Five eyed to lead NMSU

Carruthers among president finalists

In response to the desire for greater continuity at the helm of New Mexico State University, regents accepted its search committee recommendations of five finalists that includes Garrey Carruthers, former New Mexico governor and current NMSU College of Business dean.

Carruthers is a graduate of NMSU, where he also began his teaching career in 1968. He has been the business college dean since 2003 and served as vice president for economic development. Beginning in 2009, he has been the director of the Pete V. Domenici Institute for Public Policy. His departures from NMSU have been to serve as assistant secretary of the U.S. Department of the Interior during the Reagan administration and as governor of New Mexico. He also was co-founder, president and chief executive officer of Cimarron Health Plan, a statewide managed care company that sold in 2004 to a national corporation.

Carruthers isn't the only finalist who has familiarity with NMSU.


Daniel Howard spent 20 years at NMSU as an assistant professor of biology and eventually as Regents Professor of Biology, head of the Department of Biology and interim associate dean for research in the College of Arts and Sciences before leaving five years ago for the University of Colorado-Denver to be its dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

There is a Hispanic woman among the finalists – Elsa Murano, former president of Texas A&M University. Murano was the first woman president of Texas A&M and endeavored to create greater diversity in university administration.

The other finalists are also former university presidents – David Ashley of the University of Nevada-Las Vegas and Guy Bailey of Texas Tech.

Larry Lujan, chair of the NMSU search committee, said the opening attracted 57 nominations, which regents Chairman Mike Cheney said was more than the

Commissioners OK Fort Sill casino plans

County joins city in giving nod to Akela Flats proposal

Joining with the City of Las Cruces' support of an Indian casino west of the city, the Doña Ana County Commission passed a resolution Tuesday, April 9, supporting the Fort Sill Apache's plans for its land at Akela Flats, outside of Deming.

"I am pleased that the Doña Ana County Board of Commissioners recognizes our rights as a sovereign nation and supports our return to New Mexico," said Fort Sill Apache Tribal Chairman Jeff Haozous. "As we continue to fight to regain the rights that are naturally and historically ours, the passing of

Casualty adds emotion to 573rd homecoming

After 9 months in Afghanistan 125 soldiers return to WSMR

When soldiers return from deployments, there is always heightened emotion, but there was extra anxiety and gratitude for those gathered in a gym Monday, April 8, at White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) as they waited for the return of 125 soldiers of the 573rd Maintenance Co.

Only a few weeks before the end of their deployment in Afghanistan, the life of Sgt. Tristan Wade, 23, was taken when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device.

News like that makes it harder for a spouse such as Robin Davis whose husband, Spc. Benjamin, was on his first deployment.



Domenici Forum talks sequester April 18

Expert will consider security impacts

Gary Schmitt, of the American Enterprise Institute, will take part in New Mexico State University's spring 2013 Domenici Forum at 1 p.m. Thursday, April 18, at KRWG-TV studios, inside Milton Hall, on the NMSU campus.

Schmitt will discuss sequestration and its potential impact on U.S. strategic defense initiatives. He is a resident scholar and co-director of the Marilyn Ware Center for Security Studies and is the director of the program on American citizenship at the American Enter-

Schmitt is a former staff director of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. He was also executive director of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board during Ronald Reagan's second term.

Schmitt's security work focuses on longerterm strategic issues that will impact America's security at home and its ability to lead abroad, while his work in the area of citizenship focuses on challenges to maintaining and sustaining

a strong civic culture.

Garrey Carruthers, dean of NM-SU's College of Business and director of the Domenici Institute, will host the forum, which is free and open to the public.

be seated in the KRWG-TV studio, in Milton Hall, by 12:55 p.m. Taping will begin promptly



Anticipation is building for Trout's championship bout

Do we know what we have in our local star?

Elvis Presley's 1969 album "The Memphis Record" – probably his best outside of the Sun Sessions – opens with a song by the sadly underrated writer Percy Mayfield.

The song is "Stranger in My Own Hometown" and talks about someone who's not accepted in the very city where he grew to greatness.

And though it's one of Elvis' better songs, it feels a tad disingenuous because I can't imagine the King ever getting booed in Memphis, dead or alive.

It is fairly common, though, for a hometown not to fully appreciate what it has. I think Las Cruces is experiencing a little bit of that with our world boxing champ, Austin "No Doubt" Trout.

In San Antonio, Texas, April 20, Trout, the WBA light middleweight champ, will fight Canelo Alvarez, the WBC light middleweight champ, in a unifying bout.

The fight will be televised on Showtime, and in front of a big crowd in San Antonio's Alamodome.

According to blogger Scott Christ at www.badlefthook.com, more than 31,000 tickets have been sold already. Christ said that should make it the biggest crowd to watch a proboxing match this year.

It certainly doesn't hurt that Alvarez has a huge following among Mexicans and Mexican-Americans. Having the fight in San Antonio makes it relatively accessible for fans of both fighters to make the trip. Alvarez is 41-0 with 30 knockouts. Trout is 26-0 with 14 knockouts.

In another bit of intrigue, Alvarez is claiming this as a bit of a revenge bout, as Trout defeated Alvarez's brother, Rigoberto, in 2011.

After Trout defeated Miguel Cotto in December 2012 in Madison Square Garden, Las Crucens began to understand more what kind of fighter we have in Trout.

Trout has always been amazingly generous with his time here in Las Cruces. Every single charity fundraiser I've attended in 2013, Trout has been there. And I'm sure he's been at several others I've missed.

We've tried to help readers get to know Trout through the column he has written for us in our sports section (page A15) – and will continue to write – leading up to his title fight.

Our city's awareness and appreciation of Trout is growing, but if Trout achieved a similar level of success in the NBA or the NFL, I think we would have already erected a statue in his honor.

Part of the problem is boxing itself.

With a seemingly endless number of boxing councils and associations, and an infinite number of weight classes, it's difficult for the average fan to follow the sport. Not to mention the fans who have foregone boxing for mixed martial arts events like the Ultimate Fighting Championship, or even for women's boxing, which has soared in popularity in the past decade or so.

For generations, boxing and horse racing stood alongside Major League Baseball as America's sport of choice. Boxers like Joe Louis, Sugar Ray Robinson, Rocky Marciano and Floyd Patterson were on par with Babe Ruth and Joe DiMaggio.

Boxing may have hit its peak in the 1960s and '70s when Muhammad Ali (aka Cassius Clay) "shook up the world" multiple times in dramatic heavyweight fights.

In the 1980s, the foursome of Roberto Duran, Marvin Hagler, Thomas Hearns and Sugar Ray Leonard dazzled fight fans from the welterweight and middleweight classes.

In the past 30 years, however, only periodically have boxers come along with enough skill and charisma to capture the attention of the general public – Oscar de la Hoya, Roy Jones Jr. and Johnny Tapia come to mind.

In our own "No Doubt" Trout, we might just have another one. No matter the outcome on April 20, let's make sure we don't make him feel like a stranger in his own hometown.

End unconscionable VA benefits backlog

The backlog of claims by veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars is huge and getting bigger and longer. This is unconscionable.

Imagine if we all supported a sustainable future

Alternative energy sources can spur economic development

Imagine – it's 2018.

In the past five years, mining of natural gas in North Dakota and elsewhere has caused so much exhaust, chemical pollution and water contamination that fewer people are willing to mine it.

In addition, coal and nuclear energy have caused such large amounts of air pollution and water damage that there has been a moratorium on coal mining and the building of nuclear plants. Also, in the Southwest, due to persistent drought, there has been a moratorium on planting any crops using large amounts of water.

In 2015, local farmers agreed to share the cost of an acequia retrofit to create a drip system in their fields and in 2016 all new planting began with an underground irrigation system. This has saved huge amounts of water lost through evaporation since crops are now irrigated in a more efficient manner.

All of these environmental changes have caused a boom in renewable energy sources and water reuse, and Las Cruces is experiencing an environmental revolution.

First, in areas both south and north of the city, solar farms are powering 75 percent of our city's homes. These farms were constructed using local residents and the solar panels and mirrors were manufactured in our own local

This state-of-the-art plant on the West Mesa keeps 100 full-time workers busy producing both highly efficient thin film solar panels and solar-string windows. The salaries of these workers average \$49,000 per

year. These solar-string windows are solar collectors built right into already efficient windows and are the plant's top sellers throughout our country and North and South America.

The rest of our homes are powered by two waste-to-energy plants using crop, dairy and solid waste that are located near the dairies. These two plants were built using 100 construction workers and now each plant employs a large staff to keep the plants managed and maintained.

The construction workers building these plants made an average of \$32 per hour and the operational staff averages a salary of \$40,000. Odor from the dairies has become a thing of the past and the plants use its waste to provide heating, electricity and biofuels for diesel cars and trucks. An additional tank for biofuels has been added to all of the gas stations near La Mesa and Anthony, N.M., since this fuel was produced in one of the waste-to-energy plants located nearby.

Our trading partners Canada, Mexico and South America decided in 2013 to do the bulk of their trading with countries closest to their points of manufacture.

This in turn has saved each country in transportation costs, minimized pollution and kept as many jobs as possible in the Americas.

That's why our part of the world is experiencing positive job growth and economic development, while countries with workers making lower-than-average wages spend more of their production costs on transportation.



Our new Sustainability Center was built in 2015 and houses three different economic development projects. In one building, old clothing and paper is collected and shipped to all of the regional insulation manufacturers who are now producing insulation made from re-used materials.

In another section of the property, glass bottles are being cleaned and stripped and sold back to local and regional

wineries, saving these businesses the cost of buying new bottles while keeping them out of the landfill.

The center includes a biodegradable plastic manufacturing plant that produces small and large containers that are used in restaurants whenever a customer wants a "doggy container."

The building was built creating more than 100 construction jobs and each entrepreneurial endeavor creates 15 production jobs. That's 45 new jobs that wouldn't have existed before the city's new "green initiatives."

There is now a plan to include the manufacture of drip irrigation tubing incorporating reused plastic to be used by farmers and gardeners throughout the region and beyond.


Drop-off plants throughout the county weigh and pay our citizens for the glass and clothes and will eventually pay for the plastic, so we have created a marketplace for items that would have been considered worthless before our new initiatives.

The City of Las Cruces has also partnered with the Las Cruces and other neighboring school systems to run tours

of our projects so that children learn at a young age how their science and math classes are a natural bridge to these new careers.

Las Cruces has become a sustainable city, making it eligible for more funding sources and a well-publicized stop for out-of-town and out-of-country visitors now that we are a national leader in environmental economic development.

Does Fort Worth ever cross your mind?

Fracking provides benefits throughout U.S.

Once upon a time in America, sound environmentalism was desperately needed. Unfortunately, having run out of sensible things to accomplish years ago, the modern day green movement has morphed into a collection of cynical political manipulators.

The typical radical environmentalist in 21st century America cultivates an attitude toward fossil fuel use that is exactly like the 17th century Puritans' personal approach to sex. They all did it, but they felt very guilty about it.

A few facts would seem to be useful. Since 1949, more than 1.2 million oil and gas wells have been fracked. During the last 64 years, there has been only a pair of instances in which groundwater pollution has ever even been alleged to have occurred as a result of fracking. In both of those instances, it was determined that poor well casing designs, not fracking, caused the problems. Those well casing designs have been corrected.

Like 17th century Puritans, today's anti-fossil fuel crowd believes it is on a religious mission. And despite the fact the manufacture of virtually every modern convenience known to mankind requires fossil fuels, these fanatics spread false hysteria in an effort to suppress new production of fossil fuel. Thanks to widespread ignorance, non-stop efforts to kill golden egg-laying geese has become a way of life in our society.

We can blame our own public education system, one that is now hopelessly trapped in nonsensical politics, for this troubling reality.

Examples of clean fracking taking place in America are almost endless. In Fort Worth, Texas, natural gas and oil is produced in many

densely populated urban areas. Wells have been fracked within 200 yards of schools, churches, businesses and homes. There are no instances of groundwater contamination in Fort Worth, even after 15,000 frack jobs. And unlike places where environmentalist fanatics have taken control of public policies, Fort Worth is clean, and the city coffers are brimming with tax revenue to support critical public services.

By preventing the continued export of our wealth and the permanent lowering of our living standards, new fracking technologies are responsible for putting millions of dollars per day into the New Mexico state tax revenue coffers. That's right, millions of dollars per day.

They also ignore the sources of funding of critical services for the most vulnerable members of our society. Make no mistake: Public education is spreading financial and economic illiteracy far and wide as it embraces the ridiculous premise that we can somehow do better without fossil fuels.

Ironically, all of our most critical functions, including public education, would come under horrific financial strain if the modern-day environmental Puritans and their partners in public education have their way.

The failure of public education in this area is very sad for society because there is a basic truth that does not change as successive generations are encouraged to embrace economic self-destruction. Not only is poverty quite painful, it is not green either.

The anti-fracking crowd's fantasies regarding the elimination of fossil fuel consumption is


the economic equivalent of bridge burning. The bridges they are willing to burn will permanently keep many living in poverty away from access to greater opportunities.

George Strait's catchy lyrics from one of his earliest hit songs encapsulates the proper response to modern-day Puritan approach to fracking:

"Darlin' while you're busy burnin' bridges Burn one for me ... if you get time Cause good memories don't fade so easy Does Fort Worth ever cross your mind?" Apparently the good memories regarding all that fracking does for Forth Worth, for New Mexico and for the rest of America, doesn't cross their minds. Even more disturbing is the fact that these bridge burning extremists are slowly gaining control of all aspects of our lives.

'It is reflective of the quality of NMSU that these highly qualified individuals want to be our president. We fully expect that the statewide community will question the finalists and research their backgrounds.

We are confident that the discussions will be open and candid."

The 30-acre parcel of land at Akela is 40 miles west of Las Cruces off Interstate 10 and was recently granted reservation status, giving its casino plans better leverage for approval by the Interior Department than the Jemez Pueblo's proposal for on off-reservation casino in Anthony, N.M., according to

In both proposals, Gov. Susana Martinez will be asked to approve the casino, but Haozous has said his tribe could more easily appeal opposition by the governor than the Jemez proposal.

In the resolution, Haozous said Doña Ana County now also supports the economic benefits the Apache Homelands Casino would bring to the region. The Las Cruces City Council passed a resolution supporting the tribe earlier this year.

We welcome the Fort Sill Apache Tribe home to southwestern New Mexico" said Doña Ana County Commissioner Wayne Hancock. "We look forward to the jobs and economic impact the tribe will bring to our community.'

When available, a copy of the official resolution will be posted on the Fort Sill Apache New Mexico website at www. fortsillapachenewmexico.com.

The Fort Sill Apache Tribe is the successor to the Chiricahua-Warm Springs Apache Tribe. In 1886, they were taken as prisoners of war by the U.S. Army and removed from southwestern New Mexico and southeastern Arizona to Florida, Alabama and Oklahoma, where they were eventually released.

Haozous said the Akela location represents only a fraction of the nearly 15 million acres that were once the tribal members' homelands. The casino project aims to create economic support for members of the tribe who want to return to their homelands, he said.

Currently a snack bar and smoke shop are housed at a building originally designed for slot machines and other casino games.

The Jemez Pueblo proposal has been resubmitted to the Interior Department and also is being reviewed. Both the City Council and County Commission had previously passed resolutions in support of the Jemez

time," she said. "You spend a lot of time worrying if he's going to come back home alive and safe."

For Sri Mahley, it was the second deployment for her husband, Spc. Matthew Mahley, who was in the same platoon as Wade.

"It never gets easier," she said.

They were among the many relatives, friends and comrades who filled the gym bleachers as the soldiers marched into the gym in formation. They cheered the soldiers as they entered and finished singing the "Star Spangled Banner" when the speakers cut out halfway through the song.

WSMR Commander Brig. Gen. Gwen Bingham gave a short speech to the troops after she noted

that this was the first time for her to meet them.

Bingham also spoke of Wade's sacrifice, which is the third fatality for the 2nd Engineer Battalion since it came to WSMR in 2008 and was the second deployment for the 573rd Maintenance Co., both times to Afghanistan. Like many in the 573rd, Wade was a young husband and father.


The other two casualties for the 2E since being stationed at WSMR were Sgt. Brian Pedro, 27, in 2010, and Spc. Nathan Carse, 32, in 2011. All the battalion's casualties have been in deployments to Afghanistan, which illustrates the hazards of their duties to keep transportation routes clear.

The 573rd Maintenance Co. is one of five companies in the 2nd Engineer Battalion. Two of the battalion's companies, the 595th Sapper Co. and the 40th Engineer Mobility Augmentation Co., are still deployed to Afghanistan.



NMSU to build new institute

Domenici Hall to also house business classes

New Mexico State University will hold a ceremony to officially break ground on a construction project that will transform the Hershel Zohn Theater into Pete V. Domenici Hall at 1:30 p.m. Friday, April 12.

Construction work will begin Tuesday, April 16, and conclude in fall 2014.

Once the building is finished, it will house NMSU's Domenici Institute and portions of the Arrowhead Center. As the third College of Business building, it will add classroom and office space for graduate students and faculty.

NMSU's Domenici Institute was founded in 2008. It hosts a yearly public policy conference, various public policy forums and sponsors public policy research projects.

The large auditorium inside Pete V. Domenici Hall will be outfitted with state-of-the-art audio-visual technology and be used for classes, forums and other large meetings. Funding for the building comes from a combination of federal and state funds, as well as a significant contribution from the PY Foundation, led by Peyton Yates.



Aggies earn split with U of A

Adams' homer rallies NMSU past No. 17 Arizona in game one

On a blustery day at the New Mexico State University Softball Complex, the NMSU Aggies rallied past the No. 17 Arizona Wildcats to win 3-2 in game one of the doubleheader Tuesday, April 9.

The Aggies dropped game two 8-1 to split the series for the second straight year.

The Aggies' win in game one set a new school record of 11 straight victories for NMSU.

'I thought we played well overall today and we did some great things," coach Kathy Rodolph said. "Alex (Newman) pitched well for us in game one and then came back and helped out in game two.

"Emma Adams really stepped up and got the key hit for us when we needed it."

The Aggies were led in game one by Adams, who smashed her third home run of the season over the left-field fence in the sixth inning to lift NMSU to the 3-2 win.

Senior hurler Alex Newman worked 7.2 total innings on the day with the complete game in the early battle. She allowed just three walks on the day, while junior right-hander Celisha Walker pitched the majority of game two for just her second loss this season.

NMSU was walked in the first inning until the bases were loaded, but did not light up the board until the bottom half of the third inning. U of A was first to plate a run, with an RBI single up the right side to score the runner that was put on by a walk and stole second.

NMSU's Amber Olive worked the Aggies

into scoring position with a two-base hit to left center. She was brought in off the bat of sophomore Kelsey Dodd to tie the game at 1-1.

The Aggies allowed three hits in the top of the third to the Wildcats, but stranded the runners with a line drive for the third out.

Arizona took the lead in the fourth with an RBI single after the runner walked and was moved up by a single to short at the bottom of the lineup.

NMSU kept the Wildcats off the board in the fifth as two hits put runners at second and third with just one out. The Aggie defense came up with two big reaching plays for the

Ags host Sacramento State, visit Lobos

The New Mexico State University baseball team continues its current home stand as it hosts Sacramento State at 6 p.m. Friday and Saturday, April 12-13, and noon Sunday, April 14, at Presley Askew Field. NMSU will then travel to Albuquerque Wednesday, April 17, to play the University of New Mexico Lobos in a 6 p.m. non-conference game.

After winning the first two games against Dallas Baptist Friday and Saturday, April 5-6, the Aggies fell short on a comeback attempt, losing 12-10 in 10 innings to Dallas Baptist at Presley Askew Field, Sunday, April 7.

The Aggies fall to 18-15 on the year and 4-5 in Western Athletic Conference play, while the Patriots move to 17-15 overall and 5-4 in

NMSU was down 9-0 heading into the bottom of the fourth but tallied six runs in the inning. The Aggies sent 12 batters to the plate in the fourth, marking seven walks and six runs on two hits. DBU stopped the Aggie rally as the NMSU offense left the bases loaded with the

Starting pitcher Michael Ormseth worked 2.2 innings and struck out two batters before relief pitcher, left-hander Trey Higginbotham jumped on the mound to work 3.2 innings. Righty Evan Mott wrapped up the game for the Aggies, working 3.2 innings as well as he struck

out five batters, following last night's save.

Mott was credited with the loss and is now 0-2 on the year, while DBU pitcher Aaron Gilbreath earned his first win of the season.

After a Patriot run in the top of the eighth took the score to 10-7, NMSU crossed the plate three times off four hits and two errors in the bottom of the inning. The Aggies had a chance to pick up the win in the bottom of the ninth inning with bases loaded and no outs, but three consecutive Aggie batters went down

Dallas Baptist then took advantage of the momentum shift and hit a two-run shot in the top of the 10th to take a 12-10 lead before the Aggies left two runners aboard in the bottom of the inning.

Fadke earns WAC honor

New Mexico State's Kenneth Fadke has been named the Western Athletic Conference Golfer of the Week for April 1-7.

Fadke, a freshman from Hobbs, N.M., tied for fifth place at the ASU Thunderbird Invitational over the weekend in Tempe, Ariz. Fadke shot a 5-under 66 in the final round with three birdies and an eagle to finish at 6-under for the tournament (72-69-66, 207). The 66 was a career-low for Fadke and the best by any player in the 100-player field during the third round.

Fadke and the Aggies next compete at the 2013 WAC Championships April 29-May 1 in Las Vegas, Nev.

Lecount is Hitter of the Week

New Mexico State senior Bobby Lecount has been named the Western Athletic Conference Hitter of the Week for the week of April 1-7.

Lecount, a senior from Shoreline, Wash., led the Aggies to three wins last week, including a 10-5 win over in-state rival New Mexico and two wins over Dallas Baptist. Lecount hit .462 (6-for-13). He tallied six walks, nine RBI, two home runs, a double, a triple and scored six runs. His extra base hits equated to a 1.154 slugging percentage for the week, while his six walks helped him tally a .650 on-base percentage in the four games. Lecount reached base safely at least once in every game last week and extended his hitting streak to five games.

Lecount tallied a solo home run against UNM in a midweek game, before he opened the WAC series against DBU going 2-for-3 with a season-high five RBI in a 16-5 seven-inning win. He tallied his second consecutive 2-for-3 day against the Patriots as he led NMSU to a 7-5 victory in game two to clinch the series. That day he also had a double, a walk and a run scored.

Newman garners weekly award

New Mexico State senior Alex Newman was named Pitcher of the Week by the Western Athletic Conference for the week of April 1-7. This is Newman's first honor this season and second in her career

The Rio Linda native worked for three wins in 17.2 innings over the week, helping NMSU to sweep UT Arlington and claim first place in the conference. Newman finished her week with a perfect 3-0 record with an 0.40 ERA and holding her opponents to a .172 batting average. She boasted eight strikeouts and allowed just one earned run all weekend and two overall. She allowed just 11 hits in the circle, improving her conference ERA to 1.50 in a total of 124 innings. She worked her eighth complete game in Friday's 5-1 win and came back for eight more innings in the 12-inning 3-2 win over the Mavs in game one of Saturday's doubleheader. Newman is second in the conference in ERA overall and boasts a 14-8 overall pitching record.

Principal schools boxing champion

Undefeated fighter takes fall in fight against cancer

It didn't even take three rounds for Central Elementary School Principal Eloisa Solis – better known as the "Purple Flame" – to knock out World Boxing Association Super Welter Weight Champion Austin "No Doubt" Trout at the school the morning of Friday, April 5.

Trout, who had previously been undefeated, went down in a hail of punches from Solis before a capacity crowd of Central Elementary students, staff, media and visitors. The referee was Roberto Lozano, whose day job is assistant director of Instruction for English Language Acquisition, Bilingual and Migrant Education Programs for the school district. KGRT News Director Jack Nixon, the voice of the NMSU Aggies, was ring-side announcer.

Trout agreed to take on Solis in the ring if the school surpassed its fundraising goal of \$2,000 during its annual Pennies for Patients campaign, which benefits the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Central Elementary (which is LCPS's smallest school, with fewer than 300 students), has to date, raised more than \$3,100. So, the only serious punch delivered in the spoof

boxing match was against blood cancer, which has a special relevance for children and their families, since leukemia causes more deaths than any other cancer among children under age 20.

To date, Trout has not indicated if he will seek a rematch

with Solis, who can now hang up her purple gloves with a perfect 1-0 record against a world champion.

The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society is the world's largest voluntary health agency dedicated to blood cancer. It funds lifesaving blood cancer research around the world and provides free information and support services, and helps blood cancer patients live better, longer lives. The Pennies for Patients program began in 1995 in North Carolina.

The Aggie track and field team captured top honors and set a new school record at the Don Kirby Tailwind Invitational, Friday and Saturday, April 5-6.

New Mexico State won a pair of relays, a 4-by-100-meter relay and a 4-by-400-meter relay along with an individual title in the 400 meter.

Augusta tournament the best and here's why

I believe spring is absolutely the best time of year for sports.

For us big screen HDTV sports addicts, we really start with the Super Bowl, which is almost springtime here in the Southwest. Then there is March Madness, opening day at the ballpark, the Final Four (men and women) and the NHL playoffs, where really almost everybody is in.

Soon, there is the NFL draft, the Kentucky Derby and the Indy 500. But the crème de la crème of the rites of spring is the Masters.

There are, of course, some reasons, if you need them, not to be interested in the Masters. For one, it's played on Augusta National Golf Club, a golf course that has undergone so many re-vamps that it barely resembles what Bobby Jones had in mind in the 1930s. Some golf cognoscenti bristle at the convoluted and complicated qualifying criteria for players to make it to the Masters, which guarantees the field will not be made up entirely of nothing but the best players in the world.

I happen to agree with critics that exemptions for past champions should run out after awhile so the field is not salted with so many

Speaking of special qualifiers, the 2013 edition of the Masters will see the youngest golfer ever to compete in the event with 14-year-old Guan Tianlang from China and winner of the Asian Pacific Amateur Championship.

I don't care about any of that. The Masters is the best. It is arguably the most coveted tournament prize of any and has the smallest field of all the four majors, albeit with invitations being a quirky process. Then there's

John Daly may be hawking his lame wares outside the gates of Augusta National, but the tournament this year will not be picketed by women's lib (NOW) highness Martha Burke. Why? Last year, the first two women were accepted as members of Augusta National, to wit: former Secretary of State (and Notre Dame graduate) Condoleezza Rice and wellheeled businesswoman Darla Moore.

Here are my top-10 reasons why the Masters is the best, and why you should tune in to the Masters April 11-14. Or at least appreciate the Masters.

- 1. Marveling at the pristine, manicured grounds of Augusta National Golf Club, maintained as a country club was meant to be. Unfortunately, it sets the standards impossibly high for any other golf course. Most of us are simply destined to play on a "club in the country," not a true country club. When I look at Augusta National, I'm in awe and wonder at the closely mown fairways, so fast that even a short-hitter could be made proud. I drool at the snow white bunkers with sharp, clean lips; the perfectly smooth and lightening fast greens; the geometric, flat teeing grounds, with walkways cut ahead to the fairway; the pine trees and pine straw free of trash, junk and debris; the ponds and creeks bordered with slick, sharp and treacherous banks, that aren't unfair, but just intimidating. Azaleas, magnolias and rhododendron flowers all over the place. All this is set up because someone set the bar really, really high with attention to detail like nowhere else, and an attitude of perfection. Augusta National looks beautiful, not only because of a big budget, but because of tradition.
- CBS covering the Masters on the weekend in a virtually commercial-free format, like all sporting events of galactic importance are supposed to be broadcast. During each hour of CBS telecast, there are less than eight minutes of commercial breaks, which includes The First Tee spots. Are you listening Olympic Committee? Superbowl? Limit the ads.
- I like the fact that there is no title sponsor for the Masters. This is the Masters - period. It's not the Western Hemisphere Bank Augusta Championship. It's not the Expensive Luxury Car Invitational. Nor is it the Trust-me Financial Services Open, with Fed-up points at stake. It's the Masters – period – and it stands on it's own.
- 4. No blimps at the Masters. Raise your hand if you really love the aerial view of Adam Scott's drive as it goes up and then comes down in a clump of big trees, making us think he has no shot whatsoever. Only to find out, at ground level, he had a direct shot at the green, through an opening in the trees, with a great angle to the green. The incessant drone of blimp engines hovering overhead I can do without.
- I love the storied tradition of the Masters. No, not the long-dead racism which Lee Elder overcame in 1975. No, not the politics of exclusion. No, not the turmoil that led to former Augusta National Chairman Clifford Roberts' suicide. I'm talking about Gene Sarazen's shot heard 'round the world, eagling 15. Jack Nicklaus' last

- Crenshaw feeling the spirit of Harvey Penick while holing his final putt. The Mize chip-in. The Norman disaster. Tiger's first major. Phil's 8-inch high leap, and so much more.
- 6. Heckler idiots being "escorted" instantly and roughly off the grounds when they click cameras and act like imbeciles anywhere near a TV crew, shouting "get in the hole." The Masters isn't the FBR Open with hordes of over served, rowdy "fans' waiting for a reason to cheer or boo like they were at a soccer match. Sorry, Europe, this isn't fútbol. British Open security chiefs need to come to Augusta to see how it's done. There will be no streakers at the Masters. Promise.
- The possibility of a 15th major for Tiger Woods. The Masters is his stage. When Jack first witnessed Tiger, he saw "10 green jackets." He already has four. Jack's record 18 majors is still intact, but I'm confident that Jack knows he will ultimately be passing the mantle of history to Tiger sometime within the next 10 years. Jack will be pleased. That will be history.
- Amen Corner. Nowhere in sports is there a more defining venue than the 11th, 12th and 13th holes at Augusta - the ones that make up Amen Corner. Masters championships have been decided on these holes. They are tough, demanding holes, with the 12th most memorable. I have played replicas of Amen Corner holes in Dallas (at Tour 18 G.C.), and it was special. My


- thing. Someday, God willing, I'll get a press pass.

- 10. Watching the game as it should be played. I like the genteel atmosphere that honors the tradition of golf. I prepare pimento cheese sandwiches (that cost a mere \$1.50 to this day for patrons) at home on Sunday while watching the last nine holes on TV. Call me a sentimental fool but I even light a fire in my fireplace to mimic being inside the Butler Cabin late in the day.

Now, who will win the Masters this year? Right now the odds-makers have Tiger Woods as the slight favorite, followed closely by Rory McIlroy, then Phil Mickelson and Brandt Snedeker.

Bubba Watson is the defending champion, thanks to his brilliant, no, stunning - and lucky - wedge shot from the right hand trees on No. 10, the first playoff hole, in last year's tournament (while most thought he was dead, having pushed his tee shot into the forest).

What makes Tiger Woods the favorite this year is the fact that he has won three times already and it's only April.

USPS to continue Saturday delivery

Udall applauds reversal

The U.S. Postal Service backed down from its plan to eliminate Saturday mail delivery because Congress barred it, officials said Wednesday, April 10.

The Associated Press reported, however, that the Postal Service's governing board said it's not possible for the financially ailing agency to meet cost-cutting goals without altering its delivery schedule. Delaying "responsible changes," the board said, only makes it more likely that the Postal Service "may become a burden" to taxpayers.

New Mexico Democratic Sen. Tom Udall commended the Postal Service's announcement and claimed the decision comes in response to congressional protest and legislative action by Udall and others to ban a reduction in services.

"The continuation of Saturday delivery is a win for the countless Americans who rely on mail services," Udall said. "The Postal Service is facing serious financial problems, but they will not be solved by cutting the essential services that the business community, the elderly and rural residents depend on."

The Postal Service said in February it planned to switch to five-day-a-week deliveries beginning in August for everything except packages as a way to hold down losses.

But that announcement was a gamble. The agency essentially was asking Congress to drop from spending legislation the longtime ban on five-day-only delivery. Congress did not do that when it passed a spending measure last month.

"By including restrictive language ... Congress has prohibited implementation of a new national delivery schedule for mail and package," the postal Board of Governors said in a statement Wednesday.

"Although disappointed with this congressional action, the board will follow the law and has directed the Postal Service to delay implementation of its new delivery schedule until legislation is passed that provides the Postal Service with the authority to implement a financially appropriate and responsible delivery schedule."


On Feb. 15, Udall led a group of 24 other senators in challenging the postmaster general's authority to discontinue Saturday mail delivery later this year without congressional approval. In the letter, the senators acknowledged the financial challenges the Postal Service is facing and urged the U.S. postmaster to work with Congress to address these problems through bipartisan reform, such as the Senate legislation passed last year.

They also pointed out that a shift to five-day service could lead to further declines in mail volume and revenues, worsening the U.S. Postal Service's overall condition.

In 2012, Udall introduced an amendment to the 21st Century Postal Service Act of 2012 that would protect the Postal Service's six-day service.

Farmers market blossoms

Last block reopens after reconstruction

Saturday, April 6, at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market, shoppers and dogs, bicycles and strollers, moved south along Main Street past Griggs Avenue.

Know it or not, they were taking part in the official grand reopening of the southernmost section of the market. The section had been closed since Smith and Aguirre Construction Co. Inc. began Phase 3 of Downtown Main Street reconstruction from Griggs to Amador Avenue in

At the corner of Las Cruces Avenue, Donna Dollar was doing a remote broadcast for 101.1 KVLC-FM in honor of the reopening.

"There will be no speeches or anything like that," market president Don Kelly, better known as vendor Don Diego, said the day before the

Kelly said vendors, who were moving back after having been relocated to the north during construction, did a three-week trial run before

the official reopening.
"The purpose of extending the market space is to redistribute the traffic flow, relieving crowding in the central block, and moving some of the (vendors) back from the north end," he said. "The significance of the grand opening is that now we are ready to present the market pretty much as people will see it going

Back where they belong

Kelly said 25 or 30 vendors are moving from the far north end to the south and about 20 "floaters" will fill in for now.

A total of about 80 are doing business in the southernmost block. All seven blocks of the

former Downtown Mall, now restored to twoway traffic except during market hours, accommodate 238 permanent vendors and more than 60 seasonal or floating ones, on Wednesday and Saturday mornings.

Vendors who have seen their locations shuffled from the south to the north and back again are delighted to be back on familiar ground.

Martin Martinez, who farms in Mesquite and has been selling at the market for 20 years,

was happy to return.

"I used to be across the street then I had to move," he said. "The customers know to look for us down here. I think being back here will make a difference."

"I've been in every block of the market from the 400 to the 300 to the 100 to the 500," said Lauren Bishop.

Vets' health insurance switched

Area residents get new provider, similar benefits

In a steady voice and crisp, declarative sentences, the man on the phone described his


He introduced himself as an 83-year-old veteran scheduled for cancer surgery in a matter of weeks. He had read in the Bulletin that his health benefit through the military's Procare would be provided by UnitedHealthcare rather than TriWest effective April 1.

He wanted to know for certain his medical bills would be covered. He requested a call back that afternoon.

Although the brief notice from White Sands Missile Range read, "United Healthcare will begin to oversee western region Tricare benefits for military members and their families starting April 1," transitions such as this are complicated, with plenty of room for uncertainty.

The calls the Las Cruces veteran placed as he tracked down assurances could have come from any one of the 2,000 military retirees and

the market for 22 years, recently joined her business with that of glass designer Jan Ridley to form Agave Blue Enterprises.

"This is where we're going to stay for the rest of our lives,"

City plans ad blitz

Andy Hume, city liaison who is overseeing market management during the transition to the vendor-run 501(c) 3, said the grand reopening coincides with the kick off of some "heavy advertising" to get the new nonprofit off to a good start.

This is the final hurrah from the city's perspective," he said. A diverse mix of radio and print ads and a new website have been planned to reach a broad span of demographic groups,

The market will partner with the Las Cruces Convention & Visitors Bureau for promotions in connection with a country music festival planned for May 17-19.

Also in the works is a "Find Your Vendor" campaign, including mapping, and promoting the market online.

The city and the market corporation on Monday, April 1, signed a memorandum of agreement "granting autonomy to the vendors" and will later sign a lease agreement. Hume said his goal is to have the lease agreement ready for action by city council May 20.

After completion of the transition, the city will continue to work with the market, assisting with writing grant applications, launching marketing campaigns and maintaining open communication on each other's responsibilities, Hume said.

Path to independence

Hume, who has been in government service for 20 years, including 12 years with the city, said once the city, vendors, bricks and mortar merchants and Downtown organizations sat down and got acquainted, reaching agreement on how the market should be organized was not overly difficult.

"One of the things that's so fascinating to me is that once you strip down the hard feelings, rumor and innuendo - everything that's not fact - two groups can occupy the same space and find ways to work together," he said, noting that he's seen the same dynamic everywhere he's worked.

When you get down to the facts, generally stakeholder groups are closer to agreement than they realize, he said.

In the case of the market, both vendors and bricks and mortar merchants wanted "to make a viable profit and to promote their businesses and Las Cruces," Hume said. "Guess what? These are the same things."

- place to relax and play tourist on Saturday morning at the end of a hectic week.

This week, the changes at the market are greater than most. Saturday, April 6, was the official grand re-opening of the southern end of Main Street.

The added space means room for more vendors. It also will help alleviate pedestrian congestion in the core of the market.

The market is in the process of transitioning back to vendor management after several years under city jurisdiction. It is now a 501(c)3 corporation with its own board, which last week signed a memorandum of agreement with the city. A lease agreement is in the works, scheduled to take effect July 1, when the market's independence is finalized.

Old-timers recall the farmers market once was selfgoverning, though apparently not in the organized way that is taking shape now. They tell of issues – friction between the bricks and mortar merchants and vendors, the city's frustration with the market and vice-versa.

It's not like that anymore, and, as a farmers market fan, I'm delighted.

I'm also grateful to everyone who made possible the reopening and other impending changes. The list is long and includes the merchants along Main Street who have endured much disruption during the reconstruction of the Downtown Mall, volunteer leaders who stepped forward to organize the vendors and the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership, which brought the city and all the other stakeholders together to come up with some answers.

Since last summer, I kept hearing bits and pieces of the story of growing cooperation among the stakeholders.

Only recently I heard that Randy Harris, market regular and founder of the Great Conversation, played a key role in the stakeholders coalescing around goals they shared.

Thank you all.

family members living in the Las Cruces area who are Procare beneficiaries.

The man with the answers, it turned out, was Jeffrey Schend, deputy commander for administration at WSMR's McAfee Army Health Clinic.

The bottom line, Schend said, is nothing is going to change for veterans and their families.

"Re-enrollment is automatic," he said, although beneficiaries who had automatic payment through TriWest must reenroll with United in order to avoid gaps in coverage.

The change in providers came about because ProCare Management, overseer of the TriCare West program, which in turn oversees the civilian contractor providing Tricare benefits for active duty military and their families as well as veterans and their families, routinely re-bids contracts, Schend said.

TriWest had held the contract since 2001.

The new provider, United, has a oneyear contract with an option to extend for three additional years.

Focus on prevention

"United Healthcare got the contract based on monetary considerations and services they said they could deliver," Schend said. "They provide similar services, but United will work with the military health care system to increase awareness of military health care system wellness programs such as cancer screenings and diabetes care," he said. "The

"It's a culture change - we've always focused on taking care of beneficiaries when they were sick."

The overall objective in working with United is to ramp up preventive services and encourage beneficiaries to make McAfee their provider for outpatient services, including primary care, optometry and behavioral health, Schend said.

Retirees under age 65 will for the first time be eligible to use the clinic, he said.

In addition, active duty personnel within a 50-mile radius of the clinic will be required to use McAfee as their primary care provider.

Schend said beneficiaries as well as providers will experience a culture change.

"We will be sending post cards to remind them of annual screenings," he said. "United Healthcare will be working on marketing the cultural change as well.

Las Cruces primary care covered

Veterans may continue to see a primary care physician wherever they choose, Schend said.

The only possible complication for veterans would be if their primary care physician is not affiliated with United. Once those physicians become network providers, they will be listed as an option for beneficiaries, Schend said.

There currently are more than 25 innetwork primary care providers in Las Cruces, he said.

There would be no change in the way other providers are paid, he said. For example, the retiree concerned about coverage for his surgery would use Medicare as his primary insurance and Tricare would kick in as the secondary benefit payable through United.

Schend said McAfee is encouraging veterans to use the clinic.

"All retirees can enroll at McAfee or a provider in Las Cruces. We would prefer to have them use McAfee, but we understand, with the distance and the mountains to cross, sometimes it's more beneficial to have a primary care physician in

He said one advantage of using McAfee is continuity of care. Some 90 to 92 percent of the time patients will see their regular primary care provider.

Patients generally are seen within a half day of requesting an appointment, Schend said.

He said 76 percent of Tricare beneficiaries in this area are active duty military families, while 34 percent are retiree families.

About 20 percent of Las Cruces' retired military families receive their primary care at McAfee, he said.

Schend invited beneficiaries to stop in at the clinic for more information or call him at 678-6526.

Tricare beneficiares will have to wait several months for the long version of explanations of their new health care coverage.

Town halls will be held from July to September with the help of organizations such as the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, Schend said.



Tell us about your "day jobs"?

I am mostly busy doing homework, however, when I work as the mission shelter director, I help connect people to resources, manage shelter operations, facilitate small groups and coordinate program activities.

In addition, I provide conflict coaching and mediation services through Peacemaker Services Inc.

What qualities/skills have you cultivated to enhance your performance in the workplace?

Over time, I have developed excellent public relations skills, policy development and implementation skills and financial management skills. In addition, I have strong presentation skills, public speaking skills, strong interpersonal skills, experience working in nonprofits with governmental interaction and grant writing skills.

Most memorable mentors, and the role they played in your pursuit of education and career goals?

I keep this quote in my wallet.

Mostly though, I wanted to make myself available to my radio fans. A friend loaned me the money to start the kettle corn business and the rest is history.

In what capacities have you been active in the market?

At first, I was just one of numerous vendors at the market. As time went by, a small group started to formalize by creating a

Business as usual

NM economic development policies not working

I'm beginning to think that the Economic Development Department (EDD) should be called the Department of Corporate Welfare.

A search of EDD's website finds 25 programs that subsidize business. There are programs for aerospace, for sustainable solar buildings; there is a deduction for gross

receipts tax paid on software purchased by businesses in rural areas; there is an exemption from New Mexico income taxes for residents of Texas working within 20 miles of the Mexico border; etc. The list goes on and on.

Then there is the biggest corporate giveaway of all, which is the film credit. This monstrosity spends millions to attract film productions to New Mexico that are here today and gone tomorrow when the film wraps production. It's a very expensive way to create jobs.

The sad thing is that there is very little

evidence that any of these programs work. The oldest of them, dating back to the early 70s, is the Job Training Incentive Program, which subsidizes newly created manufacturing jobs. But despite 40 years of incentives, New Mexico still lags in manufacturing jobs. State per capita income remains stuck at 80 percent or so of the national average.

Yet Santa Fe is offering very little in new ideas. Economic Development Secretary Jon Barela, speaking at a Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) luncheon recently, touted the administration's achievements during the just ended legislative session. It was just more of the same.

Incentives just don't work. Never have, never will. In part, this is because there is always another community that can outbid us. And we should be glad that they do, as often had they not outbid us, we would have been stuck overpaying for job creation.

A case in point is the recent "loss" of an IBM facility to Baton Rouge. That city put together a \$30 million package to attract 800 jobs. Really? That's \$37,500 per job. Thank goodness New Mexico wasn't willing to pay

that silly price.
What incentives do is divert resources away from programs that are known to promote economic development - education, infrastructure and amenities. Businesses like welleducated workers, good roads and nice parks. Why do you think it is that Denver has been

so successful despite a state constitution that prohibits business giveaways?

We need to start to think differently about economic development. One idea would be to adopt a European-style apprentice program. Employers who hire new high school graduates would receive a payment equivalent to what we now give community colleges per student. In exchange for this, students would work four days a week and attend classes the other day.

If the employer hires into permanent jobs, say, three-fourths of their apprentices, they get to keep the subsidy. Otherwise, they would have to refund the state. Thus employers, realizing that the apprentices they are taking on will usually become permanent employees, will have an incentive to training well.

This is the system, more or less, that is in place in Europe and has worked well. And it's enough different that New Mexico will stand out when looking for a place to set up business. We wouldn't be competing head to head against states with more resources than we who are willing to spend ridiculous amounts to attract jobs.

Median home prices up

Area Q-1 sales price rises for first time in 5-years

Not since the first quarter of 2008 has the median price of the new and existing homes sold in the Las Cruces area exceeded the prior year's median price.

Between 2007 and 2008, the median price of the new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums sold during the first three-months of the year rose by \$2,500, from \$185,000 to \$187,500. From that time until now, prices either declined or remained unchanged.

During the first quarter of this year, Las Cruces sellers enjoyed a median price of \$152,250, up \$7,350, from the \$144,900 median price posted in the first quarter of 2012.

The median price is where half sold for more and half sold for less. A rise in the median price means that sellers are realizing more sales, indicating that the market may be strengthening. Higher median prices could also mean that lower-priced homes are selling out and leaving fewer affordable homes in the inventory.

This good news comes on the heels of years of falling prices. Since our market hit its peak in 2008, the median price achieved by Las Cruces sellers has fallen just over \$35,000. An even more daunting statistic is the decline in the average sales price, which fell more than \$59,000 during the same period.

A rise in the median price is a welcome improvement for first-time buyers and others who purchased their homes a few years ago and who currently owe more on their properties than they are worth. The added value will make it easier for those homeowners to sell or refinance as they dig out from their negative equity situations.

Another benefit of rising prices is the "trickle-up" theory. That's where current first-time home buyers purchase the homes of previous first-time buyers who, in turn, move

up to a higher-priced replacement homes. Often, sellers of the higher priced replacement homes move up or down in price depending on whether their family size is increasing or

So is there a message here? I think so. If you've been waiting for home prices to scrape firmly along the bottom of the market floor, now is the time to act – particularly in the \$150,000 and below range. I think the market will have to strengthen a bit more before prices begin to

rise in the higher priced segments.

Either way, I hope it's not too long until I ... See you at closing.





Adapting to drought

Grants to help farms and ranches build resilience to extreme water shortage

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced on April 4 the award of \$5.3 million in Conservation Innovation Grants to develop approaches and technology that will help producers adapt to extreme climate changes that cause drought.

These grants will fund projects benefiting several states that were significantly impacted by last year's drought. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) remains focused on carrying out its mission, despite a time of significant budget uncertainty. The announcement is one part of the department's efforts to strengthen the rural economy.

"USDA is working diligently to help American farmers and ranchers rebound from last year's drought and prepare for future times of climatic extremes," Vilsack said. "Conservation Innovation Grants are an excellent way to invest in new technology and approaches that will help our farmers, ranchers and rural communities be more resilient in the future."

The grants will address drought-related issues such as grazing management, warm season forage systems, irrigation strategies and innovative cropping systems.

Recipients plan to evaluate innovative, field-based conservation technologies and approaches, leading to improvements like enhancing soil's ability to hold water, evaluating irrigation water use and installing

grazing systems that are more tolerant to drought.

Among the projects included are four grazing management demonstrations in South Dakota and Nebraska, computer programs for linking weather stations with irrigation scheduling in Texas and the adaptation of irrigated cropping systems in the Central Plains to drought.

Also included is a \$640,000 grant to evaluate how traditional/historical practices aided Native American tribes in dealing with drought, developing a best practices database and using that information for training and demonstration projects. The grant will support 57 tribes in 19 states, including New Mexico.

NRCS has offered this grant program since 2004, investing in ways to demonstrate and transfer efficient and environmentally friendly farming and ranching practices. This specific announcement of program funding was in response to last year's historic drought.

Conservation Innovation Grants projects are funded by the Environmental Quality Incentives Program and awarded through a competitive grants process. At least 50 percent of the total cost of projects must come from non-federal matching funds, including cash and in-kind contributions provided by the grant recipient.

of Commerce, SCORE and Wells Fargo Bank.

A free breakfast will be served at the work $shops, during which \, New \, Mexico \, VBOC \, Director$ Joseph Long and representatives from partnering agencies will present information on how the agencies can help veterans succeed with starting and expanding their own businesses.

Among the topics to be covered are: How to determine if a business idea is feasible, available financial assistance for veterans, special business incentives for New Mexico veterans, how to create a business plan, how to pursue government contracting possibilities, veteranfriendly franchise opportunities and other ways the VBOC and the presenting partners can help a veteran business owner.

"This is a great opportunity for veterans to learn how to successfully start or grow their own business," said VBOC Director Joseph Long. "If you've ever wanted to be your own boss – and be successful at it – then this is the event to attend."

After the workshops, veterans can take advantage of free private "walk-in" business consultation sessions from 9 to 11 a.m. to discuss their own business matters

The VBOC was created by the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services to help veteran-owned businesses. It was the first such state-funded center in the nation created specifically to help veterans. It is administered by the Small Business Administration and managed by the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services. It was established through a federal grant to assist military veterans with their business development needs.

New Mexico's VBOC is located in

Albuquerque, but provides service to any veteran statewide. It is one of only fifteen VBOC offices in the country.







The best little fest in the West

KRUXFEST offers students and community food, fun and music

For more than 20 years, beginning in 1992, only one music festival has given crowds of eager fans the opportunity to see great alternative local, national and even international musicians and bands, without ever having to leave the Mesilla Valley (or spend their paycheck or financial aid for tickets).

KRUXFEST 2013 opens at 6 p.m. Friday, April 19, at The Game Sports Bar & Grill, 2605 S. Espina St., thanks to the hard work of the KRUX 91.5 FM staff and their dedication to keeping local music alive in Las Cruces.

This year's KRUXFEST kicks off with a meet-and-greet with the five acts scheduled to play – Alister M, The Vision, Arcadian, Second Class Citizens and Janet Ann - as well as KRUX-FM staff members.

Free and open to the public, the event will feature an acoustic "rumble" between a few of Las Cruces' finest singer-songwriters including Matt Morgan, KT Neely and Kris Koerper, as well as free food for New Mexico State University students who have their student ID.

"KRUXFEST is a chance for community members to get to know their student-run radio station at New Mexico State University," said Kylie Arrieta, KRUX music director.

"KRUX is the only area student-run college radio station offering a strong diversity of musical genres and alternative

After festivalgoers have eaten and had a chance to mingle with musicians, there will be free – and safe – rides to the night's entertainment.

Beginning at 7:30 p.m., a free shuttle will be available to take KRUXFESTers (21 and older) from The Game to Hurricane Alley, 1490 Missouri Ave., where the evening's performances will be held. The shuttle will run between venues until 9:30 p.m.

At 9 p.m., the music kicks off at Hurricane Alley. The five rockin' locals mentioned above will play in a "battle of the bands' style competition, and fan support will decide the victor.

"Everyone walking in the door will vote on who they are there to support and see," said Jonathan Goke, general manager at KRUX-FM, "and at the end of the night, the top three acts will receive a cash prize."

Taken for a ride

Las Cruces native releases novel on 1930s Hollywood

Steven M. Painter will hold a book signing for his novel "Take Her for a Ride" at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, April 13, at Barnes & Noble Booksellers in Mesilla Valley Mall, 700 S. Telshor Blvd.

Born in Denver, Painter arrived in Las Cruces at 6 weeks old, where he would spend his formative years, graduating from Oñate High School in 2004.

After finishing high school, he attended the University of New Mexico, where he studied journalism, and later earned his master's degree in film studies from the University of Arizona in Tucson, Ariz., where he currently resides. Between his times spent at UNM and U of A, Painter worked as a reporter for the Woodward News in Woodward, Okla.

While studying film, Painter focused his research on the films and culture of the 1930s, the heyday of the studio system, the birth of the Production Code and the dawn of the so-called "golden age" of film, which lasted through the

"Once you get past the black and white - and the fact that every actor onscreen is long dead – it really comes down to the basic human condition those films portrayed," Painter said of Hollywood's golden age.

"You don't see that in most movies being made today, those human stories love, loss, happiness, all of those. The film studios then worked without this huge amount of money for special effects, so they relied on characters, on stories, on the human element."

Painter has fully embraced his love of '30s culture in his novel "Take Her for a Ride," which follows film producer Paul Russell, desperate to save the studio from certain financial ruin. Russell sets to work with little more than a stack of horror

scripts, a lot full of old, unused sets and a handful of unknown actors. As the novel opens, Russell has just acquired the rights to "Dracula," but the studio is demanding the lead be the unavailable and contractually limited Lon Cheney Jr.

Meanwhile, Russell's girlfriend, aspiring actress Lillian Nelson, is eager to make it in Hollywood on her own - without the help of her producer boyfriend.

Lillian, who began her life in Oklahoma City – once much smaller than today – before traveling to Hollywood, is in part inspired by Painter's own time spent in the Mesilla Valley.

"A lot of her background is based on my time growing up in Las Cruces," he said. "There's only so much you can get from a textbook or a history book, so you have to rely on some of your own experiences.'

Working in the genre of historical novel - which often revolves around fictional characters and stories taking place in a world populated by real people, places, things and happenings - was interest-

"Unlike, say, a novel set in medieval times, some of the characters in this book have well-documented lives - and living relatives," he said.

Painter didn't rely on Hollywood's brightest era for setting alone - "Take Her for a Ride" is written in a style known to those familiar with the era.

'It's got a level of romance in it, but 'Take Her for a Ride' is written in the hard-boiled, pulp novel style of the time," Painter said. "The style will appeal to mystery or detective fans, even though it's not a mystery novel."

Populated with some of the studio era's best and brightest – including James Cagney, Bela Lugosi, Boris Karloff and Jack Warner - "Take Her for a Ride" should appeal not only to devotees of '30s culture; with it's mix of genres, the

novel should find a wide audience.

"It's a human story, which appeals to many different people, who may like a lot of varying styles," the author said.

The verdict is in

'Twelve Angry Men' delivers the drama

After attending the opening night production of Reginald Rose's important and searing commentary on the roles prejudice and social justice play in our society, 1954's "Twelve Angry Men," I was reminded of the title of a song in Rodgers and Hammerstein's classic "The King and I:" – "It's a Puzzlement!"

Which is more preferable? If one had the ability to stream "Twelve Angry Men," the iconic film starring Henry Fonda, Lee J. Cobb and Ed Begley, among others, in the privacy of one's home, or attend the live performance of the show brought to life by local, skilled actors, what should a potential Las Cruces Community Theatre audience member do?

For me, the answer is a no brainer: Watching the classic film in the privacy of one's home may have its advantages, but the "magic" only can take place when we are sitting among members of our community and feeling their passion and discomfort, laughing at the same

humorous lines and squirming in our seats as we encounter sections of the play which may force us to be uncomfortable.

If one is a thinking person who believes in the fairness of our justice system, seeing this live production seated among members of our diverse community is something to strongly consider. Of course Henry Fonda's portrayal of "juror nine" stands out in cinematic history, but there are reasons that outweigh a decision to sit in the audience in Las Cruces and feel the variety of emotions that emanate from the stage and circulate through the theater, most especially due to the electrifying performance of Patrick Payne.

First of all, I am one of the loudest cheerleaders in town supporting the role of live theater. There is a magic that transpires when the "chemistry" between actors and audience connect. One can't fully express that chemistry in words.

Also, we need to be there to encourage new talent and provide opportunities for established actors in our community to express themselves.

In this case, I must commend the entire cast for eliciting a sense of spontaneity as they deliver their lines in rapid fire. Kudos to director Joe Pfeiffer for setting the proper pace to keep the tension high and the play moving along.

tension high and the play moving along.

I wasn't familiar with the work of Payne until I saw him amble into the theater in LCCT's opening production of "When You Comin' Back, Red Ryder?" He scared me. He literally sent shivers down my spine. This actor is magic. Payne is an outstanding director as well. He knows how to play to his audience and thankfully knows how to project

thankfully, knows how to project.

In the pivotal role in "Twelve Angry Men," he is the catalyst who makes things happen. He is the one juror in the play who does not believe that the verdict is just, and is able, through his skill, to turn the rest of the jury around.

Others in the cast are strong in their performances, but alas, I could not hear a portion of dialogue because the acoustics in the theater could use a "boost." LCCT board members ought to address this issue in a community with an aging population with varying degrees of hearing loss. It may be too costly to "loop" the theater for the hearing impaired, but I do know that this issue must be addressed in order for audience members to hear the nuances and arguments in this "thinking persons' play."

At one key point in the action, a racist diatribe delivered by juror 10, portrayed strongly and effectively by Jake Burnham, turns the

jury around. Sitting in a primarily Hispanic audience and hearing these stereotypes uttered made audience members clearly uncomfortable. I think that watching this production in Las Cruces, surrounded by a strong, vibrant Hispanic community, made the diatribe and its response on stage even more powerful.

In sum, please make reservations to see this important drama. It deals with issues close to home and stirs our sense of social justice that is percolating so strong in every corner of this blessed country.

Share the experience with our community. It's an investment worth making and sustaining.

"Twelve Angry Men" shows at 8 p.m. Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays and at 2 p.m. Sunday afternoons at the Las Cruces Community Theatre, 313 N. Main St., through Sunday, April 21. Tickets are \$10 for adults, \$9 for students, seniors and military, \$8 for groups of 10 or more and \$7 for children 6 and younger. Since 2006, the Mesilla Valley Jazz & Blues Society has promoted an appreciation of the jazz and blues art forms and dedicated itself to increasing opportunities and exposure for established and aspiring musicians alike.

Valley Drive and 131 S. Roadrunner Parkway, as well as a third location in Alamogordo, 2251 N. White Sands Blvd

Once upon a time – and this may severely date me – Las Crucens turned to Scoopy's for all their frozen custard needs and, personally, I had a lot of frozen custard needs – that stuff is

Frozen custard – a sweet, frozen treat similar to ice cream, but made with egg yolk in addition to sugar and cream – was invented at Coney Island around the beginning of the 19th century.

Ice cream vendors at the booming turn-of-the-century amusement park found that adding egg yolks to ice cream made their treats smoother, fattier (meaning tastier) and stay cold longer – just about everything you'd want from a chilly confection to combat the summer sun.

Sure, there's some science behind exactly why frozen custard tastes so good – higher butterfat content (10 to 16 percent) than traditional ice cream (a measly 10 percent), lower serving temperature (18 to 19 degrees) than ice cream (20 to 22 degrees), lower "overrun," or amount of air in the product, than ice cream and a legal requirement (that's right, by law) of no less than 1.4 percent egg yolk solids – but none of

that really matters when you take a bite. It may come in handy someday, though, and you'll be thanking me then. 





Dead by dawn

'Evil Dead' is a splatter spectacular

The 1981 horror classic "Evil Dead" changed the face of horror and began what is generally regarded as the largest cult film series in history.

The original film, shot on a shoestring budget, not only redefined the genre, but launched the careers of director Sam Raimi – who would later go on to direct the cult classics and "Evil Dead" sequels "Evil Dead 2" and "Army of Darkness" as well as the hugely successful "Spider-Man" trilogy and, most recently, "Oz the Great and Powerful," among others – and B-movie star Bruce Campbell, who seems to have achieved the perfect level of celebrity: a luminary to fans and an unknown to the rest of the world. I bet he can still do his own grocery shopping.

"Ēvil Dead" was made for almost nothing – Raimi has said that he nearly "begged" for investments – but upon release became wildly successful, grossing more that \$2.4 million at the box office, roughly eight times its original budget.

Production, as those involved have said, was a nightmare. Filmed on location in the remote Morristown, Tenn., the filming process was riddled with mistakes, mishaps and cast and crew injuries.

The crew got lost in the woods on the first day of shooting, there were technical difficulties and injuries throughout and, by the last day on location, after days without showers on top of poor weather and illness, conditions had become so miserable on location that crew and cast members began burning the furniture inside the cabin to stay warm. Campbell later remarked that the filming of "Evil Dead" was "12 weeks of mirthless exercise in agony," though he later said he enjoyed the process nonetheless.

Åll of these obstacles (no budget, inexperienced actors, terrible weather, poorly improvised special effects) are, in my mind, all the things that make "Evil Dead" such a triumph of horror. In the face of all of these difficulties, Raimi managed to make a true horror classic. His film was the epitome of camp: gross but never grim, funny but never jokey, each and every 35 mm frame filled to the brim with gore.

When the remake of "Evil Dead" was announced, fans – including myself – took to message boards and social media platforms in either enthusiastic support of or virulent protest against their beloved horror classic receiving some new blood – pun very much intended. With a budget of more than \$17 million, what would remain intact of Raimi's low-budget



classic, and what would fall by the studio wayside?

I, like many, was skeptical, after seeing one too many beloved children's classics (I had much older cousins) bastardized by greedy Hollywood moguls. Now, months after the release of the initial – and hideously graphic – trailer, "Evil Dead" has splattered on to screens everywhere, and it's a bloody mess – in a good way.

For those unfamiliar with the 1981 "Evil Dead," the new film follows roughly the same premise. Five friends head out to a remote cabin in the woods, enter a spooky cellar full of dead animals and uncover the Naturom Demonto – the Necronomicon, or Sumerian "book of the dead." Ignoring the protestations scrawled through the book – as horror movie teens invariably do – one reads an incantation from the unholy tome and unleashes a demon. Curiosity and cats, eh?

Let's get something clear, here: If you and your friends ever come across a book bound in human flesh, penned in blood, chock full of pentagrams and horrific images of torture and savagery, skip the translations, yes?

From there, things get ugly. Really ugly. The demon possesses the teens

From there, things get ugly. Really ugly. The demon possesses the teens one by one, starting with Mia – already not quite herself due to some heavy-duty opiate withdrawals.

It's hard to tell where Mia's withdrawals end and the possession begins, but it probably starts with her attempted escape into the woods,

where she's assaulted – in a very unpleasant way – by the branches and vines of a tree.

Once her four friends bring her back to the cabin, it's an all-out splatter fest, and the weak-stomached need not apply.

"One must not put a loaded rifle on the stage if no one is thinking of firing it," wrote Russian playwright Anton Chekov, a metaphor for the dramatic principle of foreshadowing. Within the first act of "Evil Dead," audiences have seen,

Within the first act of "Evil Dead," audiences have seen, among other items, a box cutter, a shotgun, a large syringe, a crowbar, an electric carving knife, a chainsaw and a nail gun. Rest assured, they'll be put to good – and grotesque – use.

While "Evil Dead" has lots to offer moviegoers unaware of the '80s classic, at its core, it's a movie made for fans. Director Fede Alvarez has peppered his reboot with loving throwbacks to the original film – check for the Michigan State sweater

and Ash's 1973 Oldsmobile Delta 88, now rusted away outside the cabin – while maintaining enough of his own vision to avoid a simple retread.

Audiences more used to contemporary (read: not very good) horror cinema – more spook than splatter, more ghosts that gore – may want to skip "Evil Dead." For fans of all things icky, stick

Dead." For fans of all things icky, sticky and red, though, "Evil Dead" provides more than enough mid-spring carnage to whet the bloody appetites of gore hounds everywhere.

And, for fans of the original franchise: Stick around through the credits. You won't be sorry.

'Quartet' doesn't hit all the right notes

Hoffman's directorial debut somewhat off-key

The beautiful Ellie Caulkins Opera House in downtown Denver was packed last November for the Red Carpet Starz Denver Film Festival screening of "Quartet," the first film directed by actor Dustin Hoffman.

The venue seats 2,225, and unless there were seats upstairs or behind me that I couldn't see, it was sold out.

I love this festival, and one of the best things about it is going to opening night or a special screening at the Caulkins. Everyone, except me, dresses up. I was able to view all of the current styles for all ages of women – short black dresses and tall boots – that warmish evening last year and many of the men were dapperly dressed as well.

The introduction of the films at the

Caulkins can be a bit long, since they often involve sponsors or special guests. In the past, I have seen the director of the indie hit "Precious," the young man whose story is told in the harrowing "127 Hours" and director Jason Reitman and screenwriter Diablo Cody for a special showing of "Juno," as well.

Sadly, no guests this year, but the big announcement was that the Denver Film Society, which hosts the festival received a \$2.5 million gift from the Anna and John

Sie Foundation. The Sies live in Denver and John Sie was the founder of Starz, the huge entertainment network.

After that and some speechifying, it was on with the highly anticipated screening of "Quartet."

The film had already drawn a lot of support from those

thinking that it would be in the same vein as the "made for geezers" film, "The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel," which did remarkably well at the box office. Additionally, it has a cast of known British actors and, believe me, no matter where you live in the U.S., a comedy with known British actors always brings out the folks that are in or approaching my age – 90

"Quartet," for me, was a disappointment, the main problem being that the story was pretty awkward and rather predictable and the dialogue was terribly hard to understand.

The script takes place entirely in a rather posh British retirement home for aging

musicians. Three of the main characters, all former opera singers, are already there, and the anxiously await the fourth, played by veteran Maggie Smith. Smith, as Jean, was once married to Reggie, but things didn't go well and lasted as long as a Mickey Rooney marriage. Jean is quite the prima donna, not at all wanting to be assigned to this, this house of geezers. Why, she still has plenty of good years of operatic performance in her! Never mind sitting around this, this knitting circle of losers. Harumph!

Ah, but as always things aren't as they seem. Reggie and his two co-conspirators, Wilf and Cissy, are determined to have Jean perform at the home's annual gala, wherein everyone participates in a pleasant fund raising event.

Reggie is a dandy, Wilf is a lecher and Cissy is on the verge of Alzheimer's. But by combining their forces, they know they can out maneuver Jean and get her to help out.

The problems with this film are multiple. First, as Roger Ebert pointed out, it loses a bit since the gala is not to help "save the home," but rather just an opportunity for everyone to perform again. There is also the tired storyline, which is unconvincing, and not to forget that the characters are standard issue. There's nothing new here and that's a shame, since they all work hard with poor material.

"Quartet" is not a bad film; it is just not very exciting or refreshing. It will be a pleasant outing for you, but by breakfast the next day, you'll have forgotten it.



range from \$100,000 to \$1.5 million. "Every level of buyer will have a home.'

A new feature of the showcase is the twilight tour, which will take place from 4 to 9 p.m. Thursday, April 25. During the tour, 25 of the homes will be opened to showcase their lighting elements and evening features.

'We've done this in the past, and we're bringing it back in a strong way this year," Chavira said. "We wanted to give another perspective of what the homes look like. You visit these homes during the day, so you never get to know what they look like at night. Plus, this gives our suppliers and lighting contractors an opportunity to be showcased.

Over the years, the Spring Showcase of Homes has generated much business for local homebuilders, and has become a popular event that even people from out of town look forward to.

The lemon's delicious uses

This tangy fruit isn't such a bad thing after all

The lemon sure has a bad rap.
After all, sayings such as "When life hands you lemons, make lemonade" and "That (fill in the blank) is a lemon," would make one believe the lemon is some sort of hardship that should be avoided. This is far from the truth.

The tart tree fruit is full of citric acid, calcium, magnesium, vitamin C and limonene, all of which can boost your immune system and help you fight off infections.

It is also beneficial to those trying to lose weight. Studies have shown that lemons can help lower the absorption of sugars because of their high acidic content. Also, those who consume large amounts of vitamin C are less likely to gain weight than those who don't.

The tang of a lemon is also a great addition to a variety of foods. Just about everything from fish to asparagus can be enhanced by a squirt of lemon juice.

In addition to its nutritional benefits and endless culinary uses, the lemon is a fantastic for another reason all the things it can do around the house.

- 1. Remove the stink from your cat box: Loving your pet feline doesn't have to come with a smelly price. Skip those aerosol air fresheners and face masks and get rid of that unwanted odor from its cat box with a lemon. Cut a few lemons in half and place them cut side up in a dish in the room with the cat box. The air will be filled with the fresh scent of lemon, not cat
- 2. Polish chrome: Mineral deposits can collect on your chrome faucets and other items. Get rid of them and polish these

objects by rubbing the lemon rind over the surface. Rise well and dry with a soft cloth and you'll be left with a shiny finish.

- 3. Stop vegetables from browning: While boiled potatoes and cauliflower can be a tasty addition to your diet, the unsightly brown color they turn can be unappetizing. This doesn't have to be the case, however, when you have lemons on hand. Keep these vegetables white by squeezing a teaspoon of fresh lemon juice in the water while they cook.
- 4. Keep guacamole green: Potatoes and cauliflower aren't the only vegetables you have to worry about turning brown avocados are also common victims. After slicing your avocado, the surface exposed to air will begin to turn brown - not very appealing, especially when whipping up a batch of homemade guacamole. Help your guacamole stay green by adding a liberal amount of lemon juice to the mix. Lemon juice stops avocados as well as apples, pears and bananas - from turning brown thanks to its ascorbic acid.
- 5. Stop your rice from sticking: Sticky rice has its time and place, and sometimes it's not on your dinner plate. Prevent your rice from clumping together by adding a spoonful of fresh

lemon juice to your boiling water when cooking. When the rice is done and has cooled for a few minutes, fluff it with a fork and it will be ready to serve.

6. Deodorize your cutting boards: After prolonged use, your cutting board will begin to smell. This might seem like something you have to live with, due to the onions, garlic, meat, fish and other pungent food your board encounters, but there is hope. Get rid of these unwanted smells by rubbing the board with the cut side of half a lemon.

7. Revive limp lettuce: Your soggy lettuce doesn't have to be destined for the trash can if you have a lemon around. Squeeze the juice from half a lemon into a bowl of cold

water. Submerge the lettuce in the solution and place it into the refrigerator for an hour. Dry the leaves completely before putting using in a salad or sandwich.


8. Get out underarm stains: White shirts can be a welcome addition to any wardrobe. Unfortunately, over time the inevitable yellowing of the underarm area will take place. Thanks to lemons, however, you'll be able to raise your arms without worry or embarrassment. Mix together equal parts lemon juice and water. Use the solution to scrub the yellowed area and wash the garment as usual. You'll notice a difference in the stain.

9. Freshen your garbage disposal: If a foul smell has emerged from your garbage can, get rid of it with lemon. Add a few slices or peels now the drain, run the water and flip on the garbage disposal. A fresh fragrance will be dispensed from your garbage disposal. This is a great trick for those leftover lemon slices and saves them from the dumpster.

10. Remove stains from marble: Marble is a porous stone, making it easy to stain. It can be hard to remove stains from marble – good thing there is the lemon. For your tough marble stains, cut a lemon in half and dip the cut end into table salt. Vigorously rub it onto the stain. Rinse well and the stain will be gone. Because the acid in the lemon can damage the marble, do

this on only those overwhelmingly stubborn stains.

11. Deodorize a humidifier: Living in the Southwest, land of sand, dirt and plenty of wind, your home is most likely equipped with a humidifier to moisten the dry air. After time and use, your humidifier can develop an unpleasant odor. Remedy the situation by pouring 3 to 4 teaspoons of lemon juice into the water. A more pleasant, lemony fresh smell will be emitted. Do this every few weeks.

framed construction.



Time for asparagus

Versatile veggie can be cooked many ways

April is peak season for asparagus, so on my last trip to the grocery store, I purchased 2 pounds.

To keep them fresh, I plunged the stalks in about 2 inches of water in a tall jar, covering the tips in a damp paper towel. Now they'll stay fresh and crisp for three to four days, giving me ample time to consider which recipes I'll whip up over the next few days.

Asparagus can be steamed, stir-fried, roasted, blanched, nuked, grilled and eaten raw. When selecting asparagus, and if they're available, opt for stalks with the largest diameter – they offer the best quality. The key to great tasting asparagus is to not overcook it. Mushy asparagus not only appears less than appetizing but it tastes flat.

A few years ago, I published a recipe for a sandwich wrap, which received plenty of posi-

Espárragos Medley Wrap with Pine Nuts

1 package oversized flour tortillas, lard free 1 pound asparagus, steamed 1 large and firm red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded and julienned 1 medium onion, sliced paper thin 6 roasted, peeled and de-veined plump Sandia (or other favorite) chile, cut lengthwise

1/2 pound of asadero or Monterey Jack cheese, sliced thin 1/2 cup pine (piñon) nuts

Fat-free sour cream Fresh or dried parsley or cilantro Grated Parmesan cheese

Steam asparagus, preferably resting in a vegetable steamer, until just tender or until it offers a slight resistance when bitten into. Set aside. Place a flour tortilla on a microwaveable dinner plate. Put three pieces of cheese across the center of the tortilla. Wrap a chile slab around a bundle of five slender asparagus stalks, use fewer if asparagus is chubby. Place bundle in center of tortilla. Top with bell pep-

Scatter tortilla with parsley and pine nuts. Roll tortilla into a burrito. Microwave until just heated through and cheese begins to melt. Top with two or three dollops of sour cream and garnish with Parmesan sprinkles and two or three cilantro sprigs. For additional color, add a bell pepper sliver. Repeat with remaining tortillas. S Makes about 6 servings.

Spicy Sweet Chunky **Asparagus Salsa**

1/2 pound asparagus spears 1/4 cup orange marmalade 2 tablespoons jalapeño peppers, minced 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped 1 tablespoons cider vinegar 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt 3/4 cup fresh pineapple, coarsely chopped (or substitute an 8-ounce can of pineapple chunks, drained) 1/2 cup seeded orange sections,

coarsely chopped

Diagonally slice asparagus spears into small pieces. In large skillet, stir fry aspara-gus with 2 tablespoons water just until color intensifies, 1 to 2 minutes. Drain; rinse with cold water, drain well and set aside. In a medium bowl, stir together orange marmalade, jalapeño pepper, cilantro, vinegar and garlic

salt. Add asparagus, pineapple and orange and gently toss together until coated. Chill at least 30 minutes before serving. Makes 2 1/2 cups.

Asparagus Pasta Stir Fry

1 pound asparagus, trimmed 1/2 cup onion, sliced

2 tablespoons olive oil 2 tablespoons soy sauce

1 clove garlic, minced

1 teaspoon fresh ginger root, minced

1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper 6 ounces Vermicelli or angel hair pasta, cooked and drained

Diagonally slice asparagus into 1 1/2- to 2-inch pieces. Stir-fry asparagus and onion until crispy tender. Add seasonings and mix well. Add cooked pasta and stir-fry until thoroughly heated and evenly mixed. Makes 6 servings.







The first five years are crucial



Rorie Measure The Reading Solution

When we think of the most influential teachers in our lives, we often remember a special elementary, middle or high school teacher, a first boss or someone else who entered our lives at a pivotal moment.

Yet our first and most important teachers are often overlooked. They are those who care for us as babies and guide us through the first five years of life. Because these primary caregivers are our first teachers, their influence is more important than anyone who comes later.

Scientists now know that the fastest learning and most brain development occurs from birth to 5 years old. All future learning is built on this foundation. Yet parents may not recognize their role as their child's first and most important

First Teacher: Ready for Kindergarten, a new project in Las Cruces, addresses parents' need to understand child development and provides tools to promote their children's future success in school.

Parents with preschoolers are now "playing with a purpose" in 70 households as a result of unique parenting classes offered at three Las Cruces schools. Moms, dads and grandparents participated in a pilot program conducted by Children's Reading Foundation (CRF) of Doña Ana County.

Families with 3- and 4-year-old children residing in the enrollment districts of Conlee, Valley View and Jornada elementary schools were invited to enroll in a six-week early literacy program. Parents learned how their interactions with their preschoolers affect future success in school. Each hands-on session focused on a specific area of literacy and provided tools and books for the parents to use at home.

"Some parents assume that learning begins in kindergarten," said CRF Vice President Terry Miller. "Actually, a child is expected to enter kindergarten knowing numbers, colors, shapes and the names and sounds of letters. Without these skills, and without the shared experience of reading books at home, a child is at a disadvantage on the first day of kindergarten.'

With funds provided by a grant from the Stocker Foundation, Miller, Ann Rohovec, CRF board secretary and myself created First-Teacher: Ready for Kindergarten specifically for parents in Doña Ana County.

Principals and teachers at the three elementary schools joined forces with Miller and Rohovec to work around parents' schedules by offering the classes on Thursday evenings and Saturday mornings. Participating teachers were Elizabeth McDonald, Kim Ortiz and

Bringing awareness to the community

"Obviously, it's been a blight on my existence for a while," said Joseph Ortiz, a Las Cruces High School (LCHS) senior and ambassador for the national Tourette Syndrome Association (TSA).

Ortiz, who has Tourette syndrome, was diagnosed with the neurological disorder when he was 8 years old.

"(Having Tourette's) prepares you," Ortiz said. "I can handle anything. I feel like I'm an adaptable person.'

According to TSA, the disorder is characterized by involuntary "multiple motor and vocal tics lasting for more than one year. The first symptoms usually are involuntary movements (tics) of the face, arms, limbs or trunk. These tics are frequent, repetitive and rapid.

Tourette's affects all races and ethnic groups. Approximately 200,000 people are known to have Tourette's in the United States; however, the disorder can often go undiagnosed.

"It's genetic," Ortiz said. "You're born with the condition but it doesn't manifest until 6, 7 or 8 years old and gets worse around puberty. It diminishes after that. It calms down significantly when your hormones do."

Tourette's is diagnosed in those 18 or younger. Those with the disorder tend to have one vocal tic and one motor tic.

"They change frequently," Ortiz said. "There aren't certain tics you get. It's a neural synapse, but there are commonalities - shaking hands, nodding of the head, Coprolalia."

One misconception people have about Tourette's is the prevalency of Coprolalia – an involuntary vocal tic that takes the form of curse words or something socially inappropriate such as offensive remarks, sexual comments or racist slurs – when in reality less than 15 percent of those with Tourette's develop it.

Ortiz admits that he has Coprolalia, however, as Ortiz explained before, tics can develop or change on their own.

"Another misconception that is that people

who don't know you think you're slow, when it's actually an excess of neuro-energy," said Ortiz, adding that Tourette's manifests as a way for the brain to get the energy out.

"My AES facilitator used to say, 'Everyone has a curveball they have to deal with in life no matter how old they are, and you got yours early," Ortiz said.

His AES facilitator assured him that in the long run, it would help him better deal with

According to the National Cancer Institute, more than 1.6 million people in 2012 were estimated to receive a cancer diagnosis; of that number, 9,640 lived in New Mexico.

In 2012, it was estimated that of those with cancer, 577,190 would die as a result of their illness.

"She went (to the doctor) for an entirely different thing and they caught it," Flores said.
"They gave her three to six months and she ended up living a year."

While Esparza was at Mesilla Valley Hospice, Flores witnessed the importance of caring not only for the patient, but their families.

"Ever since Ginger's diagnosis, we've heard so many stories of people or someone in the family affected by pancreatic cancer," said Flores, adding that she witnessed how understanding her husband's employers were to the situation and saw that other's with family members in hospice weren't as fortunate.

Flores got the idea to organize a race/walk in Esparza's honor and to raise proceeds for families who have loved ones with pancreatic cancer. With the help of family and friends, the race/walk came together.

Ginger's Race to the Rainbow 5K Run will be held 8 a.m. Sunday, May 5, at Barnett's Las Cruces Harley-Davidson, 2600 Lakeside

The race was named for Esparza's love of Hawaii, a place she had the privilege to often travel to for work.

(The cancer) moved very quickly," said Flores. "She tried to work as long as she could. She wanted to have quality of life. Her and her brother, my husband, took a trip to Hawaii and then she passed."


Flores said, the family was grateful for the year they had with her, and that Esparza was able to do the things she wanted to.

other obstacles that would come his way.

"A lot of people take for granted how easy it is (to do certain things)," Ortiz said. "There is so much I do that I have to hold back. It's hard to do even rudimentary things, but I manage. I have to work harder at everything. I try to be normal – cleverness and humor distracts."

Ortiz said he compensates for his disorder so he isn't memorable because of his disorder, but for his humor and wit.

"As omnipresent as it is, I kind of forget," Ortiz said. "There comes a point where you can't tell everyone you meet you have it, but there are situations where it is necessary, like at the beginning of every school year."

Some people don't know or understand what Tourette's is and thinks the tics are voluntary, Ortiz said.

"I know it doesn't make an easy first impression," he said.

Ortiz became involved with TSA after his neurologist referred him. Ortiz currently makes presentations educating people about Tourette's or how to educate people who have Tourette's.

"It's a national organization, but it doesn't get a lot of attention," Ortiz said. "I'm thinking of getting more involved with events. It's easy to feel alone. (Working with TSA) makes you realize people are going through the same thing."

Due to his responsibilities as an ambassador, Ortiz recently attended a TSA conference in Washington, D.C., and met other ambassadors with Tourette's from across the U.S.

"I can't describe what it's like to have Tourette's, and they know," said Ortiz, adding that no one really knows what it's like unless they have it.

"You'll be surprised by the kindness of people," he said. "Some people are cruel, but there are so many people who are very

understanding."

Although Ortiz said he doesn't personally know anyone in Las Cruces with Tourette's, his work as an ambassador allowed him to meet a local elementary school boy who has the disorder. Ortiz spoke with administrators and teachers at the school to help them better understand Tourette's and make things easier for the student, who he hopes has an easier time than he did

"If you have a kid with Tourette's, getting them to exercise and in a sport is a big thing," Ortiz said. "Playing an instrument, writing – any thing that focuses the brain (will help). Video games and TV are bad – stimulation is bad, creativity, creation is good."

At a young age, Ortiz became involved in swimming and competes on the LCHS swim team as the swim captain. He also is involved with the high school newspaper as the health and science writer and is involved in the theater program.

"Diagnosis is a weird road," Ortiz said. "It's nice to have an excuse, but there's no cure only treatment and sometimes those may not even work. Ultimately, it's what you make of it."

"My child is using her imagination more and we are making reading more fun," Mendoza said. "She is learning shapes, colors, numbers, words and even sounds of the letters. We really make it fun when we read. I have enjoyed every class. And I think this really benefits parents and shows us how to be more of a teacher to our children by making reading fun for them. The teachers made this class fun and interesting."

CRF continues to grow throughout the community. There are many ways to get involved. Right now we are looking for warehouse space, volunteers to work with inventory and various office and computer tasks, people with strong backs to move boxes of books, as well as skilled fundraisers, grant writers and people who would enjoy reading to children this summer.


