


There is no doubt Las Cruces, New Mexico, is in the desert – the Chihuahuan Desert to be specific – where there is no shortage of mountains, rocky ridges, cactus, yucca, roadrunners and coyotes. However, a valley of green interrupts the brown, fed by the Rio Grande.

In fact, it makes for a perfect New Mexico road trip. New Mexico True, if you will. From Las Cruces, take Interstate 25 north to Hatch, the world's green chile capital. Then drive back – but on the scenic route. Take NM Hwy 185 then meander south, roughly shadowing the Rio Grande.

When you hit Las Cruces, you'll be on Valley Drive, which eventually intersects with Avenida de Mesilla, NM Hwy 28. Follow that all the way to the Texas border.

Along the corridor, you'll find chile vendors, historical markers, green fields, breathtaking mountainscapes, great restaurants, the magic of Old Mesilla, wineries, churches and routinely spectacular sunsets.

You'll experience the flavors and personalities of the Land of Enchantment, and you'll be convinced that, yes, Life is Good in Las Cruces.



New Mexico "chile" has had a large impact on New Mexico's cultural heritage, so large in fact, that it was entered into the congressional record as being spelled "chile," and not "chili."

Driving Ground Town

If you are new to New Mexico, you are required to surrender your license from any other state and obtain a New Mexico driver's license once residency is established. Those applying for a first-time driver's license (now known as a REAL ID and compliant with federal regulations), a license renewal or a license replacement are issued a temporary license while their regular license is being processed and mailed.

REAL ID Driver's license

Documents needed to obtain a New Mexico driver's license:

- Proof of identification number (e.g.: Social Security card)
- Proof of identification (e.g.: state-issued ID, birth certificate, passport)
- Two proofs of residency (e.g.: one utility bill and one bank statement)

Driving authorization card

Documents needed for a driving authorization card, for those who cannot

provide proof of lawful residency status:

- Two proofs of identity and identity number
- Two proofs of New Mexico residency
- If you don't qualify for a REAL ID, you must provide fingerprints

Note: Documents not in English must be submitted with written translations of those documents in English. The translation must be certified by the translator as a full and complete translation of the document.

Fees:

- \$18, four-year license
- \$34, eight-year license
- \$15, DWI records check on all drivers moving from another state.
- Drivers age 79 years and older must renew their licenses yearly, but are not charged renewal fees.
- For out-of-state drivers, New Mexico requires a DWI records check for a one-time \$15 fee, increasing the total to \$33 for a four-year license or \$49 for an eight-year license.

Registering your vehicle

To obtain a New Mexico vehicle title, registration and license plate, the following is required:

- Current title or ownership documents
- Current odometer reading
- Proof of identity and two proofs of New Mexico residency
- Proof of insurance, including an insurance card, copy of the policy and a letter from the company verifying coverage
- For out-of-state vehicles, a VIN inspection is required

Fees:

- \$27 to \$62, one-year registration
- \$54 to \$124, two-year registration
- For trucks, registration will range from \$38-\$207 for one year and \$76-\$414 for two years, depending on weight and model year of the vehicle

If you are driving and talking on your cell phone, you risk getting a traffic ticket, unless you use a hands-free method or device. Texting while driving is also prohibited.



BE WATER WISE IN LAS CRUCES

As drought concerns throughout the Southwest become a part of everyday reality, it is important to remember that individual decisions can make an impact on future livability for desert communities such as Las Cruces.

One way to be water conscious is by installing water-conserving fixtures and appliances, such as low-flow toilets and showerheads. Another method is to learn to cultivate water-conserving habits, such as taking shorter showers or only running full loads in the dishwasher and washing machine. Both approaches are important together to preserve communities growing in arid climes.

However, being water conscious does not mean you must have a barren yard. Choose native or drought-tolerant plants to conserve water. If you have a lawn, deep, infrequent watering will promote


deep root growth. Installing a dripwater system will supply water at the roots, and watering your plants early in the morning or in the evening will help limit the water lost to evaporation. Taking extra steps, such as installing a rainwater or gray water-harvesting system, will have a positive impact on both the environment and your water bill.

Lush and Lean Workshops are free workshops conducted by the Water Conservation Program of the City of Las Cruces. The annual spring workshop series educates about attendees water-wise irrigation, landscaping, gardening and more.



NEW MEXICO MOTORCOACH REGULATIONS

New Mexico does not require that motor coach and commercial bus operators display New Mexico plates when entering the state on a chartered trip. For information on certain fuel and prorated agreements now in force between New Mexico and other states, operators should check with the Motor Transportation Division of the state in which their vehicles are domiciled. For information on requirements for liability statements and ICC regulations. contact the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission, Transportation Division, P.O. Box 1269, Santa Fe, NM 87504-1269; 505-827-4519. For information on motor carrier safety regulations, highway and fuel taxes or permits, contact the New Mexico Motor Transportation Division, P.O. Box 1028, Santa Fe, NM 87504; 505-827-0321.

NUISANCE

Weeds, trash, tall grass and junk are considered nuisances and must be removed from private or public property. Weeds and tall grass should be pulled or cut down to ground level. The trimmings must be removed or bagged for the grappler to pick up.

SIGNS

Signs - including those for yard sales or missing animals - must be placed on private property, with the property owner's permission. Signs aren't permitted in or on road medians, shoulders, sidewalks or other city rightsof-way. They also can't be posted on light poles, stop signs or other public property.

WATERING

Effective vear-round:

- No watering on Mondays
- · Even numbered addresses water on

Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays

- Odd numbered addresses water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays Summer rules effective April 1-Sept. 30
- No watering between 10 a.m. and 6

NOISE

It is unlawful for any person to make, continue or cause to be made any loud or unusual noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of others.

Recycling & Solid Waste Services

Recycling

Curbside recycling for all recyclables except glass is provided as part of residential services throughout Las Cruces. A recycling bin will be delivered with a trash container and picked up every other week by Friedman Recycling. Items in the blue bin should not be bagged.

The city accepts glass for recycling at its two recycling drop-off locations: South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA), 2865 W. Amador Ave., and Sonoma Ranch landfill, 555 Sonoma Ranch Blvd. The glass is ground up into different textures of cullet, which is free for use in yards and decorative projects. The textures range from fine sand to pebble-sized. The courser cullet is popular for landscaping, while the finer grounds can be used in potting soils. For a full list of what can and can't be recycled, call 575-323-5086 or visit www.friedmanrecycling.com.

Solid waste pick-up

Containers must be rolled to a flat surface in the street, against the curb, not on the sidewalk. Handles and wheels must face away from the street. All trash in the brown bin must be bagged or tied without overfilling the bin. The lids must be closed so trash doesn't fly away. All bins should be at the street by 6 a.m. and removed by 7 p.m. Containers should be at least 5 feet away from other objects, including

other trash or recycling bins. Trash pick-up occurs once a week per residence; the day of week depends on residence location.

Grappler service

Items are picked up once a month on the same day as your trash service. To find your grappler pick-up day visit www.las-cruces. org/departments/utilities/solid-waste/grappler-schedule. All items for the grappler must be placed out by the curbside the night

before or by 6 a.m. and should be 5 feet away from any obstruction such as trash container, fence, wall, mail box, vehicles, and away from overhead wires. Yard waste, to be picked up by the grappler, must be bagged in clear plastic bags. It will then be turned into mulch, rather than go to the landfill.





Licensing

An owner of a dog or cat older than three months within the city must obtain a dog or cat license issued by the city or its agent within 30 days of acquiring ownership of the pet, proof that a licensed veterinarian has properly vaccinated the dog or cat against rabies and an implanted working identification microchip is provided.

Rabies shots and control

Any dog, cat, domestic ferret or other animal older than three months for which there is a state-approved rabies vaccine must have the vaccination as issued by the state Department of Health. Every animal bite must be reported to the New Mexico Department of Health office within 24 hours of when it happened.

Permitted pets

Pets that are permitted include:

- Up to seven licensed pets per home.
- Up to six chickens and/or ducks with a permit. Roosters and drakes, however, are not permitted within city limits.
- Feral cat colonies with permit.
- · Any amphibians, reptiles, caged birds, aquarium fish, caged rodents or caged ferrets maintained within the

confines of a dwelling unit, except as prohibited/restricted by federal or state law regarding those species listed as threatened, endangered or as prohibited/restricted by the city codes enforcement department.

Restraining animals

All animals must be kept on the owner's property. If an animal is restrained on the premises of its owner, the tether must be no shorter than 12 feet. Tethers may only be used as a temporary means of restraint. Dogs may not be tethered to a stationary object for more than two hours in any 12-hour period or more than four hours in any 12-hour period to a running line, pulley or trolley system. While on the street or in public, the animal must be kept on a leash of suitable length so as to enable the handler to maintain control of the animal under the specific circumstances.

Waste pick up

Every owner of a dog or cat should be aware that animal defecation is prohibited on property other than that of the owner. Owners of animals are responsible for immediately cleaning up after their animals.



Nuisance

An owner can't allow an animal to persistently or continuously bark, howl or make noise for more than 10 minutes. However, reasonable barking and noise common under normal circumstances isn't considered a disturbance of the peace.





AREA MILITARY INSTALLATIONS INTEGRAL TO MESILLA VALLEY

New Mexico is unique in many ways, but one thing that sets it apart from its neighbors is the distinctive relationship that its citizens have with area military bases.

Southern New Mexico's economy owes much to the military and the facilities working together to keep the country safe. White Sands Missile Range and Holloman Air Force Base occupy a substantial amount of land between Las Cruces and Socorro. Fort Bliss, based in Texas, includes range space in New Mexico.

The ups and downs of each of these installations have a direct economic impact on the surrounding communities. Likewise, the support and involvement of the communities that host these installations has a significant impact on their ability to carry out their respective missions.

Brig. Gen. Eric L. Sanchez took the helm as commander at White Sands Missile Range on Aug. 25, 2016. He said he has never seen the kind of community support as southern New Mexico provides the range.







AGRICULTURE ROOTS GO DEEP IN DOÑA ANA COUNTY

New Mexico's residents are resilient, and nowhere is it seen more clearly than in the agriculture of the state. Drought has long affected Doña Ana County, but farmers are diversifying, using technology, finding highervalue crops to offset water losses, and creating a wider outreach in the sale of produce.

The county is identified as the oldest commercial wine-growing region in the United States, with grapes being brought in by Spanish colonists and monks as early as 1580.

Doña Ana also ranks in the top four counties in the nation in chile acreage, and the top county in pecan acreage, at 28,729 acres, coming in third in the nation for total pecan acreage of a state.

SPACEPORT AMERICA: AN INVITATION TO SPACE

Spaceport America, the first purpose-built commercial spaceport, is located 45 miles north of Las Cruces and 20 miles southeast of Truth or Consequences. Situated on 18,000 acres, with a concrete runway more than two miles long, it can accommodate both vertical and horizontal launch aerospace vehicles.

Spaceport America's strategic advantage over other potential spaceports includes access to 6,000 square miles of restricted airspace, with which it works in collaboration with the Army's White Sands Missile Range to have access. Other location benefits include 340-plus days of sunshine, launches start at an elevation of 4,600 feet about sea level, there is no damage to equipment from salt air corrosion and there is a low population density in the area.

Generating excitement for the next generations about space exploration, is Spaceport CEO Dan Hicks' goal, he said.

The spaceport reaches out to the 6th graders in the Doña Ana and Sierra county school systems. The Spaceport Authority's Dr. Bill Guttman works with the youth, taking projects to the schools and inviting students to experience science.

In June 2017, Spaceport America hosted the Spaceport America Cup, a college student competition sponsored by the Experimental Sounding Rocket Association which brings participants from more than 70 universities around the world to experience New Mexico and the spaceport.

Hicks said the importance of what Spaceport America brings is not only as an economic engine but job creation potential. The facility has already generated more than 50 jobs here in the state.

"As engineers and mathematicians are leaving New Mexico colleges, we want them," he said. "Other trades are also needed. We need a technician workforce too."


The vision going forward is to draw more of the 40 existing companies working toward space transport, and to attract the additional 25-30 space operations companies, Hicks said. Those could include companies focusing on commercial exploration of resources or mining debris in space.

"We are going to be fully self-funded by 2019," Hicks said. "It's going to be a team sport going forward. The question is how do we work with everybody to make the most out of the national treasure that is Spaceport America?"

In addition to the Spaceport America Cup event, the spaceport hosts several other events yearly offering opportunities for the public to be involved, including the Spaceport America Relay Race and a drone summit.

The second Annual Drone Summit comes to Spaceport America in September 2017. Visitors will enjoy three days full of racing, workshops, demonstrations and more.







Enjoy the sights of Main Street Downtown

Las Cruces' Main Street characterized by its eclectic mix of unique specialty shops, art galleries, theaters and other cultural venues. The nationally recognized Main Street Community is home to the Las Cruces Museum of Art, Branigan Cultural Center, Rio Grande Theatre and Museum of Nature & Science, as well as popular events that include the annual SalsaFest!, monthly arts ramble and twice-weekly Farmers & Crafts Market of Las Cruces. The new Plaza de Las Cruces, complete with a lighted stage and a splash pad, enhances the experience of events Downtown.

The farmers market features a colorful array of unique local artisan wares and myriad fresh produce, as well as food trucks, live entertainment and dog and cat adoptions from the local animal shelter. From May through October, the farmers market is also held once a month in the evening hours.

Dovetailing with the completion of Plaza de Las Cruces in 2016, two Downtown projects are in the works. At the corner of Main Street and Amador Avenue, longtime restaurant and billiard hall, My Brother's Place, was razed to make room for the Amador Redevelopment Project as part of downtown revitalization efforts. When completed, it will be the new home of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, as well as space for restaurants, retail space and a live event venue. Church and Water streets, that create a loop around Downtown Main Street, will soon be converted to two-way streets to aid traffic in and out of the downtown area.

It is the only operating two-story adobe theater in the country and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Theatre is owned by the City of Las Cruces and managed and operated by Visit Las Cruces.

The theater features a wide selection of entertainment from local, regional and national recording artists and performing arts, as well as a classic film series, a Saturday children's matinee program and live music every Thursday night. The theater now serves concessions and refreshments including snacks, soft drinks, beer, wine and spirits.

LAS CRUCES EDUCATION GIVES STUDENTS AN EDGE

Las Cruces, the second largest city in the state, offers a wide variety of educational opportunities, from K-12 at public, private and charter schools to technical schools and graduate programs. Families with young children are sure to find public or private schools whose educational pathways mesh with their children's personal interests as well as their philosophy on instruction.

Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) is the second largest district in New Mexico, as well as the region's third-largest employer. Academically, the district offers myriad programs that support the different learning styles and needs of its students. One such program is JUMP (Joint Ungraded Multiage Primary), for K-2 students at risk for not performing well. The students remain with the same teacher for up to three years.

LCPS also offers 25 days of additional instruction for children in kindergarten through third grade in the K-3 Plus program. During the summer months, more than 2,200 students in 18 schools are eligible for 25 days of extra instruction to improve literacy and math skills.

At the middle-school level, children can apply to attend one of several magnet programs, which focus on multi-media, science, engineering, visual arts and music technology.

For high school students, Arrowhead Park Early College High School and Arrowhead Park Medical Academy offer multiple dual-credit courses at Doña Ana Community College and New Mexico State University (NMSU), with programs that offer pathways in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), health occupations and entrepreneurship. By the time students graduate high school, they will have earmed an industry certification or associate's degree.

NMSU, a land-grant institution founded in 1888 and home to the new Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine, along with DACC, Vista College and technical schools, round out the region's offerings that prepare students for the rapidly-changing professional and technical workplace both in the Southwest and points beyond.

NMSU BEGINS HERITAGE FARM DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

A groundbreaking ceremony for the Heritage Farm Interpretive Trail was held in May 2017, which included a tour of the seed house lobby and displayed renderings of the project.

The trail is part of New Mexico State University's larger plan for the Heritage Farm development west of the campus, off College Avenue, southwest of the Las Cruces Convention Center and just west of East Union Avenue.

Heritage Farm will showcase NMSU's agricultural roots and help advance current research. It aims to support private and public economic initiatives and to create a park-like gateway to campus. Students from area schools will have the opportunity to take field trips to the Heritage Farm to learn about agriculture and New Mexico crops.

"We have released 50 varieties of chile at New Mexico State University over time," NMSU Chancellor Garrey Carruthers said at a May 2017 groundbreaking ceremony. "All of this research, we want to demonstrate here. People are going to come to the convention center, they are going to stay at this hotel over here, they are going to have some time on their hands. We


want them to walk over here and look at the variety of research (NMSU has) done."

The project will demonstrate various irrigation systems and work with local schools to bring students in for field trips, he

"Agriculture is still a mainstay in New Mexico," Carruthers said. "The value of agriculture production right now is 3.4 billion dollars. There are 80 agritourism businesses in New Mexico. This will be an agritourism business. "

In addition to an interpretive trail walk, Heritage Farm plans include a university hotel, a winery, a brewery, agricultural fields, exhibit gardens and an adaptive reuse of the seed barn one of the oldest buildings on campus - into the Chile Pepper Institute.

The trail will eventually consist of plants along the nearby acequia, or irrigation ditch, as well as crops grown at NMSU and native plants used for erosion control. Irrigation methods - from drip systems to flood irrigation - will also be on display.

Doña Ana Community College (DACC) was established in 1973 at the request of the Gadsden, Hatch, and Las Cruces school boards to provide vocational and technical education opportunities to the citizens of Doña Ana County. Today, it offers 39 degree programs and 14 certificate programs. Businesses are also assisted through the Customized Training Program and the Small Business Development Center. DACC is independently accredited by the Higher Learning Commission. The community college offers instruction leading to associate degrees and technical certificates and prep for further academic work.





Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument

The monument's 496,000 acres surround Las Cruces and feature a wide variety of recreational opportunities. Hiking and walking trails, many featuring historical landmarks and ruins, can be explored at Dripping Springs Natural Area, Aguirre Spring National Recreation Area and the diverse, 935-acre Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park.

Prehistoric Trackways National Monument

The monument was established to conserve, protect, and enhance the unique and nationally important paleontological, scientific, educational, scenic, and recreational resources and values of the Robledo Mountains in southern New Mexico. The trackways contain fossilized footprints of numerous amphibians, reptiles and insects (including previously unknown species), and plants and petrified wood dating back 280 million years. The site contains the most scientifically significant Early Permian track sites in the world.

White Sands National Monument

Rising from the heart of the Tularosa Basin is one of the world's great natural wonders, offering visitors an exhilarating, one-of-a-kind outdoor experience. Glistening white gypsum has engulfed 275 square miles of desert, creating the world's largest gypsum dune field. Information: https://www.nps.gov/whsa

Aguirre Spring National Recreation Area and Campground

One of the most scenic areas in southern New Mexico features hiking, mountain biking, picnicking and camping. Two trails are listed as part of the National Recreation Trail System: 6-mile mountainside Baylor Pass for hikers and horseback riders that ascends approximately 5,500 feet, and the 4-mile Pine Tree Trail. Located 21 miles east of Las Cruces on U.S. Highway. 70. Information: 575-525-4300, http://blm.gov/nm

Dripping Springs Natural Area

Hike along four miles of trails leading to the ruins of the old Dripping Springs Resort, a former hotel and sanctuary, or to La Cueva, a mountain cave believed to have been a shelter for prehistoric Mogollon Indians. Located seven miles east of Las Cruces along University Avenue. Information: 575-525-4300, http://blm.gov/nm

Leasburg Dam State Park

Camping, picnicking and bird watching year-round, with fishing, canoeing and kayaking on the Rio Grande offered from mid-May through mid-October. Located 15 miles north of Las Cruces. Information: 575-524-4068, http://stateparks.com

Multi-use Trails

The 4-mile Las Cruces Outfall Channel Trail connects the Triviz Multi-Purpose Path with the La Lloroña Trail that follows the Rio Grande, and to trails that loop around the city. Paved walking and biking trail that runs along Triviz Drive, has parking facilities at the water tower at Griggs Avenue. The La Lloroña Trail is accessible from Picacho Avenue.

Horseback Riding

Corralitos Ranch is a working ranch west of Las Cruces. It is ideal for riding, photographing and exploring. More than 1,000 square miles of hills and canyons, serene terrain, amazing sunsets, historical landmarks and old ranching ruins. 25 miles north of Las Cruces into the rugged Sierra de las Uvas. Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park





STROLL THROUGH HISTORIC DISTRICTS

Thirteen blocks long and six blocks wide, bounded by East Texas, Campo, Tornillo and East Court streets, the Mesquite Historic District was staked out in 1849. With Klein Park on San Pedro Street and numerous buildings built in the late 1800s, a walk through this district is a walk through history.

Part of the Mesquite District, the Downtown area provides a venue for locals and visitors to enjoy the local color found in handmade crafts, homegrown foods and historic culture.

The Alameda Depot Historic District centers on Pioneer Woman's Park, established by the Woman's Improvement Association in 1898. The area, developed because the train depot

welcomed new residents and visitors daily, remains a hub of the city's most well-known housing design and style. The Alameda area, with its houses of brick and rock, surrounded by shade and greenery is still anchored by the train depot, spreading north of Amador Avenue, south of Picacho Avenue and points all along Alameda Boulevard.

To the west of Las Cruces is Mesilla and Mesilla Park. Mesilla is a community still centered around an original plaza – the heart of the neighborhood - and spreading into a rural, farming area. Mesilla Plaza is bounded by Calle de Principal, Calle de Parian, Calle de Guadalupe and Calle de Santiago.


TV production industry.

FESTIVALS MARK LIFE IN LAS CRUCES

Las Cruces does not suffer from a lack of celebrations throughout the year. All flavors of organizations pitch in to make it one of the most active fiesta cities one could find. Honoring food, arts, music, history and traditions of all sorts, Las Cruces culture is loud with festivity nearly every weekend.

Southern New Mexico's world-renowned chile crop is celebrated with the Hatch Chile Festival at the end of summer. Wine lovers rejoice at festivals that champion the region's winemaking traditions, dating back to the 1600s.

All things hot and spicy are the centerpiece of SalsaFest! The twin triumvirates of Tequila, Tacos and Cerveza and Beer, Bacon and Bourbon each get their due with events geared toward the college crowd. New Mexico's booming craft-brew culture is toasted with spring, summer and fall beer festivals. There are also a few longstanding wine festivals each year, and even a pecan festival, to celebrate yet another area crop.


When you're done eating and drinking, there's plenty of room on the calendar to exalt the arts. In fact, since 1998, the city has dedicated the entire month of February as For the Love of Art month to just that.

This month-long celebration of all things art is joined by the two-day Las Cruces Arts Fair, the Renaissance Arts Faire, the Las Cruces Country Music Festival, the Las Cruces International Film Festival and Avenue Art New Mexico, which invites local artists to chalk their masterpieces directly onto Main Street Downtown.

There's also the city's summer Music in the Park series, the Mesilla Valley Jazz & Blues Society's Mesilla Jazz Happening and the Red, White and Blues Festival along with a host of one-off performances and day-long performing arts events.

Food and art are only one part of the equation; southern New Mexico's deep roots are watered each year with events honoring its rich, multicultural heritage.

The Town of Mesilla hosts three annual festivals - Cinco de Mayo, Diez y Seis de Septiembre and Dia de los Muertos - that pay homage to the area's lasting ties to Mexico. Preserving the area's agricultural roots is the mission of the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, which celebrates Cowboy Days one weekend in March. Finally, the New Year's Eve Chile Drop rings in a new year.



ABOUT THE PLAZA

The historic town of Mesilla, adjacent to Las Cruces, centers around a plaza that contains many of the town's jewels, including shops, restaurants, Basilica de San Albino and more.

At its founding in 1848, Mesilla's plaza was for defense against Apache raiders. In 1853, troops from Fort Fillmore raised the United States flag in the plaza upon the consummation of the Gadsden Purchase, officially making it part of the United States Territory.

Because of its significance in state and United States history, the Mesilla Plaza was declared a state monument on Sept. 10, 1957, and a National Historic Landmark in 1961. MESILLA IN THE 1800S

- The river shifted: Mesilla was founded in 1848, and the Rio Grande actually flowed between Mesilla and Las Cruces. Travel between the cities meant a barge ride. The river changed course in 1863 and again in 1885 to its present location.
- Butterfield Overland Stage stop: From 1857 to 1861 the stageline carried mail and passengers between St. Louis, Missouri and San Francisco, California, via the Ox Bow Route, covering 2,812 miles in a harrowing 23 to 25 days. Mesilla was almost the midpoint of the route. Where La Posta de Mesilla now exists at the corner of Calle de Guadalupe and Calle de Parian was a stage stop for feeding and shoeing horses, and rest and refreshment for driver and passengers.
- Bloody politics: On Sunday, Aug. 27, 1871, members of the Democratic and Republican parties held rallies on the plaza, both parties agreeing to meet in different areas, the Democrats on the plaza and the Republicans in front of a nearby residence. Wanting to close their respective meetings by marching around the plaza, the two processions met on the west side of the plaza. Angry outbursts lead to fights and shots being fired. Nine men were killed, and 40 to 50 wounded.
- Outlaws and Confederates: Dutch Hubert, Nicolas Provencio and Billy the Kid hung out at bars and dance halls in town. At the jail and courthouse on the southeast corner of the plaza, Billy the Kid was tried and sentenced to hang

in 1881. In the summer of 1861, Lt. Col. John Baylor raised the Confederate flag in Mesilla, calling the area the Territory of Arizona, and naming Mesilla as its capital. The Battle of Glorieta in March1862 forced Confederate troops to retreat to Texas, ending the Civil War conflict in New Mexico.

FILM, LIBATIONS AT THE FOUNTAIN THEATRE

The Fountain Theatre, a half block off the plaza in Mesilla, is the home of the Mesilla Valley Film Society, which screens first run foreign, documentary and independent films daily. Patrons enjoy fresh popcorn with real butter, Haagen Dazs, ice cream, cake and other concession items, as well as beer, wine and cocktails from La Posta de Mesilla next door.

The Fountain family has been associated with Mesilla since 1973, when Colonel Fountain moved here with his wife and children. He was a lawyer (Billy the Kid was his most famous client), legislator, judge, assistant district attorney, newspaper publisher and Texas lieutenant governor. The cause of his disappearance, along with his 8-year-old son Henry, in 1896 (believed to be murder) is still the subject of much debate.

In 2014, present owners, Tom and Jerean Hutchinson, owners of La Posta de Mesilla, made extensive repairs and restored the theatre's iconic murals, painted by Albert Fountain Jr. The murals depict scenes of his father's arrival into the Mesilla Valley. In addition, the film society made the decision to go digital in 2015, and the theatre now operates with a state-of-the-art digital projection system.

NEW MEXICO IS NO NEWCOMER TO THE WINE INDUSTRY

You don't often hear the terms "rebel" and "monk" in the same sentence, but the New Mexico wine industry may owe a debt to rebel Franciscan monks in the early 1600s.

In the 1590s, when Spain began exploring and settling the Land of Enchantment, missionary work was part of the effort. That meant a need for sacramental communion wine.

The wine was imported from Spain, where grapes were big business. To protect the huge revenue generated by wine exports, Spain outlawed removal of Spanish grapevines.

The rebel monks had other ideas, and began sneaking grapevine cuttings on the boat trips from Spain to the New World. Monks first planted the vines near Socorro, New Mexico, around the 1620s. That Mission Grape varietal survives to this day.

By 1884, New Mexico Territory was among the top wine producers in America. That got another boost in the early 20th century – particularly in the southern part of the state - from the agricultural research of New Mexico A&M (now New Mexico State University).

Flooding on the Rio Grande in 1943 washed out vineyards statewide, but in the late 1970s a few hardy vintners got things going again. The rising popularity of wine in the past decade or two has fueled the industry once again.

Today, New Mexico Wine, an association of grape growers and wine makers, has about 45 members, many of them just a short drive from Las Cruces. Its new slogan "Viva Vino" highlights and celebrates the state's industry.





SOUL, TRANSCENDENCE AND BEER BREWPUBS MAKE THEIR MARK ON MESILLA VALLEY

The craft beer and microbrew trend that began in the late 1980s and early 1990s is clearly more than a passing fad. New breweries continue to pop up all over the country and in New Mexico.

Las Cruces is no exception.

The past several years, the Mesilla Valley has seen the arrival of Pecan Grill & Brewery, Spotted Dog Brewery, Picacho Peak Brewing Co. and the taproom of Bosque Brewing Company.

The granddaddy of microbrews in Las Cruces is High Desert Brewing Co., which has been crafting ales, lagers, porters and more for 20 years.

Tucked away on West Hadley Avenue, High Desert Brewing Company (pictured) is often missed by first-time visitors; its facade nicely shrouded in trees and vines. Almost as revered for giant plates of nachos as for beer, High Desert can be personified by the following scene: On the benches of its shaded patio sit all walks of life from Las Cruces. New Mexico State University professors, rocket scientists from NASA and White Sands Missile Range, doctors, lawyers and business people amiably interact with students, artists, poets, priests and politicians, all blissfully ignored by the wiser dogs resting underfoot.


That scene is re-created (in some cases without the canines) at Las Cruces' other brew pubs, such as Picacho Peak Brewing Company, which offers a large outdoor and a variety of handcrafted brews.




