

## Cervantes fears loss of agriculture

### Other uses seek to take away water

Imagine a Mesilla Valley without pecans or chile – or agriculture of any kind. That could happen, state Sen. Joseph Cervantes, D-Las Cruces, told the Primitimers Tuesday, April 16, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, for the group's legislative session review.

Cervantes said he was frustrated in his efforts to get serious water legislation passed in the recent 60-day session and it's a situation that should be taken seriously as drought, competing uses, anti-agricultural industry forces and interstate litigation threaten the farms and dairies of southern New Mexico.

For the first time since the Elephant Butte Reservoir was created in 1916, it was looking like farmers would not get any river water because of the drought and a lack of snow this winter, Cervantes said, but more recently Elephant Butte Irrigation District is signaling that Mesilla Valley farmers may get a 4-inch-per-acre-foot allocation this year.

"The good news is that maybe we will get some water," said Cervantes, whose family has long been farming in the Mesilla – primarily chile, a crop that has seen its production in the valley scaled back by as much as third.

In recent years, the prolonged drought has steadily reduced those allocations of Rio Grande water, forcing farmers to pump more groundwater.

The cost of pumping and lack of surface water, he said, has many farmers deciding to leave their fields fallow – tilled without crops planted. With the possibility of between a fourth and a third of the valley's farmland left fallow, Cervantes painted a picture he likened to scenes out of "Grapes of Wrath," the classic novel about the 1930s Dust Bowl.

The picture gets bleaker, Cervantes said, when he talks to the owners of pecan orchards, who aren't sure they can afford to pump water for the trees, which require

## Downtown plans set for an update

### Las Cruces city councillors formalize logo, parking study

In anticipation of upcoming design brainstorming to update the Downtown revitalization plan, the Las Cruces City Council formally approved, with minor revisions, several related efforts from recent years at its meeting Monday, April 15.

Since 2005, Downtown has been using a logo incorporating features found in wrought iron fencing from surrounding neighborhoods, which was never formally approved by the City Council, said Andy Hume, the city's liaison with Downtown.

Hume said the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership has been using the logo to not only promote Downtown in general, but also has adapted the top half of it to incorporate designs for events such as the Downtown Art Ramble and SalsaFest!

The logo was the result of 2005 planning by a development consultant and not everyone was happy with the final result, said Mayor Pro Tem Sharon Thomas, who said she is pleased the revitalization plan is being updated with help of a master developer.

The revised revitalization plan process will begin in the fall with

## Hatch mayor loses battle with cancer

### Nordyke remembered for guiding town

It wasn't an official visit to the Village of Hatch without being given a tour of the town – and its potential – from its mayor of more than a decade, Judd Nordyke, in his pickup truck.

While the truck was emblematic of the town's rich history in agriculture as the state-proclaimed "Chile Capital of the World," Nordyke would enthusiastically point to the state-of-the-art solar farm on the town's west mesa, as well as its position as a gateway community to Spaceport America.

Nordyke's vision for the village had his eyes looking into the future with his feet firmly planted in its past.

On Tuesday, April 23, the Village of Hatch will pause to say goodbye to Nordyke, 72, who died Friday, April 12, after battling brain cancer.

Andy Nuñez, former state representative and ex-mayor pro tem who is still on the village's board of trustees, said he and Nordyke worked as a team after both being elected to their municipal government positions in 2002. "We were together since the beginning," Nuñez said.

Nuñez was there to see the beginning of the end as well, when Nordyke called him into his office in August 2012. With his left eye fluttering, Nordyke said he was experiencing problems with the whole left side of his

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

# Silver named Teacher of the Year for LCPS

## Technology used to reach students

Arrowhead Park Early College High School (APECHS) English teacher Joshua M. Silver was named Las Cruces Public Schools 2014 teacher of the year at the LCPS Foundation's annual Celebration of Excellence dinner Monday, April 15.


Silver has taught with LCPS for 10 years, the first eight at Sierra Middle School and the last two at APECHS.

"I am incredibly thankful for this honor," Silver said. "I get the privilege of working with so many of my personal mentors and friends on a daily basis and share this with all of them. What a great opportunity to represent the tremendous teachers in Las Cruces."

Silver was joined by APECHS Principal Jennifer Amis at the dinner, along with APECHS teachers Chris Vaudrey and John Tapia and Dean of Students Gabby Alaniz.

Last June, Silver was named New Mexico Society for Technology in Education (NMSTE) outstanding teacher of the year for the state. He was one of only six teachers nationwide to receive the College Board's 2012 Bob Costas Grant for the Teaching of Writing. Silver also was co-runner up in the 2009 LCPS teacher of the year competition.

"Mr. Silver is known throughout his school district for innovative uses of technology, as well as his capacity and willingness to collaborate and share with others," Amis said. "His impact on education extends far beyond his high school English classroom and the early college

high school in which he works."

In the 2014 teacher of the year contest, sponsored by the LCPS Professional Development Center (PDC), the first runner up was Las Cruces High School science teacher Joanie Anderson. Second runner up was Tombaugh Elementary School fourth- and fifth-grade dual-language teacher Tasha Carrillo. Oñate High School theater teacher Sherrie Aland was a finalist.

The process of selecting the 2014 teacher of the year began in January, said PDC Coordinator Thea Hand. Dozens of LCPS staff members volunteered to serve on the Teacher of the Year Committee, and seven were selected. That group read the applications, selected the finalists, interviewed all four of them and chose the teacher of the year.

Superintendent Stan Rounds was the first to congratulate Silver on his selection. He thanked all the evening's honorees for their dedication to Las Cruces children.

The Celebration of Excellence dinner also recognized the 2013 Bilingual Teacher of the Year, Patricia Bish of Centennial High School; 2012-13 Sandra Nakamura Professional Development Excellence Award winner Michelle Estrada, who teaches kindergarten at Desert Hills Elementary School; Lynn Middle School seventh-grade science teacher Kendra Buckelew and Lynn Bagwell of Doña Ana Elementary School, who were recognized for achieving National Board Certification; and six LCPS National Merit Scholar semi-finalists.

### Taking a wade in the water

Let's hope we have some water to wade in

Last weekend, nearly 300 people were baptized at First Assembly of God Church on Las Cruces' East Mesa.

A couple of weeks before, I was at the nearby Santa Rosa de Lima Catholic Church for the Easter Vigil, and there were about 15 young people undergoing their baptism. No doubt dozens more locals were baptized recently.

Someone once said as long as babies are being born, it's a sign God still has faith in humanity. If you follow that logic, then as long as people are choosing to get baptized, it's a sign humanity still has faith in God.

Another way people demonstrate this faith in God is through prayer. Prayer is practiced in many ways, public and private. Performed alone, it can be an important part of an individual's meditative spirituality. Performed in groups, it can be an important part of fellowship and healing.

Often, its power can be made even stronger when tied to appropriate action.

Earlier this week, I attended the monthly meeting of the Primetimers, a group of local farmers who get together to discuss important topics. This meeting - which opened with a prayer, by the way - featured talks from four state legislators who represent Doña Ana County.

Sen. Joseph Cervantes spent almost all of his time to talk about a huge problem in New Mexico: the lack of water.

"We need to appreciate the magnitude of this," Cervantes said. "Elephant Butte Reservoir was completed in 1916. In its entire history, this year, for the first time, there may be no water delivered."

Cervantes expressed frustration because, during the 2013 legislative session, his many pleas and conversations regarding the water crisis fell on mostly deaf ears.

"Pray for rain, that's what people up north are saying," Cervantes said, and it was clear from Cervantes' tone they had no interest in backing that prayer with action.

"For those up north who believe this is our problem, it affects the entire state. If there's no water, there's no jobs and there's no economic opportunity."

Cervantes said he was fretting about "the idea of looking out at our valley this summer and seeing brown instead of green."

Two of Cervantes' fellow senators also attended, old pro John Arthur Smith and legislative newcomer Lee Cotter.

Cotter, who worked for nearly a decade in the state senate, acknowledged he "didn't quite have the appreciation" for what the job itself fully entailed. Cotter had his own ideas about water, one of which included a pipeline, which he recognized as terribly expensive, but that demonstrates the severity of the situation.

Smith, chair of the Senate finance committee, said one of the biggest things to come out of the session was "we gave ourselves the opportunity to expand our economic base."

Major tax changes performed that task, Smith said, by closing four critical loopholes. Reducing the corporate income tax will also make New Mexico more competitive with surrounding states he added.


Rep. Mary Helen Garcia, the lone attendee from the House, spoke about her bill, which would enable the state to retain students who aren't reading by the end of third grade.

"It's an intervention and remediation program that starts at kindergarten and the student can be retained only once from kindergarten to third grade," said Garcia, who believes her bill has been blocked by fellow Democrats who tie it closely to Gov. Susana Martinez.

The meeting's opening prayer referenced the Boston bombings, which sparked a memory for Smith, who was in Santa Fe for a special session when New York's Twin Towers fell on Sept. 11, 2001. Officials asked for New Mexico government offices, including the Roundhouse, to close. Sen. Tim Jennings, then the Senate Pro Tem, had other ideas.

"He said, 'The New Mexico State Senate is going to have a floor session,'" Smith said. "Tim Jennings said we were going to carry ahead and I'll always remember that."

Let's take some action on water, and let's pray about it, too. And while we're at it, how about let's pray for an end to these serial incidents of senseless destruction of precious life.

### Tax bill debacle

The League of Women Voters of New Mexico is concerned about the last-minute tax bill slammed through the New Mexico Legislature and the broken process.

HB641, like any comprehensive tax legislation, has many components which will have long-term effects on New Mexico's economy. Experts are still debating the overall cost and benefit projections, the challenges for municipalities, the difficulties of implementation and other effects.

Open discussions on these important matters should have taken place before and during the session. Much more time was spent on congratulatory memorials than on examining the various aspects of this major bill. Committee hearings and floor sessions on many inconsequential matters clogged on for most of the session. In the last few days of the session, legislators had to work unreasonably long hours and vote on legislation that they had never seen, much less studied.

They were under tremendous pressure to arrive at a grand bargain that the governor would sign.

Very few legislators ever saw the bill before it was introduced on the floor of the House during the last hours. How could legislators make an informed decision on the numerous components in this bill when the document

most legislators rely upon, the Fiscal Impact Report (FIR), wasn't completed until nine days after the session was over?

Some legislators have argued that each component provision of HB641 had been through the legislative committee process. We don't buy that argument. Interested parties should have had the opportunity to look at the various components and decide whether in balance they would have supported the entire package. The public was also denied an opportunity to weigh in.

Over the last 15 years, the New Mexico Legislature has made considerable progress in improving transparency and openness. The way HB641 was handled is a regrettable regression to old bad practices.

With the haste in adopting this omnibus tax reform bill, also known by the governor as the New Mexico Jobs Package, we can expect "the law of unintended consequences" to kick in. We'll soon see that it was far easier to pass and sign this law than it will be to amend it after we see how it plays out. It is imperative that both the legislative and executive branches think ahead and work together in meaningful, thoughtful ways.

We ask the leadership to create rules that will clean up legislative processes so that the Legislature can work in a thoughtful, deliberative, transparent manner. It needs rules

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# Tough times for Republicans

Party looks for ways to change with the times

The National Republican Party is getting long of tooth. So say many of its current leaders. Reince Priebus, the Republican national chairman, says yes. He wants to get on "The View" with Whoopi Goldberg and her morning TV friends.

The party chair and several other top Republican strategists have laid out a plan to rebuild the GOP. The plan has been embraced by Newt Gingrich, House Speaker John Boehner and Deputy Eric Cantor.

It is something the GOP should have done four years ago, when the national and state rumblings were that the party was dead, gone the way of the Whigs in 1850. But they caught a break when new President Barack Obama chose to make health care reform his major project.

Suddenly, the uproar at the grass roots was deafening. The tea party was born. Democrats suffered for it nationwide. In New Mexico, Democrats lost the governor's office, the 2nd Congressional District and, for the first time since 1930, they lost the secretary of state race.

Losing our southern congressional district wasn't a big surprise. But the governor's office? Then Lt. Gov. Diane Denish had been running for it for years. During that time she built up a \$2 million war chest. She scared out other Democrats, and Republicans couldn't attract any big name to run against her.

As you know, 2010 was one of Republican's biggest years ever. They captured gubernatorial races nationwide. Many state legislatures switched to Republican just in time for redistricting. Democrats won't recover from that for 10 years.

But in presidential politics, Democrats still carry the day, and they are best positioned to profit from the intense changes our culture currently is going through. As polls show, the majority of Americans are fed up with wars, marriage inequality, immigration laws and gun violence. Democrats seem ready to tackle those issues, but Republicans

are fearful of losing their conservative base, which includes the tea party. Consequently, they have become labeled as a party of old, white, cranky men.

But they will survive. Democrats had the same problem during the civil rights movement of the 1960s. Their Southern Democrat wing held them back until Richard Nixon's Southern Strategy made most of them Republicans.

Republicans also had their problems in 1930, when the Great Depression caused a Democratic takeover at the state and national level. It took 20 years until New Mexico elected a Republican governor and 22 years until a Republican was elected president. Republicans still have trouble gaining a majority in the New Mexico Legislature, but they still are very much a major party in the state.

Barack Obama surprised the world by getting elected U.S. president twice. In 2008, vice-presidential candidate Sarah Palin chortled "What's a community organizer?" She and the Republican Party found out when the GOP ticket got out-organized without realizing what was happening. It took a second drubbing in 2012 to figure out what Obama was doing.

Priebus understands, and leading Republicans are beginning to jump on board with the goal of rivaling Democrats in data gathering, volunteer recruitment, voter targeting, outreach, turnout, online fundraising, ad placement and campaign talent.

Volunteer recruitment may be the most important factor of all. Mitt Romney thought he could match Obama's recruitment efforts with extra paid staff, but he was missing a key ingredient. Small government and low taxes don't turn on potential volunteers like the issues Democrats address.

Depending on how the gun debate develops in Congress and the states, Republicans may be able to draw volunteers from the NRA and other gun rights supporters, but the demographics may not be right. Gun rights supporters tend to be mostly older men, while Democrat issues such as immigration and marriage equality attract young people with energy and vision.

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# Government by the government for the government

## All aspects of citizens' lives controlled by the government

Nearly 100 years ago, Walter Lippmann wrote about the sickness of an over-governed society. Good thing he is not alive today. He would find more than a sickness with today's society. It is reasonable to ask: When is too much government really too much?

Early in the life of our country, Thomas Jefferson wrote, "The natural progress of things is for liberty to yield and government to gain ground." Especially in the last 100 years, our

government really gained ground on liberty. We certainly see the distorting influences of too much government in our lives. Americans are heading toward a society of tyranny. Perhaps we are not living in a completely totalitarian society, but it is easy to answer: Are we Americans heading toward more liberty or more tyranny?

When government tells us how many ounces of soda we can purchase at any one time, this is tyranny. Further, people in business tell horror stories about government workers who operate with the force of a dictator. For example, we have constitutional rights except when a government functionary says we do not. Can I keep from incriminating myself with the IRS via the Fifth Amendment in the Bill of Rights? No, therefore it was goodbye U. S. Constitution, regardless of Supreme Court rulings.

What should government be doing? Walter Lippmann wrote: "In a free society the state does not administer the affairs of men. It administers justice among men who conduct their own affairs." The legitimate role of government in a free society is focused only on justice and the defense of our nation both externally and internally.

Further, while I grumble at many "nanny state" regulations, I do see a smidgen of value in seat belts and helmets since they mitigate the damage I do to those citizens when I, myself, drive in error. That is justice to me, that if people drive on the road and I cause an accident, I do not kill them.

That said, government has taken the few valid interventions and made a command and control society where all citizen actions are controlled by the government. It is now government of the government by the government for the government. We know where we want to start to have the government intervene in the lives of citizens. Can we say where government intervention should end?

For anyone in a family, command and control by the leader rarely works. The male elephant can trumpet to the herd, but the herd will decide ultimately through voluntary decision making what the herd will do. Our economy is stifled by all of the rules. It is a wonder we still have anyone in business. Most of what people in business do is try to have voluntary exchange and do so in some work-around for all of the command and control government rules.

What a strange society we live in, where many citizens and businesses decide where to live in our country by tax policy. This is that distortion of our country by a society that is over-governed. How strange it is when tax policy sends jobs to other states and jobs to other countries. Strange indeed is this American life where citizens are reactive to government rather than the other way around.

The most powerful force in American business is government. And government seems oblivious to common sense. For example, our country could be a net exporter of energy. There is enough money in those untapped energy resources to deal effectively with our financial crisis if our Congress does not just spend all of that extra money as past congresses have tended to do.

We have a workable resolution of our financial crisis. However, government will not use that energy solution. So, is our country moving toward more liberty or tyranny?

Uncle Joe was makin' his rounds this spring checking the horses and cows to make sure everything had water. When he got to the bull lot, one of his prize young Charolais bulls had managed to crawl through one of the round bale feeders and was lying down happily chewing his cud.

Uncle thought over how to extricate his bull, then went for the tractor. He'd put the round bale in fresh that morning and had not yet cut the twine. That made it easy to lift the bale out of the feeder and set it out of the way.

Next, with the lance he tipped the feeder up to let the bull find his way out, but the bull panicked.

In his effort to escape, the bull stuck his head through one of the slots and took off wearing the feeder around his neck.

Joe watched the crazed critter stampe through the other young bulls in the lot, who, in turn, went berserk, scattering back and forth as if the iron monster was attacking them.

to reduce the amount of legislation to be considered to whatever is manageable. It also needs to improve the committee process to avoid redundant hearings on duplicative bills and excessive discussion on weak bills and memorials.

We also ask the Legislature to use some of the state's impressive technology resources to support their work while they are in session and the interim. The Legislative Council Service's website can post agendas, minutes, reports, spreadsheets and webcasting of

hearings. Why not allow blogs for legislators and controlled opportunities for public input? Why not use the technology that the state already has so experts can contribute data and pros and cons, allowing legislators to weigh alternatives wisely in open meetings?

If we are to move from the bottom of the ranks, New Mexico must make significant improvements in the way our citizens legislature works and the way our government operates.

No matter what, our legislators need to know the facts before they vote, and they need to refuse to act on legislation that is sprung on them at the last minute.

a series of charettes – design brainstorming sessions in which people and businesses can give their suggestions to architects and developers.

The original Downtown revitalization plans also held charettes, but there have been elements of the plan that haven't materialized or won't happen. Similar to the current Cineport 10 at Mesilla Valley Mall, the revitalization plan called for a large movie theater complex. The only property that could accommodate such a proposal, however, is where American Linen operates, and the company doesn't want to move. Also envisioned was a row of townhouses along Water Street and a civic plaza, both of which have not materialized.

City Councillor Nathan Small said he was upset to learn that Gov. Susana Martinez line-item vetoed \$250,000 for work on the plaza.

Next up for review was a parking study, which Hume said called for a parking garage structure that is not yet needed, adding that parking facilities can be very expensive.

Councillor Greg Smith countered that a parking structure may become a question of its existence creating the need in that there are businesses choosing to not locate Downtown because of the lack of parking.

"Outside of restriping ... we're going to have to address Downtown parking in some kind of concrete, conscious and cognitive way," he said.

Hume said there are other recommendations in the parking study that some would argue are not needed yet, such as the city creating a parking enforcement division. Both the study and an ad hoc committee, however, support a two-hour parking limit, he said.

The only real shortage of parking space occurs during Saturday's popular Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market. Hume said he's been working with vendors to park further away.

Smith said Downtown progress requires continuous improvements while attempting to avoid unintentional complications.

Brian Denmark, assistant city manager, said the Downtown Partnership has as its priority the plaza.

Smith said he supported the ad hoc committee's work, which he was a member of before running for council.

more water than most vegetable and fruit crops. Some are thinking of just cutting back their trees to stumps and hoping for the water picture to turn around next year, he said.

Meanwhile, Texas is suing New Mexico in the U.S. Supreme Court for not only a greater share of the meager water running through the Rio Grande, but the federal government could order the valley's farmers to stop pumping groundwater.

"If we're not careful, agriculture is going to go away, and we need to fight that," Cervantes said. "The alternative is to lose our Mesilla Valley. ... If that happens, everything about our valley is going to change."

Northern lawmakers aren't concerned, according to Cervantes.

"Pray for rain, that's what people up north are saying," Cervantes said.

While some urban policymakers see a solution to water scarcity through eliminating water use for agriculture, Cervantes said, others are even opposed to traditional agriculture because of their opposition to genetically modified foods or a utopian belief that people should be growing their own food.

"Agriculture is under attack in Santa Fe," Cervantes said.

There are even people who knowingly move into a rural agriculture community using dairies because of the smell, he said.

Unfortunately, Cervantes said, there is not a unified concern about water and agriculture in the local legislative delegation to send the message "up the Rio Grande." New Mexicans need to understand the value of water for agriculture and the economy, he said.

"If there's no water, there's no jobs and there's no economic opportunity," he said.

Cervantes said he was perplexed that it was a priority this session to protect the state's \$209 million investment in the spaceport, but he couldn't get lawmakers to be willing to spend less than half that to fund protecting water resources in the state.

## Balancing the budget

Sen. John Arthur Smith, D-Deming, chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee, expressed frustration with more lawmakers lacking the understanding that you can't spend

more than you take in.

With less federal money coming in and natural resource prices relatively low, Smith said he pushed through a series of tax incentives to help diversify and increase the state's economy.

What got less attention, he said, was the tax package that eliminated loopholes that were costing the state dearly, especially the "hold harmless" payments to local governments to reimburse them for the revenue loss of exempting food and medical services from gross receipts taxes (GRT).

The plan phases in the reductions of reimbursements from the state coffers while giving local governments the option to levy a local GRT on food and medical services.

## Political battles

State Rep. Mary Helen Garcia, D-Doña Ana County, said she returned from the session facing a lot of criticism from inside the Democratic Party.

As she has in the past sessions since Gov. Susana Martinez was elected, Garcia worked on legislation to reach the third-grade reading literacy goal. Garcia said she has made the goal of her legislation to provide intense intervention and remediation starting at kindergarten, but it still became a political battle for Democrats wanting to thwart the Republican governor's success record.

Garcia said she also has faced internal criticism for swing votes on committees to stop issues of the minimum wage and gay marriage to be resolved through constitutional amendments. A state constitutional amendment costs \$45,000 to put on the ballot, Garcia said, adding that many of her south valley constituents have a hard time understanding ballot questions.

"I don't believe that the minimum wage belongs in the (state) constitution," she said.

Garcia also claimed that a gay marriage advocacy lobbyist admitted to her the organization lacked the funds to adequately run a statewide campaign in support of a constitutional amendment, so the bill's death in committee avoided a possible defeat at the polls.

"There have been 482 state senators since New Mexico statehood in 1912," said freshman Sen. Lee Cotter, R-Doña Ana County. "I'm honored to be part of such a select group."

"It's a very collegial group and it's impressive the way the different sides come together."

body, perhaps some kind of stroke.

The news turned out to be far worse. It was brain cancer with multiple tumors. Nuñez took over the mayoral duties as Nordyke underwent intensive treatment in Houston. After losing re-election to the Legislature, Nuñez went back to work as a lobbyist and turned over the mayor pro tem duties to Bobby Torres.

When the cancer treatment proved unsuccessful, Nordyke spent final days in hospice care at Casa Del Sol Care and Rehabilitation Center.

Nordyke was a resident of Hatch for more than 40 years, arriving as a teacher after graduation from New Mexico State University. A Navy veteran of Vietnam, Nordyke held master's and bachelor's degrees from NMSU and served the Hatch Valley Public Schools system for 29 years as a teacher, principal and administrative director before retiring in 1998.

By then, however, Nordyke had started

his public life following his appointment as the village's municipal judge in 1978, a position he held for 25 years. As mayor, Nordyke would be elected for three consecutive four-year terms.

Nordyke's wife, Marcia, also has been very active in the village chamber of commerce and its annual chile festival.

Jim Hayhoe, who became close to the Nordykes as he worked on bringing the village economic opportunities related to the spaceport, described the couple as the "mother and father for the Village of Hatch."

"They've been involved in everything that happens in the community," Hayhoe said.

Nuñez couldn't agree more, saying the village wouldn't be what it is today without Nordyke.

"There's a reason his name is on the new municipal pool," Nuñez said.

Nordyke remained very interested in everything that happened in Hatch, even in hospice care, Hayhoe said, but "it was extremely sad to see his health failing him like it did."

Nordyke's daughter, Crista Nordyke-Long, has returned to help her mother through the services Tuesday, which will start at 10 a.m. at the Hatch Community Center.

## Aggies progress at practice

### Las Cruces players show leadership for NMSU defense

New Mexico State University football coach Doug Martin said Tuesday, April 16, his team is making progress during spring practice.

"I think we are developing an identity on both sides of the ball," he said. "We are starting to be a real physical football team. We are playing fast. I am really pleased with where our football team is going mentally."

Martin, who was offensive coordinator for the Aggies in 2011, said this year's team is similar to that team, but would be playing at a faster pace.

"We are a much more up-tempo offense because of the no-huddle. I think that's more of a change for the players from back in those times. I think we are a much more active offense. We are able to be a lot more multiple, and on defense I think we will be able to cause more turnovers."

One player the team could count on for offense in 2011 was running back Kenny Turner, who has since left the program. Martin said he thinks he has some players who can produce results similar to Turner.

"Germi Morrison is playing very well," Martin said, "and Brandon Betancourt, we moved him back to running back where previously he was, and those two guys are looking good. I am really pleased with the progress they have made."

The Aggies have four quarterbacks in spring practice and Martin said he is waiting to see who rises to the top of the depth chart.

"We are waiting for those guys to sort themselves out right now," he said. "King Davis III is probably behind because he is a true freshman and learning, but he is going to be an extraordinary talent down the road for us."

"I think (Andrew) Manley, (Travaughn) Colwell and (Andrew) MacDonald, those three will begin to sort themselves out as we have a couple of more scrimmages."

Martin had a lot of praise for the freshman Davis, who is listed at 6-1 and 180 pounds and built like a running back.

"Davis is a great looking young man, he could play running back, he could play a lot of things, but his ability to throw the ball is real

impressive so he is going to be a quarterback," Martin said. "He'll be a fun one for people around here to watch for a long time."

Martin said some kids with local ties are rising to leadership positions on defense.

"Matt Ramondo (Michigan State and Mayfield High School) has really emerged as a team

## Trout seeks unified title in Alamodome

### Undefeated fighters battle to achieve boxing fame and fortune

Boxing fans in Las Cruces gave a rousing send-off to boxer Austin "No Doubt" Trout at the Doña Ana Government Center early Tuesday, April 16.

The popular home-town fighter will step into the ring against Mexican puncher Saul "Canelo" Alvarez at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas at 8 p.m. Saturday, April 20. The bout will be telecast live on Showtime.

The winner of the highly anticipated match will not only have the title of undisputed Su-

per Welterweight World Champion, as Trout currently holds the WBA championship and Alvarez owns the WBC belt, he will also be catapulted into the highest level of boxing acclaim, with the prospect of fighting more mega matches against quality opponents and a host of endorsement opportunities.

Trout (26-0, 14KOs) has a one-inch height and reach advantage over Alvarez, and is considered to have better boxing skills and footwork, while Alvarez (41-0-1, 30KOs) is billed as the harder puncher, with 30 knockouts in 41 bouts.

Trout, who is trained by Las Cruces box-

ing legend Louie Burke, looked extremely fit at a charity match recently in Las Cruces, and Trout said he has been training very hard in Ruidoso to improve his weakness and exploit those of Alvarez.

Alvarez has said that one of his motivations for the fight is to avenge Trout's defeat of his brother Rigoberto, but Trout has been dismissed of Alvarez's claim.

"I've had this goal since I was a young boy," Trout said. "It's a lifelong work that I've been putting into make this happen. That is more motivation, in my opinion, than a two-year old revenge policy that he's going for."

Martin also mentioned defensive back Winston Rose as a flashy playmaker and said senior Trashaun was playing really well.

"We are starting to see some guys emerge on that side of the ball and I really like the identity that our defense is getting," Martin said. "We've gone to a 3-4 defense, which means we can put more athletes on the field, having four linebackers instead of three. What we have is really good team speed on defense, and that style of defense lets us utilize that a little bit more."

"I think the players are enjoying it, we are a lot more multiple and we can disguise coverages and blitzes a little bit better than what we have done in the past."

At practice on Saturday, April 13, redshirt freshman cornerback Miles Washington suffered a severe injury to his back while making a tackle and had to be airlifted to a hospital in El Paso. Washington is currently recovering from surgery, but his long-term prognosis is not yet determined.

Martin said he was proud of the way his team responded to the adversity.

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# NMSU softball dominates WAC

## Red hot Aggies sweep third straight conference series

Notching its third straight sweep in Western Athletic Conference play, the New Mexico State softball team worked for 7-1 win over UTSA Saturday, April 13, and came back in game two for a late-inning home run by sophomore Staci Rodriguez to beat the Roadrunners 3-2. NMSU improves to 30-14 this season and 11-1 in WAC play.

Freshman catcher Tatum Reedy finished the day going two-for-three with one run of her own and two RBI. She hit her first home run as an Aggie in game one, helping the Aggies to the 7-1 win. While going 3-for-6 on the day, Rodriguez lifted NMSU to the win in game two with two RBI and seven total bases.

"I have to tip my hat to UTSA, they came out fighting and really made us battle," head coach Kathy Rodolph said. "I think we had some good contributions at key moments in the game and I thought Alex (Newman) and Celisha (Walker) both pitched well for us. I knew coming into today that it was going to be a challenge and I think that those are the games that are making us better."

Newman worked seven complete innings between the two games and allowed just one run. Walker went 6.2 innings in the circle with two earned runs and two strikeouts. Neither pitcher allowed a walk through the two games.

UTSA finished the day with six hits in game one and 10 in game two. The Aggies were able to hold the Roadrunners to just three runs on the day and leave 11 runners stranded.

### Game one

Scoreless through the first two innings, the Aggies had three hits in the bottom half of the second inning as senior Tehani Kaaihue, Reedy and redshirt freshman Ayssa Vargas each singled, but left the bases loaded.

Vargas came up with the big hit in the bottom of the third with a two-run single through the middle after Kelsey Dodd and Malena Padilla each got a base hit and Kaaihue was hit by a pitch to load the bases. A walk by Reedy loaded the bases once again, but a two-out pop up by Adams left the bases loaded for the second inning by NMSU.

The Roadrunners answered back with their lead-off hitter of the inning hitting a first-pitch rocket over the center field wall to get on the board in the top half of the fourth.

That did not stop NMSU as a double to left center by Rodriguez plated two more Aggie runs. Seniors Amber Olive and Teresa Conrad singled their way on base. Rodriguez eventually was brought around the bases and brought across the plate on a wild pitch by UTSA's Alyssa Vordenbaum.

In the bottom half of the fifth, Kaaihue singled her way on base and worked her way to third on a passed ball by the Roadrunners' catcher and advanced to third on a strikeout. Reedy

came up with her first collegiate home run with a shot over the left side for two more Aggie runs.

NMSU sealed the win in the bottom of the sixth with a sacrifice fly that plated pinch runner Chelsea Dohrwardt.

### Game two

UTSA got the first couple of hits of game two with one in each of the first two innings. NMSU was sent away in order in the bottom half of the first and picked up just one hit in the second.

The Roadrunners plated the first two runs of the game in the top of the third off a single up the middle with runners and second and third and a play at first base.

With a 2-0 lead on the WAC-leading Aggies, Reedy and

Adams reached base on a walk and fielder's choice bunt. Olive walked to load the bases and Padilla came up with her first sacrifice fly of the season, second of the day for NMSU, to score Dohrwardt, who was pinch running for Reedy.

With Runners at the corners, Olive and Adams attempted a double steal and Adams moved safely across the plate for the tying run.

The teams were scoreless in the fourth, and UTSA came up in the top of the fifth with two shallow singles. A double play by NMSU held the Roadrunners from scoring as the outs came at first and home from the work of the Aggie defense.

In the home half of the inning, the Roadrunners got two straight outs on the Aggies to bring up power hitter Rodriguez. She knocked her 16th home run out of the park to give NMSU the 3-2 lead and the win.

NMSU heads back out on the road to meet the Texas State Bobcats on April 19-20, in San Marcos, Texas. The teams open the series with a doubleheader at 3 p.m. Friday, April 19, and close out the weekend with a single game at noon Saturday, April 20.

## Lobos top Aggies

### La Tech next NMSU opponent

The New Mexico State baseball team (19-18) fell 13-6 to in-state rival New Mexico (20-17) on a cold and extremely windy day in Albuquerque Wednesday, April 17. NMSU split the series with the Rio Grande Rivals this year and is now 4-2 against the Lobos in the last two years.

The Aggies opened the game with a solo home run by junior catcher Tanner Rust to take an early 1-0 lead, but UNM crossed the plate twice in the bottom of the inning. NMSU would not regain the lead again as the Lobos scored two more runs in the bottom of the second to take a 4-1 lead.

Another solo-shot by Rust in the top of the third made it a 4-2 game but UNM scored two more in the bottom of the third going up by the score of 6-2. NMSU went into the fifth inning down 7-2 but a two-RBI single by senior Kyle Phillips squeezed the Lobo lead to 7-4.

Starting pitcher Robert Kraft was credited with the loss and is 0-1 on the year while UNM pitcher Jake McCasland got the win and is now 1-0 this season. The Aggie defense struggled as it tallied season-high six errors while allowing seven stolen bases. The NMSU offense posted 11 hits but left 12 runners on base.

Rust led the Aggies going 2-of-5 at the dish with two homers and sophomore Cameron Haskins was 2-of-2 at the plate with a run scored. Phillips also had a 2-of-5 day batting while he marked a team-high three RBI.

NMSU heads back into Western Athletic Conference play taking on Louisiana Tech in Ruston, La., in a three-game series starting Friday, April 19. First pitch on Friday is set for 5 p.m. Both NMSU and La Tech baseball teams are planning to wear Boston Red Sox replica hats to honor those affected by the Boston Marathon tragedy.



## How to speak Australian:

Adam Scott – it's Australian for champion

The weather, the darkness, the pressure, the drama and the beauty of the game of golf came together on Sunday at the Masters. If you read my Masters column last week, you know how much I revere the Masters and how passionate I am about what goes on there.

Well, this past tournament was no exception. It was a close race with many changes at the top of the leaderboard, but Adam Scott prevailed as the first Australian golfer to win the Green Jacket at the Masters. Good on ya, mate!

Scott extinguished the pall that had come over the Aussies since Greg Norman made his famous meltdown in 1996, leading by six shots on Sunday and losing to Nick Faldo. Last summer, Scott himself had a meltdown when he was leading the Open Championship by four shots and proceeded to bogey the last four holes, only losing to South African Ernie Els at the end.

But, it's not how you fail – only how you bounce back – and bounce back Scott did at the Masters.

It was reminiscent of last year, when Bubba Watson pulled a most improbable shot. Adam Scott made three clutch putts down the stretch to win his first major. He made his final, winning 12 foot putt on the second playoff hole, after Angel Cabrera narrowly missed a birdie attempt.

"It's my destiny," Scott said.

"Such is golf," Cabrera said, adding that "God gives and takes," which expressed my thoughts perfectly.

Please allow me to share with you my

considered reactions to what happened to Tiger Woods at the Masters. Everyone has their opinion about this, and I'm only presenting my personal observations, albeit passionate, as a golf writer and a lover of the game.

First and foremost, I object to the handling of the penalty to Tiger Woods on Friday, when he took an allegedly illegal drop after hitting the ball in the water on the par 5 15th hole.

Initially, Woods laid up to sand wedge distance for his third shot and proceeded to have an unbelievable outcome as his wedge shot caromed off the flagstick and down into the water. He then went back to the original spot to replay that shot, hitting it to six feet, and making the putt for a six.

Rule number 20-2b (USGA) states that the ball "must be dropped no nearer to the hole than the specific spot which, if it is not precisely known to the player, must be estimated."

He did that.

It turns out that some self-anointed rules police officer called the tournament site (incredibly, getting through) and claimed that Tiger had made a "bad drop" – that he dropped the ball farther back from where he hit the first shot to begin with.

In an unbelievable turn of events, Masters officials agreed with that caller and assessed Tiger a two-shot penalty – the next day – giving him an 8 on that par 5 hole. It was more than 15 hours later that they even talked to Tiger.

I saw the video replay and I thought he dropped within a reasonable margin from where he hit his first shot. The point is – as I have talked about before in this very column – TV viewers should have no business influencing any outcome of any major professional sport, especially golf. If the tournament officials are not there to see or view the happen-

ings in real time, so be it.

Maybe a rules official should accompany each group in majors to make rulings on the spot. They should not let an outsider do their work for them. I fault the officials for taking the phone call from the viewer, and I fault the officials for deciding that the viewer could call the play.

Bear in mind that a relatively small number of players even appear on camera during a regular live telecast, so, automatically, the business of paying attention to a TV viewer is inherently biased and patently unfair to the field of players as a whole.

Tiger, meanwhile, presented himself as submissive to the decision of Masters officials in calling a penalty.

How would you like it if scores were changed the next day by TV viewers who call in claiming an NFL official blew a call? How about an NHL goal a TV bozo overturned? I know a lot of my readers watch those games. Why weren't so many MLB calls overturned for obvious reasons over the years?

I'll tell you why. Sports fans wouldn't have it. It would bastardize the game.

Viewers' calls aren't right in other sports, so why are they a part of golf? I think the powers that be in the golf world have the same mindset as those folks who set themselves up as the PC police.

Speaking of which, they should not have penalized 14-year-old Tianling Guan for slow play on Friday. What bozo in their right mind would have done that? Someone who didn't want to grow the game in China? It's been 10 years since they penalized any PGA professional for slow play, and yet they do it in the Masters. C'mon, man.

A few years ago, I interviewed a communications person at the PGA Tour office in Florida and asked him about a viewer who makes a phone call about rules and then gets to talk to someone at the tournament site

My conclusion was that some insider cretin who has a bone to pick – and who has some familiarity with the rules – has a special phone number to a tournament person and can be heard. That's insane.

Some of you agree that golf should be a game of integrity. They have turned it into a matter of dis-integrity by including viewers as the deciders. Bobby Jones, the quintessential

### 100 years ago

#### 1913

• A heavy rain fell over the Mesilla Valley and from El Paso to Elephant Butte Sunday afternoon and night and again Monday night. The rain may have contributed to the collapse of the roof of an adobe home on Main Street, occupied by Mrs. Hickerson. No one was hurt, but the rain damaged some furniture.

• A number locomotive engineers and firemen were laid off at Elephant Butte due to a scarcity of work in their line. All labor was taken off sand storage and sand hoppers and devoted to excavating the river bed so as to reach bedrock on which the foundation of the dam would rest. It was expected that masonry laying would begin in 10 days to two weeks.

### 75 years ago

#### 1938

• More than 90 prominent El Paso club women joined the Mesilla Valley Garden Club for a tour of the college experimental farms and flower gardens. The tour was conducted by Prof. W.P. man of honor, is turning over in his grave because that happened. The PGA Tour and the USGA have changed the rules for disqualification, identification of the ball in the hazard and, so far, anchoring putters.

I contend they absolutely have to amend the rules to eliminate call-in rules police. They need to have rules marshals following every group, especially in majors, to look at and determine whether a rules violation has happened. After the hole is played, so be it.

Instant replay may have a place in other professional (and college) sports, but not in golf. It would be like after the next football snap happens, you can't go back and look at the previous play.

It infuriates me the way tournament rulers aren't around to call the plays and cave in to TV callers. Tournament directors, officials and the PGA bring dishonor to the game of golf by allowing distant TV watchers to influence golf history. There are many who felt that in lieu of Tiger not being disqualified for signing a wrong scorecard, he should have withdrawn from the tournament, and that CBS influenced the "goose that laid the golden egg" to continue to play to boost the TV audience.

Greg Norman bemoaned the fact that Tiger did not withdraw as less than honorable. As for the outcry that Tiger should have been disqualified or should have disqualified himself, I would refer you to USGA rule 33-7 which reads: "A penalty of disqualification may in exceptional individual cases be waived, modified or imposed if the Committee con-

siders such action warranted."

Golf is an honorable game played for centuries without interference by TV watchers. In my view, professional golf has no moral integrity and no honor as long as they continue to pander to self-styled couch-potato TV rules police.

With respect to Tiger's role in the dreadful mishap, which effectively nixed his 15th major win, he certainly bears responsibility. There is no excuse for Tiger or his caddy not knowing the "as nearly as possible" drop rule (rule 26-1a and 26-2b).

Joe LaCava, Wood's caddy, was nowhere to be seen or heard from for the drop. He should have had a part in it, or at least slowed things down.

The whole affair reminded me of the tragic ending that befell Argentinian Roberto DeVicenzo in the 1967 Masters, when a fellow competitor (Tommy Aaron) marked down a 4 instead of a birdie 3 on his 71st hole (the 17th) and DeVicenzo signed the card, thereby leaving him out of a playoff by stroke.

"What a stupid I am," he bitterly lamented to the press.

Indeed, golf is a cruel game. That's my story and I'm stickin' to it.

Meanwhile, Sergio Garcia and Lee Westwood are two of the best players in the world who haven't won a major. Garcia was leading after the first round and the media made a big deal of it. But they also quoted him as remarking, "I don't know if I'll ever win one of these (a major)," Westwood may be a tough customer in the Ryder Cup, but he will never win a major unless he gets angrier.

Back to the winner of the 2013 Masters, Adam Scott. It seems he redeemed himself after a meltdown on the final four holes of the 2012 Open Championship. He would say that this win is the sweetest by far, since he is the first Aussie to win the Green Jacket.

He did it with his putting. He uses the very long wand that he anchors to his chest and makes the smoothest stroke imaginable. Angel Cabrera, winner of the 2009 Masters, uses the conventional putter and make the smoothest stroke possible. I don't care if a player uses a 10-foot long putter held above his head. He still has to read the break and makes the perfect unhurried stroke.

As the "Famous Japanese Pro" says, "Ball in hole important."

God bless the geezers. I contend that some of the players who make up the field of the Masters should decline the invitation. Ian

Woosnam, Craig Stadler and Ben Crenshaw, to wit. You aren't going to like me saying this, but I would favor invitations going to young Asian players if, as Tim Finchem asserts, we want to grow the game internationally.

Still, Freddie Couples, at 53, who had it to 5-under and was in contention, if ever so briefly, gives us geezer chops reason to keep playing. And Bernard Langer, at 58, lit it up on Sunday for a few holes before fading with his energy sapped and weather making the course several strokes tougher.

I found the CBS telecast to be enjoyable, but not one of their best performances. They need to show more shots by more players and less walking away from the greens.

Someone from CBS should go to the American Country Music awards to see what excitement and a lively show is all about. Folks I have talked to tell me that they were disappointed in not knowing what other golfers were doing on the course, while CBS focused on one or two particular players.

I was also disappointed in the boring and repetitive advertising. IBM's slogan "Let's build a smarter planet" is passé. I would like to build a smarter - mostly safer - planet by institutionalizing the severely mentally ill individuals, like Adam Lanza and James Holmes, so they wouldn't murder masses of innocent people.

As for Exxon-Mobil, who propose to raise science and math scores in schools in order to boost our economy, I would wonder why their money and efforts aren't directed at preventing oil spills. Their empty words ponder "Let's solve this."

My favorite ad from Masters week was from ATT, with a weary air traveler who lands in a remote Alaska airstrip and presses a button for a car rental. Amazed that an agent appears on the screen he asks, "Are you a real person?" and she replies, "I am."

I want to know that rental company. On a more somber note, my heartfelt thoughts and prayers go out to the victims and families of those who were slain and injured in the bombing at the finish line the Boston Marathon Monday, April 15. I have a special place in my heart for that American Patriots' Day tradition. I ran four Boston Marathons (back in the day), with a best time of 2 hours 40 minutes in 1980. I am still a good friend of Bill Rodgers, America's top marathoner in the 1970s and winner of four Bostons.

So, now that the governor has finally signed the “limited liability” space travel bill into law and Spaceport America is able to move forward with business unusual, the question surfaces once again: Would you do it? Would you pay \$200,000 for a two-hour ticket to the Earth’s outer atmosphere and a place in the pages of history?

Getting into outer space, it seems, has become big business. In fact, the official Virgin Galactic website is currently booking for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity with a “range of different reservation options to suit your preferences on flight timing and amount of deposit required.” Which means the more money you plunk down, the more likely you’ll be to get there, but they’ll check your references just to be sure.

According to that website, more than 500 people have paid their deposits and are eagerly awaiting their chance to climb aboard the world’s first commercial spaceline. People just like you and me, only richer and more privileged. Not surprisingly, the list of celebrities who are ponying up for the opportunity continues to grow, with names like Victoria Principal, Bryan Singer, Russell Brand, Ashton Kutcher and Stephen Hawking already on the roster.

## Tresco’s 45th begins Nonprofit plans a year of celebration

Expect to see a lot more of Tresco Inc. in the coming year, as the nonprofit serving the developmentally disabled celebrates its 45th anniversary.

With a theme of “45 Years Enhancing People’s Lives,” Tresco will spread community awareness with a billboard, a Fourth of July parade float and an open house in July.

A community-based nonprofit owned by the consumers it serves, Tresco is deeply interconnected with the business community throughout southern New Mexico. Tresco employs some 600 people and places and supports clients and other persons with disabilities in jobs at 16 private businesses in the area,

as well as in local schools and government-run facilities.

Alfonso Sanchez, vocational services director, said the nonprofit has a “tremendous” impact on the community.

“Aside from the jobs we provide ... we are consumers. Our clients rent apartments and buy homes. They go out to restaurants, use services in the community,” he said.

It wasn’t always that way.

Before the advent of Tresco in Las Cruces and a national cultural shift, people with developmental disabilities lived quiet lives, out of sight of the greater community. They were both stigmatized and institutionalized.

“Fifty years ago, people sent their children to an institution. Some were ashamed of their children,” Sanchez said. “Parents are now more active in the lives of their sons and daughters

and expect them to be more active in the community – to go to school and graduate and possibly get a job after they graduate.”

He said the key word is inclusion.

“Our services facilitate a person being included in the community,” Sanchez said. “Inclusion comes when people not only work in the community but when people start inviting them to birthday parties and on fishing trips.”

Tresco was the catalyst for inclusion in the City of the Crosses.

### Opening doors

Forty five years ago a group of parent with disabled adult children got together to obtain services for them. Among them were Willis Parsons and Gabriel Paz, “two of the founding members we lost this past year,” Sanchez said.

He said they started their program in the back room of a church on Valley Drive. Known as the Open Door Center, the program began offering social services to developmentally disabled adults and soon expanded to work with infants. Don Darenkrug was the first director.

A \$15 million renovation and addition will transform the aging and now vacant Hershel Zohn Theater into offices and classrooms for the College of Business Domenici Center and Arrowhead Center at New Mexico State University.

The business college hosted a ribbon cutting at 1:30 p.m. Friday, April 12, at the site of the future Pete V. Domenici Hall.

Special features of the building will include a newly constructed atrium and an auditorium that will be created in the former theater.

Prior to the event, Garrey Carruthers, dean of the business college, said Domenici Hall was funded in part by a \$10 million legacy gift Congress approved to pay tribute to Domenici when he retired from the U.S. Senate. It will contain a replica of Domenici’s Capitol Hill office.

Carruthers said \$9 million of the legacy gift was set aside for the building.

“It wasn’t enough, and so I went to the

“About the time the parents got together, the state and federal governments started funding programs,” Sanchez said.

The center merged with a program in Socorro in the 1970s and became Tresco, short for Tres Condados (Three Counties).

Although the name was apt at the time, the current Tresco service area stretches far beyond.

In the early years, Tresco ran group homes where clients could live and a wood shop and a printing company where they worked.

“We closed all of them because they were not integrated,” Sanchez said. “We moved out into the community.”

The transition occurred in the late 1980s and early '90s, he said.

Today Tresco's main office, where it located in 1997, is at 1800 Copper Loop. The TOTS program is at 2325 E. Nevada Ave. There is also an office in Socorro.

Tresco consists of three major divisions – Tresco Tots, community living and vocational services. In addition, there is respite program for families caring for the severely disabled.

Sanchez said that while some area residents are aware of one of the services, most don't know the full range of Tresco's endeavors.

Tresco TOTS is an early intervention and training service for families with children age 0-3 born with developmental disabilities or at risk.

The community living division assists adults with disabilities to live in the community.

“We assist them in life skills training and in enjoying the community through getting out on weekends and evening,” Sanchez said.

Vocational services encompasses both meaningful adult day services and community employment services, he said.

Adult meaningful day services offers opportunities to visit the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market, send-off festivities for champion boxer Austin Trout, swimming and visits to the library and a gym.

## At work in the community

Community employment services finds jobs for clients and coaches those employees and their employers.

Sanchez said New Mexico State University has been a major employer of Tresco workers for 22 years and two of those employees have retired from the university after long careers. Most at NMSU work in grounds keeping, maintenance and custodial jobs.

Another long-standing major employer is McDonalds, owned by Mike Lavin. Sanchez said Lavin's Tresco staff typically works as lobby attendants.

Due to its location, Tresco has been able to take advantage of employment opportunities at White Sands Missile Base and other government facilities in the area.

Contracting with these employers is made possible by state and federal funding that came into being with the Javits-Wagner-O'Day Act in the mid '50s to offer opportunities to minorities, Sanchez said.

Government contracts specify that 75 percent of these workers have disabilities of some kind. A total of 65 with developmental disabilities currently are working at government sites, Sanchez said.

“We can hire a plumber with one eye or a welder with one hand,” he said, “somebody who has skills society doesn't feel are marketable anymore.”

Tresco's White Sands crews are at work in all the military dining facilities, the stock commissary and the High Energy Laser Testing facility. They do all the custodial work at the main base, which comprises 200 buildings and “several million square feet” of grounds.

Legislature about a year ago and got another \$5 million,” he said. There have been subsequent gifts from private donors.

“The private donor who gave the money for the theater wanted to make sure all the audio and technology known to man would be in that theater,” he said.

At the ceremony Carruthers acknowledged the donor as Peyton Yates, an alumnus and the first College of Business Executive in Residence.

Carruthers said he believes the auditorium will be the second largest classroom on campus.

“There is a great need for larger classrooms, especially for introductory classes,” he said.

Mike Cheney, chairman of the NMSU Board of Regents, said the new building is a great opportunity to display Domenici's work.

Manuel Pacheco, interim president of the university, credited Domenici with leadership in moving New Mexico to the

Other government clients include the Department of Game and Fish, the Bureau of Land Management and the New Mexico Department of Transportation, which has been partnering with Tresco for 22 years. Sanchez said Tresco crews provide maintenance at rest area north to Socorro, south to Anthony and west to Lordsburg.

“The average wage of our funded clients is \$9.15 an hour,” Sanchez said. “The average privately employed is \$8.52 and the overall wage is \$8.92.”

He said some of the people for whom Tresco has found jobs at White Sands began their affiliation as infants with the TOTS program 20 years ago.

“We've come full circle,” he said.

Although the organization has accomplished much, there is more to do, Sanchez said.

Tresco is committed to employing the developmentally disabled and educating the community, he said.

“There is still a lot of educating to be done,” Sanchez said. “We've opened the doors to educating and to letting employees we serve live normal lives.”

Tresco CEO and President Pam Lillibridge said the anniversary celebration will acknowledge “what we and particularly the people we serve have accomplished.”

Lillibridge, who has been with Tresco 23 years, said the number of long-term staff is a tribute to the mission of the organization – and the great community support it receives.

She said the significance of the anniversary is that in the 45 years Tresco has been in business, the community has evolved in how it sees people with disabilities and Tresco in turn has evolved.

“In the 1960s, when Tresco opened a school, it was because people with disabilities weren't allowed to be in school,” she said.

forefront in the development of sustainable energy.

He said the former senator's interest in NMSU made it possible for the university to take its rightful place in the state.

“You have a rich heritage of materials and we know it will processed in a way to do credit to you,” he assured Domenici.

“This is a great second life for a beautiful old building – a life dedicated to free enterprise,” Domenici said.

Following the groundbreaking, architect Van Gilbert said the 1950s building has “great bones.”

“To take a program like this with the Domenici papers and incorporate it into a building is amazing,” he said. There will be archival space with precisely controlled 40 percent humidity.

“This is what I think a university should be about – talking about things that are going on in the world today.”

He said crews will remove an addition put on years ago and do a new addition, which will become the atrium. It will evolve into a “very important space for space for discussions” that will bring students and faculty together.

goes away,” Gilbert said.

He said the atrium will foster “the brush-off concept of education.”

It will be enhanced by markers designed by the winner of an art department competition to honor donors who participate in the project by contributing \$500 to a campaign announced at the groundbreaking.

Interior space will house three major classrooms, three smaller ones and three seminar rooms as well as graduate student offices, Gilbert said.

The auditorium will feature the latest in audio-visual equipment, cameras, a divided screen for distance learning, “the newest and best in LED lighting” and acoustic treatment for ceilings and walls.

All systems will be redone for Domenici Hall, including heating and air conditioning and the electrical system, which will be new “from the transformer all the way in,” Gilbert said.

Construction will get under way immediately and is scheduled for completion July 1, 2014, when Congressional funding expires.

**Second half property tax bills mailed**

Doña Ana County Treasurer David Gutierrez has mailed the second-half property tax installment notices, and he reminds property owners that they have until Friday, May 10 to pay their second-half property taxes before state-mandated interest and penalties begin to accumulate.

Gutierrez said his office has placed a priority on convenience for the public, noting that payments can be made a number of ways, such as:

- By mailing your payment to the Treasurer's Office using the self-addressed envelope provided with the tax notice.
- By check or money order at any of the 10 Wells Fargo Bank branches, located from Sunland Park to Hatch, where money orders for the payment of taxes are provided free of charge to any Wells Fargo customer.
- At the Treasurer's Office, 845 Motel Blvd., from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- By using the drop box inside the Doña Ana County Government Center, adjacent to the Treasurer's Office teller windows.
- Online with a credit or debit card, or electronic checks at [www.donaanacounty.org/tax/](http://www.donaanacounty.org/tax/). There is a nominal fee for this service.

If your taxes are paid by an escrow holder, the company will receive the tax notice.

Property owners who have not paid their taxes in full and did not receive reminders should immediately contact the Treasurer's Office at 647-7433.

Property owners can avoid penalties and interest by making arrangements to pay their property taxes on time. Once penalty and interest are incurred, there are no provisions in the property tax code to remove them from an account.

**NMSU Library staff members win scholarships**

New Mexico State University Library staff members Jonathan Butz and Felipe Castillo of the library's Reference & Research Services Department were both awarded scholarships to attend the New Mexico Library Association conference in Albuquerque Wednesday through Friday, April 17-19.

The scholarships were made available by the New Mexico State Library to support professional development among librarians and library staff in New Mexico. Applications from employees of all types of libraries in the state were considered

and a total of nine scholarships were awarded. Each stipend provides up to \$300 to reimburse registration, hotel, travel and meal costs.

**EPA gives green award to NASA White Sands test facility**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is recognizing the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) White Sands Test Facility in Las Cruces, for its efforts in increasing the amount of waste recycled from 158 tons in 2011 to 10,756 tons in 2012, resulting in a 6,708 percent improvement. This achievement by the facility has earned them the award for the Highest Overall Level of Performance nationally in the Federal Green Challenge.

The Federal Green Challenge (FGC) is a national effort under EPA's Sustainable Materials Management program that challenges federal agencies throughout the country to lead by example in reducing the federal government's environmental impact. Federal agencies are recognized through the FGC for outstanding efforts that go beyond regulatory compliance and strive for annual improvements in selected areas.

In 2012, nearly 300 participating federal facilities, representing 500,000 federal employees, reduced their environmental footprint in several target areas, which in many cases resulted in significant cost savings. Some of the accomplishments made by the FGC participants included diverting more than 360,000 tons of waste, saving over 52 million kilowatts of electricity, saving 488,000 gallons of oil, and reducing potable water usage by 133 million gallons.

These combined efforts resulted in an estimated cost savings of more than \$31 million to the U.S. taxpayer.

**State Land Office earns \$44.8 million in March**

In the month of March, the New Mexico State Land Office (NMSLO) earned \$44.8 million in revenue for the beneficiaries of the state land trust. The NMSLO is responsible for managing state trust lands to generate income for 22 beneficiaries and for taking care of the lands so they are healthy and productive for the future.

Of the \$44.8 million dispersed, approximately \$40.4 million

went to support public schools in New Mexico, \$546,000 went to state colleges and universities, \$1.98 million went to special schools, \$491,000 went to hospitals and the remaining \$1.3 million went to other institutions, including the State Penitentiary and public buildings, water reservoirs, Rio Grande improvements and other beneficiaries.

**Grants available for 2,600 homeless veterans**

The U.S. Department of Labor announced April 3 the availability of up to \$5 million to fund 16 or more Homeless Veterans Reintegration Program grants. Approximately 2,600 veterans will receive job training and related services to help them succeed in civilian careers.

Funds for the grants will be awarded on a competitive basis to state and local work force investment boards, public agencies, nonprofit organizations, tribal governments, and faith-based and community organizations. Because these groups are intimately connected with their local economies and the needs of homeless veterans, they can offer occupational, classroom and on-the-job training, as well as job search and placement assistance, including follow-up services. Awards will range from \$100,000 to \$300,000 each.

**NMSU scientist joins RAIPAP team**


New Mexico State University's Rural Agricultural Improvement and Public Affairs Project has a new tool to help underserved farmers be better agricultural producers.

# Ed Murphy, B2BCFO: World-traveling CFO settles in Las Cruces

Consultant advises business owners on succeeding, exiting

Want to impress the bank? Hire a CFO.

Although not every business grossing \$3 million can afford its own CFO, having one may pay off in a number of ways. Impressing a potential lender is just one example.

Finding the right CFO could be simple: Engage Ed Murphy. Murphy, with more than 37 years of experience as a corporate and public-sector CFO and COO, has settled in Las Cruces, where he hires out for growing businesses that really need a CFO – part time.

He consulted from his home base in California before affiliating in 2010 as a partner with B2BCFO, a national group that acts as a marketing partner for him and others, extending the resources of each partner.

“The trick is, for a very small amount of money a business can access an experienced CFO with an extensive network of resources,” Murphy said. “Most clients like the idea that if they have an issue I’m not familiar with, I can post it on the Internet and have 200 CFOs looking into it.”

He acts as a part-time CFO for 10 to 16 clients at a time. Clients range in size – some with up to \$40 million in annual revenue.

“When I start working with a client, there is a lot of cost up front solving problems,” he said. “The idea is to become a long-term adviser and maybe see the client only once month or once a quarter. There is room for flexibility, because everybody has a different need.”

On the other hand, smaller businesses and even startups could benefit from a limited engagement with the partners, he said.

## The discovery begins

Murphy said a typical project begins when a client brings an issue to him and he begins work on a game plan.

“It starts with the discovery process,” he said.

There is no charge for this service.

“Hopefully, they have financial statements, but some just work out of a checkbook,” Murphy said.

During discovery he analyzes the client’s records and does industry comparisons. This leads him to the point at which he and the client examine what is causing concern. Sometimes it’s accounts receivable or payable or the inventory process.

“Every company, no matter its size, should have a CFO,” Murphy said, “an experienced financial person to talk with making business decisions, help with planning and focus on profitability.”

After two or three initial meetings, much of the business he conducts takes place via email, Skype and GoToMeeting.

Murphy said about 20 percent of his current clients are local. Most of the remainder are based in New Mexico, California and Nevada.

## Smooth exit ahead

Among Murphy’s areas of expertise are acquisitions, business exit planning and the sale of businesses.

His charge is to fix what’s wrong and/or plan ahead for the companies that engage him.

In one instance, he started work on a one-year project. “They thought they had an underwriting problem,” Murphy said. “By the time we got done, they didn’t have an underwriting problem, they had a management problem.”

He shared with them several issues he saw, including one that turned out to be a dead end. “Forget that one. That’s my brother-in-law, and I’m not going there,” the business owner told him.

Rapidly growing, family-owned businesses that are heavily family staffed are a special challenge, he said.

“When they get to about \$10 million revenue they have to start dealing with management issues,” he said. “They need someone with more skills, or they need to divide jobs. They need to look at where they’re going and the next move they’ll make. If they don’t, the business owner ends up spending most of his time fixing things.”

Family business owners also need an exit strategy, Murphy said.

He said he is working with two Las Cruces energy companies, one rapidly growing and the other “getting ready to go gangbusters.”

“Before we can even get there, we need to how you’re going to get out,” he said.

Murphy said exit planning serves two distinct populations. One is young entrepreneurs who know they don’t want to stay with the same business all their lives and have a five- to seven-year timeline. The second is people who have been in business 15 to 20 years.

Although the discussions are different, both groups need to look at bringing in a specialist and structuring a sale, he said.

## Travels with Ed

A Massachusetts native, Murphy was raised in Southern California.

He served with the Air Force in Vietnam. While in the service, he traveled to Alaska, Japan, the Philippines, Hawaii, Wake Island and Australia.

He later relied on his VA benefits to help pay for his accounting studies at the University of Southern California.

Ten years later, he earned an MBA at Pepperdine University.

Murphy worked with construction companies that built bridges and did offshore construction for oil and gas companies from 1974 to 1987.

His position as corporate controller took him to Singapore, Mexico City, Egypt, the United Kingdom, Iraq, Brazil, Argentina, Nigeria and Israel. He

was responsible for everything from financial reporting to risk management.

“International business is the most fun job,” he said.

He said the challenges such as foreign exchange and political risk appeal to him.

“There is nothing more intriguing than working in an environment where things are not done according to U.S. rules,” he said.

In 1987 the team sold the construction company and he joined Devon Industries, a manufacturer of sterile products for hospital operating rooms, as CFO and later moved into the COO slot. The team built a \$15 million business into an \$80 million company in eight and a half years.

“We reached the level of profitability where it made sense to sell at the top of the market,” he said.

In 1996, he sold the medical device company and did consulting for a number of industries, including banks, retail and construction.

One client was a large, Atlanta-based manufacturer and installer of commercial carpet.

“They did a \$400 million acquisition,” Murphy said. “There were 58 locations reporting 56 different ways. They needed to standardize their accounting.”

In 2005, Murphy left high-cost, crowded Ventura, Calif., for Las Cruces, which offered everything he was seeking: a reasonably sized city with a university less than an hour from an international airport.

A golfer and Sonoma Ranch resident, he quipped: “Worse things could happen to you.”

In addition to consulting, he is involved with the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance and the High Tech Council of Southern New Mexico, working with angel and venture capitalists to secure the location of medical technology and other advanced technology businesses in the Mesilla Valley.

# Where is the inflation?

## Rapid money growth but prices remain tame

We economics professors teach in our classes that prices and money supply tend to move together.

Over the long haul, a 10 percent rise in the money supply will be associated with a 10 percent rise in prices, holding all else constant. This prediction hasn't been validated by recent experience.

Money supply in the United States has been increased aggressively by the Federal Reserve. Starting with the failure of Lehman Brothers in September 2008, the Fed has done everything it can to provide liquidity to the financial system. Indeed, it more than doubled the money base in the year following Lehman's collapse, a move unprecedented in U.S. history.

Meanwhile, the price level has hardly changed. Inflation has averaged 2 percent since 2008. Where is the inflation that so many would have predicted before the events of the last five years?

The theory linking prices and money

supply dates back at least to the 18th century Scottish philosopher David Hume. The argument is straightforward. If money supply increases but the supply of goods remains constant, then the money will be used to bid up the price of goods, assuming that is, that people don't choose to hold the money in their pockets rather than spend it.

The reason money growth has not translated into inflation is that people are choosing to hold money rather than spend. Banks in particular are holding excess reserves of \$1.7 trillion. Prior to 2008, bank excess reserves typically were less than \$2 billion.

Besides banks, individuals and corporations are holding more money without spending it. Household debt service as a percentage of disposable income hit a record low in the fourth quarter. Meanwhile, corporations held a record \$1.24 trillion in cash. Apple alone held \$137 billion in cash reserves.

All this money sloshing around yet nobody is spending. And if they don't spend, they aren't bidding up prices, so no inflation.

The underlying reason is excessive caution. People are still running scared from the 2008 financial crisis. No one

wants to spend if they fear losing a job. Corporations don't want to invest if they think they can't sell the product. Banks don't want to lend if they think they won't be repaid.

The financial crisis is now getting long in the tooth. People decide to start spending again, if they start putting all that hoarded cash to work, the result could very well lead to higher prices. That's why many economists, including yours truly, warn of inflation toward the end of this decade.

The Fed has a plan, however. Starting in 2008, the Fed has paid interest on reserves. This gives the Fed a new tool. If banks begin to lend out excess reserves, the Fed can increase interest payments, inducing banks to continue to hold reserves. The Fed can then slowly bring down the money supply, avoiding inflation.

On paper, it might well work. One problem: It's never been done before. Let's hope the Fed can pull it off.

# Better things to come?

## New-home sales fuel boost in local Q-1 median price

I wrote in this column last week that the median price of the new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums sold in the Las Cruces area during the first-quarter of this year exceeded last year's Q-1 median price by more than \$7,300.

What I did not include in the piece was

the fact that new-home sales were the driving force behind the increase in value. The median is where half sold for more and half sold for less.

Prior to the first quarter of this year, local homebuilders struggled to attract customers as first-time and repeat buyers opted to purchase comparable three-to-five year old bank- and government-owned homes at prices that were 20 to 30 percent below new-home prices. Such homes were bargains, upwards of 40 percent of them sold in excess of their asking prices at time of sale.

At last count, around 35 percent of

pending sales are being transacted on bank and government-owned properties. A sale is considered pending after the purchase agreement has been signed but before the transaction has closed. Not surprisingly, this high level of demand created a shortage of available properties and drove prices upward. While today's demand for these types of properties remains high, only about 21 percent of the available existing-home inventory is owned by banks and the feds.

This shortage of distressed properties has inspired buyers to reconsider the value of purchasing a new home, which many of them have done. As a result, the number of new-home sales booked in the first quarter of this year equaled the number of new homes sold in Q-1 2012 – effectively reversing the downward trajectory of

new-home production.


We all know that numbers can be tortured to admit to anything, but I think these statistics are the real deal. Our marketplace has been throwing off many indicators of better things to come for quite some time. By all accounts, we're experiencing the beginning of those better times right now.

# NMDA to host safety workshops

## Workshops prepare NM's food producers for new legislation

New Mexico's farmers, ranchers and food processors are invited to attend one of three workshops across the state to help them better understand how new federal food safety legislation could impact their business.

New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) and the Southwest Border Food Safety and Defense Center at New Mexico State University are hosting the workshops to explain the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA).

FSMA is federal legislation that is being implemented by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). According to that agency, the new law "enables FDA to focus more on preventing food safety problems rather than relying primarily on reacting to problems after they occur."

FSMA provides for FDA to mandate new produce safety standards and preventive controls for food facilities, among other new measures of authority. Because FSMA covers such wide-ranging areas as prevention, inspection, response and imports, FDA will implement the new law portions at a time over the next few years.

"The first goal of these workshops is to share the most current, useful information about FSMA with New Mexico's food producers," said New Mexico Secretary of Agriculture Jeff Witte. "The second goal is to ask for input from attendees so I can share with the FDA just how this law will affect our farmers, ranchers and others who are in the business of producing food in New Mexico."

Debra Garrison of PrimusLabs, a food safety consulting firm that works with companies throughout the produce and food industries, and Tyler Holmes, food safety manager for Morrow Farms, a family-owned farm in Hatch, will lead the workshops.

Because FDA is seeking public comment on FSMA, NMDA will also use the workshops to gather input on the first parts of the law to be implemented. NMDA will compile that feedback and send it to FDA before the current public comment period ends May 16.

The first workshop will be held at 3 p.m. Monday, April 29, in the Colfax Room at Corbett Center Student Union on the NMSU campus. Two more workshops will be held in Portales Tuesday, April 30, and in Albuquerque Wednesday, May 1. The workshops are free and open to any farmer, rancher or food producer in New Mexico. 

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

## Once upon a time in the Southwest ...

### Open Stage 2013 draws internationally acclaimed artists

In the winter of 2007, a group of friends and New Mexico State University students – poets, rappers, spoken-word artists, dancers and others – became tired of the tepid to antagonistic responses their work and performances garnered at other “literary” open mics and banded together, forming Soul Verse.

In the five years since, the group, which hosts just more than 10 members, as well as others with varying degrees of involvement, has continued their mission: to bring together the diverse poetic, musical, locomotive and artistic talents of NMSU students and the Las Cruces community, and to provide a comfortable and open forum for creative expression that cultivates and furthers self-respect, self-love, empowerment and fellowship, aggressively seeking and embracing differences in the hopes of transforming limited understandings of ourselves and others.

In 2008, through a collaboration with the Associated Students of New Mexico State University (ASNMSU) the group expanded its aims and, in an effort to make its voices heard, held the first Open Stage event, featuring all student and local artists.

In subsequent years, Soul Verse has held the Open Stage event annually, growing larger and drawing a wide array of local, national and international acts – as well as a larger and more diverse crowd each year.

Since 2008’s Open Stage, Soul Verse has made strides to bring to the City of the Crosses a wide array of music styles, cultures and nationalities, drawing groups from all over the world, including Brazilian singer-songwriter Céu, Puerto Rican hip-hoppers/rumberos Alkem, French-Chilean musician/MC Ana Tijoux and virulently hyper-political rapper Immortal Technique out of Harlem via Lima, Peru – who, as an aside, was rumored to be quite a diva despite his incendiary, “for the people” political rhetoric. Needless to say, he isn’t likely to return.



2012 iTunes UK Rap/Hip-hop Album of the Year winner Oddisee will headline Open Stage 2013, Saturday, April 27, at the Corbett Center Student Union outdoor stage. Trek Life, Chicano Batman and Next Level Records are also scheduled to perform.

Following the course of inviting conscious, progressively minded musicians of all genres from around the globe, Open Stage 2013, the festival’s sixth iteration, kicks off at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, April 27, at the Corbett Center Student Union (CCSU) outdoor stage, with a roster of nationally and internationally recognized poets, rappers and musicians set to perform. The event, as always, is free and open to not only NMSU students, but the community at large.

Headlining this year’s Open Stage is producer-rapper Oddisee, whose critically lauded debut album “People See What They Hear” has received widespread acclaim – including being named the 2012 iTunes UK Rap/Hip-Hop Album of the Year.

Oddisee – real name Amir Mohammed el Khalifa – was born in Washington, D.C., and now splits his time three ways between his hometown, Brooklyn, N.Y., and London. His soulful take on the classic boom-bap sound, all crisp, snapping snares

and floating horns, built up from the warmth of ’70s soul.

In his three previous Open Stage appearances, Oddisee has rapped, spoken and produced music for other artists with whom he shared the bill. He’s appeared onstage both alone and with friends. This year, however, his set will be a bit unexpected – in addition to teaming up with fellow Mello Music Group artists and Open Stage co-headliner Trek Life, Oddisee will be backed by a full band.

Trek Life, also no stranger to the CCSU outdoor stage, hails from West Covina, Calif., right in the middle of the suburbs of Rancho Cucamonga and the urban sprawl of Inglewood. Growing up in the era of widespread gang activity and police brutality that plagued Southern California, Trek focused his efforts on his music, crafting his own brand of soul-soaked hip-hop.

“Aztlán Superheroes” Chicano Batman, out of Los Angeles, will bring their unique blend of ’60s and ’70s Brazilian bossa nova and samba, spaced-out psychedelia, slow, sweet soul and a dash of surf-rock cumbia – not to mention their trademark powder-blue ruffled tuxedo shirts – to the CCSU stage as well, the perfect soundtrack to a warming spring evening.

Also performing at this year’s Open Stage are Juárez rap cooperative Next Level Records, NMSU student singer-songwriter Eric Burton and NMSU students and rappers Rhyval and S-Out, rounding out what is sure to be an evening of music unlike anything Las Cruces have ever seen.

Excited about the show? Get started a day early, with a special pre-show at 7 p.m. Friday, April 26, at the CCSU auditorium featuring HBO Def Poetry legend and National Poetry Slam champion Shihan, with special guests.

In all, Open Stage 2013 promises to provide the community with a great night of dancing and music – just in time for the warm, long evenings of spring – as well as furthering Soul Verse’s mission to keep creating art and music in an environment that fosters a sense of belonging, of respect and of community, open to anyone with something to say.

# Technology sparks change

## 'Dead Man's Cell Phone' examines our connections

As engaging and compelling as its title suggests, "Dead Man's Cell Phone" by Sarah Ruhl is far from a simple, funny play. The play is not a walk in the park; it is one you have to live with for a while before coming up with an opinion about this provocative work.

Ruhl is the recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship and the PEN/Laura Pels International Foundation for Theater Award for a distinguished American playwright in mid-career. She was a Pulitzer finalist for her 2004 play "The Clean House" and a Tony nominee for her most recent play, "In the Next Room: The Vibrator Play." After watching "Dead Man's Cell Phone" and reading about her other works, Ruhl seems to have a fixation on gadgetry.

"Cell phones, iPods, wireless computers will change people in ways we don't even understand," Ruhl said in an interview with John Lahr in "The New Yorker."

"We're less connected to the present. No one is where they are. There's absolutely no reason to talk to a stranger anymore – you connect to people you already know. But how well do you know them? Because you never see them – you just talk to them. I find that terrifying."

In addition to background on the English literary masters such as Charles Dickens and John Donne, which appears in director Ceil Herman's notes and dramaturg Elizabeth Turner's comments, it might have served the Black Box audience as well to include a short lesson about "Theatre of the Absurd," elements of which figure prominently in this challenging, contemplative play.

While we, the eager audience, wait not for Godot (the classic theatre of the absurd play), but for this play's Gotterdammerung-like resolution, we ought to be equipped with a state-of-the-art GPS to know where we are headed – to the past, to the present, to the future, as well as deep inside the imaginations of the quirky characters.

The play presents us with Jean, a character comfortable making up lies to satisfy those to whom she speaks. We know little about her past, other than she works in Washington, D.C., at the Holocaust Memorial Museum. She is present at the death of Gordon, in a café, as he covets her lobster bisque. She has never spoken to Gordon, and yet she integrates and ingratiates herself into the life of this stranger whose shady past reveals itself as the play unfolds. She unabashedly and with no hesitation answers his cell phone and takes over his life in the most bizarre way.

Alas, Nora Brown, whose work I so admired in "Steel Magnolias," needs to add more depth to her breadth in her presentation of this complex role, originally played on Broadway by Mary Louise Parker. Brown's performance seems one dimensional.

Gordon's dysfunctional family includes a mother (Karen Caroe) who seems to have an unnatural fetish with fur, which she wears inside her lavish home and with which she "plays" (suggestively) throughout her appearances on stage. I found this behavior very disconcerting and creepy.

The other members of the dysfunctional family are equally quirky. There is Hermia, Gordon's wife, who we learn has no love lost with her husband. Jamie Bronstein nails this part

perfectly. I feel compelled to warn audience members that there is a sexually explicit monologue Bronstein delivers in the second act that some audience members may find offensive. It is most certainly not appropriate for children to hear. Jamie also plays the role of Carlotta, Gordon's mistress, who makes a brief appearance toward the play's end.

The challenging role of Gordon's brother Dwight is played by Eric Brekke, who also plays Gordon, and presents himself as an entirely different persona – quite an accomplishment.

At the start of the second act of "Dead Man's Cell Phone," there is a "Rashomon"-like moment in which Gordon comes back to life and tells us his version of his own demise. In this scene in particular, Brekke shines.

Unfortunately, the play goes all over the place from this point, as we waffle back and forth between the past, the present and the future.

My take away is never answer another person's cell phone – especially if they are dead!

I applaud Ceil Herman and the No Strings Theatre Company for bringing us the work of award-winning playwrights. It is good to challenge the mind and to bring fresh theater to our community. This play gives us much upon which to contemplate.

"Dead Man's Cell Phone" runs through Sunday, April 28. Performances are 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, 2:30 p.m. Sunday and 7 p.m. Thursday, April 25. Tickets are \$10 regular admission, \$9 students and seniors 65 and older and all seats on Thursday are \$7. For more information, tickets and reservations, call 523-1223.

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

## From the Orient to the Organs

Renoo's Thai Restaurant is a hidden gem in the foothills

A short drive up U.S. Highway 70 to the small unincorporated community of Organ – in the foothills of the eponymous mountain range – takes hungry Las Cruces eager for something different to Renoo's Thai Restaurant, 16151 Highway 70, owned and operated by husband and wife Larry and Renoo Alexander.

Serving a mix of American classics – steaks, sandwiches and burgers – and authentic Thai cuisine, Renoo's is a great destination restaurant, with an out-of-the-way charm perfect for when you have the time to sit and enjoy a meal.

Renoo's was, admittedly, my first foray into Thai food – which, according to Larry Alexander, isn't all that uncommon here.

"A lot of people think 'Asian food' and just think Chinese, or maybe Japanese," he said. "In truth, there's so much more that's very different."

He is absolutely right. While Thai cuisine may share several similarities with more familiar Eastern food cultures, it's the differences that mean the most.

You'll find a lot of familiar ingredients in the dishes at Renoo's – many of the meats and vegetables will be readily identifiable staples of Asian cuisine – but the dishes at Renoo's are rife with surprises.

Ordering off the menu may seem daunting, at first – it's large, offering more than 50 dishes, many of which will be unfamiliar – but any one of the knowledgeable and friendly staffers is more than glad to help you through it and offer recommendations. I had the privilege of being led by the owners themselves, who take an evident joy in the food they make and the reactions it evokes in their customers, many of whom are new to Thai food.

To drink, Larry Alexander brought my dining companion and me each a glass of Thai tea, a sweet chai-based iced tea served with cream. The sweetness of the drink makes it a true "Southern boy's dream," he said with a laugh.

For our first course, we order a bowl each of the miso soup – made with tofu, scallions and, in a change for me, beef broth – and the soup of the day, Tom Kha Gai. The latter, cooked with chicken, mushrooms, tomatoes, cilantro, onions, scallions and Thai herbs in a broth made with coconut milk, is unlike anything I've ever tried. The balance of flavors – the savory chicken and vegetables, spicy Thai herbs and sweet coconut milk – is a revelation to a simple

man such as myself, with a classically simple palate.

As an appetizer, we moved on to the Angel Wings – highly recommended by the Bulletin's beloved Pam Rossi, as well as the Alexanders – and, as the name would imply, they're heavenly.

It may be important to note that I am a firm devotee to the "meat inside meat" method of cooking. Bacon-wrapped anything is, generally speaking, the best kind of anything, and there's no better Thanksgiving than a turducken Thanksgiving – unless you've got a bacon-wrapped turducken you failed to tell me about.

That said, back to the Angel Wings: two huge, crispy fried chicken wings, stuffed with (wait for it) a mixture of ground pork, scallions and a special sauce, served on a bed of steamed rice with a side of steamed, spiced vegetables. I don't know if I need to tell you how good these things are, and I'm rapidly eating up my word count. Just try them.

As we move on to the main course, a word of caution from one spice-devotee to another: "hot," at Renoo's (as well as Thai cuisine on the whole), really means "Thai hot," and that difference is crucial.

As we peruse the menu in search of entrées, Larry Alexander makes a recommendation that, under ordinary circumstances, passes in one ear and out the other: If this is your first time, go for mild or medium.

Again, he's right.

As someone who eats green chile with at least a few meals a week, the hotter the better, I'm hesitant to go mild, for fear of the immediate revocation of my New Mexican card. At Renoo's, I'm glad I did. The medium hot rivals the BTUs of

any but the hottest of chiles without sacrificing the more subtle flavors found in these carefully prepared dishes. Even Larry Alexander doesn't go for the Thai hot, and by this point in the meal I implicitly trust his judgment.

For our main course, we opt for a mix – I order the Phad Kee Moon, or Drunken Noodles, almost on name alone, and my companion opts for the Beef Thai Delight. The portions are, in a word, huge – perfect to order a few and pass them around the table to family and friends.

The Drunken Noodles are fantastic, name aside: Wild rice noodles fried with chili paste, egg and mixed vegetables served with your choice of meat, tofu or shrimp. I opted for chicken, cooked to tender perfection and tossed in the steaming hot and ultra-spicy noodles.

The Beef Thai Delight – which I lovingly pilfer from across the table – is stir-fried beef marinated in Thai sauce with red and green bell peppers, onions, scallions and tomatoes (another pleasant surprise) on a bed of white rice. The steak is thin-sliced, juicy and cooked just right, adding a tender, spicy balance to the crisp vegetables and sticky rice.

Renoo's is – and I say this sincerely – far and away different from anything else you're apt to find in the City of the Crosses, all the more reason to make the short trip "up the hill."

If you've had Thai food before, head up and see what Renoo has cooking in her kitchen; if not, you've waited too long already, and there's no better place to start in the Mesilla Valley.

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





## Darkness into the light '42' captures Robinson story well

Why is a movie about a 28-year-old rookie baseball player, set 66 years ago, relevant in 2013?

The answer comes about an hour into the film when Harrison Ford says to the title character, "Jackie, you're medicine."

Indeed the messages in this film can still heal.

It's hard to comprehend today what Jackie Robinson's integration of Major League Baseball meant back in 1947, just one reason the story bears repeating.

I've read almost every published word about Robinson, as well as his Dodger teams from 1947-56, and was worried the movie would play loose with the facts, or make things seem too polished and Hollywood.

Of course, if it had depicted all of the horrors Robinson had to deal with as the first black man in baseball, the movie would have been unwatchable. I hoped the movie would strike the right balance.

For the first hour, while staying historically accurate, "42" leaned a little too much to the Hollywood side. If the filmmakers wanted to communicate what Robinson really went through, I thought, they

need to show more of the ugliness he faced. Almost simultaneous with my thought, the film took a painful turn with the racial on-field taunts of former Philadelphia Phillies manager Ben Chapman. That scene was nearly unbearable, but if you multiply that by almost every inning of every game, even at times from Robinson's own teammates, you begin to get a sense of what this man went through.

The Chapman scene culminated in the film's darkest moment, which took place in bright white tunnel below the Dodger dugout.

Actor Chadwick Boseman, eerily visually similar to the young Robinson, portrays No. 42 in a fit of rage, though safely out of view of fans and teammates. Up walks Harrison Ford, who deftly plays Branch Rickey, the Dodgers' executive who sought and signed Robinson as the man to break baseball's code excluding black players.

In the tunnel, Rickey reminds Robinson of his promise not to fight back when taunted.

"If you go back on the promise now," Rickey said, "no one will remember Chapman. They'll just remember you couldn't take it."

He reminded Robinson of all the eyes watching him, the whites waiting for him to fail, the blacks praying for him to succeed.

That's when he delivers the "medicine" line. Based on the audience reaction at the Cineport 10 on opening night, when moviegoers applauded spontaneously at the movie's end, Robinson's life is still inspiring and enlightening people all these years later, whether they're in Brooklyn, N.Y., or Las Cruces.

The film demonstrates how Robinson channeled his immense fire onto the field. It also highlights his talents running the bases, which brought a new dimension to the game.

Many will perceive Nicole Beharie's portrayal as Robinson's wife, Rachel, as a Disney-fied perfect partner. Based on the many accounts I've read, however, from multiple sources, the movie captures the relationship

well. There was great mutual respect between Rachel and Jackie and, in many ways, they only had each other to rely on during what must have been a torturous hell.

The constant stress Jackie faced during his 10-year career no doubt took its toll; he died at 53 in 1972. In the intervening years, Rachel Robinson has represented her husband at numerous ceremonies honoring his contributions. Without fail, she is elegant, eloquent and full of grace, just as in the film.


More static, but equally interesting, characters in the film are the computer-generated ballparks of 1947.

Because only Chicago's Wrigley Field remains of the eight National League stadiums from that era, location shots were impossible. Other movies have used current parks as stand-ins, but here the filmmakers decided to go the CG route. In parts you can tell the stadiums are faked, but it's worth it to see the detailed tributes paid to such long-gone parks as New York's the Polo Grounds, Cincinnati's Crosley Field, Pittsburgh's Forbes Field and, of course, the Dodgers' own Ebbetts Field.

There are great sub-performances as well. For example, John C. McGinley, from the TV show "Scrubs," does an amazing performance and loving tribute as Red Barber, the Dodgers' longtime radio announcer.

Because of its accuracy, and the strong performances by the lead performers, as well as many recognizable character actors, "42" should stand for a long time as one of the rare quality films that also serves as the definitive movie of an important American historical figure. In that light, it approaches two other great films, 2012's "Lincoln" and 1992's "Malcolm X."

So, even if you're not a baseball fan, you should see this movie. I would say take your children, too. There is some harsh language, primarily that one ugly word that could not have been left out. However, if your child is mature enough to sit in an adult movie – probably at least 9 or 10 – there is some important medicine to take in this movie.

'Birders: The Central Park Effect' is short and sweet

It was sad to read about the recent passing of Starr Saphir, one of the birders who the filmmakers visit with in the warm little documentary "Birders: The Central Park Effect."

Saphir (pronounced "sapphire") led ad hoc bird watching tours in Central Park over the years in spite of being afflicted with metastatic breast cancer, cataracts and arthritis. It was the cancer that did her in, but not after being able to count 2,582 species of birds over the course of her lifetime. Her favorite, it was noted in her obituary, was the cerulean warbler. She kept 80 notebooks of her Central Park sightings, which included identifying 250 species just within the park.

The film itself is a pleasant mix of birds and birders, one wherein the birders explain



The bird watchers of Central Park are the subject of the hour-long documentary film "Birders: The Central Park Effect," now playing at the Fountain Theatre.


their fascination with our feathered friends, while the birds just go on about their business of being birds, as they do everywhere. I think only ravens "people watch," and they are quite skilled at it.

Shot over a period of four years, the film follows a four-season's type path, sharing the time equally between the birders and the birds. The cinematography, color and

interviews are all above par and the film has a light, quiet and moving feel to it.

Not much else I can tell you about this one except that you may wish it were longer after you see what is presented. "Birders: The Central Park Effect" is simple, warm and likable on all levels.



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## Perfecting your pies

### Understanding the science behind this pastry

A symbol of America and the name of a small town in Catron County, N.M., pie, it can be assumed, is one popular dessert.

“It’s not just an American thing,” said Doña Ana Community College Culinary Arts instructor Carl Miller. “It dates back to ancient times, to the Greeks and Romans – maybe even further.”

Just about every culture has a form of pie, Miller said, even if it varies in appearance.

“Every area does it different,” he said. “In Eastern Europe, it’s a pierozki, or pierogi. ... It’s a variation of a turnover, like an empanada.”

A seemingly simple creation, a pie is basically anything with a filling contained in a crust, Miller said. However, as with all baking, there is a science behind making pie, one that people may not understand or pay attention to, which can lead to disastrous results.

To create perfect pie every time, Miller offers these suggestions, tips and insider knowledge.

#### **Mastering the crust**

“The first thing you have to decide is what type of dough you’re going to make,” Miller said.

There are several types of crust to choose from when creating a pie. A popular selection is the graham cracker crust, typically created from ground graham crackers combined with spices – such as cinnamon – sugar and butter.

When creating his graham cracker crust, Miller has opted for cereal, such as Golden Grahams, which eliminates the need for added spices. After pulverizing the cereal in a food processor, the powder is mixed with butter and sugar then pressed into the pie pan.

While graham crackers are a popular crust option, likely the most traditional pie crust is the dough variety.

“Simple doughs go back a long time,” Miller said. “It could have been the first form of bread for all we know.”

The basic types of pie crust doughs are long, or medium, dough and short, or mealy, dough.

What separates long and medium dough from short, mealy dough is how much the fat is incorporated.

The fat in a long, medium dough will be less incorporated, with more visible chunks – about the size of a kidney bean – which creates the layers and flakiness of the pie crust. The fat of a short

dough is more incorporated – about the size of a pea – making the fat less visible and creating more of a sheet dough, similar to pasta dough. This dough will be less flaky.

“(Which dough to use) depends on the preference of the person,” Miller said. “It’s about its texture and flakiness.”

“Everything is the same. A short dough is just worked more. It doesn’t have those chunks of fat.”

Another element to consider when preparing your pie crust is the type of fat used. Butter will give the dough a richness, while lard will have a flatter flavor and vegetable oil, or shortening, will have no added flavor.

“The whole idea for a good dough is that everything has to be ice cold (when mixed together),” Miller said.

If too much water is added, the dough will be sticky.

“Starting over is your best option when that happens,” Miller said.

When mixing ingredients, Miller recommends doing it by hand.

“A machine will work it too much, because of friction, which will cause the fat to soften quicker,” he said. “Also, knead with your palms, not your fingers.”

After the ingredients have been incorporated to your liking, you will notice the texture. A short dough will be more pliable, like a putty, than a long dough, which will be tougher with visible layers.

#### **Rolling out dough**

Before rolling out your dough, it is important to first let it relax in the refrigerator, said Miller, adding that this step is often skipped and can lead to problems later on.

“The protein in the flour, known as gluten, can get tough if it isn’t relaxed,” he said, adding that dough should sit in the refrigerator overnight – or at least for an hour – before using. “Also, you want the fat to get hard again, so it will separate in the crust when cooking, creating flakiness.”

After the dough has properly relaxed, next comes rolling it out.

“You want to lightly flour your work area,” Miller said. “You don’t want to overdo it, because you don’t want to incorporate more flour into your dough. That will make it tough.”

As with all pastries, you want to roll from the center of the dough outward for an even thickness, Miller said.

“It might take a little extra time, but you want to make sure it’s all even, so it will cook even,” Miller said.

The dough’s thickness should measure about one-fourth to one-third of an inch when rolled out. Drape the dough into the pie pan and press it into place, removing any excess around the brim with a knife. This leftover dough can be used to patch any holes that are created.

“You want to make sure it is filled in all the way to the bottom and that it’s the same thickness,” Miller said. “Be gentle and take your time.”

**Creating your filling**

Some fillings, such as custard fillings, need to be cooked before placed into the crust, while others, including some fruit fillings, need to be cooked in the crust. There are also those fillings, such as pudding, that don’t need to be cooked at all.

No matter your filling, it will need some sort of thickening agent, such as cornstarch, gelatin or egg yolks.

“Thickening is important or else the filling will leak out when the pie is cut. The pie could also collapse,” Miller said. “When I teach a pastry class, the first thing I remind everybody is that sugar is a liquefier.”

Although sugar tightens when it cools, if there is too much sugar and not enough thickening agent, the filling will be runny.

Pies can have savory or sweet fillings, Miller said, adding that one ingredient you shouldn’t skip – no matter the filling – is salt.

“You’ll need a little bit of salt to bring out the (sweet) flavors,” Miller said. “Like with ice cream, you use salt to enhance the flavor. It’s that same idea.”

**Cooking to perfection**

If your filling isn’t going to be baked in the pie crust, you’ll have to blind bake the pie crust. Blind baking is cooking the crust thoroughly before the cold filling, such as that for a cream pie or tart, is added.

“If you’re going to use raw fruit in it, you need to cook everything in a raw state,” Miller said. “Otherwise, you have to blind bake it.”

Because you don’t want the dough to rise when blind baking, weights – such as beans or rice on parchment paper – are added to the surface. Another common problem is inaccurate oven temperature.

“You should buy a thermometer to put into your oven, so you know the exact temperature,” said Miller, adding that pies are generally cooked at 375 degrees.

“Every oven has hot spots, so you’ll have to rotate the pie to get it in and out of that hot spot.”

Miller said during baking, you can tell if the dough didn’t have enough time to relax if it shrinks and contracts in the pan or develops small holes and tears.

When blind baking, the crust is done when it’s brown – but not overly so – and is visibly flakey, Miller said.

“Some people leave it in too long,” he said. “But there is no hard, fast rule of when it’s done. It all depends on your oven and what you’re trying to achieve.”

After it is removed from the oven, Miller suggests applying an egg wash of egg whites and water to keep in the moisture and seal the crust, preventing it from becoming soggy when the filling is added.

“If your crust is too hot, the egg whites will begin to cook and you don’t want that,”

to the top, attach the top and bottom pieces of dough with a sealing agent, such as egg whites. Slits should also be added to allow steam to be released.

After the filled pie has cooked about halfway through, remove it from the oven and attach a foil cover to edges.

“This will prevent it from getting burnt and overcooking,” Miller said.

When your pie is done baking, let it cool before slicing into it. This will allow the filling to set and be less runny.

**Making alterations**

Whether it’s replacing your cornstarch with tapioca, adding chia seeds to your filling or finding ways to make your crust gluten free, when alternating your pie ingredients, it all comes down to trial and error.

“You’ll have to experiment with it,” Miller said. “Are you getting that flavor and consistency you want, or will it break down? You should also consider its cost factor and the availability.”

Rather than using pastry flour, Miller makes his dough using two parts cake flour, which has a low gluten content, with one part all-purpose flour, which provides the protein he needs.

“You have to have gluten for structure, but too much can get tough,” he said.

Nut flours can be used for those who have gluten issues, however, a binding agent, such as potato flour, will need to be added.

“You’ll just have to play with it,” Miller said. “You have to figure out what works and what flavors you like.”

he said. “You want to wait about 10 minutes.”

Melted chocolate can also be used to seal the pie crust, Miller said.

When baking a pie with the filling in it, such as an apple pie, additional steps will need to be taken. If a crust or lattice is added

## Tacos in bowl form Edible flatware great for salad

Tasty tacos are on the agenda for this week's column – not the ones you grip in your hands, but rather the ones eaten from a bowl.

Officially called tostadas, bowl tacos are actually crispy-fried fluted tortillas. Some bowls are larger than others. The grande are made for salad fixin's and the pequeño for snacks or appetizers. What makes these bowls remarkable is that once you polish off the filling, you can eat the bowl. I can't recall the last time I had a taco salad, but when I spotted tostada bowls recently in a grocery store, I couldn't resist.

There are oodles of filling recipes. Many can easily be of your own creation. Now that grilling season is in full swing, meats and veggie skewers are a great start. If in a rush (or a bit lazy), canned goods suffice.

Anxious to indulge, I took the easy path, tossing together a colorful medley that included canned corn, canned black beans, canned pineapple chunks, cherry tomatoes, onion, basil, cilantro, spring lettuce mix, fresh squeezed lime juice and minced serrano and poblano peppers. I loaded the works into an oven-heated eatable bowl topping it off with "home-made" dressing: hot tequila lime salsa mixed with sour cream. Delicioso!

Give my recipe a try or better yet, try one of your own. If you're a strict recipe follower, I share several below that can be prepared as a main entrée for the big "bowlers" or, if you prefer, for several smaller ones. Enjoy!

### Grilled Salmon Salad

- 1 pound grilled salmon, skinned and cut into one inch cubes
- 1 tablespoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 medium yellow onion, chopped
- 2 limes, quartered
- 2 (8-ounce) cans diced tomatoes with green chiles, drained
- 1/2 bunch fresh cilantro, chopped
- 1 bunch green onion, chopped
- 4 tostada bowls, heated until golden brown, according to packaged directions

Toss grilled cubed salmon in cumin and chili powder. Salmon should be firm in the center. Set aside. Heat large skillet over medium and cook yellow onion 2 minutes, until it begins to soften. Add canned tomatoes and chiles, cilantro and green onions. Gently incorporate and heat through. Squeeze quartered limes over the salmon mixture; give it a quick stir and drain. Add chopped romaine lettuce to each tostada bowl. Add salmon mixture. Serve with favorite salsa, sour cream and sliced avocado. Makes 4 servings.

### The Ultimate Sirloin Taco Salad

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds beef sirloin strips very thinly sliced
- 12 ounces sliced fresh mushrooms
- 1 medium white onion, chopped
- Minced garlic to taste
- Garlic powder to taste
- Garlic paste to taste
- Ground coriander to taste
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 (16-ounce) can dark red kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 4 tostada bowls heated according to package directions
- Favorite pre-washed mixed salad greens

#### Topping suggestions:

- Sliced black olives
- Sliced green onion
- Chopped chile pepper such as Anaheim, poblano, serrano or jalapeño
- Fresh avocado, slices
- Thinly sliced cucumber
- Diced tomato
- Corn kernels
- Fresh lime wedge
- Chopped fresh cilantro
- Sour cream (or Ranch dressing)
- Fresh baked corn tortilla chips
- Chili powder
- Refried beans
- Shredded cheddar cheese (optional) or Monterey Jack cheese

In a bowl, add beef strips and seasonings to taste. Stir well to coat. Heat oil in large skillet or wok. Add mushrooms and onion. Cook on medium-high heat for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally until nicely browned. Add seasoned beef strips and cook for 10 minutes longer, stirring occasionally until desired doneness. Add red kidney beans and heat through. Add

desired amount of mixed greens to each tostada bowl. Add cooked beef mixture and favorite topping suggestions. Enjoy! Makes 4 servings.

### Sweet Heat Grilled Chicken Salad

- 1 (15-ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained
- 3/4 cup medium-hot salsa
- 1 cup fresh cilantro, chopped, divided
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 2 tablespoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 pound skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 4 cups lettuce, shredded
- 1 avocado, peeled, pitted and sliced (optional)
- 1 lime, cut into wedges (optional)
- 1/4 cup sour cream (optional)

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium-high heat and lightly oil the grate. Mix black beans, salsa, 1/2 cup cilantro and lime juice in a bowl; set aside. Stir chili powder, cumin, coriander, brown sugar, cayenne pepper and olive oil in a bowl until smooth; rub mixture over chicken breasts.

Cook chicken breasts on preheated grill until no longer pink in the center and the juices run clear, 10 to 12 minutes per side. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 165 degrees. While the chicken is cooking, place tortillas on grill and grill until lightly brown on both sides, 3 to 5 minutes.

Transfer chicken to a cutting board and slice into long thin strips. Divide chicken strips over tortillas and top with bean mixture, lettuce and remaining 1/2 cup cilantro. Serve with avocado, lime wedges and sour cream. Make 4 servings.

# Watch out for summer pests

Protect your kids from itchy insects

With the end of the school year just weeks away, parents and students are prepping for some summer camp fun in the sun. Head lice, mosquitoes and bed bugs are more prevalent than ever in our children's summer camp.

## Head Lice

Itching is only one of the problems caused by head lice. According to the American Camp Association, one of the most common help line calls they receive is from summer camps preparing for or treating a lice infestation. These parasitic insects can be found on your child's head and body, surviving by biting the scalp. It's important to be informed about head lice and know the facts before sending your little one to camp.

- Head lice spread through direct contact.
- Make sure your child's summer camp has a head lice control policy.
- Conduct regular screenings of your child's scalp.
- Treat lice infestation quickly.

If your child has ever had lice, you know how frustrating it can be to get rid of these blood-sucking pests. Even the toughest shampoos won't kill them all. They have the ability to "play dead" for up to two hours, shutting down their nervous systems so they can remain submersed in otherwise lethal products.

## Mosquitoes

Mosquitoes are infamous for being vectors of disease for humans and animals alike, much like how kids are infamous for coming back home from summer camp with mosquito bites. While mosquitoes have a short lifespan, females can lay up to 3,000 eggs in their lifetime.

Generally feeding within a 100-foot radius of their breeding site, mosquitoes can be a huge nuisance to children playing outside and are potentially dangerous. According to National Geographic, mosquito-borne diseases cause millions of deaths worldwide every year. Before you put your child in a protective bubble, consider educating them on prevention such as always using bug repellent and staying away from standing water.

## Bed Bugs

If your child takes naps during the day or is getting ready for sleep away camp, identifying bed bugs and the red welts they can leave behind is critical to eliminating an infestation and preventing them from making themselves comfy in your home.

These flat, wingless pests are about the size of an apple seed, making no judgments on the cleanliness or messiness of where they'll find their next food source. While they aren't known to spread diseases, they do cause irritations. Keep on the lookout for red spots in the form of clusters or arranged in a rough line.

Before sending your kids off to camp, check reports in the surrounding area and ensure they take precautions against bed bugs. Also consider packing the following for each child:

- Use trunks instead of luggage with soft materials making it difficult for bed bugs to climb.
- Pack 1 percent Hydrocortisone cream. While the camp will have this in their arsenal, bed bugs are nocturnal so it's convenient for any late night bites.
- Pack a flash light for night-time bed bug checks.

## The kindness of horses

Humans and horses have worked together for thousands of years.

Horses were the main technology on the planet until fairly recently. They pulled our wagons and logs from the forests; they fought battles beside us; they carried doctors to patients; and ponies worked deep in mines.

Horses, being much larger than human beings, did not do these things by natural submission. They have been our partners because of their good natures and innate kindness. I watch this process daily.

I have a horse who will stand as still as a stone for a new rider or a disabled person to climb into the saddle or dismount with helpers standing by. He will endure the pain and surprise of a misguided leg or foot digging into his side or flopping onto his buttocks. Yet, when I ride him, the slightest touch of the leg can move him forward and sideways. He knows the difference in what needs to be done for different humans.

The amazing part of this equine awareness is that many times it goes unrecognized. And while horses are large, reactive prey animals that can hurt us, they are most likely just trying to get away from us in dangerous situations.

To maintain our well-being and safety working around horses, we need to know some facts about their eyesight and instincts. Equine eyes are set out on the sides of their heads so the horse is able to see almost 360 degrees around when grazing (the most vulnerable position for prey animals). Yet horses have a "blind spot" directly behind them and just under and in front of their noses.

I often tell students, "If you can see the horse's eye, he can see you".

So, we talk a lot just to let the horses know where we are. Horses do not like surprises and the last thing anyone wants to do is surprise a horse from behind.

Our safest place to be when near a horse is at his shoulder. We should approach the horse at his shoulder, too. This is where he can see us, yet we are out of kicking range and not easy to bite or strike with a front hoof. Now, horses are not usually intent upon biting, striking or kicking us, but a fly could make one kick at his belly, a previous owner might have fed tons of treats, or any number of innocent reasons could put us in harm's way if we get into a vulnerable position. This is especially true with horses we do not know well.

That unusual (to us) eyesight also means that the horse can see two things at one time – from each eye on each side of his body. He is mostly noticing

### March for Babies a community effort, marks March of Dimes milestone

In the 75 years the March of Dimes has been an organization, it has truly made a difference in many lives.

"We are the only nonprofit working to prevent premature births and birth defects," said Becky Horner, March of Dimes division

director for southern New Mexico. "We are the only organization that has succeeded in achieving our original mission, which was to defeat polio."

In Las Cruces, March of Dimes continues to make a lasting impact, through several high-profile events such as the High Heels for High Hopes fundraiser, held each year in November, and the March for Babies, held each year on the last Saturday in April. Exceeding its goal of \$150,000, the sixth annual High Heels for High Hopes style show raised \$164,398 for the organization in 2012.

The 2013 March for Babies will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, April 27, at Young Park, 1905 E. Nevada Ave. Registration begin at 7:30 a.m.

Hundreds participate in each event and work to raise hundreds of thousands of dollars in support of March of Dimes' cause. More than 1,200 people participated in the 2012 march, raising more than \$232,000.

"A portion, 60 percent, stays in the community, and 40 percent goes to our research programs," Horner said.

The March for Babies has become a community effort with various businesses and organizations lending a helping hand during the event.

The entire event is achieved locally through the efforts of Horner, administrative assistant Sally Chavez and the efforts of the board of directors and local volunteers.

March of Dimes also carries out projects throughout the year that play a major role in the health and well-being of babies born in southern New Mexico through the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) Family Support Program, Folic Acid Education Program and nursing training modules, as well as assisting with continuing education credits and providing educational material to clinics and providers.

"We provide transportation backpacks and information to mothers who have to be transported for early delivery," Horner said. "We're trying to get those to the clinics and obstetricians that bypass the hospital and work with the El Paso (March of Dimes)

division."

The March of Dimes is planning on launching a folic acid education campaign to promote the importance of taking the acid during the early stages of pregnancy.

"Folic acid is a B vitamin," Horner said. "If taken before pregnancy, it can help avoid neural tube birth defects such as spina bifida, which is very serious."

Horner said taking the acid could decrease the chances of these types of birth defects by up to 70 percent.

"Many times, women don't know they're pregnant until after eight weeks when the neural tube is developed," Horner said. Which is why the March of Dimes encourages women who have any chance of becoming pregnant to take a multivitamin.

Not only does the March of Dimes play a large role in the care of families and babies affected by premature births, but its research plays a key role in ensuring the health of all newborns through mandatory prenatal care tests, vaccines, newborn screenings and advancements in technology.

"Statewide, about 900 families are touched through our NICU project," Horner said. "Every baby born in our community is impacted by what we do."

movement with this side vision and will often move suddenly when startled by something that, instinctively, could be a predator.

This peripheral, monocular vision has no depth perception. The horse must face an object and see it with both eyes (binocular vision) to tell how far away it is. A horse jumping needs to face the jumps to tell how high and at what distance they are. To focus, the horse raises his head for distant objects and lowers his head to see something close by.

They are fascinating animals. Understanding horses helps us stay safe and helps them stay sane.



## Safe Haven is county's only no-kill shelter

### Working to find cats, dogs forever homes

Safe Haven Animal Sanctuary, the only no-kill shelter in Doña Ana County, operates as a way to prevent strays and surrendered animals from euthanization due to shelter overpopulation.

Safe Haven opened in 1996 and now has two primary components: the thrift store and the sanctuary. The thrift store at 840 El Paseo Road, Suite D, is a way to provide operation income for the sanctuary along with money provided through donations and grants.

The sanctuary, 6890 Eagle Road, which operates on 3 acres of land, houses an average of 40 dogs and 40 cats up for adoption. All animals

remain at the sanctuary until they are adopted.

With the help of its staff and volunteers, Safe Haven is working hard to get its message to the community.

"We're trying to educate on responsible pet ownership to reduce the number of stray animals," said Lorna Harris, executive director. "They usually end up at the (Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley) and their chances aren't very good because the shelter is overwhelmed. We educate people on the importance of spay and neuter."

Safe Haven spays or neuters all pets that are adopted from the sanctuary.

"We are the only no-kill facility in the county; it would be terrible if Safe Haven didn't exist," Harris said.

Through donations, dedicated staff and a strong base of volunteers, Harris said Safe Haven has become a successful operation.

"We try and match volunteers with their sets of skills," Harris said.

Volunteers are a vital part of the day-to-day operations of the animal sanctuary and thrift store. Safe Haven is in need of more volunteers to operate the thrift store, or as dog walkers, adoption counselors, socializers, maintenance and landscaping at the sanctuary.

"Safe Haven works to provide a safe environment to all cats and dogs coming in," Harris said.

Sanctuary manager Jeff Barker lives on site and cares for the sanctuary animals daily with the help of volunteers.

Dogs and cats have their own areas at the sanctuary and are separated by size and temperament.

"The average length of stay is three months, but others stay longer," Barker said. "Some have health or behavioral issues we are working through."

Animals remain at the sanctuary until they are adopted. All dogs and cats are accepted, the majority of which are surrendered, strays or recommended through a referral service. Although Safe Haven works hard not to turn away any animal, space limits the amount of animals the sanctuary can take in.

"It's very rewarding (work), but there is a need in this country for more no-kill (shelters)," Barker said. "I stay passionate about this because of the success stories. Watching a dog that was going to be surrendered (to the shelter) and we're able to step in and find them a forever home."

Safe Haven's annual fundraiser, Wineing for Animals, raises money through ticket sales, a silent auction and raffle to support the operating costs for Safe Haven. Wineing for Animals will be held from 5:30 to 8 p.m. Thursday, April 25, at Amaro Winery, 402 S. Melendres St. Tickets are available for purchase at Amaro Winery, the Safe Haven thrift store or by calling 522-1044.

## Strides made, progress still needed

Still a long way away from no-kill status

“We are finally getting there,” read a recent report by Beth Vesco-Mock, director of the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley.

The report went on to list the accomplishments of the shelter over the past five years. While any movement in decreasing the needless killing of healthy, treatable or behaviorally acceptable animals is welcome, it must be measured against what is possible.

In comparison to the best in the field – the Nevada Humane Society/Washoe County Regional Animal Services in Reno, Nev. and the Williamson County Regional Animal Shelter (WCRAS) in Georgetown, Texas – due to some demographic similarities with Doña Ana County, I have selected the most vital

points of performance measurement to show how the ASCMV measures up.

The tables compare the save rate of the three facilities. In each case, the first year is a benchmark that represents the organization's position before a significant change. In the case of ASCMV, it was the hiring of a new director in 2008. A new director joined the Nevada Humane Society in 2007 and WCRAS initiated its no-kill policy in 2008.

Why does it matter? The ASCMV

euthanized 3,389 more cats and 2,515 more dogs than would have occurred had we reached the Nevada Humane society's save rate level. The tragedy is that these deaths were unnecessary.

What's the difference? In both the Nevada Humane Society and the WCRAS, there was a conscious and public commitment to no-kill. To date, that cannot be said of the ASCMV.

What are some of the practical implications of this difference? In the wealth of data

available from the more than 90 communities that have achieved the recognized no-kill save rate of 90 percent, community involvement is essential.

There are a variety of ways to measure this, but the most direct and effective are the numbers of volunteers and foster families working with the organization. When the Nevada Humane Society hired its new director, it had 30 volunteers, which grew to 1,300 rapidly and now numbers more than 7,000. At last count, the ASCMV volunteer count stood at 70 and the foster families at 29.

Without engaging a huge cadre of volunteers and fosters, it is virtually impossible to implement all the programs and practices that result in massive saving of lives.

The bottom line is we may have started, but we have taken far too long and have a very long way to go to reach no-kill status.

## Local APA attends Austin conference

American Pets Alive! educates about no-kill

Austin, Texas, is a wonderful, pet-friendly city with a Fetch Dog Park near the river and a tremendous regard for companion animals as a no-kill city.

It was my first time to Austin in February as a conference attendee with five others from Las Cruces, all board members of ACTION Programs for Animals/Doña Ana Pets Alive!, and a New Mexico Pets Alive! member from Albuquerque. We were part of a New Mexico delegation, among other states represented, there to learn from the experts – in particular how FixAustin.org's grassroots efforts led to no-kill success saving 90 percent of healthy, treatable animals and returning the practice of euthanasia to its original purpose – for animals truly suffering or posing danger with poor medical or behavioral prognosis.

It started with Ryan Clinton, one of Texas's best appellate attorneys, and an animal activist-leader who formed FixAustin in 2005 with a goal to end the unnecessary killing of homeless pets at Austin's municipal animal shelters. It required a regime change and partnership with other animal activists for FixAustin to persuade Austin City Council to pass a resolution to save 90 percent of

impounded animals at the city's shelters. The no-kill policy adopted in 2010 made Austin the largest city in the nation to pass such a measure, and today a stand-out success for Austin Pets Alive!

Because Austin Pets Alive! is nationally recognized among communities throughout the country, many turn to it to seek advice and tour its facilities allowing it to create American Pets Alive!, the sponsor of the conference.

“Reaching no-kill, an idea that has become the expected norm, requires a multi-faceted approach,” said Ellen Jefferson, executive director of Austin Pets Alive!

While legislation, education and sterilization are still core ingredients of the 10-point no-kill equation, the three alone are not enough. Jefferson learned firsthand that high rates and volumes of spay-neuter over a three-year period were not significantly

lowering the municipal shelter's kill rates.

Ryan Clinton said some shelters have no attractions or events to promote the cause or aren't welcoming places, suffering from poor customer service, which impacts volunteerism and adoption rates, but they complain nonetheless that “it's the public's fault to have to kill so many.”

“There are no excuses here,” Clinton said.

There are more than 100 no-kill communities in the nation with more joining the ranks. A year or less was all it took for most municipal shelters to make the turnaround using comprehensive implementation of the no-kill equation, which provides lifesaving services and programs.

Our community is hard at work with a range of services offered by nonprofit organizations and dedicated animal advocates providing low-cost or no-cost spay or neuter, veterinarian/medical help, transport and rescue, foster care and adoption promotion, pet help line assistance, pet retention work, humane education, pet network notifications, media and outreach work.

These are just some of the services

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
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
