



ELIGIBILITY

Summer Games are open to out of state



residents in the 18+ sports that are held at Nationals. State athletes are no longer required to participate at local games in order to attend New Mexico Summer Games.

AWARDS

Only medals will be awarded. Awards will be presented to overall winners regardless of state status.

RECREATIONAL EVENTS

Are now grouped as one sport for the following events: Basketball Freethrow, 3 Point Shot, Frisbee Accuracy, Frisbee Distance, Huachas, Soccer Kick and Softball Throw.

DANCE

Dances in the Latin category will be rotated every two years except for Rumba.

TALENT

Will be two age categories, 50+ and 70+, and will have the following eight events: Comedy Solo, Comedy Group, Dance Solo, Dance Group, Instrumental Solo, Reading Solo, Vocal Solo, Vocal Group.

REGISTRATION FEES

Entry registration fee will be non-refundable for Summer Games.

DEFAULT DURING COMPETITION

Athletes in an individual sport or team that forfeit all pool play rounds shall not be permitted to advance to bracket plat, no exceptions.

New Mexico becomes 'open competition' state Albuquerque preps to host 2019 National Games

Senior Olympics is about fun and friendship. It's about health and well-being – staying mentally and physically sharp. It's also about friendly competition and some rule changes passed down from the New Mexico Senior Olympics (NMSO) board of directors ups the ante.

"Prior to October 2016. New Mexico was a 'closed' Senior Olympic participant," said Doña Ana County Senior Olympics (DACSO) Office Manager Mike Simione. "The state board for New Mexico Senior Olympics decided that for the next four vears. New Mexico will become an 'open' state. leaving only Tennessee. North Carolina and the District of Columbia as closed states.

"It means anyone from any state can now compete in any New Mexico local or state game venues," he said.
"New Mexico athletes will no longer have to compete in local games before registering to state games. Yes, this means that anyone in Doña Ana County can register with the state and pay their increased fees and compete at the state level."

See page 13 for more information on open competition rules.

In Doña Ana County Senior Games, this change means athletes from any county will be able to register for the local games, and anyone in the state can register directly for state competition without first first qualifying at the local level. Additionally, anyone from any state can register to participate in the New Mexico Summer Games, regardless of their state of residency. Simione and NMSO, however, highly encourages athletes to continue

participating in local games for several reasons.

"It is important to continue to participate in local games because a) it's a place to train before going to state, b) it provides you with a look at what the local competition is about, c) it's a place to learn playing rules for your sport, and d) it's a place to learn your sports format," Simione said.

The New Mexico Summer Games will be held in Albuquerque, New Mexico for the next two years (2017 and 2018), a big move away from Roswell, New Mexico. where it has been held the past five years. In 2019, the National Senior Games will be held in Albuquerque, as well. The summer games will help prepare the city for hosting the national games, which requires about 4,000 volunteers to manage the 12,000-15,000 participants.



Golfer, teacher, world traveler gives back to her community

Our 2016 Dee Harris Female Athlete of the Year was born in Corpus Christi, Texas, where she lived for the first 18 years of her life. Her siblings include a brother and sister, their spouses, and many nieces and nephews.

At age 18 she left home and enrolled at Baylor University in Waco Texas, where she majored in English and Education. Upon completing her bachelor's degree, she stayed at Baylor for her master's in American and English Literature. She then traveled to Salamanca, Spain, where she earned her doctorate in 16th Century Spanish Literature.

Her first teaching position was in Westminster, Colorado for four years. Then followed a teaching position in Cali, Columbia, South America for six years. After that she started a 15-year teaching stint with the University of Maryland Overseas Programs on U.S. military bases in Spain, Morocco, The Azores, Turkey, and the city of Aleppo, Syria. As she looks back on those times, she recalls her favorite locale was Aleppo.

While an undergraduate at Baylor, she took her first golf lessons. Upon moving to Cali, she continued lessons and played at a country club, as well as in other countries. She noted that the life of a teacher does not lend itself to providing a lot of free time to practice golf.

In 2002, all of this changed when she returned to teach at a junior college in Memphis, Tennessee. With her extensive background and prior teaching positions in 16th Century Spanish Literature, she was asked to establish classes at the junior college in this area. Beginning on the main campus with a small number of students, she eventually set up 20 classes on three other campuses within the system.

In 2004, her brother-in-law sent her a set of irons, which became a part of her eclectic collection of clubs, and she began playing golf at the NMSU Golf Course. This was also the first time she became involved with Doña Ana County Senior Olympics.

Upon her retirement, she wanted to become involved with

the League of Women Voters, as there were many important issues on the local and state level that people need to know about. She also set three other goals: continue to take golf lessons and play as often as possible; go into politics; and work crossword puzzles. Golf lessons and playing, along with cross word puzzles, have materialized. Going into politics has changed into immersion into the League of Women Voters. In addition, she has also spent 13 years as an AARP IRS Tax Preparer for the elderly and low-income people in the city of Las Cruces.

She feels very indebted to Senior Olympics on the local and state level for providing her an avenue to stay in shape. Also, the people she has met over the years in Senior Olympics who "help each other in a nice way, not an ugly way," and their sense of the need for sport to be fun has been unbelievable.

2016 DEE HARRIS MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Former Navy Commander, marksman retired in Las Cruces

The 2016 Dee Harris Male Athlete of the Year was born in Globe, Arizona. When he was in third grade, his family moved to Miami, (Arizona that is.) He has three sisters and is married. In 1961, he graduated from Miami High School, with a fondness for drafting and industrial arts classes. While a senior student, he engaged in what he thought was a class project. He designed and drew a tennis court, which ended up being built by the local school board, due to its attention to detail and accuracy, two of his lifelong traits.

At age 17, he joined the United States Navy. In 1969 he entered the Warrant Officer Program, and was the youngest enrollee in the country at the time. He was presented the Junior Officer Ship Handling Award for the Atlantic Fleet in 1973. This was also the year he was selected for the Limited Military Duty Program. After 33 years in the Navy he retired with the rank of Commander (05).

Our honoree developed his love of marksmanship starting in the third grade. In fact, he still owns his first rifle. Throughout his military career, he competed in both national and international levels of competition. He has attained the Distinguished Pistol Shot in National Rifle Matches, as well as the Master Service Rifle award in International competition. Prior to his Navy retirement, he went to the NRA Pistol Instructor School. After his retirement, he joined the Virginia Police Department, and then onto the Department of Criminal Justice Firearms, where he became an instructor.


In 2002, he visited Las Cruces from Norfolk, Virginia, liked what he saw, bought a house, went back to Virginia and retired from the police department. This was also the time he first met Terry Collins and Cindy Pollock who were with the Picacho Gun Club, and he began shooting in Las Cruces at the Butterfield Range.

Since that time, he has developed a close friendship with Cindy Pollock, the event manager for the DACSO Air Gun events. He has assisted at both the local and state levels of Air Gun competition. He has built targets, set them up, and taken them down. He has also been the Range Safety Officer for DACSO, as well as for the NM Summer State Games when they were held in Las Cruces. He is always open to being available to assist and help senior shooters improve.

He is a strong believer that pistol performance improves with shooting every day, and also having a 'tolerant spouse." He has enjoyed going to Roswell for the NM Summer State Games, as this has provided his wife with "unlimited thrift store" opportunities.

Our honoree states that "the greatest thing he ever did was to enlist in the Navy, because it taught him a respect for personal achievement that has stuck with me all my life." He also said that being a part of Senior Olympics "replaces birthdays and Christmas, as it gives me something to look forward to."

Multiple medal winner will compete in five-plus events in 2017

Las Crucen Phillip Holmes got started in Senior Olympics at age 55 after attending the funeral of a high school friend. While at the funeral, another friend suggested he give Senior Olympics a try.

"I haven't done that kind of thing for years," Holmes remembers telling his friend. But he signed up for Senior Olympics that year and has competed for 16 consecutive years. He has won multiple gold and silver medals in local and statewide competitions.

Holmes, a native of Muskogee, Oklahoma, is a 1963 graduate of Las Cruces High School, where he was a distance runner and quarterbacked the Bulldawgs football team.

This year, Holmes, now 71, said he likely will sign up for five or more events, including the discus, javelin and shotput, along with several walking events.

"It's a great way to stay in shape," he said.

Holmes regularly engages in "a little weight training" and powerwalking, along with throwing his own personal discus and shotput.

He and other local senior Olympians get together on Saturdays at the New Mexico State University track to hone their skills and prepare for local and state competition, he said. The athletes work with each other and get support from NMSU staff and students, he said.

"There's competition there," he said, "But there's also comraderie."

Holmes set the state Senior Olympics record with a 119-foot discus toss in his age group, he said, and has taken the

At 62, Avery has won 29 first place ribbons at local matches and 13 blues at the state level (as well as a handful of red second places.)

"I want to move to New Mexico," she thought. "I turned around and there stood a young boy with a Nike "Just Do It" T-shirt ... so I did." She moved to Las Cruces a couple of months later.



Her departure might seem fast to some of us, but speed is in her nature. Speed is what she loves most about table tennis.

"It's a great lesson in being present in the here and now," she said.

It's also the biggest challenge of her game.

"You have to be present and pay attention," she said.

Avery practices as often as possible in the mornings during the week at Mesilla Park Recreation Center and she's prepping for this year's Senior Olympics on "a hope and a prayer," she said. Her day job is driving a school bus and training new drivers

She stays motivated

with the support of her family of rescued dogs and cats, and refers to a sign in the Doña Ana County Senior Olympic office that states: "...we don't stop playing because we grow old, we grow old because we stop playing." She also gets motivation from seeing "folks 20 years older still playing. They're great role models for us youngsters!" Avery said.

Her take away message?

"If anyone is giving thought to getting involved with Senior Olympics, 'Just Do It,' she said. "It's a wonderful way to get exercise and to meet amazing people."

NM now an open competition state

1. Anyone from any state can now compete in any New Mexico local or state game venue for the next four years (2017-2020).

2. New Mexico athletes no longer must compete in local games, if they choose not to do so, before registering and competing at state. Athletes from any county can compete in New Mexico Summer Games at any of the 18+ sports that are offered at National Senior Games.

3. This means any Doña Ana coun-

ty resident can register directly with state, pay their increased state fees and then compete at state.

4. But it is important for Doña Ana County Senior Games to continue because its provides a look at the competition; provides an opportunity to ramp up your game; it is a place to learn ever-shifting playing rules; and it's a great place to learn your sports' format. Also, for many athletes, local games are the only place they may choose to compete.

gold in shotput, along with other events, including doubles ping pong.

Holmes also had a long career as a traveling entertainer and bass player. He joined his first band while in the seventh grade, and at age 19 was the oldest member of the band he formed while a student NMSU.

Holmes' career was interrupted by a stint in the National Guard, but he returned to performing music in 1968, playing in a band that became "Phil and Bess and Anybody's Guess,' which featured his wife, Bess. The band performed at high-end private clubs across the country until 1980.

Over the years, Holmes has also

played with bands "Triple Play" and the "Cadillac Kings" (from Alamogordo), along with Guitar Slim from El Paso.

He continued to play on weekends during a career as a salesman in California. Phil and Bess returned to Las Cruces in 1999, he said, and he worked in El Paso until his retirement in 2008.

Senior Olympics is "a whole different atmosphere from what people figure elderly people do," Holmes said.

He's looking forward to the local and state competitions this spring and summer. Later this month, he said, "I'll go down and sign up for more than I can do" at this year's event.



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Storyteller hopes to defend local title

It was on her bucket list to someday participate in Senior Olympics, said local champion Gloria Cobos.

Cobos, who turns 71 on Feb. 20, competed for the first time in 2016 in the storytelling category. She won the local competition and finished third at state.

"Ever since I was a child, I liked telling a story to an audience," said Cobos, a native of Lordsburg who has lived in Las Cruces since 1979.

She was an educational assistant for 19 years before earning a degree in her 40s and teaching for 20 years with Las Cruces Public Schools (at Court Junior High School and Picacho Middle School) and Gadsden Independent School District. Cobos also taught English as a Second Language and GED classes in Berino for New Mexico State University.

When she meets former students, Cobos said they often tell her the thing they remember most about her is reading stories.

Cobos read a story about La Llorona, the Crying Woman, who is the subject of a local legend, to win the local Senior Olympics competition last year.

She was among 23 competing in a similar category at the state competition last July in Roswell. A quartet took first place, Cobos said, a singer and guitar player was second and Cobos, dressed in a ghost costume, took third with another reading of the La Llorona story.

Storytelling, Cobos said, is "just something that I like to do. I enjoy it thoroughly."

In retirement, she continues to read all kinds of stories in schools and to fellow senior citizens at local senior centers and the local TOPS (Taking Off Pounds Seriously) program. Cobos has lost more than 80 pounds through the program, she said.

Cobos hopes to compete in Senior Olympics again this year to defend her storytelling title.

For the 2017 competition, Cobos said she will likely read a story about "El Cucuy" (pronounced koo koo e, it's the equivalent of the "boogey man" in Spanish) or one about a pet snake.

She's also considering a story called "The Day It Snowed Tortillas," which was written by professional storyteller Joe Hayes, whom Cobos met in 1980.

"I was so inspired by him," she said. "I mostly like scary stories."

She especially enjoys using voice inflection and sometimes whispering to bring emphasis to a word or passage in a story. Watching her audience, she said, and especially seeing kids' eyes widening motivates her more.

Cobos is the oldest of five sisters. She has three sons, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Her mother, Molly Talavera, 88, still lives in Lordsburg. Cobos has traveled extensively in Europe with church groups and continues to do water aerobics at the Las Cruces Regional Aquatic Center.

"God has given me a good life, and I'm happy," Cobos said.



Pool player, golfer shoots for the stars

Peter Kenny is a shark. In a good way

The 72-year-old sportsman has meandered around a pool table since he was about 12 years old, when he started playing 8-Ball Billiards with friends and classmates. And this spring, he's warming up his cue stick for a shot at an 8-Ball medal at the Senior Olympics. He'll also take a stab at 18 holes of golf during the contest.

Originally from Connecticut, Kenny and his wife moved to Las Cruces two years ago.

"I was a recruiter for about 30 years. Then I served as director of national accounts/business development for a disaster restoration contractor," Kenny said.

That was followed by six years as a volunteer for a job search support

group where he helped displaced workers find new employment. His wife, Peg, is a former CFO of a large nonprofit company and they just celebrated their 39th wedding anniversary.

To prepare for the billiards competition at the Senior Olympics, Kenny is playing as much as he can in game situations, "trying out new shots and practicing difficult shots," he said.

He generally plays about 10 to 12 hours a week.

"I enjoy playing pool even when I'm alone," he said. "But I also enjoy playing against others who are good players and good sports," he said.


In fact, good sportsmanship is high on his list of priorities when it comes to competition.

In addition to billiards, he'll also compete this year in golf, which he started playing later in life. "I played a lot of golf – poorly, but I don't care. It's fun," he said. "I've reached a point in life where I can hit the ball farther than I can see. That has led to me losing an inordinate number of golf balls and that doesn't exactly help my score. What's frustrating is that I hit the ball pretty straight, so I'm probably losing them in the middle of the fairway. I tried looking through binoculars while swinging my driver but eventually I figured out that that wasn't working for me."

Kenny is always one to enjoy the ride, not the destination. At last year's Senior Olympics, Kenny admits "there were some pretty good golfers there and I felt fortunate to be somewhere in the middle of the pack."

He doesn't play and compete just for the medals, though.

"If people are just playing for the



medals, they are missing out on the larger picture," he said. "No matter what your sport, Senior Olympics provides an opportunity to meet new people, form new relationships and play a sport you enjoy with genuinely good people."



Even at 65, Linda Goff knows starting anew is possible

When the arthritis in 65-year-old Linda Goff's right hand became too painful for her to bowl, she knew quitting was not an option. She loved the game too much.

So, she decided to try using her left. With 65 years under her belt as a righty, she wasn't confident in her abilities right from the start as a lefty, but she also wasn't pessimistic. Practice makes perfect, she thought.

She set out for 10 Pin Alley. She felt good, in her element, in the unusually soft bowling shoes looking down the polished planks of her lane. She examined her 10 old nemeses, whom she had knocked down countless times before.

"Can I be as good as I once was?" she wondered. "What if I'm not?"

But the game has never been about the competition, at least not against other bowlers. It's always been about the pins, who are at once her best friends and her worst enemies, the kind who challenge you as no one and nothing else ever has before.

Bowling is in her blood, she knew, and even if she

couldn't be as good as she was with her right hand, she would have to keep playing.

Her average score with her right hand was 107, and as a leftie she set a goal of 72. At the end of her first game using her left hand, she had scored 107. She said she's confident and excited about competing in this year's Senior Olympics.

"I've competed twice before," she said, both as a righty, and she medaled both times.

Goff has bowled since she was 12 years old. Her parents were also bowlers and Goff recalled her sisters and her spending much time in bowling allies growing up. The raucous of the great heavy ball smashing the pins and scattering them about the back of the lane is music to her ears, all 10 collapsing at once the sweetest sight her eyes have ever seen.

"I like bowling because I can control the object that's thrown instead of someone throwing something at me," she said, as in softball or tennis.

Goff was formerly deputy treasurer for the town of Mesilla. She retired in 2012 and said she hasn't been bored a single day. She bowls in a league, the Gutter Dodgers, once a week and practices on her own throughout the week.





Paul the Great, king of the gold, set to compete this year

After I asked to see Paul Turner's Senior Olympics medals, his wife comes into the living with such ringing noise as to shame Santa Clause and all his reindeer.

"I'm very competitive," Turner said.

And not a pushover opponent, as attested to by his wealth of gold medals, which make his wife look like the patron goddess of El Dorado as she lays them on the couch.

He looks at the pile of gold medals as only a king can, watching barrelfuls of gold tithes being constantly hauled into his treasure chamber—almost bored.

Once Turner, now 73, retired at 59 as a professor in New Mexico State University's Department of Fish, Wildlife and Conservation Ecology, he decided to invest more of his time as a competitor.

His primary sport in the Senior Olympics, which he has played in for most of the 14 years he's been retired, is bowling, but he's also won medals in volleyball and pickleball.

He bowls five to six times a week and plays in five

leagues in town.

He and his wife have also competed in Senior Olympic bowling as a mixed-doubles team. The pair thought it would be a nice bonding experience, regardless if they did well. They did, nonetheless, taking home first-place medals.


Turner is competing solo this year and said his appetite for competition is just as ravenous as ever. Competing, whether it be in a bowling alley, in a sandlot, in an enclosed room, even in the middle of the Rio Penasco River fly fishing for trout, keeps him young.

"I compete to make sure my balance and physical abilities don't deteriorate too fast," Turner said.

With arthritis held mostly at bay, his hips and back healthy, and his mind still sharp, Turner is in prime condition for the heat of competition. Several years ago, he had a knee replaced but said that hasn't interfered with his performance.

He also said he competes to keep himself mentally healthy, as well as to keep in touch with his community.

Turner has competed and won medals in Senior Olympics in Las Cruces, Albuquerque, Santa Fe,



Roswell, Texas and Arizona. Turner said he especially likes going to Santa Fe to compete so that he and his wife can spend time with their grandkids.

Will he win more medals this year? Probably, but that's not his intention. He only wants to play the best he can and the laurels he receives are purely afterthoughts.

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
