# Plenty to do in the City of the Crosses

hile Las Cruces still has a small-town feel, the city has seen significant growth over the past few years, with new bars, coffee shops and restaurants popping up throughout town. Perhaps the area that has changed the most in recent years is the revitalized Downtown, which features several bars, a used bookstore, a comic shop, theaters, museums and galleries, apparel stores and coffee shops along Main Street. It's also a prime spot for festivals, and the stage on the Plaza de Las Cruces is often used to host live music events.

In addition to Downtown Las Cruces, there is the Mesquite Street Historic District and Old Mesilla, a popular tourist attraction. And if you're the type of person who enjoys the outdoors, you're in the right place. Explore the many peaks and trails of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument or float down the Rio Grande River on a kayak or inflatable tube.

Here are some ideas to help you get started planning your next outing:



### LAS CRUCES FARMERS & CRAFTS MARKET

Food trucks with burritos or vegan pulled "pork" sandwiches gather on Main Street along with artisans offering beard creams and CBD salves, jewelry and art. This is the place to find both locally sourced meat, a great cup of coffee or a card featuring the Organ mountains to send back home. Local farmers offer the freshest produce from tomatoes, pecans, honey and greens to fresh flowers to brighten your dorm room. The market takes place near the Downtown Plaza every Wednesday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Info: farmersandcraftsmarketoflascruces.com, 575-201-3853

### **MESQUITE STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT**

For a sense of the town's history without the touristy feel, take a walk through the Mesquite Street Historic District, a colorful neighborhood filled with character. Along these historic streets you'll stumble upon parks and shops, as well as restaurants like La Nueva Casita and Nopalito and some of Las Cruces' oldest buildings. Beck's Roasting House and Creamery hosts live music from 6-8 p.m. Mondays, as well as other special events throughout the week.



### **WATCH THE DRAMA**

If your schedule allows for a little drama in your life, Las Cruces is home to numerous theatres where you can test your audition skills or take in a show.

Las Cruces Community Theatre, 311 N. Main St., is located Downtown, and offers a student discount on tickets. This year LCCT will present classics such as "Neal Simon's Biloxi Blues" and "Nunsense." Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main St., gives a platform to overlooked and little-known works, as well as a space for local writers to develop their projects. Scaffolding Theatre Company's is a startup theatre company co-founded by Justin Lucero of El Paso and Megan McQueen of Las Cruces. Learn more and keep up with shows at scaffoldingtheatrecompany.com. The recently formed **Doña** Ana Repertory Theater aims to produce shows that you wouldn't normally see locally, so follow them on Facebook for performance and audition announcements. There's also the American Southwest Theatre Company, which hosts productions at the ASNMSU Center for Fine Arts,1000 E. University Ave.

### **FILM**

The beautifully restored Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St., is located Downtown. It shows a variety of classic films and hosts national musicians and regional acts. The theatre will be closed for renovations beginning July 1 and will reopen in September. Call 575-541-2290 or visit riograndetheatre.org for more information. Located at 2469 Calle de Guadalupe, in Mesilla, The Fountain Theatre has entertained residents of Mesilla since 1905. Visit this landmark, enjoy the best popcorn in town (short of the kettle corn at Farmers and Crafts

Market) and take in an Oscar winner or foreign film. Visit mesillavalleyfilm.org for a list of current showings.

### **MUSEUMS**

Visit Las Cruces' many museums for a day of culture of enrichment. Downtown, you will find the Branigan Cultural Center, Museum of Art and the Museum of Nature & Science. Nearby, in the Mesquite Street Historic District, you'll find the Railroad Museum. And closer to campus is the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, which serves as a venue for several events, ongoing exhibits and some special breeds of livestock. Visit las-cruces.org/1523/Museum-System or nmfarmandranchmuseum.org for more information.

### FIRST FRIDAY ART RAMBLE

On the first Friday of every month, Downtown Las Cruces hosts galleries, shops, businesses and restaurants that make Las Cruces unique. 5-7 p.m. Free to the public. For information, visit facebook.com/lascrucesfirstfridayramble or call 575-525-1367.



### **ART OBSCURA**

Part gallery, part gift shop, this quirky two-story building at 3206 Harrelson St. provides intriguing diversions and gift ideas. Featuring local artists and historic ephemera and oddities, this is a place to get lost in for a little while. Open 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 11 a.m.- 4 p.m. Sunday, Art Obscura often hosts musicians as well as food trucks. Learn more at artobscuragallery.com.

#### **TAKE A HIKE**

Las Cruces is near several hiking trails and mountains. Try the simple hike of Tortugas (or "A" mountain) near University and work your way up to Dripping Springs Natural Area or Soledad Canyon. Hike Baylor Pass and end up at Aguirre Spring Campground. For a day trip, cruise south to the beautiful Franklin Mountains of nearby El Paso.

### **ROCKIN' JUMP LAS CRUCES**

Rockin' Jump, 805 S. Solano Drive, features trampolines, a dodgeball arena and slam dunk zone. Open noon-9.p.m Monday through Thursday, noon-10 p.m. Friday, 11a.m.-10 p.m. Saturday, 12 p.m.-8 p.m. Sunday. For information, call 575-339-0005 or visit rockinjump.com/lascruces.

### Explore pubs, wineries and more

f you enjoy the nightlife, there's plenty to do in Las Cruces after dark.

Whether viewing the stars from the patio of a wine bar, listening to live music while enjoying retro arcade games, or enjoying karaoke and craft beer, Las Cruces has a growing list of bars and social spaces to enjoy.

Most of these local hangouts have an active social media presence, so follow your favorite scene for updates on shows, open mics and other events.



- The Amador, 302 S. Main St., is a new entertainment complex located in Downtown Las Cruces. The venue features a restaurant and several different bars, including Amador Patio, Bar & Grill, 575, Broken Spoke Tap House and Jax, a rooftop bar. There is also an outdoor stage used to host live music events and cornhole games set up on the lawn. Food is served at Broken Spoke Tap House until 10 p.m. Info: amadorlive.com, 575-680-0172
- Bosque Brewing Co. Public House and Beer Bar, 901 E. University Ave. This popular brewery has two locations in the Cervantes Plaza across from campus. With on-tap options like fruity Elephants Parade or a smooth and bold Scotia Scotch Ale, you might as well order a flight! Info: bosquebrewing.com, 575-571-4626
- **Elephant Ranch**, 3995 W. Picacho Ave. is one of the newer bars in the area, serving a variety of alcoholic beverages and featuring a beer garden and food truck. Info: 575-635-9856
- **El Patio Bar**, on the Mesilla Plaza, 2171 Calle De Parian, is a Las Cruces/Mesilla landmark. With domestic and foreign imports, El Patio has pool tables, a Jukebox, and a vibe not quite like any other. The bar is cash only. Info: 575-526-9943
- **The Game Sports Bar & Grill**, 2605 S. Espina St., and The Game II, 4131 Northrise Drive, offers a full bar, food menu and craft beer. Enjoy the shaded patio and live music. Info: thegamebarandgrill.com, 575-524-4263 (GAME), 575-373-4263

- **High Desert Brewing Co.**, 1201 W. Hadley Ave., is a favorite among Las Cruces locals. This dog-friendly hangout spot serves platters of nachos big enough to serve your whole study group. Local and regional bands play inside every weekend. Under 21? Order a pitcher of their home-brewed root beer. Info: highdesertbrewingco.com, 575-525-6752
- **Icebox Brewing Co.**, 2825 W. Picacho Ave., is the only brewery in Las Cruces and Mesilla that has its brewing equipment open to the taproom. And it's one out of only a handful of breweries in town that brews its beer locally. Featuring a wide range of flavors, from the Apple Beer to the Frostbite IPA, there's something for everyone. Enjoy a hip atmosphere with food served by Ruby Soho food truck and live music performances. Info: iceboxbrewing.com, 575-526-7129
- Little Toad Creek Brewery and Distillery, 119 N. Main St., specializes in small-batch craft beer and spirits and offers a variety of cocktails. With indoor or outdoor seating and a different food truck every night, this hot spot has something for everyone and is only a hop from many of the community theaters downtown. Info: littletoadcreek.com, 575-556-9934



- **NM Vintage Wines**, 2461 Calle Principal, offers a chill alternative to your typical bar scene. Nestled in neighboring Mesilla, NM Vintage Wines offers tapas, select beers, an impressive variety of wines and a great ambiance. Live music is featured on weekends. Info: nmvintagewines.com, 575-523-9463

- **Picacho Peak Brewing Co.**, 3900 W. Picacho Ave. Keep an eye out for the sign; you don't want to miss this brewery with their unique hand-crafted beers and a new menu with options for meat-lovers and vegetarians alike. Info: picachopeakbrewery.com, 575-680-6394
- Rad Retrocade, 201 N. Main St. Take a trip down memory lane with this 1980s and 1990s themed arcade bar and grill. It features 44 arcade video games, vintage pinball machines, basketball shooting games and Skee-Ball. Alcohol is served, but children and the under-21 crowd are allowed before 7 p.m. Info: 575-556-9338
- **Spotted Dog Brewery**, 2920 Avenida De Mesilla, is a locally owned microbrewery with a variety of seasonal and

Every first Friday of the month Eyeconik hosts Friday Night Live, an all ages music show. Info: 575-222-0531
- Grab some friends and make a break at Las Cruces' two escape rooms:



# **Daytrippin'**

# Take a study break to visit the area's nearby attractions

he getaway you need is just a short drive away when you live in Las Cruces. Explore neighboring El Paso, Texas or discover something unique and mysterious at Meow Wolf in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Looking for an outdoor adventure? Visit the area's nearby caverns, hot springs or gypsum sands. Check out the Outdoor Center in the Activity Center on campus to rent any camping equipment you might need!

### **CARLSBAD CAVERNS NATIONAL PARK**

Located in the Chihuahuan Desert, Carlsbad Caverns National Park is only a three-hour drive from Las Cruces if you take U.S. 180. Hike in the underground caves by day and watch the flight of bats at night. The \$10 cavern entrance fee is good for three days. For information, visit nps.gov/cave/index.htm.

### **HOT SPRINGS IN TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES**

Truth or Consequences, New Mexico is known for its hot springs. Journey out with your friends for a relaxing, therapeutic soak. You can reserve a time slot to soak in a private pool at most places, or you may choose to take a dip in a community/shared pool. One of the more well-known places to visit is Riverbend Hot Springs, a mineral springs resort and spa on the Rio Grande. For information, visit riverbendhotsprings.com, call 575-894-SOAK (7625) or search other hot spring properties at sierracountynewmexico.info.

### **EL PASO, TEXAS**

Less than an hour drive away, take a day to visit the El Paso Zoo or the impressive (and free) El Paso Museum of Art. Stop by the family-friendly Rubiks Arcade Bar for walls of classic and new games. El Paso provides hundreds of culinary experiences from local landmarks like L and J Café, Lucy's or the cash-only Chicos Tacos. It isn't too hard to find something for everyone, with even Toro Burger offering a tasty vegetarian option.





### **MEOW WOLF**

An art installation that is part gallery, party jungle gym, and several parts fantasy, Meow Wolf's House of Eternal Return, 1352 Rufina Circle in Santa Fe, is an immersive experience you don't want to miss. Tickets are \$22-\$25. For information, visit meowwolf.com or call 505-395-6369.

If the four-hour drive is too much for one day, consider staying in Albuquerque where hotels are affordable, and life is louder with markets and unique shopping by day and numerous show and club options by night.

### **VALLEY OF FIRES IN CARRIZOZO**

Along part of the Tularosa Valley runs the Valley of Fires, several square miles of basalt lava originating from the nearby vent known as Little Black Peak. The lava fields are reachable by driving 4 miles northwest along U.S. 380 from the U.S. 54 junction at Carrizozo, New Mexico. After a two-hour drive, take a break at the provided campsites complete with tables and grills. There's a ¾-mile nature loop trail, and off-trail hiking is possible, but take care. The mountain village of Ruidoso is 36 miles away.

### WHITE SANDS NATIONAL MONUMENT

Situated 40 minutes east of Las Cruces, 10 acres of white gypsum shine with haunting beauty under a full moon. Tours are available November through April, and the monument regularly has concerts, full-moon hikes, sunset hikes and educational programming. The entry fee is \$5 per person, which varies for special events, and annual passes are available. Info: nps.gov/whsa/index.htm



# Exercise your right to vote

Here's what you need to know to register to vote, learn about candidates and cast your ballot.

### **QUALIFICATIONS**

You must be a resident to register to vote in New Mexico. If you're not, check your state of residency for guidelines on how to cast an absentee ballot.

### **REGISTRATION**

You must be registered in order to vote. This can be done at **RegisterToVote.org**. Or find various registration stations throughout Doña Ana County at **donaanacounty.org/elections/registration#where**.

You must submit your application at least 28 days before an election. You will

need a New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico identification card issued through a motor vehicle division of the taxation and revenue department;

any document that contains an address in the county together with a photo identification card; or a current valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary education institution in New Mexico accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

### **LEARN ABOUT THE CANDIDATES**

To find out who is running for office statewide, check out the New Mexico State Secretary's candidate portal at **sos.state.nm.us**. For city elections, check the City of Las Cruces' website at **las-cruces.org/1295/City-Clerks-Office**.

### WHERE TO VOTE

Once you're registered, you can vote at any voting convenience center (VCC)



throughout the county, regardless of district. The VCCs closest to New Mexico State University are **Corbett Center Student Union**, **University Hills Elementary school**, 2005 S. Locust St., and **Las Cruces High School**, 1750 El Paseo Road. For a complete list of voting convenience centers and early-voting locations, visit **donaanacounty.org/elections/vcc**.

### **WHAT TO BRING**

In Las Cruces, a physical form of identification is required only for first-time New Mexico voters who registered by mail and did not include identification with the registration form. Otherwise, you will be asked to provide a **verbal or written statement of identification** including your name, year of birth and registered address.

# NMSU campus offers several activities and opportunities to socialize


here are a variety of organized and under-the-radar activities at NMSU. Enjoy your down time and defeat the dull moments while making new friends at some of the following:



# Your guide to getting around on and off campus

alking can be exhausting, especially on a campus as large as New Mexico State University. Know your options when it comes to getting around.

### **AGGIE TRANSIT**

Provides a free shuttle service to students with a valid Aggie ID. This free bus service runs from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday during the school year. With routes reaching the far ends of campus and plenty of stops along the way, the Aggie Transit offers easy transportation from any of the free parking lots. North-side buses have stops every 10 minutes. South-side buses have stops every 20 minutes. Plan bus routes here: park.nmsu.edu/transit

### **CRIMSON CAB**

One of ASNMSU's most popular services, Crimson Cab, runs every day from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. to ensure the safety of students by providing a safe ride. Show your NMSU Student ID, and Crimson Cab will take you and your friends home anywhere within the Las Cruces city limits. No reservation needed. Crimson Cab will also give you a ride back to your car in the morning. Crimson Cab offers services during the day to help students reach the bus station, auto shop, medical appointments or interviews. Making a reservation one day in advance is highly encouraged. ### **CRIMSON COACH**

Crimson Coach is a free special event shuttle bus offering rides every Thursday to two different El Paso locations. Hop a ride from Corbett to Little Bit of Texas, a country bar in El Paso any Thursday at 7:30 p.m., 8:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., with rides returning to Las Cruces starting at 11 p.m. Or go to Cincinnati Street, a happening scene in El Paso, by taking the Cincinnati Route which runs every Thursday from the West Corbett Center

Parking lot, 8 p.m. and 10 p.m., with returning rides at midnight and 2 a.m. Students can use this service for free by showing their valid student ID. Crimson Coach now offers a local route as well! Park in parking lot #19 or leave your car at The

Game, Whiskey Dicks, The Warehouse or De La Vegas and catch a ride on the Coach route between the five stops as many times as you'd like. This route also runs on major holidays. Local routes run 9 p.m. to bar closing every Saturday night. Info: 575-646-4415.

### **AIRPORT SHUTTLE**

By reservation only (at least 24 hours prior), Las Cruces Transportation will take any student with a valid NMSU ID to the El Paso International Airport. All pickups will either be in the west side parking lot of Corbett Center Student Union, the Ramada Palms or Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces. (For home-tohome pickups and drop-offs, the charge is \$10). Students must present ID at pick up to use the free service. New students coming from the El Paso International Airport for the first time without a valid NMSU ID can present a valid photo ID (in the form of a visa, passport, driver's license or other valid identification) along with their Aggie ID number at pick up. ### PETE'S PICK UP

If you find yourself alone at night on campus for any reason, you can call Pete's Pick Up for a safe escort to your car or dorm in a golf cart. Just call 575-646-1111 between 6:30 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. Monday through Thursday and Saturday, and within minutes a driver will be there to safely pick you up.

### **RENT A BIKE**

The Outdoor Center, located in room 108 of the Activity Center, allows students with valid NMSU IDs to rent bikes for \$10 a day during the week, and \$15 over the weekend. 



#### 2019/20 Meal Plans

Meal plans are a year-long obligation, so if you have a meal plan for the fall semester, you will automatically have the same one for the spring. First-year students are required to purchase a meal plan and are limited to Aggie Unlimited or the Aggie Choice 230. If you haven't chosen one by the first day of classes, you will be assigned Aggie Choice 230.



• Aggie Unlimited: \$1,951 per semester buys unlimited entrances to Taos Restaurant and \$100 in Aggie Dining Dollars, which can be used at other dining locations on campus.

- Aggie Choice 230: \$1,898 per semester, students get 230 entrances to Taos Restaurant and \$325 in Aggie Dining Dollars
- **Aggie 150:** \$1,344 per semester, students receive 150 entrances to Taos Restaurant and \$250 in Aggie Dining Dollars.
- **Aggie 100:** \$1,026 buys 100 Taos Restaurant entrances and \$250 in Aggie Dining Dollars.
- Aggie 64: \$918 per semester purchases 64 Taos Restaurant entrances and \$325 Aggie Dining Dollars.
- **Pistol 400:** \$400 per semester purchase five Taos Restaurant entrances and \$400 Aggie Dining Dollars
- Family Resident Optimum 350: \$1,426 per semester for 350 Taos entrances, no Aggie Dining Dollars
- Family Resident Optimum 250: \$1,019 per semester for 250 Taos entrances, no Aggie Dining Dollars
- **Details:** Upperclassmen or freshmen living off campus may purchase Aggie Unlimited, Aggie Choice, Aggie 64 or Pistol 400. Family resident plans are only for residents of family housing on campus. Any unused Taos entrances and/or Aggie Dining Dollars transfer from the fall to the spring semester, but not from the spring semester to the fall semester.

- **IHOP:** Whatever hour you decide to study, stack your books by a stack of pancakes. Open 24 hours, and just across from campus at 351 E. University Ave.


### **STUDY TIPS**

## Set a course for success

### Academic advisers help you stay on track

ourse catalogs and managing a schedule can be overwhelming. An academic adviser can help you make educated decisions regarding your academic schedule and class choices as well as your long-term career goals.

The most important aspect of advising is making sure the classes you take fulfill your degree and/or the university's requirements. By the time you graduate, you'll have mastered the Star Audit system, accessible via your MyNMSU account, but the audit might initially be difficult for a student to interpret. Your adviser should be well-versed in doing so, and they will be able to help you balance required classes as well as some of the fun courses NMSU offers.

### WHO NEEDS ADVISING?

All students are encouraged to receive advising at least once a semester. New and second-semester freshmen and transfer students, undecided or exploratory students, student athletes, "pre" majors (e.g. pre-nursing, pre-social work), students with less than a 2.5, and students whose GPA is less than required for their designated major requirements will have academic advising holds.

Advising holds are put in place to ensure that you have an opportunity to meet with an adviser. To avoid an advising hold, meet with your adviser or department. If you aren't sure if you have an advising hold, you can find out through your my.nmsu.edu account. Click "Student Records," and then "View Holds." From there you can find out if and why your account is on hold.

## HOW TO MAKE AN APPOINTMENT WITH YOUR ADVISER

Students may make an academic advising appointment online at advising. nmsu.edu/staff, by phone at 575-646-2941 or in-person at Garcia Center between 8 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday or 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday.

**Phone appointments:** Academic Advising appointments are available for online and distance education students via scheduled phone appointments. Non-distance education students do have the option to set up phone appointments under special circumstances. Call 575-646-2941.

Canceling/rescheduling: Advising

appointment space is limited so show up for your appointment. If you need to cancel or reschedule your appointment, use the cancellation link in your appointment confirmation email or call the Center for Academic Advising and Student Support front desk at least one hour in advance.

## Get legal advice on campus

If you find yourself in need of legal advice, the Associated Students of New Mexico State University (ASNMSU) has a licensed lawyer on staff with whom you can discuss any legal problems.

Karl Rysted is licensed in Oklahoma and New Mexico, and can render legal advice and, in rare instances, court representation for students. You have already paid for his services through student fees, so Rysted will meet with you for an hour free of charge. If, after the consultation, you think you need further legal representation, Rysted can provide private attorney referrals.

Employed by ASNMSU, licensed attorney Karl Rysted cannot advise you on issues dealing with ASNMSU or NMSU since it would be a conflict of interest, but he can help you with numerous other legal concerns, such as landlord/tenant issues and constitutional law.

Student Legal Aid will need to know the reason for your visit before you go in, so download their intake sheet at studentlegalaid.nmsu.edu. Everything you say is confidential. The student legal aid office is located on the second floor of Corbett Center, room 205. For information, call 575-646-4419.

ook on too many classes and can't keep up? Don't worry, there is a way out. Dropping a class is simple and will ensure you receive a refund, but act quickly! The last day to drop a class and receive a "W" is Oct. 18 for fall 2019 and March 10 for spring 2020.

### **BEFORE THE DROP DEADLINE**

- Visit my.nmsu.edu and log in to your MyNMSU account
- Click on "Registration"
- Click "Add/Drop Classes"
- Select "Web Drop/Delete" on the appropriate class
- Submit changes



### AFTER THE DEADLINE

- Go to your college dean's office
- Ask for a withdraw slip and fill it out accordingly
- Get a signature of the course's professor
- Return it to the dean's office to get the class dropped



### IF YOU ARE EXPERIENCING A CRISIS

If you don't have an on-campus counselor or you feel you must speak to someone outside of your scheduled appointment, you are welcome to go to the health center and request to meet with the on-call counselor. You will be asked to fill out some brief paperwork. Typically, you will be able to meet with the counselor almost immediately afterward. See need-to-know phone numbers on page 47 for other local and national resources you or a friend might need.

### **Tips to manage stress**

- **Play on:** Studies have shown playing calm music can reduce the hormone linked to stress, so give your eyes a break from chemistry homework and enjoy some music history. Laughter is another stress reliever, so watch an episode of your favorite sitcom, listen to a comedian's podcast, or call that friend or sibling who can always put your stress in perspective.
- **H20** and **Vitamin D:** Our basic needs are often the ones we ignore. Make sure you're getting a little sun, fresh air and plenty of water. Don't overdo it with sugar or caffeine as this can make your anxiety feel worse and lead to energy crashes. Take a shower or a nap. Your body deserves a little maintenance, so take yourself for a run around the duck pond or a dip in the campus pool.
- Take it Easy (on yourself!): College is hard. Life is harder. You are a champ for getting out of bed this morning. So you didn't finish the extra credit assignment, or you had to cut back on your hours at work to keep up with your classes. It's okay. While saying affirmations in the mirror isn't for everyone, you can talk back to the voice in your head when it's being a jerk and tell yourself "I've got this." Or try a guided meditation like one of these provided by the Aggie Health and Wellness Center, wellness.nmsu. edu/guided-meditations.
- **Speak up:** Relationships are important to our mental health. Don't bottle up negative emotions. Whether it is roommates, friends or teachers, assertive and thoughtful communication can help you express how you feel, avoid miscommunication and gives others the opportunity to help you sort it out and stay on track.
- **Ask for help:** The NMSU Counseling Center has a variety of tools and services that can help in times in need. Don't hesitate to reach out.

# How to recognize and intervene a potentially harmful situation

ampus sexual assault is an uncomfortable topic, but one that must be talked about. Did you know that one in six women have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in her lifetime and 3 percent of men have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in their lifetime? While in college, a young woman's risk increases to one in four chances of being sexually assaulted. This means that someone you may already know or someone you may meet has been a victim of sexual assault.

Sexual assault may consist of sexual harassment, sexual coercion, sexual contact (unwanted fondling/groping) attempted rape and rape. Unfortunately, a victim of sexual assault or rape may

often face blame and shaming.

It is never the victim's fault. Ever. Rape and sexual assault are not crimes of passion and love. Rape and sexual assault is about power and control.

There are ways everyone can – and should – help prevent sexual assault or other potentially harmful situations from happening or continuing. Read the tips below to understand how you can utilize bystander intervention to evaluate the situation and respond in a safe way.

# How to recognize the signs of a potentially harmful situation

- Body language: Is the potential victim leaning away, pushing the other party away or just appears uncomfortable?
- Raised voices: Do you hear yelling, screaming, banging or other alarming sounds?
- Intoxication: Is the person stumbling, swaying, unable to communicate, being

forced to drink, or otherwise unable to consent to what is happening?

• The golden rule: If you placed the person you love most into the potential victim's place, would you intervene? Trust that instinct or gut feeling.

# Use the "three 'D's" to safely help the victim(s) DIRECT

Directly intervene by saying or doing something.

Examples:

- "That's not okay!"
- · "Stop doing that!"
- "Are you okay?"
- "Can I help you?"
- Physically separating the people.
- Remove either party from the situation.

### **DELEGATE**

If you don't feel safe or comfortable directly intervening, delegate to someone else.

Examples:

- Police (911)
- Party host

# Be aware of the

# Plan ahead to avoid the serious consequences of drinking

s a freshman in college you may be excited for the school year to begin and yet also feel apprehension about what to expect. There will be many new experiences in your future. With a new sense of independence can come some difficult choices.

One of the many things you will encounter is alcohol. There will be many opportunities for you to drink, and there is a common misperception that for you to have the college "experience" and "fit in" you should drink, despite being underage. Remember that drinking under the age of 21 is illegal and can result in some hefty charges including MIP (Minor in Possession) or fourth-degree felony for those caught providing alcohol to a minor(s). Even if you are underage, you can still receive a fourth-degree felony for providing alcohol to other minors.

Anyone who decides to drink should consider ways to reduce your risk of potentially serious consequences.

- **Plan ahead!** Set a limit before you start drinking and stick to it.
- Alternate between alcoholic drinks

**and water** in order to stay hydrated and space out your alcohol intake.

- Always have a **designated driver**. Keep *Crimson Cab's* number (575-524-TAXI; free rides for NMSU students with ID) or Project Home's number (575-524-TAXI; discounted taxi service) in your phone, or plan on registering an account with Uber or Lyft.
- Eat before and while you drink to help slow the absorption of alcohol into your blood stream. Note, however, that eating after drinking will not help you sober up. Only time will sober you up.
- Either avoid playing drinking games or cheat during. Drinking games can lead to drinking a larger amount of alcohol in a shorter amount of time, which could lead to you not realizing how intoxicated you're becoming.
- Know how much you are drinking: One drink = one 4-ounce glass of wine, one 12-ounce beer, one shot of 80-proof liquor. Mixed drinks may be more than one serving!
- **Use Bystander Intervention.** If you see a potential harmful situation, like someone putting something

in someone else's drink, either do something about it or let someone know about the situation.

- Don't drink from punch bowls or pitchers – they are easy to drug, potentially unhygienic, and it is difficult to keep track of how much you are drinking.
- Never hesitate to call for help. If someone is showing signs of alcohol poisoning (shallow breathing, clammy skin, vomiting, blacking out and/or passing out), call 911 immediately. Never try to give the person a cold shower, coffee or allow them to sleep it off. Alcohol may be legal (at least for those who are 21) and it comes in many different flavors, with lots of colors and pretty bottles, but it is still a dangerous drug that you can overdose on, or become addicted to over time.
- Remember that it's okay to not drink; you can have just as much fun sober!

### **DISTRACT**

Cause a distraction to diffuse the situation or allow the two parties to be separated.

# **Examples:**

- "Do you need to go to the bathroom?"
- "Your car is getting towed!"
- "You left \_\_\_\_\_ in the other room."

- Spill a drink.
- Set off an alarm.
- Honk a car horn.
- Make a scene.
- Pretend like you know the person having the potential harm done to them.
   You can take it a step further and help change campus norms to reflect the following:
- 1. Violence is never okay and will not be tolerated.
- 2. Everyone needs to do their part to help.

### Here's how:

• Educate others about bystander

intervention.

- Speak out if you hear opposing thoughts.
- Encourage bystander intervention and denounce violence by:
  - Wearing a pin, or button expressing these thoughts.
  - Hanging up a poster at your dorm or office expressing these thoughts.
  - Posting on social media about bystander intervention.

## **ON-CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS**

- Use high-quality "U" locks on all bicycles, locking both the frame and front tire to the rack.
- Roll up windows and lock doors on vehicles and campus residences. Do not leave property in plain sight from windows, or anywhere on campus

unattended.

- Be aware of potential scams via phone calls or email. Don't give out personal information over the phone unless you are sure of the source of the request.
- When in an interpersonal relationship, remember that "no" means exactly that. If the other person is asleep, intoxicated or drugged, they are incapable of giving consent. Any sexual contact at that point is a crime

   no matter what they may have said or done earlier. If you are someone you know is the victim of sexual assault, you can call 1-800-656-4673 to be walked through the process for seeking help.
- If you see someone else in danger, say something, do something and/or call for help. If you see an unsafe condition like a fallen tree limbs or power lines, flooded streets or other hazards, report it promptly.

# Warning signs and resources for suicide prevention

# SIGNS SOMEONE MAY BE HAVING THOUGHTS OF SUICIDE

- Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself
- Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or obtaining a gun
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain
- Talking about being a burden to others
- Increased use of alcohol or drugs
- Acting anxious or agitated, or behaving recklessly
- Sleeping too little or too much
- Withdrawing or feeling isolated
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge
- Displaying extreme mood swings

# **WAYS TO PREVENT SUICIDE**

It is not necessary to wait until thoughts of suicide arise to prevent suicide. There are protective factors, which serve as a shield from thoughts of suicide and acts. Protective factors include the following:

- Effective clinical care for mental, physical and substance abuse disorders
- Easy access to a variety of clinical interventions and support for help seeking
- Family and community support (connectedness)
- Support from ongoing medical and mental healthcare relationships
- Skills in problem solving, conflict resolution and nonviolent ways of handling disputes
- Cultural and religious beliefs that discourage suicide and support instincts for self-preservation

- Mint: Still considered one of the most reliable money management apps available, the free Mint app from Intuit is an all-in-one resource for tracking your spending and creating a budget. Mint can also provide bill reminders to help you avoid late fees.
- **Unsplurge:** This app has a unique community-based

section where you can compare your spending goals with those of others. It also gives you saving tips.

- PocketGuard: This free app helps you find ways to save based on your regular spending habits. You can sync up your accounts and the app will track and help you analyze your spending, so you can build a better budget. The app also picks up on recurring bills and even looks for better deals.
- Albert: Want a personal finance assistant? Albert can help. Combining artificial intelligence and human guidance, the free app gives you personalized information about you can improve your financial health, based on

your income, spending habits and bills.

### **ANOTHER WAY TO SAVE:**

- **BigOven:** By providing ideas for transforming the dregs of your fridge into appetizing meals, this app helps you make the most of the groceries you have on hand. # What you'll need and how to apply for loans, scholarships

o qualify for subsidized loans (where you don't acquire interest and don't have to repay until after you graduate), unsubsidized loans (where you do) or work-study employment with the university, students should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at fafsa. ed.gov every year. The Financial Aid Office can help students in completing the application and finding scholarships.
