"I'm leaving at the end of the school year and going into educational consulting. After 17 years of leading SCS, it's definitely bittersweet," Yackel told the Inquirer.

National Bikers Roundup will bring thousands of cycle enthusiasts to JB Wells

As many as 30,000 to 40,000 motorcycle and camping enthusiasts will call the JB Wells Arena, Park and Expo in Gonzales home for six days this summer when the 48th National Bikers Roundup convenes on July 29 through Aug. 3, 2025.

National Bikers Roundup is the largest camping motorcycle rally held in the United States each year and is organized by several primarily African-American motorcycle clubs. There are strict rules that all attendees must follow: no weapons; no ATVs; no drones; no four-wheelers and no glass containers allowed. More than 1,000 motorcycle clubs attend the event each year, and African-American women make up close to half of the participants.

Last year, the roundup was held in Springfield, Illinois, and included a special "Ride for Justice for Sonya Massey," a 36-year-old African-American woman who was shot and killed in her home by Sean Grayson, a deputy with the Sangamon County Sheriff's Office in Woodside Township, near Springfield.

January sales tax allocations show declining November 2024 sales

November sales tax receipts were down in 2024, meaning sales tax allocations for Gonzales County municipalities for January 2025 were down more than \$12,900, a decrease of nearly 4.1 percent less than cities received last January, according to figures released by Texas Comptroller Glenn

Hegar announced he has sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for January, 0.3 percent more than in January 2024. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

Combined sales tax allocations for the month

Free tax filing service available on IRS.gov

The Internal Revenue Service announced that the IRS Free File Guided Tax Software is now available for taxpayers ahead of the official start of tax season later this

IRS Free File is now accepting individual tax returns. Millions of taxpayers nationwide can access free software tools offered by trusted IRS Free File partners by visiting IRS.gov.

Entering its 23rd filing season, IRS Free File is just one of many free options available to taxpayers for filing their tax returns, whether online or in person. This service is made possible through a public-private partnership between the IRS and Free File Inc. (formerly the Free File Alliance). As part of this partnership, tax preparation and filing software partners offer their online products to eligible taxpayers for free. To access these free tools, taxpayers must start from the IRS Free File page on IRS.gov.

This year, eight private-sector partners will provide online guided tax software products for taxpayers with an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of \$84,000 or less in 2024. Additionally, one partner will offer a product in Spanish.

Although the IRS official tax filing season begins later this month, IRS Free File providers will allow taxpayers to prepare and file returns now and hold them until they can be electronically filed on that date. Many other software companies offer a similar option.

Taxpayers with an AGI above \$84,000 can use the Free File Fillable Forms (FFFF) starting January 27. These electronic versions of IRS paper forms are ideal for individuals who are comfortable preparing their own taxes using IRS instructions and publications.

UNDERSTANDING IRS FREE FILE

Each IRS Free File trusted partner establishes its own eligibility criteria based on age, income, state residency and military status.

Taxpayers with an AGI of \$84,000 or less in 2024 can find an IRS Free File product; some providers include free state tax return preparation and filing. All partners offer active-duty military personnel with an AGI of \$84,000 or less in 2024, free tax preparation and filing using IRS Free File.

USE IRS FREE FILE TO CLAIM VALUABLE TAX CREDITS IF **ELIGIBLE**

IRS Free File offers a simple, no-cost way for taxpayers to claim the full amount of tax benefits for which they're eligible, including the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), the Child Tax Credit and other valuable credits. The EITC is available to qualified taxpayers with earned income under \$66,819. The EITC Assistant, available in English and seven other languages, can help taxpayers determine if they qualify.

The EITC is just one of several refundable tax credits related to family and dependent care that individuals without a filing requirement may still be eligible to claim. Refundable tax credits allow taxpayers to receive a refund even if they owe no tax, or refundable credits can reduce the amount of tax owed, potentially leading to a refund. This funding is available for private landowners/ producers who own natural or agricultural lands in eligible counties across Texas, including Austin, Brazoria, Calhoun, Chambers, Colorado, DeWitt, Favette, Fort Bend, Galveston, Gonzales, Grimes, Harris, Jackson, Lavaca, Matagorda, Montgomery, Victoria, Waller, Washington, and Wharton counties.

Landowners/producers can apply for funding to support Habitat Management Practices, including brush control, prescribed fire, cattle cross-fencing, and other beneficial practices that promote healthy ecosystems and

improve wildlife habitat.

Q. What is the deal with the Cooper's hawk in my neighborhood. I saw what I thought was a roadrunner hunting in the brush along my fence, but it turned out to be a Cooper's hawk! It was near my bird feeder; would he be hunting birds on the ground?

A. Actually, it is not unusual for the Cooper's hawks to hunt on the ground. In addition to birds, they also feed on lizards and even small rodents. Other gardeners have reported that they were especially inclined to be looking for cold sluggish reptiles during the cold spell.

Q. How did everyone's cyclamen and primula fare in the freezes? I covered mine with one layer of N-sulate and they did fine. Even the "whopper begonias" that were under the fiber survived. Of course, the begonias that were not covered got flattened

along with the pentas. A. Based on my plants and the reports I received from other gardeners, the results were pretty consistent with yours. Don't be too quick to pull up your Whoppers. They will often regrow from the roots in mild freeze

situations. Q. What can we replant in the vegetable garden? Most of our greens were frozen

A. You have time to replant English peas and lettuce by seeds. Some nurseries also have broccoli, spinach, onion, Swiss chard and collard transplants that will probably have time to make a crop. Plant potatoes now. It is too early to plant tomatoes in the garden, but you can pot up transplants in a container and put them in the sun out of the wind until April 1.

Q. It was amazing, the stocks survived the freeze and now after I watered them are just as attractive and fragrant as before. The snapdragons don't look great though, should I toss them?

A. In addition to the stocks, it appears that the calendulas, alyssum and pansies fared well. In most cases the snapdragons will recover and rebloom in a few weeks. You have the choice to replace them or just be patient. Unfortunately, the sweet peas were frozen. The good news is that there is time to reseed them if you act fast.



And that was then...

t is interesting how history appears to be headed in one direction, and then is sent in another by a seemingly unimportant event, or occurrence, of routine significance. Such is the case in the history of Texas, about three years after Green DeWitt's Colony had been founded.

In 1828, the president of the Republic of Mexico commissioned a scientific and boundary expedition across Texas to accomplish the following purposes:

First: Observe the Indians, and the natural resources of the area:

Second: Determine the location of the boundary between Mexico and the United States along the Sabine River and the Red River; and

Third: Discover the number of Americans living in the area, and the attitude of these settlers relative to becoming citizens of the Republic of Mexico.

The leader of this scientific expedition was Rafael Teran, General in the Mexican army.

His college training was in mathematics and engineering. The expedition was well staffed - there was a mineralogist, a botanist, a zoologist, an artist, and a cartographer.

The expedition came through Gonzales in March of 1828. General Teran seemed to be more interested in the attitudes of the Texans than in his other responsibilities as expedition leader. While on the expedition, General Teran viewed the Texans as misplaced Americans, not citizens of Mexico. He noted they possessed strong attitudes on individual freedom, and did not respect the laws of the Republic of Mexico.

Upon his return to Mexico, General Teran's report recommended that strong measures be taken to stop the influence of the United States on the residents of Texas. This report was incorporated into the Law of April 6, 1830, adopted by the Congress of the Republic of Mexico, which made it illegal for Americans to come to Texas. This law was the turning point in the relationship between Texas and Mexico. It introduced doubt and mistrust between the colonists and the Mexican government. For the first time, the colonists started to question the sincerity of the government of the Republic of Mexico. This doubt and mistrust would continue to grow, and augmented by other events, would climax in the start of the Texas Revolution here in Gonzales on October 2, 1835.

An event as harmless as a scientific expedition to study plans and minerals resulted in a harsh law that literally turned history around. and pushed the colonists toward revolution and independence from Mexico.

So, we might ask this question: If the scientific expedition into Texas in 1828 had been led by someone whose views of the colonists were not as rigid as those held by General Teran, would the Congress of the Republic of Mexico have passed the hated law of 1830?

And keep in mind, this was the law that separated fathers from their children, and husbands from their wives by prohibiting Americans from coming to Texas.

And, to speculate further, if General Teran's recommendations had not become law, would all of Green DeWitt's Colony, which includes Shiner, Hallettsville, Yoakum, Cuero, Seguin, Luling and Lockhart, be part of the Republic of Mexico today?


And that is part of our history, the history of Gonzales. Gonzales, Texas, is the birthplace of your Texas Freedom.





Gonzales ISD among finalists in 2025 H-E-B Excellence in **Education Awards**

SAN ANTONIO, Texas—Today, H-E-B announced five early childhood facilities, five public school boards, and eight school districts throughout Texas as finalists in the 2025 H-E-B **Excellence in Education** Awards program.



The resort is planning a soft opening to the community in early March, and more information will be forthcoming on

how to reserve a spot. "Ottine has long been revered as a sanctuary for healing and well-being," says DeDe Gibson DeStefano, Ottine Mineral Springs General Manager and 1986 graduate of Gonzales High School. "Preserving the sanctity of our therapeutic waters and fostering wellness experiences remain at the forefront of our mission. Ottine is more than a destination: it's a cherished part of our community's heritage, devoted to renewal and rejuvenation."

Ottine Mineral Springs has retained the majority of the original structures, blending them with new elements to preserve their historic charm. After opening to the community in March, Ottine Mineral Springs will continue to build in phases that will include a full-service restaurant and bar, a steam room, extensive hydrotherapy experiences, additional private pools, a voga room, and lodging. A larger spa will be built offering amenities such as facials and body wraps, along with massage therapy. Additional experiences will include outdoor activities such as hike and bike trails along the San Marcos River, outdoor yoga structures, and more.

Dating back to 1909, Ottine's healing journey began with the discovery of the 105-degree artesian springs at a depth of 1,550 feet while drilling for oil. Following a period of dormancy, the springs gained prominence during the polio epidemic, when the newly established **Gonzales Warm Springs** Foundation raised funds for a hospital designed to treat those with polio, despite their race, religion or ability to pay. Throughout the years, the foundation continued to raise funds and open facilities as polio cases increased. After the invention of the Salk vaccine and the decline in polio cases, Warm Springs continued to serve as rehabilitation for those suffering from disabilities such as head and neck injuries and Multiple Sclerosis.

The water's source, yielding mineral waters at a rate of 200,000 gallons per day, stands as a testament to Ottine's enduring heritage. The soft mineral waters originate from the Carrizo-Wilcox aquifer and are considered the best of their kind in the country. Part of a rare class of alkaline waters found mostly in Texas, Ottine has been compared to the enriched waters of Karlovy Vary in eastern Europe.

of January 2025 for all four municipalities were \$305,212.56 — down \$12,951.34 below the \$318,163.90 received in January 2024 and a decrease of \$14,071.12 from December's combined sales tax allocation of \$319,283.68, which was based on October 2024 sales.

As November is traditionally the start of the Christmas shopping season, this decrease seems to track with a survey performed by WalletHub, in which 68 percent of respondents said Santa will be less generous in 2024 because of inflation, while about a third of respondents said they'll spend less on holiday shopping in 2024 compared with 2023.

Three of the four municipalities in Gonzales County -Gonzales, Waelder and Smiley - saw a decrease in sales tax allocations this month.

Gonzales saw a 4.36 percent decrease, or \$11,838.83 less, in

sales tax allocations for January 2025. The largest city in the county, which generates the lion's share of sales tax revenue, received \$259,493.32, compared to \$271,332.15 in January 2024. This is \$22,112.96 less than the \$281,606.28 received in December 2024.

Sales tax receipts were up for Nixon, which received \$33,943.26, up \$2,752.51 or 8.82 percent more than the \$31,190.75 received in January 2024. However, it is down from the \$39,005.01 the city received in December 2024. Last year,

Nixon was the only city to be in the black (have a positive increase) for sales tax allocations in the county.

Waelder received a total of \$8,906.38, a decrease of \$2,005.79, or 18.38 percent, less than the \$10,912.17 received in January 2024 and \$2,506.25 less than the \$11,412.63 received in December 2024.

Finally, Smiley's sales tax receipts were \$2,869.60, down \$1,859.23 or 39.31 percent, below the \$4,728.83 received in January 2024. However, this is up from the \$2,559.09 the city

received in December 2024.

Three cities in Gonzales County - Gonzales, Nixon and Waelder — collect a 1.5 percent sales tax rate, while Smiley collects a 1 percent sales tax.

Gonzales County itself also receives a 0.5 percent sales and use tax and for the month of January 2025, the county received \$173,903.80, which is \$36,149.54, or 17.2 percent, less than the \$210,053.34 received in January 2024 and \$27,631.49 less than the \$201,535.29 received in December 2024.

For the past four years, the community has raised more than \$700,000 each year in scholarships for exhibitors.

In order to take part in the county show, an exhibitor must be a FFA or 4-H member in Gonzales County as of 5 p.m. Nov. 1, 2024. The exhibitor also must have a homestead in Gonzales County or attend a school in Gonzales County at the time of club registration and the animals must be housed in Gonzales County unless permission is otherwise granted. An exhibitor must also be enrolled in school and passing all subjects as of the most recent completed grading period and he or she may show in only one community/local/ county show during the year.

While there, they visited the World War II Memorial, the Vietnam Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery and the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and a Smithsonian Flight Museum where they got to see the Enola Gay, a space shuttle and other World War II planes and spacecraft.

It was an experience they will never forget.

"I don't think words can express what the trip meant to us," said William Berger, who served as a tail gunner on a B-17 bomber over Germany during World War II. "This trip and experience could not have been any better, and I didn't want to come home because it was so inspiring to actually see

"It was the trip of a lifetime." His son Bobby, who served on an aircraft carrier in Vietnam, agreed.

in person.

"I thought the whole trip was amazing," Bobby added. "I was blown away by everything we saw and was completely overwhelmed by it. But this trip was really about Dad, and it was truly amazing to see how he took things in and how people responded to seeing him and thanking him for his service."

The Bergers arrived in Washington on Friday afternoon. On Saturday morning they were picked up by guide Stephanie Fitzwater-Arduini, the director of education and marketing at the Museum of the American Civil War in Richmond, Va.

The first stop was the World War II Memorial, and both William and Bobby were impressed by the site.

"I thought it was amazing," Bobby said. "The size and scope of the memorial was amazing. Whoever designed that was a genius."

"I was so impressed by the size of it," William Berger said. "TV does not do any of the

monuments in Washington justice. They are so much more impressive in person."

William Berger said one of the more emotional moments of their weekend trip was being able to find out what really happened to one of his high school buddies who died in France during the war.

"His name was Henry Lassmann, and we were great friends," Berger said. "I had heard he died sometime in the Omaha Beach landings, but never knew. While we were at the World War II Memorial, Stephanie looked up his name and we found out he died in July 1944. He is buried there, and now he rests in France."


"It was very emotional to see how everyone reacted to Mr. Berger," Stephanie said. "From the time we first got there, I knew it was going to be special. When the national park worker saw Mr. Berger's World War II veteran hat, he walked right up to him and said, 'Welcome to Your Memorial.'

"And then it hit me that this was for him and for all those veterans."

The veterans were then squired to the Vietnam Memorial, and on the way numerous people stopped to thank William for his service and talked to him about relatives they had who fought in the war or who had died. It was a cathartic moment for both William and Bobby.

"I was moved by all the people who came over to talk to Dad, or thank him, or just shake his hand," Bobby said. "I was really happy for him, and proud that everyone recognized him for his service."

"Bobby was awesome taking his dad around," Stephanie said. "When we got to the Vietnam Memorial I asked Bobby why he wasn't wearing his Vietnam veteran hat. He said he didn't wear it because this trip was 'all about Dad.' That really touched me."

One story that William said that stood out to him actually happened on an elevator at their hotel.

"We were riding on the elevator when the doors opened and some people were getting out,"

William said. "A lady on the elevator leaned over and gave me a kiss on the cheek. She said: 'Someone once did that for my father, so I thought I would just pay if forward.' I never got to thank her or talk to her, but that was something."

William summed up the feeling of both men at the end of the day.

'We would like to thank everyone who helped make this trip possible," William said. "I will never ever forget it, and words can't express how grateful I am and how proud we were to be there. Thank you."

The first roundup was organized in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1977 by Dallas Thibodeaux and Rozell Nunn Jr. and attracted 49 riders. It has grown in stature since then to become a multiple-day event with as many as 30,000 to 40,000 participants who enjoy camping, exhibition of their rides, parades, stunt shows and other entertainment, including drag

racing and contests. Because it primarily attracted African-Amer-

ican riders, the event was largely ignored by mainstream media and the motorcycle industry early on in its history, but has since attracted the support of manufacturers such as Harley-Davidson and Honda because it is family friendly and open

to people of all ethnicities. Since 1998, participants have been donating food and money to support local food banks and have since raises thousands of dollars and contributed tons of food.
