Keep a close eye on all pets this weekend

It's no secret that fireworks are great fun for people, but our four-legged friends are not fans of the bangs and flashes that accompany the July 4 celebrations.

Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, executive director of the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley, said the days and night around the holiday generally see a spike in intake numbers at the shelter, and Facebook and other social media light up with posts about missing pets in neighborhoods throughout Doña Ana County.

"These guys get scared by the noises and the flashes in the sky," she said. "They'll act very uncharacteristically during this kind of stress, and they'll try to flee the stress any way they can. Jumpers will jump, and diggers will dig.'

She recommends bringing companion animals in-



doors during the busiest times of fireworks activity, between dusk and 1 a.m., and she said yards should be checked closely for potential escape routes. She said the shelter, at 3551 Bataan Memorial West in Las Cru-

ces, is routinely open from noon to 6 p.m. for people to come reclaim pets that got out and may have been impounded. July 4 hours are noon to 3 p.m.

She said microchipped pets are much easier to return to owners, and she recommends chips for all pets.

Fire chief reminds residents of fireworks provisions

BULLETIN REPORT

With the upcoming celebration of the nation's independence on July 4, Doña Ana County's Fire and Emergency Services Department reminds residents of regulations set within the unincorporated areas of the county.

Fireworks allowed to be purchased and discharged within the county are ground and hand-held sparkling and smoking de-



vices, such as cone fountains, crackling devices, cylindrical fountains, flitter sparklers, illuminating torches, smoke devices and wheels.

Fireworks prohibited for possession, sale or use within the county limits are aerial spinners, helicopters, mines, missile-type rockets, Roman candles, shells, stick-type rockets, chasers and firecrackers.

County-prohibited fireworks purchased in the City of Anthony, Town of Mesilla or the City of Hatch can only be possessed or discharged within the boundaries of those perspective municipalities. Possessing or using prohibited fireworks in unauthorized areas can result in immediate confiscation of the contraband material and the initiation of criminal proceedings.

The Doña Ana County Fire and Emergency Services fire-prevention division will work alongside the Doña Ana County Sheriff's department to conduct patrols before, during and after July 4. Any illegal fireworks found will be confiscated, and citations will be issued.

"Doña Ana County Fire and Emergency Services Department strongly encourages users to discharge fireworks only on paved or barren lands, and with a readily available source of water nearby," said Interim Fire Chief Eric Crespin.

Additional rules and safety guidelines include:

• Keep in mind the hour of usage, and be considerate of your neighbors, particularly veterans with PTSD.

• Bring dogs indoors when fireworks are being used nearby.

• Be aware that dry weather conditions have left grasses and weeds susceptible to fire.

• Limit use of fireworks to areas away from combustibles.

• Children should never use fireworks without close adult supervision..

• Light only one pyrotechnic at a time and move a safe distance away while it ignites.

• Purchase fireworks only from a licensed vendor.

• Follow all label directions carefully.

• Safely dispose of all spent casings and debris, and do not torment companion animals or livestock.

LCPS schedules rivalry football games

Drawing a standing-room-only crowd of parents, students and community members, the announcement that the Oñate-Centennial High School rivalry football game would be played Thursday, Nov. 2, at Aggie Memorial Stadium drew support from a broad range of high school representatives attending the June 20 Las Cruces School Board meeting.

As part of the announcement, the Las Cruces-Mayfield High School rivalry football game was consequently scheduled for the following day, Friday, Nov. 3, at Aggie Memorial Stadium.

The announcement was made by Superintendent Dr. Greg Ewing, who negotiated with the LCPS Director of Athletics Ernie Viramontes and all four comprehensive high school principals to reach an agreement regarding the games.

Ewing also initiated the development

of a task force to study the logistics, feasibility and cost of scheduling future rivalry games beginning in 2018.

"I'm thankful and grateful for all the feedback I received. Going forward, we want to be transparent, open, and most importantly, supportive of students. So, by working with the principals and the director of athletics, we see this as an opportunity to continue to support students at all four comprehensive high schools," Ewing said.

At the previous LCPS School Board Work Session on June 6, a proposal to examine the logistics of a doubleheader football game, where all four comprehensive high school football teams would compete on the same day at Aggie Memorial Stadium, prompted a flurry of discussions among representatives from the four schools.

Contract extended for LCPS superintendent

BULLETIN REPORT

Following many words of praise for the work he has done since he arrived in Las Cruces, Dr. Greg Ewing, Superintendent of the Las Cruces Public Schools, was given a two-year contract by the Las Cruces Board of Education.

The contract is effective July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2019, and was based on his mid-year performance evaluation.

"The Board is overwhelmingly pleased with his performance," stated President Maria Flores during their June 20 Board Meeting. "We thank Dr. Ewing for his invaluable contribution to our students, teachers, classified staff, and the community of Las Cruces."

Flores cited many of Ewing's accomplishments during the past six months including:

• Working constructively and effectively with staff and the bargaining units;

• Bringing cohesion to

the district's work and keeping a focus on the district's mission;

• Preserving staff positions closest to the classroom and adding staff based on class size;

• Focusing on the "essence of the art of teaching" and encouraging teachers "to focus on teaching children with enthusiasm":

• Managing the district's multi-million-dollar budget and establishing an appropriate cash balance;

• Focusing "on the importance and integrity of the individual."

"I accept [the new contract] not only with enthusiasm but with humbleness," Ewing remarked. "I'd be remiss if I didn't say that all the great things [that have taken place] are a product of what happens when we work together as a team."

Ewing's salary will be \$180,000 annually. He offered, and the School Board agreed, to remove compensation related to his fringe benefits, including Internet service at his home office and the use of a district vehicle.

Ewing joined the Las Cruces Public Schools on Dec. 5, 2016, after the district conducted a national search. Previously, he was a top administrator with the Cobb County School District in Marietta, Georgia.



Reading program donates books to children

With a grant from the Devasthali Family Foundation Fund and nearly \$15,000 raised from corporate and private donors, the Children's Reading Alliance (CRA) has been able to purchase enough books to give one to each child who attends CRA reading programs at local schools this summer.


"We are closing in on our goal of being able to supply 9,000 books to struggling readers this summer, but we are still short about 1,600 books," CRA President Rorie Measure said. CRA is partnering with Las Cruces Public Schools to provide the books to children participating in the K-3+ program at many LCPS elementary schools during the summer.

"Our volunteers will visit classes at 18 K-3+ sites four times each," she said.

Many children and families would have "no books and no access to books unless we do what we do," Measure said. She said the books donated by CRA go "more than 2,200 of the most educationally vulnerable children in Las Cruces." The books belong to the children and are theirs to take home and keep.

"Struggling readers lose between two to four months

of their academic gains made during the school year when they do no recreational reading at home during the summer," Measure said. "Children raised in homes with books consistently out-perform those without books."

Search for and empty things that could hold water, like tarps, tires, buckets, plant saucers, clogged rain gutters, wheelbarrows, and wading pools. Fix leaking faucets and sprinkler heads. Bird baths and pet water dishes should be emptied, cleaned, and refilled at least twice a week

For standing water that can't be drained, local home improvement, hardware, and garden supply stores offer products like "Pre-strike" mosquito granules, "Mosquito Bits", and "Mosquito Dunks," which can be applied to the water for long-term control for developing mosquitoes. Read and comply with label directions.

Doña Ana County Vector Control is offering mosquito minnows, Gambusia spp, for stocking long-term standing water, like irrigation culverts, drainage ponds, garden ponds and water features. These small fish prey on developing mosquito larvae in the water, preventing their emergence as biting adults. Please call 575-526-8150 for details on the distribution

Mosquitoes require standing water to complete their lifecycle. MAKE YOUR HOME MOSQUITO-TIGHT. Repair or replace widow screens and screen doors. Mow your lawn regularly, and keep vegetation trimmed back around entrances.

> PROPERLY SCHEDULE OUTSIDE ACTIVITY. Mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Plan your activities to avoid peak populations.

USE MOSQUITO REPELLANT. A variety of products are available. Choose and use one that works for you. Read and follow label instructions.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS. Loose-fitting, light-colored clothing, long sleeves and pants, shoes and socks, will all reduce bites

MANAGE SWIM POOLS AND WATER FEATURES. Maintain regularly or drain completely.

Aedes aegypti, the type of mosquito that carries and transmits the Zika Virus (ZIKV), is closely associated with human environments and is predominantly a container breeding species found throughout Las Cruces. Its preferred breeding sites are containers such as bowls, tires, vases, fountains, empty bottles, etc. (figure below). Shallow culvert areas and catch ba-

sins can sometimes provide conducive larval environments for Aedes

aegypti Along with mosquito prevention and management conducted by Entomology Consultants LLC, the guidelines established by the Centers for Disease Control for ZIKV suppression will be utilized. Trapping data from the 2003-2016 seasons will aid in determining the surveillance and management needs for the 2017 season

The City will continue to:

 Provide public education campaigns focused on reducing or eliminating mosquitoes.

- · Develop and distribute mosquito education materials. Initiate community-wide mosquito surveys to:
- Determine mosquito presence or absence. - Estimate relative abundance.
- Determine distribution.
- Develop detailed vector distribution maps. - Evaluate the efficiency of source reduction and larvae treatment.

LAS CRUCES UTILITIES · GAS SECTION Digging: Your Rights and Responsibilities Know what's below. Call before you dig.

New Mexico excavation law places certain responsibilities with the excavator (a person using a mechanical digging device) for preventing damage to underground facilities. The law provides for a one-call system that the excavator can use free of charge to arrange to have underground facilities located and marked before an excavation occurs.

State Law Requires Excavators to:

- 1) Plan your excavation
- 2) Mark the excavation area in white.
- 3) Call before you dig.
- 4) Determine the location of any underground facilities.
- 5) Call the one call center if any facility is not marked to determine if it is "clear.
- 6) Preserve line location markings or provide offsets.
- 7) Expose any conflicts and maintain at least 18 inches of clearance from the horizontal mark and the edge of the mechanical digging device.
- 8) Support underground facilities during excavation as necessary.
- 9) Backfill in a careful manner.
- 10) Notify facility owners and 811 of any damage immediately 11) Standard locate tickets are valid for 10 working days.

What Happens When You Call:

Once you provide the necessary information, the one call operator will confirm all pertinent details. It is your responsibility to ensure the information was properly recorded on the request. Likewise, faxed or on-line requests will be returned to you as confirmation, and it is your responsibility to immediately confirm the information is correct

Sanchez Hall undergoes nearly \$5M renovation

Water Technology lab slated to reopen

With passage of a countywide 2015 general obligation bond and a state bond in 2014, Alex Sanchez Hall at Doña Ana Community College is seeing renovations that make the building more functional, more efficient and better suited to educate students.

Most of the renovation of the hall is completed. with only the commons area and some hallway areas pending final completion. The total cost for the project, which included extensive remodeling, building stabilization, roof work as well as a new fire alarm system, totaled \$4.95 million.

"Thanks to voters for passing the bond issue. as the original building at DACC built in 1978 is once again a stable. functional and beautiful place for students to learn," said Kelly Brooks, DACC Vice President of Business and Finance. "There are new classrooms which are refreshed and refurbished with new chairs. tables and projectors and a brand new water technology laboratory."

The crown jewel of the construction is a new state-of-the-art water technology laboratory slated to open for fall classes. The renovated laboratory includes two

water plants and an Ultra-Pure water purification plant, which was already in place.

In the past, the system prepared students to go into the microchip manufacturing industry with companies such as Intel, Motorola, and Kurita America. As water becomes scarcer, the cleaning of brackish or highly contaminated water is beginning to utilize this technology.

The second water plant is a new \$150,000 wastewater treatment plant which includes a nutrient removal system. Nutrients impact the environment and potentially public health. The plant is designed to remove nitrogen-ammonia and nitrates. The system converts ammonia to nitrates and then removes the nitrates through the process of denitrification. The plant is a smaller version of what students will experience on the job upon graduation.

"This renovation gives students a leg up when moving to the workforce and reflects a quality educational experience," said Terry Mount, director of Commercial Technologies. "The up-to-date nature of the facility will instill a sense of pride in our students."

The laboratory will be unveiled in late July with tours for students in the morning and a ribbon-cutting ceremony for local businesses in the afternoon.

The addition of the new plant will enhance the student experience according to Celina Apodaca, a former water tech student and current lab technician.

"The wastewater package plant will give students the opportunity to develop their skills for wastewater treatment plant operation through the biological, chemical, and physical analysis of wastewater."

Burrell College students host clothing drive

Determined to leave a positive impact on the community during their relatively short tenure in Las Cruces, students enrolled in the Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine's (BCOM) tenmonth, post-baccalaureate Foundations in Biomedical Science program, spent May collecting nearly 400 new clothing items to benefit students at Booker T. Maintaining such a supply allows school nurses to provide the students with the resources they need to help minimize embarrassment and lost instructional time."

The Foundations in Biomedical Science program is a graduate curriculum taught by BCOM medical school faculty and designed specifically to assist students in strengthening their credentials as medical school applicants.

Founded in 2013, BCOM is a private, osteopathic medical school located on the New Mexico State University Campus. The school is one of the newest medical colleges in the United States and the only one with a mission focused on health care in the Southwestern United States and Northern Mexico, according to the BCOM website.

Rocket science

Up to 2,000 rocketeers, family, friends, judges, sponsors and volunteers gathered for the Spaceport America Cup June 20-24, aka the Intercollegiate Rocket Engineering Competition (IREC). The Cup, conceived in 2016 by the Experimental Sounding Rocket Association (ESRA) and Spaceport America, is already the world's largest rocket engineering competition. Students from six continents attended this year.

Student teams were required to design, build and launch a rocket carrying at least 8.8 pounds of payload to a target apogee either 10,000 feet or 30,000 feet above ground level (AGL). After three days of non-stop launches and intense judging, the results were announced at the Spaceport America Cup Awards Banquet June 24:





Commuter rail study completed

The results of a study on a possible commuter rail connecting Las Cruces to El Paso were revealed June 27.

The Bulletin will have a report on the results in its July 7 edition.

The rail study was funded by \$50,000 in state legislative funding, which compensated the Center for Neighborhood Technology (CNT) to conduct the 15-question online survey in April 2016. The study received about 1,000 responses.

David Chandler, director of market research and innovation at CNT. said, "The study reveals how people will use the commuter service, which impediments or problems the commuter service may have and will be helpful for a proposed service plan.

"A rail service would be a fixed, permanent anchor and would operate on the same track as the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF), one of the largest freight railroads in the United States."

Chandler is the study's project manager.

Las Cruces resident Scott Snyder has been commuting from Las Cruces to El Paso for the past 34 years. Snyder commutes to the far-east side of El Paso and said "Horizon City has been exploding." He believes more people would benefit from rail service that includes far-east El Paso.

The proposed north station would be located at the Las Cruces Railroad Museum on Mesilla

Street. Union Station in El Paso would be the southern destination.

Ngage New Mexico provided community outreach for the study, assisted by the Empowerment Congress of Doña Ana County.

"There are many dual rail systems. Albuquerque to Santa Fe, Austin to San Antonio, San Francisco to Seattle, all of which contribute to economic development," said Ngage New Mexico **Executive Director Frank** R. Lopez.

The approval process for a commuter rail system is lengthy, with kev players in the South Central Regional Transit District, regional governments, the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway, and the New Mexico Department of Transportation.

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Getting pigs to market in the age of technology

At a workshop on incentives for ag and ag tech entrepreneurs, Karen Rawers described her plan to raise heirloom animals and sell them to restaurants.

One challenge, Rawers said, is finding slaughtering services.

She said she knew of mobile slaughter houses in California. She could buy one and trailer it back to New Mexico.


"There are not enough slaughter services in New Mexico," said workshop presenter Christine Logan of the New Mexico Economic Development Department.

Seated in the back row, Clyde Hudson, rural development coordinator for the USDA in Las Cruces, had an idea for Rawers.

Hudson said he knew of a mobile slaughterhouse in northern New Mexico that was purchased with USDA funding assistance. Perhaps funding is available, he suggested.

"That unit is for sale now," Logan said.

Rawers wondered aloud whether she might expand her business con-



Defining who you are

State incentives for a business that raises and sells heirloom animals could be very different than incentives for a mobile slaughtering business, Logan said.

In order to know where to go for help, ag and ag tech entrepreneurs need to know whether their business is defined as agriculture or technology, retail or manufacturing.

"If you sell whole watermelons, it's agriculture," Logan said. "If you sell slices to a person, it's retail."

Growing and selling heirloom animals also could be agriculture or retail. Providing mobile slaughtering services, however, could be classified as manufacturing, because it provides a nonretail service.

The new face of manufacturing

Like Rawers, Laura De La Cruz heard new possibilities at the workshop and learned who could help.

De La Cruz, a herding trainer and also a business and marketing professor, is putting together an online dog association with which people could video dogs working with livestock in order for them to become certified remotely.

Following the workshop, De La Cruz said Logan helped her determine her business would be classified by economic development assistance agencies as manufacturing.

"I didn't realize the venture I was looking into would fall into the manufacturing category because I would be delivering a service online," she said. "It was great mended sources I could contact for help. I had heard of New Mexico True, but would never have thought they could help market my service."

De La Cruz said she's designed a website, lined up judges and is eager to launch her new venture.

"In 2017, we can reach out with technology and touch Australia as easily as we can someone 10 miles down the road," she said.

The right kind of help

Logan advised ag and ag tech entrepreneurs to determine what they need in the way of assistance and who can do it for them, before they seek help.

Within the New Mexico Economic Development Department, major programs such as the Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP) and Local Economic Development Act (LEDA), sometimes referred to as New Mexico's closing fund, target financial assistance to businesses that are growing.

"If you have more employees, land, buildings, equipment, sales than before (more than the average for the past two years) you may be eligible," she said.

Most state economic development programs only help businesses that grow the state's tax base, she added.

"That's why traditional ag gets kicked out," Logan said. "We only help businesses that pay their (GRT) taxes. It's not that we don't like ag, but it doesn't fill our piggy bank.

"Any time you ask an agency for help, ask yourself what's in it for them."

Not just the money

She urged attendees to check out programs that provide technical assistance rather than funding. "Don't turn up your nose at technical assistance," she said. "Don't look away from a program that's not paying cash, just offering technical assistance."

Within NMEED are a number of sources of technical assistance, such as the business advocacy office, which helps businesses move through regulatory hurdles.

NMEED's international trade office can help identify international markets. New Mexico True, the office of tourism, promotes products grown or made in New Mexico.

Various tax credits, deductions and exemptions are available to a variety of business categories, Logan said. The state's department of Taxation and Revenue website has information on eligibility for tax credits, deductions and exemptions..

Other state governments departments, as well as federal, local and private organizations, may be able to help.

"You can do it all by yourself, but it hurts," Logan said. "Get some help."

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





City planning to re-negotiate franchise fees

The City of Las Cruces will soon begin renegotiating the franchise fees it charges El Paso Electric (EPE), Comcast Cable and other utility and telecommunications companies for the use of city rights-of-way.

Assistant City Manager William Studer said the city currently charges EPE a franchise fee of 2 percent, which nets the city about \$1.9 million a vear. The fees the city charges other companies using Las Cruces rights-of-way are also about 2 percent a year, Studer said, and generate another \$1 million annually.

Studer was speaking at the city council's work session, where councillors also heard about the city's sustainability program and received an update on its affordable housing program.

Mavor Pro-Tem Greg Smith said cities are trending toward charging an average of 4 percent franchise fees. That increase could double to about \$6 million a year in the amount Las Cruces collects.

The fees are also charged to city-owned utilities like gas, water and sewer.

Assistant City Manager David Dollahon said the city last renegotiated the franchise fee it charges EPE in 2000, while the last negotiation for cable television was in 1999, and the last negotiation with U.S. West was in 1996.

A franchise fee is charged to entities for their "extraordinary use of rights-of-way beyond the general right of travel" that regular taxpayers are entitled to. Studer said. The uses include the installation and repair of utility and communication lines, pipes and other services.

City getting greener

In the third year of the city's Sustainability Action Plan, adopted in June 2014, the citv has reduced its energy use by 25 percent, saving more than \$1 million a vear. and has reduced the greenhouse gases it produces by 21 percent, city Sustainability Officer Lisa LaRocque told the city council.

Much of the city's energy savings came about because of a \$6 million investment in sustainable energy projects, LaRocque said. The three major areas of investment were photovoltaic systems, a citywide LED streetlight retrofit and energy audits.

Solar panels installed at the Las Cruces Convention Center, Munson Center, East Mesa Safety Complex, Regional Aquatic Center,

Sage Café and the East Mesa Water Reclamation Facility have saved 1.7 million kilowatt hours, equal to \$225,000, LaRocque said. A citywide replacement of streetlights with LED lights has saved 6.2 million kWhs, or \$680,000.

"Over the next 15 years, the city will save over \$12 million from using LED streetlights and \$4.3 million from its solar projects," LaRocque said in the Sustainability Action Plan update.

Other findings in the update included:

• The city reduced its fleet fuel consumption by 23 percent between 2013 and 2016, and continues a conversion from diesel to unleaded fuel.

• The city saw a 1.3 percent increase in water consumption in city buildings, parks and operations. The city manages more than 1,800 acres of parks, ballfields, trails and gardens, along with rights-of-way properties throughout the city. Parks and Recreation staff will install irrigation controllers at city facilities on Hadley Avenue and smart controllers at Young Park.



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which adjust optimum sprinkler run times based on weather conditions

• The city installed 10 water fountains with bottle fillers, which prevented the use of 1.7 million plastic bottles.

• Parks and Recreation Dept. staff are developing a tree ordinance to increase the number of city trees. The report said Las Cruces has only a 4.5 percent shade canopy, compared to 5.1 percent in El Paso, 13 percent in Albuquerque and 27 percent nationally. The report said 72,000 trees would need to be planted to bring the city's tree canopy to 10 percent.

• The city Public Works Department installed rain-harvest tanks at the Juvenile Citation Program building for use in the program's garden: elements of rain-water harvesting were included in the design for downtown development; and staff will incorporate rainwater harvesting in to the Valley Drive renovation project design.

• The Munson Center garden donated 450 pounds of produce to the center and its members.

City pushes affordable housing

The city would welcome private contributions to its fund to create more affordable housing. Dollahon said. The city's affordable

housing trust fund contains about \$516,000, citv Housing and Neighborhood Services Manager Ver Zamora said. The fund is generated by grants from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, which have declined by about 50 percent since the trust fund was created in 2000. City Public Works Director David Weir said the HUD grants are used to create additional housing for the city's low- to moderate-income population and to maintain and rehabilitate existing properties.

The city's affordable housing land bank currently includes two properties: a 4.5-acre site near

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Sierra Middle School and a .42-acre site on Griggs Avenue. The city is considering purchasing additional land at 1310 Pecos St., near the intersection with Idaho Avenue and at 615-19 N. Mesquite St., Zamora said.

A \$5 million renovation project could create 36 affordable-housing rental units at the Pecos Street site, said Jennifer Lopez, coordinator for Homeless Program for the State of Colorado. who is working with the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness (NMCEH). The purchase would require a local contribution equal to 10 percent of the total project cost, which could come in the form of funding, land and/

or buildings, Lopez said. With the local match, the project could qualify for low-income-housing tax credits and state and federal funding.

"This is the project to start with," Lopez said. "You've got the team."

Though the city used HUD grants and local funds to provide housing services to nearly 45,500 people during the past five years, a recent study says Las Cruces lacks almost 5,000 affordable rental units and about 4,100 affordable units for homeowners.

HUD identifies a household as cost burdened if the family pays more than 30 percent of its income for rent or for a mortgage and utilities, according to the Affordable Housing Plan that Community Strategies Institute (CSI) of Edgewater, Colorado, pro-

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duced for the City of Las Cruces in 2016.

The city needs a comprehensive plan to deal with affordable housing, Councillor Jack Eakman said. The Pecos Street site, he said, "doesn't even scratch the issue. I am not the least bit satisfied looking at this one unit at a time. The "complete need" should be addressed, he said, "rather than piecemeal. Many, many people would love to be a part of the solution. We have some very intelligent entrepreneurs in this town. I think they would like to bring their brilliance to the table."

"We have to be realistic," Mayor Pro Tem Greg Smith said, chairing the work session in the absence of Mayor Ken Miyagishima, who was attending the U.S. Conference of Mayors in Miami. "Hopefully, we're addressing some of the causes of homelessness and near homelessness."

Liz Garcia of Tierra del Sol Housing Corp. said Tierra Del Sol has developed seven affordable-housing complexes in Las Cruces and 32 throughout southern New Mexico and west Texas.

Mesilla Valley Community of Hope served 2,588 homeless and near-homeless people in the last program year, Executive Director Nicole Martinez said at the meeting.

Sport rocket is largest to launch in the world

BULLETIN REPORT

A 53-foot-tall high-power sport rocket carried payloads thousands of feet above the New Mexico desert at Spaceport America on June 24.

United Launch Alliance (ULA) summer interns designed, built and launched the Future "Heavy" rocket, which carried 16 payloads, experiments and instruments, some built by K-12 students. The rocket launched during the Spaceport America Cup International Intercollegiate Rocket Engineering Competition in association with the Experimental Sounding Rocket Association (ESRA).

Future Heavy is the largest sport rocket to launch anywhere in the world, breaking the record set previously by ULA in 2016, when the

rocket towered at 50 feet. The launch marked the culmination of an experience designed to simulate a real-life launch campaign and inspire students from kindergarten through graduate school to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

ULA interns designed, built and launched the rockets with the guidance of mentors, and Ball Aerospace mentors volunteered their time to create and test their payload. Altogether, more than 50 interns and eight mentors from ULA along with Ball mentors participated in the 2017 event.

The ULA and Roush payload will test a number of Integrated Vehicle Fluids (IVF) system components. IVF uses an internal combustion engine, manufactured by Roush Industries, that runs on propellant boil-off, otherwise vented to waste, to provide power to enable long-duration missions for the upper stage.

The Future Heavy and its payloads weighed in at more than 1,350 pounds and generated approximately 8,000 pounds of thrust off the launch pad. The K-12 payloads included a swarm of small gliders to gather atmospheric data, a test of various methods to harvest the energy of descent and a kindergarten parachute experiment.

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At its heart, 'Baggage' is a love story

The title of the play currently running at Black Box Theatre -"Baggage" - really says it all.

This show, which continues through July 9 at Black Box, 430 N. Main St., is about a mix-up in two strangers' checked bags from a flight they shared, and the burdens each one bears (and bares) in life.

"Baggage" has a simple set, few props and costume changes and only four actors. It's about characters and their relationships and the chemistry among the performers.

The play's director, Nika Zimmer, said that chemistry was evident from the beginning among Debbie Jo Felix (Phyllis), Eric Hadley (Bradley), Scott Brocato (Dr. Alexander) and Heather Castillo (Mitzi). That, to me, is the mark of a good director - find that center all your actors can work from and let the energy guide your storytelling. Zimmer, a talented actress in her own right, and a delightful person to know and to work with, did just that.

Without revealing too much, "Baggage" is, essentially, a love story. You can see the arc as Bradlev transforms from a broken-hearted weeping whiner into someone who finds what he truly wants in life - he moved from gray to red, as you will see. Likewise, Phyllis evolves from a strong personality looking to mold the perfect mate into

someone who has fallen unexpectedly and uncontrollably in love.

Alexander, a psychologist and author, is a most unusual role. In his first scene, he speaks directly to the audience. But then. he becomes a character in the play, and goes back and forth seamlessly. Mitzi provides a bit of comic relief, but is integral to the story as someone who has failed at marriage but will apparently – and quite unexpectedly - succeed in love.

I liked all four of these characters, and I liked what Felix, Hadley, Brocato and Castillo did with them, individually and collectively. This is truly an ensemble piece, and all four actors brought a charming and energetic give and take to their performances. They were, first to last, very human,

and I think that's exactly what playwright Sam Bobrick was looking for when he wrote this play in 2008.

I had not seen Felix, Hadley or Brocato on stage before this show. Castillo was in "Seagulls in a Cherry Tree" – the previous show at Black Box – and did a great job. just as she did in "Baggage." So did her three castmates. The four have a very interesting mix of previous credits - Hadlev's includes both stage and television credits.

Zimmer's directing credits include "Look Homeward, Angel" for Las Cruces Community Theatre and "Enchanted April," "The Spitfire Grill," "The Sisters Rosensweig," "Still Life with Iris," "The Women of Lockerbie" and "Impossible Marriage" for Black Box.

Gorton Smith is "Baggage's" stage manager and assistant director, Lana Eckman is the costume designer, Peter Herman designed the lights and the set and Ceil Herman is the producer. Daniel Caroe is the light and sound board operator.

'Transformers: The Last Knight' serves its finished franchise

Big bucks, big story, big robots transforming into cars, dinosaurs and dragons — it's what the Transformers franchise is all about. Aside from the first "Transformers" movie released in June 2007, they have all become one long, blended mass of giant robots beating on one another as people roll around underneath them and somehow never get smashed.

"The Last Knight" is a unique entity because the story involves Arthurian legend and several other creatively considered places transformer robots have played in human history.

Other elements which I enjoyed include not-sosubtle flirting between the lead characters, Cade Yeager (Mark Wahlberg) and Vivian Wembley (Laura Haddock), which continues through the direst of circumstances; Sir Edmund Burton (Anthony Hopkins), who has the best lines and the best part; newly introduced transformer Cogman (Jim Carter) as Burton's diminutive, polite and proper butler with anger issues; and some cleverly embedded dialog.

As for detail, I liked the way the talisman left to Yeager by a dying Autobot (good Transformer), thus naming him the "Last Knight," had a mind of its own. Sprouting legs, the talisman moves itself about Yeager's body to areas that needed protecting, i.e. covering his heart area just in time to stop a bullet.


Annoying and a bit distracting — mild spoiler alert — was the point where Burton, introducing Wembley to her ancient family tree, tells her she is the last of the Witwicky line. I spent the rest of the movie wondering what happened to Sam Witwicky (Shia Lebeouf), lead character in the first three Transformers movies.

Previous Transformer fight scenes were overlong and so intricate as to be boring and hard to follow. "The Last Knight" still has plenty of fight scenes, but they're shortened. As a Michael Bey piece, there is plenty of huge-scale activity, explosions and (unfortunately) shaky-cam work. Both Bey (who directed all five movies) and Wahlberg have said they are done

So what IS next? Bumblebee (a beloved and very yellow Autobot who most often turns into a Camaro) gets his own movie in 2018. I'll be there to see how he evolved. Also looking forward to seeing some female transformer characters someday — one can only hope.



'Pippin' rocks at community theatre

Las Cruces Community Theatre's production of "Pippin" is about moments. Each of the leads and many of the supporting players find opportunities to shine in this Tony-award winning musical that continues its run at LCCT through July 9.

Mike Cruz has many chances to sparkle as Pippin, and brings a sweetness and innocence to the role that I thought worked especially well in "Extraordinary." Pippin's "Corner of the Sky," at the top of the show, is perhaps the character's – and the show's – signature piece.

Christopher Sedillo as Leading Player opened the performance in gold top hat and tails with a powerful rendition of "Magic to Do," which I also love. This is a vitally important character who reflects the many emotions of this show and helps stitch the whole thing together.

Joni Autrey's Catherine was simply charming. She's not much in evidence in the first act, but makes up for it in the second with "And There He Was," "Kind of Woman," "I Guess I'll Miss the Man," and, with Pippin and Theo, another favorite moment of mine, "Prayer for A Duck."

And speaking of Theo, Mia Ayon, the cast's youngest member, was outstanding. The performance of "Corner of the Sky" at the end of the show makes you look forward to a long career for this talented performer.

Susie Ouderkirk, in her provocative black dress, clearly loved her role as Pippin's stepmother, Fastrada. And the audience loved her throughout, especially in her boldest moments in "Spread a Little Sunshine."

I really enjoyed Alex Rossario's work as Pippin's father, "Charlemagne." He did a lot of great work in this show, but his "death" scene(s) – I am cleverly not giving away an integral part of the plot in case you haven't seen the show yet – were two other great moments in this show for me.

I'd never seen Billy Huntsman

perform before, but I really liked his "Theo," Pippin's tacky brother. He brought an energy and a snideliness (you're allowed to make up words in reviews) to the role that rocked it.

And Diane Thomas as Bertha – oh, my! Diane is the show's musical director, and sat stage right until it was time for "No Time at All." She slipped seamlessly from crew member to cast member and killed as Pippin's wise (and slightly off-center) grandmother. Wow!

There are 16 cast members in "Pippin," including the eight leads and eight more in the "troupe of players:" But more than just players were Kerrigan Sivils, (Brianna Horvath, Jazmin Ibarra, Mason Hooley (he and I performed together in "Shadowlands" at LCCT about five years ago – it was great to see him perform so powerfully in this show), Matt Esqueda (one of my favorites in every show he's in, leading or supporting), Gus Sanchez, Zoe Ayon and Zeta Shearill. Congrats to all of you!

Gus Sanchez and Brianna Horvath danced together in Pippin and Catherine's bedroom scene, and that was another great moment in this show. I'm not sure if Brianna or Susie choreographed that scene, but it was brilliant.



"Wishing upon a Star" at Boba Cabaret has four stars and gets four stars.

The film that won the war stars in 'Their Finest'

This interesting romantic/drama/light comedy flick snuck into theaters recently, totally escaping my usual detailed eye on upcoming movies.

Still another World War II work, but with a unique and fresh story, "Their Finest" is about the war at home, this time in England, where a young woman with hopes of entering the motion picture business does so, quite by accident.

It is based on a novel by Lissa Evans and some of the work is familiar, but it really works, since it is a rather old-fashioned style flicker, which tells the story of the making of still another old-style movie, a morale-lifting piece about "Dunkirk." (Do note that this film has nothing to do with the zillion dollar budget film titled "Dunkirk," which is coming out in July.)

Catrin Cole is played by Gemma Arterton. Her role, as a Welsh lass who has a knack for writing catchy quips for the ad agency where she works, is at first a secretary, until her work for comic strips (more oneliners) is noted by Tom Buckley (Sam Claflin), who is a screenwriter for the English Ministry of Information. At that moment, he is in need of someone of the fair sex to write "the slop – girl talk, women's dialogue," for in production war

propaganda films.

She needs a better job to help pay the rent for the flat she shares with her lover, who is an unemployed artist, who was wounded in the Spanish Civil War, thus disallowing him to serve in the British Army, something that chafes him, but not too much after his previous experiences.

Needless to say, she is treated as an underling

by her co-workers, all male, and must fend off flirtations from Tom and others, and deal with a very funny Bill Nighy, as Ambrose an old actor, who is drooling to get back into a starring role. "The war has skimmed

off the cream and we're left with the rancid curds," grouses Ambrose at one point.

The ministry, of course, wants to make films that ooze authenticity and their previous attempts have audiences guffawing at the stilted acting and dialogue presented in film about civilian workers in warsupport factories.

A "film that will win the war" is what's needed, with said motion picture also required to draw American sympathy, with the hope that it will make the Americans see that they are needed in the war effort, as well. Before long, Catrin comes across twin sisters, who helped evacuate troops from Dunkirk, and the cameras roll.

The picture has a rather level-headed producer, even though Catrin, among all the other things going against her, can't be paid the same has her male counterparts.

The film does a terrific job of identifying the radical changes that took place for women during the war (but not so much afterward), a nice note of realism by director Lone Scherfig ("An Education") and screenwriter Gaby Chiappe, whose previous works are all related to television (it is nice to note that almost all major crew members on the picture are women).

Although Catrin suffers through all the above, along with the aerial Blitz by the Germans on the city of London, she is able to carry on, while trying to balance her feelings for Tom.

The production of

the film moves forward, cheesy or not, with the casting of the twins going to two women who almost look like twins, Ambrose's role going from drunk to hero, and the addition of a blond, young, buff American born Norwegian pilot flying for the Royal Air Force, to help keep stateside audiences engaged, no matter how bad an actor he is.

But even with all the tribulations, "Their Finest" is still a well-made, nostalgic work about the war and at the way the movies were made back then, using toy ships as props, eschewing huge explosions and bare butts to keep audiences, neatly dressed in suits and dresses, coming back for more.

Army Band auditions for Las Cruces detachment

The United States Army National Guard (ANG) is conducting auditions to begin a detachment of the 44th Army Band in Las Cruces.

The band has existed since before World War II in Albuquerque; in fact, only about half of its 30 or so members who were on the 1942 Bataan Death March returned alive. In March 2017, the Army approved a detachment of the band to be located in Las Cruces, said MSG Bryan Slaten, who is the ANG area recruiting supervisor in Las Cruces.

"There's lots happening in Las Cruces and El Paso," SSG Paul McLaughlin said, giving the new band opportunities to perform at local public ceremonies, dedications and concerts. McLaughlin said the ANG's recruiting target is about a dozen band members from the area, who will be assigned to Las Cruces as part of their ANG service. The auditions currently being conducted are one step in the process of joining the ANG and performing in the band, said McLaughlin, who plays the trumpet. Potential candidates also must pass a physical and the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB). All band members must be ANG members.

The ANG is recruiting people ages 17 to 34 to join ANG and be in the band, Slaten said. The auditions are open to all skill levels; the only requirement is that auditioners be able to read music. The music to be performed at audition will be provided 24 hours in advance to anyone who wants to try out for the band, Slaten said. The band is an important component of the Army, McLaughlin said, because it provides morale and troop support and contributes to both public affairs and public diplomacy. During his deployment in Kosovo, McLaughlin said, the band held about 50 concerts, which included translations into local languages and performing traditional folk tunes that local residents enjoyed.

Jerry and Connie Hines and Hal and Fran Singer in 1993 bought the Schwartz and Carver farms.

"We had quite a master plan," Connie Hines said. "Our intent was to make sure development was handled properly."

Their land initially extended from I-10 to what is now St. Clair Winery.

Connie Hines said they sold a portion nearest the Interstate for commercial development.

"We put in Terra Verde and Villa Esperanza," she said.

Terra Verde is a single-family residential development and Villa Esperanza is a condominium community.

In addition, they developed the first phase of Trails West, taking their first deposit in 1994 and welcoming the first residents in 1995.

Supply and demand

Jerry Hines said he and Hal Singer initially considered developing an RV park on the Trails West site. They traveled to Phoenix and Tucson to research the possibilities.

"We scouted Arizona, "Hines said. "The more we looked at RV parks the more we decided we didn't want to do it. It's too seasonal. Part of the year it looks wonderful, part of the year it looks empty.

"We changed horses in midstream, so to speak."

He said Trails West was slow to catch on and took quite a hit during the Great Recession when "growth virtually stopped."

"Things are better now, " he said. "Las Cruces is improving again, finally."

Connie Hines said although the economy is a factor in their decision to complete the final phase, the main reason they are doing so is they're running out of space in the existing community.

"It was just time," she said. "We knew we were running low on lots. We put models on the ground and as we put them in, they sell."

She explained the residents

own their homes, but lease land from Trails West.

"We help them bring in and install their homes. We do the landscaping and maintain the park," she said.

Pins on the map

Residents come from all parts of the country, a fact visualized by pins on a U.S. map hanging in the hallway of the existing clubhouse.

Leigh Isaacks, Trails West manager who's in charge of sales, said the preponderance of residents come from Michigan, Minnesota, California, and, yes, New Mexico.

"Most folks, regardless of where they're from, want to get out of bad winter weather," Isaacks said. "And if you want your snow fix you can get it an hour-and-a-half in either direction."

Hines said in addition to northern New Mexicans looking to escape winter, Trails West attracts Las Crucens who want to enjoy the community's amenities.

"We provide the amenities the existing clubhouse with a library and card room, billiard and poker gaming room, exercise room and large multi-purpose room with a large stage," Connie Hines said.

There's an outdoor pool adjacent to the existing clubhouse. Also on site are bocce and pickle ball courts and walking/ cycling paths.

Four acres are designated for recreational facilities, Jerry Hines said.

A second clubhouse with

indoor pool will be located in the section now under development.

"A lot of people wish to swim year round," Connie Hines said. "We want them to stay and be active."

The community also will be getting a grassy, fenced-in dog park with shade and seating.

"We're committed to having a nice environment and a safe community." she said. "There really isn't another community like it in Las Cruces."

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Latest Fed interest rate action echoes 1930s

he latest Fed interest rate move is raising questions among economists and others.

Inflation has been stubbornly low since the Great Recession. The Fed has stated that its preferred rate of inflation is 2 percent, but inflation remains below this target.

Nevertheless, the Fed has raised the target rate of interest by threefourths of 1 percent and is expected to raise it perhaps two more times in the next year, perhaps more.

Some are raising red flags.

The low rate of unemployment is what justifies the Fed's actions. But contradicting this is slow economic growth, slow wage growth and low inflation.

The fear is that higher interest rates could slow growth or even push the

inflation, the Fed dramatically tightened monetary policy. The result was a recession within the Depression.

Back then, the policy tool of choice wasn't the interest rate, as it is today; rather, it was the reserve requirement, the reserves that banks must hold to

back checking deposits. The idea is that banks must keep enough cash on hand to service withdrawals. But, of course, banks can keep more if they want. The extra amount is referred to as excess reserves.

It was excess reserves that the Fed fretted about in 1936. The banking system had suffered a collapse. Between 1929 and 1933, hundreds of banks had failed as a consequence of bank runs. The remaining banks, understandably gun-shy, voluntarily held excess reserves. The Fed feared that these excess reserves would be converted into loans and that those loans would unleash a business spending spree

that would generate inflation.

Keep in mind that none of this had happened, but the Fed feared that it would. So it increased required reserves to soak up the excess reserves.

But the banks held excess reserves not for lending but out of fear. The Fed's action did nothing to change this. Banks, as a group, contracted lending to rebuild excess reserves. The result was a sharp drop in economic activity. The recovery that had


been underway was killed in the crib.


Is the Fed about to do the same thing again, with the unemployment rate playing the role of excess reserves? That is, will the Fed's fear of a low unemployment rate causing inflation generate a policy that will cause a recession?

Circumstances are different today; we have much better data todav than back in the 1930s. And our understanding of the economy is much better.

It is not even clear that inflation is the Fed's main motivation. At least as important is a desire to return to "normal." By raising interest rates slowly over the next few years, we can return interest rates to their usual 4 percent rate. which will allow the Fed to drop interest rates rapidly in a future crisis. The Fed is restocking the quill, so to speak, with new arrows.

NM auditor addresses procurement inequities

State Auditor Tim Keller has issued an executive order to support New Mexico businesses seeking to compete for business from his office.

The order applies to the Office of the State Auditor (OSA) and takes effect immediately. It lists specific ways the

office will help to level the playing field for local business in the procurement process.

While state law provides certain local preferences for large government contracts, much of state agencies' spending falls below that threshold. The executive order is aimed at ensuring that New Mexico businesses have the opportunity to compete for these smaller purchases.

"Our recent reports on vast amounts of government dollars flowing to outof-state companies shows what an opportunity we have to support our local economy through changes in procurement practices," Keller said. "That's why I issued an executive order to level the playing field when the State Auditor's office is procuring goods and services. Though we are but a small agency, this is a way to demonstrate leadership for how any agency or local government can step up and use its purchasing power for the good of our state."

The order lists three key items:

 The OSA will compare price quotes on a pre-tax basis. This change will address the structural tax disadvantage New Mexico companies face when competing for state business. Many outof-state companies pay a lower gross receipts tax, creating a disincentive to hire local companies in providing services.

• The OSA will take reasonable steps to ensure that it reaches out to New Mexico businesses when seeking quotes. This applies to small purchases that do not go through a formal competitive procurement process but make up the majority of government spending.

· Other agency heads are asked to consider taking similar action.

Realtors say NM housing market strong

Nearly 20 percent more properties sold in May 2017 than May 2016 according to the Realtors Association of New Mexico (RANM).

Victoria Murphy, 2017 RANM president, stated in a release that 2,195 sales were reported to RANM for May 2017.

"Seventeen counties reported increases in sales this May compared to May 2016, with San Juan County showing the biggest increase - 74 percent," Murphy said. "Median prices are down slightly from April 2017, but show a steady increase from median prices over the past few years."

SW LIVING Glass recycling tops 1 million pounds

The South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA) has crushed and given back to the community 1.2 million pounds of glass since it launched glass recycling in April 2014.

That's equivalent to 600 tons of inert material that did not go into the Corralitos Regional Landfill.

"It's quite an accomplishment," said Tarkeysha Burton, recycling coordinator for the SCSWA.

"The program works because residents have embraced glass recycling (cullet) and are willing to drop off their glass bottles and jars – now up to 20 to 22 tons per month – at two locations," Burton said.

Glass bottles and jars (minus the bottle tops and corks) can be taken to the SCSWA Recycling Center, 2855 W. Amador Ave., and the Old Foothills Landfill, 555 S. Sonoma Ranch Blvd.

SCSWA staff crush bottles and jars with an industrial glass crusher, and the recycled glass is used locally by the community - mostly for landscaping.

"It's all local." Burton said. "It's a beneficial use for a recycled material. We encourage businesses - especially restaurants, wineries and bars – to recycle their glass. It not only benefits the community, but also benefits the business by lowering the monthly cost to manage solid waste."

Cullet is offered back to the community without charge; it can be picked up at the Amador SCSWA Recycling Center, open from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8

a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends. It's available to anyone who wants it, and is used by agencies such as the Doña Ana County International Jetport for landscaping projects.

A local business called Clean Blast LLC uses glass sand - which is ground into even smaller particles - for sandblasting projects in and around

Las Cruces. Glass recycling is a drop-offonly program; bottles and jars are not welcome in the blue curbside recycling bins provided by the City of Las Cruces. Glass items that are not recyclable at the drop-off points include vases, ceramics, window glass, test tubes, dishes, cups, Pyrex and lightbulbs.

Green Connections is submitted by the South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA), managing recyclables and solid waste for residents and businesses in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County. For more information, call 575-528-3800 or visit www.SCSWA.net.

When reaching out to those former clients, ask about how well the builder followed through on the initial plans and if the builder met expectations regarding budget and timing. Monsoon season poses challenges to Cruces drivers

You can almost set the clock by monsoon season, which kicks up the wind, lightning and rain beginning in July and lasting well into September.

The monsoons often form over high terrain such as the Organ Mountains and sometimes slide over the desert regions of the Mesilla Valley, especially in the afternoon. Later in the season, the storms can pop up overnight.

It's only common sense, and the advice is good advice for all conditions, but with potentially heavy rain forecast the next few months, motorists should be prepared for slick driving conditions and the possibility of flooded roadways. Thus, the Las Cruces Police Department has issued a statement recommending these safety tips: • Slow down. Allow for more travel time when driving in wet weather.

• When coming to a stop, begin slowing down sooner and apply gentle brake pressure. Avoid slamming on brakes.

• Allow for greater distance between vehicles. Normal driving conditions recommend travelling at least two seconds behind vehicles. During wet weather it is recommended to increase that distance.

• Give larger vehicles, like trucks and buses, more room for stops and turns.

• Avoid making sudden turns or lane changes.

• Drive around puddles as sitting water may be deeper than what it appears.

• Never attempt to drive through flooded arroyos or running water. Even when driving a large vehicle, like a truck or SUV, fast-moving water can

Motorists are also reminded to keep their vehicles well-maintained and periodically check that brakes, tires and windshield wipers are in good working condition.

NMSU pitcher Renteria picked in MLB draft

The New Mexico State baseball team made history after day two of the Major League Baseball Draft in June. NM State pitcher Marcel Renteria was selected in the sixth round, pick 187, by the New York Mets.

This early draft selection of Renteria was the second year in a row that an Aggie has been taken in the first six rounds, joining Daniel Johnson, selected in the fifth round of the 2016 draft by the Washington Nationals. This is the first time in program history that two Aggies have been drafted in the first six rounds in back-to-back years.

Renteria is just the fifth NM State player all-time to be drafted in the first 10 rounds.

"Being selected in the MLB draft is a blessing." Renteria said. "This really shows how hard work pays off because this has been a dream of mine and getting selected by the Mets is amazing. I have to thank all my coaches and teammates at New Mexico State who have become like brothers to me. I am forever an Aggie."

The right-handed hurler completed his NM State career with a 12-7 record and a 4.76 earned run average in 32 appearances. He posted 165 strikeouts through 158.2 innings, including five or more strikeouts in 19 of 28 career starts, with a .273 opponent batting average.

After Renteria was drafted, NM State baseball head coach Brian Green said "Another great day for New Mexico State Baseball, New Mexico State University and the Renteria Family. We place an incredible amount of value in the character and integrity of players during the recruiting process. Marcel and the Renteria family were as unbelievable a family during not only the recruiting process, but throughout their entire time here in Las Cruces."

Read the greens, don't read about them

ne of the leading storylines of this professional golf tour season has been the sense of immediacy at long last shown by the USGA, R&A and the golf tours.

First. let's start with those handy greens-reading booklets that nearly all the PGA Tour players and caddies use these days. The player and caddy typically stand behind their ball

and study a booklet which has little arrows pointing out contours, severity of slopes, breaks and grain, all detailed on pages for every green.

In early May the USGA and R&A came out with a statement that they jointly "believe that a player's ability to read greens is an essential part of the skill of putting (and) we are concerned about the rapid development of increasingly detailed materials that players are using to help with reading greens during a round."

Not to mention adding to the pace-of-play problem.

Of course, nothing can guarantee a putt will find the bottom of the cup, but such massive information

takes a lot of the guesswork out of the putting. Both Jordan Spieth and Phil Mickelson, two of the standout putters on tour. use the books. Adam Scott says **BLANCHARD** the greens books

> should be banned. Jack Nicklaus agrees with the USGA and R&A about spoiling the feel and art of the game. Hopefully greens books on tour will go the way of square grooves and anchored putters.

> Next, there's the matter of what I consider the most egregious situation in all of sports: television viewer call-ins to tournament officials that can and have influenced the outcome of championships. I have written two of my Bulletin columns in the past regarding this issue: one in October 2010 ("Narc-on-the-Couch") after the Julie Inkster disqualification episode; and another in July 2016 ("USGA put on the Clock") following the

U.S. Open rules debacle at Oakmont involving eventual winner Dustin Johnson.

Over the years, ever since the modern technological combination of instant high-speed replay and rapid phone (text and email) connection took place, there have many, many situations where a TV viewer contacted tournament rules officials to report their interpretation of a rules violation. Additionally, those callers were "insiders" with access to clubhouse officials.

The most recent flap was this past April when Lexi Thompson, who was leading the ANA Inspiration tournament at the time. was assessed a two-stroke penalty for allegedly marking and replacing her golf ball on Saturday's third round, based on a viewer's call-in. But that penalty was not assessed until late in Sunday's final round when she was assessed two more strokes for signing a wrong scorecard the day before. I call that golf's version of double-jeopardy. Thompson wound up losing the tournament by a stroke.

What's more, Anna Nordqvist nicked two grains of sand in a fair-

way bunker during a playoff with (eventual winner) Brittany Lang in the 2016 U.S. Women's Open. The mishap, imperceptible to the naked eve. was "discovered" by a Fox cameraman standing behind Nordqvist, looking at it a bunch of times to see it in slo-mo closeup. In my view the only people who should be allowed to and responsible for calling penalties are the players and the designated on-course rules officials, and in real time.

Just weeks after the Thompson rules fiasco the USGA and R&A issued an immediate change in their Rules of Golf by enacting a decision intended to limit the use of video review which may stem the tide of viewers and non-officials claiming infractions. A USGA senior rules director stated: "This decision is introducing two new standards. One is a 'nakedeye' standard, which says if the player didn't feel and couldn't have seen the breach, and the person standing next to that player couldn't have seen the breach, either, there should not be a penalty as that player should not be held to a higher standard than every other player on

the course simply because we became aware of the breach through television evidence."

A third standard is basically a reasonable basis of judgment and precision. The couch potatoes better get a life!

beyond the arc in addition to his 2.5 assists per game and 1.1 steals per game.

At season's end, Lee was recognized for his standout freshman year and earned Mississippi Association of Community & Junior Colleges Second-Team All-State honors.

The Baton Rouge, La., native scored 13 points in his collegiate debut on the road against Holmes and followed with 15 points against Mississippi Delta before recording his first 20-point performance against Coahoma.

Lee recorded double-digit points in nine straight games that

spanned the end of December through the end of January. He dropped a career-high 26 points during that stretch against Hinds, going 10-for-19 from the field – half of which came from 3-point range. He tied his career-high once again on Feb. 20 against Meridian, knocking down 4-of-7 from downtown to go with a perfect 8-for-8 at the free-throw line.



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
