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## Magnolia Run returning in April

**MAGNOLIA SPRINGS** — For the first time since 2015 the Magnolia Run will be held by the South Baldwin Chamber of Commerce in Magnolia Springs. ## Young charged in Foley homicide case

**ROBERTSDALE** — Thanks to the efforts of multiple agencies across two states, a “person of interest” in the death of a Foley man last October is now being charged with murder in connection with the homicide.

Nicholas Ryan Young, 35, of Gulf Shores, is now being charged with murder in con-

nection with the death of 53-year-old Ronald Jeffery Higginbotham, who was found stabbed to death Oct. 30 in the Bay Villa Apartments of South Bay Street in Foley.

“We want to take this opportunity to send our heartfelt condolences to Mr. Higginbotham’s family,” said Foley Police Chief David Wilson, chairman of the Major Crimes Unit of Baldwin County’s Board of Directors,

“and to let them know that we have done everything possible and will continue to do everything possible to see this case through to conclusion.”

A press conference was held Thursday, Feb. 14 at the Baldwin County Sheriff’s Department’s investigations office at the Central Annex II in Robertsdale which included Wilson, Baldwin County Sheriff Huey “Hoss”

Mack Jr., Lt. Andre Reid, commander of the Baldwin County Major Crimes Unit, Baldwin County District Attorney Robert Wilters, and assistant District Attorney Teresa Hines. Higginbotham was found

## Earned Income Tax Credit could be lifechanging windfall for many

If you think of \$80 million in one person's hands, that's a fortune. If you consider that amount divided among 26,000 eligible households close to the poverty line, that's still a tremendous windfall. It's money to put food on the table or pay the electric bill and could be life-changing in the lives of low-income, working families. Sadly, that's

a large portion of our population, and that's why we need to encourage those in need who meet the requirements to file for their Earned Income Tax Credit.

In 2016, according to

the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, the EITC lifted close to six million people out of poverty, including about three million children. Nearly nine

million children in working families lived below the official poverty line (about \$24,000 for a family of four) in 2016. Studies show that the EITC encourages large numbers of

single parents to leave welfare for work, especially when the labor market is strong.

In 2018, 25 million eligible tax-filers received about \$63 billion in EITC, however, the

IRS and U.S. Census Bureau estimate this number only represents 80 percent of those who are eligible for the credit. There is some recourse for those who qualified but did not file since it is possible to amend taxes for up to three years.

Taking the step to receive a tax credit is daunting for many, who don't realize they are missing out on money they badly need. In the spirit of "people helping people" that credit unions are founded on, we want to make people aware of this unclaimed resource that averages just under \$2,500 per family. Requirements include:

- Must have earned

income from the tax year.

- Income must be less than \$45,802 for single people with two children.
- Income must be less than \$51,492 for married couples filing jointly with two children.
- Income must be less than \$49,194 for single people with three or more children.
- Income must be less than \$54,884 for married couples filing jointly with three or more children.

Please help share this message on the importance of filing for the EITC. It can make a huge difference in the quality of life for working families.

## Three bad words

A young man called me the other day working on a Scout merit badge and needed to talk to an author. I was flattered, so we talked. He asked me what training or skills one needed to become a writer. My answer was short and surprised me, because I had given only a moment's thought before I said, "Words."

There was a pause. It was not the answer he expected, so I went on. "You need to master words. You can get some mastery by learning grammar, which is the art of how words relate to each other, and essential to good writing, but the most important thing you can do is read, read a lot to learn words. You should read with a dictionary nearby and make a point to read a few words in the dictionary as well." He was quiet, so I plunged on, "Words mean things, and the more words you know the meaning of, the better equipped you are to tell a story, and the livelier your story will be."

We ended the call. I am pretty sure he did not get what he expected. I was as surprised as he was as to how the conversation went, but it served to get my wheels turning. Words do have meaning, and sometimes we do not realize the thought we are conveying. I had a lady ask, "Can I talk to you?"

She was confused when I asked tongue-in-cheek, "Am I allowed to talk too, or am I to just listen?" I knew what she meant, she wished to "speak with me," not "talk to me," but words have meaning and some, like these, are harmless, but others can be very powerful.

There are two very foul, four letter words, and one three letter one that I cannot tolerate. People use these words without regard to their consequence to the hearer, or to themselves. Words have meaning, and even when used unthinkingly, have impact.

The first of the foul is "can't", as in, "I can't do that." By saying "can't" you have already agreed to fail. How do you succeed if you have already said you will fail before you have started?

The first time I realized this ambiguity in speech was when I read the saying on a wall at an outdoor workout area in Marine Corps boot camp, "We killed 'can't', and whipped 'couldn't' 'til it could." That has stuck with me. I had never realized the impact of a word unthinkingly used. What you are saying when you say "can't" is, "I have never done that before, doubt my ability, and am afraid to try," a statement fraught with failure, one you would never use, but "can't" slips from our mouths with ease. It is a filthy, nasty, failure word.

The next filthy failure word is "try". Yoda of Star Wars fame says, "Try not. Do, or do not. There is no try." There is great truth in those words. Use of the word "try" implies that the user might succeed, but is willing to accept failure, because he, or she tried. Failure in life is not an option. Why would you use a word that implies acceptance of it?

My other filthy, four-letter word is "quit", which is what "can't" implies. Can't is quitting before you try. See how these hateful words feed on each other? Each one is laden with failure, but we casually use them, and worse, tolerate their use in school, work, sports and a hundred other activities. They are the epitome of negative speak.

Words mean things, and are powerful in their influence. Why not use such words as "can", and "will", and "do"? Speak positive words into your life as well as others. Tell yourself you can, and will, and do, and in doing so, you give yourself, and others permission to succeed, to be everything you were intended to be. Tell yourself you are beautiful, powerful, can do anything, because you can. There is greatness in all of us. Let it out. We can do with more success, and a lot less failure.

### Overturning *Roe v. Wade*

The election of Donald Trump has put two new justices on the United States Supreme Court, Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh. Both were on a list prepared by the Federalist Society that nervous Republicans and conservatives were assured by the Trump campaign would be used for Supreme Court nominations and would list

judges likely to overturn *Roe v. Wade*.

In the 1973 decision of *Roe v. Wade*, Justice Blackmun, writing for a 7 to 2 majority, found a constitutional right to privacy based on the due process clause of the Fourteenth Amendment and held that unduly restrictive state regulation of abortion is unconstitutional.

A Louisiana law requiring those performing abortions to have hospital admitting privileges within 30

miles was challenged in *June Medical Services et al v. Gee et al*. The Fifth Circuit upheld the law distinguishing it from *Whole Women's Health v. Hellerstadt*, an earlier virtually-identical Texas case in which the U.S. Supreme Court determined that the restriction was an undue burden on women seeking abortions. Five of the Supreme Court Justices including Chief Justice Roberts have temporarily blocked implementation of the law

to allow an appeal from the Fifth Circuit. Unless the law is struck down, it is estimated that only one practitioner will be allowed to perform abortions in the State of Louisiana.

Since Chief Justice Roberts had voted for upholding the Texas law, Gorsuch and Kavanaugh will very likely get the chance to gut *Roe v. Wade* as Trump promised Republicans and conservatives.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

### NORTH

- ♠ A 5 ♥ Q 10 9 6 3 ♦ A J 9 ♣ 8 4 3

### GUARANTEEING THE CONTRACT

Declarer does not have the advantage of seeing the defenders' cards when he is playing a hand, but he is nevertheless expected to do as well in the majority of deals as if he had actually seen the opposing hands.

In most situations, declarer does not have much trouble meeting this goal. Many hands play themselves, so to speak, and declarer attains par without much bother. But other hands do require a modicum of skill, and it is these that pose a challenge to the serious student of the game.

To demonstrate, take this case where South finds himself in five hearts and gets a chance to display his wares. After a spade lead, how should declarer play the hand?

If we examine the East-West cards, it seems South is destined to go down regardless of what he does. He takes two club finesses, both of which lose, and, since a diamond loser is inescapable, he finishes

down one.

This result can be attributed to bad luck, of course, but actually, South should not rely on the hope that one of the club finesses will win. He should adopt the line of play that guarantees the contract regardless of how the defenders' cards are divided.

The issue can be settled at trick one. On the king-of-spades lead, South plays low from dummy and discards a diamond from his hand! West's next play does not matter. Let's assume he leads another spade.

Declarer discards another diamond on the ace, cashes the ace of diamonds and ruffs a diamond. He then crosses to dummy with a trump and ruffs dummy's last diamond.

The stage is now set for a surefire endplay. Dummy is entered with a trump, and a club is led and finessed. West wins, but whatever he returns gives declarer the contract.

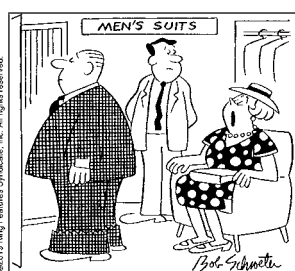

# Creating community – artist opens gallery for women in Spanish Fort

When Stewart Heath was a young girl her mother made a simple observation.

“You are so creative,” she told the tiny tot.

That seed of positive feedback inspired a lifelong devotion to creating beautiful artwork. Now Heath is crafting her largest, most creative endeavor yet - a place where women artists of all mediums and styles can gather to celebrate, create and fellowship. Stewart Heath Gallery opened in Spanish Fort earlier this year.

“I wanted to support women in our community and build a place to feature their work,” Heath said.

Within a matter of weeks her studio, nestled in the center of the Eastern Shore Shopping Centre, has become a touchstone for the community.

The gallery walls are home to acrylics, mixed media, water colors, pottery and jewelry all fashioned by local women. Each weekend the gallery’s studio space is filled with classes for women and girls. Recently it hosted an art journaling class for teenage girls.

relate to each other,” Heath said. “We want our classes to feed their souls.”

For Heath, art has been the driving force of her life.

At age 23 she purchased a one-way ticket

to Europe and lived on the continent for five years creating a life filled with beauty. She met her husband there, Olympian Darrick Heath, a member of the 1996 USA Handball Team. She worked in fashion design in Atlanta for several years before the couple relocated to Spanish Fort where their son now plays football at Spanish Fort High School.

At the gallery Heath’s own artwork bursts with color. Vibrant hues pop off the canvas. Look closely and you can see layer upon layer of color where the paint moved, turned and mixed to create the dreamy scene.

Heath said it took nearly a year, and gallons upon gallons of paint to perfect the acrylic pours. But risks, as an artist or a business woman, never frightened her. Her largest leap of faith, opening the gallery, has proven to be a creative success.

“I’m very proud of us,” she said. “Women were stumbling around looking for a place and there wasn’t one that was just a gallery. This is a place for women to come together.”

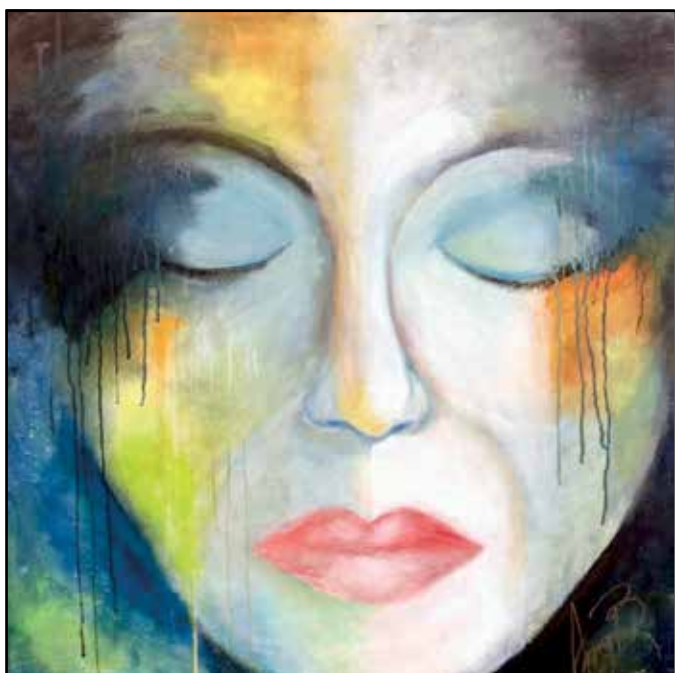

# Toros' freshman sets state and ties national record, Gulf Shores' team finishes in state top 10

HUNTSVILLE — Gabriel Warren, a freshman at Spanish Fort set a new state and national record for pins and finished as the state runner-up in his 120-pound, Class 6A Division. According to RankWrestlers.com, Warren posted 73 wins with 69 pins.

Baldwin County senior Braiden Williams (195 lbs.) also made it to the individual championships and finished second in the state for the Tigers. Gulf Shores' Gage Hudson took third in the 138-pound division. The Dolphins as a team finished eighth, Spanish Fort 11th. In Class 7A, Foley finished 18th.

Statewide, defending Class 7A state champion Thompson High School captured its seventh state championship Saturday while McAdory and Moody claimed each school's first-ever state crowns in the Class 6A and Class 1A/5A divisions, respectively.

The Warriors of Coach Sean Weltzin, who had eight wrestlers in the finals Saturday, concluded with 180 points, shattering the previous state record set by Thompson (140) in 2015. Hoover was second with 116.5 points and Vestavia Hills was third with 97.

McAdory, coached by Blake Dutton, placed seven wrestlers in the finals with all seven winning their weight class titles and finished with 154 points. Wetumpka was a close second with 137.5 and Benjamin Russell was third with 136.

And in the 1A/5A division, Moody, coached by Greg Jefcoat, posted 148.5 points to nip defend champion Arab, which finished 8.5 points behind at 140. Scottsboro was third with 122.

Steve Bell of McAdory concluded his senior season pinning Benjamin Russell senior Robert Graham in the finals to close at 91-0 to earn Class 6A meet MVP honors – tying the NFHS national record for wins in a season. His win broke the state record (90-0) set by Macon Edwards of Fultondale in 2016. McAdory's Turner Black also won the 182-pound title with a pin over Wetumpka's Noah Barclay to finish the season 90-1

– tying Edwards' previous mark.

Thompson senior Gabe Hixenbaugh (44-3) led the Warriors' domination in Class 7A with his fifth state title with a technical fall win over Conner Dubble of Hoover in the 138-pound finals. Hixenbaugh finished his career 249-17 – only three matches in competition against AHSAA competition in the seventh grade and then went unbeaten in the state the last five seasons.

Chandler Akins (53-6) closed out his senior season winning the 126-pound title for his third state crown for the Warriors.

Moody had five wrestlers in the finals with three, Cory Land (47-0), Sage Hughes (66-7) and Rashad Clark (66-2) each winning state titles at 106, 145 and 152 pounds, respectively.

Senior Christian Knop (71-0) of Alexandria closed out his career with a pin at 195 pounds in 1A/5A over Corner sophomore Cole Fuller (48-7) to become the first AHSAA wrestler to win four state titles with undefeated records. The North Carolina State signee finished his career 235-0 to rank third nationally in consecutive wins. The national record for consecutive wins, according to the NFHS Record Book, is 260 – set by Hesperia (MN) wrestler Justin Zeerip from 2004-2008. Alex Tsirtsis of Griffin (IN) ranks second with 236. Knop's total ranks him third. Knop had most pins (4 in 8:40) in 1A/5A and teammate Fletcher Swindall was named most valuable wrestler.

St. John Paul II Catholic senior Jayson Spencer (39-2) defeated Hayden's Colby Hallmark (58-5) 7-6 in what was judged as the best match of the finals in 1A/5A to win the first individual title in school history. The blind wrestler is a senior.

Clay-Chalkville's Jack Jones had most pins in Class 6A for the meet (4 in 4:15) while the 152-pound match between Oxford's Reed Hill and Benjamin Russell's Saxon Coker was judged best match.

Grissom's Tyler Ivey was named 7A MVP. Thompson's Derek Hussey had most pins (3 in 8:13), and best match was Hayden McDonald of Mountain Brook vs. Hoover's Jack White in the 195 pound finals.

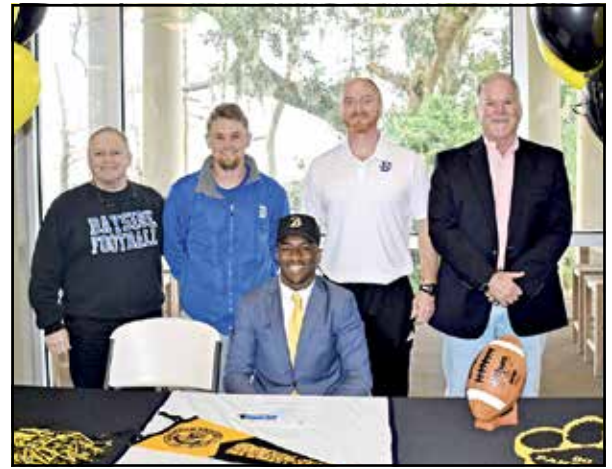

Last year, the Braves were the most surprising team in the Major Leagues when they went from a 72-90 record in 2017 to a 90-72 regular season record and losing to the National League Champs in the Los Angeles Dodgers in the

first round of the playoffs. In the offseason, the Braves coaches and front office decided that rather use the money they have for high-valued free agents, they decided to keep building success with the underrated but successful players they already have on their roster. This includes veteran leaders like first baseman Freddie Freeman, shortstop Dansby Swanson and outfielder Nick Markakis. The Braves also have great young hit-

ters in second baseman Ozzie Albies (2018 MLB All-Star) and outfielder Ronald Acuna Jr. (2018 NL Rookie of the Year). Atlanta also has great consistent pitchers in starter Mike Foltynewicz and Kevin Gausman, who was traded for on July 31 and has been reliable. The only starter the Braves lost was 35-year old Catcher Kurt Suzuki, who had the second-fewest home runs (12) and the lowest at-bats (347). The Braves are projected to insert former backup catcher Tyler Flowers into the starting lineup. The Braves did get former 2015 AL runs

leader in third baseman Josh Donaldson in free agency. Donaldson is a fantastic and reliable hitter but has faced some unfortunate string of injuries in the last few years with Toronto and last season with Cleveland. If he remains healthy, he can easily account for about 33 home runs, 35 doubles and 155 hits. The Braves needed more power hitters that can be consistent and play great in fielding. This offseason, Braves fans gave criticism to the management for only spending around \$71 million this offseason on high-valued free agent even though the Braves did not need to blow too much money. They trust the veteran leaders and the potential that the young play-

ers in Albies and Acuna can development as well as what Donaldson can bring to Atlanta. High-valued free agents like Bryce Harper and Manny Machado are still looking for teams are demanding a 10-year, \$300 million contracts with teams. The Braves were tied for 10th in the MLB in runs with 729 and fifth in batting average (.257). This season, Atlanta is looking to be even more consistent in their batting as well as accounted for more home-runs. “Everything has beautifully formed together,” said Franklin Edward, chairman of the eight-person Black History Month committee.

He added that classes normally scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. have been pushed back to 1:45 so students can attend the hour-long programs and still have plenty of time

to get to class.

The second Black History Month event, Wednesday Night at the Apollo, will be held on Feb. 20 at 6:30 p.m. It is based on the popular television and stage show, Showtime at the Apollo, and is entirely student-oriented. There will be dance, poetry, music and more. And at least a dozen acts have signed up with room for more, Edward said.

The event will be hosted by Dr. Carl Cunningham Jr., director of

student support services at Coastal Alabama Community College. Each performance will be critiqued by judges, and the winner will win a cash prize. Anyone wanting to sign up can contact Dr. Cunningham at [carl.cunningham@coastal.edu](mailto:carl.cunningham@coastal.edu).

Black History Month at the College concludes on Feb. 26 at 12:30 p.m. with featured speaker the Rev. H.K. Matthews. A veteran of the Civil Rights Era, Matthews is a pastor from Brew-

ton associated with the school’s campus there. Edward said he hopes a lot of the student body — 35 percent of which is minority students — comes out to hear the stories told by someone who actually marched with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

“We want the whole month to be a learning experience,” Edward said. “Our goal is for them to leave with more knowledge and experience than they came with.”

dead in his apartment by a maintenance employee, according to an MCU release issued shortly thereafter. Higginbotham’s death was ruled a homicide, the result of stab wounds.

After an initial investigation by the Foley Police Department, the Baldwin County Major Crimes Unit was activated to investigate.

The Major Crimes Unit is activated in Baldwin County for one of three reasons, Wilson said, an officer-involved shooting, the death of a suspect while in custody, or a homicide where a suspect has not been immediately identified.

“This case would fall into the last category,” Wilson said.

More than 30 officers participated in the investigation through the MCU, including Baldwin County Sheriff’s Deputies, members of the DA’s office, and officers from municipal agencies throughout Baldwin County, partnering with the Alabama Department of Forensic Sciences to process forensic evidence.

“The MCU brings together different officers with different backgrounds who all bring a different perspective to the case,” Reid said. “This arrest could not have been made without the collaborative effort between many agencies. This investigation and arrest is an example of what can be accomplished through cooperation.”

Without a clear suspect, Reid said, officers began collecting evidence and canvassing the area, interviewing anyone who might have information in the case. An appeal was also sent out through the media asking for information regarding the case.

“Much of the evidence collected came back to good old-fashioned police work,” Reid said. “I could not express my appreciation more for the work they did in solving this case.”

As a part of the investigation it was discovered that a vehicle belonging to the victim was missing. Young was identified as a suspect and a large-scale search for him was conducted. In response to ques-

tions, Reid said, as far as they were able to determine, Young and Higginbotham were not longtime friends.

“I would describe them as acquaintances,” he said. “We don’t believe they had known each other for very long.”

On Nov. 29, a deputy with the Santa Rosa County, Florida, Sheriff’s Department was able to locate Young and the vehicle was recovered. The vehicle was examined, and evidence was collected from the vehicle, Reid said.

Young was arrested on charges of first-degree receiving stolen property. He was then extradited back to Alabama and booked into the Baldwin County Corrections facility on Dec. 23 on charged of first degree receiving stolen property and held as a detainer for hold. A charge of murder was eventually added and Young is being held without bond pending a hearing.

“Initially, Young resisted extradition, but later he didn’t,” Wilters said. “We are continuing to investigate this

case and will bring all of that evidence before a grand jury as soon as possible.”

Reid said Young is not currently being charged with capital murder, pending further investigation. Officials would not comment on specific evidence collected or to whether or not they thought Young had help. No one else is currently being charged in the case. Reid said, in his estimation, Young has not been a cooperative participant in the investigation.

Wilters said they continue to ask for assistance from the public

in providing additional information regarding the case.

“If you know anything at all that might be connected with this case, please contact us,” Wilters said. “It could be something you ini-

tially thought was insignificant, but now think it may be important.”



# Festival of Flavor will not occur in 2019

FOLEY — For the past seven years the South Baldwin Chamber of Commerce has put on the Festival of Flavor in the streets of downtown Foley during the fall season. The event, taking place on Friday and Saturday, features local cuisine and school clubs and organizations dishing out treats for visitors. Preceding the event on Thursday is what is known as the Chicago Street Supper Club, an upscale night of fine dining taking place on Chicago Street itself.

Donna Watts, President/CEO of South Baldwin Chamber, has announced that in 2019 the Festival of Flavor will be discontinued, with more effort being put into the Chicago

Street Supper Club. “The Festival of Flavor is not doing what we want it to do, what we need it to do, or what it should do,” said Watts. “We’ve tried every trick that we have in our book that we know how to do, and it’s just not working.”

Watts suspects the timeframe may effect

the festival’s attendance, with Saturday hosting a score of college football games competing with the event. She feels this takes away a number of potential attendees.

After much discussion among the Chamber employees, the decision was made to cancel the Festival of Flavor going forward and to put the

effort and energy, along with the City of Foley’s funding, into the Supper Club. Typically, Foley puts funds only towards the Festival of Flavor, and has now agreed to instead put that money towards the Supper Club to enable the Chamber to expand on the event as well as advertising.

“We believe there is

a lot of potential in the Chicago Street Supper Club, we’ve gotten a lot of support for it from the business community and the community at large,” said Watts. “It was a good crowd at our last one with people asking questions and wanting to buy tickets beforehand, so I think we can generate a lot more interest with that while keeping our original idea of bringing something nice and well-respected to downtown Foley.”

With the cancellation of Festival of Flavor, Watts stated there may be a few changes coming to the Supper Club.

“We discussed potentially moving it to a Friday night, which might be better than Thursday as people won’t be getting up to go to work the morning afterwards,” Watts said. “It’s kind of

a late night event, so I think Friday night might bode better for that.”

The event also might move closer to November as not to compete with high school football games.

“We still want it to be something that’s very special and unique and that people really want to attend, and I think changing the date and keeping it on Chicago Street could work,” said Watts. “Everyone loved the fact that it was in the street last year, and I think we’ll continue to push forward and use that as long as the city will allow it to happen.”

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# Alabama leads way with Walker County Archery Park

Along with Alabama's sparkling Gulf waters and beautiful mountains, our great state has another strength you may not have heard as much about: Alabama's Community Archery Parks program ranks No. 1 in the nation.

The state's 16th archery park, the Walker County Community Archery Park, was dedicated recently on the outskirts of Jasper on the banks of beautiful Walker County Public Fishing Lake.

Stuart Goldsby, the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries (WFF) Division Regional Hunter Education Coordinator, has been instrumental in the spread of the archery park phenomenon in Alabama. Goldsby said the Walker County park has taken a while to complete, but it has been worth the effort.

"We're very excited about this," Goldsby said. "This is No. 16 for the Division of Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries. To be able to lead the country in developing grassroots, community archery locations, where school groups or clubs or retailers can use it to benefit the community with that life skill of archery, is very exciting for us."

The Walker County park has covered shooting areas with targets at known distances for both adult and youth shooters.

The unique aspect of the Walker County park is that it is the first state-operated archery park in the nation with a wheelchair-accessible elevated shooting platform.

Ed Poolos, the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Deputy Commissioner, said the new archery park is

special to him for several reasons, including its location.

"I am a proud citizen of Jasper and Walker County, so this is home," Poolos said. "I am glad this is here. The goal for the Department of Conservation on this project is to partner with local governments and foundations to make the Walker County Public Fishing Lake one of the best state fishing lakes in Alabama. At the same time, we want to bring people to the outdoors to enjoy the natural beauty of Alabama. Projects like this allow us to do that."

Poolos highlighted the positive impacts that archery and bowhunting can have on individuals and communities.

"Archery is a sport that requires and teaches precision, focus, accuracy and determination. It teaches all those things, but the great aspect of archery is that, no matter your age, gender or ability, archery can be enjoyed by everyone. So we're really proud to bring this park here."

Poolos also recognized the contributions of two Boy Scouts, Mason Woodman and Jaylan Banks, who aided in the construction of the archery park as part of their Eagle Scout projects.

Jasper Mayor David O'Mary said the area where the archery park is located was annexed recently by the City of Jasper, which will allow city resources to be used to help operate the park.

"I'm an outdoor enthusiast," O'Mary said. "When you put in an archery range of this quality, that is a recipe for a lot of fun for a lot of people."

"We at the City of Jasper can bring on board the administrative side of our Parks and Recreation to look after tournaments and events here. Our equipment and

our labor will be available to support this."

Jenny Short, chair of Walker County Health Action Partnership's Livable Communities Priority Group, said, although it took a great deal of work to complete the park, it was a labor of love.

"This project is a perfect example of a true private-public partnership," Short said. "We had so many partners in this project. As we say, this was 'built by our community for our community.' We're really proud of that."

Alabama residents ages 16 to 64 must have a hunting license, Wildlife Management Area (WMA) license or Wildlife Heritage license to use the range. For non-residents 16 and older, an annual WMA license or non-resident hunting license is required. Licenses are available from various local retailers or online at outdooralabama.com. Use of the archery park is free for those under 16 years of age or Alabama residents over 65.

"Alabama leads the nation in having the most community archery parks. That's one thing I'm proud Alabama is first in," Chuck Sykes, WFF Director, said. "There is a very important reason why a license is required to use the park. We receive no money from the General Fund, so none of your tax dollars go out to provide services we provide for the citizens of the state. The way we fund that is by people buying hunting and fishing licenses. We encourage you to come out and shoot the range and fish the lake. Matt Marshall, our State Lakes Manager, and Marisa Futral (Hunter Education Coordinator) and Stuart are

doing a wonderful job as well as our state biologists. So, come out and buy a license and have fun."

Sykes said the Archery Trade Association (ATA) and its president, Matt Kormann, are huge supporters of DCNR, and the Department is grateful for their partnership.

The ATA represents manufacturers of archery and bowhunting equipment, pro shops and retailers of archery and bowhunting equipment.

"As president of ATA, I have seen a lot of archery ranges," Kormann said. "I can say I've never stood on one as gorgeous as this one. I hope y'all know how lucky you are to have this park in this surrounding because it is unique."

"I've also been able to see in my job a lot of public-private partnerships. I can tell you, there is not any like there is in Alabama. To see this all come together so that more folks can come out and experience archery and possibly get into bowhunting, there's not a better feeling in the world."

Kormann said the ATA's board of directors and members have made a commitment to

promote and assist in the construction of public archery ranges throughout the nation.

"Obviously, the ultimate goal is to get more folks out shooting and bowhunting," Kormann said. "There is a lot we need to do to ensure the health of those sports. This really revolves around the 'R3' triangle of recruiting new folks to come out, retaining the shooters we have and reactivating folks who might have lapsed. The opportunity to come out in a setting like this with high-quality equipment makes it easier to get folks to come out to shoot."

"What archery teaches and what it gives back is hard to find in other sports. It doesn't matter what your skill level is. It doesn't matter what

your physical abilities are. Anybody can learn this sport pretty quickly. Beyond all of that, the sense of community and the sense of family in this sport is really unmatched."

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# Raising awareness for women's heart health

Ask the average person about the leading cause of death for men, and “heart disease” likely will be the response. Ask about the leading cause of death for women, though, and chances are they will come up empty.

The correct answer? Heart disease.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, heart disease is responsible for one in four deaths among both men and women. And the highest concentration of heart disease deaths for women is in the South — especially in Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.

This lack of awareness about women's heart disease led Salpy Pamboukian, M.D., to establish the UAB Women's Heart Health Clinic in 2016.

“We don't think about heart disease in women,” said Pamboukian, a transplant cardiologist and director of the clinic. “As women get older and past menopause, their rates of heart disease are the same as men's.”

While the classic signs of heart attack in males — chest pain radiating into the jaw and arm — are well-known, a woman's symptoms may differ dramatically.

“Women may or may not have classic chest pain,” Pamboukian said. “The pain could be in other areas and not necessarily in the center of the chest.”

She notes that pain might not flare up with exertion, as is often the case with men. In fact, sometimes there is no pain at all.

“The symptoms can be shortness of breath, nausea or vomiting, tiredness or fatigue, or abdominal discomfort,” she said.

Ignorance about the prevalence and symptoms of women's heart disease can, unfortunately, extend to the medical community.

“Women presenting with atypical heart disease symptoms are often written off as having stomach problems or hormone problems,” she said. “Clinical studies have demonstrated inherent biases in how the medical establishment evaluates women differently than men.”

As a result, there can be a significant lag be-

tween the time a woman begins experiencing symptoms of heart disease and the time she receives a diagnosis and treatment.

Witnessing those delays prompted Pamboukian to create the UAB Women's Heart Health Clinic.

“As a cardiologist, I'd see women who had lost precious treatment time,” she said. “We needed a place where women could come, be listened to and be evaluated without biases.”

### UAB Women's Heart Health Clinic

Today, women travel a variety of paths to the UAB Women's Heart Health Clinic. Some have ongoing symptoms that eventually lead a physician to order an electrocardiogram (EKG) or chest X-ray, resulting in a diagnosis of heart disease and a referral to the clinic.

In other cases, women arrive at the doctor's office or emergency department with heart disease symptoms, are diagnosed quickly and are sent on to the clinic.

Joy O'Neal, 50, eventually found the Women's Heart Health Clinic, but only after being told by doctors that her weight gain, fatigue and difficulty breathing were due to menopause, stress and allergies — when she in fact had congestive heart failure.

“Even though I presented every symptom of heart disease, they never, ever, ever offered me an EKG,” said O'Neal, founder and executive director of The Red Barn, a therapeutic equine center in Leeds, Alabama. “Dr.

Pamboukian said I'd been exhibiting signs of heart disease for two years and that she was going to treat this aggressively. I love the fact that she listened to me and saw me and didn't assume that these were my first symptoms.”

Once a woman's heart disease has been identified, the next step depends upon her diagnosis.

“There's a spectrum of heart disease,” Pamboukian said. “For some, treatment can be as simple as taking medication, while others may need heart transplants.”

In between are those who require arteriograms, stents, valve replacements or bypasses. Pamboukian's goal is to provide a central place for women to be seen and then refer them to appropriate specialists.

“For example, we have a renowned hypertension specialist and a clinic for people who have difficult-to-manage high blood pressure,” she said.

Although Sherron Simmons' story has a happy ending, her journey through heart disease was a rollercoaster. Following two heart attacks and bypass surgery, Simmons, now 62, was diagnosed with heart failure and then referred to UAB's transplant team. Simmons received her heart transplant in 2011 and says she is feeling great today.

“I'm staying in compliance with everything that Dr. Pamboukian and my wonderful transplant nurse tell me to do, and I haven't had any rejection episodes

with my transplant,” Simmons said.

### Spreading the Word

Pamboukian notes that Simmons' and O'Neal's health care hurdles are the norm and that one of the best ways to promote healing is education.

“A lot of women aren't assertive with physicians when their symptoms don't get better, and they don't ask for a cardiac evaluation,” Pamboukian said. “That motivated me to get involved with patient advocacy.”

Pamboukian's commitment to empowering female patients led UAB

Medicine to partner with WomenHeart:

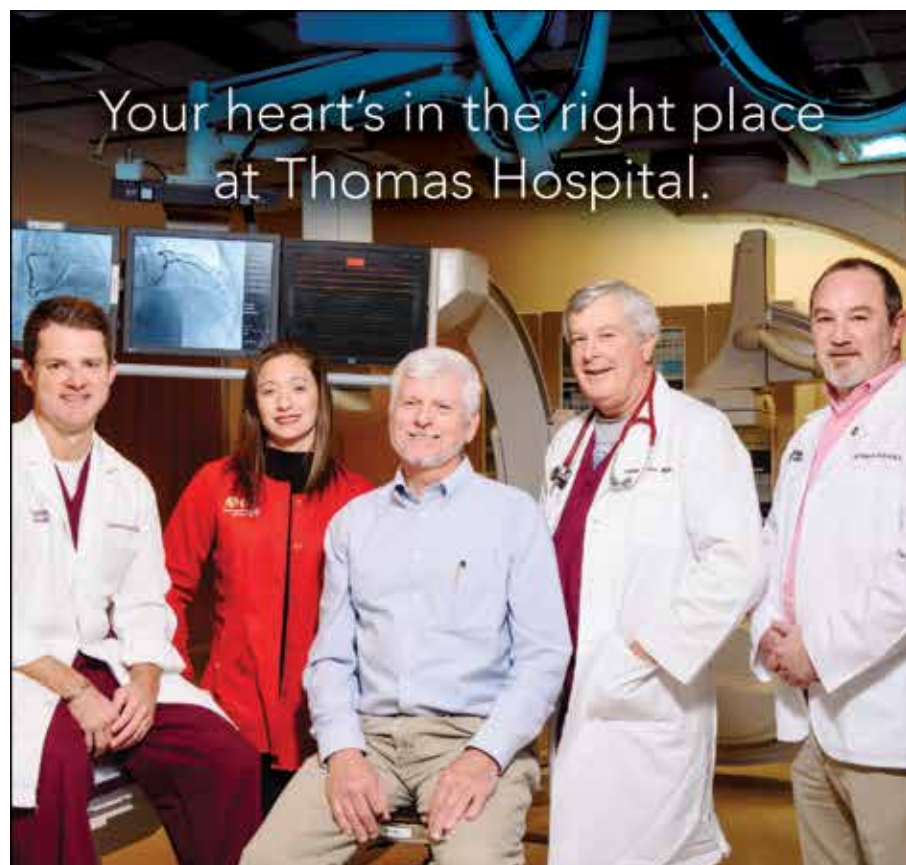
The National Coalition for Women with Heart Disease, an organization dedicated to heart disease education and patient support. She nominated Simmons and O'Neal to become UAB WomenHeart Champions and secured coalition funding to send the two women to the Mayo Clinic to receive training in heart health advocacy.

Simmons, who is retired and living in Hoover, said attending the four-day WomenHeart Science and Leadership Symposium in Rochester, Minnesota,

was “exhausting, wonderful and informative.” Nearly 50 women ages 26 to 74 and from 18 states participated. The attendees, all of whom had heart disease, learned about a variety of topics that ranged from heart disease risk factors and healthy lifestyle choices to mental health and stress reduction.

“I have never been in the presence of that many women who were heart disease survivors,” Simmons said. “It was powerful to know that we're not alone, that we're not only

survivors but also thrivers."

O'Neal echoed Simmons' sentiments, adding that the information she gathered was eye-opening.

"Women's and men's bodies are so different when it comes to heart health, but most of the medical research includes men and not women," she said. "I had thought my odds of dying from breast cancer were higher than dying from heart disease, but it's the opposite. I couldn't believe that this information is generally unknown to women."

### Paying It Forward

As UAB WomenHeart Champions, Simmons

and O'Neal are helping educate women in the Birmingham area about heart health.

Pamboukian believes the two volunteers are uniquely qualified to spread the word.

"Women can connect with Sherron and Joy on a personal level and understand that the same thing could happen to them, rather than learning information from health care providers who haven't lived through the experience of heart disease," she said.

Pamboukian has high expectations for UAB's WomenHeart program.

"We want to educate as many women as we can in as many different venues as we can," she said. "Rather than just bringing women into the hospital, we want Sherron and Joy

to connect with them in community groups, houses of worship and workplaces."

Armed with WomenHeart PowerPoint presentations, lectures and handouts, Simmons and O'Neal plan to launch UAB's heart health initiative in February.

"We'll have a two-pronged approach," O'Neal said. "I'll coordinate the educational piece for places such as community fairs, women's lunch groups and Bible study groups, and Sherron will organize a peer-led monthly WomenHeart support group at UAB."

Simmons is excited about the prospect of helping women with heart disease to find one another.

"I had a strong family support system, but there was not another

woman I could really talk to about having heart disease," she said. "Women need to know they're not alone in this fight."

She plans to rely on the UAB community to speak at monthly meetings.

"We hope to have a nutritionist speak about heart health diets, a mental health professional speak about mental health and heart disease, a cardiac rehabilitation nurse, a certified fitness trainer, and possibly even a yoga instructor to help women improve their health and their quality of life," she said.

Simmons' bottom line?

"Heart disease does not define who you are," Simmons said. "You can go on and live a full life."

Simmons says the opportunity to help other women through sharing her story is something she had prayed about.

"UAB has given us a wonderful platform," she said. "As women,

we're caregivers; but I want to talk about the importance of taking care of ourselves."

### Importance of Education


O'Neal has doubled down on educating women about heart disease, in part because — even after her diagnosis — she still fights ignorance within the medical community. A dermatologist told her she was too young to have heart disease and questioned whether she had in fact had a heart attack. "Two doctors told me I must have misunderstood my diagnosis because I was too young and looked healthy," O'Neal said. "Knowing what I know now, I want to educate women so they can argue back with confidence."

Before her diagnosis, every time O'Neal saw her primary care physician, he asked whether she had had a mammogram. "I have no family history of breast cancer or cervical cancer, and

I'm routinely screened for those," she said. "But I'm not screened for the one thing I'm statistically most likely to die from."

While stressing the importance of mammograms and Pap tests, O'Neal said, "Women's heart health should be discussed as much as breast cancer." She believes that a baseline EKG would have led to a quicker diagnosis and faster treatment. Pamboukian expressed a similar sentiment, adding, "Heart disease can affect any woman, and we need to increase awareness about screening."


Both O'Neal and Simmons say they are grateful for the UAB Women's Heart Health Clinic. "They saved my life, and they are doing so much to help women in the Birmingham community," O'Neal said. "I am blessed to live near a world-renowned research center that allows women to get the heart health treatment they need."
