### **BLM plan** to restrict off-roading OHVs offered two open areas

Eight years in the making and at least another year from being finalized, the Bureau of Land Management has released its regional management plan (RMP) for Doña Ana, Sierra and Otero counties.

The Tri-County RMP replaces two previous RMPs - both of which were more than 20 years old - that also included guidance for managing lands in Luna, Hildago and Grant counties. The three counties in the new RMP made more sense to be grouped together, said Jennifer Montoya, a BLM planner for the Las Cruces District Office, which covers all six counties.

Officially released Friday, April 12, BLM has begun taking public comments on the Tri-County RMP, Montoya said at an open house for the plan Tuesday, April 23, at the Doña Ana County Government Center. Public comments will be taken until Thursday, July 11.

BLM District Manager Bill Childress said a large change in the new plan getting noticed are new restrictions on off-highway vehicles (OHV), but he said the plan includes providing two large areas that are already popular with OHV enthusiasts.

When asked why there were new limits being put on OHVs, Montoya said it was to bring the local management plan into compliance with federal regulations. Currently, there are no restrictions of OHVs on 90 percent of BLM land in the three counties, Montoya said.

The two areas to continue allowing unrestricted OHV use are the Red Sands and Aden Hills recreation areas. Red Hills is located south of Alamogordo and Aden Hills west of Las Cruces.

"These are both pretty large areas and will be left wide open for OHV," Childress said.

On other BLM land in the three counties, OHVs will be required to stick to established roads, he said.

Of the 8.7 million acres in the three

### **NMSU finalists start** interviews, forums Carruthers, Bailey are first to offer their talents and visions

The process of selecting a new permanent president for New Mexico State University began this week with a series of interviews and forums.

First up was Garrey Carruthers, dean of the NMSU College of Business, who said he brings a set of experiences broader than the other finalists. A former governor of New Mexico, federal administration official and private business entrepreneur, Carruthers said his skills are more varied than the other finalists – but it was his loyalty to NMSU that prompted

his consideration for the post. When former NMSU Presi-

dent Barbara Couture departed at the end of last year, Carruthers first offered himself as a possibility to hold the office on an interim basis, but regents instead brought back Manuel Pacheco, who had previously filled the interim role before Couture's hire.

By then, Carruthers said he had heard from many of those concerned about the high turnover in leadership at NMSU who urged him to be considered for the permanent position.

A graduate of NMSU, Carruthers began his teaching career at NMSU and returned to See NMSU page A7

### **State nursing board OKs DACC program**

National accreditation could be in place by spring 2014

The New Mexico Board of Nursing's (NMBON) recent fullapproval status given to Doña Ana Community College puts DACC's nursing program on track for regaining national ac-creditation, President Margie Huerta said.

unanimous vote by А NMBON Friday, April 19, gave approval to the DACC nursing program for three years with an action plan for faculty recruitment and retention to be provided with routine annual reports.

That there were no deficiency

findings makes the approval a strong first step for DACC to regain accreditation from the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC), which revoked the program's accreditation last year.

One of the main reasons for the DACC associate degree program to lose its accreditation was that the program didn't have enough full-time instructors with a master's degree.

Huerta said getting the highest level of approval possible from NMBON is an important part of the next steps for beginning the self-study process for a return visit and review by the See **DACC** on page A7

#### Pearce seeks change in national monument l Wilderness supporters say proposal is political Congress, local supporters of more permanent protections of public land support a proposal to designate large sections in

U.S. Rep. Steve Pearce, R-NM, has introduced a bill to cut the president out of the process of designating a national monument, which has drawn criticism from local supporters of a large national monument proposal.

Pearce said his introduction of HR1512, a bill to reform the monument designation process by requiring that all future designations are approved by Congress through the legislative process, was in response to criticism he heard of a national monument in northern New Mexico approved by President Barack Obama.

Pearce said he recently attended a meeting of a local electric co-op in Socorro, where he learned about "seri-ous potential consequences" of Obama's designation of the Rio Grande del Norte Monument for energy. The national monument status could make it more difficult to create renewable energy development in New Mexico, according to Pearce. Had the monument been designated through the leg-





islative process, these problems could have been raised and addressed, he said.

Pearce's legislation prohibits all future monument designations except those approved by Congress. Under the 1906 Antiquities Act, the president can declare a national monument without congressional approval.

'Monument designations, like any other laws, should come up from the people, not down by executive decree," Pearce said. "Conservation is at its best when it is carried out by the people: through elected representatives in a transparent, public process. When designations are instead handed down through executive order, valid concerns are silenced, the minority cannot express its concerns, and both conservation and democracy suffer."

With a wilderness proposal unlikely to pass in the current



Doña Ana County as a national monument. Pearce also has introduced a bill to have only the Organ Mountains designated as a national monument.

"HR1512 is yet another attempt to undermine community support for the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument," said Doña Ana County Commissioner Billy Garrett. 'Due to political polarization, the current Congress has not acted to protect land anywhere in America. In many cases, the president's authority under the Antiquities Act is the only avenue currently open to those who want to protect nationally significant resources on public lands."

Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce President Renee Frank said national monuments have great economic benefits.

"I am stunned that a local congressman would want to limit the options that enable this priceless legacy," Frank said. "We urge the president to continue this proud American legacy in Doña Ana County and establish the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument."

David Chavez, president of the Mesquite Historic Preservation Society, said it was "sad that Rep. Pearce would want to block us from our best opportunity to protect our incredible lands."

### No matter the venue, a job well done is a job well done

Trout, Marquez: solid work ethic, humility Last Friday morning, after dropping my daughter off at school, an unlikely pair of Las

Crucens occupied my thoughts. The first is no surprise.

Friday, April 19, was the eve of the Austin Trout world championship fight. Like many Las Crucens, I was looking forward to watching the bout on television and cheering on our native son.

Like many Las Crucens, I'd never seen Saul "Canelo" Alvarez fight, but I believed Trout had at least an even chance between the two unbeatens.

And while almost everybody in Las Cruces knows about "No Doubt" Trout, almost nobody knows Mario Marquez.

Marquez works at Jack in the Box at the busy intersection of Lohman Avenue and Telshor Boulevard.

Anybody who knows me very long soon recognizes my fondness for mom-and-pop restaurants, greasy spoons and dining joints full of local color and flavor. However, I do hit my share of chain restaurants as well, particularly if I'm in a hurry and short on cash.

It helps if the chain restaurant is smack dab in the middle of my morning drive back from my daughter's school and my office here at the Las Cruces Bulletin. Because I'm no fan

of drive-throughs, I always go into the dining room. And that's how I came to meet Mario Marquez.

Once a week or so, I'll stop in at Jack in the Box for a Breakfast Jack with no cheese and a small coffee to go. Before I make it to the counter to order, I encounter Marquez.

He works in the dining area, sweeping, mopping and cleaning tables, chairs and walls. He's often in the parking lot, too, hosing down the previous day's grime. Marquez is always courteous and friendly, but I'm most struck by the way he works: diligent, determined and dedicated. After secretly admiring his effort the last two years, I walked up to Marquez and told him I've noticed the way he worked, and appreciated what he did. And for giving me a clean table at which to eat a half dozen or so of those oddly appealing cheap tacos.

Here's how he replied: "It's OK. I'm just doing my job." Very simple. Matter of fact. "I'm just doing my job." His response seemed to say I shouldn't thank him for his work. That's what he gets paid to do, and very little, no doubt. ...

Saturday night, after Alvarez was announced the victor of the boxing match in San Antonio, Texas, the two boxers gave post-fight interviews.

Trout recognized his defeat, recognized the skills of his opponent, and made no excuses. In fact, he said that. "I've got no excuses. He was the better man tonight."

Trout thanked God and thanked everyone who had supported him. Everyone in Las Cruces was disappointed Trout lost, but also proud of him in that moment.

There's no doubt Trout and his trainer, Louie Burke, will - as Trout said - "go back to the drawing board" and return to more boxing success. Remember, up until Saturday, Trout was a world champion. It was his first loss ever, and he lost to another world champion. Make no mistake, this young man's career is still on the rise. When I was listening to Trout answer the questions, it made me think of someone else.

Trout's reaction, his demeanor, his humility, reminded me of Marquez.

"It's OK," he was saying in a way. "I'm just doing my job."

Trout and Marquez occupy different worlds.

Marquez is old enough to be Trout's father. They could not have more wildly different jobs. Trout is, like Aretha Franklin once sang, "Young, Gifted and Black." Marquez is older, Latino and not gifted with a world-class left hook.

However, they do have at least one thing in common. They both know what it means to work. They both strive to do their job well. And they're both humble about it.

There's a lesson in there somewhere for the rest of us.

### Time names Martinez to list of most influential people

### Little media buzz accompanies governor's inclusion on list

New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez has been named to Time magazine's list of the 100 most influential people in the world. That's a big deal as far as I'm concerned.

But it hasn't seemed to mean much to others in the news business. Other than short reports saying it happened, the only opinion I have noticed was in Joe Monahan's blog last Friday, April 19. I don't get around to reading all blogs, but I expected to see much more by four days after our governor's honor.

Most of you won't be reading this for another four days so maybe the news business will have noticed by then. Obviously, Time magazine isn't the last word on who is important in this world, but I saw part of an interview with the editor who put the list together.

He said the staff working on the project tried to spread the recognition among as many new people as possible each year. Obviously, the president of the United States is going to be included every year, but not most of the rest of the Top 100.

Others chosen in the "Leaders" category were Joe Biden, Kentucky Sen. Rand Paul and Chris Christie, the only other governor chosen this year. The influential Christie has been picked before.

Others in the "Leaders" category were Pope Francis, Xi Jinping of China and Kim Song Un of North Korea. The list wasn't intended to be all good guys. It is people who influence the world.

In the "Entrepreneurs" category, Elon Musk added to his Silicon Valley influence by successfully sending two rockets to the International Space Station. He didn't launch them from New Mexico's Spaceport America, by the way.

Categories such as entertainment and sports change yearly. Time has been compiling its list of 100 for 10 years.

Martinez likely won't make the list next year. Although the brief tribute to her done by Karl Rove didn't mention it, our governor surely was not chosen for what she has done since assuming office in 2011, but for her feat of winning office despite being Hispanic, female and a Republican in a Democratic state. Her feat can influence others to realize they can do the same.

From what I can dig out, Martinez is the first New Mexican to be selected for the list in its 10-year existence. Former Gov. Bill Richardson was selected to a list of the top 25 Hispanics in the nation.

We heard a lot about that. Had he been selected to the most influential in the world list, he would have flooded the place with news releases. So far, I haven't seen anything from Martinez's office. She should do it.

Others in the leader category were Malala Yousafzai, the 15 year-old activist who survived a Taliban attack, and California Attorney General Kamala Harris, whom President Barack Obama boorishly called the prettiest attorney general in the nation. And then there was Wayne LaPierre of the National Rifle Association.

Karl Rove, in his tribute to Martinez said maybe this award will help her be reelected next year. Yes, it will help. She is already at over 60 percent popularity among New Mexico likely

voters. This will only add to that figure.

The road won't be entirely smooth, however. Democrats will contend that Martinez doesn't deserve the recognition because her accomplishments are meager. But voters like her anyway. They like who she is and don't worry much about what she hasn't done or that she hasn't been as bold as she promised.

**BSE Tsunami** 

One of the biggest upheavals in food production in the past 10 years was the result of one of the tiniest imaginable scares. It would be comparable to one single Aborigine threatening the U.S. with a flyswatter, and our government issuing every homeowner a 50-caliber machine gun to defend themselves.

Peruse any ag-media today and you will see multiple companies offering age and source verification for cattle. The biggest impetus for this technical, political and management service was the BSE/Mad Cow scare.

It began in Great Britain in 1996 and was connected to human deaths from Creutzfeld-Jakob disease. Once they diagnosed the connection between BSE and C-J, the British bit the bullet and began their eradication program, but not before the whole world had a global fright worthy of Orson Welles' "War of the Worlds."

cases were diagnosed in Canada, Korea, Japan and Europe. In 2003, the U.S. made its first diagnosis. At the peak of random testing, the number of positives compared to the cow population was less than a grain of sand in the Sahara (my exaggeration).

Meat eaters around the world soon realized their own personal risk was less than getting hit by an armadillo dropped from the sky. Yet governments have continued to restrict imports of beef from each other, but mostly for political reasons and market protection.

In retrospect, the good side to this otherwise egregious reaction was, with the advent of age and source verification came the addition of other third-party verifications of "value added" benefits. These include procedures bunk-broke, weaned, vaccinated, all natural, no hormone/antibiotics, BQA approved, dehorned, etc. Feedlot buyers appreciate the efforts

and will pay a premium for feeders that will make them more money.

I suspect these management procedures would have eventually come along sporadically over time, but the wide acceptance of the "age and source verification" avalanche has put us 10 to 15 years ahead of the game.

In every region, each cow-calf operator has to work within his own natural circumstances – soil, winter, summer, rain, mud proximity to feedlots or packing houses, labor quality and availability, personal financial situation and state or federal regulations. But almost everybody today is within reach of a company whose "value-added verification" service might fit your specific program.

BSE was a global disaster for cattle producers. The press labeled the first diagnosis in one cow as a "BSE Outbreak!" The outbreak continues; in 2012 the U.S. diagnosed its fourth case

I think we've got it under control.

### War on terror is eroding our constitutional rights

The problems in Boston this last week have brought up other problems that arose from dealing with the attack upon the Boston Marathon and the subsequent capture of an alleged terrorist.

Constitutional rights were not in effect for citizens of the area because there was an emergency. It has been said there was not enough time for the proper judicial authority so it was skipped.

We are a nation of laws, so when the government does not abide by laws, I become concerned. Perhaps this was an unfortunate instance when the problems of law-breakers required our nation of laws to not be a nation of laws. What concerns me is not this time, which is gone, it is the next time.

It is ever so easy the first time to find a reason to not abide by our Constitution and to not give American citizens their rights, since this was an emergency.

What about the next time and the time after that? Have we forfeited all of our constitutional rights because of an attack upon our nation? I would hope not.

More so, if we have to lean one way or the other, which way should we lean: toward a tyranny of the government where citizens are forced at gunpoint to obey the authorities, or liberty that requires the authorities to abide by the laws of private property search?

I am for the government never having a time when we trade our constitutional rights for safety.

Further, in the last few years, it appears that in our informa-tion age there is little information. What really happened with the "Fast and Furious" investigation other than it ground to a halt with no one in leadership being charged? Yet, the president used executive privilege to keep the attorney general from answering questions. Are we ever going to get those questions answered, and why is our president intimately involved?

Then there is the unexplained happening Sept. 11, 2012, in Libya, where something strange happened but there are still no real answers. The ambassador and some CIA operatives were slain in a seven-hour battle. No one came to their aid.

We know that people in the White House watched realtime, but there is no understanding of the president's role. Will we ever get the truth?

Finally, there are multiple tracks of questions in Boston that are not being answered, and it seems that the White House is

shielding a possible participant, a Saudi foreign student who was living in Boston instead of where he was supposed to be in Ohio. It is likely we will not get the story.

The real question is why are we citizens not getting any of these stories.

Add to that concern that we have had an instance where a town was effectively shut down without court order and people's houses were searched without search warrants. Again, it was for our safety.

So what I would like is two-fold: first, an understanding of why proper channels were not used in Boston to detain an entire town and to search house by house. But that is something that happened, so perhaps it is water under the bridge. More important, can our government just shut down towns without judicial review? Likewise, can the authorities shut down a state or even the entire nation without judicial review?

Could there be a day when every American is confined to home without paperwork? Could we find a day when every home in American is searched without judicial review? Could the newspapers be shuttered and the Internet cut off? Could the cable networks be stopped and there be no one to write about it?

This is Benjamin Franklin's point when he says, "They who can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety." At what point is our temporary safety worth more than our essential liberties?

Perhaps we should be talking about this in Congress and our state legislatures. If we do not talk now, we may not ever. Will you trade safety for your liberty?

The first trial ended with a hung jury. The second trial resulted in a guilty verdict. The case on appeal identified all the facts and there was no probable cause, but the Court of Appeals was stuck with a jury's guilty verdict and the rules required the court to affirm the conviction.

The case is State v. Pennington. A tragedy for Pennington, because he was innocent and was sentenced to 18 years in prison.

Jim Spence could be taking a page right out of Steve Pearce's playbook when he defends fracking in the gas and oil business.



become dean and vice president for economic development.

"A lot of people have asked me to do this," Carruthers said. "They were troubled by the constant change in leadership."

Adding to his willingness to be in play for NMSU president was the culmination of goals he had for the busi-

ness school, including getting a new building and establishing five \$1 million endowed chairs. Carruthers said he also saw the college's Arrowhead Center reaching a maturity where it has a national reputation as business incubator.

Carruthers said he would bring a solid business approach to running the university, while using his political relationships to improve state support. A Republican, Carruthers said he has a good reputation with legislators from both parties - a political style so cooperative and congenial so that some lawmakers refer to his governorship as "the good ol" days?

Carruthers said he also has been a key player in developing the stra-tegic planning for the university, so he knows what needs to be done

without a learning curve. At the business college, Carruthers said he has tied budgeting to the school's goals and objectives and would do the same systemwide. The long-range planning main goals call for improving faculty salaries, increasing the number of graduate assistants and supporting student success, he said.

"I think our faculty and staff are tired of planning and are ready to get down to accomplishing something," Carruthers said.

NMSU needs to do a better job of revealing the quality of its instruction through the successes of former graduates - some of whom have gone to head major corporations, he said. That would help fundraising and alumni outreach, he said.

As for running the university in a financially challenging time, Carruthers agreed that the university has become overly bureaucratic and he credited Pacheco and Provost Jay Jordan with already taking significant steps to begin streamlining administrative processes, such as returning hiring authority to college deans. Carruthers said he would reach out to the faculty and staff to find more efficiencies, which he said will also make the university more effective.

The president can't be a person who thinks the president is the only one with a good idea," Carruthers said. "You need to remove barriers to decision making. You can do away with a lot of that by trusting your people. I happen to believe they will make the right decision.

As for athletics, Carruthers said he would

have them operate more like a business with strong marketing that doesn't have to depend on winning to fill seats.

"Of all the entities at New Mexico State that should have a business plan, it's the Athletic Department, because they control their own revenue stream," he said.

Following Carruthers was Guy Bailey, former president of Texas Tech University and the University of Alabama. Health struggles by

his wife, Jan, after cancer treatment forced Bailey to resign the Alabama post in October, but Bailey said she is doing much better now, making him available to find a new leadership post - one he said he wants to be in a community he can retire.

"I'm not looking for my first presidency, but my last, and when I retire I want to leave the institution a lot better than the way I found it."

Bailey said he and his wife have lived most their lives in the Southwest and he likes the feel of the community. Bailey also said he likes what he sees in NMSU's academics and research. Whatever leadership instability there may have been in recent years, NMSU's teaching and research performance has been consistent and strong, he said.

Using his experience, Bailey said he would insist on NMSU going forward with a "really good busi-

ness plan." A fresh set of eyes, he said, could help the university find more savings and new opportunities for developing revenues.

Although much of that administrative experience was honed at Texas Tech that had a lot of resources, Bailey recalled when he headed the University of Missouri at Kansas City, where he was chancellor from 2006-08. Bailey said he and his team overcame limited government resources by forming public-private

Troubling to Bailey is the recent trend of dropping enrollment at NMSU. Bailey said NMSU is a great value and could do a better job of attracting more students, especially

Another enrollment resource that isn't being well used is NMSU's own system of community colleges, Bailey said. There should be a higher level of transfers from the two-year campuses to the main campus, he said, and if the transferring of credits is the obstacle, it should be cleared.

"I would get everyone together to get them to learn the strengths of one another," he said. "You already have a system in place that I had

counties combined, 2.8 million acres are managed by BLM. To create the new RMP, BLM planners and consultants compared four different philosophies: to leave status quo, to maximize resource conservation, to fully exploit all natural resources and then a balanced approach, which is the preferred approach by BLM.

The challenge, Montoya said, was to find the balance for protecting the resources of the land for future generations with current uses of public recreation, grazing and resource production.

Complicating the effort was a federal law-suit to restrain oil and gas production, Montoya said, which forced planning for these resources to be well defined. Because of the lawsuit, BLM will just have to continue to analyze the oil and gas potential, Montoya said.

NLNAC accreditation team by the upcoming fall semester, Huerta said.

Many of the DACC program's students transferred to New Mexico State University for the bachelor's degree, but about 20 students remain. Huerta said the current students should be graduating from an accredited program with the national accreditation back by the 2014 spring semester.

Nursing programs must meet specific guidelines and requirements to be granted full approval. The NMBON decision was contingent on the review of a self study submitted in January and a site visit Feb. 20.

While this journey has had its challenges and distractions, our focus has remained on continuous improvement of our program and our processes as evidenced by the board's decision," said Tracy Lopez, DACC

nursing program director. "Our nursing program director and faculty spent many hours preparing the self study for the NMBON's February visit," Huerta said.

The nursing program at DACC began in 1995, with the first cohort graduating in May 1997. Since then, 582 students have graduated with an associate nursing degree and 481 students have graduated with their nursing assistant degree.

Graduates of the DACC ADN program are eligible to apply for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses and those who graduate with an LPN certificate may apply for the National Council Licensure Examination for Practical Nurses.



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The RMP now has a number of new areas to be categorized as areas of critical environmental concerns (ACEC), with BLM officials also trying to strike a balance.

For example, while Otero Mesa does include about 200,000 acres of "exception grasslands" on its western side, 70,000 acres of its eastern edge is more typical scrub desert, so the BLM plan would call for a less restrictive approach to that portion of the mesa, Montoya said.

The RMP identifies land to be released for future development to accommodate growth in population, primarily in the East Mesa leading up to the base of the Organ Mountains. Large areas also are being planned to allow for renewable power generation.



### **Honor Flight asks for 'adoption' support**

### October is next D.C. trip

Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico is asking for commu-nity members to "adopt" a local veteran to support the cost of flying them to Washington, D.C.

This October, the nonprofit group is sending its sixth group of veterans to see war memorials in the nation's capital, especially the memorials for World War II and the Korean War, said Debra Melcher, Honor Flight secretary.

'While WWII Veterans are still our main focus, the program was expanded in 2012 to include Korean-conflict and Vietnam veterans," Melcher said. "Our objective is to get the older veterans back to D.C. first, but any veteran that is in poor health and has not been back to Washington to see their memorial, will be accepted this year as funding permits."

The "Adopt-A-Veteran" program was established last year

and sponsored 26 veterans. The adoption fee is \$1,000 and covers most of the veterans expenses. The adopting party can specify if they are contributing in memory of an individual, Melcher said. ### Food bank seeks Facebook votes Roadrunner close to \$45,000 Walmart grant

Throughout April, voting has been neck and neck for Roadrunner Food Bank to stay in the top 10 of Walmart's Fighting Hunger Together grant initiative on Facebook

Roadrunner Food Bank is competing with hundreds of other hunger-relief organizations from across the U.S. to obtain a \$45,000 grant. The organizations with the most votes from the community will be awarded a grant by Walmart.

Throughout the month, supporters of Roadrunner Food Bank have taken daily action to vote on Facebook for the food bank's childhood hunger project. If Roadrunner Food Bank garners enough votes, the funding will support the Food for Kids program, a weekend backpack program to help low-income elementary school-aged children. The backpacks are filled with food and distributed to 45 elementary schools on Friday afternoons. Nearly 4,000 children benefit from the program weekly.

"We want to keep the voting momentum going every day this month," said Melody Wattenbarger, Roadrunner Food Bank president and CEO. "As of Monday, April 22, at 9:45 a.m., we were at 2,031 votes. About 100 votes separates us from ninth place and 40 votes from 11th place. Help us stay in the top

10. If you have a Facebook account, please take a few moments each day in April to vote for our project."

The food bank's average daily vote is about 100, but having 150 daily votes more would secure the grant in New Mexico. The voting ends at 11:59 p.m. Eastern Standard Time on Tuesday, April 30.

According to Feeding America's recent Map the Gap data, more than 146,000 children experience hunger in New Mexico. Roadrunner Food Bank currently serves about 90,000 hungry children every year through a network of partner agencies and direct service programs. The hunger gap of children who still need to be reached is approximately 56,000.

New Mexico is ranked as one of the hungriest states in the nation. Roadrunner Food Bank, a Feeding America member, is the largest nonprofit dedicated to ending hunger in New Mexico and operates warehouses in Albuquerque and Las Cruces. Last year, the Roadrunner Food Bank distributed nearly 23 million pounds of food through its own programs, a statewide network of partner agencies, and regional food banks helping nearly 40,000 children and adults weekly.

### **MHS grad** now a Lobo

The Mayfield High School graduate is one of two men specializing in the javelin for the University of New Mexico. The junior had competed in the shot put during past indoor seasons when needed, assistant coach Rodney Zuyderwyk said, but focuses on the javelin during the outdoor season.

"I get to specialize in my best and favorite event," said Ellis, who finished 19th among 34 with a toss of 173 feet, 3/8 inches at the Beach Invitational in California.

This season Ellis is trying to improve his technique to become consistent, Zuyderwyk said.

"I'm not transferring my power as well as I could," Ellis said. "It's more of trying to throw the javelin with my whole body instead of my arm."

Zuyderwyk noted that Ellis' efforts have been hindered at times because "we haven't really had some good conditions."

He said Éllis had a strong throw during warmups recently, yet didn't produce the same effort during the meet.

"It was very, very windy and very, very cold. During warmups the wind wasn't too bad. Five minutes before, the wind picked up very, very bad."

The 6-foot-3, 205-pound Ellis said he added 20 pounds of muscle since last season, when a back injury affected him. He gained the weight to build his core in hopes of fending off additional back issues

"I had a couple of throws that jerked my back the wrong way," said Ellis, adding that he has been throwing with a dislocated rib.

He went to back therapy during the

# **NMSU hosts annual rodeo**

Teams compete in final Grand Canyon Region event

New Mexico State University rodeo coach Jim Dewey Brown will have some tough decisions to make before the Aggies ride in the National Collegiate Finals Rodeo June 9-15 in Casper, Wyo.

Brown said Tuesday, April 23, that the Aggies would probably have 12 students qualify to compete in the event, but only six can compete as members of the Aggie rodeo team.

"I have to pick six guys out of that to be on our men's team," Brown said. "If they all do good, then that's good, but if the ones I don't pick for the team do good that's good for them but not for the team.

Meanwhile, Brown's mind is squarely focused on the annual NMSU Intercollegiate Rodeo that busts out of the gate 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday, April 26-27, with championship events set for 1 p.m. Sunday, April 28, at the NMSU Student Tailgate Lot, east of Aggie Memorial Stadium. Admission is \$5 to the public or free to NMSU students with an ID.

Part of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association's Grand Canyon Region, the NMSU rodeo will be the last chance for competitors from the region to vie in the regional standings and qualify for the national finals. Teams participating include NMSU, Dine College, Mesalands Community College, New Mexico Highlands University, Central Arizona, College, Navajo Technical College, Cochise College, Northland Pioneer College and the University of Arizona.

Currently, the Aggies men's team is leading the Grand Canyon standings, while the women's team is ranked fifth. NMSU also has the top two riders in the Grand Canyon Region men's all-round and the team is ranked 10th nationally.

Brown said it has been a tough year for the Aggie women. "I have had a lot of girls who have had to

switch horses or they've been injured and are not on their A game," he said. "I lost a few high-quality seniors last year and I will lose a few more this year, but you just keep replacing them and try to get the ones that will win."

### **Menzies signs 6-2 guard from NMJC** Eldridge expected to add athleticism to Aggie backcourt

New Mexico State men's basketball coach Marvin Menzies has signed DK Eldridge to a National Letter of Intent. The 6-2 guard joins the Aggies for the 2013-14 season.

Eldridge is 6-2 guard from Dallas, Texas, who has spent the last three seasons at New Mexico Junior College in Hobbs, N.M. With the Thunderbirds, he averaged 11.1 points per game this season en route to helping NMJC to a 27-7 overall record and their first regional crown and national tournament appearance since 1996.

"We welcome DK to the Aggie family," Menzies said. "DK brings needed athleticism and versatility to next year's backcourt. He's able to play multiple positions and having

experience will only benefit an already talented team returning next year."

In 2012-13, Eldridge was the second-leading scorer on the squad (11.1) as a sophomore

and averaged 4.4 rebounds, 1.4 steals and 1.4 assists per contest and sank 37 three-pointers. Eldridge and the No. 8 seed Thunderbirds fell to eventual national runner-up Northwest Florida State, 88-87, in overtime in the second round of the NJCAA National Championship, March 19 in Hutchinson, Kan. In his final game, Eldridge scored 18 points and grabbed eight rebounds.

As a freshman, Eldridge averaged 6.2 points per game in 2010-11 before redshirting the following season (2011-12) due to an injury.

In 2012-13, the Aggies finished with a 24-11 record and won their second consecutive WAC Tournament title and made their second straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

### **Aggie women's hoops add Ellis** Trakh calls 6-2 California forward a 'great rebounder'

New Mexico State women's basketball coach Mark Trakh announced that Tyler Ellis has signed a National Letter of Intent to join the Aggies for the 2013-14 season.

Ellis, a 6-2 forward from Antelope, Calif., helped the Antelope High School Titans to a 19-9 overall season record as a senior and averaged 18.8 points per game. She worked for 17.4 rebounds, 2.5 blocks and 2.3 steals per game during the 2012-13 season.

"Tyler has a great low post presence, which fills a great need for us," head coach Mark Trakh said.

"She is a great rebounder and that will help us underneath the basket."

Ellis was named All-City in Sacramento, Calif., in 2012 and

2013 and received All-Capital League accolades.

She helped the Titans to a six-game win streak over the course of the schedule and finished the year with three consecutive wins.

She joins a group of five other newcomers to the 2013-14 group of Aggies, including Tamera Williams (Las Vegas, Nev.), Brianna Freeman (Killeen, Texas), Vanessa Garner (Milpitas, Calif.), Moriah Mack (San Antonio, Texas), and Brandee Walton (Surprize, Ariz.)

The Âggies finished the 2012-13 season with a 15-16 overall record and 7-11 in Western Athletic Conference play. The Aggies ended the year with an appearance in the quarterfinals of the WAC Tournament.





# Onthegreen **Mastering the game within the game** You, too, can putt like the pros they run into droughts when they miss a lot of puts. Like hitters in baseball. I don't know if there are slumps Linst the circle drill (nonularized by Phil) with



If you watch much golf on television, you come to understand that professional tournament golf, sooner or later, comes down to putting.

Perhaps the greatest putter of all time, the legendary Bobby Locke, was the one who coined the phrase, "You drive for show and putt for dough."

One of the greatest women golfers of all time (from a bygone era), Joyce Wethered, once understated the issue with: "The game would be nothing without this troublesome business 'round the green."

Tom Watson called putting "A game within a game," and I think that's really true.

The full golf swing falls in the category of gross motor skills, which means mostly large muscles are at work. Putting is a fine motor skill, more like painting or playing the piano.

For the average weekend golfer, 40 percent of his strokes are on the putting green. Usually only 10 percent of practice time is spent there. We need to change that.

Arnold Palmer asserted that "Putting is like wisdom - partly a natural gift and partly the accumulation of experience." And experience is, of course, the best teacher.

We can't alter your natural gifts, but we can jump start your experience. So here are some tips, with philosophy included, that you can use to improve you putting, whether you are a scratch handicapper or a just a beginner.

Have someone who is an expert instructor take a look at your putting stroke and set-up. It's no good practicing a stroke that is fundamentally flawed. Granted, there are infinite ways to get the job done. But the novice and

the accomplished player alike often suffer from flawed fundamentals when putting goes sour. Things like not keeping your head still and randomly changing ball position can be ruinous for putting. If your method is a good


one, go with it and trust it – on every putt. Get lost in your routine. Have a compact routine that doesn't vary from putt to putt, green to green, or round to round. If you don't have one, get one. It's your bubble of comfort when the pressure is on. You don't have to think about making the putt – just read the green and the putt, and proceed with your routine. It's the process that counts more than the results. Trust me, the results will take care of themselves, provided you diligently attend to the process.

Don't allow any room for negative thoughts to sabotage any putts. Normally I don't like "don'ts," but this is an exception. Just don't cave into negative thinking on the putting green, as it will do you in, eventually. For example "I better make this three-footer, or else I'll go two down."

Negative thoughts breed maladaptive emotions, with the resulting tension probably creeping into the fine motor movements. Focus on your spot (your line), and your process, not the outcome. This is what makes the best players in the world mentally tough. It won Adam Scott a green jacket.

Being overly concerned with the outcome of a putt - or any shot for that matter - is a negative thought. Make the best stroke you can, and learn from how the ball responds to the grass and the slope and the grain and the wind, and any other condition that exists at the time. Observe everything that happens on the green, including your own emotions. Expect your opponent to make a miracle shot when it is most unlikely. Then you'll be prepared to respond without surprise or defeatism.

All good putters have peaks and valleys. Players make a lot of putts for a while, and

I don't know if there are slumps. I just know there is regression to the mean, which is simply the "law of averages" at work. Things will average out. Maybe not during one round; but eventually.

If you run into a dry spell with your putter, practice a little more, and just wait it out. Refuse to be shaken by the ups and downs on the greens. It'll come back. Likewise, don't get too cocky if you start seeing everything go in for a few rounds. You may need to suck it up over some hard times yet to come.

More practice with truly solid fundamentals will allow you to raise your personal putting average. If you're a high-handicapper and have an average of 38 putts per round, create a goal for yourself to lower that by a modest four putts (34) a round, and see what happens for 10 rounds.

Confidence is mostly a matter of choice. If you find yourself suddenly confidence-challenged, act as if you're the best putter on the planet for a while. Walk the walk and expect to make everything. See what happens. More putts will start dropping.

When you're down you have to start somewhere, and "faking it till you're making it" is a good place to begin. Remember that confidence is mostly an emotional state, so you have to be in total control of your emotions at all times. Staying positive and upbeat doesn't mean you're not trying hard enough. Constant whining, like "I can't make anything," won't help you a bit. All it means that your buddies will just laugh and ask, "Want some cheese with that whine?"

Set up a personal practice program, with drills that address your particular needs. Practice lag putting from 10, 20, 30, 40 and 50 feet, so you have a good feel for distance control, which is absolutely critical to eliminate the dreaded three-putt.

Half of your total practice time should be devoted to your short game: chipping, short

the circle drill (popularized by Phil), with eight balls around the hole from three and four feet. Another is the 3-4-5 footer drill, where you must sink three putts from each distance (nine total) before leaving the green. Playing games like "7-up" with a partner can make practice fun and useful.

Remember, the scoring happens on and around the green, so we better spend most of our time there. Be sure to practice some with a string line and a chalk line, since both of those aids enhance your aim with your eyes and your putter face. Last, be unafraid. The best putters I have

seen and played with seem to approach each play with a nonchalance that suggests they don't really care if it goes in or not. They are careful to read putts properly, and careful to go through their routine. But then they just stroke it without seeming nervous at all. The "fear factor" is deadly in golf. Our fear

is usually of feeling or looking foolish and it leads to anxiety and then tension. Even the pros feel the fear and the pressure.

"Putts get real difficult the day they pass the money out," Lee Trevino used to say.

Your antidote for fear is focusing on your process - how you make your stroke, not what happens afterward. Your only task is to swing the handle of the putter smoothly with a good, rhythmic motion, on the line you have chosen. The rest is not in your control

As Jimmy Demaret once remarked, "All I can do is start it. The Lord handles it from there?

Relax, let the stroke happen. Later, when you glance at your scorecard, good results will probably happen as well.





### Santa Teresa companies grow Terminal spurs creation of 40 more jobs

Gov. Susana Martinez announced the creation of 40 new jobs in Santa Teresa while participating in a ribbon cutting ceremony for Santa Teresa Southern Railroad's new intermodal terminal Tuesday, April 23.

Santa Teresa Southern Railroad, which hosted the event, installed 2.5 miles of new track adjacent to the Union Pacific track and constructed a new terminal, operated by Ironhorse. Martinez welcomed 12 new jobs to Santa Teresa last September and Tuesday she announced that two existing Santa Teresa companies - Southwest Steel Coil and Mallory Metals, which are undergoing a 35,000-squarefoot and 20,000-square-foot facility expansions, respectively – are each adding 20 jobs.

"Earlier this year, my administration and members of the Legislature were not only able to improve the state's tax competitiveness, but we also invested in critical infrastructure needs that will help Santa Teresa and New Mexico grow in a way that creates new jobs," Martinez said. "Today's announcement is especially exciting because we are seeing economic expansion happening right now along our southern border, but we're also making investments that will yield hundreds of new jobs in the future."

The governor reported nearly \$5 million will be allocated to upgrade the Santa Teresa water and wastewater system to accommodate new growth in the region. The governor appropriated \$3.2 million, legislators \$600,000 and the Economic Development Department contributed \$955,762 in funding from its Local Economic Development Act program for the improvements.

Another \$350,000 in capital funding was appropriated for the construction of the Santa Teresa Port Access Road dedicated to routing northbound shipments from Mexico through New Mexico. This road will encourage international commerce and will help attract more logistics, manufacturing and warehousing operations. It will be the second-of-its-kind along the U.S.-Mexico Border that implements a unique Customs and Border Protection program to clear customs on the Mexican side of the border for northbound shipments.

"Our strategy for building up the Santa Teresa region means that New Mexico will benefit from growing trade and development on both sides of the border," said Economic Development Department Secretary Jon Barela. The jobs in these industries are well-paying and are good economic base jobs that have a positive impact on the state's economy."

In addition to the new projects, a \$5 million water plant in Santa Teresa was recently completed. It will provide 2 million gallons of water storage in addition to treating water for users in the industrial park.

Verde Realty was also on hand to discuss the recently launched second phase of its \$1.8 million dollar expansion to Verde Logistics Park. Construction includes street, drainage and utility improvements. This project will add 12 new industrial lots, totaling approximately 82 acres of land immediately adjacent to the existing rail-served industrial park. Construction is expected to be completed by October.

### **Chaparral clean-up slated** Lawmaker to join volunteer effort

Rep. Nate Cote, the AFSCME Community Team (ACT), and Chaparral community leaders will pick up trash and debris Saturday, April 27, on three major roads and Dolores Wright Park in Chaparral, N.M.

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# Business **Nurturing a wine culture**

### Tax deducible



**David Salcido** On second thought ...

Here's an interesting tidbit of information you may have missed. Were you aware that this year marks the 100th anniversary of the Internal Revenue Service? No, I didn't think so.

To be more specific, the first of two anniversaries occurring this year was in February, commemorating the passing of the 16th Amendment, which permitted income taxation. Not really something that the American people are inclined to celebrate in these more enlightened times.

Initially conceived in 1862 by Abraham Lincoln to finance the Civil War, it didn't actually become the institutionalized confabulation it has until 1909, when President William Howard Taft urged passage of a corporate income tax and a constitutional amendment permitting personal income tax.

Despite heavy lobbying against the federal government sticking its nose into counting houses of the common man, on Feb. 3, 1913, the 16th Amendment was passed, giving Congress the power to levy and collect taxes on income. On Oct. 3, 1913 (the second anniversary we'll see this year), President Woodrow Wilson signed the Revenue Act of 1913 into law.

Interestingly enough, the taxation issue had broad public support at the time because, according to the National Archives, less than one percent of the public actually owed income taxes. Needless to say, things have changed in the last 100 years and, sadly, we only have ourselves to blame for a lack of foresight.

Historical omissions and proposed overhauls to the tax code aside, it's pretty clear that the IRS isn't going anywhere fast. One stress crunch may be behind us, but there will always be another waiting about a year down the road. Maybe that's why the IRS has sent out

a handy little post-trauma reminder for you, the American taxpayer. It involves your records and what to do with them after the filing has been done and, no, it doesn't involve uncomfortable posterior obturation.

According to the memo, you should keep a copy of your 2012 tax return and all documents used to create it someplace handy. You know, in case your return is audited. I know, it's a bit like saying you should keep all records of auto repair work just in case you're involved in a head-on collision. Will it

#### Bobby Lee Lawrence Wine Academy opens By Alta LeCompte

The word "wine" is on the tip of many Las Crucens' tongues this week as New Mexico State University holds two major events - the grand opening of the Bobby Lee Lawrence Wine Academy and a wine conference stu-dents are planning for Saturday, April 27. (See story on page B8.)

Both events celebrate a strong and growing wine culture on campus and in the community. On Saturday, April 20, about 150 guests

On Saturday, April 20, about 150 guests of NMSU's School of Hotel, Restaurant and Tourism Management stepped into a labora-tory unlike any other on campus, the Bobby Lee Lawrence Academy of Wine laboratory. They gathered to celebrate the grand open-ing of the academy and to remember Lawrence,

a nationally known food and wine expert. There is no stainless steel in this laboratory,

and instead of glass beakers, there are wine glasses housed in dark wood cabinets reminiscent of a Tuscan wine cellar. The cabinet hardware, hand-hewn woodwork and natural travertine floors evoke the mellow look of a centuries-old wine cellar.

Everywhere the eye lights in the windowless room, it is treated to architectural de-tails carefully overseen by Lawrence's widow Marion Lawrence.

Asked how the project began, HRTM Director Janet Green, said: "Wine showed up on our doorstop."

The academy was born when Marion Lawrence walked in and expressed a desire to make a memorial gift. "Mrs. Lawrence had thought about endow-

ing a golf scholarship, but a friend reminded her of his love of wine," Green said.

"I met with her and we discussed creating a scholarship or an endowed chair. She really liked the idea of a tangible environment to honor his commitment to education."

Green said Bobby Lee Lawrence would give "boot camps for people who didn't know a thing about wine.

"He had a national presence as a sommelier," she said.

Lawrence trained at Le Cordon Bleu in Paris and the Culinary Institute of America. Through his career as head of engineering at NBC News, Lawrence traveled the world, building his knowledge of wines.

He wrote a wine column for the Southwest food magazine, ¡Sabroso!, presented and taught courses at local and regional wine festivals and was celebrated for his blog "Southwest Wine Guy?

When Marion Lawrence next visited campus in summer 2010, she told Green she wanted to do a wine education classroom.

In November 2010, Lawrence made a \$250,000 memorial gift and she and Green started re-energizing plans for the space, which previously was conceived as a retrostyle lounge where bar management, merchandizing and inventory and spirits would be the curriculum.

After demolition of the space, formerly a food tech lab, the buildout began in March 2012. Construction was completed in September.

Occupying the space was delayed, however,

due to a wait for two wine coolers, each with a capacity to protect 440 bottles.

One cooler will be devoted to building a special Lawrence collection initially established with 200 bottles from Marion Lawrence's private collection, Green said.

HRTM students had an opportunity to catalogue the collection, she said.

The other cooler will be for working wines, those served at events such as HRTM's international dinner series.

With generous cooler space available, the program can take advantage of opportunities to buy wines at a discount and keep them at the required temperature, Green said.

We're probably the only venue in Las Cruces with two 440 bottle coolers," she said.

Working on the project were architect Cesar Molina with Nine Degrees Architecture & Design Inc. in Santa Teresa and ESA Construction of Las Cruces.

"Midway into the project, Mrs. Lawrence brought in (Las Cruces decorator) Connie Hines, who had traveled to Tuscany and had a real sense of what Mrs. Lawrence wanted to achieve," Green said.

"The room itself – and who Bobby Lee was all about - is people learning to use wine to enhance their lives while improving their knowledge."

'This facility is a great addition to the School of Hotel, Restaurant and Tourism Management," said Garrey Carruthers, NMSU's vice president for economic development. "In particular, it provides an opportunity to expand students' knowledge of how wine fits into the hospitality management business?

Carruthers and his wife, Katherine, are matching all donations made to the academy, up to \$10,000, to help create an educational program to accompany the facility.

AT NMSU, wine education is an evolving aspect of the curriculum.

HRTM has a beverage management class and a basic wine education course, Green said. She said the Lawrence gift and others will

help build on these courses in the recently completed academy of wine.

We hope to grow into sommelier training," she said.

Elsewhere on campus, there are viticulturists in agriculture, wine and culture experts in anthropology and other faculty members with an interest in the many aspects of producing and understanding wine who also may contribute to the work of the Bobby Lee Lawrence Wine Academy.

# The value of a dollar bill

Bitcoin challenges the concept of money, but don't give up on cash currency yet

What gives money value? This is a question that vexes many. If you think about it too much, it can give you a headache.

Start with a basic fact. Money is something that you can spend, but this requires that someone else is willing to accept money in exchange for goods and services. That means the seller must think he can also spend the money, which requires someone else to be willing to accept money. But what got the process started? How did we all decide

what would be money and what isn't money?

If you think about it, it is strange that we are willing to accept paper rectangles covered in strangle doodles. The dollar, like most modern currencies, has no material asset backing it – not gold, not silver, not even beaver pelt. But the dollar does have one thing going for it that guarantees it has value. It is legal tender, which means that it can be used to pay debts – that is, taxes – owed to the national government.

You might think this silly. When was the last time, you said to yourself, "Oh, I'm being paid with

dollars. Good, now I can pay my taxes." Of course, we use dollars today without thinking because we've been

without thinking because we've been using dollars our whole lives; the same wasn't true of a trading post operator in the 1820s, when the use of pounds and shillings was still common in the United States. Only slowly did the dollar come to dominate the American monetary system. This means that the dollar, like other

national currencies, is intricately connected with the fate of the national government. If people thought that the U.S.

government was going away, then the U.S. dollar, like the Confederate dollar before it, would lose its value and cease to be used in trade.

All this makes Bitcoin, the bizarre web based "currency," something of an anomaly. Like the U.S. dollar, Bitcoin is a fiat currency in that it has no asset backing it. Unlike the dollar, it can't be used to pay taxes. What does give it value is

that it is untraceable, a valuable characteristic among libertarians, conspiracy nuts, tax dodgers, and drug dealers – not that those groups necessarily go together otherwise.

As a tax dodge, Bitcoin gained value during the Cyprus crisis. The Cyprus bailout was paid for in part by imposing a haircut on large depositors. Previously, Cyprus had been a popular tax haven especially among Russian oligarchs. If the EU wasn't willing to bailout depositors, then tax dodges would need to find some other way to avoid taxes. Bitcoin seems to be one place to go.

There is an irony here. The U.S.

dollar has value because it can be used to pay taxes, while Bitcoin has value, at least in part, because it can be used to avoid taxes.

But don't get too excited. Bitcoin is far from a perfect vehicle for tax avoidance. Although some online vendors accept it, Bitcoin is hard to spend. Moreover, its value has fluctuated widely relative to the dollar. If you bought Bitcoins on April 10 when the price hit \$260, you're not very happy right now as

the price is hovering around \$120. Tax avoidance isn't much of a benefit if prices decline by more than half.

Built around a proprietary, copyrighted system of 9 challenging workout stations developed by founder and CEO of the company, Shannon "the Cannon" Hudson, 9Round workouts involve aerobic, anaerobic and resistance training for the average person.

Stations one and two consist of strength building equipment and routines. Stations three through eight provide a variety of punching bags to build power, increase hand eye coordination and develop timing. Station nine is dedicated completely to strengthening the core.

"There are no class times," said Rojas. "The workouts change every day, so that nobody has to do the same routine every time they come in. Basically, it's aimed at the person who is time pressured, so instead of going to the gym and working out for two hours on the treadmill, we take care of it within 30 minutes."



The best part, according to Rojas, is that a trainer is with each member every step of the way.


"We try and target certain muscles in every round," said Rojas. "Maybe one day we'll do all legs, then the next we'll do all arms, then the next we'll do all core. Then there are some days when we combine it all together. The point is to burn off fat and calories in each session."

Open now for about two months, the Las Cruces location already boasts around 100 members, according to Rojas. Most of those members have learned about the new fitness center through word of mouth or social networks such as Twitter and Facebook. The reason, he believes, is because the results are more noticeable in a shorter amount of time.

"The moves aren't really complex, so anybody can do it," he said. "I've had a few members come from (a gym) and they tell

## **Masterpieces on Main Street** Avenue Art returns Saturday, April 27

Beginning in the Italian Renaissance during the 16th century, artists abandoned their traditional canvases and used the very ground they walked on to create beautiful, large-scale chalk paintings, usually of the Madonna.

The practice of these "madonnari," as they were called, eventually faded away, only to witness a resurgence in the 1970s, starting with the first International Street Painting Competition, held in 1972 in the town of Grazie di Curtatone in Italy.

Since then, street painting has gone global, with artists taking to the pavement in every corner of the world – including the Mesilla Valley.

The second annual Avenue Art New Mexico will color the newly reopened Main Street in Downtown Las Cruces from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, April 27.

This year's Avenue Art features 24 competing juried artists, several of whom are returning from last year, three showcase artists – Bob Diven, Emma Henderson and the husband-andwife duo of Benjamin Hummel and Cherish Flieder of Denver – and a kids' chalk area for your aspiring artists, as well as food vendors and entertainment.

Diven, local artisan and jack-of-all trades, first brought the idea of Avenue Art to Las Cruces after attending and competing in the first-ever Denver Chalk Art Festival, as well as Chalk the Block in El Paso.

Inspired by his experiences in both Colorado and Texas, Diven set out to create Las Cruces' own street art festival and went to Carrie La Tour, executive director of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership, with the idea. In April 2012, Avenue Art New Mexico was born.

Last year's event drew 20 juried artists and a crowd of hundreds of onlookers, eager to sneak a peek and these masterpieces in the making.

"What really impressed me about last year's event was that it drew a lot of artists new to this medium, who tended to work in isolation, to this big communal, public setting," Diven said.

"It's a way to get artists out and around the public, and to get the public out and around artists."

This year's 24 juried artists will compete in three categories – adult/professional, student and youth – for cash and prizes, and an "audience favorite" cash award will also be presented.

A judges' panel consisting of Jud Wright, painter and owner of Del Valle Printing; Matt Byrnes, animator, designer and department chair and instructor of the Digital Imaging and Design Technology Department at Doña Ana Community College; and Carolyn Bunch, figurative painter and owner of the Adobe Patio Gallery in Mesilla, will review the works and award prizes.

To prepare newcomers for the event, Diven held an artists' workshop on Saturday, April 20, for those interested in getting into or improving their street art before the festival.

While most patrons of the arts are used to seeing finished pieces in a gallery or museum setting, Avenue Art attendees get a look into the creative process often hidden behind studio doors.

"It's almost as much performance as it is visual art," Diven said. "It's not unheard of to watch art being made, but this is a very high level of that happening. These are really large paintings completed from start to finish in just seven hours, all in front of an audience."

Following the success of last year's event, this year's Avenue Art is even bigger, attracting more artists and – hopefully – even bigger crowds.

"We've already seen an increase this year in interest and participation," La Tour said, "and I think we will continue to see Avenue Art grow in the coming years."

Or, as Diven puts it, "It's become a living, growing, energized thing."

Unlike many art festivals and events that are geared wholly toward the public, Avenue Art aims to be an event for the creators as well.

"Avenue Art is for the artists," La Tour said. "It's free for them to participate, and we feed them and provide all the materials. It's a chance for them to perform, to show the public the process and all the work that goes into it, all while working alongside other artists."

For Diven, Avenue Art is a way for the public to gain a little bit of understanding into the artistic process.

"It consistently surprises people that artists go through so much work for something so inherently temporary," he said, "and it purifies it, in a way.

DANG Art Gang and DAMN Union bring art and music together By Zak Hansen

#### No, I didn't just stub my toe.

The Doña Ana New Ground Art Gang, or DANG Art Gang, will hold a special pre-show opening of their first group exhibit, titled "Local Seeds," at 5 p.m. Thursday, May 2, in conjunction with the Doña Ana Music Night Union (DAMN Union) Tour Kick-Off Variety Show at 7 p.m. at the historic Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St.

The artists who make up the DANG Art Gang - Emma Henderson, Coy Lowther, Meg Freyermuth, Jesse Reinhard and Sonia Payan - are all talented, young artists who call Las Cruces home and have committed themselves to not only their craft, but to cultivating a strong, cooperative arts community within

the Mesilla Valley. According to Henderson, "The DANG Art Gang is really about getting local artists established in Las Cruces."

"It's open to anyone, and we're primarily geared toward establishing a rapport with the community by holding gallery openings and shows and participating in local events," she said. "Ultimately, we hope to create a network between local artists who support and show with one another."

With no dues to pay and no subject, style or medium requirements, the DANG Art Gang is truly all-inclusive and open to new members in addition to the five "initiated Gang members," as Henderson calls them.

Henderson said the DANG Art Gang evolved from an idea kicked around by the members for years, when core members were in the Mayfield High School Art Society, under the tutelage of art instructors Raul Dorn and Stephanie Grijalva.

'We've all known each other for years," Henderson said. "We had been talking about getting something like this together for people our age for years now, where anyone can join in and there aren't really guidelines to what you can or cannot create.

We're all from Las Cruces, based in Las Cruces, but you don't even have to be a Las Crucen to join?

Last November, Henderson, Freyermuth and Lowther attended an MHS Art Society alumni event, a three-day celebration that included a show at West End Art Depot.

During the event, Freyermuth said, "the connections we all shared became so clear.

'It was fascinating that so many of us who were in the Art Society in high school kept making art and kept a local base here in Las Cruces. We all have a connection to Raul (Dorn) and Stephanie (Grijalva), and the event in November was really a way to honor them and all they've done for us and our art."

After graduation, Henderson said, "so many of us kept making art, though we all went different ways with it."

Beyond having the same educators, members of the DANG Art Gang find influence and inspiration in the same things.

"From my point of view, each of us DANG Artists are not only influenced by having the same educators, but also influenced by the community and area we've been living in for most of our art careers," Freyermuth said.

'Emma, Coy, Sonia and I have spent most of our lives in the Mesilla Valley, and we all have an urge to create unique art that is colorful, detailed and precise, regardless of what medium or subject matter we choose to work with.

We try to bring art to the community in an easy and affordable way, and we want to encourage other artists with likeminded goals to check out our group and see if they'd like to join our cause of bombarding the community with unique art."

The DANG Art Gang isn't the only product of the MHS Art Society, renowned by former students as a sort of haven for the best and brightest upcoming artists.

Another MHS Art Society member and stalwart of all things art in Las Cruces is David Tucker, who founded the weekly music nights that, over the years, evolved into the DAMN Union.

While the DANG Art Gang and the DAMN Union express themselves in very different media – visual arts versus musical – the similarities between the two run deep.

Aside from knowing, working with and supporting one another's creative endeavors - some members have known each other for decades - the members of both groups share a philosophy or an ethos toward the important intersection of art and community.

"For one, we've all been friends forever," Tucker said. "Beyond that, though, we see this as a way to build the art and humanities community as a whole in Las Cruces.

"Aguja" by "There are so many young talented people in Las Cruces who want to stay here, who want make it their home and their community, and they want to have the freedom to do what they

do and pursue their art as a serious career here." The "Local Seeds" opening is free and open to the public, and will remain on display through May 31 in the El Paso Electric Gallery. Admission to the concert is \$10.

## **Picasso and Einstein walk into a bar** ASTC brings Martin comedy to Medoff Theatre yet there is a mischievous twinkle in her eye.

In all, 'Picasso

at the Lapin Agile'

is an exceptional

student production

of Martin's

In addition to being a "wild and crazy guy," comedian, actor and amazing banjo afficionado Steve Martin proves in his 90-minute witty play "Picasso at the Lapin Agile" that he is a skilled playwright with a delicate touch, in addition to being an insightful philosopher.

In all, "Picasso at the Lapin Agile" is an exceptional student production of Martin's work performed by the American Southwest Theatre Company at the Medoff Theatre in New Mexico State University's Center for the Arts, playing though Sunday, May 5.

Save for the inimitable Tom Smith, head of NMSU's growing theater department as Gaston, a womanizing social critic/barfly with a prostate problem (which he plays as he does all his roles, with the perfect comic touch), all the other roles are played by students.

I have long argued that productions of the American Southwest Theatre Company should be a laboratory of sorts for theater students at NMSU. For years, I have complained bitterly about the absence of students and a proliferation of faculty cast in these productions. I am delighted to report that even the director of this production, Marcus Vickers, is a student.

Vickers does an excellent job of keeping the action rolling along at a careful pace, in order for the ideas around which the play is built to circulate and allow audience members to contemplate.

Written by Martin in 1994 and set in 1904, the play creates a fictional meeting between

a socially inept yet cheerful Albert Einstein, one year before publishing his special theory of relativity, and the egotistical, talented, womanizing artist Pablo Picasso three years before painting his mold-shattering work "Les Damioselles D'Avignon." The play is set at an appropriately appointed Parisian bar and artist hangout, Le Lapin Agile (The Nimble

Rabbit). Its message reverber-ates strongly today as we enter the 21st century as it does in this work, which dreams ahead into the 20th century. We realize as we watch this short play that we are witnesses to the age of scientific and artistic discovery. The final scene, staged to perfection, underlines this concept with numerous exclamation points! Over the years, I predict that Martin's work will hold a special place among the

significant plays of this century.

"Picasso at the Lapin Agile" has a lot to say about the relationship between art, science, creativity and fame. It dabbles in the issues of love and lust as well. The script is particularly well written and the lines must be articulated correctly by all the performers. Its message is spelled out in a variety of ways through the eyes and words of an assortment of individuals who gather at the bar. Each character seems to understand their raison detre, and

save for a couple of exceptions, perform quite admirably.

It may have been opening night jitters, but Josh Horton, who portrays the catalytic role of Freddy, the owner of Le Lapin Agile, speaks far too rapidly for his comic lines to sink in. He also dropped his voice at the

end of many of his lines, which made it a challenge to catch the wisdom and humor of the lines Martin placed in his mouth. As the run of the show progresses, I hope he will slow his pace. Kudos most especially

go to Frank Alvarado, who milks every ounce of bravura and ego out of the role of Picasso. He brightens the stage from the moment he makes his dramatic entrance.

I was also impressed by Daniel De La Rosa, whose quirky portrayal of Einstein is spot on. Ger-

maine, the all-too-wise barmaid, is played to perfection by Lindsey Porter, whose work I have watched develop over the years at NMSU.

Trevor Nazario in the mysterious role of "A Visitor" also does a fine job keeping his role under control. This could have been an opportunity to overact, but wisely, Nazario knows his limits.

Jamie Smith, in a variety of roles, is as sensuous and serene as she needs to be, and

William Zimmerman is appropriately bombastic and "over the top" as his role is written, but Cruz Talamantes is a bit too effete and out of "Central Casting" for my taste.

The technical aspects of the show are up to ASTC's usual standards, thanks to Jim Billings' scenic and light design and Raul Carrasco III's costume design.

I am happy to report that some much needed "tweaking" has been done to the sound system at the Medoff, and the acoustics are greatly improved.

However, there is work to be done outside the Center for the Arts in completing the pav-ing to the entrances to the theater to prevent us from walking through sand and mud in order to reach the entrances. Not only is the hike dangerous for those who are handicapped, the paving is not in compliance with ADA standards.

To end on a more positive note, let us raise many glasses to ASTC, NMSU's growing theater department and so many talented students. Cheers!

"Picasso at the Lapin Agile" runs through Sunday, May 5. Show times are 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday and 2 p.m. Sunday. Tickets range from \$10 to \$15 and are available at the NMSU Center for the Arts Box Office on the NMSU campus on the corner of University Avenue and Espina Street between the hours of noon and 4 p.m. or by calling 646-4515 or 646-1420.

## **Adventures in Mexican dining** Delicias Café offers tried-and-true Mexican food

There are, in my mind, two camps of Mexican restaurants found in Las Cruces.

The first camp is the restaurants devoted to out-of-towners and tourists the kind of places that serve what my Hispanic friends like to half-lovingly call "white people Mexican food."

Ethnocentric implications aside, my buddies have a point – an entire subsection of Mesilla Valley eateries specialize in safe, mild "Mexican" food of questionable authenticity, catering to the delicate, sensitive palates of a seemingly endless stream of Midwesterners eager to gain some "culture" and not burn their tongues in the process.

You know the type, God bless 'em. They ask what each and every item is on the menu, not realizing that it's all, in reality, the same thing – tortilla served with cheese, meat and/or vegetables. They pronounce the "ill" in Mesilla, start "jalapeño" with a hard "j" and revere Tostitos and Pace as the true tastes of the Southwest.

Once upon a time, I was one of them, but I've acclimated.

These restaurants have their place, certainly, but for a proud, tried-and-true southern New Mexican like myself, they do nothing for me.

Luckily, Las Cruces is also home to a number of authentic - or should I say "auténtico?" - Mexican places, and Delicias Café, located at 1413 E. Amador Ave., is decidedly and safely within this second camp.

This is a place the locals go - occasionally bringing with them their consorts or cousins from the middle half of the country - and for good reason. If you like your Mexican food authentic, your salsa hot and your menu mostly in Spanish, Delicias Café is the place for you.

Once a single restaurant, the Delicias name has boomed in recent years, with franchises opening in both El Paso and Albuquerque, as well as two other satellite restaurants under the Delicias name - Delicias del Mar and Burritos Victoria - here in Las Cruces.

As with most things, though, the original will always be the best, and Delicias Café is no different. Inside the modest accommodations of their flagship restaurant, you'll find some of the best - and most authentic - Mexican food in Las Cruces.

For starters, Delicias Café offers

patrons a bowl of welcome soup with most plates, chock full of rice, vegetables (including a section of whole-ear corn) and steak. It's a great, light way to start off a meal, especially in the cold winter months, but just as good in the weeks approaching summer.

As with any self-respecting Mexican restaurant, Delicias also starts diners with chips and salsa. What sets it apart, though, is the salsa itself - fresh, chunky ingredients, great flavor and plenty of heat. It's a far cry from the Old El Paso jarred stuff my Michigander family back East swears by – which is just glorified tomato sauce, if you ask me.

If you haven't stuffed yourself with soup, salsa and chips yet – and believe me, it's a risk you're going to run - be ready for the entrées.

> Delicias entrée menu features all you'd expect from a Mexican restaurant this close to the

border, with a few special surprises. It can be intimidating to pick something, but in all my times there, I've never had the same thing twice; nor have I been disappointed once.

Where Delicias really shines, for me at least, is for breakfast. Open at 7 a.m. well before I've dragged by grizzled
 countenance from my bed – Delicias is a quick, delicious place to start the day. My favorite breakfast dish by far is the

Huevos Divorciados, or "divorced eggs" - one tortilla served with an egg topped with green chile, one tortilla served with an egg topped with red chile, a gulf of refritos between them and served with hash browns on the side. I don't know what went wrong in that marriage, but I'd gladly be locked in the custody battle between them for as long as it takes.



"The Place Beyond the Pines" is the latest teaming of director Derek Cianfrance and actor Ryan Gosling, who previously worked together on 2010's harrowing "Blue Valentine," which charted in excruciating detail the course of a doomed relationship.

"Blue Valentine" was a difficult picture to watch. From its first frames, the audience knows that it will end in tears, and slowly but surely, we watch a relationship travel from the initial spark to the inevitable dissolution.

Cianfrance's new film is imbued with the same tension from start to finish – each scene draws inexorably closer to the tale's wrenching end – and while not entirely successful in reaching the lofty ambitions it sets for itself, "The Place Beyond the Pines" is nonetheless a sweeping epic, a rumination on themes of fatherhood, fate, family, sin and redemption across generations.

Presented as a triptych, Cianfrance's film opens with a long tracking shot of a shirtless, tattooed and chain-smoking Gosling as he strides confidently and quietly through the flashing neon lights of a traveling carnival.

Gosling plays "Handsome" Luke Glanton, a motorcycle stunt rider on the cusp of leaving town. After a performance one night, he is visited by a former one-night stand, Romina (Eva Mendes), and, shortly after, discovers that he is the father of her 1-year-old son.

<sup>'</sup>Romina has moved on and started a life with a new man, Kofi (Mahershala Ali), and does not want Luke a part of her nor her son's life. Undeterred, the locally famous stuntman quits his job on the road to stay in Schenectady, N.Y., and provide for his family.

Soon after, Luke meets Robin Van Der

Zee (an excellent Ben Mendelsohn), who offers him part-time work at his failing auto repair shop. The scenes between Gosling and Mendelsohn are among the film's best. There is an undefined attraction between these two "man's men," and although their relationship is neither sexual nor romantic, the scenes that play out between these two are imbued with the same light as lovers.

Luke is soon frustrated by the trickles of work he finds and the meager amounts of money he makes in the process, and turns to Robin for ideas. Robin soon reveals that he used to rob banks – successfully – and the two devise a scheme that utilizes Luke's particular set of skills.

While successful with his first robberies, we know Luke is headed for a fall. After a botched heist, he crosses paths with a rookie beat cop, Avery Cross (Bradley Cooper). As these two men – both sons, both fathers – are thrown into one another's lives, they come into direct contact with tragic consequences, the repercussions of which will be felt across generations.

Cross, attempting to operate in the shadow of his domineering politico father and within the confines of a rampantly corrupt police force, is faced with the same dilemmas as Luke in regards to family and fatherhood.

This act, while strong, holds nowhere near the emotional intensity of the first chapter, and while this threatens to derail Cianfrance's film, it does not. To tell much of the third frame in

To tell much of the third frame in this triptych is to venture far too deep into spoiler territory. As the implications of the first two segments come full circle in the third and the narrative arc finally makes itself seen, "The Place Beyond the Pines" is powerful, difficult stuff.

"The Place Beyond the Pines" isn't all successful. Gosling's story is by far the strongest; nothing in the rest of the film can match its emotional intensity. Characters begin to develop unrealistically in the second act, and things start to fall together too neatly, too pat, to jibe with the film's opening act - up until the stunning climax, as all these narrative and thematic threads finally weave together.

It's encouraging to see a young director like Cianfrance take on a project of this scope. Even if he can't quite deliver on all it promises, "The Place Beyond the Pines" serves to reassure us that, in this day and age, a talented cast and director can – and will – set out to make an ambitious, naturalistic drama of this magnitude and emotional weight.

In "Barbara," an intense and nearly cheerless German drama, the title character, a doctor in 1980 East Germany, has been exiled by the powers that be to a small rural pediatric hospital. Her "crime?" Applying for an exit visa from Communist operated East Germany.

Her distaste for the place and her coworkers (some in the same predicament) begins almost immediately, and it doesn't help that she is under constant observation from Andre, the hospital director, and Klaus, a member of the German Democratic Republic secret police.

As much as Barbara attempts to keep to herself both at work and away, it is nearly impossible. The spies abound and they are most interested in why she wanted to go to West Germany, for reasons that I won't share with you.

But in spite of all of this, Barbara is clearly committed to her work, working with any number of young children who have been more or less shunned aside by others and also making friends with an irascible young woman who is an inmate a local labor camp. Stella will have nothing to do with the other staff members, especially after Barbara correctly diagnoses her ailment as meningitis, when the others couldn't or, more likely, wouldn't.

Andre, also a doctor and possibly "other things," shall we say, is drawn to Barbara, both because of her skill and involvement with the patients. It is a blessing they share and Barbara, very tentatively, allows herself to open up to him, but only in the most minute of ways.

There is no humor here, or altruistic string music to help define the moment for you or anyone else. Barbara herself is humorless, dry and secretive, but it is easy to become involved with her character (played by actress Nina Hoss) because, on some level, you know she is right – what she is doing is right and how she is doing it is out of a sad necessity brought on by the difficult, albeit impossible, circumstances that people in the GDR had to cope with.

The film is finely understated and tells a lot of story via camera angles and minor facial

expressions. The director is Christian Petzold, who has done a couple of other films including the excellent drama "Yella," which also starred Hoss. I recommend that film if you have the chance to view it via Netflix or another source.

"Barbara" proceeds like a quietly emotional chess game, with Andre usually one step behind what Barbara is really going on, perhaps intentionally due to his mostly unrequited bond to her.

A fine film, one that will keep you thinking, guessing and hoping until its unique ending.



What was once fields and farms west of Las Cruces has been transformed into a residential paradise, and while the Picacho Hills neighborhood is filled with a bevy of modern housing marvels, one residence looks as if it was created centuries ago. Built in 2010 by Classic New Mexico

Built in 2010 by Classic New Mexico Homes, the residence at 1220 Sonnet Court features a historic style typical of the region, yet showcases the latest amenities for luxury living.

"Once I saw one of (Classic New Mexico Homes') houses, I fell in love," said homeowner Ruth Dolan, who had the home built. "Wayne and Kiki (Suggs) have a passion for homebuilding and for those details found in historic homes."

Described as "ageless," the home took nine months to complete, and when finished, contained 2,400 square feet of rich wood detailing, lavish tile work and the curves and lines associated with the pueblo architectural style.

"You can see all of these little details," Dolan said. "You'd miss them if they were gone."

A turquoise-blue gate encloses the manicured courtyard. Green foliage speckles the area surrounding the path that leads to the front door, a large wooden creation.

Inside, a small entrance area welcomes guests with a view of the Organ Mountains, framed by windows in the living room. Wood paneling covers the ceiling as Saltillo tile – complete with dog and cat footprints – lines the floor.

A long hall leads past a half bathroom that features a turquoise cabinet with yellow countertop created by Greg Duff of Classic New Mexico Homes, who, with Wayne Suggs, built all of the cabinetry and some of the furniture found in the home. The turquoise and yellow are reflected in the lilies decorating the Talavera sink bowl. Green accent tiles along the tan floor complete the colorful space.

"Kiki designed the layout for all of the tile," Dolan said. "She's an artist."

At the end of the hall is the master suite. Tall walls fill the bedroom, providing Dolan with a sense of openness as well as a place to display her street banner collection. Wayne Suggs' attention to detail can be seen in the recessed wall element and adjacent window bench, which features nichos for knickknacks and books.

An arched entryway leads to the colorful master bathroom. Drenched in vibrant green and brown tile, the bathroom includes a shower, jetted bathtub under a window and two copper sink bowls. As with the kitchen, the bathroom cabinets include under lighting. The living room is at the center of the

home. Wood panels and large vigas accent the 14-foot-tall ceiling.

"There is a lot of wood in this house," said Dolan, adding that the various beams, columns, corbels and other wood detailing give the home a feeling of warmth.

A kiva-inspired fireplace is located in a corner in the room across from several large windows that capture that envied view of the Organ Mountains.

The kitchen looks out to the living room as well as the dining room.

"The whole thing is very open," Dolan said. Bold blue and yellow tile – and some with flowers – fill the kitchen along the countertops and backsplash. Dolan said Kiki Suggs even painted the outlet face plates to match the tile designs.

The bright colors are set off by the hammered copper sink and stove from Italy and alder cabinets, which were distressed to give them a rustic feel.

The large island with a pine top at the center of the room is brightly lit by a skylight overhead. Not missing an opportunity to show off their creativity, the Classic New Mexico Homes team decorated the skylight in more tile and wood trim.

In this area are the home's other two bedrooms as well as another bathroom.

As colorful and comforting as the interior of the home is, the backyard and covered patio are equally so. Artificial grass lines the center of the backyard and is surrounded by rock landscaping and various native plants. While Dolan has an herb garden beside the house, her back wall features raised beds containing various flowering plants that, when in bloom, provide shades of oranges, purples and pinks.

A flagstone path leads to a more private patio that can be accessed from the master suite. From there, guests can take in a quiet spring breeze, various visiting wildlife and views of the Organ Mountains and Picacho Peak.



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## Two area buildings determined to be Trost & Trost creations

Mesilla Valley Preservation Inc., a nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting the region's architectural legacy, announced significant discoveries pertaining to two historic buildings in the area.

During ceremonies on Wednesday, April 17, and Monday, April 22, the organization confirmed that the Mesilla Community Center, formerly the Mesilla School, and the Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center, formerly the Mesilla Park School and Mesilla Park Community Center, were designed by the renowned El Paso architectural firm Trost & Trost.

"(Trost & Trost was) the architectural firm in the area in the 20th century," said MVP President Eric Liefeld.

Henry Trost was a contemporary of Frank Lloyd Wright, Liefeld said, adding that both were students of Chicago architect Louis Sullivan, who is referred to as the spiritual father of American architecture.

Together with his brothers Gustavus and Adolphus, Henry Trost led Trost & Trost, designing several homes and businesses in the El Paso and southern New Mexico area.

"Henry was very gifted and prolific," Liefeld said. "Having his touch on building is something very special."

Hearing that there were still undiscovered Trost & Trost buildings in the Mesilla Valley, MVP members set out to discover them. "It's been an amazing month," Liefeld said.

One of the first they were able to pinpoint was the missionrevival style Mesilla Community Center, built in 1910 and used as a school until approximately 1975.

"Things get lost," Liefeld said of why this information was previously unknown. "Things are typically underappreciated in their own time."

Throughout the years, the community center received renovations and steady upkeep. The Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center, built in 1907, has also been maintained over the years and is a staple of the community.

"MVP congratulates both the Town of Mesilla and the City of Las Cruces on their continued efforts to maintain these two important buildings while keeping them as an active part of the community," said Liefeld, adding that these historic structures are examples of adaptive reuse.

Also through their research, MVP members were able to confirm other Trost & Trost designs that unfortunately haven't





## Grilled Tequila-Lime Chicken Wrap Bites

1 cup fresh lime juice 1/2 cup tequila

- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro, chopped
- 2 tablespoons jalapeño, minced and seeded
- 1 1/2 tablespoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- About 1 teaspoon garlic, minced
- 6 boneless chicken breast halves (with skin, preferably)

12 (6-inch) tortillas for wrapping Favorite salsa

Sour cream

Mix lime juice, tequila, orange juice, cilan-

tro, jalapeños, chili powder, salt and pepper in bowl. Add chicken; turn to coat. Cover; chill overnight. Prepare barbecue (medium heat). Brush grill rack with oil. Grill chicken until cooked through, turning occasionally, about 18 minutes. Slice chicken into strips. Transfer to a platter. Serve with tortillas for wrapping and salsa and sour cream as a topper. Makes 12 servings. (Recipe adapted from Bon Appétit magazine, August 2000.)

Slice the chiles and bell peppers into ribbons about 1/2 inch thick. Arrange them decoratively on a serving platter. Pour the dressing over the chiles and scatter the cheese on top. Garnish with lettuce around the plate's edge. Makes 6 servings.

## **Bean and Pepper Salad**

## 1/2 cup dried black beans

1/2 cup dried pinto beans 1/2 cup dried red or kidney beans

1 yellow bell pepper

1 red bell pepper

1 fresh poblano chile pepper

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper 1 canned chipotle chile pepper in adobo

sauce, stemmed, seeded and minced 2/3 cup olive oil

## 1 red onion, finely diced

Sort through all the beans, keeping them separate, and discard any misshapen beans or stones. Rinse well. Place each bean variety in a separate saucepan and add water to cover generously. Bring each to a boil, reduce the heat to medium-low, cover and simmer until the smallest bean is cooked through and creamy inside, about 1 1/2 hours. Drain all the beans in a colander (they can be mixed at this time) and spread them out on a plate to cool slightly.

Meanwhile, remove the stems, seeds and ribs from the bell peppers and poblano chile. Cut the peppers into 1/4-inch dices

In a large bowl, whisk together the vinegar, salt, black pepper and chipotle chile. Slowly add the olive oil, whisking constantly. Toss in the diced peppers, onion and warm beans and mix well. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours or as long as overnight. Serve the salad chilled. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

## Serrano Pepper and Avocado Fruit Salad

1/2 cup walnut oil

1/3 cup (or less) raspberry vinegar Salt and freshly ground black

- pepper, to taste Minced fresh cilantro to taste
- Boston or Bibb lettuce leaves 4 medium red grapefruit,
- peeled and sectioned
- 2 medium avocados, peeled, seeded, sliced lengthwise
- 2 medium papayas, peeled, seeded, sliced lengthwise 2 serrano peppers, stemmed,
- seeded, minced 1/2 cup toasted walnuts, chopped

For the dressing, put the walnut oil and raspberry vinegar in a screw top jar. Cover and shake well. Chill dressing in the refrigerator for at least 1 hour.

Line a large serving platter with Boston or Bibb lettuce leaves. Top with grapefruit sections, avocado slices, papaya slices and minced serrano pepper. Sprinkle with toasted walnuts. Shake the dressing well, season to taste with salt and pepper and whisk in the cilantro. Distribute the dressing evenly over the salads. Makes 8 servings.

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

## **Decorating for special needs**

Research vital when creating a comfortable space



I've always tried to emphasize the importance of determining what a client's needs are before starting a decorating plan - but, what if the "client" can't tell you what their needs are, even though they might be very specialized?

I've been working on a project recently in which this is the case. The project is the Esperanza Children's Therapy Facility. They specialize in children who have autism as well as speech, language and eating disorders and conducts occupational and physical therapy, working with children older than 3.

Autism now affects 1-in-110 children and 1-in-70 in boys. Architects, interior designers and color professionals should be aware of the special design requirements for this growing population. I studied for months, looking for answers about what colors I should use and what makes autistic children comfortable or uncomfortable.

Frequently, facilities appear sterile and hospital like - not at all appealing to children in general or autistic children, specifically. The facility has a childlike atmosphere, with murals of animals, trees and scenes of outdoors with soft colors. The murals were used not only in the waiting rooms, but to lead them down the halls to the therapy rooms. In a long hall, trees were painted to hold clotheslines to display artwork that the children are so proud of from their therapy.

A typical waiting room has nothing to do but sit and wait. Esperanza's two waiting



rooms not only have a quiet place to read books, but also mats and new Space Age beanbag chairs called "Yogibo" that allow the children to physically play. The "bean bag" completely surrounds and supports them, which is comforting to autistic children.

Research has repeatedly found associations between color and mood. For example, some shades of blue help with creativity and calmness. Cool colors such as blues and greens typically have the most soothing effect for autistic children. At the opposite end of the spectrum, red looks fluorescent and vibrates with intensity. Primary colors have not been used; instead, muted colors are found throughout, including soft yellows, limes, lavenders and blues.

We simplified and uncluttered the spaces. Researchers have found that autistic children's rods and cones – components of the eve have changed due to the chemical imbalances or neural deficiencies. Each therapy room has a closet and/or cabinets to unclutter the space and allow the children to concentrate only on the project at hand.

The overall reaction to the colors and décor has been very positive with the children and the parents. My heart melted the day I walked in and heard a little boy say, "Blue is my favorite color, I love this place." The overall reaction to the facility by the parents and, more importantly, the children has been wonderful to see.

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

## Healing takes time



"Good things come to those who wait," is an English phrase extolling the virtue of patience, because everything that is worth it in life takes time.

From building a successful business to losing weight, if overnight success is promised, it usually is not true. Get-richquick schemes never pan out. Weight loss programs without lifestyle change are the easy way out, but the results are just as fleeting. Anything that addresses only the symptoms is a temporary fix, at best. If there is no pain, there is usually no gain.

Pain in this case would be the effort involved in waiting and doing what's necessary to bring about a positive change. Another way to look at it is that if it comes too easy, it will more than likely not last.

Just as it takes time to undo anything negative, it would have taken time to get to that point as well. Most things do not take place overnight, whether positive or negative. When it comes to healing, it is important to remember that if it took a while to get to that point of discomfort, pain or misery, complete healing and restoration more than likely will not be instantaneous. It may not be your first day, week or even month that you might feel like healing is taking place. It certainly won't take you as long to heal as it did for you to get to that point, but it will definitely take time. The longer you have had the problem, the more time to undo.

It is important to understand this principle of time. A good example to illustrate this would be repairing bad credit. It would be nice if it could be repaired overnight, but it takes a while and requires commitment and discipline. The same can be said for health, which, if lost, can take a while to restore.

To truly regain it would require commitment and discipline by making the necessary lifestyle changes that encourage good health, and being patient to reap the fruits of this effort. For one to succeed in regaining health, it takes time to truly realize and appreciate the benefits of making the necessary changes to not only regain health, but also to maintain it. Just as one invests and knows that it takes time to get a return on investments, patiently making the right choices for health almost guarantees better health in the future.

## **Dealing with hot weather**

## Take precautions to stay healthy By Lorena Sanchez

Beating the heat is something people in Las Cruces know a lot about.

The hot temperatures are becoming a permanent occurrence this season, making it that much more important to stay cool.

Dr. Brooke Parish, medical director at Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Mexico, said it's important to keep cool as temperatures rise.

"Some mistakes people make is (being active) during the hottest part of the day, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., and not hydrating enough, especially during strenuous activity," Parish said.

It is important to take precautions as summer approaches and temperatures climb.

"Make sure you have proper protection for your skin and stay hydrated," said Ben Gabriel, manager of operations for recreation at New Mexico State University. "Wear long sleeves and long pants. I know it sounds counter intuitive, but it's important to protect yourself."

For someone who is active in the heat, Gabriel said it is important to plan ahead.

"Know your goal and make sure you pack

enough water for that time period," he said. One mistake people often make, Gabriel

said, is underestimating the time they are

going to be out in the heat.

"People underestimate the amount of time they're going to be out and don't take enough fluids and sunscreen," he said.

Gabriel recommends letting someone know where you are going in case injury or illness occur.

'Utilize the best time of day if you are going to be active - the morning and evening hours,

he said. "It is also important to track your heart rate and know what ranges are acceptable for your body type and skill level. And plan activities that are in line with your skill level."

When someone becomes overheated and dehydrated, several symptoms can occur.

Heat injury generally refers to heat cramps, beginning dehydration, heat exhaustion and See Heat on page C29

The bombings in Boston, the plant

explosion in Texas and the severe flooding taking hold of the Midwest have forced the nation to confront a wide range of traumatic and stressful events recently.

Incidents like these require everyone to pay attention to their mental health and to take steps to positively manage stress.

The American Red Cross has some simple steps everyone can take to help cope with the recent events:

- Stay informed, but limit exposure to media coverage of the events.
- Take care of yourself. Eat healthy, drink plenty of water and get enough rest.
- Be patient with yourself and others. It's common to have any number of temporary stress reactions such as anger, frustration and anxiety.
- Stay connected with your family and other

support systems. Reach out and accept help from others.

Encourage children to express their feelings and thoughts. Reassure them about their safety.

To reach out for free 24/7 counseling or support, contact the Disaster Distress Helpline at 800-985-5990 or text "TalkWithUs" to 66746.

Children are especially at risk since they may become afraid that a disaster could affect them, or that they or someone in their family may be harmed. It is important to comfort children and talk to them in a calm manner. Their view of the world as a safe and predictable place is temporarily lost during emergency situations. How a parent or other adult reacts around children following a disaster can determine how quickly and completely they recover.

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) is common with worldwide prevalence estimated at 9 to 23 percent. Yet many people remain undiagnosed and unaware that their symptoms indicate a medically recognized disorder. IBS is a disorder characterized by abdominal pain or discomfort, and altered bowel habit (chronic or recurrent diarrhea, constipation, or both - either mixed or in alternation).

IBS affects between 25 million and 45 million people in the United States (10 to 15 percent of the population). About 2-in-3 IBS sufferers are female. About 1-in-3 IBS sufferers are male. Most persons with IBS are under the age of 50. But many older adults suffer as well. Stress does not cause IBS. However, because of the connection between the brain and the gut, stress can worsen or trigger symptoms. Treatments are available for IBS to help manage symptoms.

heat stroke," Parish said. "There are some genetic aspects to heat tolerance and intolerance. The young and old and people who are not used to the heat are more prone to heat injury." Recognizing when the body is becom-

"As soon as you start getting cramps, seek air conditioning, start hydrating and use an electrolyte replacement option," Parish said. "(Heat injury symptoms are) different for different people, but typically, if you're thirsty, you're behind the 8-ball and becoming dehydrated."

Symptoms of heat injury become more severe as body temperature rises and include excess sweating, fatigue, thirst, muscle cramps, pre-fainting, headache, dizziness, hallucination and seizure. Seek medical attention, Parish said,

when signs heat exhaustion occur, which include headache and dizziness.

"Summer is an excellent time to get active, but it's important to be aware of

other dangers as well," Gabriel said. As it heats up, snakes come out. To avoid injury the best thing to do is to be aware of where your hands and feet are.

"Leave them alone," Gabriel said. "Bites happen a lot when people engage the snake.




