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Huerta sent to NMSU for assignments

Burke to serve as interim president

In a letter sent to faculty and staff by email Tuesday, June 4, New Mexico State University President Garrey Carruthers announced a change in leadership at Doña Ana Community College, with Margie Huerta transferred to the NMSU president's office and an interim DACC president named.



Andy Burke. DACC's vice president for business and finance, is now the college's interim president and chief executive officer. Huerta will become a special assistant to Carruthers, who said her main focus will be improv-

ing articulation issues - a long-standing problem at NMSU that causes students transferring in from a community college to lose a lot of credits.

Huerta, who has been DACC's president since 2004, has been under intense criticism over the nursing program's loss of accreditation last year. The accreditation loss forced most of the students in the program to transfer

to NMSU's bachelor's degree program, which takes two more years of study than the associate degree at DACC. NMSU is covering the costs of their classes.

Those angered by the accreditation loss called for Huerta's removal, saying no one has been held accountable for the accreditation blunder, with students in the program being the only ones to suffer. They questioned whether the DACC program could regain accreditation with

to return to TWEF

Estrada to bring back feat with help from Martinez

Last year was the first time since 1980 Roberto Estrada didn't make the Guinness Book of World Records largest flat enchilada, but mark Sept. 29 on your calendar for the return of the extreme cooking feat to The Whole Enchilada Fiesta (TWEF).

At a press conference Friday, May 31, at Roberto's Mexican Food restaurant, TWEF officials announced Estrada will once again make the three-layer mammoth enchilada at this year's fiesta.

When Estrada had to scratch

making the record enchilada last year because state officials raised concerns about the safety of his equipment, a fund was set up at Citizens Bank to begin collecting donations.

Originally, Estrada estimated it would cost about \$40,000 to replace the equipment. Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima said Gov. Susana Martinez intervened and was able to get state officials to require less stringent equipment improvements, so that estimate is now between \$7,000 and \$8,000. According to TWEF organizers, the Roberto's Equipment Fund has

Record enchilada | Council increases park impact fees

Split vote OKs most costly option

In a split 4-3 vote Monday, June 3, the Las Cruces City Council approved raising the park impact fee from \$800 per new home to \$2,600 per dwelling unit for developments of 3 or more acres.

Other options before the council were raising the park impact fee to \$1,300 per dwelling unit without a "level of service" minimum requirement for development size, leaving it at \$800, putting the increase on hold for more negotiations or eliminating the impact fee.

The problem with the city's

park impact fee is that it really doesn't generate enough money to create parks close to the neighborhoods paying the fees - and never has, said Parks and Recreation Director Mark Johnston. When the park impact fee was first established in 1995, the council set it at \$249 despite staff recommending a park impact fee

"The city has been behind the curve since the beginning," he said.

Councillor Nathan Small pushed for taking a couple more weeks to forge an agreement with developers and home builders, who said the increase would

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

Huerta preempted the possibility of her firing after former NMSU President Barbara Couture resigned by announcing she would retire at the end of 2014. Huerta said she wanted to leave DACC with the national nursing accreditation restored.

Huerta's new task from Carruthers to improve class articulation between the community/branch colleges and main campus, however, is a situation she has tried to improve in the past, but found more receptiveness from other four-year institutions in the state. The articulation problem became a frequent topic for NMSU presidential finalists, with some of the candidates pointing to the university's system of four community colleges as an enrollment increasing strategy. The past couple of academic years, NMSU has seen a steady decline in enrollment.

In his letter, Carruthers said Huerta also will help with development opportunities. During the NMSU presidential search, improved donations and outreach to alumni also were frequent concerns raised.

In the interim ... again

DACC is currently holding a series of community meetings as it prepares to find a new president. Tuesday's announcement does not impact the current search process for the next DACC president, Carruthers said in his letter.

The new interim DACC president has served in various positions at the college for nearly 30 years, including interim CEO from 1997-99. Burke originally started as an accountant at DACC in 1984. He has a master's degree in accounting and a bachelor's in business administration from NMSU. He is also working toward a Ph.D. in educational administration from NMSU.

"I've known Andy Burke for most of his life. He's known for being an outstanding manager and fiscal agent for DACC," Carruthers said in his letter. "At this time, it's important for someone with his experience to focus on the enterprise."

In a press release issued by NMSU, Burke said he agreed to stepping back into the interim president role as a way to give back to the community he grew up in.

back to the community he grew up in.

"Through the years, there has been tremendous growth at DACC," Burke said. "When I started, we had 500 students. We now have more than 9,000."

Carruthers gave credit to Huerta for the college's growth. DACC is the fourth largest higher-education institution in New Mexico. Since 2004, it has become one of the fastest growing community colleges in the nation, Carruthers said. During Huerta's time as president, DACC added satellite campuses in Gadsden, Chaparral, Hatch and built the East Mesa campus.

"I thank Dr. Huerta for her long service to DACC," Carruthers said. "She also has strong connections to the community, which will be helpful in her new role."

make homes more expensive in a still fragile market.

"We have to raise the level of service," Small said. "But as far as determining what that level of service should be, we're not there yet."

Steve Chavira, managing director of the Las Cruces Home Builders Association, agreed with Small that there should have been more discussion about what kind of parks the city wants.

Builder Kim Hakes, however, said he felt the fee could be eliminated through stronger subdivision requirements because the private sector can build parks more cheaply than the city government.

In response to criticism about the lack of parks in many of the newer subdivisions, Hakes said the housing market today is less frantic and developers are more balanced in seeing good parks as an amenities that helps sell homes.

Eddie Binns, a longtime local developer, agreed, adding that the city doesn't have a good reputation for putting the money collected back into the neighborhoods that paid the fees.

But a majority of city councillors said increasing the park impact fee had been debated for years. Mayor Pro Tem Sharon Thomas said a substantial park impact fee would encourage more developers to opt for offering parks and trails in return for the city waiving the fee.

Mayor Ken Miyagishima said he thought the larger fee was too much of an increase and that a consultant to the city had recommended the lower increase.

Councillor Gill Sorg said the problem with not raising the park impact fee was the lack of a "credible alternative." All sections of the city deserve equal service, but the reality is a lot of unevenness about the accessibility to parks in different neighborhoods, Sorg said.

The new park impact fee will go into effect July 1.

more than \$4,400 in the bank.

"It looks like the huge enchilada is back," Miyagishima said.

Making the world's largest enchilada is an event that many people identify with Las Cruces, he said.

"Wherever I go, people ask me about The Whole Enchilada Fiesta – specifically about the huge enchilada," Miyagishima said.

Last year, Estrada cooked up enchiladas for the second "Fire in the Whole" Enchilada Eating Competition. Doubling

down, so to speak, Estrada will continue cooking enchiladas for the eating contest, along with making the record enchilada.

Erlinda Portillo, a member of the TWEF organizing committee, said it was important to get the word out about returning the world-record enchilada and about the fiesta in general, because there were rumors in the community that TWEF would be called off.

That's not the case, Portillo said, adding TWEF is coming back stronger with community fundraising for the weekend celebration that draws about 50,000 each year.

Last year, rain during the outdoor fiesta did damper sales, but that doesn't

mean the fiesta is washed up, she said.

"In fact, the board plans to make

"In fact, the board plans to make TWEF bigger and better this year," said John Vasquez of US Bank.

TWEF's theme this year will be "Community and Culture," with a Miss TWEF and Miss Teen TWEF pageant added to the festivities with the help of Curtis Rosemond, who has years of pageant experience.

Other regular TWEF features – a parade, contests such as huachas, a 5K run and vendors – will be held during the fiesta, which began as a "block party for the city" 34 years ago.

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

Students get the job done

Young people provide impressive examples

We all would like it to be fair. Many people have devoted their lives, vocations and avocations to promoting fairness in one sense or another.

Still, prejudice, cronyism and just plain bad luck and timing continue to foil many a

The following quote has been attributed to about a thousand people, from inventor Thomas Edison to golfer Gary Player, but Thomas Jefferson may have the earliest claim: "The harder I work, the luckier I get."

I had that thought recently when I was looking at the Las Cruces Bulletin's High School Class of 2013 publication.

In the Mesilla Valley Christian Schools section, I found some jaw-dropping information about some hard-working and lucky young Las Crucens.

MVCS grad Devon Tourtillott earned a New Mexico State University Honors Excel scholarship worth \$25,000. He plans to use that to study science en route to medical school and a career as a pediatrician.

Rachelle Holdridge plans to turn down \$58,000 in scholarships from Abilene Christian University and a \$64,000 scholarship to Nazarene University to follow her dream of going to Pepperdine (where she has \$9,000 in grants) and majoring in business or marketing.

Emily Biad will take a \$48,000 scholarship to Creighton University to study nursing. James Adam Rivera earned an \$88,000 scholarship to the Massachusetts Institute of

Technology and will major in aerospace engineering.

If, in the next Las Cruces wind gust, you see little bits of gray, fleshy matter drifting by, those are parts of my mind that was just blown away by these scholarship numbers. And that's just scratching the surface.

Similar scholarship stories are coming out of Las Cruces, Mayfield, Oñate, Santa Teresa, Hatch Valley and Gadsden high schools. The same will be true next year when Centennial High School has its first graduates.

These success stories go beyond high school. Such a case is John Kear, a 2009 Mayfield alum who just graduated with highest distinction from Duke University and has been accepted into the master's program at the University of Germany. There are many more like Kear who have gone from high school in Las Cruces to do great things in college. And many have found their success in the military.

These things don't happen just by luck.

Even these young people, despite their great efforts and the success they've already achieved, will find at some point life is not fair.

Remember, Doña Ana County remains one of the poorest in the nation, and many of our young people face an uphill struggle with two strikes against them. Not fair, and many of them are not able to overcome. Our county's dropout rate, while improving significantly, still hovers near 40 percent.

Today, though, there are more opportunities than ever for students to find a path to success. We have alternative high schools such as San Andres, Las Montañas and Alma d' Arte. We have the amazing success of the Arrowhead Park Early College High School, which to date has still seen no dropouts.

Doña Ana Community College gears much of its efforts to training locals to join the work force. And, of course, we have NMSU, whose presence is felt from its looming campus down to dual-credit courses in the high schools.

There are hundreds of great local success stories, too, of young people who worked hard on their own or in a family business and now are successful business people and

No one ever said it would be easy and no one ever said it would be fair. Well, they may have, but they were wrong.

We adults and parents always hope to be good role models for young people, especially

There's an impressive new generation of young people, however, and we could learn a thing or two from them.

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Republicans eye 2014 elections

Backing from Gov. Martinez could aid GOP candidates

Recently we talked about negative GOP campaigning directed against two Democrats, one not even an announced

We also mentioned that the announced Democratic candidate, Hector Balderas for attorney general, doesn't even have a Republican opponent yet. It is a woeful commentary on the American political system that negative campaigning now starts first.

Sometimes the GOP isn't able to fill out a slate for statewide offices. This year, I'm guessing it will. With all the money that is being made available by court decisions, it is enough to attract candidates into every race.

So, the movement to find some GOP candidates is beginning to take shape. Much of this information comes from a recent Joe Monahan blog.

The only definite Republican candidates for next year's elections appear to be the incumbents: Rep. Steve Pearce in the 2nd Congressional District, Gov. Susana Martinez, Lt. Gov. John Sanchez and Secretary of State Dianna Duran.

Very likely, the GOP will field a candidate in the 3rd Congressional District, but with little to no hope of winning. Likewise, Democrats will field a candidate against Pearce with slim hopes, although Democrats are on the increase in that

Excitement could break out in the lieutenant governor's race. Sanchez has never been in the Martinez camp of the Republican Party. Past governors and lieu-

tenant governors seldom have fared well. Full-time lieutenant governors really just get in the way. The position never was meant to be full time.

But Sanchez is making the most of what he has to deal with, traveling the state as an unofficial ombudsman while forging political alliances everywhere.

There has been talk of the governor cutting him loose and backing another candidate in next year's primary. Back in 1994, Diane Denish talked of taking on Lt. Gov. Casey Luna,

who had been giving Gov. Bruce King much grief. Luna turned the tables by running against King in the primary and perhaps ruining King's chances for another term

Too many mine fields are in the path of switching lieutenant governors. Besides, as we've said, they just get in the way.

U.S. Sen. Tom Udall will draw opposition, maybe Allan Weh. He has been very active since his 2010 GOP primary loss to Martinez. Udall has been hard to beat, so there may not be many seeking to knock him off.

The GOP will put up a good battle for the 1st Congressional District slot won by Michelle Lujan Grisham last November. Republicans have held the seat much longer than Democrats. So far, Simon Kubiac, an Albuquerque business-

man is the only name we have heard

Republicans always make a strong bid for attorney general. Clovis District Attorney Matt Chandler made a good bid in 2010 and is expected to get back into the race this time. He is close to Martinez and may see significant backing from her.

The state treasurer's office seems to be an enticing position for Democrats this year. On the Republican side, state Taxation and Revenue Director Demesia Padilla is getting the most mention. She ran for the office before. She could be stronger this time because of support of Martinez.

If Padilla were to win, she would be the third statewide office holder who is female, Hispanic and a Republican. Duran also is in the group. U.S. Rep. Michelle Lujan Grisham is a Democrat, but she also adds to the female Hispanic power in

The state Land Office is very important to ranchers and oil and gas interests. Democratic incumbent Ray Powell has won three non-consecutive terms and always is a strong vote gatherer, but Re-

publicans have often won the seat and will have big financial backing in this election.

The GOP is looking at current Public Regulation Commissioner Patrick Lyons to return to the Land Office spot he held twice before. House Republican Whip Nate Gentry also

my neighbors I have neighbors I haven't visited for years. They were so good to me growing up. They raised walnuts.

They are part of the reason I moved back to Arizona.

English was not their first language. I learned theirs and encouraged my children to do the same. Then, several years ago, an uncle moved in with them. He was a bully and intimidated them. He discouraged them from having visitors. They became afraid, but there was nothing they

Every night the uncle would steal their walnuts, drive into the big city and sell them. He still does. My heart aches for my neighbors, but we no longer talk. Their windows are boarded up and "no trespassing" signs are in their front yard.

I have spoken with the police, the Border Patrol and the politicians but there is little they can do. A sadness has fallen over our whole neighborhood.

My neighbor is the country of Mexico.

I miss it. Living along the border today is like living on the Korean DMZ or the Berlin Wall; the drug cartels rule. They are as powerful as the cartels that ruled Columbia in the '90s. The number of murders attributed to them now approaches 50,000. Phoenix is second only to Mexico City as the kidnapping capital of the world.

The real victims are the trabajadores, the workers on both sides of the border, legal and illegal, who come looking for work. The risks they take to enter the U.S. are frightening, and yet they continue to come by the hun-

dreds of thousands every year.

They are like a school of fish swimming through a channel full of sharks. Their continuous march north only demonstrates our stubborn denial of the obvious, "We want them and we can't stop them.'

Not to mention the biggest elephant in the room, we desperately need their drugs. We are willing to turn a blind eye to the murderous carnage, the violation and inhumanity that defines our border, as long as we can feed our voracious addictions. The cartels are willing to sacrifice their own lives and those of the trabajadores to supply

Message to jobless: time to adopt a second plan

These are tough times for some American citizens. Jobs are harder to get for many Americans than they were a few years ago. The economy has turned somewhat sour. Yet, there are other Americans who find this the best of times. They are making money and building a business. Go figure. They have gone against the tide of everyone else and done well despite the market.

In the midst of all the economic bad news, some Americans are starting businesses that are thriving. They are taking a chance and working very hard. Some are hitting the jackpot. Yes, others may be slipping down the porcelain convenience. It is capitalism where those who satisfy the customers best usually do the best in business.

That needs to be the American motto: You can still do well in America. And you can. There are important factors, which include being business smart, working hard and having some luck

Does luck play a part? Yes, especially if you equate luck with smarts and hard work. There is a correlation, but, as my stats professor drummed into our minds, correlation does not

In some forms of government the elite live wonderful lives and get to do what they want but the masses live lives of desperation. In theory, everyone in America can change jobs or move somewhere else. But many people are their own jailers.

I have worked jobs I did not like and was quite happy to

I have worked jobs I did not like and was quite happy to leave. But I had those jobs rather than be unemployed. Yet I know several people who have been long-term unemployed, who are very talented, but would rather do without a job if it is not what they want. Relatives and friends enable this thinking.

My earliest lesson involved a paper route in Colorado Springs where I made the observation as a 12-year-old that putting the paper on the porch within easy reach of the front door made the customer much happier than if I threw it into

a bush. Maybe someone said something to me or I could have thought of it. Regardless, I discovered that upon going to collect for the Gazette Telegraph I received several tips.

It started a lifetime of me thinking of making customers satisfied. At times, I have been better at it than at other times, but I have always been aware that if my customer and I both profit from a transaction then good things will happen for me. Likewise, any attempt to not satisfy the customer usually leads to disaster.

This is why government is problematic in a free society. In government, say the IRS, the mantra is do what we say or bad things will happen to you. There is not equal satisfaction. In the marketplace if I do not like the last transaction I may take my business somewhere else. But with government we are captive. In fact, some government leaders refer to us citizens as "giving units."

We need to whisper quietly to the millions of people who are long-term unemployed that it is time for a second plan. Maybe you will get back to that field someday, but sitting out of the job market, even if the government makes it relatively easy to do, is disastrous.

Everyone repeats that it is easier to get a job if you have a job. It is. If there is a four year gap, it is hard for me to take a chance on a potential worker.

The countless taxpayers' sentiments, both in private and public discussions and much publicized in the Associated Press news media, reference the Stephen Slevin case, which is costing Doña Ana County taxpayers \$15.5 million, and we continue to nationally and worldwide be perceived as ignorant, irresponsible and uncaring simple taxpayers.

The appearance may be justified, but what we do not know, may not be true, because we rely on the veracity of well compensated management to be truthful. Management let us down by allowing the torture of Stephen Slevin to occur and then engaging in a massive coverup, for almost two years. He almost died.

It is not sufficient that, due to the lack of proper supervision, management hind-sight and "business as usual" attitude by our county commission and many others on the public trough, our dignity has been blemished as owners of the Doña Ana County Detention Center.

Now, the Doña Ana County Commission has demonstrated the appalling nerve to vote to tax us to try to make up for their ignorance.

Gross mismanagement, dereliction of duty and fraud all amounting to corruption, are being over abundantly costly to us, the taxpayers, sufficiently to motivate us to take this action. As registered voters, we must be at least willing to participate. It will not hurt and will not cost.

Federal Judge Martha Vasquez in her decision, factually addresses that Chris Barela, Doña Ana County administrator, is liable for \$3 million. And not only is he still there, he recently received a salary increase to \$95,000.

Sue Padilla, former assistant county manager and Chris Barela's immediate supervisor, is still there, and Karen Perez, who was the Doña Ana County Commission chairman from 2007-08, is also still there, conducting the cover up.


An election for the taxes will come upon us in July. We must prepare.

Rio Grande flowing, flat-raters get one day

Water began flowing again in the Rio Grande south of the Caballo Reservoir for downstream deliveries, including irrigation in the Mesilla Valley.

"The 2013 3.5 (acre-inch) allotment will

not go far," the Elephant Butte Irrigation District informed its customers, "however, with communication, scheduling and delivery, it is EBID's goal to make water last as long and go as far as possible."

Farms began getting water Saturday, June 1. The last day for farmers to place their orders is Friday, June 21.

Saturday, June 8, is the one day all "flat-raters" will get their water allocation.

A flat-rate user owns less than 2 acres, typically a home that used to be a farm and still pays the water tax for rights to irrigation water. For the flat-raters, EBID recommends:

Make sure your ditch is clean or don't expect to get your water.

- If you are on a community ditch, coordinate and schedule with your neighbors so that you will be ready when the water becomes available, and can irrigate continuously to water all interested small tract users - and any farm rate irrigators on the ditch with orders in - then shut off.
- Be ready to take water on short notice. If you are not ready, don't expect a second chance to receive water.
- Be ready to irrigate at night. Flat rate schedule begins at midnight Friday, June 7, and ends at midnight Saturday.
- Don't expect to water on Saturday, shut down for the night, and start up again on Sunday, either for individuals or community ditches.
- Communicate closely with your ditchrider, neighbors on your ditch and your neighboring community ditches.

Downtown bistro closes

The Main Street Bistro & Alehouse, 139 N. Main St., has closed.

summer, especially if there is no Summer School provided in their community," said Family Nutrition Bureau Chief Cesar Uriarte. "CYFD's Summer Food Service Program provides children with over 600 meal sites where they can go and get a nutritious meal free of charge."

During last year's summer food service program, 1.8 million meals were served to children throughout the state of New Mexico. This year, CYFD's Family Nutrition Bureau expects that close to 2 million meals will be served to New Mexico children.

'It is very important that our children continue to have the opportunity to eat nutritious meals, even when school is not in session," said CYFD Cabinet Secretary Yolanda Deines. "We encourage all New Mexico children to take part in this wonderful program and to take advantage of these free meals.

CYFD reimburses statewide sponsoring organizations (administering agencies) for the administration and service of meals at approved meal sites, when school is not in session. The meals are free and no registration is required.

of the college deans and the community colleges this summer will be exciting."

Fant has served as NMSU's associate vice president and deputy provost since 2011. He was interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences twice, from 2007-08 and 2009-10. He has also been an associate dean, an assistant dean and head of NMSU's music department. He originally came to NMSU as the

associate director of bands in 1990 and is a conductor, saxophonist and tenured professor in music.

Fant will work to support the university's education, research and public service programs. Two areas he is currently focusing on include classroom space issues and strengthening the pathways for community college students into NMSU's Las Cruces campus.

NSF awards water grant

Student to study salt cedar and salt grass

New Mexico State University graduate civil engineering student Juan Solis has obtained a \$40,000 annual Graduate Research Fellowship from the National Science Foundation to support his research in the measurement of evapotranspiration depletion of inland salt grass and salt cedar. The organization will fund his research for three years.

A combination of evaporation of soil and transpiration of plants, evapotranspiration measures the amount of water that is consumed by vegetation.

Solis' thesis is based on using native New

Mexico salt grass to manage riparian habitat dominated by salt cedar. An indigenous plant in Eurasia and Africa, salt cedar limits biodiversity and consumes large quantities of water where it grows.

Through his research, Solis said he hopes to stop the growth of salt cedar with the use of salt grass, which suppresses salt cedar seed germination, filters contaminants, is arid-climate-tolerant and has low water consumption. Because New Mexico sees little rain, he said, it's important to conserve water in the ground system.

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

Bringing a professional women's tennis tournament to Las Cruces might have seemed like a long shot to local promoters several months ago, but all indications are that the Las Cruces Professional Women's Tennis Challenger at the New Mexico State University Tennis Center is being pulled off without a fault.

Don Hemingway of the USTA Southwestern New Mexico said it couldn't have been done without the help of the community.

"Community involvement has been very heavy," he said, "and it is very much appreciated.

"Comment from the national people and officials is that the number of volunteers and support for the community has been excellent."

Hemingway said the remark he hears most often from players and officials is: "We don't know how you did it without a title sponsor."

He pointed at the signs of the tournament's local sponsors. "That's how we did

The Las Cruces tennis community had only about four months to prepare for the tournament, whereas most tournaments begin planning and lining up sponsorships a year ahead of time.

Handling the press for the tournament has been Dave McCollum, publisher emeritus for the Las Cruces Bulletin. McCollum said attendance has been good, with about 200 to 300 people attending each day.

"For the semifinals and finals on the weekend, we expect more," he said.

A big pat on the back needs to go out to people such as Hemingway and McCollum, as well as Judy Harlas, president of the Las Cruces Tennis Players Association, and many other volunteers, promoters and local tennis fans, not to mention NMSU.

"We are really indebted to NMSU," Hemingway said.

If Hemingway has any complaints, it might be that he hasn't been able to watch many of the matches.

"I used to watch these things on TV and couldn't understand why (seats reserved for tournament officials) were so vacant, but now I know that that's when you are busiest behind the scenes," he said. I got to watch my first match last

The tournament is only one sign that interest in tennis is on the rise in the City of the Crosses, Hemingway said.

"Local membership has gone up by a factor of three over the last three years he said. "Our growth is focused on new league members at all levels."

Hemingway has a message for Las Crucens: "The pro circuit is here and here to stay."

Top seed advances through Wednesday's first round

Pooler had dropped out of playing professional tennis for several years, but upon the death of her father, decided to take another swing at playing tennis full time as her father had wished.

A player at Arizona State University in her college career, Pooler said this was her first time in Las Cruces and she felt the tournament was being "wonderfully run."

In her run through the qualifier, Pooler said she had to resort to an unusual move because of the wind in one of her matches.

"I couldn't make a serve to save my life, so switched to underhand," she said. "I knew if I could get the ball in play, I could win the point. If you want to have a chance, you have to gut it out."

The doubles team of Anamika Bhargava and Mayo Hibi had a little more luck on Wednesday, as their scheduled opponents withdrew due to an injury.

"We were in the main draw and we're playing today but our opponents withdrew because of injury," Bhargava said "We are waiting to see if a lucky loser signs in, then we'll play and if not, then we have a bye, and won't play till

"Most of the girls already flew out, because this rarely happens, a lucky loser in doubles,"

New Mexico State University track and field coach Orin Richburg announced Wednesday, June 4, that Moorpark College standout, Megan McNally has signed a National Letter of Intent and will join the NMSU cross country and track and field team beginning in the fall of 2013.


In the 2013 outdoor track and field season, McNally finished second in the 1,500-meter, 5,000-meter and 10,000-meter run, earning 24 of her team's 59 total points and helping them to a fourth-place finish at the CCCAA Southern California Championship.

She went on to compete in the California Community College State Track and Field Championships and took second place in the 5,000-meter run with a time of 17:55.86. McNally also finished third in the 10,000-meter run and earned a total of 14 points. She was named an All-American for both races

McNally ran her best time in the 5,000-meter run early in the 2013 outdoor season with a time of 17:27.34, which also broke the school record set in 2010 with a time of 17:41 by Madelyn Stoltze, who also continued her career with NMSU.

In the 2012 cross country season, McNally finished first at the 65th annual Mt. Sac Invitational. She also earned a thirdplace finish in the Southern California Cross Country Championships and led the team to a third-place finish, which was the best finish in school history.

"We're all pretty excited to have her," assistant coach Christopher Huff said. "She's the second Moorpark College athlete we've had. Madelyn Stoltze also came to NMSU through Moorpark and did well for us and Megan actually broke her record, so to sign her on to the team is huge for us."

Wisdom from a land far away

Interview with the 'Famous Japanese Pro'

I have been writing this column in the Bulletin for a little more than seven years. The column started in early April, 2006 when (then publisher) Dave McCollum invited me to "stimulate our readers with something golflike." Since then, I haven't missed a week.

About five years ago, I started offering insights from "The Famous Japanese Pro" about every eight months or so, whenever F.J. Pro was available to talk. For our newer readers. I feel compelled to explain just how my relationship with F.J. Pro got started, so I thought I would provide a little background.

As I get older (yes, it happens), I have been struck more than ever by the fact that golf is full of puzzles and paradoxes. Sometimes I feel like Garrison Keillor's private eve, Guv Noir, who is always searching for the "answers to life's persistent questions."

Back in the early 1980s, humorist Douglas Adams came out with a cheesy parody called "Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy," where he sought "the answer to the ultimate question of life, the universe and everything." Turns out the answer was

But the answers to golf's persistent questions - such as why does a putt break uphill; or why does a dog bark right in your backswing - aren't that simple.

A breakthrough happened recently and I became infused with philosophical hope when I attended a golf teachers and coaches summit. During a coffee break, a fellow head-doctor introduced me to an Asian gentleman, who he simply referred to as the "Famous Japanese Pro," as if I had already heard of him.

My golf-shrink friend quickly explained to me that F.J. Pro was not really a former tour professional, but he is a philosopher of the game of golf. He rarely visits the U.S.; he doesn't spend time on the practice range with video cams like other teachers; and the man had never heard of Hank Haney, Butch Harmon, Dr. Bob Rotella or even Tim Finchem.

Anyway, I was able to garner some time alone with this recognized guru of golf.

He struck me as an unassuming, middle-aged man who looked very fit, spoke broken English and was clearly a man of very few words. What a marvelous opportunity, I thought, to acquire some Tao-like wisdom. Seizing the moment, I queried the F.J. Pro on some things that had been truly concerning me.

Golf Doc: All the professional tours are now facing the difficult and unsavory struggle with policing performanceenhancing drugs. There have been some well-documented sanctions amid players' objections. A few years back, legend Gary Player leveled the accusation that he knew some pros were cheating. Since then, it's gotten worse.

F.J. Pro: Fire often there with smoke.

Golf Doc: Most recently, there has been a flap about a substance called "deer antler spray," which some folks feel is a magic bullet to solve injury problems.

F.J. Pro: Only snake oil. Golf Doc: Veteran tour pro Vijay Singh has since admitted to using deer antler spray about six months ago and then was suspended by the PGA Tour for 90 days. Now Singh is suing the tour saying that the ban was unfair.

F.J. Pro: Bite not hand

Golf Doc: In early May at the Players Championship,

Tiger Woods was paired with Sergio Garcia in the third round when a disagreement erupted. Although Garcia was a good 50 yards away from Woods, he heard the gallery around Woods cheer just as Garcia played his shot. He glared over at Woods and later said he felt Woods should have had the courtesy to delay while he hit. The two then traded barbs over the ensuing few weeks, including when Garcia made the statement, "We don't like each other's company." Why do you think that is?

F.J. Pro: Envy (jealousy) one of seven deadly sins.

Golf Doc: The most damming situation was when Garcia was jokingly asked (at a European Tour banquet) if he planned to have Woods over for dinner at the U.S. Open, whereby Garcia replied that he might serve fried chicken. The humor was totally lost amid cries of racism, mostly from the media, with Woods remarking that it was inappropriate. You know about the flap?

F.J. Pro: Sushi most preferred to chicken.

Golf Doc: Turning to less controversial topics, there is considerable attention these days to what we call the "mental game." It's common knowledge that among extremely talented players, the non-physical dimensions of golf separate the winners from the others. It seems that the biggest problem for golfers is anxiety, or put another way, nerves. What say you?

F.J. Pro: Let pond in head

Golf Doc: Golfers seem to get nervous when they find themselves in a new situation, whether it's at the top of the leaderboard or playing in their first tournament. I've been searching for the secret to help players get comfortable when they are in new and alien circumstances.

F.J. Pro: Experience probably best teacher.

Golf Doc: As a fan of many sports, I feel that luck is often a major difference maker, especially in tight contests between evenly matched opponents - a favorable bounce here, a chip-in there. Luck can be huge. How much of a factor do you think luck plays in golf?

F.J. Pro: Fate favors most prepared mind.

Golf Doc: Several years ago in the U.S. Open, Phil Mickelson, the leader and favorite, had a meltdown on the 72nd hole, while Colin Montgomery, who could have easily won, made a double from the middle of the fairway on the same hole. In 1999, Jean Van de Velde had a similar meltdown at Carnoustie. Talk about bad luck. And Greg Norman at Augusta in 1996. Wow. What goes on with these people?

F.J. Pro: Reliable swing most desirable under pressure.

Golf Doc: Going through the list of LPGA players, I notice that so many are foreign. Glancing at the group of players who made the cut at a recent LPGA tournament, I found that 20 of the top 40 were Korean golfers. I was stunned. Any ideas on what

is happening here?

F.J. Pro: Go ask Korean

Golf Doc: Many of us are lamenting the fact that there are so few American girls in the top echelons of golf these days. Girls' programs in junior golf and in high school golf don't seem to be producing as many talented players as we would like.

F.J. Pro: Perhaps texting more fun than practice.

Golf Doc: Many celebrities and experts have written books about how golf teaches us the lessons of life: Dr. Bob Rotella, David Cook, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player and M. Scott Peck, to mention just a few. It seems to me at times that often life reflects golf; that our best efforts don't always pay off and that it takes considerable work to be masterful. Please share your ideas about how golf might mirror life or vice versa.

F.J. Pro: Both life and golf hard.

Golf Doc: I can remember a time when sports heroes were true winners and showed little of today's "attitude." There was no trash-talking or fist-pumping or end-zone dancing or chest-thumping. They did their jobs and let their performance do the talking. Have you noticed?

F.J. Pro: Victory most hollow with no humility.

Golf Doc: It seems there is a lot of complaining that goes on in golf. The tour players complain about course setups and conditions. Golf writers complain about top

players losing the desire to win and not having any personality. Even I have been known to complain sometimes about the suspect greenskeeping on some of the local courses we play. What's with all the complaining?

F.J. Pro: Inept farmer whine over bad crop.


Golf Doc: Swimming phenom Michael Phelps, winner of 18 Olympic gold medals, has taken up golf, with instruction by Hank Haney, popular with viewers on the Golf Channel. When asked if he would give up a gold medal to become a professional golfer, Phelps replied, "not a gold, but maybe

F.J. Pro: Vanity (vainglory) another deadly sin.

Golf Doc: One of the mysteries of golf that has had me wondering for years has to do with attempting a shot or a putt over again. Haven't you noticed that if we miss a putt, and then try the exact same putt over again, it always goes in? Or if we hit a wild, ugly tee shot, and then try it over again, we do it perfectly? Any advice, sir?

(Long pause) **F.J. Pro:** Hit second ball

Your office may have desks and a break room or it may be a dusty field that is open from sun up to sun down. My office is different

Arenas and stadiums are my office, and from time to time I take a moment to think about the historic, kooky and memorable "offices" I have worked in.

Here is a slice of those memories. Let's start with the kooky.

Twice I sat in the end zone of a basketball arena elevated above the basket.

Grand Island High in central Nebraska and Eckerd College in Tampa, Fla., put the radioman in an elevated perch behind the south goal. It made for an unusual depth of field in watching the game and in both cases, it meant climbing up a ladder ferrying the equipment in the hand that wasn't gripping the ladder.

That isn't the only time I climbed a ladder to a cubbyhole, my broadcast position. Duke University's Cameron Indoor Stadium has similar accommodations, but the broadcaster is on a sideline, not the end zone.

Duke fits into the historic category along with Madison Square Garden and the Los Angeles Sports Arena. The Aggies were in the finals of the preseason National Invitation Tournament in 1994, in "the Garden." As we moved from the underside of the arena to the floor, I realized that I was walking where Frank Sinatra, Hulk Hogan and all the performers walked en route to the main stage.

President John Kennedy once spoke in the L.A. Sports Arena in the early 1960s. The

arena housed several major prize fights and was the first home of the Lakers. I called the game between NMSU and USC in the building, when Rodney Walker, Clyde Jordan and Skip McCoy were mainstays on that squad.

As far as memorable road venues, both are in Arizona. Let's put Sun Devil Stadium at the top of this list. The 1999 vic-

tory over Arizona State was an incredible night for NMSU athletics. Tony Samuel and staff put together the game plan and the team executed it to perfection.

The ASU Activities Center alongside Sun Devil Stadium holds a special spot in my memory palace as well. In 1992, it was the springboard for the Aggies' last entry into the Sweet 16. The upset win over DePaul leading to the decisive win over Southwest Louisiana makes that structure a memorable location.

My offices are big and small but they are seldom dull. My home offices are my favorites, not only is my desk just the right size, but there are always thousands of friends there "at work" with me.





'Daughter' from Mexico makes first visit to 'dad'

Las Cruces man opens heart, resources to foreign student

By Todd G. Dickson

Although Bill Bradley had described Las Cruces to his "daughter" in Mexico, the 22-year-old woman found her visit this week to the city surprising in both its modern ways and its challenges.

Karen Zuñiga was a waitress in the coastal Mexico city of Zihuatanejo when she met Bradley, a tourist. Bradley was no ordinary tourist, however. During his stays at Zihuatanejo, he was drawn to helping its children in poor schools to improve conditions.

As Bradley got to know Zuñiga, he learned she was working two jobs – putting in 60 hours a week to support herself and her family while studying international business at the University of Guadalajara. Impressed with the young lady, Bradley made her a deal: She had to write him a long email each week in English – a skill she would need in her desired profession – and he would pay for her tuition and class supplies.

For the past several years, she has done that – only missing a couple assign-

ments, but learning Bradley was serious about not sending her support if she failed to keep up her part of the agreement. She has faithfully sent the emails ever since, even though she admits English is a very difficult language.

With summer break, Bradley brought Zuñiga to the United States for a visit. Some of it will be for her enjoyment, but he also is connecting her with experts for her thesis on human resources, which was Bradley's profession before he retired to Las Cruces.

The week in Las Cruces began on a serious note with a visit to the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope, where she met with people of Camp Hope, the tent city for homeless people. In Mexico, the United States is seen as a place with so much affluence Zuñiga said it was eye-opening for her to also see Americans living in tents on the other side of the border.

She also met with professors at New Mexico State University, where the campus is larger and more modern than the one she attends in Mexico. Other visits have ranged from perusing the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market to joining Bradley at the Animal Services

Center of the Mesilla Valley, where he

Zuñiga described Bradley's assistance to her life as "very nice and unbelievable." But Bradley said he just felt compelled to help, even though he lives on a limited income himself.

Bradley published a book about the experience titled "Journey to Zihuatanejo" in the hopes of inspiring people to do what they can to help others. Just as Zuñiga has become his "daughter," she has taken on a "brother" in Mexico, a boy with school and girlfriend problems. Like Bradley, Zuñiga said she tries not to be judgmental when the boy falls short

"He never judges," she said of Bradley, whom she calls her "dad" because her real father died when she was a young girl.

If she is successful in business, Zuñiga said she will continue helping others.

"I really want to help other women,"

That's the real lesson Bradley said he wants Zuñiga and others to learn – don't worry about changing the world, just make things better where you can, and inspire others to do what they can.



Hidden history revealed WWII bomb targets

Seven sites exist in a proposed monument

Organizers of the effort to establish the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument took media and others on plane rides Wednesday, June 5, to one of the harder-to-recognize historical landmarks – targets used for bombing practice during the early days of World War II.

Nathan Small, of the New Mexico Wilderness Alliance, said the seven targets for bomb practice were hurriedly dug into the desert in early 1942 for flight missions out of Deming.

The flights were conducted by LightHawk of Albuquerque, which provided use of a Beechcraft Bonaza piloted by Richard Hoover. LightHawk assists groups such as the Wilderness Alliance with plane tours of areas being considered for preservation.





For months now, the interweb has been abuzz with news of a technologically advanced social media product called Google Glass, a wearable device that brings hands-free usage to new levels.

Made to straddle the face much like a pair of Borg-devised eyeglasses, the gizmo is designed to do many of the same things a smartphone does, including provide directions, let the viewer engage in video chat and take pictures and first-person video. During the last week in May, the device was unveiled to mixed reviews at the D11: All Things Digital developer's conference, held in

San Francisco.

Of course, he was at the conference to unveil his own gadget, a Nike+ FuelBand bracelet that tracks the wearer's physical activity. Perhaps because of the conspicuous nature of the telltale frames, another executive who asked not to be named dubbed the wearers of the device, "Google Asses." It's clear that the marketing department at Google has its work cut out for them. Still, many are heralding Google Glass as the wave of things to come.

Internet analyst Mary Meeker, who is considered to be the go-to person when it comes to all things web, has predicted that Google Glass and other wearable devices will be the next big thing in the coming years. In fact, in a report she released on Wednesday, May 29, that is chock full of "interesting" factoids (the average person checks his or her smartphone 150 times per day - no real surprise there), she called wearable computing the harbinger of "the third cycle" of the Internet. Sounds ominous, doesn't it? Either that or the plot of a Philip K. Dick novel.

She also reports that only 15 percent of the United States population overshares on social media sites like Facebook and MySpace, as opposed to 60 percent of the Saudi Arabian population or 5 percent of the Japanese population. Which is interesting because, either my Facebook friends are that 15 percent, or she was misquoted and actually meant there are only 15 percent of the American population who don't overshare. Even that number is questionable. But I digress.

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Bankruptcy baffles local fans

Pro's Ranch Market gets vote of confidence

Although most shoppers filing into Pro's Ranch Market on Wyatt Drive Tuesday, June 4, were unaware the city's newest supermarket was part of a bankruptcy filing, all voiced strong support for Pro's.

Only one shopper who spoke with the Las Cruces Bulletin, Daniel Thornton, said he read the news Friday, May 31, the company has filed for voluntary reorganization under Chapter 11 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code.

"It's sad to see that after just a year," Thornton, himself a business owner, said. 'They've got my thumbs up."

He described the Las Cruces market as "a wonderful little store."

"They try to have a good business, with fresh meats, nice atmosphere," he said. "It's clean and the food is fresh. They go above and beyond."

Pro's, an 11-store Hispanic-oriented food chain, opened its Las Cruces location in late 2011. The family-owned company founded in 1982 is headquartered in California but owns most of its stores in the Phoenix area. Pro's expanded into New Mexico in 2008, opening a store in Albuquerque. It has two locations in El Paso.

Discussing the bankruptcy with Supermarket News, COO Rick Provenzano said, "We made this move to improve the overall health of the company and save the jobs of more than 2,200 team members. This opportunity to restructure our business will result in a stronger and more stable company for years to come.

Pro's said it does not plan to sell or close any of its stores. The company said it has hired HG Capital Partners of Phoenix as its restructuring adviser, SuperMarket News reported.

Change a constant at strip mall

Sally Quillin, a Las Cruces resident since 1979, said she's seen the store at 320 Wyatt Drive go through a number of evolutions in the intervening years. She recalled it formerly was Skaggs Alpha Beta, also a chain food store.

The space later was a Jewel Osco and then operated as a Raley's. Before going dark, it served as a community center. The space,

which anchors a strip mall, was vacant prior to Pro's undertaking extensive alterations. Adjacent stores came and went in recent years, and were often vacant.

Quillin said she is a big-time fan of Pro's.

Asked what she likes about the store, Quillin said: "The people. The way they create ambiance with mariachis. Everyone is so helpful - they ask you if there's something you're looking for.

"I've never had a bad experience. They have such great deals. I hope something happens and they're able to stay open."
"It's so convenient," said Mario Castillo of

Las Cruces. "If the store goes it would be a bad thing."

Irma Rey of Hatch, also surprised the company is experiencing difficulties, said she likes

Company expects success

Michael Provenzano Jr., chief financial officer told Supermarket News that Pro's revenues have been hurt "by the lingering recession.

"This reorganization will put us back on a more firm financial footing," he said.

Provenzano said the company has obtained

a \$3 million loan commitment to continue operations during the reorganization.

"The short-term plan is to emerge from Chapter 11 as soon as possible," he said. "Over the next few months we will be laying out our long-term strategy to ensure success.

Pro's Ranch founder Mike Provenzano Sr. in a keynote speech at the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce annual awards dinner in February outlined the company's business philosophy and its reason for moving into the Las Cruces market.

He said he and his son Mike Jr. in 1992 launched a small business model based on reaching out to the Hispanic base and competing with big-box stores for that market share.

Provenzano commented that Hispanic growth in the border regions exceeds 60 percent and Hispanic buying power is growing

"Las Cruces is about to explode," he said. "We've been setting up for years to come here."



Interactive and conducted by YouGov, 1,000 smartphone users were asked what they thought of Google Glass. Fortyfive percent called them "socially awkward." Another 44 percent claimed that they weren't at all interested in the Glass' known features. Only 10 percent of those surveyed said they would wear the headset, regardless of cost. That's right, only 1-in-10 Americans say they don't mind looking like a dork in order to do the exact same things their smartphones will already allow them to do.

So, what are the good points of this newfangled technology? The price tag, which to date is only available to a select group of "explorers" willing to write a check, is \$1,500. Speculators at Google are claiming that a consumer version of the device will be hitting markets as early as 2014 with a much more agreeable price tag; like, say, \$200. Currently, Glass lets wearers who have their eyewear wirelessly tethered to their mobile phones take pictures, record video and send messages with a simple voice command. As new apps are developed, new uses will be explored. In fact, several companies are already doing so.

Whether or not the CEO of Apple or 90 percent of Americans surveyed believe Google Glass will catch on, it hasn't stopped service providers such as Facebook and Twitter from launching Google Glass apps. Erick Tseng,

head of mobile products at Facebook, became the first to use his app when he posted an image taken at the developer's conference. Meanwhile, engineering manager at Twitter, Shiv Ramamurthi, tweeted an image from one of the conference sessions with the hashtag #throughglass.

And this is just the beginning. The New York Daily News reported March 12, two months before the conference that made all of this information public, that a company called InSight had created an app that allows the wearer of the device to find friends in a crowd based on their "fashion fingerprint." So, if you're a fan of certain patterns, textures and/ or colors, once the Glass has peeped you, the information goes into its databank and the next time it sees somebody with your fashion tastes, it can recognize the fashionista as you, with "reasonable consistency." The developers claim that this app is 93 percent accurate. Creepy, no?

With recent news that a company in China is also developing a wearable gadget, called the Baidu Eye, that is geared to give Google Glass a run for its money, it's increasingly obvious that this is not an idea that will be going away any time soon. Considering I never thought I would see the day 70-year-old cowboys would be wearing Bluetooth devices, something which has become pretty common in these parts, I believe anything is possible. We may not have the rocket packs or hoverboards we were promised in the 21st century, but wearable technology has definitely arrived. Being the fashion plate that I am, I just hope it matches my color palette.





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A tale of two countries

Brazil enjoys a dynamic economy compared to Cuba, but lacks educational opportunity



One of the perks of my research is that it often gives me an excuse to travel to Latin America.

Last year I traveled to Cuba and I've just returned from a trip to Rio de Janeiro. The contrasts between Cuba and Brazil are many.

Cuba is, along with Korea, the last of the old-line totalitarian states. The Cuban government seeks to create the new man who puts the state before themselves. Uniformed officials are prevalent, ensuring that citizens comply with numerous arbitrary rules and regulations.

Brazil, by contrast, is developing into a modern Western capitalist country. By U.S. standards, the country remains poor, but rapid economic growth in recent years and a shortage of labor means that jobs are plentiful and there is an air of prosperity. Rio is set to host the 2014 World Cup and the 2016 Summer Olympics. This has imbued the city with an attitude of confidence.

Of course, Brazil is not a paradise and Cuba is not without advantages. Access to health care remains a problem in Brazil, while Cuba famously produces a surplus of doctors, which it exports to other Latin American countries, including Brazil.

Cuba provides universal high-quality education through college. Indeed, a problem for Cuba is an overeducated population that doesn't want to do the menial jobs – too many doctors, not enough plumbers. Meanwhile, public education in Brazil is a national

scandal. Only recently, for example, have elementary school teachers been required to be high school graduates. Any Brazilians with the means to do so send their children to private schools.

This means that Brazil is a land of privilege, and not a meritocracy. Gaining a highpaying job depends on a good education, and a good education comes from having parents who can afford to pay for it. Wealth begets wealth. Equality of opportunity is a nonexistent. This contrasts sharply with Cuba where, at least so far, with the obvious exception of the Castro brothers, family connections are not a requirement for high office.

The two countries' relations with the United States also differ. Cuba, of course, has been on the receiving end of a half century long embargo, while Brazil was a Cold War ally and remains a major trading partner. Cuban propaganda aimed at the United States is daily fare in newspapers and on TV. Meanwhile, a visit by a smiling Vice President Joe Biden warmly greeted by Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff was the main news item during my visit.

An item that illustrates feelings of the two countries toward the United States is found on university campuses. On the campus of the University of Havana is a tank that allegedly was involved in repulsing CIA-backed invaders at the Bay of Pig in 1961. On the campus of the Pontificate Catholic University-Rio is a bronze bust of John F. Kennedy, the president who ordered the Bay of Pigs.

Kathy Brook: Taking on a new leadership role

Associate dean to serve as interim business dean

Kathy Brook sat at her desk in the New Mexico State University College of Business surrounded by stacks of papers and books.

She's been busy for 16 years as associate dean for academics at the college.

"Once upon a time, I used to attend city council meetings," she said, recalling less hectic days gone by.

As interim dean, Brook is about to get even busier.

She confidently looks forward to

continuing to be a leader in curricular and administrative matters.
Fundraising, however, is an as-

pect of her job that's new for her.

Her predecessor, Garrey Carruthers, embraced the role of fundraising during his tenure as dean of the college and director of

development prior to taking over the NMSU presidency Saturday, June 1.

"The big area where I have not had much experience is in fundraising. I've been involved in how scholarships are awarded, but not in raising the money for them," Brook said.

"In the future I will probably be more involved with alumni than I have been."

Continuous improvement the goal

"We have a good group of department heads," Brook said. "I've worked with them closely – more closely during Dean Carruthers' tenure. We meet regularly. I think we're in good shape in that respect."

She described her leadership style as consensus building, an approach used in the League of Women Voters where she previously served as local president and state vice president.

One topic the business college leadership team will look at is how to improve the quality of undergraduate education.

"We have made a lot of progress in the past few years," Brook said. "We are taking advantage of electronic tools to gain compliance (with academic standards)."

Future discussions will likely focus on

whether to raise admissions standards as well as performance standards.

A closer relationship with distance learners and curricular changes to reflect an increasing emphasis on entrepreneurship also may be in the offing.

Changes must be approved by faculty. They are driven by feedback from students, employers and accrediting bodies, Brook said.

"Continuous improvement has always been an emphasis at the college," she said, adding that the focus is on the employability of new graduates and their ability to function as members of civil society.

"I want to remain closely linked to the community. I think we have a lot to contribute to how the community grows and develops."

Into the desert

Brook came to NMSU in 1980 as visiting faculty.

At the time, she was teaching at Smith College in Massachusetts, a prestigious liberal arts college for women.

Brook offered an anecdote to shed light on her experience at Smith. She related that soon after her arrival at the college, she had to cancel a class to attend a conference with departmental colleagues.

"The students were rather taken aback," she said, noting the high level of self-motivation they brought to their academic experiences.
"What I liked about Smith was the intima-

"What I liked about Smith was the intimacy. I was able to go into the library and on my own word take out books. What I didn't like was it was also a small town, so I never really got away from my job."

She said she enjoyed the fall foliage and the opportunity to explore Boston and other nearby cities.

Then Brook heard from a grad school friend about an opening at NMSU and took the opportunity to return to the West.

She found her teaching role different at NMSU than at Smith, the culture more similar to the University of Texas at Austin, where she earned her Ph.D.

"NMSU was a big change for me," she said, adding that one of the things that appealed to her most was that the role of faculty was more

important than at an elite private college.

Brook's first impression of Las Cruces was "a very friendly community."

"When I had dinner for a second night at a little restaurant on El Paseo that's no longer there, the waiter apologized for not knowing whether I took cream in my coffee," she said.

On the other hand, she had to get used to not having some of the cultural amenities she experienced during her time in the East.

"I couldn't walk into the PicQwik and get a New York Times," she said. "There used to be a little place – John's Newstand– downtown – that would get the Sunday times off the bus on Thursday."

Vagabond finds a home

Brook's father was an engineer, originally in oil and gas-related industries and later in semiconductors and then the defense industry, she said. The family moved as his career evolved.

"We moved to Maine with the expectation my parents would retire there. We were there only a year before going to California," she said. "It was kind of addictive to start every year in a new location."

In spite of her earlier wanderlust, Brook turned her visiting professorship at NMSU into a long-term career path.

She accepted a permanent appointment in the economics department, where she taught introduction to money and banking, the New Mexico economy, business cycles and macro economics at the upper division and graduate levels.

The border economy became more of a focus of her research once she took root in the City of the Crosses. She later became research director and associate dean of the college.

Although most of her time as associate dean was devoted to administrative matters, she managed to teach one class year in conjunction with the Federal Reserve Bank of El Paso, dealing with monetary policy and the local economy.

She had administrative responsibility along with the college's department heads for the MBA program.

Her other duties included:

- Directing the distance learning program
- Meeting with students who were seeking rule exceptions

Our local listing inventory, which hit 1,745 units in 2007, now consists of around 1,100 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums. Until the end of 2012, even that reduced number was too high to absorb the meager number of buyers in our local marketplace. As a result, values continued to decline

Not until this year did the balance of supply and demand finally catch up with other areas of the country and make an about face. Through Friday, May 31, Las Cruces area sales production and values have both been on the rise. Sales are up 7.3 percent over the same period last year, with total sales volume up by 9.9 percent.

The issue of a shortage of inventory becomes obvious in the \$140,000 and lower price range. Through the first five months of 2012, a total of 221 properties sold at or below \$140,000. This year, a shortage of good listings in that range has reduced the number of sales

by more than 50 percent, to just 109 closings. The trend continues into the \$160,000 price range.

Adding to the lack of inventory is the declining number of distress sales, which have fallen by 15 percent during the past year. As with any supply and demand model, the shortage of inventory is causing prices to move higher.

The average and median prices of the new homes sold through the first five months of this year (\$202,540 and \$190,000, respectively) represent a significant improvement over last year's respective average and median prices of \$172,095 and \$155,695.

The same is true for local existing-home sales, where this year's average and median prices of \$174,880 and \$147,800 are an improvement over last year's \$172,095 and \$140,000 values.

Well, there you have it. The behavior of the Las Cruces real estate market is beginning to catch up with the behavior of other U.S. markets, giving rise to the notion that 2013 will mark the year our local market began its recovery in earnest.

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

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

Conquering the mighty Rio Grande

16th annual Raft the Rio set – as long as there's water

Despite tensions felt by a record drought in southern New Mexico, state land officials have assured the public that the occasionally mighty Rio Grande will see water released from the Caballo Reservoir in early June, setting the stage for one of the Mesilla Valley's most beloved events.

That's right – as dry as it is, on Saturday, June 15, the Rio Grande will be filled not only with precious water, but the with the shouts of amateur crews captaining dozens of makeshift seafaring vessels – some of which may actually float – in an attempt to conquer the fickle "big river" during the Southwest Environmental Center's (SWEC) 16th annual Raft the Rio.

In 1997, SWEC held its first ever Raft the Rio in an attempt to draw attention to the issues facing the Rio Grande, one of the country's most endangered rivers.

Since its inception, Raft the Rio has grown into one of Las Cruces' premier summertime attractions, with last year's annual event drawing nearly 1,000 people and as many as 200 rafts, created, captained and crewed by enthusiastic pseudo-sailors of all ages.

For nearly two decades, SWEC has sponsored the annual, family-friendly event that not only provides a great day of fun in the sun – and even some surf – but serves as a way for the community to connect with the natural world around them.

According to SWEC's Ashley Martinez, "Raft the Rio is really important for Las Cruces, and New Mexico as a whole, in bringing the community out to connect with the river.

"Many people don't use it at all, and Raft the Rio is a great way to bring awareness to the Southwest Environmental Center and the projects we do," Martinez said. "It's also a way for the community to get outdoors and connect with nature, and it's a lot of fun."

The three-mile downstream journey begins at La Llorona Park, located on West Picacho Avenue, and ends at the bridge that crosses Calle del Norte in Mesilla, just north of the Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park.

In keeping with the environmental and conservatory nature of the event and the mission of SWEC, rafters are strongly encouraged to build their own homemade rafts.

"The recycled rafts are a good way for people to put to use a lot of things they'd normally throw away," Martinez said.

Prizes will be awarded to boats in a number of categories, including first to finish, best use of recycled materials, most spirited crew, best theme, best mascot – a new addition to the competition – and the perennial favorite, least likely to finish. A prize will also be awarded for this year's "Champion of the River," the team that best promotes appreciation for the natural wonder that is the Rio Grande.

Teams may register at the starting line – La Llorona Park – beginning at 8 a.m. Saturday, or in advance by contacting the Southwest Environmental Center at 522-5552 or by visiting www.wildmesquite.org/events/Raft-the-Rio and downloading

the available registration materials. The entry fee is \$20 per raft in advance, with an additional \$5 fee assessed on day-of registration, plus \$5 for each crew member 13 years or older after the first two.

Two divisions – kids and open – begin at staggered times, with the Kids Division race starting at 10 a.m. and the Open Division race at 10:15 a.m. To qualify for the Kids Division, at least half of the raft's crew must be 13 years of age or younger.

In accordance with state law, all participants must wear approved personal floatation devices, and no motorized craft are allowed on the river.

Established in 1991, SWEC is a grassroots conservation organization based in Las Cruces. From its offices Downtown, SWEC and its members have dedicated themselves to protecting the native wildlife and habitats along the border through education, advocacy and community projects.

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Breaking new ground

'Terra Nova' is a cutting-edge drama

The No Strings Theatre Company at the Black Box Theatre is to be applauded enthusiastically for its courage, vision, skill and

Producer Ceil Herman is never afraid to take risks in selecting unusual, rarely produced plays.

I so admire, applaud and appreciate the many artistic risks Herman and her husband, Peter, have taken at No Strings since its inception more than a decade ago with Edward Albee's risky "Seascape."

Ceil Herman selects plays to produce that are "cutting edge" and otherwise would never find a venue in our community. Over the years, she and a coterie of especially skilled directors have mounted plays that examine issues that scream out for examination.

The current production, the 1984 best play writing Obie (best off Broadway play) award-winner, "Terra Nova" by Ted

This masterful, powerful drama tells the tale of the final, ill fated expedition of Capt. Robert Falcon Scott and his crew of four to discover and explore the Antarctic region.

During the second of his two exploration ventures on his ship, the Terra Nova, from 1910-12, during which he reached the South Pole, Scott was devastated and emotionally bereft to discover that he and his crew had been preceded to the South Pole by a Norwegian expedition led by Roald Amundsen.

On their attempt to return to their ship, Scott and his crew all died from a combination of exhaustion, starvation and exposure to freezing blizzard conditions. Scientists believe Scott was the last of his team to die. He died in March 1912, but it took seven months for his frozen corpse to be discovered. It was covered with notes and his parka contained a journal he had written. These documents have become his legacy and are the source of much of the material for Tally's play.

Only after a restless night's sleep did the "Terra Nova's" message and Tally's artistic genius gel in my mind. I realized, and had my thought confirmed after reading the director's note in the program that Tally tells the story from Scott's "Dark Place Inside," from the perspective of Scott's deteriorating physical and mental condition. This is a stream of consciousness script, mirroring a confused mind, jumping from past to present to imagined past to the future as one would wish it to be.

An audience member must "work" to participate and benefit from gaining a full intellectual and artistic experience from Terra Nova." Trust me, it is worth the effort. As the rabbis of old said in the Talmud, "According to the effort, so is the reward."

The cast is passionate and top notch. Director Algernon D'Ammassa has done a superb job of melding them together as one. Each character has an English/Australian accent and there is no "slippage."

Each character's flaws come out as the play progresses. Scott, as portrayed expertly and sensitively by David Reyes, was known in England at the time of his death as "the bungler" because of the quality of some of his judgments. Ultimately he is redeemed as a great and venerated hero, whose snow tomb is topped by a cross on which is carved Tennyson's words from his poem "Ulysses" - "To strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield" and which is re-carved on his permanent memorial on Observation Hill overlooking Hut Point.

The mood of the production is in no small part due as well to an innovative set designed by Tiffini Raimann and magically enhanced by Peter Herman's outstanding lighting design. Ironically, I saw the Aurora Borealis photographed via time-lapse photography on television earlier in the day. Peter skillfully recreated the same effect electronically on the stage of the Black Box. It was miraculous! How the colors played against the set made me catch my breath.

The element that makes the production remarkably theatrical is the overbearing presence of Scott's nemesis, Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen, portrayed elegantly and deliberately obsequiously by master performer Bob Diven. Amundsen mystically appears in almost every scene, in subtle bullying ways, to remind Scott who really arrived at the South Pole first. Éven in Tally's re-enactment of the famous expedition photograph, Amundsen appears in Scott's mind as being a part of the picture.

As Scott's mind meanders through the play, he reviews his courtship, marriage and ambivalence toward his wife, sculptress Kathleen Bruce, a student of Auguste Rodin, and whose social circle included Pablo Picasso and Isadora Duncan. Claire Koleske's portrayal of Bruce is both elegant and complex. Their

scenes together show their mutual strong will, independence, vulnerability and affection.

The work of the other crew members is also noteworthy. Each has a distinct personality, yet they work as one to meet their goal. Eric Young, Joe T. Meier, Charles LeCocq and Mark Steffen each play off of each other and have a knowledge of the many technical instruments and supplies, which are on loan from New Mexico State University's Department of Surveying Engineering.

Steffen, in particular, has the most challenging role, and he does an amazing job of making us feel his physical and mental pain.

In all, "Terra Nova" deserves your attention. It's an example of the best theater our community has to offer. Bravo to all!

Next season at the Black Box promises to be even more exciting, including a rarely performed production of Ingmar Bergman's "Nora," a take on Ibsen's "Doll House." Season tickets are on sale now. Invest in our community's cultural growth. You'll get a great return on your No Strings investment.

Terra Nova" runs through Sunday, June 16. Performances are Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m., Sunday matinees at 2:30 p.m. June 9 and 16 and a Thursday evening performance at 7 p.m. June 13. Tickets are \$10 regular admission, \$9 students and seniors older than 65 and all seats on Thursday are \$7. For reservations, call 523-1223.

"At the end of the day, it's over and I get to go home to my family and spend time with them, without constantly thinking about the restaurant," he said.

While Liberto may be taking a little bit of well-deserved time off, his devotion to the craft of fine food still speaks to the passion and talent that has made Lorenzo's a Mesilla Valley favorite.

With less time and energy expended on managing a large staff, Liberto has been able to get more involved with each and every dish that leaves his kitchen for your family's table.

"I feel like I've always had a good product, but that it's even improved since we closed the restaurant," Liberto said.

"I'm here every day, I've got my hands on the dough, and I've been really paying attention to the detail and the quality.



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AtTheMovies

This movie is real (bad)

Seeing it is a choice

"After Earth," the latest offering from the king of the twist – no, not Chubby Checker, but M. Night Shyamalan, the once-promising director of "The Sixth Sense" whose films have epitomized the phrase "diminishing returns" – has one more startling than perhaps any of the director's films: It's quite possibly his worst, a feat that looms as a bigger shock than any he's placed in his films, dead psychologists and killer plants included.

Based around an original story idea by its star, Will Smith, "After Earth" pairs Smith – the 11th highest grossing star in history – with his 13-year-old son, Jaden, playing ... well, a father and son.

well, a father and son.

As the film opens – "in the near future" – we learn that, due to some sort of environmental catastrophe, mankind was forced to lead a mass exodus from the uninhabitable Earth to the greener pastures outside the solar system, eventually settling on the utopian Nova Prime.

The elder Smith is Cypher Raige – a name even more ludicrous pronounced than spelled – a general with the Ranger Corps (a sort of space U.N. as far as I can tell), who comes into contact with the evil S'krell, aliens hell-bent on taking over man's newest home.

Using large, poorly rendered creatures that can smell fear (or something) called Ursas, the S'krell attack Nova Prime, but are repelled when Raige teaches his troops a technique called "ghosting," or eliminating fear.

His son, Kitai Raige, is intent on following in his father's footsteps and becoming a ranger, in large part due to the blame he feels over his sister's death, an event the audience is treated to – in fragmentary, second-long bursts – throughout the film.

Kitai is skilled but reckless in his training, and is rejected from the rangers, a disappointment in his decorated dad's eyes.

It's only a matter of time before someone

- Kitai's mother – tells Cypher that his
son "needs a father, not a ..." (in this case,
commanding officer) and the hackneyed,
poorly executed tale of paternal bonding takes

Cypher is convinced to take his son on a mission – always a responsible, "take your child to work day" activity, especially for a military

man – and the duo begin to bond until, wouldn't you know it, something blows up the ship.

Crash-landed on the "Class I Quarantined Zone," the elder Raige breaks both of his legs, and his son is forced to travel across the planet to locate the tail section of the ship to retrieve the backup beacon to activate the rescue signal to, well, you get the idea.

This paper-thin, rote premise isn't helped by terrible pacing and protracted, painfully forced platitudes stretched so thin for emotional weight the screenwriters must have blown out a period button, or three, on the ellipses alone.

Get ready to bask in banalities even worse than the movie's tag line – "Danger is real. Fear is a choice" – for 100 minutes of your life. Hack-work dialogue like "every single choice you make will be life or death" is bad, but made so much worse – and much longer – when it's so full of dramatic pause it comes off as "every ... single ... decision ... you ... make ... will ... be ... life ... or ... death."

Smith and son stumble their way through this muddled mess of "Hang in There," kitten on a clothesline-caliber inspirational quotes about overcoming adversity and believing in yourself for about an hour and a half, punctuated at intervals with things resembling – but not quite – "action" and "narrative."

Oh, right – the narrative.

I didn't expect "After Earth" to break any new ground here. From the inciting incident to the final frames, the narrative arc is obvious – but it's so full of plot holes and continuity errors that serve to highlight just how rote this story is.

How - and this is only the most glaring

example ... in the preview – does an entire planet of animals "evolve to kill humans" when humans have been off the planet for 1,000 years or more? Anybody have a ninth-grade biology book handy?

With a script that reads like a video game and dialogue that's so much worse – it only gets more contrived from the "he needs a father ..." line, somehow – "After Earth" could, theoretically, rest on its \$130 million budget and top-end special effects ... right?

Here's another twist – no. They're terrible,

Perhaps the biggest letdown of all – and that's saying something – is that a real life father and son can't create any believable relationship of the sort onscreen. Will Smith spends the bulk of the movie lying down – seriously – and Jaden, bless his heart, couldn't act his way out of the pool house behind great Uncle Phil's Bel Air mansion.



Better living through Scotch

'Angels' Share' proves everyone has a talent

So far, in this young year, "Angels' Share" takes the prize for my second favorite film of 2013, just ahead of "Blancanieves."

At once a believable drama blended superbly with a dry wit and flecked with outright comedy, director Ken Loach has done well in switching gears in "Angels' Share."

In the past, most of Loach's work has focused on heavy drama, leaning heavily on socialism, soccer and Irish politics. With "The Angels' Share," he shows a knack for blending the absurd with the believable, which brought him the Jury Prize at the 2012 Cannes Film Festival for this work.

The film, which opens with a most funny scene in a courtroom where various neer do

In court we meet Robbie, a young man with a past, an attitude and no future. His outlook and aptitude are both off the charts and somehow he avoids jail one more time and is sentenced to 300 hours of community service for his latest transgression.

About to lose his girlfriend and their new baby, Robbie is getting desperate. A failed job interview, which is sadly funny in itself, pushes all involved to the edge.

pushes all involved to the edge.

With no discernible skills and with the bullies of a family who hold a grudge against him, and who want him to not have anything to do with his new son or their sister. Robbie

reports, late of course, to his first day of community service. Told to leave by the gruff but ultimately kindly supervisor, Harry, Robbie is once again able to con his way into being allowed to stay.

During the community service, Robbie meets his future partners in crime. Helped along by the kindly Harry, who takes a liking to the lad, Robbie soon finds that he does have a skill after all – a knack for being able to tell good Scotch whiskey from bad. A skill that Harry also has, Harry is suitably impressed by Robbie's ability and takes him along (with his goofy new "friends") to a slightly highbrow tasting conference, which leads to a trip to an auction where one of the most valuable barrels of distilled beverage is due to be auctioned off.

It is here that Robbie's true nature comes about, as he and his friends plan a grand heist after witnessing the auction, where the John Barleycorn is sold for a princely sum.

The title of the film is a term used for the natural evaporation of whiskey, and what

Robbie and his "gang" plan is an advanced form of just that.

Loach has chosen a fine cast, especially newcomer Paul Brannigan as Robbie, and all members of the supporting cast help carry this film along briskly and with a touch of whimsy.



Going green in sty

Contemporary-pueblo home so efficient, meter runs backwards

NetSolar Construction has once again shown that green and energy efficiency doesn't have to be boring with its 2013 Spring Showcase of Homes entry 3655 Santa Cecilia, in the Metro Verde subdivision.

Completed this year, the three-bedroom home features a pueblo style with contemporary touches, said Javier Cabrera, NetSolar co-owner, adding that this was achieved using structural insulated panels (SIPs) for the exterior walls and stick framing for the interior, which allowed for more design

A red door leads into the 1,607-square-foot home, which can also be accessed from the two-car garage. The garage features an insulated door as well as an electric car charger.

Inside the home, next to the door leading to the garage, is a "drop area."

When you come in from the garage, there is this transition area where you can store your shoes, bag and coat. And there is a charging station," said Cabrera, adding that the area includes an outlet with an USB port.

The Umbrella Mesh security system and Nest thermostat are located in the entrance area.

"It's a learning thermostat," said Emmanuel Dominguez, coowner of NetSolar Construction. "It detects when they're in the house and when they're not."

'It also works with the Internet, so you can access the network from any smart phone, computer or tablet and have the temperature set to what you want," Cabrera said.

A hall leads to two of the bedrooms as well as a bathroom.

The bathrooms have different style cabinets and countertops than the kitchen," Cabrera said. "They're Formica countertops. Also, the Formica cabinets are Green Guard certified."

An 11-foot-tall rotunda works as a transitional space between the bedrooms and the great room. A faux finish covers the ceiling, adding a pop of color to the gray color palette, as a modern-style chandelier lights the space.

The great room consists of the kitchen, dining room and living room, which allows occupants to interact while conducting different tasks.

Upgraded cabinets with glass doors and shelves and

Quartz countertops fill the kitchen. The gray backsplash features ceramic tile with mosaic glass tiles, an element found throughout the home in the bedrooms' thresholds and showers. Because the sink is located in the island, residents can still interact with guests sitting around the bar without turning their backs to them while working in the kitchen.

Exposed beams are placed along the 11-foot-tall ceiling in the living room. The built-in entertainment center with additional shelving also features the vibrant accent color found in the rotunda.

Near the living room is a hall that leads to the master suite. Located outside the master suite for convenience is the laundry

"It makes the laundry room more accessible and easier to use," Cabrera said.

The master bedroom features a tray ceiling measuring 9 feet tall. Windows are placed on either side of the bed and bring in natural light as well as the view of the Organ Mountains and budding Metro Verde subdivision.

The bedroom features a seamless, doorless entry into the master bathroom. Designed as a long rectangle, the tiled shower and double sinks are located to the right of the entrance, while the finished walk-in closet is to the left.

With this home, the builders decided to try something they hadn't done before: an outdoor living area, complete with builtin barbecue grill, wood burning fireplace and TV area. The tiled area features views of the Organ Mountains and other area

The backyard features several newly planted pine trees and bushes. Surrounding them are pecan shells, gravel and bark mulch ground coverings.

"It has a rain sensor for the irrigation system," Cabrera said. "So if it rains, the irrigation system won't start."

Cabrera and Dominguez said they built the home to qualify as LEED platinum certification. In addition to SIPs, the home features CFL lighting; Energy Star appliances and windows; a high-efficiency heating, ventilation and air conditioning system; low-VOC (volatile organic compounds); solar panels; WaterSense-certified faucets; tankless hot water heater; and other eco-friendly, green products.





Solar installer chooses Las Cruces

Former Realtor opening local CST office

Consolidated Solar Technologies, an Albuquerque-based installation company with a national client base, is moving its southern New Mexico headquarters from Sunland Park to Las

Opening the office for CST is Las Crucen Bruce Ball.

We decided to move from Sunland Park to Las Cruces because the Las Cruces market is stronger than the El Paso market," said Ball, who is representing CST in Las Cruces while waiting for the new headquarters space to become available.

Since the overall cost of solar is more appealing in New Mexico, demand in the state is stronger than in El Paso.

Ball said it costs almost twice as much to build a system there as it does in the City of the Crosses.

New Mexico property owners can take advantage of a 30 percent federal tax credit, 10 percent state tax credit and a 6 cent per kilowatt hour renewable energy credit from El Paso Electric Co., which will drop to 4 cents July 1.

Since El Paso property owners have to foot an 8 percent sales tax in addition, their costs for a solar system are much higher.

"Solar in Doña Ana is the most cost-effective in the state of New Mexico," Ball said. "Systems have come down in cost 40 percent in the last three years. With no down payment, you end up with a solar payment of less than your average electric bill."

Ball said that's been true in the case of every customer CST has served in Doña Ana County.

A company discount currently being offered in conjunction with the move to Las Cruces is an added incentive, he said.

CST spans residential and commercial

In addition to residential work, the company has installed systems for the Border Patrol checkpoints across southern New Mexico as well as at White Sands Missile Range and the University of Texas at El Paso.

The CST staff includes 70 commercial grade electricians.

"It just goes hand in hand," Ball said. "The panels are only as good as the install."

CST installs an average of one system per day, working in all 50 states, Ball said.

When CST does a job out of state, it ships the components and flies two technicians to the site.

The company's volume buying makes even long-distance projects, such as one currently underway in Tennessee, cost

Ball said CST installs most brands of panels and does warranty work on all. The company, however, is an elite dealer with preferred pricing from Sun Power Energy.

"We lead with Sun Power Energy panels because they're the most powerful in the world," he said. "They are used by the Department of Energy, Target, Walmart and FedEx."

Those companies do their homework, he said.

Sun Power panels are 30 percent more efficient than any other brand, Ball said. They have a mirror plate inside that increases energy production.

"They have more than 200 patents and technology no other panel has," he said. "The circuitry is on the back of the panel so it is protected from breakage."

There is a 25-year warranty on both the product and the CST

CST has its roots in Mosher Enterprises, founded in 1979. The largest electrical company in the state, it did solar installations throughout the 1990s. Consolidated, a spinoff, "became official eight years ago," Ball said.

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Ball came to Las Cruces in 1985, where he earned a bachelor's degree in computer science at New Mexico State University.

He chose to follow another career path, however.

While I was at NMSU, I was working for Westinghouse for the Department of Defense at White Sands Missile Range," he said. "They went out of business just as I was finishing my last semester. A professor talked me into getting into real estate.

"Bruce, you're a little outgoing. Why don't you go into real

The professor persuaded him by offering to pay for his real estate classes, and he decided to take the offer.

He became a Realtor, worked with several local RE/MAX offices and became an associate broker.

"Once you get into sales, it's hard to get out," he said. "I have 21 years of sales experience and I enjoy it very much."



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Sunny Conley Chile Knights



Meatballs aren't just for pasta. Petitesized can be toothpick-speared and served as an appetizer or folded into a tortilla as a wrap; the grandes pair well with rice, mashed potatoes, quinoa, kasha or polenta.

Nearly every country in the world has a recipe version of the tasty bite, but Chile Head snobs such as us know that the best bites are those chockfull with pepper heat.

On a recent cyber-surfing jaunt, I came across a recipe for "loaded nacho meatballs," a clever concoction that I tweaked for Enchanters' fiery quests. Also on the meatball menu are bacon-chipotle pork and sriracha "sauced" turkey. Consider serving Dad one of these recipes on Father's Day, which this year falls (a kindly reminder) on Sunday, June 16. After all, he deserves a bite of the best.

Nacho Macho Meatballs

1 pound ground beef, preferably 80/20

1 egg

1/4 cup white flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/2 cup sharp Cheddar cheese, shredded

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon garlic powder

3 tablespoon prepared salsa

2 tablespoons serrano peppers, stemmed and chopped

1/4 prepared favorite medium-hot salsa or other degrees of preference

4 slices horseradish white Cheddar cheese,

(I purchased mine already sliced, cutting each slice into triangles.)

16 jalapeño or serrano pepper slices 2 tablespoons sour cream

Combine meatball ingredients in a medium bowl and mix thoroughly. Form into 16 meatballs. Sauté in a large nonstick pan until golden brown and cooked to doneness. about 3 to 4 minutes per side. Arrange the meatballs on a microwavable casserole dish. Top each meatball with about 1 teaspoon salsa, and 1 cheese triangle. Microwave briefly until cheese melts. Remove from microwave and top each meatball with a dab of sour cream and a jalapeno slice. Makes 16 meatballs. (Recipe adapted from http:// ibreathimhungry.com)

Smokin' Bacon-Chipotle Pork Meatballs

For meatballs:

2 slices bacon, minced

2 garlic cloves, minced

2 large eggs

1/2 cup bread crumbs

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1 1/2 pounds ground pork

2 teaspoons dried oregano or fresh mint, finely chopped

1 to 2 teaspoons chipotle powder (or 2 teaspoons of adobo sauce)

For chipotle sauce: 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 medium onion, chopped, about 1 cup

3 garlic cloves, minced 1 to 3 canned chipotles in adobo sauce, minced fine (reserve sauce)

1 (28-ounce) can crushed tomatoes, preferably with jalapeños

1 teaspoon Mexican dried oregano 1/2 cup beef broth Garnish: Cilantro, if desired

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Mix meatball ingredients thoroughly in a large bowl with

With wet hands, form meat mixture into about 16 plum-size balls. Space them out in rows in a 13-by-9-inch baking dish. Bake until lightly browned, about 15 minutes.

While meatballs bake, heat the olive oil in a sauté pan over medium-high heat and sauté the onions until they just start to brown. Add the garlic and cook for 1 minute, then add the minced chipotles, the can of tomatoes, oregano or mint and beef broth. Mix well and add salt to taste. For more chipotle flavor, add the reserved chipotle sauce spoonful by spoonful, mixing and tasting between spoonfuls. Boil the sauce uncovered.

When meatballs are ready, put them into the sauce and toss to coat. For a thicker sauce, boil down to desired consistency. Serve with rice, tortillas, quinoa or polenta. Garnish with cilantro to serve. Makes 6 to 8 servings. (Adapted from simplyrecipes.com.)

Sriracha "Sauced" Turkey Meatballs

1 pound ground turkey

1 egg beaten

1/3 cup dry plain bread crumbs

1/2 yellow onion, minced

2 green onions, chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

2 teaspoons sesame seeds

2 tablespoons sriracha 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt

2 tablespoons peanut oil

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Combine all ingredients except peanut oil in a bowl. Mix well to combine. Roll into 20 meatballs. Heat peanut oil in a skillet over medium high heat. Cook meatballs until

browned. Transfer to a baking dish.

Bake in preheated oven for an additional 20 minutes or until cooked to doneness.

Transfer to a serving platter sprinkle with more sesame seeds and chopped green onions if desired. Makes 20 meatballs.

Correction: My May 10 column wasn't too hot. The featured sriracha sauce recipes caught the attention of two Chile Knights readers. Harry M. emailed, "Everyone on the Food Network and other media in the U.S. pronounce it as you indicate in your column, i.e. Sir-rotch-ah, or Si-ratch-ah. That is the U.S. mispronunciation of an Asian (Thai) word. Remember, SE Asians don't pronounce the 'R' as an 'R.' Again, remember, 'flied lice' (fried rice). The correct pronunciation is Si-La-Cha". If you go to Thailand, or eat in a Thai restaurant here in the states, ask for it as "Si-La-Cha" sauce. Keep up the great work." (Thank you Harry for the clarification.)

Ruth D. emailed: "I need a clarification for the Sriracha burger. It calls for 2 1/2 tablespoons of sriracha, 'divided,' but the recipe instructions say combine 2 1/2 tablespoons in the mixture. My question is why does it say, 'divided'? Also is there a recipe for the Sriracha Roasted Pepper Sauce called for in the salmon and cauliflower recipe?" (Oops. Rather than "divided," I should have written, "or to taste." The missing recipe follows. Thanks for the catch, Ruth!)

Roasted Red Pepper Sauce

1 large red bell pepper, roasted, and peeled 1 tablespoon olive oil


2 teaspoons sriracha

1/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste

Combine all of the ingredients in a bowl of a food processor. Purée to form a smooth consistency. Makes about 3/4 cups.

Las Cruces Day Trips

Off the beaten path

Wonders can be found within a simple day's drive from Las Cruces

Summer is here and that means vacation time. If you're not able to fly somewhere exotic or take the family on an extended road trip to cooler climes, you can always take in the sights locally, via a simple day trip.

Sure, many of them are well known, but several aren't, and chances are pretty good that no matter how long you've lived in Las Cruces, you haven't seen them all. Here are a few you may have missed.

Heading north? You've probably already dipped a toe into Caballo or Elephant Butte lakes, soaked in the tubs of T or C, quenched your chile habit in Hatch and taken the biyearly excursion to the Trinity Site. What else is there to do up north within a day's drive?

For starters, you might consider walking the trails of history at Fort Selden State Park, located on the east bank of the Rio Grande River, one mile southeast of Radium Springs. Established in 1865 as protection for settlers in the Mesilla Valley from marauding desperados and Apaches, Fort Selden is a window to the past, offering exhibits on frontier and military life with occasional living history demonstrations on select weekends. Take exit 18 off Interstate 25 toward NM 185. For more information and visiting hours, call 526-8911.

Then there's the cosmic majesty of the Very Large Array (VLA), located 50 miles west of Socorro off U.S. Highway 60. In addition to being the backdrop for the 1997 Jodie Foster movie "Contact," the VLA is one of the great engineering feats of the 20th century, featuring 27 goliath dish antennas all trained on the heavens, in search of intelligent life in the great, vast unknown. The VLA hosts free 30-minute guided tours on the first Saturday of each month. To get to the VLA, take U.S. 60 to state Highway 52 then follow the signs. For more information, visit www.vla.nrao.edu/genpub.

Turning your compass east, there's a plethora of choices, including the many scenic trails of the Organ Mountains, White Sands Missile Range Museum, White Sands National Monument, New Mexico Museum of Space History in Alamogordo and the mountain towns of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft. All are great choices for the casual day tripper, as are the following.

Just north of Tularosa you'll find the turnoff to Three Rivers Petroglyph Park, one of the largest petroglyph sites in the Southwest. With several trails to choose from and hundreds of images and symbols dating back 700 to 1,100 years, Three Rivers is a cultural bonanza. Afterward, wander along the shady river banks of one of the most beautifully secluded wilderness areas in the state. To get there, drive 17

miles north of Tularosa on U.S. Highway 54, turn east onto County Road B30 and follow the signs. Day use is \$5 per vehicle. For more information, call 525-4300.

If the Sacramento Mountains are your destination, why not try Sunspot National Solar Observatory, one of the premiere heliocentric laboratories in the world, located a mere 16 miles south of Cloudcroft. A visitor's center offers interesting facts and exhibits, while a free self-guided tour takes you along a walking path through the cool pines to various structures offering a time capsule of space age technology. For more information on Sunspot, visit www. nsop.nso.edu/pr or call 437-6822.

South is the direction where El Paso lies, offering metropolitan fare such as the El Paso International Museum of Art, the El Paso Museum of History and for the brave of heart, Ciudad Juárez. Already seen those? Never fear.

Located in El Paso's lower valley, the historic Mission Trail will take you hundreds of years into the past where three adobe churches – Ysleta Mission (est. 1862), Socorro Mission (est. 1843) and San Elizario Chapel (est. 1789) still stand as reminders of a bygone era. Along the nine mile route connecting the missions are galleries, restaurants, boutiques, bookstores, museums and even a petting zoo for the kids. Discover this gateway into the past by visiting www.visitelpasomissiontrail.com.

Just 32 miles northeast of El Paso lies Hueco Tanks State Park, located off U.S. Highway 62/180, then north on Ranch Road 2775. Named for the large natural basins that dot the huge volcanic outcropping of rock formations, Hueco Tanks is a virtual goldmine of activities including hiking, rock climbing and guided tours of more than 2,000 pictographs and petroglyphs. More information can be found

by visiting www.tpwd.state.tx.us/state-parks/hueco-tanks or calling 800-792-1112.


To the west lies adventure in the form of the City of Rocks, Rockhound State Park, Faywood Hot Springs, the Gila Cliff Dwellings and the Mogollon Catwalk. A true Las Crucen will already have walked those trails at least once. But what about the hidden treasures?

Past Deming and south of Lordsburg, lies Shakespeare, considered the West's most authentic ghost town, where you can walk the streets trod by Billy the Kid, John Ringo, Curley Bill, The Clanton Gang and more. With 28 points of interest, including the Shakespeare Cemetery, and a guided tour that includes the interiors of seven buildings, the flavor of the Old West has never been so tantalizing. Shakespeare is 2.5 miles south and west of Lordsburg on state Highway 494 (Ghost Town Road). For more information, call 542-9034.

If the Gila is your choice, a little known stop is the Ben Lilly Monument and one of the most spectacular views you'll find in the area. Just three miles north of Pinos Altos – where a quick drink may be had at the historic Buckhorn bar and hours can be lost in the Pinos Altos Historical Museum – you'll find a small sign on the side of the road, at the high point of a hairpin curve. An easy 900-foot walk will bring you to a plaque, erected in 1947. Continue around the outcropping to the rocky shelf beyond and prepare to be amazed.

These are obviously just a sampling of the many uniquely southern New Mexican wonders to be found within a day's drive of Las Cruces. Just remember, this is wilderness country and preparation is key. A hat, solid shoes, sun screen, water and a camera should always be on your inventory list. Have fun and be safe!





Solar incentives are still worth the savings

Rate change for tax incentive to come in July

Whenever I mention incentives are dropping, the reaction is often "Oh, the tax credits are going away?"

No, the tax credits will be here for a few more years. The declining incentive is one you probably never heard about.

It's the incentive that shaves years off the time required for the solar PV system to pay you back. The REC is currently 6 cents per kilowatt hour. Beginning July 1, it drops to 4 cents until Dec. 31, when it drops further to 2 cents. Solar PV will still deliver a good investment, but you can really score by taking advantage of the historically low system prices offered by the industry and leverage that benefit with the higher 6 cent incentive. Quicker action not only gets you the higher incentive, you also get to enjoy it for a greater length of time. You see, the entire program, regardless of incentive level, ends Dec. 31, 2020. So if you grab the higher incentive, you also secure a longer term in the program.

The accompanying graph shows the greater benefit from the current 6 cent program versus what you get if you wait for the lower 4 or 2 cent programs. What you're seeing is how much you would receive in bonus payments (REC payments) for the electricity you will generate over the remaining life of each program: 6 cents, 4 cents or 2 cents. The values in the graph are based on a system sized to eliminate a \$100 electric bill using the current 6 cent program. If your current bill is higher, the differences become even more dramatic.

To lock in the current program rate of 6 cents per kilowatt hour, contract a new system before the end of this month. It is not necessary to have your system installed until Dec. 31 to maintain the higher rate, but you must be contracted and the applications approved.

The time for thinking is over – set aside your thinking cap and put on your running shoes. Don't let financing be a hurdle. There are numerous ways you can finance your system. Many will simply replace your current never-ending electric bill with a lower, tax deductible, temporary loan payment. Now is the time to get solar and score the

Life Warrior: problem solving skills



Problem solving is becoming a lost skill among American citizens. Too many people find themselves depending on other people to find the solution to their problems.

This lack of rugged individualism will result in many of our friends and neighbors settling for solutions that another person determines. In order to solve a problem, a person must make a decision. Following the steps of the decision-making process to solve problems will prevent the pitfalls of group thinking and the failure to make a personal decision.

The process follows these steps:

- · Define the problem
- Gather the facts and information
- Develop courses of action/decisions
- Select a course of action/decision
- Utilize the course of action/decision
- Evaluate course of action/decision

An example of a problem many individuals and agencies have is spending more money than what is being earned

First, gather facts and information on the spending problem. If you are spending money on wants rather than needs, then you're spending money on the wrong category.

You need to spend the money on needs first, and then wants. This will put you on a track to resolve your financial situation

Second, you must gather all the available information on your spending priorities, and determine where you can reduce or stop the money leaving your bank account.

The third step is to develop at least three courses of action/decisions. This will ensure that you have conducted a complete analysis of your budgetary situation vs. spending situation. The reason you should develop three possible courses of action/decisions is that you can rank them. This ranking will give you an opportunity to determine the least painful monetary decision with the greatest benefit.

Select your course of action/decision to solve the problem. This should be the course of action/decision that resolves your problem. If you have done an objective analysis without pre-determination, the problem will stay solved. If spending is still a problem, then the last step will assist in re-evaluation.

You must be vigilant and evaluate your course of action/decision objectively. If you find that you are still spending more money than you are earning,

Little things matter most

Active duty vet makes big local impact

Editor's note: This is part four of a 10-story series describing the heroic efforts of local citizens and organizations recognized and honored as 2013 Red Cross Real Heroes.

It might be the end of summer before Sgt. Maj. William Apodaca-Fisk finally gets to hop on his Harley for a ride through the Mesilla Valley.

He's been waiting for the better part of the year to do so, after his last deployment to Afghanistan left him needing several spinal surgeries that have long recovery times.

Fisk hasn't let his injuries get the better of him – they actually seemed to have given him more time to devote to his family and numerous charity causes he's involved with.

After a 24-year career with the Army, Fisk is credited with seven combat tours, and is currently assigned as the executive officer of the Sergeants Major Academy at Fort Bliss.

He is also the commander of chapter 47-1 Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association, vice president of Mesilla Valley Community of Hope and co-chair of Willie's Heroes Community Foundation for Wounded Warriors.

"We all come back with some scars – physically and mentally," Fisk said. "Doing this definitely helps with the mental scars. You feel like you're doing some good for your brothers and sisters, for the soldiers that didn't come back, you honor their service by finding ways to continue to serve"

Together with the help of several organizations and their volunteers, Fisk raised more than \$100,000 to give back to veterans in 2012.

"I've been very fortunate to be surrounded by heroes and a lot of great people," Fisk said.

What started out as a group of friends sending care packages while he was deployed, Willie's Heroes evolved into an organization of farmers, ranchers and business owners coming together to send comfort items to soldiers under Fisk's command in Afghanistan.

"I asked them to send socks and underwear," Fisk said. "I know it seems kind of small. But when (the injured) are being moved from one hospital to a helicopter to another hospital,

to another helicopter, and they're sitting there with no dignity left ... I tried my best to provide some comfort."

Willie's Heroes now organizes an annual chile roast to benefit wounded warriors coming home who have immediate needs the military can't readily provide.

"We were able to do some significant donations to some wounded warriors ... computer donations for those starting college or helping homeless vets get into transitional housing," Fish said

The Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association can be seen at fundraising events as well, volunteering to take supplies and donations where they need to go to make a difference.

As the vice president of the Community of Hope, Fisk also tries to help veterans of all ages get back on their feet.

"That's where I've been able to help is not necessarily doing it myself, but pulling people's resources together and working together," Fisk said.

Fisk said being a member of groups that have similar interests and stories to share helps lift the mental burden of injuries or losses incurred while in the military.

"What I've discovered is that by continuing

"What I've discovered is that by continuing to serve, by seeking out veterans in my community and finding ways to help them, I honor those that fell," he said.

"I sleep a little better knowing that I'm doing what they would have wanted me to carry forward."

For his family – wife and four children – the chance to attend events and help the cause is not only a way to give back, but also a chance to spend precious time with their hero.

Fisk's daughter Carolyn, 16, said she even likes to ride with him when she can.

"It's nice to see someone that's so selfless and that puts other people before himself," Carolyn Fisk said. "I think that everyone can benefit from seeing someone like that every day."

Fisk has been recognized with numerous combat and service awards, including the Purple Heart and four awards of the Bronze Star for Valor

Cancer patients have therapy options

Integrative center opens for comfort services

Cancer or other life-threatening illnesses may be the hardest thing a person has to attempt to overcome – physically and emotionally.

Treatments can be burdensome on the body, mind and especially on a financial situation.

According to the National Cancer Institute, palliative care addresses the emotional, physical, practical and spiritual issues of cancer, and research shows that palliative care improves the quality of life of patients and family members.

For years, the only medically directed palliative and integrative care clinic in New Mexico has been the Center for Life, a part of the University of New Mexico medical school – an impractical option for cancer patients living in the southern part of the state.

"I've been across the U.S., from the East Coast

to the West, from the Canadian border down to the Mexican border, looking at how cancer patients receive treatment and what's available," Clear said. "There are towns much smaller and much larger, and they have been offering this kind of service and these kinds of therapies since the late '80s ... it's high time we had it."

re-evaluation is critical. Review your course of action/ decision for possible adjustments. You must not be so rigid or stubborn that you can not adjust your problemsolving plan.

In conclusion, learn and apply the life warrior problem solving skills and enjoy the life you were meant to live. Life will be less stressful, healthier and more

The services Clear spoke of include certified oncology massage, medical and therapeutic massage, mind-body therapies and personalized support and wellness programs for those with cancer and cancer histories.

The center's goal is to reduce the burden of cancer and its impact on citizens of Las Cruces and New Mexico.

"That's the purpose of this center - to make it available to everyone in the area, reduce that burden by nurturing and supporting (patients) with the best medical care they can get and then offer it at a controlled cost."


Clear said many times patients go untreated because of the cost of drugs and treatment, which isn't going to get any better as the cost of health care is on the rise.

Offering therapies and services at a fixed cost, and then educating family members and care givers on how to properly administer the therapy at home, can save on the cost and time of travel and care.

"Our main focus is on the overall needs of the patient. They become our world," Clear said.


