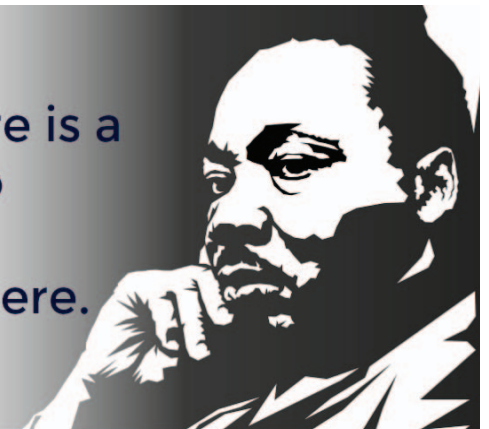

# Coffeen feted as 2020 Woman of Influence

When the 16th annual Women of Influence awards are handed out in Albuquerque next month, Dr. Kelley Coffeen, an award-winning cookbook author and faculty member within NMSU's Department of Family & Consumer Sciences, will take center stage as one of 24 honorees whom Albuquerque Business First has identified as having made a positive and influential impact in the New Mexico business community.

"I was honored to be nominated and then completely overwhelmed and humbled to find out I was an honoree," Coffeen said. "There are many women in our state from every socio-economic level and ethnicity, all work-

ing hard for themselves, their families and their communities. My story is just one of many."

The author of six cookbooks – including one targeting diabetics who love Mexican cuisine – Coffeen

has been featured on ABC's Good Morning America for her work. She's been writing cookbooks for more than 25 years.

"My mother was diagnosed with Type 2 Diabetes in her 60s," Coffeen said. "Her love for Mexican cuisine -- chile rellenos, tacos and enchiladas -- made her daily struggle with diabetes challenging. As a result, I started researching and developing Mexican and Tex Mex low carb and diabetes-friendly recipes."

Coffeen said hers has been a life of both struggle and achievement.

"As I reflect on my life I want to be seen as a woman who serves others in many ways. I offer hope and encouragement through my life experiences and what I have learned from them. I have

persevered through many of life's struggles to become an accomplished cookbook author and educator," she said. "Through it all, I have successfully written six cookbooks that have been nationally recognized. I have been a single mom, working three jobs to make ends meet. At the age of 50, I ventured back to college, graduating with my Ph.D. with the goal of teaching students at the college level. I am not unique, just driven to succeed."

The selection process for the 2020 Women of Influence awards began with an open call for nominations. Those who were nominated were then asked to submit an application with information for a panel of judges who represent a cross section of leaders in the business com-

munity. Many are alumna of the award.

Collectively, the judges evaluated the applicants on professional achievement, leadership and community involvement. The top scorers were named honorees. Judges recused themselves from voting on any applicants with whom they had close ties.

The top women-owned businesses in New Mexico reported a total of over \$464 million in 2018 revenue.

The awards will take place on Feb. 24 at Sandia Resort and Casino, preceded by Bizwomen Mentoring Monday, an event in which attendees will have the opportunity to participate in one-on-one coaching sessions with various mentors, as well as take part in roundtable discussions.

The 2020 Martin Luther King Jr. Day Breakfast will be held Monday, Jan. 20, at 8 a.m. at the Las Cruces Convention Center, 680 E. University Ave. Doors will open at 7:30 a.m.

This year marks the first commemoration since the mass shooting at the Cielo Vista Walmart in El Paso, where 22 innocent lives were lost, and 24 others were wounded, including the daughter of keynote speaker, Pastor Michael Grady, former president of the El Paso NAACP.

## Martin Luther King: 1929-68

If he had not been assassinated more than 50 years ago, Baptist minister and civil rights activist Martin Luther King Jr. would turn 91 on Jan. 15, 2020. King was born Jan. 15, 1929 in Atlanta, Georgia. He was murdered April 4, 1968 in Memphis, Tennessee.

King led the 1955 bus boycott in Montgomery, Alabama, where, on Dec. 5, 1955, Rosa Parks, a black woman, was ar-

King helped organize the 1963 March on Washington, during which he delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. He won

rested for refusing to give her seat on a bus to a white person. The boycott lasted Dec. 5,

the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for combatting racial inequality through nonviolent resistance. King was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Gold Medal.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day was established as a holiday in numerous cities and states beginning in 1971; the holiday was enacted at the federal level through legislation signed by President Ronald Reagan in 1986.

## Another legislature comes to the front burner

**B**y this time next week, copies of our 16th annual Southwest New Mexico Legislative Guide should be making their way across the state.

From the Publisher

Creating this publication, which has won several state and national awards through the years, is a huge undertaking, stretching our small staff to its limits. The result, though, has always been worth it.

The publication is used as a vital resource by people all over New Mexico, including the staff at the Roundhouse, our state's capitol building in Santa Fe. In recent years, some readers have taken to tearing pages from our magazine, and putting them in plastic sleeves in loose-leaf notebooks so they don't wear out from use.

Our staff spends a lot of time talking to legislators and public officials from around the region, and we learn a lot about what's going on in our state. Our goal is to pass that information along to you in a useful format that can help during the session and beyond. The regional information, contacts and data create a compendium for all things legislative and beyond in New Mexico.

I personally enjoy visiting with and getting to know our citizen legislators, as well as

all the public officials who do the day-to-day work of running our cities and counties.

Governments from the tiniest villages to the massive United States government get criticized constantly. And that's fair game. These people are working with our money, and we've earned the right to have a say. And, yes, from the smallest to the biggest, corruption frequently finds its way into the process.

When you have a conversation with these folks, though, you can tell, by and large, they really do want to do right by the taxpayers. They are working hard trying to get things done and get them done efficiently.

This year's session

The even-year, 30-day sessions focus primarily on the budget but, invariably, other topics pop up.

This session, the subject of legalizing recreational marijuana likely will go before the legislators.

Most of the people we've talked to are hopeful but cautious. Most legislators believe legalization is inevitable, and most believe it could generate revenue beneficial to the state and help us be competitive with surrounding states that have already legalized it.

However, some consistent concerns keep coming up. They include the following:

- What measures will be in place so employers can prohibit its use in the workplace and on the job?

- While we have some reliable ways to determine if individuals are impaired by

alcohol, there's no such test in regards to cannabis.

- Since the substance is still illegal federally, how do we reconcile issues that cross jurisdictions?

- When determining how licenses are created, monitored and distributed, we need to figure out a way to avoid the mess we've made of our liquor-licensing process.

Marijuana's lookalike cousin, hemp, is finally making progress in New Mexico, after being delayed by vetoes by the previous governor, despite bipartisan support in both houses.

For those who don't know, hemp looks like marijuana, but has only trace amounts of THC. In other words, it can't get you high.

Growing and producing hemp makes a lot of sense for New Mexico, given our climate and our rich tradition in agriculture. The industry has already attracted companies in Doña Ana and Sierra counties and elsewhere in the state.

In talking with legislators in the past few weeks, it's clear many have a lot of great ideas. Whether they'll make any progress this year, during the budget session is unclear, but here is a sampling.

Sen. Bill Soules of Las Cruces has put in a lot of work in addressing ways that communities can address adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) that affect children throughout their lifetimes, including abuse, neglect, and witnessing experiences like parental conflict and substance abuse. NMSU will become the fis-

cal agent for the Anna Age 8 Institute (designed to work on ACEs issues) Soules helped create with 2019 legislative funding. The institute has been located at Northern New Mexico Community College in Española since it opened last year. Soules said he hopes for additional legislative funding for the program in 2020, the first of its kind in the country.

Rep. Gail Armstrong of Magdalena has a bill that will eliminate New Mexico's taxing of Social Security Income. Armstrong says the tax is likely a deterrent for retirees moving to the southwest to pick New Mexico, and an undue burden on some of our most vulnerable citizens. Only 13 states still impose the tax, and West Virginia will be the next to repeal it. Of our five neighboring states, the only other one still imposing it is Colorado.

Sen. Bill Burt of Alamogordo has a bill to eliminate taxing military retirees. He believes our state, which has a significant military presence, is losing out on some major talent, as these soldiers and airmen typically finish their careers in their early 40s, and often begin new careers. The tax relief could incentivize New Mexican military retirees to stay, and perhaps attract retirees from other states to take advantage of our weather and relatively low cost of living. Their buying homes and other big-ticket items would likely offset the reduced tax revenues, plus we could add a lot of value to our workforce statewide.

## Cowboy Vegetarian Cookbook

When beef gets short, a lot of cowboys are forced to do without. The cook must come up with meatless meals. The following recipes are from the Cowboy Vegetarian Cookbook.



**BAXTER BLACK**

it over the garage floor. Then chop the stems with a heavy blunt utensil like a bucket or hoe. For dressing, pound a kumquat-sized piece of 17 percent protein block on a flat surface and add

**TENNIS SHOE TONGUE:** Select an old one. The price is better, and it may have picked up some natural flavor depending on where it has been worn. Boiling is suggested, but it may also be fried to a crisp and served on a bed of marinated sweat shirt. Garnish with pickled shoe string.

**SEED CORN CAP PIZZA:** Carefully clean with a fish-scaling knife. Remove all metal buttons, rivets and any plastic tabs. Flatten the cap by soaking in linseed oil then placing it underneath a door mat that gets heavy use. Once pliable, cover it with lots of cheese and ketchup. Dry kibbles or dust motes may be sprinkled as toppings for variety.

**MEADOW HAY SALAD:** Choose a bale toward the middle of the stack. Break the bale, being careful to remove any plastic twine. Take a flake and winnow

vinegar. Croutons chipped from corn cobs or diced styrofoam may be tossed in. Feed whatever is left to the cows.

**FAN BELT FAJITAS:** The most succulent fan belt can be found on old farm equipment molding in your boneyard. It should be sliced into bite-sized chunks. Tenderize before cooking by soaking in fingernail-polish remover. Fry in lard along with half a hatful of ¼-inch black plastic hose and shredded playing cards. Serve with beer and jalapeños. It tastes a lot like abalone.

**RAWHIDE STEW:** Ever wondered what to do with those old reins, quirts or saddle tree bark? This recipe has been tried and tested from ancient Mongolians right up through Donner Pass. Place the strips of rawhide in a pot and boil

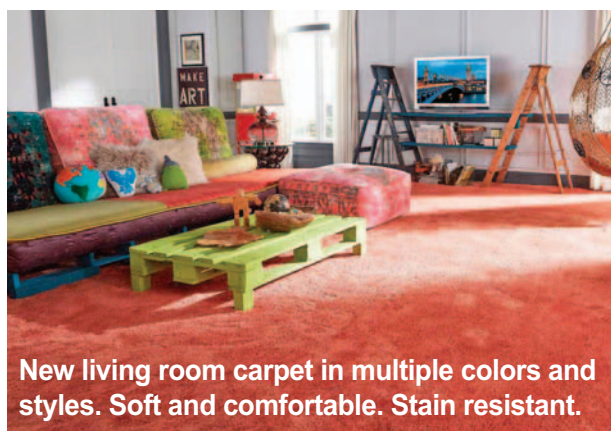

# A compromise on early childhood funding

This year, Dr. No is saying yes.

Sen. John Arthur Smith, D-Deming, has earned that moniker after decades of serving as one of the Legislature's chief budget writers in a state where revenue

has fluctuated wildly from year to year based on the international market for oil

coffers are full. It was Smith's opposition to a series of bills over the past several years seek-

ing and gas.

And so, Smith is always looking at what he calls the "out years" - two years, five years, 10 years from now. That's especially true in years like this one, when the

ing to tap into the state's permanent fund to create a new funding source for early childhood education that led to the title of Dr. No.

Each year, those bills have died in Smith's Senate Finance Committee without ever getting a hearing.

It was considered something of a breakthrough last year when Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham convinced Smith to at least give the bill a hearing. She made the most of that opportunity, bringing her three-year-old granddaughter along to sit on her lap as she made a passionate appeal.

Smith and the committee listened politely, then moved on without taking a vote.

This year, however, Smith has agreed to sign on as cosponsor to a bill by House Minority Whip Doreen Gallegos of Las Cruces to es-

tablish a dedicated funding source for early childhood education without tapping into the permanent fund.

The Early Childhood Education and Care fund would be established within the state treasury, with money from the general fund. Gov. Lujan Grisham's preliminary budget proposal includes \$320 million to start the new fund.

The new Early Childhood Education Department, which was created by the Legislature last year, will be responsible for deciding how those funds are spent.

Gallegos, who is a designee to the Legislative Finance Committee, said she has proposed similar legislation before, and had conferred with Smith on those past bills. He wasn't a supporter at first, she said, but was generous with his advice. Over time, as they continued working on the

bill, he came around.

It is, to be sure, a compromise.

Tapping into the permanent fund would provide a larger, more reliable stream of revenue.

Smith and others argue that the permanent fund was intended to provide for the state after the oil and gas revenue is gone. Supporters argue that it makes no sense to keep billions of dollars in the bank when our state has the worst child-wellbeing ranking in the nation.

That debate is still worth having. But it makes no sense to continue relying solely on the same bill when everyone knows exactly where and how it will die.

This will allow the state to get new programs up and running as the debate over the permanent fund continues.

The expectation is that

the money in the fund will be invested wisely and will grow over time. The immediate result will be that on July 1, 2021, \$20 million will be made available from the fund, and can immediately be put to use.

Distributions each year after that will be at least \$30 million, and could be more, depending on the market value of the fund.

Last year, I thought the Legislature put the cart before the horse when they created a new cabinet-level position without a dedicated source of funding. This would remedy that situation.

With both Sen. Smith and Gov. Lujan Grisham on board, it would appear that the bill has solid support going into the session, which starts Jan. 21.

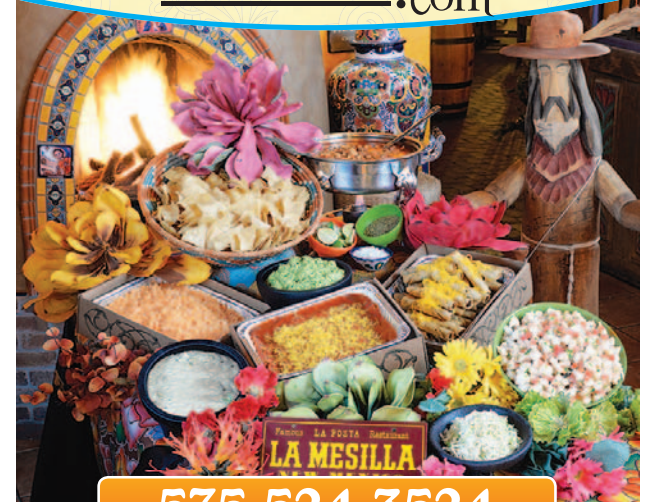

# Looking to 2045, council likely to vote on long-term city plan

Ever wonder where the City of Las Cruces will be in 25 years?

If you don't want to wait until 2045 to find out, take a look at the city's comprehensive plan – called Elevate Las Cruces – which gives a pretty clear picture of where city leaders, planners and people who live here want Las Cruces to be in the next quarter century -- and the path necessary to get there.

The plan, still in draft form, was presented to the city council at a special work session Wednesday, Jan. 8, at city hall. The city's Planning and Zoning Commission is expected to vote on the plan at its Jan. 28 meet-



ing, and the city council likewise on Feb. 18.

The city's first comprehensive plan was adopted in 1999 and updated in 2013. Currently, the city manages more than 100 facilities, including city parks, across an area of 68 square miles.

The update "preserves your wonderful natural environment," said Christian Lentz, principal planner for Halff Associates of Richardson, Texas, which is the city's planning consultant. said, with guiding vision that considers inclusiv-

ity, cultural diversity, quality of life, livability and economic prosperity.

The draft plan presents four scenarios for city growth and development. Based on an anticipated 1.2 percent annual growth rate, the plan projects the city's population will climb

from about 105,000 in 2020 to more than 141,500 by 2045.

The comprehensive plan will "promote managed growth," Lentz said, helping guide fiscal, social and environmental sustainability. It maintains the city's centers and corridors

development framework, he said, as it considers downtown; Las Cruces International Airport and the West Mesa Industrial Park; residential, commercial, industrial, agricultural and recreational development; schools, education and health care providers;

historic districts; flood plains and open space.

"Land use is at the core of the plan," Halff Associates Vice President Jim Carrillo said at the work session, adding that revising the plan began in the fall of 2018 and included a significant amount of public engagement: multiple stakeholder advisory committee meetings and community meetings and three community surveys that drew about 2,800 responses.

Lentz said the plan encourages more mixed-use development throughout the city, along with infill and infrastructure investment to guide development and redevelopment.

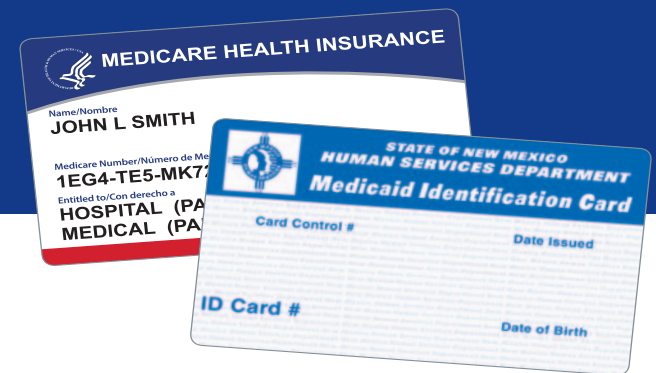

## Spine Health 2

Last week, I wrote about what happens with the spine as you age, about common spinal conditions in older adults. I'll continue this week with that discussion, and talk about ways to help prevent back pain and injuries in the future

Lumbar spinal stenosis is a narrowing of the spinal canal that occurs in the lower back, resulting in low back and leg pain that characteristically occurs while standing or walking more than a short distance but dissipates once you sit down or lean forward. Pain associated with this condition may also occur with symptoms of sciatica

Degenerative spondylolisthesis occurs when weakened facet joints, ligaments and bones allow a vertebra to "slip" forward so that it is out of alignment with the vertebra below it resulting in over back and/or leg pain that lessens while sitting and worsens when standing upright, plus a loss of flexibility in the lower back and pain while bending backwards.

Compression fractures often occur in the thoracic and upper lumbar portions of the spine, and are typically accompanied by sudden and severe back pain, spinal deformity, loss of height and an inability to participate in routine physical exercise. These fractures often occur in the presence of osteoporosis, in which poor bone strength results in collapse of the vertebral bone.

Back and neck pain that occurs as part of the aging process can and should be treated – particularly if it keeps you from being active and doing the things you enjoy. People who experience pain from the above conditions and those which I wrote about last week can typically get substantial relief via nonsurgical medical treatments.



While not all back pain can be avoided, the time to start protecting yourself against preventable spine problems when you are older is now. Start to exercise regularly to keep off excess weight and strengthen the core muscles in your back and abdomen. You can do so with targeted stretches as well as safe aerobic activity such as walking, bicycling, swimming and yoga.

- Be mindful of your posture when seated at your desk at work. Adjust your chair and computer screen, provide proper lumbar support.
- Strengthen your core muscles via targeted exercises including aerobics and back stretching exercises.
- Avoid lifting objects that are more than 25% of your own body weight and always use correct bending, twisting and lifting techniques.
- Eat a balanced diet that includes anti-inflammatory foods and vitamin D to keep your bones strong.
- Consider buying a better, more supportive mattress or trying a new sleeping position if you have trouble with your back in the morning.
- Consult a spine or pain specialist or a physical therapist to learn the cause and best treatment options while avoiding further injury. Remember that recurring and debilitating back pain is never normal, and can be mitigated with the right assistance.
- Find ways to relax and loosen your back and neck muscles at the end of each day.
- Be practical about your exercise routine, and avoid overdoing it with repetitive movements that can lead to muscle strains and sprains.

## Governor speaks in Las Cruces

Speaking at the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce's 2020 Roundtable Forecast lunch on Jan. 8 at the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum (with Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Debbi Moore looking on), Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham said the state's oil and gas industry is producing record revenue, which her administration and the New Mexico Legislature are "investing in our future." Education and diversifying the state's economy will be major focuses during the 2020 legislative session that starts Jan. 21 in Santa Fe, the governor said. Lujan Grisham said she will propose an allocation of \$320 million for an early childhood education trust fund, and also will put money into pension reform to "take billions in unfunded liability off the table ... taking care of our retirees" and improving the state's bond rating. Lujan Grisham said her call for the 30-day session will also include another raise for educators and public education employees, legalizing recreational cannabis, additional state police officers and \$25 million to make sure the state's senior citizens are receiving adequate meals and services.

# Governor to introduce 'extreme-risk protection order' bill

With Las Cruces state Sen. Joseph Cervantes and Doña Ana County Sheriff Kim Stewart at her side, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham was in Las Cruces Jan. 8 to announce that her 2020 legislative call will include an "extreme-risk protection order" (ERPO) bill that "reduces the opportunity for violence and suicide," the governor said.

The bill "would allow household members and law enforcement officers to ask a court for an order – attesting to the urgent need for it under oath – to temporarily take weapons and ammunition from someone who is making violent threats against himself or others," a news release from the governor's office said. "The court would be required to hold a hearing within 15 days, and the weapons and ammunition would be returned when the order expires."

New Mexico leads the nation in suicides by firearm, Lujan Grisham said,

and has one of the highest rates of gun violence in the nation.

If the bill is passed in the 30-day legislative session that begins Jan. 21 in Santa Fe, New Mexico would join 17 other states and the District of Columbia that already have similar extreme-risk laws, sometimes called "red-flag" laws, the governor said.

The news release from her office said most of those laws "were enacted in the wake of the high school mass shooting in Parkland, Florida. Before that event, family members told law enforcement that the gunman exhibited warning signs of potential violence, but there was no clear process to restrict his access to guns, even temporarily."

The Aug. 3 mass shooting at a Walmart in El Paso, "brought our two communities together in a way no two communities should ever have to come together," Cervantes said at the news conference. The shooter in that case, he said, published an online

manifesto that spelled out his violent intentions before the shooting, but no action was taken to stop him. The proposed bill, Cervantes said, will give the courts and law enforcement another tool to respond when "we know action is going to be taken."

State Rep. Joanne Ferrary, D-Doña Ana, said the bill could also help reduce suicides among military veterans in New Mexico suffering from depression and PTSD.

"We can no longer turn a blind eye to what is happening with guns in our country," said state Rep. Daymon Ely, D-Bernalillo, Sandoval, who also spoke at the news conference in Las Cruces.

The ERPO Act Ely introduced during the 2019 legislative session passed the New Mexico House of Representatives 39-30 but was never voted on in the Senate.

Lujan Grisham said

ERPO legislation has broad support among Republicans and Democrats in New Mexico and nationwide, in part, because it "doesn't create problems for responsible gun owners."

**DR. MILAN H. COBBLE**

Milan Cobble passed away in his sleep on January 4, 2020, almost a year after his beloved

wife Nancy left us. He died in hospice care in Albuquerque. Prior to that, the couple lived in Las Cruces for more than 55 years.

Milan was born on March 13, 1922, in St. Paul, Minnesota, to Houston I. Cobble and Lillian Strom Cobble. Growing up, he lived in North Dakota, Texas, Illinois, New York and New Jersey.

75 years ago, Milan served in the United States Army in World War II. He was a paratrooper in the 17th

Airborne Division, and jumped into Germany in March of 1945 during the Battle for the Rhine River.

After the war, he graduated from the University of Michigan in 1948 with a Bachelor's Degree in Mechanical Engineering. He received his Master's Degree from Wayne State University in Detroit in 1952, and his Ph.D. Degree from the University of Michigan in 1958.

The University of Michigan was also where Milan met his

lifelong partner, Nancy Musselman. They married in July of 1949, and were together for almost seven decades.

They first moved to Bowling Green, Ohio, where he taught engineering at Bowling Green State University. He also taught at the University of Delaware in Newark, Delaware. Then in 1962, they moved to Las Cruces, New Mexico, where Milan began a 22-year-career at NMSU as a Professor of Mechanical Engineering. He also taught as a Distinguished Visiting Professor at the University of Michigan at Dearborn after his retirement from NMSU.

Dr. Cobble was a member of Phi Delta Theta, Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Sigma Xi Engineering Society, American Association of Engineering Education, Pi Tau Sigma Engineering Fraternity, and the Union of Concerned Sci-

entists. He was the author of many scientific papers and articles. In 1968 he was named the American Association of Engineering Education Southwest Teacher of the Year. In 1981 he received the Bromilow Award for Engineering Research, plus a research award from the Naval Research Laboratory.

The Cobbles were long-time members of First Presbyterian Church, where they were responsible for keeping the church pews supplied and in order for many years. They also attended chapel at the Good Samaritan Village in Las Cruces, where they lived for several years.

Dr. Cobble was an avid golfer, with two holes-in-one at the NMSU golf course. He also was active in the Senior Olympics, winning the county and state championships in his age group in golf numerous

times. He then took up the shotput late in life, and he set the New Mexico State Record in the shotput for both the 90-94 and the 95-99 year old age groups. Last June, Milan even won the National Championship in the Senior Olympics, which were held in Albuquerque, when he made the longest shotput toss in the 95-99 age group.

Milan was preceded in death by his wife, Nancy. He is survived by their four sons: Steven (Molly) of Washington, D.C.; Brian (Julie) of Albuquerque; Kevin (Crystal) of Las Cruces; and David of Albuquerque. He is also survived by five granddaughters: Kacy, Elizabeth, Sara, Julia, and Satya.

## Local HVAC program rated state's best

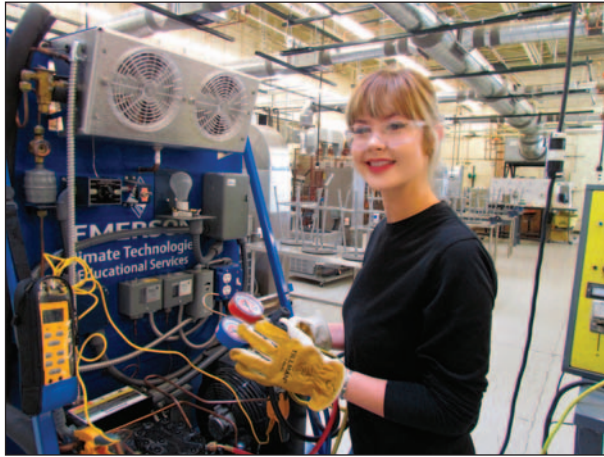
According to a recent national study that compared college heating, venting and air conditioning (HVAC) programs, Doña Ana Community College's (DACC) program is the best value in the state of New Mexico.

Air Filters Delivered, the research firm, based the rankings on several criteria including:

- Was an associate degree offered for successful graduates and upon completion, were there transfer options to pursue a bachelor degree;
- What was the cost of attendance based on IPEDS and College Scorecard information on in-state and out-of-state tuition;
- What was the six-year post-enrollment average salary, as graduates from some schools have a higher average salary; and
- What is the median salary for HVAC technicians in the state.

From that data, the researcher assigned a rank and then averaged the scores to form a final list.

# Ron Saltzman: A man and his cars

Tucked away in quiet cul-de-sac in Las Cruces is a house with a normal looking two-car garage, but when the doors open, the normalcy vanishes in an instant.

Ron Saltzman's garage is deep enough for three cars to park one behind the other on one side and two deep on the other side. As if that weren't enough, he has a lift on one side that lets him pack one more car up top, near the ceiling.

"They all run, and they all need work," he said with a chuckle, standing next to his 1968 AMC AMX, a muscle car that he said he drives when he feels the need for speed. For the most part, he said he has done the mechanical work himself.

AMC produced fewer than 20,000 AMX models between 1968 and 1970, and not many are left on the road.

Up on the lift, above the AMX, is his 1967 Jaguar XKE, which he has owned for the last 50 years. He said he has won awards in both showing and racing, with himself behind the wheel. Most recently, he took a third-place speed-trial trophy in Truth or Consequences, coming in just two seconds behind the first-place finisher.

"The track was set up with pylons in a configuration that matches courses all over the country," he said. "I did five runs, and three of them counted. The crazy thing about that course

was the finish line, which was right up next to a fence, so you had to get there quick and then stop quickly, too."

Saltzman also has a completely restored 1979 Volkswagen Super Beetle convertible. He calls it his favorite car to drive between Mesilla and El Paso on N.M. 28.

"With the top down, going through the pecan orchards, you just can't beat that feeling," he said.

In addition to his three classic cars, Saltzman has a Ford Expedition, a Honda Element, a

Jeep Cherokee and a smattering of bicycles, as well as a motorcycle and an ATV. They all fit in the garage together. Adjacent to the line of classic cars and the lift, Saltzman has a work bench and tool boxes that would give any grease monkey a hard case of mechanical envy.

"I work out here on these cars all the time," he said. "The lift really makes things easy, because I don't have to get down on the ground and slide around on my back."

When he was designing the house, Saltzman said he knew exactly what he wanted in terms of the garage space. His builder wanted to construct a full deck over the garage, but Saltzman insisted that the deck be smaller, so that the lift could accommodate any of his vehicles without bringing the ceiling into play.

"I have to remember to remove the radio antennas, but otherwise, they all fit," he said.

The left upright arm of the lift – where the motor is located – is marked with neat white paint at all the stopping points for each vehicle.

"The trickiest part is moving everything around when I want to work on one of them," he said. "It's like one of those puzzles where there's one piece missing and you have to move all

the other pieces around to get the blank spot where you need it."

Saltzman cracked a wry smile remembering one afternoon when he was moving all the cars around for one reason or another.

"The next day, my neighbor came over and said he was hurt that I had a party and didn't invite him, but then he realized they were all my cars."

Although the Jaguar, the AMX and the VW are his current darlings, Saltzman said he estimates that he's tinkered with dozens of other cars he's owned through the years, including MGs, Triumphs and Alfa Romeos, just to name a few of 40+ cars he has owned in the past.

"It's a long list," he said.

Recently retired – he

sold his business last summer – Saltzman said his garage is his refuge, and the place he goes to tinker and toil, regardless of the weather outside.

"It's completely climate-controlled in here," he said. "I tried a swamp cooler at first, but it just made everything muggy and rusty. That wasn't going to work, so I put in a central heating and cooling unit. Now, I can regulate the garage as easily as I can the house. Even the garage doors have a ridiculous R-rating to help keep the heat and cold out."

Saltzman said he drives all of his vehicles fairly regularly, and he shows the vintage ones from time to time. He considers them works of art.

"Look for me at a car show," he said. "I'll talk your ear off about these machines."

The Las Cruces Arts and Cultural District (LCACD) plan, adopted by the Las Cruces City Council in July 2018, recently received an international award from the Creative Tourism

Network (CTN), an association based in Barcelona, Spain.

The recipients of the 2019 Creative Tourism Awards were announced in London at the World Travel Market Nov. 6. The awards aim “to reward companies, projects and destinations worldwide that foster the new generation of tourism, characterized by the active participation of the tourists in artistic and creative activities,” according to a news release from SVPratt Creative Strategies, who received the “Best Strategy for Creative Tourism Development” award on behalf of the city, LCACD and the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership (DLCP).

SVPratt, including owner Sabrina Pratt in Santa Fe and Associate Irene Oliver-Lewis in Las Cruces, was the consulting firm that worked with the city to develop the plan.

This is the first time a creative tourism award was given to a project in the United States, accord-

ing to the news release.

# Black Box Theatre opens 2020 with 'The Killing Game'

Black Box Theatre (BBT), 430 N. Main St. downtown, continues its 20th season with a production of Eugene Ionesco's "The Killing Game."

Ionesco (1912-93), who was nominated for the Nobel Prize in literature in 1964, wrote the play in 1970, which features "an unnamed city in an unnamed country beset by an unnamed plague," said Marissa Bond, who is directing the production. "Quarantined from the rest of the world and hemmed in by unknowns, how does the population of the city deal with the horror? Not well. Ionesco's absurdist play uses gleefully dark humor and an unrelenting examination of human nature combine to keep us unbalanced and uncertain, but laughing through it all."

"I have always loved the Theatre of the Absurd, but it wasn't originally my plan to do Ionesco," Bond said. "I had been looking for a fun murder mystery when I came across 'The Killing Game,' which is absolutely not a murder mystery, but I was thrilled by the opportunities it brought to challenge collaborators on every level of the production: designers, crew, actors, director, and, of course, the audience."

The cast includes Teddy Aspen-Sanchez, Karen Buerdsell, Vanessa Dabovich, Gina DeMondo, Avra Elliot, Cassandra Galban, Erica Krauel, Taylor Landfair,

Ed Montes, Joseluis Solorzano, Nancy Sorrells, Josh Taulbee and Robert Young.

The play has no main characters, as 13 actors play 100 characters, Bond said. "It is one of the many ways that Ionesco challenges our expectations in this work. Each scene contains new people (with one very short exception), and it is the work of the actors to create new characterizations and to find ways to invest the audience in embracing the ephemeral."

Bond said the biggest challenge the play has faced in rehearsal "has been our own case of dramatic irony -- in a play about the plague, most of the cast got sick in the first week, delaying the start of our rehearsals."

The show will include the work of many talented designers and technicians, Bond said, including: Peter Herman, lighting designer; Bekah

Taulbee running lights and sound; Josh Taulbee, set design; Robert Young, costumes design and assistant director; and Erica Krauel, creating props.

"I want the audience members to walk away with an awareness of their role as collaborators in the act of theater and in the creation of meaning," Bond said. "Though the play interrogates the way we struggle against the inevitability of death, Ionesco tempers the brittle edge of satire with moments of softness and vulnerability which validate the reasons why we struggle. I hope the audience leaves with thoughts and questions, to be sure, but also joy and delight in the experience."

Bond first appeared in Las Cruces theater in the cast of "Avanti, or a Touch of Spring," at Las Cruces Community Theatre. At Black Box The-

atre, she has appeared in 'Nora,' 'Mad Gravity,' 'The Explorer's Club' and

'Agamemnon.' She was directed twice by the late Mark Medoff, including

playing General George Armstrong Custer in LCCT's production of the one-woman show "I, Custer."

Performances of "The Killing Game" are at 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, Jan. 24-25, Jan. 31-Feb. 1 and Feb. 7-8; 2:30 p.m. Sundays, Feb. 2 and 9; and 7 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 6.

Tickets are \$15 regular admission, \$12 for students and seniors over age 65 and \$10 for all seats for the Thursday night, Feb. 6 performance.

# Museum brings dinosaurs to Downtown

## BULLETIN REPORT

Beginning Jan. 25, the Las Cruces Museum of Art will present “Dinosaur Discoveries: Ancient Fossils, New Ideas,” an engaging exhibition that will reveal a vivid picture of what living, breathing dinosaurs were really like.

The exhibition introduces how current thinking about dinosaur biology has changed over the past two decades and highlights current research by scientists from the American Museum of Natural History and other leading paleontologists around the world.

Using a combination of major fossil finds, captivating computer simulations, and provocative models, “Dinosaur Discoveries: Ancient Fossils, New Ideas” introduces a dynamic vision of dinosaurs and the scientists who study them.

The exhibition examines in great detail recent scientific sleuthing and the array of investigative tools — from bioengineering computer software to CT scans — used by modern scientists to reinterpret many of the most persistent and puzzling mysteries of dinosaurs: what they looked like, how they behaved and how they moved.

“This exhibition illustrates how scientists are using new ideas, new discoveries and new technologies to revolutionize our understanding of dinosaurs,” said

Mark A. Norell, curator of Dinosaur Discoveries and Chair and Macaulay Curator of the Division of Paleontology at the American Museum of Natural History.

“Our work reaches across many disciplines involving paleontologists, biomechanical engineers, paleobotanists and others to showcase how we go about reconstructing the mysterious life of dinosaurs.”

The exhibition is divided into four major themes: “How Dinosaurs Moved;” “The Liaoning Forest;” “How Dinosaurs Behaved;” and “Extinction.”

In “How Dinosaurs Moved,” biomechanical studies of dinosaur movement are explored, and it features the different movement styles of Tyrannosaurus rex and Apatosaurus.

“The Liaoning Forest” is a diorama depicting a section of a 130-million-year old forest in China that has changed scientific thinking about dinosaur evolution.

“How Dinosaurs Behaved” reconsiders the purposes of horns, frills, crests and domes on many dinosaur skulls, asking if they were used for defense, mate recognition, or display.

“Extinction” presents the evidence for theories concerning the end of the dinosaur age, including asteroid impact, global climate change and massive volcanic eruptions.

“Dinosaur Discoveries: Ancient Fossils,

New Ideas” is a traveling exhibit organized by the American Museum of Natural History, New York ([www.amnh.org](http://www.amnh.org)), in collaboration with the California Academy of Sciences, San Francisco; The Field Museum, Chicago; the Houston Museum of Natural Science; and the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences, Raleigh.

The Museum of Art is located at 491 N. Main St. and is open 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Saturday.

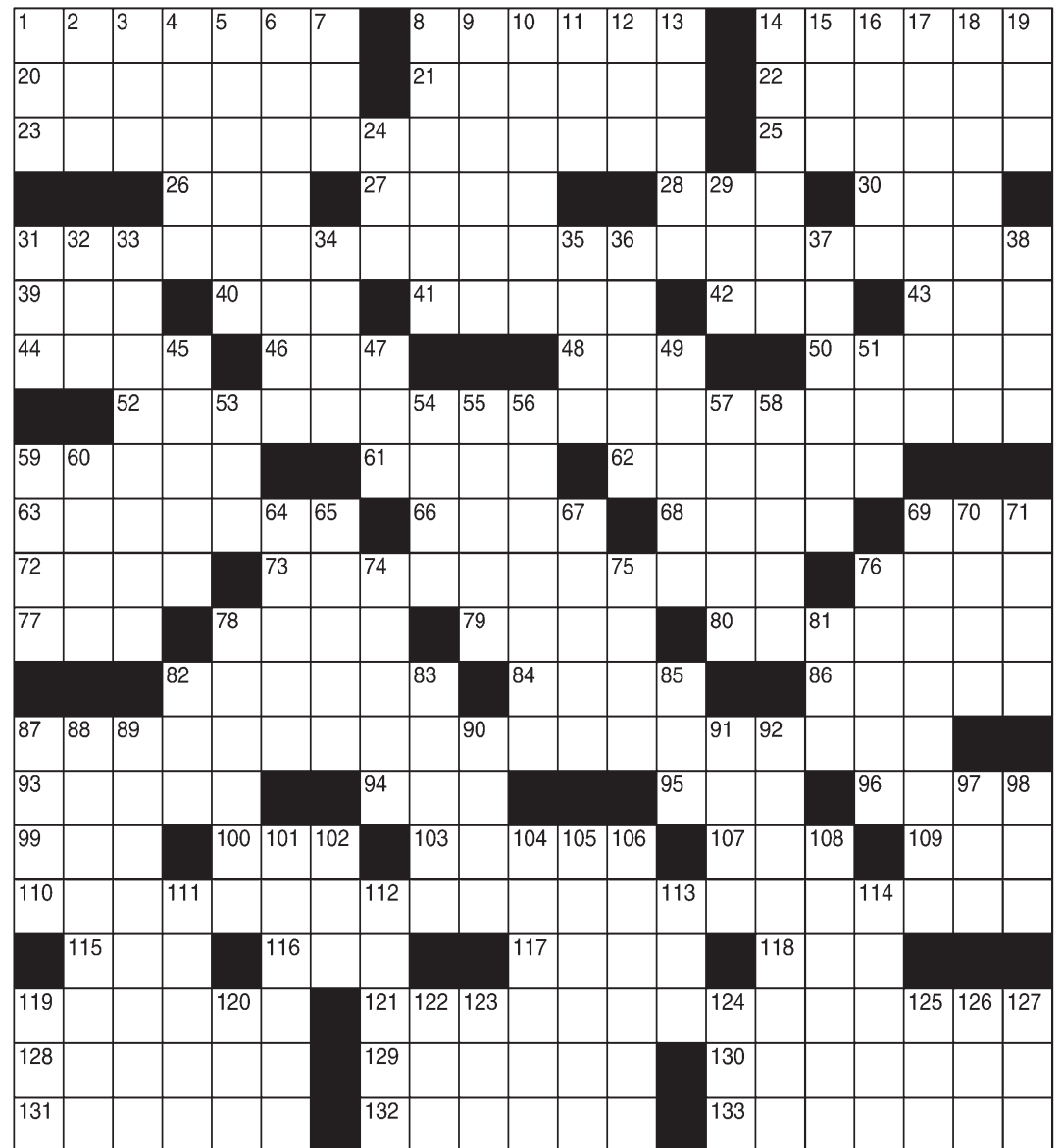

# DACC's media technology program includes audio certification

Among the many other programs Doña Ana Community College offers through its Creative Media Technology (CMT) program, audio certification prepares students for a variety of careers in the audio industry.

Classes provide students with hands-on training using state-of-the-art equipment and technology, said DACC instructor Jason Begin. Students learn about the real-world application of multi-track recording, mixing and editing, with emphasis placed on the physics, theory, understanding and practical application of audio so they can work in film and television production,

gaming and a variety of other fields.

"There are a lot of avenues that are available to students," Begin said.

In 16 credit hours at a total cost of about \$1,100, students can learn "the theory and practice of audio production and

post-production," according to the DACC website.

The new hardware and software that are part of CMT's audio program are "very cutting edge," said Begin, who has an audio engineering degree from Ithaca College and has worked for more than a

dozen years in the field. He is also a musician and composer.

With audio and particularly music as his long-time vocation and even longer-time avocation, Begin is keenly aware that sound is a vital but often overlooked com-

ponent in many creative endeavors, including movies, television shows and commercials, music videos and game design.

In the pie that is creative media, Begin said, sound is "the small piece that's often missing. Sound in film is the last thing to be thought of and it's the first thing you will notice if it's wrong," he said.

And yet, nothing points out an amateur production more quickly or more certainly than poor sound quality, said DACC Arts Department professor Lamaia Vaughn.

In addition to gaining the credentials to work in a creative industry that pays well, Begin said "all of my students have had a lot of fun in these courses. The kids that I work with have so much determination and talent."

"There's a lot of talent

in Las Cruces, a large artist population," Vaughn said. "It becomes very evident in our classrooms."

The audio program is just one way CMT has been able to successfully "cross pollinate" with the Creative Media Institute (CMI) on New Mexico State University's main campus, Begin said, with the programs working together to prepare students to work in all aspects of filmmaking and other creative media, including animation.

CMT classes are taught on DACC's East Mesa campus, 2800 Sonoma Ranch Blvd. Audio courses will be available during the spring 2020 semester.

# New business manages pain through science, mind

Aaron Villarreal opened Hygia Pain Institute in Las Cruces last April to provide non-surgical pain management that includes science, technology and even meditation.

Villarreal is a nurse anesthetist and a graduate of the Advanced Pain Management Fellowship at Texas Christian University. That makes him one of only about 50 practitioners in the nation with that background, he said. He also belongs to the nonprofit U.S. Pain Foundation, which was created by people with chronic pain issues.

After graduating from TCU in 2018, Villarreal said he wanted to locate his business in a rural, underserved area where he could “make an impact on the community.” He chose Las Cruces, opening Hygia in suite No. 4 at 3851 E. Lohman Ave., in the complex just east of Jason’s Deli.

“Since we’ve opened, we’ve done a lot of good things,” Villarreal said. The key, he said, is to “get to the root cause” of pain, which might be organ-, nerve- or cancer-related, as well as post-operative or caused by an injury, psychological factors or some unknown cause. Villarreal said pain can man-

ifest in a specific area of the body, like a headache or migraine, backache, muscle or joint (including arthritis) pain, or it may be widespread.

Villarreal uses a variety of treatments to help his patients, including injections, patches, radiofrequency treatment, nerve blockers and even mindfulness meditation. He may also recommend water therapy and/or changes in a patient’s diet.

In addition to examination rooms and a meditation area, Hygia includes a state-of-the-art fluoroscopy suite for “image-guided interventional procedures,” he said.

A physical assessment is the first step to get the right diagnosis and treatment plan for each patient, Villarreal said, including the patient’s age, personal habits,

clinical diagnosis, psychological factors and social environment. The psychosocial assessment can be critical to effective treatment, he said, because traumatic life experiences, stress, anxiety, depression and other behavioral health issues can cause or contribute to pain.

Each patient’s treatment plan is “tailor-made,” he said, and often involves Villarreal working with other healthcare providers, including primary-care doctors, physical therapists, chiropractors and surgeons.

Villarreal said he accepts most insurance and can work out a payment plan for patients without coverage. “Not having insurance is no reason to be in pain,” he said.

“When I first saw him, I was crying because it hurt. I had a lot of pain,” said Heather Dawson, who first consulted Villarreal in late 2019 because of severe rheumatoid arthritis, fibromyalgia and other pain issues.

Dawson had to give up her career as a nurse because of her health issues, she said. “That broke my heart. I’ve been disabled since 2015,” she said. “All this time I’ve been trying to find a provider who would listen to me. Aaron is a miracle worker. It was just night and day. I haven’t felt like

this in years,” Dawson said. “He will literally look you in the eye and talk to you and he will make notes about everything you’re talking about. It took me five years to get to this point. It’s all because of him.”

In addition to the pain treatment he provided, Dawson said Villarreal was able to get her an appointment with a rheumatologist in El Paso, who also assisted in her treatment.

“Mrs. Dawson is an extremely rare and unique case,” Villarreal said. “We first came up with a scientific-based approach to decrease the Dilaudid (pain reliever) intake using medications to decrease the chances of withdrawal symptoms and eliminate the opioid-induced hyperalgesia (increased sensitivity to pain). Once this was accomplished, we treated her pain with an opioid agonist/antagonist which has giving her great pain relief.”

“She was very motivated on getting well,” Villarreal said about Dawson. “Her outcome has been tremendous. This is what I went to school for. She’s been such a rewarding experience,” he said.

## TV’s ‘Golden Age’ predicted by economists

Critics have designated the recent past as the new Golden Age of Television. The list of recent great TV shows is long, starting with the “Sopranos” continuing with “Break-

ing Bad,” “Mad Men,” and going on to “Game of Thrones” and “The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel.” Add to this list “Walking Dead,” “Stranger Things,” “Fringe” and “Arrow” well, there is something great for everyone.

Interestingly, the emergence of really good TV was all predicted by economists way back in the 1970s. Back then, cable TV was an unrealized technology. Over-the-air television was highly regulated by the FCC. Most people watched only three or four channels.

During the 1960s and ‘70s, it was generally acknowledged that TV was bad. Even though there were only three channels, so much less air to fill, much of what was on those three channels was not very good. Newton Minow, the chair of the FCC, described TV as a “vast wasteland,” because of its lack of redeeming content.

It was, in fact, the shortage of channels that explains the bad TV. Because network programming was paid for by advertising, the goal was gathering as many eye-

balls as possible to watch. Because of the limited number of channels, the way to do this was to provide programming that appealed to the widest possible audience.

The corollary to this was that TV had to be pabulum — offering no offense to anyone — thereby being bland and uninteresting.

A show like “Get Smart” was critically acclaimed, while “Gilligan’s Island” was panned. But if you watch either of these shows today, neither really holds up well. Both relied on jokes that were stale even then.

The question for economists was whether the move from limited channel, over-the-air to multi-channel cable TV would be a positive or a negative for TV watchers. Would more channels mean just a yet-vaster wasteland or would it mean more quality?

What economists predicted, especially Michael Spence, who would later win the Nobel Prize, is that as the number of channels increased, the way to attract eyeballs would change from appealing to the masses to offering programming better tuned to the eclectic tastes of individual viewers.

Rather than one bland program attracting mil-

# Recent reports confirm ‘Why we’re right’

I am constantly reading reports – national, state, and local best practices, case studies, and recommendations on interventions and approaches relative to workforce development. Many of these reports inform our work. Others confirm it.

Where College Graduates Gather, Prosperity Rises, an article and report by economist Dr. William Yu at the University of California, Los Angeles, discussed the

impact of educational attainment on local economies.

“Economists consider human capital calculations strong indicators of economic prosperity,” Wu writes. “Regions

where the population’s skills and knowledge are high – places high in human capital – typically have the highest average incomes, GDP growth and business innovation. Lower human capital areas report more need for public assistance, lower consumer spending and lower productivity. Today’s popular places for highly educated people, especially places that attract younger college graduates, are likely to become the nation’s most prosperous economies in the future.”

Wu found New Mexico ranked in the top seven states showing population gains in well-educated 25- to 34-year-olds. The key for Doña Ana County is to continue not just graduating more high school,

college and university students, but employing and retaining them in the key industries vital to our economic growth.

This is the foundational premise of the groundbreaking workforce development plan from The Bridge of Southern New Mexico and our mission-aligned Workforce Talent Collaborative:

- Education is key to building talent.
- Talent is the key to economic development.
- Economic development is the key to job growth.
- Job growth fuels regional prosperity and a vibrant, thriving community for all.

Part of this overarching work includes an intentional focus on supporting educational outcomes for single parents. In our county, 7,000 families are single-parent families. More than half (56 percent) of our single mothers live in poverty, which means their children live in poverty (69 percent of children under 6 years of age).

Why is this group so important?

The Center on Equity in Higher Education’s report, Investing in Single Mothers’ Higher Education in New Mexico: Costs and Benefits to Individuals, Families, and Society, tells us why.

Single mothers (26 percent of New Mexico college students) who graduate with associate’s or bachelor’s degrees:

Are 35 percent and 59 percent less likely to live in poverty than high school graduates.

Earn \$366,614 to \$607,084 more over their lifetime than high school graduates.

Save New Mexico \$26,842 and \$43,711 in lifetime public assistance.

Contribute \$105,138 and \$202,685 more in lifetime taxes than high school graduates.

Recommendations for supporting their success include:

- Making quality childcare accessible and affordable for student parents, increasing funding for childcare for college students, removing barriers to students’ eligibility for state childcare assistance and incentiv-

izing greater collaboration between the early and higher education systems.

• Investing in supportive services at the college level — affordable, campus-based childcare services, holistic case management and programs that target support and information to students with children.

• Removing obstacles to single mothers’ educational progress in college policies, such as allowing makeups for absences due to child illness and building campus environments that embrace and acknowledge student families.

• Informing students that childcare is an allowable college expense that can be considered in calculating financial aid and assist them in applying for the dependent care allowance.

• Leveraging federal programs, such as TANF, SNAP Education & Training, Head Start and the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, to support parents with low incomes to pursue higher education.

• Collecting and reporting data on students’ parental status and educational outcomes to inform the design and implementation of interventions.

I continue to be blown away by the passion, commitment and wisdom of the leaders of this community who instinctively knew long before these reports showed us “why” that what we were doing was the right thing to do, and we are in the trenches working on priorities even now.

Every member of our workforce continuum has a critical and specific role to play. By working together and leveraging our collective resources, we can and will change the economic future for the county and boost the economic futures of those who live here.

lions of viewers, the strategy would be to offer 100 programs, each appealing to a particular slice of the audience. More viewers in the aggregate, but programming not having to appeal to everyone could be more interesting, at least for a subset of viewers.

Economists refer to this as product differenti-

ation, meaning that each product — while similar to that of any given competitor — differs in some features so as to be more tailored to the tastes of individual consumers. This is both more profitable for producers and more enjoyable for viewers.

Economists’ successful prediction of the new “Golden Age of Television” illustrates what economists do best,

which is to study the effect of changes in market institutions. Massively multiplying the number of channels meant better TV — not an extension of the “vast wasteland.”

While all this seems obvious now, it was not so in the 1970s when new rules regulating cable were being developed. Work by economists back then helped to develop the rules, making for better TV today. Now if we

can just come up with a way to predict the next recession.

# Henry and Harris out for season

## BULLETIN REPORT

NMSU Head Basketball Coach Chris Jans has announced that senior guard Clayton Henry will miss the remainder of the 2019-20 season due to a broken bone in his hand, while senior guard AJ Harris will be out indefinitely with an ankle injury.

Henry, who made his season debut in the Aggies' 2019-20 non-conference home win over Northern New Mexico on Dec. 29, sustained

his injury at the Aggies' practice on Dec. 31, 2019. In one game this season, Henry finished with eight points, four rebounds and two assists.

Harris, who sat out the Aggies' first 14 games of the season while recovering from a broken finger, sustained an ankle injury in the first half of his team's WAC opener at California Baptist on Jan. 4. In his three games so far this season, Harris was averaging 6.7 points, 0.7 rebounds and 3.7 assists in 15.0 minutes per game.

These computer rankings from MaxPreps.com are based on game results from the current season only. Specifically, they take into account three criteria:

- Ratio of wins to losses
- The relative quality of wins based on opponent's rating
- The overall strength of a team's schedule.

### What do these rankings mean?

If the state tournament were tomorrow,

Volcano Vista and Eldorado would be bracketed to meet in the semifinals, as would Las Cruces and Cleveland.

These ratings are used to establish tournament brackets by the New Mexico Activities Association.

But there is still a lot of season left to play. Only the first half of the season is completed, and district play has begun.

### Movement:

#1 Volcano Vista lost its first game of the season to #2 Cleveland (47-48), so look for

them to change place.

Cleveland jumped from #3 to #2 and should go to #1 with their one-point win over Volcano Vista.

Eldorado went from #6 to #4, leapfrogging Capital of Santa Fe, despite both teams winning a game.

### District Play

Las Cruces dropped from second to third in the state despite a win over #19 Gadsden (84-56), and #26 Deming (70-41).

The outcome of their home game against the Centennial Hawks won't affect their state

ranking much, but it will be key to their winning the District A championship.

Oñate dropped from fourth to sixth with its upset loss to district rival Centennial (51-68).

Deming dropped from 24th to 26th with its losses to Silver City and #3 Las Cruces (41-70).

Centennial became the team to watch in district 3A, beating two of the top three teams in district.

Their ranking could improve dramatically, depending on the outcome of their game against Las Cruces.

# Dan Jenkins: A golf writer without parallel

Dan Jenkins may not be a household name to many younger golfers today, but he was arguably the best golf writer ever. Famed TV interviewer Larry King called Jenkins “the quintessential Sports Illustrated writer and the best sports-writer in America.”

Jenkins died March 7, 2019. He was 89.

Jenkins grew up in Ft. Worth, Texas, and graduated from Texas Christian University, where he was captain of the TCU golf team. In addition to numerous newspapers and magazines, Jenkins worked as a senior writer for Sports Illustrated (SI), writing more than 500 articles up until 1985. Jenkins also contributed hundreds of stories and articles for Golf Digest.

Yet, he may be best known for his 20 books, three of which were turned into movies: “Semi-Tough” (starring the late Burt Reynolds), “Dead Solid Perfect” (Randy Quaid), and “Life Its Ownself.” But if you want to get the best sense of Dan Jenkins classic, inimitable writing talent, as well as find yourself laughing non-stop for hours, buy a copy of Dogged Victims of Inexorable Fate, an anthology of amazing stories, first published in 1970.

In his articles and books, Jenkins made a habit of skewering celebrities, especially

professional golfers. After SI, Jenkins wrote monthly articles for Golf Digest for 30 years. Fellow Golf Digest staffer Cliff Schrock, stated “Anyone who got zinged by Dan ... deserved it.”

But on one occasion, Jenkins attempt at zinging humor backfired. In December of 2014, Jenkins published an article in Golf Digest titled “My (Fake) interview with Tiger; or how it plays out in my mind.”

The piece featured images of a Tiger Woods lookalike in golfing gear, while during an imaginary interview with Tiger, Jenkins mocks Woods’ aloof and arrogant behavior and reputation.

Although the piece was clearly identified as a parody, the real Tiger Woods demanded an apology from the magazine. Woods felt Jenkins’ writing “fails as a parody, and is really more like a grudge-fu-



eled piece of character assassination.”

I read it twice, and Tiger reacted as if the fire hydrant didn’t exist and he was above Dan Jenkins’ zings. Nobody was.

Not only was Dan Jenkins the best golf writer, he was the most prolific, covering 230 professional golf men’s majors, including the Masters in Augusta for 68 years!

Schrock, who used to edit and arrange Jenkins’ articles, made the important observation that Jenkins “spanned golf from rudimentary tour days of vagabond pros trying to scratch out a living while also holding a club pro job to the megabucks players today who really have

little understanding of how the old days were.

Dan always made the point that golf heritage was foreign to today’s tour players. Their pampered lifestyle today dulls the senses to realizing the rough-and-tumble way it used to be to earn a living as a tournament player.”

That having been said, Jenkins, his own-

self, covered Hogan and Nelson, Palmer and Nicklaus, in the day when there were no posh media perks or amenities for golf writers and reporters.

While I personally admired Dan Jenkins greatly, I did not agree with one of his writing beliefs, which was his practice of favoring the iconic name or legend over the common, unheralded golfer who had a brief shining moment as a tournament champion.

In Schrock’s words, “Jenkins loved it when the marquee player won, since it would generate greater readership.”

I wanted unknown Mike Donald to beat

Hale Irwin in the 1990 U.S. Open, but Irwin’s unlikely 60-foot putt sealed it, followed by a victory trot around the green.

“He (Jenkins) did not get as enthused when the lesser-known player won, who would not be of any great consequence in the history books and ruined a great storyline,” Schrock said.

Dan Jenkins was introduced into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2012, as only the third golf writer to be awarded that honor.
