# Munson to close for | Compromise eyed for repairs, renovations

By Todd G. Dickson

The City of Las Cruces will be closing the Munson Center starting Saturday, Aug. 30, through most likely the end of the year for upgrades and expansion of the nearly 40-yearold senior center, with most of its services being temporarily relocated to other centers.

The main objective of the work is to install an improved and safer – heating,

ventilation and conditioning (HVAC) system, said David Dollahon, the city's director of community and cultural services.

Last year, the Munson Center was shut down after high levels of carbon monoxide were found in the building. Dollahon said the culprit was the center's antiquated boiler system. In researching the

# Try us, you'll like us

We have a saying around here at the Bulletin: "Life is Good in Las Cruces." If you talk with people around the state, and even around the country, and they're familiar with Las Cruces, almost universally, they like it.

Unfortunately, as much as we love our community, plenty of people out there are still clueless as to the great qualities of Las Cruces.

A recent survey of citizens in Albuquerque demonstrated that those who had been to Las Cruces were quite fond of it. Those who had not been here, however, were wildly misinformed. Thinking it was six hours away, right on the Mexico border and other inaccuracies.

The Las Cruces Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Las Cruces Convention Center have been working to correct those misconceptions the best way possible: Getting people to come to Las Cruces and experiencing it.

In the past year, the Convention Center, which opened in 2010, has accelerated its activity. Nine conventions in those 12 months have generated almost 6,000 hotel room nights and lots of people experiencing our fair city.

"We are coming of age as a destination," said Philip San Filippo, executive director of the Las Cruces CVB. The convention center, which has earned overwhelmingly positive reviews by convention attendees, has helped "showcase the city," San Filippo said.

Food is one of the center's most popular features and it comes out of a beautiful kitchen with a great chef, Tom Agius.

There are some great details at the convention center. Great coffee, for one. The center recently upgraded its wi-fi, which is increasingly important to convention attendees. The new wi-fi is both faster and less expensive, Convention Center General Manager Rebecca Bolton said. The savings on service more than covered the expense of the installation, she said.

One missing link is the lack of an attached or adjacent hotel. That, however, is coming. In the meantime, Las Cruces has other attributes. I don't know if you've looked around lately, but we're actually experiencing a halfway decent monsoon season. That brings some amazing cloud formations complementing our most unique geological feature, the Organ Mountains.

There's something else helping to showcase Las Cruces: the people who live here. Often, tourists and visitors are more likely than residents to engage and interact with local citizens. When they do, they typically will have positive encounters. We really are good folks. Las Crucens are as a rule nice and friendly. Plus, we usually do a good job of helping visitors, and giving them good ideas and ways to experience the uniqueness of our Mesilla Valley.

The more people visit Las Cruces, the more people will like it. They'll spread the word and, in time, we'll have more conventions, more tourists and more economic activity. Because once you spend a day or two here, you'll realize Life is Good in Las Cruces.

### **Voter suppression**

Local radical tea party groups are crazily pressing Las Cruces and Doña Ana County for photo voter ID.

We have 113,083 eligible voters in Doña Ana County. Based on an Ohio study, as well as others, photo voter IDs will probably cost taxpayers \$13 per person in Doña Ana County. That will be almost \$1.5 million added to the county budget. So the tea party irresponsibly wants to raise our taxes when there is absolutely no voter fraud.

However, I am sure the tea party's goal is solely to get rid of voters. Nationally, an estimated 11 percent of U.S. citizens without a current government photo ID are disproportionately poor, elderly, minorities or young adults. The bottom line is voter suppression and disfranchisement.

In New Mexico, an analysis shows that the voter photo ID, if imposed on the state, would likely cost taxpayers more than \$1.8 million per year, or \$5.5 million over the next three years.

Regarding voter ID, Paul Weyrich, a co-founder of ALEC (American Legislative Exchange Council) made that group's agenda clear as long ago as 1980, when he spoke to a group of religious conservatives. "I don't want everybody to vote," Weyrich said. "Our leverage in the elections quite candidly goes up as the voting populace goes down."

If the true purpose, danger and expense of this hideous photo voter ID were better understood, it would become clear that the cost – to democracy in New Mexico and to our wallets – is far too high. Hopefully, our elected officials will be disgusted by this unnecessary proposal!

In an instant, it was just like what had happened in her life 20 years ago. The good advice was once again being rejected.

"I can't go back to school," she said. "It is too late for

"But you have at least 20 or more years working," I protested. "The education you get this year will get you a much better job."

She replied evasively, "Maybe I can find a nice man to

Finding a nice man and having kids was what she told me started her problems since she dropped out of school, got married and had kids. She shambled away before we could talk further. She wore no ring, so the early marriage may not have endured. And, I am sure she found, when you marry the wrong person, they are also the wrong person to divorce.

I am not unduly picking on this person, nor do I think she is a victim of anything but her own actions. We should make this woman the poster child for the consequences of making bad choices.

Truth be told, I was writing newspaper columns 20 years ago about the value of education. This woman ignored good advice then and now. Unfortunately, she is

# Designing your future

Who will be the next great architect? Will they be prolific in design and construction like the American architect Frank Lloyd Wright? His projects were admired and lauded by many. However he knew that one must exercise caution in design. He once warned architects, "The physician can bury his mistakes, but the architect can only advise his clients to plant vines" (New York Times, October 4, 1953).

Or maybe they will take the form of one of the great architects in New Mexico such as Antone Predock who was the architect for Petco Park, the Major League Baseball Park in San Diego, and the New National Stadium Japan, Ascending Sky Park. Regardless who is their role model, there are many elements to master before being a successful architect.

Architects have expertise in many subjects as illustrated by Leonardo Da Vinci, who was an artist, painter, engineer and scientist and was recognized as a great architect. Da Vinci was knowledgeable and promoted ideas, concepts and designs in technology, science, engineering and mathematics. In addition to these STEM requirements, architects must understand history, design, culture and trends of modern society, such as sustainability.

The next great architect may get his or her start at Doña Ana Community College (DACC). The two-year Pre-Architecture associate degree program is known for its small classes, great instructors, collaborative projects and challenging course work. Also, the support of local architectural firms gives students a perspective they might not get at a larger institution.

Like Da Vinci, the first two years at DACC will bring many disciplines together to further the knowledge of the students and prepare them for the competitiveness of a four-year program. Art, computer-aided design, architectural drawing and drafting, green building, sustainability, building information modeling and portfolio development all help students toward their degrees. A diverse and comprehensive portfolio developed with professors and local architects can provide a pathway to an architecture baccalaureate degree.

As with many disciplines at DACC there is a student club that helps students become immersed in their major.

The American Institute of Architecture Students club promotes excellence in architecture education, training and practice, and fosters an appreciation of architecture and related disciplines. Students provide service to the community through residential design services and acquire professional skills by attending national conferences.

Wendy Quiñonez Natividad graduated from DACC with an associate's degree in architecture and went on to earn both a bachelor's and master's degree. She is a LEED Accredited Professional with a Building Design & Construction Specialty. She works with Studio D, a local architectural firm. She has worked on several projects in and around Las Cruces, including Bank '34, Early College High School, Citizen's Bank and Jason's Deli.

The next time you enter a building and are amazed at how beautiful the architecture is, don't be surprised if the architect started their career at DACC.

# Letter to the editor Ferguson response

On Aug. 9, Michael Brown, unarmed and holding his hands up in surrender, was shot and killed by a police officer.

His death and actions by the Ferguson Police Department is a distressing symptom of the untested and overaggressive policing culture that has become commonplace in minority communities for too long. The death of yet another African-American at the hands of those sworn to protect and serve the community where he lived is heartbreaking.

The question was asked: "What should you do if someone slaps you on the cheek?" The answer was given: "Turn the other cheek."

The question was asked, "How many times should you turn the other cheek? "The answer was given: "Seventy times seven."

But the mothers of Brown, of Trayvon Martin, of Ben Chaney, Andrew Goodman, Michael Schwerner, Emmett Till and countless known and unknown others, might well ask: "Have we not yet reached seventy times seven?"

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King was a follower of Gandhi, and non-violence. He advocated for change without violence. He advocated civil disobedience. He was assassinated.

Fortunately, there are still followers of Martin Luther King who are calling for calm and protesting peaceably.

The Ferguson police department has responded with military equipment suited for and designed for war.

The profiling, assaulting and murdering of unarmed people of color in this country by police – for any reason – must be outlawed.

The NAACP and our allies will not stand down until accountability and justice in cases of police misconduct are served for Michael Brown and the countless other men and women who lost their lives to such police discrimination.

We also call on those we have elected to office to become our partners in the fight for equality and fairness. For now is the time to ensure that all communities can live safely – both safe from violence at the hands of criminals and at the hands of a few police.

It is time to stop. It is time for sober and appropriate action. This is not a call for violence. Rather, it is a call to reason and for an honorable investigation and application of law.

# Border Network walks 100 miles for immigration reform, DACA

The Border Network for Human Rights (BNHR) gathered Thursday, Aug. 21, through Sunday, Aug. 24, to march in the 100 Mile Border Walk for Our Children and Our Dignity, which started in Las Cruces and ended in El Paso.

BNHR members walked to send a message against border militarization and deployment of the National Guard in their communities, to Texas Gov. Rick Perry and to call for border enforcement accountability.

Founded in 1998, BNHR is an advocacy and immigration reform organization located at the United States and Mexico border. BNHR has over 7,000 members in southern New Mexico and west Texas.

The walkers urged the Obama administration to keep immigrant families united through the deferred action program, serving more than 11 million undocumented individuals already in the US

Among the 21 BNHR members who walked the 100 miles, 11 core members walked for immigration reform and deferred action for all. Five walkers represented the voices of more than 50,000 unaccompanied minors seeking refuge in the U.S. The final five walkers represented 500 migrant deaths at the border each year.

The 100 Mile Walk for Our Children and Our Dignity kicked off on Thursday in Las Cruces at Congressman Steve Pearce's office.

BNHR rallied there to ask the congressman to publicly explain his vote on Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and ask for safeguard at the Artesia detention facility.

Though the congressman was not at his

office during the rally, the voices of many children and BNHR members were heard by Pearce's staff.

BNHR Executive Director Fernando Garcia was arrested by Las Cruces police for being on private property. The sidewalk and parking lot outside the congressman's Las Cruces office had been the location for similar demonstrations and protests in the past without police making arrests.

According to a statement released by BNHR, Garcia said he felt the charges

against him were inappropriate.

Garcia was released shortly after being arrested and BNHR continued the walk. In Anthony, N.M., BNHR members gathered at Saint Anthony's Catholic Church to exchange letters from children at the border to children in the detention facilities.


On Friday, Aug. 22, BNHR members rallied at Congressman Beto O'Rourke's office in El Paso to express their gratitude for his leadership and encourage him to continue fighting for better border policies that reflect human rights for all. Gathering in the evening at the fence in Chamizal, BNHR held a vigil against the National Guard and militarization of the border.

On Saturday, Aug. 23, members re-

leased symbols for children and border migrant deaths as well as held a town hall meeting. BNHR ended the walk by joining Mexicanos en el Exilio at the Santa Fe International Bridge, in downtown El Paso, where they presented personal testimonies of the consequences of the brutal violence occurring in Mexico.

According to a press release from BNHR, close to 26,000 Mexicans have been high jacked and disappeared by corrupt and criminal forces, and more than 100,000 people have been killed in the last few years. Those Mexicans seeking political asylum in the United States have been rejected at a 98 percent rate.

Walkers also ended the event with a protest against children and immigrant families held in detention facilities.







# Ice bucket challenge delux NMSU freshman gets 1 of 11 national Hispanic scholarships

New Mexico State University freshman Mariah Garcia of Albuquerque is one of 11 high school graduates nationwide to receive the John S. Martinez Scholarship from the National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislators (NHCSL).

The Del Norte High School graduate was presented the \$3,000 scholarship by state Sen. Daniel Ivey-Soto, District 15, at the NMSU-Albuquerque Center prior to her departure to Las Cruces for her first semester.

The John S. Martinez Scholarship is a collaboration of NHCSL, the Council of State Governments, Comcast Media Technology Corp. and Hispanic state legislators. It is part of NHCSL's "Closing the Educational Achievement Gap" Initiative, which has the goal to create meaningful learning opportunities and experiences for Hispanic students.

"In memory of Connecticut state Rep. John S. Martinez, who was president of the NHCSL in 2001-02, this scholarship awards students who demonstrate leadership and dedication to their community, just as Rep. Martinez did throughout his political career," said Ivey-Soto, a member of the NHCSL who presented

the scholarship check to Garcia.

"It's an honor to present this check to Mariah, especially since her high school is in my district. We want to encourage outstanding young people like Mariah to continue their education, because they are our future leaders."

Garcia said the one-time scholarship of \$3,000 will be added to the 10 other scholarships she received to pay for her education.

The daughter of Barbara Garcia has not declared a major emphasis for her degree work, but said she wants to go into a profession that helps people, possibly with hearing impairments.

Public service is a vital part of Garcia's life. In the scholarship application essay, she shared what public service means to her.

The recipient of the Albuquerque Public School Foundation's Selfless Senior honor encouraged her classmates to be involved in public service.

"We created a community service committee where my classmates worked with Roadrunner Food Bank," Garcia said of her work while senior class president.

# Garcia vote challenge

A district court judge Friday, Aug. 22, refused to throw out disputed absentee ballots in the House District 34 race that saw challenger Bill Gomez edge past state Rep. Mary Helen Garcia by 16 votes in the June Democratic Party primary.



"The outcome of the election is Garcia not overturned," 3rd Judicial District Judge Jim Martin ruled after

hearing a day of testimony, the New Mexico Watchdog reported.

Since there isn't a Republican in the District 34 race, Gomez will take the seat when the state Legislature convenes its upcoming 60-day session in January 2015. New Mexico Watchdog reported that Chris Saucedo, Garcia's attorney, said they'll appeal to the New Mexico Supreme Court.

"We won, that's all I have to say," Gomez told New Mexico Watchdog by telephone shortly after the verdict was announced. At issue were more than 40 absentee ballots cast in two precincts in Sunland Park. a town inside Doña Ana County with a reputation for political controversy.

Garcia claimed that a number of the absentee ballots were fraudulently cast and a hand-writing expert testified on Garcia's behalf Friday, questioning the validity of many of the signatures on the ballots.

Garcia lost the absentee balloting in the two Sunland Park precincts to Gomez 82-8, so if the judge decided to throw out at least 17 of the votes, Garcia would win.

But by the end of a hearing that took the entire day, Martin said he was persuaded by depositions from voters who insisted they had indeed signed the ballots.

best way to remedy the problem, he said the best solution was to replace the old chiller and boiler HVAC system with independent, roof-based units, which will make repairs easier. If one unit needs to be taken offline for repairs, he said the other units can still keep the building reasonably cool or warm, depending on the time of year.

"These package units will be much more energy efficient, as well," Dollahon said.

Because the units will be installed on the roof, new roofing and ductwork will be installed, Dollahon said. Installation of roofing material includes a period in which the process will require some toxic chemicals to be used – the primary reason to shut down the center during the work.

The HVAC upgrade also provided the opportunity to expand the center. Pool tables that, in the past, have taken up a portion of the center's lobby will be moved into a new pool room, Dollahon said. This will give the center more flexibility for events and activities to held in the lobby, he said.

During the renovation work, most of services provided at the center – located at 975 S. Mesquite St. – will be moved to other city centers. The Eastside Community Center, 310 N. Tornillo Ave., will pick up many of the services, but the Henry Benavidez Community Center, 1045 McClure Road, and the Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center, 304 Bell Ave., also will be providing services, as well as the Regional Aquatic Center, 401 Hadley Ave.

Dollahon said the city is aiming to keep the same days and times for activities.

The only Munson service that the city won't be able to temporarily relocate, Dollahon said, is the art program. Munson Center has a large arts and crafts workshop that would be too difficult to simply move to another location, he said.

Activities being moved from Munson to the Eastside center are enhanced fitness, Tai Chi, line dancing,

bridge, euchre, canasta, mah jongg, hands-n-feet and new temporary home. pinochle.

Activities being moved to the Benavidez center are monthly dance, PVA, bingo, GRG support group, basic computer instruction, AARP board meetings, conversational Spanish and creative writing.

Activities being moved to the Papen center are the new beginnings support group, Al Galves presentations, SPAB, Senior Programs new member orientation, the community garden, SPAB work sessions, low vision support group, stroke support group, intermediate Spanish and chess.

The Aquatic Center will hold the zumba gold classes on its second floor, but the book club has yet to find its

Dollahon said staff hopes to have the work done by December, but Munson probably won't open before January 2015.


"The contractor is facing a pretty tight schedule," he said. "We want to reopen as soon as possible."



such as a sanctuary.

and vaccinated before releasing them back to their turf.
Some city residents see feral and free-roaming cats as a nuisance and contributing factor to property damage. City Councillor Nathan Small has said he believed an urban environment called for a more enclosed and controlled way of caring for free-roaming cat colonies,

In the work session, Deputy City Attorney Marcy Driggers reviewed the variety of options available, which ranged from no change – in which people who feed or care for wild cats are breaking the law – to allowing both cat colonies and sanctuaries.

Most councillors said they were willing to allow both, but only on a trial basis with the ordinance to sunset after five to eight years. Most councillors, however, want a method for monitoring the care being given at the colonies and sanctuaries through a permitting and inspection process similar to commercial kennel requirements.

Small said he still had concerns about the cat colonies; primarily that most feral cats don't live long – an average of two years – so long as there is permitting process and monitoring in place, he said.

"If there are no permits, we've opened up more opportunities for harm," he said. "With no oversight, we are truly opening a Pandora's Box."

Councillor Ceil Levatino said she had similar concerns about cat sanctuaries in that she has seen many media reports of inner-city sanctuaries being shut down because of deplorable conditions. Cat sanctuar-

ies can result in animal hoarding, she said. Levatino said the sanctuaries should be regularly inspected, as are commercial kennels in the city.

Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, executive director of the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV), said most cats captured in order to be spayed or neutered will likely be taken to the ASCMV because the shelter provides the lowest cost for performing the procedures. She said ASCMV would be able to keep track of who the cat colony managers are and could share those records with animal control.

"In order for this to work is through compromising and transparency," Vesco-Mock said. "The end goal is to reduce the cat population and not punish people who are trying to care for these animals."

The current approach has done nothing to reduce the number of cats that have been euthanized at ASCMV. Since she arrived at ASCMV in May 2008, more than 25,000 cats have been killed because most of them are too wild to be house cats.

City Councillor Olga Pedroza said she wished the lawsuit in Albuquerque, questioning whether that city's change to allow people to manage feral cat colonies violates state law, had already been resolved. The state law requires municipalities to capture and dispose of wild animals. Driggers said a recent hearing was rescheduled, but no matter which way a state district judge rules, the issue will likely be appealed.

# Aggie freshman running back named to preseaon award list

# Make practice a positive on the golf course

Many golfers attach an emotionally negative connotation to the idea of practice.

The whole idea of practicing golf seems to evoke images of Ben Hogan "digging it out of the dirt" until dark, exhausted and with his hands bleeding. Hogan spent nearly all his noncompeting waking hours practicing golf.

Yes, practice can be overdone. Old-time pro golfer Jerry Barber once remarked, "They might be able to beat me, but they can't outpractice me."

Still, practice doesn't need to be drudgery.

In 2007, game-improvement experts Lynn Marriott and Pia Nilsson came out with a book titled "The Game Before the Game," in which they report there are several versions or patterns of practice.

Marriott and Nilsson base their entire concept of practice on the premise that playing golf and practicing golf are inseparable: "The joy is found not in the destination, but rather in the pursuit. Practice is part of the process, it is part of golf," they write.

There are three types of practice.

They are warm-up practice,
maintenance practice and preparation

practice. Warm-up is what you do before the round, no matter whether it's a fun round with friends or a competitive round that counts.

Our pros tell us the perfect warmup is a 30-minute session to hit a limited variety of shots, including drivers, medium irons and 50-yard pitches, while paying very close attention to tempo. Maintenance is the kind of practice "you do to keep your swing and your game performing efficiently," Marriott and Nilsson write.

Maintenance practice brings into play all of the five dimensions of playing golf: physical, technical, mental,

emotional and social. In other words, we need to practice everything.

Marriott and Nilsson offer these quick tips (slightly paraphrased here). Think of your

golf swing as a fine machine that needs careful and continual maintenance. Strive for a reliably repeatable swing; and through practice you can bring a greater measure of repeatability to your play.

Last, there is preparation-type practice, which can encompass fusing the practice area together with the golf course. You do this either by creative and disciplined practice or by playing actual on-course practice rounds and holes.

This practice includes developing new skills – new shots, different variations or perhaps making a swing change.

Golf swings are like politics and the economy: Things change, sometimes when you least expect them to. One day we think we have it, the next day we shake our heads in disbelief. Marriott and Nilsson call preparation "evolution with a purpose."

"While change is inevitable," they advise, "growth is optional. Practice is intentional growth."

Preparation also involves getting ready for a specific event in the future. This type of practice may not mean spending gobs of hours on the range or the green. It may mean working to become stronger or more flexible and perhaps more mentally tough.

"The point of practice is to play better, not to hit the most balls," our teachers counsel.

The practice ground is also the perfect place to work on your mental game. If you don't have a solid and secure pre-shot routine that you use every time on the golf course, identify a comfortable rehearsal and preswing method and practice it until it becomes habit.

Executing your pre-shot routine is really the only sure way to overcome nervous jitters during competition.

According to Marriott and Nilsson, you can do your mental planning and thinking in what they call the "think zone," which is a space 3 yards or so behind the ball. But when you step into the "play zone" as you take your stance and address the ball, you have to turn your brain and your thinking off.

On the practice tee, try to work on separating the

# Domenici Hall grand opening set for Sept. 17

# New building to house classrooms, public policy institute

ting the finishing touches on New Mexico State University's newest building, Pete V. Domenici Hall, and a grand opening reception is slated for next month.

The reception will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 17, at the building, which is located at 3014 McFie Circle, in the center of campus. Doors will open at 4:30 p.m., and the program will begin at 5:15 p.m. The grand opening festivities are part of the 2014 Domenici Public Policy Conference, set for Sept. 17 and 18 at the Las Cruces Convention Center, 680 E. University

Crews broke ground on the project in April 2013, repurposing and expanding the university's Hershel Zohn Theatre to become the 40,000-square-foot Pete V. Domenici Hall. The Hershel Zohn building was originally home to NMSU's theater arts program, which moved to the university's new Center for the Arts building at the corner of University Avenue and Espina Street in December 2012.

Pete V. Domenici Hall will have one of the few large auditoriums on campus, funded through a significant contribution from the PY Foundation. led by Peyton Yates of Artesia. in honor of his parents. Yates served as an Executive in Residence in NMSU's College of Business and received an honorary doctorate from NMSU in 2010. The S.P. and Estelle Yates Theater will seat about 240 people, and feature equipment and connectivity to allow for seamless integration of learning technology in the classroom.

The El Paso Electric Classroom is equipped for advanced, high-definition video conferencing, allowing students enrolled in online courses to have the same real-time learning experience as their classmates attending in person.

College of Business alum Bobby Lutz, who is also a former Executive in Residence, and his wife, Rebecca, contributed to a main floor lecture hall with fully automated touch panel control and the same

Construction crews are put-smart setup podium as will be found in the Yates Theater. The Rebecca and Bobby Lutz Lecture Hall is connected to the Yates Theater to allow it to serve as overflow seating for that auditorium.

> The couple's business, G.L. Seaman & Co., worked with NMSU to design several lounge and study areas in the main and upper floor atrium spaces to benefit students. The company then supplied and delivered all of the furniture as an inkind donation.

> Pete V. Domenici Hall is the third building in the College of Business, and Dean Jim Hoffman said the state-of-the-art facility presents exciting opportunities, particularly for the business graduate students. who'll have office space that wasn't available before.

> "This is the kind of environment where students can connect to the tools that will enhance their learning," he said. "The graduate students and faculty members moving in here will have a space that's beautiful and functional.'

While occupants will begin moving in this month, classes will begin in the building in the spring semester. During the fall, classrooms and other spaces in the building will be used for meetings, seminars and other events.

The building will also house the Domenici Institute for Public Policy, named for retired U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici and founded in 2008. The institute hosts an annual public policy conference and various public policy forums and sponsors public policy research projects. Its mission is to deliver timely scientific analyses and educational opportunities to frame the debate and development of public policy.

NMSU President Garrev Carruthers, who is director of the Domenici Institute and a former dean of the College of Business, said the building's significance is more than just high-tech bricks and mortar.

"This building honors the legacy of Senator Domenici and all he's contributed to New

Mexico and to our university," Carruthers said. "He's meant a great deal to our state and its people."

Funding for Pete V. Domenici Hall comes from a combination of federal, state and private funds, including a gift of \$1 million from Sunland Park Racetrack and Casino owner and NMSU supporter Stan Fulton earlier this year that helped fund completion of the build-

ing's construction. Final cost of the project is estimated at just over \$12.6 million.

The NMSU Art Department designed a display in the building's atrium that will recognize donors to the College of Business "500 for \$500" fundraising campaign, and will be unveiled at the September reception.



# Mediation program boasts 80 percent success rate

Each year, more than 800 lawsuits filed in the Third Judicial District Court are sent to mediation in hopes of helping the parties come to a mutually agreeable outcome without having to go to trial.

In about 80 percent of the cases, the mediation process succeeds. In fact, the Third Judicial District Court's mediation program is a model for court systems statewide.

Lisa Betancourt oversees the Third Judicial District's Alternate Dispute Resolution Program, which contracts with five domestic mediators and 11 settlement facilitators, most of whom are retired judges or

attorneys whose fees are negotiated by the parties on a case-by-case basis. Of the five domestic mediators, Betancourt said two are fully bilingual.

Mediators in the State of New Mexico are trained and certified. Mediation trainings are offered at the state level three times each year. Each 40-hour mediation training is offered over two weekends – during fall, spring and summer semesters – and combines law students with community members, including lawyers, judges, therapists, law enforcement officers, managers from private and public entities and others from diverse backgrounds who want to have a com-

mand of how to understand and manage conflict constructively.

The course is designed to improve the negotiation skills and knowledge of participants and hands-on methods are used to introduce, model and allow students to try best mediation practices. The class draws on experienced mediators who serve as coaches for students as they engage in simulated mediations. Advanced courses are offered annually through the University of New Mexico School of Law.

The Third Judicial District Court program is divided into three areas: Domestic, Civil and Water. The domestic and civil divisions collectively account for approximately 800 cases each year, while the water division has handled up to 200, Betancourt said.

Most of the cases that end up in domestic mediation involve custody disputes and contested divorces. If a child is involved, then the mediator makes it clear from the outset – and continually reminds the parties – that the best interests of the child must come first. Betancourt said that in these cases, the mediator is essentially the architect of a parenting plan that considers a range of factors including the child's age and developmental state, whether the parents live in close or distant proximity and the ability of the two parents to communicate with one another about scheduling and logistics. Betancourt said the court staff does "a lot of hand-holding" to assist the estranged couples through the program, answering questions and sending out appointment reminders all the way through the process.

Betancourt said all participants in domestic mediation must successfully complete a four-hour parent-education class before mediation will begin. Once the class is completed by both parents, then mediation is scheduled. Betancourt said that once the actual mediation session gets underway, the first challenge for the mediator is to dispense with any personal agendas in play and reach a common understanding that the best interests of the child will be the only considerations during the subsequent two-to-five hours of discussion.

"That's a real eye-opener for most of these people," she said. "The mediator first breaks down any expectations they might have, then facilitates a discussion oriented toward identifying workable solutions that have the least harmful psychological and environmental impacts on the child. In most cases, they leave the session with a mutually acceptable plan for custody and visitation going forward."

Although the comparative success rates for mediation in domestic and civil cases are about the same – 80 percent – Betancourt said the comparison ends there.

"No two civil cases are ever alike," she said, noting that cases include disputes between neighbors about property lines, real-estate transactions gone sour, fore-closures, personal injury, breach of contract, etc. "You just can't imagine some of the cases we see come through here," she said.

Betancourt said that no matter the nature of the case or the high emotions that swirl around litigants by the time a lawsuit has been filed, the mediation process is a proven pathway to avoid trial and the expenses associated with discovery and depositions.

She said civil cases are further complicated by the sheer size of the case files related to legal pleadings, extension requests and supporting documents.

# Neighbors We've Lost


### BARBARA FUNKHOUSER

Barbara Funkhouser, a journalism pioneer, died Aug. 15 at the age of 84. She was the only female editor of the El Paso Times in the newspaper's 133-year history, serving from 1980 to 1986. She began her career in 1958 as a freelancer for a year, then worked for the Las

then worked for the Las Cruces Sun-News for a year before joining the staff of the El Paso Times.

She also wrote the coffee-table book, "The Caregivers: El Paso's Medical History, 1898-



Her father Kenneth Funkhouser died when she was 6, and her mother, Lucille and stepfather, Leon "Sparks" Tatreault ran the farm with help of hired labor until their deaths. Her brother, Kenneth, Jr. died in the early 1950s.

She graduated from Las Cruces Union High School and from New Mexico State University in 1952 where she was a member of Zeta Tau Alpha sorority. She spent six months in Europe on a 4-H Club exchange program and then worked for five years for the 4-H organization in Washington, D. C., and Chicago, before returning to New Mexico and beginning her career as a journalist. She also participated in early discussions with Gannett Company in the development of USA Today.

She retired from the El Paso Times on June 1, 1990 but continued to work in her journalism field, teaching courses at New Mexico State University and writing editorials for the Las Cruces Sun-News.

She remained active in the community and was a founding board member of the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum. She continued running Tatreault Vineyard on her family farm until her death. She

is survived by three cousins, Phyllis Denton, Gordon Denton and Claire Shervanick, all of Las Cruces.

In Las Cruces, he had appeared in numerous community theater performances including "Still Life with Iris," "Children! Children!" and "Waiting for Godot," as well as plays at Oñate High School. He was a long-time volunteer for the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley, walking adoptable dogs at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market on Saturdays with his grandfather. Jackson was also a budding guitarist.

Jackson was beloved by his family, teachers, classmates, fellow thespians and former co-workers at Andele's Dog House. He was on his way toward his next big ad-

venture in life and was as happy as a young man could have been. Just hours before his death, he had participated in the ceremony that made him an official William Woods University student. He had connected with a campus theater group and was planning for a script-reading the following week, and had already checked out his first recreational book from the university library.

Jackson had a big smile and an even bigger heart, with a capacity to make friends with everyone he met. He will be missed by the people closest to him, but also by those who knew him only casually.

Jackson is survived by his father, Keith Whelpley and Rachel Schneider of Las Cruces, N.M.; his mother, Susie Eichstaedt-Ouderkirk and Mike Ouderkirk of Fulton,

Mo.; his sister, Lanie Whelpley of Las Cruces, N.M.; his maternal grandfather, Carl Eichstaedt of Las Cruces, N.M., and countless aunts, uncles, cousins and animals. He is preceded in death by his maternal grandmother, Donna Eichstaedt; paternal grandmother, Therese Whelpley, and paternal grandfather, Donald Whelpley.

### Innovative drug court programs reclaims lives, reunites families

Problem-solving courts are in the business of scraping children, adults and families from the rock-bottom abyss of alcohol and drug-related misery, and then showing them a way forward through a rigorous and tested series of programs.

Administered since 1997 at the Third Judicial District Court, the Drug Court programs represent an ongoing success story of lives changed for the better. They are managed by David Borunda, a veteran law-enforcement officer with additional experience in the state's Department of Children Youth and Families. He is assisted by a program manager, a surveillance lead worker, four surveillance

officers and two contracted treatment providers – Nava Counseling and Families and Youth, Inc.

Each of the court's eight judges see their fair share of cases in which addictions and abuse related to alcohol, prescription medications and illegal narcotics have split apart families, torn children from school and society and propelled adults into criminal behavior. Offenders who have been convicted of violent felonies, drug trafficking or drug distribution are not eligible.

The Third Judicial District's Drug Court programs are alternate-sentencing mechanisms for individuals and families for whom the judges see a glimmer of hope for recovery. No one gets into the program without a judge's referral, and once they're in, they're both regularly and randomly monitored and tested for compliance while they work their ways through whichever program they've been assigned.

"I have been involved with Drug Courts since 2001" said Judge Darren Kugler, "and it has given me the opportunity to see a Court work in a very different way – a non-traditional way – by helping troubled litigants deal with the crippling effects of drug and alcohol addiction. Joining the Third Judicial District Drug Court earlier this year as a judge presiding over a drug court completes the circle

since I have previously served as a both an assistant public defender and an assistant district attorney in drug courts."

In any given calendar year, Borunda said the Drug Court Program can accommodate 42 juveniles, 38 adults and 18 families trying to reunify.

Both juveniles and adults taken in to the program face a 52-week program divided into four phases, each of which involves monthly court appearances, random evening and weekend surveillance, treatment sessions and random urinalysis and Breathalyzer testing. Violations of the program's rules can range from curfew and house arrest to community service and jail time.

# City embraces 'Fantastic' opportunity Feature film crew sets up shop in Picacho Hills

The mysterious yellow signs with CF in big, black letters that appeared the week of Aug. 18 directed motorists up Picacho Hills Drive to parking spots for crew.

More CF signs signaled a right turn at Via Norte and another right at Vista de Oro

There, in a residential neighborhood, a New Mexico film truck and a catering truck were parked.

In the yard, crew members were setting up tents. Two men were constructing a Styrofoam tombstone inside the

open garage of a home.

Who are these "Fantastic" people? And what does their appearance mean to Las Cruces?

They are Electric City Entertainment and ShivHans Pictures, the film makers producing "Captain Fantastic."

The film stars Academy Award Best Actor Nominee Viggo Mortensen ("A History of Violence," "The Road," "Lord of the Rings," "Eastern Promises") as an idealistic father of six who tries to assimilate back into society after living "off the grid" in the forests of the Pacific Northwest for 10 years. Starring opposite Mortensen is three-time Tony

Award winner and Academy Award nominee Frank Langella ("Frost Nixon," "Robot & Frank," "Superman Returns").

What they mean to Las Cruces is direct and indirect economic impact, and the possibility that after the film's release tourists will be drawn to the area to see the locations where "Captain Fantastic" was filmed.

Gary Camarano, city economic development coordinator, said the company filmed in the Masonic Cemetery, Tapestry Circle in Mesilla, at Shorty's gas

station and along Interstate 10, as well as in Picacho Hills.

He said local businesses assisting with the project included a security firm, a company that rents tents and retailers that sold materials. Hotels and restaurants benefited from the visit as well.

"Everything went very smoothly," Camarano said. "Everyone was very happy with the cooperation they received from Las Cruces, Mesilla, the county and the state."

Louise Runge, line producer for the New Mexico shoot said: "The city has been helpful to our production efforts and the area has a wide variety of locations and resources. I hope the production adds as much to Las Cruces as it is adding to the film."

"We've tapped into the local talent pool and local businesses for assistance in the filming process," said Location Manager Deborah Wakshull. "Having an asset like New Mexico State University's Creative Media Institute and other businesses that assisted us made Las Cruces a perfect location for filming. It's been great working here."

Camarano said the project came about because the filmmakers were

looking for a location that could pass for Phoenix. They chose New Mexico over Arizona because of state film incentives.

"Their scouting people contacted us," he said.

"Captain Fantastic" spent 11 days shooting in the state, mostly in southern New Mexico, wrapping Thursday, Aug. 28.

Cast and crew celebrated with members of the local community at a party Sunday, Aug. 24, at La Posta de Mesilla.

Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima thanked Tom and Jerean Hutchinson for their hospitality and presented director Matt Ross with a key to the city.

According to the New Mexico Film Office, "Captain Fantastic" employed at least 75 New Mexico crew members, a New Mexico actor and approximately 220 locals as background talent.

Although New Mexico's movie industry started in 1897 with the Edison Company filming "Indian School Day" at Isleta Pueblo, film is enjoying a recent growth spurt.

New Mexico hosted 25 productions of varying sizes in 2013, including several potentially lucrative television series pilots.

The state film office estimates the

productions accounted for \$204.5 million in direct economic impact and \$129.4 million in indirect impact the first three quarters of FY 2014. The industry employed 1,940 directly and 1,530 indirectly. Localities took in \$5.3 million in taxes.

The jobs they bring to New Mexico are good ones - about \$20 an hour for technicians, according to Ann Lerner of the Albuquerque Film Of-

According to a July state film office report, production spending in 2013 in New Mexico totaled \$213.7 million

With plans to hire a part-time film liaison, the City of the Crosses intends to become a bigger presence in New Mexico's film scene.

"Captain Fantastic" could be the beginning of a growth spurt for film in Las Cruces

"Film production is a great way to promote Las Cruces, create jobs and bring outside dollars to the region, and the city will be stepping up its efforts to recruit more film production to the Las Cruces region," the mayor said.

He said according to New Mexico law all medical records must be preserved for at least 10 years before they may be destroyed. Minor children's records are kept for 21 years. Mammograms are permanent records.

From one hospital, the storage business grew to serve other medical facilities, as well as attorneys, banks and others who require storage security. Clients include Doña Ana County and White Sands Missile Range.

Currently some 10,000 linear feet of shelves are on site at 300 A N. Seventeenth St., Jackson said.

All types of micro media are stored.

"It's just another form of storage." Jackson said. "It's back up. What we do is protect identity. A lot of security measures are in place, including in transit."

Anyone who enters the office and warehouses is observed by 32 video cameras. Staff can watch every move made on the premises from their computers and other devices,

including cell phones. Guard dogs patrol. In addition to these and other security measures, the warehouses are equipped with climate control as well as fire and insect protection.

Jackson said he started with one part-time staffer. The staff of 17 now handles from 400 to 500 records each day, Jackson said, locating any record in less than four minutes.

"New laws and regulations have kept us growing," he said."We're still growing."

Along the way, American Document Services built two additional warehouses. As demand grows, he'll just keep building more, Jackson said.

"We get people with one box," Jackson said. "They're all equally important. We treat every client exactly the same, whether they have 5,000 boxes or five boxes."





# Project Mainstreet finds support in foundation

When Russ Smith needed a fiscal agent to handle donations and event fees for the newly created Project Mainstreet, he knew exactly where to go: the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico.

Project Mainstreet was created to encourage activity on Main Street Downtown, where in the past the Farmers & Crafts Market of Las Cruces,

SalsaFest!, special events and Doña Ana Arts Council happenings were the only consistent events.

In April, after a group of volunteers joined Smith to plan the future, the first Project Mainstreet event was held, and community members and friends were greeted with an outdoor movie and local food trucks. Every month since then, Project Mainstreet has held a variety of events, building community collaboration among residents, businesses and city facilities.

"Since we started, many different groups ask us, 'What can we do to help?" said Smith, mentioning a new-found relationship with the City of Las Cruces. Smith worked with city facilities on a light switch needed to turn off lights during nighttime movies.

"From the little things to the big things, we have seen an enormous amount of support from the community," he said.

This year, Project Mainstreet will coordinate the yearly Zombie Walk on behalf of the Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC), the organization that has coordinated it in the past at a time when they also coordinated their biggest event, the DAAC Renaissance Arts Faire. Another exciting event Smith and his Project Mainstreet volunteers are planning is a "chile drop" at midnight on New Year's Eve (stay tuned for details).

Smith is excited about future Project Mainstreet events, especially knowing the CFSNM is serving as a fiscal agent.

"It is so much easier to accept money for events and from donations when you have a 501(c)3 like the CFSNM behind you.
When you are under their umbrella, you can describe yourself formally

through that entity," Smith said.

# NMSU's student-run store opens

# Locally produced foods are in the spotlight

New Mexico State University's new studentrun store, what was once a small gelato operation tucked away on the third floor of Gerald Thomas Hall, has grown into a spacious retail operation on the ground floor, stocked with shelves of products made by NMSU students.

The store, Crimson Creations by ACES, marked its grand opening with a ribbon-cutting ceremony and celebration featuring tasty treats Wednesday, Aug. 20.

Regular store hours will be 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The shop will offer brownie mixes, blue cornbread mix and other items – along with ACES in the Hole Foods signature gelato.

In addition, refrigerators at Crimson Creations are stocked with floral arrangements from the floral judging team and fresh organic produce from the student research garden.

ACES in the Hole Foods company is a part of the curriculum in the

Food Science and Technology major in the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (ACES).

"We have been selling our products for almost two years now out of our kitchen lab that we use for classes for food science, so it hasn't really gotten the dry mixes out to the public very well," said Whitney Biel, an instructor who helped launch the ACES in the Hole Foods class in 2012 and manages the store's operation. "A lot of people have heard of our

gelatos and sorbets, but they had to come all the way up to the third floor to get them."

The new Crimson Creations by ACES storefront greets people as they walk through the lobby of Gerald Thomas Hall, making a pint of freshly made gelato much more easily accessible.

Customers can sit at one of the shop's tables to enjoy their gelato or sorbet.

Biel said she would like to add coffee and other offerings to give the store the feel of an ice cream parlor or café.

She said she hopes to bring in additional student products in the future.

The store gives the students' food science education an added dimension, as they discover what's involved with every step of the process, from creating recipe formulas and packaging them for sale to keeping their store stocked and interacting with customers, said Jim Libbin, associate dean and director of academic programs for the college.

Students in the course rotate through different jobs, including production, quality control, sanitation and marketing, and they'll also staff the store, Biel said.

They receive four credits for the course and put in 6.5 hours a week, making it more like an internship experience.

With the university's recently acquired liquor license for Gerald Thomas Hall, the store may eventually offer beer and wine produced on campus.

"Hopefully, with the demand that will come from the store, we'll draw more students to our food science program, so we can have a broader range of products we can offer," Biel said.

The space for the store, located off the southwest corner of the main lobby in Gerald Thomas, formerly housed part of a storage room and some offices. It was renovated

using the NMSU building repair and renewal funding.

Plans include using additional building funds to create a pilot plant in the nearby Tejada Building, which would allow students to make their products in greater quantities, Biel said.





# **WSIFF brings Hollywood home**

As attendees settle into their seats and the lights inside the four designated Allen Theatres Cineport 10 theaters go dark Wednesday, Sept. 3, the movies will begin to roll, kicking off the fiveday 2014 White Sands International Film Festival.

The festival began in Alamogordo in 2004 and moved to Las Cruces in 2009. Since then, WSIFF has taken off, bringing in industry legends, local and international filmmakers and moviegoing enthusiasts, all with the goal of showcasing what the area has to offer.

"We have a fantastic lineup scheduled for this year's festival, which I think is very appropriate considering it's our 10th anniversary," said WSIFF Artistic Director David Salcido. "In addition to an amazing selection of regional and international films, we also have an outstanding group of industry professionals coming in to facilitate workshops and share their expertise,

the return of the extremely popular 48-Hour Film Frenzy and the southern New Mexico premiere of Rajeev Nirmalakhandan's locally produced independent feature, 'The Odd Way Home.'

"This combination of local and outside talent has become a hallmark of the White Sands International Film Festival and I would like to believe closely aligns with the intentions of the festival's founders in Alamogordo."

This year, WSIFF, taking place Wednesday through Sunday, Sept. 3-7, will feature 76 films - 16 documentaries, seven feature films, 35 shorts, 16 student shorts and special screenings of "Buffalo" and "The Odd Way Home."

"This is your opportunity to see some really amazing independent films." said WSIFF Board President Rob Sharp. "They're a different than the normal offering you'll get at the movie theater. They're considered to be more artistic and give you something to think about.

"I'm looking most forward to the

opening night film, 'The Odd Way Home,' which was written by a local filmmaker and stars Bruce Willis' and Demi Moore's daughter, Rumer Willis. It is getting great reviews."

In addition to a plethora of film watching opportunities, the festival has other offerings. Along with its VIP parties, WSIFF will once again include the 48-Hour Film Frenzy workshops.

Producer/writer Kirk Ellis ("John Adams," "Into the West"), special effects wizard and puppeteer Mike McCormick ("Labyrinth," "Return of the Jedi") and cinematographer Michael Goi ("American Horror Story," "Glee") will present workshops from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 6, at the Doña Ana Community College East Mesa campus.

"We've come up with a greatly expanded group of workshops for filmmakers and interested community members," Sharp said. "These national leaders are going to convey the industry they know to our vibrant New Mexico community of filmmakers."

Local industry experts, including FX makeup artist and New Mexico State University graduate Timothy Sedillo, IATSE 480 and the Regional Film Development Advisory Council, will also hold workshops.

"With all the excitement surrounding the announcement of a new studio backlot to be built outside of Las Cruces and the city's recent hosting of the company producing Viggo Mortensen's next feature, 'Captain Fantastic,' it's clear that southern New Mexico is finally coming into its own as a player in the film industry," Salcido said. "I am extremely pleased to have the film festival positioned to help in this endeavor and to promote the film industry as it continues to grow and

"To advance that cause, we have two seminars scheduled alongside the workshops, one by the Regional Film Development Advisory Council, the other by IATSE Local 480, which should shed some light on the subject for those who are interested."

Returning for a second year, the 48-Hour Film Frenzy, held Saturday, Aug. 30, requires entrants to write, cast, shoot and edit a short film from scratch within a two-day period following specific creative tasks.

"This year, we added two competitive categories (middle school-high school and college-independent) to the 48-Hour Film Frenzy, and each has a \$300

prize," Sharp said.

All of the excitement will culminate during the WSIFF Awards Gala, held at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 5, at the Rio Grande Theatre on Main Street Downtown. During the show, which includes performances directed by Megan McQueen, awards will be presents to the Best Feature, Best Director, Best Documentary and Audience Choice.

# Comic Con brings pop culture to Cruces

For three days in September, the Las Cruces Convention Center will transform into a full-fledged pop culture spectacular featuring vendors, panels, celebrity guests, costume contest, fashion shows, cosplay, movies, gaming, a Nerd Rave, a pop culture-themed burlesque show and more as the inaugural Las Cruces Comic Con comes to town.

Zia Comics and other vendors will have these games for sale, too, if and when a new favorite is found.

Of course, it wouldn't be a true comic con without some elaborate costumes, and the Las Cruces Comic Con has this covered with a costume contest Sunday afternoon and cosplayers on hand throughout the weekend hosting panel sessions to give newbies advice.

The fun doesn't stop when the convention center closes, though. The Las Cruces Comic Con also includes two after-hours events, for those who want to keep the party

Friday night, Las Cruces' own Strangeluvs Burlesque & Variety will be performing a pop culture-themed burlesque show, featuring the sexiest superheroes and supervillains. On Saturday, El Paso DJ duo No Requests will spin the hottest tunes for the night's Nerd Rave.

The weekend will also feature panels with artists and featured guests, held in a Q-and-A format giving fans a chance to ask their idols those burning questions they've held for years.

Among this year's celebrity guests is martial artist and actor Ray Park, whose face you may not know but whose



The Las Cruces Comic Con is open from 6 to 9 p.m. Friday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and 11 a.m. to 6 p.m Sunday. The Friday night burlesque show begins at 9:30 p.m., and the Nerd Rave is from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. Saturday night.



## **NMFRHM** continues Culture Series in Sept.

There's a lot of history tucked away in the rugged beauty of the country's newest national monument.

For the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum's next Culture Series presentation, Las Crucen David Soules will talk about a number of the cultural and historical features within the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument. The presentation is at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 11, in the museum's theater. Admission is a suggested donation of \$2.

'Google Earth" will set the stage for aerial views of the Butterfield Trail and other historical sites within the monument boundaries. Soules' presentation will cover caves that once housed prehistoric fauna, petroglyphs and bedrock mortars from various Native American periods, the Bartlett-Conde Survey, Billy the Kid's hideout at Outlaw Rock, Civilian Conservation Corps work projects and World War II-era aerial targets. There also will be current and historical photos of many of these

Soules is a lifelong resident of Las Cruces, and is a product of the local school system, from grade school through graduate school. His childhood was enriched by picnics at Chavez Cave in the Robledo Mountains and La Cueva at the base of the Organs, along with self-styled cookouts and campouts in the arroyos of his backyard.

As a youth, Soules raised steers purchased from ranches near Lookout Mountain and Dripping Springs, and delivered newspapers by horseback to pay for their feed. He hiked and camped in the Doña Ana and Organ Mountains as a Boy Scout, followed by extensive hiking, hunting and camping in the Uvas and Potrillo mountains as a teenager and

Over the past few years, Soules has developed an interest in the unique historic and cultural features within the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument. He is an engineer at White Sands Missile Range, and is a member of numerous conservation organizations.

At 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 18, join the Foundation for Las Cruces Museums and the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce at an evening reception to celebrate new artwork at the Las Cruces Railroad Museum. An anonymous donor commissioned the work by local artist Stephen Hansen. Hansen is well known nationally for his whimsical, three-dimensional artwork that often provides a playful look at everyday scenes. The evening reception will be a formal "ribbon-cutting" for the artwork, as well as a chance to meet and mingle with the artist and museum guests. It is free and open to the

At noon Saturday, Sept. 27, learn about "Edible Plants in the Chihuahuan Desert" at Branigan Cultural Center.





# 'Sin City' sequel Dullsville

"Sin City: A Dame to Kill For" is little more than a return to co-director Frank Miller's particular brand of pimple-faced prepubescent neo-noir, all beatings and bullets and bare breasts strung together with hackneyed hard-boiled dialogue and rendered in the first film's trademark black-and-white chiaroscuro but with less impressive results. It manages to squander a largely talented cast and, makes an hour and a half of gut-splattering comic book violence and kinky sex boring as all get out.

In "Just Another Saturday Night," Mickey Rourke returns in prosthetics as the maniac Marv to exact gory revenge on a quartet of frat boys dousing hobos with petrol. It's short, stupid and seems unfinished.

The second and fourth tales, "The Long Bad Night Part I and II," respectively, are the film's highlight, but even that isn't saying much. Joseph Gordon-Levitt, as a quick-talking gambler engaged in a game of high – very high – stakes poker with the evil Sen. Rourke

(Powers Boothe, sufficiently menacing), is the movie's greatest asset, but after his turns in two of the best neo-noir films of the last decade – the high-school whodunit "Brick" and 2012's time-travel tale "Looper" – watching him chew through this dialogue is simply painful. The vignette features two cameos, one of which – Lady Gaga – seems no more than a desperate grasp at contemporary relevance by hoisting up a star who is already fading. The segment's other guest – Christopher Lloyd as a morphine-addled back-alley doctor – is great for all two minutes he's on screen.

The film's titular tale, "A Dame to Kill For," takes place years before the events of the first film's "The Big Fat Kill," filling the shoes of Dwight McCarthy with Josh Brolin, who is blandly tough as can be. Working as a private dick, Dwight is roped back in to the life of old-flame Ava Lord (a constantly nude, red-lipped and vacant Eva Green), who abandoned our hero for a rich tycoon. The story, especially damning as the film's centerpiece, is obvious, repellant and boring throughout, even chock full of explicit sex and violence.

The film's final segment, "Nancy's Last Dance," reacquaints us with Nancy Callahan (a writhing Jessica Alba), still dealing with the suicide of her protector John Hartigan (Bruce Willis), who appears as a Christmas Carol-style ghost to dispense life advice, and working her way up to avenging his death.

Miller's perpetually pubescent universe is populated only by the most hard-boiled clichés, harkening from a time when men were men – thick-necked men with bulging veins and thick cigars, thick like their necks, chomped down in their square jaws, unafraid to handle their qualms with their fists even, or especially, when their quarrel is with a broad with a fiery yap – and women were women – dancing on tables and wearing next-to-nothing, existing solely for the pleasure of those thick-necked men as trophies and prizes.

In a recent Playboy interview, Miller, who looks more and more like he's either a character in his own works or is actually melting, claimed "there has been a crisis of masculinity in modern times, and the 1940s-style gentleman needs to make a comeback – the sort of man who opens the door for women and compliments them and does things for them." He goes on to cite biological im-

perative, then blames Rod Stewart's "You're in my Heart" for the man-crisis.

It's a moot point to call Miller's career deeply and staunchly rooted in a bygone and hyper-masculine, misogynistic time, but for god's sake, it's 2014 – are we really rooting for protagonists who sleep with their female charges seconds after giving them some chin music right on the kisser?



# From 'llo llo' to 'A Long Way Down'

Heartfelt but also using a story that is a bit overused, "Ilo Ilo" takes place in Singapore in 1997.

It is during a real financial crisis that took place in Asia during that time, and Jiale, a 9-year-old hooligan and somewhat spoiled brat, is the focus of the story.

His parents are both struggling financially and emotionally. His mother, Leng, works at a large shipping conglomerate and seemingly spends her work days preparing layoff letters and presenting them to her unfortunate co-



workers. His father, Teck, is in over his head at work and when he loses his "real" job, he takes employment as a security guard. This leaves little time for supervising the out-of-control Jiale, and thus enters Theresa, or Terry, as housekeeper and nanny to Jiale.

She is a Filipino and out of place and out of money, unable to make ends meet at home, where she has family of her own to tend to. Leng relieves Terry of her passport almost immediately, thus trapping her in what might be an untenable situation. There are also language, cultural and religious issues to overcome as well.

Jiale repeatedly acts out while in Terry's charge, often forcing her into embarrassing or compromising situations. However, Terry is not without resources of her own and eventually her version of tough love starts to make a difference.

Things continue to spiral downhill for Jiale's parents, who become more and more involved in trying to pay the bills, allowing for a slow and hard-todetect relationship to form between Terry and Jiale.

"Ilo Ilo" is based on the experiences of the director, Andrew Chen, and won an award at the Cannes Film Festival for best debut feature.

Chen's work is not without fault. Sometimes the situations seem a bit too pat, and I personally didn't like this film as much as two other recent movies, "The Maid" and "The Amazing Catfish," with similar plots

The film carries well and is strong in terms of casting and situations. I found myself at times feeling empathy galore for Leng, Teck and, of course, for Terry, who must deal with all of the family dynamics without empathy or support for her own.

"Ilo Ilo" is a good film, but not a great one. It does cover real life, but perhaps does so just a little too slowly.

"A Long Way Down" doesn't have to fall too much further to become a comedy of minimal interest. A great concept on first glance, the final product doesn't carry too well in reality. It is New Year's Eve and, by accident, four lost souls end up atop one of London's tallest buildings, each contemplating suicide.

Martin (Pierce Brosnan) is a disgraced television personality; JJ (played by "Breaking Bad" alum Aaron Paul) is an egocentric musician who tells everyone he is dying of cancer when he is not; Jess (Imogen Poots) is a flighty, loudmouthed young woman; and Maureen (Toni Collette) is a lonely single mother of a developmentally disabled son.

Unbeknownst to our characters, they have picked the most popular day and place to commit suicide.

With that in mind, they make a pact to not do anything rash until Valentine's Day. From there, the story, narrated by Brosnan focuses on each of their stories.

Always the news hound, Martin leaks the story of their pact and meeting to the media and the four become an overnight sensation.

What could have been a fun and interesting comedy is rendered mostly dull by typecasting and keeping any possible fresh material from entering in. "A Long Way Down" tries hard but fails to please.



# Preventing the stings of summer

# Mosquito season is upon us – are you prepared to combat it?

The much anticipated monsoon rains are finally working their magic on the deserts of Doña Ana County, but with all the happy vegetation and color comes an inevitable scourge.

Yes, it is officially mosquito season and that means the battle is on to lessen the sting whenever and wherever possible.

Unfortunately, many of the tricks we thought to be effective are turning out to be erroneous under rigorous testing. For instance, did you know that a study conducted by the University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, found that commercial bug zappers are a waste of money? In fact, the study found that bug zappers actually make things worse by attracting more mosquitoes into your yard.

The sad truth is, while the UV light is lethal to a wide range of insects, mosquitoes and other biting insects are more attracted to the carbon dioxide exhaled by people and pets. They see and are attracted to the light, but the minute they detect the carbon dioxide, they change course and zero in on that odor instead. Of course, as redneck entertainment goes, there aren't many sources that can supply as many hours of mindless pleasure and maybe that's enough to take one's mind off the stinging swarm.

For those not as easily amused, however, the search continues. For instance, a study by the University of Georgia found that citronella candles are really no more effective than regular candles, because it is the emission of carbon dioxide that attracts mosquitoes away from people. Lining the patio with tiki torches works whether you're using citronella or not, but there will still be a high percentage of people bitten.

The only thing that really works is a campfire or pit fire that emits a lot of smoke, but who wants to smell like smoked sausage all night?

Then there's DEET, which many people swear by, but should be used with extreme caution. Developed by the U.S. military in the 1940s, this powerful chemical is absorbed into the skin and will repel mosquitoes, but the side effects can cause problems for some people. Rash, swelling, itching and eye irritation are just a few of the

problems that can arise. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that repellents used on children contain no more than 10 percent DEET. Those DEET-soaked wristbands, on the other hand, don't work at all, according to experts.

Finally, according to a study by Texas A&M University, ultrasonic repellents such as sonic key chains and the sonic iPhone app are completely useless. Mosquitoes are attracted to carbon dioxide, period. High pitched sounds will not deter them from their meals, though they may give your dog something to howl about.

So, what does that leave us with? All across the board experts agree that wearing loose, full clothing – long-sleeved shirts and long pants – is the best protection when outdoors. They do recommend, however, to avoid wearing heavy, dark clothing in warm weather, because mosquitoes are attracted to warm bodies.

The Old Farmer's Almanac has its list of natural mosquito deterrents, which include burning sage or rosemary on the barbecue grill, rubbing the skin with baby oil, eating lots of garlic and/or eating and rubbing cider vinegar onto the skin. Chances are pretty good, however, that you'll repel far more than mosquitoes.

Or, you could just try planting natural mosquito repellents such as basil, lemongrass, rosemary, catnip, garlic, marigolds or tansies. Growing these plants in small pots around your patio or deck has proven to work to a large degree, though you are always going to find yourself fending off those pesky rogue stingers.

Remember, too, that standing water is a breeding ground. It's just common sense to make sure that wheelbarrows, buckets, pots, cans or any other container is dumped out after a rain. Check your rain gutters, too. While you're at it, keep your shrubs and trees well trimmed and grasses short. Mosquitoes love to wait out the heat of the day in low-lying brush or vegetation. Get rid of it and they won't have a place to hang out.

For ornamental ponds, bird baths or any other water feature that is

impractical to drain, Bti mosquito dunks are still among the best ways to kill mosquito larvae without harming fish, aquatic plants, pets or even humans.

In the end, all experts agree that when it comes to fighting mosquitoes, it really comes down to common sense. Prevention is the best deterrent and not exposing oneself to potentially harmful situations can cut down on risks.

If, however, you insist on having your nudist barbecue in your lush green back yard in the middle of mosquito season, be prepared for battle and have lots of calamine lotion on hand to soothe the inevitable itches that may occur.



live in communities that lack basic city support services and infrastructure. In fact, among the six dioceses supported through this initiative along or near the Mexican border, there are 4.3 million Catholics - many of whom live well below poverty compared to other dioceses in the country.

In addition to these difficulties, the current international crises unfolding on the U.S. border is estimated to bring approximately 90,000 unaccompanied children into the U.S. in 2014, mostly from Central American countries. This will put a heavy strain on personnel, volunteers and social services that respond to the large numbers and needs of this population.

By providing the funding necessary for much-needed resources, Catholic Extension is a critical partner to these Catholic dioceses whose mission is to empower individuals and families to have faith, hope and opportunity.

# Strength training done the right way

It's an unfortunate fact: aging is typically accompanied by a decrease in physical strength.

The culprit is sarcopenia, a medical term which simply means the loss of muscle mass and function.

Loss of muscle mass typically begins in your 30s and accelerates in your 70s. But strength training can help you fight the effects of sarcopenia.

Recently Good Samaritan Society-Las Cruces Village's head of therapy, Shane Sheehan, gave the apartment residents a tutorial on how to use the weight machines in the campus' wellbeing room.

"If you are going to lift weights, you want it to be the right intensity," Sheehan said.

If your goal is to gain strength, you want to choose a weight that you can lift eight to 10 times before you feel you can't lift it anymore. If the goal is to maintain muscle, you should be able to do 12 to 15 repetitions.

"If you are doing 20 or 30 repetitions and realize that wasn't very hard, you need to put more weight on," Sheehan said, or the exercise just isn't effective. By the end of your set (eight to 10 or 10 to 15, depending on your goal), your muscle(s) should feel fatigued and like you could not do another repetition.

When lifting, you should always tighten your stomach muscles.

"It protects your back and strengthens your core," Sheehan said.

You should also breathe out as you lift the weight, and breathe in when you release the weight.

"It's all about form and technique," Sheehan said. "Quality over quantity."

The ideal strength training schedule is a day of training followed by a day of rest. It is during the day of rest, Sheehan said, when the muscles actually grow. If you like the routine of exercising every day, he recommended alternating upper

# 'Our lives have never been the same'

### Local walk honors New Mexico's drunk driving victims

Gabriel Montoya was a quiet 16-yearold at Mayfield High School in 2002.

"For being a quiet guy, he played the loudest instrument he could find—he played the drums," said Donna Tapia, Montoya's cousin.

There was something that made him different. If he ran into a family member while he was out with his friends on the weekend, he always made a point to go talk to that person and introduce his friends, Tapia said.

One evening on his way to pick up his girlfriend, a drunk driver crashed into him in front of Mayfield.

"The drunk driver was three times the legal limit at 7 o'clock, which is ridiculous to begin with," Tapia said. "From what I'm told, he (the drunk driver) was coming home from another beer run because he was heading toward his house and he had new bottles or cans of beer in his truck and as far as I know, he didn't get hurt at all."

Gabriel, who was one of five children, was seriously injured and in a coma for a week before he passed away.

"Ever since the day of the crash, our

lives have never been the same," Tapia said.

Being one of 60 first cousins, Montoya is severely missed at family get-togethers.

"Now there's always just that little bit of sadness," Tapia said. "It's not happy, the way it should be."

Montoya's older brother was planning on getting married when the crash changed their lives. Even though they postponed the wedding for a year, the pictures didn't have the smiles you would usually see at a wedding, Tapia said.

As time goes on and the family celebrates milestones, such as they recently celebrated Montoya's youngest brother graduating high school, they remember that they never got to celebrate those milestones with Gabriel.

"He never got to go to college, get married, have kids, nothing," Tapia said. "As far as we know, the drunk driver is out free, living his life, going on."

Instead of being able to celebrate Gabriel's milestones together, the family now gathers to walk in his memory during Walk Like MADD.

Mothers Against Drunk Driving have hosted Walk Like MADD since 2004, under the name Strides for Change until rebranding. According to state executive director, Ben Lewinger, Walk Like MADD is held annually as a way to bring the community together to honor victims of drunk driving crashes.

"It's like a moving mediation, we're physically walking and also walking towards a brighter horizon for New Mexico," Lewinger said.

Since MADD's creation, it has been the first time total alcohol-related fatalities have dipped below 10,000 per year, Lewinger said.

According to findings of local Centers for Disease Control, New Mexico ranks worst in the nation for the numbers of years life lost due to alcohol. This includes diseases related to alcoholism, underage drinking, accident, violent crime, assault and DWI.

"We also lead the nation in young people who have their first drink before the age of 13," Lewinger said. "We have a pipeline of young drinkers who turn into alcoholics and DWI offenders in their adult life and we need to come together as a community to prevent underage drinking and to end DWI."

Lewinger said they've seen the lowest number of DWI fatalities in New Mexico recently with 132 in 2013, but unfortunately they've begun seeing more over the summer and an increase is imminent.

"With Labor Day Weekend, historically one of the most violent weekends for DWI crashes, just ahead, it's important that everybody commits to keeping themselves and other drivers save by designating a non-drinking driver, and by never getting in the car with a driver who has been drinking," Lewinger said.

Tapia and her family participate in Walk Like MADD events annually in Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Tucson. Raising about \$1,000 each year, they choose to focus their fundraising in Las Cruces because the financial support stays within Doña Ana and Otero counties.

Progress can be seen around town with MADD opening an office and hiring a victim advocate in Las Cruces in October and an early prevention specialist in early 2015, Lewinger said.

Before you drink and drive, Tapia wants people to remember: You're not only risking the lives of someone you might not know, you're risking your life and maybe your loved ones. How would you feel if a drunk driver killed someone you loved dearly?


