Inmate charges now on DAC website

Each day, the Doña Ana County Detention Center receives multiple, anguished calls from people asking whether friends, relatives or – in the case of attorneys – clients have been booked into the facility.

Detention Center Administrator Chris Barela said he wanted to find a way to make jail accessibility more transparent and customer-friendly for those callers.

To that end, he partnered earlier this year with the Doña Ana County Information Technology Department to create a new service on the county's website where attorneys, the media and the public may instantly access all aspects of an individual's booking information and charges except those that would compromise identity.

"This is all public information that is constantly requested," Barela said. "At present, we can only ac-

commodate the calls during business hours for the administrative staff. Having the information available on

the website will ease the minds of family members, make the media's job easier and help attorneys and bond agencies better represent their clients."

The service allows for searches by name to show information on adult detainees currently held within the jail, as well as those who have been held for the previous 365 days from the date of the search.

While Social Security numbers, dates of birth and other personal information will be redacted, each inmate's name, booking date, mug shot, arresting agency and list of charges will be available on the web service.

The is no plan at this time to allow similar searches for juvenile detainees.

Shelter seeking homes for sick dogs

The Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley is filled to capacity, and among the animals awaiting adoption are several that are either heartworm positive or carry various tick-borne maladies.

While all of the affected animals are treatable, the shelter has neither the resources nor the space to hold them for a protracted period of time. In an effort to expedite adoptions of these special-needs animals, all adoption fees for them are being waived for families willing to provide them with the veterinary care that they need to survive.

Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, the shelter director, said she will hold the dogs for adoption until Sept. 1, at which time any of the unadopted ones will have to be put down.

"I wish we could save them all," she said, "but our intake numbers are exorbitantly high this year, with 6,433 animals through the door as of Aug. 19. I can guarantee that any family who takes on one of these wonderful critters won't regret the decision. Each one is worth the veterinary investment."

Vesco-Mock also warns pet owners to have their companion animals tested for heartworm and other diseases and to begin preventive treatment for those that test negative or veterinary care immediately for those that test positive.

"We shouldn't be seeing so much of this kind of thing," she said. "It's heart-breaking, because it's completely preventable."

Police: Man fatally shot lunged at officer with knife

BULLETIN REPORT

A man shot to death by police officers Sunday, Aug. 21, had lunged toward an officer with a large knife before he was fired upon, the Las Cruces Police Department reports.

Juan Gabriel Torres, 36, was shot on Lohman Avenue, near the I-25 Exit, shortly after 4:30 p.m. He was transported to a local hospital where he died

Police Chief Jaime Montoya showed the knife to members of the media Monday, Aug. 22.

The incident began at about 3 p.m. when officers were dispatched to the report of a robbery and theft of a pickup. The suspect stole a 2012 white Chevrolet pickup from an 86-year-old man.

Officers caught up with the truck that was abandoned in the east-bound lanes of traffic on Lohman, directly above I-25. The driver, later identified as Torres, had exited the pickup prior to officers arriving at the overpass.

The police department reports the officers ordered Torres to drop the knife but he refused to do so. The officers discharged their weapons when Torres lunged toward one of the officers. He was struck multiple times.

Investigators are asking for witnesses to call police at 575-526-0795.

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Confusion clouds county code

do not hold an advanced degree in public policy. Nor am I a builder or developer. I don't hold a real estate license. I'm certainly not an attorney.

So it's no wonder I had trouble reading and understanding the 455page Unified Development Code (UDC) that's being proposed for Doña Ana County.

Of course, many of the landowners in our county are not experts either.

The code, which is a guide to implementing the county's comprehensive plan, contains many things of which those landowners need to understand, because it greatly affects their greatest asset. In many cases the landowners have property that's been in their families for generations.

The code, currently in its sixth draft, is available at www.vivadonaana.org, under Specialized Plans. There are a lot of landowners, builders, developers and real estate folks

who are deeply concerned about the UDC. Many elements in the code are difficult to interpret. Some appear to alter or prevent the plans landowners have for the future of their property.

Some people like the vision created in the UDC.

In this week's Bulletin, we present some information on the topic, in hopes to give people a better picture

of the UDC, why it exists, how it was created, and what it may hold for our collective future.

We have a column by Sharon Thomas, a former Las Cruces City Councillor who was involved in the Camino Real Consortium, which helped create the UDC. We also have a column by Steve Montanez, a local real estate associate broker and board member for both the Las Cruces Association of Realtors and the Las Cruces Homebuilders Associations.

Here's a collection of observations and curiosities after reviewing the UDC and talking with people more expert than me.

See related opinions from Sharon Thomas on page 6 and Steve Montanez, below.

- One of the nine tenets of the UDC's intent is to provide for floodwater management. Very important. Another tenet is far less concrete: "Provide adequate light and air."
- Apparently you can't subdivide your land in less than 10-acre parcels. If I'm a farmer with 25 acres, and need only 20 acres to continue my operation, but desperately need the income from selling the other five acres, I may not be able to do it.
- In new developments, no residence can be more than 1,000 feet from a park. Yet there's no entity designated to create or maintain parks.
- Elementary schools shall have sites no greater than five acres unless playground has 24-hour access. Do we really need 24-hour

The Unified Development Code: Here's what you need to know

For over a year and a half, a new development code has been written by members of the Camino Real Consortium and an initiative known as Viva Doña Ana. This is one of the final elements to the county's comprehensive plan, which will be implemented once passed by the board of Doña Ana County Commissioners. As a result, we are about to see significant changes in the way the county is built and developed.

This document is in its sixth draft and is over 450 pages long and, for a resident not familiar with code, it is extremely difficult to comprehend. It also raises questions on how county staff will interpret the regulations once implemented. This may be adopted and become law within

the next 30 to 60 days.

ever done by Doña Ana County. Which raises the question: If this is one of the most transparent projects, why are you just now reading about it?

transparent projects

The UDC, along with the comprehensive plan, has a goal to implement a whole new way of living in our county. The new developments are described as "villages" and encourage less driving and more mixed-use districts. While these sound like positive elements, the biggest

concern is these are not optional, but required for future development.

The code will divide the county into sectors, restricting access to and use of private land. These sectors are set by county staff, a concern for landowners who have no say in the zoning of their property.

Another concern is the code was written by a contractor selected by Viva Doña Ana using housing urban development (HUD) funds, without recommendation from current land developers familiar with how our residents wish to have their county developed.

As a result, the original UDC failed to answer many basic questions and 15 months later, we are now on draft six. This has cost the county staff and planning and zoning countless hours.

The UDC should have never been paid for and is still costing our county more money.

Currently, if you own a parcel of land under 10 acres and you wish to subdivide your property you are able to. Under the new UDC, the county will no longer allow subdividing for parcels under 10 acres. Landowners feel this is intrusive to their private property rights.

There are many areas in rural Doña Ana County so rural they carry a certain character. Take Soledad Canyon or Mesquite. What would commercial development or multifamily units do to the land value in those areas? Do those areas require walking trails or bike paths? If there are playground requirements in these areas, who would be



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Give your 2 cents: Plan, UDC positive steps for county

comprehensive plan is a tool used by communities to plan their future growth and development. All New Mexico counties that receive state funding are required by law to develop a comprehensive plan and to revisit it at regular intervals. In the process they can make the changes necessary to guide community decision-making in subsequent years.

In 2011, Doña Ana County and the City of Las Cruces, the local municipalities of Sunland Park, Mesilla, and Hatch, New Mexico State University, and a variety of planning organiza-

tions and nonprofit groups formed The Camino Real Consortium. With the support of these entities, along with a \$2 million grant from the federal government, the consortium began a process that included developing our county's new comprehensive plan.

Key to the process was securing the participation and en-

gagement of as many county residents as possible. Since the summer of 2013, there have been scores of meetings with leaders of local municipalities, nonprofit and business organizations, and other community groups. Community workshops, public input sessions

and focus groups were held throughout the county.

Hundreds of county residents attended sessions where the emerging plan was reviewed and revised.

Possibly the most remarkable outcome of this intense and lengthy process of engagement was the broad consensus in support of the key principles guiding future growth in Doña Ana County: development within or close to existing communities; prioritized flood management; infrastructure maintenance and expansion; transportation choice; and farmland stewardship. Economic development, community health and education also received high consensus rankings and were incorporated into the final plan, which was adopted by the Doña Ana County Commission in August of 2015.

The next key step in the planning process has been to develop a unified development code (UDC) that serves the double purpose of implementing the vision adopted in the comprehensive plan and updating and combining all subdivision, drainage, zoning and engineering design standards into a single, coherent code for future development.

The new UDC also creates map-zoning districts for the entire County and provides a transition from the currently awkward administration of the Extraterritorial Zone (ETZ) to county oversight and implementation of nonmunicipal development standards.

Significantly, the UDC was developed with an understanding that individual landowners may want to develop their properties in ways they are familiar with. For that reason, conventional zoning categories will still be available to landowners much as they are now. What the UDC also pro-

vides is an option for access to more flexible development standards that are designed to better adapt land use to community preferences laid out in the comprehensive plan. Landowners who select the more adaptive approach have the incentive of being expedited more quickly through the development process.

The UDC, like the comprehensive plan it implements, will continue to support the vision laid out by community members and stakeholders over the four year planning process. It will encourage maintaining the integrity and function of existing communities and of built and natural environments. It will encourage development and growth that is sensitive to natural resources, culture and economics.

It will also provide a framework for economic growth that utilizes industry standards and best practices as part of economic development and ongoing commercial and residential growth.

The UDC, while far more technical, is also like the comprehensive plan in that it has received an unprecedented amount of public input, including over 100 meetings covering every possible aspect of the Code. This includes more than 40 meetings of the Planning and Zoning Commission itself, where line-by-line edits have been pored over carefully and in detail by P&Z commissioners; stakeholders; landowners; county planners, legal staff, and engineers; and the public at large.

This thorough oversight is, of course, exactly the way it should be. A comprehensive plan and its associated unified development code are important achievements for a community. So, by all means go to www.vivadonaana.org and review the final draft of the UDC, under the tab "Specialized Plans."

Send suggested edits or other comments to county staff via the link provided. Your input should be received by 5 p.m., Friday, Sept. 2.

Public hearings before the Planning and Zoning Commission on the UDC have been tentatively set for 6 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 20, and 9 a.m., Thursday, Sept. 22 at the county complex at

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Don't forget the WWII generation of heroes

ew Mexicoborn World cartoonist Bill Mauldin died more than 10 years ago. To some people he is of no use any longer, therefore he is forgotten. To those who were home or in combat during the Second World War. Mauldin and his cartoon characters Willie and Joe were some of the most important people ever.

That was long ago. It is not even taught to young people today. Being forgotten is happening not only to those who die, but also those who get old.

When I was young, old people were revered.

Today there seems a backlash against elderly citizens. Even when we talk of the "Greatest Generation," those who fought in World War II, there is little acknowledgment by young people today.

A few years ago at halftime during a New Mexico State University football game, former NMSU president Gerald Thomas, a WWII combat flyer, was honored on the field. At the time, Thomas was about 90 and was moving slowly. He made it to age 95 before his death.

At this football game one student was impatient and hollered, "Get those old farts off the field so we can get back to the game."

Everyone around him, including me, tried to hiss him into silence.

He protested, "I was not even alive during that time, so I do not owe him anything."

We gave him an earful but he was never convinced. He asserted that if he was not alive in the 1940s he does not owe any debt to these people who served in the military. He and many young people today show no gratitude for what has come before them. Apparently they were never taught these things.

This last weekend was the 93rd birthday of my friend Col. Jesse Jacob, USAF retired. He flew B-17s in World War II and F-80 fighters in Korea. After that he had a long aviation career that would take several books to document. Un-

like most of his fellow flyers in Europe and Korea, Jesse is still alive. He is one of my favorite people of all time.

Mauldin died in 2003 and was born 95 years ago near Alamogordo at Mountain Park. He enlisted in the Army in 1940 as a rifleman and gradually people realized that while a fine rifleman, he was a fantastic cartoonist. What many people don't realize is he was also a great writer.

His 1946 book "Back Home" details how poorly combat troops were treated when they returned to our country after the end of the war. But that premise is rejected today because people just don't want to believe it. The ink on my book was put there in 1946 by this Pulitzer Prize winner and no revisionist can change that.

In our everyday life we see wrinkled old people and not the youngsters that they were. One of my grandfather's friends fought in the Pacific. He had a tattoo that read, "Tojo is a dwarf."

When I first met him years ago, I asked him what that meant. He said it meant that while in combat with the enemy from Japan, he was never going to surrender. Few men in the Pacific on either side did.

My father was a combat photographer in WWII making landings in North Africa, Sicily, Italy and Anzio. In the middle of the battles, my father and his fellow photographers were documenting what was happening.

Stephen Ambrose summed up, "Then I think about those who didn't make it, especially all those junior officers and NCOs who got killed in such appalling number. What life was cut off... a builder, teacher, scholar, novelist or musician? I sometimes think the biggest price we pay for war is what might have been."

I salute those serving and who have served in our military and their families. But there is more. It seems that our nation has turned on the older generations who built and ran our country. There is a blowback against senior citizens by the young because the senior citizens are no longer as productive as they were in their prime.

As a senior citizen I see this often and I am offended.

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Following these hearings, the final UDC will be scheduled for consideration by the county commission for adoption.

Residents of southern New Mexico have every reason to be proud not only of the Comprehensive Plan and emerging UDC, but of the process itself, which has involved all sectors of public life in Doña Ana County.

The input of everyone,

including the plan's critics, has been essential to the process. In coming years, we will look to the comprehensive plan and UDC to guide our county wisely and well.

Sharon Thomas is a former Las Cruces city councilor, and is a retired associate professor at Michigan State University; she was one of the authors of the \$2 million grant from HUD that supported the development of several county projects and have been involved with the projects ever since.

access to playgrounds? Where is the liability if an accident occurs on the playground at 3 a.m.?

• Childcare facilities shall have no more than four parking spaces.

• There are several matrices of the different types of land uses and what is and isn't permitted on them. If you own a food truck, you should be OK, because they are permitted in almost every instance. But there are many more "Not Permitteds."

• There are requirements as to what plants you can have (based on

more than 14 pages of descriptions of plants). Oddly enough, an existing plant or tree on the property may not qualify and might need to be approved to stay. And you can't shape or shear existing plants.

• If one day you decide to go into business for yourself and hang out a shingle, the UDC literally spells out how you can hang the shingle. Hint: Your letters better not be nine inches tall; the maximum is eight.

• Wastewater service is required for all community types. I read that to mean no septic tanks. After observing the struggles the City of Elephant Butte has had the past decade, annually begging for state money to piecemeal a wastewater system, it seems to me this requirement could be a major hindrance to any development in the county.

It appears to me if you were to apply the code retroactively, nearly every landowner in Doña Ana County would be in violation to one degree or another.

If this is going to guide us for the next 20-40 years, why not take a little more time to make sure the most important parties — the affected landowners — can comfortably make sense of it, and to correct any items that need to be corrected?

The planning and zoning commission meets on Thursdays at 6 p.m. and meetings are posted on the county website. You can also see a copy of the final draft on the website.

I hope as many residents can attend these meetings and voice input on this important piece of administrative legislation.

This is our county. Let's take care of it.



The United Military Women of the Southwest (UMWSW) will host a groundbreaking ceremony for the women veterans monument at the Las Cruces Veterans Park, 2651 N. Roadrunner Parkway, beginning at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept.

The Las Cruces City Council accepted \$406,500 in state capital appropria-

tion funding in November 2014 to construct the monument.

"The United Military Women of the Southwest. working with a volunteer architect, developed a concept for the monument," according to city documents. "From that concept the city, working with an engineering consultant, has completed construction documents and is in the process of procuring construction services. The monument

will include sculptures of six service women representing all the branches of service and several eras during which women served in the military. Two shade structures will frame the monument and cultured stone will clad the walls. Construction is

DOLLAHON months, or until a permanent city manager is hired.

Dollahon succeeds Daniel Avila as interim city manager. Avila, who will return to his previous position as assistant city manager, was named interim city manager for three months following the retirement

of long-time City Manager Robert Garza at the end of May.

"It was always the city's plan to alternate (interim) managers before we hire a new manager," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said. "Hopefully, we can find some great candidates before the holidays or the new year. If we find some candidates, we will introduce them to the community first, so they can provide some feedback."

"I have known David (Dollahon) from my

county commissioner days, circa 1993," the mayor said. "He worked in community development back then. He is a highly motivated, intelligent senior executive; he is no stranger to hard work."

"I have very much appreciated Daniel Avila's leadership as interim city manager the past three months," said Mayor Pro-Tem Greg Smith. "Contemplating this transition, I have heard some concerns expressed regarding continuity and different managerial styles. Those are legitimate concerns, but our vote indicates that we are confident David Dollahon will maintain operational stability until the next city manager can be hired."

A New Mexico State Univesity grad, Dollahon began working for the city as an intern in 1990 in what was then called the Planning Depart-

City, LCPS to work on project

"This is huge," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said at the Monday, Aug. 22, work session of the Las Cruces City Council after Las Cruces Public

Schools Board of Education President Maria Flores suggested the city and school

district work together on the city's first community school and other school sites that will become community schools.

"We've been waiting for this a long time," Miyagishima said.

A community school is both a place and a set of partnerships between a school and other community resources.

Flores said the LCPS board of education passed a resolution in April in support of community schools, appointed a district-wide liaison and selected Lynn Middle School as LCPS' first community school.

Flores said LCPS is working with Ngage New Mexico and New Mexico State University on the community schools project, and wants the city as a partner as well. The city, she said, would be able to make greater use of Lynn for extra-curricular activities for youth, "wrap around services," teaching English as a second language, public meetings and other services for children, adults and families living in the Lynn community to help them "confront poverty"

and address the achievement gap. The school is located at 950 S. Walnut St.

Additional LCPS schools could also become community schools, she said.

Lynn could serve as a community hub to address homelessness, hunger and illness, said LCPS truancy teacher and NEA-New Mexico Vice President Mary Parr-Sanchez.

The school could be available to the community after school and on weekends as it partnered with businesses, the city and other entities to "extend the learning environment" and provide a site for medical, mental and dental health services and social services "for children, families and the community," she said.

A community school could have a number

of positive benefits for the school district, Parr-Sanchez said, including increased student attendance and parent engagement at the school, a higher graduation rate and lower dropout rate district-wide and a lower crime rate in the neighborhood.

If the cooperation can be expanded to include Doña Ana County, the mayor said, it might be possible to use school kitchens to prepare meals for poor county residents who "have no access to food. This is endless. This is huge," the mayor said.

Through a school community partnership, "we can be smarter with the funds that are available," said Mayor Pro-Tem Greg Smith. "I taught for 20 years," he said. Community schools are "an idea I have wanted to see championed for a long time."



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Experts offer advice on comprehensive plan

"That vision of who you are and what you want to create is so important," national healthy communities expert Dr. Richard J. Jackson told the Las Cruces City Council at its Monday, Aug. 22 work session.

The council was discussing updating the city's comprehensive plan, and specifically healthy community section of the plan. The council also heard from Dr. Suzanne Lennard, an international expert on livable cities.

The City of Las Cruces adopted a comprehensive plan in 1999 to guide all future city actions regarding land use, development, financing and the location of capital improvement, city Community Development Senior Planner Srijana Basnyat told the council at the work session.

Administrative updates to the plan began in 2013, she said, and will continue through 2023. The update of the healthy community section of the plan, which should be complete in the summer of 2017, has included stakeholder meetings with officials from New Mexico State University, Las Cruces Public Schools, nonprofits, local community organizations, business and development representatives, members of the city council, and

others, she said.

It also included a community vision fiesta held during a Farmers and Crafts Market in downtown Las Cruces; city staff technical training and walk audits of University Avenue, Roadrunner Parkway and Nevada Street; a community-led bicycle tour; and a walk with Mayor Ken Miyagishima.

Policy recommendations to update the healthy community section will include more housing options, managing parking, walkable village centers, street connectivity and investing in infill, Basnyat said. The proposed update will then be presented to the city Planning and Zoning Commission and ultimately to the city council for approval.

Jackson, professor of Environmental Health Sciences at the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health, said designing a healthy community means using vision and leadership to put people's needs first and make the easy choice the healthy choice.

While the United States spends about \$8,000 per capita per year on health care – more than any other country – it continues to deal with childhood and adult obesity, which he called "a crisis for our society."

Americans added 30 years to their expected lifespan in the 20th century, he said, but chronic diseases like obesity and the type 2 diabetes that it often causes have begun to take a heavy toll in the past 30 years. During that time, adults have gained an average of 24 pounds and the percentage of children and adults with type 2 diabetes has skyrocketed, Jackson said.

Driving a vehicle to the complete exclusion of walking can add about six pounds to a person's weight, for example, Jackson said. And, car crashes continue to be the leading cause of death for those aged three to 34. In Los Angeles County, he said, there are 18.6 million parking spaces covering 200 square miles.

In 1968, the average American consumed zero percent high fructose corn syrup. In 2000, the average consumption, Jackson said, was 63 pounds.

Making physical activity an integral part of the routine of life is essential, he said. But,

the number of adults aged 46 to 64 who get no physical activity has grown from 17 percent to 52 percent in the last three decades, Jackson said. Just walking regularly can reduce major health risks by more than 50 percent, he said.

The challenge for city planners in Las Cruces and elsewhere is to "create environments that make it (exercise) irresistible. A walkable community is better for people's health," Jackson said.

Jackson complimented the city on its comprehensive plan regarding a healthy community, but said, "I wish it had a bigger vision."

The plan, Jackson said, has to put people ahead of vehicles and sidewalks ahead of roadways.

Jackson is the co-author of "Designing Healthy Communities" and one of the editors of "Making Healthy Places." He was director of the Centers for Disease Control's National Center for Environmental Health for nine years and received the presidential distinguished service award.

Dr. Suzanne H. Crowhurst Lennard, co-founder and executive director of International Making Cities Livable Conferences, said Las Cruces should reject a value system that emphasizes economics and ongoing construction in favor of quality of life and "the care and culture of humans and the earth."

Many cities, she said, have become dependent on the automobile and have made streets dangerous to walkers and bikers. The result is childhood and adult obesity, diabetes and social isolation.

Quoting author Wendell Berry, Lennard said, "community is the smallest unit of health."

Lennard complimented the city on its creation of a downtown plaza, which will be dedicated in September. She called the plaza "a huge step" that fills a "huge need." Community plazas, she said, are places where neighbors meet each other and people of all ages build social networks and communities."

Other attractions, she said, should include a mix of uses in the shops and housing that frame the plaza, along with food, shade, seating, evening life, beloved features, wide sidewalks, a sense of place, hospitality and parking.

Through it all, she said, city planners must "maintain the DNA of Las Cruces," its unique identity, as they create "a city for all ages."

Lennard is the co-author of "Genius of the European Square," "The Forgotten Child" and Livable Cities Observed." She co-edited "The Wisdom of Cities" and "Making Cities Livable."

Organization unveils LGBTQ news website

The Las Cruces chapter of a national organization advocating for equal rights for members of the local lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer community on Aug. 17 introduced supporters and members of other such organizations to a new website dedicated to creating a cohesive LGBTQ community in Las Cruces.

The Parents and
Friends of Lesbians and
Gays (PFLAG) of Las
Cruces created The Rainbow Hub, "a one-stop
place" that will eventually host local news from
the various LGBTQ organizations in Las Cruces,
southern New Mexico
and even the Borderlands
as far as El Paso and
Juàrez, said Ryan Steinmetz, PFLAG – Las Cruces board member.

"In April we gathered the (LGBTQ) community together to talk about brainstorming about where the local LGBTQ movement would be heading in the future," said Steinmetz.

At this meeting one concern kept arising: the lack of a common space in Las Cruces where local LGBTQ information and updates could be found.

"There used to be a newspaper, for example, called The Normal Heart that was a source of information for LGBTQ individuals," said Steinmetz.

This newspaper is now defunct.

"Also, the LGBTQ

center that was here in Las Cruces is no longer, unfortunately," said Steinmetz.

The loss of these two community resources left "a huge gap," said Steinmetz, for LGBTQ individuals. The Rainbow Hub will fill this gap by providing LGBTQ news and also by routinely hosting gatherings, perhaps every other month, to "focus on creating community and relationships through networking and face-to-face interaction."

Steinmetz said PFLAG hopes The Rainbow Hub will also be a source of education and outreach, to inform more people, both LGBTQ and straight, of events in the LGBTQ community and perhaps get them to participate.

Steinmetz said PFLAG is in talks with such organizations as Equality New Mexico and Las Cruces Trans People to get their news on The Rainbow Hub. PFLAG also hopes to get local groups such as Singing Out, an LGBTQ choir, to take part in the website.

"This is something we're building for the community to be able to use in a variety of ways," said Steinmetz.

PFLAG – Las Cruces was founded 20 years ago and has been a source of help for LGBTQ individuals, such as Steinmetz.

"I came out late in Ohio and then moved directly from college to here, and PFLAG was a place where I found home and acceptance and connections with people," Steinmetz said.

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
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

Zia Comics is a community meeting place

Comic book addicts, collectible hunters, board and card game players, fret not over Las Cruces' Hastings closure! There is another place in the city where you can go to share your passions — arguing why Frank Miller's Batman is better than Alan Moore's, why comics are just as literary as anything by Faulkner, whatever it may be.

Zia Comics has been in business for three years and shows no sign of slowing down, having made itself an

integral part of the communities of Las Cruces and El Paso by hosting each city's respective Comic Con for each of those three years. With Hastings closing, Zia

Comics is now the only comic book store in town.

"It's usually pretty busy," said proprietor Troy Stegner, who said he opened the business because "there was no good place in town to get (comic) subscriptions. You've got to stay on top of the trends."

The most significant challenge of owning a comic book store is destigmatizing comics. The perception of comic books used to be that they weren't intellectually significant, Stegner said.

"But now, you can see all the movies they're making from comic books, they have some pretty deep storylines," Stegner said. "People are actually starting to see comics as a legitimate literary medium."

Stegner said making films and TV shows of comic books is good because it exposes more people to littler-known characters.

"Like with Guardians of the Galaxy," he said. "I can venture to say 90 percent of the people out there had no

idea who Groot and Rocket Raccoon were before that movie."

Stegner said comics are a low-profit-margin product, so selling other stuff, such as collectibles, is necessary.

But comics and collectibles, such as busts of Harley Quinn, Robin and the Joker, are not the store's only specialties. They also have a variety of board games and collectible cards—Magic specifically—for sale.

Every Friday night from 6 to 9 p.m., Zia Comics hosts Magic tournaments, and every Saturday from 5 to 9 p.m. is free board game day, where someone will demonstrate how to play a board game so people can more easily decide whether they want to buy it.

These are examples of Zia Comics' community feel, which, Stegner said, is part of why people come, because customers are more than customers.

"Everybody who works here can carry on a really good conversation about pretty near anything in the store, games or comics," Stegner said.

Stegner said some people even come in, not for comics, collectibles or games, but to debate the quality of movies.

"It's like a weird family," Stegner said.

Stegner said a comic book store, particularly one with a subscription service, which Zia has, is paramount to comic collectors.

"You can get comics digitally now," said Stegner.
"Marvel has its own service, Comicsology has one.
There's different methods for getting comics digitally.
But for a real collector, they want to have that physical book in their hands."

Information and signup for Zia Comics' subscription service can be found online at ziacomics.com.

"They're not superhero-type comic books, they're more story driven," he said.

Zia Comics put on the inaugural Las Cruces Comic Con in 2013. This year's will be at the Convention Center, Sept. 9 to 11. There are still plenty of tickets on sale, and there will be more at the door for a higher price.

"The first year we had at the turnstile about 5,000," Stegner said. "The second year was just short of 7,000.

NMSU photographer switches to faculty position

Darren Phillips came to New Mexico State University in October 2001, taking the position of chief photographer in University Communications, which was then located, along with Phillips' studio, in Milton Hall.

In the 15 years since, University Communications has moved buildings, but Phillips finds himself once again in Milton, though with a different title in a different department.

If you've seen a photo from New Mexico State University in the past 15 years, odds are it was taken by Phillips, who recently moved from his staff position to become a faculty member in the university's Journalism Department.

In his tenure, Phillips said he took "hundreds of thousands" of photos, "tens of thousands" of which were published alongside press releases and NMSU marketing materials.

Prior to coming to NMSU in October 2001, Phillips worked as a photographer for various newspapers.

"I liked working for newspapers, but I was looking to get into something where I might have a weekend on occasion or where there was a little bit more job security," Phillips said.

One of the most difficult transitions in becoming NMSU's photographer was losing the autonomy, he said, that comes with being a newspaper photographer.

"I wasn't used to working with art directors a lot and designers." he said.

A loss of variety in assignments was also challenging, he said.

"(As a newspaper photographer,) one day I might be shooting the U.S. Motocross Championship and the next I'm at city hall and I'm shooting a murder trial, or it's breaking news, there's a triple homicide or there's a fire," Phillips said.

Much of Phillips' work as NMSU's photographer consisted of environmental portraits — photographing individuals in places where they work — and headshot portraits, such as of the members of NMSU Athletics.

"The things that were different I really enjoyed were the more regular hours, better pay," he said.

After working 15 years as NMSU's photographer, Phillips said, much as he was after having worked so long for newspapers, he was ready for a change and so sought a faculty position.

"I still love doing photography, I still like being out on location, but I would rather shoot on my own terms," Phillips said.

Moreover, Phillips said, serving in a faculty position is more closely tied to the core mission of the university—teaching, instruction, learning—rather than serving in "an auxiliary capacity" as a photographer.

"I feel like I'm really on the frontlines working with students and that's exciting to me," Phillips said. "I got to work with a lot of students in University Communications and I always enjoyed being around them and mentoring them."

He said he anticipates his biggest challenge as an instructor will be polishing up his teaching skills.

"I want to be the best I can be," he said. He previously

taught photo courses at NMSU, as well as at the University of Missouri – Columbia, where he attended graduate school.

Writing and photography are closely related, he said, as both are forms of storytelling and knowledge in one naturally improves your skills in the other.

Phillips was first drawn to photography during his travels as part of the U.S. Navy after graduating high school.

"I had no clue what I wanted to do with my life, but I knew I wanted to travel and see the world," he said.

He traveled throughout East Asia for four years, which, he said, gave him focus and direction.

Phillips said his legacy at NMSU is the online photo archive. $\,$

"When I came to NMSU, there just wasn't much of an infrastructure in place in the Photo Services unit," he said.

After 15 years, everything is "ship-shape," he said: film, outtakes, negatives, black-and-white, some dating back to 1975, are currently searchable by keyword and/or date online.

"(As a photographer,) you can shoot great images, but if you don't catalogue and archive them properly, what good are they?" he said. "They might as well not exist."

Though it may sound tedious or even superfluous, Phillips said such work is significant in preserving the history of NMSU.

"When I was feeling down about not getting to shoot some of the cool stuff I shot when I was working newspapers, I reminded myself that I'm chronicling the life of this university," Phillips said.

A group of local nonprofits will introduce Las Cruces to the benefits of mindfulness practices at a Mindfulness in Business Luncheon 11:30 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 1, at the Hilton Garden Inn, 2550 S. Don Roser Drive.

"The luncheon is the first step in an ongoing effort to build successful businesses, families and communities," Caroline Zamora of Aprendamos Intervention

Organizers of the luncheon believe the practice of mindfulness — being fully present in the moment can not only improve productivity in the workplace but also contribute to the success of families and the community.

Mindfulness in Business has been shown to reduce employee stress and turnover, while improving job satisfaction and increasing productivity, Zamora said.

Ancient technique gets modern validation

Mindfulness is an ancient practice that 21st century research has proved effective.

"The goal of mindfulness practice is to 'quiet the mind's constant chattering — thoughts, anxieties, and regrets," Frances Weaver stated in "The Week."

"Mindfulness practitioners learn to focus on the present in everything they do and to accept events in the present moment."

"Mindfulness has roots that go back 2,500 years and uses an anchor — often breathing — to center attention," Kimberly Schaufenbuel, program director, University of North Carolina Executive Development, wrote in a recent white paper.

"HR and talent management professionals are increasingly looking for ways to reduce employee stress, and many employers — like Google, Aetna, Target and General Mills, to name a few — have found that introducing mindfulness into their workplace not only lowers employee stress, but improves focus, clarity of thinking, decision-making, emotional intelligence

and more."

In 2011, Harvard University researchers using magnetic resonance imaging reported people who practiced mindfulness-based stress reduction (MBSR) had increases in gray matter in their brains. The researchers concluded, "Participation in MBSR is associated with changes in gray matter concentration in brain regions involved in learning and memory processes, emotion regulation, self-referential processing and perspective taking."

Companies all over the world are incorporating mindfulness practices into their company systems and culture, Zamora said. "When employees are happier at work this translates to their personal lives.

Parents can be more engaged, present and mindful at home, creating a stronger home life and building a successful future for all generations."

Zamora said a parent who is thinking about a child's homework during a marketing meeting is not fully present. The meeting is a waste of time for both the employee and the company.

On the flip side, thinking about the meeting while helping the child get ready for school wastes an opportunity to engage with the child.

"How do we make sure people are being present and involved at home and being present and involved at work?" Zamora asked. "It starts with being mindful and being aware of what you are doing at that moment."

"With our accreditation achievement and the Heritage Garden opening, we feel like this is a special time at the museum, and we want to share it with the community, said Museum Communications Manager Craig Massey.

"A big part of accredi-

tation is our role in the community, so everyone who loves this place and supports us, whether it's through visitation or becoming a Friend of the Museum, played a part in that honor," he said.

Swinton shines in 'Splash'

"A Bigger Splash" takes place on a sun-baked Mediterranean island somewhere between Sicily and Tunisia. It is "the" getaway place for Marianne (Tilda Swinton) and Paul (Matthias Schoenaerts), whose lives are quite public.

Marianne is an international rock star – something we know quickly when the camera watches her come to the stage in a tinfoil jumpsuit and thick dark eye makeup.

They are on holiday while Marianne recovers from a throat problem that has taken her voice.

Paul is a filmmaker and a recovering alcoholic, who also needs a break from the real world, which is three hours away by air. On this island they can rest, recuperate, make love, cover themselves in cleansing mud, and swim as much as they likeuntil....

Harry (Ralph Fiennes), who is Marianne's former lover and producer, shows up at the airport with a beautiful young woman in tow. Not his lover as Marianne and Paul think at first, but rather she is his daughter, long lost, from

a previous affair with a long forgotten woman. They do give hints at being lovers, but that becomes more clear as the picture moves along.

Harry's arrival isn't with any reason at first and I did wonder just how he knew

where to find them and why he would come unannounced, but the more we learn about Harry, the clearer it becomes. It is not long before old feelings arise, jealousy appears, and passion and lust could be just around the corner.

With Marianne unable to speak, she makes herself known

through glances, glowering and otherwise, glares, and ennui, not to mention body language. Swinton is my favourite actress and her performance with so little dialogue is impeccable.

Paul is the weaker of the two and his attraction to Penelope (Harry's daughter, played by Dakota Johnson) becomes a bit too obvious at times, while Harry, a lout first class, is a brat, loudmouth, and braggart. Ralph Fiennes has this part and does it with gusto. He's the kind of guy that might wolf-whistle at a woman as he stands in front of a Taco Bell.

The picture proceeds cautiously and with a good degree of suspense, drama, and plenty of tension, most especially when Paul and Penelope take a hike one day.

Innuendo and suspicions are aroused between all four of the characters, none of whom are particularly likable or honest.

"A Bigger Splash" is an intriguing picture, filled with pathos and enhanced by great performances and glorious scenery and not one to be taken lightly.

Poet publishes fifth collection, 'Odyssey'

Las Cruces poet Charles H. Harper found his in-

spiration in Alfred Lord Tennyson's "In Memoriam A.H.H.," which he read

in high school, and his message in Paul Gauguin's painting "Where Do We Come From? What Are We? Where Are We Going?" which he saw in the Boston Museum of Fine Art.

More than 50 years later, the retired pastor has written five poetry collections, including his most recent, titled "Odyssey."

"Most of my poetry has a common theme," Harper said. "It tends to be contemplative, meditative; reflections on daily life."

"Sacred Writ," is a good example: "I've listened long / read as much / cannot believe / as believing goes. / Yet - strangely - / glimpse a light / within / I've come to trust."

So are these lines from "Concession": "Life, he now concedes / will not

be understood. / It simply will be."

Poetry was an avocation for Harper, 81, during his 39 years as pastor at the United Church of Christ in Boston. It became his vocation when he retired to Plymouth, Massachusetts in 2000.

"I've really been on a long theological journey (exploring) classical theological traditions and Mystery with a capital 'M," Harper said. Many friends tell Harper his poetry makes him sound more like a Buddhist than a Christian.

Harper writes almost every morning at his desk at the home he shares with his wife, Pat, on the edge of the East Mesa desert. He also walks each day, taking "a little notebook and a pencil with me to jot ideas. I frequently get my best ideas when I'm out walking," he said.

The landscape changed from trees and the Atlantic Ocean to the Chihuahuan Desert about a year ago when the couple moved to Las Cruces to escape the harsh New England winters.

"This was a big question for me," Harper admits. "The flora, fauna, topography of New England were so deeply a part of


me. Would I be able to write when I got to New Mexico?"

"I am finding that the vastness of the desert does have some of that same mystical pull on me that the ocean does," Harper said, as he works "to decipher / what is going on here / then refigure / again and again" as he says in his poem "Here."

Harper is already at work on his next poetry collection, which will be titled "Psalms 151-300." For the book, he is duplicating the number of psalms in the Bible "from the perspective of a postmodern world view."

Harper said he will use the three-tiered (heaven, earth, hell) view of the universe reflected in the psalms – "still some of the most beautiful poems in the world"- and look at them through the lens of the modern, westerneducated mind.

Russo was playing cards with family friends in Louisville, Kentucky some years ago and listening to singer Neil Sedaka's "The Hungry

Years" on the stereo when the idea for "The Poet and The Singer" came to him: two people "terribly in love who haven't got two dimes," Russo said. That's the novel's eponymous poet and singer - Geof Barringer and Annie Melodie.

"It took years of writing and rewriting to complete the book," Russo said. "It has been an adventure."

A native of Baltimore, Russo, 73. dreamed as a child of being a U.S. Air Force test pilot and the first man on the moon. Medical issues kept those dreams from coming true, but after reading a book called "Rocket Man," about a co-op student at New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts (which later became NMSU) who managed to get into space, Russo decided to move to Las Cruces in 1961 to attend college.

"The school catalog had every course I wanted and NMSU was so affordable compared to MIT or even the University of Maryland," he said.

"I came out here to be a physi-

cist," he said.

But he couldn't overcome a struggle with calculus.

By that time, Russo said he had fallen in love with the desert environment, so he stayed in Las Cruces and completed a degree in mass communications.

"I discovered I could write, and I loved it more than anything I had ever done," he said.

"I can't take credit for the ideas," Russo said. "They come into my head. It's the talent God gave me, as opposed to a sculptor, a concert pianist, a nuclear physicist," he said.

Russo already has two other novels in the works. The stories are finished, he said, but "they need work." He is "going back and making sure they are the best they can be. You evaluate every sentence," he said.

New state veterinarian brings broad animal experience

After a six-month, nationwide search, a new state veterinarian has been named for New Mexico. Ralph Zimmerman, DVM, will lead the Office of the State Veterinarian after seven years as head veterinarian at the Albuquerque Biopark Zoo.

The Office of the State Veterinarian resides within the New Mexico Livestock Board. Zimmerman and his staff of field veterinarians will work with the Livestock Board and various other government and private-sector partners to ensure New Mexico remains free of diseases affecting livestock. The office is critical in responding to and ending outbreaks such as the equine herpesvirus outbreak that occurred at a southern

New Mexico racetrack earlier this year. "In addition to his scientific back-

ground and expertise in both regulatory medicine and private

practice, Dr. Zimmerman brings extensive experience in personnel management and public relations to this key position in the State of New Mexico," said Bill Bunce, executive director of the New Mexico Livestock

Board. "We all look forward to working cohesively on the myriad state, domestic, and international issues that impact our livestock industry."

Throughout his career, Zimmerman has worked with animals both small and

large, including dairy and beef cattle, horses, goats and more. He graduated at the top of his class at Ross University School of Veterinary Medicine in the Federation of Saint Kitts and Nevis in the West Indies. He first moved to New Mexico in 1987.

Zimmerman's first day as state veterinarian will be Monday, Aug. 15. He said his goal is to have open, honest communication with the state's livestock producers.

"My job is to protect and promote the New Mexico livestock industry, and I intend to meet with the different producer groups to get a feel for what their needs are, and how the New Mexico Livestock Board and the State Veterinarian can better meet them," Zimmerman said.
"We may not always agree, but an open dialogue, with all treated evenly and respectfully, will better serve the industry's needs."

New Mexico's livestock sector is the top contributor to the state's agricultural economy. The sale of New Mexico-produced, unprocessed livestock products (including meat animals, milk, wool, mohair and honey) amounted to nearly \$3 billion in 2014, the most recent year for which such data are available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. That figure becomes larger when some of these items are processed into high-value products, such as when milk is turned into cheese and when wool is spun into yarn.

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

Crafts, the pursuit of excellence and God

any years ago, when I first wrote "Bread for the Wilderness," a book on baking, my wife said to me, "What you have written in the chapter about the spiritual aspect of bread baking could be easily applied to any craft. It's more or less universal."

I realized the truth of her statement, and in fact had already thought about the similarity between baking and calligraphy and, really, everything else.

Calligraphy is exacting. There are standards to an alphabet on one hand, but there is freedom of expression on the other. Recently I've been visiting the web site for Ieuan Rees, a true master of the art in both paper and stone. Ieuan lives and works in Wales. I attended a deeply inspirational workshop with Rees

many years ago and I have never forgotten his spiritual energy, expressed so magnificently in his calligraphic forms.

In Rees's work one sees both the exacting standards of a particular alphabetic form, but at the same time his creative powers of expression. His heart is there, visible to

the beholder in and through the forms.

One of my favorite writers and artists was David Jones, an Anglo-Welsh poet who did a series of what he called "inscriptions" in his latter years. Once, when a friend was visiting and asked about a particular piece he was

working on, and noted the incredible concentration and thoughtfulness he brought to the work, Jones said something to the effect of, "I have to set this aside for now. Perhaps by Saturday I will be able to complete the E."

Here is the heart of the matter expressed in a simple sentence. Here is Jones, unaffectedly speaking to a friend, somewhat distracted, and yet pursuing excellence insofar as he was able.

When you are deeply involved in any craft, you lose time and place in the pursuit of that which is excellent by the standards of the craft. You lose yourself in the best way possible: into that which you love.

The pursuit of excellence is both a universally spiritual experience and also a deeply Christian vocation. Early Christian writers and teachers emphasize

that we are called to do all things well to the greater glory of God. What could be more evident than that, if we love both God and neighbor, we must be prepared to give our best?

For those who do not frame matters in this sort of language, there remains the pursuit of excellence in whatever one does. Any increase of beauty in the world deepens our awareness of that which is beyond us, nameless or not, even as does an increase of truth or goodness.

So if you are a plumber, pursue your craft toward excellence. There is beauty in a wellfunctioning plumbing system, as any of us who have known plumbing problems would testify. If you are an electrician know that people are counting on you grounding the system in order to render it safe. They will praise your competence as you pursue excellence in that craft. If you are a musician or a writer or a waiter... You get the point.

When I would introduce the art of leading worship to students in my past teaching life in Chicago, I would advise them to go to a good restaurant and observe the behavior of the waiters. There is an art to waiting tables: the best waiters strive to be on one hand invisible and on the other completely at your service.

Just like God. And there you have my connection between the Holy and the excellent for this week.

Check beneath soil to see if you have grub worms

f you have tried more water, different or more fertilizer, iron or soil acidifiers, but still can't get your tree or shrub to look healthy, it might be grub worms. They are the larvae of

the May and
June beetles,
which are the
large brown
beetles that
hovered around
your yard right
before sunset.
You probably
have inadvertently played
tennis with

them or they may have buzzed around your hair this past spring. Very pesky varmints! If these pests were present in your yard a few months ago, you probably have grub worms feasting on your lawn, tree and shrub roots right now.

They will show up on your lawn as brown patches that can be lifted up like a piece of carpet. They can weaken or stress new-planted trees or shrubs



by chewing up newly formed roots. They can be the size of your pinkie and they can wreak havoc in your landscape.

Fortunately there are some beneficial nematodes that are a natural and organic way to control grub worms. Although they might be a bit tricky to apply, this is a great way to be rid of these critters, especially if you have pets and/or children in the garden. The upside to this method is of course it is organic and will also kill a variety of other harmful soil creatures without hurting earth worms. The downside is that it

is more expensive and covers a smaller area, and may take a bit longer to work.

Of course there are granular and liquid forms of grub control. They are relatively safe to use but do not fall under the "organic" line of pesticides. Both list that it is safe to re-

enter treated areas after the insecticide has thoroughly dried. The upside is this method works immediately, with the exception of the largest of the grub worms, and covers larger areas for the money spent. The downside is that it may harm earthworms as well as other beneficial organisms. As always please read and follow all of the directions on the label of any products you use.

So if you can't figure out why your plants are not thriving, dig deeper into the soil. There is no mistaking these unsightly creatures. They have an off-white body with a dark brown head. Skunks and birds love to feast on these. By the way, getting rid of these grubs may also get rid of your skunks, if you have them, of course.



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It's that time of year! Chile recipes pleasing, addictive

Don't miss out on the upcoming 45th annual Hatch Chile Festival held the weekend before Labor Day. After collecting your fresh-roasted batch of Hatch, scurry to your home galley to prepare sizzling hot dishes guaranteed to cause brows to sweat and eyes to tear—a diehard chilehead's most welcomed endorphin high. From creamy dips to cheese-laden rellenos, the

recipes shared this week are taste-bud pleasers, and I warn, addictive.

Roasted Hatch Green Chile and Corn Salad (Serves 4-6)

8 ears corn, shucked
Olive oil
2 cups Sandia green chile peppers, roasted, stemmed and seeded
8 ounces cherry tomatoes, stems removed
2 ounces cotija cheese, crumbled
½ cup cilantro, stemmed and coarsely chopped
Juice 1 large lime
3 tablespoons white wine vinegar
Salt and pepper to taste
Optional garnishes: Cilantro, zest of lime, sour cream, or Greek

Light an outdoor grill to medium-high. Rub 6 of the 8 ears of corn

with olive oil. The remaining two will be tossed with the salad to add a fresh and tasty crunch. Grill corn until preferred charred doneness. When close to doneness, blister the cherry tomatoes along with the corn. Once charred, put corn and tomatoes on a large plate. On a cutting board, remove corn kernels with a sharp knife and place in a bowl. Next, slice cherry tomatoes in half and add to the same bowl as corn.

To prepare dressing:

In a small bowl, add the juice of lime, white wine vinegar, and the salt and pepper to taste. Pour dressing over corn medley and toss. Scoop salad into a serving bowl. Salad can be served as a side or as a salsa with chips (blue corn is my favorite) or top dish with grilled scallops or chopped grilled tilapia. Garnish, if desired.

Creamy Roasted Hatch Chile Dip (Yield: 1 ½ cups)

2 Hatch green chiles (mild to hot), roasted or grilled, peeled and seeded

1 cup sour cream

4 ounces cream cheese

1/4 cup fresh cilantro, chopped

2 cloves garlic, peeled

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon fresh cracked pepper

1 tablespoon fresh squeezed lime juice

Place all ingredients in food processor or blender and pulse until smooth. Add more salt and pepper to taste as needed. Serve with your favorite baked pita chips or slather on grilled meat or seafood. Store leftovers in the refrigerator.

Hatch Green Chile Rellenos (Yield: 6 rellenos)

3 whole eggs, separated

34 cup flour

6 each (about) ¾ " x 4" stick cuts of cheddar or Colby jack cheese 6 whole, large favorite Hatch green chiles, roasted and peeled ½ cup shortening

Cut top off of each roasted and peeled Hatch green chile. Remove seeds and veins. Place one stick of cut cheese inside each chile. Place ½ cup of flour in a shallow dish. Roll each stuffed chile into the flour and set aside on a plate covered with a paper towel to absorb extra moisture. Set aside.

Place egg whites in a medium sized bowl and whip with a hand mixer until stiff. Beat in 1-2 tablespoons of flour to help set the egg whites. Set aside. In another bowl, beat with a fork, the egg yolks. Fold yolks into the egg whites with a wooden spoon. Note: Do not beat. Set aside.

Heat shortening in a heavy skillet until hot. (Do not let oil to smoke.) Dip each cheese filled chile into the egg mixture, making certain to cover the entire chile. Carefully place into hot oil. Cook approximately 1 minute on each side or turn when golden brown. Remove from oil and place on a paper towel lined plate. Repeat with remaining green chile peppers. Serving suggestions: Serve plain or with favorite green or red chile sauce, or with sour cream.

HERB OF THE WEEK Milk thistle boasts a history of being good for the liver

Latin name: Silybum marianum **Part used:** Seed

Milk thistle is (you guessed it) a thistle, and it is a member of the daisy family. Its common name is in reference to the white veins on its leaves, which make it appear as if milk was spilled on the plant. It is native to the Mediterranean, but is now widely naturalized throughout North America.

Milk thistle has a long history of medicinal use. It has a strong affinity for the liver, and proves beneficial in treating most diseases that affect this organ. It is classified as a cholagogue, which is an herb that increases bile flow. This action stimulates liver function.

Milk thistle contains constituents that exert powerful protective effects on the liver, inhibiting absorption and damage from numerous liver-toxic chemicals, including carbon tetrachloride, butyrophenones, phenothiazines, acetaminophen, halothane, dilantin, organophosphate insecticides, ethanol and the mushroom toxins amanitin and phalloidin. Milk thistle protects and regenerates the liver after exposure to toxins, though it may be more beneficial to use it before exposure, in order to better fortify this organ.

In addition to the actions above, milk thistle also activates the regeneration of liver cells. For these reasons, it is used in the treatment of chronic hepatitis, fatty liver, cirrhosis, jaundice and liver damage due to toxin exposure, as well as alcohol and drug abuse.

Milk thistle can be taken in capsule and tincture form. The seeds can be ground up and added to foods. They can be roasted and used as a coffee substitute.

Medicare's website rates your local hospital care

Have you wondered how your area hospitals stack up in terms of the quality of care they provide?

Emergencies obviously call for rushing to the nearest hospital. But when you have time to plan, it is worth doing some research and finding out which hospitals do the best job of caring for their patients.

Medicare's Hospital Compare website (*medicare.gov/hospitalcompare/search.html*) has just made it easier for you to check that. The site has added overall star ratings to help you better understand which hospitals are top performers, which are average and which need improvement. The ratings range from one to five stars, with five being the best.

The Hospital Compare site already enjoys a solid reputation with the public, showing how 4,600 hospitals scored on various indicators of quality care. You can compare hospitals on the basis of such factors as clini-

cal outcomes, customer satisfaction and patient safety.

The new overall star ratings offer a snapshot of a particular hospital's quality of care by summing up 64 individual measures of hospital performance already

posted on the website. The ratings reflect such factors as how often patients get infections after surgery, how long patients must wait in the emergency department before seeing a doctor or nurse, and how likely patients are to get admitted to the hospital after a heart attack.

The stars take into account the mix of patients at a hospital, so that those fa-

cilities with a high percentage of sicker patients aren't rated lower than those that handle more run-of-the-mill cases.

Medicare assigned stars to 3,662 Medicare-certified hospitals nationwide. Another 937 couldn't be included, mostly because they didn't have enough data to properly evaluate them. They may have been too new or

too small and, therefore, had too few cases on which to base ratings. The ratings will be updated quarterly on the website, as the government continues to collect the most recent data.

Nationally, 102 hospitals received five stars, 934 rated four stars, 1,770 scored three stars, 723 received two stars, and 133 had just one star.

The 31 rated New Mexico hospitals scored an average of 2.7 stars for overall quality of care – slightly below the national average. None received five stars, three rated four stars, 17 scored three stars, 10 received two stars, and one hospital had just one star.

The three New Mexico hospitals that received four stars were Lovelace Westside Hospital in Albuquerque, Nor-Lea Hospital District in Lovington and Gila Regional Medical Center in Silver City.

The two Las Cruces hospitals scored as follows:

- Mountain View Regional Medical Center, three stars
- Memorial Medical Center, two stars

UNM scientists find already-approved drugs fight cancer

Cancer cells don't die when they're supposed to. Animal and human bodies follow an orderly process of birthing new cells and killing old ones. But cancer cells escape programmed cell death, called apoptosis, and multiply uncontrollably. Now new research from The University of New Mexico Comprehensive Cancer Center sheds light on how the cells of one type of cancer cheat death. In a paper published in the medial journal Oncotarget, Alexandre Chigaev, Ph.D., and his team their discovery that some approved drugs contribute to this process.


"There are mechanisms that eliminate mutated cells normally," Chigaev said. "But one of the ways that cancer cells survive is that those mechanisms break."

In studying cellular systems, Chigaev and his team discovered a process that leukemia cells use to expel a molecule that could be toxic and that starts apoptosis. Normal blood cells don't have the cellular machinery

for this process.

All cells produce a molecule called cyclic adenosine monophosphate, or cyclic AMP, through normal cellular processes. If it builds up, cyclic AMP can harm the


cell, so the cell converts it to a nontoxic form. Most normal cells can maintain low levels of cyclic AMP because their conversion system can keep up. If too much cyclic AMP piles up, though, the apoptosis process starts and the cell dies.



to keep each cell in its proper place, called its niche. The team discovered that cyclic AMP reduces VLA-4's stickiness, allowing cells to detach and wander when they shouldn't.

The team also confirmed other scientists' findings that cyclic AMP starts apoptosis in leukemia cells. The team studied cyclic AMP's effect on leukemia cells and discovered that those cells could pump the molecule out. But when they loaded cyclic AMP into normal blood cells, the cyclic AMP remained inside. The team confirmed their model by testing several different drugs that block leukemia cells' ability to pump cyclic AMP out. The drugs, all approved by the Food and Drug Administration, are used to fight malaria and fungal infections. They disable the cellular machinery that leukemia cells have to pump out cyclic AMP. When that machinery is disabled, the leukemia cells died. Because normal cells don't have such machinery, the drugs had no effect on them.

The discovery gives cancer scientists another target to shoot at in stopping cancer. Repurposing already-approved drugs greatly shortens the approval process to use them for leukemia. Since the drugs were tested on cells from actual leukemia patients, the Chigaev team hopes to continue seeing promising results. They have begun animal studies in preparation for human clinical trials.



That's like waiting an hour after the Super Bowl game clock expired to determine if it was a catch. The following week I heard from several reliable sources that the USGA received cancellations from many of its members, but there is no way to confirm that.

Finally, there is the issue about the TV coverage, with its hyper-close-up, slowmo, high-def cameras that capture the minutest detail, which is inherently and patently unfair because it isn't universally applied to every player in the tournament equally or every situation.

This TV coverage failing was all too evident a few weeks later in the U.S.

Women's Open when the Fox camera crew detected that Anna Nordquist had nudged a few grains of sand on her backswing in a bunker, leading officials to assess a 2-stroke penalty – not immediately, since they could not see it with the naked eye, but only after a lengthy booth review. Brittany Lang was the eventual winner of the playoff.

Similar to my report on "narcs on the couch," charging that call-ins by home viewers should not influence golf championships, I intend to cover more on the TV close-up lens interference with major golf outcomes in later columns.

Then there was plenty of feedback about back-to-back columns dealing with rude golfers and slow play. Perhaps the most interesting reaction was from a nongolfer who is a regular reader and who shared: "I was surprised by the story on misbehaving, bully golfers. And I always thought golf was a refined, genteel pastime for folks of polished upbringing."

As for the "play at a snail's pace" article, one local golfer had this to say: "If golf clubs and daily fee courses would

consistently and sternly enforce pace of play standards the problem wouldn't be nearly as bad."

Yet, therein lies the "rub-of-the-green" so to speak. Private clubs seem to be quite reluctant to police slow-playing groups for fear of offending the guilty members. What they don't realize is that the members who are constantly waiting on the snails are a larger group and more offended.

Part of my piece about slow play involved modern golf courses that are way too long and too difficult for occasional, beginner and inept players, that may lead to time-consuming rounds and total frustration. I heard from a couple of local golfers who agreed with my praise of "executive" type 9-hole courses; support is building for a par-3 course in the local area. Even a short 6-hole layout would provide a popular starter for some folks.

Slow play on the professional tours has been a longstanding complaint of mine. Pro players – men and women – get rankled when they know they are being observed closely by "time rovers."







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
