Lebanon's boys baseball team is returning a large number of upperclassmen this spring.

Coach Alex Weathermon said the team has more than 10 seniors who

have been playing varsity baseball for the past three years.

Lebanon's track team has attracted a total of 150 athletes this spring as it prepares to compete, according to Coach Shane Rebmann.

The team is looking to build off of last year's conference championship on the girls side.

According to Rebmann, the team has "a lot of really good returners. We're still pretty young. We're coming off a conference championship last year with the girls' side and a lot of those girls are coming back. They're a deep group. They have good kids at almost every event."

On the boys side, Rebmann said the athletes are very young.

"I don't know that we've had a team this young in a long time. We have a lot of freshmen. Our junior class is really strong," he said.

The girls' side boasts two returning state qualifiers. Abigail Tague is a two-time returning state qualifier in the 800 meter run.

Addy Rebmann is a returning state qualifier as a high jumper.

"Those two really set the tone for our girls team," he said.

He said the boys team is led by a lot of younger athletes.

"On the boys side, it's about learning what we can do," he said. "We've got a lot of kids, but we've got to learn where they all fit and how we can spread that team out to score some points in the conference meet and district meet," he said.

He mentioned some of the athletes on the boys team.

"Rhett Rhoades is our jack of all trades," he said.

"Rhett is a really good hurdler, but he also runs anything from a 4 by 100 meter relay all the way up to the 4 by 400 meter relay," he said.

"Josiah Simmonds is a really good sprinter for us coming back. He had a great season last year," Rebmann said.

"We've got a lot of depth on the boys side as well. That junior class is really good and we have a few freshmen that are going to provide a spare for us for sure," he said.

He also mentioned

Liam Allen, a cross country runner.

"He is another great kid," Rebmann said. "All the kids I've named are outstanding students and good character kids. Liam is another one of those who runs our distance events. He's the leader of that group on the boys side for sure."

Rebmann said he is looking forward to seeing how this year's younger team performs.

"I'm excited to see what these guys can do," he said.



Stepping off of a strong 2024 season, the Lebanon boys tennis team is ready to make its mark in the Central Ozarks conference.

Coach Ron Crowell reported a good run in the 2024 season with 16-9 wins. The team lost its district championship match against Rockridge, who Crowell says has been one of the dominant Missouri programs. Despite Rockridge's history, he felt like Lebanon had had a real chance at victory.

"Most years, a lot of years, their number six player would absolutely destroy our number one player," Crowell said. "So that was really encouraging to see how far we'd come."

Despite the athletes being less familiar with Rockridge than Crowell, he found it exciting to be on Rockridge's level during the last season.

Crowell reported a good group of players this year, with five out of

ers returning. The top four returning players are seniors Ethan Fisher and Kasey Hicks, junior Conor McGruder, and sophomore Josh Rogers, though top spots are fluid depending on match performances.

Other returning players include sophomores Teigan Vance and Denver Woodruff, juniors Scout Bowles and Kurtis Frazier along with senior Josiah Ruble.

"I'm really excited about the future of Lebanon tennis right now," Crowell said. "It's in really good shape."

The early year weather hindered most of the team's attempts to work in off season practices. Earlier in the school year, the team has 20 days of limited practice time during the summer, which includes matches and a hosted tournament.

One characteristic of this year's team Crowell noted was its ability to represent LHS well with its sportsmanship. The school's tennis program aims to teach its athletes

how to win the right way. He highlighted the self-officiation athletes must conduct as well as the relationship they must maintain with their opponents.

The boys play their first game on March 25 against Willow Springs. The year's shortened season has a strong schedule, said Crowell, such as an

early April match against state title contender Joplin. Lebanon hosts a home tournament on April 10 and 11.

New this year for the 'Jackets is the Springfield Invitational Tournament held on April 16, where they will compete with teams that Crowell said typically produce state qualifiers. Another up-

coming tournament is the Waynesville Invitational, which helps prepare athletes for the Central Ozarks Conference Tournament.

In the team's first year in the new conference, Crowell said it was difficult to say whether the boys would head to state given a lack of information about their district. How-

ever, he was undeterred.

"I'll say this: I'm not afraid to play anybody this year," Crowell said. "That doesn't mean we'll win all of them, but I'm not afraid to play them. And I think we'll compete with everybody and hopefully compete well enough to maybe give ourselves a chance to win."



After a season of boys basketball, coach Joe Nicholson and the Stoutland Tigers are now preparing for spring baseball.

Being both the head boys basketball coach and baseball coach, Nicholson says the sports take two different kinds of ath-

Just because the Conway Bears come from a smaller school doesn't mean that they can't compete in their baseball conference, according to Coach Clay Bilyeu.

With a total of 20 ath-

letes out on the baseball field, the team still competes against larger schools like Waynesville and, in the past, Lebanon. While Bilyeu acknowledged that larger programs may have greater year-to-year depth, he said most years the Bears could hold their own

against their larger foes. "A lot of people probably, especially from bigger areas, don't necessarily think that when they think about small school baseball," he said.

Last spring, the Conway Bears ended their post season play in the semi-finals of the district tournament against the Forsythe Panthers. Going into this season, the team is down five seniors from

last year, including four starters and two All-Conference, All-District players.

Likely returning starters for this year include first baseman Mason Miller (2024 All-District honorable mention), pitcher and short-baseman Brixon Bilyeu (All-State as sophomore and junior, signed with College of the Ozarks), right fielder and likely closer Jackson Gunter, left fielder Evan Peters, Gentry Bilyeu,

With this being the eighteenth year as Conway's coach, Bilyeu noted that what was special about this year's team (beside his son Brixon being on it) was its good mix of athletes. With the pandemic hindering participation levels in sports when some of the current athletes first joined the program, those same athletes have consequently played at the varsity level since they were freshmen.
