Plaza gets deadline Downtown TIDD money in jeopardy By Todd G. Dickson

It could become a case of "use it or lose it" with the Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) money for Downtown Las Cruces if a project isn't lined up in the near future.

That concern dominated a TIDD board meeting Monday, Jan. 13, which included the City Council and County Commission Chairman Billy Garrett.

While the creation of a plaza remains the most favored project, the desired property across Main Street from the Rio Grande Theatre belongs to the Bank of the West for its drive-through lanes. The city was unable to get a deal finalized with the bank and turned it over to the Las Cruces Community Partners, a group formed to assist Downtown development.

Also desired by many in the business community, however, are the conversions of Church and Water streets to two-way traffic, said Susan Henderson of PlaceMakers, a company that late last year held a design charrette as part of an effort to update the Downtown revitalization plan.

For the many community members who attended the charrette, the plaza remains a priority, Henderson said, but there also is a clear need to open Water and Church streets to two-way traffic.

The TIDD, which was created in 2007, commits money from growth in gross receipts tax (GRT) and property taxes to development projects. But the TIDD hasn't generated a lot of money. Andy Hume, senior planner leading

Andy Hume, senior planner leading the city's efforts in Downtown revitalization, said the TIDD has generated \$7.6 million, which is 74 percent of projection, but only \$103,000 in property taxes. The "dramatically underperforming" property See **TIDD** on page A7



Legislature to begin busy 30-day session State budget set at \$6 billion

When lawmakers meet Tuesday, Jan. 21, their primary goal is to pass a budget over the next 30 days, but there are some budget differences already being debated between Gov. Susana Martinez and legislators.

The Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) has proposed a \$6.15 billion budget with \$50 million for a 1.5 percent acrossthe-board pay hike for all state workers, which the Santa Fe New Mexican reports has already drawn criticism from Martinez.

Martinez has proposed a \$6.07 billion budget, which represents an increase in recurring state spending of 3 percent. Her budget calls for more spending on education reform, expanding the health care work force and investing in water infrastructure and research. About 58 percent of the LFC

budget – \$3.55 billion – would

NMSU enrollment declines for spring An 8 percent drop possible

With classes starting up again Thursday, Jan. 16, New Mexico State University is seeing an 8-percent drop in its spring semester enrollment, despite assurances of support for students on the New Mexico Lottery Scholarship.

Numbers available Monday, Jan. 13, had NMSU systemwide seeing an 8-percent decline with 22,714 signed up for classes compared to 24,694 taking spring semester classes last year. On the Las Cruces main campus, the total is just under 14,000 students compared to more than 15,000 students last year.

Of NMSÚ's branch colleges, Doña Ana Community College is the most stable with a 6-percent drop compared to doubledigit decreases at its Alamogordo, Carlsbad and Grants campuses. Carlsbad and Grants are seeing about a 27-percent decline,

A photo of photographer Erik Winter's daughter was named Photo of the Year by judges in the third annual Doña Ana Camera Club contest.

The judges also awarded a Photographer of the Year award to member Karen Siemsen.

Thirty-eight club members submitted a total of 112 photos for this year's contest.

The photos submitted were overall of very good quality," said Ron Wolfe, club president. 'Each year we have seen an increase in the quantity and quality of the photos entered."

Winter is a site support manager at the White Sands Complex, an owner of a photography business, specializing in portraiture, and a freelance photographer for New Mexico State University and the Las Cruces Bulletin. His winning photograph was shot in the bedroom of his house, capturing his daughter in the shadows. The judges described it as being very striking and liked the use of lots of black.

Winter used a Nikon d7000 camera and a Sigma 17-50 f/2.8 lens. Photoshop was used to turn it from mostly black to all black.

Siemsen submitted three blue-ribbon winning entries to earn the Photographer of the Year Award. Black-and-white photos from the for years, having taken a New York Institute of Photography class in 1990 and then attending numerous workshops and seminars throughout the country.

Over the years, Siemson's photo subjects have changed from scenes to close-ups to people. Most recently, she has noticed a trend toward black-and-white and has been converting many of her shots, hence the submissions for this year's competition. Siemson splits her time between California and Las Cruces.

The Doña Ana Camera Club conducts one competition each year, but more typically focuses on enhancing photo skills and encouraging members of all skill levels. 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

MLK's legacy on exhibit

Local leaders exemplify positive changes in society

As we commemorate the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr., we know the struggle for which he gave his life continues.

Still, there are impressive signs of progress.

Here in Las Cruces, we don't have to look far to see significant examples. Our commander at White Sands Missile Range is Maj. Gen. Gwen Bingham. The recently named county manager of Doña Ana County is Julia Brown.

Both are African-American women.

A generation ago, it would have been hardly conceivable either position would be held by a woman. A generation ago, it would have been just as unlikely either position would be held by an African-American.

These are two of the most important positions in our community, yet in each appointment, little fanfare was made of their gender or their ethnicity. That is a good thing; it indicates we aren't surprised that people of their backgrounds can succeed. Discussion instead centered on their qualifications.

If you've met Brown and Bingham, you know they are delightful, with very positive, results-driven outlooks. They are good at what they do.

The success they've achieved comes in spite of obstacles even in their home states. Brown is from Óklahoma, where I grew up.

Oklahoma has quite a history of racial prejudice. In 1921, racial violence set afire my hometown of Tulsa. The riots set back progress for black Tulsans for decades.

In 1951, at Brown's alma mater - and mine - Oklahoma State University (then Oklahoma A&M), the school's football field was the site of an ugly incident. Drake University came to town, featuring star player Johnny Bright, who was black. Oklahoma A&M players targeted him, knocking him unconscious multiple times and breaking his jaw. Bright, a Heisman Trophy candidate, still managed to throw a touchdown pass before leaving the game due to injuries.

Brown earned her juris doctorate from the University of Oklahoma, which has its own history of prejudice. My godfather, Leo "Speck" Reynolds, attended OU after World War II on the G.I. Bill. He told me of dividers built into classrooms. Black students were forced to sit behind them, able to hear the instructor, but not visible to students or faculty.

Bingham is from Alabama.

You only need mention some cities in Alabama to be reminded of the deep-seated discrimination and segregation of that state. Montgomery and the 1955 bus boycott inspired by Rosa Parks. Birmingham and the 1963 church bombing that killed four young black girls. Selma and the bloody 1965 attack of peaceful civil rights marchers on the Edmund Pettus Bridge.

It is important we never forget these painful chapters in our nation's history. We must be vigilant to work against those attitudes, which still thrive in many forms. King achieved what he did without benefit of elected office or government support.

Indeed, in many cases the government - especially municipal and state governments did everything they could to work against him.


King and many others died for the righteous cause of racial freedom and dignity. Because of those efforts, we have the opportunity to have talented and qualified leaders like Bingham and Brown.

Because of those efforts, we really do have a nation capable of living out the true meaning of its creed: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal?

On a regular basis, though, our nation still fails to live out that creed, which is exactly why it is so important to honor and recognize the efforts, the ideas and the sacrifice of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Spend ed money on kids Governor's agenda results in corporate bonanza

These feel-good phrases sound great to the general public: "We need to raise education standards in New Mexico." "Our kids deserve better." "Kids First."

No one in our state, which has ranked persistently in the bottom of the nation in child poverty and graduation rates, would argue. But dig deep into the world where con-

cerned parents, students and teachers are operating, and Gov. Susana Martinez's reforms are not about kids. Her reforms spearheaded by Hanna Skandera, a non-teacher and a nonparent, are really about corporate money and re-election campaign slogans.

The Public Education Department (PED) won't acknowledge the huge elephant in the room: Not every child has a supportive adult at home. Many of our state's children live in poverty and endure abuse and neglect. In Albuquerque Public Schools (APS) alone, 6,000 of 87,000 students are homeless and 64 percent of students qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Despite these challenges, APS has increased its graduation rate from 63.2 percent in 2008 to 70.1 percent in 2012.

An APS Board of Education member, I can assure you that nowhere in our game plan to close the poverty learning gap has the district ever looked to standardized tests as the answer. Instead, we've been innovative in reaching out to children of poverty and helping them and their parents improve academic outcomes.

Skandera, on the other hand, works from a corporate playbook that forces districts to measure student and teacher "progress" with mathematical models that even Los Alamos National Laboratory scientists can't figure out. The problem with her business approach to education is that kids, and the challenges they face in our economically depressed state, are not robots.

Skandera's new standardized bubble test, the End of Course exam, is a corporate boondoggle. It is spearheaded with the help of a New Hampshire company called Measured Progress, which has been paid more than \$7.3 million since Skandera came on board. It has another \$2.4 million coming to it for contract work in 2013.

How many more out-of-state companies are profiting from the governor's "reforms?" Let's hope New Mexico's major news providers will What should informed citizens know about these bubble tests? Well, the required pass scores for a few End of Course exams were

devote resources to following the money.

scores for a few End of Course exams were recently revealed by the PED: Chemistry, 13 out of 50 (26 percent); Algebra II, 20 out of 50 (40 percent); Biology, 22 out of 50 (44 percent). The PED is spending millions to develop and administer End of Course exams and yet the required pass scores are so low, you have to wonder: "Why bother taking them?" A teacher would call such a score an "F."

The PED will ask the Legislature for an additional 3.9 percent for its programs. That's \$99 million in additional funds for reforms.

That's outrageous to teachers and parents who know that the \$99 million isn't going directly to our classrooms. So where is it going exactly?

The governor and Skandera are increasing education spending but they're doing it on the backs of kids. They'll spend much of the \$99 million on expanding testing for K-3 students and the ridiculous End of Course standardized exams for fourth through 12th grades.

They'll give first-year teachers a 10 percent pay raise when every teacher deserves an increase, and they'll spend some of the millions on merit pay that benefits just a few teachers as part of a pilot program that is based on a faulty and subjective evaluation system.

If we really value education, we'll scrutinize the claims Skandera and Martinez make when they defend their corporate reform model – the same model that is failing in Tennessee, Florida, New York, Oregon and Washington, D.C.

If Skandera and Martinez were true collaborators, they wouldn't ask the corporate-funded American Legislative Exchange Council for insight. If they truly valued collaboration, they would put a hold on their destructive path and consult those of us in the trenches about what we want in our New Mexico schools.

Here is my short wish list: art and music classes for elementary students every year; basic classroom needs like paper towels and copy paper so teachers and parents don't have to pay for them; adequate materials and professional development for teachers so they can apply the new Common Core State Standards with fidelity; and more money for middle and high school arts programs. Here is what would never be on my wish list: more standardized tests.

Reform spending in the governor's budget includes \$15.5 million for the "New Mexico Reads to Lead" program, which deploys early childhood reading initiatives to readers between kindergarten and the third grade, and \$9 million to help the state's lowestperforming schools improve their student achievement.

Under the LFC budget, about \$2.7 billion in overall funding would be provided for public schools.

Rep. Luciano "Lucky" Varela, D-Santa Fe, and Sen. John Arthur Smith, D-Deming, LFC co-chairmen, said they don't foresee major budget battles in the upcoming session. But a spokesman for the governor told the Associated Press that the proposal "doles out millions of dollars worth of untargeted, across-the-board government employee pay raises, while dramatically underfunding economic

development efforts."

The committee's budget – which includes a spending increase of more than \$253 million - is an effort to restore some of the budget cuts the Legislature had to make during the 2009 session, Varela and Smith said.

The LFC budget would use \$40 million to help schools and state agencies recruit workers for hardto-fill positions, to reward deserving employees and to fix other pay issues.

The LFC budget includes \$4.5 million to raise the pay of beginning teachers to \$32,500 a year from \$30,000. The committee's recommendation also includes \$2.7 million for salary increases for teachers' aides.

One major area of state government spending - Medicaid, now called Centennial Care - would be decreased in the LFC's budget proposal by more than \$24 million.

The LFC budget calls for \$837 million for the state's network of colleges and universities, which represents a 5.1 percent increase and includes additional money to help train more nurses to address a shortage of health care providers.

Martinez's budget calls for \$1.5 million to double the number of awards in New Mexico's nursing loanfor-service and health professional loan repayment programs which, over the next 10 years, would add up to an additional 720 new primarycare practitioners committed to work for a period of time in rural areas of New Mexico. Her budget would spend \$1.6 million to add 24 new nurse practitioner slots and \$750,000 to expand the number of family practice residency slots by seven at the University of New Mexico.

"Unprecedented changes in health care threaten to drive up costs and

leave thousands without the primary care services they need. We can lead the nation in responding to this challenge by increasing the number of primary care practitioners, especially in rural areas," Martinez said.

Other features of Martinez's budget include \$1 million to make permanent the "Returning Heroes" firefighting program – an initiative launched by Martinez to hire returning veterans and train them to battle wildfires, \$14.2 million in targeted compensation increases for state employees in positions that are traditionally the hardest to recruit and \$2 million in new water research funding through the Water Resources Research Institute at New Mexico State University.

Martinez has proposed spending \$112 million – or 60 percent – of the state's capital outlay budget on water infrastructure projects.

Carrie La Tour, executive director of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership, said the plaza would help businesses, because every time a special event is held Downtown, Main Street has to be closed. With events held at the plaza, the street could remain open, she said.

Hume said if the TIDD isn't committed to projects by 2018, the money would go back to respective governmental entities, with about 60 percent going back to the state. He said state officials have already asked him why it isn't being spent.

Miyagishima said a deadline should be set to get a plaza deal on the table and suggested three months.

Bob Pofahl of the Las Cruces Community Partners said a deadline would help spur movement in negotiations with the bank.

"It's good to say that it's going to happen or not (by a certain date)," he said. "Three months is good."

Currently, any New Mexican who graduates from an in-state high school with a minimum 2.5 GPA is eligible to receive the scholarship, which covers full tuition - but not fees - for eight consecutive semesters. Students who receive a New Mexico GED are also eligible.

(HED) Higher Education Secretary José Garcia, a Martinez appointee, has sent 32 different lottery scholarship solvency scenarios to top-ranking state lawmakers.

They all would fundamentally change the scholarship program,

the Journal reports, by implementing a mix of student GPA and financial need, both on a sliding scale, to determine award amounts. Each of the 32 scenarios would separate the scholarships from tuition, meaning students or their families would have



The New Mexico State University women's basketball team will host the University of Missouri-Kansas City at 6 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 18, in the Pan American Center. The Aggies were 1-2 in Western Athletic Conference play and 4-12 overall prior to hosting Chicago State (0-3 WAC, 3-13 overall) at 6 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 16.

Kansas City (6-10; 2-1 WAC) averages slightly more than 74 points a game. The Kangaroos feature the WAC's leading scorer, Eilise O'Connor, who is averaging 20.1 points a game. This season, the 'Roos have won two of their six games in overtime. The 'Roos played at Texas Pan American Thursday, Jan. 16.

NMSU and UMKC are 2-2 all time. The Aggies handed Kansas City a 75-50 loss in Las Cruces last season.

The Aggies, starting three freshmen, a sophomore and a junior newcomer, have one of the youngest starting lineups in the country.

NMSU is led in scoring by junior Danesia Williamson, who is averaging 17.4 points a game. The Aggies have three other players averaging in double figures: sophomore Sasha Weber at 11.1 points per game; redshirt sophomore and Mayfield High School product Elena Holguin at 11 ppg.

NMSU announced Wednesday, Jan. 15, Vanessa Garner was leaving the team due to personal reasons and September Offutt had been dismissed for academic reasons.

High school boys ready for district play Defending champ Bulldawgs battle back from early stumbles

Defending 5A boys basketball state champion Las Cruces High School has struggled to a 7-6 record so far in the 2013-14 season. The Bulldawgs got off to a slow start, and on Dec. 12, 2013, a 74-63 loss to Hope Christian in Albuquerque put them at 1-5.

Since then, Las Cruces has gone 6-1, starting with road victories at Los Alamos (75-37) and Rio Rancho (82-60). The 'Dawgs' resurgence continued with wins at home over Hobbs (60-52) and last year's runner up Clovis (61-51) before LCHS dropped a game Jan. 7 at Cathedral (51-44). They followed that up with a win at Hanks High School in El Paso (75-56) and 55-42 home victory over Faith Christian Tuesday, Jan. 14.

The Bulldawgs have a busy schedule this week, with home games at 5:30 p.m. Friday, Jan. 17, against Albuquerque Eldorado, and at 1 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 18, against Volcano Vista. District play begins at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21, when Alamogordo (11-4 as of Tuesday, Jan. 14) makes a visit.

Mayfield High School has the best record of any of the Las Cruces 5A teams at 10-5, and technically, is leading the 5A District 3 standings at 1-0 with a 50-39 win over Oñate High School on Dec. 28, 2013. The Trojans are coming off a 79-75 win over a very good Hobbs team at Mayfield Saturday, Jan. 11. The Trojans host Volcano Vista at 5:30 p.m. Friday, Jan. 17, and Eldorado at 1 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 18, before visiting Deming at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21.

Oñate High School has struggled in the 2013-14 season, with a 4-12 mark going into a 5:30 p.m. game at Atrisco Heritage Academy Friday, Jan. 17, and a 1 p.m. game Saturday, Jan. 18 at Manzano High School.

The Knights open district play at 12-3 Gadsden Tuesday, Jan. 21.

Perhaps the hottest team in Las Cruces is be the Centennial Hawks, who have battled to an 11-5 record with wins over traditional 5A powers Las Cruces (53-51) and Clovis (59-53) and 4A contenders Los Lunas (57-53) and Artesia (61-59). The Hawks have done well in close games, with six of their wins coming by six points or less.

CHS will put its four-game win streak on the line this weekend when they travel to Albuquerque to visit Manzano High School at 7 p.m. Friday, Jan. 17, and Atrisco Heritage Academy at 1 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 18.

Mesilla Valley Christian Schools, under new coach Jeremy Roman, has earned a 9-4 record after defeating Chaparral Tuesday. Jan. 14, 65-56. The SonBlazers are 4-0 at home, and 3-1 on neutral courts, but have struggled on the road at 2-3.

Some of MVCS struggles have come against tough competition, including at 4A Deming (8-5), and Kirtland Central (10-4), and at 3A Sandia Prep (6-7). The SonBlazers' only neutral court loss is to 3A Silver, which is 9-1.

The 'Blazers are playing Jan. 16-18 at the Dexter Tournament, before opening district play against rival Tularosa (8-3) at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21, in Las Cruces.





A seasoned golf instructor will put you at ease

Young golfers need to get in lots of practice



Question: Everything I've read and heard tells me I should get golf lessons. You say that all the time, Dr. Golf. Alright you've convinced me. I'm going to book lessons. But what do I tell my golf teacher? What do I ask? What do I do? Laura P., Mesilla Park

Dr. Golf: Let's keep it simple. Taking golf lessons is a little like going to counseling. At first you're a bit nervous, but a seasoned counselor (and golf teacher) will put you at ease. First of all, I suggest you prepare a quick summary, mental or written, of your golf game and experience, to share in about 10 seconds. Like the proverbial "elevator speech" where you tell about yourself in a short quick manner.

Next, state your key goals: specifically, what you wish and plan to accomplish with your golf game. Here's an example: "I'm a 20 handicap and have been for five years. I have my moments and I know I can play. It's blowup holes that kill me."

A golf teacher, like a psychotherapist, needs to know exactly what problem you would like him (or her) to help you with. If you would like an ongoing golf coaching relationship you'll be working on all aspects of the game: drives, long irons, fairway woods, short irons, pitches, lobs, chipping, bunker shots, putting and the mental game.

For "faults-and-fixes" type lessons, I advise you to ask for what you want to do for 30 or 60 minutes of instruction, and what you should be practicing the most.

Having trouble getting the ball airborne? Then, get help with that. Chunking the ball and hitting it "fat?" Tell your instructor.

Question: I want to get longer. Your take on gadgets and gizmos for trying to gain the magical 20 more yards was funny. But I'm serious.

Rob S., Las Cruces

Dr. Golf: Be patient. Herb and I are planning on doing a weekend golf school later this spring.

Question: Who has slow greens and lousy cups?

Dr. Golf: I'm not calling anybody out. I'm just saying that, on a golf course, they call legitimate, greens have to be mowed - winter and summer - so that some consistency is maintained.

Cups must be cut anew and moved at least every other day. Otherwise, the edges become like a mini-volcano, with golf balls rolling sideways like trying to putt to an upside down saucer. If tour players had to putt to cups like that they would rebel and Tim Finchem wouldn't hear the end of it.

Question: Last week, you went through Indian nicknames for college sports teams but I didn't see any golf course names. I know there are a few.

Pete N., Las Cruces

Dr. Golf: There are more than a few, not formally associated with any Indian tribes or reservations, casinos or properties. My research reveals that there are at least 97 private golf clubs with Indian names.

That, of course, does not include public golf facilities. It also doesn't include Hawaii and Alaska. In Michigan there are: Indianwood CC, Owosso CC, Saginaw CC, Tecumseh CC, Wabeek CC and Washtenaw CC, all of which I have played. In Ohio there are: Maketewah CC, Mowhawk CC, Shawnee CC, Tippecanoe CC and Scioto CC, which is famous for where Jack Nicklaus learned golf. In Iowa there are: Oneota CC, Ottumwa CC, Sioux City CC and Wakonda CC.

In Florida there are: Indian Creek CC, Indian River Club, Seminole Lake CC and Seminole CC, made famous by the rich and Ben Hogan.

I could go on. I am not aware of any complaints or efforts by golf bodies like the USGA to force name changes.

Question: I have a 14-year-old daughter who is learning to play golf and shows some promise. One of her friends plays on the high school golf team and she thought it looked pretty neat, so I bought her golf clubs and she took a few lessons. She goes to the range once a week and plays nine holes once a week. She's athletic and can hit fairly long drives, but then struggles from there; she hasn't broken 110. I want her to do well, and have fun, but now I'm frustrated. How can she get better and play right along with the other girls? Angie P., Las Cruces

Dr. Golf: Dear "frustrated," you raise an interesting issue: How do we get young girls interested enough in golf to want to go out and practice until the sun goes down?

The fact is that golf is a sport which is relatively hard to learn, and long hours of practice are required to become any good at it. The golf swing is actually fairly simple, but the game itself is difficult, since it has so many facets and nuances.

In his groundbreaking book "Outliers: The Story of Success," Malcolm Gladwell identified the "10,000-hour rule" as the sine qua non of being at the top in any competitive field, whether it be music, computers or sports. After making an exhaustive study of thousands of successful people Gladwell concluded that true expertise and mastery (as in playing the violin, for example) required no less than 10,000 hours of work and practice before rewards would come your way.

That's basically working at it nearly every day for something like five to six hours a day over a span of maybe 6 or 7 years.

The Asian girls (especially the Koreans) don't seem to have a problem with that. American girls do. And maybe American parents do.

It appears that in the case of Tiger Woods, since early toddlerhood, the 10,000 hours was only a start.

Frankly, I haven't decided which is best for kids: for parents to push them really hard; or to just leave them alone and let them motivate themselves

Fewer and fewer kids are self-starters; it seems there are so many distractions in our culture that it's hard for a kid to get zealously focused and become singularly goal-oriented. For that reason I lean toward pushing, but only up to the point when it is reasonable and not overpowering, smothering or abusive.

Back to your daughter, she needs to understand that to get good at anything you need to practice, practice, practice and play, play, play. Arrange for a regular teacher, and keep trying to get her interested in learning more about the game: it's history, the rules, the professional tours, the stars and possible role models.







testified in favor of the Water Streams Commission dividing New Mexico into five districts.



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

Boy shoots students at middle school

A 12-year-old boy armed with a shotgun opened fire at a middle school in Roswell Tuesday, Jan. 14, seriously wounding two students before a staff member persuaded him to put down the firearm, authorities said.

The shooting at Berrendo Middle School took place in a gym before the start of class, Gov. Susana Martinez said.

'The shooter was quickly stopped by one staff member who walked right up to him and asked him to set down the firearm, which he did," she said.

The wounded students were flown to University Medical Center in Lubbock, Texas. The wounded children were a boy, 11, in critical condition, and a girl, 12, in serious condition. Both underwent surgery for gunshot wounds, said hospital spokesman Eric Finley.

The 12-year-old boy arrived with a shotgun - whose wooden stock had been sawed down - concealed in a bag, said New Mexico State Police Chief Pete Kassetas.

The shooting was the second to take place at a U.S. middle school in three months, after a 12-year-old boy opened fire at his middle school in Sparks, Nev., in October, killing a teacher and wounding two students before killing himself.

J.C. Penney store stays in Las Cruces

Store closures were in Alabama, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota,

Montana, North Carolina, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia and Wisconsin.

The closings will be completed by early May.

What a difference a couple of decades can make.

From the time I relocated to Las Cruces in 1992 until the mid-2000s, sales of new and existing Las Cruces area homes, townhomes and condominiums plodded along at a humdrum pace. Our local listing inventory contained a little more than 300 new and existing homes; values were appreciating at around 4 percent annually and new-home sales accounted for approximately 17 to 18 percent of the total number of closings. Then everything changed.

Congress authorized Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae to purchase mortgage loans made to just about anyone who could fog a mirror, igniting a fire under our nation's housing market. Buyers came out of the woodwork, creating a shortage and driving up prices.

Enter the builders.

Subdivisions sprang up all over town and new-home construction was off and running. First-time buyers were purchasing almost half of the available homes, while investors were snapping up almost 40 percent of the inventory for rentals and vacation getaways. By late 2007, our listing inventory had ballooned

Good money lures drivers Demand skyrockets in oil fields have the money to invest in you and your continued training."

Every five weeks, International Truck Driving Academy and Doña Ana Community College enroll a new class of students preparing for careers behind the wheel of a big rig.

The partnership program is located at the DACC Workforce Center, 2345 E. Nevada Ave.

The main goal of the training is to get out there and get a job. For the amount of time the training takes and the amount of money you'll be making, it's the best thing available," admissions counselor David Ortiz said. "If you have

a good driving record and no criminal record, you are pretty much guaranteed a job over the road or in the oil fields."

He said demand for drivers in the New Mexico oil fields has "gone through the roof." Oil company drivers can earn \$17 to \$25

per hour to start, with plenty of opportunity for overtime, he said.

Also looking to hire drivers who have just received their commercial licenses are large transport companies.

Werner in Phoenix and Swift in El Paso are the two we work with most," Ortiz said. "Bigger companies that focus on transport

These companies pay by the mile rather than the hour, Ortiz said. "An entry-level driver averages \$37,000 to \$43,000 the first year."

Local employers such as beverage distributors, on the other hand, typically require two years of commercial driving experience.

"We've had students from 19 years old to 64 years old," Ortiz said. "Most are between 25 and 40. There have been a couple ladies, but most are gentlemen. Some have had dead-end jobs out of high school and are looking for

Medical center plan submitted City to rule on Park Ridge concept

The proposed Park Ridge Medical Center has moved forward with the submission to the city of a subdivision concept plan.

A decision on the medical center plan could come as early as late January, according to Susana Montana, planner with the city's Community Development Department. If the concept is approved, a plat plan will be submitted for review and eventual vote by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The 30-acre property is part of the 110-acre former Las Cruces Country Club at 2700 N. Main St.

The developer, CBI Holdings LLC, envisions a mixed-use urban infill project that ultimately would occupy the entire 110 acres. Multi-family housing, retail and dining, professional offices and green space would be part of the mix.

A 42-bed boutique hospital, medical offices and an assisted living facility would be the first

phase of the medical center, followed by an open space linear park and additional assisted living space. The third phase of medical center construction would include additional medical, dental and professional offices.

CBI won approval in August to rezone the medical campus site.

Approval was contingent upon a traffic impact study, which Montana said was submitted Jan. 6. The target date for construction to begin is June 2014.

The study conducted by Zia Engineering &

Virgin Galactic successfully completed the third rocketpowered supersonic flight of its passenger-carrying reusable space vehicle, SpaceShipTwo (SS2), on Friday, Jan. 10, at Mojave Air and Space Port in California.

The company aims to begin commercial flight in 2014 at Spaceport America in Sierra County.

The crew tested the spaceship's Reaction Control System (RCS) and the newly installed thermal protection coating on the vehicle's tail booms. All test objectives were successfully completed, the company reported.

Today's flight was another resounding success," said Virgin Galactic CEO George Whitesides. "We focused on gathering more transonic and supersonic data, and our chief pilot, Dave (Mackay), handled the vehicle beautifully. With each flight test, we are progressively closer to our target of starting commercial service in 2014."

The WhiteKnightTwo (WK2) carrier aircraft lifted SS2 to an altitude around 46,000 feet. On release, SS2's rocket motor was ignited, powering the spaceship to a planned altitude of 71,000 ft. -SS2's highest altitude to date - and a maximum speed of Mach 1.4. SS2's unique feather re-entry system was also tested.

Two important SS2 systems, the RCS and thermal protection coating, were tested during the flight in preparation for upcoming full space flights. The spaceship's RCS will allow its pilots to maneuver the vehicle in space, permitting an optimal viewing experience for those on board and aiding the positioning process for spacecraft re-entry.

The new reflective protection coating on SS2's inner tail boom surfaces is being evaluated to help maintain vehicle skin temperatures while the rocket motor is firing.

something stable where they can provide for a family."

Applicants must pass a drug test, Department of Transportation physical and moving violations check.

They sign up for a program of 50 hours of classroom instruction and 150 hours behind the wheel. A typical student spends a week in class and three weeks driving, Ortiz said.

Head instructor Willie Santillan said driving practice can take as much as four or five weeks or more - until the students are ready to take the DMV test for a commercial license.

"We don't schedule an appointment until they're ready," he said.

'We have an 85 to 90 percent success rate," Ortiz said. Students also can qualify for a defensive driving certificate and to take DMV tests for specialty endorsements, including driving double and triple rigs, tankers or transporting hazardous materials.

Eyes on the prize

On Friday, Jan. 10, their first day to get behind the wheel, a class of five men and one woman took a break from reviewing test questions to talk about their aspirations.

Some had lost jobs; all wanted more security and good money.

"I was laid off, so it seemed like a good opportunity to do it," said former hotel maintenance employee Kirk Hard. "The guys I worked with mentioned I could probably qualify for a grant."

The son of a truck driver, he qualified and is looking forward to a new career.

Quality engineer Suzy Estrada said she also is looking to change careers

"Basically there are no (quality engineering) jobs in New Mexico," she said. "There's not much manufacturing here."

Alex Herrera, a seasonal firefighter with the U.S. Forest Service in Cloudcroft, said he wants to land more consistent work and earn more money.

Climbing into the cab

Instructor Abraham Ortiz who has driven a truck for 25 years and taught for eight years, said the school looks for students who are stable, not nervous - "someone who can take a little criticism. Definitely someone who's safety conscious.'

He said the aspiring drivers practice all the routines, such as braking and parking, in parking lots before they accelerate out onto the road.


"It's a little scary getting into a 70-foot truck and remaining conscious of your mirrors, where everybody is, the flow of traffic that's moving around you," he said.

Environmental Consultants of Las Cruces evaluated traffic flow at six intersections in the immediate vicinity, all with traffic signals.

Engineers concluded two of the intersections - one at North Main Street and El Camino Real/Camino Rex and the other at North Main Street and Elks Drive/Triviz Avenue – currently are failing. They recommended total reconstruction by the develop-

er of the Camino Real intersection. In addition, they recommended a study of remedial alternatives for signal operation at the Elks Drive intersection. The developer expressed willingness to participate in remediation, Montana said. "We are very pleased to have the traffic studies completed

and be moving forward," Bob Pofahl of CBI Holdings said.

The property lies within the city's Infill Development Overlay District and the City's Subdivision Code has special provisions for review of applications within the District, Montana said.

If the concept plan for Park Ridge Medical Center is approved by the city subdivision administrator, the applicant may submit a final plat plan showing the proposed development lots within the concept plan area, Montana said.

The final plat submittal would be reviewed by city agencies and the city's Development Review Committee (DRC) would make a recommendation to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The commission would review the proposal at a public hearing and make a decision of approval, approval with conditions or denial.

to almost 1,750 homes. That was also the year when Las Cruces area Realtors sold more than 2,400 residential properties.

Then everything changed, again.

The housing market started to crumble and values began to fall. Builders curtailed their efforts and began slashing prices in an effort to move excess inventory. Homeowners who thought they could cash in on the hyper-appreciation created by the buying frenzy began to realize that they'd be lucky to sell at all, much less make a profit. As a result, inventories of new and existing homes began to shrink.

Fast forward to today.

On Jan. 14, the Las Cruces Association of Realtors reported that our local inventory of unsold residential properties stood at just 971 units. That's a 44 percent reduction from the 1,745 properties for sale when our inventory peaked at the end of 2007, and the lowest since 2004.

The raw numbers tell only part of the story, however. Fortytwo of the 971 homes are located in outlying areas, such as Chaparral, Truth or Consequences and Deming, leaving just 929 new and existing Las Cruces area homes to choose from. Thirty-two of those properties are condominiums. Another 56 are townhomes.

Have you done the math? After eliminating condominiums, townhomes and outlying offerings, Las Cruces area homebuyers currently have only 841 actual free-standing, single family homes to choose from. Just 76 of those are new construction. Those numbers are pretty low considering local Realtors sold 1,220 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums over the past 12 months.

At our current sales pace, the 941 homes represent a 9.5 month supply of inventory across all price ranges.

The supply of homes in the \$100,000 to \$275,000 price range is currently favorable to sellers, however, and will last only four to seven months at the current sales rate. If I owned a home in the price range and was thinking of selling it, I would seriously consider exploring the possibility while conditions are favorable. Who knows what the remainder of 2014 has in store for us? See you at closing.

Wednesday, Jan. 8, was the 50th anniversary of Lyndon Johnson's state of the union speech in which he announced the "War on Poverty."

The anniversary provided an opening for pundits on both sides of the political aisle to pontificate on the country's progress in the past 50 years.

Democrats point to growing income inequality, while Republicans have decried the "War on Poverty" as a failure. Both miss the main point, which is that the poverty has largely been eliminated from America. People just don't go to bed hungry in America from lack




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of resources.

When I say this to people, they often get angry. Of course, there are people who don't have enough to eat, but it's not because of a lack of resources. Rather it is because these people have problems accessing the resources.

In my own family, I have relative who is schizophrenic and disappeared for three months last summer. When finally found, she was confused and disoriented, and she had lost nearly 100 pounds. She was emaciated. Obviously, she hadn't had enough to eat. But the problem was not a lack of government programs, but rather that she is mentally ill.

At this point, those of you who haven't slammed down the paper in disgust will be saying to yourself, "But poverty isn't just about food. It's about lots of other things."

But this just proves my point.

We have so little true poverty in our country that we have redefined poverty to mean something other than what poverty has meant for virtually all of human history: Poverty equals malnutrition.

Take the U.S. Department of Agriculture definition of food insecurity. The U.S. government has not tracked malnutrition because so few suffer from this in the United States. Rather, the government looks at food security.

to other periods in history or other countries, the War on Poverty isn't really a war anymore, more of a mopping up action. In America, the concern is over whether someone has money to buy diapers or repair a refrigerator. The concern for the vast majority of us, the vast majority of the time, isn't food but material goods.

Meanwhile, globally, more than a billion people are considered to be in absolute poverty, living on \$1.25 a day or less. These people aren't able

to feed or clothe themselves. Their children have stunted growth. Most have inadequate housing. These are the truly impoverished, and they don't live in the United States.

Green Chamber urges presidential action

100 local businesses sign OMDP letter

The New Mexico Green Chamber of Commerce, along with business leaders in Doña Ana County and from across New Mexico, has penned a letter to President Barack Obama, asking him to use presidential powers granted by the Antiquities Act to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks as a national monument.

The letter was signed by leaders representing more than 100 New Mexico businesses.

Despite the efforts of New Mexico's two Senators, Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich, who have introduced a bill, S. 1805, to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument (OMDP), the letter notes a "deeply divided congress" has failed to act on important conservation issues in recent years.

One goal of the letter was to outline the significant economic impact that an OMDP would have on nearby communities, said Carrie Hamblen, executive director of the Las Cruces chapter of the New Mexico Green Chamber of Commerce.

"There are piles of evidence demonstrating the ways in which national monuments strengthen local economies," Hamblen said. "A new national monument at Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks would boost our growing tourism industry, create new jobs and attract new businesses to our community. Economically speaking, there is no downside." The letter cites a recent study that projects the OMDP would contribute \$7.4 million in additional local annual economic activity and create 88 new jobs in the area.

Hamblen said local business owners, such as Jenifer Russin of Russin Reporting LLC in Las Cruces, are optimistic about this potential for economic growth.

"When you look at all the data surrounding what this national monument could do for our community, it is hard not to get excited about the prospects," Russin said. "It is clear that my business, as well as other types of businesses, would greatly benefit from the increase in awareness about our county, in tourism to the area and the additional revenue that comes along with that."

"So much is at stake here," Laura Sanchez, CEO of the New Mexico Green Chamber said. "Not only would the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument help our economy, it would ensure the protection of places important to our shared heritage, such as the Butterfield Stagecoach Route, critical sites along the Camino Real and areas of spiritual importance to Native American communities.

"We hope this letter, along with the efforts of Senators Udall and Heinrich, will convince the president that creating the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument is the right thing to do."

Water table scrutinized Improvements seen but outlook questionable

Water agencies are working with Elephant Butte Irrigation District ground water specialists to learn how much the Mesilla Valley water table has dropped after three years of heavy pumping during the extended drought, consultant J. Phil King said.

The condition of the water table, or aquifer, is important because the well depths are reaching "salty" or mineralladen water, which hampers emerging plant growth.

The average level of water tables in the Las Cruces well fields is lower, according to John Unruh of the U.S. Geological Survey, located on the New Mexico State University campus.

"The average in September was about 10 feet lower," Unruh said. "But they're recovering. That's from a combination of not pumping ground water and the rains we had in September."

Jerry Franzoy of the Hatch Valley said the water table has gone up in his area, although the official figures haven't been recorded yet.

"The water table is better this year because of the heavy rains we've been having up here," said Franzoy, who represents Precinct 1 on the EBID Board of Directors.

"But until the snow pack starts to melt, it's no time to start planning."

EBID farmers are concerned, as reports of the mountain snow packs have been taperng off and the summer runoff melt is not promising.

"The irrigation outlook this summer in the valley is

not good," King said.

The Elephant Butte Reservoir is at about 281,000 acre feet, or 12 percent of storage capacity, state climatologist David Dubois said.

NMSU lecture series addresses herd selection

Strategies for restocking in NM climate

Drought conditions and a lack of forage in New Mexico have prompted the state's cattle producers to greatly reduce their herds in recent years. That's created a drop in the state herd of more

than 65 percent since 2010 – and ranchers are now looking for strategies to restock their herds with cattle that are well-suited to the region's climate and terrain.

To help meet that need, the New Mexico Ranch Management series, provided by New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service, will address "Genetic Selection: Strategies to Restock the Ranch" at its three January sessions.

Local DJs share skills with Boys & Girls Club kids

The laughter and chatter of children and the sometimes cacophonous sounds of early attempts at musical instrumentation are commonplace inside the Boys & Girls Club of Las Cruces (BGCLC), but during the past summer, and again in the past two weeks, a new set of sounds has become familiar.

Entering the pink building at 330 W. Las Cruces Ave., a weathered exterior belies the life inside. A group of five boys crowd around a table in the center of the room, intently fixed on a card game, while a duo of girls whispers and giggles at one side of the room.

In the opposite corner, a small crowd gathers around a surprising sight: Nathaniel Saavedra and Khalila Gilbert, both 10, take turns DJing on a professional setup – matching beats, fading between tracks, mixing and fading George Strait into Lorde into Skrillex and back again, wearing headphones nearly too large for their heads – under the watchful and patient eyes of Justin Ismond, better known to many Las Crucens as DJ TRiST, and BGCLC Program Director Brian Johnson.

It's all part of the BGCLC Junior DJ Program, which recruited several of the area's best DJs to provide music instruction of a different kind to children who participate in the club's afterschool program. This session will culminate with a live DJ performance from the 10 kids participating in the program from 6 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21, at M FIVE,

While music and arts programs are not new at the club, the Junior DJ Program is unique, Johnson said, and appeals to a variety of kids who spend their afternoons on the ones and twos.

"They really like this music," he said. "When

I was young, listening to Guns N' Roses, obviously I wanted to play the guitar. This kind of music is a lot more visible to them, they hear it more, and the cool thing is this breaks it down for them.

"At first, it looks really complicated, but they learn to see that they can DJ, too. It gives them a new musical avenue if they don't have an interest in learning a different instrument. It's another option for them to be a performer."

While mixing wildly varying types and genres of music, Johnson said this particular program has had the similar effect in bringing different kids together.

"One of the best parts for me in this is that, normally, these kids don't really interact with each other – they'd all be doing different things – but this really unites them."

The program, which has 10 regular participants, has banded together a unique group of Las Cruces kids with vastly different interests who have found a common ground.

Twelve-year-old Kinte Gilbert, a seventhgrader at Sierra Middle School and older brother of Khalila, participated in the first program and said he was eager to do it again.

"I did the DJ class over the summer and it was a really good experience," he said. "We learned how to make music, use music that was already made and mix it all up."

Gilbert, who played flute and now plays trumpet in the Sierra band, said at first the DJ equipment was daunting, but with practice, he understood the setup.

"The biggest thing I learned was how to do it – all the buttons and knobs and stuff – and how to feel the music, to make it in time with beat and match it up."

Gilbert added Ismond has been a great instructor.

"He's a really good DJ and a really good teacher," he said. "He's fun, he's patient and he teaches us to the best of his abilities. Now I just want to keep learning." Isaac Apolonio-Duran, a 14-year-old

Isaac Apolonio-Duran, a 14-year-old freshman at Arrowhead Park Early College High School, said he was only able to attend one day of the summer program, but remembered how some of the setup worked, a benefit this time around.

"I remembered how to work the machine and what each thing did," he said. "It's good, now that I know how to use it more, I'm able to make music more."

Eleven-year-olds Cheyenne Salem and Julissa Galaz, sixth-graders and self-professed best friends, have participated in both the summer and current DJ program.

Salem, who said she comes from a musical family, plays drums and has recently taken an interest in guitar, spurred on by what she's learned through this process.

Galaz, too, has taken an interest in the musical arts.

"Before this, I would always listen to music, but through this program, it's gotten me more into it," she said. "Now I can listen and hear the beat."

Decade of the Dead Arcade talks recording, performance hiatus

Decade of the Dead Arcade's first appearance in the pages of the Las Cruces Bulletin came exactly eight months ago – May 17, 2013 – and predated the band's inaugural show, held in a crowded University Park living room, by a

little more than a week. In the eight months since, and 10 total as a band, Decade of the Dead Arcade – Andrew Martinez, Luke Dumke, Ricardo Sifuentes and Manny Rodriguez – has played almost 20 shows, rapidly becoming one of Las Cruces' favorite up-and-comers with a devoted and ever-growing following of enthusiastic supporters.

Using a combination of organic and electronic instrumentation, Decade of the Dead Arcade's output is diverse and dynamic, but unmistakably its own. From the driving dance rock of "Floordropper" and the Caribbeantinged party-starter "My Friends" to the slower, subdued "Renegade" – an unexpected fan favorite – they've carved a niche for themselves locally and are starting to chip away at a larger audience.

The band has recorded four live music videos at West End Art Depot and has rocked energetic, sweaty, wall-towall living-room shows and wild, dusky barrooms in Las Cruces, El Paso and beyond – the band's New Year's Eve show at El Patio packed the historic cantina with a crowd, clad in black and gold, which may have singlehandedly upped the market price of Fireball Cinnamon Whisky and rang in 2014 with a bang – and has taken a few larger stages along the way, performing at the Vans Warped Tour in June 2013 and the Zombie Walk in October of the same year.

On Wednesday, Jan. 15, though, Decade of the Dead Arcade graced its largest stage of all, when it performed at the Pan American Center opening for Chicago rock legends Styx after beating out more than 25 other acts for the spot.

After that show – undoubtedly the largest crowd and biggest venue the band has played – things will quiet, as Decade of the Dead Arcade takes a brief hiatus from performing to focus on both the completion of its first record – an eight-track, full-length release due in March – and moving forward with new material.

"We started tracking a couple months ago in my studio, but we've been playing so many shows," said Dumke, who runs a professional-quality recording studio, The Yard, from his courtyard apartment near the university campus, along with handling drums and electronics for the band.

"We were wanting to play more shows so that, by the time the record is finished, people will want to pick it up, but for the next couple months, we're taking off. We need to get it finished, and it's getting to the point where the shows are getting distracting."

Given the enthusiastic reaction the band's received at the majority of its performances, it's no wonder venues are taking a keen interest, but for now, Decade of the Dead Arcade will be tucked away in the studio.

When the band reemerges in March with a record-release show, however, it will have a complete album and a batch of new material ready to go for eager fans and new converts – "coming back fresh," as Dumke put it.

"I've been writing a lot of new stuff, and during the recording process, taking a month or two off, there will definitely be new songs," Martinez said. "I don't want to come back and say, 'We have an album' and then play the same material. When we start playing shows again, we will be playing new songs."

As rabid consumers of a wide variety of music themselves, the members of Decade of the Dead Arcade know better than most that nothing dooms a band like stasis and saturation.

"If we keep playing the same eight songs two or three times a month, people are going to get tired of us," Rodriguez said. "As much as we love playing shows for everyone, we're going to chill. We want to keep the momentum we've got."

Though they'll be bereft of one of their favorite live acts, Rodriguez credits Decade of the Dead Arcade's fans with their rapid and continuing success.

"I feel pretty confident in our live show and what we're doing, but at least half of it is our crowd," he said. "Everybody goes nuts, and people who haven't heard us before see them go nuts. I'm really grateful we have so many good friends who go to every show and are that energetic at every show. Sometimes I wish I could do more for them."



"When I'm going to college, I want to work here," Galaz said, before adding a stint as a California DJ and an eventual move to France to her notable life goals. "It's a really good start."


Salem, who wants to pursue a doctorate in science, also said she wants to give back to the BGCLC.

Dating a digital diva 'Her' takes a look at love and technology

When Theodore Twombly meets Samantha, their relationship begins as many do in the digital age: They meet online, awkwardly get to know one another via text and voice, never meeting in person before truly, emotionally connecting.

They go shopping; they go people watching; they take daytrips to Venice Beach and Big Bear, even to Catalina Island for a double date with Theodore's coworkers. Theodore and Samantha's relationship

blossoms, open, honest and empathetic. There's just one small catch: She doesn't exist, at least not in a physical, human sense. Samantha is, instead, a highly advanced, artificially intelligent operating system,

formerly known simply as OS1, downloaded and installed on Theodore's computer and cell phone. She's Siri with a "soul," or at least the programming to mimic one. So begins "Her," a gently funny, sweet and

profoundly sad look at the future of dating, written and directed by Spike Jonze

("Being John Malkovich," "Adaptation") and starring Joaquin Phoenix, Amy Adams and Chris Pratt, as well Scarlett Johansson, in voice alone, as Samantha. Theodore,

bespectacled, mustached and clad in highwaisted tweed pants, has become a loner, a true introvert, reeling from an impending divorce from his

beautiful childhood sweetheart, Catherine

(Rooney Mara).

His days are spent toiling at a desk working for BeautifulHandwrittenLetters.com, a site that composes heartfelt, deeply personal handwritten greetings wholesale. Orating expressions of love from grandchild to grandmother, from spouse to spouse, Theodore and his coworkers are in the business of manufactured sentimentality, and he's highly regarded as one of the company's best composers.

Theodore's evenings are spent playing fully immersive, holographic video games, rarely socializing with his friends and neighbors, among them Amy (Adams) and her pompous husband Charles (Matt Letscher). His lonely nights are spent combing the Internet for other solo singles, exchanging often-bizarre sexually charged pleasantries through their cell phones' earpieces - sex without sex intimacy without intimacy, pleasant fiction accepted in place of sad fact.

Things start to change for Theodore when he purchases the latest in operating systems, designed to adapt, learn and evolve - just like a real person. Deciding he'd prefer the OS with a female identity, the program

names itself (herself?) Samantha, after combing through The Complete Book of Baby Names in 2/100 of a second and settling on the one she liked best.

At first, Samantha urges Theodore to get out and live a little, pushing him to go on blind dates and inquiring into his relationship with Amy, whom he dated briefly in college.

As Theodore and Samantha get to "know" each other, a friendship blossoms, soon budding into romance and relationship. Newfound love

impacts Theodore's writing in a positive way, and things seem to be going well.

As with any relationship, however, complications soon arise. Samantha's lack of body, for instance, is an issue she tries to solve by hiring a sexual surrogate, a physical form, a vessel to fulfill a component of a relationship she cannot. Later, Samantha begins a friendship with another OS – a composite modeled after British philosopher Alan Watts - and Theodore becomes jealous. To say much more is to ruin a sweetly sad, genuinely funny tale of love and loss in the age of social networking.

Phoenix plays strongly against type, imbuing his role with a gentle sadness, slightly lisping his words, capable of expressing the emotions of complete strangers yet unable to voice his own. Johansson, whose voice alone takes second billing, is surprisingly attractive, considering she lacks matter or mass. Her husky, seductive voice makes it a bit easier to understand what Theodore sees - or hears in her. A voice has never looked so good.

Writer/director Jonze has always had a unique eye for visuals, honing his chops on skate tapes and music videos before extending his vision into feature films. In a class with Michel Gondry and Mark Romanek, auteurs who made an early splash with music video work, Jonze has a perfect eye for the way the world – our world – could very easily look "but for the grace of God," as they say.

Set in a near-future Los Angeles – the

contemporary City of Angels skyline has been filled in with the spiraling, towering highrises of Shanghai - Theodore drifts through a world where everyone - everyone - is always on their phone. Strangers pass one another staring into their palms and chattering away into their earpieces without so much as a glance at their fellow man. Desktop computers are wood-grained, cell phones are leather-clad, but are too similar to our own devices to dismiss

The film is something akin to sci-fi, but that designation seems ill-fitting; call it speculative fiction, perhaps, extrapolating along a curve our current societal trends in technology and its implications in the world of human connection, of dating and love, to a frightening but logical conclusion.

With more and more people around the world meeting their mate on any number of increasingly esoteric dating sites, finding emotional connection before physical encounter, "Her" is one step from being set in the present day.

In a world of increasing "connectedness," many feel we're losing the ability to truly connect, replacing true involvement with websites devoted to our egos, broadcasting our every thought via status update. One look around a crowded restaurant, where couples spend silent dates staring into their smartphones, will tell you so.

We are alone, together, and Jonze sees this with his trademark idiosyncratic tenderness.

Hide your children

'Kill Your Darlings' blends obsession, writing, sex and love

A little known true tale of some of the beat authors of days past, "Kill Your Darlings" effectively blends obsession, writing, sex and love into a great potboiler.


The film is more or less an introduction to the source material of some of the noted writers of the so-called "beat generation."

It starts in the early 1940s and Allen Ginsberg, a mild-mannered young man - at

the time - has just been accepted into Columbia University. Leaving behind his poet father and emotionally disturbed and clinging mother, Ginsberg may have been looking for a new lease on life.

It is not long before he meets Lucien Carr, and in fact, it is the first day, as Ginsberg and others are being given a tour and in the library, a very special event takes place, with Carr doing a prank of a sexual nature that cuts the tour short, shall we say. Before long, Gins-

berg is a protégé of



Carr, who is much worldlier when it comes to the arts, various chemicals and sex.

A major drawback exists - that of David Kammerer, who is obsessed with Carr and won't let go. Carr plays this to his advantage, since they had a brief relationship sometime earlier, by having Kammerer write all of his papers for his classes. Kammerer himself is a rejected writer and former professor, now

working as a janitor. Into this mix come William Burroughs and Jack Kerouac. Fortunately, these two do not become the main characters in the film, as director John Krokidas focuses on Carr, Ginsberg and Kammerer. Čarr has a way about him that soon takes in Ginsberg as well. It is an awakening for

Ginsberg, you might say, but again it is not the heavy part of the film.

The young men take part in several misadventures and do a lot of cavorting and experimenting with the drugs of the times, but they also start to show the ways that will make them some of the most revered writers of their times and whose works continue to draw new readers even today.

Finally, Carr, who will never be a writer but who is a very good muse, has had enough of Kammerer and tragedy ensues. Unable to write a story in his own defense, he pleads with Ginsberg to help him - a plea which may have opened the doors of literary genius for the man.

"Kill Your Darlings" is filled with energy and passion and is not just another look at the same old story about the beat authors. It opens a new window into their early world, one that sets the tone for many years to come.





Tree Steward Bruce Schneiber and Weed & Seed member Jacob Valenzuela planted a tree in the Mesquite Historic District Saturday, Dec. 7, 2013.

The result is a community beautification effort that puts a new twist on urban renewal.

"It involves everybody and is ongoing," Flores said. "That's why we have a contract through this program, saying that the people who get the trees are going to take care of them. If they can't, then they need to call us and we'll take the kids from the Weed & Seed program to help."

With all this in mind, Flores went door-todoor, engaging her neighbors and introducing them to the project. Once she had raised awareness and interest, she sat down with Llerenas to draw up a plan for putting the project into effect.

"I told Myra, we needed to start in Klein Park, because that's the heart of the neighborhood," Flores said. "Now we're working our way around it. We broke it into spheres. The second round was in the second sphere of the neighborhood. Round three will be the next sphere and so on. I walked the neighborhood and knocked on doors to ask people if they wanted trees. I came up with 67 applications. Now people are calling us asking if they can have a tree, too. We're planting them everywhere."

We're planting them everywhere."
"Everything is connected," said Llerenas.
"Revitalizing the neighborhood, restoring old buildings and planting trees, but not just at homes. We gave two to Philips Chapel. We gave La Nueva Casita two trees to help their business, because they're going to do an outdoor patio in the back. Beck's Coffeehouse will get two. The galleries are getting them, too."

So far, the project has been a great success in the Mesquite Historic District and has helped advance both the Las Cruces Tree Steward program and Keep Las Cruces Beautiful. The \$5,000 grant to make the 100 Trees project possible came from the United Parcel Service via

Planting for the future 100 trees find homes in the heart of Las Cruces

For more than 100 years, Las Cruces has been considered an oasis in the Chihuahuan desert. The life-giving waters of the Rio Grande have nourished generations of agricultural families and given rise to the second largest city in the state.

But with urban renewal in the 1960s and '70s having a disastrous effect on property ownership in older neighborhoods, a recent series of cold snaps partnered with an enduring drought wiping out entire groves, trees have not fared well in Las Cruces over the past few decades. Which gives rise to the question, what is an oasis without trees?

The City of Las Cruces Tree Steward program addresses that very topic. An educational program established in 2012 to recruit and train volunteers who understand how critical trees are to the community, its mission is to advocate, plant and maintain trees in public spaces.

An offshoot of the program, called 100 Trees in the Heart of Las Cruces, has been successfully transforming the Mesquite Historic District since fall 2013. On Saturday, Nov. 16, 2013, the Las Cruces Tree Stewards collaborated with Weed & Seed staff and youth volunteers from the A. Fielder Memorial Safe Haven to plant 12 trees on residential and commercial properties near the Klein Park area. Then, on It's sort of a mentorship between the Tree Stewards and the kids.

MYRA LLERENAS, assistant coordinator for Keep Las Cruces Beautiful and project coordinator for the Las Cruces Tree Stewards

Saturday, Dec. 7, 2013, a second round took place in which 13 more trees were planted. Three more rounds are planned for the project on Saturdays, Jan. 18, Feb. 1 and Feb. 22.

"We're hoping to get all 100 trees planted by Feb. 22," said Myra Llerenas, assistant coordinator for Keep Las Cruces Beautiful and project coordinator for the Tree Stewards. "For the first round, we wanted to start off slow, to get everybody used to it. The second round we planted 13, which brings us to 25. For the next rounds, we want to do 25 each time." In order to make the project run smooth-

ly, Llerenas and her former boss Craig Fenske – who retired in August 2013, but not before founding the Las Cruces Tree Steward program and applying for the grant for the 100 Trees project – enlisted the aid of Freda Flores, longtime neighborhood advocate and then president of the Mesquite Historic District's neighborhood association, Las Esperanzas.

"Craig called me, because he wanted to involve Las Esperanzas," said Flores, who currently holds a position as a social worker at the Fielder house. "Because I wear two hats, I told them I wanted to involve the Weed & Seed kids. The original concept was for them to go through the Tree Steward classes, but it was way above their heads and we couldn't keep them focused. So, Craig tried something else. When we actually started planting the trees, the Tree Stewards educated the kids through hands-on training. It worked out beautifully."

"It's sort of a mentorship between the Tree Stewards and the kids," Llerenas said. "The stewards show them exactly what to do and from the first planting to the second, you can see that they learned what they needed to and know how to do it. I think it worked out better this way, to have hands-on experience while we're doing the planting, because it's more real for them."

Keep America Beautiful, the parent organization for Keep Las Cruces Beautiful. Llerenas calls it an incredible success and the perfect marriage of municipal programming and community support. The ultimate goal, however, is to promote the message of "Right tree, right place, right way."

"The fruit trees we have to purchase, but most of the trees come from the city nursery," said Llerenas. "The trees from the nursery need low water, which makes it inexpensive for the people receiving them. They're also trees that do well in this climate and environment. We want these trees to last."

As the project kicks into high gear, Llerenas and Flores are still seeking neighborhood support in order to complete it.

"We're still accepting applications," Llerenas said. "If there's anybody living in the Mesquite Historic District who is interested in a free tree, they can contact me at 528-4508."

"Or they can come by the center and I'll help them fill out the form," Flores added.

"People are getting really excited," she said. "We want to make this a big deal, so when this grant runs out, we can get another one to keep it going. Pretty soon the whole neighborhood will be lined with trees again."

Start the new year right, by decluttering, organizing and simplifying your home life

Always, about this time of year, I start feeling an urge. The urge draws me to declutter, organize and simplify. This can be very addictive but hard to get started. It could be tied to taking down the Christmas tree and putting everything away. 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



The horse who is blind or losing his sight feels very vulnerable. He must never be startled by a silent approach followed by a touch. We must talk to him in soothing tones and touch him on the neck or shoulder in a direct and comforting manner.

He should be led wearing a halter with lead shank while you keep your hand touching the cheek piece of the halter and his cheek. Always stay by his shoulder. This way, holding the lead in your other hand, you can direct him with a light, steady pull toward you or gentle push away to have him know to go left or right.

If the ground rises, raise his head with halter and slow him while speaking to him. If the ground drops, stop him and take one slow step at a time so he can keep his footing. You may need to keep a hand on his neck also to support him.

When grooming or massaging, always keep a hand on his body so he knows where you are, starting at his shoulder.

Leave the whiskers and feeler hairs on his face long so he can feel before he bumps his face on fences or trees and the like. Remove objects he could stumble over, bump into or fall onto. Wrap pipe fences with spongy, insulating foam to cushion a bump.

Always look where you lead. Think ahead in order to prevent trouble.

Laminitis/founder – a disorder of the hooves

The horse who has foundered starts out with a lot of pain and, even when healing well, will be tender in his hooves for a long time.

It is imperative that the coffin bone is supported. There are many pads available for use inside of boots or to be taped on the bottom of the hooves.

The foundered or Laminitic horse should be led on straight lines with huge curves to turn around – any stepping sideways can be extremely painful. Therapy includes diet details,

Project Enable showcases STEM

Grant encourages disabled participants

When Jeanine Cook was involved in a car accident at 19 years old that left her a paraplegic, she said she decided right then and there that it would not be the end of her life.

That was almost 31 years ago, and Cook, an associate professor of computer architecture at the Klipsch School of Electrical and Computer Engineering at New Mexico State University and a computer architect for Sandia National Laboratories, has been trying to get more people with disabilities involved in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

"The National Science Foundation is trying to recruit anybody who could be interested," Cook said. "People with disabilities have traditionally terrible participation in STEM. You can't even measure our numbers."

Through a grant from the National Science Foundation, Cook and a colleague in Pennsylvania have facilitated Project Enable for the past three years.

Over the course of a year, participants complete a series of workshops and presentations that showcase what computer science fields have to offer.

"I want them to do something that is accessible to them, and a lot of these STEM fields are," Cook said. "You can be a mathematician, you don't need to walk to do that. I try to motivate them and give them talks about different careers."

"Career night is to show them what a diverse set of careers a degree in a computingrelated area allows you to pursue," Cook said. "When people think computer science, they think, 'Oh I'm going to be sitting in front of a boring desk all day."

"No. I can guarantee you Starbucks hires computer scientists, the horse track – basically any industry you look at, there are computer scientists involved."

One of the last events of Project Enable includes a transition night, in which participants are given a tour of a college campus to catch a glimpse of college life, interact with disability services and inquire about what resources are See **Enable** on page C22

Program seeks to get lives back on track ^{By Rachel Christiansen}

"No one just wakes up in the morning and says, 'I want to be a heroin addict."

Honest words spoken by Chad Tewksbury, marketing director of Alt Recovery Group, a program that helps opiate addicts free themselves from addiction and hopefully find a better path in life.

Tewksbury has dealt with opiate addiction nearly his whole life, with a father and stepmother who both passed away from an overdose, and a brother who also suffered from serious addiction.

A native of California, Tewksbury said he and his business partners began a needs assessment more than a year ago that included seven different states and communities within.

Lo and behold, Las Cruces was identified as an area with an enormous opiate addiction problem with little to no resources available to addicts.

"We basically went to the emergency rooms, probation and parole departments, courthouses and asked how much traffic they were seeing from heroine or opiate-related arrests, overdoses and other crimes," Tewksbury said.

Witnessing a similar program's success for his brother, who was able to change his life and live clean years ago, Tewksbury began formulating a business plan.

Alt Recovery Group opened in October

2013, and is getting the word out about what it provides.

Each patient goes through an intake process that includes a doctor's assessment. From there, a professional treatment team discusses with each individual what their goals are, how serious the addiction is and begins the plan to help them along their road to recovery.

Tewksbury said treatment often includes the administration of the medication See **Addiction** on page C22

available to them.

After participants have completed the yearlong project, they receive a \$1,000 scholarship - to hopefully be used toward enrolling in college and obtaining a STEM degree.

Once these people are in the social system ,they don't want to get out, but I think we've had a good success rate with getting people to go back to school," Cook said.

Many, she said, simply don't know that services and resources are available on campuses for disabled people, such as accessible

buildings and dorm rooms.

Cook said the program has allowed her to interact with people who have disabilities and understand them much more than she ever did before.

"I've met some incredible people," Cook said. "The fact that they're still happy and living life inspires me."

Project Enable is still looking to fill up the 2014 cohort, and applicants are encouraged to apply before the start of the first class Thursday, Jan. 30.

Methadone, which has received some public criticism.

"A lot of people say that we're just replacing one thing for another," he said. "Well, that's not necessarily true?

Prescribed doses of methadone used to help with opiate addiction is designed to improve one's functioning abilities by eliminating withdrawal symptoms and the craving for opiates, Tewksbury said.

In effect, he added, it also decreases the risk associated with heroin use, such as infections contracted through needles, as well as decreasing criminal behavior by keeping addicts off the streets and away from supporting drug dealers.

'Unfortunately, there's the population out there who says that they should 'just quit," Tewksbury said. "Addiction is a disease. It's like if you have diabetes, you treat it with insulin."

According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the number of people who said they have used heroin over the past year jumped 56.2 percent

supplementation to maintain good circulation and many methods to restore the energy flow in the legs and encourage restructuring of the hoof capsule. Hard ground, rough or uneven footing and go-ing downhill can all be torturous for the foundered horse.

from 2002 to 2011.

Many health organizations are blaming the crackdown on the use of illicit prescription painkillers, such as oxycodone, pushing those who were addicted to pills to move to the street-ready heroin.

"After the prescription pill boon, they're shutting down the doctors who overprescribe, but the problem is, the addiction didn't go away," Tewksbury said.

Calls for help come from all over the map, from those as young as junior high, high school and college to middle aged and older.

"One thing people should know is that drug addiction reaches everyone. It doesn't know sex, gender, how rich you are or how poor you are," Tewksbury said. "We have people coming in from blue-collared workers to guys driving up in suits and ties.

"People always assume everyone using drugs is the guy on the corner, begging for change, and it just isn't like that at all.



ASPCA awards \$5,000 grant to DACHS

The Doña Ana County Humane Society (DACHS) announced the receipt of a \$10,000 grant from the The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) for the Animal Relief Fund (ARF), a program that helps low-income pet owners with emergency veterinary bills.

This is ASPCA's second grant to this program in 2013. Earlier in the year, the ASPCA awarded \$5,000 to the ARF program.

This funding is vital to our area, as Doña Ana County is home to 37 colonias, designated by the federal government as such because of the low-income levels and lack of basic infrastructure," said DACHS Executive Director Kathy Lawitz. "The Animal Relief Fund allows DACHS to assist scores of families with veterinary bills that they could not otherwise afford."

"Safety net programs, such as DACHS's Animal Relief Fund, are critical resources for pet owners who would otherwise be forced to make the impossible decision of choosing between taking on additional financial hardship and making the best choice for their pet's well being," said Karen Medicus, senior director of community initiatives at the ASPCA. "The ARF fund provides financial aid to help qualifying Doña Ana County pet owners with emergency veterinary bills, helping to prevent animal suffering and allowing pet owners to keep their animals rather than surrendering them to the animal shelter because they can't afford veterinary care. It also provides financial aid toward preventive care such as vaccinations and dental cleanings. Applicants must qualify as low-income under WIC income eligibility guidelines.

Dollars and sense in animal control

Number crunch reveals savings for no-kill



The recent adoption by Doña Ana County of animal ordinances that enable community cat management programs saves money. It is a keystone for a no-kill community, which has far ranging economic impact.

This puts more emphasis on the importance of the city quickly following suit by bringing city animal ordinances in line.

We can see the financial potential by applying the no-kill standard of a 90 percent live release of dogs and cats from the local animal shelter. Based on projections of 2013 statistics, the total intake of dogs and cats to the shelter will be 12,744. This gross number is composed of 8,244 dogs and 4,500 cats.

The 2013 kill rate for cats at the shelter was 65 percent. This means 2,925 of the 4,500 cats taken in were killed. At a cost of \$117 per animal killed, the cost for this activity was \$342,000. Reducing this kill rate to 10 percent would lead to a savings of \$289,575.

For dogs, the 2013 kill rate was 32 percent, which means 2,638 were killed at \$117 each, a total of \$308,655. Reducing this rate to 10 percent would yield a \$212,000 savings.

Combined, there is a potential for an

annual savings of \$501,775 with dedicated and committed implementation of the no-kill principles.

A community cat management program is an essential part of the 11-point No-Kill Equation formulated by the No-Kill Advocacy Center. The others are:

- Volunteers 1.
- 2. Rescue access
- 3. Foster care
- Comprehensive adoption programs 4. Medical and behavior prevention and 5.
- rehabilitation 6. Public/community relations and involvement
- High-volume, low-cost spay/neuter
- 8. Proactive redemption
- 9. Pet retention
- 10. Leadership
