Coach dies in car wreck

Akins was head of girls basketball at Spanish Fort High

Spanish Fort head girls basketball coach Thad Akins was killed in an automobile collision with a tractor trailer on I-65 near Fort Deposit last Thursday night.

According to a release from the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency, the crash occurred at 9:50 p.m. near mile marker 153.

Akins previously served as a coach at Gulf Shores High School and Horseshoe Bend.

Spanish Fort High Principal Brian Williamson said in a press release that his school was sad to lose a member of their family.

"It is with an extremely heavy heart that I announce to you that Coach Thad

Akins, our Head Girl's Basketball Coach, passed away in a tragic automobile accident last night," Williamson wrote. "Thad was a true Toro at heart and loved our school

In his resignation letter, Sligh said he was returning to his position with Riviera Utilities, where was previously the chief engineer.



Sligh had previously served at the City of Fairhope's electric department manager from 2008 until July 2015.

"During this time, we were able to make many changes for the better that had been needed for many, many years," Sligh wrote in his letter. "The employees that I supervised embraced these changes, as they knew from talking to their peers what other utilities were doing and what they should be doing. One appeal of this new job to me was the fact that due to reasons outside my control, and due to the influence of others less knowledgeable in utility work, when I left in 2015 there was still a lot to be done to bring Fairhope Public Utilities into the modern age; I felt that change was still needed and the time was now to start doing it."

According to city officials, Sligh had started in his new position just last Tuesday, leaving many surprised by his sudden exit from the job.

In his resignation letter, Sligh pointed out some issues he saw with the city's current utility status.

"In several aspects, the utilities perform well, but in many others, they lag far behind other utilities," Sligh wrote. "While the sewer plant upgrades were necessary and carried out in fine fashion, there exist many

other large, unfunded infrastructure needs. A couple of examples are the natural gas cast iron replacement need, and the need for new substation transformers and circuits. Fairhope also lacks a strong network of employee resources and faces a real shortage of leadership in the employee ranks – possibly by prior design. Strong leaders challenge and push the leaders above them. Effective leaders don't mind people pushing them and realize it can be healthy. Poor leaders get mad and actively work to keep people down."

He said it would be up to Mayor Karin Wilson to find a way to complete some of those larger projects during the upcoming budgeting process.

Wilson confirmed Sligh had resigned his position last week.

"Scott Sligh was excited to join the team here at Fairhope and work with the new administration," Wilson said. "However, since accepting the position, there has been a turn of events in his personal life that require him to spend more time at home with his family."

Sligh indicated in his letter that a personal family matter was his main reason for vacating his position, but he took time to offer his support to Wilson.

"Mayor Wilson is energetic and has

a lot of new ideas for many things; she and her staff will be infectious in this regard," Sligh wrote. "I want to help her by fulfilling this position, but the time is just not right for me as a husband and father. She is trying to enact change by example, and she needs more good people that want to help her do so. She is obviously disappointed in my decision, but remained the consummate professional in talking with me. I know that there are those who will believe otherwise no matter what I say, but I want to stress that my decision had nothing to do with her, her ideas, her personality, or any other thing having to do with Mayor Wilson. Anyone who underestimates her resolve and determination does so at their own peril."

Fairhope Council President Jack Burrell said he was incredibly surprised by the resignation, but said the city would move to find a replacement quickly.

"We will have to continue to search for an operations director, which is key to the city moving forward," Burrell said. "I feel the council should consider making this an appointed position now."

The students representing Eastern Shore Repertory Theatre presented selections from Singin' in the Rain JR. for director, choreographer and performer Jacob Brent (appeared in Broadway, London and DVD productions of Cats and Starlight Express, directed premiere of Avenue Q School Edition) and First Stage Education Director Julia Magnasco.

"Eastern Shore Repertory Theatre displayed outstanding energy, impeccable ensemble dance numbers, and a commitment to embodying the style of Singin' In The Rain JR," Magnasco said. "The young performers were so engaged in telling the story, it had the entire audience singing along and dancing in their seats."

The students representing Eastern Shore Rep Kids presented selections from Bugsy Malone, JR. for producing Artistic Director at Adventure Theatre MTC Michael Bobbit and Associate Professor, Drama and Theatre for Youth and Communities, Head of Drama and Theatre for Youth and Communities at the University of Texas at Austin, Megan Alrutz.

"Holy moly!" Bobbit said "Something must be in the water in Alabama. What these kids did reminded me of how much I love and need musical theater in my life!"

Baldwin Pops celebrates 20th anniversary

In 1997, musicians Regina Bush and Tom Robinson, local band directors Steve Sims and Joe Riemer, and Bordon Morrow, then director of Continuing Education at Faulkner State College in Fairhope, had an idea for a new band in Baldwin County. Riemer was a founder and longtime member of the Mobile Pops Band, and he thought there might be interest for a similar band on this side of the Bay.

Now conductor-emeritus and music director of Baldwin Pops, Riemer says they expected a dozen or so people to show up for their first meeting. "We had close to 60 people come out for that rehearsal, and there were some very good players. We were surprised but very happy with the turnout and with the quality. We've always been fortunate to have good players of all ages, from high school and college students to retirees."

The Baldwin Pops first concert filled the Fairhope Civic Center; later they played in Daphne and Foley "and we filled those locations as well," Riemer recalled. "We were amazed with the support. And of course, our best crowds and our favorite location to play has always been on the bluff in Fairhope."

Original sponsors for the all-volunteer organization included the City of Fairhope, Fairhope Single

Tax Corporation, and Faulkner State College. The cities of Daphne, Foley, and Gulf Shores have also been sponsors, along with the Point Clear Rotary, the University of South Alabama, and the Alabama State Council on the Arts.

The band's first conductors were Riemer and Sims. The Honorable Randy Davis, an Alabama State Representative and longtime music educator, has conducted in the past and is the band's conductor-in-residence. The current conductor is Dr. Roger Jones, who holds a Ph.D. in music theory and composition and has taught and conducted bands and orchestras around the country.

Although they represent the county, Baldwin Pops home is in Fairhope, Riemer said. "The city graciously allows us a place to rehearse, space to store our equipment, and helps us in many ways. We currently do four concerts a year in Fairhope and eleven concerts total across Baldwin County, including Foley, Gulf Shores, Robertsdale, Orange Beach, and Daphne.

In addition to the concert schedule, Baldwin Pops awards three annual scholarships to high school students and has players who visit elementary schools in the county for "instrument petting zoo" events that give children a chance to see, hold, and try to play different instruments.

Several current members of Baldwin Pops have been with the band since the beginning, said Anne Brooks, who is a charter member and now executive director for the band. "We musicians really weren't surprised at the turnout for that first rehearsal. Many of us knew Joe from Mobile Pops, and we were eager to play under his direction."

Over the years, the band has held steady at around 60 to 70 members, Brooks said. "We get new players all the time. It never fails that when someone leaves, we get an email or call from a new person who wants to join: usually someone who has played in other community bands in other cities."

The Baldwin Pops 20th Anniversary Concert, sponsored by the City of Fairhope and the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation, is Thursday, Feb. 2 at the Fairhope Civic Center. The concert will include a Fairhope history segment, selections from Aaron Copland's Rodeo, plus other favorites, along with a new piece written by conductor Dr. Roger Jones that will feature the band's talented oboe and English horn player, Erica Lovato, a senior at Spanish Fort High School.

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



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Falcons top Packers to claim NFC Championship

THE ATLANTA FALCONS ARE THE 2016-17 NFC CHAMPIONS after a dominating 44-21 win over the Green Bay Packers. Falcons' head coach Dan Quinn was cautious of the red-hot Packers who were on an eight-game win streak, including a win over the No. 1 NFC seed Dallas Cowboys last week.

Before the game started, the Falcons had the edge with all their role players but they still had to contain the high power passing of Packers' quarterback Aaron Rodgers.

Falcons' quarterback Matt Ryan and Rodgers are in contention for 2016 NFL MVP so the game could be a factor for the award.

Ryan accounted for 27 completions (out of 38 attempts) for 392 yards (an average of 10.3 yards), four passing touchdowns and one rushing touchdown.

Falcons' wide receiver and former Foley Lion Julio Jones had another big game despite multiple injuries with nine receptions for 180 yards and two touchdowns.

Jones dismantled the Packers' secondary with out routes and a 73-yard touchdown.

Atlanta dominated the Packers in every major category. They had 493 total yards while Green Bay had 367 total yards.

The Falcons averaged 7.2 yards per play while Green Bay averaged 5.7 yards per play. Of the 60-minute game, Atlanta had possession 11 minutes and eight seconds more than Green Bay.

In the first half the Falcons held the ball for 20 minutes, two seconds while the Packers only held the ball for 9 minutes, 58 seconds.

Atlanta's defense played surprisingly well against Rodgers and the Packers offense.

The Falcons were 27th in the league in points allowed per game this season.

So when Atlanta only allowed 127 total yards and shut out Green Bay in the first half, they proved they are Super Bowl contenders.

Robert Alford had five tackles and three pass deflections. Ra'Shede Hageman had three tackles, one sack, three tackles for loss, one quarterback hit and Ricardo Allen snagged an interception from Rodgers.

The Packers needed to have their pass defense play more efficiently.

The Packers were 31st in the NFL in passing yards allowed



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

It ain't all it's cracked up to be

IT HAS BEEN TEN YEARS since we made landfall from our three-year sojourn in the sailing vessel Starchaser. Yet when people hear about it, they are all a-twitter with questions and curiosity about what cruising and living aboard are all about. After answering their questions, the next one is the most difficult, "Why don't you write about it?" In short, it ain't all it's cracked up to be.

I have succumbed. This is it. I am writing about it. If your dream is to sail away and live forever cruising the blue, calm waters of the Caribbean, or the world's oceans, visiting exotic ports, and even more exotic, secluded anchorages off tiny, uncharted islands, catching your own lobster which are cooked right out of the water, drinking your favorite beverage while dining and watching the sunset on another perfect day, while you listen to Jimmy Buffet, stop right there. Do not read any further. That is the dream, but a dream is not reality. I'm telling you, it ain't all it's cracked up to be.

Sailing is hard work. You see these idyllic pictures of a tanned couple dressed in clean, crisp, white outfits, standing at the helm of an immaculate sailboat, smiling with a glass of wine in hand, and saying something like, "Now, bring me that horizon," a la Captain Jack Sparrow. That is not the reality.

A cruising vessel, if it has been to sea longer than a couple of days is not clean and uncluttered. There is all manner of gear lashed to the deck, all salt encrusted, and all a daily necessity. The idyllic, smiling couple will look as salty as the gear on deck. The outfits are no longer crisp or white. If they have not been dumped in favor of cut-offs and t-shirts, if that much, they will now be sweat soaked, grease and food stained, and will smell like the bilge.

If there are only two of you and you are making a several days crossing, you are likely to be sailing in four-hour watches, which do not allow for much sleep, and even basic personal hygiene is abandoned. Showering on a pitching, rolling boat is almost out of the question even if you have the water on board to take one.

After four hours of standing watch, the only thing you want to do is lie down, and as soon as you

Put two little girls, a dog, and two frogs into this mix, and there is no way you are ever going to capture the attention of the ad agency that took the idyllic, white outfitted photo. You soon realize why sailors are characterized as surly, unshaven, and ill kept. It is now embarrassingly clear where, and how, the term "cusses like a sailor" came about.

In your cruising dream, if you imagine hours of lounging at anchor reading a book, swimming, or resting, if you are the captain, forget it. Your time at anchor will be spent repairing all the stuff that broke on the crossing while the Admiral and the Princesses do all the things they dreamed of... washing dishes, doing laundry, re-supplying, and handing me tools.

As captain of a sailing vessel, you are ultimately responsible for everything. You are plumber, carpenter, electrician, rigger, painter, mechanic, minister, doctor/nurse, meteorologist, navigator, hydrologist, sail maker, and all around encyclopedia. Heaven help you if you ever say the words, "I don't know." If you do, you might as well get off at the next port and give the boat away. Your credibility with the crew is shot.

You must be these things because, in the middle of the big, blue, wet thing, there is no roadside assistance or anyone likely to pass near if you break down. You are on your own. At sea, as captain, there is God, then you. He will help, but the decisions and work are all on you.

There comes a point when you wear down and instead of settling in some exotic locale that you dreamed of, you end up in Fairhope, Alabama... never a sweeter place on

A tribute to Governor Albert Brewer

THE PASSING OF GOVERNOR ALBERT BREWER ON JAN. 2 AT 88 YEARS OLD, marks the passing of an era in Alabama politics.

Albert P. Brewer was a good man and a true public servant. Brewer was born in Tennessee, but his folks moved to Decatur when he was very young after his father

accepted a job with the Tennessee Valley Authority.

He graduated from Decatur High School with honors, then matriculated to the University of Alabama where he earned his undergraduate and law degrees. Brewer returned to Decatur to begin his law practice. Soon thereafter he was elected to the Alabama Legislature at the ripe old age of 25. He was elected without opposition three times and during his third term he became Speaker of the House. Brewer was the youngest Speaker in state history. In 1966, he beat two prominent state senators without a runoff to win the lieutenant governor's job, which was much more powerful than it is today.

During his tenure as Speaker and Lt. Governor, either George or Lurleen Wallace was Governor. Brewer was a Wallace ally. When Gov. Lurleen Wallace died

of cancer after only 16 months in office, Brewer ascended to the Governor's office. He quickly and decisively took the reins of state government and became immedi-

ately effective. His years in the legislature gave him a keen insight into the machinations of state government. He was very well liked among the legislators and senators he had worked with over the past 15 years and therefore was extremely successful with his legislative agenda. He became a working governor.

Although Brewer was governor for only 33 months, he accomplished more as governor than most of his successors over the past 30 years combined. Brewer brought a low key businesslike style to the governor's office, which was strikingly different than George Wallace's racist flamboyant rhetoric and cronyism.

In 1970, Brewer and George Wallace squared off in what is the most memorable classic and pivotal governor's race in Alabama political history. Brewer led Wallace by a slim margin in the first primary. However,

Wallace, with his political life on the line, played the race card overtly in the runoff and defeated Brewer by a narrow margin.

Most political observers believe that had Brewer won, Alabama would have joined other southern states like North Carolina and Florida who had elected progressive pro-business governors. Brewer is often referred to as Alabama's "New South" Governor.

He was a prince of a fellow and a good friend for over 50 years. I first met Governor Brewer when I was a young 13-year-old page in the State Legislature and he was Speaker of the House. My mentor was the State Representative from my home in Pike County. Mr. Gardner Bassett had been in the House for 24 years and was in his 70's. He was training me to take his House seat once I was old enough. Mr. Gardner adored and admired the young Speaker Albert Brewer. He got Brewer and I acquainted and we became friends. Brewer would let me sit next to him in the Speaker's box as he explained how he assigned bills to their proper committee. When Brewer became Lt. Governor in 1967, I was 15 and he made me head of the pages in the Senate. His daughters Becky and Allison served with me as Pages.

Gov. Brewer spent the last 30 years of his life teaching and mentoring law students at Samford University's Cumberland School of Law. He was a mentor to my daughter, Ginny, while she was in law school at Cumberland, and followed her legal career as if she was his own daughter. Last January, Ginny and I ran into Gov. Brewer at a Birmingham restaurant. He was aging but still had that keen smile and twinkle in his eye.

Gov. Brewer and I had remained good friends over the years and he is featured prominently in my book, *Of Goats and Governors: Six Decades of Colorful Political Stories*. Thus, it is appropriate that the last time I visited with him was at a book signing in Bessemer. We later had lunch together at the Bright Star. As I close this column I am looking at a photo of Gov. Brewer and me from that day that adorns the wall of my office, with his ever present smile.

Albert Brewer has a special place in Alabama political history and in the hearts of many.

Meme's Restaurant

THERE ARE A FEW PEOPLE AROUND who remember eating at the world famous seafood restaurant named Meme's at the end of Highway 49 right on the Bon Secour River. It is now a part of the folklore of Baldwin County. If you are in the Bon Secour area, chances are you will smell a pot of gumbo simmering (not boiling) on a stove somewhere. But are those smells from this day and time or from more than fifty years ago?

Amelia Swift was one of the 11 children raised in the historic Swift Coles Home in Bon Secour by Charles and Susan Swift who ran the Swift Lumber Company. Meme, as she was known, married Charles Wakeford and they built a reputation as the finest seafood cooks in the south. During World War II they lived in the original house and were said to have hosted many a seafood fest for the military personnel stationed at nearby Fort Morgan and Barin Field. This was their contribution to the war effort on the home front, giving the boys a taste of southern hospitality. The kitchen in the Big House was always full of laughter and there was always something cooking on that old wood stove.

After the war, they decided to move into one of the fishing cabins on the river and then they ran a post office from one room of their home. People often came in and asked where they could buy good oysters, so they opened a small oyster bar in 1953. Soon it grew into a full service seafood restaurant and little did they dream the heritage they would build there. At first, the restaurant was in a cement block building and later a River Room was built over the water. Boaters could dock right at the front door, and it was advertised accessible by "good" roads. Dirt roads and pot holes only added to the charm of the destination and many famous people made the trek to dine on the best gumbo ever made. It was at first made by a French Creole cook, but once when she was ill, Charley stepped in and used the recipe he had learned from Meme's mother who he called 'The Madam.' He used her spoon that was flat on the bottom due to years of stirring the rich gumbo, and the diners raved so much that recipe was used from that time on. Charley made it known that good gumbo must be cooked very, very slowly (never boiled) and stirred almost constantly.

The menu lists a deviled crab dinner for \$3.50 and a seafood platter cost a whopping \$4.00, with drinks and dessert included. One specialty was broiled oysters on toast and another was "Fish Baked in a Sack." The gumbo could be shipped frozen to almost anywhere.

Meme's became a hot spot for political gatherings and a few election campaigns

were kicked off there. The menu had a list of famous people who had graced her doors, including most of the governors of Alabama during her years of operation. Listed are guests from all fifty states and more than 53 foreign countries, including His Royal Highness The Prince of Durrani, Hes-

san. After Charley died, Meme continued to run the restaurant with the assistance of Rose Weeks, who stayed on as Meme's caretaker after the restaurant closed. It seems the restaurant never opened back up after the devastation of Hurricane Frederic in 1979.

There are now no remains of the restaurant on the grounds of the Bon Secour Fisheries (which now owns the private property) except maybe the concrete slab. The ruins of the house stood for years as a reminder of the horrible storm that changed all who were here then. But that is another story... In the meantime, take a whiff of that delicious gumbo simmering on the wood stove somewhere along the river – maybe it is from the Tin Top, which is building a legacy of its own.

Meme and Charley Wakeford wrote a book entitled, *Food, Fun, and Fable*, available at the Swift Coles Historic Home. There are recipes, historical anecdotes and stories included.

Special thanks to Judy Roberds and the other members of the Higbee family who saved a copy of a menu from Meme's. What a treasure! Harriet Outlaw is a local folklorist and storyteller, author of several publications.

We sincerely hope that you enjoy the food and hospitality of MEME'S and we are most happy to add your name to our growing list of friends who return again and again, bringing their friends along with them; and when you return, we hope you will bring along a friend.



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Beating those winter blues

1. When there is sunshine go drink it up! Open up curtains and blinds and let the sunshine in! Too, when there are warmer, sunshine days, go and take a walk in the bright sunshine! Sitting in the sunshine makes us feel more positive and energized! Caregivers be sure to take your elderly love ones outside in the sunshine whether they are on walkers or in wheelchairs.

Reading or having "Sit and Chats" with your Senior friends or family while enjoying the sunshine can boost energy and optimism! In Mobile and Baldwin County, we are blessed with beautiful weather even during the winter! Try to schedule a time during the day when you can enjoy the health benefits and emotional boosters of sunshine.

If you live in an area like my son does, with not much sunshine during the winter months, investing in artificial light like a sun lamp or light box can aid Seniors to experience healthy light during the winter.

The Low vision group, "The Eyes have It" at Westminster Village in Spanish Fort, Alabama share that lighting makes a huge difference in what they can see. This is a group that I help to facilitate and we discuss how different kinds of lighting can help with emotions. One important suggestion they make is to consciously turn on lights in your bedroom before you get up out of bed. Light helps a Senior adult to welcome a new day!

2. In talking to dieticians and nutritionists for the elderly about what is important in helping them to avoid the winter

blues, they stress that it is very important for the elderly to stay hydrated. Seniors need to drink plenty of water and fluids. Adding more fruits and vegetables to the diets of Seniors are "foods for good thoughts" to avoid winter depression. It is very important for Senior adults to get plenty of rest during the Winter months.

3. Be encouraged to be happy and optimistic! When I have Sit and Chats" with my Senior friends we talk about "POP" P-Stands for Positive, O-stands for Optimistic, P-stands for peacemaker. We come up with ways to stay happy during the winter months. One of those suggestions is to anticipate the coming of Spring! Too, bird watching as different birds fly up to winter bird feeders is a favorite past time. And too, accept the season of winter in what it brings to us. In our area we don't see a lot of snow or ice. In the 30 years I have lived in Baldwin County, I can remember just 3 times that I have seen snow or ice. But in our area we can experience colder temperatures in which we can enjoy cozy warm activities!

4. Increase your movement and exercise during the Winter months. Exercise helps to alleviate winter blues. Too, exercise helps our health, thinking skills, emotions, and increases a person's immunity to seasonal illnesses. Walking outside is good

but if the weather does not permit, walking inside a mall is good. Some malls have scheduled walking times. Too, many gyms have places for walking. Many seniors in facilities will exercise by walking up and down the halls.

Too, Seniors can walk up and down the halls within their own homes. For those Seniors who are disabled, they can engage in restorative exercises under the guidance of their doctors and therapist.

5. As a Senior it is so important for them to keep up their Social relationships. My own mother who lived to be 97 years old use to joke with we children by saying that being with other people was her life line. She attended all activities that she could. She would schedule her day where she could meet and greet people each and every day. Sometime with her age she did not feel well, but she would share with me that it made her feel better to be with other people. I love to hear the greater generation where I serve greet and share with each other over the coffee table during these winter months. Too, at many community centers Seniors can enjoy weekly games and activities. As caregivers of the elderly we can encourage them to connect in activities whether it be in a facility or in a community center. Being connected with others truly boost good health!

I hope these few simple tips will be gentle reminders of having winter happiness and not winter blues!

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

Local businessman Jin Pak passes away

Yun Kol "Jin" Pak chose Baldwin County in Alabama as his home when he immigrated to the United States from Korea in 1974. Together with his wife Michele Piastro, a Peace Corps volunteer, they raised a family and built a family business, Baldwin Optical & Hearing Aid Company. Michele recalls, "We had relatively little to live on other than hopes and their dreams of having a home, making a living and raising a family."

When they first arrived, Jin worked as a dishwasher at a Japanese restaurant in Pensacola. Michele was a waitress. They saved up about \$250 and opened Baldwin Optical in a corner of The Country Market — a Bon Secour convenience store serving local shrimpers and community members.

Within a year the business grew enough to allow them to

open a small shop in Foley, in an Alston Street office they rented from Arthur Holk. Because of their dedicated service to the community, the business grew and eventually they were able to build their own store on Laurel Street, across from the Foley Public Library, where it remains today.

Jin was known for his dedication to family and his business. His first employee, Cheryl Riebe Pilgrim, was hired when she graduated from Foley High School and has been a mainstay

at Baldwin Optical & Hearing Aid Company for nearly four decades.

In the 1990s, Jin expanded the business to provide hearing tests and hearing aids to customers. For the last 13 years, Stephen Michael has been Jin's right-hand man, gaining his license in audiology and assisting with dispensing both hearing aids and eye glasses.

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

‘Riverdale’ puts dark, modern twists on the Archie comics

It's not your parents' Archie ... nor Betty ... nor Veronica. Some of the comic-book world's most celebrated characters get a big, frequently dark transformation in a CW series named for their town: "Riverdale." Premiering Thursday, Jan. 26, the drama from prolific executive producer Greg Berlanti ("The Flash," "Arrow," "Blindspot") involves the mysterious death of popular student Jason Blossom in the quint-essentially all-American locale where musically inclined Archie Andrews (played by KJ Apa) is viewed romantically by both longtime friend Betty Cooper (Lili Reinhart) and sophisticated new arrival Veronica Lodge (Camila Mendes).

Other familiar figures featured in the program include Jughead Jones (Cole Sprouse, "The Suite Life of Zack and Cody"), Josie McCoy (Ashleigh Murray) — as in Josie and the Pussycats — and the late Jason's sister Cheryl (Madelaine Petsch).

Famously a former television teen himself, "Beverly Hills, 90210" alum Luke Perry

portrays Archie's blue-collar father, with Madchen Amick ("Twin Peaks") as Betty's newspaper-editor mother and Marisol Nichols ("24") as Veronica's mom. Robin Givens has a recurring role as Josie's mother and Riverdale's mayor, and Molly Ringwald will surface later in the series as the mom who deserted Archie and his dad.

able to create our versions of them, but it's been a very collaborative process between the actors and the writers and the producers. We've crafted these characters together, which is rare. And it's great."

Since "Riverdale" is cast largely with relative newcomers, Reinhart voices gratitude for the acting veterans surrounding them: "Luke (Perry) is like our fairy godfather in a way, always checking in with us and making sure we're OK. He's so wise, and he'll talk to us individually and share his insight and his experiences. He's incredibly helpful and very sweet. He was unfathomably huge when '90210' was on, so he shares with us ways to stay grounded, and it's good to have someone who's been through that. We see him as a real person, not an icon."

As the launch of "Riverdale" nears, Reinhart is wishing for acceptance of the line it walks between the nostalgically familiar and the very updated. She says, "We just hope that people know these aren't the stereotypical characters that they kind of were on the page. They are real."



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

The event takes place starting at 10am on the Fairhope Faulkner campus.

Along with the always-popular distribution of tree seedlings, the day will honor new "treasured tree" award recipients and recognize the 5th grade poster contest winners from Fairhope Elementary and J. Larry Newton.

"Also, we plan to raffle off a few fruit trees, and we expect to have commercial tree vendors there to answer the public's questions about trees," Fidler said, adding that the vendors provide drinks and snacks and often hold a giveaway.

Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department 2017 officers announced

For 2017, the same officers were re-elected to serve the Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department that have served for the past three years. Fire Chief Chris Ellis says this is the first time that's ever occurred in the department's 80-plus years. "As far as we can tell, we've never had the same people elected to serve for three years running. That's significant, and I guess it means that the members like the way things are going."

Along with Ellis, the elected officers are 1st Assistant Chief Daniel Moore, 2nd Assistant Chief Ed Hall, Secretary Ken Eslava, and Treasurer Mark Poillucci.

Currently, the FVFD has 55 volunteers, most board certified at the Firefighter 1 or 2 level, and many with additional certification. "Training remains a top priority for our department," Ellis said. "Firefighters attend a minimum of 72 hours of training a year, but most do much more than that. We have instruction here at our training center on Thompson Hall Road, and we offer our firefighters outside training at the Alabama State Fire College, the National Fire Academy in Maryland, and elsewhere."

In 2016, the FVFD responded to 921 calls for service, including structure fires, vehicle fires, grass and brush fires, medical calls, and other miscellaneous calls. The FVFD fleet includes five engines, two rescue units, a 100-foot aerial

ladder truck, a crash truck at the airport, four brush trucks, two service vehicles, and two boats. The department's four stations are located throughout Fairhope: Leo Keller Station No. 1, is on Ingleside Drive, behind the hospital; Roy

White Station No. 2 (also the site of the classroom and training facility) is on Thompson Hall Road; Les Bung Station No. 3 is at the H.L. "Sonny" Callahan Airport on Highway 32; and the newest station, Timothy M. Lennix Station No. 4, is on Parker

Road behind Publix.

Besides training, another priority of the FVFD is supporting young people through the FVFD Explorer Post, which is open to young men and women, ages 14-18. "The Explorers are a Learning for Life program, which

means the program is designed to give students an idea of what the fire service does," Ellis explained. "Explorers are trained to assist with non-dangerous tasks on fire scenes." Since its inception in 2009, more than 75 young adults have gone through the FVFD program, and of those, 24 went on to join the FVFD after turning 18.

2017 FVFD Firefighter of the Year

Jason Canarela has been selected the 2016 Firefighter of the Year for the Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department. Fire Chief Chris Ellis says the competition was tough this year. "The three fire chiefs select the winner based on a number of different factors, and we have many firefighters who do an excellent job, so it's always a difficult decision to select just one person to honor."

Canarela has been a member of the FVFD for eight years and is employed by Sunbelt Fire in Fairhope as a parts consultant.

Canarela has certification as Firefighter 1 and 2 and as a fire fighting instructor; he is also certified to handle hazardous materials and to drive

a firetruck. He says he joined the FVFD after talking with some older friends who had served. "I thought it sounded like something I would enjoy, and I do. I like helping strangers; I like knowing that when someone is in need, when they are having their worst day and need help, I can be that person. But really, I don't think I do anything different from what all the other members of the FVFD do. We're all trained to work together to help save lives and property. I'm just a typical firefighter."

Ellis notes that Canarela is always willing to help. "He's frequently available at the drop of a hat. If something needs to be done, he offers to do it. He also works as an advisor with the Explorers. Put it all together, and that's why we picked him."

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What are the Unborn

Last Sunday, churches all over the country (including mine) observed "Sanctity of Life Sunday," addressing the uncomfortable but unavoidably crucial issue of abortion. This issue evokes passionate and, too often, angry engagement from all sides because it touches nearly all of the fundamental issues of human existence from the widely political to the deeply private. Because so much is at stake, fruitful and meaningful discussions are, ironically, both much needed yet very difficult to come by. As someone who is convictionally pro-life, I still believe that engagement with those who disagree with me is of critical importance.

Perhaps a single, simple question can bring everyone to the table: What are the unborn? This is a critical moral question that must be answered whether you are pro-choice or pro-life. If pro-life advocates are right and the unborn are persons from the moment of conception, then abortion is quite literally the greatest and most horrific injustice in human history. If pro-choice advocates are right and the unborn are just tissue, then millions of women are being prevented from an important healthcare option that has the moral significance of a tooth extraction. There is no place of neutrality.

What are the unborn? This question pushes all other dynamics of the debate to the

periphery. Privacy, religious commitment, freedom, even the circumstances of the conception are all secondary to the question of the ontological status of the embryo. If it's a person, that's all that matters. If it's tissue, it does not matter at all.

What are the unborn? Finally, the implications of the answer to this question couldn't be more far-reaching. If the unborn are persons, then they deserve the same protection and care as all other persons. If the unborn are tissue that become persons at some later point, then the point of personhood must be determined and articulated with absolute certainty and an ironclad rationale, because, so far, when societies determine that some groups are only sort of human, the outcomes are always terrifying and always wrong. What are the unborn?



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


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
