# SunZia line study nods to WSMR

### Heinrich asks for 'solutions'

The Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Lincoln Laboratory released its report on the effect of the proposed SunZia high-power transmission line on White Sands Missile Range testing to federal officials Tuesday, March 11.

Congressman Steve Pearce said he was at a briefing on the report and the MIT study confirmed the Department of Defense's concerns about the proposed above-ground route of the line. This means that SunZia must agree to run its line further north or bury it, Pearce said.

According to Pearce, the MIT study found that the line's height, electromagnetic fields and project debris would compromise the kind of testing conducted on a section of Bureau of Land Management (BLM) property sometimes used for testing of low-flying weapon systems, commonly referred to as the northern call-up area of the range. Ranchers have to vacate the area during testing.

SunZia has asserted that its \$1.2 billion, 515-mile line project could not afford the additional cost of moving the line.

U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich, who also attended the briefing, said "There are pragmatic solutions to allow SunZia and White Sands Missile Range to mutually exist. The administration should issue the record of decision on SunZia's (National Environmental Policy Act) process. This is about diversifying New Mexico's economy, lessening our dependence on federal dollars and charting a course for a more prosperous future. SunZia should get built."

# Ohio provost picked for DACC president

#### Scott to begin duties June 1

Less than a week after three finalists interviewed at Doña Ana Community College, a provost of an Ohio community college has been selected as president of DACC.

Dan Howard, executive vice president and provost of New Mexico State University, announced Wednesday, March 12, that Renay Scott will be the new DACC leader.

Scott is vice president and provost of academic services at Owens Community College in Toledo, Ohio. She previously served as the dean for the School of Arts and Sciences at Owens.

She holds a doctorate degree in curriculum and instruction from Wayne State University, a master's degree in curriculum and instruction from Michigan State University and a bachelor's degree in social studies education from Calvin College.

# NMSU desires to boost enrollment

#### Regents discuss new strategies

A steady trend of enrollment decline at New Mexico State University has the administration looking for ways to not only attract more students, but to also keep them from dropping out.

In a report to regents Monday, March 10, Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management Bernadette Montoya said NMSU and its branch community colleges have seen a steady enrollment decline since its highest point in 2011.

This spring semester, the NMSU systemwide enrollment was 26,000 students, with 12,200 students at the Las Cruces main campus. While there was a 4.9 percent drop in head count, those attending are taking more credit hours, Montoya said.

The sharpest enrollment decline, she said, is in the students taking graduate classes, which is currently at 3,000 students. The college with the most steady

### What about our military?

#### Current delegation can learn from the past

From 1983 to 2003, southern New Mexico's Congressional delegation was unchanged. Your senators were Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman and your representative was Joe

For that 20-year stretch they served together, you could count on this: White Sands Missile Range was their baby and they made sure things were right by the range.

When it came to military affairs, Skeen, Bingaman and Domenici were like the Three Musketeers: "All for one and one for all."

As the three gained tenure, their impact on and benefit to New Mexico's military installations grew. When Cannon Air Force Base was slated for closure in 2005, the political clout of Domenici and Bingaman, combined with the national influence of then-Gov. Bill Richardson, saved the base and thousands of vital New Mexico jobs. Cannon continues to add missions and people.

Skeen retired in 2003 and passed away shortly thereafter. Except for Harry Teague's stint in 2009-10, Steve Pearce has represented Congressional District 2 since Skeen's 22year run. While Pearce's national clout is not at Skeen's level, there's never been any doubt to the Air Force veteran's pro-military stance and strong support of WSMR and Holloman Air Force Base.

The picture is less pronounced, however, for Bingaman and Domenici's successors, Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich, who took office in 2009 and 2013, respectively.

The SunZia Southwest Transmission Project is an illustration.

If you're not familiar with the SunZia project, I'll try to summarize.

Phoenix-based SunZia seeks to build more than 500 miles of high-voltage transmission lines and five substations between Arizona and New Mexico to deliver energy, including renewables, from New Mexico to Arizona and points west.

WSMR officials say the planned route, which cuts across the range's northern call-up area, would limit and interfere with critical testing. That could cost the range – and the state - millions of dollars and put many jobs at risk. The Department of Defense goes even further, saying the reduced testing could put national security at risk.

The folks at SunZia, an entrepreneurial venture relying on investors and betting on the outcome, understandably balk at the additional millions it would cost to lengthen their route or bury lines.

Regardless, for months, Pearce has said SunZia needs to move its route, WSMR and national security can't be compromised.

Udall and Heinrich, while voicing support for WSMR, have also supported SunZia, Heinrich adamantly so. They have both, also, put the ball in other courts on the issue.

Last summer, Udall said the Obama administration needed to weigh in on the issue. Last fall, Heinrich urged an independent study by the Lincoln Laboratory at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to review the effect of the transmission lines on the range's testing mission.

The study was finally completed Tuesday, March 11. Much of it is classified but, not surprisingly, there are differing interpretations of what has been released.


Please, though, no bickering.

If Pearce, Udall and Heinrich work together, a la Skeen-Bingaman-Domenici, they have the ability and power to work with SunZia and the Department of Defense to get this solved. We can find room for SunZia.

However, if the choice comes down to SunZia vs. WSMR, there is no choice.

With SunZia, you have a promising business idea that will bring some construction jobs to New Mexico and potentially provide opportunity to some rural counties whose residents might be able to erect wind turbines and solar panels.

With WSMR, you have thousands of good-paying jobs for New Mexicans and more than \$800 million in economic impact for the state. Plus, you have the men and women of the Army and testing that helps keep our nation and world safe. There's no price on that.

I have great respect for the weathermen. They do a great service to us all. They continue to expand their abilities. They give us the facts when possible, but they have the responsibility to remind us that their predictions are simply that; educated guesses whose validity declines daily, monthly and yearly over time. The last two winters have demonstrated that.

The problem arises when CEOs, talk show hosts, selfappointed environmentalists, activists and carbon credit panhandlers tempt real scientists into their shell game. Winters like this damage the good guy's global warming

And probably the best or worst example of the tainting of their reputation is the desperate, blatant grasp of changing the name of the threat from global warming to the transparent, meaningless, shameless climate change.

I guess when money comes in, science goes out.

### Martinez signs \$6.15 billion compromise budget

#### Many local capital outlay projects OK'd

Gov. Susana Martinez has signed the state's \$6.15 billion budget and approved a slew of capital outlay projects in which a number of regional projects escaped line-item veto.

On Tuesday, March 11, Martinez signed the budget bill, which was a bipartisan compromise out of the Senate at the very end of the 30-day session last month. Martinez had until Wednesday, March 12, to sign or veto legislation. She did line-item portions of the proposed budget – about \$27 million in spending "to keep budget growth at a reasonable, responsible level."

While teachers, state workers, and higher education employees will all receive compensation increases, Martinez did not authorize pay raises for exempt employees in state government, elected district attorneys or elected indees

Martinez said she trimmed funding for various spending earmarks that were not part of base agency budgets and vetoed \$4 million for the higher education endowment fund. The governor vetoed a \$15 million appropriation for changes to New Mexico's school funding formula because she said the changes do not take effect until fiscal year 2016.

#### Education and health care boosted

In the budget Martinez approved, state spending will increase by 4.3 percent over the current fiscal year. Education spending will in-

crease by \$147.7 million, or 5.75 percent, to a record high of \$2.7 billion.

Included in the new money is the expansion of several education reform initiatives championed by Martinez, as well as all teachers receiving a 3 percent pay raise. Also, the minimum starting salary for teachers in New Mexico will move from \$30,000 to \$32,000 – a 6.7 percent increase.

Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Stan Rounds recently told the District Advisory Council the budget bill included a 6 percent raise for educational assistants, but still fell far short of funding what schools statewide need to get up to date on instructional materials. The "grossly underfunded" instructional materials, Rounds said, will put pressure on the budget and force administrators to look for new avenues to get the materials, such as free resources from the Internet.

Martinez said the compromise budget wasn't perfect, but did offer breakthrough to passing a budget after the House was deadlocked on its version of the budget.

"Over the past three years, we have worked in a bipartisan way to restore our state's firm fiscal footing after years of over-spending, and the budgets we have passed have enacted moderate, responsible spending growth," she said. "Along the way, we have invested heavily in public education and early childhood programs, expanded job creation efforts and provided for a strong safety net to help the most vulnerable."

Martinez said the budget funds health care work force initiatives, including \$1.5 million

to increase the number of nurse practitioners, \$726,000 to increase the number of health care professionals in health shortage areas and \$905,000 to expand primary care residency slots at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine.

Capital outlay approvals

Also on Tuesday, Martinez signed capital outlay legislation that includes \$89 million for critical water infrastructure projects throughout the state, such as repairing watersheds damaged by fires and floods, fixing faltering dams, building backup water supplies for cities and towns at risk of going dry and ensuring that communities have access to clean water.

Among the projects approved was money for water infrastructure in Santa Teresa.

"We face some serious challenges in New Mexico with a severe drought and aging water infrastructure," Martinez said. "By signing today's legislation, we will begin to allocate money to communities in virtually every corner of our state, helping them meet the unique water challenges we face statewide."

Other capital outlay dollars went to core "infrastructure improvement areas" such as repairs of public school facilities, road work and the construction or repair of public buildings.

Martinez said the \$6.4 million to help pave the southern road to Spaceport America was approved. The New Mexico Spaceport Authority has another \$8.1 million to add to the project for paving more than 20 miles of dirt road from the Upham exit off Interstate 25 to the spaceport in southern Sierra County.

Also among the projects was \$550,000 to support planning and infrastructure for a film backlot studio in southern New Mexico and

\$406,500 for a women veterans memorial in Las Cruces.

In an email, state Rep. Jeff Steinborn, D-Las Cruces, praised the work of the Regional Film Development Advisory Committee formed eight months ago.

"This is a tremendous accomplishment for all of us, particularly our local film professionals who have worked for years to make this happen," Steinborn said.

#### Lottery Scholarship amended

On Wednesday, Martinez signed legislation to reform and provide additional funding for the Legislative Lottery Scholarship. She used her line-item veto authority to fix a language error that could have kept some students from receiving their tuition on time.

"I'm pleased that a bipartisan solution was reached to protect the Lottery Scholarship for students currently in their spring semesters, and I believe we've begun the process of instituting reforms to the scholarship to ensure that students will be able to receive significant tuition assistance for years to come," she said.

Ricardo Rel, New Mexico State University's assistant vice president for governmental relations, said the new funding should allow universities and colleges to continue giving the current level of Lottery Scholarship dollars to students with three or more semesters.

Martinez also signed the list of projects for voters to approve in November as part of the statewide general obligation bond. Rel said NMSU's portion is \$25.1 million, which is mostly for upgrading aging classroom facilities and infrastructure. NMSU had asked for \$19 million to renovate and upgrade Jett Hall and Jett Annex, but lawmakers passed \$17 million.

Scott will start on June 1 on a 12-month appointment with a base salary of \$175,000.

The other two presidential candidates were Lydia Tena of El Paso Community College and interim president Andrew Burke.

In his announcement, Howard said Scott is a respected scholar, teacher and administrator with broad experience in a community college

"During the course of the extensive interview process, she impressed virtually everyone she met with her openness, vision and willingness to tackle difficult problems." Howard said. "She is a consensus builder and brings the 'can do' attitude and willingness to consider innovative solutions that I was seeking in the next president of DACC. I am sure that she will embrace this community and will be embraced in

Speaking at a forum Friday, March 7, Scott said she brings an ability to reach out into the community - especially the business community - to support community college programs. She recounted how she was able to get a company to create a MRI simulator to make Owen's MRI training program one of two certified MRI programs in the country.

There was a lot about DACC that Scott said she found familiar as she investigated the school before applying for the opening. Along with sharing the accreditation challenges, Scott said she had to guide Owens through the transition to a shared governance form of

Sometimes, Scott said, she has had to make decisions that the faculty and staff aren't in total agreement with, but she made sure their voices were heard and that the decisions were made in a transparent manner. Part of that effort included adding faculty representation to the provost council.

Transparency is vital to trust," she said. "Trust is vital to shared governance."

Scott said the DACC presidency would not be a short stepping stone to something else, because it would involve relocating her family. It would be a major move and investment of her family, she said.

"Investing here means being here for the long haul," Scott said.

Howard also made a point to thank Burke for serving as interim president, the second time the DACC vice president for business and finance has served in that role. He was been with DACC for more than 30 years.

"My sincere hope is he continues in a leadership role," Howard said. "His experience, institutional knowledge and management style are invaluable to the college and to the community. I look forward to working with Andy now, and in the future."

As interim president, Burke has been working with the dual accreditation process currently under way - one to restore national accreditation for its nursing program and the other for DACC systemwide.

Recovering national accreditation to a nursing program that lost its accreditation is something Scott said she went through as dean of Owens Community College's School of Arts and Sciences. Not only did the program regain its accreditation, but Scott said she put into

number of graduate students was engineering, especially in areas of civil and chemical engineering, she said.

Another trend was Doña Ana Community College seeing a sharp decrease was Doña Ana in first-time enrollment.

Montoya said NMSU's strategic plan wants to see a retention rate of 80 percent by 2020. Although the retention rate is now

at 74 percent, she said there are many challenges to bringing that rate up.

Strategies being considered to help students complete school include possibly making orientation mandatory for new students, bringing first-time students on campus early and revising the degree auditing system to provide clear direction to students, she said.

'Recruiting new students is still at the forefront of what we're doing," Montoya said.

Pearce said he would urge the Defense Department to push the Interior Department to side with its original opposition to the proposal.

Heinrich said the SunZia transmission line will help deliver wind and solar energy generated in New Mexico to the major Western energy demand centers. Without access to those markets, New Mexico's abundant renewable energy resources will remain isolated and largely untapped, he said.

Pearce said he also is supportive of the SunZia project, but not in a way that would compromise WSMR's testing mission.

Heinrich said he, too, supports WSMR, but "it is also important to find common ground that does not preclude one national priority over the other when both priorities can be realized, especially when it means so many jobs for New Mexicans."

Pearce said he has heard the argument for jobs - most of which would be temporary during the line's construction - but contended the project could well afford to make accommodations.

"I'm a businessman, but I don't believe in putting corporate profits over national security," Pearce said.

Getting MIT's Lincoln Laboratory was done at Heinrich's request in November 2013 after BLM sided with the Defense Department and WSMR during the environmental impact process. WSMR officials have said the aboveground, high-voltage line could inhibit about a third of its testing, which Pearce said would translate into a \$1 billion loss in recurring contracts to the range and surrounding communities. BLM agreed to postpone a decision on an environmental impact statement.

Overall federal dollars are shrinking and the Pentagon is looking to technology to make up for reduce troop strength, Pearce said, which makes the testing at WSMR even more

Heinrich said he has "consistently fought to support the state-of-the-art military training, research and development, and testing that occurs in New Mexico, and I will continue to do

Both Pearce and Heinrich said they wanted to release unclassified portions of the report in

"It's not the answer that SunZia wanted, but they need to accept it," Pearce said.







# National monument supporters hold rally

#### Petition collects 15,000 signatures

People gathered Wednesday, March 12, in Downtown Las Cruces to announce the collection of more than 15,000 signatures asking President Barack Obama to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument.

The rally was held during the Farmers & Crafts Market of Las Cruces, with participants including ranchers, sportsmen, veterans and small business owners.

"For nearly a decade, sportsmen have been at the forefront of trying to safeguard the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks for future generations," said Fernando Clemente, a small business owner in Las Cruces who spoke at the event. "A national monument will protect our outdoor traditions and way of life and ensure that our birthright as sportsmen and women live on for future generations."

The effort is asking Obama to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks as a national monument through his authority under the Antiquities Act. The proposal would protect 500,000 acres of public lands near Las Cruces. Supporters said the proposal will help ensure border security and continue to allow hunting and grazing, while also providing access for various recreation activities throughout the region.

"On behalf of all of the supporters and volunteers who live, work, and play in these unique areas every day, we are asking President Obama to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument," said Lucas Herndon, director of Friends of the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks, who introduced the speakers. "These lands that hold so much

cultural and natural heritage deserve to take a place alongside other national monuments across the country."

Supporters point to a recent study that predicts the national monument designation would give a \$7.4 million boost to the economy and double the number of jobs supported by outdoor recreation and tourism on public lands. Supporters point out that the newly designated Río Grande del Norte National Monument drew 50,000 new visitors in 2013, which is an overall 40 percent increase in visitation over 2012.

"An Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks national monument will protect our borders and community, and be a boost for business," said Bernie Digman, a veteran and business owner in Las Cruces. "We believe marketing our products with the beautiful Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks can help our bottom line and that's just one more reason to designate the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument.

In late January, Secretary of the Interior Sally Jewell visited Doña Ana County to see the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks and listen to why the community wanted to protect the area.

The Downtown rally came a day after Obama expanded the California Coastal National Monument to include the Points Arena-Stornetta Public Lands.

Market venders that support the proposal, such as Beck's Coffee, Happy Dog and Luchador Food Truck, offered special Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks products with stickers advertising their business.



### Ferrary to challenge McMillan in District 37

#### Democratic activist announces run for House seat

Joanne Ferrary, a longtime community activist who has advocated for increasing the minimum wage and raised community awareness on DWI issues, has announced her candidacy for state representative in District 37.

In the 2012 election, Ferrary was defeated by eight votes for the same position, which required a recount to determine the winner. District 37, which covers northeast Las Cruces, has been represented by Terry McMillan, a Republican.

In her announcement, Ferrary said she worked her way through New Mexico State University as a single mom and went on to fight for responsible growth in Las Cruces and has been a leader in efforts to reduce alcoholrelated traffic deaths, through programs addressing underage drinking and DWI.

Ferrary said she hopes to bring this experience to Santa Fe and fight for working families in District 37.

"The more time I've spent at the Legislature fighting for a minimum wage increase and other issues that would help New Mexico families, the more frustrated I've become," she said. "There is too much political posturing and pushing wedge issues, not enough problem-solving that will help families step up out of poverty, get our kids into early childhood programs, and boost our economy.

"We need to look at facts, not myths or outdated beliefs, and work together on issues that will make the dramatic improvements needed for southern New Mexico and the entire state."

Ferrary said broad-based economic development is one area in which legislators can work together.

Ferrary said she is a strong advocate for regional planning

regional planning and for increased investment in public education, public transit, work force retraining and improving infrastructure.

"We need to listen to the sound, research-based ideas that are offered by seasoned and knowledgeable experts regarding different issues, not

answers of one party or the other," she said. "It's up to the policymakers to be there to protect the rights of New Mexicans, allowing them the opportunity to have good and productive lives, preserve the


environment and our natural resources, and promote a fair playing field for small businesses as well as corporations.



# **Scholarship available** Essay deadline Friday, March 21

It's amazing to see that in the face of tragedy, a community can be brought together as one.

Oñate High School student Keian Padilla and his mother Marcia Parra were killed in a car crash Oct. 31, 2012, on U.S. Highway 70. The community offered support to the grieving family, including organized fundraisers and a scholarship.

The scholarship's profits came from a 5K run/ walk that was first put into effect on Oct. 8, 2013. The Keian Padilla-Marcia Parra scholarship is a collection of the \$10 entry fees. The result is a one-time scholarship awarded to the LCPS senior who writes the best paper about something on which he or she has had a positive influence.

The essay must be 300-500 words, with a deadline of Friday, March 21. Any interested seniors can talk to their guidance counselor for more information.

Back in 2012, Oñate High School began many fundraisers to help the family. Students organized a Zumba event, where all proceeds went to the Parra-Padilla family to help pay for funeral costs

and other expenses. The faculty, staff and students began carrying 5-gallon jugs around the halls of the school to receive any donations from anyone willing to help. Oñate alone raised around \$2,000. Oñate's generosity was quickly met throughout the entire community.

Las Cruces and Mayfield high schools also began fundraising, along with businesses and companies. All proceeds they collected were given to Oñate, which then gave the money the family. Everyone was really supportive, and in total around \$6,000 was raised.

This tragic event paved the way for many things that helped the community. Camino Real Middle School appealed to the Las Cruces City Council to install barriers on U.S. Highway 70 to ensure that nothing like this ever happened again. Along with Camino Real, many Las Cruces residents - from students to parents and everyone in between - signed a petition online requesting the barriers be installed before the original installation date.

The city finished construction last April, the month the city originally had decided to start construction.

### Reward grows in hotel robbery, shooting

At around 1:30 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 1, two men entered the Econo Lodge hotel at 2585 S. Valley Drive and confronted the 24-year-old clerk. One of the men jumped over the front desk counter and threatened the clerk while the second man pointed

a handoun at the clerk

The two men then took the clerk to a back office and shot him once in the leg. The two suspects took an undisclosed amount of cash from the hotel and fled, last seen running toward the west side of the nearby Motel 6 on La Posada Lane.

### Remember the journey

'Hoosiers' with a taste of green chile on the side

Editor's note: As this week started, state championship dreams were still alive for four local teams: Mesilla Valley Christian Schools boys, Centennial High School boys, Mayfield High School girls and Las Cruces High School boys. At press time, Mayfield and Centennial high schools were still in the running. In this column, local radio broadcaster Jeff Matthews shares some of the sights and sounds of years covering the state tournament in Albuquerque.

The New Mexico Activities Association catches a lot of grief.

Still, it throws a great state high school basketball tournament.

People will always bicker and fight over seedings and game starting times. (Mesilla Valley Christian Schools had an 8 a.m. tipoff for its second round game in Rio Rancho Wednesday, March 12.)

Conspiracy theories abound, but to attend a state basketball tournament is to see athletics at its purest and, often, finest.

The upper divisions play most of the semifinal and final games at the Pit, Albuquerque's legendary basketball arena and the home court of the University of New Mexico. That adds to the thrill for these young men and women. Recently, some of the lower division games and girls' games have been played at Rio Rancho's Santa Ana Star Center, which still feels like the big time to these kids who play in tiny gyms on the back roads of New Mexico.

The tournament has been watered down some. Corporate sponsorships and contract deals are starting to flood the high school market. You get a little tired of hearing the scripted ads over the arena loudspeakers. There is signage everywhere that has diluted the purity of the event, but the games themselves are often pure gold.

It's like watching the movie "Hoosiers" come to life before your eyes. Raw emotion on display. Games that mean everything to people who aren't making a cent. The coaches don't make six-figure salaries. Most are getting a \$5,000 stipend or less to serve as the head basketball coach. Assistants make much less. Volunteers are everywhere, on all the teams, acting as scorekeepers or unpaid coaches. No million-dollar stars here.

Not that the coaches don't have a presence. There is coaching royalty in New Mexico, familiar year in and year out at the tourney, patrolling the sidelines, going on another late season run.

Watching William Benjamin and the Las Cruces High School Bulldawgs celebrate last year after winning the 5A state title gave me chills.

Seeing Bulldawg guard Joseph Garza's smile after the game in the locker room, when I went in to share the moment with the players and coaches was worth the pittance I make to broadcast the games.

The Mayfield Trojans girls state basketball championship in 2011 was bittersweet for the players and especially coach George Maya. While the Trojans were advancing through the tournament, Maya's father was dying of cancer in an El Paso hospital. The coach missed the team's game against Carlsbad Saturday, March 8, to be at his father's bedside. When his condition improved, Maya headed to Albuquerque, only to return to El Paso again between the semifinal game and the championship game. "Tuesday was really hard," Maya said. "There's no way I could leave him. Thursday was a better day, and when I told him we made the final four, he nodded his head for me to go. It made his day when we told him we won it."

A look of pure 100-percent satisfaction of a dream come true. Coach Benjamin dancing with his players in a circle after the championship. The scene played itself out for many other teams. One thing that made the Bulldawg celebration so special was the runs that didn't work out for them the previous two seasons in the Pit. A last-second shot and peculiar foul trouble put an end to those runs and the tears were running the other way.

Yet, the drama can be almost too much to take. You see players who will never put on a

uniform again in a tie game; advancing in the tourney or hanging up the uniform forever, as the two scenarios possible for a senior during a free throw in a tie game.

I remember watching my friend Mike Carr after his Bulldawgs lost a state championship game at the buzzer, a tip-in, against Alamogordo in 1997.

I walked out of the arena expecting to see a crushed coach. He was instead beaming, holding the second-place trophy. He told me he had

Instead of others picking coach Carr up, he was picking everyone else up. He was not going to let this be a bad memory for his Bulldawgs. Nope, it was the end of a journey well done.

The state tournament is special. You see entire towns vacated. Destination: the Pit, to watch their boys or girls play. Radio row will be full of broadcasters and sometimes you wonder who's left back in Gallup or Bernalillo or Española or Tularosa to listen. Everybody is at the game, including the police.

There have been so many great games and great players on display, it's hard to pick them out of the memory banks. I have fond memories of Oñate's run to its first basketball





### Now is a great time to transform

### Don't put off game makeover: First step, work on your swing

Let's face it, this is past the time when we all buy health club memberships under the illusion we'll finally get in shape.

It's when we swear we'll finally start the diet we've been putting off for years and think about trying to fit in our swimsuits. The time has come when we face the clutter that has surrounded us and we look longingly and jealously at the nifty stuff (like boxes) on the shopping channels that offer us hope that we can finally get organized. Spring cleaning is just a few weeks away.

We tend to think that early in the new year we might just have the hope we are longing for so we can break some bad habits. We are looking for some source of courage and hope. So it is with our golf game. We need some courage and hope. Maybe you need a nudge, too. Well, here it is. This is the first in a series of columns that will give you the motivation and ideas you need to transform your game, and yourself, as a golfer.

When folks up north are frozen in the off-season, out here we're still playing golf and loving it – which makes it the perfect opportunity to tune up our golf games and make the changes we have been seeking for so long. Maybe it's time for a golf makeover.

The term makeover is generally applied to changing one's appearance. It may be interpreted as a superficial, temporary alteration for how you look or how you feel about yourself. On daytime TV, we are able to see makeovers for cosmetics, skin care and the biggest losers.

Nobody has come up with a genuine personality makeover, but I'm sure it's only a TV script reality show away. I wish it would take place on "Duck Dynasty." Whatever.

Personally, I did a career makeover almost 30 years ago when I sold my running shoe business in Michigan to become a clinical psychologist. It was hard work and took six years, but it was worth it, since I became licensed and became self-employed. Still, we can do a makeover with the way we play golf.

To help you with your golf makeover, we will first deal with getting organized and coming up with a plan that will get the job done. This may be part of an ongoing series about how to transform your game. I hope I have the courage to do it. I'm looking forward, over the next few months, to covering solid, reliable swing fundamentals you can count on; short game tips and techniques that are sure to save you strokes around the putting green; and the how-to's for you to become mentally excellent even in the face of adversity.

In a way, similar to a virtual personality makeover, a golf makeover most definitely requires you to undertake some soul searching, complete with critical introspective, selfawareness, feedback from golf buddies and, mostly, your golf professional as well an open mind and willingness to change.

The first thing I'm suggesting is for you to take a dispassionate look at how you presently play the game of golf. Have you ever seen yourself swing a golf club? It might be an eye-opener. In your heart of hearts, do you think you honestly know how to swing a golf club? If not, maybe this is the time to learn how.

Dr. Bob Rotella said we should play golf without thinking about it. Forgive me if it sounds harsh, but most of the golfers I see flailing away on the range are wielding a golf club without thinking about it. Maybe they need to think about how they're doing it. These are the same folks who say they don't need lessons and probably don't read this sage column.

I ask you, do you want to get better? Do you want to make a quantum leap in your ability? Do you long to beat your friends? Do you want admiration from fellow golfers? It isn't God-given, you know. You have to work at it. Go get a teacher.

Next, take a hard look over how you played last year. This is part of your dispassionate self-assessment. Notice what you did well and what you did poorly. If you see yourself as a golfer who is less accomplished than you would like to be, have you recently considered building a fundamentally sound and technically correct golf swing? Age really is not relevant here. You could be 30 or you could be 80, it doesn't matter when it comes to fundamentals.

I play with an 80-year-old gentleman who has one of the most sound golf swings I've ever seen and a lot better than the vast majority of 20-year-olds. Of course, he says he feels only 50 on the golf course.

With all due respect, have you ever wondered what it is that makes you think your swing is very effective? It's time to take lessons. It's time to get it right. If not now, when? Don't you long to be the biggest winner not loser?

Hopefully, you are a person who still wants to achieve things and gain some mastery within this great game that Arnold Palmer said is both "deceptively simple and endlessly complicated."

Now is the time to write down your golf goals for the coming year. Is this the season you'll break 100? Break 90? Break 80? Shoot your age? Have a personal best score? Are you going to take 7 strokes off your handicap? Maybe 2? Win a tournament, or a flight? I urge you to be very specific about your aspirations and then commit (with ink and paper) to them with all your energy because they will never happen otherwise.

Let's look at how you can plan for success in the new golf season. Practicing may actually be the key. Go figure. Coach Herb Wimberly has a general rule that says you'll need to hit at least 500 balls before any slight swing change becomes a habit you don't have to think about. Well, get started. Will you allocate the time to hit 500 practice balls over the

next month? Here's one secret to getting golf organized: Make appointments with yourself to practice. Trust me; it will pay off; maybe literally when you win your bets.

The same principle is true with putting. The more you practice the luckier you get. Make an appointment with yourself to practice your short game. Put it in your day planner. I had a fellow recently tell me, "I'm just a lousy putter and I'll never get any better."

As Wimberly will confirm, playing your best golf is mostly tied to having a positive attitude. Why wait any longer for your private attitude adjustment? Do it now. Stuck figuring out how? Get help.

If you are waiting for something magical to take place and transform your game to where you demonstrate golf mastery, then you're guilty of what we call poor reality testing. That's where one is out of touch with how things actually are – reality. The time is now to get in touch with reality and consider your golf makeover.

Centuries ago, Leonardo da Vinci made this useful observation: "It has long since

come to my attention that people of accomplishment rarely sat back and let things happen to them. They went out and happened to things."

Embarking on a golf game makeover, complete with goals and plans and determination, is going to require you to monitor your progress and measure your results. Keep your stats. Fairways, greens, putts, sand saves, the whole enchilada. If you don't know where to start and would like to get a handy guide and format in your hands right away, I'll send you one.

#### New tennis strategy works

#### Players embrace psychological slant

My plan for rebuilding the team this year was with thoughts of capturing this and future WAC Championships. I decided to also reformat the way I run my women's tennis program.

During the off season last summer, I recruited five new Aggies to the team for this year.

This is the largest recruiting class that I have ever had. Of the returners from last year, three saw a lot of time on the court and one had to red shirt last year. So, out of my 10 student athletes, six are competing in Aggie uniforms for the first time.

I thought this would be the perfect opportunity to address concerns of the past as well as to try to implement a more structured approach to the conditioning and practice schedule.

Knowing that we had such a new team and that we were building for the future, I began creating the new system with the help of a graduate assistant coach who was a former player of mine as well as getting the assistance of a sports psychologist from the New Mexico State University Kinesiology Department and our strength and conditioning coach. I wanted to not only address tennis as a physical sport but also as a psychological sport.

The most important part of this plan to restructure was to get my returners to really buy into this new plan. I knew once I had them on board, all of the new recruits would follow suit. My two seniors, Annemieke Witte and Ros-Polly Nguyen, have been instrumental in this new approach. They welcomed this new program and have gone

out of their way to make sure that all of the new girls not only bought into it but also committed to the new program of technical, physical and psychological training.

I knew this change would not yield immediate results, especially with such a young team but I know, in the long run, we will reap the rewards.

I began by clearly laying out the plans for practice, conditioning and mental training while having the team identify a mission statement and a team goal. They also had to identify how they were going to achieve this goal.

Their hard work and dedication this year has impressed me immensely. I have guided them through the ups and downs of this season, focusing more on their effort and fight, not so much on the results. I told them that as long as we kept working hard and fighting for every point, every set and every match that the results we were working toward would come on their own.

With this new plan in place, I committed to an extremely difficult spring schedule. I wanted to test the girls against tougher completion as opposed to playing easy matches.

While not yet achieving all of the results that we were hoping for, we have competed extremely well against these teams and that has kept the team motivated since they can see that all of this hard work is going to pay off. I know that by the time that we get to the WAC Championships here in Las Cruces the last week of April, we will more than ready to achieve our ultimate goal of winning the WAC.





Glendale Community College is the No. 2-ranked team of the decade by the National Junior College Athletic Association. The Gauchos are undefeated in Region 5 play five of the past 10 seasons and have three national championships, two since 2000. The Gauchos are seven for seven in bowl appearances since 2000.

Several of Granados' LCHS teammates, including Jalen Bishop and Jesse Olsen, signed with Pima Community College in Tucson, Ariz. Glendale CC and Pima are in the same conference, the Western States Football League.



### State town hall on water scheduled

### Locals shape dialogue

Residents ranging from government officials to ranchers and farmers are being invited to a statewide town hall on water planning, development and use April 15-16 in Albuquerque, sponsored by the public policy group New Mexico First.

While the gathering will be held in Albuquerque, a group of Las Crucens met last month to help identify areas that the attendees should look at. New Mexico First asked the Great Conversations of Las Cruces to envision a future in which the state was a world leader on water issues.

Great Conversations facilitator Randy Harris asked participants in the Las Cruces gathering to imagine what kind of balanced public policy the state developed that conserved water resources and still preserved a good quality of life.

To reach that future ideal, everyone in the state recognized the seriousness of the water situation in New Mexico, said Mellow Honek, a Las Cruces solar businessman.

"Everybody got in the game," he said.

That meant people learned about the true availability of the resource and made changes to be less wasteful, such as water recycling and grey water systems becoming commonplace.

Policymakers also overcame their reluctance to acknowledge there was water shortage, said Win Jacobs. Because cities

such as Las Cruces tap into large aquifers deep underground, policymakers too often get the idea that there's plenty of water, she said.

Participants said the future "model" state would have not only improved traditional water infrastructure – such as fixing line leaks – but also used technology to have the system operate more efficiently.

The cost of water is going to have to reflect its scarcity, William Little said. It could be said that it's often not a case of running out of water, but running out of cheap water, he said.

In the conversation, several talked about the social impact of water reflecting its truer cost as a limited commodity. A significantly tiered water rate would become standard, making water for personal consumption still relatively cheap and with heavy water users paying a much higher cost.

Antiquated water policies would have been finally addressed, participants said, such as "use it or lose it" water rights.

Las Cruces City Councillor Greg Smith said he'd rather see incentives used to encourage conservation efforts in people's homes than the price of water, or fee and fines.

Helping the policymakers are the state's research universities, especially New Mexico State University Water Resources Research Institute, participants said.

Leslie Cryder said New Mexico policymakers also understood that water resources weren't just confined to state lines and reached out to their counterparts in neighboring states and Mexico.

Getting the different government entities – each with their own self-interests – to work cooperatively could be even more challenging than the technology of water conservation, said Las Cruces City Councillor Nathan Small.

"Sometimes it's unfair to lock a cat and dog in a room and expect consensus," he said.

Forming a consensus from opposing views is something that New Mexico First has a lot of experience with and is now registering those wanting to participate in the statewide town hall.

The two-day town hall will be 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday, April 15–16, at the Marriott Pyramid North in Albuquerque. The town hall can accommodate a limited number of participants, so early registration is recommended. To register, visit http://nmfirst.org/events/th-40.

### Fruit fly caution

### New pest could hurt N.M. growers

Tessa Grasswitz, New Mexico State Univeristy Extension integrated pest management specialist, reports that the Asian fruit fly Drosophila suzukii, commonly known as the spotted wing drosophila, was found in three locations in the Los Lunas area last summer.

"The arrival of this invasive insect is going to be tough on New Mexico growers," Grasswitz said. "Cane fruits, like blackberries and raspberries, used to be good money spinners for our producers because they are high-value crops with no serious native pest problems. But this new insect is going to impact growers' revenue."



Drosophila suzukii, commonly known as the spotted wing drosophila, is a new pest not found in New Mexico before last summer. New Mexico State University entomologist Tessa Grasswitz is tracking the spread of this invasive pest.

The spotted wing drosophila was first detected in California in 2009. Since then, it has spread across the country and has been present in some of the major fruit-producing states, including Oregon, Washington and Michigan, for some years.

The small fly lays its eggs in ripe or ripening fruits of cherry, raspberry, strawberry, blackberry, grape and similar crops.

"We first found the insect in mid-August last year, Grasswitz said. "And if the experiences of other states are anything to go by, we can expect it to become much more widely distributed in New Mexico this year."

Because of its short life cycle, the spotted wing drosophila can complete multiple generations during a growing season, so it can build up very quickly. Growers in other states are spraying every week throughout the fruiting season to control the fly. They have to target the adults, because the eggs and larvae are protected inside the fruit.

"Many of the more effective pesticides that are being used in other states are not currently registered for this purpose in New Mexico," Grasswitz said. "I am working with manufacturers to get some of the key pesticides registered with the New Mexico Department of Agriculture so that our growers have more control options."

Until the pesticides are registered, Grasswitz said growers have very few tools to prevent the destruction of their fruit crops. Organic growers have even fewer choices.

"The spotted wing drosophila has destroyed existing integrated pest management programs for native pests of soft fruit crops in other states" she said

# NM positioned for Tesla run

### Car producer shops for factory site

New Mexico is competing head to head with Texas, Arizona and Nevada for "the largest single private investment opportunity in a decade," Economic Development Secretary Jon Barela told a Las Cruces audience Tuesday, March 10.

Giving an update to the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance at the Business in the Borderplex Forum, Barela said the states are vying for a factory for Tesla, the California-based manufacturer of high-end electric automobiles.

Barela said the company intends to invest \$15 billion and create 6,500 jobs when the build-out is completed.

"We are competing very, very aggressively to win that project," Barela said.

He said the company would be a good fit culturally for the state, but added he could not comment on Tesla's selection process or the locations it is considering in New Mexico.

While reporting on a generally positive 2014 legislative session, in which water infrastructure projects were funded, the gross receipts tax (GRT) on aircraft sales eliminated and the GRT on aircraft maintenance reduced, Barela said a utility rate bill that could benefit large manufacturers such as Tesla "did not happen."

#### Bill to return in 2015

The House passed the Economic Development Utility Rate Bill by a 47-17 vote, but the measure was stuck in the Senate Conservation Committee when the session adjourned.

"We simply ran out of time," Barela said. "We plan to re-introduce the bill next year."

The bill would have allowed public utilities to negotiate subsidized electric rates with large-scale industrial investors. The subsidized rates would apply to prospective manufacturers that invest \$5 million or more, create at least 20 jobs paying \$40,000 or higher and consume at least one megawatt of electricity.

"The utility rate bill was designed to make sure rates become competitive, especially for large industrial users," Barela told MVEDA. "It would have provided a process through which they could seek lower rates."

He said the legislation could be important to users such as Tesla that are looking at locating or expanding in New Mexico.

According to Department of Economic Development analysis, at least 44 states, including Texas, have some form of electric incentive rates.

Barela said other legislation passed during the first three years of Gov. Susana Martinez's

### **GRT** revenue continues to slide

#### City officials anticipate stable second half

Officials are keeping a watchful eye on slumping gross receipts tax (GRT) revenue, the city's primary revenue source.

GRT is a tax on the total gross revenues of a company, regardless of their source. The state collects GRT and then distributes the revenue to support schools and state and local government operations

A gross receipts tax is similar to a sales tax, but it is levied on the seller of goods or service consumers

GRT remittance to the city for February 2014 – \$6.7 million – was down .5 percent from February 2013.

"Given that GRT is by far the city's largest revenue source, we are concerned and continue to closely monitor the situation," City Budget Manager Dick Gebhart said.

Gebhart said the growth rate for the first eight months of FY14, which runs from July 1, 2013, to June 30, 2014, registered a negative 2.2 percent. He said the city adjusted its current fiscal year 2013-14 budget in January to account for the trend in GRT collections.

"The overall growth rate was decreased

from 2.7 percent when the budget was originally adopted last May to zero growth for the year. The result was that the budget was reduced by approximately \$1.7 million for the current fiscal year," he said.

Gebhart said the city's conservative approach to budgeting enabled officials to make the adjustments without a disruption in city services.

"The city is looking carefully at every program and additional operational efficiencies are being sought in every department within the city," City Manager Robert Garza said.

#### Second half rebound?

Although the figures continue to show a consistently weak pattern, Gebhart holds a cautiously optimistic outlook for the months to come

"On a positive note, the US economy continues to expand and the uncertainty surrounding the federal government has been greatly reduced going forward. While rapid expansion is not anticipated, we are expecting a more stable economic environment for the rest of the current fiscal year," he said. "The outlook is for more stability in (GRT) collections

during the remainder of the year as the economy adjusts to an environment that has more certainty."

#### Sectors show mixed results

Gebhart said receipts from four sectors declined in February. The biggest year-over-year drop was in construction, 27 percent.

Transportation and Warehousing and

Transportation and Warehousing and Services GRT declined in February, the city reported.

Major highway projects have a dramatic impact on GRT from the transportation sector. Gebhart said major highway construction projects, especially the Interstate 10/Interstate 25 interchange, elevated transportation GRT in the previous year but are not occurring this year.

"As the current year progresses, we should see a lessening of the year-over-year-negative influence." he said.

"The city itself is anticipating the issuance of almost \$30 million in capital improvement bonds going into the next fiscal cycle and that alone will help keep construction sector and professional service providers employed," Garza said.

Gebhart said the services sector consists of two components – personal services such as beauty/barber, landscaping and dog grooming

and professional/technical services.

"(Professional/technical services), especially in our local area, is greatly impacted by federal contract spending," he said. "The effects of sequestration and the shutdown has had a direct impact on this industry segment."

On the plus side, retail trade, which reflects the Christmas shopping season, was up 2 percent from the February 2013 report.

"While not spectacular, a positive performance for the city's largest sector during the

important holiday shopping season was encouraging," he said.

"The holiday shopping season was remarkably strong in the face of sluggish economic growth and the impacts of the federal shutdown locally. Local consumers continue to maintain confidence in the future," Gebhart said

#### Restaurant/lodging sector improves

Medical and food "hold harmless" distributions also were up in February, along with restaurants/lodging and health care.

Asked to comment on the strong showing for the restaurant and lodging sector and the future of demand for these services, Gebhart said, "The Las Cruces area continues to add population, plus a gradual U.S. economic recovery, both bode well for food and lodging."

Referring to proposals to build a five star hotel Downtown and a three-star hotel on University Avenue near the Las Cruces Convention Center, Gebhart said hotel and restaurant industries tend to follow residential population.

The current development of residential units Downtown will be a plus. In addition, the redoubled efforts of the City's Convention & Visitors Bureau will bring in added convention business. Both developments will support added activity Downtown and on University."

Garza said a local hotel/motel market assessment recently completed by NMSU "clearly shows a higher occupancy level for higher rated facilities within the city."

"With the proposed hotel adjacent to the Las Cruces Convention Center, a three star facility is targeted and should be successful.

"Three weeks ago, Ernst & Young ranked New Mexico No.

1 in the west in terms of taxes on manufacturers," Barela said, noting that three years ago the state's tax competitiveness was ranked No. 51 nationally.

"We've come a long way," he said.

Among measures enacted in the past three years is a "single sales factor" tax formula approved in 2013 as part of a bipartisan tax reform package. Under that change, a corporation's local payroll and property no longer have to be included along with the value of its local sales when assessing how much it owes the state in corporate income taxes. The previous tax policy essentially penalized companies that manufactured products in New Mexico and sold them out of state.

According to the Albuquerque Journal, California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger "was able to deliver a major tax break and other incentives.

The Journal in February 2014 reported that Tesla is looking to initially open a \$2 billion battery factory employing 1,500 to 2,000 workers.

Another 8,000 indirect jobs would be added through the creation of related service companies, Global Equities Research analyst Trip Chowdhry told the Journal.

The Journal based its report on Chowdhry's analysis. Tesla did not comment.

Chowdhry said New Mexico would be an "ideal" location for such a facility.

Tesla founder Elon Musk in 2013 announced his plan for the world's largest battery plant.

"I don't think permitting is going to be the driver here," Musk said following the announcement. "This is going to be a very green factory.

There is going to be a lot of solar power. It's going to have essentially zero emissions and there are no toxic elements that are going to come out of this factory and we will build in recycling capability right into the factory."



### **NMSU's Casaus focuses on students**

The bottom line for Anthony Casaus, the new assistant dean for development and alumni relations at the New Mexico State University College of Business, is "to support the students

In his previous role as development director for KRWG Las Cruces, Casaus was charged with generating the resources to sustain the station's community education and entertain-

Now, he relishes the opportunity to work directly for higher education, which gets students on track for their careers, Casaus said.

His mission is to generate alumni involvement and financial support for the school, but he is keenly aware that supporting students consists of far more than providing material resources to operate classrooms

Casaus got his start in broadcast journalism, thanks to the very personal support of Sean McCleneghan, the head of the department and "one of several professors who played a critical role in my success."

#### Rookie changes course

As a rookie entering the journalism program, the shy kid from Roswell envisioned becoming a sports reporter.

"I thought I could do sports reporting, but I found out news reporting was far more necessary in the eyes of a broadcast station," he said.

Casaus navigated his undergraduate years the hard way, working 35 hours a week at a shoe store in Mesilla Valley Mall while cobbling together the money for school with loans

and grants.
"I came in with writing skills that were not the strongest," he said. Faculty helped him correct that deficit.

He said McCleneghan was well known in journalism circles and always successful securing internships for students, including one for him in his home town.

"I pulled into the parking lot at KBIM in Roswell for the first day of my internship and went to the back door. The news director met me there. He was waiting for me. 'I need you to cover a story, he said, handing me a camera."

His career path took him from KBIM-TV, Roswell in 1988 to Boy Scouts of America in

He returned to Las Cruces in 1996 as director of development at KRWG-TV, and in 1997 spearheaded an effort to save live student broadcasts, which were about to be cancelled due to lack of funding.

With McCleneghan and another staff members he went on the road to stump for the program, meeting with public media station executives in El Paso and Albuquerque.

"We were able to come back with a twoyear commitment," he said.

#### Partners make big things happen

Now Casaus looks ahead to partnerships within the business college, on campus and in

A number of faculty, including accounting department head Kevin Melendrez, participate in alumni and development activities, he said.

Casaus said he'll be working closely with NMSU's executive director of alumni relations, Tammie Campos, who creates opportunities to meet alumni all around the country.

'The alumni office is our greatest resource, with a database of more than 100,000 alumni. I will utilize their resources and support," Casaus said.

He also will be working closely with development officers in the NMSU Foundation.

"A lot of gifts to the business college are part of gifts to multiple programs on campus," he said. "It is imperative for development officers to work collaboratively."

Casaus said when he returned to Las Cruces he made a commitment to contribute to the journalism department.

"I immediately became involved contributing to the scholarship fund for Hispanic students, and I will do the same for the business college," he said.

### Opening a portal for businesses in the state


Gov. Susana Martinez signed legislation Thursday, March 6, creating a one-stop online portal for New Mexico businesses. The legislation proposed by Senate Pro Tem Mary Kay Papen of Mesilla Park, Senate Bill 9, provides for the development of a website that will allow businesses to streamline their transactions with the state.

"Creating this new online portal will make it easier for business owners and entrepreneurs to start and maintain their businesses," Martinez said at a ribbon cutting ceremony at Las Cruces Machine Co. "Easing the burden on small businesses is a key part of our continuing efforts to diversify our economy, compete for jobs, attract new companies and help small businesses grow."

The New Mexico Department of Information Technology (DoIT) has already begun to work with the Economic Development Department, Taxation and Revenue Department and the Department of Workforce Solutions planning for the new portal.

DoIT Secretary Darryl Ackley said the object is to use technology to better deliver services businesses "have come to expect and deserve."

The project is scheduled for completion in 2017; portions would be rolled out incrementally, he said.



The pot of gold at the end of the rainbow is filled with green beer

Distance between Las Cruces and Dublin, Ireland: 4,855 miles.

The entire Atlantic Ocean may lie between the City of the Crosses and the shamrock capitol of the world, but that has never stopped Las Crucens from getting into the spirit o' the Irish on Saint Patrick's Day.

## Featured Artist: NMSU Student Show

# Contemporary visions NMSU Art Gallery showcases the year's finest

Each year on the New Mexico State University campus, a juried show of the best, most challenging and most provocative student work opens.

Included in the exhibition are submissions that demonstrate a mastery of the artists' chosen media as well as a willingness to play with traditional forms, deconstruct them or discard them entirely and start anew, testing the boundaries of what "art" means today.

This year, the Juried Student Show opened with a gala reception at the University Art Gallery Thursday, March 13, unveiling the diverse, eclectic and challenging work created by 37 undergraduate and graduate students from

Juror Jessica Pizaño Roberts - NMSU Master of Fine Arts graduate, current University of Texas at El Paso sculpture teacher and Border Arts resident - had the difficult task of bringing together a cohesive show of work from the more than 80 artists who entered their pieces for consideration.

From those 80-plus applicants, 37 were selected, and the representative work on display throughout March offers a glimpse of the creative and often challenging world of contemporary art, created by students living and working in Las Cruces.

Stephanie Taylor, interim director of the NMSU Art Gallery, said the annual Juried Student Show is the gallery's most popular exhibit for a number of reasons.

Walking the halls of D.W. Williams Hall daily, Taylor said she's seen much of the work on display evolve over time, slowly, in the classrooms and hung on the walls. In a gallery setting, however, the finished work takes on a new heft.

'It's my favorite show of the year,' Taylor said. "A lot of this work, you'll see out in the hallways or in progress, but then when you see it installed and lit properly, it's incredible."

Not only does the show serve to highlight the work students have pored diligently chance to include the public in all that's going on inside Williams Hall, a place that to some seems insular, even

think people in town know where the gallery is," Taylor said. "It's a way of really welcoming the public in to the gallery."





## '50 to 1' embarks on national tour

In 2009, a flop-footed underdog horse from New Mexico named Mine that Bird, who had gone winless for more than a year, charged through the finish of the Kentucky Derby, overcoming monumental, 50-to-1 odds.

Mine That Bird went on to the Triple Crown, taking second in the Preakness Stakes and third in the Belmont stakes, amassing more than \$2.2 million in winnings before retiring to Roswell's Double Eagle Ranch in November 2010.

Now, a talented group of filmmakers, led by Academy Award-winning writer, director and producer Jim Wilson ("Dances With Wolves," The Bodyguard" and "Wyatt Earp," among many others) came together to tell Mine That Bird's inspiring true story.

Starring Skeet Ulrich, Christian Kane, Todd Lowe and Hugo Perez, "50 to 1" will soon see national release, but in the months leading up to full distribution, the cast and crew are






## This ... is ... stupid!

## 'Rise of an Empire' a foolish mess

If you like your blood in endless, arcing, crimson spurts, your men shirtless and oiled, your narrative bland, your acting heavy-handed and painfully expository and your history dumbed down to an inestimable level, "300: Rise of an Empire" is for you.

"Empire," based on an as-of-yetunpublished (and if the film is any indication, hopefully never-published) graphic novel penned by Frank Miller, follows Athenian politician and general Themistocles (Sullivan Stapleton) as he wages war against the invading Persian forces, led by the pierced and golden God-king Xerxes (Rodrigo Santoro) and his wicked naval commander Artemisia (an unhinged Eva Green).

Not a proper sequel to 2007's
"300," "Empire" is rather a parallel; as Themistocles wages war at sea, his fellow Spartan brethren of the first film are getting their collective butts kicked at the Battle of Thermopylae.

The narrative, if one could call it that, is largely ancillary. So near is "Empire" to its predecessor's underdog story, it resembles a Mad Lib penned by an awkward, hormone riddled teenage boy. The gore is endless and overdone, the sex perverse and, at times, fetishistic in the worst ways, and the dialogue is stunted beyond belief.

Nearly every line spoken seems cribbed from "Henry V's" St. Crispin's Day speech: Constant morale-boosting speechification on honor, courage, brotherhood, nationalism ad infinitum. It's as if the screenplay's dialogue was written entirely in bold, underlined capital letters and read, without much conviction, directly from the page. If "300" felt like the acne-plagued fan fiction version of Russell Crowe's terrible "Gladiator," "Empire" is more akin to a "300" coloring book scribbled over in shades of blood red by a kid destined for the counselor's office.

In terms of acting, don't bother. Despite his miserable track record since, Gerard Butler's presence is shockingly missed in "Empire."

Stapleton is wholly forgettable as the film's hero, unable to give even his "Braveheart"-lite pontificating any semblance of import.

"Game of Thrones" star Lena Headey's all-too-brief screen time is wasted as Queen Gorgo; Santoro is bland and expressionless as the pierced, towering Godking Xerxes; and Green, as the bloodthirsty



Artemisia, is overacting embodied. The way she chews scenery, she's only missing the fangs. I've never seen a group of people act so hard for so very little.

As an aside, this film, as many others have, makes no attempt to justify its actors' accents with the roles they fill. Why, for instance, do nearly all of "Empire's" characters – Greek, Persian, what have you – speak with English accents ... or speak English at all? Perhaps the film's target demographic – bored 14-year-old boys – is largely too lazy to read subtitles.

The violence, the film's sole selling point, is at once repellant and rote. With an incessant parade of dismemberments, beheadings, rapes and brutalities on display, "Empire" never manages shock or awe; even as one of its principals bestows a tender tongue kiss on the lips of a still-blinking severed head, the film never manages memorability, only crass iuvenilia.

Much like the first film, "Empire" relies

an Oscar, but are said to be quite good, yet

almost solely on aesthetics to remain remotely passable, hammering away at the superimposition chroma-key technique, in addition to the series' trademark physics-defying speed-up/slow-down battle sequences, endless streams of gore and a heavy-handed reliance on cheesy 3-D. It's quite expensive – as in, \$110 million expensive – to look this cheap. Spurts of poorly rendered blood spray toward the screen, along with arrows, explosions and at least one eye rent from its socket during battle.

The film's lengthy naval battles are, initially, rather fun to watch. After more than an hour of them, though, they lose a lot, and the film slogs through a sea of blood, bodies and buff dudes for much of its running time.

All in all – and I never thought I could say this – "300: Rise of an Empire" is in every way worse than its terrible predecessor, a shoddy photocopy of a stupid picture recreated hundreds upon hundreds of times.

Well, movie fans, I'm sorry to say, unless you saw them when Allen Theatres screened it, you've missed the best of the bunch of this year's Oscar-nominated short films.

The Mesilla Valley Film Society opted to skip the documentary entries, one of which was "Cave Digger," a made-in-New Mexico short by a man who "builds" amazing caves in northern New Mexico as his form of artistic expression. It didn't win the award, but it is a good watch.

However, there are some fine pieces that you will be able to see from the narrative and animated shorts, including:

#### **Animated**

**Feral:** Certainly the darkest of the nominees this year, it tells the story (wordlessly) of a feral boy who is taken in by a man and taught the ways of human beings with somewhat unpredictable results.

**Get a Horse:** From Disney, this is a fun blend of a very, very old Mickey Mouse cartoon, mixed with present day animation,

as Mickey has to save Minnie from the evil Peg-Leg Pete. Just silly enough...

Mr. Hublot (France): My personal favorite and the Oscar winner for this year, Mr. Hublot is part of a mechanical world, one in which everything appears to be made of scrap metal, including the lost puppy that he catches sight of one day from his apartment. Suffering from either OCD, agoraphobia or both, Mr. H wants to help, but can he?

Possessions (Japan): With hints of an environmental theme, "Possessions" shares the story of a samurai, lost in a storm, who happens upon a cabin filled with damaged umbrellas. Using his skills and a previous untapped kindness, the warrior must repair the umbrellas and other misused items in order to escape.

Room on the Broom: Definitely a fine piece for kids, young and old, "Room on the Broom" tells the tale of a kind and generous witch who, no thanks to her cat, helps other lonely and displaced animals on a journey – until her broomstick breaks.

In addition, there may be several other animated films that were not nominated for

preview copies and titles were not available.

#### Live action

**Do I Have to Take Care of Everything** (Finland): In this far-too-short short, the mother of an easy going family attempts to get them all ready to attend a wedding with side-splitting results. My favorite for this year

The Voorman Problem: Another that is too short, this film features a confident psychiatrist who is dealing with a man in a straitjacket with a God complex, who just might be for real. Just ask the residents of Belgium...

It Wasn't Me (Spain): This is the heaviest film of the entire program, wherein a pair of doctors who have come to offer aid to an unnamed African country, are kidnapped and threatened by a gang of goons. It has an interesting aspect of forgiveness attached.

Helium: Enzo is a hospital janitor who becomes friends with a young boy who may be dying from an unnamed illness. A love for balloons helps the two bond, as Alfred's condition worsens and Enzo offers a look at a different kind of paradise that Alfred may need to explore on his own. Won the Oscar, but ...

Just Before Losing Everything: Cover-

ing a subject that can never get the coverage it needs – spousal abuse – this outstanding and tense French entry follows a department store manager, Miriam, the mother of two, who is trying to escape her abusive 'husband' (a title that abusers don't deserve) with her kids. Her plan is detailed and works well until he shows up at the store to get the family checkbook.

There is not a bad film among this year's offerings, which is a pleasant turn. I remember a lot of heavier brooding dramas in the past, and although they are present this year, they don't overwhelm the program.

# Where community matters Sonoma Palms Apartments welcomes tenants home

Most apartment complexes are impersonal. A place to store stuff and wile away the hours not spent at work or out enjoying the activities a growing city affords.

If a tenant is lucky, he or she might get to know a neighbor or two, usually met in the laundry room or poolside. The management of the complex is rarely seen, except when rent is due or a problem arises that requires attention.

For many, these are the expectations of a normal life.

The management staff at Sonoma Palms Apartments has a different philosophy. They believe there is more to creating a home environment than simply providing a living space. In fact, they think of their property not as an apartment complex, but rather as a neighborhood.

Once a month, they host a resident gettogether, so neighbors can meet one another over a community dinner or a shared experience, such as a televised event or holiday. But it doesn't stop there. On a separate occasion each month, they also host an event for the children living on the property, called Kidz Club.

"Every month we either host a movie, or have a game night," said Assistant Property Manager Liliana Montes. "It's just something so all the kids can get to know each other. You don't always get that in other communities."

Another thing you don't usually get is the luxury amenities. All apartments feature wood flooring, carpeting in bedrooms, granite counter tops, 9-foot ceilings, track lighting, walk-in closets, full-size washer and dryer, microwave, stove, dishwasher and refrigerator with ice maker. And it all comes together in spaces that are far from standard issue.

"We have one, two and three bedrooms

available," Montes said. "Our two-bedroom apartments are the size of a small house. For an apartment, you're getting a lot. Our onebedroom apartments are about the same size as most two-bedrooms in the Las Cruces area. That's a pretty big deal. That's a lot of space."

Outdoor features include a professional half basketball court, a heated salt water swimming pool with beach access, a high tech workout room, a playground for kids, a dog park and soon, a car wash station. Then there are the media and gaming room, with a 70-inch television on one side and an Xbox and Playstation on the other; a conference room available on a first come, first served basis and a clubhouse, where the monthly events for residents are hosted.

"If our residents want to host something after hours, they're more than welcome," Montes said. "I have tenants who work from home and use our conference room to meet with their clients. I've had a baby shower and a birthday party in the clubhouse just recently. This is their space. Normally, I have a few students who come in here to study, because we have free wifi. There are always drinks in the refrigerator for them. We try to make it as inviting as possible."

Sonoma Palms resident Kyle Flamm, a business student attending classes at the Doña Ana Community College East Mesa campus, counts all of these conveniences as reasons for his patronage.

I like the area and I like the way they run things here," he said. "I go to the school right down the street, so the location is really good for me, but I'm also a big sports freak. No other apartment complex I looked at has a basketball court. The units are really nice, too. I like the wood flooring and the lighting. It's very modern, which is very cool."

"We've had some residents tell us that it's kind of like living at a resort, which is really

neat," Montes said. "Resorts are usually the places you go to get away, but to be able to come home to a resort atmosphere is really special."

Even better, not many resorts have a policy in place that accepts pets of all sizes. "A lot of apartments don't accept great danes, because of their size, but we do," Montes said. "Our owner is a pet lover, so he doesn't put restriction on pet owners. We have a one-time pet fee, paid up front, but no monthly fee for pet owners."

Another benefit of community living at Sonoma Palms is the location of the property. Situated on Northrise Drive, directly across the street from Sonoma Elementary, it is less than a minute from U.S. Highway 70.

"It's easy access to the highway and we're starting to attract people from White Sands, which is great," said Montes. "It's interesting,

because I know a lot of people don't seem to know we're here. We have a lot of people call thinking we're a retirement community. We're not. We have people from all backgrounds and from all walks of life living here. Families, students and working professionals. It's a little of everything."

With a preferred employer discounts for military, law enforcement, fire department or for those working at any of the area hospitals, as well as detached garages available for residents who don't like to leave their vehicles out in the open, or may just need a little extra storage space, the amenities just keep on coming at Sonoma Palms.

'We just really like to take care of our tenants," Montes said. "We're always coming up with new stuff for them, which I like. I live here, too, and these are my neighbors. It's the personal touch that makes it really special. It's what makes it feel like home."

Regular business hours for the Sonoma Palms management team are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday, or noon to 6 p.m. Sundays. For more information, call 382-5611 or visit www.sonomapalms.com.

# Mentality versus physicality



What can I say about training for one of the toughest marathons in the world that you don't already know? It's really, really hard – that's the bottom line.

Depending on how much training you've done, your body may react better to the distance, but it will still feel and absorb every single step in the 26.2 miles that make up the full route of the Bataan Memorial Death March.

Those 26.2 miles aren't suddenly going to feel like 20, 23 or even 25 miles. Wrapping your mind around every step involved is just as tough as getting in the physical shape to do so.

In preparation for those miles, I attempted another 16-mile hike through the Doña Ana Mountains this weekend.

I use the word "hike" here loosely, because hike is a term I've previously used to describe jaunts through some aesthetically pleasing environment or another. This particular "hike" is no jaunt, stroll or saunter, and there's not a whole lot to look at – other than miles upon miles of winding arroyos, rocks and cacti.

My hiking buddies, a couple of Bataan march aficionados, mapped this aggressive route to best prepare for the varying terrain of the actual march through the Chihuahuan desert. This journey through Mordor is almost entirely uphill, the only respite being steep, rock-face declines here and there.

This was now my second test hike of this path, and I thought I was ready. New legitimate hiking shoes, plenty of water and nutritional snacks were going to get me through the six-hour ordeal better than the previous week – or so I thought.

The shoes allowed me the comfort of not having pain from blisters, which freed my mind to think about the misery of everything else.

This time, I knew just how far I had to go – or rather, how much farther I had to go. Ten miles in, my legs hurt with every step, and thinking I had roughly six more miles to push out of them, up and down rocky, sandy, mountainous trails, pushed me to new levels of mental desperation.

Î convinced myself numerous times that I probably wasn't going to

## They play like anyone else

SNM Down Syndrome Families spread awareness

When New Mexico State University professor Tim Query gets through teaching his classes for the day, he sometimes takes his 9-year-old son, Mateo, to the park near their home.

Mateo said he loves the park as much as he loves playing soccer, T-ball and basketball. Mateo was born with Down syndrome, but that hasn't stopped him from enjoying the finer things in life.

"His favorite thing about T-ball was at the end of a game, when the team would put their hands together and yell," Query said.

Query is the director of the Southern New Mexico Down Syndrome Families (SNMDSF), a group of families who gather for events, play dates and discussion on what it takes to raise a child who has Down syndrome.

The SNMDSF will meet from 4 to 7 p.m. Friday, March 21, at Peter Piper Pizza, 2290 Bataan Memorial, in honor of World Down Syndrome Day, recognized as a time to spread awareness in local communities about the inclusion of those with Down syndrome.

"Awareness is letting people know they can treat our kids how they treat anybody else's kids, especially at public places such as the park, the mall – just know they don't need to be afraid to come up and ask the kids to play," said Kassidy Lask, a member of the SNMDSF and mother of 4-year-old Bre Hamberg.

As with other children, each individual is unique in their personality and learning ability. Query said, for example, Mateo is mostly a happy child, eager to please his parents.

"He's in a pretty good mood most of the time, and wants to do the right thing," Ouery said.

Lask said firecracker Bre, on the other hand, is in a bit of a defiant phase.

"She likes to say 'no' right now," Lask said.

The group agreed that although it may take a little more time and patience when it comes to teaching Down syndrome children tasks, the reward that comes when they do learn is something to cherish.

Al Spencer and his son George, 8, have been a part of the SNMDSF for about five years, and said the landmarks of progress aren't just gone in the blink

of an eye as they were with Spencer's other children.

"I really enjoy seeing his reaction when he learns something new," Spencer said. "To finally see that change, it's more sustainable."

Spencer said they have found camaraderie among the children and adults in the SNMDSF, and are able to find common ground and share

may be.

Potty training, for instance, may take years longer than it does for other children, or teaching them to look both ways before crossing the street and other safety issues may take

a little more patience.

"We just want them to reach their full potential, whatever that potential may be," Query said.

When it comes to their education, Down syndrome children are more integrated in regular classrooms than ever before, and parents have the right to sit with school administrators to discuss their educational plan every year.

Lask said Bre is in speech therapy three times a week, where she is currently learning her colors and other descriptive words to make three-word sentences.

Education about Down syndrome has helped her family move forward, Lask said, but Internet research can sometimes yield a negative feeling

"It's sometimes like you only read about the worst-case scenarios," Lask said.

Since each individual is different, the best thing to do may be just getting to know the limits and setting goals for each child. Query said he would like Mateo to possibly learn a musical instrument or find a sport in the Special Olympics to excel in.

When asked who his favorite basketball team, Mateo, grinning from ear to ear, replied, "Go Aggies!"

Lask said she wants Bre to take swimming lessons, something she has already shown an affinity for

Spencer said, some day, he wants George to be able to live as independently as he can while still being safe.

They all have big dreams and goals for their children, as any parent does. For now, it's Peter Piper Pizza time.

## Local efforts jumpstart enthusiasm for reading

## Activities with children can boost education, intellect and social skills

Chances are you learned to read early in life and take pleasure in doing so.

Perhaps you even describe yourself as an avid reader. If so, you are among the educational elite in Doña Ana County.

Far too many of your neighbors have not had the opportunity to reach full employability and self-sufficiency because of an inadequate literacy level.

According to statistics reported by Colleen Heild in the Albuquerque Journal, more than 80 percent of New Mexico's children from low-income families are behind on the first day of kindergarten and one-in-four is unable to read even one letter of the alphabet.

Today's column celebrates the efforts of six Las Crucens who are taking the initiative

within their own neighborhoods to improve the prospects for children by building literacy skills within families.

Conlee Elementary School teachers Elizabeth McDonald, Clara Lopez and Kim Ortiz and Jornada Elementary School teachers Sarah Johnson, Nicole Scott and Martha Benavidez are welcoming parents of preschoolers to join them after school. Together, they talk and play and discover how children develop language skills.

Using the First Teacher curriculum developed in Las Cruces, parents engage in purposeful play and read-aloud activities to prepare children for future success in school. A sampling of parent comments at the end of six weeks reveal that parents see positive changes at home.

"I never thought just reading with my child would be such a bonding moment," one parent said. "Before, my son did not like to be held, but as we started to read together, his walls started to come down. Now, he can't wait for our reading time to come."

The premise of First Teacher workshops is that parents provide their children with the cornerstone of learning success when they share a love of learning at home before their children enter school. In Las Cruces, First Teacher workshops are supported by a grant from the Stocker Foundation.

Teachers at Conlee and Jornada elementary schools are engaging families of preschoolers in a new and powerful way.

While this is a local effort that concentrates on the needs of our specific community, it also reflects a new trend in education toward creating more community centered schools.

According to Amy Dean in the current issue of YES! Magazine, "Around the country, public schools are reestablishing

teachers as partners in a child's learning and development."

New programs initiated by teachers are creating relationships with parents to ensure school success.

The Children's Reading Foundation of Doña Ana County (CRF-DA) is a community-driven, countywide project that promotes the message "Read with a child every day" and focuses on improving literacy throughout Doña Ana County. The column promotes literacy by offering ideas for family activities, featuring community projects, and exploring local resources that help children succeed. That was a sobering thought, and made me mentally slap myself back into reality, that this wasn't so bad. It may be hard, but it isn't that bad. Just keep going, and remember Bataan.



Daily cat adoptions are available at both PetCo, 3050 E. Lohman Ave., and Pet's Barn, 1600 S. Valley Drive.

The Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley also offers low-cost spay/neuter operations at the rate of \$35 for dogs and \$25 for cats. Appointments can be scheduled by calling the shelter offices.


