FOLEY — Those who are interested in participating in the Kiwanis Club's Annual Foley Christmas Parade still have plenty of time to sign up and become part of this magical holiday tradition! City to advertise for bids on Public Works Complex

ROBERTSDALE — The Robertsdale City Council voted at its Monday, Nov. 18 meeting to authorize the advertisement for bids on the city's new Public Works Complex, which will be constructed on property the city owns on Chicago Street north of the police station.

A representative of Adams Stewart Architects presented plans for the project at the Robertsdale City Council meeting Sept. 16 and requested at the Nov. 18 meeting that the city move forward with the bid process.

The more than \$3.7 million project, which is considered to be Phase 2 of an improvement project surrounding Honeybee Park, which the city plans to complete as part of its Centennial Celebration in 2021, calls for a 23,000 square foot administration office, along with five additional buildings, two warehouses, a me-

Andrew Monaghan takes Magnolia Springs Council Place 1

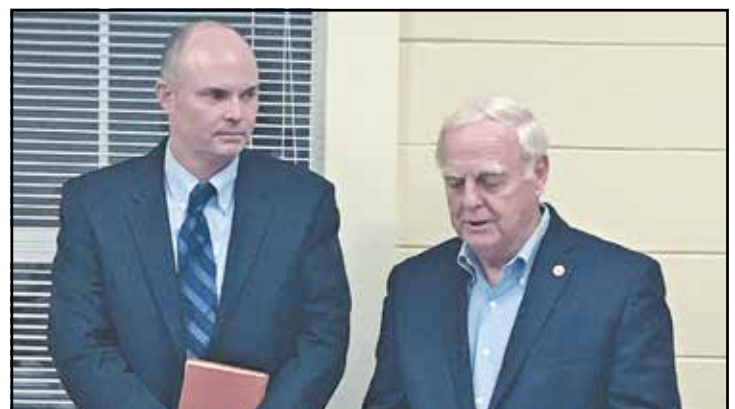

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS — During the November council meeting, it was voted unanimously that Andrew Monaghan would be joining the council, taking seat one. Three letters of interest

were submitted to the council before Monaghan was nominated to fill the position.

The seat became open last month, after former town mayor Bob Holk announced his resignation. It was then voted for Kim Koniar, previ-

Trafficking arrest nets 45 kilos of cocaine

LOXLEY — Baldwin County Sheriff's deputies arrested two California men after finding 45 kilograms of cocaine in a tractor trailer headed eastbound on Interstate 10 near the Baldwin Beach Express Exit on Wednesday, Nov. 20. According to a release issued Thursday by the Baldwin County Sheriff's Office, Special Operation Unit Deputies conducted a traffic stop on a tractor trailer near the 49-mile marker on

I-10 Wednesday. During a consensual search of the tractor and trailer, Deputies located personal use amounts of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia. A further search revealed approximately 45 kilograms of cocaine secreted within a natural void on the trailer. "The shipment originated in California and was destined for central Florida," according to the release. Deputies arrested the driver and co-driver, identified as 60-year-old

Mauro Lopez of Riverside, California, and 53-year-old Jose Encines of Anaheim, California. Both men were transported to the Baldwin County Sheriff's Office Corrections Center where they were booked on charges of drug trafficking, unlawful possession of a controlled



substance, and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia. Both are in jail without bond. The tractor and trailer were seized.

participants a number when they arrive, but that number is not to denote where they're at in the lineup, it's to give them an identifier for when they pass by the review stand. Even if they're located 50th in line but their number is two, our announcer sees the number, looks at the list we prepared that morning and is able to announce who is passing by."

Jackson said this is much easier on participants as there's not space restrictions prior to the parade; whenever you arrive, that's where you are in the lineup. Only select groups have designated positions, such as the marching band and JROTC. Anyone who arrives later than 9:30 can still lineup, but may not make it onto the list. This prevents them the opportunity to win the float contest, which awards first-fourth place in both civic and business categories.

Jackson will contact the winners the week following the parade. For those looking forward to enjoying the parade this year, mid-November numbers had approximately 45 entries already, with around 30 more expected to sign up. "I checked the data from last year and near the end there's usually a huge push to sign up," Jackson said. "I'm still calling last year's entries, and I expect 70 or so participants to be included this year." The

parade typically runs for an hour and is the largest parade Foley offers. Participation is free. The Grand Marshal for 2019 is Dean Hansen, former county commissioner and charter member of the Kiwanis Club. He has been involved with the Foley Christmas Parade since its inception. Floats can be any holiday/seasonal theme participants wish, with only one exception: the Kiwanis Club asks that no one feature Santa or Mrs. Claus on their

floats. Immediately following the parade will be Let It Snow in Heritage Park, beginning at 11 a.m. Everyone is invited to visit the park and experience the magic of "snow" thanks to the City of Foley. Those who would like to fill out an application are welcome to visit FoleyKiwanisClub.com to print and complete the form available there. You can either scan the document and email it to the Kiwanis Club (link on the website) or Jackson

(jjackson@cityoffoley.org), drop off the completed form at the Foley Public Library (319 East Laurel Avenue) for Jackson, or give him a call at 251-943-1032 to sign up via phone. Check out the Kiwanis Club of Foley on Facebook for additional information. The club meets every Tuesday at Vallarta's at noon, and Jackson invites anyone interested in volunteering with the parade or speaking with the members to join them for lunch at that time.

chanic shop, equipment shed and maintenance shop, a total of just under 63,000 square feet. The facility will be built to withstand hurricane-force winds and is designed to house city employees and anyone who comes in to assist with storm cleanup and power restoration following a storm, which means it will also be equipped for use as a temporary shelter with housing, kitchen and shower facilities. Phase 1 of the project was dedicated on July 4 and included the installation of new sidewalks, which increase booth space for the annual

Honeybee Festival. Existing sidewalks which surround the park were also removed and replaced. Brick columns surround the park, along with a brick entranceway at the south end of the park and the pavilion, which is located on the east side in the middle of the park. Additional improvements include landscaping, additional parking and restroom facilities. The majority of the brickwork for the project was done by David Wilson Masonry Inc. of Summerdale. Phase 3 of the park improvement project will be the construction of an amphitheater on the property where the Utilities Barn is currently

located, featuring local entertainment, with additional parking and restroom facilities surrounding the structure. Estimated cost for that project will be around \$1 million. In other business Nov. 18, the council approved the purchase of a 2002 E-One Cyclone II 95-foot Platform vehicle for the city's Volunteer Fire Department. Robertsdale Fire Chief Nick Moore said the vehicle is currently being used by the Nassau County, Florida, fire department. "We were able to go over there and ride along with them," Moore said. "This has everything we're looking for to meet our needs." Moore said the fire

department is asking \$250,000, but said they would be willing to come down to \$200,000. "We're hoping to get them to knock off a little bit more," he said. "Our plan is to ask \$180,000 and go from there." The council authorized Moore to spend up to \$200,000 for the new vehicle. Robertsdale Police Chief Brad Kendrick, who is also the Public Safety director for the city, said the department plans to surplus a 1991 Engine and a 1991 Rescue Truck once the new vehicle is purchased. Moore said the department currently has enough money in its equipment budget to purchase the vehicle and will not have to borrow any money to pay for it.

Fairhope High graduate awarded Baldwin Bengals scholarship

FAIRHOPE — The Baldwin Bengals LSU Alumni Club has awarded a \$1,000 scholarship to Emilie Ann Eastman of Fairhope.

The daughter of Scott and Shawn Eastman, the 18-year-old is a 2019 graduate of Fairhope High School and is currently enrolled as a freshman at LSU studying natural resource ecology and management with an emphasis on wetland science.

“This is really the only place I considered for my area of study,” Eastman said. “LSU offers in-state tuition because there is no place in Alabama that offers this field of study.”

Eastman said as a freshman, she is only able to take one class, renewable natural resource, in her course of study, but will have all her basic classes out of the way and be able to take on a full course load by her sophomore year.

“It’s really hands-on

and I will be able to take a lot of field classes,” she said. “This spring, I will also be assisting one of my professors in studying the sturgeon.”

She is a member of the Student Wetlands Society and LSU’s bass

fishing team.

Upon graduation, Eastman said, she wants to work for an environmental education center, such as the Weeks Bay Estuary.

“I really want to teach students about the envi-

ronment at the middle and high school levels,” she said. “I want to educate the younger generation on things that really aren’t being taught in school right now.”

The Baldwin Bengal Club was founded in 2013 with the mission of providing the Gulf Coast with an LSU alumni club. Dawn Hebert Beasley was the founding president of the club and Jeffery “Scooter” Pleasant is the club’s current president.

The Baldwin Bengals provide networking opportunities, watch parties and fundraisers to benefit the club.

Primarily funded through an annual crawfish boil, the club has now raised \$40,000 to allow the granting of a \$1,000 scholarship each year for the foreseeable future. This year’s crawfish boil will be held Saturday, May 2.

This \$40,000 fund will increase each year as the club continues its fundraising activities. This will allow for increases

in the scholarship level.

The Lillian Bicentennial Christmas Parade Dec. 14

The date for the annual Christmas Parade this year falls on the 200th anniversary of Alabama becoming the 22nd state. We will combine the celebrations, and Price Legg, the chairman of the Lillian Bicentennial Committee, will be the parade Grand Marshal. The parade is sponsored by the Optimist Club and Price is an active member.

Mr. Legg is a perfect choice to lead the bicen-

ennial observance. His ancestors were settlers in Alabama before statehood. He is a charter member of The Order of First Families of the Alabama Territory. He is a former President of the Alabama Society Sons of the American Revolution, and he also served as President of The Society War of 1812 in the State of Alabama.

Price was born in Birmingham and graduated from the University of Alabama in 1961. He served in the U.S. Air

Force and was stationed in France. After he left military service, he began working at the Birmingham Credit Union. This was the beginning of a long and distinguished career that eventually led to becoming an officer at CUNA Mutual Insurance Group (Credit Union National Association).

His work for CUNA made it possible for Price and his wife, Jean, to travel all over the country, and following retirement Price became a member of several organizations' boards

of directors which allowed them to continue traveling. A friend told them about Lillian and the Legg's purchased property on Perdido Bay in 1992 that is still their home. Baldwin schools make improvements

ROBERTSDALE — Continuing progress in Baldwin County education requires efforts to improve attendance, reading and the morale and interest of both students and teachers, local educators said.

The recent state education report card gave Baldwin County a "B" average, moving up from an 85 to an 86 out of 100. Baldwin County had 18 "A" grades, 16 "B" grades and eight "C" grades. No schools received a D or a failing grade.

Fairhope Elementary and Orange Beach Elementary received a score of 99, a rating never achieved by a Baldwin County school.

On Nov. 15, principals from those schools and two schools with the best improvements in scores, spoke with local officials at the monthly Baldwin County Superintendent's Breakfast in Robertsdale.

"We're mastering the standards," Baldwin County Superintendent of Education Eddie Tyler said. "But there's so much more that figures into a score and even though teachers and schools are working extremely hard, just one little thing like a chronic absence, which is what this term from the state board, can keep you from achieving a certain score."

Controlling absenteeism was one key to improvement, Joe Sharp, Robertsdale High principal, said.

"I don't care if you've got Einstein teaching math," he said. "You can't learn if you're not

in school."

Sharp said Robertsdale was at the bottom of Baldwin County in several criteria several years ago. Robertsdale had been declared by the state of Alabama in a critical area because the graduation rate was so low.

The school set up teams to focus on at-risk students and to improve interaction between teachers.

"We felt like when we first got to Robertsdale, we were 82 individual schoolhouses that shared a parking lot and we wanted to be able to push those groups together so we could learn from each other, we could develop common assessments, we could analyze where the mistakes were going on and address those problems," Sharp said.

In one year, the school's graduation rate improved from 74 to 89. Robertsdale also ranked in the top 8 percent, or 92nd percentile on growth in the ACT with some of those major improvements in English, math and science.

"Robertsdale High School showed the most growth of all high schools in Baldwin County, again that's something that we're proud of," Sharp said.

Foley Elementary also faced challenges. With 1,400 pupils, the school is the largest elementary school in Alabama, Principal Michelle Moore said. "You can be standing in the middle of the school and it feels like you're in an airport," she said.

She said the school has concentrated on investing in teachers.

"What do teachers think they can do and how much do they think they can do it? Investing in teachers is one of the most important things that we feel is the most important for allowing students success in the classroom," she said. "We talk about building relationships, not only with the students, but with each other and the community."

Fairhope Elementary just missed a perfect score on the last report card, but that was not always the case, Principal Julie Pierce said. Four years ago, the school had a 64 in reading proficiency.

"You're not making a 64, a D, unless there is a problem in the classroom, which there was,"

she said.

Pierce said school officials looked over data and made a strong effort to push coaching and make sure children learned to read.

One big benefit at Fairhope was the quality of teachers, she said.

"Fairhope Elementary is unique. I've never worked in a school where every faculty member

loved every child," she said. "You always had one or two teachers who were a little bit grumpy towards kids. That's not what happens at Fairhope Elementary."

Ryan Moss, Orange Beach Elementary principal, also stressed the importance of employees, both teachers and other staff members.

"It is a complete team

effort," he said. "Orange Beach Elementary School, classified, certified, it's all the same to us. It's all staff and we all are a huge part of the students and making sure when they come in those doors they're happy, safe and healthy and when they're the same."

Senator Jones introduces legislation to protect and increase red snapper populations

WASHINGTON — U.S. Senator Doug Jones (D-Ala.) has introduced bipartisan legislation to improve the health of reef fish populations, such as red snapper, in the Gulf of Mexico. The legislation was co-sponsored by Senator Bill Cassidy (R-La.) and a companion bill was recently introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressmen Garrett Graves (R-La.) and Jared Huffman (D-Calif.).

Reef fish, such as red snapper, caught and rapidly brought to the surface from deep water can suffer from barotrauma, a condition that kills fish because they cannot readjust

to deep water upon release. Venting tools and descending devices reduce barotrauma and save fish harvested for both recreational and commercial uses. The Direct Enhancement of Snapper Conservation and the Economy through Novel Devices (DESCEND) Act would require commercial and recreational fishermen to keep descending devices onboard their boats.

"I've been fishing all my life, so I know how important it is to protect Gulf species like red snapper. The use of descending devices and venting tools is one way we can help maintain healthy populations

of reef fish, which is crucial for the economy of Alabama and for ensuring that future generations can continue to enjoy red snapper season," Senator Jones said.

"For charter fishermen in the Gulf of Mexico, fishing is more than a pastime — it's our way of life. Charter fishermen such as myself have been using descending devices for some time, and we hope that this legislation will encourage the use of these devices among all sectors of the Gulf fishing community. I'm also pleased to see that this bill mandates further study into the role that descending devices

and venting tools may play in reducing discard mortality and preserving the health of Gulf reef fish species," said Johnny Greene, Owner, Intimidator Charters in Orange Beach and Former Gulf Council Member.

"This legislation is greatly appreciated by recreational anglers in the Gulf of Mexico who understand first-hand the frustration associated with releasing a reef fish back into the water, only to watch as it fails to make it back to the bottom," said Blakeley Ellis, Executive Director, Coastal Conservation Association Alabama. "The DESCEND Act will ensure that fisheries managers have every tool at their disposal to help return these fish to depth and minimize post-release mortality. Fewer wasted fish will result in increased access to fisheries like red snapper in the long run. We appreciate the leadership by Senators Jones and Cassidy to enhance marine

resource conservation with this common-sense measure."

"While Gulf of Mexico red snapper has historically been a highly contentious policy issue, it's heartening to see such strong support for this effort to reduce mortality rates of discarded reef fish," said Mike Leonard, Vice President of Government Affairs, American Sportfishing Association. "Thanks to the bipartisan work of U.S. Senators Doug Jones and Bill Cassidy, the DESCEND Act of 2019 will make meaningful progress in improving fish survival by requiring proper gear be used to release fish caught in the Gulf federal waters. The more fish that survive, the healthier their populations will be in the future, therefore providing better fishing opportunities."

"The Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources participated in a descender device pilot program a couple

of years ago with the American Sportfishing Association. We provided hundreds of descender devices to Alabama anglers. The program showed that the use of descender devices was very effective in decreasing release mortality of reef fish. I am appreciative of this legislation that will increase use of descender devices that will contribute, along with other initiatives and sound management, to rebuilding our reef fish populations," said Chris Blankenship, Commissioner, Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

The legislation has been endorsed by the American Sportfishing Association, Center for Sportfishing Policy, Coastal Conservation Association, Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation, National Marine Manufacturers Association, and Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership.

Alabama's Fears fuels fire for dutch oven revival

Now that the weather has finally cooled, the outdoors takes on a whole new appeal for many in Alabama. Hunting and camping are likely on the agenda, and being able to feed a delicious meal to a group of hunters or campers can often hinge on your upbringing.

If you're like J. Wayne Fears, who calls Tater Knob in Jackson County, Alabama, home, it means breaking out the cast iron, just as his ancestors did while trapping and living off the land in north Alabama.

What Fears finds interesting is that a new generation is discovering the benefits of cast iron.

"Millennials are discovering the advantages of cooking on cast iron," said Fears, a certified wildlife biologist and prolific outdoor writer. "My grandma knew that. Lodge (Manufacturing in Tennessee) had to build another foundry because of the popularity of both the cast iron skillet and the cast iron dutch oven."

When it comes to cast iron dutch ovens, two different models are available for distinctly different purposes. The flat-bottom dutch oven is made to be used on conventional stovetops, while the dutch oven with legs is designed for outdoor cooking at campfires with coals from the fire or charcoal briquets.

"For camping, you need a dutch oven with three legs and a recessed lid," said Fears, who held a seminar recently at the Southeastern Outdoor Press Association annual conference. "The legs keep the bottom of the dutch oven off the coals, so you don't burn everything. It has a recessed lid so you can put coals on top to use it for baking."

Fears honed his dutch oven expertise during numerous years of overseeing hunting operations all over North America, including the

western U.S., Canada and Alaska.

"Especially in our remote camps, we depended on dutch ovens to do a heck of a lot of our cooking," he said.

If you're planning a hunting or camping trip, or just cooking on an outdoor campfire, Fears recommends certain cast iron cookware to achieve a delicious meal. If you expect to draw a crowd when the smell of the cooking spreads, Fears recommends a No. 12 dutch oven. The No. 12 is the diameter in inches of the pot. Fears said you might need more than one, possibly in different sizes.

"It depends on what you're cooking, whether it's a stew and a pan of biscuits. You're going to need one for each," he said. "For the stew, I'd recommend a No. 12, and a No. 10 dutch oven so you can cook some cathead biscuits."

"If you're going to make a cobbler, you're going to need another No. 10. You can cook all three, and all of your meal will come out at the same time."

Fears also recommends that you don't look for the cheapest dutch oven you can find.

"I want to stress to get a quality dutch oven," he said. "There are so many dutch ovens made overseas that are pitted or they'll shatter if you drop them. If you get good quality cast iron, it can be a lifetime investment. In fact, a lot of my dutch ovens are in their third generation."

Fears doesn't discount the value of cooking with coals from the campfire if you're in remote locations. However, if you can take a sack of charcoal briquets with you, your meals will likely be more palatable.

"Charcoal is just better as far as consistency and heat control," he said. "Most people who cook with dutch ovens can go either way. With a little practice and good hardwood coals from the campfire, you can cook just as good as you can with charcoal. But most people who are just camping will use char-

coal briquets because it's a lot easier to fool with and the temperature is more consistent on top and on bottom."

Contrary to what you may have seen in western or pioneer movies and TV shows, veteran dutch oven cooks have more heat on top than on bottom.

"You want to use twice as many coals on the lid as on the bottom," Fears said. "You're cooking down more than you're cooking up. Most people, when they first start, they want to stick a dutch oven right in the middle of the campfire and put a few coals on top. Generally, they'll burn everything on bottom, and it'll still be rare on top. That's why you have the lipped cover so the briquets won't roll off of the top."

Fears admits to making a "world of mistakes" while learning the fine art of dutch oven cooking and says adjustments have to be made depending on conditions.

"You may have a recipe that says cook at 350 degrees for 45 minutes," he said. "Well, 45 minutes in a dutch oven in Ely, Minnesota, is different than 45 minutes in Montgomery, Alabama. The wind, humidity and outside temperature have effects. You have to learn to see how the conditions affect the cooking."

"You've got to be patient and, every now and then, take a peek at what's going on in the dutch oven so you can learn what you're doing. And I rotate the lid about a quarter-turn every 15 minutes so that if you have any hotspots, you're moving

them around."

Fears also said not to skimp on the amount of charcoal you light when you start cooking.

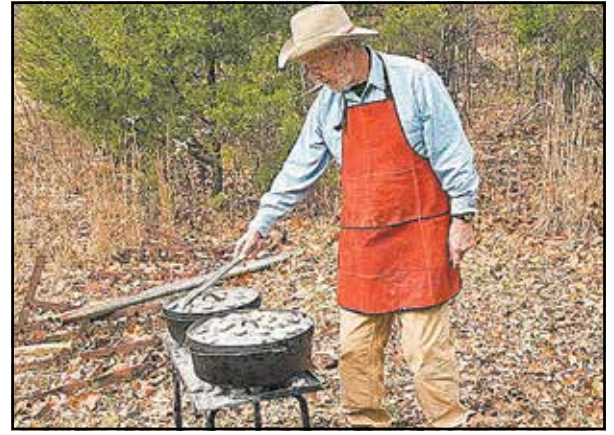
"Always have plenty of coals," he said. "If it's cold, like it is now up on Tater Knob this time of year, you need to have more coals waiting when the first ones are burned up."

Fears also recommends a pair of heavy-duty gloves because just about everything you touch will be hot. He also recommends lid lifters that are capable of lifting a dutch oven filled with venison stew that might weigh 40 pounds.

"A coat hanger is not going to quite get the job done," he said.

Fears has also learned that one of the best ways to use a dutch oven is to use it as just that, an oven. He takes a wire rack and places it in the bottom of the cast iron and uses a heavy-duty aluminum pan that fits on top of the wire rack to cook the food.

"The food doesn't come in contact with the cast iron, and it saves you a ton of time for cleanup," he said. "Having said that, the easiest way to get started with a dutch oven is to go to the supermarket and get a peach cobbler mix and two cans of peaches. Follow the instructions on the box and cook several cobblers in your dutch oven. You can learn more cooking cob-

blers than you can anywhere else.

"Once you have mastered peach cobbler, move up to stew or chili. Then when you get that mastered, you might want to make sour-dough cathead biscuits. It's not difficult. You just have to get out and actually do it. Anything you can cook in your oven at home, you can cook in a dutch oven. But I burned a lot before I figured it out."

Fears' "Lodge Book of Dutch Oven Cooking" is about to be translated into a fourth language. It's filled with cooking tips and recipes.

"The book is selling really well in Japan right now," Fears said. "They're cooking a lot of rice dishes, and it's easy to burn rice if you're not careful."

Of course, when the

meal is done, it's time for cleanup. One cardinal rule prevails when cleaning cast iron.

"Never use soap," Fears said. "You can get these pot scrubbers that look like chain mail that work really well. If your cobbler spills over, pour hot water in it and hit it with that chain mail scrubber."

For those looking for Christmas gifts, other than his book, Fears recommends a wire rack, heavy aluminum pan, chain mail scrubber, whisk broom for removing ashes from the lid, a small fireplace shovel to move coals around and a quality lid lifter.

"And wear some good boots or shoes," Fears said. "No sandals or flip flops. If you do, you're going to have some interesting scars on your toes."

Hanyu, Biles named United States Sports Academy October Athletes of the Month

DAPHNE — The most decorated gymnast in history and a global figure skating sensation have been named the United States Sports Academy’s male and female Athletes of the Month for October. American gymnast Simone Biles and Japanese superstar Yuzuru Hanyu took home the top honors for the month.

Hanyu won the Skate Canada men’s title by 59.82 points, the largest margin in Grand Prix figure skating history, in competition in October 2019. Hanyu won with a personal best total of 322.59, the highest point total in the world this season.

Biles won five gold medals at the FIG Artistic Gymnastics World Championships in Stutt-

gart, Germany, in October 2019, and became the most decorated gymnast in world championships history with 25 career world medals. Biles also completed two skills never performed by a female gymnast in competition.

The second-place finisher on the men’s side was Washington Nationals pitcher Stephen Strasburg and third place went to Kenyan runner Eliud Kipchoge.

Strasburg was named the MVP of the World Series after winning both of his starts against the Houston Astros in October. The right-hander became the first pitcher to go 5-0 in a single postseason, striking out 47 batters and posting an 11.8 strikeout-to-walk ratio, the third best in MLB postseason history.

Kipchoge became the first person in history to finish a marathon in under two hours with a time of 1:59:40.2 in Vienna, Austria, on Oct. 12.

The second place finisher on the women’s side was Australian swimmer Minna Atherton and third place went to Kenyan runner Brigid Kosgei.

Atherton set a world record in the women’s 100-meter backstroke with a time of 54.89 seconds in Budapest, Hungary, on Oct. 27. Atherton’s time topped the previous world record of 55.03 seconds set by Hungary’s Katinka Hosszu in 2014. Atherton also won the 200-meter backstroke with a time of 2:00.58 the previous week in Lewisville, Texas.

Kosgei broke Paula Radcliffe’s 16-year-old

women’s world record by winning the Chicago Marathon with a time of 2:14:04 on Oct. 13. It was the second consecutive Chicago Marathon title for Kosgei, who also won the London Marathon this year.

Each month, the public is invited to participate in the Academy’s worldwide Athlete of the Month program by nominating athletes and then voting online during the first week of every month. The online votes are used to guide the Academy selection committee in choosing the male and female monthly winners, who then become eligible for selection to the prestigious Athlete of the Year ballot. A worldwide public vote on the annual ballot is used to guide the committee in making the final selection.

The Athlete of the Year Award is part of the United States Sports Academy’s Awards of Sport program, which each year serves as “A Tribute to the Artist and the Athlete.” The Academy presents the awards to pay tribute to those who have made significant contributions to sport, in categories as diverse as the artist and the athlete in several different arenas of sport.

The awards honor exemplary achievement in coaching, all-around

athletic performance, courage, humanitarian activity, fitness and media, among others. In 10 games this season, Jones has 59 receptions on 91 targets for 882 yards and four touchdowns. He has also accounted for 46 first downs, averaged 88.2 yards per game, accounted for 13 big plays of 20 yards or more

yards, accounted for 226 yards after catch. Jones leads the team in all the previously mentioned categories for the Falcons except for touchdowns and yards after catch.

Jones is fifth in the league in receiving yards, fifth in yards per game, tied for fourth in first downs and 11th in

receptions. Jones is on verge of being selected for his seventh pro bowl in his nine-year NFL career.

Jones had six receptions for 91 yards in the Falcons' 29-3 win over the Carolina Panthers. That victory over the Panthers have knocked them further away from the

NFC Wildcard spot with the NFC being a highly competitive conference this season. Jones' best performance in a victory this season was their 24-20 win over the Philadelphia Eagles on Sept. 15. In that game, Jones had five receptions for 106 yards and two touchdowns.

Sailing League exhibition: Premiere Series coming just over the state line

PENSACOLA — While a premature taste of winter blanketed much of the U.S.A. in the past week, the Premiere Sailing League (PSL) was busy readying for the January 2020 debut of its Exhibition Series just over the bridge in Pensacola, Florida. Following a well-received event, held in conjunction with the Annapolis Boat Show, where roughly 200 sailors experienced first-hand the concept of stadium sailing, the PSL's fleet of six RS21 keelboats have arrived at Pensacola Yacht Club.

"With the help of the folks at the Annapolis Sailing School, who provided immeasurable logistical support, we were able to escape the snow and travel to Pensacola," said PSL President Benjamin Klatzka. "Now we are gearing up for a test event in early December that will set the stage for the PSL Exhibition Series."

The PSL Exhibition Series will consist of four regattas, with dates confirmed as follows: PSL Exhibition Series 1 is scheduled for Jan. 3-5, 2020, off Plaza de Luna at the foot of historic South Palafox Place adjacent to the Pensacola Marina. The remaining PSL Exhibition Series events are scheduled for Jan. 31-Feb. 2, March 6-8 and April 3-5, 2020.

PSL Exhibition Series 1 will take place on courses set just off the Pensacola waterfront. For each event, practice racing will be held on Friday from the Pensacola Yacht Club, located

in the downtown Sanders Beach Community. On Saturday and Sunday, the six to 10 teams will race short-course, fast-paced flights, each roughly 20 minutes long, with up to 20 races per day, to determine the

winner. Spectators will be able to take in the action from either Plaza de Luna or the nearby Vince Whibbs Community Maritime Park. Teams can now sign up for Series racing at YachtScoring.com.

The fast pace of the series is largely achievable with the use of the high-tech MarkSetBot. Utilizing GPS and a smart phone to set the marks of the course saves time for event organizers, and, sig-

nificantly, it improves accuracy in setting the course.

The PSL's fleet of RS21s will spend the winter at Pensacola Yacht Club, making it possible for college sailing teams or other inter-

Bay Minette man facing sodomy charges

BAY MINETTE — A Bay Minette man is in jail on a first-degree sodomy warrant after being picked up during a traffic stop on Tuesday.

According to a release issued Wednesday by the BMPD, Timothy Dewayne Thomas Jr., 30, is in jail without bond.

The arrest came after the BMPD was notified in early October by DHR regarding a minor child who had been sexually assaulted.

“Investigators determined through their investigation that Thomas was the suspect and develop probable cause to issue a warrant for his arrest for the charge of sodomy in the first

degree,” according to the release issued by Chief Al Tolbert.

Thomas is currently being held in the Baldwin County Corrections Center without bond.

“A bond hearing will be set and we will release that information when comes available,” Tolbert said. “No other details or information is available for release at

this time regarding this arrest.”

Thomas has a long history of bookings at the Corrections Center, dating back to 2009 when a then 19-year-old Thomas was booked on charges of possession of marijuana, carrying a concealed weapon and disorderly conduct.

He was booked in December 2011 on several

charges of negotiating a worthless instrument with the Summerdale Police Department, released in February of 2012.

He was booked again on negotiating a worthless instrument charges with the Bay Minette Police Department in 2013, booked in February of 2014 on drug charges and again in March of

2014 on an alias warrant.

He was last booked in May and November of 2018 on failure to pay and failure to appear charges with the Summerdale and Bay Minette police departments.

SILVERHILL — The Silverhill Town Council held a swearing in ceremony for its newest police officer, Justine Parr, at its meeting on Monday, Nov. 18.

A native of Louisiana, this will be Parr's first job as a police officer, she said. She plans to enter the Police Academy in January, where she will complete her training.

On hand for the ceremony were her husband,

LaVon, who is a captain with Silverhill's volunteer fire department, and their two children, Blaine, 3, and Mallory, 5.

The department currently has two fulltime police officers and four parttime officer, said Chief Kenneth Hempfleng.

The veteran Daphne police officer was hired as the town's newest police chief in July and said the town plans to hire an addition officer in the coming weeks.

"We are taking our

time to find quality officers, not just fill positions," he said.

LaVon Parr presented the fire department report at the council meeting in the absence of Fire Chief Josh Rice and the council authorized the purchase of two compression devices for the fire department.

Parr explained that the machines are completely battery operated and are used as life saving devices in the event of a cardiac arrest.

One of the machines

will be kept at the station, Parr said, while the other will be kept in Rice's command vehicle.

"A lot of times, he is on the scene a few minutes ahead of us," Parr said, "and in those instances where this device is necessary, every second counts toward saving a life."

The council also spoke with a representative from Data Trust at the Nov. 18 meeting about the possibility of switching to a wireless Internet and phone system.

The Big Picture

The Cotton Gin

The dirt I wore around me in the cotton fields was my cloak and in it I was home. We were home, Bethany and I, tearing through the fields, the intermingled smells of clean blossoming cotton and the hot earth alternating as we ran, and fell, and ran again. The dirt was always our clothing but the cotton would be whatever we asked them to be. Our fortress, our hideaway, our adventure, almost every trip was constantly padded by soft cotton and their

woody unbreakable shells woven around into tunnels and roofs.

Mr. Trantham didn't know it, but we owned the cotton. Our boundaries extended as far as our three-foot frames could see and to wherever never tiring legs could run. While there was safety in the field it ended abruptly, imposingly, at the trees surrounding the cotton; immediately trading the obedient cotton stems for omniscient green sentinels. We owned the cotton field, but the trees were strangers and we never dwelled among them for long.

It was in this border we lived during the warm dusty months of the summer. Be-

tween the lines of leafy sphinxes in which the wind never blew with any great enthusiasm and the dirt hung in the air as well as over the earth. Through our adventures and discoveries we lived and ran and hid. As it was, we marked out our territory; the washout at the edge of the field where the cotton became so short that we were exposed, the low rolling mound near the edge of the field belonged to us, and the telephone pole that signaled we were almost halfway to my grandmother's. We began claiming the cotton field and the cotton field claimed us as well.

Our discoveries, not quite to the telephone pole, were made largely along the low, almost invisible, mounds that served as our fort, our second home, our hideaway. These would only come out in the winter, when the cotton stalks had been torn away and the ground had revealed itself at last. Dirty cotton strung along it that could look like yesterday's snowfall, if you want it too. It was here we found that snakes can look like cotton and that I was not

as brave as I thought. It was here that I discovered the adventure that is given by the unknown, as Beth and I braved the green silent strangers and poked hesitantly into their territory, stick in hand, there was safety in sticks. And it was here that I came to understand that all change occurs in time and that time changes all, as the cotton would brave the ground to form whatever we requested, yield its cotton, and at last whither away before the cold of winter.

As the cotton grew and changed so did we, getting older, marking out larger swatches of the field to call our own. And while the trees never ceased being foreign strangers, we prodded our way slowly into their terrain, sticks still in hand.

I learned the concave back of a cursive s and still the cotton broke the ground. I developed my first crush while leaves developed, concealing our fake snow and ensuring the coming warmth of summer. And by the time I went into the next grade, to find she liked me too, the cottonseeds had tangled

up in the soft crop and presented themselves for harvest, tiny clouds floating above low green matte leaves.

The next grade saw her separated and the cotton had been leveled to the earth again. He dirt on our paths was packed harder and harder with each month, the trails reaching deeper into the mysteries concealed among the corners of the field. The hard bulbs of the plants rattled against our bare limbs, counting time, as we ran and the year crept by. The metronome motion continued and time was counted off until it brought the news that we were leaving the cotton fields. We moved. The cotton stayed.

We would visit my grandma every Sunday. She would cook for hours and as we arrived roasts, casseroles, and cookies, to name a few, would crowd out the table so you could barely see its top. Over the years my family continued to grow and our adventures were undertaken by ever-greater bands of heroes until our boundaries encompassed the entire fields. The telephone pole with

its stunted stalks, the tunnels built of tangled stems, and the clacking metronomes all belonged to us now. We taught our new brother the safety of sticks and the imposition of the trees that had given them to us. We took on the challenge of the trees and the knocking of cotton bulbs was replaced by the whispering of the leaves. As we grew the trees seem slightly smaller, slightly less impenetrable, though their territory was never fully ours.

I left the small private school that taught me cursive to be introduced to public school and saw sphinxes once again, teachers and kids I had never met. But this was only new terrain, and I had braved that before, stick in hand and siblings at my back. It was the cotton field that taught me the unknown, the foreign, and it was the cotton field that revealed those same mysteries to me. As I met friends and my family grew I saw again how the foreign became close, become home. And even still the cotton continues to grow a thousand miles away, and change for the next year, so do I.

Alabama can do better

Alabama recently received an “F” from the March of Dimes for its high rate of premature births — a rate that is the second highest in the country. We can definitely do better.

According to the March of Dimes, one out of every eight Alabama babies is born early, increasing the risk of future health complications and resulting in stress for

both families and our health care system. And, according to the report, while the number of premature births in Alabama had been decreasing, in the last three years it has been rising.

While there are a number of risk factors for premature birth, often early deliveries can be caused by the poor health of the mother. The National Institutes of Health includes high blood pressure and diabetes in its list of maternal condi-

tions that place the pregnancy at risk for preterm birth. These are conditions that land Alabama at the top of many national lists, and being at the top of these lists is not a positive.

The March of Dimes report recommended a way to help Alabama overcome this problem — expand health insurance coverage. The report noted that in 2017, about one in seven women of childbearing age (14.3 percent) was uninsured in Alabama. These are women who

don't have access to the preventive care and medications they need. They often present to hospitals without having any prenatal care and end up delivering very sick babies. Expanding Medicaid would provide health insurance to these women and give them access to the care they need to have healthier pregnancies and healthier babies. Expansion has also been shown to reduce infant mortality. According to a study in the American Journal

of Public Health, the decline in infant mortality in Medicaid expansion states was more than 50 percent greater than in non-expansion states.

There are many things hospitals are doing in conjunction with physicians, the March of Dimes, the Alabama Department of Public Health, the Alabama Medicaid Agency and other stakeholder organizations to improve the health of mothers and babies. However, unless we provide the health

coverage needed, many women in our state will continue to have premature births, poor birth outcomes and lasting health problems. Now is the time for us to invest in a Healthy Alabama Plan to expand access to care for everyone... an investment that would help impact the youngest and smallest Alabamians.

Great teachers can make a difference

There is a teacher shortage crisis in Alabama.

During the 2017 school year, more than 1,700 Alabama teachers in grades 7-12 were not certified to teach the English, math, social studies, science, or special education classes they were assigned to teach.

In fact, in 70 schools in Alabama, 10 percent or more of the teachers are working without full certification. These teacher shortages have been shown to be even worse in rural parts of Alabama, where there are the largest

percentages of teachers using emergency or pro-

visional certificates.

And the problem is getting worse. From 2009 to 2015, the number of education majors enrolled in Alabama's public universities dropped by 19 percent.

That's why I recently introduced the Classrooms Reflecting Communities Act, which was inspired by a roundtable that I held in August at the University of Montevallo with teachers and

administrators about the challenges facing Alabama's teacher workforce. The bill would authorize competitive grants for schools to establish “Grow Your Own” programs, which recruit diverse teacher candidates from the community and support them as they work to receive a teaching certification.

Fifty-nine school districts in Alabama would

be eligible for these grants. The goal is to recruit and retain teachers who have strong local roots and reflect the diversity of their classrooms. Studies have shown that over 60 percent of teachers teach within 20 miles of where they went to high school, and these “Grow Your Own” models focus on cultivating teaching talent in the communities that need it most.

This is so important because great teachers can make a huge difference in lives of the children they teach. We need to do everything we can inspire young people to become teachers, to help schools retain teachers, and to make sure that they have the resources they need in order to be successful. The Classrooms Reflecting Communities Act would be a great step forward.

Violent crime in Alabama: Enough is enough

Over the last six weeks, the people of Alabama have been confronted with a frightening reality that very few of our politicians have been willing to acknowledge: our state has a violent crime problem.

Don't believe me? Violent crime in Alabama is up 20% over the last ten years, despite some improvement over the past year. We have the seventh-highest murder rate in the nation and FBI data indicates that we are the fifth most violent state in the nation. Let that sink in. The kidnapping and murder of a three-year-old, the abduction of a

bright college student, and the cold-blooded killing of a 20-year-old National Guardsman — in light of these statistics, these incidents don't seem quite as unforeseen, do they?

But who is talking about it? In Alabama, and across the country, “enlightened” reformists only want to talk (or get paid to talk) about the plight of the criminal. They tell stories about what life is like for those behind bars, but conspicuously fail to mention the crimes that landed the prisoners there in the first place — the havoc they wreaked on a community, the sense of security they took away from the innocent, the

parents and siblings they left heartbroken.

The activists would also have you believe that our prisons are full of peaceful pot smokers and inadvertent thieves. But, of course, that is false. Alabama's prisons are full of violent offenders — 4,200 murderers, 2,500 violent robbers, 1,000 rapists, over 1,200 would-be murderers, and the list goes on. The imprisoned “nonviolent” offenders are mostly those that simply refuse to stop stealing or dealing drugs or will not follow the terms of their probation. Only 21% of those in our prisons have committed “low-level” felonies and those offenders aren't staying long — there's just always a new offender waiting to fill the spot.

Traditionally, incar-

ceration serves four purposes: retribution, rehabilitation, deterrence, and incapacitation. Somewhere along the way, we have forgotten the common denominator of all four purposes, and that is public safety. If a disproportionate fixation on any one of these four (like rehabilitation, for instance) leads to decreased public safety, then we are doing it wrong. I fear that that is precisely where Alabama is headed.

For those who think that “criminal justice reform” has a nice political ring to it, let's examine the most recent reform package to become law — the FIRST Step Act, passed by the U.S. Congress. At the time of passage, the Republican-led Congress was so smitten with the tepid media ac-

claim surrounding its “progressive” efforts that it refused to heed the warnings of law enforcement and prosecutors from around the country. Now, only one year after passage, we are left wondering what exactly Congress took a “first step” towards? Gang members and other violent offenders have been set free and lives have already been lost as a direct result of the new federal law. [A note of thanks is due to Senator Shelby and all of Alabama's Congressional Republicans who wisely voted against the final bill.] We must ardently oppose similar efforts in Alabama and, believe me, they are coming.

In 1981, Ronald Reagan recognized that, “for too long, the victims

of crime have been the forgotten persons of our criminal justice system.” It was true then, and sadly, it has become true again. The pendulum in Alabama has swung too far. We have a very real violent crime problem and it won't be solved by incessantly watering down sentences, expanding extracurricular activities in our prisons, doing away with the death penalty, or, most shamefully, ignoring victims of crime. If we believe that our citizens deserve better than the dangerous lawlessness of today, we must reevaluate our logic and our priorities when it comes to criminal justice. Enough is enough.

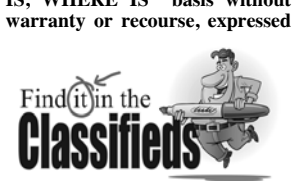
