Alcohol consumption is NMSU, statewide concern

"Alcohol is the drug connected to 90-95 percent of violence on college campuses," NMSU Police Chief Stephen Lopez said April 18 at the university-sponsored Responsible Alcohol Consumption Summit.

The NMSU Police Department, Lopez said, responds to 250-300 alcohol-related calls on campus each year, averaging five-six per week.

There is a "culture of drinking on the NMSU campus," Student Body President Kevin Prieto said. "They're going to do it." One of the goals of the Associated Students of NMSU, he said, is to "monitor them and help them do it responsibly."

One way to do that, Prieto said, is to provide

safe transportation for students. That includes the Associated Student of NMSU's Crimson Cab and Crimson Coach service. (Visit asnmsu.nmsu.edu/ aggie-transportation/ crimson-coach)

Binge drinking is a serious issue for college students, New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) Secretary Lynn Gallagher said at the summit, recalling incidents from her own past while an NMSU student.

(The national Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism defines binge drinking as men consuming five or more drinks and women consuming four or more drinks in a two-hour period. "Most people younger than age 21 who drink alcohol report binge drinking, usually on multiple occasions,"

according to the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The 2015 Youth Risk Behavior Survey showed that almost 18 percent of binge drinkers were high school students and one in four were age 18-24. Visit https:// www.cdc.gov/alcohol/ fact-sheets/binge-drinking. htm. People aged 12-20 years drink 11 percent of all alcohol consumed in the United States," according to ibis.health.state.nm.us. "More than 90 percent of this alcohol is consumed in the form of binge drinks.")

"Your presence will change the way we see alcohol consumption in New Mexico," Gallagher told the approximately 200

New Mexico among the worst for alcohol-rated deaths

Since 1990, New Mexico's death rate for alcoholrelated (AR) injury has consistently been among the highest in the nation, ranging from 1.4-1.8 times the national rate, according to bis.health.state.nm.us

While New Mexico's alcohol-impaired motor vehicle crash fatality rates have declined almost 60 percent during this period, death rates from other AR injuries have increased. New Mexico's AR injury death rate increased 29 percent 1990-2015, and AR poisoning deaths replaced AR motor vehicle crash

deaths as the leading cause of alcohol-related injury death in New Mexico.

For more than 15 years, New Mexico's death rate for AR chronic diseases (chronic liver disease and cirrhosis, alcohol dependence, etc.) has been first or second in the nation with rates 1.5-two times the national rate. During the same period, New Mexico's death rate for AR injury (motor vehicle crashes, drowning, suicide, homicide, etc.) has also consistently been among the worst in the nation, 1.4-1.8 times the national rate.

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

students, faculty and visitors attending the summit at Domenici Hall or online from NMSU campuses in Alamogordo and Grants.

Among changes the state needs to make, she said, is doing more to celebrate designated drivers.

"I'm proud to drink water," Gallagher said, adding that drinking water instead of or along with alcohol is a key component to reducing alcohol consumption.

New Mexico spends "millions and millions of dollars unnecessarily" because of poor alcoholrelated choices made by individuals, businesses that serve alcohol and the alcohol industry, Gallagher said, and "75 percent of those costs are related to binge drinking."

"It's clear we have a real problem," Gallagher said.

The state also needs a universal helmet law she said, because there are "idiots riding motorcycles and

drinking. It's a problem in New Mexico and all of vou have to help us fix that."

"We need to take a hard look at alcohol consumption in New Mexico," Gallagher said, and "take a considered step toward making improvements. And it does start with you."

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
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OPINION Hair today, gone tomorrow

Future Marine Garcia-Washburn makes the first cut

rizzt Garcia-Washburn, an 18-year-old senior at Centennial High School, walked into foreign territory last Saturday.

fashioned in a braid going down the length of his back. The long Drizzt has long hair too.

at 1201 N. Main St. was a big deal, and friends and family showed up to watch.

So, after all these years, why get a haircut now?

For one thing, Centennial's prom was that night. Everyone likes to clean up for prom and Drizzt's girlfriend Bethany Bridges, was there to watch. For another, Drizzt will join the military this summer, the beginning of a six-year stint with the United States Marine Corps. He heads to boot camp in San Diego in July.

I asked him why he picked the Marines.

"That's the hardest one," he said.

Drizzt loves competition, and played football and ran track for CHS. Drizzt's mom, Jennifer

Wright, showed up at City Barber Shop a few minutes before the big cut. This would be almost as traumatic for her as for him

They decided she should re-braid his hair, ostensibly to make it tighter, and easier to save as a keepsake. Watching this take place, though, it seemed a solemn ceremony. She'd probably braided his hair a thousand times, and this time would likely be the last. She unraveled the braid, and spread out his long brown locks, giving them one last, loving look, before swiftly braiding it all back together, a ritual she could do blindfolded in her sleep.

She took a deep breath and handed her son off to barber Zack Mirabal.

Drizzt sat in Zack's barber chair as a dozen friends and family formed a semi-circle, their cellphones set to video.

First thing to go was the braid, and it was tough cutting for Zack. Once it was off, Drizzt was all open-mouthed and bugeyed, surprised, shocked and suffering all at the same time.

"My head feels so light," he said. "Oh my God!"

Then his smile briefly turned into a somber frown.

"This is the worst thing I've ever done in my life," Drizzt said.

"Wait until boot camp," cracked Matthew Arguello, the barber manning the next chair over.

When Zack held the braid in his hands, it had the weight, look, length and feel of a banded-rock rattlesnake. With it gone, Drizzt no longer looked like a rock band drummer, and Zack could then perform a regular haircut.

Drizzt remained clearly in shock.

Anyone who's ever gotten his hair cut at a barber shop knows the last move. The barber hands you a mirror, and you reflect the back of your head in the wall mirror behind. It's usually a five-second look, and the customer says, "Yep, looks good."

For Drizzt, though, it felt more like five minutes as he did triple-take after double-take, repeating, "Oh my God!"

To make it official. Zack pulled from a drawer a First Haircut Certificate, an 8x10 parchment to mark the date. In most cases, the certificates are for boys closer to 18 months than 18 years. The certificate was signed and dated and the deed was done.

Drizzt hopped out of the chair and the crowd gathered round as if he'd just won the heavy-

When I asked about the braided pony tail, he handed it to me.

We spoke briefly about his track season, in which Drizzt had done three field events: high jump, long jump and triple jump. I asked if he'd qualified for the state track

meet.

"Just barely missed it," he said, holding his thumb and forefinger less than an inch apart.

I held out the braid in both hands. Mentally scaling it, I figured it was a good three pounds, easy. "Man, if you didn't

have this weighing you down, you might have made those jumps," I said.

He shook his head and wrinkled a smile, as if to say, "Maybe so ..."

"What about you," I

asked Bethany, Drizzt's girlfriend. "What do you think of the new look?"

"I like it," she said, visibly pleased.

By then it was selfie time, as everyone went outside and took turns getting phone pics with Drizzt and his certificate and his brand new head.

Somewhere beneath all the buzz, inside that head, surely were thoughts about what will happen in the next few months, in his brand new life.







Aggies Without Limits helps locally, internationally

In May, 35 New Mexico State University students will join 20 students Engineers for a Sustainable World from UTEP to build a suspension pedestrian bridge destroyed by Hurricane Maria in 2017 in the city of Utuado, Puerto Rico. The students will also install a solar panel grid to provide power to homes that have not had it since the hurricane.

The NMSU students are part of the nonprofit Aggies Without Limits (AWL), which was founded in 2007 and has completed major sustainable engineering projects in Las Cruces, Alamogordo and Anthony, and in Nicaragua, Bolivia and Mexico.

Internationally, its projects have included:

• Construction of a bridge in 2017 in El Potrero, Nicaragua, near the city of La Trinidad, where approximately 100 families make their living farming corn and beans on steep hillsides, according to the AWL website.

• Reconstruction of a community center in 2014 in Querétaro Mexico, which also serves as a primary school and health care facility, serving approximately 100 people.

• Construction of a pedestrian suspended bridge in Herrera Cancha, Bolivia, in 2012. AWL partnered with the nonprofit Bridges to Prosperity on the project. Before the bridge was built, residents "were unable to cross the river five months out of the year due to heavy rainfall," according to the website. The bridge will give more than 100 families in the area "easy access to education, access to healthcare facilities and a way for farmers to take their crops to the market in a nearby town."

• AWL students also have worked with Foxhole Homes, an Alamogordo nonprofit, to help establish a community for homeless veterans.

• It has worked with the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope and Camp Hope tent city in Las Cruces

• It has partnered with the Colonias Development Council on a rainwater-harvesting project at the community center in Anthony.

AWL completes one local and one interna-

tional project each year.

"It's not an everyday thing where you get to help others, learn about a different community and become part of that community," said AWL President Adriana Erives Gonzalez. "To do one project, it takes a whole year of planning. Planning includes deciding on a project that will make an impact, budgeting, fundraising, designing, coordinating with the community and scheduling and constructing a project. This is done by the students with the help of professional engineers (our student organization's advisers).

One of AWL's major fundraising efforts is a team of up to 30 AWL students, called the Chain Gang, that is available to do yardwork, tree trimming, moving and other work, said Kenny Stevens of AWL at the March 13

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

According to the announcement, the project will develop connections to the sewer system that will eliminate the use of septic tanks and reduce the possibility of groundwater pollution and contamination. The improvements will benefit the 1,088 residential and 20 commercial users within the two communities.





zations making an impact in our region. While the fund has evolved throughout the years, the current grant cycle opens in the spring and fall to give nonprofits additional opportunities for funding.

"We are most impressed with the fact that nonprofit organizations have been able to count on this type of grant funding to help supplement summer programs for children and the arts," said donor and local philanthropist, Ammu Devasthali. "By showcasing a history of funding for nonprofits, we hope to instill confidence in other funders so that they too feel that these programs are worth supporting."

The spring Devasthali grant funds come at a crucial time for nonprofit organizations. "Motivating all children to read and providing books to children who have none are Children's Reading Alliance's immediate goals as spring turns to summer," said Rorie Measure, Board President of the Children's Reading Alliance. "After providing 9,000 books last summer, CRA's inventory is currently quite low, so the Devasthali grant helps us replenish this supply so we can support the next generation of readers."

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

David Edwards and the conversation of acting

Las Cruces actor David Edwards has been everything from Puck in Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" and Mr. Franklin in the original production of "Children of a Lesser God" to Jesus Christ in "Godspell," Pozzo in "Waiting for Godot" and Willy Loman in "Death of Salesman."

"Crazy facial hair is my one acting skill," Edwards said.

He has performed in hundreds of plays at NMSU, Las Cruces Community Theatre (LCCT), the Black Box, Rio Grande Theatre and Catteman's Dinner Theatre, and for Doña Ana Lyric Opera, lo-fi productions and other theatre companies in the past 46 years.

He's also directed more than

100 plays at most of those venues, along with Mayfield and Oñate high schools and his beloved St. Paul's United Methodist Church.

And, Edwards has appeared in dozens of short and featurelength films made in Las Cruces and elsewhere, often acting in NMSU student films. He's currently writing his own movie script and teaching a Perspective on Film class at Doña Ana Community College.

Edwards, 65, spent 20 months in Los Angeles in 2014-15, studying acting, doing background work for TV series including "The Big Bang Theory" and "Two and Half Men," auditioning for "Criminal Minds" and pursuing a full-time professional acting career.

"I'd love to be able to make a living at it," he said. "That would be the best."

An elementary education major at NMSU in 1971, Edwards took an introduction to theatre class taught by Arlene Belkin.

"I was so enthralled with her that I signed up for her acting class," he said. "I was hooked."

In the spring of 1972, Edwards was cast in his first play, in the chorus in NMSU's production of "Antigone." Chorus members moved and spoke as one, but Edwards remembers that his mother, Sammi, recognized his legs.

Edwards learned lines for a local production of "Henry IV Part 1" while making his rounds as a security guard at the L'eggs factory in the early 1970s. He played a Puerto Rican delivery boy in "The Gingerbread Lady" which friend and mentor Mark Medoff directed for LCCT in 1973.

Edwards was in the original 'Children of a Lesser God'

"I always feel very fortunate when I look at that and see my name there," Las Cruces actor David Edwards said about the script from the very first production of "Children of a Lesser God."

Edwards originated the role of Dr. Franklin, one of 13 parts in playwright Mark Medoff's workshop production of the play, which premiered April 25, 1979, at NMSU's Hershel Zohn Theatre.

"I began working with Dave when he was 19," Medoff said. "I don't know the exact number of plays or movies we've worked on together, but I do know Dave is the actor I've worked with the most in my half century in theater and film."

"I owe him a lot," Edwards said of Medoff. "He's been very encouraging in so many ways personally and professionally."

"Other actors may learn lines, but Dave knows and tells the whole story, so it really feels like a conversation, not a recitation of lines," said Las Cruces actor/director Gail Wheeler. "Acting with Dave is like doing a dance that you know really, really well and don't even have to think about."

"I have directed Dave in a number of local productions, and what I have always liked about working with him, besides his being incredibly knowledgeable about theatre and actonly seven that survived Medoff's extensive rewrites when the play moved to Los Angeles later that year before opening on Broadway in 1980.

"I don't know how I got lucky enough to have my character make it to the final cut," Dave Edwards said. "It really didn't have anything to do with me." Actor Anthony Edwards

One of Dave Edwards' co-stars in the NMSU production was the late Phyllis Frelich, for whom Medoff wrote the play. Frelich created the groundbreaking role of Sarah Norman in Las Cruces and performed it in Los Angeles and New York City. She, fellow actor John Rubenstein and Medoff won Tony awards for the Broadway production. *Mike Cook*

comfortable on stage or in front of camera but has come to prefer film work.

"It fits more my style," he said. "I'm really into honesty and realism in acting as opposed to presentation."

Edwards makes time to act in student films and mentor young actors, directors and filmmakers.

"I want to support that work," he said.

Edwards has a few dream roles still to play on stage: the psychiatrist in "Equus," "King Lear" and switching off with another actor playing both characters in "The Dresser."

"It has been a great comfort and source of amusement and joy to know I can suggest to Dave any nebulous idea or ask any muddled question of him as a collaborator and be certain he will extend himself to the furthest reaches of his imagination to respond without guile or fear," Medoff said.

Three Las Cruces Public Schools elementary art teachers are helping to put the "A" in STEAM.

The convention included speeches by nationally recognized artists



Area musicians to be feted in Santa Fe

The New Mexico Music Commission (NMMC) and the New Mexico Music Commission Foundation (NMMCF) have announced six honorees for the second annual 2018 New Mexico Platinum Music Awards.

Among them are two with Las Cruces ties.

Dr. William Clark is a composer and conductor at New Mexico State University. He is also a founder of the Mesilla Valley Concert Band, Las Cruces All-City Middle School Honor Band, and the Las Cruces New Horizons program for seniors. He maintains an active private studio and is a freelance tuba player.

Nacha Mendez is pioneering the genre of world Latin music, drawing from the influences of her youth growing up in La Union, where she began singing and playing the guitar at an early age. She learned traditional ranchera cancion from her grandmother and performed in towns between Las Cruces and El Paso with her cousins, the Black Brothers. She is a nationally recognized artist with various honors including National Endowment for the Arts Award.

They and four others will be honored at the Lensic Performing Arts Center in Santa Fe on Aug. 30. Proceeds from the show will benefit the music commission's Music in the Schools and ART2ART projects.

"It was a tough task to select this year's honorees, as virtually all of the nominees were great candidates," said David Schwartz, president of the New Mexico Music Commission Foundation, the nonprofit that produces the event. "These honorees represent a wide range of styles and genres, but all have the lifetime commitment to music."

According to a press release, the New Mexico Music Commission is an advisory body made up of governor-appointed volunteer specialists and leaders in the state's diverse music industry. Their mission is to protect, promote and preserve the state's musical traditions, to foster appreciation of the value of music and to encourage the "educational, creative and professional musical activities" of New Mexico residents.

The Commission is administratively attached to New Mexico Arts, a division of the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs. In 2017, the New Mexico Music Commission adopted the Platinum Music Awards ceremony and show as its annual signature event and primary fundraiser.







'Oh Lucy!': Pathetic romance in a dark and curious drama

This interesting but unusual movie has a rather chilling opening.

It opens wordlessly on a commuter train platform in Tokyo. Most of the people waiting for the train are withdrawn and wearing dust masks. Of a sudden, as the speeding train approaches, a man jumps in front of it, without warning and without much reaction by the other commuters.

One of the bystanders is Setsuko, a middle-aged woman with a boring and dead-end job. The scene really doesn't play into the movie, but it kind of sets the tone of curious drama, dark comedy and pathetic romance that ensues.

Soon after, we follow Setsuko to an odd café/ bar where her niece Mika works. Mika. sprightly and smiling to no end and wearing a clichéd French maid costume at her restaurant job, is taking an English class taught by an American named John. She can⊠t continue with the course as we find out (since not long afterward the niece runs away to Los Angeles with John) and convinces Setsuko to spend the 600 yen (about \$5,600) to take the course herself.

Setsuko shows up for the first class, which is in a bland old building, and is immediately set upon by the lively John (Josh Harnett) and told to speak only English, probably in part because he doesn't know much Japanese himself.

He is overwhelmingly

cheerful and soon has Setsuko wearing a blonde wig and using the name Lucy as a sort of alternative identity. There is but one other student in the class, a man, renamed Tom, who is about the same age as Setsuko. As the film progresses, Tom, who seems centered and kind, develops an interest in Lucy, to no avail.

Setsuko is also crass enough to get drunk at a company party for a cheery but rather useless retiring co-worker who everyone pretends to adore and tells all what they all really think of her – which is true, but very hurtful. The next scene shows the older woman holding some colorful balloons on a train platform, and one really must wonder if this saddened, but caring person is going to kill herself as well. It is a horrific moment, to be sure.

Although it is hard to tell why or if it is for real, Setsuko develops a crush on John, but soon after she finds out that John and Mika have gone to LA.

Setsuko and her sister, Ayako, who holds no great adornment for Setsuko, are soon off to LA themselves, as Ayako wants Mika back and needs to confront her about her decision to just take off.

Things only get worse from here, as they discover John in a lowball apartment, about to get evicted and find out that Mika is on the run. Things are explained, sort of, by John, a genteel conman for sure, but Setsuko, again without much reasoning, still has her eye on John and it is not long before she seduces him in a car. Repercussions ensue for everyone and this is where the heavier part of the drama sets in.

This film is a remake of a very popular Japanese short film of the same name, and is vaguely similar at times to the much, much better "Kumiko, The Treasure Hunter" from a few years ago.

It is frightfully uneven, and it is really difficult to like Setsuko, although that might be the point. At moments "Oh Lucy!" is very funny, at others very odd, and never stays on any one path. Setsuko, if she has a heart, hasn't really found it and if she has found it, it is not quite in the right

place.


Arts association moves to historic district



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Letting go as a spiritual discipline

My mother lived to be almost 96, in fairly good shape until the last four years when a minor stroke laid her low. We closed her apartment, knowing that she would not be able to live alone any-

more. She had outlived my father by 35 years and had occupied the same secondfloor walk-up apartment in Philadelphia most of those years. We distributed her possessions among us and gave the key back to the landlord, an old family friend.

Three weeks later my mother returned to full consciousness to find her-

the aging. I was with her at the time. The conversation was simple: Is this where I live now? Yes, mother, it is. We had to close your apartment because

you can't live on your own anymore. A short pause occurred and then she said, "The food's not bad."

Thirty-five years in the same place given up in a flash. Most of her possessions were in storage in our several garages. The last of her friends was at a significant distance. And all she said was, "The food's not bad"?

One of her best friends was the mother of a friend of mine. When her husband died, she told my friend that she would move to California to live with her. My friend said that she was welcome to do so but wondered how long it would take her to arrange matters and clear out the house.

A while later she arrived with a clutch of suitcases. My friend wondered what had happened to the rest of the household goods from a house they had occupied for 50 years. Gave it all away, said her mom, and stepped over the threshold to new life.

The Pennsylvania Germans have a word for what most of us would see as this extraordinary behavior; they call it Gelassenheit. It means the ongoing ability to let things go and live in the moment. It means relinquishing your cares and concerns and rolling with the punches life deals you without regret or rancor. It means relaxing into the circumstances you have at the time.

It is indeed a spiritual virtue, because nobody can do this without spiritual resources. Most of us get so angry when things don't go right in our lives. We fuss and fume and lose our cool over even minor matters, like losing a parking space to the guy in front of

us or breaking a wooden spoon.

For my mother and my friend's mother, who were faithful Christians, the whole thing went back to Jesus. After all, he had said, "Do not take thought for the morrow, for the morrow shall take care of itself. Sufficient unto each day is the evil thereof." Be present where you are. Accept the conditions of your life, whether foul or fair. If they are foul, deal with them as best you can. If you cannot understand the lesson of difficult times. wait patiently and it will be revealed to you.

My mother was an orphan at 6 and lost her guardian at 13. Life was

never easy. But she lived by the virtue of Gelassen*heit*, including when my father died abruptly and relatively young. Teach me to drive, she said, I'm not going to spend the rest of my life in the house. By letting go, she was able to move on. No dwelling in the past. No whining about difficult times. Press on toward the newness of the next day. New life awaits if only you don't hold back and try to hold on to what has already gone by.

NMSU's Studio G helps launch homegrown businesses

Entrepreneurial community college students and alumni across the New Mexico State University system are making their mark on their communities with support from Studio G, the student business accelerator at NMSU's Arrowhead Center.

Thanks to a three-year Regional Innovation Strategies i6 Challenge grant Arrowhead received in 2016 from the U.S. Economic Development Administration in the Department of Commerce, the university's entrepreneurship and innovation hub was able to expand its reach with a program called Next Generation Entrepreneurship, launching Studio G at each of NMSU's twoyear campuses, including Doña Ana Community College, NMSU-Alamogordo, NMSU-Carlsbad and NMSU-Grants.

Since that time, students at these campuses have brought more than 90 new business ventures at different stages to Studio G for support. These Next Gen Studio G sites have also created student contests with cash prizes for the best business idea pitches and hosted free half-day business accelerators open to members of the community.

"Grants is a rural community where bringing in new resources like Studio G can make a big difference," said Zac Smith, the Studio G champion at the NMSU-Grants campus. "Out of all of the new businesses registered in Grants in 2017, about 25 percent are Studio G clients."

At a student business idea pitch competition hosted by Studio G Grants last fall, Dana Eicher won \$1,000 to support starting up her professional cleaning business.

"This funding from Studio G really helped me by giving me the opportunity to invest in some advertising and equipment for my business," Eicher said.

Smith said an added benefit for each of the competition's participants was the opportunity to raise awareness of what they were doing. "All of our competitors walked away from the experience with at least one potential client, too."

In Alamogordo, Studio G partnered in March with the Small Business Development Center to host a free half-day accelerator. Trish Livingston, director of the center, said the partnership brings a new perspective to the community for those new and existing businesses that her organization supports.

"This seminar really brought it all together and helped them with some valuable insights on the marketing and launch of their new businesses," she said.

Livingston also served as a judge for the student pitch contest at NMSU-A, and said these types of opportunities are a great way to motivate students

and others in the community.

"A lot of people in our community have an idea or a product, but they don't know where to start," she said. "Sometimes people just need more guidance and resources. We work closely with Studio G to get them the advising that will help them get started."

At Doña Ana Community College, the largest of the four community colleges in the NMSU system, more than 56 new businesses have joined Studio G. DACC student Jesse Villareal won funding for his Green Piggie trash grinding device through a student pitch competition in October and has been selected for a semester-long Hunt Startup Sponsorship to continue working on his business idea. The Hunt sponsorships are made possible by a \$2.5 million gift from the Hunt Family Foundation to Arrowhead Center in 2017.

"One of the key benefits of bringing students from our community colleges into Studio G is that they can then access many of the programs and resources that Arrowhead Center offers, from our sprint accelerators and startup sponsorships to Aggie I-Corps and Aggie Shark Tank," said Studio G Director Kramer Winingham. "It opens the door for them to obtain the outside funding and support they need to take their business idea to market at a

'Made in China 2025' justifies Trump trade actions

"Made in China 2025" is Beijing's strategy for transforming China into a hi-tech giant that dominates industries like robotics, avionics and electric vehicles. It is also a step back from the market forms, relying instead on top-

down decision-making. The strategy depends on massive government subsidies and centrally directed loans to key industries. The goal is "self-sufficiency" in these industries while at the same time seeking to dominate global markets. Key to the success of the plan is acquiring foreign technologies. As such, the plan is an attack on the competitiveness of U.S. industries.

Beijing has long followed a policy of forcing foreign companies want-

ing to do business in China to partner with local companies, giving the local companies access to hi-tech. Later the former partners become

of the competitors. Forcing Boeing to produce in China, for example, is a key strategy in China's stated goal of gaining dominance in avionics.

This longtime strategy of forced partnering is now on steroids with the adoption of "Made in China." It is a policy aimed at systematically stealing from the U.S. and other advanced countries.

China is not concerned with complying with the rules-based free trade approach that is the global norm, as in bodied in WTO. The intent, instead, is to use action, in the form of subsidies and government directed loans, to gain global dominance in hi-tech. By setting targets and goals by industry, as China has, the plan violates WTO to which China is a party.

It is China's lack of compliance with WTO that is the entry for Donald Trump to impose sanctions. Trump can be ham-handed, but he has a point. While economists have shown the benefits of free trade, which are undoubted, we have also shown that when one side of the transaction uses the coercive power of the state to shape the transaction while the other side is passive, an imbalance can be created in favor of the market manipulator.

In the current situation, China is forcing tech transfer from the U.S. companies without just compensation. In effect, U.S. companies are "paying" for access to Chinese markets via tech transfer. The Chinese government is using its monopoly over access to Chinese markets to overcharge for this access. And the Chinese plan on using this newly acquired tech to take market share from American firms.

Were China to become dominant in one market or another as an organic outcome of free market forces, who can complain? Indeed, the beauty of capitalism is its ability to direct resources to their best uses. If China can out compete against the United States in hitech, the world is better off. But when government control is used to divert resources to less effective uses. The world is worse off even if China is better off.

While Trump's strategy of threatening a trade war is not illogical, there is another approach, one adopted by the Obama administration, which is to ignore "Made in China 2025."

With or without U.S. sanctions, whether "Made in China 2025" will work is an open question. Expecting dimwitted Chinese bureaucrats to pull off a complicated thing like a tech revolution seems a bit far fetched.

Certainly, there are many examples from history of failed centrally controlled economies that are now in the dustbin of history. In this view, it precisely because China has adopted a topdown economic approach is why they will fail; therefore, benign neglect is the best response

The problem is, even if "Made in China 2025" is ultimately a failure, China can still do much mischief in the process of failing. Too often state support has local companies and governments chasing after subsidies, resulting in overcapacity. It is exactly this overcapacity that led to a global steel glut that was the initial target of Trump's tariffs.

much faster pace."

Studio G clients at NMSU's community colleges have a wide variety of businesses. The nine ventures currently underway at NMSU-Carlsbad include a ballroom dance studio, a construction company, a wedding event center, a juice and smoothie bar, a candy shop and a social media company, among others.

"Any type of business can benefit from Studio G," Winingham said. "We see very high-tech companies with intellectual property that needs to be protected, and we also see service-oriented businesses that have a very specific market in their own communities."

The success of the new Studio G sites through the U.S. EDA grant has served as a model to expand Studio G to six additional sites outside the NMSU system, thanks to a generous grant from the Daniels Fund. Studio G sites opened this semester at the University of New Mexico's Anderson School of Business in Albuquerque, Western New Mexico University in Silver City, Eastern New Mexico University in Roswell, New Mexico Tech

in Socorro, San Juan College in Farmington, and Santa Fe Community College. Studio G is also available at Navajo Technical University through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation. For more information about Studio G and how to join, visit arrowheadcenter.nmsu.edu/studiog.

Record-keeping is essential to running a small business

Propagation tools might already be in your yard

In 40 years, the miracle of making a new tree or brush hasn't worn off for Jeff Harvey. "Taking a seed or stick and watching it turn into a tree; it's still pretty neat," says Harvey, production manager at Sunland Nursery.

While there are plenty of different ways to grow new plants from existing ones, Harvey will share his decades of propagating experience at the Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Lush and Lean presentation on Thursday, May 3. Titled "Propagating

Trees and Shrubs,"

Harvey brings an appropriately named "bag of props" to his presentation. He'll show off sticks, cuttings, and seeds that homeowners may already discover in their yards. Harvey will explain how easily propagation – creating a new plant – can be accomplished by those with a little patience. Two considerations

Two considerations Harvey suggests for new plant parents is to remember that some shrubs and trees will propagate better at certain times of the year, although there is still a certain element of flexibility. Also, choose vegetation that is already well-suited to our area, with our heat and nutrient-poor soil, and is hardy enough to flourish with some encouragement.

Harvey encourages attendees to bring in their plant cuttings to get tips on their exact budding problem. A mix of different elements, just like nature, allows Harvey to keep something that might seem like a dry topic feel like the magic it really is.

"For example, the birdof-paradise germinates readily, and it's easy to see when the seed is tan," said Harvey. "If you grab the pod, you give off the right humidity and it'll pop right in your hand." All Lush and Lean open to the public. They are held Thursday evening at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, 200 E. In a saucepan, heat sauce and adobo for about 5 minutes. To meld flavors. Reduce heat to a simmer.

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Arrange the squash in a single layer on a large rimmed baking sheet. Drizzle with olive

oil and rub the squash to coat completely. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Bake 1 hour, stirring three or four times. until the squash is tender and beginning to caramelize. Remove from the oven and reduce the oven temperature to 375 de-

grees F. Coat a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray and pour ¹/₄ cup enchilada sauce in the bottom of the pan, spreading it out to loosely cover the bottom. In a large bowl, com-

bine butternut squash, black beans, and 1 cup of cheese. Add 2/3 cup of the enchilada sauce and stir to combine. Divide the filling between the tortillas, roll tightly, and place seam side down in the prepared baking pan. Top with the remaining enchilada sauce. smoothing it out to coat all of the tortillas, and sprinkle with the remaining cheese.

Bake 20-25 minutes or until bubbly and the cheese is beginning to brown. Top each enchilada with suggested toppers or use your favorites.

Chipotle Veggie Burritos 4 servings

1 bunch cilantro, chopped 1 clove garlic 1/2 teaspoon chipotle chile powder, plus more to taste Kosher salt 1 cup white rice 1 (15-ounce) can black bean soup (preferably the spicy variety) 1 (10-ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry 4 burrito-sized flour tortillas Corn Salsa (see recipe below)

Puree all but 3 tablespoons of cilantro with 2 cups water, the garlic, chile powder and ³/₄ teaspoon salt in a blender until smooth. Transfer to a medium saucepan along with the rice and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to low; cover and cook until the liquid is absorbed, about 18 minutes. Uncover, stir and let cool 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, bring the black bean soup to a simmer in a small saucepan over mediumhigh heat and cook until the liquid is slightly reduced, about 3 minutes.

Stir in the spinach and return to a simmer. Remove from the heat and cover to keep warm.

Corn Salsa

Yield: 2 cups 2 cups frozen fire-roasted corn, thawed 1 large tomato, diced Juice of 1 lime

Toss the corn, tomato, lime juice, the reserved 3 tablespoons cilantro, 1/2 teaspoon salt. and chile powder to taste in a large bowl.

Warm the tortillas in a dry skillet or in the microwave. Divide the rice, bean mixture and cheese among the tortillas; top with some of the corn salsa. Fold up the bottoms of the tortillas, then fold in the sides and roll up. Serve with the remaining corn salsa.

You think getting fit is only about logging miles and lifting weights?

Re-adjust that thinking and check out a Zumba class. There are numerous options in Las Cruces.

An expert instructor will lead you in an hour-long group fitness dance to Latin, hip-hop, Bollywood, African, Asian, or country rhythms. Along with dance moves, your instructor may incorporate squats, lunges, martial arts, and other aerobic moves.


"Zumba brings people in who would have never gone to a gym before." says veteran instructor Linda Perez, who teaches at Fitness One. "It's a different crowd. We get lots of moms and others who want an hour away from 'real life.""

Her class ranges in age from 20-something to 70-something. They mingle amicably before the Tuesday morning class.

The intimidation factor is nonexistent, even for a beginner. Perez says that newbies end up just having a good time and forget to be self-conscious. She notes that the lights are low, the music and the party lights are going, and people are watching the instructor; nobody is judging.

Instructors provide visual clues in Zumba classes, and it's important, especially at first, to see them. It usually takes people a few classes to catch on to the moves.

"Don't judge the class by your first day," class participant Teri Howard said. "Remember, there's no pressure, it's an open format. Each instructor has a flavor and style,

so try different instructors to find out what you like."

A significant attraction of Zumba is that moves can easily be modified depending on your fitness level and physical limitations. Perez gives the example of a 75-year-old lady with tendinitis who takes Perez's regular Zumba class instead of Zumba Gold designed for seniors because she loves the energy; she just dials down the intensity of

the moves.

Retired lab tech Katherine Propst also modifies some of the moves, deadpanning that she got hooked on Zumba when she "came to dance and accidentally exercised." Propst says of the moves that "some are sexy and some have attitude," and she shares that a Sudoku puzzle before class "helps get the brain in gear and prepped for following steps."



Zumba is not for women only. Frank Paul, a 1980s tight end on the Moriarty High School football team, was introduced to group exercise when he gave up football to join the cheerleading squad. "They'd [the football team] be up there lifting weights, and I'd be busy lifting cheerleaders," he chuckles.

He continued to run and lift weights, but was bored exercising alone. He became more involved in high intensity aerobics and step, yet when he took his first Zumba class, he was "completely lost" - but had a great time and kept at it. Now he's a seasoned instructor in Alamogordo.

"Instructors make it look easy, but it's not, so don't worry about it," he advises newbies. Paul notes that some of

his favorite students have been "the guys who come in herded by their wives. They find out they can do it ... and keep coming even when their wives stop." He says he has "many good-news stories of ladies making healthy lifestyle changes and feeling better about themselves. That's why I keep on teaching Zumba."

Ready to give it a go? Go to www.zumba.com, type in Las Cruces or your zip code, and a list of local classes will appear. Try a few different instructors out, and follow Linda Perez's advice to "enjoy the music and move your body!"

Adult beginners bring their lifestyles to instruction

Mature horsewomen and horsemen have an approach to their horses that is usually reflective of the manner in which they have lived their lives. If you, as an elder equestrian, have worked for

yourself, managed your own company, etc. – you will likely approach your horsemanship with a "hands on" attitude and enjoy learning and doing everything yourself from feeding and mucking to building a barn and giving injections. It just flows with your nature to take initiative.

If, on the other hand, you have worked most of your life under the supervision and direction of another, you may truly need to be coached through every process with your horse – at least in the beginning. Elder equestrians function at each end of this spectrum and at every point in between.

All of this is normal, expected and actually wonderful, because, in the world of horses, there is truly something for everyone.

An instructor is flexible when it is prudent, and firm when the horse's well-being demands it. A good instructor never allows a dangerous situation to develop and knows when to step in and when not to.

If you are an adult beginner you will benefit from the recognition of what YOU bring to the relationship with horses. The following questions

should help you determine the baggage and the assets you arrive with at the stable. Have you been

responsible for others – either in the home or in your occupation as a provider of basic care of oth-


ers (human or animal)? Have you been the

teacher of others – in a classroom, raising your own children, caring for other children?

Have you owned and run your own business? Are you still running it? How do you handle the responsibilities? Has this responsibility been a burden to you or a cherished experience?

Have you been or are you someone's employee? Do you enjoy being told what to do or do you resent it? Look inside yourself and really see if you need to be told what to do most of the time, or are you able to take some direction from others and continue on your own.

These questions should be pondered; they help you see what you bring to your horse and this new relationship. It is easy to create a system of learning about horses that touches your individual style and requirements. If you want a rigid, nononsense teacher who holds you to the highest standard of technique, you will not resonate with a program that lets you figure things out on your own! If you are looking for interaction with horses on a "herd" basis, finding out how to connect emotionally and

to learn from them ways to master your own emotions – you will not like a competition-based riding school.

As adult beginner, you may wish to trail ride only, enjoying horses in nature either with compatible groups or on your own with a gentle, experienced equine partner. You might be able to get riding lessons at a trail barn (be certain that the horses are treated properly) or take lessons elsewhere and do the trail rides while you are learning. Even if the stable does not require that you wear a helmet, wear one. Certainly you do not plan to fall off of a horse or ride under a low hanging tree limb ... but it happens sometimes and your head needs to be protected.

Important things to remember that will become second nature to you in time are:

Always approach the horse's shoulder and be sure that he sees you coming.

Handle the horse from his shoulder where he cannot easily bite, kick, paw or rub on you (horses are not aggressive by nature, but they can test your boundaries).

Keep him aware of your position. Don't surprise him when grooming, leading or from behind (!). Horses do not like surprises.

Do not feed treats from your hand until you know the horse well (if ever).

Move with confident, slow gestures around horses. Don't run, yell or sneak up on them.

Do not "play" with horses. I know there are lots of programs out COURTESY PHOTO

there with definite play techniques, but until you spend some time around horses to understand how to establish boundaries, playing with a horse can lead to injury!

It's never too early to make advance healthcare plans

"Standing in the ICU not knowing what Grandma wanted was heartbreaking."

That's why advance healthcare planning is important, according to a participant in Memorial Medical Center's National Healthcare Decisions Day event April 16 at the hospital.

Beginning that conversation, though it may be unpleasant or even frightening, gives you "the peace of knowing people know your wishes," said MMC

Memorial Medical Center's Pastoral Care Department director, the Rev. Dr. Margaret Short, points out one of the reasons advance care planning is important as listed by a participant in the hospital's National Healthcare Decision Day program April 16.

"It seems too early until it's too late," Short said, echoing a National Health Benson, medical director of MMC's Palliative Care Team, said some people choose non-family members to fill that role because "the emotional investment is too much" for a loved one.

The important thing is to make that and other choices now so your family and friends and your healthcare providers know what you want.

"As a result of National Healthcare Decisions Day, we are hopeful that many more people in our community will have thoughtful conversations with their loved ones and providers about their healthcare decisions and then complete advance directives to make sure their wishes are known." Benson said in an MMC news release. "Families, healthcare providers and facilities will be better equipped to address advance healthcare planning issues before a crisis and also be better able to honor a patient's wishes when the time comes to do so."

"Be as specific as you want," Short said. "Once you have a plan, you don't have to think about it anymore." Advanced care planning forms are available from MMC and online at www. begintheconversation.org and www.nationalhealthcaredecisionsday.org. Short recommended providing copies of completed forms to a family member, healthcare provider, hospital or clinic and keeping one in the glove compartment of your vehicle.

Simple courtesies every golfer should remember

Amid our hectic, post-modern, digital, diverse society we risk losing common social graces, which I call "simple courtesies." Golfers may need to be reminded of

such things. A courtesy not heard often enough is when fellow golfers, usually competitors in their regular money game, compliment each other on a shot well played. We all could afford to elevate the quality of how we personally engage with others.

Another courtesy is tipping the "bag boy" who removes your clubs from the trunk of your car and gently secures them to the golf cart. Red Hawk Golf Club is the only local club that has that service; others should try it. While we're at it, the beverage cart girl deserves tips.

It may be a lost courtesy, but winning the meager amount of money wagered may afford the recipient of good luck on the golf course (which is often the case) the means to buy the drinks for friendly competitors in the game. Get it? It's not about the money!

As everyone knows, slow golfers bother me. It's not because they are inept, lining up many more shots than other players on the course, but because they are inconsiderate. Letting

members, like slow players, should be posted prominently throughout the premises.

A courtesy we all can improve is to leave light footprints on our courses: raking sand in bunkers, avoiding cart tracks where they don't belong, stepping lightly on wet and frost-laden ground and not damaging the cups with flagstick or club.

I'm always amused by negative remarks from golf course staff that concern regular members and patrons. Almost always those remarks have some validity: club employees don't make those things up. It's common courtesy to be nice to pro shop folks, wait staff and others. You don't want to be the person known around the club as mean and surly. It's all about trying our best to be kind in a rude world.

Are you one of those golfers who suffers from lockjaw in your weekly small-money games? I'm talking about conceding putts, like inside of two feet. In friendly games, which are mostly about camaraderie anyway, it's just courteous to give short putts.

I would like to see a little more courtesy paid to parking. It's just annoying to pull into a parking spot, empty on both sides, and then come out and find it hard to open your car door because some idiot pulled in so tight that you have to turn sideways to fit. And some people are discourteous enough to bang their door into yours and drive away.

If you tend to be a know-it-all type, try your best to throttle it back and refrain from bullying your opponents. Over the years I have witnessed wellintentioned but sorely misinformed golfers attempt to give unsolicited advice to others, only to be rudely rebuffed. The courteous thing to do is mind your own business and let the teaching pro give lessons. And when things go south in your golf game do your best not to pout or become moody.

Lastly, it's also a matter of common courtesy to keep complaints to a minimum, unless, of course, you are a golf writer.
