## **GRT** bump up for vote

#### City criticized for supporting effort

In addition to voting on candidates, voters Nov. 4 in Doña Ana County will be asked to approve a gross receipts tax (GRT) increase of .25 percent increase to support a rural public transportation system.

The South Central Regional Transit District (SCRTD) began providing bus services from Chaparral and Anthony, N.M., to Truth or Consequences this summer with support from municipal and county governments in both Doña Ana and Sierra counties. A GRT question is also on the ballot in Sierra County for the general election.

Jack Valencia, a former Las Cruces city councillor tasked with setting up SCRTD after successfully creating regional transportation district in northern New Mexico, said the proposed GRT increases are estimated to generate \$9.8 million in Doña Ana County and \$500,000 in Sierra County.

The increase would add 25 cents to every \$100 spent on taxable goods and services.

Along with subsidizing the rural routes, Valencia said the plan is to give \$3 million to the City of Las Cruces' Roadrunner Transit system, which is providing connecting service within city limits, with the city's intermodal center being the central hub

## **New Year's event** to hold Chile Drop

## **Honor Flight poised** to take 60 veterans

Veterans from southern New Mexico and El Paso will be gathering early Monday, Oct. 6, to travel to Washington, D.C., to visit war memorials.

About three fourths of the 60 signed up for the three-day round trip are World War II veterans, with other veterans from Korea or Vietnam also taking the all-expenses-paid Honor Flight, now taking its seventh group of veterans to the national capital.

The total is up from 34 veterans on last year's trip because the Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico organization now has picked up El

### National monument focus of public meeting

Doña Ana County District 1 Commissioner Billy G. Garrett will host a public meeting on Oct. 9, 2014 to discuss future plans for the the meeting to outline the terms of the presidential proclamation recently-established Organ Mountains Desert Peaks National Monument.

The meeting will take place from 6 to 7:30 p.m. inside the Board of County Commission chambers at the Doña Ana County Government Center, 845 N. Motel Boulevard.

Representatives from the Bureau of Land Management will be at that established Organ Mountains Desert Peaks as a national monument, and will also discuss how the monument area can be used until a management plan is prepared and approved.

Time will be set aside for the public to ask questions.

#### Election deadlines to remember

Anyone who wishes to participate in the upcoming November general election has until 5 p.m. on Oct. 7, 2014 to register to vote in Doña Ana County.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 4 at several Voting Convenience Centers.

Early voting via absentee in-person voting at the Doña Ana County Clerk's Office will begin the 28th day prior to Election Day at the Doña Ana County Clerk's office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on regular business days and 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. on the last Saturday prior to Election Day.

#### Discount prescription cards available

Doña Ana County has joined the Coast2Coast Rx Card program. The cards are free, and all cardholders – regardless of income, age, or health status – can save on the cost of medications and veterinary supplies.

Nationwide, the program saved cardholders an average of 60 percent in 2013 on the cost of prescription drugs and veterinary medicines. The card is distributed free of charge and may be used at all pharmacy chains and most independent pharmacies in Doña Ana County. More than 60,000 drugs are covered under the program.

Besides the discount on prescriptions, the card also provides discounts on dental, vision, veterinary and hearing services, plus discounts on lab work, imaging tests, diabetes supplies and diabetes equipment for all family members.

The Coast2Coast Rx card is available for residents at governmental offices, libraries and county facilities. Residents can also print the Rx card and view the nearest participating locations at www.coast2coastrx.com.

Not everyone is in a position to donate a much-needed \$500 to his or her favorite charity.


Almost everyone, though, has a pair of socks to give. Or a blanket. Or some

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## A reason to privatize public schools

Could capitalism run our public schools better than they are being run now? Without a doubt, pure capitalism could. Unfortunately, we see little pure capitalism in our society. Crony corruption creeps into almost everything Americans do, none more than in our public enterprises.

In capitalism, people trade things with full disclosure, no fraud or coercion. America has been made strong by free enterprise.

Today's society combines capitalism with socialism and they do not mix well. In New Mexico, half of the state government's budget goes to public education. However, nothing causes a fuss like wanting to explore how our free market system might work better for our students than what we are doing.

Those suggesting a move toward the privatization of public schools are pelted by those who say that someone working for a profit cannot do as well for the society as anyone working for the good of us all. That is mostly crap. There is one place where you can see that work: The Peace Corps, where Americans help as volunteers worldwide. I love what they do.

In today's society we say public school leaders take a vow of poverty. Not so. The Albuquerque superintendent of schools makes a quarter million dollars a vear and is surrounded by legions of other high wage workers. These fat cats are not wowing us with their ability to help the students and seem to spend most of their time feathering their administrative nests with golden parachutes.

Enter a for-profit company that only gets paid for results. What they pay managers and workers will be exactly what it takes to get the job done for the students, nothing more or less. The current structure pays huge salaries and plush retirements for educators regardless of results.

In a free market, each trade must benefit both participants or they do not trade. In our factory model of education. students are compelled to attend, not taught to their learning styles, not taught well and the privileged adults get paid regardless of whether or not the students get anything of value out of the system. It is a jobs program for adults and nothing more.

Contrast that with an educational enterprise like flight schools where people learn to fly. These schools must perform and give students what they need. The students can decide to come or leave. The best sales tool of flight schools are the graduates. These forprofit schools work well.

Here is the point: The government does not have to teach flight, there are schools that will do so with the government as the gatekeeper of the product. No one can buy their pilot's license – it must be achieved with a representative of our government making sure the school adequately prepared the student.

The government should monitor the enterprise and certify the results.

As to the cost of education, in public education how do the administrators decide how much money to spend on school buses, cafeteria equipment, computers, desks and the thousands of other things schools buy? They spend their budget. How much of the budget? All of it. A month before the


end of the fiscal year they empty their accounts whether they need the stuff or not.

Do private companies do this? Of course not. They only buy what is needed. Know this: If they do not buy enough, there will be dissatisfied customers, which endangers the sustainability of the enterprise. If they buy stuff they do not need, they do not make a profit, again endangering the sustainability of the enterprise. Only by being very good at matching needs with results do they prosper.

Public education can go decades without paying the slightest attention to the students. No company in business can do this. Maybe we need to think outside the public school box. Maybe we need government oversight with the power of private enterprise.

The money squandered on extra layers of administration in public schools would never be tolerated by private companies any more than would we tolerate private companies that do not deliver the results. We must overcome the crony corruption that pays people well to continue a system that does not see the students as the most important stakeholder.

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Your teeth – you don't think about them much, you brush every day, floss occasionally and they do their job.

But as you get older, you miss brushing every day. Coffee, tea and the glass of red wine stain them. You may get braces, have wisdom teeth removed and get a crown but you are OK with that.

Then your dental hygienist asks a question that changes your comfortable relationship with your teeth when she says, "You want to keep your teeth for the rest of your life, don't you?"

This may require some work, but this is only a cosmetic problem, you argue. Not according to research by the Centers for Disease Control in 2012. Tooth decay is linked to diabetes, heart disease, stroke, learning problems for children and, in pregnant women, premature and low-weight births.

Martha McCaslan, CDA, MA, and Laura Moss, RDH, BS, run the dental clinic at Doña Ana Community College (DACC). As professionals they have seen their share of dental problems. They urge you to take care of your teeth because of cosmetic and health concerns. There are things you can do to keep your teeth healthy. Here are 10.

- 1. Get a dental checkup on a regular basis. Dental professionals can identify issues and provide solutions to oral
  - 2. Floss your teeth at least once a day.
  - 3. Brush your teeth twice each day.
- 4. Change your toothbrush; look for bent bristles which can cause erosion of gum tissue that does not regenerate. A change every three months is a good
  - 5. Eat a healthy diet. Limit snacks and

eat foods that will help meet nutritional

- 6. Don't smoke or use smokeless tobacco products. Oral cancer and tooth loss can be a result.
- 7. Don't eat sugar. On occasion have that chocolate, but save it for special
- 8. Stay away from soda. It includes two types of acid that can affect your teeth, phosphoric and citric acid (WebMD, 2012).
- 9. Your teeth are for chewing food. Do not use them to tear open packages or open bottles, which can cause chipping (Better Health Channel, 2012).
- 10. Brush your tongue or use a tongue scraper, which leads to better breath

(Delta dental, 2011).

DACC has a clinic to help you begin your journey to better oral health. At the clinic local dentists and professional instructors help students perform oral examinations and other treatments. The students perform duties as part of the dental hygiene associates of science degree or the dental assistant program.

The clinic operates at the DACC Central Campus at 3400 S. Espina St., DAMA Building, Room 80. An appointment can be scheduled by calling 528-7071.

## Veterinary medicine ain't what it used to be

Over the years, the number of large animal veterinarians has steadily declined. Many factors have contributed to this decline; the greatest is the change in the profession itself.

The cost of schooling is daunting. Male students are only 20 percent of the enrollment. Fewer farm kids are interested in vet school. Attitudes have changed.

Back in the good ol' days, a rural veterinarian was on call 24/7. His life was controlled by the phone. It was hectic; days off, vacations, meetings, birthday parties and church were always planned with the knowledge that dad might not be there. These vets were what some would call dedicated but most would recognize as workaholics.

The new generation wants to "have a life." Family time, days off, no night calls and a decent wage are part of their plan.

All of these factors have combined to fuel the decline in the number of rural veterinarians.

There is another large factor that has always been discouraging to rural vets, that is the reluctance of farmers and ranchers to willingly pay the vet a "reasonable fee."

Livestock have a calculable value, expressed as per head or dollars per pound. With the exception of the occasional ranch horse, there is no

anthropomorphological attachment as exists in the pet world. This has always led the cowman to try to treat the animal himself. If the critter dies, it only evens out what the vet would charge ... no loss. But things are different.

Droughts, herd depletion and demand for beef of all kinds have caused the value of cattle to soar. Business for rural veterinarians has picked up and continues to grow. Maybe there's hope. But the good cowman is being backed into a corner. He considers himself capable of pulling a calf, or treating the scours, deciding what vaccine to use, at least he always has ... he even did a caesarian once ... 'course the cow was dead.

He's a hard workin', stubborn, do-ityerself, thrifty cowman and it bothers him to ask for help, especially if it costs money. It goes against his cowboy mentality. What are the odds?

"Harold, she's been tryin' to calve since noon. He's worth 500 bucks when he hits the ground. It's time. Unhook those chains and put down the come-along."

"But..."

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"But ... but ... what if he charges mileage?"

SCRTD has been able to start the service through contracting with existing regional transportation companies, along with a few buses of its own, keeping fair rates at \$1, except for ZTrans service to Alamogordo, which is \$3 because Otero County opted to not join the district, Valencia said. After the third year, the contribution to Road-RUNNER Transit would increase to \$4 million, which, he said, is the equivalent to Road-RUNNER's annual budget.

allow "This will RoadRUNNER to enhance its services, because the rural residents will increase its ridership." Valencia said. "The

focus is to maximize service."

Since the SCRTD began providing the service as a pilot program, Valencia said it has seen more than 2,000 riders a month

GRT increase has The garnered support from most policymakers in Doña Ana County as well as rural community activist groups, who want rural residents to have transportation to new job opportunities in Santa Teresa and at Spaceport America, as well as improving access to medical care by residents on limited incomes, such as seniors.

But the GRT increase has also attracted opposition from local conservatives who question whether the cost is worth the benefit. Besides some signs opposing the tax, the opposition recently became more public when Russell Allen, vice president of operations for Allen Theaters and former Doña Ana County Republican Party chairman, objected to the City of Las Cruces including a flyer supporting the GRT increase in utility bills.

In an email Sept. 18 to City Manager Robert Garza, Allen questioned whether including the flyer in the mailing reflected the city's official support for the GRT increase.

"There are groups who oppose this tax increase and they deserve the same opportunity to educate the citizens of Las Cruces why they feel this tax increase is not good for the city

or the county," Allen wrote. "In this time, when the county's spending far exceeds (its) current revenue, adding a new tax (for) service will only make the situation more difficult for (the county) to turn back the tide of its excessive spending in the future."

Allen told Garza he felt the city should give more balanced information to residents, asking if the opposition would be allowed to provide its side in the new billing mailing. Allen also asked who paid for the

In response, Garza wrote to Allen that the regional transit district has been funded and supported by the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), Mayor Ken Miyagishima and

the City Council.

"The city is in the third year of a three-year commitment to contribute funding to assess the viability of expanding the (regional transit district)," Garza wrote. "The support has been included in both of the last two City Council strategic plans, the RoadRUNNER Transit Plan, and the MPO strategic plan, all of which have been presented and approved publicly."

Garza said the city is allowed to endorse another government entity's work, noting that SCRTD was created by the Legislature in 2003 as its own legal

board chairman.

Since 2006, Honor Flight groups have been taking WWII veterans to their war memorial, though they are now also taking Korean and Vietnam veterans, as well as terminally ill veterans from more recent con-

While the expansion makes sense geographically, it's more expensive. The veterans don't pay for the flight, overnight lodging or meals during the trip, which amounts to about \$1,600 per veteran, Melcher said. Donations from fundraisers, deposited in a fund maintained by the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, cover the veterans, whereas the guardians pay their own

Donations can be any amount, though an adopta-veteran program starts at \$1,000. Most recently, 7-Eleven ALON of El Paso recent gave \$15,000 collected at their convenience stores to the Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico and El Paso.

Debra Melcher said the stores offered the help after learning that the group had its largest number of applicants with the territory expansion and organizers feared having to tell some of the veterans to wait until next year.

"Due to the senior age of these heroes, Honor Flight is committed to doing all within their power to make the vets dream of visiting their memorials a reality," she

"This support guarantees that all WWII veterans that applied to go will be taking to the skies on Monday.

Since Honor Flights begin in southern New Mexico in 2008, the regional organization has escorted 269 veterans to Washington, D.C.

Of the 60 veterans chosen for this inaugural tour, 34 are from El Paso.

15-foot-long chrome chile sculpture covered in LED lights will be lowered by a 90-foot crane to a stage, taking on its full shine at midnight, Smith said.

The question of whether the chile will green or red at the stroke of midnight will be decided by Las Crucens voting through a Facebook page survey.

"No one will know the answer until midnight," Smith said.

People can vote on their green or red preference until Christmas, he said. That would give organizers time to finalize programming of the LED light effects, he said.

Prior to the finale, there will be music on stage from 24 local musicians, vendors and a beer garden,

with a children's play area at La Placita until 9 p.m. Supporting the event are a number of sponsors.

Also, the District Attorney's Office has held fundraiser for the organizers to rent Safe Ride vans to ensure people have free rides home if they need them, Smith said. This was an important concern, he said, because it's already a busy night for the area's limited taxi services.

In addition to volunteers, businesses have "really stepped up" to help make the event, he said, such as Weaver's Welding, which is providing the crane, and Days Inn, which will provide special rates for those who want to visit Las Cruces for the event, along with shuttle transportation.

'We really want to make these Downtown events attract people regionally," Smith said.



## Reward grows to \$10,000 for store robberies

Las Cruces Pic Quik stores have pitched in \$9,000 on top of the \$1,000 reward Crime Stoppers is offering for information that helps identify the suspects in any of the recent robberies and the Aug. 19 shooting at their stores.

#### NMSU's default rate increases

The U.S. Department of Education released the college student loans default rates Sept. 25, and New Mexico State University's systemwide three-year default rate is about 20 percent, showing a slight increase.

"We are taking steps to address our default rate, but there is a three-year time lag between our actions and when we can hope to see any effect," said Bernadette Montoya, vice president for student affairs and enrollment management.

Defaulting on student loans is much more common for students who attended college, but do not graduate. NMSU graduates had a default rate of 6 percent for the 2010 three-year cohort rate, which is only a third of the rate for the institution in general. Last year, the national default rate increased from 13.4 percent to 14.7 percent.

NMSU's rate includes students from all the NMSU campuses including Alamogordo, Carlsbad, Grants and Doña Ana


After students leave higher education institutions, they are given a six-month grace period to begin repayment and 270 days after that before they are considered in default. NMSU is working to improve its default rate through intervention programs focused on student financial education.

## **GSU** in town for Pink game

#### Aggies look to end three-game losing skid in league game

Doug Martin admits Georgia Southern University quarterback Kevin Ellison is fun to watch.

Unless you're playing against him. Martin, New Mexico State University's head football coach, and his Aggies have to do just that Saturday, Oct. 4, at Aggie Memorial Stadium.

Kickoff is scheduled for 6 p.m. for the school's annual Pink game when thousands of fans will don the color in support of breast cancer research.

What Martin and his staff had to research leading up to the contest, though, was a way to stop Ellison, a redshirt freshman who has thrown for 573 yards and four touchdowns as well as rushed for 478 yards and three more scores for the Eagles.

The answer? Stay ahead of the Eagles from the start.

"The key to the football game is the first quarter," Martin said. "We gotta score points."

He said Sun Belt Conference foe GSU scores a lot of first-quarter points.

"That takes you out of your game," Martin said.

The Eagles enter Aggie Memorial Stadium with a 3-2 record that includes a one-point loss to North Carolina State and a four-point loss to Georgia Tech.

One of GSU's three victories was an 83-9 shellacking of Savannah State.

NMSU holds a 2-3 record and is coming off 63-7 defeat at the hands of LSU.

The Aggies started their season with back-to-back victories, but have now lost three straight.

Still, the Aggies have a chance to stay unbeaten in Sun Belt play.

A 2-0 start in league games would be "absolutely huge," Martin said.

To do so, the Aggies will have to stop more than Ellison, though. The team loves to chew grass. The Eagles average 367 yards rushing per game, led by running back Matt Breida. NMSU's defense has surrendered an average of 312 yards per game.

Martin said GSU is not afraid to run the ball into the middle of the line.

"They have a really good inside

game," he said. "They work to be a power football team. They'll hand it off and knock you back."

Martin said two major keys to stopping the Eagles' ground attack will be to stop the fullback dive up the middle and get to Ellison when he keeps the ball.

As for the Aggie offense, Martin believes the corps can light up the scoreboard.

The Aggies, who had swept their previous four opponents, had a much tougher time en route to winning their fifthstraight match and 10thstraight WAC matchup dating back to last season to move to 2-0 in WAC play and 8-5 overall.

Although the Aggies were outhit .185 to .172, and had fewers kills than Bakersfield, they came up big defensively in the latter sets. The Aggies held the Roadrunners to a .029 hitting percentage in the fourth set and a negative percentage in the fifth and deciding set.

Junior Nathalie Castellanos marked her second double-double of the season after finishing with 10 kills and 19 assists while also hitting at a .389 percentage.

Redshirt freshman middle hitter Sasha-Lee Thomas led the squad with 11 kills and also added two solo blocks and two block-assists. Junior setter Taylor Livoti had 31 assists and libero Hannah Walker finished with a matchhigh 21 digs. Outside hitter Andrea Tauai added 13 digs and eight kills.

The critical set of the match was the fourth set ,when the Aggies had to go to extra points.

The Roadrunners took a 19-17 lead but the Aggies rallied for mark three-straight points and held on to win.

Junior Dorrotya Lennert was one one-hundredth of a second off the school record set by Terrin Seaver last year while placing a very close third place. She had an amazing summer and is in the best shape of her life to hopefully take down that record.



#### **Burglaries on upswing in county**

Doña Ana County Sheriff's investigators say they have seen a growing trend in the number of reported burglaries since July in certain Doña Ana County communities, and are warning residents to take precautions that could prevent them from becoming a victim of a crime.

According to the reports, the number of burglaries has nearly tripled in Districts 2 and 4, compared to other districts patrolled by the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office.

District 2 includes North Valley communities such as Doña Ana, Fairacres, Shalem Colony and Picacho Hills, which are located west of Interstate 25 between Radium Springs and Interstate 10.

District 4 encompasses the area southwest of Interstate 10, stretching from Talavera to Afton Road. It includes the communities of Tortugas, Brazito, Berino, Vado, Mesquite and La Mesa.

In District 2, there were 29 reported burglaries between July 1 and Sept. 24. In District 4, 31 burglaries were reported.

In comparison, there were fewer than 10 reported burglaries in Districts 1, 5, 6 and 7. District 3, which includes the East Mesa area, reported 15 burglaries during the same time period.

The types of burglaries reported included auto burglary, residential burglary, breaking and entering and non-residential burglary.

Deputies warn residents to always lock their home when away, including windows and vehicles. Some of the thefts reported recently included items that were taken from cars that were left unlocked in victims' driveways.

If residents plan to be out of town, they are advised to tell a trusted neighbor, who can report suspicious activity to police.

It is critical that residents document serial numbers on all electronics or items of value, along with as much information about the make and model as possible. Photographs are also helpful. That information should be kept in a secure location, and preferably not on a computer that could also be stolen. Relaying this information to investigators aids in the search for the property and suspects responsible.

Burglars struck the Las Cruces Habitat for Humanity ReStore Monday, Sept. 29, at 2301 S. Main St.

Executive Director Maria Vasquez said items were taken and the office was damaged. The store's safe was also damaged beyond repair. Las Cruces Locksmith, though, has agreed to donate a safe to the ReStore.

"Their generous gift is greatly appreciated," Vasquez said. "Businesses like LC Locksmith who answer our call in a time of need speak highly of (their) commitment to our community.

"Now that we have the safe, we can gear our focus on raising the funds to repair other damaged things."

Habitat for Humanity, a nonprofit that builds homes for needy families, sells donated merchandise at the ReStore to raise money. The Las Cruces office is located at 720 N. Santa Fe St. and can be reached at 525-0475.





## Stockholders making money, others not so much

"Over the last year, the New Mexico economy can be easily compared with the New Mexico State football team," economics professor Jim Peach said at the semi-annual KRWG-Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Economic Update Forum. "We've made a lot of progress, but we still have a long way to go."

Peach shared the platform with fellow

NMSU economics professors Christopher Erickson and Kenneth Martin at the event video recorded Thursday, Sept. 25, at the KRWG studio on campus. Peach focused on progress and prospects for the national economy, while Erickson discussed the state and local economy and Martin the stock markets.

A tepid economy is treating some Americans better than others, they agreed. In 18 of 20 most recent quarters, real gross domestic product grew, Peach said. However, the 2 percent projected annual growth rate for 2014 is "well below our average."

Job creation, while also improving, also has a long way to go, he said.

"The great recession was really horrible," Peach said. "We lost 8 million jobs. By May of this year we finally got them back."


Mike Flores, U.S. Postal Service manager, Post Office Operations, conducted the ceremony.

Since the completion of the restaurant's expansion within the building, foodies who favor A Bite of Belgium for breakfast or lunch can invite friends to join them. There's room for larger tables now.

York said they cut a hole in a wall to open into an expansive interior space that basks in sunlight thanks to skylights. The original restaurant seated 21 diners, who placed their orders at a counter. Post-renovation, A Bite of Belgium seats 68 in a series of comfortably sized rooms lined with paintings and Belgian tapestries that bring European ambience into Downtown Las Cruces.

"I love the reaction when people come around the corner and see the rooms," she said.

Suspended from the skylights are oversized hanging baskets containing plants. York's husband and co-owner Jim York climbs a ladder each weekend to water the greenery.

#### Food hobbyist goes pro

The Yorks have owned and operated Telstar Networks for 35 years.

They started Telstar to provide business telephone system sales and service for Las Cruces businesses. To address a growing need for professional, dependable technological support for their clients, they expanded the business to include a wide range of services. Telstar now installs business networks across the United States.

The Yorks ventured into the restaurant business "because of my husband's love of food," Jodie York said.

"Jim and I are big foodies. We love to try different things," she said.

They bought A Bite of Belgium and then bought Metropolitan Deli.

At A Bite of Belgium, Jodie York is in charge of the front of the restaurant.

"I like the customer-service side of it. The best compliment I get is 'great experience, great service and great food,'" she said.

Jim York runs the back, planning the menu with its daily featured dishes, procuring the ingredients and supervising the kitchen staff.

"All the stuff we get is handpicked," he said. "Our Roma tomatoes and green onions, for example, come from Anthony, N.M."

He said he doesn't cook in the restaurant's kitchen, which has tripled in size.

"I do all the creating at home," he said. "In the restaurant, I stay out of their way."

For his wife's birthday, he pre-

pared his specialty – rack of lamb – pairing it with catfish, because they had some on hand.

The unlikely combination turned out to be wonderful, they said.

"He's very talented," Jodie York said.

At the restaurant, Belgian waffles star.

"Authentic Liège waffles are

made from dough, like bread is, not batter," Jim York said. "The yeast dough is crimped like bread and baked in a waffle iron."

In addition to waffles, Bite of Belgium serves omelets, salads, soups, brioche and pastries, hot sandwiches and more.

Just as lamb is Jim York's signature dish at home, A Bit of Belgium's lamb sandwich is getting rave reviews on Yelp.

"A lot of people come through town on their way to California," Jodie York said. "They've read about us and they come here especially for the food. It's amazing."

There are omelet and waffle specials daily. Gluten-free options include bread, French toast and sandwiches made on a bun, hoagie roll or bread.

A Bite of Belgium is open for breakfast and lunch seven days a week. Although the restaurant has more than tripled its seating capacity, Jodie York said reservations are recommended on weekends.

## State receives grant for export promotion

The New Mexico Economic Development Department has received \$197,500, from the Small Business Administration for the State Trade and Export Promotion (STEP) program.

The SBA grant will be combined with a state match of \$65,833 for a total 2015 of \$263,333.

Funding will enable New Mexico businesses to promote themselves at a number of trade missions and shows, some of the industry-specific, all around the world

The Office of International Trade in the state's economic development department will use the Step Grant to support and assist New Mexico businesses seeking to expand their markets abroad through trade shows, trade missions and workshops focused on export basics, along with other international trade promotion efforts.

Edward Herrera, director of the Office of International Trade in the state economic development department, said he encourages Las Cruces and Santa Teresa companies to take advantage of STEP offerings, as this is the last year of the STEP grant.

November trade events include the cosmetics industry attending Cosmoprof Asia in Hong Kong; the aviation, avionics, instrumentation and software industries heading to Montreal for Aerocan Montreal; and a Mexico Trade Mission in Mexico City. In December, New Mexicans will take part in the World SME expo in Hong Kong.

Additional trips are planned through July 2015, including several to Mexico.

The laser optics and photonics industries will take part in Las Optics 2015 in Munich and the Paris Air Show is planned for aviation-related industries.

"We'd be tickled pink to have Las Cruces companies participate in any of these activities," Herrera said.

He added that if none of the scheduled events is a good fit, his office can "tailor something to meet their needs."

He said custom services provided through the Gold Key program guarantee a minimum of five trade leads.

New Mexico was one of 24 states to receive STEP awards.

The STEP program aims to increase the number of small businesses that begin to export and increase the value of exports for small businesses that currently export.

"Expanding New Mexico's interna-

tional exports continues to be a major focus for creating more opportunity in the state," said Economic Development Department Secretary Jon Barela. "Advancing the state's exports will continue to foster our growth in manufacturing and bring more economic base jobs to New Mexico."

"I am very pleased that the state of New Mexico again applied for STEP funding and was willing to provide the necessary state match," said New Mexico SBA Director John Woosley. "We in the New Mexico District Office look forward to working with the state to help and encourage New Mexico small businesses to start or increase their exporting."

## Rains boost water table

During the last 25 days, the recent rains have increased the reservoir storage and raised the valley water tables, said state climatologist David DuBois.

The storage in Elephant Butte Reservoir is 154,800 acre-feet, an increase of about 6.5 percent.

"We had 3.3 inches of rain in September, the third highest on record," DuBois said.

The rains have raised the water tables a little and allowed farmers to pump briefly, said Erek Fuchs, irrigation district aquifer specialist.

"There'll be some pumping in October to finish out the season," he said

"But it'll slow down in November. I won't know until I make my end-ofthe-season report what the change in the water table has been."

## Pecan production class planned for Oct. 20-21

The in-class portion of the Western Pecan Production Short Course will take place at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Museum Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 20 -21.

"The idea is to cover as much as possible, from start to finish," said Richard Heerema, New Mexico State University Extension plant specialist. "That means everything from how to select a pecan orchard site, which varieties to plant and the best tree planting arrangements all the way to hedge pruning mature trees and marketing nuts."

This course is intended for anyone, from those who are new to the pecan industry to those who have grown pecans for years and wish to do so more profitably.

"We will have speakers from NMSU and the University of Arizona with a wide range of expertise, including horticulture, soil science, entomology, plant pathology, weed management and economics," Heerema said.

Attendees can expect to gain a strong research-based background in pecan production in the arid and semi-arid southwestern U.S., he said.

"On the third day of the short course, we will have a field trip to local pecan-related businesses and the NMSU Leyendecker Plant Science Research Center." Heerema said.

The cost per person is \$300 and it includes lectures, a binder with lecture notes, three lunches as well as refreshments and field trip transportation.

Digging deeper, the economist uncovered both strengths and weaknesses in the economy's ability to create jobs.

He said manufacturing lost 1.6 million jobs since December 2007 and construction lost 1.5 million.

"Both of those are central to anything you would call recovery," he said.

Industries that are thriving include auto sales, which stood at 10.5 million in 2010, climbed to 15.5 million in 2013.

"A lot of people suggest they will hit 17 or even 17 and a half this year," he said, cautioning that whether the trend continues depends on the employment picture and when the Federal Reserve decides to raise interest rates.

#### **Growth slow in state**

Erickson said New Mexico's growth rate is "a modest one half of 1 percent." Declining industries in July included construction and manufacturing, while natural resources and services did well.

The Las Cruces economy is growing by 1.5 percent.

"That growth is mainly driven by expansion at Fort Bliss," he said. "El Paso is one of the metropolitan areas to receive the most increase in government employment in the past two years. Expansion at Fort Bliss is spilling over into Las Cruces."

Financial and utilities sectors are particularly strong in Las Cruces, he said.

Erickson also touched on what he called the controversial and very divisive local issue of the minimum wage, commenting that City Council recently accepted the New Mexico Comunidades en Accion y de Fe's (CAFé's) proposal to raise the rate to \$10.10 per hour by 2017. (See column on page B5.)

"The evidence is that raising the minimum wage does not reduce employment," he said. "That's a surprise to a lot of people, including me."

Raising the minimum wage does, however, have an economic impact.

Calling the decision a value judgment, he said raising the minimum wage takes money out of small businesses and puts it into the hands of employees.

He said Las Cruces is 231st in economic growth among 381 metropolitan areas nationwide.

"When I came to Las Cruces 25 years ago, it was fifth from the bottom, so that's an improvement.

"We live in an area that has very low incomes," he said, adding that in 2013 the average annual income \$27,000, or 53.1

percent of the national average. "We're not providing jobs for low-income people."

#### **Local poverty rate rises**

Moderator Fred Martino said the New Mexico poverty rate of 22 percent actually rose in 2013, while the national rate of 16 percent went down.

He said the median household income of \$44,000 is \$8,000 below the national average.

"Median family income actually went down 5 percent from 2010 to 2013," he said.

Martino said the state has lost 3,000 – or 10 percent – of its manufacturing jobs.

"Jobs that are being created as we move out of this very severe recession are an issue," Erickson said. "The structure of the economy is changing."

Erickson said a bright spot for southern New Mexico and Las Cruces is the Union Pacific multimodal hub in Santa Teresa, whose location is "driven in large part by manufacturing just across the border in Jeronimo."

That growth is a source of employment for our region, he said.

Erickson said that while New Mexico manufacturing has declined, its value added is up sharply as a result of an increase in productivity, which led to a decline in the demand for workers.

"Output per worker has skyrocketed, even if income for workers has not," he said.

"Santa Teresa is out of

space," Peach said. "They're turning away deals because they don't have any buildings."

Commenting on the impact of international conditions, Peach said the Eurozone "is in the tank" and developing countries are not growing as much as expected. Meanwhile, political and military crises have multiplied.

#### Markets remain strong

For those fortunate enough to own stocks, Martin said he sees "nowhere near bubble conditions in any of the markets."

He said using the Dow Jones Industrial Average as a benchmark he calculates a rise to 18,700 in the next six months.

"Historically ... what we find more often than not is the market keeps going up," he said.

"Overvalued markets can get more overvalued. (Of course, the flip side can happen, too.)"

He said international tensions, including with ISIS, can threaten the world's economies.

Martin said the best policy for individual investors is to have a diversified portfolio and stay the course.

"If you are panicked, you probably have a little too much in equities," he said.

## Workers are winners; businesses, consumers lose

Minimum wage is the topic du jour in Las Cruces.

When people find out I'm an economist, it's the first question they ask. Friends from other cities are emailing me about it. Even my wife is interested

Two proposals are currently under consideration. One is a proposal to raise the minimum wage to \$8.50 per hour by 2016. The other, proposed by the activist group New Mexico Communidad en Accion y de Fe (CAFé), would raise minimum wage to \$10.10 by 2017.

What everyone wants to know is, "What will be the effect of raising the minimum wage on the economy?"

And the answer is: "Not much!"

That conclusion may be surprising to many, yet that is the conclusion a slew of empirical studies over the last two decades

For example, like most economists, until recently I've argued that minimum wage hurts the poor by eliminating jobs. After all, if you increase the price of something, demand falls. The only problem with this analysis is that it isn't supported by the data.

There appears to be very little impact, if any, on employment from an increased minimum wage. Faced with the facts, I've had to re-evaluate my views on minimum wage.

While the overall economy won't be much affected, there will be winners and losers.

My guestimate is an increase in minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour would increase overall production costs by something like 3 to 5 percent. Of course, cost increases for some businesses will be much more, for others less.

Someone has to pay for these higher costs and it will be either businesses, consumers or most likely both.

Here is the crux of the controversy: Minimum wage takes from consumers and business owners and gives to low-wage workers. When deciding between winners and losers – workers, consumers, business

people – the issue is not efficiency, which is in the economist's purview. Instead, the issue is fairness – and economists aren't much help. You're better off consulting a philosopher or even a member of the clergy.

Of course, one obvious solution is to rely on the free market. After all, government imposed minimum wage reduces the freedom of both employee and employer to enter into freely agreed upon contracts.

But relying on the market assumes workers are in a position to negotiate on an equal footing with business. In the real world, very often low-wage workers aren't in a position to negotiate equally with employers. They tend to be younger, not as well educated,

perhaps suffering from physical or mental deficits. These are not people who can go toe to toe in negotiations.

When talking about fairness, there is another issue, at least when considered by baby boomers like me. The minimum wage is really very low right now, especially when compared to when we were young. I earned \$1.60 per hour at my first job in the early 1970s. That wage, adjusted for inflation is – guess what – \$10.10 an hour today.

## Collaboration aims to streamline funding for projects

When a New Mexico community wants to undertake a project for downtown revitalization, business incubation, housing or infrastructure, backers often don't know where to look for financing and are easily discouraged or intimidated by the maze of government agencies they have to navigate.

The state addressed this problem in the "rural renaissance" platform of its five-year economic development plan, unveiled in 2013, by creating New Mexico FundIt – a federal-state partnership that aims to be a one-stop source of start-to-finish financing for projects that will help with infra-

structure development, job creation and small-business development.

Through FundIt, communities can vet their development proposals before multiple state and federal infrastructure funding agencies at the same time. Representatives of these agencies make up a review panel whose members collectively analyze proposals and direct the most feasible ones to stay on a continual track to financing.

#### The panel and its work

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The FundIt panel convened by Economic Development Secretary Jon Barela includes representatives from state agencies (the New Mexico Department of Transportation, Environment Department and Department



ment of Finance and Administration) and quasipublic entities such as the New Mexico Finance Authority, which finances infrastructure proiects, and the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority, which finances housing and related services that benefit low- to moderate-income residents. Three federal agencies - the Small Business Administration, Department of Agriculture and Department of Housing and Urban Development - bring projects to the table, as do regional representatives of the Economic Developstate councils of governments and the New Mexico MainStreet program.

At the quarterly meeting, projects are presented and FundIt panel members offer comments or direction. If the project is ready to proceed, a panel representative can take it back to his or her agency to assist with the application, achievement of the funding source's criteria, or processing.

#### **Looking forward**

The types of projects that are a natural fit for FundIt fit five general categories. They are business development, such as business incubators and industrial parks; community development, such as feasibility studies, comprehensive plans and asset mapping; infra-

structure development that increases capacity, which might mean updating or replacing what exists; housing projects that increase capacity and availability; and downtown redevelopment, such as revitalization projects in downtowns and adjacent neighborhoods.

Following the 2013 institute, Diana Seward, chair of the Estate Planning Institute, said the institute continues to grow in participation and 2013 was the best attendance yet.


"I think that attendance has to do with the reputation of the institute," Seward said.

## **USDA** announces risk management assistance

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack on Monday, Sept. 29, announced new programs to help farmers better manage risk, calling this one of the most significant reforms to U.S. farm programs in decades.

Vilsack also said that new tools are available to help provide farmers the information they need to choose the safety net program that is right for their business.

'These new programs help ensure that risk can be effectively managed so that families don't lose farms that have been passed down through generations because of events beyond their control. But unlike the old direct payment program, which paid farmers in good years and bad, these new initiatives are based on market forces and include county and individual - coverage options. These reforms provide a much more rational approach to helping farmers manage risk," he said.

The new programs, Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC), are cornerstones of the commodity farm safety net programs in the 2014 Farm Bill, legislation that ended direct payments.

Producers will have through early spring of 2015 to select which program works best for their businesses.

To help farmers choose between ARC and PLC, USDA provides online tools that allow farmers to enter information about operation and see projections of what each program would mean for them under possible future scenarios. The tools are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/ arc-plc.

Farm owners may visit their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices if they want to update their yield history and/ or reallocate base acres, the first step before choosing which new program best serves their risk management needs. Letters sent this summer enabled farm owners and producers to analyze their crop planting history in order to decide whether to keep their base acres or reallocate them according to recent plantings.

The next step in USDA's safety net implementation is scheduled for this winter, when all producers begin making their ARC or PLC election, which will remain in effect for 2014-18 crop years.



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

## ASTC's ambitious 'West Highland Way'

Ov. am I exhausted! I write this review on the morning after an arduous and convoluted two-hour, intermissionless, 95-mile trek through the Highlands of Scotland, while at the same time navigating my way through thick weeds of family and sexual dysfunction as played out on the stage of the Medoff Theatre on the New Mexico State University campus.

"West Highland Way" is the creation of Meridith Friedman, this year's winner of the 10th American Southwest Theatre Company (ASTC) High Desert Play Development Workshop and directed by NMSU Theatre Arts faculty member Larissa

The workshop is an arduous process in which a number of up-andcoming playwrights are invited to submit a script that, if deemed worthy, is paired with a second play, both of which are given public readings and feedback. Ideally, one of the two plays is given a full  $% \left\{ 1,2,...,n\right\}$ production as a part of the ASTC season.

At its heart, Friedman's work tells the unforeseen outcomes of a 95-mile trip through the Highlands of Scotland, taken by a father and daughter, during which all characters confront seen and unknown turns along the path.

The father, Ben, is a physically fit retired professor, and his daughter, Jane, is a member of a large Boston law firm. Each have issues. The father's, we eventually learn, are physical; the daughter's stem from the emotional trauma of a recently broken long-term engagement.

Their trip, like many bike tours and hiking expeditions, places them in different inns each evening. Their luggage meets up with them at each night's venue, thanks to the efforts of Liam, the "baggage shlepper" - for lack of a better job

description. Do you get the picture?

The play starts with an overt display of apparent family dysfunction. Father and daughter climb to their own "music" and at their own pace. Jane has no interest in the background of the towns she visits on her path. Her father, of course, has studied every detail of local points of interest and soaks them in with sheer joy.

Conversation is minimal and lacks affection. Eventually, we piece together the structure of their family, and the walls of angst between father and daughter start to break away. This is a heartwarming element that ties the play together by its end.

The addition of the "baggage shlepper" Liam into the mix complicates matters and adds an element of confusion to Jane's zeitgeist.

Jane confesses to Liam that she suffers from some physical and sexual dysfunction, which Liam agrees to help her work through in a graphic and extended scene before our eyes, causing such discomfort to many audience members, the young lady in front of me actually took her hair down a couple of times and re-braided it when the action was hot and heaviest.

Liam, it seems, has his own issues and cannot develop a relationship with Jane. Life is complicated. Each character is at a crossroads by play's end, and we aren't sure which

path each will discover as their journeys continue.

So, do I have any suggestions as this work moves along in its development? Indeed I do. Some judicious editing and better direction seem in order.

Humor, according to the summary provided by ASTC, is apparently a tool used by the playwright to temper or soften the heavy themes of the plot. Alas, from our seats on far stage right, we did not understand why the audience seated in the center orchestra section was laughing. Microphones might help make the dialogue better understood for those not seated in the center section of the orchestra.

The only cast member who could be heard throughout is guest artist/ Actor's Equity member Dean Robinson as Ben. His energy, compassion and full understanding of the role make his performance especially memorable.

Student performers Veronica Bissell and Ron Drynan, while acting their hearts out, tended to swallow the ends of many pieces of dialogue, making it next to impossible to comprehend what they were saying.

Aye, Drynan's Scottish brogue was barely existent. We asked those seated around us if they could make out what was being said and many shook their heads.

In sum, "West Highland Way" could use an intermission. Many around us

needed a good stretch by play's end. Lury's direction seemed uneven, and a tighter rein might have made the time move more quickly.

One parting word: I cannot sing loud enough about the skill and vision of ASTC's resident scenic and lighting designer, Jim Billings. To view the set alone, not to mention how powerfully it is lit, is reason enough to attend a performance. The only word we could say as we entered the theater and gazed at his amazing set was, "Wow!"

Billings turned the stage into a 95-mile path with two eating areas, cliffs and inclines to boot. If his set and lighting design can travel, I would encourage transport or replication.

This is such an ambitious effort, ASTC is to be commended and supported by our community.

"West Highland Way" runs through Sunday, Oct. 12. Tickets are \$10 to \$17 and are available at the Center for the Arts box office from noon to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, or by calling 646-4515 or 646-1420. Performance times are 7:30 p.m. Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, and 2 p.m. Sundays.

## Making movies, then as now

Because I'm something of a history buff when it comes to southern New Mexico, as well as an advocate for filmmaking in the area, I often stumble upon fascinating tidbits of information that combine the two interests.

A while back, I came into the possession of a set of pictures documenting the filming of a pilot for a television series starring Jackie Cooper and Barbara Stanwyck, shot in and around Las Cruces in 1963. A little research – and cross-checking with fellow film scribe and historian Jeff Berg – revealed the pilot to have been "Calhoun: County Agent," which had been slated as an entry by CBS during the 1963-64 season but for some reason was never picked up.

Recently I was reminded by a reader, who responded to my publishing one of those images in my Looking Back column, that a book had been written on the subject, called "Only You, Dick Daring!" by Merle Miller and Evan Rhodes. Looking into it, I discovered that the book in question was a national bestseller when it dropped in late 1964, mainly because it was a scathing tell-all about the

television industry. Even better, it was written by the screenwriter himself, Miller. Best of all, it made mention of "the little town of Las Cruces, New Mexico," which figured prominently in the bailiwick. I knew I had to read it.

I ordered a used copy from Amazon and began my travel back in time. Here's what I discovered during that trip:

- 1. The entire reason the series was based in the Mesilla Valley was because, in the early stages of research. Miller was told by a representative at the USDA that the penultimate source of information when it came to agriculture in the southwest was John White at New Mexico State University. An early research trip by Miller and star Jackie Cooper clinched the deal, as both fell in love with the area and the people.
- 2. Pitch meetings have always been both tense and tedious.
- 3. The film crew was only in Las Cruces for about a week in November 1963. It was only outdoor scenes that were shot here and most of those were shot on the Mesilla Plaza. though the Branigan Library (now the Branigan Cultural Center) stood in for the county offices, which we were to believe were sitting on the plaza, right about where the Billy the Kid shop is located.
  - 4. Miller's book should be a must

read for film students who have yet to learn about "the disease of the committee system." It's a cruel world and an even crueler industry. Nobody knows that better than an industry veteran.

- 5. The pilot, which is available in its entirety on YouTube, is actually much better than it could have been, considering the political machinations and infighting that took place behind the scenes. The music is a little hokey in that way only black-and-white television can be, but the characters are compelling and the acting above par. Lots of recognizable faces, too. The mystery of why it was never picked up by the studio is pretty plainly spelled out by Miller.
- 6. It's a pretty good bet that Matthew Wiener, the creator of "Mad Men," read this book.

"Only You, Dick Daring!" beautifully describes what it was like working in television during the golden age and it pulls no punches doing so. It also paints a vivid portrait, in very few words, of how the Mesilla Valley was perceived by Hollywood and Madison Avenue during that time.

There are enough recognizable people (including NMSU President Roger Corbett and then Dean of Agriculture Philip Leyendecker) and places (the Mission Inn, the Amador

Hotel and La Posta de Mesilla among them) to delight history buffs, but be warned, if that's your only reason for reading it, you may be disappointed. The entire catalogue of scenes taking place in and around Las Cruces covers around 40 of the 278 pages of the book.

For those who espouse the belief that filmmaking in southern New Mexico is a pipe dream and that no production would ever want to come here, "Only You, Dick Daring!" stands as a proclamation that not only has it happened, but it most certainly can happen again. Stranger things have.

Truth is, if I had a nickel for every time somebody said something can't happen, I'd be able to fill several socks with which to respectively smack them upside their thick skulls. Can't is a self-fulfilling prophecy. Nobody who has ever achieved anything of worth in his or her life has ever given any validation to the word can't. Think about

While we're on the subject of dimly remembered forays into Mesilla Valley filmmaking, a tip of the hat to the late Theodore J. Flicker, co-creator of the Emmywinning sitcom "Barney Miller" and the man responsible for blowing up parts of downtown Las Cruces in the 1970 feature film "Up In The Cellar." Flicker passed away on Sept. 12, in his home in Santa Fe, at age 84.

To Merle, Ted – and you, too, Jeff – thanks for the cinematic memories.



## 'Equalizer' better than average

Robert McCall (Denzel Washington) is awake and alert before his 7:30 a.m. alarm, cleaning his sneakers with a toothbrush while he sips his morning coffee before quietly riding the Boston city bus to his job stocking shelves at the local big-box home-improvement store.

He returns home each night to his sparse apartment to eat dinner alone, meticulously washing his one plate, one glass, one knife and one fork.

When he can't sleep, McCall frequents the Bridge Diner, where he tucks into a corner booth with cup of herbal tea – brought from home in a carefully folded napkin – and the tattered classics of American literature.

It is here, at the Bridge Diner, McCall meets Teri (Chloe Grace Moretz), a teenage prostitute and fellow night owl in the vicious, violent grips of the Russian mob. When Teri shows up with bruises on her face, McCall takes note; when she doesn't show up at all, beaten into the ICU, he puts to use his finely honed skills – and I don't mean stocking two-by-fours – meting out brutal street justice with all manner of implement.

Such is "The Equalizer," the latest pairing of Washington with his "Training Day" director Antoine Fuqua. Based on the 1980s serial of the same name, "The Equalizer" is not a fresh premise. In it, a quiet man with a secret past utilizes a long-dormant "particular set of skills," vigilante-style, a la Liam Neeson in the "Taken" franchise. What Fuqua's film may lack in originality, though, it makes up for with an undeniable sense of style – especially when it comes to violence, and there is lots – and the strength of its leading man.

McCall's involvement with Teri leads him in to the seedy underbelly of Boston's organized crime syndicate, controlled transcontinentally by a shadowy Russian kingpin named Pushkin, whose stateside interests are handled via his lieutenant Teddy Ransom (a deeply creepy Martin Csokas), "a sociopath with a business card."

Teddy is an old-school movie baddie, cool, collected and creepy as hell, a worthy adversary for McCall, whose abilities from his hidden past allow him to size up a room and exactly how a brawl will play out, "Sherlock Holmes"-style, even timing himself to the second on his watch. It's a fun gimmick, but by its third or fourth time around, it starts to lose its luster.

As always, Washington is a blast to watch. Is he really that good of an actor, or is he just really that charming? No matter – he brings his trademark cool charisma to McCall's sense of vigilante duty. Even when he's doing wrong, you're pulling for him. Bill Pullman and Melissa Leo show up at some point, inexplicably, to shed a little light on our hero's history, but the scene could have been done away with altogether, the backstory shaded in with a few lines of dialogue.

That's a problem with Fuqua's film – while it isn't overstuffed, it could have been slimmed down to an hour and a half, and one or two of the four – yes, four – endings could have been trimmed.

That said, it's all about the action here. Are you familiar with Chekhov's gun?

A dramatic principle described by the 19th century Russian dramaturge and author Anton Chekhov, it requires that every element of a narrative be necessary, and everything else be removed.

"If you say in the first chapter that there is a rifle hanging on the wall, in the second or third chapter it absolutely must go off," Chekhov wrote. "If it's not going to be fired, it shouldn't be hanging there."

"The Equalizer" ascribes to this principle almost religiously. Within its two-hour runtime, witness Chekhov's – or Denzel's – gun, knife, corkscrew, sledge-hammer, propane canisters, shot glass, power drill, nail gun and roll of barbed wire, just to name a few, put to use in the most bone-shattering, blood-splattering utility. The only time it falters is somehow overlooking "Chekhov's warehouse full of industrial-grade meat-processing equipment," a shocking omission.

In all, "The Equalizer" is familiar territory trod right by its star and stylish director. It's dumb, violent fun, never more or less than entertaining throughout – and that's not such a bad thing.

## **Solar-powered cars**

Living Better Solar Powered

So, you are thinking about filling that garage with an electric car? Not a golf cart but a full-blown, freeway-ready EV, or electric vehicle?

More and more folks are getting tired of paying the high price of gasoline and making this shift.

Electric cars make a lot of sense if you live in or around Las Cruces, because EV distance limitations place only minor restrictions on your travel. You can comfortably cruise all over town with trips to work, the grocery store and several other errands before returning home.

All this can be done on a single charge. You can also eliminate your fuel costs by recharging with solar electricity.

New EV models are flooding the market every month. Let's take a step back and look at the field. EVs come in two basic plug-in varieties: Plug-in electric and plug-in electric hybrid. The plug-in electric is the focus of this column. For reference, I'll briefly describe the plug-in electric hybrid before continuing.

The plug-in electric hybrid is an electric car with an onboard gas generator. So, in addition to the ability to plug-in and recharge at home, the gas generator can continuously recharge or run the car's electric motor while you are on the road. For those who want to be "gas free," however, on to the star of the show – the plug-in electric

The plug-in electric vehicle has only one method of recharge. It must be plugged into an EV charger. For now, that means recharging at home. Eventually, chargers will begin to appear across the city to offer more charging flexibility.

Cars from Honda, Ford, Kia, Fiat, Chevy, Nissan, Mercedes, Mitsubishi, Tesla and Toyota are already on the market, and some are selling well. In the next few years, other car makers will be bringing their electric cars to the US market – VW, Volvo and BMW – so you may be able to get a model from one of your favorite car makers

Wouldn't it be great if in addition to enjoying the silence and performance of the electric car, you could refuel for free? This part of the equation is perhaps more accessible than finding an exciting electric car.

Refuel your car with the sun. I'm not suggesting you put solar panels on your new electric car. Unfortunately, the car does not have enough surface area to support a sufficient solar generator. But you can put solar panels on your home and, since you typically plug-in to recharge at home, your car is solar powered.

The question is, how many solar panels are required, or more importantly, how much would it cost to enjoy free fuel for your car? Here comes your favorite answer – it depends. But it can easily be calculated. It depends on the efficiency of your car and how much you plan to drive. That

## Building hope from the ground up Habitat for Humanity celebrates a milestone

Giving hope and changing lives for the better is an ongoing cause for celebration at Mesilla Valley Habitat for Humanity (MVHFH). It isn't every day, however, that a milestone is reached.

In the coming year, MVHFH – founded on the principle that all people deserve a decent, affordable place to live – will build its 100th house.

Considering the nonprofit organization set up camp here in 1987, it's a milestone that is causing a great deal of excitement.

Already on the drawing board, the 100th house will be one of four built by MVHFH in the coming year. Located in the Rincon Mesa subdivision, north of Oñate High School, the houses will be constructed from January to March, 2015.

To kick off the build season, Mesilla Valley Habitat for Humanity will join with partners around the world and supporters from the community to help raise awareness about housing issues through a "Pledge and Prayer" event at 8 a.m. Monday, Oct. 6, at 4730 Whitney Place. Designated World Habitat Day, the event is a special opportunity for Habitat for Humanity to call on individuals and organizations to help address poverty housing by visiting and supporting the local ReStore, 2301 N. Main St., sharing commitments on social media networks and inviting followers and friends to find out more about the organization and what it stands for.

But that's just the beginning, according to Executive Director for MVHFH Maria Vasquez.

"Along with the ground breaking, we'll also have our 911 Build in January, so our local law enforcement and public servants will be framing the 100th house," she said. "We're also hoping to invite Habitat New Mexico to join us for the celebration. It'll be a big thing for affiliates, not only here, but all across New Mexico."

Though the organization is completely dependent on locally raised funds to purchase land and building supplies, the most important ingredient in its continued success is its volunteers.

"We're always accepting individual volunteers to help with the builds," Vasquez said. "On the weekends, we rotate groups like NMSU and businesses, but during the week, we need support from anybody who can spend a few hours using a hammer or a paintbrush."

Vasquez believes that in making the effort, community members have the opportunity to change people's lives.

"It's not just about the house," she said. "The excitement comes from giving these families that hope; that new beginning. There was a recent study of Habitat homeowners that shows 98 percent of their children graduate from high school on time. That's higher than your normal neighborhood family. This is what we provide them. Not just a house, but the stability of a home"

As MVHFH gears up for its landmark event, almost 28 years in the making, Vasquez is hopeful the community will embrace the celebration. Not just by participating in World Habitat Day, but by signing on to help with the build season as it progresses.

"We are inviting community members and churches to assist us, by participating in this project," she said. "They can do it by participating, or planning an event during the celebration, providing meals, just letting people know that we're here and building our 100th house. They don't necessarily have to give monetarily. Every little bit helps, but the impact of having the whole community know we're here and who we're helping, that goes a long way."

tells us how much fuel is required, in this case the units are measured in kilowatt hours (kWH) instead of gallons. (EV information available at www.fueleconomy.gov/ feg/evsbs.shtml)

Now, all we need to know is how many kilowatt hours your plug-in electric car uses to travel 100 miles. From there, you determine how many miles you plan to log during a year. Once we know this, we can determine how many kWH your solar energy system must produce annually to fill your tank for the year.

Here's how we calculate how many annual kilowatt hours are required to power a Ford Fusion, which can travel 100 miles using only 32 kilowatt hours. Assuming you drive 10,000 miles each year. Take the mileage driven, divide by 100 (10,000 ÷ 100 = 100), then multiply by 32 (100 x 32 = 3,200). You need a solar energy system to produce 3,200 kilowatt hours each

year to cover the use of your car.

That's half the answer. Now you probably want to know how large must the solar energy system be, and what's the cost? In this area, each kilowatt of solar will produce approximately 1,800 kilowatt hours each year. So, we divide 3,200 by 1,800  $(3,200 \div 1,800 = 1.78)$  to get the size of the solar energy system in kilowatts.

In this case, the answer is 1.78 kilowatts. If this is part of a larger installation or an expansion of an existing installation,

you could expect a cost of between \$5,500 and \$6,500 before 40 percent tax credits. It pays for itself in about three and a half years when compared to gas purchases for a 40 mpg car.

Remember, your house can use the electricity even when your car is not charging.

While looking through the photos on display and perusing the books, buyers and history buffs shared their memories and questions about the old and new St. Genevieve's churches and Holy Cross School.



"I believe we're the largest (medical group) in southern New Mexico," said clinic/practice manager Irene Benavidez. "We have a one-stop shop: X-ray, allergy (testing), ultrasound, mammogram, laboratory, bone density, pulmonary function testing, pharmacy – everything available to the patients."

These services allow patients to get all the medical attention they or their families need without ever leaving the building.

As the parent institution for the NCORP grant, UNM Cancer Center will work closely with the New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance, the statewide health care partnership for cancer clinical trials.

The academic-community health care partnership in New Mexico enables people all over the state to take part in clinical trials, even if they live in rural and underserved areas. The NCI has listed expansion of clinical goals.

"Most people with cancer are seen in community hospitals and practices,' says Melanie Royce, M.D., PhD.

both at the UNM Cancer Center, serve as co-principal investigators — the lead scientists — for the NCORP

"If we do not include them in clinical trials, we miss many cancer patients who are critical to answering important questions about our treatment management of cancer,"

Royce said.

The NCI also values the unique populations in New Mexico because people in these populations can have markedly different patterns of cancer incidence and different responses to standard cancer treatments. By bringing clinical trials to the entire state, the New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance makes studies about different cancer patterns and treatments

the clinical trials get the benefit of a new treatment years before it gets approval without ever having to leave their community or their doctor.

The New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance has established a structure to

support all aspects of clinical research. Physicians throughout the state get clerical and other help to meet the increased patientmonitoring needs of a clinical trial and to capture data for clinical research. The New Mexico Tumor Registry, part of the NCI's Surveillance, Epidemiology and End Results Program,

works closely with the New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance to manage data and specimens for clinical research. Several pathology laboratories and collection centers also work jointly within the network.

In its evaluation, the NCI noted the strength of the leadership at the New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance and the UNM Cancer Center Clinical Research government support that both organizations receive.

'What we've done in New Mexico is the model for the rest of the country," said Teresa Stewart, the executive director of the New Mexico Cancer




