY: My wife and I are part of a three-couple group who enjoy dining out as well as entertaining in our homes. However, while my wife and I and one other couple serve as hosts, the third never invites us into their home. They often suggest a menu or an occasion for us or the other couple to serve when we host.

## Can agrivoltaics save family farms, local land?

Our climate team's leading voice, John Smilie, has been posting on social media about agrivoltaics, and if you've never heard the term, you can figure out its part science, part agriculture.

If you're curious or nerdy enough, you might fall into a research rabbit hole to find out what it is and why it matters.

The term photovoltaics just means power from light. And yes, photovoltaics is jargon for solar panels, and agrivoltaics is a kind of portmanteau, a blend of voltaics and agriculture, to suggest that large scale solar farming is an increasingly an attractive way to optimize yields, which could help smaller farm operations survive the takeovers of agribusiness.

These days, a number of people turn more to YouTube to bypass the jargon the jargon of newspaper and journal articles. YouTube can be helpful, but it's critical to remember that it's just a library of videos from anyone who adds their content, many of which are not subjected to fact-checking and the rigor of accuracy that science journals and reputable periodicals must pass. Furthermore, Google and search engines work on



algorithms that can provide long lists of videos and websites that just repackage the same misinformation and utilize search engine optimization techniques to attract attention.

For this reason, Smilie helped to fact-check one particularly insightful video — Matt Ferrell's "Solar Panels Plus Farming Agrivoltaics Explained." Because Ferrell self-publishes via YouTube without an editorial board and a team of fact checkers, he's an

independent reporter. He does cite all his sources posted with the transcript of his video linked in the notes of his video and his website includes his personal ethics statement, which is promising.

Smilie has been presenting his research across Indiana and helping foot the bill to install solar for local non-profits — the Boys & Girls Club, the Youth Services Bureau, and now the Free Clinic. His goal is to educate about solar and mitigate climate change.

"It's real. It's bad. It's us. There's hope," Smilie said.

Ferrell too leads with hope.

"We have a world population expected to grow by 1.2 billion people within 15 years, coupled

with a growing demand for meat, eggs and dairy, which soak up over 70% of fresh water for crops, plus electricity demand that's growing even faster than population growth ... what are we supposed to do about all of that? Well, we can combine two of my favorite things: technology and food." This video, one of many on promising new technologies, explains the types of land usage that are helping small farmers save their land from corporate takeovers.

Ferrell defines dual-use land, where small farm animals help with the upkeep and maximizations of large scale solar installations. It's the kind of usage that Hoosier energy employed in 2021 when it partnered with

sheep farmers in Columbus. WTHR reported the sheep graze down growth beneath the panels and thrive in the shade. Ferrell explains that chickens and geese are also excellent small animals to co-farm with solar.

Until recently crop farming around solar farming was technically alternating use land. Farmers could only plant between the rows, losing ground under the panels,

to allow the sun to reach the plants. Now European nations have begun farming with vertically mounted bifacial modules solar panels. Because they're vertically mounted, the panels help reduce wind erosion in vulnerable areas. Furthermore, in Next2Sun AG's pilot project in Germany, the bifacial vertical solar panels allowed for large farm equipment to cultivate

hay between rows, boosting yields by 50% because they improved moisture retention in the soil. Smilie imagines that this promising innovation could transform the plight of Kansas wheat farmers, where farmers compete for water and rely on irrigation. Another benefit of bifacial panels? They produce more power at morning and evening, when we need it, making them complementary to ordinary tilt solar panels that maximize production at noon.

Another solution is putting panels on stilts, which Purdue University has done in cornfields of Northwest Indiana. Because they're high enough to let equipment

to move beneath, the land can generate profit two ways.

The University of Arizona reported a study on growing cherry tomatoes and pepper in arid land. The solar panels cool the land beneath in addition to preserving moisture, which improves water usage and yields in Arizona and other arid areas.

In his video and linked article, Ferrell breaks down how much land might not be used with the different configurations and how yields are affected depending on the type of crop grown — sun-hungry versus shade-loving — under solar panels. Shade loving plants like raspberries, spinach, lettuce, potatoes and tomatoes can thrive. Yields for sun loving crops vary based

on shifts in climate. In 'wet and cold' years, German experimenters saw 25% lower yields in agrivoltaic fields, but in "dry and hot" years, yields were greater than non-solar fields. Researchers believe this holds promise for hot, arid regions of the world.

After Ferrell provides all this positive evidence for voltaics, he asks, "So what's keeping us from rolling out this dual-purpose, game-changing system at a massive scale? What's the catch? Energy production is a different ball game from agriculture, which can slow down farmers from embracing the technology. But the actual obstacles are sadly ... mundane ... and some frustrating."

Ferrell addresses the

not-in-my-backyard effect, bureaucracy and the market concerns. He graciously speaks to crowds of people who resist the change, acknowledging that building local support is to ensure that the systems should be run by and be profitable for local farms, local energy cooperatives like CEL&Ps solar efforts and regional investors. Empowering the local people and communicating how it profits them are two solutions in Ferrell's opinion.

Smilie notes that "we already use our fields for energy production — nearly 40 million acres of corn, and another 28-30 million acres for soy biodiesel. It's insane. You get minimum 30 times more gross energy per acre with solar (and

like 100 times-plus net energy). Put that into an EV with three times efficiency, you get 90 times the vehicle miles traveled with less engine wear and tear and no air pollution or fertilizer runoff."

Finally, for those farms that have implemented solar farming in conjunction with their operations, it's been a life-saver. Byron Kominek, a hay farmer with only 24 acres in Colorado, adding solar saved his farm. A Wisconsin farmer struggling to keep his dairy farm alive decided to share 500 acres because he wanted to preserve family land. In the decades since Nixon's Agriculture Secretary Earl Butts fostered a shift to corporate farming, causing family farms to

rapidly disappear, agrivoltaics is rescuing struggling farmers. "Farmers have what solar energy companies need: land," Wisconsin Public Radio reported. In turn, communities installing solar farms have realized they can benefit from farmers. From beekeeping to potatoes, broccoli, kale, herbs and tomatillos, Minnesota solar installations are better utilizing land to serve the people.

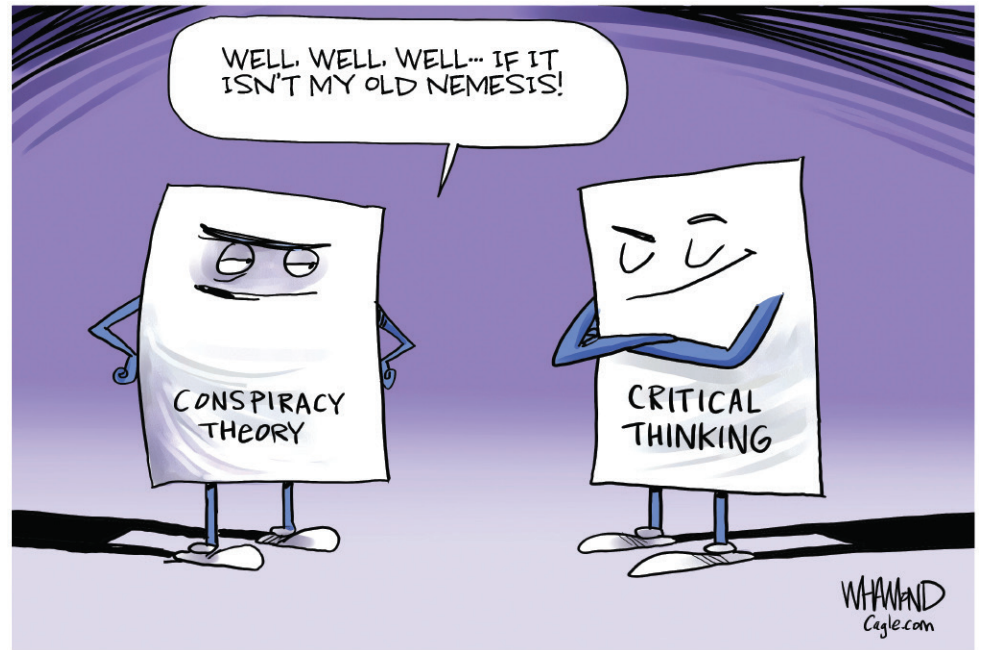

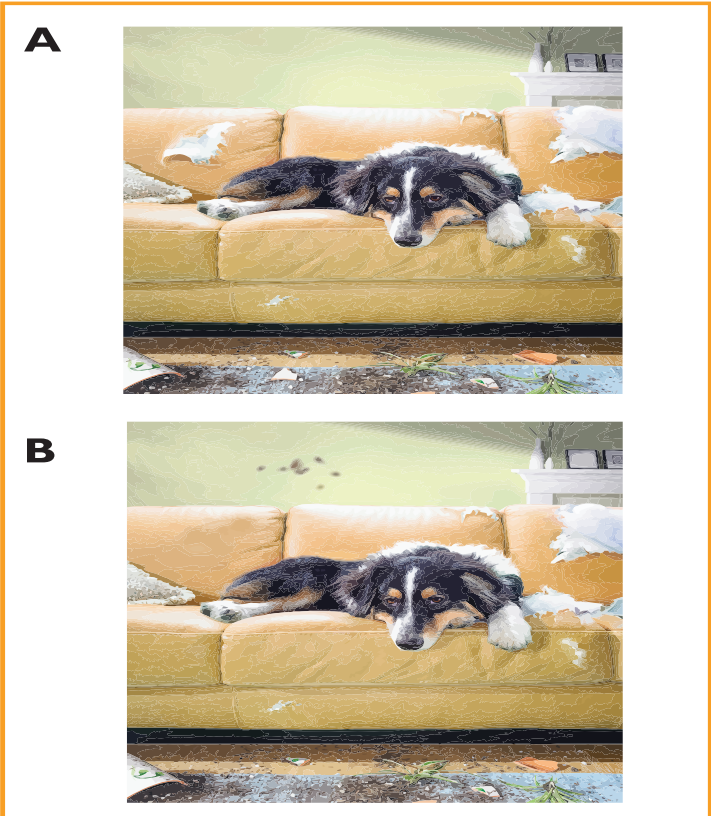

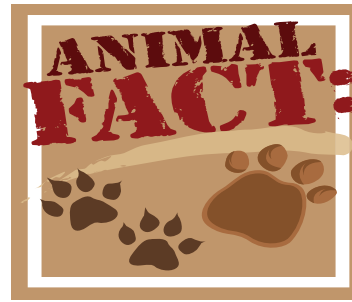
