# Spring blood drive slated for April 7

Doña Ana County's annual spring blood drive will be held Friday, April 7, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the

main rotunda of the Doña Ana County Government Center at 845 N. Motel Blvd., in Las Cruces.

Several appointments have been scheduled at 20minute intervals, but walkins also will be welcome.

The spring blood drive is one of three coordinated each year at the Doña Ana County Government Cen-


ter. Each drive historically results in the donation of about 30 pints of blood, which United Blood Services distributes to area medical facilities.

Donors will receive a movie ticket, a snack and some juice. Giving blood normally takes less than an hour, and the results save lives throughout our region. The staff at United Blood Services screens each applicant and then allows qualified donors to take a seat in one of the comfortable recliners where the donations are processed.

All materials used in the donation process are sterile and disposable. Donors cannot contract any blood-borne disease by giving blood. All donated blood is typed to determine the A-B-O group and the Rh factor and then tested for safety, including a test for the HIV virus. Tainted blood is not distributed.

Most units of accepted blood are separated into several components, allowing one donation to help several people.



# NMSU researching county aquifer



Zohrab Samani, a New Mexico State University civil engineering professor, and his graduate student Pooneh Pahlevani are leading a research project examining water accessibility in southern New Mexico. The goal of the project, "Evaluating water budget for the Mesilla Bolson Aquifer," is to develop a hydrologic model that can predict future water storage and sustainability of the Mesilla Valley Aquifer known as the Mesilla Bolson.

Doña Ana County's groundwater is the Mesilla Bolson, which supplies drinking water for Las Cruces and other small communities in the county in addition to parts of El Paso and Juarez. The aquifer is the lone water source for agriculture during dry years when there is little river flow.

"The aquifer is like a bank account, which is vital for sustainability of agriculture, and quality of life in southern New Mexico," Samani said. "The aquifer gains water during wet years and loses water during dry years. We have been in a drought during the past 15 years, which means we are pulling the additional needed water from the aquifer, and the water level is dropping.

"There is an urgent need to figure out how the water budget has changed


in the past and will change in the future as we face climate change, population growth, drought and land use."

New Mexico legislators sponsored the project through the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute.

"The result of the aquifer project has significant implications in the future planning and management of the water resources in our area," he said. "Our results show

that we have been losing water from the aquifer storage during the past 25 years, and the loss has accelerated since 2010. The results of our research show that if serious steps are not taken in conserving water and curtailing the excessive withdrawal the aquifer will continue to deplete and could eventually dry up."

# Local bookstore is a great place to get lost


hen you have friends or family come in from out of town, how do you show off Las Cruces?

There are the Organ Mountains, of course, the New Mexico State University campus and, if you're a bookworm nerd

like me, COAS Books.



Not surprisingly, COAS
Books was named the best
in New Mexico. The magazine partnered with Yelp
and used Yelp's reviews and

A great bookstore is one where you can figuratively – and literally – get lost. It's a place where you find old friends, whether they are bound with pages or standing upright on two human feet. It's a place to discover new treasures and hidden gems.

COAS meets all those criteria and deserves its statewide and even international reputation.

Las Crucens Mike and Veronica Beckett own COAS. It's a common sight to walk in the door and see Mike standing at a computer, surrounded by books stacked from floor to his waist, plugging their data into the store's inventory.

If you're seeking a specific book, Mike and his staff often walk you to the shelf where it should be, and — Bam! — there it is. You can be in and out in minutes.

Other times, you don't want to be in and out in minutes. You want to wander the seemingly endless aisles and shelves, linger and discover. There's nothing like holding a book in your hand, leafing through pages and finding a nugget of knowledge. COAS has a great humor section, which I mined when introducing my young daughter to The Far Side comics. She was fascinated when I showed her the Japanese-language hardbacks. I always find something in the sports area. There are broad, deep sections on hundreds of topics.

None of this was the vision of Mike's dad, Pat Beckett, when he founded a tiny publishing company – Center Of Anthropological Studies (COAS) – in 1973. Beckett, now 76, was (and remains) an archaeology junkie, and liked the fact "coas" was a term the Nahua peoples in central Mexico used for a digging tool.

For his day job, Beckett was director of contract archaeology at New Mexico State University. His passion, though, for archaeology, history and books meant he was doing many other things on the side. Despite being a political independent, he received several gubernatorial appointments to serve on various archival and historical state boards and committees.

Between 1973 and 1983, he acquired so many archaeological texts their cumula-

tive weight actually damaged the structure of his home. He was profitably re-selling enough of them, however, he could afford to rent a space to keep them, so that's what he did. Shortly thereafter, he accepted an offer to buy the inventory of another local bookstore, and suddenly he was a bookstore owner.

In 1984, when he was chairman of New Mexico's Cultural Properties Review Committee the combined weight of his vocation and avocations nearly took its toll. A series of epiphanies led Pat to resign from NMSU and curtail many of his extracurricular activities.

He may be the only person in American history whose stress level reduced when he decided to focus on owning his own business.

Today, Pat credits that decision for saving his life.

Pat's dad, Herman, built many of the COAS bookshelves. Herman showed Pat and Mike how to do it. Subsequently, Mike taught his sons, Brett and Brandon. That means four generations of Becketts have crafted the shelves upon which may rest the book that could change your life.

Since selling his stake in the store to Mike and Veronica, Pat's focus has shifted, but he still finds himself periodically doing fill-in work at COAS.

And sometimes, Pat Beckett will go in the store, like any other bookworm nerd, and just browse the shelves he helped build.

Does he ever get surprised by what he might see on the shelf?

"Every single time," Pat said.



If passed, the proposed amendment to the firework ordinance will bring economic parity to additional firework vendors within our county, along with jobs and increased tax-revenue. The ordinance amendment does not repeal Safe and Sane, nor does it allow residents of our county to

# Fighting fires: It's all about caring

Editor's note: This is the first in a series on Las Cruces Fire Department members. Look for the articles every two weeks.

The word "fighter" shows up a lot in Louie Burke's resume.

He was a top-rated prize fighter in the 1980s, then entered a different arena 19 years ago when he became a Las Cruces firefighter.

Burke, 55, won the ESPN Jr. Lightweight title in 1981 and won 18 consecutive bouts during his career. Burke retired in 1985 with a record of 19-3 (including 12 knockouts).

He was a boxing and events promoter and later owned the Chicken Coop bar before becom-

ing a firefighter in December 1997.

When he applied for the department, Burke said

he "didn't have any idea what a firefighter did," thinking it meant playing cards, putting out fires and being a hero. The reality, he said, was "a rude awakening."

Burke's first day on the job, Dec. 8, was the single busiest day of his entire firefighting career. Fire Station #1 at 201 E. Picacho Ave.,



where Burke was stationed, had nearly 20 calls during his first shift, including a head-on collision and a double drug overdose.

"I thought that was going to be the norm," Burke said.

Burke doesn't like to talk about the worst of the fires and emergencies he's experienced, but did say seeing children suffer is "real hard," along with testifying in court about the child abuse and neglect he has witnessed on the job.

Burke also remembers responding to a plane crash in which four people died. "That was a very sad situation," Burke said. "You feel so bad for the family, for everybody involved."

Then there are the

blisters on his hands and neck received in an apartment fire on Nestor Street. "It was a little bit hot going in there," Burke said, and there were moments when he wasn't certain

he'd make it out.

Though he will be eligible to retire soon, Burke has no plans to do so. "I still find excitement in the job," he said. "I work with a great bunch of guys. The honor and respect (that people hold for firefighters) has made me a better person."

And, though he was 37 when he joined the Las Cruces Fire Department (LCFD), Burke said he credits the department "for making me grow up. It's made me a hell of a lot better person. It makes me want to help people."


What makes a good firefighter? "You should have a good heart," Burke said. "You have to care about people." Dealing with emergencies that sometimes result in the loss of a home or a life also "makes you appreciate what you have."

Continuous training and learning new techniques and technologies in dealing with accidents and other emergencies is also a part of the job, he said. "A firefighter's life is a lot of change."

When he joined LCFD, no firefighters were paramedics. Today, all are emergency medical technicians, and many receive even more advanced medical training. "It's amazing what they can do out in the field," Burke said.

Burke's schedule has him on 24-hour shifts, with 48 hours off in-between. He has been stationed at every Las Cruces fire station at one point or another, and is currently stationed at the Las Cruces Airport.

As a long-time veteran of LCFD, Burke said his advice to rookie firefighters is "always wear your PPE (personal protective equipment) (and) do what you're taught."

# Community Foundation awards grant to children's program

hild hunger in New Mexico is a pressing issue and the daunting reality of this is that the faces of hunger aren't easily identified.

According to the United States Census Bureau, in Doña Ana County, more than 25 percent of the population is living in poverty. The poverty threshold for a family of four is an annual income of \$24,600.

One fourth of our county not only struggles to make ends meet but struggles to put food on the table with limited resources, especially during the summer when children are not receiving low-cost or free meals at school.

Thanks to the Casa de Peregrinos' (CdP) Children's Summer Program, families can receive additional, nutritious food during the summer months.

The Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico awards grants annually to nonprofit organizations in the region through its Wellness Fund. The Wellness Fund is made possible because of generous donors who support projects and programs that positively impact maternal/child well-being. In 2016, the **Community Foundation** granted \$7,900 to the CdP Children's Summer Program for use in 2017 to support costs associated with the food distributions made possible by this program.

Both New Mexico and Doña Ana County food insecurity percentages

have historically exceeded national food insecurity statistics, and is more prominent during the summer months. Lowincome families struggle financially because for every child in the household, fami-

lies have to budget for 10 additional meals per week.

Hunger has long-lasting effects on children. Food insecurity is not only linked to physical impairments that are due to a weak immune system but it affects an individual's mental and emotional well-being and can cause developmental delays as well.

"If we didn't have funding, we wouldn't be able to buy the additional fresh food that we provide through the program," said CdP Executive Director Lorenzo Alba, Jr. "We make it a point to provide foods like apples and oranges because we don't want children to develop

diabetes or other healthrelated issues because of the food we're providing."

CdP created the Children's Summer Program in 2009, and it is the smallest of CdP's food distributions. In all, CdP spends a total of 20 cents per pound for food and, according to Alba, it provides a benefit that far exceeds its cost.

Last year, the summer program served a total of 482 families including 1,807 children.

"We've had a lot of success with our program but I don't think it should be measured by the number of people we served," Alba said. "Instead it should be measured by the significance of providing nutritious foods to these families."

The Community Foundation is proud to support programs through its Wellness Fund that are addressing even a portion of the child population affected by hunger.

# Council vote looms in April on RGT management contract

At the conclusion of their Monday, March 27, work session, members of the Las Cruces City Council informally agreed that their Monday, April 17, meeting would be an appropriate time to decide who should manage the cityowned Rio Grande Theatre (RGT) when the city's current management contract with the Doña Ana Arts Council

(DAAC) expires June 30.

The council could vote to extend DAAC's contract, or to turn over management to the Las Cruces Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB), which, like RGT, is part of the city's Economic Development Department (EDD). The council also discussed a partnership between DAAC and the CVB to manage the theatre.

City Attorney William R. "Rusty" Babington said the RGT management contract

calls for the city to give DAAC 60 days' notice if it decides to change managers.

"I believe we could make the theatre self-sustaining in three years," said Phil San Filippo, who became EDD director March 24 after five years as CVB executive director.

San Filippo said the CVB could use the city's \$120,000 annual allocation for theatre management to hire a full-time general manager and an operations specialist, and to "en-

sure RGT is fully utilized" as a performing arts center that attracts both locals and visitors and showcases local, regional and national talent.

San Filippo said the CVB's "aggressive but realistic" management plan for RGT would include weekly productions featuring local talent, additional programming in partnership with the Mexican Consulate, collaboration with New Mexico State University and local schools, bringing in

nationally known touring companies and artists and hosting annual comedy performances at the theatre.

A monthly classical movie series would be added, along with sing-alongs, silent movies with a live piano player, seasonal films, locally produced movies and Saturday movie matinees.

Also, San Filippo said the CVB would combine events at

department, "has served as city attorney for the City of Rio Rancho, where she also held the position of assistant city attorney," the City of Las Cruces said in March 24 a news release. "Prior to that, she was assistant county attorney and public information official for Bernalillo County. She received her law degree from the University of New Mexico School of Law, and both her Master's and Bachelor of Arts degrees from NMSU," the release said.

Vega-Brown is expected to begin her new duties on April 10, according to the city. She will be Las Cruces' first female city attorney, Ed said.

"Ms. Vega-Brown will bring valuable city and county experience to her new job," the mayor said. "Her local government legal and professional experience will be unmatched. I think she will be a great hire for the city as well as our legal department."

"I have worked with Rusty for several years," Miyagishima said about the retiring city attorney. "He has helped save our taxpayers several hundreds of thousands of dollars through his professional experience and legal knowledge in dealing with all of the city's legal issues. He is a lawyer's lawyer, he will be greatly missed. I want to also thank Rusty for his 20-plus years of military service to our country."

"The City of Las Cruces is indeed fortunate to have this caliber of talent successfully recruited and retained," Ed said. "Both individuals (San Filippo and Vega-Brown)

have strong ties to our community and will be able to affect immediate, positive impacts."

William F. Studer Jr. of El Paso will become the new assistant city manager beginning on Monday, April 3, Ed said.

Studer has been a local government consultant since October 2014, serving as executive director of the Economic Development Corporation for the Town of Horizon City and as city administrator of the newly incorporated City of San Elizario, Texas, according to Studer's resume.

Studer served as assistant city manager for the City of El Paso from 2004

to 2014. He was deputy city manager for the City of Arlington, Texas, from 1988 to 2003.

Studer is a graduate of the University of Texas-El Paso with a bachelor's degree in political science. He is

also a graduate of the John F. Kennedy School of Government graduate program for senior executives of state and local government.

Studer will replace Daniel Avila, who resigned as Las Cruces assistant city

# Amador Hotel redevelopment is on time, on budget

The Amador Hotel redevelopment project which "is creating all the commotion on the south end of downtown"—is on budget and should be completed in early 2018, local developer Max Bower told members of the Las Cruces City Council and Doña Ana County Commissioner Billy Garrett, who were meeting as the Las Cruces Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) board on Monday, March 27.

Even though the project includes a lot of moving parts, "it's been a very smooth process to this

the theatre, 211 N. Main St., and the new downtown plaza across the street, like showing of the movie "Grease" and hosting a classic car show. Performances at RGT could also be combined with pre- or post-receptions at the nearby historic Amador Hotel. which will soon be the CVB's new home.

The RGT lobby could be used as a downtown visitor center. San Filippo said, and tickets to events at RGT and other theatres and venues could be sold at the theatre's ticket booth. And, DAAC could continue its programming at RGT under CVB management.

Ed said he continues to be concerned about DAAC's management of RGT because of issues the theatre audit mandated in the contract, DAAC exceeding the theatre budget and the arts council's failure to continue booking commitments at RGT after June 30.

DAAC Executive Director Kathleen Albers said DAAC has answered all questions about the audit and is still "actively booking events at the theatre." She said the DAAC board voted to allocate DAAC funds to RGT because it "is committed to a certain level of programing" at the theatre.

Ed said the city took ownership of RGT from DAAC in October 2002, so it could accept \$2.28 million in

state and federal appropriations for theatre renovation. To ensure the city was receiving fair market value for the property, it entered into a five-year theatre management agreement with DAAC in July 2014. DAAC is in the third year of that agreement, which is renewable each year.

Mayor Pro-Tem Greg Smith said the city has a "long-term relationship with DAAC" regarding RGT management that it needs to honor. "I'm a little disappointed that we've arrived at this place in this situation. I feel very strongly that the community invested in the arts council being in that facility," he

"I have been happy with the way RGT has been run," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said. "Not everything that we have in the city is meant to make money," he

"I appreciate the time, effort, resources and sacrifices that DAAC has made" for RGT, Councillor Ceil Levatino said. "But that doesn't mean my loyalty is to them. Our first loyalty is to all of the residents of Las Cruces and especially the taxpayers."

"This is really hard," Councillor Kasandra Gandara said. She said she is "concerned about discrepancies in the (RGT) audit. "I definitely want those questions answered."

point," Bower said. "We're obviously off the ground and running."

The city entered into a \$6.5 million agreement with Bower's GMB Development company for the Amador renovation project last May. Work began late last year.

Once construction is completed, ownership of all properties will be transferred from GMB to the city. Under its agreement with the city, GMB will then begin seeking tenants for the new properties.

The completed project will include four fullservice restaurants. Bower said, including a main restaurant, a cocktail lounge, a tap room and an upstairs lounge. There also will be a

patio space and an event courtyard that will seat 900-plus.

The renovated hotel will be the new home of Visit Las Cruces, also known as the Las Cruces Convention and Visitors Bureau. Bower said Visit Las Cruces staff could move in before the end of the calendar vear.

Collectively, Bower said, the project will create "an unprecedented draw for downtown," and is expected to generate 40 to 60 new hospitality jobs and about \$385,000 in annual gross-receipts tax revenue for the city. City Downtown Coordinator Andy Hume said on-site parking will be provided behind the completed facility and across Bowman Avenue.

The project "will bring out-of-area people to downtown and the (downtown) Farmers Market," Councillor Gill Sorg said. He suggested placing signage on local interstates to attract more visitors.

"It's a huge asset for us," said Councillor Kasandra Gandara.

TIDD was created by the city in July 2009 "to generate revenue within the downtown area and to use those revenues within that area for

public improvement projects," according to city documents. It is funded through existing gross receipts tax revenues, with additional funding from the New Mexico Legislature.

TIDD funds are paying not only for the Amador Hotel renovation, but also for the upcoming conversion of Church and Water streets to two-way traffic. They also paid for construction of the downtown plaza that opened last September.

# City council hears healthy food initiative

At its Monday, March 27, work session, the Las Cruces City Council heard a presentation by La Semilla Food Center Co-Director Krysten Aguilar about a program that could make healthy food more available in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County (DAC).

Aguilar said the same presentation will be made to the DAC Commission about the Healthy Food Financing Initiative (HFFI) proposal, as a "first step to explore what that would look like" as a partnership among the city, the county and the local Healthy Food Healthy Community Co-

alition. Aguilar is a member of that coalition and the Mesilla Valley Food Policy Council.

The HFFI could help address local "food deserts" where people live up to 20 miles from a grocery store in a rural area or one to five miles in an urban area and, because of poverty issues, lack access to transportation to a grocery store, she said. Those conditions mean affected families and individuals are less likely to eat healthy foods, especially fresh fruits and vegetables.

Poverty is a major issue in DAC, she said. The county has a seven percent unemployment rate and an adult poverty rate of 27.9 percent. The coun-

ty's childhood poverty rate is 39 percent, which compares to 28 percent statewide and 21 percent nationwide, Aguilar said.

Aguilar said.

That means 59,300 people in the county lack access to healthy food, and 28.4 percent of DAC children are

food insecure, she said. And, nearly 81 percent of residents don't have adequate consumption of fruits and vegetables.

Those figures contribute to DAC's

> 31.8 percent adult obesity rate, Aguilar

Aguilar said, and the 14 percent of DAC adults who suffer from diabetes. "Lack of access to

good, healthy food is a real problem in Las Cruces and DAC," Aguilar said. Improved access to good food would mean healthier eating and healthier children and adults.

HFFI programs have had success in other areas, including Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and New Orleans, Aguilar said.

In Pennsylvania, the state invested \$30 million over 10 years in an HFFI program beginning in 2004. That public seed money helped leverage about \$130 million in private money for the program and created 5,000 jobs, 88 new or improved grocery stores and about 400,000 residents with increased access to healthy food, Aguilar said.

"I absolutely support

this," Councillor Ceil Levatino said.

Las Cruces needs to "make sure our community is better connected to healthy food options," Mayor Pro-Tem Greg Smith said.

Some with access to fruits and vegetables still choose to eat fast food and high-carbohydrate meals, said Councillor Jack Eakman, who attended the meeting by phone. That makes educating people about the value of making good food choices an important part of the project, he said.

"Food insecurity – access to healthy food – this is one of the issues I am most focused on," Councillor Kasandra Gandara said.

"I'm so glad you're keeping this in front of us (and) addressing poverty in the area," Councillor Gill Sorg said.

Because the city has hired a consulting firm to help generate "ideas for additional external funding," City Manager Stuart Ed told Aguilar the timing of her presentation to the council "is really great."



# Thousands of sixth graders have visited space center

Since the Challenger Center for Space Science Education (CCSSE) was moved to Las Cruces Public Schools' Professional **Development Center** (PDC) in August 2015, thousands of 6th graders from LCPS and other New Mexico school districts have participated in simulated space missions.

Thanks to the Village of Los Ranchos in Bernalillo County, which donated the center's simulator and other equipment valued at \$1.5 million, and former LCPS Interim Superintendent Dr. Steven Sanchez, who secured the donation, Las Cruces has the only CCSSE in the state, LCPS Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Coordinator Melissa DeLaurentis said.

The local center is one of 49 worldwide. Its closest neighbor is in Colorado Springs. Others are located throughout the U.S. (mostly on the East Coast), Canada and overseas.

LCPS spent about \$500,000 in voter-approved mill levy funds to renovate the PDC's textbook warehouse for the CCSSE. which is supported entirely by funds from the Spaceport gross receipts tax fund, DeLaurentis said. The money pays for student transportation. substitute teachers and all center staff and materials. LCPS receives about \$1.2 million in Spaceport funds each year, she said,

and they also help to fund robotics, student travel and after-school STEM programs.

A two-and-one-halfhour visit to the center provides pupils with "a true educational experience," DeLaurentis said. Each visit is "an extension of the classroom and not just a fun field trip." That's more important for today's students than ever before, she said, because about 80 percent of all new jobs require STEM skills.

Students do STEMrelated classwork before their CCSSE missions, play different roles (like navigator, medical and communications officer) during the space mission and want to learn more when they get back to their home schools.

"It has transformed sixth-grade instruction," DeLaurentis said.

"They don't stop talking about it for weeks," Vista Middle School science teacher Norm Jensen said. He visited the CCSSE for the fourth time with Vista 6th graders earlier this month.

Each student "has a different experience," said Jensen, who has been a science teacher for 18 vears. "They share that. No kid is left out in the learning experience."

Visits to the center also ensure "100 percent student engagement," he said. "We do not have discipline problems here," he said, even with students who have been banned from other field trips.

"There is no fluff," Jensen said. "There's practical learning."

The center has also had visits from Doña Ana Community College, the Asombro Institute for Science Education and even Virgin Galactic. It also has provided corporate missions for adults.

A Challenger summer camp will offer students an "extension of the academic school year," DeLaurentis said. Registration for the camp will open April 3, and there will be limited slots, which will fill up quickly.

CCSSE came about

in April 1986, less than three months after the Challenger disaster, when the families of the crew members who were killed on the flight gathered to "carry on the spirit of their loved ones," according to www. challengermn.org. "They envision(ed) a place where children, teachers and citizens (could) touch the future: manipulate equipment, conduct experiments, solve problems, and work together. immersing themselves in space-like surroundings."

### Fathom II breaks altitude record

USC's Fathom II rocket broke the current Spaceport America Student record when it reached an altitude of 144,000 feet (27.27 miles) after blasting off from Spaceport America's vertical launch campus On March 4.

USC students and alumni cheered alongside Spaceport America crewmembers as the Fathom II rocket soared past the previously held apogee to bring back the Spaceport America Student Rocket record to USC's Viterbi School of Engineering. Viewers around the world also joined via Spaceport America's https://twitter.com/periscopetv, and Facebook Live channels with over 4,000 views.

The distance was indicated by analysis of on-board image data, and independently corroborated by accelerometer and barometric pressure data during descent.

The first CCSSE opened in Houston in August

virtual gala – enough to support another 15 incoming freshman scholars from across New Mexico throughout four years of their undergraduate degree program.



# NFL Hall of Fame receiver to speak at annual breakfast

Boys & Girls Club friends and supporters Lou & Mary Henson welcome NFL Hall of Famer Andre Reed as the guest speaker for the Ninth Annual Lou & Mary Henson Community Breakfast. The breakfast, which benefits the club, will be held Thursday, April 13 at 7 a.m. at New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum.

The event has brought prominent keynote speakers to Las Cruces since 2009.

Andre Reed has had a legendary career, ranking 12th in NFL history in total career receptions with 951. He played for 16 NFL seasons, 15 with the Buf-

with the Washington Redskins in 2000 when he retired. Reed was selected for the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2014.

falo Bills (1985-

1999) and one

With the Bills, Reed played in four consecutive Super Bowls (1991–1994) and was selected to the Pro Bowl in seven consecutive seasons (1988–1994). A tribute to his durability, he played

in 234 NFL games between 1985 and 2000, the 59th most by any player, including those in less physically demanding positions, such as kickers and punters.

In his Super Bowls, Reed recorded 27 receptions, second-most in NFL history. His 323 total Super Bowl receiving yards are the third-most in Super Bowl history. Reed ranks near the top in nearly all NFL career statistical receiving categories. He went over 1,000 yards four times in a 16-year career, is ninth in NFL history in total career receiving yards with 13,198,

and 11th in total career touchdown receptions with 87.

He established the Andre Reed Foundation in 2010 to help underprivileged children reach their potential in becoming responsible contributors to their communities.

For his efforts, Reed was inducted into Boys & Girls Clubs of America's Hall of Fame in 2015, joining the likes of Denzel Washington, Jennifer Lopez and Magic Johnson. He volunteers as an ambassador for Boys & Girls Club kids by visiting local clubs.

The breakfast is the sig-

nature event for the Boys & Girls Club, with ongoing support from the Hensons. "We are extremely grateful for the tremendous support of Coach Henson and Mary, who have become a part of our club's extended family," said Ashley Echavarria, Executive Director. "Andre Reed is just one more testament to the work that we do in clubs across the country, and we are thrilled to welcome him to Las Cruces to hear his story."

# **The Old West** has new look

Pete Paulson was a kid roaming free in an amusement park —until he reached age 6 or 7.

Then he went to work, tying up horses and taking tickets for his dad's stagecoach ride at The Dells in Wisconsin. He earned a dollar a week.

He's still taking tickets and tying horses — both in real life and in the movies.

His business, Frontier Adventures, is headquartered on a farm north of Doña Ana, but Paulson works anywhere in the region where folks want to hop a ride on a stagecoach or horse-drawn trolley, especially at festivals.

Paulson and his team are at Buddy Day on Saturday, April 1, in Pioneer Women's Park, giving free rides sponsored by Sierra Title Co. The following weekend, Paulson returns to Pioneer Park for the Las Cruces International Festival.

For years, his wagons have been a regular feature at the Great American Duck Race in Deming.

When he first started working the event, he charged for rides. Nobody rode.

Now rides are free and the demand is so brisk he takes two trolleys to the event.

"We went to sponsors, and it worked out," he said.

The same thing happened at Old Lincoln Days, where sponsors from Ruidoso and Roswell now promote their

businesses with signs attached to the trolleys.

#### **Inventory** and salesmanship

"I spend more of my time seeking sponsorships than behind a team of horses," Paulson said.

Making his appearances possible are two teams of horses, half draft and half saddle horse, raised on Amish farms. They pull Paulson's six horse-drawn vehicles, including the stagecoach and trolleys.

The modern, horse-drawn trolleys are manufactured in Minnesota and can carry 20 to 25 people.

Also in Paulson's inventory is an elegant black coach in the French style, known as a vis-à-vis because passengers sit on facing seats. The coach is available for hire for weddings, quinciñeras and parades.

Paulson says healthy, happy horses make the best "employees."

"If horses are not healthy and happy, all this stuff — the trolleys, the coaches, the tractor don't mean a thing," he said.

Paulson takes care to protect those "employees." During the off-season, they exercise in a large, fenced pasture. Their busy season starts slowly, beginning in November with the Sun Bowl parade in El Paso.

"For 28 years in a row I've been on a wagon on Thanksgiving Day in El Paso," Paulson said.

In January, it's the Fort Worth Stock Show All Western Parade and in February the Tucson Rodeo parade.

"It's not like horses that have regular jobs out on the street in the city," he said, noting the horses have down time between gigs.

Nonetheless, Paulson said, people occasionally give him flack about the horses being out in the sun.

"That's troublesome," he said. "If a horse could talk they would tell him, 'No, this guy is cool.'

"I do this because I love horses. It's a privilege for me to ride behind a good team for six hours then put them up at night knowing they've done a good job. I take pride in the care I give my animals."

#### Family business rolls along

Paulson initially worked for his father, Chap Paulson, who bought property in Las Cruces in the early '70s and later purchased the Doña Ana farm. The family spent winters there and summers at Wisconsin Dells.

"We ran a ride at Fort Dells (Wisconsin amusement park) until I turned 15," he said. On a busy day they ran two coaches and three teams, transporting 1,000 passengers.

Chap Paulson built his first coach in 1952, Pete Paulson said, and his 43rd in 1980.

His factory produced three stagecoach models - one of which his son still uses.

In the 1960s a new coach would sell for \$5,000, Pete Paulson said.

Among Chap Paulson's other Wisconsin ventures was a mock gold mine for tourists. Pete has an equally eclectic resume, including movie acting. He spent three weeks in Santa Fe on the set of the 2014 TV show, "Gunslingers," appearing in stagecoach scenes and "anything that included horses."

He also worked on the movie "The Ridiculous 6."

"It was a thrill — a lot of fun working with the other wranglers," he said. "The horses enjoyed it, too. A movie set is not any more stressful than what they're used to dealing with."

# A sensitive subject: Who pays for the tax?

hen the government imposes a tax, who actually pays it? The buyer or the seller? This is one of the oldest questions in economics, predating even Adam Smith. And it is the "theory of tax incidence" that seeks to answer this question.

How the tax incidence is divided between businesses and consumers depends on the ability of the business to pass on the tax. It could be that the business can raise the final price,

passing the tax along to consumers. Or it could be that attempts to pass on the tax will be thwarted by loss of market share, forc-

ing the business owners to pay the tax out of profits. Either outcome is possible. Moreover, what is true in one place and time may not be true in another place or time.

the critical factor in determining tax incidence is the relative sensitivity to price of supply and of demand. If demand is particularly

price sensitive, or supply insensitive, then business ends up eating the tax. If supply is particularly price sensitive and demand relatively insensitive, then the consumer pays.

Think of the extreme case where supply is completely insensitive to price changes, while demand is highly sensitive. In this case, any change in price will result in a sharp drop off in sales, thereby, punishing the business for trying to pass on the tax.

Now think about the opposite extreme: supply is now highly sensitive to price and demand insensitive. In this case the seller will be able to raise the product's price to cover the tax without

loss of market share. The incidence falls on the consumer.

More typically is the middle ground where the incidence is shared between the business and the customer. For example, if both supply and demand are equally sensitive to price then the incidence will be exactly split between sellers and buyers—the neat sort of symmetry that economists love.

It makes no difference on whom the tax is accessed, the buyer or the seller, as the incidence depends only on the relative price sensitivity of supply and demand. Who is legally responsible is irrelevant.

Take, for example,

FICA tax, which is currently 15.4 percent split evenly between employers and employees. The supply of unskilled workers is notoriously insensitive to wages, which means that the incidence of the Social Security tax falls heavily on unskilled workers, not on the employer. Skilled workers have much more elastic supply, so they pay less for Social Security than the unskilled. That emplovees and businesses are each accessed 50 percent of FICA doesn't matter.

Beyond the incidence of taxes is the dead weight loss associated with higher taxes. Because taxes raise prices, total sales volume falls. The loss of value from lower sales is a loss to the private sector that is not captured by the government.

Dead weight loss can be minimized if taxes are imposed on a market with relatively insensitive supply and demand compared to other markets, and have less sensitive sales so the dead weight loss is smaller.



### Partnership rewrites NM's marketing message

Tim Nitti, guest speaker at the March Business in the Borderplex Forum, noted Las Cruces recently was honored as an undiscovered gem.

"I think we should all be sick of being an undiscovered gem." he said.

"There's a lot of dead air out there. We have a unique opportunity to differentiate ourselves."

During his first three months as president and CEO of the state's economic development marketing arm — New Mexico Partnership - Nitti has identified messages he believes should tout the state's marketing, among them its workforce, political stability and low risk of natural disasters.

"I don't think we make enough of our natural disaster risk." he said.

And, compared to neighboring states, Nitti said, New Mexico can be portraved as having "a moderate, temperate political climate."

#### **Showcasing** the workforce

The state's workforce is also an important asset. Not only is it available, there are no dominant employers with the ability to hire the best potential emplovees.

"If you go to Charlotte (North Carolina) as a financial services firm, vou will ... probably be fifth or sixth in line (for employees,)" Nitti said. "That's a huge intangible that really resonates with companies."

New Mexico's abundance of science and engineering talent should be packaged and sold to the outside world. Nitti said.

In addition, such talent creates a "halo effect" that attracts other kinds of companies, he said.

The perception is that "this is a smart place with really intelligent, creative people."

#### The 'how" counts

Big advertising campaigns are "incredibly expensive" and usually don't produce the desired effect, Nitti said. Instead, the New Mexico Partnership will emphasize marketing and public relations.

The state has "a ton of great spokespersons who can talk about their niche or just be a great cheerleader. People here have good stories that will resonate."

He said the state struggles with funding economic development organizations. Other states have public-private partnerships up to four times larger. Some, such as Utah, "have been where we are and have transformed themselves," he said, by thinking "big and audaciously."

#### **Momentum shifts**

Prior to joining the New Mexico Partnership, Nitti founded Geo-**Analytics Consulting** LLC and was a principal with KLG Advisors, an advisory firm for global companies expanding into new locations.

MVEDA CEO and President Davin Lopez said Nitti knows what companies want and has earned their trust, citing Nitti's role in bringing Fidelity to Albuquerque in 2008.

Nitti said prior to the recession New Mexico was starting to build momentum. "We did it once," he said. "Let's just do it again."

He noted the state recently has landed some

good projects, beating out Utah. Florida and Texas. "We're punching way above our level."

Nitti touts the role of incentives in attracting companies. Although they have their core requirements, incentives become a factor when several states are competing. New Mexico's incentives are "not lavish, but predictable," Nitti said.

"I think we're in pretty good shape. Now we've got a shot in any given fight to win on incentives."



# Santa Fe actress crafts a one-woman show

A Santa Fe actress with a long career in stage, television and film work is bringing to Las Cruces the one-woman show she wrote about her love of cooking and what she learned growing up in a large, immigrant family.

"If you grew up in a family that cooked a lot, you learned a lot in the kitchen," said actor and playwright Debrianna Mansini. "We made everything."

Mansini will perform her play "The Meatball Chronicles" at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, April 21 and 22 and at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, April 23, at Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main St.

Families cook together less than they used to, she said, and that has been a loss for our culture. "It's incumbent on storytellers to remind us of our roots, of the things we may have lost."

Mansini said the idea for the play began when she prepared meatballs and pasta for her then-boyfriend David Forlano, whom she married in 2006. Making the meal, the first she had prepared for Forlano, proved emotional. "I could not stop crying," Mansini said. "All of the parts of my life were flooding over me. I had an epiphany. That's what the story is – how I found myself. I felt invisible my whole life. In that moment, I discovered who I was."

Writing, workshopping and rewriting the script convinced Mansini that she had chosen the right title for her play. It reflects a journey that "was full circle, so I was glad I used a round food."

The play includes about 60 video clips of family photos, a vintage school bus and abstract images designed to spark the au-

dience's imagination, she said.

Mansini, who said she has been acting her "whole adult life," studied the craft at Circle in the Square Theatre in New York City before moving to Santa Fe. Her professional credits include the second season of "Better Call Saul," 2009's "Crazy Heart" and 2014 "Drunktown's Finest." Mansini made an earlier visit to Las Cruces while filming 2008's "The Burning Plain."

Mansini has performed "The Meatball Chronicles" in Santa Fe, and future performances will include the prestigious Last Frontier Theatre Conference in Valdez, Alaska, in June.

As a writer, she has a lifetime of journal work, poetry (winning a national contest as a high school freshman) and a web series. "The Meatball Chronicles" is her first full-length play.

Writing and then performing

her own 90-minute, one-act play has been "a very surreal experience," Mansini said. "It's an intimate piece."

"We are fortunate to have the opportunity to host Debrianna Mansini and her wonderful solo performance of her play." said Black Box Theatre owner Ceil Herman. "The play is an entertaining and heartwarming memory of family and food. It is also the first time in our 18 years that we have had an opportunity to couple with Lorenzo's Restaurant. They are already one of our 20 Food for Theatre Partners, but over the weekend of April 21-23, they will have The Meatball Chronicles special meal."

The gallery is located at 3206 Harrelson St. in Mesilla Park, Look for the big Art Obscura name on the building, and the old Sunland Park fire truck out front.

Inside, you will find antiques, oddities and collectibles ranging from license plates and bottles to hubcaps and lanterns. There also are pinball machines, a small safe, buttons and magnets, an old-fashioned cash register, a slot machine, a candy machine, a cigarette machine, a juke box and even Roberts' collection of guitars. You will also find jewelry (including a necklace made out of shell casings), prayer flags, figurines and "all kinds of stuff," Roberts said.

The gallery/store opened in 2013. Roberts said he chose the name "Art Obscura" because it's "different from anywhere else."

Art Obscura sells Tshirts, hoodies and caps with the Organ Mountain Outfitters logo. You'll also find muscle shirts and caps with the logo of Brazito Farms, a local vegetable farm owned by Roberts' girlfriend, Abbey Carver, who is a regular fixture at the gallery.

Ever been to Paterson. New Jersey?

No? Well, here is your chance! In this quiet and reserved new movie that was written and directed by Jim Jarmusch (Ghost Dog, Year of the Horse) one may find a believable tale about an every man and his family. His name. certainly not coincidentally, is also Paterson. Played by Adam Driver, Paterson in Paterson drives a bus for the city and is also a poet.

Paterson the poet is inspired, we discover, by the Pulitzer Prize-winning and former poet laureate of the U.S., William Carlos Williams, who actually

hailed from Rutherford about 10 miles down the

Paterson's Paterson is a quiet but somewhat ghostly place. As he walks to work each day, Paterson takes the same route, as he is a man of routine. He gets up at the same time, using a skill of arising before the alarm goes off. He spends every lunch hour at Paterson Falls, where he also spends some free time.

He is happily married to Laura, an amazing woman of many talents, who mostly stays at home but occupies her time with black-and-white creations and vummvlooking cupcakes. She is of Iranian descent and seems to love her life and

seems to only be able to share his emotional depth through his writings. He keeps a notebook in which he writes, by a neat hand, plain-sounding but meaningful poems, which match his lifestyle.

ber and his sometimes adversary is an English bulldog named Marvin, who mostly lounges

on a favorite chair, but clearly is not enthused by the presence of Paterson the man (we never learn his first name). But, again, as a part of his daily rituals, Paterson takes Marvin out for an evening stroll, where they end up at the neighborhood tavern. Marvin is leashed outside, Paterson goes in for a beer with an occasional friend and the slightly pessimistic barkeep. Paterson has just one beer as he talks to

the bartender, discussing rather mundane things such as the bar's "wall of fame," which features Lou Costello among others, sandwiched by thoughts about life in general. He talks love with a recently dumped

> guy, whose former girlfriend is also a regular. From here. Paterson finds ideas for his poems;

other ideas come from eavesdropping on bus riders. Conversations, especially when two polite gents discuss amorous events in very appropriate terms, are the best parts of the movie.

The film is composed and straightforward. Jarmusch and company are not out to solve the world's problems or to have the main characters walk away from a fiery explosion. Each scene is well set and detailed


(the addition of Laura's beautiful black and white creations rather describes the tone of the movie) The cinematography is amazingly interesting and this is a film that I want to see again, just because of the detailing and story.

Another wonderful thing about Paterson is his lack of a cellphone. When asked why he doesn't have one, he responds that it would be like wearing a leash (I paraphrase), which is so

The film ends as simply as it begins, with Paterson sitting on a bench by the falls, when a stranger happens to sit nearby. They discuss Williams and as he departs. the stranger notes, "I breathe poetry."

A perfect metaphor for a lovely and engaging film.

## Facing down the elephants in the room

ntil the last century, Jews had no reason to trust Christians. From the time of the Byzantine Emperor Justinian. Jews were systematically excluded from society. In the Islamic world, the Pact of Umar limited Jewish participation in society.

The Holocaust marked the turning point to an international movement of re-thinking a very bad history and changing it toward the future.

That elephant in the room has been faced down for half a the Cassock century and the situation has decidedly changed. But there's another elephant in the room: the relation of Islam to

Most Americans grow up with minimal understanding of history. Given our colonial background, we know something about western European history. We know about France and England and Germany,

Christianity and Judaism.

but what about Poland or Ukraine or Croatia? When you ask about regions even farther East, many Americans know little about, say, Egypt in historical perspective.

Around 580 CE, a monk named John Moschos wrote "The Spiritual Meadow," in which he

surveyed the vast Christian landscape of Palestine and Egypt. His work was meant to survey and strengthen Christian faith everywhere, but part of its appeal was to highlight the extraordinary vitality of Christianity in those areas.

In the 1990s, a young Oxford graduate named William Dalrymple retraced John Moschos's steps and wrote about that trek in "From the Holy Mountain." He saw the dissolution that happened since Moschos's time and the fragile nature of Christianity in the middle east. Our Orthodox Christian faith remained the same, of course, but the numbers of adherents had dwindled precipitously since Moschos's time. Some reviewers have called the book an obituary for Middle Eastern Christianity which is chiefly Orthodox.

Because many Americans know little or nothing about the Orthodox Church and its history, this may be received as news like the shrinkage of Christianity everywhere. It is not. In the Seventh Century CE, Muslim conquerors flooded the area and in their wake, came the systematic diminution of the Christian monasteries and villages and the beginning of the Dhimma, a means to control non-Muslim populations in areas of expansion. Dhimma is

a system of taxation and restriction of aspects of citizenship which applied to both Christians and Jews in Muslim countries. This could include such things as dress codes, restriction from key areas of your own conquered land, and additional tolls. The Dhimma still pertains today in the countries of Pakistan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Iran.

This is the elephant in the room. We need to address these issues in America if we are to come to the full level of Muslim-Christian and Muslim-Jewish relationships for which we have heartfelt desire. Casting a blind eve on these matters is neither useful or helpful. There is a level of distrust that is hard to move beyond under these circumstances, since the history is a continuous narrative of suppression and oppression in these countries.

That said, America is different. We are an established republic seeking to be a democracy, and within that framework we have no room for the establishment, favoring, or dominance of one religion over another (although Protestantism was, in truth, the unofficially established American religion for most of our history).

Muslims who have migrated to America and those now born here embrace that ideal and seek to live within the parameters of our society, many in gratitude that they are no longer participants in a force of political and religious dominance. Islam is flourishing and growing on our soil and the results of interreligious cooperation and crossfertilization are beginning to be evident on local levels everywhere, including the Mesilla Valley. We can only hope that they unfold in even more encouraging and fruitful ways in future.

## Clients benefit from NMSU therapeutic riding program

When 3-year-old Caleb Casaus arrived for his therapeutic riding lesson at New Mexico State University on a crisp spring morning, he looked a little uncertain. Jorge Cardona, an occupational therapist with MECA Therapies, lifted Caleb onto Frankie, a large brown Appaloosa horse with a white face.

It didn't take long for Caleb to start to smile, speak and even high-five Cardona.

Caleb is one of several clients in the NMSU Therapeutic Riding Program, which is part of the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences. His unquestionable comfort level with Frankie is one reason his therapy sessions are successful.

Laura White, director of the TRP, said the human-animal connection is a key component to the therapy sessions.

"We see a lot of interaction between the client and the horse," she said.

"The clients are usually able to first connect with the horse and begin to trust that large ani-

mal. Then they begin to trust the people who are there to help them in the session."

White is also an as-

sistant professor in the Department of Animal and Range Sciences who teaches a number of equine-related courses.

The TRP has partnered with private therapy companies and with the NMSU Family and Child Science Program to provide therapeutic equine options to community members. Those options include equine-assisted learning, equine-assisted psychotherapy and hippotherapy.

"Our clients have a wide range of abilities, so everyone takes away something a little different," White said. "Many of the young clients are unsure of the world around them, and they don't trust very easily.


In order to complete a therapy session on the back of a horse, with a therapist and without their mother or father, it takes a lot of trust."

Plans are underway for a sensory trail surrounding the covered arena. White said the sensory trail will provide another scenario in which the client and horse may interact. The trail will include hills, trees, plants and interactive games on a board that's the height of the horse.

Other future improvements include arena improvements and a barn. Members of the NMSU Therapeutic Riding Association organize a pony carnival each semester as a small fundraiser.

## Healing is aided by time, supporting health naturally

o often, humans see things as either healthy or unhealthy, sound or unsound when it comes to our horses. Truth is, there are so many variations of condition that our horses are often somewhere in between and in the process of healing one thing or another most of the time.

Often, a malady is

addressed with the strongest allopathic medicine available, which can suppress symptoms to ease the equine, but the condition and its cause are still viable. This makes

human goes to "out

the horse more vulnerable to further injury or illness because the body has not been given the time needed to heal.

Bodies know how to heal. All we do is support that process and reduce further damage while easing discomfort. If we remove the body's own innate systems of protection (pain, inflammation and edema), then we must rest the horse and not act as if nothing had happened. Flesh, bone and blood need time to heal. Pain keeps the body from reinjuring something; inflammation acts as a natural "splint" to help immobilize a traumatized area. All injuries receive an increased supply of blood to bring healing and detoxifying agents immediately to the site.

Sometimes, after a horse has not fully recovered, alternative treatments are considered. At Dharmahorse, herbs, homeopathy, hydrotherapy, oils and nutrition are our first choices as we endeavor to enhance healing while determining the underlying cause of disease

or disorders. The pharmaceuticals that the vet prescribes are in addition to our support of the body. We believe that relieving only the symptoms prolongs healing time.

As stewards of our horses, we need to take a "Whole Horse" approach and we must recognize that when the body is healing an injury or a malady, it is at work! Rest is the great equalizer. "Tincture of Time" is the powerful remedy.

Since we have had horses here with skull fractures, cancers, laminitis, founder, split open hooves, COPD, ulcers, severed tendons, contracted tendons, heart murmurs, enteroliths, Uveitis, Cushing's syndrome, arthritis, abscesses, hypothyroidism, no teeth, hives, bowed tendons, knocked down hips, upward fixation of the patella, pelvic misalignment and more, we

have learned the lessons of patience. And we have learned that bodies really do know how to heal – given time, support, nourishment and love.

That is the incredible symbiosis of horse/human relationships. We support each others' healing with positive experiences, compassion, touch contact and empathy. When we can see the big picture of ongoing healthy choices and practices, we can heal each other.

Sitting quietly in the lobby, Richard Astepp, a distinguished white-haired gentleman, worked with crochet needles on a blue and pink baby blanket decorated with puffy letters from A to Z. Although I was surprised to see a man doing what many may think of as "woman's work," Astepp's skills belie a knack for his hobby. He's been crocheting — and teaching the craft — for more than 20 years. He spends many hours at Sage Café, shoul-

der to shoulder with the ladies, creating artwork from yarn.

More than 10 activities for seniors take place at the Las Cruces Senior Centers, including enhanced fitness geared to seniors, train dominoes, card games, chess, a book club and electronic device classes. A branch of the Branigan Library also is open at Sage Café.

I asked the ladies as they twined their needles and stitched tiny colors into flower shapes stretched over round frames, if any gossip occurred during their time together.



Baker cements his place in New Mexico State basketball lore after becoming the third Aggie to earn AP All-American Honorable Mention status in the last four years and fourth overall, joining James Moore (2003), Daniel Mullings (2014) and Pascal Siakam (2015).

The Washington, D.C., product was also named the Western Athletic Conference Player of the Year earlier this month in addition to his National Association of Basketball Coaches All-District 6 First Team award. He is the fourth Aggie to earn NABC All-District honors in as many years.

At the end of his senior campaign, Baker led team with 16.7 points per game while pulling down 4.2 rebounds per game - good for third on the team – while dishing out a team-best 4.2 assists per game. The Aggie floor general also led the team in scoring in 19 of the 33 games he started.

Before starting conference play, Baker tied his career-high in 3-point field goals made against UTEP at

home – draining six from downtown.

The 6-0 guard opened conference play with his second-career doubledouble, recording 12 points and five rebounds while dishing out a career-high 10 assists. Baker then willed the Aggies to a road victory over Seattle U with 19 points and a career-high 11 rebounds for his third-career double-double. He also dropped a career-high 36 points on 11-of-18 shooting at UT Rio Grande Valley to help power NM State past the Vaqueros 107-101.

He was instrumental in New Mexico State's 20-game winning streak, the second-longest in program history behind the 1937-38 team's record of 21. That streak also was the thirdlongest in the country this season behind Gonzaga (29) and Vermont (21).

Baker also played a significant role in the team's 23 straight wins on Lou Henson Court at the Pan Am Center as well as its 39-game home win streak in conference play.

His feats will enter the record books for NMSU. Baker's 200 made shots from beyond the arc place him fourth all-time, while his 325 free throws place him eighth in school history. His .799 shooting clip from the line ranks him sixth. His 378 assists at NM State are good for fourth

all-time and were just two shy of passing Keith Hill (379, 1987-90) for third. His 138 steals over four years ranked him sixth in the Aggie record books (since 1981).

The Washington, D.C., product cemented his name into Aggie lore when he recorded his 1.000th career point in the second half at UTEP. At season's end, his 160 made free throws was fourth-most in a singleseason at NM State, while his .829 clip from the line was 10th best in a single season.

All this, after a brief fling with the NBA draft after his junior season. Baker eventually withdrew his name from consideration and returned to NMSU for his senior season.

Baker was the lone WAC player named to the district first team, while Jaylin Airington of CSU Bakersfield and LaVell Boyd of UMKC were named to the second team.

## NMSU golf team finishes 15th in Texas invitational

### **BULLETIN REPORT**

The New Mexico State men's golf team completed a two-day, three-round event at the Lone Star Invitational in San Antonio, Texas on Monday. The team's play on Briggs Ranch Golf Course saw them finish in 15th place out of 15 with a 54-hole score of 892 (+28).

Leading the play for

the Aggies was Luis Medina who posted totals of 76-71-71—218 (+2) to finish in a tie for 41st. Just behind Medina was Ryo Harada finishing with his best round on the final day with scores of 73-75-71—219 (+3), putting the freshman in a tie for 47th.

Another freshman, Jack Snyder, fired rounds of 75-74-76—225 (+9) to

complete the invitational in a tie for 67th. Isaac Merry put up totals of 74-74-82—230 (+14) to place in a tie for 74th. Rounding out the NM State lineup, Michael McGilton posted scores over two days of 77-82—82—241 (+25) which put him in 78th.

Through 54 holes, Medina led the Aggies firing 10 birdies over two days, followed by Isaac Merry

and Ryo Harada with nine apiece. Jack Snyder added eight and McGilton posted five.

After the Lone Star Invitational wrapped up, No. 15 Oklahoma took home first-place honors with a score of 824 (-40), followed by No. 7 Illinois in second at 828 (-36) and Mississippi State filled out the top three posting a total of 837 (-13).

## Everyday golf statistics you can relate to

Statistics can be a blessing and a curse. In 1948 statistics showed Dewey would win; but in fact, Truman won. That same thing happened just last November.

As for statistics being valid and meaningful numbers, some wise man once opined: "statistics are like bikinis – what they reveal is suggestive, but what they conceal is vital." When recreational golfers chart statistics they usually just consider fairways, greens and putts. All the professional golf tours keep far more extensive stats on player performance, which dig deeply into the effectiveness and efficiency of the best players in the game.

There are stats on "sand saves," "three-putt avoidance," "final-round scoring," a "par-breaker" stat (the ratio of birdies to total tournament holes played), "scrambling" ratio, which is non-GIR pars saved, and my favorite, the "bounce-back" number, which is the frequency a player makes birdie following a double bogie or worse. It's really an indicator of mental toughness.

I confess that as I read through PGA Tour stats my mind wanders. C'mon, who can relate to "holes-per-eagle?" Most chaps play golf their entire lives and maybe have one eagle, when they bladed a shot over the green and it miraculously ricocheted off a ball washer

into the hole for a three.

So I started thinking up more telling methods of tracking personal performance and behavior for everyday golfers. Here are some of my more unique and creative golf stats of which you might consider keeping careful logs.

**Panhandling ratio:** probability of you begging your competitors for strokes on the first tee.

**Hangover scoring:** average score on morning rounds when suffering from a killer hangover.

**Shank-you's:** the number of solid, quality shots after two consecutive shanks per round.

**Face-savers:** your percentage of good shots after whiffing or cold topping your hall

**Over probability:** chance of a player declaring a "breakfast ball," or "hit-till-you're happy" stat.

**Post-meltdown scoring:** score on the next round after you've scored 14 over your handicap.

**Post-sandbag scoring:** your average score the round after you just had a net 62; you're not a 14!

Vanity ratio: total high scores which

were not posted compared to total rounds played.

**Gimmies:** putts shorter than 18 inches that you get to pick up during a round.

**Stupidos:** putts that should have been gimmies that you missed. Often confused with "yips."

**Bear-downs:** putts you made after opponent snickers "get it close" as you're over the ball.

**Re-putt makes:** second-attempt doover putts that go in; yeah, that second guy is good.

**Driving distance:** the total distance in miles and tenths that you had to drive your cart per round.

**Bump-and-runs:** number of other carts, stone walls, obstacles and curbs hit by your cart.

**Risk-taking index:** total rounds played on your anniversary, wife's birthday and Mother's Day.

**Whining chart:** yelping on course conditions, weather or hole locations. Cheese with that whine?

**Wedgies:** proximity (in feet) to the

hole of your next shot after laying the sod over the first wedge.

**Pounding index:** number of beers consumed per round; index is doubled by post-round beers.

**Suds-saves:** number of (full) beer cup catches per 18 holes, as your beer is about to exit the cart.

**Ironman or Wonderwoman index:** number of rounds a golfer has played in a vear, over 200.

**Helicopter score:** number of club throws per round times penalty fines leveled. Zero is good!

**Polies:** number of putts made longer than 7' 6" (flag pole length) saving net bogie to win money.

**Sandies:** Gross pars (or better) made from shots played out of officially marked hazards. Money.

**Wing-and-a-prayer score:** Average score over a dozen rounds without any practicing at all.

**Driver-of-the Month tally:** number of rounds played per new driver. So many clubs, so little time.



The New Mexico State baseball team struck first but left too many runners on base as the team fell to the University of New Mexico for the second time this year, 5-3, March 28, at Presley Askew Field.

UNM beat NMSU earlier in March, 8-2, in El Paso.

Chris Kucko (0-0) got the start Tuesday for the Aggies, squaring off against the Lobos' Austin Isenhart (3-1). The game was scoreless through two innings, but in the bottom of the third, Austin Botello roped a two-out double to left field, bringing home Joey Ortiz for the Aggies. Dan Hetzel then knocked a double to

center, scoring Botello for a 2-0 lead.

The Lobos answered in the top of the fourth on a passed ball. After a pitching change, UNM's Andre Gregory hit a two-run homer to give the visitors a 3-2 lead.

NM State responded in the fourth as Mason Fishback scored from second base on Cooper Williams' single to left field, tying the game 3-3.

UNM took the lead for good in the fifth as NMSU failed to get key hits with men on base over the final four innings. The Lobos added an insurance run in the eighth.

The win went to UNM reliever Cody Dye (1-0), while Chris Tripp picked up the save (4).

Aggie freshman Joseph Standley (1-1) was charged with the loss.


Led by Hetzel and Fishback with two hits apiece, the Aggies outhit the Lobos, 9-7, but stranded seven runners.
