Rival teams meet again

Game may set records

The state championship football game between Las Cruces and Mayfield high schools Saturday, Dec. 7, could set attendance records for not only Aggie Memorial Stadium, but for the New Mexico Activities Association, (NMAA).

At a press conference previewing the match-up Wednesday, Dec. 4, Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) Athletic Director Ernest Viramontes predicted New Mexico State University football stadium could be filled with as many as 30,000 high school football fans. If that happens, Viramontes said, that would be Aggie Memorial Stadium's largest crowd ever.

If Viramontes' prediction comes true, LCPS Superintendent Stan Rounds predicted that would also be the best attended NMAA championship game in the state's

In addition to the Bulldawg-Trojan rivalry, one of the strongest in the nation, other state championship games in lower divisions than 5-A are being played in northern New Mexico, Viramontes said. That makes Saturday's game the biggest one for this region.

Rounds, who sits on the NMAA board, said the excitement around this game gives support to his position that championship games should be played at one of the teams' hometowns, rather than centralized in Albuquerque, which has been suggested by some in the NMAA.

The last time the two teams met for a state championship was in 2002, when Las Cruces High won. The last time the two teams met was Nov. 8, however, Mayfield won 28-20 in an upset and earned the Trojans a district championship.

Adding even more history-making to the rivalry, Saturday's game will be the 50th time the two teams have played. Having it be the 50th game and the state

Promotion is made official

Udall visits food bank to highlight hunger

Senator opposes cuts to SNAP

U.S. Sen. Tom Udall visited the Roadrunner Food Bank's southern New Mexico warehouse in Las Cruces Tuesday, Dec. 3, on a dual mission.

Udall said not only was he there to encourage people to donate to the food bank during the holiday season, but wanted to illustrate the need for programs to help feed the poor, such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP),

which in November began seeing cuts and could face more in the farm bill before Congress.

In the House version of the farm bill, SNAP - which distributes food stamps - would be cut by \$40 billion over 10 years, Udall said. The Senate version slices \$4 billion over the same period, but Udall said he is against weakening the food "safety net" for anyone.

If the House SNAP cut is what eventually gets passed, 32,000 people in New Mexico alone



championship, Rounds said, will bring out alumni who may not have been able to make last month's regular-season rivalry game. That game, by the way, attracted about 16,800, lower than normal because of other area events, Rounds said. There isn't that kind of competition for the championship game, he

Because of the large crowd expected, recreational vehicles (RVs) and trailers will not be allowed at the New Mexico State University parking areas (see related story). If RVs and trailers were allowed for tailgating, NMSU estimated it would lose 4,000 parking spaces, Rounds said, and NMSU is going to need every parking space it has.

Security is the largest expense LCPS has for the game, but a record gate could also mean a record return for LCPS. After expenses, Rounds said, NMAA gets 70 percent of the net gate receipts and the remaining 30 percent is split between the two

Rounds said he has had conversations with ESPN and is confident the sports broadcast network is going to list the rivalry at least among the top 10 in the nation, if not the top five. The rivalry leads New Mexico in the best rivalry for high school football

in a USA Today online poll. With all the intensity and emotion, this will be a game that not only tests the student-athletes' playing talents, but their character, said Mayfield coach LAS CRUCES VS MAYFIELD Michael Bradley. "What a great stage for us to be

playing on," Bradley said.

While Mayfield is this year's district champion, Las Cruces High is the defending state 5-A champ from last year.

Las Cruces High coach Jim Miller said he is happy for his team with 20 senior players to have been able to make it through the state playoffs to make this championship

game.
"This has been phenomenal for us," Miller said.

Tailgating, parking set for state game

Trailers, RVs barred; tickets on sale now nmaa.ticketleap.com and at both high schools

Tickets are on sale for the New Mexico 5-A State Championship football game between Las Cruces High School and Mayfield High School at 1 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 7, at Aggie Memorial Stadium.

New Mexico State University Police Department has announced the tailgating and parking rules and regulations, which include separate areas for fans of the teams and restrictions to kinds of vehicles that can park near the

NMSU has planned road closures for both Arrowhead Road and Stewart Street at 7 a.m. Saturday until the conclusion of the

football game. To avoid traffic congestion, alternate routes on the west side of campus such as Espina Street and Sam Steel Way are encouraged.

Parking lots for tailgating open at 10 a.m. Saturday and gates to the stadium open at 11 a.m. Alcohol consumption is not allowed. Trailers, RVs or towed vehicles will not be allowed. Pre-staging or parking of vehicles prior to parking lots opening is not allowed. Cooking must be done on a propane grill. Open fires or fire pits are not allowed.

Las Cruces High School will use lots 33 and 38, immediately north of the stadium. Mayfield High School will use lot 34, immediately east of the stadium. (See map.)

Tailgating will conclude at kickoff and fans will be required to enter the stadium. The parking lots will close one hour following the conclusion of the game. 




Which team wins showdown No. 50?

Either way, Las Cruces remains 'Titletown'

Las Cruces High School vs. Mayfield High School.

For the state football championship.

We could probably stop talking right there. Enough said.

Almost everyone in Las Cruces, however, has talked about little else since we learned a few days ago the two teams would meet for the title. Both teams are 11-1 on the season and whoever wins Saturday, Dec. 7, will also take home the big blue trophy for the Class 5-A state championship.

The state title game will also mark the 50th time the two teams have played each other in football since Mayfield High School opened its doors in 1965.

The defending state champ Las Cruces Bulldawgs have plowed through almost everyone on their schedule this year and would be the overwhelming favorite except for one little technicality. The team that gave them their only loss? The Mayfield Trojans.

In the annual regular-season meeting of the two district foes Nov. 8, Mayfield upset LCHS 28-20 before a big crowd at Aggie Memorial Stadium.

Expect an even bigger crowd this Saturday, Dec. 7, when it's for all the marbles.

This state title game was set up with both teams' semifinal victories Saturday, Nov. 30. The game's roots go back a little further, though. Back to August when both teams began two-a-day practices. Back to the summer, when Trojans and Bulldawgs were working out individually and in small groups.

The game's roots also trace to the summer of 1993, when the late Sandra McGrath and her husband, Kevin, organized a little golf tournament to raise some funds for high school football in Las Cruces. The It's Burger Time tournament.

It worked. Big time.

This past summer, the 20th anniversary of the tournament, the Burger Time event raised \$299,000 for multiple programs for local high schools.

The results speak for themselves. Since 1995, teams from Las Cruces have now been in the state title game 20 times.

This year, like in 2002, LCHS and Mayfield will vie for the 5-A title. That same year, Oñate High School also competed, winning the 4-A state title.

The money raised by that program has certainly helped our local high schools. Serious credit also must go to the current head coaches at Las Cruces and Mayfield.

The Bulldawgs' coach, Jim Miller, has taken LCHS to five previous state title games, winning them all.

The Trojans' coach, Michael Bradley, has also taken his team to five previous state title games, with a 3-2 record.

Both coaches have won back-to-back championships. Miller did it with the 1999 and 2000 editions of the Bulldawgs. Bradley led the 2006 and 2007 Trojans to titles.

For the 2013 editions of the Bulldawgs and Trojans, all that history won't matter a whole lot.

What will matter is the heart, fight and football-playing ability of the 22 young men who will occupy the field between the sidelines at any given time Saturday.

A crowd of 25,000 or more will fill Aggie Memorial Stadium for the game; that's about a quarter of our whole city's population. Unfortunately, about half of those folks will go home disappointed.

No matter what, it will be a day to remember.

lottery, did you? Monument benefits well documented

Designation a great opportunity for local business

As of late, there has been much discussion over designating the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks (OMDP) a national monument. One of the most recognizable vistas from our community is of our beloved Organ Mountains. By exploring the mountains, as well as areas to the west and the north, such as the Potrillo, Doña Ana, Robledo and Uvas mountains, residents and visitors to our area will be overwhelmed with desert landscapes, petroglyphs, wildlife, cultural and historical artifacts and stories of our state heritage in every view.

But the effort to protect our treasured public lands and heritage have been countered by some with false information, most recently challenging the positive impact a national monument would have on our local businesses.

In August, the Las Cruces Green Chamber released a study (http://bit.ly/1afWFme) we commissioned by an independent firm, BBC Research and Consulting, to determine the economic viability of designating the OMDP a national monument. BBC is a well-respected consulting firm that has conducted hundreds of economic studies for clients in a wide range of public and private sectors. Their study found that designating OMDP as a national monument would contribute more than \$7.4 million in additional local annual economic activity, create 88 new jobs and result in an additional \$562,000 per year generated in combined state and local government tax revenue.

In recent local publications, Utah researchers questioned the findings of BBC's OMDP economic forecast report, claiming they could not recreate similar economic benefits for our community resulting from such a national monument designation.

We find this curious, since BBC used the well-known and highly regarded IMPLAN economic modeling techniques in both their OMDP and 2012 Rio Grande del Norte (RGDN) studies. IMPLAN has been providing widely used economic modeling tools since 1976. The modeling projections are straightforward, supported by the simple logic that national monuments attract thousands of visitors and those visitors spend millions of dollars in the local economy.

In March 2013, President Obama designated RGDN in northern New Mexico as a National Monument. Since that





time, visitation to the area has skyrocketed. Data compiled by the Bureau of Land Management for this new monument shows a year-over-year visitation increase from fiscal 2012 to 2013 of 40 percent. This is all the more impressive when you consider that the monument was designated exactly half way through fiscal year 2013. The increase for fiscal year 2014 is expected to be even greater.

Locally, 2009 data showed that nearby White Sands National Monument saw 471,167 visitors who spent \$16 million in the local economy, supporting 278 jobs. Based on the experience at White Sands, Rio Grande del Norte and other area attractions such as Carlsbad Caverns, it is a no-brainer that national monuments attract thousands of visitors annually.

Beyond economic modeling and tourism numbers, having a national monument designation for OMDP is plain common sense. The Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce has been discussing this issue for more than a year with our members. With their input, we are advocating for what we know is the best opportunity for our local businesses.

The possible economic benefits are well documented, providing evidence to appropriately dismiss as ludicrous the claims that this important conservation effort would harm our local economy.

When approximately 100,000 new, non-local visitors start coming to Las Cruces to explore the surrounding public lands, they are going to spend millions of dollars that will benefit our local businesses and create new jobs. Why are we arguing about this?

The Washington Redskins

and tripled their tuition so the money from the lottery is not enough.

But I have a solution. The proceeds from

this tax on people who don't understand math at this point goes to college general education, in fact, anything the student wants to study. High court sides with state on GRT hike delay

A three-eighth of a percent increase to the gross receipts tax (GRT) approved by the Las Cruces City Council will not go into effect until July 1, 2014, the New Mexico Supreme Court recently ruled.

The court sided with the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department's decision in late October that Las Cruces could not implement its GRT increase by Jan. 1, 2014, because the city failed to adopt a model resolution in September.

The Las Cruces City Council passed a reworded ordinance in October, which was approved by the state, but not in time to begin collecting the tax on Jan. 1, according to Tax

The city petitioned the state Supreme Court to accept its first tax hike ordinance, in hopes it could beginning collecting the tax on Jan. 1. But the Supreme Court didn't agree.

The city wanted the GRT increase in place in case the Legislature decides to change the rule in the next 30-day session, starting Jan. 20. The option to increase GRT is available to larger municipal and county governments depending on hold harmless payments from the state - reimbursements of GRT they would have earned if lawmakers hadn't exempted food and medicine.

The hold harmless payments will be phased out over a 15-year period starting in 2015. The six-month delay is expected to cost the city about \$5 million.

New Mexico U.S. senators and Rep. Lujan back gay marriage

U.S. Sens. Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich and U.S. Rep. Ben Ray Lujan reaffirmed their support for marriage equality Wednesday, Dec. 4, by joining the work of New Mexico Unites for Marriage, the campaign dedicated to securing and protecting that freedom for everyone in the state.

Their endorsements come as the New Mexico Supreme Court is poised to rule on a case filed on behalf of six plaintiff couples who were represented by the ACLU of New Mexico, the national ACLU, the National Center for Lesbian Rights and local attorneys.

"I enthusiastically support the freedom to marry for everyone in New Mexico," Udall said. "Family comes first for all of us and that's why it is imperative that we support all New Mexican families and work together to win marriage equality and defend it if we must."

"I am very hopeful that the New Mexico Supreme Court will find that our constitution supports full equality for all our citizens," Heinrich said. "Marriage is the foundation of a strong community and I will do all I can to secure and protect this freedom for loving gay and lesbian couples and their families."

"Now that legally married same-sex couples can access the critical federal protections so necessary in times of stress and crisis, it is important to ensure that every couple can make that personal choice of marriage," Lujan said. "Gay and lesbian couples make the same contributions and sacrifices that we all do, including paying taxes, owning business and caring for their families. It is time everyone is treated equally under the law."

'We are extremely grateful to have Senators Udall and Heinrich and Congressman Lujan onboard to support our work to win and defend marriage equality," said campaign manager Robert Adams. "Over 1,700 same-sex couples have already married in New Mexico, and that fundamental freedom belongs to everyone in the state. New Mexico Unites for Marriage is committed to making that dream a reality.



One of those friends was Betty Taylor, who was part of the University of Alabama ROTC unit with Bingham.

"She was always a mover and shaker," Taylor said. "She was always in charge."

Although not a imposing figure, those who know the 54-year-old Bingham acknowledged her drive and passion. It's a 32-year career filled with such an array of assignments – both stateside and overseas – they were too many to mention, said Gen. Dennis Via, commanding general of the Army Materiel Command, the presiding officer of the ceremony.

"Gwen Bingham is a trailblazer, a leader and a soldier who can be trusted to accomplish the mission that has been assigned to her," Via said.

As one of only 119 major generals currently serving in the Army, Via said the promotion was "a big deal" for the Bingham, who was the first female commander of Fort Lee and the first African American woman to command WSMR.

Her children said they weren't surprised by the promotion because of her passion for serving in the military.

"She really loves what she does," Phillip Bingham said.

Tava Bingham said she appreciated hearing others recognize her mother as a trailblazer.

Besides speaking about her family and friends, Bingham spoke of other career Army officers such as Via who have served as her mentors – and her Christian faith.

"I want to thank God for waking me up today," Bingham said. "All that I am and hope to be would not be possible without the love of Jesus Christ, my husband, family and, as we say down South, a heap of people. ... You can't get there by yourself unless you fool yourself."

No other assignment illustrates the need for teamwork better than her current assignment, she said.

Paying it forward

Operation Christmas Child recipient becomes volunteer

Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child, a Samaritan's Purse ministry, has touched the lives of more than 100 million children with shoeboxes filled with goodies and scripture.

While many have heard stories about the impact these simple shoeboxes make on children living in more than 130 different countries, few have had the firsthand experience of Martha Diaz, a Las Cruces visitor and Operation Christmas Child volunteer.

Diaz received her shoebox when she was a teenager living in Ecuador.

"At that time, my pastor told us that children in the U.S. and Canada pulled their gifts to share," she said.

She said the box contained markers, toothpaste and a toothbrush, soap, crayons and a pair of green sandals that she still wears to this day. Her favorite item in the box, however, was a pink lamp.

"It reminds me that Jesus is my lamp," she said. "The main purpose of sharing those boxes is to share the real gift of Christmas: Jesus Christ."

As she got older, Diaz remained active with Operation Christmas Child, distributing boxes to children in Ecuador.

"I was now on the other side," she said. "It was so exciting to make those boxes. It's wonderful to me to package the boxes because I know the other side."

She also spent four years helping Operation Christmas Child distribute boxes to Tuquerres, Columbia, a farming community that has a high amount of drug trafficking.

"Those Columbian children touched my heart," she said, adding that the looks on their faces as they opened their shoe-boxes reminded her of how she felt when she received hers. "It was so amazing, and I'm grateful I got to see their faces when they opened their boxes and knew that other children in the U.S. wished them a merry Christmas."

She said often times the items the children were most excited about were the markers and notebooks, adding that it meant their family didn't have to find the money to by these necessary school supplies.

"My pastor told a story about one child who found a pair of

shoes in their box and they started to cry," she said, adding that the child's father had been sent to jail for stealing. "He went to visit him with the shoes and said, 'Look at what God gave me, so you don't have to steal anymore."

In May, Diaz – along with 69 Ecuadorians – came to Las Cruces to attend a seven-month course at New Mexico State University to improve her English, a skill she will use when she becomes a teacher.

She began attending First Evangelical Free Church and learned that it was a processing center for Operation Christmas Child.

"Thank you for the great operation here," she said. "My country doesn't have money. I'm grateful for the people who do this job.

"Through these boxes, we share the love of Jesus Christ and talk about the real gift of Christmas."

This year, 8,089 shoeboxes were collected from throughout southwest New Mexico and El Paso.



would be cut off from food stamps, Udall said.

'The average for a person to be on the SNAP program is eight to 10 months - not a lifetime," said Melody Wattenbarger, Roadrunner Food Bank CEO. "Nobody wants to get SNAP or wait for hours in the cold to get a box of food."

Wattenbarger's comments were a rebuttal to fiscal conservatives who advocate cutting food stamps because they believe many are abusing the system. Wattenbarger said her organization has seen how the economy has hurt the poor the most. Many who were not working fulltime or in minimum-wage jobs were the first to lose their jobs when businesses made cuts, she said.

The recession has been devastating," she said. "The people with the least to start with were hit the hardest."

Teresa Johansen, chief operations officer for the food bank, said Roadrunner's southern New Mexico operation grows every year and currently distributes more than 4 million pounds of food annually. While there are food pantries that Roadrunner supports, the majority of food is distributed through a network of mobile food banks that set up for periodic distributions in different communities.

The nonprofit organization supports about 100 mobile food banks statewide, Wattenbarger said, which means Roadrunner is supplying the food to at least five mobile food banks every day. Roadrunner has 62 paid employees -15 of whom are certified truck drivers making only \$11 an hour - so it depends on a small army of volunteers, Wattenbarger said.

About 12,000 people volunteer at Roadrunner statewide over a course of the year, she said. Some volunteer regularly, but the majority of volunteers help out for just a

couple of hours, Johansen said.

While Roadrunner does get some federal food surplus supplies, the food depends on donations, from food drives to cash, Johansen said. Cash is preferred, she said, because the food bank can buy larger quantities of food at bulk prices, from basics such as beans and rice to breakfast cereal and peanut butter. Cash also helps the food bank pay for the food warehousing and storage, she said, as well as equipment costs and maintenance.

If SNAP was to be eliminated, as some advocate, Udall said organizations such as Roadrunner would not be able to fill in the

gap.
"Food banks would have to double "the New Mexico" what they are doing now," the New Mexico Democrat said.

'We could never generate enough private donations to fill the need, Wattenbarger said.

"There has to be a public-private partnership to feed the hungry this country," Udall said. "It's been a tough recession, but we need

to protect our safety net."

Polarized politics over how to handle the government's finances is putting at risk these kinds of safety nets for people when they need it the most, Udall said.

"It is time put aside the labels and find some kind of common ground," Udall said. "There should be common ground about safety nets for people and not have starvation in this country. We need to leave SNAP whole."

'Transformation' begins

Construction is more than renovation

The long-awaited Las Cruces High School renovation project is finally under way.

Referring to this project as a renovation is very misleading, however. What will be happening over the next few years at LCHS is nothing less than a total transformation, from an older, scattered collection of buildings to a state-of-the-art educational campus.

The project has been broken into three phases, with the first phase set to begin at the beginning of December. All of the work done this past summer was a "pre-construction" package that allowed for much of the demolition to be done while students were gone for the summer.

Phase I, which should last two years, will see two-story instructional buildings go up on both sides of El Paseo Road, connected by a fully enclosed bridge. These buildings will house most of our core classrooms, and will come equipped with the most current educational technology available. Our main gymnasium, which has a very strong tradition to maintain, will remain unchanged aside from some much needed cosmetic and heating/cooling upgrades.

The most exciting part of this project is the main "mall" or courtyard that is being established in the center of the campus. For years, our campus has been added on to and there is no real focal point. It is our belief that this design will help bring the school together and unify our many activities



The Western Athletic Conference New Mexico State Aggie volleyball team will face off against the University of Arizona at 6 p.m. (MT) Friday, Dec. 6, in San Diego, during the first round of the NCAA Volleyball Championship.

In the other match, host and No. 9 seed San Diego (24-3) will face UC Santa Barbara (18-10) at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6. The Toreros won the West Coast Conference title with a 16-2 mark and are currently on a 15-match winning streak. UCSB shared the Big West regular-season title with Cal State Northridge and Hawai'i, but earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament due to the conference's head-to-head tiebreaker.

The first-round winners are scheduled to

meet at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 7, but fans are advised to check www.nmstatesports.com for late schedule changes.

The regionals for the Aggies' bracket will be played in Lincoln, Neb., Friday and Saturday, Dec. 13-14

NMSU coach Mike Jordan said the Arizona Wildcats are a "great" team, the Aggies won't be intimidated.

"We are very familiar with them," he said. "We play them a lot in the spring season, a lot of scrimmage type stuff, and we have an idea of what they have personnel-wise.

"We competed well with them in the spring, and we are looking forward to the challenge," he said.

The Aggies (22-10) advanced to the NCAA by winning the Western Athletic Conference tournament Wednesday, Nov. 27, in Phoenix.

This will be NMSU's seventh NCAA Tournament appearance and second in a row.

The Aggies are led by WAC Player of the Year and WAC Tournament MVP Desiree Scott, who averages 2.62 kills on .372 hitting and 1.33 blocks per set.

Arizona (20-12) earned an at-large bid out of the Pacific-12 Conference. The Wildcats tied for fifth in the Pac-12 with a 10-10 conference mark. Arizona is led by Madi Kingdon, who averages 4.38 kills and 3.19 digs per set.

Jordan said playing a team from the Pacific 12 Conference will be a challenge.

"Obviously, the Pac 12, I think, is the premier volleyball conference in the country," he said. "It's loaded with good teams – great teams. Arizona is no exception. They are very talented, they are well coached. They have a lot of very

Undefeated UTEP tops Aggies

Young NMSU team battles but falls behind in second half

The New Mexico State women's basketball fell to the undefeated Miners from the University of Texas at El Paso, 80-61, Tuesday, Dec. 3, in the Pan American Center. The loss drops the Aggies record to 3-5, while UTEP improves to 7-0 on the season

Freshman Brianna Freeman led the Aggies in scoring with 12 points, Moriah Mack ended the game with nine points and both freshman Vanessa Garner and junior transfer Tyler Ellis finished with eight.

The Aggies shot 38 percent from the field, but allowed UTEP to shoot 42.6 percent. The Aggies shot 41.2 percent from three-point range (7-17), while holding the Miners to just 15.4 percent (2-13).

"The team did a good job tonight, they competed for the entire game," coach Mark Trakh said. "We started three freshmen, a sophomore and a junior tonight so this is a team that is really building for the future."

The Aggies got off to a slow start, held without a field goal for the first three and a half minutes.

Freeman scored the first four points of the game for the Aggies, followed by a three pointer from junior transfer September Offutt, which tied the game at seven with just under 16 minutes remaining in the first half.

UTEP answered by going on a 9-2 run that pushed the score to 16-9. The Aggies wouldn't go away, though, and Mack hit a three pointer that broke the Aggies out of their scoring drought.

NMSU went on their own scoring run, capped off by sophomore Sasha Weber hitting a pair of free throws to give the Aggies a 19-18 lead with nine minutes to go in the first half.

The Aggies and Miners traded baskets for the remainder of the first half. UTEP pushed their lead to seven points, but the Aggies would answer back right before the half with a Weber steal, which led to a fast-break score. UTEP led going into halftime 39-35.

Cold Aggies fall to Lobos 79-70

NMSU basketball travels to No. 19 Gonzaga and No. 2 Arizona

Poor shooting in the first half put the New Mexico State University Aggies in a hole they could never dig out of as they fell to the University of New Mexico Lobos, 79-70, in the Pan American Center Wednesday, Dec. 4.

The Aggies were led by Daniel Mullings with 16 points.

The game was tied at 16-16 with 12:03 left in the first half, but the Lobos went on a 19-9 run as the Aggies went cold from the field.

"We had a lot of mental breakdowns tonight and, as a team, they didn't handle the pressures of this game, the magnitude of this game and the ramifications of what it means to the city and the college – are immense," NMSU coach Marvin Menzies said.

The Lobos led 39-29 at the half.

The Aggies pulled to within four, 43-39, with 16:48 to go in the game, but never got closer.

coach Craig Neal said. "I think they have a really good team. "It was a tough road win."

The Aggies were able to get to within six with 5:52 to play on two free throws by D.K. Eldridge, but fouls by K.C. Ross Miller and Tshilidzi Nephawe, and missed shots by Eldridge and Sim Bhullar, handed momentum back to the Lobos.

NMSU was able to score 10 points in the last 55 seconds and cut the lead to six at 74-68 on a Kevin Aronis three-pointer, but the Lobos made four straight free throws to seal the win.

The Aggies will go on a brutal road trip starting at 9 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 7, at No. 19 Gonzaga and continuing at 7 p.m. Wednesday Dec. 11, at No. 2 Arizona, 6 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 14, at Drake and at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 17, for a rematch against the Lobos in Albuquerque.

A balancing act

Can we find a self-fulfilling middle ground?

A lot of golfers and other athletes are wearing "performance jewelry" these days. I have magnetic bracelets, rubber wrist bands, pendants that hang on chains around my neck and other stuff. I even have a magnetic belt endorsed by Raymond Floyd.

I noticed many of the major league baseball players in the World Series had multiple bands around their necks. I don't know if this stuff does any good. Certainly there is no real solid scientific evidence to prove that these accouterments actually make a significant and lasting difference in one's performance. I guess it would take "indisputable" scientific evidence – the kind needed to overturn a football referee's call on the field – for me to become a passionate believer.

One bracelet I received from the marketer (to test) was promoted as creating "better balance" for the wearer. That would be nice, I thought.

Then my mind began to wander, pondering the various dimensions of balance that seem to be involved in golf. Of course, a balanced golf swing, along with a balanced weight shift and finishing position, are fundamental for a solid swing. However, for the purposes of this lesson, I'm talking other types of balance: mental, emotional, behavioral and attitudinal. Perhaps we could even

go deeper into personality traits. For now, we'll look at five critical aspects of balance in your approach to the game of golf that will help you toward faster improvement.

I view the challenge of balance for athletic performance as a continuum, with extremes of behavior on either end. My first example is with the emotional extremes of fear on the one end and anger on the other end.

Visualize a scale with fear on the left side and anger on the right side. What we want is something more performance enhancing, in the middle. Playing with fear all the time, whether it's fear of failing, fear of losing, fear of looking bad or just fear in general, is going to sink us eventually. Being afraid of bad results and negative outcomes is a sure recipe for failure, in my book, regardless of what sport you're playing.

On the other hand, playing angry golf won't get you anywhere either. Temper tantrums, club throwing, vulgar outbursts and a sour disposition are maladaptive emotional states that will dampen any chance of success. I coach golfers to get themselves in an emotional place that is calm and collected, where the emotional ups and downs are minimal. Call it serenity if you will. There are so many ups and downs in a round of golf, and a golf tournament lasting several days, that we need to keep things level - balanced.

For some folks, the balancing act is between indifference and perfectionism. Over my years of playing golf and doing golf schools, I have seen more average, recreational golfers who have an "I don't care" attitude,

who play what I call "hit-and-giggle" golf, as opposed to golfers who demand that every shot be perfect, or at least much better than it turned out.

I see perfectionist attitudes in many young golfers who are just learning the game. The vast majority are simply not good enough yet to get that down on themselves, to get so upset when they mess up.

Between apathy and trying to make everything perfect, in my opinion, lies a positive attitude of striving for excellence while accepting the results at any given moment. I must admit I do favor a mindset that sets high standards of performance, as opposed to an attitude settling for just average or "whatever." Golf is certainly not a game of "perfect," as Ben Hogan said. Golf is mostly a game of misses; we just want our misses to be such that we can work with them.

One of the really important balancing acts we must be aware of concerns our level of stimulation or excitement.

On the one end, we have the lethargic golfer, who doesn't seem to be motivated by much at all, or at least not motivated to perform at his or her very best. No effort, no intensity, no forethought, no real exertion.

On the other hand, there is the golfer who is just stoked. It's like he has just consumed three bold grande coffees from Starbucks or three monster drinks.

If you're a defensive tackle whose job it is to sack the quarterback, it's hard to be overaroused, but if you're over-aroused as a golfer you're in trouble.

Fine motor skills, like those needed in putting (and playing the piano), don't respond well when we're overly aroused. We need to be calm. We need to be motivated, enthusiastic, optimistic; but not over-zealous, nervous or over-eager.

This balance is what I call "passionate detachment." This is where you badly want the desired result, but you are not so attached to the outcome that it gets in the way of your performance.

Let's talk about the continuum of insecure on the one end and cocky on the other. If you want to see insecure, take a look at the golfer who seems to be constantly in fear, as noted in our first comparison. Insecurity can also be found at the highest levels of the game, from Q-school all the way to a tour pro who may be on the verge of winning his or her first professional tournament.

When you're out of your comfort zone, out of your element, you're going to feel nervous and there is no pill, no sports drink, no shrink who can help you out of it. Experience is the best teacher, pure and simple.

Cockiness, on the other hand, is the one area that I'm unsure about, because I don't have much advice on that one.

My experience is that cocky golfers tend to be narcissists. They're usually self-centered, ego-driven, boorish characters, who are not welcoming to suggestion or advice. They tend to be taken by themselves, with little sensitivity to what may be going on around them, or how others are feeling. They tend to think that it's all about "me."

Perhaps that's why we like to see certain sports figures (and politicians and entertainers) taken down by their own self-defeating, egotistical and rapacious behavior. I'm not naming any names. OK, I will. To cover the misbehavior bases of celebrity-dom we're talking about A-Rod, Lindsay Lohan and Anthony Weiner, for example.

Just pick your sport and think about it; you'll come up with lots of examples.

The middle ground is the confident player who knows himself and who knows that things will be OK, regardless of the outcome of this particular match. Confidence, in reality, is quiet conviction in how you have prepared and that you are doing things right. Believing in yourself and your method. That amazing attitude will get us through almost anything. That's how the brave men who struggled up the beaches of Normandy on D-Day and fought on Iwo Jima won World War II for us.

My friends know that I mark my golf ball on the green with what are called "challenge" coins, honoring and remembering World War II heroes

I do that to keep the game of golf properly in perspective. Golf is simply a game – pretty minor when it comes to the big picture. But veterans of foreign wars and wounded warriors were dealing with life-and-death. Life is not a game.

Lastly, let me explain the difference between someone who is a "know-it-all" and someone who is intractably ignorant.

The know-it-all has an answer and a come-back for everything, regardless if he knows what he is talking about. He is the fellow who seems to be constantly talking - about the market, about the NFL, about politics – but the more that comes out of his mouth, the more you realize that his ego has hijacked his brain.

Beware of this brash cretin, since he is liable to convince you of false idols. He's the type of person who says, "Every statement I make is firmly backed up by my own

This golfer-ignoramus has not bothered to read the rules, take any lessons or learn anything about the game. No thought of raking a bunker or fixing a ball mark. No thought that someone may be waiting in the group behind, while he takes a dozen practice swings and then studiously lines up his fourth putt.

Which is worse? Take your pick. I like people who are coachable: serious golfers who would like to get better; who approach golf with some appreciation for the sacred history of the game, the genteel sport that it

is and some humor.

Aggies hold off Vandals

Team ends season with 21-16 victory

The New Mexico State University football team finished the 2013 season by holding off the Idaho Vandals, 24-16, in Aggie Memorial Stadium Saturday, Nov. 30. The Aggies finish the season with a 2-10 record.

NMSU would score 17 of the final 20 points in the game, including outscoring Idaho 14-3 in the second half.

Senior quarterback Andrew McDonald finished 17-of-27 for 186 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. Senior running back Germi Morrison had the second 100yard game of the season, and third of his career, after finishing with 111 rushing yards on 17 carries.

Junior Austin Franklin once again led the Aggie receiving corps, this time with six catches for 64 yards and two touchdowns. Adam Shapiro added four catches for 62 yards.

The Aggie defense played one of its strongest games of the season, led by senior linebacker Trashaun Nixon, who had 12 total tackles, half a sack and a forced fumble.

The teams traded punts during the first four drives of the game. The Vandals' second punt of the day pinned the Aggies on their own fiveyard line.

McDonald got NMSU out of trouble, however, as the Aggie quarterback scrambled for 28 yards on the first play of the drive. Later in the drive, McDonald hit junior wide receiver Joseph Mathews for a 27-yard pass.

A couple of plays later, McDonald hit Franklin down the left sideline for a 28-yard touchdown catch, giving NMSU a 7-0 lead with 6:27 left in the first quarter.

The Vandals tied the game at seven after a 56-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Taylor Davis to tight end Michael LaGrone.

During Idaho's next drive, NMSU seemed to force a Vandal punt for the fourth time in five drives, but Idaho punter Austin Rehkow ran 40 yards down the field on a fake punt.

Rehkow kicked a 25-yard field goal to give

the Vandals a 10-7 lead.

On the ensuing NMSU drive, McDonald was stripped of the ball after attempting a pass. Idaho recovered the fumble at the Aggie 11-

yard line.

NMSU's defense held the Vandals to a Rehkow field goal that extended the Idaho lead to 13-7, with under five minutes left in the half.

The Aggies turned the ball over during their next two possessions, but the defense kept its team in the ball game.

After a McDonald interception, the Aggie defense got the ball right back when Nixon forced a fumble at the Idaho 45-yard line.

Following another Aggie turnover, the defense would stop the Vandals on fourth-andthree from the Aggie 26-yard line to give the ball back to NMSU with 1:48 left in the half.

The Aggies went 55 yards on eight plays to set up a 36-yard field goal by Maxwell Johnson, with 13 seconds left in the half, to cut the Idaho lead to 13-10 at halftime.

NMSU regained the lead during its first possession of the second half. After forcing an Idaho three-and-out, the Aggies went on a nine-play, 73-yard scoring drive, giving the Aggies a 17-13 lead with 9:21 left in the third quarter.

Idaho answered with a final field goal of the day to cut the NMSU lead to one at 17-16.

The Aggies made two touchdowns in two second-half drives. Shapiro extended the lead to 24-16 after he scored on a reverse handoff during the second play of the final quarter. NMSU would go 4-for-4 on third-down conversions during the drive.

With the Vandals driving and in the red zone, NMSU senior defensive back Darien Johnson intercepted a pass, giving the ball to NMSU on its own 20-yard line with 10:48 left.

Idaho had four opportunities from inside the red zone to try and tie the game, but the Aggie defense held strong.

to block well, they've got to make the plays," he said. "On defense, we have to tackle well, which we've done this year, and we have to prevent the big plays"

Miller said his team knows what to expect from the Trojans.

Colemenero said a group including "Indios Mansos" from Ysleta chased the raiders to Soledad Canyon in the Organ Mountains, where they prepared to ambush them in their sleep. One of their horses, however, stumbled over a lamb and the bleating awoke the slumbering marauders. A fight ensued, and no hostiles were killed initially, but Colemenero said he later slew two Indians in a hand-to-hand fight.







Cantú elected to head international committee

The Most Reverend Oscar Cantú, bishop of Las Cruces Catholic Diocese, was elected chairman of the Committee on International Justice and Peace by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) Tuesday, Nov. 12, in Baltimore.

Cantú, a committee member, was elected to the chairman position in a 126-110 vote.

This position is an important one in the church. It comes at a time when the Pew Research Center reports that 75 percent of the world's population "lives in countries where governments, social

groups or individuals restrict peoples' ability to freely practice their faith," according to a press release from the Las Cruces Diocese.

"We do not need a report to tell us something that we sadly see on the news every day," said Cardinal Timothy Dolan, archbishop of New York and president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, in his address to the USCCB General Assembly Monday, Nov. 11. "Religious persecution in the form of violent attacks happens every day all over the world."

Pope Francis urges all Christians to pray for one another, to look beyond one's own fence.

Collectively, the body of bishops established this committee to protect religious freedom, to advocate for justice and peace in the world.

The USCCB Committee on International Justice and Peace assists the bishops, both collectively and individually, in advancing the social mission of the church on international justice and peace through policy development, advocacy, education, outreach and acts of ecclesial solidarity. The committee advises the bishops on international public policy issues especially integral human development, human rights, religious freedom and peace.

Cantú is an academic and a theologian; an advocate of Hispanic ministry, ecumenical and interfaith dialogue, social justice, Catholic education, youth and family life. He is the youngest bishop in the United States leading a diocese. Cantú said he has accepted this new challenge prayerfully and thoughtfully. Cantú's motto is "Zeal for the Lord's house does consume me"





Group formed to support 2014 school bond election

Financing structured to avoid tax increase

More than 40 community members have joined a "blue ribbon committee" for the school bond and mill levy election for Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) Tuesday, Feb. 4, 2014.

The ballot will contain two items: a \$65 million school general obligation bond issue and renewal of a three mill capital improvements tax levy. LCPS Superintendent Stan Rounds said approval of both items will not increase the current school tax rate for property owners.

'If approved, the election will fund the continued remodeling at Las Cruces High School and will remodel older classrooms, make repairs throughout the school district, and bring additional safety measures to all schools, Rounds said.

The committee will be chaired by Sherley O'Brien, a former LCPS teacher and administrator, who is the parent of twin daughters at Centennial High School. She is a long-time LCPS and community volunteer who has served on the boards of many local nonprofit organizations and volunteered in numerous fundraisers. O'Brien currently serves as vice president of the LCPS Foundation board of directors. She and her husband, Jeff, own Arroyo Medical Supply and Mesilla Valley Kitchen.

"Our children deserve to have safe and appropriate facilities to support their learning," O'Brien said.

LCPS officials said passage of both the bond issue and the mill levy would maintain the current school tax rate, which is \$9.81 per \$1,000 of taxable property value. Taxable value is onethird of the assessed value for property owners in the Las Cruces school district.

Items the bond would fund include: \$24 million for continued renovations at Las Cruces High School; \$6.5 million for a new gymnasium and remodeled music facilities at Sierra Middle School; \$1.5 million for improvements at the Field of Dreams soccer complex, including bleachers, lighting, concessions and a press box; \$1.5 million for another field at the Field of Dreams baseball complex; \$3.5 million for a new multipurpose center and kitchen at Hermosa Heights Elementary; \$1 million for roofs at Doña Ana Elementary and Mesilla Elementary; \$1 million for heating and air-conditioning renovations at Lynn Middle School; \$1.05 million for security card access

for all schools; \$955,000 for improvements to school fire alarms and intercom systems; \$900,000 for school security cameras; and \$1.025 million to relocate the front offices at Booker T. Washington and Jornada elementary schools to improve safety.

Also included on the bond election is \$240,000 for compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act and \$4 million

for partial funding toward the Court Youth Center charter schools' campus, which would house Alma d'arte Charter High School, J. Paul Taylor (charter) Academy, and the Mesilla Valley Youth Foundation. A list of all bond projects is available on the LCPS website at www.lcps.k12.nm.us.

Rounds said renewing the three mill levy would generate approximately \$9 million a year for the school district to make major repairs and purchase school furniture, playground equipment and technology, among other items. The mill levy would also bring revenue to three local charter schools: Las Montañas Charter High School, New America School and La Academia Dolores Huerta.

LCPS spokeswoman Jo Galvan said this is the first LCPS election that will also benefit the charter schools. State law allows for charter facilities, which are public schools, to request a portion of the locally approved mill levy, based on their enrollment, she said.

The blue ribbon committee members have organized themselves into a number of subcommittees, including a speakers' bureau. The committee is also helping to register new voters, including students who will be 18 years old by election day, O'Brien said. The last day to register for the school election is Tuesday, Jan. 7, 2014. O'Brien can be reached at 649-2373 or lcpsblueribboncommittee@gmail.com.

Galvan said money used to generate materials will be paid by private donations raised by committee members. The school district intends to produce information-only brochures, she said.

2013 a very good year?



This year's sales of new and existing Las Cruces area homes, townhomes and condominiums were significantly outpacing last year's closings until late summer, when Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke announced he was toying with the idea of cutting back on the Fed's purchases of \$85 billion per month in treasuries and mortgage-backed securities. Within 48-hours of the announcement, the stock market fell more than 500 points, mortgage rates rose almost a full percentage point and home buyers fled the market.

That was big news.

Since that time, and without much fanfare, the stock market has recovered. Mortgage rates have declined to about where they were prior to the announcement and home buyers have returned to the market. The question remains, however, whether there are currently enough buyers in the marketplace to push prices and production above last year's levels.

According to statistics from the Las Cruces Association of Realtors, it appears that just might be the case – but it's going be close.

Local Realtors closed 1,217 residential transactions through the first 11 months of this year, outshining last year's 1,174 closings by 43 units. New-home sales accounted for around 11 percent of

Las Cruces back office hiring under way

General Dynamics Information Technology (GDIT) is building a 20,000 square foot addition at its back office facility on Hickory Loop and hiring 200 additional employees.

Barela said an improved business climate, which he attributed to a "more competitive tax structure on job creators" and the availability of training support through the Job Training

Red flags fly low to the ground along the roadside past Sisbarro showrooms and lots from Avenida Blanco south past Sisbarro Mitsubishi and VW to the Old Town Restaurant. They resume at Boutz Road and surround Sisbarro Buick GMC and the preowned vehicles office and sales lot.

The flags celebrate a major renovation that

will become official with a ribbon cutting in January 2014. In the meantime, they help direct customers accustomed to a different configuration.

Prior to the re-do, new Buick and GMC vehicles were sold out of the mission-style building at the southeast corner of Valley and Boutz. The sales office for the new vehicles has relocated to a renovated structure that formerly housed administrative offices.


Used vehicles, previously displayed around the signature yellow tent, formerly were sold out of an office in a nearby trailer, Robert Calderon of the used vehicle sales staff said Monday, Dec. 2. Used car offices now are located in the mission-style building at the corner of Valley and Boutz that previously housed the new car operation.

When GMC asked for the renovations in order to create a unified and modern look at dealerships across the country, Sisbarro took advantage of the opportunity to improve all the operations at that location.

The remodeling has been completed and the project has morphed into the move-in stage, marketing manager Rick Nezzer said.

all closings in both years.

As we enter our final month of the year, 171 buyers and sellers are holding signed contracts and awaiting closing. Last year at this time, 195 buyers were in line to check out.

By my fuzzy math, that 24-unit deficit eats up more than half of the 43-unit advantage our market gained so far this year.

Can we maintain that momentum? As I said before, it's going to be close.

Through November, the average sale price of the new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums sold in and around Las Cruces was \$174,843. That's a

\$1,553 improvement over last year's combined average of \$173,290.

During the same period, our area's median price rose by just over \$7,200. It's encouraging to see that Las Cruces area prices are finally on the rise, if only slightly.

This year's total sales volume of just over \$212 million represents a \$9.2 million improvement over last year's \$203 million total. By all appearances, this year's dollar volume will outpace last year's total, even if the number of sold units falls short of last year's total.

Well, there you have it. Prices are up slightly, buyers are in the marketplace and hopes are high that this year will end with more sales and higher values than in years past. Let's hope that these positive signs

Incentive Program (JTIP), has led to a number of jobs announcements around the state.

"Businesses are looking for predictability and certainty, and, in stark contrast to what is happening in Washington, Gov. (Susana) Martinez and I, with bi-partisan members of the Legislature, are positioning New Mexico to grow the private sector economy and create opportunities," Barela said.





Christmas brings to mind patent reform

Patents present difficult dilemma

This Christmas, like Christmases past, I'll be buying electronic doodads for my wife and especially my children. And capitalism is marvelous at generating more and different gadgets. But there are problems in paradise: The technology we so lavish on each other this time of year is the product of our patent system.

Patents always represent a delicate balance. On the one hand is the desire to incentivize innovation. On the other hand is the need to make new technologies broadly available

Patents raise prices, thereby incentivizing innovation, but at the same time limiting access. The goal is to calibrate patent law so as to maximize the development of new technologies without unduly limiting the uptake of existing technologies.

Make patents too generous and high prices prevent users from having access to needed products.

The classic example is HIV/AIDS treatment. Twenty-five years ago, when life-saving, anti-viral drugs such as AZT first came on the market, the cost of even one drug could be thousands of dollars per year – too high a price for many in need, especially in developing countries. Since then, the price of treatment has fallen by one-seventh. It seems the high profit of early treatment encouraged development of new, cheaper drugs. The combination of expiring patents and increased competition explains the fall in HIV/AIDS pharmaceuticals. Yet, early on, many died who didn't need to because of the high cost.

In addition to rationing users through high prices, patents also can inhibit research. If innovation builds on a patented technology, that research can only proceed if the patent holder gives permission, and permission usually comes at a price in the form of a licensing fee.

The classic example here also comes from the field of medicine: the BRCA1 "breast cancer gene," patented by Myriad Genetics. Myriad refused to allow researchers access to BRCA1 unless they paid a licensing fee. In many cases, the fee was prohibitive, stifling research and incurring the wrath of the biomed establishment.

Myriad defended this practice based on the cost of isolating and identifying BRCA1, which ran in to the millions of dollars. Without patent protection, Myriad argued, it and similar pharmaceutical companies would have no incentive to isolate naturally occurring genes like BRCA1. The Supreme Court found against Myriad.

Patent trolls also are responsible for unintended consequence. A "patent troll" is an organization that owns a portfolio of patents, but has no intention of marketing a product under the patent. Rather, the patent troll waits for someone else to violate its patent, then sues the violator. This is particularly vexing for tech companies, as products often involve large numbers of individually invented patents. An iPhone, for example, is said to involve thousands of separate patents, any one of which could be subject to litigation by a troll. These litigations are often settled out of court and amount to nuisance suits as the troll's patent often isn't valid.

One solution to trolls would be to revive the "paper patent" doctrine. The idea is that patents that are just paper – that haven't been put into practice – would be disfavored in the patent system relative to patents issued to entrepreneurs who have actually applied a new technology. The "paper patent" doctrine is precisely designed to thwart patent trolls.

Holiday shoppers seek pecans

Local growers need a cold snap

Mesilla Valley pecan growers are preparing for the Christmas market season, but they need a hard freeze to ready the crop for harvesting.

"Traditionally the holiday season has the largest pecan consumption in the year," said Phil Arnold, broker with San Saba Pecans. "Christmas is usually my busiest time of the year."

Arnold said San Saba has received 45,000 pounds of pecans from Chihuahua, Mexico.

"Some of the quality is good and some not so good," he said.

The price per pound paid to growers currently ranges from \$1.80 to \$1.90, he said.

A hard freeze, which usually hits in this valley between Thanksgiving and Christmas, is needed to loosen the nut hulls for harvest.

"What we need to get things going is a good hard freeze," he said of the Arnold

Brothers local 100-acre farm. "We are expecting a decent yield for this year."

Pecan grower Greg Daviet also is timing the harvest on his 250-acre orchard.

Daviet said he is concerned about the salty, or mineral content in the soil.

"Right now the issue is, for all of us, how much damage the salty water has done," Daviet said.

Sally Harper, who grows 34 acres of organic pecans near Brazito, said that the production and quality are both looking good.

She said she grows organic pecans, "because it's the proper thing to do and the bottom line is, I get a better price for my pecans."

Crews harvest the pecans mechanically with a boom attached to a tractor that grips the trees and shakes them. The nuts are then gathered into windrows and hauled to plants where they are cleaned of litter.

Pecans' rank fourth in the state's agriculture commodities, according to New Mexico Agricultural Statistics.

In 2012, New Mexico orchards produced 65 million pounds of pecans. With an average price of \$1.70 a pound, the harvest brought \$110,500,000 into the state economy, a 32 percent decrease from the 2011 crop, the statistics service reported.

Street musicians drew a crowd, as did coffee vendors and merchants selling Christmas cacti and other seasonal specialties.





Unearthing the obscure

Shop offers affordable local art, antiques

Just yards from the clamor of rail cars loading and unloading cargo at the Old Santa Fe Railroad Depot in Mesilla Park, a large, nondescript, two-story saffronyellow building has seen a flurry of activity, an unremarkable exterior belying the

artistic happenings just inside.

Opening its doors Friday, Nov. 29 – just in time for the rush of Black Friday shopping - Art Obscura Art & Collectibles Superstore, 3206 Harrelson St., has a mission to provide a chance for great, up-and-coming local artists to show and sell their work, as well as a way for those of us with little disposable income to purchase one-of-a-kind artworks and antiques, putting money back into the local economy and the burgeoning artistic community in Las Cruces.

Owner Deret Roberts - no stranger to beautifying the City of the Crosses as a co-founder of Cruceño Cleanup - has found a way to utilize his coming arts degree from New Mexico State University, his talents as a painter and printmaker and his extensive address book, which seems to include the names of all of Las Cruces' best young artists.

Graduating this semester with a bachelor's degree with a focus in painting, Roberts said the idea to open the gallery came from facing a future with a liberal arts degree - a plight I, and many local artists, sculptors, photographers, writers, philosophers and musicians know all too well.

'I'm finishing up my degree in art, and I really had to figure out what I was going to do when I graduate," Roberts said. "I decided I'd open up a store and invite all these local artists, so they have a place to come sell their work."

With a roster of some of Las Cruces' best young artists, including several who have graced past pages of the Las Cruces Bulletin as Featured Artists, another of Art Obscura's missions is to offer pieces affordable to a wider segment of the population - art affordable to even the starving artists who create it.

Artists with work currently on display at Art Obscura include: Jamila Hull of Jellywell Ink; Mama Cass; Chris Shelton and Steph Preciado of REVIVER Printing; Jesse Reinhard, Sonia Payan, Coy Lowther and Meg Freyermuth of the DANG Art Gang; Luis Navarro; Cody Jimenez; Sam Ross; Annika Rundberg; Saba; Logan Howard; and Roberts himself, to name just a few.

"My focus here is to keep art affordable for people," Roberts said. "That way, everyone can have a piece of it. If you're going to be an artist, it's not all big sales. You need those steadier, small sales those are the lifeblood."

With a plethora of stunning, unique pieces, most priced well below \$100, those with a bit of money to spend can find something wonderful.

On a tighter budget? Art Obsucra also features smaller works, including jewelry, buttons, stickers and prints, some priced as low as a few dollars, from the same respected artists providing some of the more expensive, larger pieces that adorn

In addition to all the great, modestly priced pieces from Las Cruces artists, Art Obscura also offers a range of antiques and collectibles, which Roberts said is in

"I've been steadily collecting over the years," he said. "My great-grandpa was a collector, my grandpa, my dad, so it's kind of family tradition."

cleanly lit, chartreuse-walled main showroom holds quirky items including neon bar signs, classic guitars, soda machines, pinball games and antique tin signs, among others.

The second floor of the space features another narrow gallery space, a small side room perfect for a small, solo exhibition, as well as three rooms open for use as studio space, one of which Roberts occupies to work on his own art, and two that remain open for rent.

In its first weekend open to the public, coincidentally the busiest shopping weekend of the year, Roberts said Art Obscura did shockingly well, with nearly all of its more than 200-plus guests leaving with something, however large or small.

With that kind of reception, coupled with a commitment to both the young artists and starving art-lovers of Las Cruces, let's hope Art Obscura is here to

Welcome to the doll house

Ingmar Bergman's 'Nora' turns a mirror on dissembling human nature

The re-envisioning of classic works has long been a popular pastime, particularly in the world of theater. It isn't every day, however, that one gets the chance to encounter an adaptation of an internationally acclaimed "masterpiece" by a famed international filmmaker. That is exactly what is in store for those who catch No Strings Theatre Company's latest production, "Nora," at the Black Box Theatre.

Far from a freshening up of a turgid Victorian melodrama, "Nora" is a concise modification of Henrik Ibsen's Norwegian feminist manifesto "A Doll House," written in 1878, by legendary cinematic auteur and prolific playwright in his own right, Ingmar Bergman. Quaintly stodgy and a bit laborious in the first act, the play ignites with explosive inevitability in the second, giving audiences a glimpse into a life not so very unlike our own some 130 years later.

In the title role, Marissa Bond is a delight as the flighty, manipulative, somewhat insensitive gossip Nora Helmer. Swinging from girlish flirt to calculating schemer, Bond explores every facet of the character, sometimes with little more than a raised eyebrow, a smirk and/or a wave of a hand. Her delivery, though at times a bit histrionic, is perfectly in keeping with the melodramatic nature of the script.

As her arrogant, overbearing and clueless husband Torvald, Eric Brekke slowly builds his character from a stern, condescending cipher, who speaks to his wife as though she were a naughty 3-year-old in the first act, into a bellowing powerhouse in the second. In fact, it is in act two that Brekke truly displays his chops, swinging from irritably amiable drunk, to raging, inconsolable terror and, finally, to emotional cripple, stripped bare by his wife's cruelty, with an ease that is astonishing to watch.

The cast is rounded out by newcomer Rachel Ribeiro – who is a revelation as Nora's long-suffering, dour and rigid childhood friend, Christine - Rafael Medina, as elegant, yet desperate, blackmailer Nils Krogstad and Shaun Hadfield, as Torvald's amicable childhood friend, Dr. Rank. All are solid and perfectly attuned to the nuances of the time, giving brief glimpses into lives only hinted at through Bergman's lean

The production itself is a triumph for director Ceil Herman and a first-rate production team. The set is lovely in its simplicity, though it is curious that the center wall was left so conspicuously blank, while everything around it was so starkly balanced. The costumes, designed by Jeanne Luper, are simple yet sumptuously stylish and exquisitely suited to the action.

The lighting, designed by Peter Herman and engineered by Joe and Heather Pfeiffer, is wonderfully nuanced to create emotion and range throughout the uncluttered drawing room set. Finally, Ceil Herman's choice in sound design, which makes wonderful use of Swedish and Norwegian compositions, is inspired and denotes the careful attention to detail NSTC's productions are known for.

First produced in 1879, "A Doll House" scandalized proper Victorian audiences with its depiction of a strong-willed woman thinking outside the box for the betterment of her husband and family. Ibsen was no stranger to controversy at the time and, though many hailed him as a proponent of the abecedarian feminist movement that was then in its infancy, he demurred by stating he was really only interested in social commentary of a more universal nature.

He was, in fact, a master of the form. As anyone who has ever seen "A Doll House" produced in modern times can tell you, however, sometimes one century's scandalous hotbed of controversy can be the next century's tepid, overbaked donnybrook. Bergman took this into account, not by bringing the action into a more contemporary milieu, but by paring down the ponderous script and eliminating minor characters that only served to muddle the proceedings. In doing so, he created a spare and competent adaptation that wowed German audiences in 1981 with its contemporary social relevance.

Does that 30-plus year adaptation hold up today? In some ways. Though the play was written more than 130 years ago, and their actions may appear a bit affected, the characters are all recognizable to a modern audience, particularly one brought up on soap operas or telenovelas. They scheme, they backbite, they behave selfishly and they casually drop revelatory hints at past dalliances, alliances and questionable actions. All that's needed is the swell of organ music cued at appropriately expository moments to enhance the actor's delivery.

And maybe that's the problem. Remember, it was in the early '80s that soap operas made the leap from bathetic afternoon passion plays to blistering evening slugfests. Expectations change. What doesn't change, however, are the actions of men and women embroiled in volatile relationships, no matter what the time frame depicted.

In the end, there are no villains in "Nora." Nor are there any heroes. In fact, there are no redeeming qualities inherent





in any of the characters on display. Each has his or her own secrets, each manipulates those around them to their own ends and each stands by the moral righteousness of his or her own actions. In this way, "Nora" is unflinching social commentary, pointing out the pettiness of human nature as the one defining factor throughout the ages.


If theater is, as Shakespeare maintained, simply a mirror depicting society's virtues and vices reflected back in their true shape, Bergman's re-envisioning of Ibsen's anthropological commentary is a more crystal clear and propitious indictment than any reality television show presented today.

Performances of "Nora" are 8 p.m. Fridays, Dec. 6 and 13, 8 p.m. Saturdays, Dec. 7 and 14, 2:30 p.m. Sundays, Dec. 8 and 15, and 7 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 12. Tickets are \$12 regular admission, \$10 students and seniors older than 65 and \$8 for all seats on the Thursday evening performance. For reservations, call 525-1223.

Home field disadvantage

'Homefront' is a commercial for other, better action movies

With a reliable cast and a script penned by a man who helped define the action genre, "Homefront" should have been at least violent and fun, but struggles to toe the line between grit and camp, managing only to be wholly unmemorable.

Jason Statham plays Phil Broker, a retired DEA agent who's moved to the rural town of Rayville, La., following either the violent closure of his last undercover case, a flashback of which opens the film, with Statham in full biker regalia and a terrible hairstyle, or the death of his wife, which is left entirely out of the setup and only revealed in later, pained conversation.

Starting over, Broker lives with his young daughter, Maddy, who has inherited her daddy's propensity toward fisticuffs.

This quick-to-hit attitude lands Maddy in the school psychologist's office after she trounces the bully son of a local tweaker, Cassie Bodine (an against-type Kate Bosworth), and her bedraggled spouse, Jimmy Klum.

The kids' scuffle balloons into a parking-lot confrontation where Broker shows us where his daughter gets it, besting Jimmy in front of his woman and his son – an offense that leads into a full-blown feud when Cassie contacts her methmaker brother, Gator (James Franco).

A series of small-scale antagonisms, slashed tires and gas station fistfights begin to punctuate the otherwise-idyllic life Broker has made for himself and his daughter, consisting entirely of soft focus afternoons spent riding horses, skipping stones and bemoaning the loss of a wife and mother.

Things get worse when Gator finds Broker's boxes of old records stashed in his basement, because I'd assume that's protocol for the sensitive case files of outgoing undercover agents – "just put 'em over there by the water heater."

Eager to go big time, Gator, along with Sheryl Mott (Winona Ryder), passes Broker's whereabouts on to the incarcerated leader of the Outcasts, who dispatches a team of bikers to wipe out the Broker family. Then he fights back. Roll credits.

To call an action movie dumb is usually a compliment. In the case of "Homefront," however, a tangle of loose-ends, gonowhere-plot-reveals and met-and-forgotten characters, punctuated by jerky, quick-cut action sequences and slammed in to a genre template, it's a sleight.

The script was written by Sylvester 'Sly' Stallone himself, whose career could be generously called "spotty" in the way a clear night sky is "spotty" – vast, dark and empty, dotted with distant, ever-fleeting flashes of light.

Stallone's best movies – "First Blood" and "Rocky" – are at once genre-defining and entirely devoid of innovation. "First Blood" is like every action flick that came before it, and became the template for every one that followed; "Rocky" is rags-to-riches schmaltz, albeit with punching, but set the standard for every movie in which people play a sport since 1977.

Then again, some of Stallone's worst movies are his best movies, the more ridiculous the better. As Rambo, Sly singlehandedly defended himself against, like, the whole National Guard. In "Demolition Man," Sly played a cryogenically frozen cop who wakes up in the future to freeze and jump kick a blonde Wesley Snipes into a million icy pieces. In "Over the Top," Sly played a trucker who enters the professional arm-wrestling circuit to... win back custody of his son. Go ahead, read that again.

Clearly, the man knows the value of ridiculous, and pairing him with Jason Statham seems like the recipe for action movie gold. Statham, mind you, starred in the essential 2006 film "Crank," which still ranks

as one the all-time best worst premises.

Hitman Chev Chelios has been injected with a synthetic drug that blocks the flow of adrenaline and stops his heart, meaning he must keep his adrenaline levels up. To that end, he brawls with legions of thugs, snorts coke off a bathroom floor, raids a pharmacy for the good stuff, crashes a motorcycle and has public sex with a woman in front of hundreds of passersby before jumping out of a helicopter to keep himself alive. And there's a sequel.

The teaming of these kings of so-bad-it's-good should make for a great time. Instead, "Homefront" comes off as little more than action filler, offering no new or innovative ways to crash cars or kill people in a genre that only survives through innovations in carcrashin' and people-killin'.

Statham is pretty-standard Statham here, with a never-ending wince scrunched between his trucker hat and his butt-chin. I get that actors like to expand their repertoire, but watching Statham not punching things is tough, because you know he'd rather be punching things, and so would we.

Franco doesn't do much with his character, which is a shame. He was a funnier, campier dope dealer in "Pineapple Express," a creepier, more predatory dope dealer in "Spring Breakers" and a more realistic dope dealer in both. Gator lands somewhere in the middle, disinterested in the goings-on until an inexplicable internal change

Despite a decent action pedigree, "Homefront" commits the ultimate sin of action flicks: it's boring.

prompts the relatively benign pusher to shoot his sister and kidnap a child out of nowhere.

Writers, take note: While meth has become the drug du jour in recent films – '80s and '90s baddies were all about blow – whatever you're thinking, "Breaking Bad" already did it smarter, scarier and grittier than you will, and everything that comes after will be, shall we say, not quite up to Heisenberg standards.

Much of the hack narrative either comes out of nowhere or leads nowhere. We know Broker is devastated by the loss of his wife, whom we learn exists only as he explains that he's devastated by the loss of his wife. Broker hits it off with Maddy's teacher, who never appears without sunlight backlighting her hair, but her character is entirely abandoned once the action starts.

Once that action starts, it's an unintelligible blur of punches, kicks, arm bars and at least one pitchfork impalement, filmed entirely without a hint of style or excitement. Yawn.

It's telling, in reading what I've written, that I wandered off on so many tangents: "Homefront" serves as little more than a reminder of other films, including Stallone's and Statham's own, that did it first, faster, bloodier, louder and dumber – in other words, better.

A tale of love and devotion

'Still Mine' is an old story, freshly done

Although it could be seen as still another tale of an elder being bullied by the powers that be, the beautiful Canadian production "Still Mine" goes far beyond. It also offers a powerful and believable story of love and devotion, well portrayed by the veteran stars of the film, Genevieve Bujold and James Cromwell.

The film starts in flashback and carries back through the story, with the opening scene taking place in a courtroom.

Cromwell plays Craig Morrison, and Bujold plays his wife of many years, Irene. Up in years, Irene has begun to have trouble getting around in their older house and needs to make some adjustments. The easiest way to do that, the couple decides, is to build a newer single level and smaller house on another piece of their land. Craig is a gifted carpenter and with the talents of one of his seven children, a lawyer (Campbell Scott) who advises against the project since Craig ignores the permitting and inspection process of the project, work starts on the new place. But once he sees his father's determination, he works to smooth the road for the new domicile.

It is not long before one of the local

It is not long before one of the local building inspectors arrives and makes life difficult for Craig, due to local regulations and such.

Craig is not interested in being buffaloed by the so-called authorities, and each time he is called on the carpet he is able to prove or show that his project already meets safety standards of all sorts. But that is not good enough since the structure was never approved in the first place.

When not tackling that project, Craig remains tender and constant in his attention and love for Irene, who is slowing down both physically and mentally. His patience and understanding is clearly understated by Cromwell's performance, and there is a wonderful chemistry between Cromwell (actually 73, playing a character of 87) and Bujold (age 71 in real life), who in the film, have been married for over 60 years. At one point, Irene uses a phrase that I wish my wife would say to me once in a while – "Take off your clothes, old man," she commands.

It is a poignant and moving moment, one filled with beauty and desire and it clearly makes it known that the love story is going to usurp the house story. It does, but you don't get to watch.

Director/writer Michael McGowan clearly makes the point that the film is more about the relationship, rather than one about man vs. bureaucrats, which remains

in the forefront but is not the point of this picture

Craig continues his project, since it soon becomes clear that without Irene he would be lost, and if continuing to defy the bureaucrats is what it takes, then building codes be damned.



NM's renewable energy policy is still sound



Mellow Honek Living Better Solar Powered

Do not believe the headlines you've read in the past few weeks about the New Mexico regulators dealing a blow to our State's renewable energy policy. It is not true. The industry was not dealt a blow.

It is true, however, that the regulators made some bad decisions and reduced the requirements for utilities to add renewables to their portfolio of energy sources. They've done this at a time when we should be celebrating the success of renewables, especially solar, in the New Mexico power mix.

OK, now that you're confused, I'll explain what happened and how you are affected.

Last month, the regulators in Santa Fe decided to ignore the intent of the Renewable Energy Act and reduce the amount of renewable energy the utilities are required to source as part of their portfolio. They accomplished this by doubling the value of each renewable energy credit (REC) - a two-for-one deal. Previously, the utility was getting credit from the state one-for-one. Now, each single REC the utility purchases from a renewable energy producer, the state counts as two.

Of course, the producer only gets the value for selling one. This little change cuts in half the number of RECs the utility is required to accumulate in order to meet future renewable energy requirements.

This change flies in the face of the legislators who enacted the renewable energy act in 2002 to stimulate expansion of renewable energy production in New

They determined we were underutilizing the power of our abundant sunshine, one of our state's greatest natural resources. New Mexico refined its vision for the role renewable energy should play in the state when, in 2007, the renewable portfolio standard was adjusted to the current configuration, as shown in New Mexico Renewable Energy Portfolio Standard Chart.

It seems particularly odd that this action was taken now because the price El Paso Electric pays for these now-diluted RECs

has fallen by 86 percent since 2009. Clearly the strangest part of this saga is the regulatory team in Santa Fe ending a program that has been incredibly successful. Typically, it is the failing programs that receive the axe.

Here we have an example of standards, and an accompanying incentive program, that have driven you, me and the rest of the market to install renewable energy systems, such as solar, on our homes and businesses. In most cases, the programs have spurred enough installations of solar and other renewables to help the utilities meet or exceed their requirements. It may escape notice for those of us who live here, but visitors and new residents are amazed because they don't see solar panels on every home. They assumed in an environment like ours, solar would be ubiquitous.

So with the regulators making it easier for the utilities to meet their requirements with less solar installed, why won't that kill the industry? Because it's too late. The programs have worked. Look around. You see solar panels on more and more rooftops in your neighborhood every day.

The incentives tied to the REC program have dropped every six months for the past two years. In fact, they'll drop again for new system applications in just a few

But while the incentives have been declining, the price of a solar energy system has dropped, too. With incentives dropping, the rate of solar installations continues to accelerate. You may have noticed the utilities are sourcing an ever-increasing amount of solar. Their calculations show that solar is a profitable source of energy.

For the thousands of homeowners who already have solar or other renewables, you will not see any change to your current deal. El Paso Electric will continue to deposit money in your bank account as you watch your savings accumulate. You still get the benefit of huge tax credits. Count on them being active and as powerful as ever, all the way out to 2016.







Bringing the word to life

First Baptist Church's Living Christmas Tree entertains with a message

For the past 17 years, the First Baptist Church at 106 S. Miranda St. has been presenting a living embodiment of the Christmas observance to the community of Las Cruces. Now in its 18th year, the Living Christmas Tree continues the tradition in a way that Minister of Music Mike Edwards hopes will "impact the spiritual heart" of any and all who attend the annual event.

"I don't ever view this event as a musical concert for entertainment," Edwards said. "The purpose of the Christmas tree is solely to present the message of the gospel of Jesus Christ



through song. Ultimately it's the story of God's love and his infinite plan of sending his son, as a baby, to redeem us and go to the cross to save us from our sins. That message will be woven throughout the entire program. Not only in song, but in narrative script. It's a Christmas message, but it's all pointing to the cross."


To present this message, a massive, church-wide effort is put into play months before the holiday season begins. According to Edwards, technical production begins in August, while the choir – consisting of children, youth and senior members of the congregation, as well as members of other churches who want to be part of the event – begins rehearsal the first weekend after Labor Day. Musicians begin practicing the first week in November, while choreography teams are given a full month and a half to prepare.

"The actual structure of the tree is very insignificant as far as preparation," said Edwards. "The tree is assembled and ready within about six hours, but the programming of the music for the lights has been in process for many weeks now. The software and equipment that we have to simulate what the big tree will do, all of that has been in play for months."

Edwards refers to the process as a multi-faceted project with a lot of moving parts. "It's not just something that the music ministry does," he said. Committees for everything from dance, acting and tickets to refreshments, child care and parking are assembled.

"It's an opportunity for the entire church body to come together and pool all their resources for one common goal. It's actually a church-wide event celebrating the love of Christ."

Featuring members who have been involved since the project's inception, including many who started out as children and are now singing as adults, The Living Christmas Tree choir is made up entirely of volunteers, according to Edwards. And though there's no real theme, other than the gospel of divine birth and ultimate redemption, he gives assurances that the

event will be anything but routine.

"There are brand new arrangements that just came available this year," he said. "There's a mix of familiar traditional carols as well. Every year I try to vary the program with new arrangements and new material that we haven't done before. We even have one this year called "Patapan," which is an old traditional French Christmas carol that we'll be doing with choreography and dance."

Last year, ticket sales for the four-day concert event totaled close to 3,300, up from the approximately 3,100 the year before. This year, Edwards is hoping to spread the word a little wider, though he says he would be happy to repeat the average for another year; and not because of the entertainment value.

"It's something of a higher calling," he said. "It's not just a musical production. It's a ministry for the Holy Spirit. That's our sole purpose for all of this massive amount of work, to present the message of Jesus Christ."

In March 2012, Crossroads Community Acupuncture opened its doors in a small closet space within a building undergoing construction at 125 N. Main St., becoming the first low-cost community acupuncture clinic in the Las Cruces/El Paso region. After raising enough money to move to a large, refurbished space just down the street, CCA moved to its current location, inside one of the oldest buildings in Las Cruces, at 130 S. Main St.

With a mission of providing acupuncture and health services for people of all income levels throughout the region, CCA has helped provide more than 25,000 treatments, most in impoverished or underserved areas.

On Jan. 1, 2014, howev-Crossroads Community Acupuncture will ring in the New Year and reopen its doors Crossroads Community Supported Acupuncture, a nonprofit incorporated on Nov. 19, allowing them to further their goal of providing affordable health services to, truly, everyone.

Crossroads founder and acupuncturist Ryan Bemis first gained an interest in acupuncture while working in Portland, Ore.

"I had gotten a job at a detox program in Portland, where they were detoxing heroin addicts and alcoholics, a lot of whom lived on the street," Bemis said. "The first thing they'd do, before they sat down with a counselor, was sit them in a group and gave them ear acupuncture.

Bemis was immediately impressed with the efficacy of the treatment, known as "acudetox" or the NADA (National Acupuncture Detoxification Association) protocol.

"I was fascinated by the group atmosphere because, in this program, every day the clients would get up in the morning, come together in a group and get ear acupuncture," he said. "A lot of them weren't people who were comfortable sitting in a group, or in silence, and there they were in this almost meditative state. "As a counselor, I heard a lot about how much it helped them to get clean, to stay calm, to feel like themselves, to help with withdrawals."

His interest piqued, Bemis began studying acupuncture, going on to earn his master's

degree from the Oregon College of Oriental Medicine in 2011.

In Portland, Bemis said, there are a number of clinics, like CCSA that offer sliding-scale, community acupuncture, as opposed to the more traditional - and more expensive – one-on-one setting.

Bemis brought that model to

the Southwest when, working on his thesis, he, together with fel-Crossroads acupuncturist Mateo Bernal started a project in Juárez, training practitioners through the Catholic Diocese of Ciudad Juárez and the nonprofit CHEPAZ (Centro de Crecimiento Humano y Educacion para la Paz, Salud y Bienestar Comunitario, or the Center for Human Growth and Peace Education, Community Health and Wellness, roughly).

Brought in to support the Catholic church's response to violence by the assistant to the bishop of Juárez, Monsignor Rene Blanco, and lawyer and human rights activist Maria Elizabeth Flores, Bemis and Bernal traveled to Juárez and began training

pastoral workers in the NADA ear acupuncture protocol. To date, the organization has trained more than 83 health workers, most of whom provide free ear acupuncture out of their churches and mental health programs.

More than 11,000 people have been killed in the border city, just 50 miles from Las Cruces, since 2007. In response, the project has served more than 20,000 within impoverished Juárez neighborhoods and surrounding rural towns.

In Las Cruces, Crossroads helped install ear acupuncture services at St. Luke's Health Clinic at the Community of Hope, where free, walk-in treatments are offered every Wednesday from 10 a.m. to noon.

Following the successful startup of this cross-border project, Bemis opened the Las Cruces clinic, which currently sees an average of more than 170 clients a week, for a wide variety of maladies, on a simple, community-minded and cost-effective model.

Bemis said people come in for treatment for a multitude of reasons, from the small to the dire.

'We have people come in to treat pain, stress, anxiety, depression, addiction, sleep problems, chronic fatigue, chronic autoimmune disorders such as Lupus, rheumatoid arthritis, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, peripheral neuropathy. We also have people coming in for things like irritable bowel syndrome, stomach upset and constipation, all the way to people looking to help with schizophrenia and bipolar disorder."

Although demonstrated to be very effective in studies from diverse of organizations as the WHO and the U.S. Military, which utilizes staff acupuncturists and NADA-trained psychologists to treat PTSD, Bemis points out that acupuncture is not a magic bullet.

"Acupuncture is not a cure for a lot of these things - for most of them, though, Western medicine doesn't have a cure either - but if it's accessible on a regular basis, it

can greatly enhance the quality of life and improve health outcomes."

To treat a variety of ailments in a large, diverse segment of the population, CCSA offers treatment on a low-cost, sliding scale.

"It's pay what you can, no questions asked," Bemis said, noting that new clients needn't bring with them proof of low income. Treatments range from \$16 to \$41, and monthly memberships, which allow patients "acupuncture when (they) need it" for \$85 to \$150.

The average one-on-one acupuncture session, however, ranges from anywhere between \$65 on the low end to \$150, making it an unavailable option for many. While some public health acupuncture programs are dependent on funding from grants, CCSA operates without, allowing it to remain autonomous and not run the risk of an abrupt pull of funding.

Relying on the community also allows CCSA to avoid unnecessary complications between patient and provider.

"A lot of acupuncturists have to depend on insurance for reimbursement," he said. "Then, the company is dictating how we treat people, adding more paperwork and bureaucracy between them and treatment. We have a philosophy of simplicity in how we provide care."

The goal, Bemis said, is not to get rich. 'We want people to be able to afford our care," he said. "Our goal is to serve the community and be able to pay our staff a living wage.

"Families can afford to come here. I want to be able to provide treatment for my next door neighbor, my friends, my family, and I can't imagine practicing it any other way."

Whether steeped in the violence that has plagued Ciudad Juárez, or in the relative peace of Downtown Las Cruces, Bemis said, in the end, acupuncture is largely about providing

safe space.
"If people can be safe and comfortable, be able to walk out of the door on their own two feet feeling ready to face the world again, then that's a mission accomplished," he said. "This is less about fixing or curing, or becoming a wizard or guru, and more about community

As CCSA looks forward to a New Year of providing services and training to the border region, the clinic is offering a number of holi-

On Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 24 and 25, \$10 treatments and \$800 annual memberships (members are entitled to free acupuncture all year long) will be offered, the perfect way to start a healthful New Year.

This special will be offered again on the clinic's one-year anniversary, Jan. 1, 2014, when the center closes its doors, and reopens them as the nonprofit Crossroads Community Support Acupuncture.

And from 5 to 7 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6, they will host an open house and Downtown Art Ramble reception featuring the work of local photojournalist Peter Goodman.

Surviving health care woes

Work force shortages a top issue in the United States



This article will provide an overview of the health care professional shortage problem. Health care professionals of all specialties are essential for an effective and efficient health care system. Health care professionals are critical for a person to resolve a health issue or problem.

Unfortunately, politicians and policy makers were short sighted and utilized faulty problem solving. As a result, millions of Americans lost health care with a dismal and embarrassing website launch.

Recently, the focus has started to shift on the most critical component of a health care system problem. Doctors and other health care professional are retiring, leaving the profession and refusing to take the medical insurance due to unrealistic rules and regulations. If detailed analysis and planning had been utilized, this situation would never have

Politicians and policy makers failed to focus on the issue of health care supply and demand. Before health care reform, health care professionals were a shortage commodity. Health care professionals were already overwhelmed with an increase of patients and

It is estimated that an additional 35 million people will obtain or be forced to obtain health care coverage. More disturbing, is that by 2020, the U.S. will need an additional 91,500 doctors to meet the medical demand, according to the American Association of Medical Colleges.

At the current time, this problem is not being addressed or workable solutions formulated. Health care issues are event and time driven. Politicians and policy makers failed to take this fact into their analysis. As a result, more people will be forced to wait in order to have issues and problems resolved. That is if a health care professional is available to resolve the issues or problems. That does not take into account the non-research-based coverage for different issues.

The last part of the problem is the amount of time it takes to train an individual health care professional. This is very complicated, as a significant number of years are required in order to graduate a health care professional.

This could be five to eight years post bachelor's degree depending on specialty. This does not include the business aspects required after being allowed to practice their profession. This is a serious topic of discussion, if a person is currently faced with a chronic or life-threatening disease.

What is the solution? In order to bring this supply and demand into balance, there must be an increase of health care professionals in the workplace prior to any change in health care accessibility.

The axiom should be, "It is better to have and not need than to need and not have." This life warrior axiom is derived from the survival and resilience approach that Americans should embrace.

Faced with this tragic reality, a person needs to utilize life warrior survival skills and become resilient to embrace the concept of personal responsibility.

Remember to stay solution focused not problem focused. If you gather the facts necessary, then you can develop a workable solution. The next article in this series will address a few of the more serious health problems and solutions.




