

Revitalizing Las Cruces: from downtown to the airport

It's less than 10 miles from downtown to the Las Cruces International Airport. But, while one is a picture of vibrant growth and activity, the other is "a fairly blank canvas," to quote Airport Administrator Andy Hume, who may be the single most important asset the two entities have in common.

As the city's long-time downtown coordinator. Hume oversaw the revitalization of that one-half mile stretch of business and recreation that is again the heart of Las Cruces. He became interim administrator of the 2,200-acre airport in early 2018 and then accepted the permanent appointment a few months later.

After the Plaza de Las Cruces opened and the conversion of Church and Water streets back to two-way traffic neared completion, Hume was looking for a new challenge. "I jumped at it," he said, when the airport administrator position came open. "I've always loved aviation," he said, and "the opportunity

to learn how to run an airport" - especially the one in Las Cruces - provided him with a unique set of challenges that he couldn't pass up.

Hume, who began his 19th year with the city in October, saw a chance to take what he'd learned from and brought to downtown redevelopment and apply it in a very different venue.

In the center of Las Cruces, the revival of downtown had been in the works in one form or another for many years before Hume took over. But, lying on the far western edge of the city, the airport has stayed mostly out of sight and out of mind, "chronically neglected" as a resource for investment and economic development since the

city took it over from the federal government in the mid-1950s.

Not anymore.

"We're turning this place around," Hume said. With the citv's master plan in mind, Hume sees "five or six big projects per year out here" going forward. To paraphrase an old Mastercard commercial. they include everything from lengthening two runways to make the airport a better option for larger planes and "a viable secondary landing site for Spaceport" – cost: about \$12 million; transforming the airport "back to a place where people want to be" – priceless.

"The best thing that attracts people to a location is other people," Hume said, citing a lesson he learned as downtown coordinator. The "Wings & Wheels Fest" and the High Desert Fly-In that brought large crowds to the airport earlier this month were "a solid step in the right direction," he said. "We've got to get Las Cruces reacquainted with the airport, just like we did with downtown."

You used to see kids hanging on the airport fence watching planes

take off and land. Hume said. It was home to a restaurant until about 10 years ago and has welcomed several commercial air service providers over the years.

Hume sees his greatest opportunity and foremost challenge is putting the airport back into the Las Cruces vocabulary and making it a popular destination for locals and visitors. To do that, he needs to improve airport infrastructure, expand hangar development, build partnerships and find investors.


"The challenge is exciting," Hume said. "We have a diamond in the rough."

Hume is part of a five-member staff at the airport, which he called "an amazing team. We punch above our weight

class," he said. The staff includes administrative assistant Lori Romero and three operation and maintenance technicians: Josh Garcia (senior), Sammy Garcia and Cody Sedillos.

The airport is home to approximately 130 based aircrafts, including single- and twinengine places, a Native Air ambulance and four Army National Guard helicopters. There's also a repair shop, an aircraft upholstery shop, a fuel farm, Civil Air Patrol, Chapter 555 of the Experimental Aircraft Association, fixed-base operators Francis Aviation and Southwest Aviation, a New Mexico State University Physical Sciences Laboratory han-

gar and Frost Aviation flight school and Las Cruces Aviators flight club.

"We're pretty full," Hume said, and that's why adding more hangars is a vital part of airport growth. Fortunately, past city leaders recognized that the airport would need to grow, so the city bought up the land that surrounds it.

The airport undergoes a vigorous FAA inspection every year, Hume said. This year, it reduced the number of discrepancies it was cited for to six, he said, and the goal for 2020 is zero.

Hume said the city is developing a contract to conduct an assessment to determine if bringing commercial air service back to Las Cruces is economically feasible. The study will look at things like the volume of local passengers not currently being served, charter flights, corporate travel, the need for a regional air-

line to connect to larger carriers and the convenience of having TSA (security) and bag-check service in a smaller airport like Las Cruces.

If Las Cruces becomes a center of film and television production, the airport could become an important hub for connecting those industries with local locations, Hume said, noting that Clint Eastwood flew in and out of the Las Cruces airport a number of times while making "The Mule."

Revitalizing downtown became a clear goal for city administration, Hume said.

"That's what we need here," he said. "Downtown has champions; the airport needs champions."

The run is unique because it will take place on airport land that is part of restricted airspace.



Las Cruces NASA iTech event features technology innovators

On Oct. 7 and 8, the NASA Space Technology Mission Directorate held an iTech Cycle II Forum at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces. Program Executive Kira Blackwell said NASA iTech is an innovation incubator created to search for and identify cutting-edge technologies being developed to solve problems on Earth.

Local citizens/participants were invited to listen to finalist presentations during the event and help make the final decision by narrowing the finalists down from 10 to three during the event. Focus areas of the cycle include improvements to energy storage density; radiation – protection, mitigation and hardware; power efficient technologies; medical breakthroughs; and xfactor innovations.

Luis Morales with his company H-Trap One was one of the 10 finalists presenting at the event. Morales said even though NASA does not provide a financial reward to the top companies, what they do offer is more valuable. H-Trap One LLC is working on an innovative coating that enables safe, novel and low-cost solutions to protect hydrogen pipeline infrastructure.

"iTech has two applications: space and earth," Morales said. "We are looking to solve some challenge here and one of the main issues we have is our access to resources. We have a very small company, a start-up, so access to facilities, to labs, to people with resources, can make our vision a reality."

During the announcement of the three winning companies, Blackwell said it is an accomplishment to make it to the top 10 list at all.

Harry Partridge with NASA's Ames Research Center announced the three winners:

• OXOS Medical Inc. based in Atlanta, Ga. Is working on a digital, handheld X-ray and fluoroscopy device that runs on standard power, minimizes radiation exposure and is easy to operate.

• Everix Inc. based in Orlando, Fla. Is working on an ultra-thin, flexible and shatter-free optical filters thermally drawn at scale.

• Alertgy is developing a wearable, continuous blood glucose monitor that provides accurate measurements without invasive probes or sensors.

VOTING 2019 Ranked choice: Just mind your rows and columns

as Crucens have expressed hesitancy, trepidation and confusion about ranked-choice voting and our 10 mayoral candidates.

minutes. That includes my making a mistake bad enough the presiding judge said I needed to spoil my ballot. I gave my name, got my ballot, marked some votes, screwed up, spoiled my ballot following the official procedures, got a new ballot, filled it out, fed it into the machine and got my "I Voted" sticker all in seven minutes.

Granted, I went into the polling place knowing what I was going to do. I had familiarized myself with the candidates, the issues and the questions. That did not stop me, however, from making a logistical error.

Here's how to avoid the mistake I made.

When doing ranked-choice voting for the 10 mayoral candidates, and the other city council candidates, you'll see the number rankings in columns from 1 to 10 going left to right on your ballot. The candidates' names are below, going from top to bottom, creating a grid.

I recommend making marks using the numerical columns, not the candidates' rows. Look at First Choice No. 1, and slide your finger down until it's on the row of your candidate. Then mark the oval. Then look at Second Choice No. 2, and slide your finger down until it's on the row of that candidate, and so on.

My mistake was putting the name on the candidate and then looking at the numerical column. This meant I was doing things out of order. And that's how I wound up with two different candidates as my fourth choice. But if you go number by number, as I did the second time, it is clearer and simpler.

I also learned something I didn't know before. If you are physically unable to walk into the government center, but can get to the government center parking lot in a vehicle, you can still vote.

If you need this "curbside voting" service, you can call the county clerk's office ahead of time. Drive to the designated spot and two poll workers – one Democrat and one Republican, to ensure nonpartisanship – will come out and give you the paperwork, and wait while you fill out your ballot. Then they'll take the ballot back.

Also, a reminder you can vote early now through Nov. 2. Early voting began Nov. 8 at the Doña Ana County Government Center. Beginning Oct. 19, early voting will expand to alternate sites and include Saturday voting.

Vote yes on DACC GO Bond

Many of you won't have to sort out the mayoral candidates, because you don't live in the city. But you still need to go vote, because there are several other things on this combined ballot. There are school board candidates to choose from, a mill levy for the Las Cruces Public Schools, as well as representatives for the Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation District.

Another important question on the ballot is a \$16 million general obligation bond to benefit Doña Ana Community College. This bond is a continuation, so it will not increase your taxes.

However, it will provide funding for several key projects at both DACC campuses in Las Cruces, the Workforce Development Center, and DACC campuses in Anthony, Chaparral and Sunland Park.

Following are among the projects the bond will support:

• A Creative Media Technology building in the Arrowhead Research Park. • Security and safety upgrades.

• Infrastructure improvements.

• IT upgrades and equipment acquisition.

• Gadsden Advanced Technology Center.

The film industry's growing importance to New Mexico, and increasingly to our area, makes the Creative Media building, and the budding film and creative campus at Arrowhead Park, a wonderful addition to local education opportunities.

DACC's impact to our region is huge, and this bond keeps that going. Often, for people who live in Anthony, Chaparral and Sunland Park, the drive to Las Cruces can be a huge financial and situational obstacle, making it unrealistic to attend New Mexico State University.

That's the whole theory behind community colleges, and why they work.

The DACC branches and their availability in those communities have literally saved lives and advanced careers, particularly for those who haven't pursued the traditional routes.

This bond will also take care of basic functions, such as safety and infrastructure, needed simply to keep the doors open.

Let's keep the value of DACC strong to our citizens, and vote for the bond issue.

GUEST COLUMN County commission should say yes to PACE

The County Commission should say yes to the creation of a Renewable Energy Financing District (REFD) so solar energy can be available to all property owners, not just the rich. PACE, or Property Assessed Clean Energy, does just that, makes solar energy available.

New Mexico is third in the entire nation when it comes to the clean energy of the sun. The price of solar has been dropping for years and is now less expensive than buying electricity from a utility. Let's face it, we're all going to pay for electricity. Why not pay for a solar system that costs less than what you will save on your current electric bill every month and then pays a bonus at the end when the system is paid off? Once the system is paid off, you get the electricity for free for as long as the system lasts. PACE loans made available under a Renewable Energy Financing District, are for 20 years or less, and the average solar system lasts 30 years or more. Imagine generating your own electricity for free for 10 vears!

Instead of paying a big electric bill, the PACE loan helps a homeowner purchase a solar system of their own by paying off the loan in monthly payments via their property tax bill. But, the program must be sponsored by a county, local, or municipal government. It is completely voluntary, and it only gets approved if it will lower the homeowner's overall utility cost.

Why are PACE loans inexpensive? Because the loan takes a primary property lien position next in line only to your property taxes. That is what makes PACE very attractive to lenders. It is so attractive that they will give a low interest rate in return. All PACE lenders must be authorized by the New Mexico Department of Finance. Banks can become PACE lenders but banks tend to not like PACE programs

because they don't want their mortgage loans taking the back seat, or secondary lien, when it comes to collection. Utility companies don't like PACE programs either because if you own your own system you don't buy electricity from them.

PACE projects are not 100 percent fail safe; nothing is. But, because PACE is sponsored by a government under a Renewable Energy Financing District, added protections can be included that make buying under a PACE program safer than

GUEST COLUMN Consumer protections needed in PACE proposal

A solar salesperson knocks on your door. Many of you have had this happen. But now he is telling you he can install solar panels at no up-front cost. Just sign this application and we will take care of the rest. You will be billed through your property taxes. You'll save money. This will be a result of a proposed Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Loan program being considered by the Doña Ana County Commission Oct. 22. This sounds like a great idea.

I'm here to tell you it is not such a good idea, and the reason why a coalition of business groups strongly oppose PACE.

You are not being told this type of loan supersedes any other loan on your home, including your mortgage, home equity line of credit, or any other traditional debt against your property. These types of loans are prohibited by most mortgage lenders and, once you have recorded a PACE loan, the unintended consequences may take effect. You would be unable to refinance or make another kind of loan on your home. If you want to sell your home, you would likely be limited to cash buyers, as lenders will not issue loans on homes with an outstanding PACE loan.

For the first six years of your PACE loan, you do not own the solar panels. You only own the energy generated. This means you will not have access to federal tax credits or be able to item-



without such a program. Some of those safeguards include: 1) a complete explanation of what a property owner would be buying and what it will cost; 2) contract language in English and Spanish; 3) the right to change your mind within three days of signing the contract; 4) review of the proposed project and terms of the contract by an independent third party; 5) approval criteria designed to protect property owners from exploitation by unscrupulous venders. Property owners can have a high degree of confidence that they will be better off financially if they choose to participate.

PACE is needed in Doña Ana County and it only happens if the county commission votes yes. PACE is good for the people of Doña Ana County. What's good for the people of Doña Ana County is good for all of Dona Aña County.

ize depreciation on the panels. That belongs to the PACE lender. You now have a 20-year loan at a 6-percent interest rate. By the time your loan is paid, what shape will your panels be in? Will they still perform like they used to? Have they depreciated their value? Did you really save any money?

These are possible consequences should this proposition pass. Defaulting on a PACE loan would be the same as a delinquency in property taxes, meaning you can lose your home.

The PACE proposal in its current form has no consumer protections: meaning that solar salesman does not have to inform you this loan takes first lien position. They do not have to disclose how much you are paying over a 20-year period. No disclosure of administrative costs added to your loan. No credit check or income verification: they will lend to anyone with a home in their name. Currently in our county there are at least 12 options for solar financing, many with low fees and reasonable interest rates. There is no need for a government loan for solar and especially no





El Caldito Soup Kitchen passes two million served, keeps going strong

A few months ago, El Caldito Soup Kitchen surpassed two million meals served to homeless, hungry and needy clients since it was established in 1984.

A part of the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) complex at 999 W. Amador Ave. in Las Cruces, El Caldito serves meals 11 a.m.-2 p.m. every day of the year, said Gabe Anaya, a soup kitchen volunteer for the past 21 years who is now in his third year as the El Caldito board president. He said the soup kitchen averages about 200 people served

each weekday and a few less on Saturdays and Sundays.

El Caldito relied entirely on volunteers from the time it opened in 1984 until three years ago when it hired its first fulltime manager, said board Vice President Richard Lohmeyer. It added a second manager last year but continues heavy reliance on volunteers to help prepare and serve meals, wash dishes, pick up food donations and fundraise.

Lohmeyer said El

Caldito averages about 500 volunteers a month, including some individuals or group members who volunteer once a month or once a week and others who are on site several days every week throughout the year.

"I don't turn away any volunteer," Lohmeyer said.

El Caldito's cadre of volunteers includes two professional chefs, along with many local retirees and New Mexico State University students. Anyone is welcome to volunteer any amount of time he or she has available at the soup kitchen.

"People who work here are absolutely dedicated," Lohmever said. "They love serving other people."

In a story from Anaya's spring 2019 newsletter, one client "has been coming to El Caldito for years. She brings her two grandmothers and her two daughters when they are not in school. As a single mother and the sole caregiver of her grandparents, she is grateful for the soup kitchen and the lunch it provides her family. When her girls are in school, she can take home some extra fruit, bread and other treats that may be offered. "The staff and volunteers make us feel like family," the client said in the newsletter.

The soup kitchen receives food donations from about a dozen local stores and restaurants on a regular basis, Anaya said, and has a van to make daily pickups.

The success of El Caldito is "a community effort," Lohmeyer said. "It takes everybody in the community to make it run."

Including those struggling with homelessness, low-income families and others in need, "nobody is turned away" from receiving a free meal at El Caldito, Lohmeyer said.

El Caldito welcomes donations, including paper goods like cups, plates, napkins, utensils and to-go containers, said Volunteer Coordinator/ Kitchen Administrator





Combined election ballot, ranked-choice voting saves time, money

Doña Ana County Clerk Amanda Lopez-Askin reminded Las Cruces residents that ranked-choice voting will be in place in the mayor's race and races for two seats on the city council. This will allow voters to choose a mayor and city councilors and to participate in an instant runoff election at the same time.

This will be the first time the City of Las Cruces will use a rankedchoice voting system in a city election. It will be in place in the 10-candidate mayor's race and the races for two seats on the city council - District 2, which has four candidates, and District 4, which has three candidates. There will not be rankedvoice voting but a simple choice between two candidates in the races for the District 1 seat on the city council and for presiding municipal judge.

In the ranked-choice races, the candidate with the lowest number of votes is eliminated after the first round of voting. The votes on that

candidate's ballot for second, third and additional candidates are then redistributed to the other candidates in round two of voting and the process continues until one candidate in each race has 50 percent plus one vote and is declared the winner.

Ranked-choice voting likely will save the city and county \$80,000-\$100,000 because it eliminates the need for a run-off election. Lopez-Askin said at a news conference she held with Chief Deputy County Clerk Lindsey Bachman Oct. 7 at city hall to talk about ranked-choice voting.

At the news conference, Lopez-Askin said:

 Voters can vote at any alternate early voting locations Oct. 8-Nov. 2 and at any of the 40 locations that will be open on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 5.

• Any ranking of a candidate is a show of support for that candidate, no matter where he or she is ranked on the ballot.

• If a ballot is correctly filled out, voting machines will make a sound which Lopez-Asking called "the

ring of democracy." If there is an error such as a skipped ranking or an overvote (first-choice votes cast for two candidates, for example), the machine will make a different sound and indicate an error. The voter can then choose to get the ballot back and go through the "spoiled ballot" process with the presiding precinct judge at the voting location to get a new ballot or can opt to cast the ballot anyway.

The computer will start with the first eligible vote it finds on the ballot if there is a skipped ranking. It will not count an over-vote because there is no way to determine a voter's actual choice.

"We're excited about this election." said Lopez-Askin. Her office is fully staffed for the election, she said, which likely will include 200-250 fulland part-time employees on election day, when there will be 40 voting locations open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. throughout the county.



Click on "Find My Registration & Election Information," which will show you your voter registration information. including which voting districts you are in; link you to an application for an absentee ballot, give vou contact information for the Doña Ana County Clerk's office : and show you your 2019 combined local elections sample ballot. Once you click on the "Find My Registration" box, you will be asked to provide your first and last name, date of birth and county of residence and to confirm that you're not a robot. Then, your sample ballot will come up.

If you live in the City of Las Cruces, the first page of the sample ballot will show the 10-candidate race for mayor. The back side of the sample ballot will include the citywide race for presiding municipal judge and possibly, a city council race. City council districts on the ballot in 2019 are districts 1, 2 and 4. If you live in district 3, 5 or 6, you

Is the Pain In Your Head? Part 2

Last week, we talked about the role that the brain plays in pain - the big take-away from that article is that it's very difficult to quantify how much pain a person has, because the brain plays such a big role in interpreting the message.

This week, I want to expand on those ideas a bit. There are some other things happening 'in your head' that may be contributing to your pain. Psychological factors, such as anxiety or depression can actually make your pain worse. If you are completely focused on your pain and on your injury, your pain level is likely to be higher. If you have back pain, for example, and your thoughts include: "there's no way that I can stand this -I'll never get better," you're more likely to have elevated pain than if you're thinking "this back pain is a problem, but I can find some ways to manage when it gets bad, and there will be more good days than bad."

MRIs, X-rays, and CT scans provide one piece of information, but they don't tell the whole story about your problem. In one study performed on people 60 years or older who had no symptoms of low back pain found that 36% had a herniated disc. 21% had spinal stenosis, and more than 90% had a degenerated or bulging disc, upon diagnostic imaging. This tells us that people who have 'problems' in their back may not experience pain, and conversely, positive diagnostic findings in people who have pain symptoms may not be the full explanation for the pain that they're experiencing.

All of the things that I've talked about here have focused on what's happening in your head, which may be increasing your pain. Understanding pain through education can actually reduce your pain level and reduce your need for care. Several studies demonstrate



If you're in a stressful situation, or if your brain feels that you're in an unsafe environment, your brain may go into a self-protection mode. Remember, pain is a message generated by the brain to get your attention! If you feel stressed or unsafe, you may feel more pain.

Here's another thing that plays a big role with pain. Your awareness of diagnostic findings may actually increase your pain.



that people who are educated about pain report less pain and seek care for pain less frequently, and it's something that we see in our clinic all of the time. As we teach people about pain, their pain decreases.

In our next articles, we'll spend some time talking about the role that Physical Therapists play in addressing pain, and will also talk about some things that you can do to learn more.

won't vote in a Las Cruces City Council race, only for mayor and presiding judge.

Voting in the races for mayor and city council districts 2 and 4 will be by ranked choice. It and the races in city council districts 2 (four candidates) and 4 (three candidates) are by ranked choice. Because each has only two candidates, the races for city council District 1 and presiding municipal judge are not ranked choice; you simply vote for one of the two candidates in each race.

Also on the second page of the sample ballot are two seats on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education and three seats on the Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation District (DASWCD) Board of Su-

pervisors.

If you live in LCPS Board of Education districts 4 or 5, you will be able to vote in one of those school board races this year. If you live in LCPS districts 1, 2 or 3, you will not vote in this election for school board. Municipal races are also on the ballot for the voters who live in Hatch and Sunland Park. (Mesilla and Anthony, New Mexico are participating in the combined ballot, but moved their next elections to 2021.)

There are also school board races in the Gadsden Independent School District and Hatch Valley Public Schools. And, there are races for Caballo Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors, for Lower Rio Grande Public Water Works Authority board and for the Anthony Water and Sanitation Board.

Diane D'Ambrosio. It also needs salad dressings, mayonnaise, cooking sprays, salt, pepper, sugar and other spices and cheese. And, the soup kitchen hopes to get donations of turkeys for Thanksgiving and hams for Christmas, along with all the trimmings for holiday meals, including pies and cakes.

In addition to paying the salaries of its 2.5 employees, Anaya said El Caldito also pays utility bills and for maintenance and insurance. It's also hoping to raise money to begin replacing some of the equipment it's been using for more than 20 years, including a stove, refrigerator, washer/ dryer, icemaker and a

walk-in freezer. When it was founded 35 years ago, El Caldito offered a mid-day meal one day a week, according to the soup kitchen's website. The kitchen was relocated to its present facility on the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope campus in 1998. In early 2002, services were expanded to offering a hot mid-day meal Monday through Friday. The program was further enhanced in December 2002 to provide a carry-out sack lunch on Saturday. Then, in early 2010, a hot Sunday lunch was added.

LAS CRUCES UTILITIES Actively or passively, rain can be harvested

With all the recent rainfall, you might be fascinated to know you can capture the water falling in sheets to use later as irrigation water for your lawn and garden. What comes down doesn't all need to run down the vard, into the street and into stormwater drains. With some planning and small changes to your landscaping, you can guide the water around your yard and "bank" it in swales or capture it with a traditional rain barrel.

Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) models passive rainwater harvesting at

its administration building's Demonstration Garden at 680 N. Motel Blvd.

"Passive rainwater harvesting is modifying your landscaping to hold onto the water longer," explained Rhonda Diaz. LCU Water conservation program coordinator. "You build pathways for the rain to stick around instead of draining away, giving it a chance to really soak into the soil."

At LCU, there are berms - think long, small hills –



built into the soil of the **Demonstration Garden** to guide rainwater that comes off Motel Drive. Those berms direct the water into a holding pond to soak into the surrounding garden. The location is free and open to the public and also shows different plants, shrubs and trees that are drought-tolerant

and require less watering.

Las Cruces resident Dr. joni newcomer (sic) has a different setup at her home. She uses rain barrels to catch rainwater run-off from her roof making it an active rainwater harvesting system. Her barrels, placed strategically to not only capture the water but also to water different sections of her yard, have a top to make sure that mosquitoes don't make generations of families and a spout where she can attach a hose.

"Most people would be surprised to see how much rain accumulates in these barrels in one

storm," she said. "It's all water easily reused on your garden instead of it going through the city's system. It's perfectly good for your plants."

Rain barrels are available in the garden departments at home improvement stores including Walmart, Lowe's, or Home Depot. Each is constructed with a top and a spout for a onetime investment of \$70 to \$100.

Wind Turbines Are Your Friends

Many of us have heard the caution that a little bit of information is a dangerous thing. That is surely true in connection with *The Truth About Wind Turbines*, by Patrick Lyons, in the August 9th issue of the Las Cruces Bulletin.

Today, it seems much of what is written is intended to shape opinions regardless of the underlying facts.

Mr. Lyons states that wind provides only 14% of electricity in NM, and millions more turbines are needed to keep up with demand. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration: wind provides 19%, solar 4%, natural gas 35%, and coal 41%. The turbines already under construction in NM will increase wind generated electricity by 84%, surpassing the State's 2020 renewable portfolio goal of 20%.

Mr. Lyons's claim that wind is not reliable, not totally renewable, and more expensive [than other sources] is unsubstantiated. After setting aside the speculation and imprecise information, common sense economic decisions tell the true story. Most public utilities seek the lowest cost of electricity among all generating sources. Public regulatory commissions arbitrate on behalf of ratepayers to obtain the lowest long-term cost of electricity. Frequently, wind farms win bids over natural gas facilities. Public utilities aren't alone in selecting wind. A growing number of municipalities, universities, and private companies are following suit. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, as a result of huge efforts in both government and private industry, wind energy costs have been reduced to an average of under 3 cents per kilowatt-hour in the U.S. today.

Fossil fuel supporters maintain that natural gas is clean energy. However, Environment and Energy News reports that "Studies continue to pour in, showing that the EPA's decades-old method for estimating methane emissions from oil and gas facilities doesn't stand up to empirical data." The Environmental Defense Fund reports that "Methane pollution is not a new challenge for New Mexico. The state made national headlines when the European Space Agency's satellite data exposed a massive concentration over the Four Corners Region in 2014."

Implying inefficiency, Mr. Lyons notes that the manufacture and use of wind turbines consumes a variety of resources, for example energy, steel, and concrete. Detailed analysis by NREL, the National Renewable Energy Laboratory, shows that through the life cycle of a wind turbine, its greenhouse gas emissions are among the lowest of all energy sources. NREL's analysis indicates that "Coal's carbon footprint is almost 90 times larger than that of wind energy, and the footprint of natural gas is more than 40 times larger." Fifty separate studies have found that the average wind turbine, throughout its operational life, generates 20 times more energy than it took to produce. This level is favorable compared to fossil fuels, nuclear, and solar power.

Allow me to comment on some of Mr. Lyons' other assertions...

Lyons: "Regulators, scientists, lawmakers, and yes, our newspapers, must do a better job of educating the public about how our energy system works." Migliore: Agreed, that is my purpose today!

Lyons: "[wind turbine] ...issues affect families' electric bills, our national economy and our state budget. Migliore: I agree. Wind energy affects all these factors in a *positive way*.

Lyons: "Consumers deserve the full story, so here it is." **Migliore:** What Mr. Lyons presents is not the full story and somewhat misleading. I have tried to present a counterpoint.

Lyons: "Large wind turbines... needa lot of energy to operate, and that power comes from resources like natural gas." Migliore: False! Wind turbines remain idle, with controls and instruments consuming little energy until the wind reaches cut-in speed, at which time they extract a huge amount of energy from the wind.

 ${\rm Lyons:}$ "... wind turbine blades have built in heaters that ... could consume up to 20% of the electricity produced by the turbine.

Migliore: Grossly misleading! Consider a wind turbine with a maximum power output of 2,000 kW. It is January in North Dakota with icing anticipated. (Yes, the wind turbine knows this.) Wind speed is low, so the turbine is generating only 100 kW. The blade heaters, which are not typical of all wind turbines, require 20 kW. Indeed, the heaters consume 20% of the electricity produced under the worst circumstances. But they consume only 1-2% of average production.

Here is one of my least favorite charges against wind turbines, NOT attributable to Mr. Lyons: *wind turbines kill birds*.

The wind energy industry cares about this matter and has expended resources forming the American Wind Wildlife Institute. Keep in mind, however, bird kills from cats, vehicles, buildings, signs, hunting, and cellphone towers collectively are 10,000 times greater than those caused by wind turbines. In fact, the Audubon Society strongly supports properly sited wind power as a renewable energy source that helps reduce the threat posed to birds and people by climate change.

While debate will continue worldwide about energy infrastructure, support wind energy is generally accepted. It is based on cold, hard economic facts and in many situations it is the lowest cost of new electrical generation capacity and diversifies our nation's energy portfolio.

'Ága': a simple story set in flatness and ice

The problem with trying to write about "Ága" is the plot is so simple almost every description will be a spoiler.

Here is what I can say: An elderly Yakut couple live in a yurt in the far North. Their animalhide home looks warm and cozy. They are alone in their world; only a young man, Chena, visits occasionally. Their daughter, Ága, left years ago to escape the icy tundra and join the world of people.

But what is it about, this simple but complex story set in flatness and ice? The couple, Nanook (Mikhail Aprosimov) and Sedna (Feodosia Ivanova), choose to follow the traditions of their ancestors yet must find a way to forgive their

daughter. So much is left to the viewer, like determining why they must forgive Ága (Galina Tikhonova).

It is about forgiveness yes, but it is also about magic. It's a fairy tale, but not. It is about stories, and the way stories weave into reality. It is about the silence between a couple who are one and the space between stories. Nanook and Sedna work together, parallel and equivalent, knowing what they need and how to work like a well-oiled machine.

As the film progresses, hunting becomes limited as Nanook finds animals that have inexplicably died, and food has become scarce. The ice melts earlier every year, the world is changing. But the environmental message here is not overt, only a vehicle to pass along human truths. Or maybe it's a human story that is a vehicle to pass along environmental truths. This is the kind of dichotomy that prevails throughout the movie, constantly flipping elements on backs.

As in Sedna's dream where a child, turned polar bear, turned grown youth, draws her into a hole all the stars have fallen into, the viewer is drawn into the movie on a journey that is to be traveled, not explained. The cinematography is majestic and vast. The skies move with whiteness and the ground flows with snow. Sometimes the two mix. The specks that are people grow and shrink in the landscape, according the whim of Bulgarian director Milko Lazarov and cinematographer Kaloyan Bozhilov, who make the landscape a character in itself.

The language of this movie is as rare as the world depicted. Sakha (aka Yakut) is melodic but halting, deceptively simple, much like the film. Some 363,000 people speak it.

"Ága" is a movie of stillness and music; tears and fairy tales; dead rabbits and elusive reindeer. It is a movie to experience, not watch. It literally made my chest ache with the pain of it. PATIENCE DURING PROGRESS The American Dream lives with Neto Boys Car Wash

Editor's note: 34th in a series on businesses *impacted by Valley Drive* road reconstruction.

Ernesto Rosas remembers going to the car wash with his father when he was just 9. Now, after chasing the dream of his own full-service car wash, he's set up shop at 500 N. Valley Drive. If you're searching for a place to

wash your car, truck or even semi-truck, this is the place and the prices can't be beat.

At just 23 years of age, Rosas has been running Neto Boys Mobile Detailing at various locations, on Picacho Drive (next to JC Tortas) and on Solano Drive, for the past five years. The previous owner of the car wash reached out to him, and after some convincing, and helping the owner keep the books and run

operations, Rosas took over the Valley Drive location in September. In addition to fresh paint. bright flags and a big new sign, he's reduced selfwash prices from \$1.50 to \$1, which elicited excitement from regulars and those who have followed him here.

But he's been watching Valley Drive for more traffic. "I want to make improvements to the Vallev Drive self-service location, but I can only do that



when traffic increases, and the business makes more money," he said.

While the Neto Boys Car Wash is not directly adjacent to the current phase of the New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT) active road reconstruction, some of the new medians have made it more difficult for clients traveling south on Valley to reach his location at the corner of N. Vallev Dr. and W. Hadley Ave.

The car wash itself has a bay big enough for a semi-truck, but those trucks are advised to come eastbound on Hadlev to enter.

Rosas stays optimistic: "This has been my dream to have a self-service and

full-service car wash." he said. "We're hoping that people will come out to give us a chance."

Full-service car detailing is available by appointment at 575-520-7762 and runs anywhere from \$25 up, depending on the size of the vehicle. Check out full-service options, monthly plans, and book online at www.netoboys29.wixsite.com.

One final note: Winter hours begin Nov. 1 when the 500 N. Valley Drive location will be open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily.

In the meantime, the final phase of NMDOT active road reconstruction continues from Avenida de Mesilla to Amador Ave. As the contractor is installing new gas service lines on Valley, Aspen Road is closed; please utilize Sequoia Road as a detour. Contractors' work hours are 7 a.m-5 p.m. Monday-Friday; lane closures and traffic controls remain in place 24 hours a day, seven davs a week.

Sparking opportunity through college completion

When Governor Lujan-Grisham announced her Opportunity Scholarship proposal to help more New Mexicans complete college, it sparked dialogue not just in New Mexico but across the country.

Currently 24 states offer some variation of "free college" in different forms, most focusing on two-year degree completion, due to its impact on equipping graduates for the Grand Canyon-wide gap in the middle- and technical-skilled careers that have hollowed out the workforce nationwide.

As most in our community know, The Bridge of Southern New Mexico has also championed the value of both high school and college completion from the very beginning in 2009. Why?

Because it's not just an academic issue. It's a workforce issue. And it's an economic issue.

We know that those who obtain college-level credentials of all types (career certifications, two-year degrees, fouryear degrees and higher) are simply more valuable in the world of work than those who don't have them - to employers and to themselves.

And, as we constantly stress, ALL of these can have value, depending on what industries and careers they will be used in.

Just one example is welders who spend months earning career

certifications and can later out-earn some four-yeardegree holders. But, two- and four-year Science, Technology, Engi-TRACEY neering, and Math BRYAN (STEM)-related The Bridge of degree holders Southern New out-earn practi-

cally everyone. College disconnected from career destinations and earning power can have a negative economic impact - thus the enormous \$1.6-trillion student loan crisis we face as a county. This slices down to the personal level for both graduates and non-graduates of about \$32,731 in debt per person. In New Mexico, it's about two-thirds of that amount (\$21,237), thanks to our commitment to keeping higher education costs low. Still, the Institute for College Access and Success estimates 54 percent of our state's population is carrying student loan debt.

So yes, the desire to relieve our students of this financial burden is a worthy cause, since it has a direct impact on the ability to have a life after higher education. Balancing the normal elements of a budget is already challenging. Starting off with an entry salary or wage post-graduation (in the best-case scenario), while making monthly average loan payments of \$351 for years, is an enormous challenge.

Perhaps the most important parts of this proposal are the inclusion of two-year degrees and supports for working adults who would benefit financially from securing college credentials to increase their earning power.

Much of our economic woes stem from our historically low high school graduation rates. How can we meaningfully help those who failed to secure a high school di-

ploma and/or earn a college credential be ready for the 63 percent of jobs in our state that will require more than high school education?

So, the key challenge in crafting the Opportunity Scholarship legislation lies in the exact same principles that we have used to advance our Dual Credit funding argument.

Can we realize a return on this investment for individuals, families, communities and the state?

How will academic completion result in higher earnings, greater employability, and increased contributions to the tax base and to local economies?

When individuals have the right college-level

certificates and degrees, they earn more. They spend more in their communities. They invest more in the local, state, and federal tax bases.

New Mexico wants economically strong families, the best possible environments for children for the long-term. And children whose families are economically secure experience lifelong benefits.

A critical part of the framing for the Opportunity Scholarship will be to connect these investments to the abundance of opportunity here in New Mexico. We can successfully stem the "brain drain," if we stop telling people, "There are no jobs here," and show them the value of a vari-

ety of college credentials in our businesses and industries - as well as encouraging them to start businesses of their own.

NMSU School of Nursing to tackle opioid epidemic with grant

The U.S. Health Resources & Services Administration has awarded a three-year, \$1.35 million federal training grant to the School of Nursing at New Mexico State University to fund a project that will expand the number of professionals in New Mexico, particularly in southern counties, who are trained in interprofessional settings to effectively prevent and treat opioid-use and substance-abuse disorders in community-based practices.

The project, a collaboration between the College of Health and Social Services and the College of Education, will support interprofessional faculty and community health provider training in the prevention, treatment and recovery of opioid-use and substanceuse disorders, also referred to as OUD and SUD. It is part of HRSA's Opioid Workforce Education Program.

NMSU faculty and students from three departments - the Psychiatric/Mental Health Nurse Practitioner program, the Ph.D. Counseling Psychology program and the Master of Social Work program – will participate in the project through 2021.

"NMSU will leverage its current academic-practice partnerships to develop planned clinical training experiences in the delivery of OUD and SUD prevention, treatment and recovery services," said Shelly Noe, an assistant professor in the School of Nursing and director of the Psychiatric/Mental Health Nurse Practitioner program, who will serve as the project director.

In 2017, New Mexico reported a rate of 24.6 deaths per 100,000 people due to drug overdose, higher

out of three drug overdoses in New Mexico involved an opioid and that opioid overdoserelated emergency room visits increased by 60 percent between 2010-2017.

The agency also

"The outcomes of this project will help us achieve our longterm goal to transform integrated behavioral health teams to effectively prevent and treat OUDs and other SUDs in New Mexico's medically underserved communities," said Noe, a psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner who practices in the area of medication-assisted treatment for substance-use disorders.

Eve Adams, a Regents professor in the Department of Counseling and Education Psychology, will serve as a special adviser on the project.

"We are so pleased to be collaborating with the School of Nursing on this project," Adams said. "We have partnered with them on other projects, and I believe our combined expertise in interprofessional education and treating substance-use disorders will allow us to create a cutting-edge curriculum for our graduate students."

Sixty percent of the funding will provide stipends for students in the three programs. Noe and Adams also will develop and implement interdisciplinary training experiences for these students.

"One of our objectives is to promote the integration of behavioral health with primary care, including trauma-informed care, with a focus on working with OUD and other SUD prevention, treatment and recovery services," Noe said.

She added, "We also want to increase the number of communitybased experiential training sites to help meet the behavioral health needs of persons in high need and high demand areas who have, or are at risk for, OUD and other SUD, including children, adolescents and transitional-age youth."

Additionally, Noe and Adams plan to create a curriculum and training program will include enhanced opioid-use and substanceabuse disorders content in didactic courses for all three programs. They also will re-establish a minor program focused on the treatment of substance-use disorders and offer workshops and professional development opportunities for NMSU faculty, students and community providers on interprofessional collaboration and other skills required for effective-care coordination.

As part of the project, NMSU will collaborate with eight clinical partners, including 4-H, Amador Health Center Ben Archer Community Health Center, Mesilla Valley Hospital, Memorial Medical Center, Esperanza Guidance Services, the New Mexico VA Healthcare System and Haven Behavioral Health in Albuquerque.

Noe and Adams also will work toward establishing opioid-use and substance-abuse disorders prevention programs in regional school systems.

Cruces hospitals win state awards

MountainView Regional Medical Center was named the large hospital award winner and Rehabilitation Hospital of Southern New Mexico the specialty hospital winner by a national panel of judges at the New Mexico Hospital Association's (NMHA's) awards ceremony at the 74th annual Meeting of the NMHA in Albuquerque.

Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso received the top overall award.

Derrick Cuenca, Mountain View Regional Medical Center CEO, and key hospital staff accepted the award from Jeff Bourgeois, CEO of San Juan Regional Medical Center and NMHA board of directors' chair, and Marie Cleary-Fishman, Vice President of Clinical Quality for the American Hospital Association (AHA).

Commitment to qual-

ity and patient safety are central to the mission of NMHA, according to a news release.

MountainView Regional Medical Center was cited for using nationally recognized patient quality metrics and a team huddles approach to reduce by 65 percent the occurrence of adverse patient events such as those that may occur during a hospital stay, after operations or procedures, and childbirth. Team huddles allowed for more timely treatment and analysis of high-risk situations and improved the accuracy of clinical documentation and billing.

Rehabilitation Hospital of Southern New Mexico's project successfully reintegrated spinal cord injury patients into the community seeing over 20 percent improvement in patients being successfully discharged without readmission to the hospital. The hospital implemented the highest, evidence-based clinical practice guidelines, revamped their interdisciplinary teams, and improved care planning and patient and family engagement efforts including carrying out a 30-day post-discharge transition into the community program.

"Commitment to quality and patient safety is central to the mission of NMHA member hospitals," said Jeff Dye, NMHA president and CEO. "These hospitals' comprehensive plans, put into action, have made them leaders in the state and nation in fostering patient safety and quality,"

I tell this story as an introduction to my interest in astronomy.

Social Security announces benefits increase for 2020

BULLETIN REPORT

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for nearly 69 million Americans will increase 1.6 percent in 2020, the Social Security Administration announced Oct. 10.

The 1.6 percent costof-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits payable to more than 63 million Social Security beneficiaries in January 2020. Increased payments to more than 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on Dec. 31, 2019. (Note: Some people receive both Social Security and SSI benefits).

The Social Security Act ties the annual COLA to the increase in the Consumer Price Index as determined by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Some other adjustments that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$137,700 from \$132,900.

Social Security and SSI beneficiaries are

For Social Security beneficiaries receiving Medicare, Social Security will not be able to compute their new benefit amount until after the Medicare premium amounts for 2020 are announced. Final 2020 benefit amounts will be communicated to beneficiaries in December through the mailed COLA notice and My Social Security's Message Center.

The Special Olympics Unified Schools program collaborates with schools throughout the nation to break down social barriers between students with and without disabilities. The program, formerly known as Project UNIFY, is a comprehensive model implemented in the US that combines Unified Sports, Inclusive Youth Leadership and Whole School Engagement to create school and community climates of acceptance and inclusion.

On Oct. 3, Picacho Middle School hosted the Unified Champion Schools Soccer Tournament against Sierra Middle School. Both teams played their hearts out and received ribbons after the game along with the tournament trophy, which was awarded to Picacho Middle School.

The Project UNIFY initiative first began at Oñate High School in April 2013 with a unified softball team competition. Since then, the initiative has expanded to Las Cruces High School. Mayfield High School, Centennial High School, Zia Middle School, Mesa Middle School, Vista Middle School, Picacho Middle School and Vallev View Elementary School.

"This is a phenomenal program that celebrates inclusiveness through

teamwork, and sparks new friendships between students in our schools," said Dr. Trujillo, interim superintendent for Las Cruces Public Schools. "We are happy to work alongside the New Mexico Special Olympics and very proud to see Project UNIFY expand in other schools across the district. The kids really enjoy being involved in a sporting event where the entire school is cheering them on from the stands while they encourage each other on the field."

According to the Unified Schools website, **Unified Sports joins** people with and without intellectual disabilities on the same team. It was inspired by a simple principle: Training together and playing together is a quick path to friendship and understanding. The

program also creates teams based on similar age and ability, in order to make practices more fun and games more challenging and exciting for all.

"These two schools really exemplify what it means to choose to be inclusive," said Rebecca Whitlock, Program Manager for Unified Champion Schools. "You can walk through Picacho or Sierra and see high fives happening, you can see real friendships and we are very excited to have them continue to grow their program, and we're excited for LCPS to see where this program goes from here."

Sierra Middle School and Picacho Middle School became Unified Champion Schools in 2018. Both schools completed 10 standards of


excellence and are among only 221 schools in the country to be named a Banner School since the inception of the program in 2007.

Not having fun? The doctor is in

I've noticed that many golfers don't look a bit happy like they should be. Come on, we are out recreating, playing a round and supposedly enjoying the day: we're not trying to make a living.

Sometimes I see what amounts to "golf rage": club throwing, swearing and self-recrimination. Well, today I have some suggestions for you to have more fun.

• Play a round with a buddy using only one, two or at most three clubs. You'd be surprised how you can invent and create shots when you don't

have a full bag. A few years ago, I played an "emergency" nine holes with friends all using iust one club. I CHARLIE had shot 36 on **BLANCHARD** that nine earlier:

Golf Doctor I shot 39 using one club. That was fun.

• Play with a kid. You have no idea how young it will make you feel teeing it up with a young wannabe golfer who really enjoys being out just playing golf, when his friends are home fingering their Play-stations. Golf is the great equalizer among generations.

• Play a one-person

scramble against a friend, with your opponent picking which of vour two shots vou will play. Better hit 'em both good. He better hit both good, also.

• Golf is too serious nowadays. I like a match that includes two "doovers" per nine. Call them Mulligans or Shapiros, but it makes things less serious among friends. Traditionalists might object but doovers get you away from the business of giving and taking (adjusting) strokes, especially when nobody's handicap is verifiable, which is the case most of the time.

• If you're with a small group that likes

to wager, put up a little cash for most greensin-regulation, most fairways-in-regulation. fewest putts, fewest three-putts, longest putt, longest fairway drive, and maybe include "polies" (a putt for par or better longer than the length of the flagstick),"barkies" (a par off a tree), "greenies (closest to the pin on a par 3), and "sandies" (a par out of a bunker).

• When the opportunity is available, play "cross-country" golf. Play far across the golf course from one tee to a green perhaps 1.000 vards distant. For example, one Christmas Day we played from the

16th tee at NMSU to the 12th green. We tied with 7's. You can't plan this match in advance, and the golf course has to be pretty much closed for normal play, like on a holiday. But it's sure fun and makes for some hilarious stories later.

• I'm sure by now you know about Top Golf. These facilities are not your grandfather's driving ranges. You hit balls off solid mats to specific targets where the memory-embedded ball disappears, and the score is recorded on a computer screen at your station. Meanwhile. pop music is playing, barmaids are checking on your beverage and

food requirements, and there's plenty to look at. The nearest Top Golf is now in El Paso.

• Another fun game is where players select each other's shot. For example, if you have a 90-yard shot to the green and your opponent tells you to hit a 6-iron, dial in your imagination and create a shot with your 6-iron. You'll get him or her back with the next shot when they are in a greenside sand bunker and you select a five iron for them to hit.

• "Golf Digest" tells us that "short courses are underrated," adding they're "rejuvenating,


