### WSMR, Fort **Bliss begin NIE series**

#### **Network Integration Evaluation continues**

Somewhere deep inside the 2.2 million acres of land shared by White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) and Fort Bliss, Texas, some 3,800 Soldiers of the 2nd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division (2/1 AD) are running in-the-field evaluations of the Army's high-tech communications network.

Network Integration Evaluation (NIE) is the fifth in a series of semi-annual, soldier-led evaluations designed to further integrate and rapidly progress the Army's tactical network. NIE 13.2, the current iteration of the program, is taking place April through May at WSMR and Fort

The NIE "TRIAD" – the Army Test and Evaluation Command (ATEC), the Brigade Modernization Command (BMC) and the System of Systems Engineering & Integration (SoSEI) Directorate – is managing the evaluations.

The NIE concept emerged three years ago, as the Army recognized the need to test and evaluate network technologies in an integrated manner," said Paul Mehney, chief of public communications with So-

"Up until that time, the Army tested and evaluated capability in a 'stove pipe' fashion, with each program going through independent tests and evaluations, even though each program would have to integrate and he integrated the integration of the control of the contr grate and be interoperable with each other. The Army made the determination to test and evaluate these programs together in the same fashion as they would be fielded - in an integrated package. This has led to a better understanding of how each network technology would interact with others, and has provided valuable soldier feedback to how these technologies should be used in real world operations."

The actual network – the hardware designed to run it - has been successfully tested in previous NIEs. The current and prior NIE, however, were designed not

#### Red Cross heroes will get a closer look

What does it take to be a hero?

In some cases, it takes very little.

If we say or do the right thing at the right time, for the right person, we can all be a hero for a moment, or maybe even a lifetime.

There's a more tangible definition of a hero, the one we're all familiar with, the one where someone saves somebody's life.

As it does each year in Las Cruces, the American Red Cross in Southwestern New Mexico recently recognized its Real Heroes.

These 25 New Mexicans did some amazing things from, yes, saving lives, to making the lives of children better.

This year's heroes represent a broad range of age, gender - even species, with Splash the dog winning one of the awards.

So inspiring are these people and their deeds, we've decided to profile each of the award winners over the next several weeks. The categories are: emergency medical, firefighter, law enforcement, disaster relief, military, water safety, rescue animal, good samaritan youth, good samaritan adult and humanitarian.

The first heroes we're profiling are the firefighters who saved Craig Benavidez from a harrowing bee attack last summer.

Jose Granados, Jason Smith, James Casteel and Kyle Kozlowski "are the best guys you'll ever meet," Benavidez said of the men who rescued him, enabling him to be back at work 10 days later.

The keynote speaker at the event was Lowell Catlett, a regent's professor at New Mexico State University and dean and chief administrative officer for the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.

If you've never heard Catlett speak, you're poorer for it.

As he always does, he had the audience at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum riveted.

As usual, Catlett arrived at a completely original and historically meaningful way to address the topic at hand, in this case heroism. He gave us all a history lesson about France's Marquis de Lafayette, a contemporary of George Washington.

Many of us were, frankly, a little in awe of the heroes in the room, feeling a little sheepish that we hadn't accomplished some of the monumental feats we heard retold.

Catlett once again made us feel better, this time with some comments that were not necessarily original, thoughts we'd heard and felt before.


'There are no extraordinary people," Catlett said. "Just great challenges that ordinary men and women rise to meet.

## Is New Mexico the most corrupt state in the U.S.?

### Plenty of scandal in state's past, but probably not worse than most



Has anyone ever told you New Mexico is the most corrupt state in the nation? I've heard it for years, including from an FBI agent, who investigated our financial corrup-

Since I was a kid, I remember hearing that some powerful New Mexican, maybe Dennis Chavez, saying that if you want to get a degree in political corruption, go to Chicago. If you want to get a master's degree, go to Louisiana. But if you want a doctorate, go to New

If you ask people from the East Coast, they'll probably tell you that New York and New Jersey are the most corrupt states. It just depends on where you're from.

New Mexicans can point out that former Sen. Manny Aragon still is in federal prison

in Colorado for getting kickbacks from the federal courthouse in Albuquerque and that several others pled to lesser offenses.

They also can tell you two state treasurers went to prison recently for pocketing money. And then there is the State Investment Council and its bad deals that greatly enriched a few and made the rest of us put off retirement a few more years.

And then there is former Gov. Bill Richardson, who is reported to have received big campaign donations in exchange for bad campaign advice. The pay-to-play investigations, suits, countersuits and grand jury proceedings are slowly working their way through the system, but no one has gone to jail and Richardson has remained untouched.

The allegations did force Richardson to withdraw his nomination as secretary of Commerce, however. So far, there has been much smoke but no fire. Richardson got himself into some hot water, but contrast that with Illinois, which has had seven governors arrested for corruption since 1850. At least one is still in

prison for attempting to sell the U.S. Senate seat vacated by President Barack Obama.

New Mexico began its statehood efforts in 1850 and it may have been the closest we got for the next 62 years. President Zachary Taylor wanted to make us a state but he died after only 16 months in office.

New Mexico's governors were appointed by presidents until 1912. A few of those may have landed in jail for falling under the influence of the Santa Fe Ring. Instead the president removed them from office and sent a replacement.

This lawlessness surely was among the reasons it took New Mexico so long to become a state. It settled down some in the late 1800s when Edmund G. Ross became the first New Mexican to be appointed territorial governor.

Ross was a man of principle. He cast the deciding vote against the impeachment of Andrew Johnson in the mid-1860s despite knowing it would cost him reelection to the U.S. Senate. His story was one of John F. Kennedy's profiles in courage.

So New Mexico got off to a bad start with its corruption image, but studies compiled in recent years indicate that we aren't doing so badly in spite the evidence listed above.

I wrote a column several years ago that cited a study showing New Mexico ranking 19 in corruption among the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

John Robertson of the Albuquerque Journal wrote a piece more recently citing a Daily Beast report putting New Mexico at the 45 worst state for public corruption.

An even more recent report lists New Mexico in 39th place in risk for corruption. It looks at what each state is doing to prevent the corruption. It includes factors such as public access to information, executive, legislative and judicial accountability, lobbying disclosure and ethics enforcement agencies.

We did not do well at all, but some states must be even worse. Gov. Susana Martinez tried to fix some of these areas but her House Bill 13 didn't make it out of its first committee this year.

## Blind student completes DACC automotive degree

#### Alderson overcomes challenges with determination

The words "drive" and "vision" are commonly used this time of year to describe recent graduates: "That young man has a quite the vision for his future," or "She has the drive to succeed." In literal terms, one is not usually allowed to drive without his or her vision, but in the case of 47-year-old Clifford Alderson, professional drive is all the vision he needs.

Alderson was the first blind student to earn an Associate of Applied Science in Automotive Technology from Doña Ana Community College when he walked across the stage of the Pam Am Center Thursday, May 9.

A native New Mexican, Alderson said he started losing his vision at the age of 22, and was legally blind by 23.

"I was working for the GM dealership in Albuquerque, in the parts department, and I also did basic tune-ups.

He said that when his eyesight started to deteriorate, he knew he needed to change his life.

"I had a love of cars and wanted to continue on that path,"

Through the assistance of the Lion's Club in Albuquerque, Alderson connected with the New Mexico Commission for the Blind (NMCFB) in Alamogordo, where he received training in independent living skills such as cane travel, cooking, cleaning, laundry, sewing, grocery shopping, plumbing, woodworking, identifying money and multitasking.

With these new skill sets and a renewed sense of indepen-

dence, Alderson pursued a variety of career paths. He volunteered as a baby cuddler at University Hospital in Albuquerque and repaired child car seats. He also trained to become a chaplin.

'But, I couldn't get automotive out of my blood," said Alderson, "It was my passion."

members and received encouragement along the way. He said

he had great encouragement to pursue his preferred career. "My good friend told me not to give up on your dreams," Alderson recalled. "He told me, 'Don't give up on what you like to do. Don't give up on you. I know you can do it.

At age 40, Alderson returned to the NMCFB for additional guidance. His first NMCFB counselor asked him to pinpoint his interests, goals and dreams for his future.

"I finally voiced my passion," Alderson said, "I want to work on automobiles!

His counselor helped him identify a career goal in automotive technology, and Alderson found training at the NASCAR Technical Institute in North Carolina. He moved there at age 42 and also volunteered at the Memory Lane Motorsports and Historical Automotive Museum.

"I was immersed in car history, and I loved my experience," Alderson said. Unfortunately, his dream came to a halt less than a year into his training when the NASCAR Technology Institute had to close its doors. "It had some problems and shut down," Alderson said.

With help once again from his NMCFB counselor, he applied to automotive schools around New Mexico, and was accepted into DACC's Automotive Department at age 43.

When I first met Cliff, I wasn't sure if he was up for the task," said Jose Retana, assistant professor in DACC's Technical & Industrial Studies Division, automotive department. "But, then I spent time with him and learned he was a go-getter and great problem solver. He proved to all of us that vision isn't just optics. Cliff ... has that drive and willingness to learn and succeed.

Alderson is proud of his accomplishments, noting his grade point average is a 3.8, and said his next journey will be entering the work force as an auto mechanic.

"I would tell anyone, disabled or not, to finish their own race. Follow their passion, don't give up, and surround yourself with amazing people," Alderson said.

### Faces of the cattle business

The cattle business today has evolved into several distinct segments. Éach draws certain people whose personality, skill and savvy make them best suited to that segment.

We'll start with the purebred breeders, the architects who design prototypes for the industry. They are academic minded. They steep themselves in statistics, fiddle with and refine genetics in an effort to define subjective traits, objectively. Not unlike ancient mariners drawing and redrawing the constellations in the night sky.

The next segment is the commercial cow/calf operator. They are the bedrock of the industry; the worker on the assembly line. They produce our product, beef, from scratch just as a welder builds a bumper guard, a cook bakes an apple pie and an artist paints a picture. They think in terms of generations (both human and bovine), take the good with the bad and have a loyalty to the land. You rarely hear them say, "I'm just ranchin' to make enough money to buy the car dealership downtown!"

The grower, segment 3, takes calves once they've been weaned and keeps them until they are big enough to go to the feedlot. These grower calves come from a wide variety of sources; farms, ranches, sale barns, dairies, dog pounds, gypos, traders and team ropers. It is a hands-on, intensive, frustrating demanding job. It's equivalent to teaching kindergarten through third grade - lots of babysitting. Economically, it's like

buying used cars and trying to make them

Segment 4 is the feedlot. This is where we take a new car off the showroom floor and turn it into a NASCAR Sprint contender. Today, average daily gain, conversion, genetics, fixed expenses, health problems, purchase price, feed price and sale date are predictable within reason.

However, predicting the market, the sale price 120 days later is like rolling the dice. Those who call themselves cattle feeders could easily be wild-catters in the oil business, prospectors, explorers, crap shooters, test pilots, magicians' assistants, circus acrobats, punt returners or Wall Street speculators. They thrive on risk. If you guaranteed them a 20 percent profit on a truckload of steers, they'd hold out for 25.

And the final segment in our cattle business is the packinghouse, where live cattle are turned into beef. Very little is known about this curious group of men. They sequester themselves in ritualistic confines, not unlike the Dalai Lama or Idi Amin, where they chant and mutter phrases like "yellow sheet," "on the rail," "triple grande no foam latte." To all of us who have provided every animal that enters into their castle-like facility, they are as mysterious as the Vatican. We are only aware of their presence when we see a white puff of smoke and the phone rings - offering less.

## No victory is in sight for the war on drugs Time to reconsider drug policies

"The only justification is always in terms of the existence of innocent victims. In the case of drugs, the major effect of drug prohibition is to multiply the number of innocent victims, not to reduce it."

- Milton Friedman 1991

The prohibition against alcohol took most of 100 years to reach its final stage in the 1930s. Then the society gave up on prohibition and settled for alcohol regulation. A surprising thing happened when the same forces of the society who pushed alcohol prohibition applied

the same prohibition logic to recreational drugs. Sadly, they have gotten the same result from drug prohibition as they did from alcohol prohibition.

When I arrived at college in 1968, even my cow college had people doing illegal drugs. It was common

knowledge that recreational drugs were readily available at "reasonable" prices. Today, at the same college, drugs are still readily available at "reasonable" prices after more than 40 years of the war on drugs.

Many people over the decades looked at the results and recognized the efforts were not effective and did more harm than good. Yet the efforts continue unabated. The sticking point is the principle that society should not allow people to hurt themselves. So we incarcerate millions of American citizens, "for their own good."

Like alcohol prohibition, the drug war has had three results: First, crime organizations have grown large and influential. Second, police enforcement and incarceration has become an industry. Finally, more people take drugs than before. More people started drinking during Prohibition than before. Prohibition made our nation a nation of drinkers. The drug war seems to have increased the number of drug users.

So why not stop the drug war? Two reasons: first, no politician wants to face re-election accused of being soft on drugs. Second, the drug wars are an industry for our government.







said he has seen sales at the flea market ebb and flow with the economy.

As he said, "I've seen good times, bad times" he starts to play the guitar again and by "bad times," he's singing the Led Zepplin song.

Dan Benoit stops to listen while eyeing some of the guitars, and admits to having bought one or two from Lopez over the years. If Lopez is a regular vendor, Benoit – who lives close by – is a regular customer.

"I've been coming here like a million years," Benoit said. "It's a real experience. You can write a book with the characters who are here."

Big Daddy's isn't quite a million years old, but it has been around 31 years, said Frank Sciortino, who first opened the flea market off Three Cross Road, until city officials raised concerns about the traffic.

Rather than fight city hall, Sciortino said he decided to move it to East Mesa in 1986, bringing with the market its signature oversized statues of a lumberjack and a bull, evoking the Paul Bunyan legend, even though the man was from an Albuquerque lumber yard and the bull from a defunct steakhouse.

At first, the move out of town was difficult for some of the regulars, Sciortino admits, but they have come to make enough money to cover the cost of the extra travel. Besides the mammoth figures, Big Daddy's now also hosts a gas station that is open all week, as well as an indoor market Saturday and Sunday.

Walk into Big Daddy's, and a vast array of tables open up with enough stuff to return the light to any bargain-hunter's eye. That's what flea market offers to the buying person; the opportunity to buy something they desire without spending a lot of cash – from unsorted clothing to nice furniture.

Sciortino said that whatever someone needs, they can usually find it at the flea market for a cheap price. He said he knows of people who come to buy antique books and tools at the market. "Whatever interests you," Sciortino said. "If you need to find

"Whatever interests you," Sciortino said. "If you need to find a wheel for your son's toy wagon, you'll find it. You just have to go look."

Benoit said he has tried his hand at selling at the market, but his "newbie" status resulted in him selling stuff too cheaply, only to have it resold for a better price elsewhere in the market.

Newbie buyers also can be easily spotted at the market. Amy Collins of Idaho, who was visiting her grandfather, Jim Collins, said she was happy with the price she paid for her cowboy boots, though she wasn't used to haggling on the price. But the market had her and her sister enjoying themselves looking at jewelry for sale, as well as visiting some setups that resemble small Mexican stores.

At Linda's Cocktails, you can get at large cup of chilled fruit topped with chile and salt. Paola Muñoz said the shop has been selling the fruit cocktails – as well as fruits and vegetables – for 12 years at Big Daddy's.

Sciortino said the flea market used to have more farmers, but as farms consolidated, they went to more wholesale marketing. Big Daddy's still gets some produce from smaller farms.

Even though his sons Leonard and Frank now run the market, Sciortino is an enthusiast of flea markets, noting other urban areas where flea markets are a bigger deal.

But Big Daddy's remains a big deal in Las Cruces. Sciortino said he wishes more people would attend instead of trying their hand at garage sales. The outdoor tables cost only \$8 and the covered table areas \$10, but the sellers will see a lot more people than what they can probably get from people driving by their homes.

To reserve a table at Big Daddy's, call 382-9404 Friday to reserve a table for Saturday or Sunday. The market sets up at 6:30 a.m., but Sciortino said people don't really start arriving until about 8 a.m. The market shuts down usually around 4 p.m.

The only time Big Daddy's hasn't been open on a weekend is when the rain and wind are too extreme.





to test if the network functions – it does – but rather how it works in the real world and how users work with it.

The purpose of NIE 13.2 is to "refine the (Army's) mobile communications network with soldier-driven evaluations of vehicle-based satellite communications systems, smart phones paired with military radios and software and smart energy solutions to power the network and associated gear," Mehney said.

These tests and evaluations are indispensable in strengthening the backbone of the Army's tactical network. So far, the NIEs have been inestimably valuable.

"They've been successful in integrating, developing and validating the Army's tactical network," he said.

"By assessing network capability and providing soldier-driven operational network feed-


back, NIEs have allowed the Army to field its first integrated set of network capability to deploying Brigade Combat Teams and Divisional Headquarter elements. NIEs provide the operational validation for integrated network capability, plus integrated training, techniques and procedures to assist deploying units who receive network capability understanding of how to operationalize and tailor the tactical network for their mission."

WSMR and Fort Bliss were selected as the testing grounds primarily for their massive size and rugged, unforgiving terrain.

"The size of the ranges allows the Army to stretch its communication capability over realistic operational distances that a deployed Brigade Combat Team would find itself in," Mehney said.

"In addition, the terrain – mountain, desert and foliage – allows the Army to test communications gear in a variety of harsh environments with no fixed infrastructure. We are testing the network over roughly the same footprint as the size of the state of Connecticut."

film is the second to be produced and directed by local film-makers Steven Kaeppler and Dustin Richardson.

"The main objective of these films is to capture the bits of history each of these people are willing to share, before they're gone," Kaeppler said. "World War II vets in particular are leaving us by the hundreds every day. These films are for them and for their families, many of whom have never heard these stories before. They're also, for the rest of us, to ensure that we never forget."

The fifth Honor Flight began at 4:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 3, 2012, when 39 WWII and Korean War veterans boarded a bus in the Pan American Center parking lot bound for the El Paso International Airport. They did so with a traditional send-off consisting of a ceremonial arch of swords, courtesy of more than 70 New Mexico State University Air Force ROTC cadets.

From there, they were flown to Washington, D.C., where

From there, they were flown to Washington, D.C., where they spent an entire day visiting the various war and service memorials dedicated to their honor. They returned on Friday, Oct. 5, 2012, where they were met by Junior ROTC cadets from Mayfield High School, who helped them with their luggage and escorted them to their vehicles.


The filmmakers accompanied them on their journey to document the event. All of the interviews were conducted during the course of the trip, in hotel lobbies, banquet rooms and even at the memorials themselves.

In addition to preserving history, according to Kaeppler, the film sets out to document "what a positive benefit it is to the vets who make the trip, both in helping other vets become aware of the program, but also in terms of convincing sponsors to keep these flights in the air."

Because HFSNM is a nonprofit organization, they are constantly seeking sponsors and donors to help them raise funds necessary to fly the veterans to Washington, D.C. Last year, the 39 who made the trip did so absolutely free. This year, the fundraising continues for Honor Flight 6, in order to send more veterans on the trip scheduled for October. The cost per veteran is \$1,000.




Honor Flight honorees visit the Korean War memorial in Washington D.C. in 2012.







### Sports briefs

#### Ag baseball in Seattle

The New Mexico State University baseball team scored four runs in the first two innings of play but lost 6-4 to UTSA at Roadrunner Field in San Antonio, Texas, Sunday, May 12. The Aggies are now 27-24 this season and fall back to .500 in Western Athletic Conference play at 12-12. UTSA jumps NMSU in the WAC standings at 12-11.

"It was difficult to hit the ball out of the ballpark today because of the winds, and I warned the guys about that in batting practice," coach Rocky Ward said. "We had only about two or three ground outs, and the rest were either pop-ups or fly-outs. That is the frustrating part of it. I tip my hat to UTSA as they played well all weekend.

NMSU finished the day out-hitting the Roadrunners 9-7 as each team marked one error. Both teams used four pitchers, while senior right-hander Casey Collins was credited with the loss and falls to 5-5. He allowed three runs in 2.0 innings of work. Senior Evan Mott finished the game working 2.1 innings, striking out four and not allowing a hit.

The Aggies play a three-game series with Seattle University in Seattle to wrap up regular season play. The series starts at 7 p.m. Friday, May 17, and can be heard on the radio in Las Cruces on KSNM-AM 570.

#### Meade breaks record

New Mexico State University junior Zoe Meade finished second in the heptathlon in the 2013 WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships Thursday, May 9, posting a final score of 5,304. This marks the second time she has finished in the top two in the event, as she took first in the 2012 heptathlon. Meade's score is a new all-time school record. The previous record was held by Carrie Wilbourn and stood at 4,862 points.

Senior Deserae Cota also competed in the heptathlon and finished with a score of 3,239.

Meade ranked third going into the long jump on day two of the heptathlon. She posted a jump of 19-00 (5.80m) and earned 789 points ranking second in the event. In the javelin throw, Meade earned 466 points with a throw of 96-06 (29.42m) and finished seventh overall. The 800m was the final event in the heptathlon and Meade finished first with a time of 2:17.65 earning 856 points.

"Zoe (Meade) did a good job and set a school record despite the delay because of the rain," coach Orin Richburg said.

In the long jump, Cota posted a jump of 16-05 (5.02m) and earned 565 points. In the javelin throw, Cota earned 491 points with a throw of 100-11 (30.75m) and finished sixth in the event. In the 800m, she finished with a time of 3:19.19 earning 207 points in the final event.



NMSU will miss Eddie Groth

There are many members of the NM State athletics department family. Some of them get their names in the headlines for better or worse, others are just parts in the big machine.

They keep the stats, run the scoreboard and do other things that are not particularly glamorous but are needed.

Eddie Groth was one of the pieces in the machine, but to leave it at that is giving you the tip of the iceberg. Specifically, Groth was one of the brightest lights in the press box. He had learned a lot about college athletics as the sports information director at New Mexico and at his alma mater, New Mexico Highlands.

He came to NM State as the director of University Communications, basically running public relations for the entire school. He prepped for that job at UNM at a time when one man wrote the news releases on a manual typewriter, and called local TV stations from the road with the scores in an era that looks prehistoric by comparison to the social media of our

modern world

Seeing the yin and yang of college athletics and working with colorful characters such as Norm Ellenberger gave him a wealth of experience and a sense of humor.

He was modest about everything he had achieved and done. A veteran of the Korean War, Groth was a member of the medical corps and was stationed there in the final days of the conflict. That type of job exposes you to the most gruesome aspects of war. Men who serve in these circumstances have a depth of compassion and courage that few of us will ever have to summon.

Yet the real story about Groth is that if he ever had a bad day, his friends never knew it. He would rather laugh and tell stories about the characters he had met in his journey through athletics than linger on some small setback. His job at home men's basketball games was to answer the phone for news outlets that needed the score. It was the sort of job that student interns usually do, but he was happy to be a helper, regardless of the job.

At NMSU, he often served as an adviser to sports information directors who had run out of ideas for the media guide or ways to handle stubborn coaches. They needed a sympathetic ear and had someone to talk to who had seen it all in spades.

He is gone now, cancer took him, but he didn't leave alone. He barely had a moment to himself during his stay the Mesilla Valley Hospice. Staff there tried to shoo away friends so he could get some rest, but he wouldn't have it. He had learned a secret that we all should remember. Life is too sweet not to be enjoyed until the end.

## **Aggies hunt for title**

Injuries hamper NMSU baseball team

Down the stretch we come. Baseball has the honor each year of being the last team to compete in the sports year. It's been another quality year for Aggie baseball and New Mexico State University athletics as a whole. We hope to add to the already garnered 2012-13 WAC Championships in men's basketball, volleyball and men's golf. We play in the WAC Tournament in Grand Prairie, Texas, Wednesday through Sunday, May 22-26, but we first travel to Seattle to complete the regular season.

We are currently in sixth place in the WAC, which is disappointing to some, especially considering the fact that we are the defending WAC regular season champion. We are disappointed as well, but we have also had to fight through several injuries throughout the season. We lost Derek Umphres to a broken wrist (out four weeks), Quinnton Mack to a rib cage strain (out four weeks), Parker Hipp to a stress fracture in his leg (day-to-day), Tim Torsney to an elbow injury (out for year), Kyle Phillips and Bobby Lecount to back problems (day-to-day), Cameron Haskins to a broken wrist (out for year), Chris Bradley to shoulder pain (day to day), Kent Blackstone to a scapula strain (four weeks) and Michael Ormseth to an elbow injury (unknown).

We have been fortunate that these injuries have been spread out over the year, but it has made it difficult to keep any continuity. Every time I get a player back, another one goes down.

We know that our preseason All-America shortstop, Parker Hipp, will have to finish the season in the designated hitter spot, and it is still unknown what Michael Ormseth's status will be. Besides that, we should be back to full strength in time for the tournament. If we can stay healthy and play well, we have as good of a chance as any to win the WAC Tournament and move onto the NCAA Tournament.

The league is so bunched up that we can still finish anywhere from second to eighth, depending on the outcome of the final series of the year. The unique thing about how the conference tournament is formatted this year is there is no advantage to the seeding in the tournament. It is simply a pool-play format that will put the 1-4-5-8 in one pool and the 2-3-6-7 in the other pool. The winners of each pool will play for the WAC Tournament title and the automatic berth.

This doesn't give any advantage to the teams who finish in the top of the league, but it ensures that the teams who move onto the NCAA Tournament will have fresh pitching staffs available to compete for a chance to go to the College World Series.



## Think pro golf is a game?

### The future of TV golf is spelled 'money'

After last year's boring FedEx Cup was mercifully concluded, I got to thinking about blatant commercialism in golf.

OK, I admit it, I'm "old school." The game (football, baseball, golf, whatever) ought to be played for its own sake (and maybe the fans), not for the sake of Madison Avenue. I bristle at "commercial timeouts." I loathe re-naming bowl games. You think the Pulaski Weed-whacker Tulip Bowl would be an improvement?

So when I got the opportunity to interview a heavy-hitter sports marketing type with a leading edge in golf tournament advertising, I jumped. While I was in the media center at the PGA Golf Show recently, I was introduced to Mort Salzberg (not his real name), senior vice-president of the Brash & Brazen Promotions Co. in New York.

Turns out Mort is a distant relative of Bill Veeck, the iconic former owner of the Cleveland Indians during the 1940s, who shamelessly brought in an actual human midget pinchhitter as a freakish trick to boost attendance and force walks. Veeck also inspired outfield fence advertising banners, even on the Green Monster at Fenway.

Just so you know, Brash & Brazen Promotions has (allegedly) been responsible for substituting the halftime "show" for legitimate marching bands at football games, and for getting the Houston Astros baseball field named for the now ignominious Enron Corporation. The park has since been re-named after some of the Enron execs went to jail.

Salzberg says his people have proposed to commish Gary Bettman that the NHL will make a killing with holographic ads on the curved glass at both ends of all NHL arenas. The "interview" with Mr. Salzberg follows. **GolfDoc:** My sources indicated you were an insider in the nefarious world of golf advertising. I'm told that we're looking at some major developments soon, a brave new world in

Mort: No question about it. The opportunities, and the bucks, are there for the taking, if we will just be brash enough to break the bonds of the ho-hum past. Make no mistake, pal, big-time sports, including college and high school sports, is big-time business. Golf has been stuck for way too long in tradition, with a Bobby Jones-era stuffy reluctance to see the commercial reality.

**GolfDoc:** I thought tour golf, as we watch it today, is a business.

**Mort:** Not really. They haven't scratched the surface of commercialism.

**GolfDoc:** Give me some sense of what you mean.

**Mort:** Fine. The future looks like this. You're watching a pro golf tournament on TV. Everything, I mean everything, you see and hear will have some paid sponsor. No more first-tee freebies, by the way. Let me give you a few examples, as I play announcer.

"This instant replay is brought to you by the Hopper – record a gazillion shows.

"This long shot is sponsored by the Lottery – winning is truly a long shot.

"This awesome drive is brought to you by Dodge Ram, good over the long haul.

"And now Smith's club selection is courtesy of Club Med – the right club for you.

"The senior moment you just saw was compliments of, let me think, The Villages. Snooze. "A summary of tour money-leaders is by

NASDAQ – every game has its ups and downs. "A look at the swing in ultra s-l-o-w motion

is sponsored by Motor Vehicle Division.
"Our Silly Season is underwritten by the

"This sudden-death playoff comes to you by

way of McGee's Mortuary."

GolfDoc: Got it. But it seems like the tour already has a lot of commercial distractions: blimps, title sponsors, presenting sponsors, whatever.

Mort: Distractions? You think the billions paid to us by Levitra and Viagra are mere distractions? ED is the best thing to happen to TV. Listen, the middle-aged guys (face it, it's mostly guys, with money) who watch golf are the target audience for this stuff. We didn't invent ED or whatever. The slick ad firm researchers know who watches what, who wants what, who buys what and why. They know you and your spending habits better than you know yourself.

GolfDoc: Some golf fans like tradition. Some of us feel the commercial binge has gone too far. Like when we watch a Sunday final round on TV and there are 40 seconds of golf and three minutes of ads. Some of us like the Masters with only a minute or two of ads every hour.

Mort: The Masters fogeys are Georgia good-ol' boys who don't need to make any money. Look, I'm going to confidentially share this inside poop with you. We've been appointed to re-engineer the entire game of golf, as far as the fan is concerned. Fairways, flags, tee boxes, volunteers, the whole enchilada.

Picture a blimp-view of 18 at Pebble Beach, now with a 300-yard long by 50-foot high imprint of Cialis in the middle. Think No. 12 green at Augusta with "I'm a PC" printed from left to right. Pin flags will be huge, but will have the business logos of smaller advertisers. And tee boxes, wow. All we have now is padded microphones. Verizon and Lexus will be painted on the grass adjoining. Nothing is left to chance. And nothing is free. Not even the majors. How about the Tostitos U.S. Open?

GolfDoc: Sounds like a sellout. Call me old-fashioned, but I think pro golf is already too greedy and commercial. I'm fed up with stuff like the FedEx Cup 'cause it's just a NASCAR Winston Cup, or whatever, copycat move. All it does is promote gambling by bar-flies.

Mort: Well, I'll tell you, like it or not, FedEx

Mort: Well, I'll tell you, like it or not, FedEx has gotten a lot of traction from all the hype. "Editorial" promotion is multiples better than paid advertising, and far more credible. A lot of this stuff is still under wraps and being hashed out in tight-security meetings at Ponte Vedra

Beach. But I can tell you this: One high-ranking tour guy asserted, "We (the tour) have had it with people thinking we're a charity and we should do stuff that's only 'good for the game.' We have a platform, and we're going to push product. And it'll be expensive."

GolfDoc: I notice the 2013 The Players Championship didn't have a title sponsor. What's up?

Mort: See, The Players represents Tim Finchem's stage for the world to see how good the PGA Tour really is. After all, that Pete Dye-designed stadium course was built 30 years ago (and re-vamped to the tune of tens of millions of dollars) expressly as a model for all tour courses so large crowds have a spectator-friendly atmosphere. And it's made for TV. The PGA Tour is the title sponsor. But PwC (accounting/consulting firm Pricewater-houseCoopers) was the major sponsor, playing for hundreds of The First Tee ads. Golf isn't a game; it's entertainment.

**GolfDoc:** What about the Masters and the Open Championship?

Mort: Those are, of course, majors, but the same holds true. I dare say, if the trend continues in big-time sports, including golf, even the majors will have big-bucks sponsors with their names on the marquee. How about the BP Petroleum (they're British) Open Championship? Or heaven forbid the UPS Masters. Commercialization is a tsunami. Get over it. Just like politics, money rules.

**GolfDoc:** Pro golfers shirts, hats and bags have gone the way of NASCAR outfits, so I guess it's only a matter of time before commercialism takes over completely.

I bet caddie bibs will be bright with logos. Mort: Caddies, as we know them, will not be seen much. Oh, they'll carry clubs. But what you'll see on TV will be girls. Plenty of girls. Tell me do they show the athletic trainers during Cowboys games? No. They show the Cowboys cheerleaders. You'll watch girls – and ads.

Census figures put the population of Mesilla at 1,264.





### Who needs Trader Joe's?



I wasn't surprised when Brook Stockberger of the Las Cruces Sun-News posed the question to three commercial Realtors at a recent forum: "When is Trader Joe's coming to Las Cruces?"

He prefaced the question with a comment. Stockberger said he's asked the Trader Joe's question everywhere he

Brook, I'm with you. I hear the same question around town. In fact, I asked it myself when I moved here two years ago from an isolated community in southern Virginia, population 1,200, that would consider itself lucky to be on Trader Joe's 50-year plan.

After previously working just outside Philadelphia and making regular lunch hour runs to Trader's Joe's, I had to downsize my expectations when moving to rural southern Virginia.

So moving the next time – to Las Cruces - was a big step back into urbanity. A Trader Joe's didn't seem like an impossible dream.

I asked around. The standard answer was Las Cruces is too small and has too low a median income to be attractive to the likes of Trader Joe's. So when Stockberger popped the Trader Joe's question at a Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance forum May 7, I listened.

First to respond, Jake Redfearn of NAI 1st Valley Commercial Real Estate jumped in with: "The last time I talked with them, we weren't even on their five year plan."

Being an optimist, I spun his response in a positive direction: At least he talks with them. And they know who

Redfearn followed up with an even more hopeful sounding comment, saying that could change in a minute if the appropriate space becomes available.

Discounting somewhat the median income argument, he said there are a lot of retirees in Sonoma Ranch with cash

El Paso commercial Realtor Bob Ayoub, president of MIMCO Inc., said big-box stores are choosing to move into existing buildings rather than pay to build new. But there aren't that many empty boxes looking for tenants here.

Redfearn said there has been "a lot of interest from a wide array of users" in

His spirit helped add to the positive impression left with the 7,000 marchers who visited WSMR and the Las Cruces region.

Faivre was very happy with the industry response to the hospitality awards this year. He is especially pleased, because some of the winners are known to the CVB, but others are new, which mixes things up a bit and keeps the promotion from becoming predictable.

'What's nice is last year we had to remind people over and over to get their forms in," Faivre said. "This year, we were flooded with responses. I think they saw what we did last year and how we made a big deal about it and really saw it as a great way to reward their employees. We got such a great buy in from our hospitality partners that we're already thinking of ways to make it even better next year."

With the success of the hospitality awards, Faivre is also mindful that the CVB's Ticket To Taste promotion, also launched in conjunction with National Hospitality Week, is in its final

the now-vacant former Las Cruces Kmart store on El Paseo Road, which may be poised for a renaissance

What really hurts when it comes to attracting major retailers is location, Ayoub

It's a distribution issue.

"You're too far away," he said.

More populated areas offer options for retailers to open a larger number of stores.

Redfearn said although retail spending is off slightly, it is the second strongest segment of the local economy, just behind medical. Retail vacancy rates have fallen from 4.6 percent to 4.4 percent and "people are looking," he said.

As tempting as contemplating a Trader Joe's may be, I began to feel guilty about my interest in the topic.

Trader Joe's, both for me and for the community, is just a "want." To be really crass, we Trader Joe's boosters probably are pouting about our city not being big enough or wealthy enough. We may even have a touch of Albuquerque envy.

If we want something a little exotic for the dinner table, we have local options.

More important, we could be doing something constructive by focusing on needs rather than wants - the growth needs of the entire community.

Short-term needs the Realtors cited were Downtown housing for the educated under-35 market, tenants for vacant offices Downtown and elsewhere, continued population growth and more industry, which Steinborn/TCN Commercial Real Estate's Kary Bulsterbaum asserted follows population growth.

Redfearn noted the Downtown vacancy rate is highest and has remained stagnant year after year for a long time.

Bulsterbaum said El Paso recently has had some good wins for its downtown.

The business community has to want the Downtown area to be successful and commit to Downtown," Ayoub said. "Then you've got to commit to market-rate housing

He said El Paso is creating small housing units targeted to young people and demand is outstripping supply

Commenting on El Paso city's and business community's commitment to their downtown he said, "It's our living room and we want people to see it in that light.'

Among measures El Paso has taken to support its downtown are public investment in façade upgrades (which have encouraged property owners to do more with their

interiors), city tax abatements, adoption of the international building code, updating of parking regulations, city tax abatements and waivers of construction fees.

"Cities that are seeing a lot of growth make their downtown areas a high priority. I'm not sure we're making the right factors our top priorities," Bulsterbaum said.


He said he's not sure Las Cruces is doing enough to ensure productive use of federal property and is concerned about the use to which city owned properties will be put.

"You've got to offer incentives for developers to go there," he said of Downtown, urging a higher level of "public accountability, public debate and media scrutiny" about decisions that affect the future of the neighborhood.

We need bigger buy-in to the success of Downtown from our business community at large," Redfearn said

### Water worries continue

#### EBID board reacts to minimal snowpack volume with severe irrigation allotments

"It didn't snow, and that's left us in a bad situation," Chairman James Salopek commented at the Wednesday, May 8, Élephant Butte Irrigation District board of directors meeting.

He was referring to the low reservoir storage and the runoff from a poor mountain snow pack.

EBID hydrology consultant Phil King gave the snow runoff at San Marcial a "negative 41 percent rating - basically a flow of 41 percent less than

San Marcial is the measuring station where the water flows into to Elephant Butte Reservoir.

Federal agencies had forecast a snow runoff of 39 percent. But it didn't snow.

The bad situation the EBID has been left with is that the district is planning a 2013 irrigation allotment of only 3.5 inches, less than an acre-foot.

The normal allotment is 3 acre-feet.

The EBID will have to draw the irrigation water from the already depleted reservoirs. The reservoir storages are: Elephant Butte, 220,490 acre-feet, or 10 percent of average; and Caballo, 10,580 acre-feet, according to state climatologist David DuBois.

But only 170,000 acre-feet will be available after credit water liabilities are met.

The long-range climate forecast calls for

"neutral" conditions.

"It looks like below normal precipitation for May, June and July," DuBois said.

DuBois' campus gauge received a brief shower on Friday, May 10, the first rain since February, or in 80 days.

With the shortage of river water, farmers are considering leaving some fields fallow, al-

though no figures are available

at this planning stage.

Dickie Ogaz in the Hatch area said he is planning to leave 30 or 40 acres fallow this summer.

"It'll rest the land," he said, "and it's too expensive to pump water into the fields."

Buddy Tharp, who farms up and down the Mesilla Valley, said he is leaving 200 acres fallow where he doesn't have wells on his 1,200 acres.

"I've been farming here all my life, and I've never seen irrigation water so low," Tharp said.

Biad Chili Products Co. isn't planning to leave any of the 1,000 acres it owns or leases fallow.

"As low as our wells were last year, we'll be able to pump water as long as our wells last," manager Chris Biad said.

The EBID will deliver water to farmer patrons in June. The order dates are Tuesday, May 28-Friday, June 14. The diversion schedule, as of the May 8 meeting, was Sunday, June 2, Rincon Valley; Thursday, June 6, Mesilla

## **2013 EBID irrigation** season announced

Farm and flat rate irrigators asked to prepare for limited water availability

Due to the extreme drought caused by lack of rainfall and snowmelt accumulation, and in keeping with the recommended 3.5 inch water allotment, Elephant Butte Irrigation District (EBID) announced on Monday, May 13 the following irrigation schedule:

Farm Rate Accounts: All farm accounts that intend to use their 2013 surface water should place orders beginning Tuesday, May 28. The last day to place orders will be June 21. Get water orders in early so EBID can make every attempt to deliver it. Placing an order indicates to EBID the recipient is prepared to receive it. Any transfers of water to accounts must be done before placement of orders to ensure that water is placed in accounts before the time of delivery. At the time of opening, be prepared to take all water allotted and ordered. Irrigation will be shut down when the 3.5 inch allotment has been fulfilled. Additional acres will not be added to the original order. If there is sufficient allotted water in the account, an additional water order must be placed with EBID and delivery will be attempted when and if possible. Because of limitations to the water supply, there will be no second chances to receive allotments, so be prepared to receive it on the scheduled date. Contact EBID Water Records from 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at 524-8003 to place an order.

Flat Rate Accounts: Please note that EBID has scheduled only one day for small tract irrigation (flat rate, less than two acres), Saturday, June 8. The average delivery charge for small tracts is 6 inches. Because of this, there will be only one small tract irrigation for the season. Small tract irrigations will need to be extremely efficient,

and water will be delivered simultaneously with farm irrigations. Farm and flat rate irrigators need to be prepared to irrigate when the water becomes available, or they may be passed up.

#### **Details**

#### To ensure everybody gets their water allotment, **EBID** recommends:

- Make sure ditches are clean
- If on a community ditch, coordinate and schedule with neighbors so that everybody is ready when the water becomes available
- Be ready to take water on short notice. There will be no second chances.
- Be ready to irrigate at night. Flat rate schedule begins at midnight Friday, June 7 and ends midnight Saturday, June 8.
- Don't expect to water on Saturday, whether using individual or community ditches. Shut down for the night and start up again on Sunday.
- Communicate closely with ditchrider, neighbors on ditch and with neighboring community ditches.
- Stay abreast of future developments by visiting the EBID website at www.ebid-nm.



## Where business counts

#### Exploring the value in supporting local businesses

About six years ago, when the economy started showing signs of struggle, my partner and I made a conscious decision to support local businesses whenever possible. We made this decision for a number of reasons.

First, we knew the national chains would be affected minimally by people tightening their budgets, and that our locally owned businesses would be impacted much more as discounts and bargains drove consumer

Second, through many of the charitable organizations I volunteer for, locally owned businesses contribute gift certificates and food to help raise much needed funds.

The third reason is many of the owners of locally owned businesses are people we have personal relationships with. They are our friends and people who give their time or resources to make Las Cruces a better place.

Whenever I talk with individuals about buying local, a common response is they can't purchase what they need at a local business. I understand that and occasionally find myself with the same dilemma. What I suggest is to shop at a locally owned business first, share with the owners what you are looking for, and if you can't purchase your items locally, then purchase what you need at a bigger store. All I ask is to make an effort to explore what our locally owned businesses offer. It's a little investment of time. But, it's well worth it.

The investment you make in supporting a locally owned business comes back into our community in multiple ways. According to a study, "The Economic Impact of Locally

Owned Businesses vs. Chains," there are a total of nine reasons to think local first. I'll cover a few of those reasons and how they relate to our community.

Money Spent Local, Stays Local. Several studies have shown that money spent in a local business stays in the community. For every \$100 spent at a locally owned business, \$45 goes back into the community. For every \$100 spent at a chain store, only \$14 comes back. So, if you spend \$100 at a local hardware or grocery store or restaurant, more money will stay in Las Cruces, supporting one or many jobs and returning the money to our tax base. The other \$86 that leaves our community when you support a chain store is, for the most part, supporting jobs elsewhere.

Local Owners are Local Contributors.

Nonprofits receive an average of 350 percent more support from local business owners than they do from non-locally owned businesses. They also directly inject money into the local economy through payments of wages and benefits to local residents.





# Midsummer music in the Mesilla Valley

Music in the Park concert series begins Memorial Day weekend

For nearly two decades worth of stunning Mesilla Valley summers, Music in the Park has brought the best local and regional acts to Las Cruces' numerous parks.

From jazz and mariachi to country and blues, Music in the Park offers fans young and old something the whole family can enjoy. As always, Music in the Park is a free community event, a perfect way to spend a Sunday evening: Listening to live music surrounded by friends and family as the summer sun dips low in the western sky.

The 2013 Music in the Park series kicks off at 6 p.m. Sunday, May 26, with the annual Mayor's Jazz Festival, featuring jazz from the John Tank Group of Silver City, the Billy Townes Group with Michael Herndon of El Paso and Las Cruces' own New Mexico State University Jazz Quartet.

Music in the Park first came to Las Cruces in 1994, thanks

to the efforts of then-mayor Ruben Smith and Bob Burns.

"When I got out of the service in 1969, I approached the city for a pittance to run concerts at Pioneer Women's Park," Smith said. "I think they gave us \$1,500, but the concept was simple: Let's showcase the musical talent we have in the Las Cruces area in a great Las Cruces setting.

"We did that for several years and then, sometime later,

"We did that for several years and then, sometime later, I found myself in the position of mayor and, at that time, I thought, 'We really need to do this thing first class."

To make it truly a "first-class" event, Smith teamed with Burns, a lifelong musician and critical figure in the Mesilla Valley arts and music community.

Burns, who lived in El Paso, was heavily involved in the musicians' union which, in the 1950s, organized the Music Under the Stars summer program, now held at the Chamizal National Memorial.

"When we moved back to Las Cruces in the late '80s, I thought, 'Gosh, I'm so used to having music under the stars, but I don't want to drive all the way to El Paso every Sunday night," he said.

Thinking on the same page as Smith, Burns said he "approached Ruben (Smith) and said, 'We need a music program on Sunday nights.' He agreed and said, 'Give me a budget.'

"Two weeks later and there it was – Music in the Park," Burns said.

The first-ever Music in the Park – held at the now longgone amphitheater once located on the western end of the NMSU campus – featured the music of the Mayor's Jazz Combo, which both Smith and Burns performed in.

In the 10 years following, Burns worked hard to ensure the Music in the Park series continued to draw from the same growing pool of talented Las Cruces musicians.

"I've been a musician all my life, and I've always known we had some extraordinary musical talent in the area. Going into this, we knew we needed to feature and appreciate all we have here," Smith said. "In the 10 years Bob (Burns) was behind it, we featured all local talent. Of all the things I did as mayor, I think Music in the Park was one of those I was most proud of."

In a break from Music in the Park's humble, local beginnings, the weekly summer concert series now features

artists from not only Las Cruces, but the surrounding areas as well. This year's line-up includes groups from Silver City, El Paso, Albuquerque and even Houston, and draws an average of more than 1,000 people to each concert.

While Music in the Park continues to grow and be loved by attendees of all ages, not all see its expansion as a necessarily good thing.

"When we started, it was all locals. Since they started looking for acts out of town, there's been so many locals that have really arrived and need to be showcased. It's gotten away from the concept it started with," Smith said.

If you plan on attending Music in the Park, the event's promoters have a few suggestions:

- Bring a chair or blanket to sit on
- Bring snacks and plenty of water
- Don't forget the sunscreen
- As per city code, pets are not allowed in parks during events
- No alcoholic beverages are permitted

# Decade of the Dead Arcade

# The best of both worlds

Decade of the Dead Arcade blends the electronic and organic

Just over two months old, Decade of the Dead Arcade – Andrew Martinez, Luke Dumke, Manny Rodriguez and Richard Sifuentes – is combining elements of the disparate worlds of indie and electronic music.

The band came together after the dissolution of Rodriguez's earlier involvement with Del Rey.

"Basically, the three of us – Luke, Manny and I – had wanted to work together for years, but none of us had the time nor the accessibility until Del Rey split up," Martinez said.

"When they finished, Manny was available, we all had time and all wanted to work together. It's been great, working with some of the best musicians I know."

Rodriguez is similarly excited. "I've known Andrew for five years now and – I don't know why – we never had a band." he said.

"We'd jam together for the hell of it, just having fun, but we never took it too seriously. I'm excited to play with these guys – to play with people just as excited about a project as I am.

"In Del Rey, I was kind of the 'front man.' It's new with these guys – I get to step back and just chill and play guitar," he said.

Soon after the three began working together, Sifuentes, who lives in El Paso, joined Decade of the Dead Arcade following "a super nerdy conversation about equipment" between him and Martinez.

"Talking to him, I just kind of knew he'd be a good fit in what we're doing," Martinez said. "I invited him to come play, to get to play with some new musicians."

As fate would have it, the three founding members of Decade of the Dead Arcade had already shared a "strange kind of Craigslist relationship with him," Dumke said, which sounds a lot worse than it is.

"When I first met him, we realized that, some time back, he had bought

a drum set from me over Craigslist," Dumke said.

It didn't stop there. Without their knowing it, a wealth of equipment had already passed between the now-bandmates. Aside from the aforementioned drum set, Martinez had purchased pedals from Sifuentes and, in turn, Sifuentes had sold an organ to Rodriguez.

Together, as Decade of the Dead Arcade, these four musicians are, simply put, "trying to do something different." "What we're doing is merging

"What we're doing is merging electronic and live, organic performance and instrumentation," Dumke said, "but not just going up and pressing 'play.""

Rather, he said, they are using electronic instruments and techniques – including synths, sampling and looping – "to supplement the organic instruments with other sounds and textures."

"Essentially," Martinez said, "we said, 'Let's do something that just isn't being done here.' It's not punk, it's not metal, it's not reggae or blues."

This blending of electronic and live instrumentation has seen an emergence in recent years, with traditionally organic indie acts utilizing digital and electronic sounds and techniques, and vice versa.

"Young people – actually, everyone I know – listens to it, but no one around here is making it," Martinez said.

"It's us trying to approach making music different ways, beyond the traditional guitar, bass and drums, in a way that people turned off from electronic music will kind of come into that realm," Dumke said. "And, in the same way, people from the electronic scene into the indie scene."

One oft-voiced criticism of electronic music as a genre – and one the members of Decade of the Dead Arcade are intent on side-stepping – is that electronic musicians "just press play," as Dumke said.

"You can actually perform on

electronic instruments in the very same way you can with live, traditional instruments," Martinez said.

"It's physical. Playing the keyboards, using the samplers and the velocity pads – all of that – is a lot more engaging and interesting."

Using these electronic elements also frees the group from the usual confines, "leaving it open for a lot more creativity and change during a live performance," Dumke said.

"You can change things up, switch the tempos, styles, sounds – really anything – as you want."

Martinez and Dumke both see the incorporation of electronic elements into a traditional, guitar-bass-drums setup as a way to open their music up.

"We're able to use the electronics in a way that conforms to us, as we play, rather than us having to conform to the electronics and the instruments. We haven't had to sacrifice anything due to electronic limitations," Martinez said.

Rodriguez, whose previous projects used almost entirely organic instruments, said the use of electronics is "definitely new to me.

"I'm learning as I go. It's really forcing me to step my game up, play harder and get more creative," he said.

The coming months will be busy for Decade of the Dead Arcade. The band is already in the early stages of shooting a performance video, collaborating with local filmmakers and friends, and its first show is scheduled for 8 p.m. Thursday, May 23, at The House (Martinez's livingroom venue), playing with Dark Rooms from Dallas.

In June, Martinez said, "it's all about playing shows and getting stronger and more exposed as a band."

Come July, the band plans to be ready to record a "solid EP," and members of the Decade of the Dead Arcade won't need to go far – Dumke operates a professional project studio called The Yard.

# 'More than just a gallery'

### Azure Cherry strives to be a place for all

There exists, in Las Cruces, an entire fluid community of artists and appreciators who, for any number of reasons, don't quite "fit in" at other galleries – either by choice, by style or subject matter or by bureaucracy and stubbornness in the "old-guard" arts community.

In recent years, though, these artists have found a slowly but steadily increasing number of venues to show their work – and another can now count among their ranks. Azure Cherry Gallery and Boutique, 330 E.

Lohman Ave., houses some of the finest work from up-and-coming and veteran artists alike.

The gallery, which opened its doors this past December, is the fruit of the efforts of Deloria Cherry and Joe Azure, Las Cruces resi-

dents, artists and art lovers.
At an event held at the West End Art Depot (WEAD) last year, Cherry and Azure met a number of local artists whose work - and personalities - spoke to them.

"I had always dreamed of a place like this, and we were starting to seriously think about it," Cherry said. "We were at WEAD and met (artists) Mama Cass and Saba and I just said, 'What if we had this space? Would you fill it

'They agreed right away. Three days later, I called everyone to confirm they were still interested, and two weeks after we all met, Azure

Cherry Gallery was open."

The duo's motivation to open the gallery – aside, of course, from having a space filled with beautiful creations - was to give the young, the shy, the unrecognized and the untrained a

place to display their works.
"We felt there was a lot of artists in town that people just weren't seeing," Cherry said. They were considered by some galleries to be 'too young,' or 'too inexperienced' or 'too different,' and we wanted to give them a space to

"Our vision is for this to be a common place for people with the same – and very different - ideas to come and share them," Azure said.

More than just giving these skilled artists a venue to show their work, the owners hope to make Azure Cherry "more than just a gallery."

"Ultimately, we want to work with and within the community," Cherry said. "This can be a place for everyone to come to, whether they want to look, buy or just hang out and feel welcome.

'We don't want the artists to just come hang their work on a wall and leave. We want them to be here, to be comfortable and casual. We'll never turn anyone away. If you're afraid to show your work, or if you've never shown it to anyone before, we want this to be the perfect place to do that."

In addition to simply showing artists' work at the Azure Cherry Gallery, Cherry, Azure and many of their contributing artists have focused their efforts on art therapy - for themselves and for others. An upcoming exhibit, titled "The Secret Show," is dedicated to the process, effects and importance of art therapy, inspired by the artists' experiences surviving sexual assault. The Secret Show is set to open Saturday, June 1.

The show is open to any community members who would like to share their own survival stories through artistic expression of any kind in a safe, welcoming and supportive en-

"We've been doing a lot of art therapy work," Azure said. "We want people in here, happy and working through, getting out and really seeing what's on their minds."

Aside from the "beautiful work" that has passed through the doors of the Azure Cherry Gallery, Cherry said she finds another aspect of her work much more rewarding.

"Since we've started with this journey, we've met some of the most amazing people: artists, writers, singers, photographers - just people," she said.

Pleased with where their chosen path has led them so far, Cherry admits the gallery is and will be an ever-changing, evolving work-

"The last thing we want to do is put it in a box," she said. "We're really trying to figure it out as we go along. When we started, we really didn't know what we were doing. We thought it would be fun, as well as mean something to us and others, and so far we've been right.

In addition to the myriad of artists they've met, Cherry and Azure want to extend a special thanks to the ones who gave them their

"I really have to give tremendous thanks to my father and mother, Jesus and Cherry Serna," Cherry said. "They gave us this space to support the arts community, and their help has gotten us to where we are. It wouldn't be possible without them."

I'm probably not the only desert inhabitant who ran for cover Friday, May 10, when the heavens finally opened up for some much-needed moisture.

I also wasn't the only one who decided to ditch inside Panda Express for lunch, as the restaurant was filled with hungry - and wet - patrons.

Since the restaurant opened its first Las Cruces location in March, a line can usually be seen snaking out the door and, sometimes, around the corner.

It's to be expected, as we poor souls have been living sans Panda for far too

Chicken, beef and shrimp dishes steam the glass and fill the air with a rich scent as they wait to be devoured - which happens extremely quickly, considering the high volume of customers.

Despite the depth of the line, I was in and out of there in no time, as the staff was quick and efficient in their assembly line style of work flow.

During my time there, I saw the cooks present fresh refills for at least four dishes, one of which was the biggest

My server informed me it doesn't last long - neither does my selection of orange chicken, one of the Panda's most popular dishes.

The employees working behind the counter were all friendly faces - no doubt many of them students at the

"At Panda Express, 90 percent of their employees are students," said Kyle Pierson, assistant vice president for auxiliary services at NMSU

According to the Panda's website, there are about 1,500 locations in 42 different states and Puerto Rico, employing about 20,000 people.

The university will benefit from the business as well, as Panda Express agreed to an annual \$25,000 contribution to the general fund.

The privately held Panda Restaurant Group Inc. is currently the largest and fastest-growing Asian restaurant company in the nation.

"It was also important for (Panda Express) to know that this is a community connection as well," Pierson said.

The Panda Express opening was one of several new "faces" seen on University Avenue within the past couple of years, all part of a master plan that has been increasingly gaining momentum to open the walls of student life at NMSU to the Las Cruces community at-large, Pierson said.

Whether enjoying a play or show at the newly opened NMSU Center for the Arts, or taking your kids to a storytelling at Barnes & Noble, you'll find Panda Express is another convenient option Las Cruces can now boast.






# Great, but not 'Gatsby'

# Luhrmann's beautiful adaptation wholly disregards source material

"The Great Gatsby," director Baz Luhrmann's big-budget, big-screen adaptation of F. Scott Fitzgerald's 1925 novel – the bane of seventh-grade English students across the country – is indeed every bit as visually dazzling as you'd expect. It's just not "Gatsby."

The always-anachronistic director of 1996's "Romeo + Juliet" and 2001's "Moulin Rouge" has an eye for theatricality and visual splendor unlike anyone else. In "Gatsby," he unleashes his topsy-turvy, swooping vision to 1920s America, focusing his sights on the Art Deco dazzle and debauchery of the Roaring Twenties and the golden era of U.S. capitalism just preceding the country's worst economic collapse and the Great Depression.

As "Gatsby" opens, Yale graduate, World War I veteran and would-be writer Nick Carraway, played by the perpetually boyish Tobey Maguire – does that guy age? – is confined to a sanitarium, drying out and dealing with some large-scale depression. Unable to get his feelings out, Carraway begins to write down his story at the urging of his doctor.

His narrative takes us back to 1922, as Carraway arrives in New York City from the Midwest, high hopes resting on his new job in the booming bonds market. He rents a small Long Island cottage in the fictional town of West Egg, sandwiched between the luxurious, sprawling estates of the nouveau riche, including the elusive millionaire Jay Gatsby (Leonardo DiCaprio), seen first as a mere visage haunting the windows of his magnificent mansion.

Just across the bay, in the "old money" village of East Egg, Carraway visits his cousin Daisy (Carey Mulligan) and her wealthy, brutish husband Tom Buchanan (Joel Edgerton), a polo pro and college acquaintance of Carraway's.

At his cousin's mansion, Carraway is also introduced to the dark, cynical and oddly attractive golfer Jordan Baker (Elizabeth

Debicki), who soon reveals Tom's secret to Nick: He is carrying on an affair with a married woman in the miserable industrial dumping ground known as the "valley of ashes," directly between West Egg and the bright lights and promise of the city.

Eventually, Carraway is drawn into Tom's world when he accompanies him on what he is told is a lunch at the Yale club, but instead devolves into a drunken, drugged and bizarre party that ends with a domestic dispute between the ever-macho Tom and his mistress.

tween the ever-macho Tom and his mistress.

As the summer of '22 pushes forward,
Carraway eventually attends one of the
extravagant parties thrown by his mysterious
millionaire neighbor. It is there he discovers
that while hundreds upon hundreds attend
his weekly parties, none of the guests – New
York's best, brightest and boldest – have ever
met their host, nor do they know a single
thing about him beyond starry-eyed speculation and extravagant rumor.

As Carraway – and we – soon discover, Gatsby, still somewhat of an enigma, has built his lifestyle, his fortune and most importantly his name, all in the hopes of impressing a lost ex-lover: the one-and-only Daisy Buchanan.

The flip of that ever-turning coin, however, is at the heart of Fitzgerald's story. Gatsby, despite all his wealth, wild parties and important friends, is empty, alone, devoid of an identity beyond his rarely public face and hiding his true feelings – to love and be loved by the one he lost – from everyone but himself.

Fitzgerald's novel, largely ignored upon its release, is viewed today a number of ways: As a scathing indictment of capitalism, an allegory about the downfall of the American dream or a treatise on the breakdown of class differences in the continually changing American experiment.

However, almost none of that makes it onscreen, and Luhrmann is content to let his characters fall in and out of love as they romp about in gorgeous period costumes and locales, where the champagne never stops flowing and there is literally no limit to how much glitter you can dump from the sky.



As he did with both "Romeo + Juliet" and "Moulin Rouge," Luhrmann wields time and place like Jackson Pollock used paint, splattering his celluloid canvases with Art Deco title cards and the latest by rapper Jay-Z – who executive produced the film's score, featuring the likes of Lana Del Rey, Andre 3000 and The xx. The score has drawn fire from some but, to me, perfectly matches the glamour and glitz lifestyle and the just-below-the-surface hollowness of the Gatsby's era – as well as our

own – which valued money and prestige over everything.

While nearly 100 years separate "The Great Gatsby's" era and our own, Luhrmann's take on Fitzgerald's classic novel is, as we have come to expect from the director, jaw-dropping beautiful, elegantly, expansively filmed and ever-full of anachronism. It's just not at all true to the novel's complexity, allegory or – first out the window – subtlety. It sure is a gorgeous ride, though.

# Coming of age in a twisted world

# 'Lore' is a serious and sensual drama

There has been some debate over the last few years as to what the citizens of Germany (and, in a different way, the everyday soldier) knew about, or how they participated in the Holocaust.

Reports vary, and denial seems to be rampant at times, especially with the recent news report that more than 42,000 "institutions used for persecution and death" (ranging in size from a handful of prisoners to the enormous death camps such as Auschwitz) existed during World War II, rather than the previously thought 20,000.

This would seem to point out that a lot of people didn't tell the truth over the years.

The outstanding drama "Lore," one of my favorite films of 2012, points in that direction, as we follow the attempts of a young woman and her younger siblings to escape invading allied forces at the end of the European conflict.

Her parents were active members of the National Socialists, with the consequence that she has been brought up with a similar mind set, one that is well rooted, even as the family hurriedly gathers possessions and burns documents prior to their escape attempt. These are not uneducated criminal-type people. Depicted clearly as upper-middle class and a dedicated family, Lore's upbringing has led her to become a member of Hitler Youth, something she has a firm hold upon.

However, things have changed and shortly it becomes clear to Lore that her parents are

not going to be around anymore. Leave she must, and with her brothers and sisters and the few things she can carry, she heads for her grandmother's house, some distance away.

It is not long before Lore is in way over her head, but salvation could be at hand in the form of Thomas, whom she interprets to be a "dirty Jew." She's been indoctrinated well, knowing that the coming allied soldiers will kill, rape, maim and steal everything in their path, and it is not long before Thomas has taken charge of the situation, but not without massive resistance from Lore.

She develops a case of fight or flight while around Thomas, and soon finds that she hasn't much choice but to side with him as they make their way cross country. It reminded me of a more dangerous version of the outstanding Australian film "Walkabout," which was released in the early 1970s.

"Lore" is also a very sensual picture. One

can hear and see what is going on, but at times it is almost as though we can feel and smell the dreadful circumstances that surround Lore, Thomas and the younger children as well.

There is also a subtle but noticeable sexual awakening for Lore. Does she want to punch Thomas or make love to him? It's hard to decide, but by the end of the film, you'll feel like you were punched in the stomach yourself.

Don't miss this one.

#### Southwest home has 1.2 acres of entertainment opportunities

There are several benefits to living in Las Cruces - an ample amount of sunshine, open spaces to stretch your legs and spectacular views of scenic landscapes.

Peter Harben and his wife, Jeanette, found a home that captures all of these benefits - and then some - when they moved their family into the palatal Southwest-style home at 5251 Eagle Pass Road in 2004.

"What attracted us to Las Cruces was the many days of sunshine," said Harben, a geology consultant living in Upstate New York prior to moving to the City of the Crosses. "An advantage to being a geology consultant is that I can live where I want. We bought a house in Las Cruces after we had been here for three years on vacation. We liked to take a break from the Upstate New York weather."

After the couple decided to make their Southwest retreat their permanent home, they looked at houses in the city and found the 4,800-square-foot Eagle Pass Road abode, built in 1994 by builder William Marcus as his family home.

We liked this house for a number of reasons," Harben said.

The couple was first attracted to the area the home was located in – the Cassidy at Sundance subdivision in the Las Alturas region of town.

We also liked the impact the home had when you come in the front door," Harben said.

The home is located on a slight hill, with brick stairs leading from the gravel half-circle driveway to the large front door. Inside, the entrance looks over the majority of the house, peering into the sunken living room, colorful kitchen and sweeping

"We like that the home was broken up into these different areas, but it's still open," Harben said. "You can be in a separate area, but you're still connected."

Saltillo tiles cover the floor, leading throughout the expansive house. The sweeping staircase, painted a shade of brown, offering contrast to the ivory walls, leads to a guest suite, complete with bedroom, bathroom and balcony for gazing over the city and "A"

To the left of the entrance, past a wall of nichos and arches that contain collectibles obtained during various trips, is a large sitting room.

Vigas line the 12-foot ceiling of the living room, and mirror spokes of a wagon wheel, outlining the curved wall of windows overlooking the front of the home. A fireplace with banco is located in the corner of the room.

Near this area is one of four doors to a hacienda-style courtyard, dubbed by Harben as "the kiva room."

Down the hall, double doors with an etched-glass picture of the Organ Mountains above enclose the master suite. Split into two areas, the master bedroom includes a large seating area surrounded by windows and doors to the kiva room and a private courtyard, which features a covered patio, lush grass and mature

Off the bedroom is the master bathroom - a large area decorated in neutral tile with blue flower accents. Composed of two sinks, a jetted bathtub and a snail shower, the master bathroom carries the home's Southwest-architecture theme with curved walls and exposed, protruding vigas.

"It's rustic without being too rough," Harben said.

Back at the entrance is a bedroom tucked behind French doors. Beside it is a hall that weaves past more lit nichos to another bathroom and bedroom. This area also features a walk-in, cedar-lined closet.

At the center of the home, down several stairs, is the living room. A wet bar is located in the area as is a built-in entertainment unit with ample shelving.

In this area is the dining room, which repeats the same partial wagon wheel pattern found in the sitting area, as well as the kitchen

What's nice is that nothing is square," Harben said of the

While the kitchen is decorated in the same neutral color palette found throughout most of the home, it includes a bright redorange accent color along the walls and in the tile work. At the center of the room is a large, asymmetrical island. The unusual shape of the island is repeated in the above tiled skylight.

A breakfast nook for casual dining is attached to the kitchen. Also in this area is access to the laundry room and three-car

garage, strategically placed on the side of the home so as to not take away from the home's façade.

A door leads to the backyard, which features an abundance of covered patio space.

"Outside, there are plenty of entertainment areas that we take advantage of," Harben said. "This home is great for entertaining, but it's not overpowering. It's a warm home, not just a house."




Stairs lead down into a grassy yard. Brightly colored pink and fuchsia roses line the space as flagstone steps lead to a large fountain found at the center of the yard.

"My partner was looking for work, and I was working two jobs. He was staying with his sister at the time, so while she was at work, he started helping with their household chores, mowing the lawn and stuff like that," Bencomo said

"He started thinking, 'Maybe there are others out there that need the same kind of help.'

"That's where the idea came from and we ended up primarily helping elderly people. We have some women that work, you know families and working couples, but mostly now our customers are elderly."

Bencomo said they started with very little equipment.

"We kind of started it with stuff we had around our home. We didn't even have a truck yet. We just started with our household tools and stuff," Bencomo said.

"We have been adding more tools, and we have a truck. We have employees now."

Bencomo said the company does a "little bit of everything."

"We do yard work, we do organizing, windows, any kind of household chore they need help with," she said.

"We don't do any kind of work that requires a license, like plumbing or electrical. We do small stuff that doesn't require too much knowledge."

Bencomo said she and Muñoz are originally from Silver City, and both had been in Las Cruces for about 10 years. A couple of years after moving to the City of the Crosses, they hatched Busy Bees.

"Business picked up right away. It took off really fast," she said.

Bencomo said even though the business has grown, "we work out of our homes, still."

As the business expanded, they were able to form teams to work on the various jobs.

"He has a work team and I have a team," she said. "Generally, he does the 'guy' stuff, like yard work and cleaning, and I do the household cleaning and grocery shopping and stuff like that. Occasionally we team up together if we have a big job. Some of the guys help us with the big cleaning jobs."

Some of the biggest jobs are moving jobs,



Benny Muñoz and Margo Bencomo first formed Busy Bees eight years ago, with only the equipment they had on hand. Today, the business has grown to own a truck and a van, and has several employees.

Bencomo said.

"We'll help them pack and load their trucks. If they are local, we will go and unload their truck also," she said. "Then we unpack them and help them set up their pictures and stuff. We've gone to T or C and Deming, places like that. If they are moving away, we will help them load their trailer or whatever."

Bencomo said they have not had too many requests for "weird" jobs.

"We've had little jobs like changing bulbs or so, not really weird but so small," she said. "We were asked to walk some dogs for a couple leaving, and both dogs were huge. The dogs walked us more than we walked them.

"Someone once asked us to remove a dead animal out of a wall. We turned that down."

Many of Busy Bees' customers are elderly, and need help with everyday chores, Bencomo said

"Some of them call us once a year to do

their windows or whatever," she said. "Some of them we do every two weeks. Some of them call us one time and never call back. It depends on what they need.

"A lot of them know what they want but they don't have the physical ability. They can't get up on ladders or clean up their drier vents and stuff like that."

Being able to handle the little jobs is an advantage for Busy Bees, Bencomo said.

"Most contractors won't do little jobs," she said. "Window guys don't like to come in and sweep the patio. We are able to come in and do a lot of things. Instead of calling three of four different businesses, we can do it all."

Bencomo said the company hopes to continue to grow while staying in Las Cruces.

"Eventually, we would also like to franchise out into different cities. There's a lot of potential anywhere there are retirees, particularly," she said.

# Becoming water wise

# May is National Water Safety Month: How safe are you and your kids?

Water; we couldn't live without it. Nobody knows that better than those of us who make our lives in the desert. Our survival depends on it. Water is, literally, the fountain of life.

Water covers more than 70 percent of the Earth. Fifty to 65 percent of the adult human body is composed of water. And yet, when mishandled, water can also be deadly.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drowning is a leading cause of death among children under the age of 15, ranking second only to automobile accidents. It is estimated that for every child who drowns, another five are hospitalized and another 16 are treated for submersion injuries.

Interestingly enough, 58 percent of all parents do not consider drowning to be a threat to their children.

To help change these statistics, the CDC has joined forces with the Association of Pool & Spa Professionals, the American Red Cross, the World Waterpark Association and the National Recreation & Park Association to promote May as National Water Safety Month in the United States.

Summer is fast approaching, which means water will soon become the main source of entertainment for most families, whether it's at home, the beach, a waterpark or lounging by the pool of a resort or spa. This is even more reason for educating the public about safe, enjoyable aquatic activities.

There are a number of ways one can im-

prove the safety of any swimming environment. According to the National Drowning Prevention Alliance (NDPA), the main factors that affect drowning risk in recreational set-

- Lack of swimming skills: Many adults and children report that they can't swim, but that doesn't seem to deter them from taking the plunge whenever and wherever possible. This is one of the very reasons that drowning ranks fifth among the leading causes of accidental death in the United States.
- Lack of barriers: Pool fencing prevents young children from stumbling into the pool area and the dangers therein. Statistics show that a four-sided isolation fence reduces a child's risk of drowning by 83 percent.
- Lack of adult supervision: Drowning can happen quickly. Anywhere there is water should be supervised at all times, especially when young children are involved.
- Location: Most children ages 1 to 4 who drown do so in a home swimming pool. More than half of fatal drowning accidents among those 15 years and older, on the other hand, occur in natural water settings, such as lakes, rivers or oceans.
- Alcohol misuse: Swimming and drinking is a lethal mix. Alcohol affects balance, coordination and judgment. Among adolescents and adults, alcohol use is involved in up to 70 percent of water recreation-related

Research has found that formal swimming

lessons can reduce the risk of drowning in children age 1 to 4 years. Performing CPR quickly has also been shown to save lives and improve the outcomes of nonfatal drowning victims. The most important element of all, however, is paying attention to those around you, particularly young children, at all times.

Statistics show that 46 percent of drowning victims were in the care of a parent, 32 percent were in the care of a relative or guardian, 5 percent were in the care of a sibling younger than 18 and 10 percent were completely unsupervised at the time of the incident.

Which means, the best prevention, according to everybody from the CDC to the NDPA, is never leave small children unsupervised for any reason around water. Give them 100 percent of your attention and avoid drinking alcohol when in a supervisory capacity. Make no exceptions, not even for:

- Phone calls
- Texting
- Working on a laptop or iPad
- Reading
- Yard work

If having a conversation with someone, keep your eyes focused on young swimmers at all times. It only takes seconds for a fatality to occur, but it can lead to a lifetime of regret.


The best prevention overall is to be water aware and use common sense. Water activities are excellent for keeping cool, having fun and improving mental and physical health. An ounce of prevention, as they say, can go a long way toward ensuring that you and your family have a safe and enjoyable summer.

#### **Details**

#### **Water Awareness Tips**

- Proper supervision: Designate an adult to watch children at all times. Use "touch supervision," and be close enough to reach the child in a moment's notice.
- Use the buddy system: If no lifeguard is available, always swim with a friend when possible. Accidents can happen, as well as unexpected cramps that can debilitate a person without
- Learn to swim: Formal swimming lessons can protect young and old alike, but they are no substitute for constant supervision. Consider swimming lessons another layer of
- Learn CPR: Proper CPR skills can save a life and make the difference to the person's continued health after the incident.
- Avoid alcohol: Avoid drinking before or during water activities and when supervising children. Impairment can lead to mistakes, misjudgments or accidents.
- Use proper safety devices: Don't use air-filled or foam toys, such as water wings, noodles or inner tubes as safety devices. They are not designed to keep swimmers safe and are no substitute for swimming skills.
- Keep kids away from entrapment devices: Pool drains, filters and pipes should be covered when small children are around them, to avoid hair and body parts from becoming stuck.
- Be aware of water hazards: Empty all tubs, buckets, containers and/or wading pools immediately after use. Store them upside down and out of children's reach. Also, keep toilet lids closed and use toilet seat locks.



# Dishes to help you celebrate National Hamburger Month

We don't need to designate a month of the year to celebrate and devour one of America's beloved eats, but May is National Hamburger Month, so if you're looking for an excuse to indulge, this is the month in which to do so.

Two favorite and simple recipes of mine

Two favorite and simple recipes of mine include a grilled patty kneaded with blue cheese crumbles and hot sauce and one grilled with a medley of assorted chile peppers. My preferred seasonings include Mrs. Dash Extra Spicy Seasoning Blend, Lawry's Seasoning Salt and Old Bay. Old Bay is often associated with seafood, but its blend (celery salt, red pepper and black pepper) makes for a tasty burger.

Depending on my mood, I'll top the burger with cheese, tomato, salsa, guacamole and red or white onion. I don't rule out a fried egg topped with a hot green slab.

I rarely turn up my nose at any burger, including the burger recipes I share this week – recipes to consider for the grill Memorial Day weekend.

# One Chile Knights Special

2 pounds ground beef 2 teaspoons garlic, minced 2 fresh jalapeño peppers, seeded and minced

1 small fresh poblano chile pepper, stemmed, seeded and minced

1 habanero pepper, seeded and minced (optional)

1 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes or favorite chile pepper seasoning blend

2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped 1 teaspoon ground cumin Pepper Jack cheese slices

Preheat grill for high heat. In a large bowl, mix together the beef, garlic, jalapeño peppers, poblano pepper, habanero pepper, red pepper flakes, cilantro and cumin. Form into burger patties.

Lightly oil the grill grate. Place burgers on grill, and cook for 5 minutes per side, or until well done. Top each burger with Pepper Jack cheese. Allow the cheese to melt and they're ready to devour. Makes 8 servings.

#### Mushroom Stuffed Burgers with Chipotle BBQ Ketchup

2 tablespoons Olive oil

1 tablespoon butter

1/2 pound mushrooms, cleaned and sliced 1/4 teaspoon

Kosher or coarse salt

1/4 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper

1 tablespoon red wine vinegar

2 pounds extra-lean ground beef

4 large buns

Chipotle BBQ Ketchup (following recipe) 4 large buns split

Heat oil and butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms, kosher salt and pepper. Cook for 3 minutes or until

mushrooms are just tender. Add vinegar. Cook and stir for 2 minutes or until most of liquid has evaporated. Set aside.

Shape beef into 8 thin patties 3 1/2 to 4 inches in diameter. Place 1/4 of the mushroom mixture in center of the patties. Top with remaining patties. Pinch together edges of each double patty, making sure all edges are well-sealed.

Place burgers on the lightly oiled rack of the grill directly over medium heat. Grill for 12 minutes; turn. Brush burgers with 1/4 cup of the Chipotle BBQ Ketchup. Grill 12 to 14 minutes more or until desired doneness. Toast buns on grill, if desired. To serve, place the burgers on the buns. Serve with remaining ketchup. Makes 4 burgers. (Recipe adapted from http://recipe.com.)

Chipotle BBQ Ketchup: 1 cup green onions, chopped 1/4 to 1/2 cup chipotle peppers in adobo sauce

1 jalapeño pepper, stemmed and chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced

1 tablespoon snipped fresh oregano 1/2 teaspoon salt

Combine all ingredients in a food processor bowl, cover and process until thoroughly incorporated. Add 1 cup ketchup, 1/4 cup red wine vinegar and 2 tablespoons olive oil; process until smooth. Makes about 1 2/3 cups.

#### Famed Green Chile Cheeseburger Topped with Fried Egg and Green Chile Sauce

2 pounds ground sirloin 2 teaspoons dried Mexican oregano 1 teaspoon ground cumin 1 teaspoon ground coriander
1 teaspoon salt
About 1/4 cup roasted, stemmed,
peeled and chopped hot Hatch
green chile peppers
About 1/4 cup crumbled queso fresco
or other crumbly Mexican cheese
6 large eggs (for frying)

Preheat grill to medium-high heat. To make the patties, gently mix the ground sirloin, oregano, cumin, coriander and 1 teaspoon salt together. Form into 12 thin patties. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon green chile, and 1 tablespoon queso fresco on 6 of the patties and cover with the remaining patties, pressing the edges to seal well. Cover and refrigerate until ready to grill. In the meantime, prepare Green Chile Sauce.

Grill burgers to desired doneness. Transfer

patties to a serving platter. Cover with tin foil to keep warm. In a large skillet, fry eggs to desired doneness. To serve, top each burger with a fried egg and pass the sassy chile sauce.

Green Chile Sauce:

1 1/2 tablespoon bacon
drippings or shortening

3/4 cup chopped white onion

3 tablespoons flour

1 (14.5-ounce) can diced tomatoes
with jalapeños, undrained

1 (14-ounce) can chicken broth

1 cup roasted, stemmed, peeled and
chopped hot green chile

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon salt

Heat bacon drippings in a large non-stick skillet. Add 3/4 cup onion and cook 3 to 4 minutes, or until softened and transparent. Add flour and whisk about 30 seconds to 1 minute to incorporate. Add the canned tomatoes, chicken broth, 1 cup green chile, garlic powder and 1 teaspoon salt, whisking to combine. Bring to a boil and then lower heat and simmer 2 to 3 minutes, whisking constantly. Reduce heat to keep warm.

# Red Hot and "Saucy" Burgers

2 pounds lean ground beef 1/4 cup onions, finely chopped 2 red chile peppers, seeds removed, finely chopped\*

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground hot red pepper powder
or 1 teaspoon red pepper flakes
1/8 cup freshly parsley, chopped
3 to 4 teaspoons favorite hot sauce
\*Optional: Roast additional red
chile peppers on the grill as
a topper for burgers

In a large mixing bowl, combine together all of the above ingredients. Shape meat mixture into 1/4-pound patties and place onto a tray. Sprinkle additional salt and ground black pepper on top of each patty if desired. Grill them on a hot grill until done.

While they are grilling, roast red chile peppers on the grill until they blister and char. Remove and let cool slightly before stemming and seeding. Chop and serve as a topper for burgers. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

# Firefighters save man from bee attack

# Local heroes honored for their work

Editor's note: This is part one of a 10-story series describing the heroic efforts of local citizens and organizations who were recognized and honored as 2013 Red Cross Real Heroes.

It was a normal hot summer day at work for Las Crucen Craig Benavidez, who has trimmed trees in the area for about 33 years, when an attack by a swarm of Africanized honey bees nearly cost him his life.

It was in the early summer 2012 when Benavidez and his coworkers went to complete a job at the Alameda House.

"I was up about 20 feet, stepped over a branch and saw a couple of bees," Benavidez said. "I thought nothing of it."

Suddenly after cutting a few more branches, in a matter of minutes, the man was covered in thousands of bees.

"All I could think was 'What do I do?' but I knew I couldn't panic," he said. "So I kept my cool and tried to get down out of the tree.'

Rappelling himself down inch by inch for about 15 feet, Benavidez was then stuck by his rope, which was suspended on a higher

Unable to release the rope, Benavidez's coworkers managed to cut it with a chainsaw, freeing him from the tree.

"After that, I only remember bits and pieces," Benavidez said.

The Las Cruces Fire Department crew that arrived found Benavidez unconscious on the ground, with his coworkers injured from the bees as well.

Firefighters James Casteel, Jason Smith, Jose Granados and Kyle Kozlowski sprang into action before they even arrived to save the man's life.

We were wearing all of our firefighting gear before we arrived so our skin would be covered 100 percent," said Smith, the lieutenant on duty. "Our plan was to go in there, do a search and rescue of whoever we could find and pull them to an area where we could use our apparatus and hose line to knock down the

The men first sprayed Benavidez with a CO2 extinguisher and then moved him away from the swarm to spray him with the hose

"We were lucky that we were staffed with four people because we were able to get all of the necessary steps done for a rescue," Smith said. "Two of us pulled out the victims, one was on the hose and the other operating the

Smith said in 11 years he has been a firefighter, he has responded to bee calls before, but none this severe.

After ridding Benavidez of most of the bees from his body, the American Medical Response (AMR) team on site was able to step in and get Benavidez to the hospital in critical but stable condition.

Benavidez said he was in the hospital for five days and had another five days of recovery, but on the fifth day, was back on his feet to climb "the tallest tree in Las Cruces."

"I went to work because I had to and that's what I do," Benavidez said. "I'm a tree surgeon."

Despite a quick recovery time, Benavidez said he is ever-grateful for the efforts of the people who saved his life that day, and went to the station a few months after his recovery to say a heart-felt thank you.

"Those guys are the best guys you'll ever meet," he said. "They even pulled out pictures of their kids to show me."

Smith and the rest of the crew were honored at the annual Red Cross Real Heroes breakfast and received the Emergency Medical award Wednesday, May 8.

"It took the whole system to really be able to help him," Smith said. "It took the dispatch center giving good information, us being fully staffed and the AMR team ready to take him to the hospital to receive good care.'

# Feel the heat, rest the mind

### Hot yoga offers workout, relaxation

"Namaste" was the one unison word spoken at the end of a morning hot yoga session Monday, May 13, at Downtown Desert Yoga, as a polite gesture of gratitude and closure to the class.

The room was about 105 degrees, but after a 90-minute class, the participants seemed a little more at peace with the world than when they came in.

Jane Bloom, a certified yoga instructor, said she was hooked on hot yoga after the first class she took about eight years ago.

"It's a stress relief, and it's the meditative quality that is the biggest draw for me," Bloom said. "It's a chance to get outside yourself and bring a calming, de-stressing feeling to your

The class consists of 26 poses completed twice, with half of those in standing positions and the other on the mat.

The heat in the room is accentuated with a hydroponic fog machine to create humidity, an essential part of the hot yoga. Since the room is humid, intense sweating not only helps detoxify one's body, but helps with other things such as having a healthy circulatory system, thyroid stimulation and sleeping.

Picacho Hills resident Betty Logefiel has

been going to hot yoga classes for the last 14 years, and said she has occasional back problems from being an avid golfer.

"After a yoga class, it just seems to put everything back in place," Logefiel said. "I think because of the yoga I have a pretty straight back, and that makes me look and feel younger."

Logefiel said she plays golf about three times a week, goes to yoga just as often and is going to turn 78 this year.

"I think one of the things that's so good, especially since we live in this dry climate, is to be in the humidity to make your skin feel better," Logefiel said.

Whether someone is having a first-time experience or an expert walking in, Bloom said hot yoga is for everyone.

'I think it's suitable for all levels because the sequences are created in a way that builds upon each other," she said.

An increase in strength, flexibility and balance is only the beginning of benefits seen by hot yoga participants.

There's a point where you move past the heat and are able to focus on connecting your body and your mind," Bloom said. "The heat is such a facilitator in being able to stretch your body in a safe way."

In doing so, Bloom continually referred to the Savasana, or, "the hallmark of any yoga

Also known as the "corpse pose," Savasana is the act of lying flat on the back with palms facing upward and allowing the whole body to

This pose is alternated with other floor exercises in order for the mind to relate to the hard work and balance it with relaxation.

"It's learning to develop and balance that state of mind," Bloom said. "You are always in and out of working and resting, just like in real

Hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver, most commonly caused by a viral infection. There are five main hepatitis viruses, referred to as types A, B, C, D and E. These five types are of greatest concern because of the burden of illness and death they cause and the potential for outbreaks and epidemic spread. In particular, types B and C lead to chronic disease in hundreds of millions of people and, together, are the most common cause of liver cirrhosis and cancer.

Hepatitis A and E are typically caused by ingestion of contaminated food or water. Hepatitis B, C and D usually occur as a result of parenteral contact with infected body fluids. Common modes of transmission for these viruses include receipt of contaminated blood or blood products, invasive medical procedures using contaminated equipment and for hepatitis B transmission from mother to baby at birth, from family member to child and also by sexual contact.


Acute infection may occur with limited or no symptoms, or may include symptoms such as jaundice (yellowing of the skin and eyes), dark urine, extreme fatigue, nausea, vomiting and abdominal pain.

# UNM participates in clinical trial

The University of New Mexico Cancer Center is among a few select institutions nationwide participating in a Phase 3 clinical trial studying a novel treatment for men with newly diagnosed, localized prostate cancer.

In most cases, prostate cancer is detected early and eradicated. However, even with early detection, the cancer returns in up to 30 percent of patients. The trial will study whether combining this innovative treatment with standard radiation therapy will produce an immune response that will kill cancerous cells throughout the body and decrease the likelihood of the tumor ever coming back.

In this study, men receive three injections of an engineered virus directly into the prostate followed by 14 days of oral doses of a medication called valacyclovir. The injection is a viral vehicle – a virus that cannot make more of itself – that delivers a specific gene into the cancer cell. Once inside, the gene converts the valacyclovir into an active form, causing death of the tumor cell. This process also generates a vaccine response against the cancer that can detect and kill microscopic cancer cells wherever they lurk, helping to prevent the cancer from returning.

This clinical trial is designed for men with intermediate-risk localized prostate cancer or for men with some forms of high risk cancer. This novel treatment may help men with more aggressive prostate cancer who need to consider the possibility of the cancer coming back. This treatment may help them decrease the odds of the cancer returning at a later time in their lives.

# Filling in the gaps

# APA, Meunier work to help local animals

When ACTion Program for Animals began in 2009, the organization was designed to help the much needed task of reducing shelter intake.

After a well-timed donation and start of its Pet Food Bank, APA, which started as a coalition, became an organization determined to help people and their animals.

The initial goal was to avoid having pets be surrendered to the shelter because an owner was unable to afford the care the animal need-

"At the time, there were a few no-kill advocates," said APA Volunteer Director Michel Meunier. "(The APA board and I) looked at that list and saw there was a gap in services."

Part of that gap was a lack of services to help animals already in the shelter, as much as assistance after the pets were adopted, Meunier said.

APA worked to bring together several local animal advocacy organizations in the community to collaborate, but found that each was struggling with cost and doing all they could with what they had. It wasn't an ideal situation, and the group effort wasn't successful.

"It was with reluctance that we started the organization," Meunier said.

At first, projects started out small. The Pet Food Bank was its pilot program and a large undertaking but it provided a much-needed service to the community and quickly grew. In addition, APA also started low-cost vaccination clinics and found other ways to assist owners with expenses.

Since 2009, APA has evolved and grown to include several components, including the Second Chance Dogs and Doña Ana Pets Alive!

Second Chance Dogs was undertaken in 2011 by the group to help with animals involved in court cases that were neglected or abused. Second Chance is asked to step in and find these animals a home. Typically, animals involved in these sorts of cases end up in the shelter and are often euthanized.

Doña Ana Pets Alive! is a campaign that helps shelter animals by pulling some out of the shelter and placing the animal in a foster home until it's adopted.

APA's goal is to achieve no-kill status by following the No-Kill Equation, which outlines the 12 steps communities need to take to prevent euthanization due to overpopulation.

tion.
"There are still gaps, and we'd like to start filling them," Meunier said.

Starting at a young age, Meunier discovered she had a desire to help animals.

"I became a vegetarian at 19 and now I'm a vegan," she said. "Besides being an advocate, there's not much you can do to help farm animals. As far as companion animals, I felt there was so much more I could do to help."

There is still a lot the community can do to help APA in its cause. Other than aiding the pet food bank through donations or volunteering, people can help network the adoption of pets, raise money, assist at offsite adoptions, foster pets (adult cats are most in need of foster care) or use personal skills to help APA, including forming a public relations team or coordinating volunteers.

"Behind the scenes is where we need the most help," Meunier said.

Through the APA, Meunier and the founding board members continue their work in the community for animals in need.

"Our mission and vision has evolved," she said. "It use to be 'Helping people and their pets have better lives.' Now, we've evolved to 'Helping people, saving pets."

In 2012, APA rescued more than 400 shelter animals, 50 community animals and 19 Second Chance dogs.

# Four hooves, for hooves

Because horses are actually walking on four digits (their legs each correspond to one of our fingers), the health of their hooves determines strength and soundness.

We have touched on the horseshoe vs. barefoot subject in the past, and discussed how the ideal condition is the unshod hoof. But we must also allow for the support and protection a shoe or boot can add in certain situations.

No matter how your horse's hooves are trimmed or shod, the basic health of the hoof is of primary importance. In the Southwest, our horses are usually standing on dry ground.

Even when we have monsoon rain, the ground absorbs the moisture. We are usually working to add moisture to the hooves and keep them from becoming brittle.

A lot of the condition of the hoof itself is determined by the diet, minerals, fatty acids and fats that help the hoof. A balanced ration based on hay and/or pasture with a free choice salt and mineral supplement (I like Redmond rocks, Himalayan crystal salt or Celtic sea salt) and some herbs, such as dried nettle leaf, kelp and rosehips, will support the cutaneous structure.

To add good oils to the diet,

I use flaxseed meal, black oil sunflower seeds and coconut oil as a supplement in small amounts. Note: Never feed flaxseeds whole, they are gas producing if unprocessed, and gas can equal colic in horses

Always get seeds and herbs from a reliable, untreated source and feed a small amount at first while watching for any reactions. All animals are unique and some can have allergies.

The dried herbs mentioned can be fed year-round and by the teaspoon each day. I feed a big tablespoon of flaxseed meal, a 1/2 cup of black oil sunflower seeds and a level tablespoon of coconut oil once per day per horse when needed. Build up from the original small amount.

Picking (cleaning) hooves is important to keep bacteria and

fungus from taking hold within the bottom/ground surface. While there are a lot of chemical products to prevent and treat infected disorders such as thrush, an effective and non-toxic preventive remedy is to soak the hoof or spray its bottom parts with pure apple cider vinegar at least once daily. Exercise is also essential for healthy hooves.

Horses need access to shade for their health and well-being on all levels, but also for hoof health. Standing in hot sand will pull the moisture from the hoof and can even cause changes in its growth.

A shod hoof heats up even more with a metal shoe attached. Horses in dry sand pens will benefit from having their water tubs over-flowed or dumped for cleaning right where they stand to

This will cause them to stand

in the moisture a few times each day. Even if the top of the sand has dried, there should be some moisture below.

Horses that stand in mud will need extra hoof picking and cider vinegar treatments, and it is wise to make a large area of pea gravel, elevated sand or crusher fines where the horse can stand up out of the excess moisture.

Balance is the key!

#### **Kitty Condo marks** expansion

The Kitty Condo at the Doña Ana County Government Center will celebrate its one-year anniversary at 11 a.m. Wednesday, May 22


