Lebanon baseball ready to be back in action

The Lebanon High School baseball team had high expectations heading into last year before the season's cancellation occurred. The team was 15-9 in 2019 and hoping to build off success in 2020. Head coach Dustin Young said he thought the group handled it well and didn't complain at all.

"They were a phenomenal group who loved the game and being around each other," he stated. "We laid a lot of the groundwork leading up to the season and were ready to go, and before you know it, everything happens that everyone else went through as well. We heard the rumblings of what could happen, and it came to fruition.

"I feel like MSHSAA did a good job of waiting as long as possible, and we were

preparing to see what it would be like if the season could start back up, and the senior class never said a negative word. They were mature about it and understood the magnitude of the situation."

Young also gave credit to LHS activities director Will Christian for being generous enough to find time during the summer to let the team play a few games and have some closure to their respective careers.

"The summer program that we had was two-fold use," he mentioned. "We used it to develop what we had moving forward and to give our seniors a sense of closure. It wasn't the same as what a season would be, but we did have an opportunity to get them some games, recognition, and able to do some things that gave them a sense of normalcy."

Heading into this season, Young has

tried his best to get back reps that players lost from not getting a season in the spring.

"We have started from the fundamentals and worked up," he said. "We have gotten a lot of hacks in the cage and get them live looks when we are able to. I went into the year knowing we lost a whole year of reps, so we needed to start from the ground up.

"We also worked on the game within the game with different scenarios in practice. We will build upon this foundation and be ready to roll."

Returning this year will be Missouri State commit and No. 1 ranked junior in the state of Missouri, Zack Stewart. As a freshman, he hit .397 with three home runs and 24 RBIs to earn first-team All-Ozark Conference and All-District honors. According to Young, seniors John Greenwood and Drew McBride will also be relied upon for leadership this spring.


Greenwood had a 2-0 record to go along with an 0.57 ERA as a sophomore, while McBride earned all-conference and all-district honors as a sophomore.

Varsity newcomers include Isaac Ledbetter (OF, SR), Logan Wise (UTIL, SR), Hunter Honey (INF, SR), Drew Truelove (OF/P, JR), Ty O'Neil (P, JR), Brendan Black (P/CI, JR), Max Groce (OF/P, JR), Bennett Schnitzer (CI, JR), Collin Wilson (OF, JR), Andrew Dent (INF, JR), Ian Carr (UTIL, JR), Justin Dameron (UTIL, JR), Keaton Mizer (P, SO) and Evan Fohn (UTL, JR).

Hitting will be a strength for the 'Jackets, but pitching is something that is a big question mark entering the 2021 season. "We went into the season saying that

As far as injuries are concerned, the team will be relatively healthy heading into the spring beside a couple of players who will be out for the year with injuries that occurred in the fall.

To open the season, Lebanon supports a record of 4-3 with wins over Neosho (two times), Marshfield, and Glendale.

Track team hoping for a big season this spring

The Lebanon High School track and field team has been one of the more consistent programs throughout the past 5-10 years. This season, head coach Shane Rebmann hopes the group can post solid throws and times after a year off.

The 2020 group was slated to be one of the most solid groups under Rebmann, but he says the success they have found in the last year has made him proud.

"The seniors from last year were an amazing group," he mentioned. "Not just as athletes, but as people also. I've kept up with most of them in some way or another, and it's been great hearing from them about their struggles with all of this and the success they have found in the last year. I've seen them travel on hikes and float trips, start businesses, continue to train, move to the mountains, take online classes, and all of these amazing things over the last year.

"Our kids are very adaptable, and I'm more proud of them for that than anything they could have done on the track last year. It was poised to be a great year for us, and I think it was the best team we had ever had from top to bottom boys and girls. We had the opportunity to run on a brand new track thanks to our school district and community, we were scheduled to compete in Florida, and we had dropped from Class 5 to Class 4.

"It was going to be a great season, but once I got over the disappointment of the cancellation and began to see how the kids grieved and then just moved on, it was very inspiring."

Rebmann admitted it had been a challenge to get back into the groove of things after a year off but still has lots of faith in his leaders. "The group of seniors that we had last year were great leaders," he stated. "This year's seniors were sophomores during our last full season, so they are still growing into that leadership role. We have had to teach a lot of the basics this year. But again, kids are adaptable and much quicker learners than we give them credit for.

"There are some things that we are having to go slow with, but really the kids have been able to jump right in on our normal workouts, and so far, they are exceeding my expectations. I think a lot of that is just that they are all ready to do something. It's been a long year for some of those kids, so to be back out there is special."

Some strengths of the team will be similar places they always have been. Rebmann expects the throwers, jumpers, mid-distance, and distance crew to be held to high expectations this spring. He also complimented coaches Garret Wade, Josh Smith, Nathaniel Rogers, and Seth Shockley for developing a lot of the kids into the runners and throwers that they are.

Top returners on the girls' side include Julianne Lopez (1600/3200m), Skyla Sien (400/800/1600m), Myah Hough (400/800/1600), Rory Jenkins (pole vault), Kally Mack (discus), Taylor Beckley (shot), Mariah Mebruer (returning State Qualifier in high jump and 4x400), Destiny Zimdars (Shot/Disc), and Jocee Pettyjohn (returning State Qualifier in the 4x100 and 4x400 hurdles).

On the boys' side, top returners include Derek Tucker (returning State Medalist in Discus), Caleb York (400/800/1600), Cordell Zebel (returning State Qualifier in the 300m hurdles and 4x400 relay), Caleb Falzone (jumps, 400/800m), Kaane Cobleigh (100/200m), Dalton Wagner (school record in the javelin), Logan Ly-

barger (jumps, 100/200m), Ayden Carr (1600/3200), Tristan Wilson (shot put), and Cole Patten (pole vault).

Rebmann mentioned that, in a way, all of the team is pretty much newcomers this year.

"We really don't know a lot about our freshmen class this year, so it's difficult to speak about them at this point," he stated. "We know that it is a big group with a lot of potential, so we are very excited for the next couple of weeks to start collecting some real data on where they are early in the season. Our sophomores are kind of like "redshirt freshmen" this year, so we know a little more about them even if we haven't seen them in a meet since their 8th-grade year. It's going to be a great opportunity for a lot of young kids to step up this season into a varsity role."

Newcomers include Parker Anthony, Ella Johnson, Lexi Curl, Hannah Christian, Taylor Rodden, Jenna Rosen, Maddie John, Canayaha Overton, Ledasia Alley, Halea Bartel, Bailey Joiner, Mariah Brumley, Alissa Nunn, Trey Alley, Jamarr

Rogers, Jacoby Fultz, Jarret Sing, Caden Morris, Nathan Bartel, Kaleb Nail, Preston Ellingson, Davis Joiner, Jermiah Fincher, Dakota Windsor, and Paul Debose.

As far as expectations, Rebmann is hoping that this team works hard and gets the best experience possible.

"My expectations are the same as always," he said. "We are going to work hard at practice, give the kids the best experience possible and always represent our school and community with the pride that it deserves. Even though they are new, our kids have bought into the concept of getting better every day. We know that there will be some obstacles this season, but the kids are already overcoming those issues. Our job as coaches this year is to be teachers, encouragers, and motivators, now more so than any other year."

The team held their home track meet on March 26. The girls' team will go to an Invitational at Parkview High School on April 8, and the boys' will attend an Invitational at Parkview High School on April 9.

Conway baseball leaning on hitting in spring

In 2020, the Conway Bears had a solid group slated to return, but COVID-19 forced MSHSAA to cancel spring sports in Missouri.

"I thought we had a good group," head coach Clay Bilyeu said. "We had a real chance to compete and go a long way with them last year. That is a group that you had for four years and then all of a sudden stop, so it is always tough. They are a group that was big into baseball, and they didn't get to play, so you hated to see it."

Things will look different for the Bears' baseball team on the mound this spring, but the team will have plenty of experience returning to the plate to hold their own.

Names to watch for this spring are

Chase Caffey (two-time All-Summit Conference selection), Jake Vestal (three-year starter), Tanner Simpson (three-year starter), and Kason McBride (multiple-year starter). Other seniors expected to see time are Ryan Dame, Trey Earls, and Kory McBride.

"All seven of these guys have some sort of varsity experience since their sophomore years, plus we did get to play in the fall of 2019 and fall of 2020. They have been our biggest offensive producers the last couple of years.

"We will have doubles power throughout our lineup and several guys with speed who can steal a bag or take the extra base."

Caffey batted .414 with 24 hits, six doubles, 12 RBIs, and 15 steals in the 2020 fall season. He has committed to play at College of the Ozarks next year. Simpson hit .364 with 20 hits, seven need be. doubles, and 19 RBIs in the fall. Ka. McBride had a .318 average while Ko. McBride threw 18 innings in the fall and posted a 1.14 ERA and 28 strikeouts.

Conway's first-time contributors will include sophomore Troy Replogle, who will see time on the mound and in the infield. Freshman Cade Archer will see time in the infield, according to Bilyeu.

Kaleb Doing, Nate Rice, and Alton Mackey are also expected to compete for time.

"We will really lean on those guys outside of our seniors," Bilyeu mentioned. "There were stretches where Replogle was our best hitter, and the case could be made for the same on the mound. Archer is someone who takes great at-bats, can play multiple infield positions, and throw some innings if

"Rice and Mackey will see a lot of at-bats for us, too."

Heading into the season, Bilyeu mentioned over and over again how much depth this team has.

"We have a lot of depth this year," he stated. "I think we have some pitching depth. We might not have the top couple of arms we were going to have last year, but we have six guys who can step in there and compete and give us a chance."

After the opening jamboree at Lebanon, Bilyeu liked his team's effort but says there are still things that will improve as the year goes on.

"I thought we played well first and foremost," he mentioned. "We were solid defensively with just one error in eight innings. We saw many good things

from our pitchers, with them facing larger schools (Marshfield and Lebanon) and only giving up three runs to each group.

"We just need to limit our walks and free passes that we put on, and if we do that, we will be competitive this year. We only put up one run, and timing will come as the season goes on, but we are going to have to swing our bats better in order to compete."

During the fall, Conway went 8-10, but Bilyeu said there was a lot of experimenting going on and expected those results with the time off.

"I was trying to figure out the new group," he said. "I was figuring out what worked and what pitchers were going to work in certain options. I don't think our record speaks for how good we could be this spring, and I think we are better than that record indicates."

Conway won the Cabool Classic with a 3-0 record and defeated Hartville 4-3 in ten innings to kick off the spring. The Bears beat Cabool, Gainesville, and Norwood to capture the title as Ko. McBride had one hit allowed, and nine strikeouts in seven innings pitched.

"Stamper made the conversion from infield to the outfield this fall and has done a great job," said Nicholson. "Brad is a good base runner and solid at the plate. Charlie will see time in the outfield and be our No. 2 pitcher."

Sophomore Isaiah Brent is an outfielder with good speed and base running abilities. Wes Howe will be the DH and relied upon heavily in that spot.

"Wes is a machine at the plate for us," Nicholson said. Wes delivered some huge hits for us this fall and has a decent glove in the infield as well. This spring, Wes will also be part of our pitching staff. He has been working this spring as a pitcher and is looking promising to this point."

Also in the mix for playing time is Landon Dolan, Drew Rogers, Luke Leazott, and Michael Porter.

This spring, Nicholson has spent a lot of time on the fundamentals of hitting and pitching and is hoping for big things after winning five games during fall ball.


