City discusses conflicting back to school events

Four local groups, all working towards the same goal, experienced scheduling conflicts that were addressed at the recent city council on July 14. The events

in question involve back to school fund raising efforts scheduled to take place in August.

Representatives for the Main Street Board, the Divine Restoration Apostolic Ministries, Edwards Association, and the Eastside Baptist Church attended

last Thursday's meeting to address the schedule conflict, requesting the council address a possible solution.

The events, inadvertently on the same day, specifically Saturday, August 6, creating the potential conflict. Tiffany Hutchinson-Padilla advised the council

that the Main Street board had begun promoting the event prior to council approval of a set date for the event and had been informed to stop.

"Since I am new at this position, I

BACK TO SCHOOL

Gonzales ISD and Waelder ISD agree on interlocal transportation agreement

Gonzales ISD agreed, during the last school board meeting Monday, July 11, on an Interlocal Agreement with Waelder ISD for transportation ser-

GISD Superintendent Elmer Avellaneda and WISD Superintendent Ron Lilie both talked about how this interlocal agreement will impact their districts.

We try to create this type of agreement so that our students of course get the resources and the help they need and way that's beneficial to both districts to students, and so forth and so on." Avellaneda said.

The agreement will help students

get transportation to the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program (DAEP) in Nixon-Smiley for both districts. Currently certain districts do not provide this transportation,"Lilie explained.

"We were looking for something that would be economical for the district but also accommodate the parents and their work schedules and things like that." Lilie said.

The DAEP in Nixon suggested the interlocal agreement with GISD, according to Lilie, citing the benefit to both districts in offsetting the cost of trans-

The interlocal agreement will begin Wednesday, Aug. 17 and end Thursday, May 23, 2023, with an annual review for the next school year.

County water levels in normal range despite extreme heat

Despite the county facing extreme temperatures, water level reports remained steady according to the Gonzales County Water Conservation District. At the GC-WCD board of directors meeting, it was

announced that water levels were checked on 189 observation wells for the June water level report.

"Surprisingly, it wasn't that bad for June water level measurements," Water Consultant Greg Sengelmann said. "What sort of surprised me was over on the northeastern side up in the Delhi area, there was a foot

drawdown in January, but now it's like nine feet drawdown."

Three times a year the water level report is produced in January, June and September and the water quality is checked in March.



Q. Grass Be Gone, Poast, and the other contact herbicides for grassy weeds won't work for dried out Bermuda grass in gardens but what if the Bermuda grass is growing in an irrigated garden? It is taking over my vegetable and flower gardens.

A. If the Bermuda grass or other grassy weed is receiving moisture and in a state of active growth, the herbicides will control them. One note to keep in mind

though is the label of the contact herbicides usually do not allow use of the products in vegetable gardens. They can be used in shrub borders and flower gardens but not in gardens

that are producing vegetables for human consumption. Q. Some type of insect is eating

the leaves on my pepper plants. Will one of the Bt products work?

A. A Bt product will work to control the insect if it is a caterpillar but not a beetle. If it is a beetle use malathion or Spinosad. If you are not sure what is feeding on the leaves, but it is still actively feeding use the malathion or the Spinosad which will control both caterpillars and beetles.

Q. My neighbor is complaining that my dog's urine is killing places in his lawn where it urinates. I can't see any of the dead areas that he is complaining about. Does dog urine have the power to kill lawn grass.?

A. It used to be a problem in the North when large dogs urinated at the same place on the frozen lawn over and over, and I know some horticulturists here in Texas say it is an issue even though I don't see the

damage they are complaining about. It may be best to do what is necessary to limit your dog's urination to your own yard, or if you walk him, try to avoid letting him urinate on the lawns of neighbors who find it unpleasant.

Q. You talked me into trying "Whopper" begonias and they turned out to be as attractive as you described. They have grown quite

large; can I prune them back a bit?

A. Yes, prune them as you deem it will improve their looks at some of the joints that have formed. It is also a good time to provide some Osmocote to

carry them through the autumn.

Q. Remind me which of the fall tomatoes are resistant to nematodes. Is there a treatment I can apply to the soil to control nematodes?

A. Celebrity, Tycoon, and BHN 968 will grow and produce acceptively in nematode infected soils. I am not familiar with any remaining chemical treatments for nematodes.

When life gives you the cold shoulder

Frozen shoulder, otherwise known as adhesive capsulitis in the medical community, is a medical condition that causes severe and painful restriction of motion in the shoulder joint. The pain, along with subsequent swelling and stiffness, can make everyday activities more difficult, almost always worsening over time, affecting the ability to rest, participate in normal activities, or daily routines, as well as exercise or work related activities. Though signs and symptoms typically gradually worsen they also may resolve over time, usually within one to three years of onset.

The shoulder is made up of three bones forming a ball-and-socket joint, and along with the tissues that hold it all together, the three bones form the shoulder capsule. These bones are the humerus (upper arm), scapula (shoulder blade) and clavicle (collarbone).

When a patient develops frozen shoulder, the capsule surrounding the joint contracts. The patient's body forms bands of scar tissue called adhesion. In addition, the soft sacs which cushion the joint called bursae may also stick together causing loss of ability to move the shoulder.

The contraction of the capsule and the formation of the adhesion cause the frozen shoulder to become stiff and cause movement to become extremely painful. This causes the shoulder from being able to freely move within the socket, causing it to seemingly be "frozen" in place, which is why it is referred to as frozen shoulder. Without proper treatment the condition may last for years.

This condition occurs twice as often in women than in men, typically among those between 40 - 60 years of age, as well as also developing after an injury to the shoulder area, shoulder surgical procedures, and even vaccinations in the shoulder muscle. Any instance where the surgery is exposed to prolonged joint immobilization the risk for developing frozen shoulder increases greatly.

Symptoms for this condition include shoulder pain (usually dull and aching), limited mobility, difficulty with daily activities, as well as occasional pain in the neck, upper shoulder, elbow or forearm, neck stiffness, headaches, and numbness in one or both hands. Toward the final stage of the condition the shoulder eventually begins to "thaw" with improved range of motion and decreased pain. This may take two to three years in 90% of cases, with 10% not improving without medical intervention.

Historically treatment for this condition include physical therapy, pain and anti-inflammatory medication, cortisone injections, shoulder alternatives, or some combination of all the a fore listed.

U.S. BILL OF RIGHTS

AMENDMENTS I-V

Amendment I Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear

Arms, shall not be infringed.


No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of

no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized. Amendment V No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment

or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation

On finishing well...

he late Dr. Robert L. Smith and Ethelyn Hughes Smith, his bride, fell short in precious few areas of life, but when they did, it was never by intent. By a few weeks in each case, they missed a 70th wedding anniversary, he failed to attain age 90 and she was just short of her 97th birthday when she died recently.

They set new standards of service to others, however, the kind that the rest of us may only dream of.

When they reached their 60s, the thought of retirement didn't enter their minds. In fact, they would change gears to serve another three decades of Christian service upon relocation to Brownwood, TX, where he would become a distinguished professor of preaching at Howard Payne University....

Ethelyn was in lockstep with him,

loving students and others as much as he did. The former pastor at First Baptist Church of Houston, he was a recognized artist as well, and when age started to take its toll,



he clung doggedly to teaching an adult Sunday school class now led by another HPU retiree, Dr. Paul Butler.

Dr. Butler and wife Virginia marveled at his determination, even when macular degeneration robbed him of his eyesight.

As Dr. Smith completed five years as a Sunday school teacher and with vision almost gone, he depended on Ethelyn holding up big-lettered poster boards for his outline. Dr. Butler described her as "a 100-pound package of dynamite." And she was....

She was the ultimate in modesty, saying little of playing the piano at age 10, or serving as organist at both the Baptist and Presbyterian churches in Jefferson, TX, at age 12. Nor was it widely known that she also was both an artist and ceramist.

While cleaning out her closets a while back, children Judy and Robert Jr.--themselves artists--found several drawings with their mother's name

on them. Neither had ever seen these works, nor heard much of her artistic tal-

Ethelyn sustained a broken back as the result of a fall in the Smith's yard within months of her husband's death. Soon, she and Robert Jr. long physically challenged — were residents at the Redstone Assisted-Living Community.

They were "rock stars" immediately. Robert Jr. cheered other residents as he moved around Redstone on his motorized wheelchair.

During multiple times weekly until recent months, Ethelyn made her way to the lobby to play hymns on the piano for residents....

Steady streams of visitors came to see Ethelyn and Robert Jr. Perhaps most surprising were out-ofstate visitors on her 90th birthday. Three couples — all members of the young marrieds Sunday school class Ethelyn taught during the Smiths' 14-year stint at First Baptist Church in Pompano Beach, Florida —drove to Brownwood for a two-day visit with her. Their trip covered some 2,500 miles.

We've all heard of prayer warriors. Ethelyn headed the list.

She prayed with great confidence and expectation, making specific prayer petitions as requests were delivered by class members from a prayer box at First Baptist Church. Little wonder that she soon was called "the prayer lady" by Redstone staffers who visited her regularly for prayers and encouragement....

Finally, this: Determined to serve our Lord in all ways she could, she sent birthday cards--each with personal touches of scriptures and words of encouragement — to everyone at Redstone — some five dozen residents and three dozen employees. She sent about 1,000 cards.

She didn't have "the last word" at her funeral though, as she requested. (She claimed "last word status" in the obituary she wrote in her program

The Texas Rangers are continuing to investigate the incident. It is believed the shooting occurred following an earlier disagreement between Gonzales and Benitez.



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Smiley votes to abandon unused road for safety

Smiley City Council members voted unanimously Wednesday, July 13, to abandon an unused portion of East Arlington between Leon Street and Farm-to-Market Road 108.

Cindy Scarborough, whose family owns what would be the entire 100 block of East Arlington, said it had been a part of their family for nearly 50 years and "has never been maintained as a road ever in all the time we've been

"We'd never had trouble with people driving through there until the last few years, and very specifically, in the last year," Scarborough said. "People come down through the little alley, in the middle of our block, and they cut around through that what's basically the yard by the shop. Children play out there, animals play out there and people are driving through there.

'There's no way for people to drive through the 100 block of East Arlington without cutting through the yard, in the front of my sister-in-law's property. There's a tree growing in the middle of what should be the road. There's a city sewer manhole that's about this far off the ground in the middle of what should be the road."

Scarborough asked the city to abandon the roadway so it could be closed off to through traffic, with the stipulation the city would maintain an easement to be able to access the sewer line.

"Since we own that entire block, there's not any reason for public access through there, other than the city workers to come in to work on the sewer hole." Scarborough said. "So our families are respectfully asking that the city formally close the 100 block of East Arlington so that people do not drive through there."

Council members also discussed a notice of violation from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) because the city failed to adopt and submit an emergency preparedness plan on or before March 1.

City Secretary Deborah Bustamente said Texas cities were told they would have to adopt a preparedness plan after last year's freeze, but the call for such plans was not issued by TCEQ until November 2021 with a March 1, 2022 deadline. She said she reached out to TCEQ to find out what assistance could be provided to

"Normally, communities have been reaching out to their engineers," Bustamente said. "With this, they're going to send us someone at no cost to help us put this plan together, so that's a good thing. That same person that I spoke to, they're also going to send someone out to help our community with all of the things we need to fix on our water and sewer, so that's at no cost to us as

Mayor Lisa Benavides discussed the city's financial situation, noting the city had been able to pay for asphalt from December 2020 in the amount of \$1,682.30 and to pay \$10,000 to the city's waste management contractor, which had been owed since December 2021, leaving an outstanding balance of about \$20,000.

"It's only \$20,000?" Council member Diana Moreno asked. "I thought last month you said we owed \$85,000."

"It was the total, but Ms. Bustamente has been working with them and we got it down to \$30,000 and made an arrangement to send them \$10,000, so now we're down to \$20,000 in arrears," Benavides said.

Benavides also discussed outstanding utility bills owed by residents.

"We are still doing our best to collect on our water bills," Benavides said. "We have a customer that owes us \$5,000, plus we have a total of \$14,000 that is still in past due on our water utility."

Benavides said the utility workers are placing shutoff notices on doors when an individual fails honor any payment arrangements they have made and are seriously past due.

"A lot of these people have payment agreements with the previous administration that they broke," Benavides said. "We went back to their agreements because we've been trying to work with them and honor that, but they come and tell us we're going to pay and they don't ever come, so we have to turn them off. They know they are in default."

Benavides said the original amount owed past due was around \$27,000. When asked who owed that much, she replied,

"probably half of Smiley." "We had one gentleman who had not paid his water bill and was still getting water since 2020," she said. "He hasn't paid one cent to the city of Smiley, but his water is still turned on. We are working with people when they come in and talk to us."

didn't know if they could do that without the event being approved. So I asked them to please stop." Hutchinson-Padil-

Main Street and Divine Restoration Apostolic Ministries discussed collaborating for the event, ultimately deciding that the goals envisioned different forms of distribution of the school supplies being donated. Main Street elected to provide all supplies gathered directly to Gonzales ISD for distribution, with Divine Ministries wanting the items to be given

past the chain link fence at the city's hydroelectric dam on the river (just off Water Street).

Another topic of discussion would be adequate signage or other warning devices may be needed for those who enter the river by foot or watercraft.

On Sunday, July 10, Gustavo Angel Velazquez, a 24-year-old Gonzales High School graduate, drowned in the Guadalupe River after he was last seen below the hydroelectric dam. His body was located and recovered by Gonzales County Rescue personnel later that evening.

On Sunday, May 1, 22-year-old Nixon

resident Daniel Cruz drowned near the dam after being reported missing that evening. His body wasn't recovered by game wardens until the following day.

"In light of the recent drowning events below the City of Gonzales dam and hydroelectric plant, steps have been taken starting today (Thursday, July 14) to install a temporary fence blocking access to the former Lou's Canoes river access trail and the river bank it leads to," Mayor S.H. "Steve" Sucher stated in an order. "Separately, gates to the hydroelectric plant itself will be closed to the public at all times and public access to the river bank immediately south of

the plant will be blocked as a result.

"All other recreational and fishing locations south along the river and north of the hydroelectric plant will remain open to the public. Please consider wearing a life jacket at any time you choose to enter the Guadalupe River."

A task force of "local first responders, state river management, and federal hydroelectric regulatory agencies" will be consulted to develop recommendations to improve safety at these sites. These recommendations will then be presented at the Aug. 11 council meeting and subject to public comment.

"The temporary restrictions at these

two sites will remain in place until public comment is completed and new measures, if any, are approved and implemented. Water safety at the Highway 183 bridge will be included in this discussion," Sucher stated, noting the property in question is owned by the city.

"This is a voluntary order and no citations will be issued to individuals who manage to get past these barriers," Sucher said. "We do ask the public's cooperation in avoiding these two sites during this interim period. Tampering or vandalism to the barriers will be treated in accordance with existing city ordinances."

"We expect to see some drawdown through regular (water) use in normal years. We're within normal range in the center to the southwest part," said Laura Martin, General Manager at Gonzales County Underground Water Conservation District. "It's good news, but when we get to September we'll probably see additional drawdowns unless we see significant rain between now and then."

Because Gonzales County is in an extreme period of drought, the GCUWCD wants to continue to remind people to be mindful of the water they are using.

"Don't water every day.
Once a week is sufficient.
It's okay, the grass will recover," Martin said. "Don't wash your vehicle every week, don't let the faucet run while you're brushing your teeth, make sure all the leaky faucets are fixed. All of these water saving tips, if everyone contributed, will add up."

The GCUWCD is making more of an effort this year

to increase awareness. This includes advertising. New rain gauges were approved at the GCUWCD meeting as well as participation in the upcoming Come and Take It sponsorship.

"We had rain gauges we gave out to local communities and groups," Martin said. "But we're all out of them now, they went quickly. We will do them again."

There have been discussions on the possibility of partnering with the Lions club to put out a rainwater harvesting system at the community garden near Thrive gym.

"There's one out at Palmetto state park already, but it would be nice to have one in town so local schools and community members can be able to go and see how that's used," Martin said. "It's something people can do at their homes as well and there's all different capacities from small 55 gallon barrels up to thousands of gallons of barrels. Water your lawn off of free water you don't have to pay for."

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pensated liver failure and acute kidney failure (attributed to the stress on his system from the liver failure). Issues from diabetes are to blame for his liver trouble.

Due to his illness, Decker is no longer medically able to work for the Inquirer. As such, he must take COBRA in order to continue his insurance benefits and premiums are about \$800 per month. He said administrators at the hospital have told him he must show proof of coverage for a full year (through July 2023) before they will perform a transplant due to the cost.

Decker also must have a place to stay in San Antonio following the transplant so he can be near the hospital for treatment and will have to have a caretaker who can check in on him to make sure he doesn't suffer any medical emergencies or setbacks

like organ rejection. If he is unable to meet these conditions, he will be released home to get his affairs in order for whatever remaining time he has left to live, based on their estimate. If funds cannot be used for his transplant, they will go towards end-oflife care and final arrangements. Any funds left after that would be left towards care of his cherished grandchil-
