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## 'Red' film exposed struggles 'Salt of the Earth' 60 years later

When Elisa Sanchez was 10 years old and helping her mother make sandwiches for striking Grant County mine workers in the early 1950s, there was talk of an Anglo man observing the picket line from a hill near the entrance to Empire Zinc Co. Attention paid the strike wasn't new

- the protracted strike was controversial in a time when unionization was equated with communism. Even Republican Gov. Edwin Mechem had gone on the KSIL radio station in July 1951 to urge the workers not to assist "the spreading doctrine of a slave state."

The strike by 174 mine workers, which began on Oct. 17, 1950, wouldn't end until Jan. 24, 1952, but the story of the struggle, that included women taking up the picket line when the miners were forced away by a Taft-Hartley Act injunction, didn't end when the company agreed to higher wages and insurance benefits.

The stranger on the hill turned out to be Paul Jarrico, a blacklisted screenwriter on vacation. He took the story to other blacklisted Hollywood filmmakers, who saw the possibilities of exploring issues of labor organization and gender roles through the eyes of Mexican-Americans, an unheard of combination of movie themes at that time.

These film professionals were struggling to find work after being blacklisted because they refused to cooperate with Congressional investigations of alleged communism in Hollywood. With Jarrico acting as producer, Michael Wilson wrote the screenplay. He would go on to write

## Mayors return, new trustees in Mesilla incumbents survive

After numerous recounts for more than two hours after polls closed Tuesday, March 4, Mesilla Mayor Nora Barraza won re-election by only three votes.

Jésus Caro Jr., a Mesilla trustee who gave up his seat to challenge her, earned 305 votes to Barraza's 308

Caro's pursuit of the mayor's job left only one incumbent, Linda Flores, to run for the two positions elected at large. Flores prevailed with 315 votes, but the big winner of the night was Stephanie Johnson Burick, who took in 381 votes.

In the latest turn of the behavioral health debate. State Auditor Hector Balderas released an independent audit that is critical of the state Human Services Department (HSD) in its handling of Medicaid funds, the hiring of out-of-state providers and its expenses and billing practices.

HSD audit The CliftonLarsonAllen LLP (CLA), looking at the fiscal year 2013, found poor oversight and

mismanagement of federal funds by the department, Balderas said in his report.

"Among the findings, independent auditors found that HSD violated its state contracts with five Arizona behavioral health providers by approving payments for inappropriate costs that exceeded \$620,000," Balderas said in his report. "HSD used both federal and state funds to pay the costs."

spokesman HSD Matt Kennicott said that only state funds were used for the transition.

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## **Soules declares candidacy** New qualifications inspired run for PRC

Merrie Lee Soules has announced her candidacy for the Public Regulation Commission (PRC) in District 5.

Soules cited the need for integrity and high professional standards as key to her decision to seek the position.

"In 2012, the people of New Mexico overwhelmingly voted to establish high qualifications for PRC commissioners," Soules said. "I am running because I have those qualifications and am eager to restore trust and informed decisionmaking to our regulatory process."

For 20 years, Soules was an executive for a large division of General Motors. She served as purchasing director, global pricing director and director of product planning, overseeing initiatives throughout the world.

'I regularly evaluated capital projects valued at hundreds of millions of dollars," Soules said. "I know what goes into complex proposals and how they are structured. Rate-payers need that level of understanding and sophistication on their side."

Soules said she is a strong supporter of public financing of campaigns for positions such as the PRC, and she will be running as a publicly financed candidate.

'The PRC makes extremely important decisions involving utilities, telecommunications and transportation," Soules said. "These decisions can affect millions of dollars in potential profits or losses for regulated businesses. It's

ment as key challenges for the commission.

'In my corporate life, I learned to base decision-making on the best data available, and to project the impact of those decisions far into the future," Soules said. Fortunately, our current challenges call on strengths that New Mexico already has: abundant energy resources and strong partners in our state universities

and national labs. We are well-positioned to become a leader in this new energy environment.

Soules was raised in Las Cruces and attended Las Cruces public schools, graduating from Las Cruces High School. She earned a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Cleveland State University and holds a master's degree in business administration from Harvard University.

In 2004, Soules returned to Las Cruces where she's employed by a contractor at White Sands Missile Range. She plays in the New Horizons orchestra and has chaired two separate redistricting committees for the Las Cruces Public Schools.

### Volunteer spirit overflows in Mesilla Valley

My travels take me past the Animal Services Center of Mesilla Valley nearly every day. There are always cars in the parking lot, and often, it's packed.

Many or most of those cars belong to volunteers, I guessed.

To check my hunch, I called Jan Wright, the volunteer coordinator at ASCMV. Wright said more than 130 people do volunteer work for the center, with more than 90 of those regularly active.

They're primarily students from New Mexico State University, and we also have quite a few seniors, and quite a few families with younger children," Wright said.

The volunteers do a wide variety of work at the center, such as walking dogs and taking care of kennels. A group of seamstresses put in 20 to 30 hours a week, Wright said, sewing high-quality dog and cat beds. Volunteers help coordinate Reading with K9s, a program at Hillrise Elementary that allows dogs to interact with schoolchildren.

You'll find volunteers doing important work all over this city.

There's an amazing group of volunteers at Mesilla Valley Hospice.

The Community of Hope likely could not function without volunteers.

Habitat for Humanity could not build homes without volunteers.

For just about every task in our community, there are willing volunteers at the ready. The thing is, the work becomes just as important to the volunteers as to the organizations. A good example is Big Brothers Big Sisters of Southern New Mexico. Serving as a big brother or big sister is vitally important to the lives of the little brother or little sister. It's just as enriching to the lives of the bigs.

Saving lives in a literal sense are the 40 members of the all-volunteer Mesilla Valley Search and Rescue crew.

If you ever get the blues, one sure-fire cure is to do something to help someone else. It gets your mind off your worries and makes a positive difference in another life.

A great way to help is to volunteer.

If you've ever considered volunteering, you should check out the Volunteer Fair from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, March 8, at the Branigan Cultural Center, 501 N. Main St.

Nearly 40 nonprofit groups will be there, explaining what you can do to help them and, in turn, help our community.

This is the perfect opportunity to see what needs are out there, and how your particular skills and passions can serve those needs.

I've been amazed at what this small city can do. Each year, we raise more than a halfmillion dollars for breast cancer research, nearly \$300,000 for our high schools' activity programs and more than \$200,000 for the March of Dimes. There are hundreds of other

groups that raise money important to their causes, and hundreds of different causes. Raising funds, volunteering – what makes Las Cruces so generous in these regards?

One reason may be the size of our hearts.

Another reason may be that Las Cruces is a two-newspaper city.

According to a recent Current Population Survey study, civic engagement in Denver and Seattle dropped significantly from 2008 to 2009, when newspapers in those two cities closed. In Denver, the Rocky Mountain News shut down, leaving the Denver Post as the primary newspaper. In Seattle, the Post-Intelligencer ended its print edition and now has a web-only edition with a greatly reduced staff.

Portland State University professor Lee Shaker said the newspapers' demise was a key factor in those cities' drops in civic engagement.

It's rare for a community the size of Las Cruces to have two newspapers, but it probably translates to our citizens being more informed and aware of issues and needs in our region.

Whatever the reason, our hearts or the news, Las Cruces keeps on giving and getting rid of the blues.

There is a lot of talk about getting students to attend school out of a sense of duty. There is a slim chance that some students will thank us in their prayers for teaching them discipline. Don't hold your breath. I was an English teacher at Albuquerque High School a long time ago. I understand both sides of the carrot or stick issue and it is my opinion that carrots work batter

issue and it is my opinion that carrots work better. Even though there is mandatory attendance, there is

not mandatory buy-in. Schools may have their body, but not their mind. My father said, "The military cannot make someone do something, but it can make that person sorry they did not." That is the philosophy of the stick. And it works some of the time.

However, it does not work with those students who, when told that if they do not graduate they will end up living under a bridge. For those students, that stick is just a waste of time.

We want the students to enthusiastically embrace education, apply themselves to it and graduate.

These students who do not come to school can learn all of the words to a hundred songs with ease. They learn elaborate skateboard tricks. Many are multi-talented in art and music. Why? Because the reward they want is within their control.

The secret to getting what we want them to do is to use a carrot they want. What do they want that we can ethically provide? Cars rate high on the student cool meter. What if, at graduation, a new car is given away? The keys are given right then to a graduate. Additionally, to focus their attention, each student could

earn extra chances for the graduation car. They have to graduate to get a chance at the car and there is a component for academic performance, such as one entry for each C, two for each B and five for each A. Likewise, attendance could garner extra chances. There is no guarantee someone with a 4.0 and perfect attendance will win, but it increases the odds. The cost of a car, and maybe some other cool things, is

so minuscule compared to the cost of one third of our fu-ture walking away from a free education. Schools continu-ally get more money for intervention programs. At the end of the ninth, 10th and 11th grades there might be a drawing for cool things just to keep the interest up. These are practical carrots rather than platitudes about 20 years form rout. 20 years from now.

To kids who are 14, four years is a dark enough hole to peer through. Twenty years is beyond comprehension. Do not pull out the one kid who gets the 20-year speech.

## The preservation of democracy Sunshine Week highlights government transparency

March 16-22 is Sunshine Week in New Mexico and nationwide.

Sunshine Week focuses on the importance of open government. No open government, no democracy. No transparency, no government accountability.

I care about Sunshine Week both as a citizen and as a former newspaper employee/publisher for 22 years. We relied heavily upon the State of New Mexico's strong public records and open meeting acts to help keep public officials account-able and public bodies honest.

We have many good examples of open government in our state. If the leader of a local government, school board, state department or other entity is committed to open, professional government, the citizens of that government are well served.

In my career, we used the acts to shine a light on government business, such as inequities in salaries of public employees or incorrect and illegal payment of expenses to government employees. When citizens can't obtain such information, rumors proliferate, trust in our public servants dies and our officials lose the ability to lead.

Our newsroom once requested records about a police shooting that had set the community on edge. Rumors were rampant and police were placed in the position of being the recipients of wild speculation and accusations. The police report was clearly a public document under our state's Inspection of Public Records Act. A law enforcement official refused to turn over the records to our newspaper. Fortunately the district attorney's office faxed the requested records. We then published the story and the community could form opinions based on facts. Rumors were laid to rest.

This district attorney is one of many public servants I have encountered over the years who want to follow the law, do the right thing and conduct open government. They are shining examples of good government leaders and employees.

On the other hand, I am puzzled and sometimes shocked when public bodies or officials choose not to comply with open records and meetings laws. Such decisions may stem from a lack of education or training about our transparency statutes. Noncompliance may arise out of a misguided belief

that secrecy is the better path. It never is.

Officials may not realize they have become the lawbreakers when they refuse public information that is legally obtainable. Our country's history has proven on more than one occasion that secrecy always makes problems worse and erodes public confidence in government. Secrecy is the hallmark of a totalitarian society, not a democracy. Secrecy serves only special interests and not the citizens.

Sunshine laws aren't a special benefit for the press. Sure, it's often up to media to be our witnesses in public meetings, to request and inspect records then report news that often protects the public. But all citizens have a right to know. The New Mexico Foundation for Open Government strengthens that right by educating, advocating and litigating on every-one's behalf for transparency. NMFOG can turn the voice of one person into a mandate for government to conduct business with its doors wide open.

## **BLM seeks public input on EPE rights-of-way** Transmission line carries Ariz. power

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Forest Service are seeking comments on a proposed environmental assessment (EA) for El Paso Electric's Arizona Interconnection Project 345 kilovolt-transmission line.

El Paso Electric currently has authorization with the BLM and the Forest Service for the existing 345 kV transmission line and has applied to amend their rights-of-way to include permanent access.

Permanent access is needed for necessary transmission line maintenance activities on public lands administered by the BLM and the Forest Service in New Mexico for Catron, Sierra, Socorro and Luna counties.

BLM is the lead agency and is preparing the EA with

direct coordination with the Forest Service. The EA will assess the potential environmental impacts resulting from El Paso Electric's proposed action.

El Paso Electric proposes to use existing roads, where applicable, and to construct new roads that would be necessary to maintain their infrastructure along the project's 345 kV transmission line.

As part of routine line maintenance, El Paso Electric seeks the right to clear a permanent 75-foot by 75-foot work area at each structure, and a temporary pad up to 100 feet wide by 100 feet long on one side of a structure when a structure requires replacement.

The proposed project includes the upgrading of an



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existing static wire with fiber optic cable along a 20-mile segment between the Luna Substation and the Macho Springs Wind Farm.

The transmission line extends from a tie-in point just east of the Luna Substation near Deming to the Red Hill tie-in point in western New Mexico, east of the Arizona-New Mexico border and near Springerville, Ariz.

The transmission line crosses lands administered by the BLM, Forest Service, State of New Mexico and private lands. This EA will form the basis for the BLM and the Forest Service decisions to issue the right-of-way grant amendments requested by El Paso Electric.

## The price of ivory

ON THE EDGE OF COMMON SENSE

On the north side of Denver abides the city of Commerce City. There, last fall, U. S. officials dumped millions of dollars worth of ivory tusks, carvings, and jewelry into a steel rock crusher and pulverized it into dust and tiny chips.

The officials' objective was to reduce the slaughter of tens of thousands of elephants each year.

ECONOMICS 1: What happens to a commodity's demand and price when you reduce its availability? DUH ... The price goes up!

For instance, cattle prices are at an all time high because ... the U.S. cow herd is down to its lowest since 1952. Average horse prices have plunged due to the elimination of horse slaughter, which flooded the country with unwanted horses.

Ivory's value is primarily intrinsic, meaning it serves no essential purpose, though it does work as a forklift and weapon when still on the elephant. It's unlike other precious stones and metals such as diamonds, silver, gold and uranium, which can be used in all sort of engineering processes, high tech manufacturing and dentistry, in addition to jewelry. The value of these minerals is also increased because there is a finite amount on our planet.

So how can we help the ivory problem? Flood the market, that's how.

Elephants continue to reproduce, thus

manufacturing ivory. How 'bout increasing the number of elephants? A great example of this solution is the salmon industry. Twenty years ago wild salmon from Alaskan fisheries was priced out of the range of the average family. Then the world started "farming salmon" commercially. Now it is readily available.

Pleasant, Texas for tusks from feral pigs and wild boars and turn the red necks loose. In 20 years people will be farming hogs for ivory. Make pigs a three-purpose animal; meat, hunting and jewelry.

classics such as "Lawrence of Arabia" and "The Bridge on the River Kwai" under a pseudonym in the late 1950s before being able to write, under his real name, in the late 1960s scripts of "The Sandpiper" and "Planet of the Apes.

Directing the film was Herbert Biberman, and one of the few professional actors agreeing to work for them was Will Greer, who would become the beloved grandfather on the 1970s television show "The Waltons."

But when the small production crew arrived in Silver City in early 1953, they were far from beloved, as even during production in the relatively isolated southwestern New Mexico, national leaders and media decried the project. With a meager budget of \$250,000, the filmmakers hired local people - nearly all had never acted before and many were from the ranks of the union - and an elderly rancher-miner rented his land for the mine scenes for only \$1.

In the March 2, 1953, edition of Newsweek magazine, an article called "Reds in the Desert" reported that "Silver City's 8,000 citizens were up in arms" because of the film being made there. A California Congressman on the House Un-American Activities Committee (HUAC) denounced the film, its sponsors - a local union helped finance the production - and its creators. Donald Jackson said the film was "deliberately designed to enflame racial hatreds and to depict the United States of America as the enemy of all colored peoples" and characterized the production as "a new weapon for Russia."

Despite many roadblocks from both anticommunist politicians and the movie industry not wanting to see the blacklisted filmmakers succeed, "Salt of the Earth" was completed and shown at a single New York City movie theater on March 14, 1954. While the same year Elia Kazan's "On the Waterfront" would be praised and awarded for its more realistic acting, the attention to "Salt of Earth" wouldn't come until years later, when film scholars would cite its gritty realism and mature themes. The only blacklisted movie in U.S. history, "Salt of the Earth" is now one of 100 films preserved for prosperity by the Library of Congress.

In Silver City, the schedule of events throughout Saturday, March 15, start at 10 a.m. with buses boarded at the Grant County Business and Conference Center, where participants will be taken to the United Steel Workers 9424 (the former Local 890) union hall in Bayard to start a docent-led bus tour of historic sites, followed by a panel discussion called "From Women's Auxiliary to Women of Steel" and a showing of "Salt of the Earth" at the Western New Mexico University Fine Arts Center.

For the NMSU events, Elisa Sanchez is commemorating her mother, Angelina Sanchez, who had been in the union's women's auxiliary. Her father, Jose Sanchez, worked at the smelter in Hurley and wasn't directly involved in the strike.

With her mother active in the women's auxiliary, Elisa Sanchez remembers making the bologna sandwiches for the strikers and, later, her mother walking the picket line after the men were forced to go back to work. This is a role her mother would also reprise in the movie as one of its actresses, playing a miner's wife named Consuelo Ruiz, who suggests the women continue the picket line.

According to "The Suppression of the Salt of the Earth" by James Lorence, the Empire

"By closing ranks across ethnic lines, the men and women of Local 890 anticipated the fervor of the civil right movement, which was soon to transform race relations in the American South," Lorence writes.

Along with her mother being in the film, 'Salt of the Earth" is a special film to Elisa Sanchez, for "depicting the struggle for equality of marginalized people in the unionization

Elisa Sanchez has spent much of her life championing civil rights, from neighborhood organizing in black communities in Louisiana to heading a national Hispanic woman's organization. Her activism goes back to the time of the strike, she said.

That inspiration to speak up took hold early with her. When one of her teachers complained about the "communists" in town making the movie, she stood up and said, "My mother is not a communist – she's fighting for our rights."

approved nearly \$7,000 in payments of federal Medicaid funds to Public Consulting Group Inc. (PCG) for improper costs, including double-billed expenses, duplicate per diem reimbursements and alcohol purchases.

Kennicott said only per diem were covered and did not include alcohol reimbursements.

Balderas said auditors found HSD "circumvented established requirements for investigating and referring credible allegations of fraud related to 15 behavioral health providers whose Medicaid payments the Department suspended in June 2013."

Kennicott said in a written response the department's Program Integrity Unit (PIU), which is composed of a total of less than half a dozen employees and one certified coder, couldn't handle the large scope of the Medicaid fraud audit, so PCG was hired.

Balderas said the independent

auditors found more than \$60 million in federal funds that HSD failed to collect in order to reimburse the State of New Mexico for Medicaid expenses.As a result, Balderas said, the fund is currently short \$72 million.

Kennicott said the \$60 million goes back to Gov. Bill Richardson's administration, and is part of the mess HSD is now trying to clean up after Gov. Susana Martinez's administration identified the problem.

Balderas said his office has referred the audit's findings to the New Mexico Attorney General, the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and the Office of Audit Services (OAS) within the Office of Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Many of the 15 nonprofits cited by HSD via the PCG audit have gone out of business after Medicaid funding was withheld, including Southwest Counciling Center in Las Cruces.

One local agency still standing but no longer providing Medicaidreimbursed services is Families & Youth Inc. (FYI) in Las Cruces.

FYI President Jose Frietze said the CLA audit was more professional than the PCG audit, and contains citations that are serious in terms of audits with two "material weaknesses" and several 'significant deficiencies."

These are words you don't want to hear in an audit," Frietze said. "FYI has never had any deficiency findings in any of its audits?

Frietze said he hopes the CLA audit will help the AG's office move more quickly on clearing his and other agencies of the fraud accusations by HSD. No agency from Doña Ana County has been cleared yet, he said.

What was done to us was done in a rush to judgment and in haste," Frietze said.

The CLA audit reviewed the original \$36 million in payments to the 15 providers cited in the PCG audit. The CLA audit cites HSD as having the responsibility for oversight of the payments and states that a lack of internal controls in the department resulted in the questionable \$36 million in payments. HSD disagress with this finding, the audit states.

## No charges in bomb scare

An employee at Mesquite Elementary School will not be charged following an incident Monday, March 3, that forced a total evacuation of the south valley school.

Members of the Doña Ana County Sheriff's bomb squad were called out to the 200 block of state Highway 228 shortly after 11 a.m. after receiving a call that a suspicious device was at the school.

The so-called device, which was fashioned to look like an explosive, was removed by the Bomb Squad and has been placed into evidence at the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office.

According to Doña Ana County Sheriff's investigators, the employee, who is also a member of the school's emergency planning team, was hoping to use the lookalike device as an educational tool, but did not effectively communicate his plans to the rest of the administration.

Investigators concluded there was no malicious intent in the incident and no charges will be filed against the employee.

#### Hatch dismissed two top officials

The Village of Hatch has fired Clerk Administrator Jim Schoonover and Motor Vehicle Department Manager Davene Flores after a special meeting Thursday, Feb. 27.

Schoonover had been on paid leave since Jan. 24 after allegations of harassment and fraud were made against him. The charges are being investigated by State Police.

Hatch officials manage the Motor Vehicle Department office through a contract with the state.

Deputy village clerk Elizabeth Porras is currently overseeing the day-to-day operations of municipal government in Hatch.

Schoonover is a former Doña Ana County treasurer.

#### Fire restrictions put on state trust lands

New Mexico State Land Commissioner Ray Powell made announced Friday, Feb. 28, that fireworks, open fires and smoking are prohibited on state trust lands until further notice.

"Severe drought conditions coupled with high winds and dense fuel loads can combine to produce catastrophic fires like we saw a couple of years ago in New Mexico," Powell said. "The past three years have been some of the driest and warmest on record. It is important to do what we can to prevent unplanned, human-caused fires on our state trust lands."

Efforts on state trust lands are ongoing to reduce forest fuels and risk of high severity fires, while improving ecosystem function and health. Over the past two years, more than 4,500 acres of state trust land were treated with forest thinning programs and prescribed fire to reduce hazardous fuels.

The State Land Office received \$250,000 from the 2014 State Legislature and \$500,000 from the 2013 State Legislature to address hazardous fuel loads through forest thinning and fire prevention on state trust lands during the fiscal year.

Powell appealed to agricultural lessees to maintain a clear area around improvements, such as buildings and structures, from debris and excessive dry and flammable materials and to avoid open flames during windy conditions. He also appealed to lessees to use extreme caution when driving motorized vehicles in areas with dry vegetation.

Prescribed burns are planned for the upcoming year to reduce fuels and reduce potential for high severity fires.

Because of the worsening drought, the collaboration between the State Land Office, State Forestry, the Bureau of Land Management, the U.S. Forest Service and the New Mexico Association of Counties will continue to address measures to reduce wildfire risk statewide.

The restrictions announced by Powell apply

to state trust lands, but not to state parks or other state lands.

## Texting and driving to be banned statewide

New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez has signed a bill to ban texting while driving.

The law will prohibit drivers from sending or reading text messages and emails, or making Internet searches from smart phones or other hand-held wireless devices. There would be a \$25 fine for a first violation and \$50 for subsequent violations.

The law will make exceptions for situations such as summoning medical or other emergency aid.

Forty-one other states ban texting by all drivers.

New Mexico already prohibits texting for teenage drivers with a learner's or provisional license

The ban will take effect July 1.

## Martinez signs bill to prevent sexual abuse

Gov. Susana Martinez has signed Erin's Law, legislation aimed to prevent sexual abuse by educating students about how to identify and report sexual abuse. The legislation provides for age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness training in New Mexico's schools.

"Every child in our state is entitled to growing up in a safe environment. By signing Erin's Law, we take one step forward in protecting New Mexico's children," Martinez said. "Our educators deserve the training to help our students, and our children deserve to be empowered to stop sexual abuse."

New Mexico becomes the 10th state to sign the bill named after Erin Merryn, an advocate for the law who was sexually abused while growing up.

Merryn could not attend the bill signing Tuesday, March 4, because she was testifying to legislators in Tennessee on the law, but she wrote a letter that thanked Martinez and lawmakers.

"Thank you for giving children a voice and protecting their innocence," she wrote. "This law will save the lives of countless children."

"Erin has made it her mission to provide education in all 50 states in how to prevent sexual abuse and empower our students to not stay silent," Martinez said.

The new law will do the following:

- School employees will receive additional training on how to detect and report child abuse, including sexual abuse and assault
- Require schools to include age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness
- From kindergarten through fourth grade, students will learn about identifying safe and unsafe situations and reporting them
- From fifth grade and beyond, students will also learn how to identify risk behaviors in situations that can harm them

Las Cruces Crime Stoppers is offering a reward of \$1,000 and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives has added \$5,000 for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of two men suspected in the Feb. 1 armed robbery and shooting of a hotel clerk.

At around 1:30 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 1, two men entered the Econo Lodge hotel at 2585 S. Valley Drive and confronted the 24-year-old clerk. One of the men jumped over the front desk counter and threatened the clerk while the second man pointed

#### a handgun at the clerk.

The two men then took the clerk to a back office and shot him once in the leg. The two suspects took an undisclosed amount of cash from the hotel and fled, last seen running toward the west side of the nearby Motel 6 on La Posada Lane.

The Econo Lodge clerk was airlifted to University Medical Center of El Paso with a gunshot wound to his leg. Both suspects are believed to be Hispanic and appear to be

in their 20s. The armed suspect is believed to be about 5 feet 9 inches tall with a heavy build. He was wearing a white shirt, a dark gray

zipper-front hooded jacket and blue jeans. He was armed with a small caliber semi-automatic handgun.

The second suspect was also said to be about 5 feet 9 inches tall but with an average build. He was wearing a light gray

zipper-front hooded jacket, dark-colored pants and a mask that partially concealed his face.

Anyone with information that can help identify one or both of the suspects is asked to contact Las Cruces Crime Stoppers at 800-222-TIPS (8477) or send a tip via text message to CRIMES (274637), keyword LCTIPS.

On the girls side, Mayfield High School captured its third 5A state title, powered by 30 points from Elena Holguin, who is now an Aggie.

Centennial High School is the No. 10 seed in 4A. In 5A, Las Cruces High School is the No. 11 seed, Oñate is the No. 16 seed and Mayfield is seeded No. 3.

When they won it all in 2011, the Trojans were also seeded No. 3.

On paper, head coach George Maya's Trojans have the best chance of the local teams to bring home the blue trophy. However, waiting on the same side of the bracket is Clovis High School, a buzzsaw from the eastern part of the state.

Clovis is undefeated at 27-0, ranked No. 1 in the state and ranked No. 5 nationally, according to www.maxpreps. com. The Oñate girls will get a close look at Clovis in round one. If the Trojans win Friday, March 7, at home against Sandia, they'll play again Tuesday, March 11, in Rio Rancho (they could face Las Cruces High if the Bulldawgs win their opener at Eldorado). The winner of that March 11 game would likely face Clovis Thursday, March 13.

## **The road to a championship** Four local boys teams begin the journey

#### By Jeff Matthews

For local basketball enthusiasts, Las Cruces High School's 2013 state championship basketball run was a breath of fresh air. The Bulldawgs hadn't won a state basketball title in 37 years.

"Man it's hard, it's so hard," said Las Cruces head coach William Benjamin, who won his first state title at Las Cruces last March with a 61-49 win against Clovis. "You need kids playing their best basketball at the right time and you need a little bit of luck." he said.

Oñate High School did it for the first time ever in 2011, going 27-4 and beating Manzano in the championship game 54-48.

Do two basketball titles in three seasons signal a run for the city's big school teams similar to what's happened on the gridiron?

Title Town is splashed on the wall of the Field of Dreams football stadium, home of the Bulldawgs, Trojans and Knights, who have accumulated 13 state titles since 1995.

"They want to win it all," Centennial High School head coach Steve Heredia said of his 2014 squad, which is seeded fourth in the 4A bracket. "Las Cruces has set that standard in all sports, football especially. These kids want to be a part of that."

The local team with the best recent success in basketball is Mesilla Valley Christian School. In 2A, Jeremy Roman is in his first year coaching the already storied MVCS boys basketball team.

The SonBlazers made it to five title games between 2007 and 2012, winning it all in 2007, 2010 and 2011.

MVCS went 21-6 this year, including a

66-54 victory over Lordsburg in the district title game Saturday, March 1. The SonBlazers carry a No. 6 seed and an 8-game winning streak into the state playoffs, when they host Mora in the first round 2 p.m. Saturday, March 8, at the MVCS gym.

Mayfield High School head coach Tommy Morrow won a couple of state titles while coaching at Hot Springs High School in Truth or Consequences. "It's so hard to get there. It takes a little bit of luck. One year, we were just the best team and we played that way. The other, we won a couple of shootouts. I had Royce Olney and he hit big shots, a 28-footer in the championship game. You don't count on that, but you take it when it happens."

Morrow has had some deep tournament runs with Mayfield, twice taking his Trojans to the championship game, losing both times. He has 428 wins in his career, and is making his 15th state tournament appearance Saturday.

Morrow had a No. 1-seeded Trojan team in 2006 that exited in the first round.

"It was like a perfect storm deal that year," he said.

Valley High School, the Trojans' quarterfinal, opponent packed the Pit in Albuquerque, the site of the game.

"We had a huge crowd against us, your kids get the jitters, anything can happen," Morrow said. "We didn't shoot well, we had that Santa Fe officiating crew that called five phantom traveling calls."

The Trojans' 24-3 season, ended early in disappointing fashion.

In 2002, the Trojans went on a Cinderella run and made the state championship game,

facing a Hobbs team they had lost to by 40 earlier in the year. In the state championship Mayfield narrowly missed winning, 101-94

"It's quite an accomplishment sometimes just to get there," Morrow said. His 2010 team played La Cueva for a state title and lost the lead down the stretch, losing 61-53.

For 2014, Mayfield was seeded eighth for the first round after losing to Las Cruces 61-24 in the district tournament title game last week.

"I feel like after the way we played, we were fortunate to get a home game and we're hoping to take advantage of it," Morrow said.

The Trojans drew No. 9 seeded Highland (Albuquerque) High School Saturday night at 7 p.m. at the Trojan gym.

"Danny Brown I love as a coach," Morrow said of Highland's head coach. "His team is very gritty and determined. There will be zero quit in them."

Despite its lopsided victory over Mayfield in the district title game, Las Cruces drew a lower seed (10) and hits the road to take on 7-seeded Eldorado 5 p.m. Saturday, March 8, in Albuquerque. Las Cruces lost 49-48 to the Eagles at home in January, playing shorthanded with Mike Uribe and J.T. Romney both on the mend from injury.

"It's a tough matchup," Benjamin said. "It's going to be difficult. Sam Gentry is a load down low," he said of Eldorado's 6-7 center, who doubles as Eldorado's quarterback in football and just got an offer from Alabama to play college football in Tuscaloosa.

"We're playing good basketball," said Benjamin. His Bulldawgs have won eight

## Onthegreen Frustration is guaranteed in golf Staying positive a critical factor in enjoying the game



Golf can be an awfully frustrating endeavor.

Lately, I've had more than my share of frustration in golf. I've heard about other golfers and listened to their frustrations, but I never actually felt their pain. Until now.

Golfers who have come to me for sport consultation, and young golfers I have coached, spoke about their frustrations, but I underestimated their feelings.

In the last couple of months of playing golf with scores ranging from 73 to 86, I feel frustrated. So, I began to think more about the problem.

From my point of view, feeling frustrated has everything to do with expectations. If we're expecting a good round of golf, a good shot or a good outcome and it doesn't happen, we become upset. We feel we should have done better.

It's the same in every sport. Maybe public speakers, politicians running for office, concert pianists or CEOs experience the same emotions when they realize, deep-down, they should have done better. Achievers always expect more. They expect to perform at their best every time, and when they don't, they're frustrated. They even may expect to win every time.

It's a matter of unfulfilled needs, because you think privately that you let yourself down. It's a matter of disappointment that often turns into temporary anger.

Self-help guru Anthony Robbins said, "People who fail to achieve their goals usually get stopped by frustration. They allow frustration to keep them from taking the necessary actions that would support them in achieving their desires. All successful people learn that success is buried on the other side of frustration."

It takes discipline, and a certain measure of emotional maturity, to take a step back and look at your circumstances and disappointments objectively, and then commit to a plan for change and going forward.

Sometimes frustration can become permanent. Take the 24 handicapper who gets angry when he makes a succession of bogeys and double bogeys. I don't really sympathize with him, because he's expected to make those scores; otherwise he wouldn't have that high handicap.

But the five handicapper who makes a succession of bogeys and doubles – that's another story. Or the 10 handicapper who makes a few doubles. I can understand that. It's a funny game. You can be on top of the world one day, and down in the pits the next day. The only thing that gets me through is the ID logo mark I have on my golf balls: "It's God's will."

The operative thought here is expectations.

Once we get in touch with our expectations, the better we are able to understand our emotions.

Since my life-threatening injury in February 2011, I have gotten back to playing a lot of golf; but not the way used to play golf. It's been an eye-opener to go through a round making more bogeys than pars.

Exactly a year ago, I shot my age, which at the time was 68. It was a thrill. Now, I have to take a step back and reassess. It's not like I have to learn the game all over again, but I feel like I'm starting again from where I was in 1993 as a 10 handicapper. My expectations are such that I feel I ought to be a two handicapper.

Therein lies the frustration. And there is where I feel your pain. Golf is a sport that is inherently characterized by forcing us to endure unpleasantness, discomfort and frustration, all before we finally to enjoy the thrill of victory. I tell our golf school students they

shouldn't try harder after they become frustrated. I caution them not to over-try during a competitive round on the golf course. Yet, I do favor high effort, discipline and striving when it comes to practice, working out, becoming informed, knowing the rules and managing your time. You have to try hard to master those things.

Trying hard can have its reward. Thomas Jefferson is reputed to have said, "I'm a great believer in luck, and I find the harder I work, the more I have of it." Both Lee Trevino and Gary Player shortened that thought with, "the more I practice, the luckier I get."

Trying harder in football is good; not in golf.

Feeling frustrated can lead to anger. I see that in a lot of patients I evaluate, as a clinical psychologist, who have very serious medical conditions. It doesn't matter the age, be it 45 or 85, the reaction is very much the same.

Let's take a sudden stroke. The individual was all right one moment and then debilitated the next moment; and now in a hospital bed, not knowing if things will ever be back to normal. It's quite a shock.

One only has the experience of the baseline of what normal was, but now not sensing if that normal will ever be experienced again. There is wishing, hoping, anger and paranoia. It's like going through the grief with the loss of a loved one. The steps are disbelief, numbness, bargaining with the Almighty, anger, depression and, finally, acceptance. I've been through all of that – not only with my patients, but with myself. Golf is very much a mirror of life in that respect. We expect one thing, and when we fall into a different situation, either from injury or disuse or lack of practice or whatever, we lose our ability to perform as we once were used to performing. Our confidence is eroded and we feel it's not fun anymore. Disappointment starts to take over, and soon our com-

posure and self-assurance totally disappear.

Inner insecurity often rears its ugly head. Occasionally paranoia takes over, as in the case where we start blaming bad bounces, a bad golf course, bad partners, bad breaks, bad pace, bad clubs, bad rules, bad teachers, bad equipment, bad conditions and bad luck. The new expectation is that we will be done in by forces that are out to get us no matter what we do.

Then we come to what I call low F, in part, the opposite of low T. Folks

who often demonstrate irrational beliefs, selfdefeating behavior, failure to learn from their mistakes, reluctance to change and frequent temper outbursts, are usually are plagued by low frustration tolerance.

Ben Hogan was not. He viewed professional tournaments and championship golf as the struggle, a term he used to describe the hard work, discipline and perseverance required to become great. Hogan was willing to tolerate the trials, tribulations and disappointments of a hard and demanding sport. In fact, he welcomed them.

He was like that. Some players can grind and some can't. You would think that low-F folks would avoid situations and behavior that leads to frustration; most don't. Low-F sufferers tend to have poor reality testing in that their perception of true reality tends to be warped

For example, a lot of golfers go out and play using the same faulty swing, the same poor club choices, the same awful putting stroke, the same inferior equipment, the same flawed bunker technique, the same deficient preswing routine and the same mistaken beliefs about their skill level. And then they

wonder why they come

home frustrated with golf.

The one solace I can offer for overwhelming feelings of frustration is to remind you to check your attitude. As I've said before, attitude is everything.

Anger is first the result of a negative attitude. We believe things ought to be one way, and they don't go that way. So we get angry. Occasionally clubs are thrown childishly in haste.

In reality, we probably have misjudged the situation.

Take a difficult golf shot. We can misjudge the distance, the wind, the lie, the hole location, the aiming point and a host of other factors.

Then there's the nature of the swing, the club selection and the matter of luck, which have to be flawless, or else the other factors are exaggerated to the negative.

It's a blessed game when all goes perfectly, but it's discouraging when things go dreadfully wrong. Knowing that, some folks would rather not play golf because it's too hard.

Attitude is a matter of understanding the reality of the game, its demons and accepting what is difficult to understand. Remember, things are not usually as bad as they first appear.

Staying positive is critical to enjoying the game of golf. I try my best not to get angry at all the unfortunate bounces and breaks (which are undoubtedly my fault), but to accept those events as part of the progress to my game improvement.

I try hard to master an improved sense of humor about the game and about life in general. If you are a serious golfer – I mean an obsessed golfer – be careful of attaching your identity to your golf game. It can be overwhelmingly frustrating.

## **Building a program**

"We are certain he will do an outstanding job in this position and make Aggies everywhere proud."

For the past four years, Connor has been the Commissioner of Interior's Bureau of Reclamation, which oversees the nation's largest water wholesaler and second largest provider of hydroelectric power in the West with 58 power plants including the Hoover and Grand Coulee Dams.

In his new role, Connor will be the second highest-ranking official in the department. He has statutory obligations as the chief operations officer to help guide the Interior that has more than 70,000 employees and a yearly budget of about \$12 billion. He will continue to serve as reclama-

tion commissioner. Connor was the counsel to the U.S. Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee and senior adviser to chairman Sen. Jeff Bingaman on issues involving energy development, land and water

management and tribal nations from 2001 to 2009. Connor also worked at the Interior from 1993 to 2001, in the solicitor's office, and then as director of the secretary's Indian Water Rights Office.

He earned a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from NMSU and a law degree from the University of Colorado Law School. Connor is a native New Mexican and brother of Bill Connor, a Las Cruces-based executive for El Paso Electric Co.

"Mike Connor has proven himself to be a smart, thoughtful and effective public servant," U.S. Sen. Tom Udall said. "As a native New Mexican with about two decades of experience in the public sector, he possesses a wealth of knowledge about matters that are important to New Mexico and that will be invaluable in his position as deputy secretary in the Interior Department.

"Mike has a deep understanding of issues ranging from land and water conservation, to the impacts of climate change, and the challenges facing Indian Country. His work on water management and sustainable water use have particularly impressed me as he has responded to the ongoing drought. "

## **Death of the coupon?** Deals by text work for small business

Former Living Social executive Scott Maloney drove into Las Cruces Friday, Feb. 28, to announce the impending death of the Internet-based daily deal industry he helped create.

"You guys are about to, frankly, kill it," Maloney said during his keynote presentation at a ribbon cutting for OneEighty, a no-charge service that gives the community instant access to offers from local businesses through text messages.

"You are changing the game for merchants

#### and customers."

The Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce ribbon cutting was held at the Arrowhead Center business incubator on the New Mexico State University campus where the OneEighty is headquartered.

"The simple premise of the daily deal coupon has a fundamental flaw," Maloney said. "It was meant to liberate merchants but it is slow to market and can be very expensive. On the customer side, it's not topical, not local. Merchants feel taken advantage of and customers have to deal with a cumbersome process.

"These challenges - and more - are

addressed by OneEighty, which is fast, targeted, merchant-controlled and provides instant delivery and revenue."

#### From nowhere to OneEighty

OneEighty began in December 2010 with a phone call from founder and now COO Tim Swope in Las Cruces to co-founder and CEO Jon Forrest, with whom he had worked 11 years earlier in California.

Swope said although he hadn't kept in touch with Forrest, he never deleted his phone number. When he conceived the idea for OneEighty, he knew Forrest was the man to call.

Swope and Forrest talked about the idea for two hours.

OneEighty was on its way. There were, however, many "how

to" questions to answer before the service could become operational.

"We have been around the world 100 times finding out how not to do it," Swope said. "We got to the point of almost throwing in the towel."

"We were tying a white flag to a stick," Forrest added. Then they came across medical software that had been developed for physicians but never been used. They contacted the developer, Derrick Woolworth, who became CIO of their team. "His technological expertise made it happen," Forrest said.

#### Getting started at Arrowhead

Forrest said it was serendipity that the fledgling company found Arrowhead.

The opportunity arose because he met NMSU's Marie Talnack, who was advising a business in Orange County, Calif. "She suggested the incubator and Tim was living just 10

blocks away," Forest said.

"In less than 30 days we were putting furniture in the office," Swope said.

The team felt comfortable with Arrowhead's nurturing culture and commitment to making everybody's lives better, he said.

"We have never met such an endearing and caring group," Swope said. "We could have a four-story building complex somewhere, and we still would have an office here. Even as we go nationwide, we will always tout Las Cruces and always have our headquarters here.

The university setting provided the ideal culture in which to market their new service, as well as student talent to help them connect with that market.

Monica Schwartz received a scholarship from the university to serve as their graphics intern.

"She's just incredible," Swope said. "She has an eye that resonates with that age group. Her designs have depth. They aren't static, They are multi-layered – you don't find a lot of that in marketing."

"Working with Monica is great example of being right on campus and able to connect with our target market," Forrest said.

#### *Lining up merchants*

Milagro Coffee Y Espresso was the first business to offer OneEighty deals by text to the campus and the Las Cruces community.

Others came on board, and now the fledgling company is looking to create synergies by linking merchants with complimentary products and services.

Welcoming guests at the ribbon cutting, New Mexico State University Vice President of Economic Development Kevin Boberg said OneEighty could have chosen fancier places to grow, but picked NMSU "not for the tangible assets but for the students, the culture, their commitment to innovation."

"Next week and beyond, our focus will be strictly on bringing in new merchants," Swope said.

Forrest said what matters most is to provide real value to small main street businesses, which have always been underserved by the technological revolution.

"We are dedicated to the main street economy, the mom and pop, brick and mortar businesses that send their kids to school with our kids," Swope said.

With OneEighty, a customer stores a payment profile online and then everything else happens via text.

Customers choose the kind of deals they want to be notified about. They also can search for and buy deals on anything using only text messaging. There is no need to print anything.

"When you get to the business offering the deal, simply tell them you did a 180 and text the redeem code. The merchant will receive a secure payment confirmation," for180.com explains.

"It's very safe, closed communication," Forrest said. "This finally eliminates a lot of noise that exists in the world of advertising, getting right down to the signal for people who want a good deal and people who want to sell them a good deal."

#### Moving forward together

Family, including "big brother" Bill Connor and sister-in-law Dolores, the emcee, surrounded Mike Connor at the head table.

At the podium, he recognized not only his family, but also the community where he began his journey.

"The small, close rigorous environment of the (New Mexico State University) engineering department prepared me for the job I have now," said Connor, who later earned a law degree at the University of Colorado.

"None of us, achieving any level of success ... does so without people encouraging you along the way," he said.

He said he received that encouragement in his first job as a janitor and later at GE, where he "started to go from asking 'why me' to 'why

not me." Connor said the Hispanic Chamber's successes in business and community leadership are great examples, especially to young people such as middle school awardees and participants in Junior Amigos.

"Through your efforts, one day we will have a Secretary of Commerce," he said.

#### Moving forward in Washington

Connor, formerly the commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation, said in his new capacity as deputy secretary he will work alongside Cabinet Secretary Sally Jewell, "a tremendous business leader, a banker and an engineer" from whom he has learned a lot.

He said the department has a huge, \$16.8 billion footprint in New Mexico, mostly in energy and recreation, which accounts for about 25 percent of the state's gross domestic product.

"One of our biggest priorities now is in New Mexico and the West," he said, adding the state is in its sixth year of drought.

"We're not where we want to be."

Priorities include achieving a negotiated settlement with Texas over the right to use water from the Rio Grande.

Commenting on the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument Proposal, Connor said the department "wants to work with the New Mexico congressional delegation to come to an arrangement that meets the needs of all parties."

"Our goal in any area is to act after conferring with local communities," he said.

Connor said there has been progress on oil and gas development issues and that the proposed SunZia alternative energy transmission has to be resolved in cooperation with the people of southern New Mexico.

"If the drought breaks, I will still have plenty to do," said Connor, who has led the Department of the Interior's efforts to promote sustainable water use and address issues of water supply.

He said his department wants to partner with local business while carrying out its obligations.

## **Stimulus leads to United States recovery**

### Austerity pushes Europe into recession

It is the five-year anniversary of the Obama stimulus and Warren Buffet announces the best year ever for Berkshire Hathaway, attributing his success to a bet on the U.S. economy.

Experts expect 2014 U.S. economic growth of around 3 percent. Meanwhile, Europe is mired in stagnation, having suffered declining gross domestic product through the third quarter. And the outlook for next year is anemic, with expected growth of only 1 percent.

Why is it that the U.S. is in recovery while Europe is continues to wallow in stagnation?

The answer is austerity. Europe adopted it. The United States, instead, decided on stimulus.

Austerity, of course, refers to a set of policies that include tax increases and spending cuts aimed at reducing sovereign debt. For mainstream macroeconomists, including myself, the results of austerity were predictable. Europe, already suffering from financial crisis, was pushed into recession.

Those countries adopting the most

extreme policies – Greece, Spain, Italy, Ireland and the UK – are suffering the sharpest downturn. The spillover effect has been sufficient to push the Euro area into a sustained recession.

For Greece, Spain, Italy and Ireland, the reason for austerity arises from excessive external debt. No longer able to borrow from traditional sources, last chance lenders – Germany in some cases, the International Monetary Fund in others – have required sharp cuts in spending coupled with sharp increases in taxes.

For the UK, austerity is self-inflicted, a result of the ideologically driven Conservative party policy.

Back in the U.S., in retrospect the data are pretty clear. The Obama stimulus was key to the turn around.

Take the stock market, generally considered to be the best single indicator of future economic activity. The stimulus went into effect in March 1, 2009. The S&P 500 hit bottom on March 9, 2009. Since then, it has increased by 2.7 times.

Other economic indicators have shown similar recovery. Real GDP is up 11 percent. Unemployment is down and capacity utilization is up.

As a mainstream economist, I see all this as textbook. Indeed, once monetary policy hit the zero lower bound, monetary policy

Sure, the recovery is slow, but all this means that the stimulus was too small. I think twice as large would have been better.

All the above doesn't mean everything is rosy.

The problem was not Barack Obama's stimulus, but with the profligate spending during the eight years of the George W. Bush administration. Bush inherited from Bill Clinton a surplus of \$236 billion and left Obama with a deficit of \$459 billion. Had Bush continued Clinton's policies, the extra surplus would have paid for two times the Obama stimulus, which many economists recommended.

So Bush left Obama with a tough hand to play; Obama did the best he could with it. Obama avoided a second Great Depression, but had he inherited a surplus as had Bush, his actions could have been more dramatic and the recovery stronger.

## NuMex Easter chile named All-America winner

## NMSU wins for ornamental pepper

Just in time for Peter Cottontail, NuMex Easter, an ornamental chile pepper plant bred by New Mexico State University's Chile Pepper Institute, has been named an All-America Selections winner.

The recognition highlights the plant's ability to flourish in different climates across the country. This is the first time any plant bred by NMSU has been named an All-America Selections winner.

"We started breeding ornamentals as something fun for our students, but also as something for the potted plant and nursery industries," said Paul Bosland, an NMSU regents professor and director of the Chile Pepper Institute. "It's exciting to be able to commercialize something developed at NMSU. It's another way to foster economic development."

All-America Selections (AAS) is a nonprofit organization that tests new varieties of flowers and bedding plants, and then introduces the best performers as their winners.

The organization has nearly 200 gardens in geographically diverse areas across the country where judges score the performance of the plants.

NMSU's Fabian Garcia Science Center in Las Cruces became an AAS evaluation site in 2013. According to the organization's website, "AAS winners offer gardeners reliable new varieties that have proven their superior garden performance."

"This means that whether someone is in New Mexico, California or Maine, NuMex Easter should do well," Bosland said. "This plant is heat-tolerant, drought resistant and makes for a nice container plant."

Like other ornamental chile varieties, NuMex Easter was selected for dwarfing characteristics, giving it a compact stature ideal for garden beds or indoor pots. The plant was also selected for having colorful, upright fruit, which spread across the top of the plant. The peppers for NuMex Easter are pastel purple, yellow and orange.

"Our students enjoy working with the ornamentals and developing new colors and color combinations," Bosland said. "They also learn a lot about genetics because the plants have so many obvious traits to work with."

NMSU began developing holiday ornamental chile plants in the 1990s and today has more than a dozen different varieties.

Its Valentine's Day plants have peppers that turn from white to red. St. Patrick's Day chiles go from green to orange. Halloween chiles go from black to orange. Other color combinations can be found for April Fool's Day, Memorial Day, Earth Day, Cinco de Mayo, Thanksgiving, Veterans Day and Chinese New Year.

It takes about 10 years from making the first hybridization until a plant is ready to be released to the public.

The Chile Pepper Institute's first two ornamental chile plants were the NuMex Twilight and NuMex Centennial, released in the late

1980s to correspond with NMSU's 100th anniversary.

All chile plants are frost-tender and, if kept outside, won't survive the winter. If kept indoors, with adequate light and water, chile plants can last 10 years or more. Their peppers also are edible and pack a punch when it comes to heat.

Some of the score sheet comments for

NuMex Easter included the phrases: "exceptional plant, love this little pepper, striking color, eye-catching, so easy to grow, loaded with pepper fruits in fun colors and a favorite of garden visitors."

# Featured Artist: James Tsoodle The color of a culture James Tsoodle returns to LC Arts Fair

Some images just grab you.

Perusing the nearly 100 booths at last year's Las Cruces Arts Fair, one artist – the German-born, Oklahoma-bred and Albuquerque-based James Tsoodle – seemed to keep a steady stream of art lovers in thrall with his stark, vivid portraits of warriors and peoples of the Northern and Southern Plains; stoic, fierce and powerful, but also deeply human, a certain intellect and intensity clear in their painted gazes.

After winning the Outstanding Booth Award at last year's fair, Tsoodle is returning to the fourth annual Las Cruces Arts Fair, held Friday through Sunday, March 14-16, at the Las Cruces Convention Center, as this year's featured artist.

Tsoodle was born in Frankfurt, Germany, to a military family, which necessitated their mobility. After a youth spent outside of Carnegie, Okla., the ancestral homeland of Tsoodle's own Kiowa people, Tsoodle's family relocated to northern New Mexico.

"My father was stationed here for a short time, and we liked it so much we came back," he said. "This has been my home ever since."

Tsoodle recalled the struggle growing up unable to read, with a case of dyslexia that went undiagnosed until he was nearly matriculated. Through the difficulties he experienced – or perhaps in spite of them – Tsoodle discovered his inherent gifts for the visual arts, both as a way to communicate and to discover his own worth.

"Communication was certainly a part of it, but it also had a lot to do with approval," Tsoodle said of unearthing his talents. "I think everyone, to some degree, is looking for something like that, something you excel in."

Tsoodle's youthful difficulties led him to hone another skill and, in time, he was forced to choose which of his two strongest talents to build a career from: painting or fighting. His chosen path away from the streets into the studio has been fulfilling, "and it's a lot easier on the body," he said with a laugh.

Committing to the visual arts, he worked first in pencil, drawing true-life portraits of children. He then worked in pen, then watercolor and, now, acrylic on canvas. Tsoodle's paintings of the Native American warriors of the Plains region are startlingly, stunningly colorful, far removed from the more subdued, muted earth tones of art reflecting the Pueblo and Navajo cultures that populated New Mexico, reflecting both his own ancestral heritage and his love of pigment.

"For one, myself, I just like color," he said, "but as far as the people, the subject matter – which right now is the Northern and Southern Plains warriors – if you look at the lifestyle and the way they actually dress, all that went on in the late 1800s, you get an understanding of why it was I went that more flamboyant direction.

Aside from the prominent boldness of tone present in Tsoodle's work, the eyes of his subjects, too, are striking, drawing the viewer in and holding them in their gaze.

"There's really something interestin about some faces that just grab you," he said, and that's what I've been drawn to

– capturing that expression in portraits, that quick glimpse of something that really grabs you and holds you there in the moment. One thing I look for is a certain intensity in an individual. There's a lot that can be said without anything spoken."

Tsoodle's subjects are drawn from the remaining photographs of the Plains peoples taken in the 1800s, as well as the folkloric traditions passed down by his family.

"The ideas for subjects are basically endless because, one, stories were handed down to me orally by my grandfather and, two, there are archives of what pictures are out there still today," he said.

"My grandpa used to tell us the stories about our people. Most of the time, he didn't think we were really paying attention, but I was. I was picking up on those stories he passed down, and then from my father and from the other elders among our people. Now, it's almost a dry well – many of the generations coming up now, those stories are completely lost."

As the oral traditions of Tsoodle's people fade into the past, the artist said, in a way, his work helps to make those quieting stories heard.

"A lot of the stories among my people, they're not going to offer those things up," he said. "I think of my work as a way to share that with people and show them it's there – show them that strength, that beauty, that power."

Moving forward, Tsoodle said he sees a change in his work, which is becoming at once darker and lighter.

"At this point in my work, I see aspects of both, that light and that dark," he said. "I think of it this way: Sometimes a night can be very dark, and a morning extremely bright. If you don't have that dark night first, you cannot really understand how good that morning can be, how bright it can be. There's a brightness creeping into my work, and I'm very appreciative to God for that."

# **Economy-class entertainment**

### 'Non-Stop' explodes midair

It's best to think of the most recent annual Liam Neeson action offering, "Non-Stop," as what it is: a cobbled-together flying machine, made from the disparate parts of other, better films, somehow staying shakily aloft until finally falling to pieces under its own weight in the final leg of its flight.

Neeson stars as Bill Marks, a U.S. federal air marshal with an illustriously tragic past, which includes, but is not limited to, the death of his 8-year old daughter, the subsequent implosion of his marriage and his suspension from the NYPD that led him to enroll in the Air Marshal Service despite his debilitating fear of takeoffs and landings. And you thought your job was bad

Strapped into a chair at 30,000 feet, London bound via New York City, Marks receives a text message on his secure line from an unidentified source threatening to kill one passenger every 20 minutes until the sum of \$150 million is electronically transferred into a bank account. For the next hour, "Non-Stop" is a perfectly serviceable thriller, all trashy, Hitchcock-lite fun composed of fragments of that which came before.

At times, it's like "Speed" in the air, rather than "Speed 2," which was "Speed" in the water. Other times, there's shades of Neeson's betterknown action roles in "Taken" and "Taken 2," except instead of his daughter, this unknown assailant has taken ... well, a plane full of people. There are pieces of "Air Force One" here, as well, which is a much better film and is probably, like, 99 cents to rent. Finally, there's a heavy dash of "When a Stranger Calls" - the call is coming from inside the plane.

Neeson spends much of his screen time texting, which, even with the stakes this high, is still just about as much fun as watching someone you know texting. Once the bodies start stacking up, though, "Non-Stop" finally takes off.

In its first hour, the film sticks to a fairly consistent cavalcade of red herrings: Is the culprit Marks' seatmate, the chatty but suspicious Jen Summers (Julianne Moore)? Is it the shifty-eyed co-pilot Kyle Rice, or perhaps his hush-hush flame and flight attendant, Nancy? Maybe it's Marks' fellow disgruntled brother in blue, Austin Reilly; maybe it's the bespectacled, Amsterdam-bound Tom; maybe it's Marks' fellow coke-smuggling marshal Jack Hammond. Heck, it could even be Marks himself, given his history of alcoholism, money and marital problems, not to mention the fact the account number in question is in – gasp – his name.

None of this makes much sense, none of it has to, and "Non-Stop" is at its best when the filmmakers leave it to its nonsensical devices. Dumb fun exists as a legitimate form of entertainment, and "Non-Stop" manages to maintain this balance for the first two acts. Things take a hard nosedive, though, when they have to pull together all these loose ends, and explodes in midair at the precise moment of its big reveal, which manages to be contrived and foregone but still completely unreasonable. It's predictable and out of nowhere all at once the worst thing it could be. In an attempt to make "Non-Stop" topical,

the hijackers' motives - hint: it's about September 11, just like every other movie - instead commit theatrical terrorism on what was, until that point, a relatively smooth but pleasantly incoherent ride.

Neeson is typically good here, displaying a grizzled, tough fragility he hasn't shown onscreen since, well, last time he was grizzled and tough on screen. "Taken 2," probably. Moore is more-or-less interchangeable, and she isn't given much to work with to set herself apart.

The supporting cast is rather fun, given you'll recognize them from other things and wholly forget their roles in "Non-Stop?

"There's that guy from 'House of Cards," you'll say, "and there's Executive Assistant District Attorney Mike Cutter from 'Law & Order,' and that one guy from that other thing!'

It's a veritable who's who of "that guys." Bewilderingly enough, Lupita Nyong'o, who just won an Academy Award for her heartbreaking performance in "12 Years a Slave," shows up as a flight attendant with exactly one spoken line, and that line is, "That was crazy." It's a real shame to follow-up her Oscar win with something so poorly conceived, but luckily for Nyongo, the wave of support she's received will likely wash this silly little trifle out of anyone's minds.

All told, "Non-Stop" is a middling thriller, enough fun in its first part and terrible in its finale, with so many crosses and false leads your head will spin. Best to take your seat, strap in for the ride and don't think about it too much. Just like air travel.

# Sustainable lawn care

#### Even in the desert, proper preparation is a green approach

Spring is right around the corner, which means it is now the time of the year to start thinking about your lawn.

Even in New Mexico, despite the ongoing drought, there are many who prefer a lush grass lawn to rocks, sand or xeriscaping. There are many benefits to this choice. Lawns absorb water and have a significant cooling effect. They provide oxygen, trap dust

and dirt and prevent erosion, among many other boons.

Because water is an issue in New Mexico, as is the trend toward moving away from dependence on chemical fertilizers, the best course of action is to improve the natural health of the lawn, so that it is effectively resistant to weeds, insects and diseases.

Knowing how and when to water will also decrease waste, without sacrificing the beauty a lawn can provide.

Here are a few tips to help achieve these lawncare goals:

**Choose the right grass to plant:** Grasses vary in the type of climate they prefer, the amount of water and nutrients required, shade tolerance and more. Pay a visit to a local garden center and ask for a recommendation on the grass that is best suited for the area. Extra points for asking about Eco-lawn grass seed, a drought-resistant blend of grasses that require little or no mowing and no fertilizer.

**Don't cut grass too short:** There is a school of thought that says the shorter the better, but this isn't true. If grass is mowed too close to the ground, surface roots become exposed, the soil dries out faster and surface aeration is reduced. Most grass is at its healthiest when kept between 2.5 and 3.5 inches in length.

**Don't water too often, but water deeply:** Deep watering encourages deep root systems, which will make the lawn more drought resistant. Let it dry out completely before watering again. A clever way of controlling water usage is to put a measuring cup in the sprinkler zone. Most healthy lawns only need about 1 inch of water per week. When the cup fills to 1 inch, turn the sprinkler off. Another rule of thumb is to water early in the morning to avoid evaporation.

Leave clippings on the lawn: Instead of raking up all of the shorn grass and tossing it away, recycle it. For best effect, don't mow the lawn until it's about 4 inches tall, then set the mower to remove only 1 inch off the top. The clippings will settle down into the lawn, providing nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus equal to one application of fertilizer.

Become a weed watcher: It may sound silly, but homeowners can learn a lot about their lawn by the kinds of weeds that are growing there. Dandelions thrive at a pH level of about 7.5, which means garderners sulfur may be needed to lower the pH. Clover and medic may be signs of a nitrogen deficiency, requiring compost or nitrogen rich fertilizer.

Corn Gluten meal is a healthy alternative to herbicides on the lawn, with a much greater kill rate for weeds.

**Don't use pesticides or herbicides if at all possible:** Pesticides kill the soil organisms that contribute to a healthy lawn. Corn gluten meal, a nontoxic byproduct of corn processing, has been researched for years at Iowa State University as a naturally effective alternative. The findings show that it not only adds nitrogen to your soil, it kills weed seedlings within days of application. Just one application before weeds begin to sprout, according to the study, reduces the weed survival rate by 60 percent. After a few years, the survival rate is reduced as much as 90 percent.

There are many more ways to enrich life naturally without giving up pleasantries in favor of austerity. Homeowners doing their part, by keeping their lawn green and healthy, is just one example of sustainable living in modern times.

Irish Nachos 1 package corned beef

in a 9-by-13-inch casserole dish and layer with shredded corned beef and jalapeño cheese. Bake for 7 to 10 minutes, or until cheese has melted. Top with veggies and sour cream, or other toppings of choice.

#### **Top Hat** Casserole

- 1 pound processed cheese, cubed 1 (13-ounce) can
- evaporated milk 1 pound cooked corned beef, shredded
- 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- Vegetable oil
- 12 corn tortillas
- 1/2 cup to 1 cup roasted green chile, chopped 1/2 cup onion, chopped 2 cups canned black beans,
- rinsed and drained Melt cheese in evaporated

milk in a heavy saucepan at low heat. In a mediumsized skillet, brown beef over medium heat. Drain. Season beef mixture with salt and garlic salt. Heat 1/2 inch of vegetable oil in a heavy pan at medium-high heat. Quickly dip each tortilla into the oil to soften. Drain on absorbent towels.

Layer all ingredients except cheese sauce in a greased, 2-quart casserole dish, beginning with a tortilla. Pour cheese sauce over layered ingredients and cover.

Bake in a 350 degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Serve with sour cream laced with green chile hot sauce if desired. Makes enough for 6 to 8.

#### Vegetarian Irish Whiskey Stew

2 cups carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally

- 2 cups leeks or onions, diced 1 cup parsnips, peeled and diced
- 1 cup sweet rutabaga, peeled and diced
- 2 cups green cabbage, shredded
- 1 cup barley
- 1 Anaheim or poblano green chile, stemmed,
- seeded and chopped
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 (46-ounce) can

tomato juice 1/2 cup brandy or Irish whiskey 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon veggie broth, or water, your choice

Heat sautéing liquid in a large pan then add leeks and barley. Sauté until leeks soften, then add tomato juice. Stir and bring to a boil. Add remaining ingredients except brandy and salt. Cover; lower heat to a simmer.

Cook until vegetables are tender, about 30 to 40 minutes. Add brandy and salt to taste. Serve with mashed potatoes seasoned with garlic salt. Makes 4 to 6 generous servings.

#### Pot o' Green-**Chile Cheddar** Cheese Soup

- 1/2 cup onions, finely
- chopped 4 tablespoons butter
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 tablespoons
- cornstarch
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 4 cups milk
- 1 cup carrots, cooked
- and chopped
- 1 cup celery, cooked
- and chopped 1/8 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 cup roasted green
- chile, stemmed, peeled and chopped

#### 1/2 pound cheddar cheese, finely shredded Chopped cilantro Salt to taste

Sauté the onions in butter until tender and transparent. Add flour and cornstarch, blending well. Add stock and milk gradually, stirring constantly. When boiling, add carrots, celery, paprika, green chile and cheese. Cook over low heat until cheese is melted. Add salt, if necessary,

Serve hot with finely chopped cilantro and sour cream spiked with green chile hot sauce. Makes enough for 6 to 8.

#### Serrano **Cabbage Slaw**

1 cup shredded cabbage 1 serrano pepper, stemmed,

seeded and shredded Juice from half a lime

2 teaspoons champagne vinegar

Red pepper flakes to taste

Add all ingredients to a mixing bowl and toss to combine. Refrigerate until ready to use. Makes 1 cup.

### Money from the sun Saving energy pays back big dividends

OK, so you're enjoying electric bills with a zero balance and regularly depositing checks from the electric company. Now that the financial impact of your solar power system is proven, wouldn't you like to take the next step and make it better?

It's not complicated, since it's all about the electricity. You can increase the financial win if you use less, make more, or both. Let's take a look at both of these options.

You can use less by just using less. Turn lights off and unplug the appliances not in use or rarely used in your home. Set the summer thermostat 1 or 2 degrees higher. Replace less-efficient appliances with higher-efficiency models when the time is right.

Perhaps you've tried a few of these ideas, but weren't sure if you were seeing results. After all, electric bills change every month and all you ever see is a 30-day-old total - not very good feedback when trying to alter behavior. If you could just see the results in real time, this would be much easier. The good news is, you can.

What you need is an energy monitoring system. Depending on your situation, they will pay for themselves in less than a year by helping you save kilowatt hours. These tools are easily found on the Internet and come in two varieties. One is a whole house energy monitor that lets you see the impact of every light switch. They're cool and easy to use.

A card-deck-sized monitor sits on your kitchen counter and shows your real-time electricity usage. After a while, you'll know just by looking at it what unnecessary appliances may be operating inside your home. One of my favorite devices is TED (The Energy Detective),

which you can find on Amazon for about \$250. If you have a pool, you can use TED to help fine tune your pump's run time and save lots of kilowatt hours.

The other tool is a Kill-A-Watt meter. These can also be found online, but they'll only set you back \$25 to \$50. Simply plug the meter into a wall outlet and plug the appliance to be tested into the meter. It has simple readouts showing how much electricity the appliance uses and will even translate that into dollars per year.

Either one of these devices will easily pay for itself.

The last way to use less electricity is to continue replacing those incandescent light bulbs with Compact Flourescent Lamps (CFL) or switch to the newer light-emitting diode (LED) variety. The prices on LED lights have fallen through the floor and, in some cases, they could be the last bulbs you'll ever buy.

If you get your electricity from El Paso Electric Co., you can make the most of your current incentive program by taking advantage of the drastically lower solar panel prices.

If you installed a system on your home or business between 2009 and 2013, you have a Renewable Energy Certificate incentive, somewhere between 4 and 15 cents. ### Humble beginnings

On Monday, Feb. 24, I got the email confirming my entry in the 25th annual Bataan Memorial Death March, to be held at White Sands Missile Range Sunday, March 23.

One month – that's how much time I had left to prepare myself for what is quite possibly going to be one of the most physically challenging tasks I will ever undertake.

Truth be told, after reading the safety precautions regarding the 14- and 26-mile trek through the Chihuahuan Desert, I re-considered my decision. The weather conditions alone - which may include frigid a.m. temperatures inevitably leading to a sweltering desert afternoon, mixed with possible tornadoforce winds - are enough to make me throw in the towel.

I also have quite a bit of work to do to get my body ready for the miles I'm about to force it to endure. Make no mistake, I'm no G.I. Jane. My weekend leisure activities typically include copious amounts of fried foods, cold beer and intermittent naps.

I do understand, however, that the thanks for the ability to enjoy these indolent activities are due to our armed forces, which protect our borders and fight our wars so the rest of us can feel safe to do whatsoever we please.

No amount of running is ever going to repay what some sacrifice. But the humility that occurs after completing an honorary run, as with the Bataan Memorial, is one I've only heard is overwhelming. It's a feeling I want to experience first-hand.

In the case of the Bataan Death March, which began April 9, 1942, in the midst of World War II, 75,000 American and Filipino soldiers were forced to walk a treacherous 70 miles with little to no food and water.

Between 7,000 and 10,000 men died during the march, and about 25,000 died in the days following, in what is considered one of the worst atrocities in modern wartime history.

Those men were not given the time and supplies to prepare for what lay ahead of them, and they certainly did not have a choice in the matter.

I feel fortunate to have all of the above, and my freedom and health. Those two things have immeasurable value, and are things many are not lucky enough to have.

That's my motivation to drag myself See Humble on page C22

Charles Redman warmly meets and greets visitors of the Las Cruces Railroad Museum every Thursday and Friday morning.

From 9 a.m. to noon, Redman is there helping the visitors who may be passing through the area, have an interest in trains or are looking for some kid-friendly entertainment.

"It's just interesting to see all the people who come in," Redman said.

Redman has volunteered at the railroad museum for the past year, as well as several choirs that sing to residents in nursing homes and hospice facilities. A World War II Navy veteran, he will turn 95 in July.

Redman moved to Las Cruces in 1951, where he was an electrical engineer at White Sands Missile Range for 33 years before moving to New Mexico State University for a 13year career working in solar energy.

"Older people need to get out and do things," Redman said, adding that he also makes it a point to walk 1 mile every day.

After volunteering with the Bureau of Land Management for 15 years greeting guests and guiding youth tours at recreational sites, Redman said a bout with bad health disabled his speech for a few years, preventing him from doing the volunteer work he had grown accustomed to.

In 2013, Redman heard of the City of Las Cruces' Volunteer Fair, and decided to check it out. That's where he met the representatives of the Las Cruces Railroad Museum, and he has been showing up every week since then.

Held at the Branigan Cultural Center, last year's Volunteer Fair placed more than 150 people among 36 nonprofit organizations needing the help of volunteers.

The attendance record is proof of not only the need for volunteers in the community, but of the willingness of Las Cruces citizens to lend helping hands.

The City of Las Cruces Network Volunteer Center coordinator Genevieve Kirk said the event is geared toward all ages, with the goal to help local nonprofits with recruitment for a variety of programs and services.

"A lot of college classes are requiring volunteer service now as part of their course, and this is a great place to get connected with those agencies," Kirk said. "We also see a lot of retired volunteers, whether they're new to this community or looking to make new friends.

"There have been a ton of studies about the health benefits of volunteering, talking about lower levels of depression and higher levels of happiness associated with people who choose to volunteer."

Volunteerism also contributes to lower levels of loneliness, she said, something that can pose high levels of emotional stress, especially in elders.

This year, there's going to be ice cream involved. With Caliche's Frozen Custard as the main sponsor, attendees of the volunteer fair

can take a punch card, speak with five agencies about volunteer opportunities and redeem their punch card for a free frozen custard.

The event will also feature a kid's activity table, in which they can participate in a service project and create get well cards for seniors at the Munson Senior Center, or just take one of several souvenirs home.

Kirk said the fair is a "one-stop shop" for those looking at how they can give back to their community.

"A lot of people, when they come to this community, they're not really sure what's out there for volunteer work, and this is really unique in that they can come one-stop shopping and explore volunteering with a wide array of opportunities," Kirk said. "Whether it's mentoring kids, office work, giving tours at city museums, there's really something here for everyone."

The New Mexico Department of Health announced proposed adjustments to the Medical Cannabis Program regulations within the confines of the current statute.

The department commissioned a survey in 2013 that addressed supply of medical cannabis relative to average patient use. The results showed that average patient use is exceeding available supply.

The department announced two adjustments to the program in order to meet the needs of qualified patients.

No. 1, the department is proposing to increase plant limit from 150 total plants and

### Bone up on bone health Calcium, exercise crucial to foundation

The foundation for our body, the structure that holds us up, is our bones.

Up to about age 30, we are continually adding bone and building bone mass. These bones not only hold us up, they protect our organs, anchor our muscles and allow us to move. After age 30, however, we are gradually and continually losing bone mass, putting us at risk for osteoporosis and fractures.

For tips on how to keep bones healthy, I talked to Good Samaritan Society-Las Cruces Village's Registered Dietician Rachel Mackintosh and Director of Rehabilitation, physical therapist Shane Sheehan.

The most important nutrient to build and maintain bones is calcium. Adults need about 1,000 milligrams of calcium a day; the recommendation for women older than 50 and men older than 70 is 1,200 milligrams.

"Milk is probably the cheapest and easiest way to get calcium," Mackintosh said. "An 8-ounce glass of milk has 300 milligrams of calcium, so three glasses a day will get you most of the way there."

If you aren't a milk drinker, there are still ways to get calcium from your diet. Other dairy products – yogurt, cheese and (yes!) ice cream – are all good sources. Almond milk is also a calcium-packed alternative. Other good choices are calcium-fortified orange juice or tofu.

Fish with the bones, such as anchovies or sardines, are also good, Mackintosh said. When preparing to sauté vegetables or other foods, she suggested throwing an anchovy into the olive oil before adding your ingredients. What should you not consume? Cola. "Colas are high in phosphorus," Mackintosh said.

Your body is constantly balancing the ratio of calcium to phosphorus in your system. If you drink an excessive amount of cola, "your body will actually pull calcium out of your bones to offset the phosphorus," Mackintosh said.

Is surpassing your recommended calcium intake even better? No. Mackintosh said there has been no benefit shown from higher levels of calcium intake. Excessive calcium intake interferes with iron absorption and will make you anemic.

Vitamin D helps your body absorb calcium. Milk is fortified with vitamin D and many calcium supplements also contain vitamin D. It is also the one nutrient your body can make with the help of the sun.

"Twenty minutes a day of sunshine will produce enough vitamin D to prevent a deficiency," Mackintosh said.

Another reason to stay physically active – it is good for your bones.

"Putting weight through your bones strengthens them," Sheehan said.

Yoga, weight training and tennis are all great, but one of the best choices is also cheap, accessible and suitable for almost any fitness level: walking.

"One of the best things you can do is just walk," Sheehan said. "Walking puts a tremendous amount of pressure through your joints and strengthens them."

So, put on your walking shoes, get moving and reward yourself afterward with a nice glass of chocolate almond milk. Your bones will thank you.
