

Get out and explore your surroundings


as Cruces is a growing city with a small-town feel. From Old Mesilla to Downtown and the nearby Mesquite Street Historic District, there are numerous areas to explore on foot. There are galleries and independent theatre, and peaks and mountains to fill your weekends with outdoor exploring. Grab some sunscreen and comfy shoes, and head out to see all Las Cruces offers.

FARMERS & CRAFTS MARKET OF LAS CRUCES

Food trucks with burritos or vegan pulled "pork" sandwiches gather on Main Street along with artisans offering beard creams and CBD salves, jewelry and art. This is the place to find locally sourced meat, a great cup of coffee, and a card featuring the Organ Mountains to send back home. Local farmers offer the freshest produce from tomatoes, pecans, honey, and greens, to fresh flowers to brighten your dorm room. The Farmers and Crafts Market of Las Cruces takes place near the Downtown Plaza every Wednesday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Info: fcmlc.org, 575-201-3853.

MESQUITE STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT

For a sense of the town's history without the touristy feel, take a walk through the Mesquite Street Historic District, a colorful neighborhood filled with character. Along these historic streets you'll stumble upon parks and shops, as well as restaurants and some of Las Cruces' oldest buildings. Beck's Coffee hosts live music on Mondays from 6-8 p.m.



WATCH THE DRAMA

If your schedule allows for a little drama in your life, Las Cruces is home to numerous theaters where you can test your audition skills or take in a show.

Las Cruces Community Theatre (311 N. Main St.) is located downtown, and offers a student discount on tickets. This year LCCT will present classics such as "Mary Poppins" and "The Crucible." **Black Box Theatre** (430 N. Main St.) gives a platform to overlooked and little-known works,



as well a space for local writers to develop their projects. There's a new company in town, and after bringing "Othello: The Remix," a hip hop adaption of Shakespeare's classic to Lavish Ultra Lounge (both a bar and occasional venue), Scaffolding Theatre Company's focus on both process and performance was evident in their production. Learn more and keep up with shows at www. scaffoldingtheatrecompany. com. The recently formed **Doña Ana Repertory Theater**



will begin performances in December, so follow them on Facebook for performance and audition announcements. There's also the **American Southwest Theatre Company**, which hosts productions at ASNMSU Center for Fine Arts,1000 E. University Ave.

FILM

The beautifully restored **Rio Grande Theatre** (211 N. Main St.) is located downtown and shows classic films as well as hosting national musicians and regional acts. Call 575-541-2290 or visit www. riograndetheatre.org for more information. Located at 2469 Calle De Guadalupe, in Mesilla, **The Fountain Theatre** has entertained residents of Mesilla since 1905. Visit this landmark, enjoy the best popcorn in town (short of the kettle corn at Farmers and Crafts Market) and take in an Oscar winner or foreign film. Visit www. mesillavalleyfilm.org for a list of current showings.

FIRST FRIDAY ART RAMBLE

On the first Friday of every month, Downtown Las Cruces hosts galleries, shops, businesses and restaurants that make Las Cruces unique. 5-7 p.m. Free to the public. Info: 575-525-1955.

ART OBSCURA

Part gallery, part gift shop, this quirky two-story building at 3206 Harrelson St. provides intriguing diversions and gift ideas. Featuring local artists and historic ephemera and oddities, this is a place to get lost in for a little while. Open 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 11 a.m.- 4 p.m. on Sundays, Art Obscura often hosts musicians as well as food trucks. Learn more at artobscuragallery.com

TAKE A HIKE

Las Cruces is near several hiking trails and mountains. Try the simple hike of Tortugas (or "A") Mountain near University Avenue or work your way up to Dripping Springs Natural Area or Soledad Canyon. Hike Baylor Pass and end up at Aguirre Spring Campground. For a day trip, cruise south to the beautiful Franklin Mountains of nearby El Paso.

QUALIFICATIONS

You must be a resident to register to vote in New Mexico. If you're not, check your state of residency for guidelines on how to cast an absentee ballot.

REGISTRATION

You must be registered in order to vote. This can be done at **RegisterToVote. org**. Or find various registration stations throughout Doña Ana County at **donaanacounty.**

WHERE TO VOTE

Once you're registered, you can vote at any voting convenience

center (VCC) throughout the county, regardless of district. The VCCs closest to New

WHAT TO BRING

In Las Cruces, a physical form of identification is required only for first-time New Mexico voters who registered by mail and did not include identification with the registration form. Otherwise, you will be asked to provide a **verbal** or written statement of



dventure is a short drive away when you live in Las Cruces. Grab some water and hit the road for a day in caverns, hot springs, or gypsum sands. Check out the Outdoor Center in the Activity Center on campus to rent any camping equipment you might need!

CARLSBAD CAVERNS, NEW MEXICO

Located in the Chihuahuan Desert, Carlsbad Caverns National Park is only a three-hour drive from Las Cruces if you take U.S. 180. Hike in the underground caves by day and watch the flight of bats at night. The \$10 cavern entrance fee is good for three days. **www.nps. gov/cave/index.htm**



EL PASO, TEXAS

Less than an hour drive away, take a day to visit the El Paso Zoo or the impressive (and free) El Paso Museum of Art. Stop by the family-friendly Rubiks Arcade Bar for walls of classic and new games, or head to the Wyler Aerial Tramway for an incredible view. El Paso provides hundreds of culinary experiences from local landmarks like L&J Café or the cash-only Chicos Tacos. It isn't too hard to find something for everyone, with even Toro Burger offering a tasty vegetarian option.

MEOW WOLF

An art installation that is part gallery, party jungle gym, and several parts fantasy, Meow Wolf's House of Eternal Return, 1352 Rufina Circle in Santa Fe is an immersive experience you don't want to miss. Tickets are \$22-\$25. 10 a.m.- 8 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday, and 10 a.m.- 10 p.m. Friday-Saturday, www.meowwolf.com, 505-395-6369.

If the four-hour drive is too much for one day, consider staying in Albuquerque where hotels are affordable, and life is louder with markets and unique shopping by day and numerous show and club options by night.



VALLEY OF FIRES (CARRIZOZO)

Along part of the Tularosa Valley runs the Valley of Fire, several square miles of basalt lava originating from the nearby vent known as Little Black Peak. The lava fields are reachable by driving 4 miles northwest along US 380 from the US 54 junction at Carrizozo. After a two-hour drive, take a break at the provided campsites complete with tables and grills. There's a ³/₄-mile nature loop trail, and off-trail hiking is possible, but take care. The mountain village of Ruidoso is 36 miles away. and the southern edge of the black lava formations is only 14 miles from the dazzling White Sands National Monument.

WHITE SANDS NATIONAL MONUMENT

Situated 40 minutes east of Las Cruces, 10 acres of



Tours are available November through April, and the monument regularly has concerts, fullmoon hikes, sunset hikes and educational programming. The entry fee is \$5 per person, which varies for special events, and annual passes are available, www. nps.gov/whsa/index.htm

AGGIE TRANSIT

Provides a free shuttle service to students with a valid Pete's Pass. This free bus service runs from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday during the school year. With routes reaching the far ends of campus and plenty of stops along the way, the Aggie Transit offers easy transportation from any of the free parking lots. PARKING ON CAMPUS

Students can buy parking passes or pay parking citations online (you'll need your student ID number) at the Parking Office website, **park.nmsu. edu**, or at the Parking Office next to Barnes & Noble, 1400 E. University Ave., from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Your parking pass has a color indicating which parking lots you can use. The lots will have signs with corresponding colors. If you park in a parking lot which is a different color from that of your pass, you may be cited. Citations start at \$35. If you do not pay and get another citation, you may get a boot on your car.

Parking rules are in effect between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Outside of these times, you are free to park anywhere on campus.

2018/19 Meal Plans

Firstyear students are required to purchase a meal plan and are limited to Aggie Unlimited or the Aggie Choice 230. If you haven't chosen one by the first day of classes, you will be assigned Aggie Choice 230.

• Aggie Unlimited: \$1,951 per semester buys unlimited entrances to Taos Restaurant and \$100 in Aggie Dining Dollars, which can be used at other dining locations on campus.







Advisors help you stay on track

ourse catalogs and managing a schedule can be overwhelming. An academic advisor can help you make educated decisions regarding your academic schedule and class choices as well as your long-term career goals.

The most important aspect of advising is making sure the classes you take fulfill your degree and/or the university's requirements. By the time you graduate, you'll have mastered the Star Audit system, accessible via your MyNMSU account, but the audit might initially be difficult for a student to interpret. Your adviser should be well-versed in doing so, and they will be able to help you balance required classes as well as

WHO NEEDS ADVISING?

All students are encouraged to receive advising at least once a semester. New and second semester freshmen and transfer students, undecided or exploratory students, student athletes, "pre" majors (e.g. pre-nursing, pre-social work), students with less than a 2.5, and students whose GPA is less than required for their designated major requirements will have academic advising holds. Advising holds are put in place to ensure that you have an opportunity to meet with an advisor. To avoid an advising hold, meet with your advisor or department. If you aren't sure if you have an advising hold, you can find out through your my.nmsu.edu account. Click "Student Records," and then "View Holds." From there you can find out if and why your account is on hold.

HOW TO MAKE AN APPOINTMENT WITH YOUR ADVISOR

To set up an appointment with your academic advisor, visit Garcia Center room 129 between 8 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, or call 575-646-2941.

GET LEGAL ADVICE ON CAMPUS

If you find yourself in need of legal advice, the Associated Students of New Mexico State University (ASNMSU) has a licensed lawyer on staff with whom you can discuss any legal problems.

Karl Rysted is licensed in Oklahoma and New Mexico, and can render legal advice and, in rare instances, court representation for students. You have already paid for his services through student fees, so Rysted will meet with you for an hour free of charge. If after the consultation you think you need further legal representation, Rysted can provide private attorney referrals.

Employed by ASNM-SU, licensed attorney Karl Rysted cannot advise you on issues dealing with ASNMSU or NMSU since it would be a conflict of interest, but he can help you with numerous other legal concerns, such as landlord/tenant issues and constitutional law.

Student Legal Aid will need to know the reason for your visit before you go in, so download their intake sheet at studentlegalaid.nmsu.edu. Everything you say is confidential. The student legal aid office is located on the second floor of Corbett Center, room 205. For information, call 575-646-4419. DEEP ROOTS

- Select "Web Drop/Delete"

- Submit changes

- Go to your college dean's office
- Ask for a withdraw slip and fill it out accordingly
 Get a signature of the course's professor
 Return it to the dean's office to get the class dropped

Get help from on-campus counseling

ou should never feel alone, but the transition to college life where you are suddenly balancing classes, new friends, family and sometimes work might leave a student feeling isolated and overwhelmed.

Be in the know about sexual assault

Campus sexual assault is an uncomfortable topic, but one that must be talked about. Did vou know that one in six women have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in her lifetime and 3 percent of men have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in their lifetime? While in college, a young woman's risk increases to one in four chance of being sexually assaulted. This means that someone you may already know or someone you may meet has been a victim of sexual assault.

So what exactly qualifies as sexual assault? Sexual assault may consist of sexual harassment, stalking, sexual coercion, sexual contact (unwanted fondling/groping, attempted rape, and rape). Often, the victim of sexual assault or rape faces blame and shaming.

It is never the victim's fault. Ever. Rape and sexual assault are not crimes of passion and love. Rape and sexual assault is about power and control.

So what can you, as men and women of this campus, do to help prevent sexual assault?

• When you go out be safe and stay together. Large parties can be fun, but they can also be dangerous. Make sure to keep track of your drink. Don't leave it unattended and don't accept a drink that has already been opened for you. You can't be positive of what's in the drink.

• Watch other people's drinks. If you notice someone has put something in someone's drink, do something about it. Stop the person from doing it and stop the person from drinking it. Or if it's more comfortable for you, tell someone else and they can step in.

• Be careful while drinking, in general. Alcohol is the number one drug used to initiate sexual assault. It is important to know that consent cannot be given when a person is intoxicated. Consent is a sober, verbal, and continuous yes.

• Don't be a bystander. If

you see someone getting sexually assaulted, help them.

If someone comes to you claiming to be victim, believe them and help them. Contact the police or reach out to area resources such as La Piñon Sexual Assault Recovery Service at 575-526-3437, the WAVE office at 575-646-2813, the Counseling Center at 575-646-2731 and the Office of Institutional Equity at 575-646-3635.

If you ever find yourself in a situation with your partner where things are starting to go to the next level and you feel uncomfortable, don't be afraid to say "no." Or if your partner says "no" or that they're uncomfortable, stop and don't get upset. Listen to them and respect their wishes.

Dangers of alcohol Learn how to keep yourself safe

s a freshman in college you may be excited for the school year to begin and yet also feel apprehension about what to expect. There will be many new experiences in your future. With a new sense of independence can come

some difficult choices.

One of the many things you will encounter is alcohol. There will be many opportunities for you to drink, and there is a common misperception that for you to have the college "experience" and "fit in" you should drink, despite being underage. Should you decide to drink, there are ways to reduce your risk of potentially serious consequences.

• Always use a designated driver. NMSU has several options for free rides, including Crimson Cab, Crimson Coach and Pete's Pick Up.

• Set a drinking limit and don't play drinking games. Avoid binge drinking (five drinks for men and four drinks for women in a period of two hours or less). Binge drinking can

lead to blacking out, passing out and alcohol poisoning. To make sure this doesn't happen to you, you can alternate drinks with non-alcoholic drinks to slow down the process of intoxication. Keep track of the number of drinks you have as the night goes on.

• **Utilize the buddy system.** Sexual assault is an issue that affects both men and women, and the buddy system can help you safeguard each other. Never leave

your buddy somewhere if you feel it is unsafe. Be accountable for each other! Never leave with a person you just met; exchange numbers and meet up while you both are sober.

• **Keep an eye on your drink**. Never leave your drink unattended to protect yourself from date rape drugs. Avoid drinking from punch bowls or pitchers, since they are easy to drug and it is difficult to tell how much alcohol it contains.

• **Eat before and/or during partying.** This will help your body soak up excess alcohol, and will help prevent you from drinking too much, too fast.

• Never hesitate to call for help. If someone is showing signs of alcohol poisoning (shallow breathing, clammy skin, vomiting, blacking out and/or passing out), call 911 immediately. Never try to give the person a cold shower, coffee, or allow them to sleep it off.

Alcohol may be legal (at least for those who are 21) and it comes in many different flavors, with lots of colors and pretty bottles, but it is still a dangerous drug that you can overdose on, or become addicted to over time.

ON-CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS

• Use high-quality "U" locks on all bicycles, locking both the frame and front tire to the rack.

• Roll up windows and lock doors on vehicles and campus residences. Do not leave property in plain sight from windows, or anywhere on campus unattended.

• Be aware of potential scams via phone calls or email. Don't give out



personal information over the phone unless you are sure of the source of the request.

• When in an interpersonal relationship, remember that "no" means exactly that. If the other person is asleep, intoxicated or drugged, they are incapable of giving consent. Any sexual contact at that point is a crime — no matter what they may have said or done earlier. If you are someone you know is the victim of sexual assault, you can call 1-800-656-4673 to be walked through the process for seeking help.

• If you see someone else in danger, say something, do something and/or call for help. If you see an unsafe condition like a fallen tree limb or power line, flooded streets or other hazards, report it promptly.

WAYS TO PREVENT SUICIDE

Get the Facts.

It is not necessary to wait until thoughts of suicide arise to prevent suicide. There are protective factors, which serve as a shield from suicidal thoughts and acts. Protective factors include the following:

· Effective clinical care for mental. physical, and substance abuse disorders

- · Easy access to a variety of clinical interventions and support for help seeking
- · Family and community support (connectedness)
- Support from ongoing medical and mental healthcare relationships
- Skills in problem solving, conflict resolution, and nonviolent ways of handling disputes
- · Cultural and religious beliefs that discourage suicide and support instincts for self-preservation


Use Aggie Career Manager to help you find one


