Wage debate splits council Series planned for Great Conversations

The city will be providing a venue for a series of Great Conversations about the minimum wage after a Las Cruces City Council work session Monday, Feb. 24, resulted in little consensus about what course of action to take.

Prompting the need for a working session on the minimum wage issues was a proposal by councillors Miguel Silva and Greg Smith to form an ad hoc committee on the contentious issue. While social justice advocates are pushing the city to raise the minimum wage, local businesses are pushing back, saying raising the minimum wage would make it more difficult – even impossible, according to some – to do business in the city.

At the start of the meeting, Silva said he still backed the idea of forming a committee, calling it "golden opportunity" to bring the different sides together to talk to each other.

"I view my role, as a city councillor, is to unite the community, instead of driving a wedge to divide the community," Silva said.


The business community knows the minimum wage needs to be addressed, Silva said, and would like to be active participants in the discussions.

But Councillor Olga Pedroza characterized the committee proposal as a delaying tactic, unless the committee is charged with putting forth a proposal. But even that is just the councillors "shrugging our responsibility," Pedroza said.

"People can't afford to wait," she said. "Saying the poor are always with us can't be used as an excuse to not help them."

Pedroza said there is ample evidence to show raising the minimum wage will be good for the community, so she didn't see any reason for the council to delay taking action.

NMSU to revisit on-campus hotel Interested parties sought

New Mexico State University is seeking people or companies that would be interested in creating a three-star hotel on campus near the convention center.

NMSU will soon be putting out a Request for Qualification and Development Concepts (RFQ) to begin getting the process back on track for the hotel, which would also give real-world experience to students in the hospitality and tourism program.

The idea for a hotel to complement experience students at the Las Cruces Convention Center was there in the beginning, when NMSU worked with the City of Las Cruces to provide land for the center. But when the center opened in late 2010, the economy was still reeling from the housing market collapse, so the hotel idea was put on hold.

March 4 elections to decide local leaders Four county communities voting

On Tuesday, March 4, voters in Mesilla, Hatch, Sunland Park and Anthony, N.M., will decide on candidates in open races for municipal government positions.

The Mesilla mayoral race between incumbent Nora Barraza and Trustee Jesus Caro Jr. took an unexpected turn a week before voting when the town's marshal, Tom Austin, accused Barraza of "misappropriation of funds" in a letter sent to trustees but also shared with the news media. The letter didn't go into specifics but referenced variances in

cifics, but referenced variances in overtime expenditures. Barraza is refuting the accusations, saying Austin hasn't followed her orders to keep overtime down.

In smaller municipalities such as Mesilla, the mayor takes on many administrative duties a city manager would handle, as in Las Cruces. Until Austin's letter, Caro's main criticism of Barraza was that she acted too independent of the Board of Trustees







Leadership solid at NMSU Carruthers, Howard bring positive approach

Last week I had lunch with my old friend and colleague, Darrell Pehr, on the New Mexico State University campus.

It was Feb. 19 and yet the weather was nice enough we could eat outside on the picnic tables outside Einstein Bros. Bagels

Before and after lunch, I ambled the long way, an excuse to enjoy the weather and take in a little slice of college life.

There's always something inspiring and uplifting about a college campus, filled with people actively working on their goals, many of them younger, full of life and promise.

That feeling was enhanced by the sight of several trees that had been coaxed into budding by the recent high temperatures.

A year ago at this time, New Mexico State University was in a state of flux.

An interim president was in place and there was debate about who should take over the university's leadership. Provost Wendy Wilkins resigned, with a letter critical of morale, direction and financial approaches at NMSU.

Then, on May 6, 2013, regents named Garrey Carruthers as NMSU's 27th president. That did not necessarily settle the debate. The presidency was earned on a 3-2 vote,

with regents split along political party lines between former New Mexico Republican Gov. Carruthers and another strong candidate, former NMSU department head Dan Howard. A short time later Carruthers himself ended the debate. Knowing the quality and

popularity of Howard, Carruthers authorized the regents to skip a lengthy, expensive national search to fill NMSU's open provost and executive vice president position. After all, Howard had just been through such a search as a presidential candidate, and was the clear second choice for that position.

So in August, the regents named Howard as NMSU's executive vice president and provost. Carruthers hit the ground running in June, and has not let up.

With his business and professional experience, Carruthers has developed an outstanding knack for raising money. That has been an important part of his tenure so far, and he has quickly built a good foundation for bringing important funds to NMSU.

Carruthers' affable personality has served him well both on and off campus. He has been open, accessible and active. With his experience as governor, Carruthers moves as easily in the halls of government in Santa Fe as he does in the halls of the NMSU campus. That skill serves him and the university well. Pehr, who regularly visits NMSU's extension offices around the state, said Carruthers' agricultural background and status as the only former Aggie to be president, has made him a hit outside Las Cruces as well.

Howard is not quite the recognizable public figure as Carruthers, but he spent 20 years teaching at NMSU. When he was a candidate for president, he received a great deal of support from current faculty who knew him well. Howard has his own affability and seems quite comfortable in his position.

The president is the university's top administrative official, while the provost is the top academic official.

From my observations, it appears Carruthers and Howard are as popular as two in their position can be. While everyone in a leadership position will have detractors, there appear to be few in this case. Each is energized and enthusiastic about their roles.

Their familiarity and experience with NMSU gives them the institutional knowledge to be effective and the pride to move the university forward.

Students typically are more involved with their classes, activities and social lives than with who's actually running the college. While probably many would recognize Carruthers, and some would recognize Howard, they aren't figures who occupy a very big space in students' minds. That's understandable and probably perfectly fine.

The reverse is not true, however. Carruthers and Howard are focused deeply on the students, their futures and the opportunity NMSU provides them.

So while strolling on campus last week felt in many ways like strolling across any campus in America, there was a specific air of promise, an immediate sense of positivity on the International Mall at NMSU.

cure poverty

As a lawyer, I rarely take the time to write a letter to the editor. I was moved to do so when I read the column you ran by Rev. Thomas Baca on Feb. 14. I echo Rev. Baca's observation that poverty is more than "malnutrition."

If you've ever missed a paycheck or lost a job, you know that poverty is more than lack of food - it's the inability to make rent, cover the cost of you or your child's lab, physician and hospital fees, find eight quarters for the washing machine, pay for your books and tuition on time and keep your phone service on.

It's the difference between completing your college degree or staying in a low-wage job and going home each night when you're exhausted from work to care for elderly parents, sick siblings or a newborn child. Poverty is the price we pay, as a community, when we apply a different, lower standard to others than the one we apply to ourselves. It invites despair, and cultural, intellectual and moral reliance on knee-jerk solutions to complex problems, conditions that can't be cured with a food stamp.

WPA writers and photographers documented the effects of The Great Depression that led to the "War On Poverty." If my experience representing abused and neglected children and their parents is any indication, those effects are manifest in local families notwithstanding the presence of Child Protective Services with its various social workers and Holloman Air Force Base with its industry of drones and trained soldiers ready to deploy outside the area on a moment's notice.

When respected colleagues tell me our area's economic problems are due to illegal immigrants "stealing our jobs and taking our licenses," point out with pride that "we even have a Buffalo Wild Wings," speak favorably of creating "tax incentives" for big business rather than supporting small, locally owned concerns, and wish me a "great day" on their way to make a deposit in one of our many, many banks, I'm reminded that poverty isn't confined to the poor.

Thank you, Rev. Baca, for your caring, insightful and deeply touching commentary. I wish there were more people who thought like you.

An ungrateful government Politicians give veterans little respect

"You haven't an arm, you haven't a leg, you're an armless, boneless, chickenless egg. You'll have to be put with a bowl out to beg. Oh Johnny I hardly knew ya." – 19th century Irish anti-war song

The flowers of our youth march off to war carrying the honor of our nation into battle.

Recently I quoted in another column the saying, "A man of words and not of deeds is like a garden full of weeds."

That is what I think of our current crop of politicians locally, statewide and nationally. Most, not all, spout their support for the military and veterans, but vote otherwise. They try to get the vote of veterans without actually supporting them.

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

Tragedy transcends rivalry Red and blue, green and gold come together

When describing the heat and passion of the Las Cruces-Mayfield high school rivalry, I've often used this line: "They have a mutual respect and a mutual disgust for each other."

What happened Tuesday, Feb. 25, at a boys basketball game – a game the Mayfield Trojans weren't even playing in – transcends athletics, rivalry and everything Bulldawgs and Trojans. It was downright moving and neighborly.

The Las Cruces Bulldawg boosters handed out green ribbons for fans to wear while also soliciting donations during the Las Cruces-Alamogordo District Tournament game Tuesday, Feb. 25. The efforts were to show support for Mayfield boys basketball head coach Tommy Morrow and his family. A devastating fire burned the Morrow house to the ground Friday while the Trojans were clinching the District 3-5-A regular season title against Oñate High School.

Morrow got first word of the blaze Friday, Feb. 21, during a post-game interview that his house was in flames. He left immediately to check on what was eventually found to be a total loss.

The highs of winning the district championship were quickly replaced with the lows of becoming homeless. Six people lived in the Morrow household. It could overwhelm anyone, but the community has come through from almost the first minute.

"It started that night," Morrow said. "Standing there, looking at the flames, people were stuffing money in my pockets. So that was Friday night. Then Sunday morning was that unbelievable car wash. It was spectacular."

The Bulldawg basketball booster club raised \$1,836 from fans who attended the Las Cruces-Alamogordo district tournament game.

The game was halted at the end of the third quarter with Las Cruces trailing by two so Las Cruces head coach William Benjamin could present the cash to coach Morrow. (See photo on page A1.)

Everyone in the gym, Bulldawg fans, Trojan coaches and players, Alamogordo fans and people there without any allegiance rose in unison giving Morrow a standing ovation. Even the game officials were applauding. You don't see that every day. Alamogordo guard JoJo Jones went to

midcourt to greet Morrow as the ovation continued. Then Benjamin grabbed a microphone and spoke briefly about community and helping others.

"That could've been anybody's house. Any one of our houses." Benjamin said.

"I'm having trouble putting this into words because of this damn game," Benjamin added, drawing laughs as the game was drama-filled and heated at the moment of the presentation.

"I'm pleased how the community came out and supported Tommy tonight. I just wanted to do something. Not only is he a coach, an educator and a leader, rivalry aside, red and blue, green and gold, it doesn't really matter. This is about community in a time of need."

Morrow took the microphone and addressed the standing crowd. He thanked all of Las Cruces on this night in the middle of the basketball floor of his biggest rival. Morrow was truly touched.

"This right here," Morrow said. "It is just so classy."

He accepted the bags stuffed with cash. You want to talk about a feel good moment.

Earlier, Morrow talked about the shock of losing everything balanced by the generosity seen afterward.


"A lot of our friends are teachers," Morrow said. "We know what teachers have. And they are giving until it hurts. Normally we would say, 'No, No.' But everybody knows we aren't in a position to say no. We've had strangers give us significant amounts. And they don't want to tell us their name. They just say, 'No, you need this. We know what you're about; take it. It's humbling, it really is. Every day is a new revelation."

By the way, the game Tuesday was exceptional. Las Cruces won 71-64 in overtime.

A lot of people walked away from that game from different parts of Las Cruces, different parts of the state, Alamogordo fans pitched in too, having contributed to a family's uplifting in a rival's gym.

Sometimes it's not about the scoreboard.

Ben Woods, NMSU senior vice president for external relations and chief of staff, said the RFQ is for the same 3.8 acres on the southeast corner of University Avenue and East Union Avenue, across from the convention center.

NMSU President Garrey Carruthers has said he wants to see if the on-campus hotel idea can work with the economy now more stable.

Woods said the RFQ is for a three-star, limited-service hotel because that is what a study found the Las Cruces market could use more of – but that doesn't mean it can't be upgraded if the hotel performs well. The RFQ does give respondents the flexibility to submit a proposal for a higher quality hotel and doesn't give a room limit, which the RFQ states should be determined by market conditions.

The goal for NMSU in the RFQ, Woods said, is to see if someone or a company is willing to build the hotel and work with the hospitality and tourism program while ensuring NMSU gets a fair return on the leasing of the land.

The draft of the RFQ is 22 pages long and covers a two-step process in which interested parties can submit their qualifications and concepts for review by university officials and regents. One or more may be selected for further review and interviews. NMSU will then rank the interviewed respondents to determine the preferred respondent.

The RFQ goes into de-tail about the land, its location next to the convention center and its accessibility to Interstates 25 and 10. The RFQ notes the concept of the hotel is in line with the university's desire to see University Ávenue become a corridor more interactive with the community. The hotel should "should reflect the regional influences that shaped the campus, celebrating the links to its agricultural past," the draft RFQ states.

The RFQ states the lease will include details of how the hotel would provide opportunities for "internships, experiential learning and joint programs" with the NMSU School of Hotel Restaurant and Tourism Management.

The draft RFQ does not yet have deadlines or timelines set for the process.

- and Caro has been critical of over-enforcement by the marshal's department in his campaign.

With Caro running for mayor, that leaves only one incumbent running for the board's two open position – Linda Flores. Four others are running for the two open slots, Christopher Alexander, Charles Bourger Jr., Russell Hernandez and Stephanie Johnson Burick. The trustees are elected at large, meaning the top two vote earners are elected to the board.

Most of the campaign debate has been about how the tourist town can better attract visitors, because the town government gets very little from property taxes and is very dependent on gross receipts taxes.

There's also a mayor's race in the village of Hatch. Andy Nuñez is the current mayor. He was selected by the trustees to finish the term left vacant by the death of Judd Nordyke last year. Nuñez, a former state representative, is also running for the Legislature as a Republican after failing to be elected as an independent after he left the Democratic Party.

Challenging Nuñez as mayor is former village trustee Lloyd Burns.

As in Mesilla, Hatch has two trustee openings to be elected at large, with four candidates running – incumbents Kathie Marie Franzoy and Roberto Torres – challenged by Dave Sment and Corey Watkins.

Voters in Sunland Park will elect a municipal judge and City Council representatives for districts 1, 2 and 3.

Candidates for the District 1 seat are Kenneth Giove, Christian Lira, Alberto Barrigan and Carmen Rodriguez. Only one candidate, Francisco Jaime, filed for the council's District 2 seat. Candidates for District 3 are Jaime Robles and Daniel De Los Santos.

Sunland Park incumbent Municipal Judge Lisette Salinas is being challenged by Gerardo Hernandez and Jesus Soto.

In Anthony, N.M., there are two city trustee positions open. Incumbents Betty Gonzalez and Diana Murillo are unopposed for re-election.

The last day for early voting is from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Friday, Feb. 28.

Voting on Tuesday, Election Day, is from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Councillor Nathan Small said people who work for minimum wage can't take time off to serve on a committee, so such a group would be, by default, exclusionary. Small noted there is a group currently working on putting a minimum wage question on a ballot, and said the council should not stand in the way of people being actively engaged in their government.


With the committee proposal lacking support on the council, the idea of holding a series of Great Conversations was discussed. Great Conversations are open discussions led by an experienced facilitator that can guide participants to finding common ground on controversial topics.

But Small said he was against anything that could influence the process of citizens attempting a ballot referendum.

"I'm growing increasingly dismayed as what I perceive as subtly subverting the charter process for citizens to be able to determine if they want to do an initiative in our community," he said.

Councillor Gill Sorg said he was against the idea of committee, but could support the Great Conversations if they helped provide a better community dialogue. So long as the forums reflected all sides of the argument, Sorg said they should be televised and shown on the Internet.

The Great Conversations series is credited with clearing impediments to allow some homeless people to live in a tent city at the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope. Great Conversations facilitator Randy Harris said the series of minimum wage conversations



Ceil Levatino, the newest city councillor, said she was opposed to raising the minimum wage during the current state of the economic sluggishness.

"I'm not philosophically opposed to raising the minimum wage, but this is a lousy time to be doing it," she said.

Levatino said she found it curious that those wanting to raise the minimum wage appeared to be the most against having a public conversation about it. She said the business community is willing to have the conversation. Many of the businesses in Las Cruces are small and would either have to cut back hiring more workers or reduce the number of workers.

Mike Beckett, president of COAS Book Stores, said raising the minimum wage could put him out of business, which almost happened the last time the minimum wage was raised. Even a \$1 an hour raise would cost his used book store business, which employs 35 people, \$50,000 over the course of a year, he said, and that could be too much of a cost to keep his doors open.

The minimum wage in Las Cruces is \$7.50 per hour – 25 cents more than the federal requirement.

State Rep. Bill McCamley, D-Las Cruces, said any argument made about raising the minimum wage hurting the economy and businesses was reflected in how places fared that did raise the minimum wage independently of the federal government. Idaho and New Jersey raised minimum wages with no loss of businesses, he said. In Santa Fe, some businesses did better, and there has been no statistical drop in the number of jobs in the city, he said.



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

Martinez appointed Fouratt to serve as DPS cabinet secretary after former Cabinet Secretary Gorden Eden Jr. was selected as Albuquerque Police Department's new chief of police.

"I am honored and humbled to have Gov.

Martinez's support and confidence in this new role," Fouratt said. "I am looking forward to working with the governor and our state's dedicated public safety employees. New Mexico is a wonderful place to live, work and raise a family, and I am grateful for this opportunity to continue working to make it even better."

Prior to this appointment, Fouratt served as senior litigation counsel in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of New Mexico, where he investigated and prosecuted cases of national and international scope, including capital murder and major fraud. tions in the next few months, so he accepted the fund transfer.





Man shot by police Suspect branished 'pistol'

Las Cruces Police Departmenand the Officer-Involved Incident Task Force are continuing their investigation into Tuesday, Feb. 25, shooting on the East Mesa that left a man hospitalized.

The 42-year-old man received a gunshot wound to his upper arm and is being treated at University Medical Center of El Paso. His injuries are not life-threatening and no charges have been filed against him at this time.

At around 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Las Cruces Police were dispatched to the report of a possible domestic-related altercation between a man and woman near Porter Drive, north of U.S. Highway 70. The call to dispatch indicated that one of the subjects was armed with a handgun.

The first-arriving officer located the couple believed to be involved in the domestic near the Chucky's Food Mart on the 5900 block of Bataan Memorial West. Preliminary information from the investigation indicates the man pulled out a handgun and refused the Las Cruces Police officer's commands to drop the weapon.

The officer fired at least one shot, which is believed to have struck the man's arm. No other injuries were reported.

Investigators determined that the firearm displayed by the man was an air pistol made by Umarex that closely resembles an authentic Smith & Wesson M&P 9mm handgun commonly used by some law enforcement agencies. The BB gun is manufactured as a replica and looks nearly identical to the Smith & Wesson M&P 9mm, with logos and other identifiable markings.

Elena Holguin's college career has been plagued by injury.

The redshirt sophomore guard recently returned to action for the New Mexico State University women's basketball team. The Mayfield High School graduate suffered a meniscus tear during a game and underwent surgery.

The knee injury was her second, for she said she tore her anterior cruciate ligament during her freshman year, when she redshirted.

"It's out of your control," said Holguin, who averaged 1.4 points and 1.7 rebounds in 23 games last year. "It's really hard. It's been an adventure." She had a season-high 19

points, including a

season-high six three-pointers in seven attempts, during a mid-November game. She had 18 and 14 points, respectively, in the next two games.

But Holguin was sidelined during December and most of January. She entered this week playing in 15 of 26 games. She averaged 6.8 points, fifth on the team, and 2.4 rebounds.

"I'm usually put in to score," she said. "My knee's fine. I'm just trying to get my rhythm back."

She made her lone start in the team's win Thursday, Feb. 20. She played a season-high 27 minutes and had six points, a season-high six rebounds and three assists. Even before the latest injury, this season required adjustment on her part. The team has a new offensive scheme, so she had to work on her ball handling.

"My freshman year all we had were quick plays," she said. "Now we do it dribble drive. I like the dribble drive. We're really small. The dribble drive helps us out a lot."

The NM State women's basketball team won three of four games to climb back into the Western Athletic Conference race.

The fourth-place Aggies, now 7-6 in conference play, host second-place Bakersfield at 6 p.m. Saturday, March 1, in their final home game of the season.

The Aggies hosted Utah Valley Thursday, Feb. 27, in a game that took place after the Bulletin's press time. NM State closes the regular season March 6 at Grand Canyon. The Aggies are now 8-3 at home.

Madness of March descends Aggies hit road; final home game March 6

It also marks the final game ever in the Pan American Center for Aggie seniors Renaldo Dixon and Kevin Aronis.

The March 6 Senior Night game against Grand Canyon also will be the final Western Athletic Conference regular season game prior to the conference tournament Thursday and Friday, March 13-15, in Las Vegas.

The goal, as always, for head coach Marvin Menzies' squad will be to win the WAC tourney and earn the automatic berth to the NCAA tournament, as they have three of the past four years.

As of this writing, the Aggies were atop the WAC standings, with a 10-3 conference mark and a 21-8 overall record. However, NMSU was set to play twice after press time, road games against Utah Valley (Thursday, Feb. 27) and Bakersfield (Saturday, March 1). A victory against Utah Valley, which

A victory against Utah Valley, which went into the game with a 10-3 conference record identical to the Aggies,' would put NMSU in the driver's seat headed into the WAC tourney.

If the Aggies win one or both of those games, and third-place Grand Canyon sweeps its next two games, the stakes would rise for the March 6 game.

Since losing to Idaho on the road Feb. 6, NMSU has earned four straight victories in dominant fashion, winning by margins of 15, 23, 29 and 17.

NMSU is the offensive powerhouse of the league, leading the WAC in scoring (80.5 points per game in conference play), scoring

In the midst of her 11th season as head coach for the New Mexico State University softball team, Kathy Rodolph clinched her 300th career victory in an 11-2 win over Incarnate Word Saturday, Feb. 22.

She entered the 2014 season with a record of 291-281 all-time as the Aggies head coach.

Rodolph joined NMSU in 2004, and now is the all-time winningest

coach in Aggie softball history. In her best season with NMSU, Rodolph led the surging Aggies to their first-ever Western Athletic Conference title and leading NMSU to its first ever NCAA tournament appearance in 2011.

Rodolph has strung together a series of seven seasons with 30-plus victories. Her career high in season wins came as the Aggies recorded 38 victories and she was named WAC Coach of the Year in 2011.

He's outta there!



Including her time coaching before arriving at NMSU, Rodolph has 497 victories. She could earn 500th career win as a college head coach as early as this weekend in Las Vegas, Nev., when the Aggies play five games at the Eller Media Stadium Classic.

Leading the Aggies to a second place finish last season, Rodolph and the Aggies set a record for longest winning streak in program history

with 11 wins. The record setting victory came against No. 17 Arizona.

For the 2014 season, Rodolph has led the Aggies to a 10-5 record at presstime, and they ride a current win streak of eight games.

She also coached Staci Rodriguez to WAC Player of the Year in 2013 and former Aggie Valerie Swedberg to conference Freshman of the Year in 2011.

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

Onthegreen Snail's pace mires golf Slow play continues recession



Continuing my diatribe on the golf industry's need to grow the game, it should come as no surprise that golf has been in a steady decline since before the recession began.

Why? Very succinctly: It takes too much time; it's too expensive; it's too frustrating; and it's no fun.

Having just recently attended the PGA Merchandise Show in Orlando, I was struck both by the exciting new products and also by the stagnation of the golf business.

With the exception of TaylorMade, which launched a loosely conceived Californiastyle initiative they call Hack Golf, there is a lack of any sense of urgency to think and move outside the box.

Compared to, say, leisure walking or bird watching (both alternative activities mentioned in national studies dealing with the death of golf), golf is rather expensive. And I can relate to the negative feelings of frustration from time to time, although that element seems to tap into a more visceral and deeply rooted personality style.

Some folks are better off training for marathons; some are better off playing chess. I know plenty of golfers who can't break 100 but don't leave the golf course angry or ready to explode. Some tour and college players, who want to go low every round, and sometimes have unrealistic expectations, turn into trunk-slammers. I'm not a trunk-slammer, but I do expect to have fun every time I play. And I don't like to wait. Anywhere.

These days the biggest excuse is that "golf just takes too long." Golf's snail pace becomes even more underscored when you consider that the near-term future of golf is not retired geezers playing in Sun City; it's busy folks 20 to 55 who multi-task their way through the day and who are already in a clock crunch.

Part of the difficulty stems from golf courses that are too long and too hard for the average player. Golf course designers, for all their expertise and artistry, have thought for far too long that golf courses should deceive the eye, require perfect shots and achieve a measure of difficulty that humiliates those golfers who are inept.

They trick up courses, make the greens un-puttable, scrape out stupid ponds with their bulldozers and make bunkers that are so wide and deep as if they were made by 16inch shells fired from the USS New Jersey. For the past 100 years, golf was drawn out by architects who created golf courses that are not golfer-friendly, need over-watering and are much too long for the average golfer.

I'm in favor of more executive golf courses and a pace of play that moves along

briskly. But the snail problem goes much deeper and is much more complicated.

Let's start with what chop golfers see on television. TPC Sawgrass, Pebble Beach and televised professional tournaments are not the future of everyman golf. Heck, even Jack Nicklaus says watching golf on television is like watching paint dry.

I think the PGA Tour and the coconspirator networks are promoting slow play by the way they run and show their tournaments – by example and default that is dreadful for golf. At home watching his 85-inch flat screen, Joe Hacker is naturally fixed on Tiger as Tiger checks and re-checks his club selection for an announced critical approach shot, while a PGA volunteer crowd control Nazi bullies paying spectators 50 feet away to shut up.

Then, after Tiger leaves his shot in a hazard short of the 270-yard carry he had planned, he's waiting for a PGA rules guru to show up to tell him what to do, since he hasn't studied the rule book enough.

He sure doesn't want to make some minute slip-up and have a viewer call in to the tour and then find out he signed for a wrong score and get DQ'd. So he waits, and waits – and we watch him wait. And we haven't even made it to the green, where Tiger is compelled to stalk his now par putt from seven different angles. C'mon, man!

I don't think the slow-play problem boils down to bad golfers. Some hackers play fast, not really fantasizing they are being taped by a CBS-TV camera with Jim Nantz announcing. If golf courses had designated drop areas or play zones at about 150 yards out from the green it might speed things up. Novice players could start from there.

When a beginner tops the ball along the ground three or four times to get to where he can finally get a shot airborne (at about 150 yards), no wonder he leaves the property in frustration. Nor did he appreciate the guys behind yelling obscenities and hitting into them.

I don't have the answer to the slow-play dilemma. I wonder, if golf does not address this as an industry-sensitive issue, will it will spell even further trouble in participation and even deeper losses as time goes on? Emerging market segments, such as teens and young adults, won't have the attention span or the interest to tolerate a chunk of six or seven hours (including car time) to devote to a singular entertainment form. Plus, surveys say kids don't view golf as cool anymore.

Golf courses have tried using signs, advisories, education and cajoling to speed up play. Notices on carts and other tactics to get golfers moving seem to go unheeded. Even marshals and golf course ambassadors have little influence on folks who think it's their rightful entitlement to poke along as long as they bloody well please if they have paid their money or are club members.

Course marshals need all their social skills and assertiveness training in dealing with sometimes over-served and unintelligent Neanderthals with golf clubs in their hands. A few marshals have shared with me they are afraid to anger the regular and club golfers.

One answer may be having a few uniformed bouncers in golf carts patrolling the golf course. I mean guys who are at least 6 feet tall, weigh more than 200 pounds and are under age 55. It's unlikely the snails would be inclined to mouth off with those guys.

Golfers are charged green fees for a certain number of holes, usually nine or 18. But maybe they should be charged for four hours of course occupancy and ushered away when the time has expired.



• On the front page of the Las Cruces Citizen was a report that the Elephant Butte dam, currently under construction and "about 50 percent complete," was "of stupendous proportions and a magnificent conception of engineering skill." It was reported to be "the biggest and finest irrigation project ever undertaken by the United States reclamation service."

• It was reported a committee of the "most eminent medical men of Europe" had been appointed to study the climates of the world, "with regard to their beneficial effect upon healthseekers." 

NMSU endowment funds perform well Returns follow national trends

Like many university endowments across the country, the New Mexico State University Foundation endowment once again saw increased returns in 2013 and averaged similar returns to many endowments of a similar size, according to a joint study by the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO) and the Commonfund Institute released Jan 28.

The NMSU Foundation is a separately incorporated, nonprofit organization existing solely for the benefit of NMSU. The purpose of the Foundation is to secure, manage and invest private gifts for the benefit of NMSU's teaching, research, extension education and public service programs.

The average annual total net returns for institutions having endowments of \$101 million-\$500 million for fiscal year 2013 was 11.9 percent. For that same time period, the NMSU Foundation

Foundation to NMSU's mission," said Tina Byford, interim NMSU vice president for university advancement and NMSŪ Foundation president. "Growing our endowment is perhaps the single most important role the foundation plays on behalf of the university."


The 2013 NACUBO-Commonfund Study of Endowments (NCSE) gathered data from 849 U.S. colleges, universities and affiliated foundations. The average return for endowments of all sizes was 11.7 percent, an improvement over fiscal year 2012.

The study also looks at participants' asset allocation and spending. The NMSU Foundation's asset allocation model is heavily weighted to domestic stocks, international equities and fixed income. Only 23 percent is invested in the alternative market. This is a common practice among endowments of NMSU's size. Larger endowments tend to invest more in alternative markets. NMSU's spending rate, as a percentage of beginning market value, was 4.05 percent, which compares to the 4.4 percent overall average for all public institutions participating in the study.

The NCSE for fiscal year 2013 is the result of a research partnership between NACUBO and Commonfund.

Construction for New Mexico State University's Corbett Center Student Union renovation is scheduled to begin by Feb. 28 and will last approximately 14 months. Wooten Construction Co. of Las Cruces was awarded the contract earlier this month.

'The scope of the project is pretty extensive. The goal is to create a student-friendly, student-centered building, so a lot of the project is making it the kind of space students want," said Julie Weber, NMSU director of housing and campus life. "Some of the criticism we've always taken about this building is that it is a heavily meeting-space building, and students can't use it and can't feel at home here. There's not enough drop-in space, not enough lounge space."

Weber said student concerns will be addressed in the project, including converting the old bookstore space at the west end of the building into a giant, two-story multipurpose student lounge that can be used as drop-in space, an entertainment venue and a programmatic space. All of the direct student-involvement offices such as Campus Activities, Greek Life and Associated Students of New Mexico State University will move into that space, centered in the complex.

Most of the meeting rooms will be removed from the second floor, relocating the majority of the conference facilities into one location on the third floor. The second floor will contain more study nooks, but many of them will be private study rooms surrounded by glass.

"The glass study rooms will allow students to be right at the heart of things, but still have quiet," Weber said.

The Dean of Students office and Campus Activities will move to where ASNMSU currently is, and the computer lab will move from the periphery to the center of the building. The current computer lab location will revert to a game room, as it once was.

The whole second floor will change to a curved promenade look, rather than a long, straight hall. Many glass features will give the building a more open feel, and the second floor will look over into outdoor space, instead of the hallway ending of abruptly.

We are very fortunate that the budget for the project will allow us to fix some infrastructure things and get in some projects that we weren't sure would make it into the budget," Weber said. "For example, the outdoor stage on the east end of the building is getting a canopy and sound system built into it so it's easier for us to use that venue for events?

Infrastructure improvements include converting the building's electrical system so that a backup generator can be used in the event of a power outage, which is a key update, as campus residential foodservice is located at Corbett. The ballroom floor and ceiling will be replaced, along with the roof of the building.

"Probably the thing that we've heard the most positive reaction to is that we are going to improve the technological infrastructure of the building," Weber said. "Right now, our

biggest complaint is that if there's a conference upstairs on the third floor and everyone is trying to access wireless, very quickly the wireless system in this building is full."

Corbett will go from the current wireless capacity of about 300 users to about 1,700 once the project is complete. The technology upgrades will also allow users to have continuous access while in the building, rather than getting knocked off one of 26 current wireless access points and not being able to access the next while walking through the building. There will be 70 wireless access points enabling continuous service while in the building.

Other features of the renovation project include a nondenominational, nonreservable meditation space on the second floor that can be divided into two private rooms with curtains, and three "cones of silence" that will allow students working under the cones to listen to audio or video without anyone nearby hearing the audio.

Legislation supports water conservation, drought relief

U.S. Sens. Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich are backing legislation to conserve water resources and promote sustainability

The SECURE Water Amendments Act of 2014 would expand grants and increase funding for water conservation and drought projects, and provide resources for better data collection and analysis of water supply and use.

The bill, introduced by U.S. Sen. Brian

Schatz (D-Hawai'i), chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water and Power, was heard in committee Thursday, Feb. 27.

"As New Mexico deals with the sixth consecutive year of drier-than-average conditions, the provisions in this bill to conserve water and improve efficiency are more important than ever," Udall said.

"Funding the SECURE Water Act was one of the recommendations made during the New Mexico Water Conference, which I hosted in Las Cruces, and contained in the Water Report I issued last spring. This bill would build on that recommendation and ensure critical resources are available

to help New Mexico adapt and respond to water scarcity, and it's one of several measures I will continue to support to address

New Mexico's water needs." "The ongoing drought has taken a heavy toll on our state," Heinrich said. "This bill will provide New Mexico with resources to plan for and combat drought and to assist in developing a comprehensive national water strategy.

'Expanding funding for projects that conserve and use water more efficiently will help create much needed long-term solutions to save water and money in our communities suffering from the impacts of years of drought."

- To conserve water and promote sustainability, the bill: Increases funding for WaterSMART grants. The bill will increase funding for the Department of the Interior's WaterSMART grant program, which supports local water management projects that conserve and use water more efficiently, increases the use of renewable energy, protects endangered species and facilitates water markets.
- Provides resources to plan for and combat drought. With droughts in New Mexico, and across the country, this bill makes sure projects that prepare for and respond to droughts are prioritized for funding under the WaterSMART grant program.
- Helps to develop a comprehensive national water assessment. The bill will provide resources for states to gather and analyze water supply and use information in a consistent manner to help develop a uniform national assessment of water availability and use.

The SECURE Water Amendments Act of 2014 is supported by the American Planning Association, the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership and the Western States Water Council.

NMSU hosts economic forum

An undecided Eugenio Alemán and a cautiously optimistic Jim Peach shared their 2014 forecasts at the third annual Economic Outlook Conference Thursday, Feb. 20, at the Las Cruces Convention Center.

The pair of economists spoke at the program sponsored by the New Mexico State University and Wells Fargo.

NMSÚ Regents Professor Peach predicted modest growth for the state economy, which has remained flat since the Great Recession. He stressed, however, that what happens in New Mexico depends to a great extent on what happens in the U.S. as a whole.

Alemán, senior economist for Wells Fargo, voiced some uncertainty for the national economy.

He said he recently added a question mark to the title of his talk, "The U.S. Economy: Better Times Ahead" following the release of poor economic data for January.

"I will probably take it in and out a number of times over the course of the year," he said of the question mark.

Slow growth likely

The duo addressed the outlook for economic output, jobs and individual and government income and spending. In addition, Peach touched on issues of special concerns to New Mexico – water, child poverty and education. Alemán said the national economy grew at a rate of 1.97 percent in 2013.

"I expect it to grow 2.5 this year, a little stronger than last year," he said.

"When the nation does well, New Mexico does well," Peach said. "Some economists are forecasting growth a bit higher than 2.5 percent for the nation, but it could be – might be – as high as 4 percent."

Jobs a long-term concern

Alemán said the biggest national issue is how long it will take the U.S. economy to recover the 9 million jobs lost over a two-year span during the recession.

"Government is the only sector not growing jobs, but government accounts for 14 percent of all employment and is the second largest sector in the economy," he said. "Government destroyed 1.5 million jobs. These are local and state governments that shed jobs. Only 13 percent of total government jobs are federal."

He said the national unemployment rate, which has fallen to 6.6 percent, "is coming down for the wrong reason: a reduction in work force participation."

Alemán said boomers are retiring at the rate of 10,000 a day, while discouraged workers are exiting the job market.

"People get tired of looking for jobs and drop out of the job market. People are going back to college," he said.

He said the average length a person is unemployed has declined from more than 40 weeks to 35.5 weeks, but long-term unemployment is becoming the biggest problem in the U.S. labor market.

Rothwell-Clark is a committed Las Crucen and has lived here 20 years.


"I inherited Las Cruces, but I love it and chose to stay," she said. "I had several opportunities to leave, but I chose not to."

Cruces employment in 2014, and 1 to 2 percent for the state.

He said it will take until 2019 for the state to regain the jobs it lost during the Great Recession.

Despite "tremendous activity" in Santa Teresa, employment in Las Cruces has flatlined since 2007, Peach said.

He said he anticipates a small increase in government employment locally as well as growth in commercial real estate.

The underlying problem with New Mexico's jobs picture, according to Peach, is the structure of employment in the state.

"In New Mexico, the largest sector is government, with over 20 percent of direct employment," he said. "Like most of the nation, most of that is state and local."

He added, however, the percentage of

He called oil and gas a leading sector

for New Mexico, forecast a lot of activity in the San Juan Basin in the next two years and stated: "We need more leading sectors."

Local challenges unique

Peach said one issue of local concern "the worst multi-year drought since before Pat Garrett shot Billy the Kid," which will have an impact on at least the agriculture sector.

Another concern is youth poverty, at more

than 41 percent in Doña Ana County.

"We know those people have a lower chance of finishing high school than others," he said. "New Mexico's educational attainment is a deficit. We don't have the trained work force modern, 21st century employers need."

He did, however, cite reasons to be hopeful about the local economy, pointing to the possibility of manufacturing taking off in the Santa Teresa area, the proposed SunZia energy transmission line and Spaceport America.

Following various attempts over the years, Downtown Las Cruces revitalization is taking off, Peach said.

"It's happening," he said. "It's really important for the future growth of Las Cruces.'

National challenges misunderstood

Alemán said manufacturing is relatively strong nationally and is expanding, as is the service sector, which pays poorly.

"We have been going down in our savings

surprised by their creativity," Rothwell-Clark said. "And it will give a taste of what it's like walking in someone else's shoes."

A new perspective on marketing

Terianne Everhart, qualifying broker with Property Consultants and a member of the committee, said the competition will support the branding of MVEDA within Doña Ana County.

MVEDA, the 20-year-old economic development organization supported by the city, county and area businesses, historically looks beyond the valley in its marketing efforts. The focus has been on recruiting large businesses from other locations that are looking to expand or relocate to open up shop in the Mesilla Vallev.

"To me, I don't think anyone understands the value of MVEDA's work in keeping jobs alive in Doña Ana County," Everhart said.



NMSU hosts Western Pecan Growers

Conference, trade show set for March 2-4

Global trends in nut production and consumption, the diagnosis of pecan nutrient disorders and a survey of pecan consumers' preferences will be among the presentations at the annual Western Pecan Growers Association conference and trade show Sunday through Tuesday, March 2-4, in Las Cruces.

"Pecans are very important to New Mexico," said John White, director of the association. "The New Mexico pecan benefits from our ideal growing conditions. We're usually one of the top states in terms of pecan production."

The statewide pecan crop generates a significant amount of agricultural economic activity each year in New Mexico. New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service will host the 2014 Western Pecan Growers Association conference and trade show at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces, 705 S. Telshor Blvd.

This will mark the 48th year the organization, which represents growers in California, Arizona, New Mexico and west Texas, has sponsored the event. NMSU is a co-sponsor.

Topics range from the diagnosis of nutrient disorders, invasive pests and weed competition to the economic benefits of western agriculture and a panel discussion on industry-wide funding for pecans, moderated by the president of the U.S. Pecan Council. Other topics include the health benefits of eating pecans and a survey of pecan consumers' nutritional knowledge and pecan purchase preferences.

In addition to the educational program, trade show and baking contest, the program includes a Sunday welcome reception from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Azul Ultra Lounge Bar in Hotel Encanto, as well as a Monday social hour at 6 p.m., immediately followed by the 7 p.m. banquet and awards ceremony.

Continuing education credits will be offered to attendees by Arizona, New Mexico and Texas.

Parking is limited around the hotel and overflow parking can use the Mesilla Valley Mall designated parking area and take the hotel shuttle to the event.

Heavy ground water use forecast for 2014 Elephant Butte Reservoir improves

Agencies' indications are the Elephant Butte Irrigation District could be dealing with another short water year.

Last summer, the EBID release was 168,000 acre-feet, the lowest amount since the dam was completed in 1916.

Water content percentages in all snow pack basins are below average for this time of year, state climatologist David DuBois said.

Current water content is as follows: Rio Chama, 64; Jemez River, 38; and Sangre de Cristo and Pecos River, 58.

The Elephant Butte Reservoir has been boosted to 325,170 acre feet, or 15 percent of capacity.

In early January, the storage in Elephant Butte was 280,000 acre feet.

The Bureau of Reclamation reportedly is running water in the river from northern reservoirs as a maintenance measure. The Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration forecast is for a continued dry conditions.

"The NOAA is calling for below average precipitation for southwest New Mexico in

March," DuBois said. "There's the possibility of a weather pattern change after March, but not favoring below average precipitation."

No rain has been recorded on DuBois' gauge on the New Mexico State University campus in the past 30 days.

The last recorded rain was on Dec. 21, 2013, a mere .08 of-an-inch, DuBois said.

Heavy pumping of ground water last summer dropped the water table slightly, and conditions indicate that district farmers will have to turn again to wells this summer.

Last summer, the water table in the Mesilla Basin declined an average 2.4 feet because of the low surface water release, according to Erek Fuchs, EBID ground water specialist.

The decline in the Hatch and Rincon valleys was an average of 1.8 feet. "Hatch and Rincon benefited from the

"Hatch and Rincon benefited from the heavy mid- and late-September rains they had in Truth or Consequences, and when farmers didn't pump as much as much," Fuchs said. "It looks like we're going to have less than a foot of surface water this year, and we expect a lot of heavy pumping again this summer."

2014 brings fewer sales Tight credit, low inventory dampen markets

Local Realtors sold 1,327 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums in 2013, 71 more than in 2012.

Last year's combined median sales price

also showed improvement over 2012, exceeding that year's median price by around \$7,000. Low mortgage

interest rates and plenty of inventory fueled additional sales activity for the better part of 2013. By the end of the year, however, the number of Las Cruces area homes offered for sale had declined to a 10-year low.

The reduced inventory put upward pressure on prices as buyers began to compete with one another to purchase the best homes for the money.

That trend continues today.

Through the first two months of this year, a total of 115 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums were reported sold by the Las Cruces Association of Realtors (LCAR). That's a significant decline from the 157 properties sold during the first two months of 2013. New-home sales were

rates. These issues will hinder home sales activity until the positive factors of job growth and new supply from higher housing starts begin to make an impact."

While Yun's comments reflect the state of the nation's housing market as a whole, New Mexico's poor economic conditions provide little optimism for

relief in the short term. Be that as it may, I'm a firm believer that now is a great time for investors and those contemplating long-term ownership to ex-

plore purchasing a home. See you at closing.

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
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



Las Cruces Arts Fair celebrates four years

Eighty-five national artists gather for juried event

The fourth annual Las Cruces Arts Fair kicks off with a gala reception from 5 to 8 p.m. Friday, March 14, and continues through the weekend, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, March 15, and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, March 16, at the Las Cruces Convention Center, 680 E. University Ave.

Now in its fourth year, the Las Cruces Arts Fair has recruited 85 artists from 12 states and Canada - 34 of whom represent New Mexico - each with their own unique styles and media. A number of artists are returning to the Las Cruces Arts Fair, wowed by the success of the event in previous years, but there's plenty of new artists and works this time around, keeping the event fresh from year to year.

"There's a very wide array of art on display this year," said event co-organizer Glenn Cutter of Cutter Gallery.

Art in all its many forms – weaving, textiles, leatherwork, jewelry, painting, drawing, printmaking, photography, porcelain, glass, pottery, woodwork, metal, sculpture and more – will be on display throughout the convention center. With so many artists showing such a wide variety of work, everyone is sure to find a masterpiece on display perfect for that empty space on the wall.

For Friday's gala reception, live music will be provided by Rosa y Ray Renato Dueto Krystal and Remember Then ... A Class Act, along with opening-night festivities, a cash bar and a sneak peek at the hundreds of beautiful items on display – the perfect way to ring in a weekend filled to the brim with all things art.

It's not just art for sale at the Las Cruces Arts Fair, though. Throughout the weekend, there will be near-continuous artist demonstrations and workshops taking place, on topics ranging from handmade paper and watercolors to landscape painting and pottery.

In addition, select pieces from each of this year's arts fair exhibitors will be available in a silent auction in the front lobby of the convention center.

All proceeds from the Las Cruces Arts Fair support the many community programs offered by the Doña Ana Arts Council as well as the continued upkeep and operation of the historic Rio Grande Theatre in Downtown Las Cruces.

The arts council is a nonprofit organization on a mission to "improve the quality of life in Las Cruces, Doña Ana County and southern New Mexico by ensuring that the performing, visual and literary arts are an integral part of education, economic growth and community development."

The impact of the Las Cruces Arts Fair is inestimable, but Sally Cutter said she sees the importance.

"With the Las Cruces Arts Fair, we bring the best quality artists from all over to the area," she said. "We're different from a lot of the other arts or crafts fairs. We're more geared toward fine art."

Aside from the influx of beautiful art, Glenn Cutter said the arts fair also brings with it economic development benefits, with artists and attendees staying in hotels, eating in restaurants, pumping gas and adding value to the local economy.

"I think this year is going to be even better than previous years," Sally Cutter said.

Featured Event: Cowboy Days Get along, little dogies NMFRHM celebrates 15th Cowboy Days

For the 15th year, the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum will be consumed with everything Old West during its annual Cowboy Days celebration Saturday and Sunday, March 8-9.

The fun is from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, March 8, and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, March 9. Admission is \$5 for everyone 5 and older. There are no passes or free admission for this event.

An exciting new addition to the festivities this year is the Borderland Pistoleros Mounted Shooting Club. Riders on horseback will demonstrate the fast-growing sport of mounted shooting, using rifles, shotguns and pistols. Black-powder blanks are used as the riders weave quickly through a course, firing at balloons. The demonstrations will be from 11 a.m. to noon and 4 to 5 p.m. each day.

"It's the Óld West," said Borderland Pistoleros member Jim Huff, when asked why the competition is so popular for spectators. "It's as John Wayne as you can get ... riding fast and blasting away with a smoking six-gun."

a smoking six-gun." Speaking of six-guns, Flying Cloud Productions returns this year to perform gunfight re-enactments twice each day, and also will hold an Old West Medicine Show and a 19th Century Fashion Show. The gunfights are at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Saturday and 10:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. Sunday.

Museum staff members and volunteers offer interactive, living history fun each year and the story this year will be the Trial of Samuel Cooper, who is accused of cattle rustling. Visitors are invited to interact with the characters as the fate of Cooper is decided. Will there be a hanging? The living history will be from 1 to 1:45 p.m. and 2 to 2:45 p.m. each day.

A new addition to the children's activities this year is the Sheriff School, where kids go through a brief training to see if they have what it takes to be a sheriff in the Old West. There also will be Cowboy Boot Camp craft activities throughout the day, and pony rides from noon to 4 p.m. There is an additional \$5 charge for pony rides.

Demonstrations are always a big part of Cowboy Days as the museum pays tribute to the state's ranching history. The Parade of Breeds takes place from noon to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 4 p.m. each day. Cowboys on horseback bring cattle from each of the museum's six different breeds of beef cattle into the Round Pen and talk about the history and specific characteristics of each breed. Tours of the livestock facilities will take place at 1:30 p.m. each day.

Other demonstrations include blacksmithing, sewing, weaving and dowsing. On Sunday only, Pat Howard and his working dogs will be here to demonstrate how they herd livestock. The Back Country Horsemen and New Mexico State University Horseman's Association also will be on hand.

Chuck-wagon cooking by Dave Harkness and cowboy music are also part of the festivities. The musical performers on the schedule are Tom Foster Morris, Chris Baker, Randy Granger, Bruce Carlson, Washtub Jerry, Kenny Arroyos, James Michael, the Stagecoach Troubadours and Skunk Valley.





A tale of art and artists Decade of work pays off for 'Aunt Raini'

In most theater works, the first scene sets the tone for the entire plot. Audience members are usually thrown into a situation portrayed on stage, and have an inkling of what to expect for the remainder of the performance.

Whenever there is a cultural lull in our community, or after I've reviewed a production that did not live up to my expectations, I've fantasized that I had access to one of Harry Potter's portkeys to transport me to the best seats in the house in a Broadway theater in New York to review a performance of a show with an exceptional cast about which I have read. The new production of "Pippin" comes to mind, or maybe the upcoming revival of "Of Mice and Men" starring James Franco.

Fortunately, I had no need for a portkey last Friday, Feb. 21, as I watched the opening night production of "Aunt Raini," an exceptionally well-conceived and adeptly directed play by Tom Smith, head of the New Mexico State University Theatre Arts Department and managing director of the American

Southwest Theatre Company. Ten years in the making, "Aunt Raini" has had a variety of incarnations in a number of cities and workshops. This decade of persistence and tinkering paid off, and this "final" version is a show I firmly believe can easily find an audience in New York or any other major city ... and I hope it will.

To my thinking, the core message of the play is how important it is for us to grapple with the question of what constitutes great art, and whether it is possible to create and view art in a purely objective way, separating the artist's political ideologies from the work itself.

Smith cleverly weaves his plot around elements in the life of the enigmatic Leni Riefenstahl, close friend and purported mistress of Adolf Hitler. She was a film director, photographer, actress and dancer widely known for directing the Nazi Party propaganda films "Triumph of the Will" and "Olympia." Only after her death in 2003, at the age of 101, was her work praised, and she was glorified as an acclaimed pioneer of film and photographic techniques.

The plot of the play is deceptively simple. Katherine, a sophisticated young gallery owner in New York, is visited by her Aunt Raini from Germany, who raised Katherine after her mother's death. From the moment Aunt Raini enters Kath-erine's well-appointed apartment, she finds much to criticize, most especially the photography of Joel, Katherine's current boyfriend. We soon learn that Aunt Raini is ill.

Without disclosing too many details, so as not to take away your enjoyment of the play, Aunt Raini's identity is discovered and Katherine's life unravels. By the play's end, Katherine finally begins to reconstruct her life and "inspire?

The dialogue is natural and flows effortlessly. The script is tightly constructed, with mystical cello interludes between scenes, which add a haunting element to the action.

In the hands of Mark Medoff and an exceptional cast, we leave the theater at the play's end, with much to contemplate about our own identities, our own struggles to assert ourselves and inspire others and our experiences with art and our roles as beneficiaries of many artists' inspirations.

Kudos and a large bouquet of virtual rose are sent most especially to guest artist Chicago actress Stephanie Monday, whose charismatic and nuanced portrayal of Aunt Raini takes ones breath away. What a privilege to see a polished actress "do her stuff" in our presence and at once display arrogance, muted affection and cope with her own demons. In her bio in the program it states that Monday played Blanche DuBois in "A Streetcar Named Desire." I could easily see her in this role and can only imagine what skills she brought to that portrayal.

NMSU senior Claire Koleske, whose work I have followed over the years, comes to full fruition as an accomplished actress playing the role of Katherine. She understands the many layers of Katherine's complex character, and brings a certain degree of innocence, business acumen and compassion for her aunt. I must also say that from certain angles, Koleske bears more than a passing resemblance to Sarah Jessica Parker.

Aaron Hernandez is the perfect foil, portraying Joel, a Jewish photographer and Katherine's current "squeeze." His interactions with Katherine and most especially with Aunt Raini are full of artistic and romantic passion. I look forward to seeing more of Hernandez in other productions.

In a small role as The Director, Joshua Horton's portrayal is adequate.

As expected, the scenic and lighting design by Jim Billings is excellent. Julio C. Hernandez's costume design is spot on. Words can't fully express what a privilege it is to see the

work of Distinguished Achievement Professor Mark Medoff. How fortunate are his students and colleagues to work with him firsthand. His guidance in this project is so apparent. Together with Smith, another gift to our community we must celebrate the richness and beauty which is right here in Las Cruces waiting for us to enjoy.

I urge you to make every effort to see this outstanding play. It is one of the most significant productions in this community I have been privileged to review.

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

Two hours to waste

'3 Days to Kill' is a tone-deaf mess

"3 Days to Kill" is a

dumbfounding mish-mash of bad action, bad comedy

and bad family drama.

"3 Days to Kill" is a bewildering, jumbled, tonally inconsistent mess, equal parts schmaltzy family drama, black comedy and overly complex spy thriller, stretched to a nearly unbearable two hours.

The somehow-still-employed Kevin Costner stars as Ethan Renner, a play-by-his-own rules CIA agent with a hacking cough, which in time is diagnosed with terminal cancer of the just-about-everything.

Post-retirement, Renner tries to reconnect with his estranged wife, Christine (Connie Nielsen), and daughter, Zoey (Hailee Steinfeld), whom he excised from his life long ago for alleged reasons of safety, but mostly

because "3 Days to Kill" needs them to reconnect, and the absentee father is a standby trope. With just a few months to live, Renner is given an offer he can hardly refuse. A fellow CIA operative – the terribly, terribly named Vivi Delay (a vacant-looking Amber Heard) – offers him an unproven, highly experimental new drug capable of curing his

cancer if he'll come out of retirement for one last job: catching the elusive "The Wolf" (Richard Sammel) and his second in command, "The Albino" (Tómas Lemarquis), a melaninchallenged arms dealer ... or something.

From there, Renner has to balance the newfound demands of fatherhood with killing people, a much-loved scenario of writer Luc Besson. A brief peruse of Besson's filmography is telling: The man pretty much makes this movie over and over again – hitman (or woman) tries to toe the line between domesticity and danger - twice successfully ("La Femme Nikita" in 1990 and "The Professional" in 1994) and many, many more times in the 20 years in the interim, each outing illustrating the law of diminishing returns.


Besson's weak, convoluted and now-cliché script suffers even more from the direction of McG, a man whose ego was so inflated from a few successful music videos for now-joke '90s acts, Film Review including Smash Mouth, Sugar Ray and Korn, along with a couple commercials for Gap, he willingly dubbed Grade himself something as pretentious as McG before making the leap from small-screen trash to big-screen trash with

"Charlie's Angels." Following the somewhat inexplicable success of "Charlie's Angels," McG followed with "Charlie's Angels: Full Throttle," "Terminator Salvation," "This Means War" and "We Are Marshall," each with his trademark high-gloss, no-soul style perfected in the heyday of MTV.

The blame isn't all McG's, though, as much as I may want it to be. "3 Days to Kill" also sucks thanks to phoned-in performances from all its principals. Costner is as wooden and boring as ever, shooting for gruff-but-lovable, maybe, and failing. Whatever it is he was going for, he didn't achieve it. Nielsen is acceptable, or would be in a Lifetime Original; all this script calls for is for her to seem concerned, perturbed or shed a painfully forced tear at the sight of her husband teaching their daughter to dance before prom - pass the barf bag, please. Steinfeld is atypically awful for a movie teen, and I hate movie teens. Every emotion seems feigned, from attraction to affection to indignation, and she tries on each face with equal lack of aplomb.



Worst of all is Heard as agent Vivi Delay, vamping about and chewing scenery with all the charisma of a plastic doll. She may be the least convincing CIA agent I've ever seen on film, and that's saying something. The final nail in the coffin of "3 Days to Kill"

lies in its slapdash, schizophrenic construction. It seems to follow a painful, rote formula - Renner kills guys, spends some family time, gets a new lead, kills more guys, spends more family time, and on and on - without ever settling into a groove. Each of its parts, too, seems to be worse than the other. The action is mean spirited, flashy and bland, though competent; the comedy cliché, forced and unfunny; and the family scenes are sub-CW schmaltz of the worst kind.

Balancing this kind of thing would take a director along the lines of Guy Ritchie or Malcolm McDonald, skilled and subtle in their schizophrenic movie-making, not a guy with a made-up name whose best film was either "Charlie's Angels" or the music video of Sugar Ray's "Fly." Just don't see it.

The secret life of Charles Dickens Fiennes' 'The Invisible Woman' is tastefully sensual

What is it that makes an industry viable within a community?

A moody, tasteful and slightly sensual piece, "The Invisible Woman" made me think that if Charles Dickens – the focus of the story - were alive, this is how he would have directed it himself.

The film is based in fact, unfolding slowly and in flashback, starting years after Dickens' passing in 1870. It stars and is well directed by Ralph Fiennes, as we find ourselves as observers of a part of Dickens' life that would have been plastered all over the Internet and gossip magazines nowadays, since he has probably fallen in love with a much younger woman, Nelly Ternan, played with a gentle stillness by Felicity Jones.

The time is the 1860s and Dickens is enjoying immense popularity in the literary world. He is also much into theater, and this is how he meets Nelly, one member of a family - including her two sisters and mother - of actresses. Dickens likes them all, and soon enjoys the company of all of them for dinner and on other placid outings, but he has also taken a particular liking to Nelly, finding himself attracted to her shy, quiet primness.

His popularity has brought him fame and fortune, but he also tends to a rather dowdy wife, certainly his intellectual inferior, which probably results from the fact that she has borne 10 children.

There is no love in their relationship. At one point, the stark and pointed Dickens literally divides their home into two separate living quarters.

His wife, Catherine, is dispatched to Nelly's home to deliver a birthday gift to her that was mistakenly delivered to Mrs. Dickens. Catherine seems resigned to the fact that she is trapped in a loveless and sad marriage, while announcing to the young and centered Nelly that she will never really be with Charles, since it is somewhat apparent that he is more in love with his public than with Nelly.

Even though the film is about an affair, so to speak, it is handled much differently than any I have seen on film in the past. There are no scenes of pants-less, panting rutting, and nary a kiss passes between Nelly and Charles for most of the film. When that does happen, it is most tasteful but has heartbreaking results.

At first, I didn't really like this film, but after leaving the theater and thinking about it, I grew to appreciate the presentation and dignity of the piece, which tells a slightly tawdry tale with grace and forbearance. Jones is a fine up-and-coming actress, and Fiennes is easy to watch and believe on the screen. Fiennes as director has also created a su-

perb view of the fashions, times and mores of the era, while not becoming a scold about the many double standards that loomed in society and for Dickens himself. Dickens, always fond of his adoring public, went as far as to write a letter to the London Times denying the presence of Nelly in his life.

The opening and closing shots perfectly bookend the picture, but do not go expecting to see heaving bodices and fisticuffs. "The Invisible Woman" has no room for that.



Opening Friday, March 7, *at the Fountain: "The Past"* (French, English subtitles)

Superbly crafted but relentlessly bleak, "The Past," Iran's submission for an Oscar for Best Foreign Language film this year, is the story of Ahmad, Marie and Samir.

Ahmad has returned to Paris to finalize a divorce from Marie, only to find out that she is living with Samir and is heavy with his child. There are three children involved as well: Lucie, Marie's depressed and withdrawn daughter from an even earlier relationship; Fouad, Samir's young son who relentlessly acts out due to his despair from Samir being with Marie; and the very quiet Lea. Samir's wife lies comatose in a hospital after drinking detergent in front of her children, adding to the emotional complexity of the plot and to the understated and moving closing scene.

Similar in tone and placement as "The Separation," director Asghar Faradi's last film which won an Oscar in 2012, "The Past" uses many of the same intriguing methods to bring out the best in its actors, all of whom are believable and easily draw empathy, except maybe for the often harsh and unsmiling Marie.

The Past" is a hard drama that may be offputting to some, but for those who stick with it, there are many rewards.



Painting the town green

The LCHBA Home & Garden Show explores sustainability By David Salcido

Since 1983, the Las Cruces Home Builders Association's Home & Garden Show has been a staple of the spring season, heralding innovation and advancement in the way home repair and décor is conducted.

This year, a new theme is being introduced, which plays upon a growing trend in southern New Mexico: green living and sustainability. Called the "green mile," it's more an evolution than it is a transition, said Home & Garden Chairman Max Bower.

The green mile was a concept that came up while meeting with the committee and trying to come up with something that would tie the two rooms at the Convention Center together a little bit better," he said. "In the past two years, we've been expanding the garden area in the ballroom and we've got a lot more interest this year from different vendors. That allowed us to move the garden area out of the ballroom and into the breezeway. That was always something we wanted to do, but we didn't have the vendor count to pull it off."

"The idea of the green mile is a conglomeration of different ideas," LCHBA Managing Director Steve Chavira said. "We call it our co-op space. It allows different businesses that have complimentary focuses to be able to work together to create a themed space.

What we've tried to do over the years was incorporate less of a pipe and drape feeling and more of an open floor-plan as a dynamic kind of approach to the trade show. This is the latest permutation of that effort, which is to create an atmosphere for businesses that, on the surface have different focuses, but when you partner them up with other businesses, suddenly puts a system in place that demonstrates to consumers how each of these products work together."

To complete the transition of the garden aspect of the show into a true green experience, Bower explains that he and his committee reached out to the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, along with business focused on energy efficiency and sustainable living.

"There's always been a photovoltaic presence at the show," he said, "but by bringing the Green Chamber in and picking their brains, we were able to expand on that idea of sustainable living, because there is a lot of interest in "green" construction out there. We wanted to get as big a cross-section of vendors that would fall into that category as possible."

Another aspect being introduced this year is involvement from the New Mexico State University Athletics Department.

We're going to be hosting the Aggies as a send-off to the WAC tournament," Bower said. "This is the first year that I've been involved that we're working with NMSU Athletics to create awareness for our event and also support the Aggies. We're going to have both the men's and women's basketball coaches, along with several members of the teams come in and do a radio remote on the green mile.

We've been trying to work out some ideas on how to work together, marketing-wise, because, being an alumnus, I look at NMSU Athletics as something that feeds the business community as a whole. Really what we are is an association of hundreds of businesses, whether it's banks or builders and it's a good leap off for NMSU Athletics to get more local business sponsorship. They can get a lot of bang for their buck working with us.

It's all part of what Chavira calls an "interactive aspect" of the show that has been growing over the years. He cites demonstrations from vendors and groups like the Master Gardeners as other highlights of the event, though it is the environment of the show itself that he believes

will be the real draw.

"We have a lot of new vendors who have come aboard because they've seen what we've done in the past, they've seen how it worked and they want to get involved because it's not your typical tradeshow setup," he said. "We've created an environment, more than a setting. It's sensory, it smells good and it's aesthetically pleasing. It's an environment where people are more relaxed and able to be more conversant with the exhibitors.'

Both Bower and Chavira believe that this year's event will surpass all others, owing to its fresh approach to the trade show atmosphere and sustainable living aspect. They both admit that the economy has been an issue for the Home Builder's Association, but see more homeowners taking the plunge and making changes they may have been putting off for the last few years.

"I've seen a definite upsurge in leads over the past couple of years," Bower, who owns and operates Red Mesa Design, said. "We've had everything from people redoing their backyards, to maybe doing a water feature, to maybe doing a bedroom addition. I expect that to continue this year, especially if the weather holds out and it continues to be as nice as it's been."

It's this optimism that is a trademark of the Las Cruces Home & Garden Show and has been for the 32 years it has been in existence. This year's offering raises the bar considerably, by reaching out to those interested in making a positive impact to the environment, while still having an enjoyable, interactive experience.

There's going to be a lot going on," Chavira said. "It's not going to be exactly like every other home and garden show. There will be a lot of opportunities for people to win door prizes and get involved. I think it's going to be a lot of fun and a great weekend."

Tiny critters can do big damage The common aphid sets its sights on spring gardens

With spring just around the corner, it's time to start thinking about guarding our gardens against one of the most pervasive of pests: the aphid.

Also known as plant lice, aphids are the bane of novice to professional gardeners. There's a variety of aphid for just about every plant with about 4,400 different species. Their sapsucking habits will cause leaves to curl and yellow and can do the most damage in warm weather, up to 80 degrees. Grown plants can most often withstand the damage, but it still warrants controlling. Aphids can also spread viruses among crops such as pumpkins, melons and cucumbers.

The tiny insect measures anywhere from 1 to 10 millimeters long and emits a sticky substance known as honeydew. There are many natural predators to aphids, giving gardeners a choice other than a chemical attack. Insecticides will kill

Other insects, ants in particular, may work to protect the aphid as honeydew is a source of food. According to the University of California Integrated Pest Management Program Online, the presence of ants as well as insects that are the aphid's natural predator – ladybugs and lacewings to name two – may be a clue that you have a large aphid population.

¹ Check for aphids often, at least twice a week, to catch evidence of the insect before the population gets out of hand. Aphids become more difficult to control when damage appears, because they can take refuge from chemicals and predators behind the curling leaves.

Before planting your garden, make sure to check surrounding plants and trees for aphids. If you find any, clip leaves and discard them.

Ladybugs, lacewing and syrphid flies can help control aphids. The offspring of lacewing, called aphid lions, have a voracious appetite for aphids. The best enemies are those native to your garden, but buying a batch of ladybugs from your local nursery may help control the population, even if they fly away in a few days.

You may want to research reflective mulches that can help protect against aphids. Meanwhile, blasting plants with a hard spray of water will knock many aphids off as well as clean the plants of honeydew.

The safest of the chemical control available for do-ityourselfers are insecticidal soap, neem oil and narrow-range oil. Buyers beware: Often these chemicals will also kill natural predators. Spraying a product such as insecticidal soap with water will only kill the aphids (and predators) that are present on the day of spraying – it won't kill the insects that come in after the application.

Early vegetable gardening

Avoid the frost by knowing what to plant and when

We can still have cold freezing nights this time of year, so don't be tempted by the warm days to plant items that are not frost tolerant. This includes, but is not limited to tomato plants, peppers, squash and melons.

If you still insist on planting the aforementioned now, you can use a product called "Wall O Water" season extenders. These are clear plastic columns, that when filled with water, will provide frost protection and will allow fruit development and harvest up to 30 to 40 days sooner. If you can't find this convenient garden apparatus then a large pail, blanket, or frost proof cloth will work as well. Just remember to remove them immediately after the freezing temps subside.

Vegetables safe to plant now are: broccoli, peas, lettuce, collards, radish, mustard, spinach, onions, kale, kohlrabi, turnips, celery, Chinese cabbage and Brussels sprouts. These plants will take our typical Las Cruces cold temperatures without damage. Just make sure the plants you use are "hardened off," which means they are acclimated to cold temperatures before they are planted in the ground. In other words they are not just out of "greenhouse" conditions.

After the likelihood of frost is over, which is typically late March or early April, you should be able to plant tender veggies. One of the best indicators that we have had our last frost is when the local mesquite shrubs begin to leaf out. Keep in mind nature can break its own rules, so use this strategy only as a guideline.

You should be prepared to cover new seedlings just in case Mother Nature changes her mind. That said, tomatoes, cucumber, melons, squash, corn, okra, and sweet potato are some vegetables that should be safe to plant, again after the leaves on the native mesquites have emerged.

Peppers and eggplant are usually better off when the soil warms up and the nighttime temperatures are consistently above 50, so you may want to hold off on these until mid- to late April. Before planting a vegetable garden it is most important to apply generous amounts of organic material. You can use compost, manure, peat moss and or any combination of the above. Do not use fresh manure. The salt content in the manure could burn tender seedling roots and may have weed seed to boot. If you use fresh manure it is suggested to apply it in the fall months so that it has time to break down.

Our soil, if you can call it that, has very few nutrients in it. In most cases you should supplement the ground with fertilizer. There are many forms of fertilizer application. There are water soluble, granular, dry organic, liquid organic and vegetarian organic forms available. Choose whichever works best for you.

Some granular or powder forms typically last longer in the soil, but may bother allergy sufferers when applied during breezy days. Water soluble fertilizer can help avoid this problem, but will have to be applied more often.

Organic fertilizers come in dry and liquid forms. Some organics may be in all-vegetarian form, as well. Some of the drawbacks of organic fertilizers are that they may take a longer time to work and are generally more expensive to use.


Whichever fertilizer you choose, read and follow the recommendation on the label.

Knowing how much water to use is always a challenge. We live in a very dry climate so some soils can dry out very quickly. As a rule it is best to keep the soil evenly moist but not soggy. Sandy soils need frequent light watering, while heavy clay soils benefit from slow irrigation.

The use of mulch is recommended to help keep moisture in for any soil. This can be in the form of shredded bark, compost, pecan shells etc. The application of this organic product will not only help maintain soil moisture, it will also help reduce or even prevent weeds and erosion.

Watch the Weather Channel to help you plan your veggie garden. This is a helpful tool, but keep a "frost protection kit" handy just in case Mother Nature doesn't tune into it.

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



New century of interfaith relations Expanding understanding of other religions key

We are moving toward a new phase in interfaith relations, at least among people who are learning to become more open to such matters and, according to recent studies, particularly among college students.

I have been involved in theological dialogues with Muslims and Jews for years now, and also spent a number of years in Buddhist-Christian dialogue. The main result is a deepening of both my understanding and my appreciation for my own tradition of Christianity. I am not threatened by other traditions, I have not sought to convert to other pathways, nor have I spent time lamenting any shortcomings in my own tradition. The incredible gifts received have been in expanding my own understanding of the world of faith without any sense that I must agree with another tradition lock, stock, and barrel in order to appreciate its gifts for its adherents.

In conversation with others, I see that new pathways must be followed if we are all to survive into the future as faith-traditions. Interfaith relations are central to the movement forward. We cannot afford any longer to act as if our world does not contain Buddhists, Pagans or American Indian religions, let alone the "big three" – Christianity, Judaism and Islam. Half a century ago, the sociologist Will Herberg could sum up United States religion as Protestant, Catholic and Jew (the title of his book), with no glance in other directions. This is no longer possible without putting on blinders.

The issue is how to go about negotiating this new interfaith milieu. Specifically the question that arises first and foremost is: How can I show respect for another tradition, even if I don't agree with it, or I find its understanding of God inadequate or, by my standards, simply wrong?

Most religions make truth claims. If my religion is true, the issue becomes: How can competing, or other religions, be true? Doesn't a truth claim cancel out the option for other religions to be true? Can we affirm "multiple truths" and, if so, how? What are the criteria we can use?

The Abrahamic traditions not only believe in special revelation (the idea God has communicated to us in actual ideas and/or words beyond the silent witness of the creation and its workings), but they have particular interpretations of overlapping traditions of revelation. Christians interpret some Old Testament texts differently from, and even contradictorily to, Jewish interpretations; Islam's rendition of Old Testament history and the story of Jesus is different from either Judaism or Christianity. How do we deal with this?

Does the mere act of granting respect to another tradition in some way nullify your own? Do we feel awkward about the activities – especially the prayer – of another religion if we feel that it is bogus?

Then there is the matter of etiquette: If I visit another religious group, what are the pitfalls to avoided? Do I have to do everything the members of that group do? What is expected of me? What can I expect of others?

This last question may be easiest to answer, but it assumes that you will visit the houses of worship of others, and that may be the principle hurdle to overcome. Most places, however, have people who are more than willing to help you not put your foot in your mouth, religiously speaking, and they offer guidelines and pamphlets to help the cause.

You must work out the answers to the other questions I posed in this article, and I invite you into the process of doing so. Your life will be the richer for it, I promise, as we enter further into this century of interfaith relations.

Paradox in training

Females and males of any age able to communicate can be educated and trained to protect themselves from bullies, kidnappers, angry people and more.

This is generally called self-defense or personal-protection training.

In classes that effectively teach these skills, participants learn to use their brain, voice and body for self protection. In the best classes of this type, participants complete exercises that actually train the self-protection skills to come to their mind when needed.

It's one thing to understand options available to a person facing danger, but another to actually be able to quickly make decisions and act.

For various reasons, most people never seek out training of this type. Some don't realize it exists; some don't want to admit they may someday face danger; some assume the police or someone else will protect them; and some believe they, personally, could never acquire enough skills to actually be able to protect themselves.

A few in fact don't even see the value in people learning to protect themselves. You see, there is an inherent paradox in the teaching of self protection skills, which instructor Lynn Marie Wanamaker has been credited with identifying.

When a person bullies, abducts, rapes or otherwise physically assaults another, they alone are responsible for their actions.

Sometimes, however, there are things the victim could have done differently that would have caused them to not be victimized. Therefore proponents of selfdefense classes are sometimes accused of victim blaming.

Complicating the issue are myths such as the beliefs that fighting a rapist always makes injuries sustained by the victim worse.

Myths that exist such as thinking men only rape women they find sexy, ignoring a bully will make them leave and fighting a bully will make them back down.

Actually, the best course of action in any situation depends on unpredictable situational factors only apparent to the person in the situation.

Truthfully, self-defense instructors are choosing the easier path. It's much easier to improve the world by teaching potential victims to make good self protection choices than to cause rapists and

'Nothin' but a good time'

Team Zane Celebrity Waiter celebrates five years

If you see sweatbands, spandex and sideways ponytails, you might think you are in a cheesy workout video from the 1980s.

But you might be attending the fifth annual Team Zane Celebrity Waiter held at 6 p.m. Saturday, March 1, at the Las Cruces Convention Center, 680 E. University Ave.

In its fifth iteration, one of the most popular events supporting a nonprofit organization - the Southern New Mexico March of Dimes has adopted the theme "Back to the '80s."

"It's a chance for people to come see the people they normally see in their business environments completely out of their element," said Jeffrey Silva, father of Zane Silva, the reason behind the event.

Expect to see re-enactments of "Top Gun," "Risky Business" and "Footloose." The celebrity waiters are responsible for getting their tables to participate and join in the action.

While it's designed to be a fun time had by all, the funds raised from the event go directly to supporting research to a delicate cause. The March of Dimes is designed to help new mothers and infants survive to their highest potential especially in the face of a premature birth.

We never expected to be in the situation we found ourselves in six years ago when Zane was born prematurely," Silva said.

Born prematurely and immediately rushed to a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) in El Paso where he spent almost the next year of his life, the prognosis for Zane

was not good. "They didn't think he would survive, and if he did, he would have a lot of problems," Silva said.

At that time, there was not a NICU in Las Cruces equipped to handle the depth of problems premature babies have. Now, with the help of organizations such as the March of Dimes, MountainView Regional Medical Center and Memorial Medical Center both have achieved higher NICU levels to be prepared for situations such as the one the Silvas found themselves in.

An incredible emotional trauma for Silva, Zane's

mother, Diane, and the couple's two older sons, Silva said he made a promise to himself and to God that if his son pulled through, he would do anything he could to support those who may face similar situations.

When Zane was miraculously released from the hospital, the journey was still not over for the Silvas.

"It was a tough year when he got out, because

he was still in the hospital quite a bit," Silva said. "A common cold could have meant pneumonia for Zane."

Now a lively and viva-cious 6-year-old, Zane Silva is the face of the Celebrity Waiter event – a smiling face at that. Every year, Zane opens the event with a performance of his own.

But for his dad, the best part is watching the opening video, a compilation of pictures from the precious beginnings of Zane's life, to then watching the ball of

energy on stage. "People see the reality of a little infant in critical condition, with all the tubes in his mouth, and it tells a story," Silva said. "It shows how he was to how he is today."

In 2009, the event started as an intimate gathering of community members and

businesses at La Posta de Mesilla, and before long the event needed a bigger venue to accommodate the growing number of participants.

The 2013 Celebrity Waiter welcomed more than 700 guests, and played a role in Team Zane achieving honors as one of the top 10 teams in the nation, securing a spot in a March of Dimes conference held in Washington, D.C.

Out of more than 25,000 teams in the

nation, Team Zane representatives were able to meet with members of Congress and spread the word about what little Las Cruces can do to support their community.

"Almost every single one of them asked, "Where's Las Cruces?" Silva said. "Everyone else was from these big, metro cities and had never heard of us."

Paring down this year's attendance to 500 available tickets, Silva said he wanted to get back to the heart of what makes this event truly special - having fun, being silly and supporting an organization that can help stop premature births.

"I really think this is going to be the best year ever," Silva said.

The New Mexico State University School of Nursing is accepting applications for a new specialty, family nurse practitioner (FNP), in the doctorate of nursing practice (DNP) program for the fall 2014 semester. The application deadline is Saturday, March 15.

The FNP specialty degree option in the DNP program is an online curriculum offered through the College of Health and Social Services. This degree plan is completed in three years of full-time study. All accepted students must be enrolled full-time and must be able to attend the Doctoral Summer Seminar May 19-23.

"We have been encouraged by the administration to offer the family nurse practitioner program," said Pamela Schultz, school of nursing director. "With the Affordable Care Act, there will be an increased need for primary care providers in New Mexico. The Family Nurse Practitioner is prepared to diagnose and treat a wide variety of primary care health conditions

across the lifespan, either in collaboration with other health care providers or as autonomous providers in New Mexico."

Schultz said the addition of the new specialty is a good fit for NMSU because the school of nursing has several family nurse practitioners already on faculty. She anticipates the new program will be a popular degree.

The FNP specialty trains nurses for advanced practice in the care of families across the lifespan. Courses focus on advanced health assessment, advanced pathophysiology, advanced pharmacology and management of acute and chronic illness in families.

The program includes seminars and clinical experiences emphasizing the physiological and psychosocial impact of illness on the patient and family. Graduates prepare for the Family Primary Care Nurse Practitioner certification exam.



Problems and issues affect not only you

Addiction, and the associated problems and issues that accompany it, have a devastating impact on families and society.

Unfortunately, the problem is so vast, this article only serves to provide an overview. Researching the topic in greater detail is recommended.

Research is vital to fully understand the ramifications and pursue a solution. Addiction is not a new problem or issue, it has been around for a long time.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, addiction is defined as when a person uses psychoactive chemicals, such as alcohol and drugs, or participates in compulsive behaviors including gambling, internet, sex and spending money.

Addiction is the loss of control of taking psychoactive chemicals or the compulsive behavior. Addiction has this affect on a person due the rewarding sensation on the brain chemistry. This explains why an addicted person continues to use alcohol, drugs or compulsive behavior in spite of negative consequences. Addiction is not the start point for a person; it is the result of a progression of substance abuse.

Given the recent research on brain functioning and the impact of substance use, we have a greater understanding of addiction. Addiction is the end of the road for a person's progressive alcohol and drug use or compulsive activities.


In addition to the impact on the individuals, addiction has an estimated combined medical, economic, criminal and social impact cost of more than half a trillion dollars.

This makes addiction the largest health care and societal problem we face today. According to the U.S. Department of Justice, approximately 80 percent of all crimes were committed by a person who used alcohol or drugs before, during or after the offense. Less than 30 percent of individuals who need treatment will actually seek effective and efficient treatment.

The Department of Health & Health Services and Office of National Drug Control Policy do very good job of keeping track of the problem of substance abuse that leads to addiction.

What the policymakers do a terrible job of is following through on the research to conduct

Recent federal government data estimates addiction costs at \$420 billion a year.

The second part of sizing up the situation pertaining to addictions is asking yourself, What does effective addiction treatment look like? Will your new health insurance plan cover the issue?" The answer to the first question is a minimum stay in an in-patient treatment program is 90 days with appropriate after care and comprehensive follow up.

The second answer is that very few treatment options available offer this and most insurances do not cover it. The few exceptions are the people fortunate enough to get into a drug court or are able to pay for the treatment out of pocket. Length of stay in treatment is also a common denominator.

A person must review their insurance in order to see if coverage exists for the researchbased solution of the problem. One of the new caveats to the new health care law is that the individual must take more control of their problem or issues.

People with addiction issues are famous for not taking control or even admitting that a problem exists. Unfortunately, the jails and prisons will get more crowded with people in treatment vs. incarceration.

A simple study of the math involved proves that the currently newly devised solution will fail. You, the individual, must size up the situation and develop an appropriate course of action to solve the addiction treatment crisis.

This is critical if a person is to survive the addiction treatment crisis. This course of action is for yourself or a family member.



'Pipeline to Proposal' will promote health habits in border colonias

New Mexico State University School of Nursing Associate Professor Becky Keele is the lead investigator for a "Pipeline to Proposal" funding award from the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI).

This was only one of 30 proposals approved for funds intended to develop communities interested advancing patient-driven health research. Keele's objective is to increase the capacity of Mexican-American families residing in the colonias of the southern New Mexico border region to discover strategies to promote healthy eating and physical activity to reduce health disparities related to overweight and obesity issues.

Members of the work group will be recruited from the education and health care systems, business and policy-making sectors and families living in the colonias.

"The primary aim of this work group will be to create a work group structure, develop goals and objectives and to do some initial brainstorming related to the challenges and strengths within the colonia community structure that impact the ability to participate in healthy eating and regular physical activity," Keele said.

Hispanic families residing in the colonias are at a higher risk for health disparities because of substandard housing, safety issues, high poverty levels and lack of basic infrastructure. Increased poverty places families at high risk for food insecurity, which is the inability to access sufficient, safe and nutritious food.

Children in food-insecure homes are significantly more likely to be overweight. The lack of access to needed resources makes healthy choices about eating and physical activity very difficult.
