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## Contest asks kids to read

### Martinez pushes summer reading

Gov. Susana Martinez is calling for children to take up a series of reading challenges to help them avoid what educators call the “summer slide,” in which students lose some of their reading proficiency during the long break.

Martinez announced the challenges Friday, May 24, at Branigan Memorial Library, along with members of New Mexico State University athletics. Student athletes will read to kids over the summer as a public service activity.

“Learning to read well at an early age is critical to academic success and, ultimately, to success in the workplace and in life,” Martinez said. “I am incredibly excited by the tremendous community involvement and partnerships that we have developed in creating and launching these reading challenges, and I’m hopeful New Mexico students will read throughout the summer and take advantage of the neat prizes and adventures we have in store for them.”

Three of the reading challenges are new, along with an existing summer reading program in which New Mexico is a partner. In each program, students who read six books will receive prizes, and those who choose to read an additional six books – and in some cases, submit a short write-up – will receive further awards and be eligible to win a grand prize.

After announcing the challenges, Martinez and Education Secretary Hanna Skandera sat on the children’s library floor to read them a book they selected. The book was “If You Give a Pig a Pancake.”

The state Public Education Department’s website, [www.ped.state.nm.us](http://www.ped.state.nm.us), has a full details of the challenges, which includes:

## Council OKs changes to city election rules

### Reporting times adjusted, some contributions limits

The Las Cruces City Council recently approved changes to the rules for elections in an effort to provide limits to contributions and improve transparency about campaign spending.

The next municipal election will be Nov. 5. Up for election are council seats in districts 3 – now held by Olga Pedroza, 5 – now held by Gill Sorg and 6 – now held by Mayor Pro Tem Sharon Thomas, as well as the second municipal judge. Information packets for potential candidates

will be ready in July. The candidate filing day is Sept. 24, with candidates certified Oct. 1.

Picking up on months of work by a task force, city councilors fine-tuned recommendations to strengthen the elections ordinance to address concerns raised in the last election, which included a lack of contribution limits, vagueness in campaigning spending reporting and criticism of how unspent campaign money was later used.

The new ordinance better defines what constitutes a contribution, which includes

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# Officials weigh options to save aging fire truck

## Lizzy to leave Klein Park for checkup

After about 30 years of benign neglect, Lizzy, the decaying 83-year-old fire truck, will be removed from Klein Park Friday, May 31, for some much-needed attention.

Mesquite Street area residents have been rallying around the 1930 La France fire truck after learning city officials had considered scrapping it because it presented liability exposure, should a child get hurt on the rusty metal truck with sharp edges.

At a meeting with concerned residents Wednesday, May 29, Councillor Miguel Silva said there has been a lot of progress made since talks about Lizzy's fate began in March. The city has a new risk manager on staff, Carl Conley, whom Silva said has been helpful in coming up with options for handling the truck. Silva said the city also has committed \$30,000 to the project and staff has received additional training in playground equipment safety.

Conley said there are many considerations causing the liability concerns with keeping the truck in the park. In addition to the Americans with Disabilities Act and general playground safety requirements, there is no shade structure to protect children from hot metal surfaces, he said, nor does it meet requirements for safe surface materials – though no lead has been found in samples of the exterior paint. Also, there are many places on the truck where children could get their heads stuck and protrusions that also can cause injuries.

Besides all those issues, to keep the truck as playground equipment would require that its many sharp edges be repaired and smooth plated, Conley said.

Silva said he recognized the truck got in its current condition because the city neglected to keep it up, but that he will see that its future is better maintained – either by the city or in partnership with a private group.

"That's the reason it's in the condition it's in, but the reason we're here tonight is because we

want to do something about it," Silva told the residents.

- Options for the truck include:
- Bring up playground safety standards while preserving historical value
  - Preserve the historical value, but restrict access with fencing
  - Move Lizzy to a location children won't have free access to it, such as a museum or fire station
  - Transfer Lizzy to the care of a private organization, thereby transferring the liability exposure

Conley said he believed Lizzy's days as playground equipment are over.

"The risk management concern is keeping the little guys from getting on it,"

Silva said now that there are options, the next step is to come up with good cost estimates, which is why Lizzy needs to be taken to a city auto yard for a more thorough assessment. He said the city has been given an estimate of \$8,000 to just to give Lizzy a fresh coat of paint.

David Chavez, a resident active in historic preservation, said his research has shown that the fire truck can be restored for about \$30,000. Once restored, it can be taken to schools and public events for use as an education tool and a symbol of the city, he said.

"It's time to save our historical artifacts," Chavez said. "We've already lost too much."

Conley said that idea could work because children interacting with the truck would be supervised by adults.

Dolores Connor, former city councillor, said Lizzy has generated enough interest with local residents – some with expertise in auto restoration – to have the city work with an organization under a memorandum of agreement to care and manage its use after restoration, perhaps even helping with the restoration to reduce the cost.

Local residents at the meeting said they hated to see Lizzy go, but also recognized that it is a hazard if left as is.

## How to know when you've gone native

One of my favorite things about southern New Mexico is the blend of lifelong residents and those who came from someplace else. We're each able to teach each other things, which makes for a stronger, more interesting community.

How can an outsider determine if you – native or transplant – are a true southern New Mexican? That varies from person to person, but here are a few indicators I've compiled, with a little help from my friends.

### You know you're a southern New Mexican when ...

- The ice in your freezer tastes like green chile because you always have frozen bags of the good stuff in there.
- You have a fondness for the derogatory nicknames in your state (Land of Entrapment, Fanta Se, Alamoghetto, Loose Crosses, Lost Causes, Rio Rat-hole).
- Even the real places have names that sound made up. Sorry, Weed. It's not your fault, Bent. Let's go to (the) Rodeo!
- Even if the only Spanish word you know is "bueno," that's how you answer the phone.
- People ask how you are doing and your response is "Life is Good in Las Cruces."
- You have been ticketed in Mesilla for going two miles over the speed limit.
- You think we have a monsoon season, or at least you've heard rumors of it.
- Snow starts to fall and you race home. Meanwhile, the city shuts down for three days.
- Your biggest natural disaster concern is a drought wiping out all the green chile.
- When people ask you about your favorite restaurants, you recommend them based on one menu item (green enchiladas, Andelé; carne adovada, Las Trancas or Ranchway; chips and salsa, Si Señor or La Posta; tacos, La Nueva Casita Café; green chile, Nellie's; red chile, Roberto's).
- You've stopped asking whether red or green is hotter.
- You have to go through a border checkpoint to get from one town to the next.

- Driving 70 miles for a dinner, a concert, to play golf, or to see friends and family is like going just around the corner.

### Comments encouraged

You, through the federal government, own one third of all the land in New Mexico. But you have less access, less use and less voice than ever before in the way your lands are managed.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) recently declared even more controls on lands in three western counties with more restrictions against job creation, economic growth and people with special needs. In fact, federal land management agencies appear to have a war against the people with disabilities, seniors and cultural activities.

Earl Montoya, 76, a longtime resident of Grant County said, "For roughly 400 years, Hispanics in New Mexico have lived close to the Gila National Forest. The Hispanic elders have not forgotten how the GNF helped many families through hard times. Closing roads in the Gila National Forest will not allow many of these families to get to many of their special camping and hunting locations and will impact the rites of passage."

He explained verbally that when Hispanic families in New Mexico could not afford to go to Disneyland for vacations, they could go to the Gila and build memories. Now, the potential to pass those memories along to the next generations is stopped because access is denied through the infamous Roadless Rule.

Meanwhile, the BLM is doing the same

thing with its 13.4 million surface acres of land in New Mexico. Recently at a town hall with BLM, residents were told they would not be allowed to speak and that only "substantive" comments would be allowed. Substantive is code word for "we don't care if you like it or not, we accept no comments like that. All we are going to allow you to do is read the 500 page report and comment on things in the report."

So Mr. Montoya's comments will not be considered relevant.

I think your opinions matter.

I am asking all citizens, regardless of party affiliation, to come together and take back control of our land. Washington bureaucrats do not own it. You own it, and should have control over and access to it. If you want to object to the process that stops you from speaking publicly, contact the BLM at the address below with your comments by the deadline of July 11. 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
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# Martinez maintains popularity

## Tragedy in Oklahoma brings out the best in states, but water fights may douse good-neighbor policies

Gov. Susana Martinez's popularity is still climbing. A recent poll by Survey USA shows her at 66 percent popularity. The polling group isn't one of the best in the nation, but it seems to show a continued upward trend in the governor's popularity.

It is difficult to pinpoint the source of that popularity.

The state's economy is the only one in the area not to be recovering. More people are leaving the state than arriving. And there seems to be a general acceptance of federal cuts in budget and personnel without much complaining.

Martinez was able to push through the 2013 Legislature a last-minute measure to cut business taxes. Then we were told the numbers on which the measure was sold were faulty. The cuts were supposed to keep businesses from leaving, but so far those businesses have not been identified.

The oil boom in the Hobbs area is the one bright spot in the economy. Virgin Galactic's Spaceship Two will bring us some notoriety when it finally gets off the ground. Richard Branson says that will be Christmas but he has been pushing back the date for five years. And the space travel won't bring in much money right away.

Meanwhile, New Mexico is undergoing what is being called its worst drought in history. Combined with the wind, the conditions seem much like they were in the 1950s.

Preston Jones, a classmate of mine at the University of New Mexico in the late '50s, wrote a play called "House on the Magdalena Flats," in which the villain was the wind that blew throughout the play. The characters all became a little crazy before it ended. The play was depressing but believable for those of us who had lived through the '50s.

The old adage, "Whiskey's fer drinkin'; water's fer fightin'" has seldom been truer. Water users along the Pecos are fight-

ing a priority call for water by Carlsbad, and now Midland, Texas, is pumping just the other side of the state line and draining all of Jal's ground water. Midland city officials say they want to be good neighbors so they will be glad to sell Jal the water it is pumping out from under Jal.

That is pretty typical of the way Texas has treated our state from the beginning. In order for New Mexico to become a state, Texas insisted that it get a 500,000 acre strip of New Mexico's eastern border. Have you ever wondered why New Mexico has a little notch protruding from its Northeastern corner? That is our border with Oklahoma, which didn't demand a piece of New Mexico in order to vote for our statehood.

Many New Mexicans are demonstrating the true meaning of being good neighbors. They are coming to the aid of the residents of Moore, Okla., who lost so much in the recent tornados.

The federal government is running into problems with providing its own help. Funding cuts for the Federal Emergency Management Agency mean there won't be enough money to pay the damage claims without a special appropriation.

Oklahoma's two U.S. senators are complicating the matter by insisting the money to help the citizens of Moore be taken from other federal agencies. It also doesn't help that these senators have voted against all other states that have experienced disasters. The citizens of Moore are going to have to hope other members of Congress are more understanding.

The main complaint the Oklahoma senators seem to have is that there always are some senators who will not vote for disaster relief unless their state gets a goodie in the bill. Evidently Kentucky asparagus growers want a piece of the ac-

tion. And the Virgin Islands are asking for something.

Stew and I were talking about the world we grew up in. A time when family had a much greater influence on children than they do today. Our government officials chose to lie instead of simply blaming the murderers.

Amazingly, as the revelations of their bald-faced lies were exposed, these same overseers of our government called the revelations a political "sideshow." Uncovering bald-faced lies about murdered U.S. diplomats is a side-show? It gets worse.

Last week, there was another astonishing admission. Our own Department of Justice unilaterally decided to seize the phone records of 20, count them, 20 Associated Press journalists. The next day this sweeping suspension of the First Amendment was justified in Stalin-like fashion when Attorney General Eric Holder, with the "full confidence" of Barack Obama, coolly stared into the television news cameras and said freedom of the press has to be suspended in the name of

"protecting America."

Almost simultaneous to the news of the incredible assault on freedom of the press we received word that the Internal Revenue Service, America's most powerful government agency, was fast-tracking tax exempt status to nonprofit groups friendly to the idea that the IRS should have enhanced powers. According to the Inspector General, the IRS did so while also side-tracking the tax exempt status of any nonprofit group that might somehow be planning to assemble and engage in free speech in opposition to the IRS enhancing its own power.

There was a hardly believable sense of indignation on display over the re-election enhancing conduct of IRS officials by Obama. It seems everyone in the administration, including the president, was sincerely sorry that its most powerful agency had thwarted the constitutional rights of tens of thousands of Americans who just happened to be making plans to organize, assemble and engage in freedom of speech in the hopes of convincing people that Obama's ideas on making government even bigger and more intrusive were wrong-headed.

We now know millions of Americans are willingly accepting the idea that the exposure of outrageous lies regarding murders is merely a political sideshow. Millions of Americans are also content with allowing our federal government to treat journalists as if they are inconsequential servants of the state with no constitutional rights. And millions of Americans seem impervious to the fact that our federal tax collection agency is not simply collecting taxes, but is also systematically thwarting the freedom of speech every citizen is guaranteed by the Bill of Rights.

My suggestion late last fall that America had entered into a new dark era of economic thought thanks to the tolerance of financial oppression was a gross understatement.

It seems that the time for all Americans to wake up and read George Orwell's, "Animal Farm" is over. The time for intellectual cancer treatment for American society has begun.

God help us.

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# Living in tornado alley

## Oklahomans in our thoughts and prayers

A couple weeks ago, Jaki and I made the trek from New Mexico to Oklahoma City to meet my California-based brother Tim and check in on my mom. Little did we know what an adventure the trip would be.

We should have checked the calendar a bit more closely. If we had done so, we would have recognized that the month of May is the peak season for tornadic activity in central Oklahoma.

Growing up in Oklahoma, we learned quickly that tornadoes were a part of life. Of course, as children we always had the security of the storm cellar in the backyard. After Jaki and I married, our Oklahoma City home had an elaborate underground shelter beneath the floor of our two-car garage. With 18 inches of steel-reinforced concrete and a heavy steel entrance door, our shelter was built to not only protect us from tornadoes, but to also serve as a fallout shelter should our city ever be attacked with nuclear weapons.

Each spring, during the storm season, we became quite popular with the neighbors, at least the ones who knew we had the only storm shelter in the immediate area. One of my biggest fears was that we would be alerted of an imminent tornado, and that more neighbors would show up, seeking shelter, than our bunker could hold, meaning we would have to turn people away, leaving them exposed to the potential storm.

Fortunately, that situation never occurred.

Oklahoma weather can be very fickle. Western humorist Will Rogers was known to have commented on the oft-changing Oklahoma weather, "If you don't like the weather in Oklahoma, just wait a few minutes." His observation was quite accurate.

The weather was fine the first couple of days of our most recent trip. However, on Sunday, May 19, our niece who lives about 20 miles southwest of my mom's apartment, called to let us know that tornadoes had been spotted in her area, and that they were headed directly our way.

We turned on the television, and sure enough, the weather experts warned that the storm was gaining strength and was likely to produce one or more tornadoes, and we were directly in its path.

My brother and I dashed outside and immediately saw the massive, dark wall cloud from which tufts of fluffy cloud pieces could be seen swirling about as they began to form small funnels that would dart toward the ground, then dissipate, only to form again.

The Oklahoma weathermen have become very accurate in their forecasts. With their arsenal of sophisticated Doppler radar systems, coupled with scores of daring storm chasers on the ground throughout the Oklahoma City area, they and the weathermen are able to give plenty of advance warning of dangerous weather conditions. Because of the detailed radar images, viewers can pinpoint the precise path a storm is expected to travel.

My mom's apartment has no storm shelter, so my brother and I hustled Mom and Jaki into the car and we calmly – but quickly – drove out of harm's way about five miles to the south.

Within minutes after our departure, a massive funnel cloud formed over Mom's apartment. The tornado remained in the air for about a mile, and then touched down in all its fury, ripping apart dozens of homes and buildings along its 20-mile path.

Fortunately, this tornado, while quite large, ripped through the mostly open prairie and forest area east of town. Even though there was significant property damage, most people breathed a sigh of relief that the cyclone had missed the densely populated residential areas.

Little did anyone expect the next day would bring an even more powerful storm that would devastate a large area of south Oklahoma City and the city of Moore. A massive EF5 tornado with winds exceeding 200 mph tore through residential and commercial areas. This was the fourth major tornado to hit Moore in the past 14 years.

As we watched the incredible storm on television from the safety of Mom's apartment, a dozen or so miles away, we prayed for the safety of those in the tornado's path.

Within seconds of the storm's passing, first responders were already on the scene, searching for survivors. Early reports estimated that more than 100 people had been killed. Fortunately, those early reports were incorrect, even though the final death toll was 21, including seven children who died when their elementary school suffered a direct hit. Also, it was estimated that more than 13,000 homes and business buildings had been destroyed, as the massive clean up effort began.

A day later, Jaki and I were on the road back to Las Cruces, thankful that our friends and family had escaped the damage, but also concerned for all the people who lost loved ones and much of everything they owned. We were impressed with the sophistication of the weather forecasters and the immediate response of emergency services following the storm.

We were also thankful to live in a part of the country that is virtually immune to such devastating acts of nature. Truly, life is good in Las Cruces.

It's good to be back home.

# A timeless message of giving

## Volunteering or donating can have a huge impact

On March 26, 1944, a little girl with an enormous heart and vision for humanity wrote the following entry in her diary:

"Everyone is born equal; we will all die and shed our earthly glory. Riches, power and fame last for only a few short years. Why do we cling so desperately to these fleeting things? Why can't people who have money more than enough for their own needs give the rest to their fellow human beings?"

This profound realization came from none other than Anne Frank in an essay titled "Give!"

I first learned of this essay in 2003 during a trip to the U.S. Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C., while I was working for an international nonprofit. The entire essay moved me then, especially considering the international community development mission of the organization for which I worked. This message continues to speak volumes today.

Originally, I'd planned to offer information on investing in the future through giving to student scholarships and programs at Doña Ana Community College, but as I reflected on the recent devastation caused by the tornadoes in Oklahoma, the nearly 70-year-old message penned by such an incredible young woman and my own need to make a difference in some small way, I felt it more important to share some broad perspectives on giving.

Whether you wish to make a difference globally, regionally or locally, consider giving through your time, talent and treasure.

The act of volunteering, giving of one's time, can be extremely valuable to organizations. Perhaps you enjoy volunteering for a charity to

help raise additional funds. Maybe you serve on an organization's board by offering your expertise. Giving of one's time and talent often go hand in hand.

Many times, individuals will give their time to an organization by also giving of their talent. For example, DACC has a variety of program-specific advisory boards, from architecture to welding, composed of community volunteers and local industry experts who help guide the development of programs and related curriculum to specifically meet the needs of the local work force and the mission of the college.

Additionally, these individuals may also give of their treasure. This means offering financial support to projects and programs for which one has the most affinity. Recently, a handful of businesses pooled their financial resources to establish a new scholarship for students in DACC's new culinary arts program. ## Scoping meeting set for Joint Land Use Study

The purpose of the meeting is to provide background to the public regarding the ongoing Joint Land Use Study (JLUS) for Fort Bliss, Holloman Air Force Base, White Sands Missile Range and surrounding communities as well as to share findings to date and gather input from residents on local issues, opportunities and priorities.

The southern New Mexico-El Paso region is unique among defense communities because of its size, natural, cultural and recreational resources; growth opportunities; and the value of its military training and testing environment.

The meeting in Doña Ana County will be one of six meetings held across the study area in this phase. Future meetings will be held to present the study's findings and recommendations and to solicit further comments.

The June 6 meeting will include information regarding the JLUS planning process; review of the military, community and agency missions and strategic goals; exploration of major existing conditions findings; and highlights regarding ongoing opportunities for the public to participate. Public input will help to identify additional issues, concerns, or opportunities and assist in setting priorities for the study.

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

# Proposed charter school aims for health care jobs

## Health Sciences Academy still in play

A temporary moratorium on new charter schools may have stalled the application to create a school for students interested in health-related professions, but backers of the Health Sciences Academy in Anthony, N.M., are still pushing to get it open.

At a recent information meeting in Anthony, Lorna Samraj said there is a need to better prepare students for their post-high school studies in order to succeed in their training and future health professions.

According to US News and World Report, 10 of the top 15 jobs in the country are in health sciences, with dentists, registered nurses and pharmacists taking the top three.

"The demand of jobs in the health-care industry is already high and will only become higher," Samraj said.

Graduates in health care-related fields can't be produced fast enough by two- and four-year post-secondary schools, in part because many of the students entering the programs aren't adequately prepared for the rigorous studies, she said. For example, a student interested in becoming a nurse should be taking demanding science and math classes while still in high school, but too often that's not the case, making their college or university studies challenging, she said.

A charter school focused on preparing students for work in health-care fields can help more students succeed in their future

training, as well as make the right decision of what kind health care work fits them, Samraj said. For example, phlebotomy might not be the right profession for someone who can't bear to stick people with long needles. Career exploration will allow students to find out the realities of the work they may be interested in – or specialties they are unaware of, she said. Besides rigorous academic preparation, the charter school would bring in professionals and have the students shadow health-care workers to get a better sense of what they would like to do and what they need to do to get there, she said.

There are other similar charter schools around the country, but Samraj said they are almost all for adults returning to school. The Health Sciences Academy will be for students in grades seven through 12, she said.

Because some charter schools have experienced challenges in handling finances, the Public Education Commission and the Legislature agree to not approve new charter schools in the coming school year. But Samraj said she hopes that will change in the 2014-15 school year, so the proposed school's charter application has been resubmitted to the New Mexico Public Education Department.

Those involved in creating the school have backgrounds in preparing students for higher education and health care.

# NM granted \$500,000 for early college high schools

## Martinez announces Daniels Fund award

Gov. Susana Martinez announced the state has been granted \$500,000 to boost its efforts to create pilot early college high schools across the state.

Martinez said the Daniels Fund, a philanthropic organization that supports education efforts, has agreed to contribute \$525,000 to develop and support additional early college high school programs in New Mexico. The private funding will be combined with \$500,000 in state funds secured during the 2013 legislative session to expand opportunities for New Mexico students to receive college credit and prepare themselves for the state's workforce while attending high school.

Early college high schools are unique partnerships between school districts, business leaders and higher education institutions that allow high school students to earn work-ready associate's degrees while working toward their high school diploma.

"I'm so grateful to the Daniels Fund for their generosity in supporting this innovative approach to education," Martinez said. "We now have more than a million dollars to invest in an education model that's been proven to well-prepare our high school students for New Mexico's workforce or college."

Martinez announced her interest in expanding the early college high school model throughout the state during her state-of-the-state speech earlier this year.

After securing \$500,000 in state funding for the program, she participated in an orientation session at the early college high school in Las Cruces for community leaders and educators

from other parts of New Mexico interested in bringing the program to their communities.

Martinez also commemorated the ground breaking of a second Las Cruces-area early college high school that is specifically geared toward producing graduates who are interested in working in the health care field.

The Arrowhead Park Early College High School in Las Cruces is in its third year of operation without a single student dropout. The school is the result of The Bridge of Southern New Mexico, a partnership with Las Cruces Public Schools and Doña Ana County business leaders. The high school serves over 330 students from around the district.

"When we find an opportunity to replicate best practices that are delivering positive results for students, we should seize it," said Public Education Department Secretary Hanna Skandera. "Through this partnership, not only will students have a chance to earn their degree, but they will also get a head start in understanding what it takes to be successful in college or their chosen career."

Earlier this month, Albuquerque Public Schools announced their effort to join Central New Mexico Community College and local business leaders to open an early college high school in the Albuquerque metro area. The effort received interest from nearly 100 students in the first day after the announcement.

"We believe in student-centered education reform and that's what we see in New Mexico," said Linda Childers, president and CEO of the Daniels Fund.



gifts and fundraisers, but also loans and loan guarantees, as well as contracted agreements.

A campaign's treasurer will be responsible for keeping account of who contributes more than \$25 and all spending of more than \$25. Reports will be filed on the candidate declaration day, a second report 15 days before the election, a third report 30 days after the election and a final report no later than six months after the election. That final report will include whether any leftover money was returned to contributors.

The new ordinance limits contributions to \$2,300 from an individual or political committee. The reports must itemize contributions and expenditures of more than \$250.

What to do with leftover campaign money was one of the items discussed at length by councillors, with the debate on whether candidates should be limited to giving those funds to another city council candidate of their choice. Councillor Greg Smith he would have preferred not allowing contributions to other candidates, but that there weren't enough votes for the proposal.

Unused campaign money also can be given to the city to support municipal election costs or donated to a non-profit organization.

Another point of contention among councillors is the amount for fines for those who don't make filing date deadlines. The new ordinance sets the fine at \$50 a day with a \$1,000 maximum fine.

Councillor Miguel Silva said he felt that the fine should have been more, maybe \$100 a day with a \$5,000 maximum, to compel better compliance.

Some on the council want to see limits put on outside groups spending in local elections. These groups will campaign for a councillor without overtly telling people to vote for that candidate.

Mayor Ken Miyagishima said there will be future council work sessions to suggest other changes, including third-party limits that he would like to see.

# NMSU hosts pro tennis

## Harlas to test skills against high-level competition

Southern New Mexico tennis fans will have a unique opportunity to see professional women's tennis when the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Pro Circuit brings the Las Cruces Professional Women's Challenger to the New Mexico State University Tennis Center Sunday, June 2, to Sunday, June 9.

The \$25,000 event begins with qualifying rounds Sunday and Monday, June 2-3, and the main draw Tuesday through Saturday, June 4-8. Singles and doubles finals will be Sunday, June 9. Admission is \$5 daily for the tournament and \$10 during the finals. Children 11 and younger are admitted free. All session passes are available for \$20.

There will also be a pro-am event from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Monday, June 3, open to men and women players at all levels, with a reception following from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Entry fee for the pro-am is \$250. Proceeds from the pro-am tournament will benefit junior tennis in southern New Mexico and the NMSU tennis team.

Players in all categories must register from 3 to 6 p.m. Saturday, June 1, at the NMSU Tennis Center.

Don Hemingway, president of the USTA-Southern New Mexico District said the Las Cruces community has rallied behind the tournament despite its late approval by the USTA.

"We are getting overwhelming support from the community, though most wish that they had known earlier. We have sponsorship from Wells Fargo Bank and the Las Cruces Convention and Visitors Bureau, as well as the Las Cruces Bulletin," he said.

"We have approximately 30 volunteers including some from Alamogordo, Deming and Silver City. There is no paid staff at this tournament."

For Mayfield High School junior Lindsay Harlas, being selected to participate in the qualifying rounds is a unique chance to play against a high level of competition. Harlas recently competed in the New Mexico State high school tournament, where she made it to the singles semifinals before winning the third-place match.

"I am extremely honored that I was chosen to be in this," Harlas said. "It is a really big opportunity for me."

The top finishers in the qualifier advance to

the main draw of the professional tournament.

Harlas, who will compete as an amateur, said she is feeling good about her game after doing well in the state tournament and playing

# Aggie volleyball releases 2013 schedule

## Old adversaries, tournament highlight upcoming campaign

New Mexico State University volleyball coach Mike Jordan announced the 2013 volleyball schedule that features 16 home matches, a home tournament and a trip to Honolulu.

The 2013 season begins with the annual Alumni Match Aug. 24, before the regular season starts Aug. 30 at a tournament hosted by California.

The 16 matches at home are the second most ever played in Las Cruces, and the highest number of matches played in the Pan American Center. There were 17 home matches in 2006, although the majority of those matches were played in the Las Cruces

High School gym.

NMSU warms up for the season with the Annual Alumni Match on Aug. 24 in the Pan Am Center, then immediately heads out on the road playing in two different tournaments. Two of the six teams the Aggies play in those two weeks finished in the top 15 nationally in 2012 according to the AVCA Top 25 Coaches Poll.

The Aggies start with the California Golden Bears Tournament in Berkeley, Calif., Aug. 30-31, with a season-opening match with Nevada, formerly a Western Athletic Conference foe, on Aug. 30. NMSU then plays two matches on

Aug. 31, taking on host team California first. The Golden Bears reached the NCAA Tournament last year, but fell to North Carolina in the first round. The Aggies conclude the tournament against UC Santa Barbara.

NMSU heads to Honolulu Sept. 5-7 for the Rainbow Wahine Tournament. The Aggies open with Hawai'i on Sept. 5, before facing UCLA Sept. 6. Hawai'i finished the 2012 season ranked 11th nationally, while the Bruins finished 13th. The tournament on the islands wraps up with a match against Santa Clara, which is coming off a strong 2012 season after

"I am the underdog coming into this so there is no pressure on me," she said. "The pressure is on all the other people who are used to playing in these tournaments."

"I am just going to go in, keep an open mind, play to the best of my ability and hopefully win."

How good will the competition be in this tournament? Hemingway said the No. 148 (from Slovakia) and No. 180 (from Japan) rated players in the world are entered in the tournament.

"When you consider that the U.S. Open takes the top 128 players, you get an idea of how good this competition is," he said.

Hemingway said he expects the tournament to be an annual event.

The tournament in Las Cruces should provide a boost to the local tennis community, Harlas said.

"It's great for us to have something this big because it means people will start noticing NMSU, and people will start realizing Las Cruces is a city that is good for tennis," she said.

Hemingway said promoters are trying to do outreach to members of the military in the area.

"A number of sponsors indicated they would provide tickets to military personnel," he said.

"Tickets are available and very reasonable for competition at this level," Hemingway said.

"It's certainly going to be a challenging preseason. The front end of the schedule is pretty challenging with quite a few very good teams," Jordan said. "Hopefully we'll play well early and get some quality wins."

NMSU hosts a tournament Sept. 13-14 with Southern Utah, Arkansas-Little Rock and Northern Illinois. Southern Utah is coached by former NMSU assistant Debbie Baker.

"Playing at home the last two weeks of the preseason will be nice of course," Jordan said. "It will give the fans plenty of opportunities to see what to expect heading into league play."

The Aggies take on Utah in a single match Sept. 19, before co-hosting a tournament with UTEP Sept. 20-21. NMSU will host Hampton on Sept. 20 in the Pan Am Center and South Dakota State Sept. 21.

NMSU opens the 2013 WAC season Sept. 28 in Edinburg, Texas, facing Texas-Pan American. The Aggies host Bakersfield in their first WAC match at home Sept. 30, before playing Idaho Oct. 5 and Seattle U Oct. 6 in back-to-back league matches.

The 2013 WAC schedule also features Chicago State, UMKC, Utah Valley and Grand Canyon University, which are all new WAC teams. The 2013 WAC Tournament is set for Nov. 25-28 in Phoenix, Ariz.

"We get UNM (Nov. 30) and UTEP (Nov. 12) at home and later in the year, which is great for both the team and the fans," Jordan said.

"As for conference, I'm not sure any of us really know what to expect at this point. Idaho always has a competitive team, of course, and I know a few of the teams will be improved from last year."

## Too busy for golf lessons? Here's the perfect five-minute solution

It's a well-known fact that golfers only retain 1 or 2 percent of what they're told in a golf lesson – just ask any golf teacher.

So with the help of Father Guido Sarducci (of "Saturday Night Live" TV fame) I came up with the "Five Minute Golf Academy." Everything you need to know about the game of golf can be boiled down to five minutes.

With the five-minute program, you will learn more than you would remember after five years of golf lessons. It costs just \$50, and includes instruction, snacks, practice, graduation photograph and a certificate. The Five Minute Golf Academy (FMGA) is fast-paced, true, but we live in a fast world where things happen with the click of a mouse or an iPhone tweet. Appreciating the fact that the attention spans and memories of golfers are so short, we realized quickly that we needed to tightly package information in a way you can actually use it. No need for long explanations with complicated details, fun stories or extraneous information.

Our Five Minute Golf Academy starts with registration and payment by PayPal; that takes 10 seconds. Immediately we start with our introduction to the game of golf with one short statement: "Don't take it too seriously." Another 10 seconds. And you didn't miss a cell phone text.

Quickly we move into our clinic on the fundamentals of the golf swing, with our FMGA golf pro teeing up one ball and giving a rapid demonstration. Use an overlapping grip, feet shoulder-width apart, bend at the waist, left arm straight, and shift weight from right to left, stay balanced, keep the ball in the middle of your stance, swing with even tempo and keep your head down. All of which takes but 40 seconds.

Easy, right? I mean what's not to like? All you need to know, presented in a very efficient, no-frills manner. We're already one-fifth of the way through golf school.

Now comes practice. Most golfers don't practice very much. They get bored and tired hitting a lot of balls, so we're not about to force anything down your throat. You get to hit two golf balls, one with a driver and one with a 9 iron. Takes only 30 seconds.

For the driver, our teacher says to swing hard in case you hit it. Left on their own, without a hovering instructor, golfers don't get any better after two hours hitting 200 balls anyway. Without a friendly hovering golf pro all they do is so firmly fixate such a bad swing that no teacher can undo it. Struggling with the 9 iron? Keep your head down.

With those two practice swings, our FMGA pro did notice a few false moves and glaring errors, requiring a brief "faults and

fixes" session. Golf is all about faults and fixes; just read any golf magazine, or watch the Golf Channel for a few days to grasp that. Golf gurus in print and on TV don't even need to see your swing -- they can tell you what you're doing wrong and how to correct it by long distance or over the air.

In our case it's even simpler. "Relax. Keep your head down." That's all you need to understand. It's all you're going to remember, anyway. And only 30 seconds gone.

The quickie golf university wouldn't be complete without a rules briefing. The basic thing to grasp about golf rules is keep your ball away from any colored stakes (like red, yellow and white), keep your hands off your ball except on the greens and do what's fair. Simple as that. And etiquette? Don't dress like a slob and shut up. Just 20 seconds. Perfect for your busy life, isn't it?

Oops. Almost forgot, it's time for a break, even though rest is overrated. Break time, 10 seconds. Take a deep breath and down a two-ounce energy shot full of vitamins, minerals and supplements, all listed on the miniature container in print too small to read. It's five hours of energy, but we only have two minutes left in our Five Minute Golf Academy.

No golf program would be complete without a chipping lesson. Turns out that recreational golfers spend most of their wasted shots trying to get the ball up-and-down from just off the green.

The technique of chipping is about as simple as it gets, since it's basically a full swing in miniature. How hard can that be? So the chipping clinic is a short 30 seconds, wrapped up with the best swing thought possible. Keep your head down.

As a special feature of the Five Minute Golf Academy, we give you advice on golf clubs and other equipment. We know that having the right clubs is important, so if you're a 25 handicap chop don't carry a 2 iron or a 60 degree lob

wedge. If you're a geezer who barely hits it 180 yards, don't buy stiff shafts. If you can't stop a ball on a dime with a wedge, don't use a ProV1.

So the equipment clinic boils down to one basic suggestion: Ask for club-fitting guidance from a reputable pro shop or retailer and get yourself top-grade, brand-name stuff from a place you can trust. Only 30 seconds.

Perhaps the most difficult course to teach at the Five Minute Golf Academy is playing out of sand bunkers, commonly known as "sand traps." If we were to take a beginner and teach him or her to hit a respectable explosion shot from sand, it would take some 10 hours of tedious instruction, which we (and you) don't have. A lofted sand wedge shot from a greenside sand trap demands that you open your stance, open the clubface, swing with a vertical and descending blow that uses the bottom flange (or bounce) to gather enough sand under the ball that it pops up and out, riding briefly on a shallow layer of sand.

The shortened version is this. Avoid hitting your ball into a sand trap. Once there, putt the ball if you can. Otherwise take a couple of whacks, and if it doesn't come out, throw it out so you don't hold up the folks behind you. There. Thirty seconds.

Now we come to one of the most important parts of the Five Minute Golf Academy: putting.

Most golfers think that putting is a really complicated deal. Teaching pros don't give many putting lessons because golfers aren't interested in the short game. But any pro will tell you that putting is very simple – just line and distance. That's all there is.

Bear in mind that at FMGA we're trying to make learning golf as expeditious as possible, stripping away the extraneous, useless boring details. We know you have a busy life and don't have the time to practice a mundane skill like putting a golf ball. After all, how much can there be to rolling a little ball over 30 feet of grass into a hole?

Here's all you need to know. Keep your head down. Thirty seconds.


You would think that the mental

game would require the most time of any course at the Five Minute Golf Academy. Wrong. Again, we keep it simple.

Having given hundreds of golf performance lessons and clinics, I have come to wonder what anyone actually retains after I'm done. If you took a semester-long course on golf psychology, or if you saw your own personal golf shrink once a week, you'd maybe get two things. One, keep your thinking to a minimum. Two, keep your head down. See? That only took 10 seconds.

By now you're wondering about final exams. Relax. Open book with no essays. Always respecting tolerance and diversity at FMGA, there are no right or wrong answers. Just answer one question: Do you like golf? Good – 10 seconds. Graduation – just ten seconds. Congratulations. We've been thinking about opening a tennis academy. Got an extra minute?

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# NMSU track returns from action in regional round

## Brennan ends storied career as an Aggie

After a rain delay that lasted several hours, the New Mexico State University track and field team completed the second day of the 2013 NCAA Regional Round Friday, May 24, in Austin, Texas.

Senior LaSasha Aldredge and juniors Brianna Cromartie and Alishia Perkins competed in the preliminary round of the 200-meter dash.

Aldredge ran in the second heat and finished fifth with a time of 24.27. Perkins finished the 200-meter dash in the fifth heat with a time of 24.29. Cromartie competed in the sixth heat and finished with a time of 24.36. The Aggie sprinters did not qualify for the semi-final round.

Aldredge and Cromartie also took part in the semi-final round of the 400-meter dash, where Cromartie ran in the second heat and posted a time of 55.67. Aldredge ran in the third heat and finished with a time of 53.55. Neither runners qualified for the final round.

Aldredge ends her career as an Aggie at this year's NCAA Regional Round. She leaves NMSU as the all-time leader in the 400-meter dash and the 4-by-400 relay.

Senior Kelsey Brennan was the final athlete to compete in the regional round for the Aggies Saturday, May 25. Brennan took to the field to compete in javelin and ended with a distance of 146-03 (44.58m), which ranked 22nd out of 48 competitors, but it was not enough to qualify for the NCAA Final Round.

Brennan leaves NMSU as the all-time leader in the javelin with a throw of 157-9 (48.08 meters) that she set at the 2013 WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships May 8. Brennan was also a standout athlete for the NMSU volleyball team.

"Overall, we did well, and a meet of this caliber really gives great experience on what it takes to compete at this level," coach Christopher Huff said.

### High school spring sports garner trophies

At its Tuesday, May 21, meeting, the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education honored 2013 District 5-A state champions in softball, golf, track and field and tennis from Las Cruces, Mayfield and Oñate high schools.

- The LCPS spring sports state champs are:
- **Mayfield High School girls' doubles tennis team state champions are Brooke Coffeen and Kelli Duran.** Coffeen and Duran posted a 13-0 record during district and state tournament play to win the championship. The team defeated teams from Carlsbad, Hobbs, Eldorado and Sandia high schools, all in straight sets. Coffeen, who was also part of the 2012 doubles state championship team, is a junior with a 3.93 GPA. Duran is a sophomore with a 3.85 GPA. The MHS girls' tennis coach is Judy Harlas.
- **Mayfield 100-meter girls' track state champion Kacee Ramos.** Ramos, who was Mayfield's senior class president, graduated May 18 in the top 10 percent of her class with a 3.9 GPA. She was also a member of the National Honor Society and was named Army scholar athlete of the year. Ramos plans to attend the University of Incarnate Word in San Antonio, Texas, this fall, where she will study rehabilitative science and athletic training. She plans to pursue a doctorate in physical therapy. Her father is Camino Real Middle School Principal Ralph Ramos. Mayfield's track coach is Alfred Rue.
- **Oñate High School girls' track triple jump state champion Leiyona Young.** Young set a school record with a jump of 36 feet, 6.5 inches. She is a team captain and has lettered in track for four years. Young graduated May 18 with a 4.15 GPA. She plans to attend Lee College in Baytown, Texas. She has taken many honors and advanced placement classes and has

received four academic letters; and is a member of the National Honor Society. David Nuñez is the OHS track coach.

- **Oñate High School boys' golf team champions.** The team, which finished second at state last year, is composed of sophomore Adam Porras and seniors Brett Bond, Bryan Marshall, Isaac Merry and Marcus Cordova – all of whom graduated May 18. The team had a two-day state tournament total of 627. Oñate's golf coach is Eric Luschei.

He is the only player in the area who has participated in the Junior World Golf Championships every year since he was 10. The LCHS golf coach is Miguel Cruz.
- **Las Cruces High School state softball champions.** The 2013 season for the Bulldawg softball team was a historic one for Las Cruces High School. The Bulldawgs were 12-0 in district play to win the district championship. The Bulldawgs finished the season with a 30-1 record and the school's and the city's first ever softball state championship. Fort Sill Apache Tribal Chairman Jeff Haozous was elected vice president of the Apache Alliance May 10.

Seven of the nine recognized Apache tribes were present at a meeting at the White Mountain Apache Reservation to approve the organization's charter and elected its officers, according to a press release.

"I am honored in the faith that my fellow Apache tribal leaders have placed in me," Haozous said. "I look forward to working with the other board members to achieve our common goals and to address our shared concerns. It's a big step forward for our member tribes."

The alliance will represent all Apache tribes to improve the economies, education and quality of life for each tribe and for the Apache people. Beginning in 2011, the leaders of all of the Apache tribes met regularly to establish the

alliance and to prepare its new charter.

"We have made significant progress this past year in creating this organization and I can't wait to see what the future holds," said newly elected President Ronnie Lupe of the White Mountain Apache Tribe.

The other elected positions to the alliance include: Stanley Montoya, council member, Jicarilla Apache Tribe, as secretary; John Bush, vice chairman, San Carlos Apache Tribe as treasurer; and Levi Pesata, former president, Jicarilla Apache Tribe, as the sergeant at arms.

The Fort Sill Apache Tribe is the successor to the Chiricahua-Warm Springs Apache Tribe. In 1886, they were taken as prisoners of war by the Army and removed from their homelands of southwestern New Mexico and southeastern Arizona to Florida, Alabama and Oklahoma, where they were released. The tribe purchased the property at Akela Flats east of Deming in 1998 and was granted reservation status in November 2011.

## Library gets book sorter

### Automated system to increase capacity

A state-of-the-art automated book sorter designed and manufactured by the 3M Company was unveiled at Thomas Branigan Memorial Library earlier this month, dramatically increasing the capacity of materials the Library can process.

The automated sorter makes Branigan Library the third public library in New Mexico to implement this technology, joining Farmington Public Library and the Albuquerque/Bernalillo County Library System. The automated sorter can process 2,700 items per hour.

"Staff and library customers alike find the sorter to be extremely user friendly," Lynette Schurdevin, library administrator said. "All

they have to do is put the book down on a conveyor belt. The book passes under a scanner which reads the barcode. The sorter checks the book in and directs it to one of three sorting bins – one for books, one for media (movies and music) and a bin for holds or other special needs that the staff will process further."

The touch screen that the patrons see gives on screen help in English or Spanish. Patrons can print receipts of the items they check in for their records.

Branigan Library averages 1,000 to 1,500 books, DVDs, music CDs and other materials that come back every day to be checked in, sorted and shelved.

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## Local semantics

*On second thought ...*

Recently, two very interesting press releases came across my desk. The first was an announcement by the City of Las Cruces, informing us that the city's population has officially surpassed the 100,000 mark as of April 1. Pop the cork on that champagne you've been saving for the occasion.

It is, after all, good news for business-folk, according to both Mayor Ken Miyagishima and Tom Murphy of the Metropolitan Planning Organization. I didn't even know Las Cruces had a Metropolitan Planning Organization, but it sounds official, so let's just take it as writ that this is a good thing.

Miyagishima was quoted as saying, "Las Cruces continues to be the second-largest and one of the fastest growing cities in New Mexico. And, hopefully, surpassing the 100,000 mark will make us even more attractive to businesses and industries interested in locating in cities with larger populations."

Which is interesting considering the City's purported push, of late, to highlight local businesses. The Green Chamber of Commerce regularly reminds people of the importance to our local economy of "shopping local." Our city councilfolk all nod approvingly when they hear it.

All of which might appear to point out a disparity in judgment by our city's governing body. After all, how can the inevitable flood of national franchises be good for the local economy, if they push local businesses out the door?

A good question; except for the fact that the second press release, from Albuquerque public relations firm The Garrity Group, addressed this very disparity with the headline, "New Mexico residents have a new perception of 'local business.'" That's an understatement if the statistics they provide are any indication.

To begin with, residents were asked their preference for shopping at locally-owned stores, statewide. Some 47 percent said they preferred it. Six percent said they preferred shopping at national franchise stores; 41 percent said it didn't matter. One percent didn't know.

Sounds good, huh? Almost half of the people surveyed said shopping local was their preference. Ah, but here's the catch. When those very same residents surveyed were asked, "Which local businesses have you purchased products or services from in the last month?" the responses were surprising.

# NMDOT to rebuild I-10 bridge

## Enchanting art to enhance Las Cruces-Mesilla link

A bridge beautified with art by Karen Yank will connect Las Cruces and Mesilla via Interstate 10 when the next New Mexico Department of Transportation project wraps up in summer 2014.

"We're happy the bridge will be very New Mexico, very Mesilla," said Jerry Harrell, general manager of the Double Eagle restaurant in Mesilla.

The \$10 million bridge replacement is scheduled to begin July 8, according to local NMDOT engineer A.J. Romero.

Villalobos Construction Co. Inc. of Las Cruces will do the reconstruction.

Inconveniences will crop up throughout the construction, but Harrell said he is excited about the project and pleased with NMDOT's efforts to keep the community in the loop.

Construction will bring short-term pain and long-term gain for the merchants, visitors and residents of Mesilla.

### Lane closings ahead

"Traffic will be reduced along Avenida de Mesilla from Hickory Drive to Lakeside Drive to one lane in either direction. I-10 will be reduced to one lane in either direction as they build each bridge," Romero commented by email. "During any ramp closures, traffic will be detoured to either the Motel Boulevard interchange or the University Avenue/Main Street interchange."

Romero said there will be as many as four complete bridge closures during demolition and later to set the beams for the east and west bound bridges.

He said detour information will be announced well in advance and detours will be well marked.

According to NMDOT, the closures will occur during the overnight hours.

"We're very concerned about the Avenida de Mesilla exit closing off Interstate Highway 10," Harrell said. "But we're happy with NMDOT's plans for advising people of alternative routes. They've been very good about planning with us and with the New Mexico Department of Tourism."

Harrell said the planning has been going on for more than a year, and local stakeholders have participated in the process for the past four or five months.

"It's going to be a long year," he said of the actual construction stage. "We're keeping our fingers crossed."

### Art reflects local vibe

Yank, a New Mexico artist with national commissions, said the theme for the new bridge art will be "Gateway to Mesilla."

"I visited with people in the area, went to tourist stops, information centers and museums. I asked a lot of questions and looked in people's yards," Yank said. "They really embrace the Chichihuan Desert plant life, so the majority of the imagery will be from plant life - with a little historic reference."

She said skies and mountains will be seen in the background.

The art will be cast by Fitzgerald Formliners in California under Yank's watchful eye. The

cast images will be embedded in the bridge during construction. Color will be added later, using a new paint-based stain that makes possible the application of "much more painterly color, with yellows, pinks and reds."

She said NMDOT conducted public meetings prior to design to get input. She later presented her ideas at a public meeting and modified the images to reflect public comment.

Yank said the design is more sophisticated and elaborate than one she created for the recently completed Motel Boulevard bridge, which presents a snapshot of southern New Mexico from pre-historic creatures to the spaceport.

### More projects on deck

The Avenida de Mesilla bridge project will get underway just as a \$1.7 million reconstruction of Picacho Avenue is completed.

In November, a \$6 million reconstruction of North Main Street from Chestnut Street to Solano Drive is scheduled to begin.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance improvements will include 5-foot-wide continuous sidewalks on both sides of the street. A new city transit bus pullout will be built on the west side of North Main Street across from the Buy N Fly, Romero said.

Existing lanes will be shrunk to allow bike paths and a 5-foot-wide sidewalk, according to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee.

In 2016, NMDOT is scheduled to rebuild the North Main Street-Solano Drive intersection. Solano will be realigned with Three Crosses Avenue instead of with Spitz Street. There will be extra ponding to accommodate any drainage, new signals, and new lighting. ADA improvements will include new sidewalks and added sidewalk on the free right ramp near the former Country Club.

### Looking ahead

Several additional NMDOT projects are in the planning stages.


Romero said additional redesign of the Interstate 25 and University Avenue interchange is planned, but still in the concept development stage. It has not been scheduled or funded.

Underground facilities to be installed in conjunction with the project will include city gas, sewer, and water systems and a storm sewer system to alleviate any flooding, he said.

Additional bridges slated for rebuilding are those carrying I-10 over the University-Main Street interchange and those carrying I-10 over Union Avenue.

"These bridges will receive new decks and new beams. The eastbound entrance ramp from Main Street to I-10 will receive an acceleration lane to accommodate a speed differential of 40 mph," Romero wrote. "Currently, the existing entrance ramp has a design speed of 25 mph. The speed limit on I-10 is posted at 65 mph."

### Governor celebrates opening of expanded Santa Teresa Port of Entry

Gov. Susana Martinez joined Chihuahua Gov. César Duarte and other government officials Friday, May 24, at a ribbon cutting ceremony to officially open the expanded Santa Teresa Port of Entry. The expansion will help support increased commercial and passenger vehicle crossings at the Port of Entry. With the expansion, the Santa Teresa Borderplex region has significantly enhanced its role as a growing international trade center.

Martinez also welcomed a new metal recycling company, CMP, to the area. CMP is expected to create as many as 15 jobs in Chaparral.

The expansion project, which began in the summer of 2011, doubled the number of primary vehicle inspection lanes and added an additional cargo lane. The \$11.1 million project also enhanced the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol inspection areas. Inspection areas have improved lighting and port security. An on-site dog kennel has also been added at the crossing.

### NMSU College of Business fundraising helps the arts

### NMSU to host strawberry field day at Alcalde agricultural science center

Home gardeners and commercial growers interested in raising strawberries are invited to New Mexico State University's Sustainable Agriculture Science Center at Alcalde to view this year's crop and learn about the variety study being conducted.

The Strawberry Day will be from 9 to 11 a.m. Thursday, June 6. Shengrui Yao, NMSU Extension fruit specialist, will discuss research she is doing regarding strawberry cultivar performances and planting systems. Robert Flynn, Extension agronomist, will talk about the management of soil nutrient and fertility to raise the crop in the soil of Northern New Mexico.

Yao is studying 16 June berry cultivars and two planting systems. This year will be the second harvest of berries. The study, which began in 2011, is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Specialty Crop Block Grant and the Agricultural Development and Promotion Fund from the New Mexico Department of Agriculture.

### New Mexico Realtors address critical housing issues on Capitol Hill

While Realtors from across the country convened in Washington, D.C., last week to attend the Realtors 2013 Midyear Legislative Meetings & Trade Expo, members from the Realtors Association of New Mexico (RANM) met with lawmakers on Capitol Hill to discuss the housing issues critical to New Mexico.

Meetings with New Mexico's congressional delegation focused on important issues impacting the real estate market in New Mexico, including preserving the mission and purpose of the Federal Housing Administration, protecting homeownership tax policies such as the mortgage interest deduction and ensuring that mortgage financing is available and affordable to creditworthy home buyers.

As Congress pursues comprehensive tax reform, Sens. Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich and Reps. Steve Pearce, Ben Ray Lujan and Michelle Lujan-Grisham were urged to continue to support current tax laws for homeownership and real estate investment.

### NMDA seeks comments from NM's farmers, ranchers, food processors

New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) is encouraging farmers, ranchers and food processors across the state to weigh in on two federal food safety proposals that could impact how they do business.

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) is federal legislation being implemented by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). According to the agency, the new law "enables FDA to focus more on preventing food safety problems rather than relying primarily on reacting to problems after they occur."

Because FSMA covers such wide-ranging areas as prevention, inspection, response and imports, the FDA will implement the new law

This is a difference of 40 mph, so we need an acceleration lane that allows traffic to get up to speed so that they don't enter 65 mph traffic at 25 mph. Traffic will be detoured on I-10 as two-way traffic is shifted over to either bridge while the other is being rehabilitated. Traffic below on Union will be shifted over a lane but will maintain a 35 mph speed."

The I-25 bridge over Missouri Avenue will be the last freeway bridge to be replaced in town, according to Romero.

"We're spending a lot of money on Las Cruces," he said.

Project price tags include \$30 million for the I-10/I-25 interchange, \$10 million for the Motel Boulevard and I-10 interchange, \$10 million for the Avenida de Mesilla project, \$6 million for North Main Street and \$4 to \$5 million for the Solano and North Main intersection, he said.

The top three on the list were Walmart, Albertsons and Smiths. What's more, of the top 20 most mentioned "local businesses," only three were actually New Mexico based.

Now, I know what you must be thinking. Are New Mexico residents really that dense? Do they honestly believe that companies based in Bentonville, Ark.; Boise, Idaho; and Salt Lake City, Utah, respectively, could be considered "local"? Sadly, if the numbers are correct, the answer may be yes.

Tom Garrity, president of the Garrity Group, said of this revelation, "This should put owners of local businesses on the notice that they need to build awareness, increase value and not take customers for granted just because they are 'local.'"

I'm not even sure what that means. Is he saying that because real local businesses are being lumped in with the general public's perception of "local" – i.e. because it's here, it must be local – they should be stepping up their game to compete with national franchises? If he is, that's the dumbest thing I've ever heard. Well, next to the revelation that almost 50 percent of New Mexicans

surveyed believe Walmart is a local business.

But Garrity's summation is not really the point. The point is, locally owned means just that: a business that is owned by somebody who lives locally – either in our city or another city within the boundaries of our state.

Ah, but here's the rub: If more people think that any store hanging its shingle in their neighborhood is automatically "local," it means that having a population center that is "more attractive to businesses and industries," as the good mayor would have us believe, really is a good thing. Right?

Just think of all those local businesses that can now come home to roost. It's a good

thing, until the money they make goes out of state. Last week, our newest columnist, Executive Director of the Green Chamber of Commerce Carrie Hamblen, discussed this very topic. If you don't remember, go back and look.

Better yet, let me reiterate part of what she said: For every \$100 spent at locally-owned business, \$45 goes back into the community. For every \$100 spent at a chain store, only \$14 comes back. That's the real difference between "local" and what is perceived as "local." See the problem?

Perhaps a lesson in semantics is in order.



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# Volunteers give from the heart

## CFSNM gala showcases nonprofits, draws attention to those who serve

As a nonprofit itself, the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) allows donors to give to a larger population of nonprofits through the foundation, but giving isn't the only important aspect of the CFSNM. Volunteering moves the Foundation forward.

"As volunteers, we do things that showcase our nonprofits and the foundation," said Ammu Devasthali, secretary of the CFSNM Board of Directors and one of the founders that set up the SpringBoard! Scholarship Program within the foundation in 2004. As volunteers, the board members give of their time and talents to facilitate the foundation's significant work of serving as a vehicle for philanthropy; connecting donors with causes and charities that address the needs of the community.

"It is important that we emphasize what the foundation does in the community. It is important to showcase the nonprofit organizations associated with the foundation and their needs."

The CFSNM manages 38 nonprofit endowments and 150 private endowments, and has become a catalyst for significant community change by enabling people to create and help finance charitable funds that address a wide range of interests. In 2012, the CFSNM acquired and managed permanent assets of \$13,976,000 and total invested assets of \$7,881,000 through 187 endowments, of which 37 are local nonprofits. The CFSNM awarded \$142,800 of endowment earnings to local charities, \$34,800 through designated and unrestricted endowment funds to local charities and more than 47 scholarships totaling \$28,375.42. The CFSNM also granted \$90,375 in grant funds to local nonprofits, held the 20th Annual Estate Planning Institute and funded 34 mammograms for underserved women.

One way the CFSNM showcases the nonprofits and highlights the positive impact they have is through the annual gala, an event that takes hours upon hours of planning and preparation and is held to benefit the 37 nonprofit endowments and CFSNM operating expenses. Devasthali, chair of this year's gala

committee and the two prior committees, has been involved with the CFSNM gala since it started as the Mayor's Ball.

"Because this is the only fundraising we do for the CFSNM, we want it to have a large impact, but we also want to use the gala as an opportunity to increase awareness among the community," Devasthali said.

Other members of the gala committee, who serve with Devasthali on the larger Development Committee within the CFSNM, included current CFSNM directors Karen Bailey, Mandy Leatherwood and Diana Seward and former board members Amy Buesing, Donna Tate and CaraLyn Banks.

Banks, a former board president, has been a CFSNM board member and volunteer for the past five years.

"As a volunteer, we focus on developing relationships," she said, noting that relationship building is the first step to building funds. "If you don't connect with your donors and provide the information they need, there won't be a relationship."

Along with Devasthali, the 2013 CFSNM Board of Directors include Karen Bailey, president; Jeremy Settles, vice-president; Beth Fant, treasurer; Denten Park, member-at-large; Barrett Brewer; Jennifer Cervantes; Mellow Honek; Mandy Leatherwood; Diana Seward and Richard Williams.

In addition to regular board meetings, each board member spends considerable amount of time on committees, including the executive committee, governance committee, finance and investment committee, audit committee, development committee, marketing and communications committee, Estate Planning Institute committee, grants and scholarship committee and the SpringBoard! committee.

"It is important for me to be a part of something that is teaching sustainability in the future,"

Banks said. "It is exciting to volunteer my time on an organization that is forward thinking and making an impact."

## Thinning the herds

### Drought continues, grassland dwindles, ranchers scale back

As the current drought continues to lock in over southern New Mexico, ranchers are trying to retain their cattle herds, but many have removed all their livestock, according to state and federal agencies.

Steve Wilmeth, who runs Red Angus Crosses on the West Mesa, didn't report any herd numbers but noted: "We're in an extreme drought as with the rest of Doña Ana County. We always cut back according to conditions."

Wilmeth rotates his cattle grazing pastures according to the rains.

"Our grazing is according to good range stewardship," he said. "We rotate the pastures to match the current conditions from the rains they had last year. We all need more moisture."

Tom Mobley, who grazes cattle in the Uvas Valley in northwest Doña Ana County, also reported he is running cattle on forage left by previous rains.

"But it's old grass, and the nutritional value is down," he said.

He is retaining his herd with supplemental feeds that include mixtures of high-energy mineral and protein rations.

Bureau of Land Management range specialist Leticia Lister reported that because of drought conditions, as of April 1, New Mexico ranchers have reduced their herds by 36 percent.

"And if we don't get any summer rains, the removal of cattle from the ranges will probably be much higher," she said. "It's going to take a lot of rain for us to see any significant growth of grass."

Ranchers aren't seeing any green pasture growth, according to County Extension Service livestock agent Teresa Dean. Many ranchers are relying on supplemental feeds such as alfalfa hay, grains, cotton seed and grain pellets. Locally, farmers are conducting their second and third alfalfa cutting, and some ranchers are importing hay from Arizona, Dean said.

"Many ranchers are selling off their cattle, including breeding stock," she said.


Selling is bad news for New Mexico's cattle industry. It takes a few years of investment to rebuild a herd without any income; raising heifers to breeding stages and feeding the calves until they are ready for market.

"They're just waiting for a rain," said Chris Creighton of Horse N Hound Feed N Supply about the ranchers who are keeping feed stores busy buying supplemental feeds to replace green forage.

The supplemental feeds include liquids and cattle cubes with protein and fat for energy, hay, cotton hulls, corn rations and what are known as protein tubs, with molasses for energy, Creighton said.

### 2013 Pride Festival kicks off this weekend

The 2013 Southern New Mexico Pride Festival, taking place at locations across Las Cruces, kicked off Thursday, May 30, with a pride pool party at the Desert Hills Pool.

Southern New Mexico Pride has existed for about 20 years under a number of different names. The first pride event – a small, intimate picnic in the park – took place in 1990, while the group was still known as Las Cruces Pride.

“Originally, it was just a small group of people gathering together at Young Park, fairly typical of early pride celebrations,” said Carrie Hamblen, co-chair of Southern New Mexico Pride.

“It wasn’t intentionally underground, necessarily, but for safety reasons it was passed around quietly as a way to celebrate who we are.”

Since then, the group has grown into a volunteer-run organization that, through cooperation with local community groups, businesspeople and vendors, holds an annual festival following the parade, complete with vendors, food, music and activities.

The festival has grown in leaps and bounds over the years Hamblen has been a part of the organization.

“The first year I was on, we had about 15 vendors and 600 people in attendance. Three years ago, the Pride Festival had around 100 vendors, and an estimated 2,000 people came out to show their support,” she said.

In 2006, in an effort to represent more communities, Las Cruces Pride became Southern New Mexico Pride and, in that same year, moved its home to Pioneer Women’s Park.

“It’s been a wonderful home,” Hamblen said. “It’s a lovely, family-friendly park, and we’ve built a really good relationship with the people who live around it.”

Two years later, in 2008, SNM Pride received the Honored Dignitary-Emerging Leader Award from Albuquerque Pride.

From 7 to 10 p.m. Friday, May 31, SNM Pride will host Drag Bingo at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces, 705 S. Telshor Blvd. The annual event, hosted this year by the one-and-only Bobcat, will feature bingo, prizes and, of course, performances by Mr. and Mrs. Southern New Mexico Pride as well as other drag performers from the area. Tickets are \$10 in advance, \$15 at the door, and are available at Milagro Coffee y Espresso, 1733 E. University Ave., and Spirit Winds, 2260 S. Locust St.

The centerpiece of the Southern New Mexico Pride Festival, the yearly Pride Festival in the Park, kicks off at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 1, at Pioneer Women’s Park, 500 W. Las Cruces Ave. Featuring a walking parade, vendors and information booths, food, live music and entertainment, speakers, activities, a pet blessing and much more, the Pride Festival in the Park is fulfilled way for the whole family to support their local LGBTQ community.

That night, lace up your dancing shoes and

party with Pride at two separate dance parties, open to those both younger and older than 21, at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces.

The 21 and older party will feature DJ Lady Saxon spinning the most-danceable tunes from 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. Tickets are \$10 in advance and \$15 at the door, and are available at Spirit Winds and Milagro.

Those too young to attend that dance are still invited to cut a rug with pride at the 21 and younger dance, from 8 p.m. to midnight, also at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces.

“We’re very proud of the under-21 dance,” Hamblen said. “It provides a safe base for LGBTQ youth.”

No one over the age of 21 will be admitted.

Pride Weekend ends with a song at the LGBTQ Musical Showcase, 3 to 5 p.m. Sunday, June 2, at Peace Lutheran Church, 1701 Missouri Ave. The annual revue will welcome to the stage an array of LGBTQ talent from southern New Mexico, including Randy Granger, Nicole Martinez and Singing Out, Las Cruces’ own LGBTQ 100-member chorus group.

Hamblen said this year’s pride celebration is

especially important given the current political climate and the major strides made by the LGBTQ community in its fight for marriage equality and equal rights.

“Given the national momentum of the last year, this is a really good way to bring the spotlight onto the inequalities the LGBTQ community still faces, and the current, major issue is marriage equality,” she said.

“There are 1,138 federal rights that the LGBTQ community still can’t get access to, including inheritance and Social Security.”

Hamblen said Las Cruces is an exceptional place to be a member of the LGBTQ community, finding a surprising level of support in both the government and the citizenry.

“We have New Mexico State University, the City of Las Cruces, Doña Ana County and the Las Cruces Public Schools, which all offer domestic partner benefits. Every year, you’ll see public officials out here at the pride celebrations. There’s good overall support for the LGBTQ community here,” she said.

“This celebration is open to everyone that believes in equality for all. Support given at this event is support given for equality, and it’s a great time to spend with friends, family and those you love who deserve the same rights shared by everyone else.”

## Classic country alive and kickin'

### Yarbrough Band keeps dance traditions strong

The members of the Yarbrough Band have dedicated themselves to one thing: Keeping the traditions of classic country dance music alive and literally kicking, giving audiences "music that will make them want to set their drink down and kick up the dust."

The group began humbly in 2004, as brother-and-sister Dawson and Jacy Yarbrough joined their father, Jason Yarbrough, in a small cleared area in a saddle shed for family jam sessions.

"We never set out to start playing gigs," Dawson Yarbrough said, "we were just playing for something to do. One day, people started showing up to listen and have fun."

A year after the three picked up their instruments – Dawson the guitar, Jacy the drums and the elder Yarbrough on bass – they got a call about a gig, much to their surprise.

"Our dad was playing with another band and they got a call to play something little, maybe a birthday party, but they couldn't do it," Dawson Yarbrough said.

In their place, Dawson, his sister and their father played their first gig.

"I don't remember what it was, how many people were there, or whether or not we got paid. If we did, though, it was very, very little," he said.

The next year, during the summer of 2006, the slowly emerging Yarbrough Band had five paid gigs out of town and, in Dawson Yarbrough's words, "just started to get bigger and bigger."

The increase in demand led the family

trio to bring in other musicians, bringing the total and current lineup to five. Jacy Yarbrough moved to her favorite instrument, the fiddle, joined by Milagros "Milly" Guillen. Julian Medina took over drumming duties from the Yarbrough

boots scootin'.

Those ready for a two-steppin' good time can catch the Yarbrough Band at the City of Las Cruces' summer concert series, Music in the Park, at 6 p.m. Sunday, June 2, at Young Park, 1905 E. Nevada Ave. As always, the concert series is free and open to the whole family, so cowboys and cowgirls of all ages can come out and enjoy great live music and wonderful summer weather in one of the city's most beautiful parks.

"We're looking forward to playing Music in the Park," Dawson Yarbrough said. "This will be our first time playing, but we've come out to a lot of them before and had a blast."

Yarbrough said he sees Music in the Park as an ideal way to reach fans of live music often overlooked.

"People here love live music, but usually the only place to go to see it is in bars," he said. "This gives us a place where a lot of people can go, and we love playing for everyone. It's going to be a lot of fun."

For the foreseeable future, the Yarbrough Band will keep moving dance-happy crowds around the Southwest, not only with well-known classics but new, original material as well, with Dawson and Jacy Yarbrough writing a batch of songs "along the same lines as those old, Texas tunes," he said.

At the end of the day, for the Yarbrough Band it's all about having fun.

"We've never turned down a dance for money – we love playing music, we love having a good time and we love making people happy," Dawson Yarbrough said.

"We take the songs from old-timers like Ray (Price) and Merle (Haggard) and pep them up a bit, make them great to dance to," he said.

In fact, the Yarbrough Band doesn't play concerts – "we play dances," Dawson Yarbrough said.

"We only play to make people dance and have a good time – this isn't sitting-down concert music."

For fans of classic countrymen including Hank Williams, Buck Owens, Waylon Jennings and Willie Nelson, the Yarbrough Band takes well-known, classic country tunes and adds its own twists, guaranteed to get bodies movin' and

## Life is short, eat dessert first

### Le Rendez-vous Café offers French fare and pastry

Le Rendez-vous Café, 2701 W. Picacho Ave., Suite 1, gives Las Cruces new to French cuisine an easy, non-intimidating introduction, serving a mix of traditional, home-style French food and local favorites.

Five years ago, what was the Big Chair Café was purchased by husband and wife Thierry and Jung-Sook Marceaux. Thierry, a native of France, had previously spent more than 20 years in the hotel and restaurant industry before he and his wife arrived in the Mesilla Valley 28 years ago.

With their arrival and eventual entry into the Las Cruces restaurant scene, the Marceaux brought with them a deep passion for French food, tempered with years spent immersed in various food cultures in their travels around the country and world.

"We try to bring whatever we've experienced in our lives in this country, as well as in France, to Las Cruces," Marceaux said.

The results are impressive. Le Rendez-vous is already well known for its delectable – not to mention beautiful – takes on classic French pastries, which are available not only at the café, but at several restaurants and cafes around town, including International Delights and Café de Mesilla.

There's a lot more than pastries at Le Rendez-vous Café, though. The newly expanded menu and hours – since February, the café offers a dinner service, rather than just breakfast and lunch – open up a world of food unknown to many Las Cruces.

Those a bit put off by the classically haughty French cuisine can find a delicious and easy entrance into this renowned food culture at Le Rendez-vous.

Traditional, home-style French dishes – rather than the haute cuisine that many imagine when they think French food – are all available at great prices and in large portions. An ever-changing daily special means something new is always in store for diners at the café, offering options such as beer burgundy, roasted pork loin, flounder filet with red roasted pepper sauce, chicken Dijon, pot au feu (braised beef, carrots, potatoes, leeks and turnips) and even crawfish etouffee, inspired by Thierry Marceaux's time in New Orleans.

A new addition to the menu, moules frites – mussels in white wine sauce served with French fries – is the only dish of its kind in easily a few hundred miles, and is not to be missed.

The quiche – a French classic and house specialty of Le Rendez-vous Café – changes daily, with choices including broccoli and cheddar, Greek, Provençal, spinach and mushroom and quiche Lorraine with bacon and gruyere cheese in a

buttery, pastry crust.

The permanent menu is just as varied. Sure, you can stop into Le Rendez-vous for an old favorite, but why not try something new? The café serves dishes you won't find anywhere else in town.

Tired of the same old breakfast burrito? Le Rendez-vous serves breakfast options, including lox and cream cheese bagels, pain perdu (French toast), steak and eggs benedict and fresh, three-item omelets with options such as bacon, chorizo, jalapeño, mushroom and avocado, made to order.

The lunch menu has lots of familiar classics – rubeens, ham and cheese sandwiches, cheeseburgers and quesadillas – but it's high time we did something different. Choices such as the French dip, piled high with sliced prime rib and served with au jus demi-glace, the chicken caprese, grilled chicken, fresh mozzarella cheese, tomato and basil, and "le vegetarian," grilled eggplant, red peppers, mozzarella, tomato, black olives and basil, should be enough to easily dissuade you from ordering "the usual."

After you've left your comfort zone and tried one – or several – of Le Rendez-vous' out-of-this-world entrees, make sure you've saved room for dessert. That's where this homey little café really shines.

Fruit tarts, raspberry New York-style cheesecake, red velvet and carrot cakes, cream puffs, coconut mousse – Le Rendez-vous has an array of treats for the discerning sweet tooth, the perfect end – or beginning – to a perfect meal.

Le Rendez-vous café also makes specialty desserts, cakes and pastries for weddings, birthday parties or just about any other occasion made better by a heaping plate of pastries – and what function wouldn't be better off that way?

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# The business of show business

## Tony-winning musical wows Popejoy Hall

Yes, I'm a "Jersey Boy" and damn proud of it!

Maybe that is why the mega-hit, richly awarded (Tony, Grammy, Olivier) and acclaimed musical "Jersey Boys" resonates so strongly with me. The show is currently playing to enthusiastic crowds around the world, and in our own back yard, so to speak, on the stage of Popejoy Hall on the campus of the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque through Sunday, June 2.

I was in undergraduate school at the University of Buffalo when the Four Seasons were on their meteoric rise, which got under way in 1962 with "Sherry," and wished I could sing like Frankie Valli. It never happened, but I listened to them all the time.

"Jersey Boys" is finally scheduled for a short El Paso engagement next June, and a stop in Phoenix in July 2014, but who wants to wait a year?

The current Albuquerque production is the newly formed "second national tour," because the demand to see the show is so great, that one touring company is not sufficient to meet the needs of theater and music lovers clamoring to experience the show for a first, or in my case, a second time.

I have received emails from Las Cruces and friends around the country who learned of my trip to Albuquerque to take a second look at the show. All are eager to let me know that they adored the show they saw on Broadway, in London, New Haven, Phoenix and a wealth of other cities with venues that can mount the show. The original opened at the August Wilson Theatre on Broadway Nov. 6, 2005.

The new second national touring company is full of enthusiasm and chemistry on stage. Watching them interact makes it a unique experience. My closer focus this go-round, from seats in the 11th row, was special.

Our first encounter with the show was from the rear of Grady Gammage Memorial Auditorium on the campus of Arizona State University in Tempe.

This time, I knew what to expect from the amazing music, staging, sound, lighting and special mixed-media effects. So, from a closer perspective, I had the ability to focus on the sobering back story of what transpired behind the lights and screaming crowds, which the writers Marshall Brickman

and Rick Elice cleverly wove through a turbulent world of gangsters, deals and egos.

The "business" of "show business" is often not pretty. The four distinct personalities who made up the Four Seasons each brought baggage into the group.

The "organizer" Tommy De Vito was always looking for a deal. Nick Massi, the bass of the group, lived on the edge of fidelity. Bob Gaudio, boy wunderkind, wrote amazing music and lyrics and was the creative force that forged the sound. But the group would go nowhere without the presence of the voice on top of the songs, Frankie Valli. Short in stature, his falsetto set the group apart and made him a matinee idol.

Watching his marriage and family disintegrate before our eyes is painful. Brad Weinstock, who portrays Frankie to a T, while singing "My Eyes Adored You," truly pulled at my heart, as I watched the actress portraying his wife sit alone taking deep puffs from a cigarette to the side of the stage.

The enthusiastic company members take on a variety of roles that require quick costume changes, but thanks to precise direction of Des McAnuff, the show glides by as if on

a sheet of ice.

The musical highlight, the "11 o'clock number," as it is often called, whose function is to give a big shot of adrenaline toward, the end of the show, is clearly "Can't Take My Eyes Off Of You." I was blown away the first time I saw it staged, and it did not disappoint on a second viewing.

The final number in "Jersey Boys" skips to 1990 – as the group gathers for induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame is "Who Loves You?" From the standing ovation following the final curtain, and the dancing in the aisles, it's an easy answer: We all do!

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
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
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## Arts Council award winners recognized

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# Las Cruces Museums gear up for summer programs

## Museums offer great vacation activities for kids

Each of the four city museums offers great activities for visitors of any age year-round, but students on their summer vacation will find some great new classes, camps and activities.

Kids ages 5 and older have a variety of different options, from one- or two-day workshops to weeklong sessions. Each museum offers different activities, each for different ages and costs.

Starting in June, the Branigan Cultural Center will offer weeklong camps for kids ages 7 to 12, including Archeologists in Training, Southwest Ceramics, Retablos, Sand Painting and Punched Tin.

Also in June and July, the Museum of Nature & Science will host weeklong sessions on Marine Biology (ages 10 to 12), Sound Waves (ages 7 to 9), Nature Art (ages 5 to 6) and a Summer Science Mash Up for ages 7 to 9.

On July 27 and Aug. 3, the Railroad Museum shares two, one-day family workshops on "scenicking," or creating railroad displays. Kids older than the age of 8 can attend on their own, while younger children can attend with their families.

# A way of life no longer

## Antique Treasures Day is Saturday, June 9

They once were scattered all over New Mexico – perhaps tucked away in an attic, buried in a canyon or left out in the desert sun.

They were of great use, all of these things. They may have kept us warm, delivered food, provided entertainment, or generally made life easier. Each one of them was a treasure to someone at one time ... now they're a treasure to many.

These objects – 10,000 of them – are now in a safe place, all stored neatly in a climate-controlled room at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch

Heritage Museum. They are the stars of an afternoon at the museum called Antique Treasures Day. The 10th annual event is from noon to 4 p.m. Sunday, June 9. Regular admission applies – \$5 for adults, \$3 for senior citizens and \$2 for children 5 to 17.

Antique Treasures Day is the only day each year that the 8,000-square-foot Collections Storage Room is open to the public. Visitors are taken on a guided tour through the room to see the vast array of artifacts.

Only one-third of the artifacts donated to the museum are on display for the public at any given time. Exhibits are changed periodically and most of the artifacts will at some point be on display.

Holly Radke, the museum's collection manager and registrar for the past eight years, is the "keeper of the artifacts." Each object donated to the museum is catalogued with an identification number, photographed and stored in a way to offer the best protection.

"Artifacts tell us about a way of life that's no longer," she said.

Preservation is a big part of the museum's mission, and these artifacts that represent New Mexico's history and heritage are treated with great care. Larger objects are put on pallets to keep them off the floor,

some items are stored in acid-free boxes and chemically inert products like Etha-foam and Tyvek are used to help preserve them. Most of the textiles are rolled up instead of folded to avoid harmful creases. Most everything in the room is covered.

"We have a great collection of textiles and clothing items," Radke said. "Chaps, undergarments, hats, quilts, Navajo rugs. Textiles are some of the most sensitive items."

Small farm implements are lined up in rows on pallets and covered

in plastic. Some wagons, wind chargers and other larger objects are against the wall in one corner.

There are rows of covered shelves that contain everything from kitchenware, to tools, to toys. Stone tools and points (the oldest artifacts in the collection) are stored in drawers.

One of Radke's favorite objects is a homemade, treadle-operated Rio Grande loom that is from the Española Valley in northern New Mexico. It dates to around 1900.

"I really enjoy what I do and I'm learning all the time," she said. "We have students completing internships with our department as well as great volunteers."

Radke said she looks forward to Antique Treasures Day each year because it offers an opportunity to show the museum's preservation program and also connect with people who share a desire to preserve our cultural heritage. Visitors are encouraged to ask her about their own family heirlooms and how best to preserve them.

"A lot of museums don't let people back here and give them a behind-the-scenes look," she said. "We love talking to people about their heirlooms. This is our cultural heritage and it benefits everyone if we work together to preserve it."

## Faster, furiouser Sputtering franchise receives a bit of a boost

The “The Fast and the Furious” canon is something of an anomaly. The series, now marking its sixth showing in wide theatrical release with “Fast & Furious 6,” is one of the few film series that seems to get better – and make boatloads more money – with each successive iteration.

The early entries in the series – 2001’s “The Fast and the Furious,” 2003’s “2 Fast 2 Furious,” 2006’s “The Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift” and 2009’s “Fast & Furious” especially – were critically maligned while still managing to rake in impressive box-office receipts. Critical reception for the films got steadily worse while grosses increased – until 2011’s oh-so-creatively-titled “Fast Five,” which managed to make more than \$625 million worldwide and convert some of the franchise’s most determined detractors.

Many saw the break in the franchise’s focus on the illegal street racing circuit for the mass-appeal of the heist movie as a step in the right direction for the series, and I can’t agree more, even if the results are less than stunning.

The early iterations always seemed solely for the gearheads – I can still remember audible gasps from the audience as the camera panned across tables of equipment and spare parts in the first (and sec-

ond, and third, and ...) film – while both this most recent entry and its predecessor had a wider audience draw.

Sure, they’re still aimed primarily toward the automotively inclined, but both “Fast Five” and “Fast & Furious 6” give those who can’t tell the difference between a crankshaft and a catalytic converter more of a reason to jump into this race.

Following the events of the fifth film, the old crew has scattered themselves around the world living in luxury after their \$100 million Rio de Janeiro heist, far away from America, its extradition laws and, particularly, Defense Security Service agent Luke Hobbs (Dwayne Johnson).

Dominic Toretto (Vin Diesel) is shackled up with Elena (Elsa Pataky), Brian O’Connor (Paul Walker) has a newborn son with Mia (Jordana Brewster), Han and Gisele (Sung Kang and Gal Gadot) are knocking around Hong Kong and Roman (Tyrese Gibson) and Tej (Chris “Ludacris” Bridges) are living lavishly on their ill-gotten gains.

After the destruction of a Russian military convoy by international criminal Owen Shaw (Luke Evans) and his second-in-command, Toretto’s presumed-dead ex-lover Letty (Michelle Rodriguez), agent Hobbs persuades Toretto to get the crew back together to bring Shaw

and cohorts to justice. In return, they’ll receive full pardons and a chance at a real, honest life.

From there, it’s nearly two hours of speed, shooting and splintered glass, punctuated with the occasional clunky but oddly charming non sequitur. The cast does share a level of chemistry I couldn’t have imagined possible in a movie like this, and it nearly pains me to say so. Johnson – who, as of late, is in every movie – is especially winning, chewing through his hokily hilarious lines with the best of them.

Make no mistake – “Fast & Furious 6” is still just about cars

going fast and stopping suddenly, but returning director Justin Lin has figured out that if you want to make this kind of movie really work, it’s perfectly acceptable to do away with constraints like “plot,” “acting” and, even better, things like “physics” and “reality” in the name of a good time.

Cinéma vérité this ain’t. Souped-up cars tear through exotic locales and nocturnal landscapes at staggering speeds – until they inevitably crash in the most spectacular fashions, skittering through the air and slamming into everything else onscreen. At least two things drive through other things – a

tank through a semi-truck and a car through a Soviet-era plane, most notably – and no less than 30 cars make junkyard fodder in an unending display of perfectly choreographed, physics-be-damned destruction and daredevil driving.

It more or less boils down to this: If you like the previous entries in the series, you’ll love “Fast & Furious 6.” If you aren’t a fan of the earlier iterations of the high-octane series, this sixth entry isn’t likely to top any year-end lists, but it sure is a hell of a ride – as long as you don’t care about the whole “law of gravity” thing.

## What a ‘Wonder’ Malick’s new film is daring, thought-provoking

Roger Ebert’s (my muse) last review was of this film, “To the Wonder,” the latest film from the director who truly changed my life, Terrence Malick.

It was Malick’s second film and my favorite film of all time, “Days of Heaven,” that opened my eyes when I first saw it some years ago. It was also somewhat ironic that that very film opened this year’s Ebertfest’ an annual film festival planned and presented by Ebert.

He died shortly before this year’s festival, but the show did go on in grand style, I have read.

Malick has spent some time in New Mexico (he is reclusive and reportedly lives in Austin, Texas) as he has supposedly come here for inspiration and spiritual needs and has written two films that were shot at least in part in New Mexico, “Pocket Money” and “Deadhead Miles.” There is a rumor that his latest work is partially being filmed here as well.

His directing career has been slow and methodical and many were surprised when he released this new work not too long after his last, the outstanding “Tree of Life.”

“To the Wonder” follows a slightly similar path as that film. It is a relationship story, told with quick cut editing, light

narration and watchful scenery. It has no linear plot device, nor does it have much dialogue.

Ben Affleck plays Neil, who may or may not be an environmental engineer or investigative journalist. We never really learn anything about him or his character, other than what we want to develop ourselves around his personality.

Olga Kurylenko is Marina, and we do learn a bit more about her, since much of the overlay narration is provided by her. The couple are lovers who have met in France and share a joyous, carefree (sometimes with Marina doing too much twirling and faux dancing) relationship. They are in love, but we don’t see any grand pronouncements of same, just the visual and meditational effect that is on the screen.

A single mother, Marina, and her daughter, Tatiana, return to the U.S. (Oklahoma to be exact) to be with Neil. They have left the old beauty of France for a different beauty, at least at first, of a brand new suburban type home in Oklahoma, replete with all things American, such as an overly lit, fully stocked grocery store.

Silently at first, the relationship begins to fall apart. Neil is (vaguely) following the story of what appears to be an oil spill and reencounters a past love (a nice cameo turn by Rachel McAdams as Jane) in a hospital. Although the effect of this meeting is never really shown on screen, it is clear that it has Neil trying to sort things out between old and new, which, at least to me, is an ongoing theme in the film – old versus new.

Marina and her daughter return to France, but it is not long before she desires to return to the U.S., and Neil

and Jane don’t last long in their renewed relationship.

But Neil, silent and expressionless while in Oklahoma, does not want to marry. Marina’s insistence wins, and it is not long before they wed and soon after have a child of their own.

Intertwined with this story of failing love is another story of failed love, that of a priest, remarkably played by Javier Bardem, who is having a crisis of faith. He has a large lovely and glowing new church, but spends most of his time going from door to door visiting with the sick, reckless, poor and imprisoned. His own narration clearly reveals his fear that God may not exist and if he does, why can he no longer believe.

Malick’s use of extras as the people that Father Quintana visits is visually arresting. Although their dialogue is stunted and often nearly impossible to understand, you know it is real and the people behind the words are real as well.

The use of nature, as in many of Malick’s films is outstanding. The soundtrack, in my opinion, rarely fits the scene and is sometimes overwhelming and unsuitable.

I still found “To the Wonder” to be daring and thought provoking. I will warn you with one of my favorite catchphrases, “this film is decidedly not for all tastes” “but as Ebert asked in his final review, “why must a film explain everything?”

You’re smart. You’re reading this review. You can certainly figure it out yourself.

Annual auction event helps to give back to the community





## Pests can help your garden thrive

Proper garden pest management can support a bounty of summer growth

It's easy to quickly judge any pest in your garden as a nuisance, but there are many that are beneficial to your garden's growth and sustainability.

From damsel bugs to ground beetles and tachinid flies, some pests can be advantageous to the health and pest management of your garden.

While complete prevention of insects in a garden or yard is unrealistic, the positives that come with beneficial bugs should not be understated.

- Damsel bugs feed on aphids, small cat-

terpillars and other pesky pests. You can collect these critters from alfalfa fields and release them in your garden.

- Ground beetles are ravenous predators of pests such as slugs, snails and cabbage maggots that live in your soil – eating more than 50 caterpillars. These beetles like stable garden habitats, so planting perennials will help to sustain a healthy environment for them.
- Tachinid fly larvae can burrow their way into caterpillars, destroying them from the inside to protect your garden. Adult tachinid flies are attracted to herbs such as dill and sweet clover.

Helpful bugs are one of the best-kept secrets in the gardening industry. These insects are likely to remain in your garden if there is a food supply for them and if you mix a variety of plants to bloom over as many months of

the year as possible. In addition, gardeners can purchase several types of beneficial bugs online, at their local home improvement stores and, often times, from nurseries.

Other insects that serve as advantageous bugs include bumble bees, centipedes, dragonflies, damselflies, green lacewings, spiders, yellow jackets, praying mantis and ladybugs.

As beautiful as a ladybug is, many people probably don't realize their capability to eliminate aphids and tree lice. A praying mantis will eat just about any bad bug from flies to crickets. By attracting these bugs with benefits, the garden you've worked so hard to maintain and grow has that much more of a chance to last all summer.

Here are some other tips on sustaining a beneficial bug population in your garden:

- Plant nectar-producing flowers and perennials to maintain a stable habitat, keeping

insects well-fed.

- Keep ants at bay by planting spearmint, tansy, clove oil, tansy or pennyroyal near any spotted aphids.
- Create a hiding place for spiders, which routinely take care of bad garden bugs, with mulch or dead leaves on any bare dirt in your garden.
- Don't overuse harmful pesticides to kill bad bugs – beneficial ones will also be harmed.

## Knowing birdfeeder basics

Bring on backyard birds with the right feeders

When you dine, do you prefer clean and attractive tableware? Does ambiance enhance your enjoyment of your food?

Birds feel the same way about their dining habits – the type and cleanliness of your bird feeders directly affects the number and species of birds that will visit your backyard this season.

To attract birds, you need to understand not only what they prefer to eat, but how they like to eat it. For example, while many species prefer seed, some birds like to eat their seed from elevated platforms, others prefer hanging feeders and still others are content to forage on the ground. All birds appreciate a clean feeder to prevent the spread of disease, and none of them like those pesky, seed-stealing squirrels any more than you do.

# City works to be green

## Bag and tree projects to benefit residents

The City of Las Cruces will conduct a tree planting project through July, but residents can already benefit from another of its green-ing projects.

The City of Las Cruces is netting results in the Bags to Benches recycling program. Las Cruces Parks & Recreation challenged residents to collect 30,000 plastic bags, or 600 pounds of plastic, in a six-month span in order to be awarded a new park bench made of recycled materials.

In half that time, city residents had helped to collect 1,000 pounds. The first bench has arrived and is waiting at City Hall for a permanent location.

Las Cruces continues to collect plastic bags for a second bench. The next bench will come after 60,000 bags, or 1,200 pounds of plastic have been collected. Early this week, bag collectors tallied almost 588 pounds of plastic and

say they expect to have the full amount within a week.

Several city departments and other businesses are participating by placing a collection box at their place of business.

The locations of those that have receptacles open to the public are: Meerscheidt Recreation Center, Las Cruces Regional Aquatics Center, Eastside Senior Center, Munson Center, Branigan Library, City Hall, Benevidez Community Center, Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center, Recycle Center, Las Cruces Police Department, Las Cruces Fire Department (Stations 1, 2, 3, 5, 6 and 7) NASA, Good Samaritan Retirement Village, Big Lots, Sam's Club and Girls Scouts.

Types of plastic that can be recycled include: grocery, department store and dry cleaning bags; bread, cereal, produce and zip lock bags; newspaper sleeves and paper towel plastic overwrap.

Department will partner with Groundwork Doña Ana (GWDA), a local nonprofit, to plant trees from the parks nursery into local parks and public grounds this summer.

GWDA received a Youth Conservation Corps grant that will fund the Green Team youth crews. The Green Team will perform labor for excavating the planting pits, planting the trees, installing supportive irrigation and providing final site cleanup. The Parks & Recreation Department will determine plant-

ing locations, provide and deliver trees to the planting site, and provide training and support for the Green Team crews.

Trees will be planted through July at Young Park, Legends West Park, Apodaca Park, the East Mesa Recreation Center, Oro Vista Park, Camelot Gardens Park and other parks throughout Las Cruces. The project is scheduled for completion in late July.

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# Getting to know: Kelley Cleary Coffeen

## ¡Buen Provecho!

Coffeen cookbook offers simple, delicious Mexican recipes

Kelley Cleary Coffeen loves to cook. For the last 40 years, Coffeen has lived in various locales up and down the U.S.-Mexican border and, along her way, she's been collecting the best regional recipes.

Now, she's sharing her stash of great-tasting Mexican recipes with the rest of us: Coffeen has just released her fifth cookbook, "200 Easy Mexican Recipes: Authentic Recipes from Burritos to Enchiladas," available at locations around Las Cruces including La Posta de Mesilla and Barnes & Noble, as well as several online retailers such as [www.amazon.com](http://www.amazon.com).

Coffeen said food and family has always been tied closely in her family.

"I grew up in a family of five, so Mom cooked every night, and it had to be both fast and really good," she said.

Coffeen's love affair with Mexican food and culture began when she was just 10 years old and accompanied her parents and their friends for lunch in Juárez. Her mother and a friend ordered frozen margaritas; to Coffeen, the emerald green and azure blue drinks looked "like the most wonderful snow cones."

"That was the day I fell in love with all of Mexican cuisine," she said.

While pursuing her master's degree at New Mexico State University, Coffeen said she received frequent recipe requests from friends and family alike.

"While I was in college working on my master's, my younger sister was working on her undergrad," Coffeen said. "She was always calling me about Mexican recipes: 'How do you make tacos? How do you make enchiladas?'"

After taking an afternoon course on self-publishing, Coffeen released her first cookbook, "The Great College Cookbook of the Southwest," in 1994.

From then, she was hooked. Her first foray into recipe writing eventually led to a 10-year stint cooking on NBC in El Paso, which, in turn, led Coffeen to release "Simply 7: Quick Southwest Recipes Just 7 Ingredients Away," a compilation of her most-requested televised recipes.

The book, which features recipes that require only seven ingredients and 30 minutes to prepare, was a hit.

Since then, Coffeen has released several other cookbooks, including "Fiesta Mexicali," "300 Best Taco Recipes: From Tantalizing Tacos to Authentic Tortillas, Sauces, Cocktails and Salsas" and "200 Easy Mexican Recipes," released in April.

The book focuses on Mexican food as a whole, rather than only one region, so even for us familiar with one style of the delicious fiesta food will find surprising new dishes with each



turn of the page, with recipes from our own area, as well as the Native American influenced Mexican food found further north, the coastal cuisine of the Baja region and, of course, the southern New Mexican style we know and love, drawing heavy influence from northern Sonora.

"We, living north of the border, take Mexican food and make it what we want it to be. With this simple, basic recipes, if you know them, you can play with them," she said.

Since its release, "200 Mexican Recipes" has taken off.

According to Coffeen, the latest cookbook is doing remarkably well, especially in regions that don't boast the same plethora of Mexican restaurants we do here along the border, noting that sales are high in the Northwest, Northeast and Midwest, especially, but that a multitude of orders have come in from around the world, selling well in the United Kingdom, Canada and Australia.

The reason for the book's success?

"We have something special here along the border that other people around the world don't have or understand," she said.

"People want to know how to cook like this. They want to be able to have this food for themselves and create it at home."

That said, for Coffeen, home really is where the heart is.

"Great food and entertaining others has always been a joy for me, and I think growing up on the border, I've learned to love all the wonderful things about Hispanic culture," she said. "It's really become who we are."

"Food is part of who we are, our history and how we relate to our childhood. A lot of these recipes, I grew up with, and my hope is that it's a good addition to any cookbook collection."

Coffeen's whole philosophy can be summed up simply in the words elegantly adorning the walls of her own kitchen: "Aquí celebramos familia, amigos y amor," or, "Here, we celebrate family, friends and love."

What better way to do that than whipping up a fresh batch of enchiladas and a few stunningly beautiful margaritas?

## Add some delicious color to your life

Mini peppers offer crunch, low calories

Sweet, crunchy and colorful bagfuls of sweet mini peppers are cropping up in grocery produce aisles.

I've purchased several over the past few weeks. They're a tasty snack and healthy, too (three minis equal 25 calories). Sliced or minced, minis enliven salads, veggie dishes and casseroles. They can be baked, boiled, broiled, grilled or enjoyed fresh from the bag. They make great poppers.

Although minis don't pack chile pepper heat, they can be stuffed with fillings that do – recipes that can be as healthy as the peppers themselves or as naughty as a two-fisted burger gooey with cheese. On "good" days, a favorite of mine is the Luau Popper, crammed with light cream cheese and crushed pineapple fired up with habanero powder. On another "good" day, I stuff fresh halved with tuna fish salad peppered with serrano bits. On "bad" days, it's the chorizo-potato or the green chile Velveeta. Sweet heat has never tasted so good (or bad).

### Luau-Style Poppers

**15 each sweet mini peppers**  
**3 tablespoons light cream cheese**  
**2 tablespoons crushed pineapple, unsweetened and drained**  
**1 tablespoon red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded and minced**  
**1/4 teaspoon habanero powder**  
**1 teaspoon fresh cilantro, minced**

Slice peppers lengthwise and remove seeds. Place peppers in a saucepan; add water to cover. Bring to a boil for 2 or 3 minutes or until crisp tender. Drain and let cool.

Combine cheese and other ingredients in a small bowl, stirring until smooth. Chill thoroughly. Stuff peppers with a teaspoon of the cream cheese mixture. Cover and chill thoroughly. Makes 7 servings.

### Chorizo-Potato

**1 (1-pound) bag sweet mini peppers, sliced in half**  
**2 links chorizo, minced**  
**1 large Idaho potato, cooked, peeled and mashed**  
**1 small bunch parsley or cilantro, chopped**  
**Garnish (optional): sour cream and minced chives**

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. In a medium-sized bowl, mix together chorizo, mashed potato and parsley or cilantro. Fill halved sweet mini peppers with stuffing.

Line a baking sheet with foil and drizzle with extra-virgin olive oil. Add halved peppers and roast 20 to 25 minutes. Top with sour cream and minced chives, if desired. Makes 24 pepper halves. (Recipe adapted from <http://finecooking.com>.)

### Sweet Serrano Poppers

**12 to 16 sweet mini peppers**  
**4 ounces low-fat or Neufchatel cream cheese, softened**  
**4 tablespoons sour cream**  
**2 scallions, thinly sliced into rounds**  
**1 jalapeño pepper, minced**  
**1/4 cup cilantro, chopped**  
**Juice of 1/2 lime**

Preheat oven to broil. Line a baking sheet with foil. Slice the mini peppers in half and remove seeds. Combine cream cheese, sour cream, scallions, minced jalapeño and cilantro in a small bowl. Squeeze the juice of half a lime over it. Mix until well combined. Divide cheese mixture among the pepper halves. Place filled peppers on prepared baking sheet. Broil for 5 minutes until browned. Makes 6 to 8 servings. (Recipe adapted from the May 2012 issue of *Cooking Light*.)

### Taco Poppers

**1/2 pound of sweet mini peppers**  
**8 ounces chive and onion soft cream cheese**  
**1 cup grated sharp white cheddar**  
**2 tablespoons spicy taco seasoning**  
**1 cup panko bread crumbs**

### 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut peppers in half, leaving stems on. Remove seeds and ribs.

In a bowl, mix cream cheese, cheddar cheese and taco seasoning with a fork. Fill each pepper half with mixture, so it is level with the edges. Place pepper half on a large rimmed sheet pan and continue until all peppers are stuffed.

In a small bowl, pour melted butter over panko crumbs and mix to combine. Top each stuffed pepper half with bread crumbs, lightly patting down to adhere. Return to sheet pan.

Bake peppers for 15 minutes, turn oven off and turn broiler on. Broil for 2 to 3 minutes or until bread crumbs are browned. Watch carefully. Cool slightly before serving. Makes about 12. (Recipe adapted from <http://rachelcooks.com>.)

### Spicy-Hot Pork Sausage Mini Sweet Bell Peppers

**1 (1-pound) package sweet mini peppers, halved**  
**1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened**  
**1 cup shredded sharp cheddar**  
**1 cup shredded Monterrey jack cheese**  
**6 ounces spicy hot pork sausage, browned and crumbled**  
**1/4 teaspoon salt**  
**1/4 teaspoon chili powder**  
**1/4 teaspoon garlic powder**  
**1/2 cup dry bread crumbs**  
**Optional: 1 minced serrano or 1/2 minced habanero pepper**

In mixing bowl, combine cheeses, sausage and seasonings. Mix well. With spoon, fill

each pepper half. Roll in bread crumbs. Place in a greased 15-by-10-by-1-inch pan. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Makes 24 servings. (Recipe adapted from Bailey Farms)

### Turkey Stuffed Sweet Mini Peppers

**1 pound mini sweet bell peppers, halved (and seeded if desired)**  
**8 ounces lean ground turkey or chicken**  
**1 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning**  
**1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes**  
**1 small yellow onion, shredded (using a cheese grater)**  
**2 cloves of garlic, minced**  
**8 ounces fat-free cream cheese at room temperature**  
**1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese**  
**1 tablespoon fresh cilantro, chopped**  
**Kosher salt and black pepper to taste**

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Arrange peppers on a baking tray and roast for 5 minutes then remove from the oven to stuff.

In a large sauté pan over medium heat cook the turkey for 5 minutes then add the Italian seasoning, red pepper flakes, onion and garlic. Cook until the turkey is fully cooked. Add the cream cheese and Parmesan cheeses and parsley. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Stuff each pepper then bake for 20 to 25 minutes. Makes about 12 servings. 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# Community gardens grow

## Senior programs to give garden access

Some residents who regularly take in activities at the City of Las Cruces' Munson Senior Center may well recall what a "victory garden" is, but soon they can take a step out behind the center to grow their own vegetables.

City workers are currently digging a large area of the grounds between Munson and the nearby pocket park that will become the latest community garden created in Las Cruces.

Though not a new concept, community gardens fell out of practice as people became more mobile in the 1970s and 1980s. A community garden is where land is provided – either publicly or privately – in which people could use portions of a plot, or separate small plots, to grow primarily vegetables, but also grow some fruits, nuts and even flowers.

Sometimes the plots are rented, usually for a nominal fee to cover the cost of water and other gardening assistance or guidance, while some community gardens give out allotments on a first-come, first-served system.

As concerns about global warming began in the 1990s, the idea of community gardens began a resurgence, with advocates describing it as a small step people can take to lessen their carbon footprint. When people grow their own food, their favorite tomato, lettuce or kitchen herb don't have to be shipped in on a refrigerated diesel truck.

The community garden movement began to find a place in Las Cruces by 2010 with the establishment of several gardens, the most visible being Jardin De Las Esperanzas. Taking advantage of an odd section of property formed when Spruce Street was joined to Picacho Avenue, the gated Jardin De Las Esperanzas is part of the historic neighborhood's northern gateways, a little west of the historical mural park.

To make a community garden work, someone usually has to take a lead. At Jardin De Las Esperanzas, that role currently is held by Barbara Kuhns, whose efforts range from keeping track of who gets to use one of the 18 plots in the garden to getting

hay to help keep the dirt from blowing away.

Despite the drought's water restrictions, Jardin De Las Esperanzas is flourishing, in part because of a new drip watering system made possible by Gary Camuñez, Kuhns said. The cost to get a garden plot is \$15 a year, she said, with a solid core group of experienced gardeners helping the newbies. The bounty is often shared with their neighbors, she said, and the growing season is kicked off by an Earth Day "plant share" in April.

Kuhns said she would like to hear from Mesquite residents who are handicapped but want to garden. The raised plots as they are now set up are probably not as accessible as they could be, she said.

If you want to see a great community garden, Kuhns confesses like someone sharing a favorite hole-in-the-wall café, go to New Mexico State University.

"In the family housing area, the garden there is amazing," Kuhns said.

Established in 2009, the Cole and Tom Fort Villages Community Garden has been embraced by those living in family housing – also called married housing, said Julie Weber, NMSU director of housing and campus life.

Not only is the garden thriving with a wide variety of vegetables and other edible plants – from corn to sunflowers – the garden has been a way for the residents to connect with each other, Weber said, including holding potlucks using food grown in the garden, as well as from their backyard pots and plants.

What makes the NMSU community garden special, she said, is that it is kept so lush using only organic methods.

Another community garden started in 2009 – at the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope – has been on a temporary hiatus because of staff changes, but Camp Hope is providing an opportunity to resurrect it in the tent city's future plans being developed for the city with help from NMSU students, said Nicole Martinez, interim director. Some Camp Hope residents already are growing plants in small pots, but the more permanent plan calls for each tent to have a community garden plot, she said.



## Prepare for National Doughnut Day 2013

Honor bestowed on the first Friday of June

The month of June contains several special days and holidays, one of which is National Doughnut Day, celebrated this year on Friday, June 7.

National Doughnut Day, observed the first Friday of June each year, was created by the Salvation Army in 1938 to honor the women who served doughnuts to soldiers during World War I.

A doughnut is a type of fried dough confectionery or dessert food.

Doughnuts are popular in many countries and prepared in various forms as a sweet snack that can be homemade or purchased in bakeries, supermarkets, food stalls and franchised specialty outlets. They are usually deep-fried from flour dough, and shaped in rings or flattened spheres that sometimes contain fillings. Other types of batters can also be used, and various toppings and flavorings are used for different types.

The two most common types are the toroidal ring doughnut and the filled doughnut, a flattened sphere injected with fruit preserves, cream, custard or other sweet fillings. A small spherical piece of dough may be cooked as a doughnut hole. Doughnut varieties are also divided into cake and risen doughnuts. Other shapes include rings, balls and flattened spheres, as well as ear shapes, twists and other forms.

Many American doughnut stores offer free doughnuts on National Doughnut Day. In 2009, both independent shops and large national franchises offered free doughnuts in the United States.


### Homemade doughnuts

- 2 cups flour**
- 1/2 cup sugar**
- 1 teaspoon salt**
- 1 tablespoon baking powder**
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon**
- 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg**
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, melted**
- 1/2 cup milk**
- 1 egg, beaten**
- 1 quart oil for frying**

Heat oil in deep fryer to 375 degrees. In a large bowl, mix together flour, sugar, salt, baking powder, cinnamon and nutmeg. Mix in melted butter until dry ingredients become crumbly. Stir in milk and beaten egg.

Flour your hands and begin to knead the dough until firm and smooth. Turn dough out onto a floured board and flatten down to 3/8 inch thickness. Dust doughnut cutter with flour and press into the dough. Slowly and carefully drop donuts into the hot oil and fry for about 1 minute on each side or until golden brown. Drain on paper towels.

Helpful hint: For a quick topping, add granulated or powdered sugar to a brown paper bag. Add the doughnuts, close the top and give the bag a good shake until donuts are thoroughly coated. (Recipe adapted from [www.chiff.com](http://www.chiff.com).)





# Taking the pathway to the public square

## How to defuse controversial issues, create discussion

One great source of cultural frustration is the polarization that mars virtually every public discussion.

Few people, and I include myself, know exactly how to defuse controversial issues and create open space for discussion. The public square served that function in earlier generations, but how can we renew it in our high-tech society?

Here are four problems we need to solve to renew the public square.

First, we must understand how we foster polarization. Here is the process: I begin by believing my position is correct. I may accept an outside authority for the position. The fateful move is to believe my position is the only correct one. Fold in a sense of holy indignation, and I begin to go over the line. Then I think I have every right to ignore you.

That's the way the "logic" goes. If my position is right, true and holy, why should I give thought to yours? With God on my side, I can disrespect you because you're wrong.

We all hold positions we feel our conscience and our beliefs guide us to, and that is our duty and our right. We would be wrong not to do so. But we can do this in two ways. On one hand, we can hold our beliefs in such a way that we remain open to others, even if we do not agree with them. We can stay in the game, offer our points without condemning others, and listen. On the other hand, we can pick up our marbles and go home. Many people pick up their marbles because they cannot express their position reasonably without going ballistic. This is the path to polarization.

Second, we have a problem with self. Those who become fanatical about their positions want a security both elusive and illusions. It is elusive because it requires an environment so controlled as to be sterile. It is an illusion. No such world exists because each person is

unique and each community flourishes, rather than withers, through its diversity. But this is precisely what the insecure cannot do. The path to polarization gets rockier.

Third, we need to solve our problem with rage. You are driving and someone cuts you off. You forget, momentarily, his humanity and express "road rage." The feeling is not limited to the highway. Note the key point of origin: forgetting the humanity of the other.

When you turn to rage, you dehumanize your opponents and make yourself into a blind cause rather than a seeing, feeling person. You lose your dignity and gracefulness in the process. Demonizing the other only makes you fall farther from the ambiguous grace of being human and deeper into the pretend security of your singular position.

You simply cannot bludgeon people to accept your position. You lose your humanity when you do. That's the take-away lesson from the poster event for polarization, the Spanish

Inquisition.

Fourth, we need to overcome our crusade mentality. I remember Sen. Joe McCarthy's apoplectic rants against suspected communists in living black and white on TV. I don't want to see those times again. But it looks like they are on the way, as political smearing gets ugly and religious groups call for new crusades to "save America." The "I am right and you are wrong" posture is not only scary but leads immediately to polarization.

Faith traditions combat polarization by their call to compassionate listening, which is so crucial to community. Most importantly, they offer us a sense of self worth that helps to overcome insecurity and anger. Through these traditions we turn back from the path to polarization and learn the path to community.

## Not enough to be pain free

To be pain free is a welcome relief, but it's just the beginning of reaping the benefits chiropractic care can bring.

The reduction in pain is actually an indication that the healing process is beginning, contrary to the idea that it has already been achieved. As soon as some relief is felt, most assume the goal has been achieved, because the reason for seeking care is to get out of pain.

Retraining of muscles, improved biomechanics and strengthening of ligaments in addition to optimum communication between the brain and the body can only be achieved by faithfully continuing care past when the pain is no longer felt.

Staying at the summit is achieved by maintenance care, which is less frequent and can be likened to oil changes to keep your car running and in good shape. Once one gets to this stage, it is easier to maintain by periodic checkups rather than to let it all go downhill eventually again.

We brush our teeth every day because we eat every day. If we do not maintain them daily, we can have problems such as tooth decay taking place. Neglect of spine health can have the same results, because just as our teeth, we use our spines every single day.

# Hurricane Sandy hits home

## Las Cruces disaster relief team went to 2012 storm

*Editor's note: This is part three of a 10-story series describing the heroic efforts of local citizens and organizations recognized and honored as 2013 Red Cross Real Heroes.*

Most Americans watched the news as the deadliest hurricane of 2012 smashed into the East Coast, hitting New York City and its surrounding areas the hardest, several Las Cruces residents, along with hundreds of other disaster relief teams, were headed into the heart of the storm.

As Hurricane Sandy made landfall, American Medical Response operations supervisor Alex Lucas and his team were awaiting their instructions in nearby New Jersey. The team had just completed a journey that consisted of a flight from El Paso to Atlanta, followed by a 14-hour drive straight into the storm's path.

"I never figured I would be driving into a hurricane," Lucas said. "I didn't know what to expect. I was kind of nervous, but at the same time, I was kind of pumped because of the adrenaline."

For their first mission, Lucas said he and the team from Las Cruces were assigned to evacuate a 130-resident nursing home, with seven stories, one flight of stairs and no electricity.

"All of us from Las Cruces jumped in there and got the whole

nursing home evacuated in about two hours," Lucas said. "The people that were there before were dragging and tired, when we got there to rally the troops, I think it helped get those people out of there faster."

Over the course of the next five weeks, Lucas and his partners had many important missions to help the worst-affected areas of the hurricane, including the evacuation of Bellevue Hospital, one of the largest hospitals in downtown Manhattan.

Sleeping in their ambulance for about four of those five weeks and surviving largely on meals ready to eat (MRE's), the conditions set up for the disaster response teams were less than ideal.

Some of the temporary camps with tents and generators did not have enough space for the amount of personnel – not to mention the constant transformer problems, causing the temperature in the night to dip in the low teens in New York City.

It was what he saw in Nassau County, N.Y., that struck him the hardest, Lucas said.

In Breezy Point, around 111 homes were burned or destroyed in one neighborhood.

"To walk around and realize that 111 families whose houses just burned down ... I don't really have the words to describe the emotions from that," Lucas said.

Many of the local firefighters helping in the area had also lost their homes, and had to sleep at

# A warrior through and through

## Wounded warrior guest of honor speaks up

Life as a typical 17-year-old does not reflect life at that time for Tony Burton, who signed up for the Army with his parent's permission in 2000, and was readying for his first deployment one year later.

During his eight-year career, Burton fought hard for his country, and received multiple injuries and traumas that make recounting that time hard for him to do.

In 2003, in Baumholder, Germany, an improvised explosive device (IED) hit the convoy Burton was traveling with, putting a two-inch piece of glass straight through his eye. Burton is now half blind in his left eye, but after surgery, he was back on the field.


His injuries didn't stop there.

“After that, I got stabbed in the leg, broke my back four times, broke both my ankles, got nerve damage down the right side of my body,” Burton said. “Another IED blew me off a two-story building, which gave me a traumatic brain injury.”

Due to the traumatic brain injury, Burton

said he has trouble remembering things such as phone numbers, names, how to get to his house or where he parked his car.

“I got frontal lobe syndrome because of the head injury,” Burton said. “I know (forgetting things) happens to a lot of people, but, for me, it’s really frustrating.”

At the beginning of this year, Burton said he met Junior Adams at a trade show in Las Cruces. Adams chairs the Wounded Warrior Project in Las Cruces, along with co-chair Pat

Waters, and got Burton interested in some local Wounded Warrior events.

Coming from a military family who lived all over the United States, Germany and Japan, Burton said he was used to keeping things inside, and not letting his emotions take over.

After therapy and dealing with his PTSD, Burton said he is finally able to accept what happened to him and move on with his life.

“I’m keeping myself busy, I have three or four jobs I do ... it just helps me with the mental stuff,” Burton said.

On the outside, Burton seems like an average man, but the majority of the scars from his experiences are on the inside.

“I got wounded a lot,” he said. “I’m proud of serving, but there’s just some things I had to do that I’m not proud of. The first time I went to group therapy, I left and had a panic attack. The people in there wanted to know how many

people I killed and this and that and didn’t understand that I’m just trying to move on.”

When Burton met Adams, who has chaired the Wounded Warrior project for the past three years, Adams asked him to be a guest of honor at the annual dinner.

“It’s worth it to see their faces smiling,” Adams said. “No matter what happened, if they were shot or broke their legs, to have them not worry about it at that moment and just having fun.”

The dinner will be held at 6 p.m. Saturday, June 15, at the Jornada Lodge No. 70, 1200 W. University Ave., and tickets are \$25 for two people with a Wounded Warrior sponsorship. Raffle prizes will also be given away, with all proceeds benefiting the Wounded Warrior project.

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

# June and July are peak months for grilling fires

## NFPA urges grillers to be mindful of safety

As the Memorial Day weekend kicked off the unofficial start of summer, grillers everywhere dusted off their spatulas and the grilling season commenced.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is recommending that grillers be mindful of safety, especially as the peak months for grilling fires, June and July, approach. While gas grills contribute to a higher number of home fires than their charcoal counterparts, all grills pose a risk for fires and burns.

Gas grills were involved in an annual average of 7,100 home fires in 2006-2010, while charcoal or other solid-fueled grills were involved in an annual average of 1,200 home fires, according to a 2012 NFPA report on cooking fires. More than one-quarter (28 percent) of home structure grill fires started on a courtyard, terrace or patio, 28 percent started on an exterior balcony or open porch, and 6 percent started in the kitchen.

Hannah Storm, ESPN SportsCenter anchor was severely burned by a grill fire. She worked with NFPA to record several videos to share her story and raise awareness for grilling safety in hopes that others will avoid similar incidents.

Grills should be placed well away from the home and deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. If there is a fire involving grilling equipment, any fuel for the fire should not be near the home or any other structure.

"Grilling season is a great time of year for friends and families to have cookouts and tailgate, but before starting the season, be sure your grill is working properly and review safety tips," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of communications for NFPA. "Leaks or breaks were the leading factors contributing to gas grill fires. It is good practice to check for damage before using it for the first time each year, and better practice to clean and check on the state of the grill regularly."

Some other grilling safety tips from the NFPA are:

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before igniting it.
- Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.
- If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 15 minutes before re-lighting it.

If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.

Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.

There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.

When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

## Las Cruces bans open burning

### Ban prompted by extreme drought conditions

The Las Cruces Fire Department has issued an open burning ban within the city limits effective Tuesday, May 28.

Southern New Mexico, to include the City of Las Cruces, is experiencing severe to extreme drought conditions as indicated by the National Weather Service. Such conditions pose a fire hazard and a significant threat to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the city.

The Las Cruces Fire Department has determined that it is necessary to restrict open burning within the municipal boundaries.

This burn ban will follow what the New Mexico Forestry Division has implemented for many counties in the state.

In accordance with the Las Cruces Municipal Code and the 2009 International Fire Code, the Las Cruces Fire Department is hereby banning, effective May 28, all open burning based on the atmospheric conditions

that are creating the current drought.

Open burning is defined by Section 302 the 2009 IFC as, "the burning of materials wherein products of combustion are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or chimney from an enclosed chamber. Open burning does not include road flares, smudge pots and similar devices associated with safety or occupational uses typically considered open flames or recreational fires. For the purposes of this definition, a chamber shall be regarded as enclosed when, during the time the combustion occurs, only apertures, ducts, stacks, flues, or chimneys necessary to provide combustion air and permit the escape of exhaust gas are open."

This ban will remain in effect until the Las Cruces Fire Department determines that the fire hazard is no longer a significant threat.

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
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
