### **City OKs** Vision 2040

### County next to act on development guide

Four years after a consultant delivered a long-range plan for Las Cruces and Doña Ana County, it appears the Vision 2040 plan may finally becoming the guide to coordinate city and county future growth.

On Tuesday, Feb. 21, the Las Cruces City Council unanimously approved the most recent draft of the Vision 2040 report called "One Valley, One Vision." It now goes before the County Commission at its next meeting Tuesday, Feb. 28.
The Vision 2040 has taken so long be-

cause the first draft in 2008 was considered to be too inflexible and not a good reflection of the area by both pro- and anti-growth forces.

A new large group was formed of area stakeholders and they began a long series of public meetings to reshape the plan.

Last year, the steering committee gave its final report to the 2040 commission, which resulted in the "One Valley, One Vision."

The report provides guidelines for growth and for protecting the area's natural settings.

Using the 2010 Census data, the 2040 report makes growth projections for various areas within the county for the next 30 years. The report suggests the agencies and governmental groups that will be responsible for the land and operations in the county, so they can work together on

Bill Mattiace, former mayor of Las Cruces, and Charlie Scholz, who chaired the Las Cruces Planning and Zoning Commission, led the commission that formed the new report, which they have said is meant to encourage intergovernmental and inter-agency cooperation, in conjunction with the stakeholders, on decisions about future development and preservation efforts.

Recent meetings have brought new issues, such as the need to better determine land ownership in colonias, but also added new goals, such as encouraging "economic gardening" – to provide the

### Schools pleased by **Legislature funding**

### Lawmakers get a passing grade for formula reform

Officials with Las Cruces Public Schools and New Mexico State University are both reporting progress made in the 30-day Legislature that wrapped up midday Thursday, Feb. 16.

Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Stan Rounds said the general appropriation for schools is a little more than \$2.4 billion, with \$52.6 million in recurring appropriations and a number of special appropria-

Among the new funding is \$10 million for pre-kindergarten

and a program called K-3 Plus received \$11 million. LCPS opted out of the program last year because Rounds said he was unsure about the reliability of the funding in terms of mobility for the district's students. With attendance a factor in the funding, students moving around and out of the district was a concern that he said has now been worked

The good news in all of this, he said, is the new money will help early reading efforts, which is the focus of the Reading Foundation of Doña Ana County.

Another piece of good news was on the front of what employees will have to pay for their retirement fund. Rounds said the district had put aside money in the budget to protect employees from an increase

### Officials test air at elementary school

### Child's illness prompts checks

Las Cruces Public Schools are awaiting the results of new air tests in response to parents complaining that a bathroom renovation job is making at least one child sick.

Based on air tests from last year on the project, LCPS Superintendent Stan Rounds told the school board at its meeting Tuesday, Feb. 21, he was confident the work at Highlands Elementary School will be cleared.

The work at Highlands Elementary is part of restroom renovations at four schools, said Gloria Martinez, district manager for construction projects.

The bathrooms are being brought up to current standards

and codes, especially the Americans with Disabilities Act, and the work is extensive with new pumping.

Along with air monitoring, Martinez said the projects use plastic sheets and air fans to keep dust from the work from getting into nearby classrooms. The work areas are cleaned daily, she said, as the contractors try to do as much as possible after school

Nicolas Bañales, a freelance photographer who regularly works for the Bulletin, said his 6-year-old son Hunter has recently become seriously sick with a chronic "croup" cough that has sent the boy to the emergency room. Bañales said he believes there is a chemical in the school's

# Las Cruces was once a segregated community

### NAACP pushed for 1968 fair housing law

Considering how well people get along today, it may be hard to imagine that Las Cruces was once a city divided by race.

Andrew Trotter, who grew up in segregated Las Cruces and was active in changing it, said segregation was not originally part of the town's make-up, but an import as Southerners migrated to Las Cruces in 1920s and 1930s.

Black children were excluded from schools that once taught all children. Churches with African-American congregations taught black children.

Because of the roles church played in educating black children, it is relatively well known that the schools in Las Cruces were segregated until the landmark 1954 Supreme Court decision on Brown v. Board of Education that ended the practice.

But Trotter said what isn't as well known is

housing was also segregated and it would take another 14 years to bring fair housing to the

Although some African-Americans were living on Mesquite and Tornillo streets, there were few places for blacks to live in the city, Trotter said.

In the 1950s, black colleges were producing post-World War II graduates with skills suited for employment at White Sands Missile Range, Trotter said.

A white Realtor, Seaborn Collins, was willing to sell homes to blacks in what was called the Washington Heights subdivision, he said.

"As a result, Paxton Street became an allblack street," Trotter said.

The local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People pushed for the passage of a local fair housing ordinance, In 1968, Las Cruces Mayor Tommy Graham signed the new ordinance surrounded by local NĂACP members, including Trotter.

### Off-road enthusiasts take Chile Challenge

Four-wheelers and off-road enthusiasts will once again have a chance to explore the scenic and bumpy - Doña Ana County terrain during the 22nd annual Chile Challenge.

Held by the Las Cruces Four Wheel Drive Club, the off-road event began Wednesday, Feb. 22, and will continue through Saturday, Feb. 25, beginning at the Southern New Mexico Fair Grounds, 10 miles west of Las Cruces off Interstate 10, and will cover portions of Doña Ana County operated by the Bureau of Land Management.

According to event organizers, the Chile Challenge gives drivers of four-wheel vehicles the opportunity to explore trails in a supervised, nationally recognized, four-wheeling event. This family-friendly event is designed for drivers of any experience level.

"It's an event that covers a lot of Doña Ana County," said Tom Phillips, supervisor for Recreation and Cultural Resources for BLM. "All of the driving takes place on existing, open vehicle routes. It's not and off-highway vehicle

Phillips said there are various routes drivers can take - some of which any vehicle with four-wheel drive will be able to handle and others that are more challenging.

Each ride is lead by an experienced trail leader who manages the run, makes sure all participants complete the run, oversees the climb over significant obstacles, if needed, and stays in communications with each vehicle via a CB radio. There is no competition, just the challenge of the trail. Runs last four to six hours and riders are encouraged to bring water, lunch and snacks.

The Chile Challenge is for registered participants only. Walk-in registration for trail runs will be available for a \$50 per day fee. ### Cervantes commended

On behalf of the board and staff of Think New Mexico, I am writing to commend state Rep. Joseph Cervantes for his hard work and leadership during the 2012 legislative session, which ensured the passage of long overdue reforms to the state's troubled Public Regulation Commission (PRC).

Cervantes was the lead sponsor of House Joint Resolution 11, which proposes a constitutional amendment to increase qualifications for PRC commissioners. Under his guidance, the bill passed the House (as well as both of its House committees) on unanimous votes.

Unfortunately, HJR 11 ran into some roadblocks in the Senate, and by the time it passed that chamber there was less than an hour to go in the session. Because the Senate had amended the bill, the House had to vote to concur with the Senate's changes - and by that time, a filibuster was underway in the House over other measures. Cervantes worked with lawmakers on both sides of the aisle to pause the filibuster long enough to allow the House to approve the final PRC reform legislation.

Thanks to his exceptional efforts, the people of New Mexico will have the opportunity to vote on this important reform.

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# Maybe mañana, Hanna

### With legislative session over, attention turns to primaries

Why can't Hanna Skandera, secretary-designate of the state Public Education Department, get confirmed? Two regular sessions and one special session of the New Mexico Legislature have chosen not to even give her a hearing.

The reasons include the political. Gov. Susana Martinez

must get cabinet appointees and certain other high officials confirmed by the state Senate. When the governor and Senate are of different parties, political games sometimes are played. Even when the governor and Senate are of the same party, the Senate Rules Committee often toys with a nominee or two as hostages for bargaining purposes.

Skandera happens to be the most controversial of Martinez's appointees. She wouldn't have been if Harrison "Jack" Schmitt had chosen to go through the confirmation process.

Schmitt was nominated to head our Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department, but withdrew after becoming aware that environmentalists were about to make a big deal out of his position, as a geologist, that global warming is due more to natural, rather than human, causes.

The word was that Schmitt would not get the local-hero treatment despite leading the geological exploration of the moon and returning to represent New Mexico in the U.S. Senate from 1976-82. He was born in Santa Rita and remained in the state after being defeated by Sen. Jeff Bingaman. Schmitt didn't survive re-election, but neither did Rick Santorum. And

Skandera, on the other hand, is new to New Mexico and has never taught school. That and bringing in a lot of new ideas has made her road bumpy. She has a slightly different take on her situation, however.

New Mexico is an unbelievably relational state," Skandera told Santa Fe New Mexican reporter Robert Nott.

No, it doesn't have anything to do with nepotism. It means that establishing relationships with those you are trying to influence is more important here than in other states.

If you have always lived in New Mexico, you never may have realized that wanting to know people before we let them influence us is not common in most of the country.

I came to this realization years ago in my first career when I was asked to help a teacher leader in Lordsburg who was having great difficulty selling an idea to her superintendent.

When we arrived at his office, I began the conversation by saying I was born there. The superintendent and I shared stories about people we mutually knew. When I got to the point of our visit, it didn't take long to reach agreement.

Afterward, the teacher thanked me, but offered that I had wasted valuable time chatting. I replied that I felt we still would be haggling if I hadn't established a relationship first.

The teacher replied that it didn't work that way where she

I've thought about that experience often and haven't changed my style a bit. I'm currently trying to bring an outof-state documentary filmmaker together with a New Mexican with valuable information. She won't release it until she can sit down and talk with him personally. He doesn't understand.

# Becoming the 'more jobs state'

### Limiting economic growth is a priority for some people

Two things are true for the majority of high school students in New Mexico, especially in the smaller communities.

First, if these young people get a college degree, they will make considerably more money in their lifetime than if they do not. Additionally, they will have many more opportunities with a college degree than without. Second, if they get a college degree, there is a better-than-average chance they will have to relocate elsewhere in the state or more than likely in the nation.

College-required jobs are at a premium in New Mexico outside of finance and engineering. In the public sector there are education jobs. The colleges in New Mexico graduate many students who find that the job market forces them to leave the state. There is no gun to their head, but for ambitious graduates it is obvious companies in New Mexico are just holding on, not

Nothing is more heartbreaking for parents than having children move out of state. Imagine that as a parent you have worked hard to send your children to college. Naturally, you are relieved when your children graduate, but then crushed when they tell you about the seven job offers they received, not one from a company in New Mexico. These poor parents will spend untold hours in airports because their children could not find a job in the state. It is the only way to see their grandchildren.

So why are there so few commercial professional jobs locally? It would seem to me that the reason for fewer jobs is because the climate for commercial economic development locally is very anti-business. The definition of anti-business is doing those things that make it harder to be in business than it ought to be. For example, everyone in business has to do paperwork. Anti-business is when you have to go round and round with a government agency about the paperwork which you have done correctly, but they ignore.

This unfriendly attitude toward business is not a new problem. It has been this way since the 1960s, and unless something changes, it will be this way forever. Many leaders in New Mexico have never made a payroll, and look down their noses at those people who own their own businesses. Many like the safe jobs working for the state where they get all holidays off and never have to work at night.

When I graduated from New Mexico State University with my bachelor's degree in 1972, I was forced to relocate even

though I would have rather stayed in Las Cruces. Why did I leave? There were no professional jobs in town for my degree. Years later, I was finally able to return by taking a considerable pay cut from my out-of-state job. I am glad to have returned and live in this state but it did require coming back to an anti-

There are two reasons for the long-term lack of economic growth. For some people, New Mexico is perfect as is. They want to keep its quaint and charming ambiance. Lacking that, they want as little growth as possible. They resist providing any incentives to bring companies to our area.

The second group concerns me more. For them, the real conflict is that commercial growth is fueled by people making a profit. These people do not support commercial activity because they are anti-capitalism. Some of the second group, even seem to be employed by the local, county and state government. Their priority is making rules to limit economic growth.

Real economic growth comes from jobs. It is an immutable truth that the way to depress economic growth is to place barriers to economic development. The biggest barriers to economic growth are rules and regulations like impact fees for businesses and zoning. Each rule slows growth and discour-

I am a capitalist and proud of it. I went to college to make more money. We need to develop the commercial economic base in our area so our children can go to college and then stay in the area. One way to start is with our local government. Identify those people who think that making money is bad. They need to be fired.

# Early childhood education is critical

### Change will take a 'robust effort' on the part of all involved

Public education was in the news during the recent New Mexico legislative session. Issues about funding, early childhood education, retention of non-proficient student readers and evaluations of principals, teachers, students and schools were on the table.

After more than a year of study, the League of Women Voters of Greater Las Cruces completed a comprehensive study of public education in Las Cruces, a study that reinforced our commitment to public schools as the primary method for educating students, kindergarten through 12th grade. The issues of school finance, early childhood education and performance evaluation were addressed in the position we adopted in October 2011.

We believe that funding for public education should be the highest of state budget priorities. Public education is the cornerstone to building and maintaining a strong and viable democracy, and in our current economic circumstances, a quality education is a specific need for work force employment. We support a funding formula that provides a high-quality education for all students and is consistently and fairly applied across the state.

Throughout our research, we found an emphasis on the importance of early childhood education. We support collaboration among a broad base of community organizations, social service agencies and the local school system to provide parents with programs to assist their children from birth to age 5 in acquiring language experiences that prepare them for success in kindergarten

and beyond. We also support programs that are welcoming and inclusive of parents from economically disadvantaged families.

We support evaluation of teachers, students and school performance that focuses on student academic progress rather than rigid standards of proficiency. Testing should be focused on measuring student progress in all core academic subject areas over frequent intervals, and timely results should be provided to teachers to guide the design of instruction to aid individual student progress.

Teacher performance evaluations must be comprehensive and include criteria that demonstrate the teacher's in-depth knowledge in core academic subjects and pedagogy. Currently in New Mexico, individual teacher performance evaluation plans are developed at the local school system level and are tied to the Public Education Department's rigorous threetiered licensure standards.

These standards are based on increasing levels of personal, professional growth and job performance observations. The league recommends the assessment of the performance of schools and of teachers be based on multiple factors that indicate not only the overall quality of the education provided to the students but also improvements in student academic growth measured through multiple methods, not solely through standardized tests.

We believe important goals for all students in a public education system are an understanding of the nature of democracy, the responsibilities of citizenship, the ability to think critically and the acquisition of skills necessary to continue to learn and function as adults in a complex society. Analysis of decades of education

research provides clear evidence that the single greatest predictor of unsuccessful education outcomes is socioeconomic inequality.

During the 2010-11 school year, the Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) rate of economically disadvantaged students was 61.7 percent, nearly three times the national rate. Obviously, LCPS teachers and administrators face huge challenges.

Yet, in spite of these challenges, over the last several years for which there is available data for the student cohorts graduating in 2008, 2009, and 2010, the high school graduation rate went up more than 17 points from 54 percent to 71.2 percent. The overall state rate for children living in poverty is 30 percent (half that of LCPS) and the state graduation rate was 67.3 percent in 2010.

Additionally, careful examination of the reading and math proficiency scores posted on the LCPS website for the school year 2010-2011 shows that most schools made marked progress in student achievement even though many failed by a few percentage points of meeting the higher standards set by the Public Educa-tion Department for that year.

In summary, we believe that the LCPS administrators and teachers have made remarkable progress and deserve much credit. However, to change the outcomes for all students to the extent that represents true success for all, it will take a robust effort on the part of parents and community leaders to collaborate with students, schools and elected officials to support the needed changes that will make this achievement possible.

# Financing an education

### NMSU helps students address the challenges

One of the most important decisions students make when planning for their higher education is whether to take on debt.

The decisions students make have a long-range impact, so we at New Mexico State University, including our community colleges in Alamogordo, Carlsbad, Doña Ana County and Grants, do all that we can to help students meet the costs of their education. Keeping our costs affordable is important, but so is helping students make informed decisions that will best fit their educational goals, family circumstances, career choices and other considerations.

The first way NMSU helps is to keep costs down. We strive to do everything possible in this regard, despite facing the challenges of shrinking state revenues and our need to retain and recruit excellent faculty. One way to measure the affordability of an education at NMSU is to compare our costs with those of similar institutions in the region. Such a comparison shows that NMSU's costs are competitive with regional universities, and our tuition and fees are less than most of our peer institutions.

NMSU also works with students to help them get financial aid. Our Office of Financial Aid and Scholarship Services helps students understand the different rules and obligations for grants, scholarships, loans and work study funds. We help students through the application process so they can qualify for assistance when they are eligible. When NMSU students consider taking out loans to help pay for college, they get entrance counseling and annual counseling each subsequent year they are enrolled in the NMSU system. Federal regulations require this counseling only for first-time borrowers; we do it for all borrowers.

Former students who are now paying off their loans were recently helped by the new U.S. Department of Education

Income Borrower Repayment Plans. These new guidelines limit some students to loan payments of no more than 10 percent of their disposable income and can decrease the interest rate for students who have more than one type of loan.

Keeping costs low and helping students get aid for which they are eligible has been a good approach for our students. NMSU was recently recognized in the U.S. News & World Report list of Best National Universities for 2012 because the average student debt for our graduates is among the lowest in the country.

Our efforts to keep costs affordable have helped the university receive other national recognition. Last year, NMSU improved its

standing in Washington Monthly's annual College Guide, jumping more than 50 places and ranking among the top 150 in the guide's "National University" category. Washington Monthly's rankings consider traditional measures of quality such as research, but also contribution to the public good. Their rankings value recruiting and graduating low-income students, producing cutting-edge research and encouraging students to give something back to their community.

Across the nation, students have been challenged by the costs of higher education. Families are often limited in what they can financially contribute to meet these costs, so many students have no choice but to obtain loans to cover the costs of their education.

We admire their determination, their commitment to obtaining an education and their steadfast work toward graduation. We also do everything we can to help our students understand the complex choices they face when it comes to addressing the financial challenges of obtaining a first-rate education at NMSU.



### Guided hikes at monument

The Prehistoric Trackways National Monument is now offering guided hikes to the Discovery Site where 2,500 slabs of trackways were excavated by citizen scientist Jerry MacDonald and now make up the Jerry MacDonald Paleozoic Trackways collection at the New Mexico Museum of Natural History and Science.

The trackways contain footprints of numerous amphibians, reptiles and insects (including previously unknown species), plants and petrified wood dating back 280 million years, which collectively provide new opportunities to understand animal behaviors and environments from a time predating dinosaurs. The site contains the most scientifically significant Early Permian track sites in the world.

The Prehistoric Trackways National Monument was established in 2009 to conserve, protect and enhance the unique and nationally important paleontological, scientific, educational, scenic and recreational resources and values of the Robledo Mountains in southern New Mexico. The monument includes a major deposit of Paleozoic Era fossilized footprint megatrackways within approximately 5,280 acres.

The hikes, which will be offered on certain dates this spring, are about two miles long and are guided by a park ranger. The ranger will meet hikers at the wayside exhibits off of Permian Track Road. Hikes are scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturdays, March 17 and 31; 9 a.m. Saturday, April 14; and 8 a.m. Saturday, April 28.





payment requirement to their retirement fund. Now, that won't be necessary and the money can be put back into the regular budget, he

Overall, there is a 2.2 percent increase in state funding formula for schools. Rounds said there was some money in the formula directed to specific districts, so LCPS will probably only see a 1.2 percent increase in funding. With payroll accounting for more than 84 percent of the budget, that means there will be little additional funding for employee pay increases, he said.

The district won't receive a final unit value until April, Rounds said. A draft budget should be ready by the end of April and finalized by the end of May, he said

In terms of planning ahead for the budget process, Rounds said the district had saved money on utilities, but the state Public Regulation Commission approved a rate increase for El Paso Electric Co. that recategorized schools as an industrial user. He said that amounts to a 28 percent rate increase to the schools and puts pressure on the budget.

Although teacher and school leader evaluation bills died in committee, Education Secretary Hanna Skandera may still redefine teacher evaluation for certification, Rounds said.

Passing the Legislature, however, was a home-schooling bill that will allow, with

funding support, home-schooled students to participate in extracurricular activities.

Other legislation gave school districts financial flexibility to adjust class sizes and other decisions to balance their budgets. That New Mexico received a federal waiver for the No Child Left Behind education reform standards means that schools can now totally replace it with the new A-F grading system, he said. The new system is superior because

Finally, a law to make public officials convicted of corruption felonies pay back their salaries was passed and signed by Gov. Susana Martinez. Rounds joked that school board members probably didn't have to worry about that since they aren't paid for their service.

Ricardo Rel, NMSU senior director of government affairs, said he is much happier about

reporting results from this session than the last two, in which the institution took a number of hits.

NMSU was able to accomplish improvements in the portion of the budget for instruction and general operations, Rel said. The Legislature also approved money to help higher education institutions transition to a new formula that will provide different levels of state support depending on outcomes, he said. Another good piece of news was lawmakers not withholding funding based on anticipated tuition increases, he said.

Since 2009, NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service, Agricultural Experimental

Stations and New Mexico Department of Agriculture all saw erosion of funding by more than 20 percent of their budgets, he said. Some of that money is now coming back, he said. With \$500,000 in new money for the Cooperative Extension Service, \$300,000 for the experimental stations and restored funding to many of the NMDA's programs, he said.

it ties funding to providing support GISLATIVE that have been taken away in the services for improving failing schools, he said.

Similar to the public schools, the Legislature public officials convicted of corruption felonies schools. Education Retirement Fund for higher education to help avoid employees having to pay in more, he said.

In terms of funding for construction projects, the Legislature approved more than \$30 million for the NMSU system, which also include projects for branch campuses and Doña Ana Community Col-

Lawmakers also extended a tax exemption for acts coming to the Pan American Center to help it draw acts that might take advantage of a similar break in El Paso.

### Bills signed so far

Besides signing the law to allow judges to impose additional financial penalties on public officials convicted of corruption, Martinez has signed a couple of other bills into laws.

One new law will allow ranchers to get hay to their herds using oversized trucks, which is in response to the ongoing drought.

Martinez signed House Bill 33, sponsored by Rep. Conrad James, R-Albuquerque, and Sen. Howie Morales, D-Silver City, which will allow the state to designate hospitals as primary stroke centers and make it easier for them to provide higher-quality care to patients who have suffered from a stroke. Under the new law, the Department of Health will be able to designate acute care hospitals as stroke centers, which will particularly increase access to stroke care for individuals living in rural communities.

"Heart disease and stroke are the leading causes of death in New Mexico," Martinez said. "It's extremely important that we take steps like this to ensure that people have access to the care they need in the event of a lifethreatening medical situation like a stroke. I hope that all New Mexicans embrace healthy lifestyle choices so we can reduce the rate of heart-related illnesses."

area from the work that caused his son - who does suffer from asthma - to become so ill.

Hunter has had breathing difficulties before, but nothing this severe, Bañales said. Right before the breathing problem that grew severe over last weekend, Bañales said the remodeling work area had a strong chemical smell similar to paint.

Bañales said he previously raised concerns about the remodeling in an anonymous call to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Bañales said he didn't reveal his name then because his wife Crystal frequently volunteers at the school and they didn't want to lose that interaction.

LCPS spokeswoman Jo Galvan said OSHA cleared the project then, as well as the state environmental department. She said parents should never be afraid to approach district officials about safety

"We have a lot construction projects in the district and we do a really good job of keeping students safe while that work is being done," she said. "Student safety is our most important concern."

Contrary to some assertions by parents, district officials said there is no asbestos in the school, which was built in 1985 when asbestos was no longer used. Late last year, some staff and parents had complained about a burning smell, but that came from metal pipes that were heated for fittings, according to Galvan.

Rounds acknowledged the concerns at Highlands, but said he was confident from previous air-quality monitoring reports that the air is safe at the school.

Bañales said his son's doctor is convinced the construction caused the breathing problems and has written a letter to allow the boy to stay home as long as the school construction is taking place.

District officials had hoped to have the new air quality reports by Tuesday's school board meeting; they are sent to out-ofstate labs and testing for chemicals can take longer than just checking for dust.

same kind of support to existing businesses for expansion that is often used to attract new businesses.

Another recent revision centers around anticipated growth surrounding Spaceport America.

The new plan also revised housing assumptions and set the population goal at 70 percent urban and 30 percent rural.

Proposed action items look out only to 2016 and the government entities can revisit them after three years.

City Councillor Gill Sorg said, on the whole, it is a very good plan and would like to see it adopted. He suggested adding mention of the Butterfield Trail, which is currently being considered as a national trail.



Progressive games up to \$700

Mayor Pro Tem Sharon Thomas said she liked this version of the plan, but said groups playing roles in issues are not as inclusive as they could be. Maybe other groups can be added

Thomas disputed the report's emphasis on agriculture for economic development, saying that part of the county's economy has not been growing much. By comparison, she said, there is very little emphasis on the potential for economic development in renewal energies, especially solar.

Councillor Greg Smith said the report gives a lot of good guidance for the future.

Councillor Miguel Silva said he still had some problems with the report, but it has taken too long to get to this point and

Silva agreed that the county is a dynamic, evolving area so the reviews should take place more frequently than every three

He questioned the report's assertion that there's enough water for growth foreseen in the plan.

Councillor Olga Pedroza said the report did not address "alternative jobs," saying the current economy is causing new kinds of job creation.

### Occupy Las Cruces blocks change

In other business, the council didn't approve new language that would have limited how long a group, such as Occupy Las Cruces, can camp at a city park. The city parks and recreation board recommended a limit of seven days.

Mayor Ken Miyagishima said he agreed there should be some limits in case a protest activity interfered with other uses for a park, such as youth soccer games.

Councillor Nathan Small said there were no real problems with Occupy Las Cruces camping at Albert Johnson Park.

'This is strong medicine when strong medicine wasn't

needed," he said. "I can't support this."

Sorg said the parks and rec board needed to reconsider the issue and try to reach a compromise.

Occupiers spoke passionately to the council about how the proposed rule would hurt free speech and the right to peacefully assemble. They also noted that they paid \$2,000 in fees to stay at the park a little more than three months.

Erica Samuel said the occupy movement is about objecting to the growing economic disparity in the United States.

"I truly believe that the proposed ordinance by parks and recreation is absolutely a response to Occupy Las Cruces and is unquestionably an attempt to limit Las Crucens' right to free speech and free assembly," she said. "I implore of you, see this act as what it is: an attempt to silence the screams of the disenfranchised, an attempt to allow those of us with privilege to avoid confronting the cost of that privilege. Please do not participate in the silencing but instead strike down the motion which eradicates our civil liberties.'

Jason Burke said the proposal was the result of a few detractors of the occupy movement.

Saying there are two sides to each issue, developer Eddie Binns said there are constituents concerned about what the tent city in the park was showing to visitors.

"If you want to change things, then vote," he said.

Occupiers said their effort was to raise awareness so people will make different choices when they vote. Dave Dickerson responded that tent cities are a long established form of expression in this country.

Silva said he agreed that there needed to be a solution found so parks are available to the whole community.

Small motioned to strike the rules on camping, which the council approved with Silva as the lone "no" vote on the amendment. The council then unanimously approved other new rules for parks without the camping provision change.

# Pilot John Glenn adds 'glory and prestige to our country'

### First American in orbit a major accomplishment

Twenty-two years before Clara Peller barked "Where's the beef?" for Wendy's hamburgers, Caroline Kennedy, age 4, asked John Glenn, "Where's the monkey?"

Glenn related the story, to a joint session of the Congress, Feb. 26, 1962 after spending time with President John Kennedy, Jackie Kennedy and Caroline, during John Glenn Day in Washington, D.C.

Six days earlier, aboard his Mercury capsule Friendship VII, Glenn had become the first American to orbit Earth. A flight carrying the chimpanzee Enos had preceded him, which apparently got the first daughter's attention.

"I think Caroline really cut us

"I think Caroline really cut us down to size and put us back in our proper position," Glenn joked. (Columbia Records released the audio of Glenn's mission and congressional speech on the LP, "Roger, Friendship 7!")

The Associated Press, in a Feb. 27 story in the Daytona Beach Morning Journal headlined "Glenn's Day of

Glory," summarized the event thusly: "A grinning, balding redhead, his proud family, unrelenting rain, fellow astronauts sharing the plaudits, soaked throngs cheering, waving and shouting, the nation's leaders paying tribute to a hero who spoke

humble confident words. Those were the basic ingredients of John H. Glenn Jr.'s big day in the nation's capital."

Of the heavy rains, The AP reported "bad weather, the bugaboo that dogged his initial efforts to get into orbit, followed Glenn yesterday. But there was no sign it dampened his spirits any." The webpage aerospaceguide. net said weather delayed launches for nearly a

month, beginning on Jan. 27. Glenn's congressional speech lasted 16 minutes, according to The

AP. House Speaker John McCormack

introduced Glenn as "a brave and courageous American," and "a hero in World War II and in the Korean Conflict, who recently, in a most notable manner, added glory and prestige to our country."

After more than half a minute of applause and cheering (similar ovations followed), Glenn told

those present: "I'm certainly glad to see that pride in our country and its accomplishments are not a thing of the past." He then pointed out that only three years had passed "from the original vision of the Congress" for NASA, "to consummation of this orbital flight."

Among the experiences Glenn described was zero-G. "Lack of

gravity is a rather fascinating thing," he said. "Objects in the cockpit can be parked in mid-air ... at one time during the flight I was using a small hand-held camera. Another system needed attention at that particular moment as I started to take a picture, so it seemed quite natural ... to park the camera here in the air, go ahead and do what I wanted, and then take up the camera again and go on about the business."

The April 1962 Sky and Telescope declared the mission the "first American manned satellite," because Glenn orbited. Among the successes he touted was that "man can operate intelligently in space." (Some scientists argued that, in vacuum, the brain would cease to function, causing death.)

The magazine also stressed the importance of a pilot being in

control, describing how "late in the first revolution the capsule began to yaw, and Glenn thereafter used the manual control stick to operate the superheated-steam jets for regulating the vehicle's orientation."

Glenn was optimistic regarding how NASA would benefit all mankind.

"I feel we're on the brink of an area of expansion of knowledge about ourselves and our surroundings that is beyond description and comprehension," Glenn said. "Our efforts today and what we've done so far are but small building blocks on a huge pyramid to come. Questions are sometimes raised regarding the immediate payoffs of our efforts. What benefits are we gaining from the money spent? Well, the real benefits we probably cannot even detail; they're probably not even known to man today. But exploration, and the pursuit of knowledge, have always paid dividends in the long run, usually far greater than at the outset.'

Glenn's optimism bore fruit. By 1986, according to that year's Spinoff (an annual NASA publication), nearly 4,000 "NASA patented inventions (were) available for licensing" in such areas as food, medical, safety and communication.

Glenn concluded his speech with:

"As our knowledge of this universe in which we live increases, may God grant us the wisdom and knowledge to use it wisely."

Afterward, McCormack praised the talk as "the greatest I ever have seen in Congress," the AP reported.

Only one of the Mercury astronauts, the story said, was absent from the festivities. Gordon Cooper "was unable to make it back in time from Australia, where he manned one of the listening posts which kept tabs on Glenn's flight." In his 2000 autobiography "Leap of Faith," Cooper praised Glenn as "a wonderful spokesman not only for NASA but for America"; and described him as "a freckle-faced Tom Sawyer type with a sunny smile who ... was awfully good at charming his way in or out of about any situation."

Glenn was "the fifth man to have traveled in a space capsule," Sky and Telescope documented. The first four were Soviet cosmonauts Yuri Gagarin and Gherman Titov, and astronauts Alan Shepard and Virgil "Gus" Grissom.



### Real NASA flight director to make appearance

Two men who played critical roles in manned moon exploration will make appearances at events next month for the 40th anniversary of the Apollo 16 mission.

They are Charlie Duke, the 10th man to walk on the moon, and Gene Kranz, the NASA flight director portrayed by Ed Harris in the 2002 film "Apollo 13."

The Ron Howard film starring Tom Hanks as astronaut James Lovell will be shown during the celebration as a fundraiser Thursday, March 8, at the Allen Theatres Cineport 10 in Mesilla Valley Mall.

Tickets are on sale for \$20 for the film's two special showings at 4 and 7:30 p.m. Duke and Kranz will make a special appearance after the first showing.

Those who purchase tickets by Thursday, March 1, will be eligible for autographed photos by Kranz, as well as opportunities to have their pictures taken with Kranz and Duke. Additional prizes include commemorative coins made from parts of the Apollo rocket.

Tickets for the showings are avail-

able only at www.apollo40.org.

Proceeds will benefit charities chosen by the two. Kranz will donate his portion to Habitat for Humanity in the Houston area. Duke will donate his portion to Astronaut Scholarship Foundation.

The event is sponsored by the Fellowship of Las Cruces Area Rocketry

Enthusiasts (FLARE) and Southern New Mexico Science, Engineering, Mathematics, and Aerospace Academy (SEMAA).

On Friday, March 9, a commemoration launch event will be held at the New Mexico State University main campus starting at 9:30 a.m. at the Aggie Memorial Stadium east parking lot. There will be actual launch demonstrations of scale replicas of some historic White Sands Rockets (V-2, Wac Corporal, and Little Joe II) as well as vehicles from the NASA manned space program (Mercury Redstone, Mercury Atlas, Thor-Agena, Atlas-Agena, Gemini-Titan, Saturn IB, and Space Shuttle).

The event includes a reenactment of the Apollo 16 Saturn V moon rocket launch from a working replica of Launch Complex 39.

Highlights will include a celebration of the 50th anniversary of John Glenn's Friendship 7 flight and the Space Shuttle Program.

The rest of the day's activities will be held at the Pan Am Center and will include hands-on and static displays from Spaceport America, the Las Cruces Museum of Natural History, NASA Johnson Space Center White Sands Test Facility. The New Mexico Museum of Space History, the National Solar Observatory and FLARE, among

During the day, Duke and Kranz will give a presentation on "Inventchallenges of the Apollo program.

The Friday activities are free to the public. About 1,200 middle school students are expected to participate in the day's events.
On Saturday, March 10, Kranz

will be making an appearance at the New Mexico Museum of Space History in Alamogordo to be inducted into the International Space Hall of Fame.

"We are privileged and honored to have both NASA Flight Director Gene Kranz and astronaut Charlie Duke as guest speakers for this event," said Event Director David Kovar of FLARE.

Kranz has a long. storied career with NASA. His first challenge as a NASA employee was to establish the Project Mercury Global Communication Network.

After Project Mercury he went on to become the White Team flight director for both Project Gemini and Apollo. He is best known for being the flight director for the Apollo 11 Moon landing and the Tiger Team flight director for the Apollo 13 rescue effort that was dramatized in the "Apollo 13" film.

Duke was Kranz's Capsule Communications (CAPCOM) for the Apollo 11 moon landing. He was the only person to have direct communication with Neal Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin as they descended to the lunar surface.

After Armstrong reported that the Eagle had landed on Tranquility


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



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# Hernst effort



A little less than a year ago - March 19, 2011, to be exact – the New Mexico State University practice gym was quiet except for a couple of staff members and the bouncing of a lone basketball.

It was 9 a.m. the first Saturday after the Aggie men's basketball season ended.

By all logic, the Aggie players should have been taking a well-deserved week of rest. Or at least sleeping late. And for all I know, they were.

Except one.
I happened to be at the gym that day, and I saw who was bouncing that basketball. And shooting that basketball. It was Aggie point guard Hernst

Laroche.

"His work ethic has been a big influence on me," said Aggie freshman Daniel Mullings, like Laroche, a Canadian. "He always comes in early and gets extra shots and extra reps. He's always working on his craft, and he provides great leadership." Saturday, Feb. 18, in front of a disap-

pointingly small Aggie home crowd, Laro-che showed fruits of the labor that began 11 months ago.

A half minute into the game, he drained a three-pointer. Two minutes later, he hit another to put the Aggies up 8-5. They led the rest of the way, en route to their 20th victory of the season. Laroche would make a third three-point attempt and finish with 17 points and only one turnover.

When this season ends, he will be the Aggies' career leader in games played, minutes played and steals, and second in

He has already earned his bachelor's degree in government and politics and is taking graduate courses toward an MBA. From Quebec, Laroche's native language is French and he also speaks Creole, English and some Spanish.

He never had Mexican food before arriving in Las Cruces in 2008 but, now, his most commonly used Spanish phrase is, "Enchiladas chile verde, por favor."

"I love green chile enchiladas," he said. From time to time, Laroche will spice things up on the court as well.
When NMSU beat Utah State on the

road Feb. 11, Laroche pulled off one of the most memorable plays of the season. While defending the USU point guard at the top of the key, Laroche was tripped. He hit the ground, rolled over and popped back up just in time to block the shooter's shot. Laroche then retrieved the ball and dribbled ahead for a breakaway layup.

During his sophomore year, Laroche hit a game-winning buzzer beater to defeat Louisiana Tech at the Pan Am.

But Laroche said his proudest accomplishment as an Aggie was a team effort: winning the WAC tournament in 2010 to earn a trip to the NCAAs.

NMSU, led by Laroche and fellow seniors Wendell McKines and Hamidu Rahman, have a solid chance of doing

### NMSU hosts San Jose State

Aggie fans will probably get their last close-up look at a remarkable trio of players when New Mexico State University hosts San Jose State at 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 25, in the Pan American Center.

Seniors Hernst Laroche, Wendell McKines and Hamidu Rahman will play what is most likely their last game on the Pan Am's parquet floor that night. There have been few times in Aggie history when three players have made such an impact on the program over a similar time period.

All three have scored more than 1,000 points in their Aggie careers, and they are all well represented on New Mexico State's list of all-time records.

Laroche has played more minutes than any Aggie in history (4,118 as of Wednesday, Feb. 22), and is only eight steals behind all-time NMSU steals leader William Benjamin. He is second among career assist leaders with 516, only 76 behind leader Sam Crawford's 592.

McKines is only the second player in school history to pass the 1,000 mark in both scoring and rebounding. McKines is second on the school's career rebounding list with 1,042, behind Sam Lacey's 1,265.

Rahman also has racked up an appearance on the school's all-time lists. The Somerset, N.J., native is currently third in blocked shots with 122 and will pass Slab Jones (124) for second place with three more blocks. The Aggies' alltime shot-blocker is James Moore

In addition to saying goodbye to

three Aggie greats, attendees at Saturday's game will see an Aggie team that is playing its best basketball of the season. Prior to hosting Hawai'i Thursday, Feb. 23, the Aggies have won six of their least seven games and 15 of their last 19.

Coach Marvin Menzies said he is pleased with the way the Aggies are playing, but warns all that can change on any given night.

"We are playing well lately," Menzies said. "Is it fool's gold, is it live, is it Memorex? We'll find out here in the next game and hopefully we'll play well in the next game and keep it going."

One thing that has been going for the Aggies is their 3-point shooting. At Utah State on Feb. 11, the team was 7-of-11, for 63.6 percent, and in the BracketBuster game against Drake on Feb. 18, they were 7-of-13 for 53.8 percent. On the season the Aggies are just shooting just 32.3 percent.

"I think shooting is confidence," Menzies said.

He said he feels it is important for players to know when coaches have the confidence to allow them to keep shooting it when they have open shots.

'You have to draw up an offense and have a system where you guys are confortable shooting when they are open," he said. "You can't get gun shy and not take open shots.

"I'll pull out of the game for not taking open shots," Menzies said.

After Saturday's game, the Aggies will travel to Reno, Nev., to play league leading Nevada at 9 p.m. Thursday, March 1, on ESPN2, before finishing the regular season at Fresno State at 8 p.m. Saturday,

### Softball team begins road trip to California


The New Mexico State softball team completed a home-and-home sweep of UTEP with a 9-5 victory over the Miners at the Helen of Troy Softball Complex Tuesday, Feb. 21.

NMSU (10-2) took the lead in the top of the third inning with four runs on four hits to take a 4-0 advantage into the fourth over UTEP (4-5).

Junior Alex Newman started in the circle for the Aggies. The right hander earned the win, giving up five runs on nine hits in six and a third innings pitched to improve to 7-1 this season.

After two scoreless innings, NMSU put four consecutive batters on base against UTEP starter Colleen Hohman. With one out, sophomore Valerie Swedberg singled to start the rally. Freshman Kelsey Dodd walked and classmate Jackie Candelaria came into the game as a pinch runner.

Freshman Staci Rodriguez doubled to bring

The Aggies added one in the fourth when a leadoff walk by sophomore Kristi Covarrubia led to an unearned run after a Miner error. Swedberg hit a deep sacrifice fly to score Covarrubia from third.

UTEP hit a solo home run to right center to cut the Aggie lead to 5-1 after four innings.

The Aggies kept the offense going in the fifth, extending the lead to 7-1. Kaaihue hit a one-out single and junior Amber Olive walked. Another walk to senior Tiare Jennings loaded the bases before Swedberg ripped another double to score a pair of runs with two outs.

The Miners posted an inside-the-park grand slam in the bottom of the sixth when a fly ball got past a diving Olive, dribbling to the left field wall. The four runs cut the Aggie lead down to 7-5 headed into the final inning.

NMSU added a pair of insurance runs in the top of the seventh. Jennings hit a two-out double. Swedberg followed with a double to score Jennings. A single by freshman pinch hitter Malena Padilla scored Swedberg to make it 9-5 heading into the bottom of the seventh.

Newman got the first Miner batter to strike out, but allowed a single to the next batter. Freshman Karysta Donisthorpe came on to get the final two outs.

The Aggies travel to the Cathedral City Classic in Palm Springs, Calif., and will play five games this weekend beginning Friday, Feb. 24, against San Diego State. Other opponents include Long Island and three top-25 teams from the Pac-12 in No. 3 Cal, No. 14 Stanford and No. 19 Oregon.

The New Mexico State women's basketball team beat San Jose State, 56-55, in the home finale on senior



# The things I like most about golf

### From great people to great shots – my top-10 golf list

It seems like the world of sports pays great attention to "top 10s."

College football matchups get max hype when two top-10 teams play. The top-10 professional golfers in the world are pretty darn good. A "No. 1" in sports is the goal, but "10" in life is good, too. Bo Derek was a "10." One of the all-time best selling Adidas athletic shoes was its "Top 10" model court shoe. And of course, there are the Ten Commandments, but I'll leave that for a later writing.

Respecting the prevailing culture, I'm going to devote some space here to top 10s. Actually I have to give credit for the top-10 idea to a publication called the Michigan Golfer. They invite their readers to submit their personal top-10 lists of everything imaginable in golf: like top-10 golf holes; top-10 all-time chokes; top-10 greatest shots. Taking their lead, I'm inviting you to submit your top-10s to me by email. It should be interesting. I can't promise publication, but I can promise I'll read them.

Here, my top-10 list this time concerns the things I personally like most about playing golf. I play a lot of golf, and I've thought much about why I play. But this is different. This is about the pleasures and the joys I derive from playing at golf. I base my ideas on the premise that, unless you're a true masochist (some, including Jack Nicklaus, think golfers are), you do something recreational to have fun. Not to beat yourself up. My 10 thoughts are not in any order of priority.

No. 1. One of the things I like most about

shot or do something truly special on the golf course. It doesn't matter whether you're a scratch golfer or a 30 handicapper, you are going to have special moments in golf that you can look back on and know that it couldn't have been done better - by anyone. That is one of the magic things about golf.

No. 2. I love golf because of the blurring and spanning of generations when we are together on the golf course. Fortunately, I can still play decently enough to challenge some of the younger studs that I get to play with. It's a joy to play with young, flat-belly tour hope-

fuls who hit the ball as well as anyone making \$1 million in golf; it's just that they need a chance to play events that have that kind of

money. I also play along with 70-something buddies who shoot lights-out. When I moved to Las Cruces in 1988 and occupied some of my spare moments at the New Mexico State University Golf Course, I knew right away that it was a great opportunity to play golf with all ages. I now have lasting friendships with young people who (as it turns out) I have mentored from the PGM program. But I also appreciate the older aspect. I played golf with my (late) father up until he was 90.

He would hit a shot, I vividly remember, and maybe it would not get more than a few feet off the ground. Then, as bent-over as he was, he would then analyze his grip and his stance, and mutter to me about what he did wrong. I didn't fully appreciate that sense of dedication at the time, but despite his ad-

No. 3. I value the friends I have made through golf more than just about anything. When I was recovering in the hospital exactly a year ago, my wife and my golfing friends helped get me through it. I don't necessarily play with the same few people every day. I play different courses with different groups. Still, I feel like the most blessed person on the planet when I think of the wonderful friends I get to play golf with. Sure we compete, and try to win a few bucks from each other. Competition is what makes us try harder and perform better. If you don't agree with that you

> play any sports. Heck, even the fly fishermen are competing with the trout.

No. 4. Again, back to people. I have made

lasting friendships through golf. Some friendships transcend golf and precede golf. These old friends tell me golf has made them feel better.

One example is my former high school football coach, a terrific gentleman by the name of Bill Kingzette, who coached football for some 30 years, during which time he was an NFL official for 12 years. He was a forceful person who had a considerable influence on my growing up. Today we play golf together twice a year – in January at his winter home in Florida and again at a golf course he owns up north.

I don't get to play golf with my former swimming coach at Notre Dame, but I do get the pleasure of having him come out to the Notre Dame golf course and watch me play when I visit South Bend. At those special times I feel I'm truly blessed.

No. 5. All the senses are involved with golf. I love the smell of the wet grass and the dust in the wind. Not every day for the wind, mind you. Sound is the most amazing thing of all in golf. Golf legend and NBC analyst Johnny Miller recently remarked that he can tell even in the booth how a shot was hit simply by the sound it makes. He can tell if it is one groove high or one groove low, or fat or thin. I like the sound of clubs rattling in the bag; the birds singing, the sound of sand as it caroms off the club in a bunker. I love the sound of the ball finding the cup. I absolutely adore the sound of a crisp iron shot, where I know the ball was trapped between the center of the

No. 6. Being able to play golf when traveling is a real joy. I hardly ever go anywhere where I can't somehow manage a round of golf. I keep a spare set of clubs in Dallas, and now in Denver, and I used to keep clubs in Cleveland when I went there more than once a year. It beats dragging them through airports, and paying the exorbitant airline baggage fees. Playing new courses is always a joy - and a challenge - since you have no local knowledge, and must test your wits against an alien layout.


No. 7. You may not relate to this, but I enjoy teaching golf. I don't teach golf in the manner of a PGA professional, but I do coach players of all ability levels in how to perform better, given their talents. My mentor has been hall-of-fame coach Herb Wimberly, who told me years ago that he would like me along side him to teach our students at Performance Golf Schools. That was a memorable moment in my golfing life. It is just as satisfying to me to help a beginner discover that he or she actually can become twice as good, as it is to take a prospective tour player and double his confidence that he can play with the best.

No. 8. Like my father and my grandfather, I like the process. I confess I don't like failure and I don't like losing. Each time that it happens I try to learn something. My father said, "Forget the mistake, but don't forget the lesson." He was right. Golf is a process – a never-ending process of striving and improvement. Especialin putting, which is the great equalizer.

No. 9. The fusion of technology, skill and equipment is quite appealing to me. Today golf really has a fetish with technology, maybe too much so. I would love to play a match with friends of equal ability, all using the same throwback equipment, like hickory-shafted irons. Shotmaking. But I also like the idea of a laser rangefinder, since we don't have caddies who go out the day before and walk off yardages. I like the fact that tour golf has become athletic, favoring those competitors with strength, flexibility, brains and stamina. Golf now has almost everything.

No. 10. If you have read anything I have ever written about golf you know that I believe golf is a metaphor for life. I also see golf as a metaphor, and a fantastic learning opportunity for you and I, to become better as people and as leaders. For example, golf has rules. If you break the rules you get penalized. Some folks don't subscribe to that notion, but the reality is, that's life.


### Three to enter NMSU Hall of Fame Bickerstaff, Lopez and Wragge are the class of 2012

The New Mexico State University Athletics Department, in conjunction with US Bank, has announced the 2012 inductees into the US Bank/New Mexico State Athletics Hall of Fame. The class of 2012 will include former Aggie head athletic trainer C.R. "Brick" Bickerstaff

(posthumously), former sports information director (SID) at NMSU Dave Lopez and former Aggie football stand-

out Tony Wragge.

Bickerstaff was the first person to ever hold the position of head athletic trainer at NMSU. He joined the staff New Mexico State in 1955 when the university was still known as New Mexico A&M Col-



Before coming to NMSU, Bickerstaff was the head athletic trainer and assistant coach at Arkansas State. Aside from being the first head trainer at NMSU, Bickerstaff also opened the first athletic training room at the university. He was the head athletic trainer at NMSU until 1961 when he left for the same position at Iowa State.

Bickerstaff remained the head athletic trainer at Iowa State until 1969 when he was promoted to an assistant athletic director position. He left Iowa State in 1971 to become an assistant athletic director at

Florida State University. In 1973, Bickerstaff left Florida State for an assistant athletic director position at Vanderbilt University, a position he held until his retirement in 1990.

After his retirement, Bickerstaff remained in Tennessee

and became the executive secretary of the Middle Tennessee Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (NFF), a national nonprofit organization committed to ensuring the future of amateur football. Bickerstaff remained in this position until his death in 2007.

Las Cruces native Lopez served as the SID at NMSU from 1974 to 1979. As the SID, he was in charge of publicity and media relations for all NMSU athletic programs. Lopez, who has bachelor's and master's degrees in education from NMSU, started working for the athletic department as an undergraduate student assistant.

After receiving his bachelor's degree in 1974, Lopez was immediately hired by the athletic department as its SID. During his time at NMSU, Lopez' writing skills earned him various

awards for his publications, and he twice served as president of the New Mexico Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association. After earning his master's degree in 1979, Lopez decided to leave NMSU to embark on a telecommunications career.

Lopez worked for 22 years with SBC Communications (now AT&T) ultimately becoming president of the com-

pany in Texas and Oklahoma.

In 2001, Texas Gov. Rick Perry appointed Lopez to the board of regents for the Texas Tech University System, a position he held until 2003.

On Jan. 27, 2011, Oklahoma Gov. Mary Fallin ap-

pointed Lopez as her secretary of commerce and tourism, a position that Lopez still holds.

Lopez has received various honors and awards including induction in the Oklahoma City University Commerce and Industry Hall of Honor, the Corporate Advocate Award from the Tulsa Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and the Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Oklahoma City chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Lopez currently resides in Oklahoma City with his wife, Lana, and has five children and seven grandchildren.

Current NFL player Wragge was a standout offensive guard for the Aggie football team

from 1998 to 2001. He was a big part of an offense that constantly ranked among the nation's leaders in rushing vards and total offensive vards.

During his freshman year in 1998, Wragge saw action in 11 games, mostly

on special teams. An injury to starting right guard Jason Berger before the final game of the season at North Texas, however, gave Wragge the opportunity to get his first start at NMSU, an opportunity he would not relinquish for the rest of his Aggie career. Wragge went on to start every game thereafter for the Aggies, a total of 34 consecutive games.

During the 1999 season, Wragge helped the NMSU offense reach its third-best total offensive output in school history. The Aggies also had their fifth-best total rushing offense in school history. NMSU finished the season ranked 31st nationally in total offense and 14th nationally in total rushing offense. Wragge was an honorable mention All-Big West selection.

As a junior in 2000, Wragge was selected as a team captain and anchored an offensive line

that helped the NMSU offense go from 31st in the nation in total offense the previous year to 17th in the nation. NMSU also set a school record for rushing yards in a season. The Aggies finished the season ranked sixth in the nation in rushing. Wragge was selected as a member of the second team All-Big West team.


In 2001, the school moved its athletic programs to the Sun Belt Conference. What didn't change, however, was Wragge's play on the field as a senior. Wragge, in his second vear as a team captain, once again anchored an offensive line that was one of the best in the conference. The Aggies once again had one of the best rushing seasons in school history, finishing with the fifthbest rushing total in school history.

Wragge's career after NMSU includes playing with three teams in the NFL and also one year (2005) in the Arena Football League with the Los Angeles Avengers. His NFL career includes stints with the Arizona Cardinals (2002-04) and the San Francisco 49ers (2006-10). Wragge ioined the St. Louis Rams in 2011. Throughout his NFL career, Wragge has played in a total of 82 games, starting in 23 of them.

Wragge met his wife, Nicole, while at NMSU. The couple has two daughters, Addison and Avery.

The official induction ceremony will be held at halftime of the NMSU versus San Iose State men's basketball game Saturday, Feb. 25, at the Pan American Center.

The US Bank/New Mexico State Athletics Hall of Fame seeks to recognize New Mexico State University student athletes, coaches, special benefactors and teams who have distinguished themselves in the field of athletics. either by virtue of their performance on athletic teams representing the university, or by meritorious efforts on behalf of athletics.

### 100yearsago

### 1912

- The Powers Motion Picture Company was on location on the San Augustine Ranch in the Organ Mountains filming a movie. Film company actors and San Augustine ranch hands re-created scenes of cattle rustling and banditry for use in the movie. Cowboys from the Cox and Isaacks ranches, including Bill Cox and undersheriff Felipe Lopez, became actors and assisted in depicting the scenes. One scene depicted a bullfighter being saved during a bullfight by two dogs from the Cox Ranch.
- The new Methodist church was beginning to become a reality and church leaders were hopeful it could be finished by the end of summer – in time for a planned convention.
- At 2 p.m. Feb. 15, Mr. Frank Campbell and Miss Corrine Amador were married at the parsonage of the Catholic church with Rev. Father Vandermaeson officiating. Bridesmaids were Josephine Armijo and Namacia Ascarate. The groom was attended by John W. Wyatt of El Paso and Emil Cardinal. After the wedding, the party retired to the home of Fabian Garcia where a large number of friends gathered to congratulate the couple.

### 75yearsago

### 1937

- The Doña Ana County Board of Trustees adopted a resolution to extend Highway 28 from La Union to the Texas state line. Cruz Alvarez, president of the Mesilla Chamber of Commerce, called the road one of the oldest trails in America, was used by Don Diego de Vargas when he reconquered New Mexico in 1692.
- The Aggies defeated the Tempe Bulldogs in Border Conference basketball action 42-27. The Aggies remained on top of the conference standings at 9-3, one game ahead of Arizona and two games ahead of Texas Tech.
- The graduating class at the state college voted to purchase an electric scoreboard for football and basketball games as its class gift. The seniors were hoping to receive assistance from the class of '38 as well.
- Two college instructors were married during the week when Miss Marion Payzant, a member of the English faculty at the state college, united with Mr. Benedict Hardman of Des Moines, Iowa. After the ceremony, Mr. Hardman returned to Des Moines, where the bride would join him at the conclusion of the school year.

### 50yearsago

### 1962

• The family of Melvin Lund, a blind man, asked Las Crucens for help in locating Mr.

Lund's dog Teddy. The missing dog was not a seeing-eye dog, but Lund "had learned to depend on him for a lot of things." The Lund family lived on the east side of the Bellamah addition at the end of Idaho Avenue Friends said they saw the dog at the Furr's on Solano Drive and again at the corner of Campo Street and Lucero Avenue A reward was offered.

• The Las Cruces High School Bulldogs were readying for their final regular-season game against arch-rival Gadsden. LCHS needed a win to claim a tie for the district title with Cobre, who would need to defeat Deming for part of the title as well. Both Las Cruces and Cobre were "odds-on favorites."

### 25yearsago

### 1987

- The Citizens for Education in Doña Ana County was formed to explore how the Doña Ana Branch Community College could be saved after the defeat of a bond election to fund the school on Feb. 3. In order for the school to survive, a new election would have to be held before Aug. 1. Jim Ikard of Citizens Bank would chair the committee.
- The Las Cruces City Council voted that the city had more pressing needs than a civic center and killed the project for the immediate future. Councilor Herculano Ferralez said the monies from a \$16.5 million bond issue passed in 1985 promoted as a way to fund the civic center could be used for other needs, such as providing service to recently annexed areas of the East Mesa.



# Bringing space technology from 'lab to living room'

### Lecture tops off NMSU's Engineering Week

New Mexico State University's College of Engineering continued its celebration of National Engineers Week with the 2012 Distinguished Bromilow Lecture and Faculty and

The 36-year tradition gives students, alumni, faculty, staff and visitors the opportunity to listen to distinguished members in the field of engineering in the name of Frank Bromilow, a former dean of the college.

This year, the college's deans invited Col. William Cooley, director for the Air Force Research Laboratory Space Vehicles Directorate, and Phillips Research Site and Materiel Wing commander at Kirtland Air Force Base.

"I am very pleased to be invited to speak," Cooley said, regarding the award ceremony's namesake. "Frank Bromilow clearly had a profound impact on this institution. I'm glad to be a part of advancing the principles he stood for."

Cooley's presentation was titled "Government Science and Engineering: Lab to Living Room." The presentation focused primarily on the research conducted at the AFRL, how it

becomes commercial products and the challenges researchers face in creating space technology.

"The lecture is going to be about some of the technology opportunities and challenges particularly related to space technology," Coolev said.

technology.

Instead of delving right into the specifics about research, Cooley chose to first speak about his father's time as a student at NMSU. His father's transcripts were projected onto the wall and humorously analyzed.

Adaptive optics was one example Cooley gave of technology devel-

gave of technology developed by AFRL that has become commercially used. Adaptive optics prevents images viewed through a telescope from becoming distorted due to turbulence in space.

"Today, virtually every astronomical observatory on the planet is using this technique so they can get clear resolution," Cooley said.

The image of a small, cubed satellite was shown as an example of technology that could become a part of our future, and help to get rid of the clutter of satellites and debris orbiting Earth.

"I hope people will have an appreciation for the challenges that we face in developing space technologies, as well as the commercial products that come out of that technology," Cooley

Cooley listed several challenges researchers face including, creating technology that can withstand

space's extremely harsh environment, creating satellites that are not only small, but also useful, space debris and preparing for future advancements in space technology.

Cooley concluded his presentation by





ships to fund and advance education and technology. NMSU and AFRL recently formed a partnership that allows the Laboratory to continue their level of research and development despite budget cuts, and benefit the university. "I believe in the educational partnership

that I recently signed with NMSU to help build up the technical programs they have," Cooley said about his decision to accept the invitation to speak. "And on a personal note, because my father is an NMSU grad, it was an opportunity to come down and see the campus."





### Real estate 'mother' dies

### Gerry Sells, 87, was beloved by Realtors

Editor's note: Gerry Sells, 87, died Sunday, Feb. 19. As a person respected in the market, the Bulletin had several opportunities to share her story with readers, such as when she won a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Las Cruces Association of Realtors in 2010. She also came up in stories from others in real estate. Realtor Stephanie Keepers told the Bulletin she owed her success to those in the industry before he, such as Sells. "She is kind of like Mother Superior of the real estate world," Keepers said. The following story is from the January 2011 edition of Neighbor to Neighbor.

Monarch Real Estate Corp. President Gerry Sells has mastered selling real estate over the past 24 years, but it hasn't always been easy.

Sells moved to New Mexico in 1937 and graduated from high school in Truth or Consequences in 1942, the same year she and her husband married. With him being in the Army, the two of them traveled through Washington, Texas and Čalifornia before settling down in the Land of Enchantment.

"I've worked for the Santa Fe railroad in Texas, worked and lived on a dairy farm, lived in Washington and California and then I moved to Las Cruces," she said. "There were

about 12,000 people in the city then, and there was still parking on Main Street. Subdivisions

we know now were still farmland and valleys." Even though a former boss had to convince Sells to pick up real estate, it's apparent she has a knack for the profession.

"I was the office manager for seven years for a real estate company," she said. "I learned real estate through experience."

Sells obtained her Realtor's license and began working in Las Cruces for Stanley Miller at Monarch Real Estate. After that, Sells and her partner Martha Price bought Monarch Real Estate in 1987. Price later retired and Sells' grandson bought her portion of the company.

"Selling isn't like it used to be," Sells explained. "There weren't lock boxes on houses back then. Instead of having the key right there

on the door, you had to go to the board office to pick them up. Lock boxes didn't come until the mid-to late 70s.

Other positive advances in real estate have been technology and inspection laws, she said, adding that new laws and contracts protect not only the broker, but also the seller and buyer.

Sells recalls a story about a co-worker who closed on a house sometime before inspection laws were put into effect.

"The sellers went through the house and took everything after the closing," she said. "The kitchen cabinets, appliances and anything they could remove from the house they took."

Although Realtors are now 60 percent women and 40 percent men, Sells said she remembers when women didn't have

the majority.

"More women came into real estate in the '60s with the establishment of the Women's Council," she said. "The council set up meetings, elected officers and addressed problems women were facing."


She added that not all male Realtors were in favor of bringing women into the profession.

Sells also thinks more women became Realtors because it was a reputable profession that allowed women to juggle work and household duties by setting their own hours.

Although still an excellent career for both men and women, Sells advises those seeking real estate jobs today to have a second form of income because the market is "slow and unpredictable."

But even in a slow and unpredictable economy, Sells has turned Monarch Real Estate into a profitable family business.

"People ask why I still work and I tell them because of the people.' I love the people and I


10 daughters born to the family.

With colder weather moving out, Las Crucens are anticipating the spring – a time for the flowers to bloom, closets to be freshened and taxes to be submitted.

Despite the extra day in February, the month is still flying by, and taxes will be due before you know it.

Instead of procrastinating, take the time to do your taxes. It will be one less stress when spring cleaning rolls around. Electronic filing and www.turbotax.com has made the process easier for those filing a 1040EZ form. Local companies such as Zia Tax also offer the services for

If you choose to file online, here are tips to move the process along:

- Organize your records before you begin. You'll need your current year tax documents as well as last year's tax
- Don't forget you will have to sign your return. You'll sign your e-filed return by entering last year's adjusted gross income or a five digit PIN that you create. To create a PIN, go to the IRS website and fill out its secure
- Pay your taxes. If you e-file and you owe, you can send a check to the U.S. Treasury, pay by credit card or authorize an electronic funds withdrawal.
- Get your refund. If you e-file and you're due a refund, you can arrange to have your check mailed to you or get it faster with direct deposit.
- Be secure. If you e-file your tax return using third party online software, make sure that the connection is secure. Identity theft can cause more headaches than it's worth, so look for https:// in the website you are filing
- Use common sense. If you use a shared computer, such as a computer at a public library, make sure you log out from the program and clear out the Web browser cache. It's recommended, however, that for the best security, not to use a shared computer.

### Virgin Galactic continues push to revise ITAR

### Arms control restrictions include private space flight businesses

Federal regulations that are relics of the Cold War and perpetuated by more recent concerns of terrorism have created a complex world for private spaceflight entrepreneurs, according to Virgin Galactic's key person for navigating in this world – Bruce Jackson, vice president for trade controls and export.

Jackson talked about hoops the company has to jump through to comply with rules during a High Tech Consortium of Southern New Mexico meeting Friday, Feb. 17.

Jackson said the main rules a private spaceflight company such as Virgin Galactic must comply with are the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR), which is best known in private spaceflight circles.

But the company must also comply with other laws and a variety of government agencies, Jackson said. Sometimes, nuanced interpretation of the restrictions can lead to significant fines and even jail time, he said.

Before working with Virgin Galactic, Jackson worked as a consultant for firms that also had to comply with the federal regulations.

ITAR falls under the Arms Export Control Act (AECA), and were shaped by fears that technology created for the benign use of transportation could be used for terrorism as were aircraft in the 9/11 attacks.

Because Virgin Galactic's spaceliner will have a rocket engine, it falls under a category of munitions that has the most restrictive rules. Besides launch vehicles, the "category four" list includes guided missiles, torpedoes, bombs and mines.

As a result, Virgin Galactic has had to create a totally independent U.S. company that isn't allowed to

share all its technology information with the British-based Virgin parent company, Jackson said. Likewise, Virgin Galactic is having to hire many Americans with its British employees restricted in the information they are allowed to know until they have completed the process of becoming U.S. citizens, he said.

So restrictive are the "category four" regulations that any application to the government is done "under the presumption of denial" as the starting point, Jackson said. Even if the information or technology is commonly known, he said they may not be shared with certain countries, such as China, Cuba, Iran, North Korea, Burma, Venezuela, Sudan and Syria.

"These rules (for munitions) were written in the Cold War when there were different realities," he

The company is currently working with federal regulators, he said, on what can be told to passengers for the purposes of giving

# NM has been foundering for decades

### New Mexico reforms: So close, yet so far

In 2011, Gov. Susana Martinez began the difficult task of trying to reform the governance of business, education, private-sector job creation and the scourge of fraud in our state.

As Martinez attempted to institute basic reforms, entrenched forces in the state legislature made passage of even the most basic changes nearly impossible. Here are four of many examples:

1. Putting crime syndicates out of business that market New Mexico's lax driver's license issuance laws to people in the U.S. illegally was a no-brainer, right? Nope. The Democratic leadership has stopped that reform effort twice.

2. Reforming the discredited practice of social promotion in our state education system would be easy if it had bipartisan support, right? Nope. That bipartisan effort has been stonewalled by Democratic leadership twice.

3. How about the effort to require all voters to produce a photo I.D. simply to protect all legitimate voters by reducing fraud during elections? That should be pretty easy, right? Nope.

4. After both taxpayers and private

investors plowed hundreds of millions of dollars into Spaceport America, the Democratic Party power brokers in Santa Fe would allow the project to compete through the granting of a simple liability waiver that had already been provided by other competing states, right? No way. Not in New Mexico's legislature. Here tort lawyers' rights always reign supreme.

Why do these things seem to always happen to New Mexico? It starts with understanding that one party has controlled our state legislature for more than eight decades. When any entity holds uninterrupted power that long, arrogance becomes a way of life. Unlike surrounding states that routinely rotate party leadership every so often, for several generations New Mexico's legislators have felt free to create mountains of laws, rules and regulations that emphasize "control" rather than "development" of additional resources.

During the same time frame, New Mexicans have seen many promising new businesses abruptly relocate elsewhere. When New Mexican business decision makers evaluate their location options and leave, they take New Mexico's jobs with them.

The election of a no-nonsense governor, such as Martinez, seems to have only deepened the resolve of entrenched Democratic leadership to resist change. After eight years of giving Bill Rich-

ardson a virtual blank check to pervert basic economic incentives, now it seems that blocking all meaningful reforms is the name of the legislative game.

Clearly, the last thing Sen. Michael Sanchez and Speaker Ben Lujan want is the appearance Martinez can actually make a difference. And their vindictive approaches explain why basic educational reforms proposed by fellow Democrat Mary Helen Garcia, and basic liability waivers proposed by fellow Democrat Mary Kay Papen were summarily destroyed by leaders in their own party.

How vindictive is the current leadership in the state legislature? Common sense reforms proposed by Democrats such as Papen and Garcia could have been instituted; but only if Republicans had been holding the leadership posts in the New Mexico House and Senate. This simple fact represents the ultimate evidence of complete and total dysfunction in our legislature.

For New Mexicans, reforms are finally so close. However, unless there is a complete shakeup in the House and Senate in November that provides Martinez with reasonable people to work with, reforms will remain elusive, and New Mexico will remain an economic backwater.

safety briefings or how much technical information can be released to potential passengers who need that understanding to be assured of the vehicle's safety.

The rules also limit who can be passengers, he said. Nevertheless, the company has been able to get nearly 500 people from all over the world to put down deposits toward their \$200,000-a-ride tickets, totaling about \$60 million.

Jackson's desire is to get the government to provide a unique classification for human suborbital space flights. He said there should be a Congressional study released soon to reassure skeptics about security concerns.

Virgin Galactic has safety as its "north star" and takes security concerns very seriously, Jackson said. The company is working with the New Mexico Spaceport Authority to make sure there is good security at Spaceport America that still allows for more general tourism access.

"We don't want to turn Spaceport America into Fort Knox," he said.

Getting these issues sorted out now is important to Virgin Galactic as the company works with other spaceports – such as Sweden – for future point-to-point travel, Jackson said. Along with operations, the rules and restrictions can heavily influence the company's supply chain, he said.

On the positive side, federal officials are eager to work with Virgin Galactic because the company that is working on "the cutting edge" of the private space travel industry, Jackson said. He noted his disappointment that the New Mexico Legislature failed to pass liability protects to the companies providing materials, equipment and other support to operators such as Virgin Galactic.

Jackson said he wants to help the public have a better understanding of these rules and regulations as smaller businesses seek to interact with the spaceport. They can be especially susceptible to inadvertently running afoul of the laws, he said.

"A lot of companies believe that just because they're not under ITAR, they're in the clear, but that's always not the case," he said.

AECA and ITAR were enacted in 1976 during the Cold War with USSR to implement unilateral arms export controls, but enforcement has picked up in more recent years because of information and technology shared with China, especially in terms of satellite technology.

Jackson cited the case of ITT Corp. that had to pay a \$100 million penalty for exporting night-vision goggle component parts to China, Singapore and Britain in 2001. He told of another case where companies have gotten in trouble for sharing information with the military arm of a government, such as China, whereas it was OK to share that same information with its industry. This kind of a misunderstanding about the restrictions resulted in University of Tennessee professor J. Reece Roth serving a four-year prison sentence, Jackson said.

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### Retailers: Mortgage lenders, shoe stores

### Realtors can provide information consumers need

When Las Cruces area homebuvers Steve and Mari decided it was time to purchase their first home, their initial step was to research their available financing options.

What size down payment will they need? Will there be any closing costs? How much will they have to pay each month? Other questions include asking what types of loans best match their qualifications and what size mortgage can they afford? Also of interest is learning if the newest first-time buyer loan is more or less expensive for them than the VA, FHA or Conventional mortgages that might also be available to them

Questions such as these, as well as other curious loan-related thoughts, fill the minds of just about all buyers who contemplate purchasing a home. The main question they have to ask is "Exactly where can we obtain the information we need in order to be informed mortgage consumers?" The simple answer is from Realtors and lenders. Which source is the better choice? Neither, when they're considered individually.

Some Realtors don't care to get involved in the loan process, while others, such as those who have earned the Accredited Buyer Representative designation, make it their business to personally walk buyers through the loan process. On the lenders' side of the fence, some loan officers will openly share their full array of loan "products" with prospective buyers, while others follow corporate office directives to push a particular mortgage product even when it may not be the most cost-effective loan for the buyer.

Some lenders are also reluctant to tell buyers better mortgage product is available from a competitor down the street, or they may not be knowledgeable about the latest and greatest loan products. The latter was the case with Steve and Mari. One unknowledgeable lender they talked with actually advised them against using a loan product that, in the end, turned out to be a perfect fit for their family's financial needs.

So how can purchasers such as Steve and Mari know whether or not they're being given the straight scoop? In addition to speaking to as many lenders and Realtors as possible, consumers can gain additional perspectives on the loan process by thinking of lenders as if they were shoe stores. Shoe stores, you ask?

For one thing, lenders and shoe stores are both retailers (although some major lenders

have wholesale divisions). While shoe stores sell mostly shoe products, lenders sell loan products. And as in real life, not all shoe stores carry the same shoes and not all lenders carry the same loans. Additionally, even if two "stores" offer identical products, they many not offer them at the same price. Still sound complicated? Here's an easy way to sort through the mess: First, define they type of shoe (or loan) you're going to need.
Will it be a tennis shoe? Work shoe? Dress

shoe or boot? The same logic can be applied to loan shopping. Will you need the money for a short time, or for a long time? Will you have a large down payment, or will there be no down payment at all? Once you've defined the character of your financing needs (or what type of shoe will do the job for you), vou're ready to move on to the next step: Measuring the size of your mortgage like you'd measure the size of your foot.

You probably recall sitting on that little chair or bench in the shoe store while the salesperson measured your shoe size by pressing that big metal thing against the bottom of your foot. At the conclusion of the process, you knew exactly what size shoe would fit your foot and, as a result could choose any shoe in your size. The same theory can be utilized when applying for a mortgage. Once your Realtor or lender accurately measures your loan size, you'll be able to choose any type of mortgage loan that fits your situation.

To do that, you have to begin mortgage window-shopping. Effective window shopping starts with a credit application at the bank, mortgage company or credit union. Should you allow multiple lenders to request your credit report? According to Fair Isaac and Company (FICO), the folks who developed the credit scoring software used by the major credit reporting agencies, consumers searching for a mortgage or auto loan are not penalized for shopping around for the best rate.

Looking for a mortgage or an auto loan may cause multiple lenders to request your credit report, even though you're only looking for one loan," according to Fair Isaac's website www.myfico.com. "To compensate for this, the score counts multiple auto or mortgage inquiries in any 14-day periods, in just one inquiry. In addition, the score ignores all mortgage and auto inquires made in the 30 days prior to scoring. So if you find a loan within 30 days, the inquires made by lenders won't affect your score while you're rate shopping," according to the site. Still, it's a good idea to keep the number of inquires to a minimum – just in case.

Once you've had a Realtor or lender review your application and your credit, they should be able to discuss with you the loan or loans

that appear to fit your needs. Should you obtain a 30-year loan if you're only going to live in the property for two years? Maybe, maybe not. Once you've identified the loan "products" that appear to best suit your needs, ask the lender for a "Good Faith Estimate" (GFE) and Truth in Lending (TIL) Disclosure.

The documents will outline the costs, payments, terms, adjustments and other features that will apply to the various loan products. Make sure that you keep a copy of your application. It can be submitted to other lenders who can also provide GFEs and TILs for the products they carry in their "stores."

After comparing the features and costs of the various loans from the different stores, most consumers are in a position to obtain a Conditional Loan Commitment from one or more of the lenders. The commitment should not contain a qualifying loan amount, but should contain language indicating that the lender has reviewed your credit, income and debts and that you're qualified to obtain a loan from their company (with absolutely no obligation to do so), subject to finding a property that also qualifies for the loan program.

The loan commitment is one of the key documents buyers need when negotiating a good price with a seller, because it tells the seller that you've done your "homework" and are someone whom he or she should take seriously. The final step in the process comes once you've contracted to purchase a property.

With a Purchase Agreement in hand, you can ask some or all of the previously visited lenders (and others) to provide a GFE and TIL that is specific to your transaction. It is at that moment that you will be in a position to pit one lender against another. Each lender can compete for your business by submitting to you the best products they have to offer at the best prices they can offer them.

Negotiating a good price for a property is important, but negotiation for the price for the money is even more important. After all, you'll be thinking of your loan each and every time you write the check for your monthly

# **Politicians like doling** out special tax breaks

### Evidence for the effectiveness of economic development policies

One bill that didn't pass during the recent legislative session, introduced by Sen. Steve Fischmann, called for the formation of a study group to look into how faculty at the University of New Mexico, New Mexico State University and New Mexico Tech can provide advice to the legislature on economic development policy.

Well, if the legislature asks me, my advice would be simple: eliminate special tax breaks for businesses. There isn't a shred of evidence that they work.

Special tax breaks – whether for film production, employee training or high wage jobs - benefit specific groups, but at the cost of revenue that can be used either to cut taxes generally or to provide needed government services. You help one group, but pay for that help by reducing benefits to the general public.

Of course, government officials love tax breaks because they provide them with opportunities to point to specific success stories. Tax breaks can be used to target high visibility development projects – an aircraft manufacturer here, a movie project

But what isn't as obvious are the businesses lost, the jobs not created, by a lack of social services or high taxes. How many businesses choose not to locate in New Mexico because of a lack of public parks, or due to underfunded public schools? How many local businesses found expansion impossible because of high tax rates?

We will never know, but the best evidence we have from economic studies is that it is at least as many as are gained by tax breaks given to businesses to expand. In particular, states with constitutions that limit state funded give a ways to businesses interest have the same growth rate as states without these restrictions.

Special tax breaks do work. But so do lower overall tax rates and so do better government services. A tax break to attract a new business from out of state, a lower tax rate that puts more money into the pockets of consumers or improved test scores that make a community a more attractive place to live all can promote economic development. But only special tax breaks channels money to a specific beneficiary. The other policies benefit the general community.

There is a fairness issue here as well. Tax breaks and other special programs aimed at promoting development divert public resources from the general good to specific business interests. This offends my libertarian sensibilities. Government should not be in the business of picking specific winners and losers

Republican candidate Ron Paul has addressed these issues. So has former green party candidate Ralph Nader. Both point to the nexus of big government and big business as a source of many of the problems facing our nation.

National policies that favor big business are above the pay grade of our state legislature. But what we can do is develop local policies that don't contribute to the problem. Let's focus on promoting the general good and veer away from programs targeting specific companies.





cil on Foundations and a group of community foundation practitioners formed the Community Foundation Standards Committee. Seeking feedback from community foundation practitioners and focus groups allowed the committee to create 41 National Standards that "enable U.S. Community Foundations to unify, define community foundations and promote their integrity and public

"This was a grassroots effort that now helps define a community

foundation," Watkins said. "In addition to accreditation, we provide assistance as community foundations work to understand the law

and regulations."

presented to the community foundation field, to help community foundations meet them.

According to the Council on Foundations, in the U.S., community foundations serve tens of thousands of donors, administer more than \$40 billion in charitable funds and address the core concerns of more than 700 communities and regions. With the beneficial amount of money associated with philanthropy, community foundations must face a wide-variety of responsibilities.

'Following the National Standards is a legal audit of the foundation and a learning process for the foundation itself," Watkins said. "It is about making each foundation distinct and showing their donors and grantors they are accountable."

By late 2000, the National Standards were formally adopted and organized into a process

# **Farmers fearful for 2012**

## Well pumping in 2011 significantly lowered reserve

Farmers will have to deal with another short irrigation supply during the 2012 season, consultant J. Phillip King reported at an Elephant Butte Irrigation District Board of

Directors meeting.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service reported the northern mountains snowpack runoff forecast for the Rio Grande Basin was 70 percent of normal from January to February, a drop from 86 percent in

"It's a pretty bleak outlook, it looks like a second straight year of short water supply," King said. "Even if we have a good snowpack runoff, a lot of the water could be lost in dry basin arroyos. Farmers will have to use the surface water that they get and than pump ground water. But there was very little recharge into the water table last year from the river because of the poor runoff.

"The drought continues, and a short allocation year should be expected. La Niña continues in equatorial Pacific, indicating drought through the spring of 2012 in the Southwest. The forecast is for below normal precipitation and likely to drop as it did last year.

Agencies are monitoring precipitation rates for trends. For example, the January rainfall in the Mesilla Valley - .75 inches was slightly better than average, state climatologist Dave DuBois said.

Based on the data the irrigation districts have to work on, they do not plan to release water into the farm ditches until May.

"We'll have based our plans on what we currently have in storage," Elephant Butte Irrigation District Manager Gary Esslinger said. "What we want to do is provide water for the farmers' crops in June, July and August, during the heat of the summer. We could have an irrigation allotment of 6 to 8 acre-inches, not much better than the 4 acre-inches we had last year."

The storage EBID has to work with was, as reported by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, 333,300 acre-feet, or less than 20 percent of storage capacity, compared with 474,200 at the same time last year. The Caballo Reservoir storage was 15,000 acre-feet.

The El Paso Water Conservation District (EPWCD) No. 1 plans to start delivering water to farmers at the same time as EBID, in mid or late May.

"We plan to release water at the same time and run water until the allotment runs out," said Jesus Reyes, EPWCD manager. 'Mexico will have to wait until we start delivering water. The river bed is so dry that it would be lost before it would get down to the American Dam where it's diverted into

The water table in the Lower Rio Grande remaining strong.

"We were only pumping ground water in August until mid September," Reyes said. But EBID was pumping all season.

The Rio Grande and aquifers are connected, and the river flow from the snow runoff recharges the aquifers. Last summer, farmers said they were pumping water for their crops 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and the water table was lowered 10 to 20 feet, varying up and down the Rincon and Mesilla valleys, the New Mexico Office of the State Engineer reported.

The city is analyzing its wells to see if the heavy agricultural pumping has lowered its aquifers. But the analyzes have not detected any problems with the city water supply, according to Adrienne Widmer, technical support administrator of the utilities department.



Growing up in Las Cruces, Jeremy Goins said he has worked at printing companies all over town.

Goins said his experience is based on past jobs as well as his studies at New Mexico State University.

"It started in high school," he said about his love for design. "I took drafting and 3-D AutoCAD classes. I liked the design aspect of the classes and new technology, color separation was just coming around.

"I was the kind of guy that if I didn't know it, I would do research and learn how to do it that night. I learned on the fly."

After graduating from Mayfield High School, Goins said he changed his major five times at NMSU.

"It wasn't a lack of ambition, I just wanted to take the classes that I wanted. I took what I wanted to learn," he said.

After architecture drafting, mechanical engineering, networking, computer science and digital graphics courses, Goins said he was ready for a career in the printing business. And opened Print Ninjas in 2009.

"Customers have to want to come back," he said. "I want to help my clients because if their businesses do well, then I do well. Their happiness is a No. 1 priority."


Print Ninjas also offers in-house design.

The 8-inch, square paintings are all framed identically and will be reasonably priced at \$150 each to promote sales. The show runs through Feb. 27.


"Watercolor is incredibly fun and versatile," said Simpson, a member of the NMWS-SC.


"'Die Fledermaus' is charming and funny," Sidden said. "I'm sure everyone will love it. That's especially true since the students in this are so talented."

# 'Enchanting the Nation' at NMSU

# Kent Hall Museum celebrates statehood

In honor of New Mexico's statehood centennial, the New Mexico State University Kent Hall Museum, 3400 S. Espina St., opened two exhibits on Feb. 16: "Enchanting the Nation: New Mexico and the United States" and "Sagrado: A Photopoetics Across the Chicano Homeland."

The left wing of the museum is the "Enchanting the Nation" exhibit. Early 1900s music plays, adding to the ambience of the past as mannequins wearing fashions the turn of the century and photos of a barely industrialized Las Cruces grace the walls.

Museum curator Jennifer Robles helped to make the Enchanting the Nation exhibit.

"I looked at the objects and tried to find objects that would evoke a feeling," Robles said.

Graduate Research Assistant Amadeo Guzmán pored over numerous historical documents when trying to find the pieces that are sometimes overlooked by history, to try to tell an accurate portrayal of New Mexico's history.

Guzmán said that part of his drive to make this exhibit was due to his appreciation of the state, and wanting to show people New Mexico in a different light.

The Enchanting the Nation exhibit will be on display until July.

The right wing of the museum is in present time featuring the exhibit, Sagrado: A Photopoetics Across the Chicano Homeland.

Colorful photos accompanied by blown-up pages of text decorate the walls. Spencer Herrera, Robert Kaiser and Levi Romero compiled a book over five years in the making that examines the Chicano culture.

The book is about "people who often don't get seen in the public eye but who make up the culture," Herrera said.

Herrera, Kaiser and Romero traveled from south Texas through Arizona and to San Diego.

"Sagrado means two or more people gathering in the name of a community," Herrera said. "There's no specific place ... there used to be a lot of places where that would happen."

Kaiser shot 60 rolls of film for the project on a Leica M6.

Kaiser called one of his most "powerful images" of the late Omar Castro, 17 time national champion of the Charreada.

Kaiser described the event of attending his funeral, watching "20 to 30 horses line up on either side of his hearse, that was being lead by his dog, stop and salute the hearse."

The Sagrado exhibit runs through May 25. Admission is free. Museum hours are from noon to 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

## Celtic music to fill Atkinson Recital Hall

Ryan, with her crystalline vocals and insightful songwriting, is an original and distinctive voice in Celtic music.

Since her acclaimed seven-year tenure as lead singer of Cherish the Ladies, the Detroit-born Ryan has established herself as one of Celtic music's most popular and enduring singer-songwriters.



# Sorrow in the city streets

## Neighborhood stands against violence

Last November, the new mayor of Chicago, Rahm Emanuel, attended a memorial noting the murders of 260 Chicago Public School students in the past three years. That ceremony, one of five that were

That ceremony, one of five that were planned by a group called Urban Dolorosa (Sorrowing City), will probably do nothing to stop the ongoing violence, but will, at least for now, not allow the victims to be forgotten.

And that is only part of the picture. It was reported in March 2011 that in 2010, over 700 Chicago children were "hit by gunfire."

In New Mexico, recent news reports offer that New Mexico is among the top three in number of gang members of the 50 states. Put in perspective, since California and Illinois, the other top contenders are more populated than New Mexico, it might mean that we have more gang members than any other state in the union.



From January through October of 2011, Las Cruces police reported 217 gang related crimes, and it is also noted that for every police officer in New Mexico, there are three to four gang bangers. Albuquerque estimates that there are 10,000 gang jerks in Bernalillo County.

Los Angeles and El Paso have been noted as incubators of this lunacy, from the 1920s, although some historians offer that it all started much earlier, in part because of the Treaty of Hidalgo (you have to read this to believe it) and the presence of Irish gangs in New York, about the same time as the treaty. Supposedly, crime-free Las Cruces is only

safer than 8 percent of cities in the US according to figures supplied by www.neighborhood scout.com.

It's a problem that's growing, won't go away and is hard for a rational human being to handle. What's the solution, if any?

In this documentary film, "The Interrupters," a group calling

itself CeaseFire, has started in Chicago, doing intervention work on the streets and in the home. Created by a doctor and made up of former gang members who have seen the light, CeaseFire uses common sense, art and one-on-one talks to those who are embroiled in gang activity.

The film follows several of the counselors, telling their stories, while they work with individuals or small groups in order to get people to stop beating and killing each other for alleged slights of respect (even an awkward glance can earn you a bullet) or the more serious offense of spitting on someone you don't like.

The gang members aren't overly rich in the brain cell department, and most opine is the reason they beat the bloody hell out of one another or "cap" someone is – that's the way it's always been, or that's what I know or that's what I see.

CeaseFire, however hard it tries, doesn't seem overly effective in the film. Indeed they do outreach to any number of disaffected young people, but more often than not, the help they offer is refused, with those who accept often go back to the "life." It is frustrating to see these intelligent, kind-hearted (and stern when they need to be) CeaseFire advocates be slapped back time and time again. At times it is so bad—at least twice during group sessions during the film—fights break out just outside the meeting place, and in one scene, a youngster comes to the meeting reporting that another has just been shot.

As well meaning as I think it is meant to be, "The Interrupters" accidentally stumbles on itself (I feel) since the fledgling group, which

began in 2000 and has seen its methodology used by 18 other groups and has been shown to be effective the U.S. Dept of Justice after a three year study, looks like a needle in a haystack.

"The Interrupters" is a fascinating film, (note...there are numerous scenes of violence), and deserves the attention and accolades that it has received. It is an open book on a small but mildly successful help program that will need a miracle to help it achieve any long range goals.

# Damon and Cruz steam things up

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. on Saurday, Feb. 25, is "All the Pretty Horses" (2000, 116 minutes, rated PG-13).

In "All the Pretty Horses," the film version of the acclaimed Cormac McCarthy novel, the sky not only frames a young man's life, but provides a vast, romantic vessel for his thoughts and dreams.

In the first scene, when John Grady Cole (Matt Damon) lies on his back and regards the stars and a half moon, he seems completely at home.

"Do you suppose there is a heaven and a hell?" Rawlins (Henry Thomas) asks.

"I guess you can believe what you want to," Cole answers with a sweet drawl. Directed by Billy Bob Thornton, "All the

Directed by Billy Bob Thornton, "All the Pretty Horses" is an elegiac, visually hypnotic film about love, honor, reverence for nature and the loss of tradition. When it opens, soon after the end of World War II, Cole is crushed to learn that his mother has sold off the West Texas family ranch that he had hoped to work all his life.

Craving escape and adventure, he sets off on horseback for Mexico with Rawlins, encounters a 13-year-old horse thief (Lucas Black) and falls in love with Alejandra (Penelope Cruz), the beautiful daughter of the Mexican landowner (Ruben Blades) who hires him to break wild horses.

Cole is jailed on trumped-up charges, nearly loses his life and ultimately learns a sad but important lesson.

Damon is an excellent actor and he plays Cole with an earnestness, simplicity and boyish modesty that match his character perfectly. From the easy way he has with a horse, to his interplay with his buddy Rawlins, to the cadences and timbre of his West Texas accent, he's never less than true.

Best of all are Damon's scenes with Cruz – at a community dance, embracing in a moonlit pond – which are some of the most lusciously romantic in memory. It's said that Damon and Cruz became involved during the making of the film, which is evident onscreen: That kind of chemistry can't be faked.

"All the Pretty Horses" is slow and languid, but it is a visual feast and a chance to see Damon, an actor whose talents are frequently obscured by his looks and his celebrity, deliver his best work," according to www.sfgate.com.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society which showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West – the new West, Old West or anything in between – and "movies that missed us," notable films that never had a lot of publicity.

Performance times are 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday and 2 p.m. for all Sunday shows from Feb. 24 through March 11.





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

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# What's cooking at La Cocina? Serving up good eats at Pro's Ranch Market

If there's one thing I've learned, it's food doesn't have to be fancy to be delicious.

The diner ultimately doesn't remember how the dish was plated, what garnish was used or if there was an even coating of paprika over their mashed potatoes. What's important when it's all said and done are the complex flavors and textures that leave their lasting impression on the palate.

Since the opening of Pro's Ranch Market, 320 E. Wyatt Drive, in November 2011, many have turned to the grocery store for their produce, baked goods and fresh tortilleria.

A hidden gem and perhaps the crowning glory of Pro's Ranch is its incredible selection of hot, fresh food, located to the right of the produce. Picnic tables decorated with the same colorful swirls beckon shoppers to sit down, take a break and indulge in La Cocina's delights.

According to www.prosranch. com, "La Cocina is the nucleus of the store, as fresh cut meats, hot tortillas, fresh breads and crisp produce come in from our other departments into La Cocina, providing customers with the best tasting items anywhere. The Aguas Frescas refreshment bar, contains a wide variety of Hispanic beverages prepared from scratch every day."

On one side, customers can order and personalize traditional favorites such as burritos, tacos and quesadillas. All of the tortillas come fresh from the ovens, and the meat (carnitas, barbacoa, roasted chicken) is roasted only a few feet away.

Pro's Ranch funnels much of its grocery items, including fresh produce, meat and other ingredients straight into their meal preparations.

În an almost cafeteria-like fashion, a mountain of cheese, pico de gallo and guacamole smothered my "street tacos" until I couldn't tell if the soft corn tortillas were still under it all. They were.

After digging my way into the platter, swimming in a moat of refried beans and surrounded by a dense forest of vellow Spanish rice. I discovered the heart of the citadel. The three tacos were smothered, covered and delicious.

The whole affair was rather messy, but I'd like to think I'd won the battle. After inhaling the entire platter, I realized with a catatonic glaze that the food had probably won the war.

The line for the food was lengthy, wrapping around the bakery, but the few minutes were definitely worth the wait. \$5 and three street tacos later I was stuffed, sated and ready to take a nap.

The other side, which I didn't notice until I was already seated, fork in hand, had its very own line.

Shorter and far less complicated, the far side serves platters of other traditionally Hispanic dishes. These included my personal favorite, chile rellenos, as well as roasted chicken and enchiladas all served with a side of rice, beans and a salad.

The salsa bar offered a mountain of chips and a variety of garnish, sides and you guessed it, salsa of varying color heat and consistency to customers. Away from the food lines in a separate area, the salsa bar wasn't crowded and allowed me to ponder salsa choices at my leisure.

Behind the salsa bar, a drink station called Aguas Frescas served up fruit infused water, horchata and other traditional Hispanic beverages to complete the meal.

La Cocina offers party-sized platters for family gatherings, catered with the same freshness cus tomers can expect at the counter. "Everything is made fresh daily,"

# Studio Ghibli takes on 'The Borrowers'

Studio Ghibli, a Japanese animation and film studio, has produced some of my all-time favorite animated flicks.

"My Neighbor Totoro," "Spirited Away" and my uncontensted No. 1, (which I recently watched for the hundredth time) "Howl's Moving Castle" are all films which are not only animated and child-friendly, but are also completely rewarding for an older audience.

In a children's film market that is saturated by 3-D technology, Hayao Miyazaki's films are almost alone in staying true to their animated roots. Hand-drawn, Studio Ghibli's films are made up of colorful scenery, interesting characters and emotionally complex messages.

"The Secret World of Arrietty," the latest of Miyazaki's films, is based on the 1952 book "The Borrowers" by English author Mary Norton.

Unlike Miyazaki's other films, which traditionally have some element of eccentric fantasy or psychedelic mythology, "The Secret World of Arrietty" stays grounded in the story of here and now. The simplicity of the story allows viewers to imagine the house in the film is their own home and there is the possibility of Borrowers within the walls of their own bedrooms.

"The Secret World of Arrietty" incites the imagination in ways that other recent animated

films have not.

It is a pleasant antidote to so many Hollywood films that try to capture the audience's attention with an assault of noise and images. Slow pans and lovely pen and ink frames do a wonderful job of bringing the film to life without the siege of life-like animation.

I was more than able to appreciate "The Secret World of Arriety" for what it was – a cartoon with a thoughtful message and a few silly antics.

Arrietty (voiced by Bridgit Mendler) is a Borrower, a minuscule 14-year-old who lives under the floorboards with her mother and father (voiced by real-life couple Amy Poehler and Will Arnett).

To survive, her family "borrows" items from

the much larger "human beans" who live in the house. In the scaleddown family, a sewing pin becomes a sword and a leaf from the garden an umbrella.

On her first borrowing adventure, Arrietty is spotted by Shawn (voiced by David Henrie), a frail human boy who has just moved into the house with his aunt for some much needed rest and relaxation.

This breaks the first rule of borrowing, which is to never be seen, as the little people survive only because their presence is a secret in the house. The story becomes a sweet and chaste first-love story.

Arrietty sheds her fear of humans, and Shawn proves a tender soul who understands the fragile existence of his small friend and her kind.

He seeks to help her and her family by bringing them supplies and eventually a new kitchen, made from an elaborate dollhouse built by Shawn's grandfather years before, after discovering the tiny occupants.

Humor and tension are injected by the filmmakers in the form of the boisterous housekeeper Haru (voiced by Carol Burnett), who discovers the Borrowers living beneath

the floorboards and seeks to capture them in order to prove she's not seeing things.

One of the best scenes in the film involves Haru's no-nonsense attitude, a shoe and an unlucky crow.

The giggles of the children in the theater were a joyous melody, and I soon found my own laughter unstoppable in response.

Mendler nails the title role with vivacity and a spirit of adventure, while Poehler is hilarious with her squawky, frantic voice. Arnett applies rock-solid vocals to the part, but lacks the humor that would be more effective

alongside his smirking poker face.

However, the warm simplicity of the story and the cleverness and artistry of the animation make up for any vocal shortcomings.

Ultimately, the film is a flattering homage to Norton's novel and excels in visually telling a heartwarming story that appeals to both children and adults.

## 47th in health care policies

Some residents living in the Eastern part of the U.S. still don't realize that New Mexico is a state.

If you read the New Mexico magazine, there are always stories about various companies who state they "don't ship outside of the U.S. to Mexico." New Mexican residents complain about the illiterate geographic knowledge of other U.S. citizens, but, unfortunately, it's true.

We live in an undiscovered gem of a state when it comes to climate, topography, art, culture and food, but we cannot boast about our political climate in Santa Fe.

After working in Santa Fe for 30 days during the legislative session, I would like to inform New Mexicans to wake up and register to vote. Research who your representative and senator are and discover how they voted on more than 200 bills presented between Jan.16 and Feb.16.

Health care is a major concern for everyone, young and old. New Mexico has one doctor, Terry McMillan, who sits in the House of Representatives

He has been the biggest and best contribution to the Legislature that I witnessed during the session. How can legislators write and vote on health care bills when they, or their analysts, are not in the health care world or even experts in health care?

The answer is simple – they can't. The scenario for a physician to serve as a legislator is extremely costly.

# State of city's health care

Leading industry professionals address coming issues, past successes

Although the two acute-care hospitals in Las Cruces share competing values, their goals are one in the same - to provide the best possible care to the community.

Businesses in Las Cruces had the opportunity to hear what is happening in the medical community when the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce held its annual medical update luncheon, Thursday, Feb. 16.

There to represent the medical community was Paul Herzog, CEO of Memorial Medical Center; John Andazola, program director of Family Medicine Residency; William Adler, oncologist; Denten Park, CEO of MountainView Regional Medical Center and Donna Brown, executive director of Mesilla Valley Hospice.

Recurring themes of all the speakers included the uncertainty of the health care industry due to changes being made on a federal level, the progress both hospitals have made over the past few years and the underlying need for community education on better pre-

"If we want to reduce health care costs, we need to take care of ourselves," Herzog said.

Herzog, Andazola and Adler all touted MMC's ability to retain 85 percent of their physicians through its residency program, as well as the significant progress the hospital's cancer center has made.

According to Adler, a first-class cancer center has been built from the ground up over the

# Paving the way for active commuters

### Local program proves it's not a thing of the past to walk to school


When Grandpa starts telling stories of walking 10 miles to school come rain or snow back in his day, the moral of the story may be lost in the cynical eye-rolls.

The notion of walking or bicycling to school every morning may even seem trite to some of today's youth - even if they only live one mile away.

According to a U.S. Travel Data survey, in 1969, 48 percent of children ages 5 to 14 walked or biked to school. By 2009, that number decreased to a mere 13 percent.

The effects of the lack of physical activity on children are now becoming problems gaining national attention - a population that is becoming more obese at a younger age.

Problems with childhood obesity have proven to cause physical and emotional health issues, such as depression and developmental

However, it's not as if there aren't legitimate concerns for why parents don't let their children walk or bike to school anymore.

Distance from home to school, the safety of children in traffic and other crime dangers are all valid reasons parents pack the kids up the comfort of the car every morning.

How would such an exceptional trend of not actively commuting to school even be steered otherwise?

That's exactly what the nation was implored to find out in 2005 when Congress created the federally funded Safe Routes to School program (SRTS), and as of 2011, more than 10,000 schools throughout the country have SRTS programs seeking to fix these concerns parents have.

According to Las Cruces SRTS Coordinator Naoma Staley, this move prompted action on the local level in the form of a partnership between the Metropolitan Planning Organization and the Las Cruces Public School District.

Thanks to this collaboration, over the past few years, 32 elementary and middle schools within the district have been staked out to determine just what it is preventing kids from actively commuting to school.

"We look at everything included in the five E's: engineering, education, enforcement, encouragement and evaluation," Staley said.

On Feb. 8, the Las Cruces Metropolitan Planning Organization adopted the SRTS action plan as an official document, and will begin working systems, such as walking school buses, to allow more children to walk to school with an escort.

"It's now a bridge from just telling people about it to actually doing it," Staley said.

Ashleigh Curry, the SRTS champion for Mesilla Elementary School, has been the leader of "Two-wheel Tuesdays" and "Walking Wednesdays" for the past five years, and said she has seen nothing but good come out of it.

"Kids are walking and getting exercise who weren't at all before, and both parents and kids are realizing it's not that big of a deal," Curry said.

Curry walks with her own children to the designated drop off area, a park on the corner of Highway 28 and University Avenue, to wait for the usual suspects – about 30 to 40 students – who walk or ride their bike the few blocks to the school.

As an incentive to students who walk or ride every week, Curry passes out punch cards that are given another notch with every participation as well as charms.

"They're all so excited about it," Curry said.

It's not just students who walk the short 15 minutes to the school, as teachers, parents and other volunteers want in on the action as well.

"It's just a good way to get out of bed and start your morning," parent Cindy VanPelt said.

Peggy Castillo, a fifth-grade teacher at Mesilla Park Elementary School and frequent walker, said she has noticed a positive change in students who "get their squirms out" with walking or biking in the morning.


"They're better mannered, more awake and just more ready to focus," Castillo said.

Walking school buses and bike trains, such as the one in place at Mesilla Elementary, are now in a pilot process at four schools, Staley said.

Infrastructure changes, such as sidewalks and signage near elementary schools to make it easier for actively commuting, are also underway.

"My experiences with walking to school turned into a love of nature and helped my independence," Staley said. "I want to be a part of giving today's kids that same opportunity."

"Last year, we had 899 applicants for six residency positions, and we were able to retain 85 percent of that," Andazola said.

Herzog said the current debate over the doctor fix, a type of formula on how to reimburse doctors for Medicare treatment, could mean a nearly 30 percent reduction in funds received.

This cost, he said, would then be shouldered on the hospitals.

"More and more things will start to play out over a period of time, and hospitals are trying to live with these changes," Herzog said.

Park said he agreed with Herzog that the constant changing atmosphere of the health care industry can easily be overwhelming, but he is excited to see "more people taking care of routine appointments."

Community education on the importance of preventive care is a top concern, Park said, especially for women who "have a tendency to take care of everyone else but themselves."

"I think it's healthy to have two entities who compete to try and do a better job," Park said. "We try to recruit the best physicians and give the best possible care to every patient that walks through the door."

Technological advancements are also making it easier for patients to decide the best course of action for an illness.

A drive around town may reveal billboards telling viewers exactly how many minutes one will have to wait for an emergency room visit to MountainView.

"We are extremely blessed to have such a great medical community," Park Closing the update luncheon was Brown, also touting the accomplishments of the medical community of Las Cruces.

According to Brown, her attendance at medical conferences around the nation has given her an eye to the unique relationships between facilities in the region to provide a level of care not seen in other areas.

"I will go places and people will ask me how we do it," Brown said, also thanking Park and Herzog for their ability to work with Mesilla Valley Hospice.

One thing Brown wished to emphasize, she said, is to get people away from associating hospice with death and the loss of hope.

"Hospice should equal hope," Brown said. "We put the patient and family back together to do something wonderful."





# Feel the familiar flow



**Gabriel Rochelle** *Cycling the Mesilla Valley* 

A number of people have asked me, "How can you ride 25 to 30 miles a day?"

First, I get dressed, then I grab some snacks and a water bottle, maybe two depending on the distance I want to go, check the tires on the bike and inflate them if necessary, check out the mechanics, then go.

I have a goal, but it's not fixed. I can choose to adjust my goal up or down as I am rolling.

I get out one or two miles and I notice that my left ankle hurts. So, I ride through that minor discomfort.

At about six miles, I notice that my right knee is feeling a bit sore and kinky. So, I ride through that minor discomfort.

Then at about 10 miles I notice that my sit-bones are beginning to hurt, so I ride standing for a half-mile and then adjust my clothing as I sit again. And so it goes.

Soon, however, I no longer notice the problems in my body. That concern drops away and there is only cycling.

I'm doing it, of course, but I am no longer aware of the stress or the energy it requires to do it. I am coming close to being in the flow, happy and calm.

When focus on my physical condition drops away, simple enjoyment ensues and I'm content. That's how I ride 25 to 30 miles a day.

It is not difficult if you enjoy it and achieve that sense of flow.

Mihaly Czikzentmihalyi coined the term "flow" in the '80s. Then chairman of the psychology department at the University of Chicago, he went on to found the Quality of Life Research Center at Claremont, Calif.

Flow has become a key to explain a variety of physical activities that carry fulfilling spiritual and intellectual components. Flow is closely connected to theories of play.

Flow is when you are, to use a popular term, "in the zone."

Czikzentmihalyi studied creativity as well as activity because he wanted to know what makes people feel happy, fulfilled and satisfied. He determined that flow occurs when people lose their sense of time and feel satisfied in the moment.

He defined flow as "being completely involved in an activity for its own sake. The ego falls away. Time flies. Every action, movement and thought follows inevitably from the previous one, like playing jazz. Your whole being is involved, and you're using your skills to the utmost."

The notion of flow defines a wide variety of activities in which you lose yourself – or rather lose the sensation of being wrapped up in your own ego. We'll stick to cycling since that's what this column is about, but I have certainly thought about and experienced flow in a number of other activities, and I invite you to reflect on flow in your life.

Joe Friel, one of the leading gurus of cycling (I recommend his book "Cycling Past 50"), gives three basic rules for training: ride consistently, ride moderately and ride frequently. Sound advice.

Many cyclists in this great area ride at least three or four times a week, some more, for that consistency.

Don't forget to include commuting. Frequent and moderate riding helps you achieve the rhythm that allows flow to occur.

Czikzentmihalyi, a true pioneer, turned psychology from an emphasis on illness to a positive view of human growth and development. He enabled us to name an experience that most of us have had, but did not have words for.

Get on that bike and get into the flow.



# Putting the pieces together

### Dream home features plenty of thought, unique styling

In 1995, builder Michael Floyd was tasked with a challenging feat – to create the dream home of Bill and Marty Whaley exactly as they had imagined.

Bill Whaley's career as a geologist took the couple around the world, including far-off destinations such as Libya and Australia, before they ended up in Santa Fe. Deciding Las Cruces was a better place seasonally, they walked into Floyd's office with a plan, the builder said.

"Marty came in with a large envelop of photos," Floyd said. "She dumped it out onto the conference table and said, 'This is my house.' We had to put it together piece by piece.

"They had such detail in mind. They knew exactly what they wanted."

Floyd said the couple even created a paper replica of their dream home to scale and after finding the right location at 3225 Sundown Road, in the Majestic Hills Subdivision off Telshor Boulevard, work began.

When completed five months later, the couple was left with the picture image of what they had envisioned – a 2,809-square-foot abode featuring a classic, ranch-style façade.

"They didn't want a Southwest-style home," Floyd said. "They wanted a shingle roof. They didn't care that it didn't fit the area."

A sloped driveway leads up to the side garage, placed in such a way as to not deter from the curb appearance of the home. Rocks and native plants line the property, complementing the residence's earth-tone color scheme.

"The terracing of the yard on both sides – every rock you see out there was placed there by Marty," Floyd said. "She wanted it to be perfect and she worked on it daily."

A large front door painted a deep red leads into the home. At the entrance, tucked behind close doors, are a sound room that contains a sound system for the house, a bar area and a half bathroom, featuring a simple white interior with brightly colored tile.

To the left of the entrance is the living room. Fond of entertaining guests, the Whaleys designed the room to be open and bright, allowing for room to "mingle," Floyd said. A tray ceiling decorates the space as a wall, colored a somber blue, houses a fireplace wrapped in a stone exterior.

Across the hall from the living room, on the other side of the entrance, is the dining room. While most of the home features sporadic aqua or blue walls, the dining room is covered with a taupe color. Small countertops can be found next to double doors leading to the kitchen.

Beyond the dining room is a second living room, designed to house the couple's library.

"We built a system for all of their books with a library ladder," said Floyd of the built-in white shelves that extend from floor to ceiling.

floor to ceiling.

With a TV and entertainment center built-in in a corner, Floyd said the space, painted a shade of orange, was used as the couple's social space, where they would enjoy time with company in a relaxed environment.

The room transitions into a breakfast nook connected to the kitchen. While the small eating area showcases a large window overlooking a side of the property, a mural of the Organ Mountains created by Marty Whaley and her grandson rests on top, ensuring occupants always have a view.

The kitchen features a long linear design. Wanting the space to be simple, Floyd said Marty Whaley selected white cabinetry and Formica countertops. A pop of color is added to the kitchen through a stained-glass-like decorative window.

Two bedrooms, including the master suite, are located down a hall off the breakfast nook. A big thing the couple wanted, Floyd said, were built-in beds and shelving for convenience.

As much thought as the couple put into the interior of the home, they put in just as much into the surrounding property, Floyd said. A covered patio extends the length of the home and features a roll up garage door at the end to block the invasive southern New Mexico winds.

The patio overlooks the property's resistance pool. Used for exercise, the pool is enclosed for privacy and has an adjacent outdoor shower for swimmers.

A casita completes the courtyard area. The brightly colored interior features a dual living room-bedroom as well as a private bathroom. A spiral iron staircase leads to a deck on top of the casita, installed to allow residents to view the breathtaking surroundings of the Organ Mountains, Robledo Mountains and city lights.

This view can also be enjoyed from a gazebo resting outside of the enclosed courtyard.

Capturing what the Whaleys envisioned, Floyd said he wants the residence's new owners to find beauty in the small and large details.

"You look at the home and you know that in-depth thinking went into the house," Floyd said. "I hope (the new owners) really appreciate that."

### Professionals, homeowners encouraged to attend

New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service is offering a first detector training course to help home gardeners, as well as plant professionals, detect pest and disease outbreaks.

The class will be Thursday, March 1, at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, 200 E. Picacho Ave. The four-hour first-detector training will be from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., with a two-hour continuing education course from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. This training will also be available live online via CENTRA. Lunch will not be provided.

"This training is important not only for professionals, but for homeowners who work with plants and plant material on a consistent basis," said Jason French, NMSU plant diagnostic clinician.

French is the training coordinator of the course, which is designed for Master Gardeners, pest control operators, agricultural producers and the general public.

"This training is part of the National Plant Diagnostic Network's education and training program," said Natalie Goldberg, NMSU extension plant pathologist, who will teach the art and science of diagnosing plant disorders, high-risk diseases and how to submit samples to NMSU's plant diagnostic clinic. "Participants who attend the training will become certified first detectors and added to a national registry of trained first detectors."

Current certified first detectors will have the opportunity to participate in continuing education courses in the afternoon session on high risk and exotic weeds and arthropod pests.

"It is important for those wanting to receive this training to enroll now, because there won't be another opportunity for this training until 2013," French said.

There is no charge for the training, which is funded by New Mexico State University, the National Plant Diagnostic Network, the Southwest Border Food Safety and Defense Center and Agroguard, a program of the New Mexico Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

# More bugs to emerge

Mild winter encourages pests to come out earlier



It's been noticeably warmer this season, without a doubt, and in some cases, people have already been trading their sweaters and scarfs for shorts and flip flops.

As one of the country's mildest winters on record, this only means that more insects will come out of their hiding places much earlier than we normally expect.

Although meteorology records tell us we still have a good six weeks left of winter, we're assuming what's left will be rather mild, which means that pesky pests are bound to start making their appearance around the household much sooner than we'd like to see.

Some states have even started experiencing tick sightings – which are not a welcomed encounter while out on a brisk walk

Insects typically survive brutal winter temperatures using several strategies, such as slowing down their metabolism, respiration system and seeking a warm place to over-winter. But with warmer temps coming our way, many are being forced to leave their home, in search of yours.

With this premature weather change, other insects that might be spotted include boxelder bugs, multicolored Asian lady bug and springtails, as well as increased ant and termite activity.

There may even been wasp and hornet "future queens," who may also survive the winter, which results in more swarms during the spring and summer months.

So as always, don't forget to take precaution – and in the meantime remember to seal up that house. Always maintain a one-inch gap between soil and wood por-

tions of your home. And lastly, keep tree branches and other plants trimmed back from the house to avoid those creepy crawlers from starting their spring break early.

# **Ex-nurse finds new way to help**

### Real estate allows Jennifer Goude to continue to care for people

A nurse in her previous life, Realtor Jennifer Goude may have switched careers, but she said she has still dedicated herself to the well-being of others.

Born in California, Goude said her father, Col. Theodore Goude, was in the Air Force, which led the family to move every two years or so, including around the United States and as far as Guam, Japan and the Philippines.

"I know what the moving thing is all about," Goude said. "I lived it firsthand several times."

During their travels, Goude said her father became an inspiration and encouragement to

"He had an absolutely brilliant career in the Air Force," she said, adding that her father was a pilot and flew in Korea. "I always wanted to be like my father. He had a life that was just incredible and I wanted to be like him and accomplish as many things as I could."

She attended Iowa Western Community College, where she was studying cultural anthropology and archaeology until one icy day when she was 19 years old.

On her way to campus for a geology test during an ice storm, Goude was in an almost-fatal car accident. Hit on the passenger side into oncoming traffic and thrown out of her car, Goude was rushed to the emergency room where she had to have emergency surgery on her face.

"The paramedics came, and I was just so moved by them and what they did," she said. "They just saved my life. I decided then that I wanted to become a nurse."

After graduating with her associate degree in nursing, Goude went to work and eventually worked in a variety of specialties, including coronary care, emergency room care, critical care and, finally, oncology.

"I even worked on an ambulance," she said, explaining that she began a pilot critical care team in Los Angeles that performed interfacility transfers. "I trained the EMTs how to

read the monitors. They were patients who were stable, but still needed someone certified to watch over them."

She also worked at an emergency room in East Los Angeles and saw her fair share of shootings, stabbings, car wrecks and babies being delivered in cars.

At the encouragement of friends, she visited Las Cruces in 1987.

"I went back and gave my notice," she said. "Within two weeks, I was here."

She went to work at Memorial Medical Center as a surgical nurse, before moving to oncology and treating cancer patients.

"It was a pretty intense type of nursing – probably my favorite type," she said.

Although she loved the work, Goude said she often found herself becoming too attached to her clients. It became difficult to get to know them and see them pass away. Deciding it was best to get out of the nursing field, she began looking for a new career path.

Talking to friends in the real estate world, she decided to give it a try and earned her license in 1998 and joined Drew Self Realty.

"I had moved quite a bit in my life," she said of her desire to join real estate. "And I still had an interest in helping people. Real estate is all about helping people, so I felt like I could still be doing the helping-people part of my career."

She was a top producer with the company for seven years before deciding to break out of her comfort zone and join Steinborn & Associates Real Estate, then Steinborn GMAC Real Estate.

"I'm so glad I came here, Steinborn is more than I thought it could be," she said. "I have dear friends here who have become my family. It was a very good decision."

Working with residential customers, as well as builders and those in investment, she said her favorite part of being a Realtor is seeing the joy on her clients' faces.

"(Pastels) are so bright and colorful, I love it," she said.

She has shown at galleries such as Adobe Patio Gallery, Cutter Gallery and the Branigan Cultural Center. Her work – prints, cards and originals – is also found at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market on Downtown Main Street.

Tapping into her interest in cultures and anthropology, Goude said her art contains a lot of figures and people, especially the Tarahumara, a group of people from northwestern Mexico.

Dedicated to real estate and art, Goude said she still finds time to give back. Since entering the industry, she has been active with the Las Cruces Association of Realtors, serving on the Grievance Committee before transitioning to the Community Service Committee.

"It's very rewarding to raise these funds and to be able to allocate them to different charities in the community," said Goude, who will walk with the LCAR team in this year's Bataan Memorial Death March. "As a nurse, I rented, but it became more important to me to be a homeowner. I was able to accomplish that when I moved to Las Cruces," she said, adding that she had her own home built in 2006.



# Dustpan can be a helpful tool

From sweeping to scraping ice, keep one around just in case

A popular mantra to live your life by is "A clean home is a happy home."

While many consider April to be the time for "spring cleaning," during which homeowners will breathe new life into their residence by thoroughly scrubbing and discarding unwanted items, every season is a good opportunity to get things tidy.

According to research published by www.cleanhomeideas. com, women claim to do 79 percent of the household cleaning, although 55 percent of men claim to vacuum better than their partner and 14 percent of men said they believe they do a better job at washing dishes.

One task most people don't enjoy is sweeping. Those little particles of dirt and dust can at times seem impossible to gather, let alone pick up to toss out. Thankfully, there is the dustpan to the rescue.

While the dustpan is an essential tool when sweeping, it also can be handy in other ways.

1. Capture a touch of fall: Fall is a very distinct season with well-known colors, vegetables and overall look. Give your house a bit of fall style with the help of a dustpan. Gather fall foliage, such as leaves, corn, branches and berries, along with other decorative greens, and fasten them together with a rubber band. Add a decorative ribbon to the mix to hid the plain band. Twist the sticks so they lay in a fan shape. Set it against a copper dustpan. Use a bit of glue to attach the bouquet to the pan. Hang the ornate crate to your front door for all to see.

2. Use in the sand: Whether it be a sand-box or a sandy beach, most children will choose to use their time digging, building and creating in the mud. Add to your menagerie of toys one more item – a dustpan. The pan can be used as a shovel or as a lifter. Whatever your kids can think of, the dustpan will help keep them entertained.

3. Quickly pickup after the kids: Building blocks, toy cars and doll accessories can turn an afternoon of fun into a headache of a mess. Make clean up time

a mess. Make clean up time go by quicker by using a dustpan. Working it

go by quicker by using a dustpan. Working it like a shovel, scoop up the toys and put them into their correct

containers or toy bin. In no time, the area will be clean.

**4. Scrape ice:** The finicky New Mexico weather can make it difficult at times to be able to predict what is in store for the Las Cruces landscape. If you find yourself in a frosty situation without an ice scraper to clear you windshield, don't fret – grab a dustpan. Run the angled lip of the dustpan along the surfaced to remove frost and snow from the glass. The dustpan can also scoop away any flakes that have gathered on the hood of your vehicle

**5. Get help filling a bucket:** Mopping can be a strenuous task, complicated even more when your sink is too shallow to fill the bucket. Your bucket doesn't have to fit in your sink, however, when you have a dustpan near by. A rather ingenious trick, set the dustpan in the stink so the flat scraper is wedged against the faucet and the handle sinks out. The handle of dustpan must be hollow, or else this trick won't work. Place the bucket slightly under the handle and turn the water on. The water will fall into the pan and the handle will act like a canal, guiding the water into the bucket. The bucket might need

# **Food Fantasy comes to Hotel Encanto**

### Contest to challenge the community to get creative with pecans

Whether an experienced at-home chef or a culinary novice, all are encouraged to whip up their favorite pecan-inspired dishes for the annual Pecan Food Fantasy Contest Sunday, March 4, at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces, 705 S. Telshor Blyd.

Now in its 46th year, the Food Fantasy was created as part of the Western Pecan Growers Annual Conference and Trade Show, held by the New Mexico Pecan Growers Association, as a way to encourage more people to use pecans in their meals.

"It's just to get more people using pecans in food and other dishes, not just desserts and breads," said Gayla Weaver, an extension home economist with the Cooperative Extension Service, who is assisting coordinator Karin Davidson with the Food Fantasy.

Weaver said there are many nutritional values to using pecans. The locally grown nut is an ideal source of heart-healthy unsaturated fats and contains the highest level of antioxidants, according to the New Mexico Pecan Growers. It also offers more than 19 vitamins and minerals, such as vitamin E, folic acid, calcium, copper, zinc, fiber and several B vitamins.

Not only high in nutrients, Weaver said pecans also have diverse cooking uses, which will be on display during the Food Fantasy.

 quick breads, yeast breads, yeast rolls and bread machine; traditional pecan pie; other pies; candy; cookies – drop cookies, bar cookies and other cookies; cheesecake; and tarts.

This year will also include an entrée category, a selection that was offered when the contest first began, but was discontinued. Weaver said participants can also enter an "on the lighter side" item.

"The last 10 years or so we added this category," she said. "They provide the original recipe and one that is lighter, so people will be aware of what is in their dish and to show that they don't have to use any more fat, sugar or salt in a recipe than what is needed."

Weaver said last year they had 92 adult and 147 youth entries, with cookies being the most popular for youths and traditional pecan pies the most popular overall.

"There is a recipe on the back of the entry form with an ingredient list for the traditional pecan pie," she said. "They must stick to this list because only these ingredients are acceptable."

Anyone can enter the Food Fantasy, Weaver said, adding that they have received entries from as far away as Deming and Silver City.

She said mini grants are provided to schools that give students with whole and half pieces of pecans so they can enter the contest. This year, seven teachers from five schools – including Las Cruces High School, Mayfield High School, Gadsden High School, Santa Teresa High School and Deming High School – have taken advantage of the mini grants.

"The teachers really encourage their students to enter the contest," Weaver said.

While anyone can participate and enter as many items into as many categories as they desire, Weaver said there are rules that must be followed, such as each entry must come in disposable containers and must be a certain amount, such as a whole cake or 12 cookies.

Entries are due at Hotel Encanto between 9:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Sunday, March 4, for judging. Entries being mailed in – which are usually candy entries – must arrive Friday, March 2, to Pecan Food Fantasy Contest, Doña Ana County Extension Service, 530 N. Church St., Las Cruces, NM 88001.

Judging will begin at 1 p.m. with one judge evaluating each category. Some of the judges,

Weaver said, are food science professors at New Mexico State University, including Willis Fedio who is responsible for the traditional pecan pie category and Wanda Eastman who will judge the on the lighter side entries.

Awards for first through third place will be given for adults – ages 19 and older – and youth winners and will include a ribbon and cash prizes of varying amounts.

From 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday, March 5, samples of the entries and award results will be on display.

"It's fun to see all of the entries," Weaver said. "Everyone who enters also gets a brochure with last year's winning recipes so they have more ways to use pecans."

# **Another way to help Habitat's recipients**

MVHFH computer donation program trains homeowners on important skill

In the age of email, social media, YouTube, PowerPoint and video chat, it can be hard to imagine getting through daily life without the

use or access to a computer.

To help connect everyone to this essential digital technology, Habitat for Humanity International has teamed up with Redemtech to provide home recipients with donated, refurbished computers.

"Statistics show that one in every four households – that's about 28 million – don't have access to a PC," said Mesilla Valley Habitat for Humanity Development Officer Marie Schwarts.

Working to provide community members with not just homes, but other elements to improve their lives, MVHFH Operations Coordinator Maria Vasquez said she saw such an opportunity through this computer program.

Beginning last year through a pilot program, Vasquez said the computer refurbishing company donated updated computers with Microsoft software to one Habitat for Humanity affiliate to see what sort of response it would generate. The outcome was a success.

"They saw how much good it did in the community," she said. "It really helped everyone – parents, students, children. Habitat International decided to extend the program to all affiliates two months ago and that's when we signed up."

One of more than 1,700 Habitat affiliates across the United States to take advantage of the program, MVHFH has received five computers for the five families receiving homes this build season.

"We call (Habitat) building homes, building hope," Schwartz said. "This is one way we're helping the families. We take things like having easy computer access for granted sometimes."

"We're giving them access to technology, which most low-income families don't have," said Vasquez, adding that everything from applying for jobs to doing schoolwork requires access to a computer and the Internet.

Vasquez said there are some requirements MVHFH must fulfill as part of the program,

the most important being training the homeowners on how to use the computers within 60 days from the organization receiving them.

"We're looking for help training the families and helping to set up the computers in their homes," Schwartz said. "We want to start the training as soon as possible."

Volunteers will help the MVHFH staff train the homeowners on things such as basic computer skills, Internet safety including parental controls and the proper disposal of the computer when the time comes.

Vasquez said they have been provided a manual to help with the training, so anyone – from the computer savvy to those who just enjoy the technology – can help their fellow Las Crucens.

"We hope these computers make their lives easier and expands their knowledge," Vasquez said.

Schwartz said those with MVHFH are grateful for receiving the computers and hope to be able to receive more in the future.

"This will allow the kids to have lifelong computer skills," she said. "Statistics show that children of homeowners are more likely to graduate high school and pursue a higher degree. Hopefully this will help that even more."

# A plant for sun, shade

Boxwood is ideal for those hard-to-grow-in areas

If you are looking for something easy to grow, take a look the versatile boxwood.

This plant grows in our hot, dry sun as well as partial shade. It can grow in containers as entry or even specimen plants. You can train it into bonsai form or use it as a small hedge. With age, it can also be used as a large hedge.

Very few ailments plague this wonder. As long as it receives regular irrigation it will thrive in our hot, arid climate. It typically does not get powdery mildew, so it does well with a fair amount of shade. This is an ideal plant for those areas of your landscape that get both. Courtyards are a prime example of this as they can get shade throughout the early morning and late evening hours, but get that hot blazing sun during midday.

The only insects I have ever witnessed on these plants were grub worms in the root ball. Although older, more mature specimens should be able to cope with the grub attack, smaller and newly planted versions may succumb to the voracious appetite of this white worm. If new shrub appears to be on the demise and you have ruled out water and fertilizer or herbicide damage, check the root ball for the dreaded grub worm and treat if necessary.

These plants can be left to grow in their natural form or can take regular pruning. The shapes they can take on are limited only to the imagination of the person that is pruning them.

They can be pruned into geometric figures, soft rounded curves or globes, or even animal shapes. Keep in mind there are several cultivars of this plant – some may grow more than 6 to 8 feet tall, some may grow columnar and some may grow conical – so it is important to look at the growing habits listed on its label. Try to keep the tags in a file in case you need to match one later on. This tip applies to any plant acquired.

If you are growing these in a container the possibilities are limitless. You can choose just about any container size, shape or color that you desire. Of course you should pick a size

slightly larger than the size of the original root ball. The same rules listed above still apply for pruning although you may have to water more frequently during the summer months.

You can break up the monotony of just green plants by adding seasonal flowering annuals around the base of the main trunk of the boxwood. Pansies and viola can be use during the winter months, and petunia, ice plant, verbena, moss rose, alyssum, among others can be used during the summer and fall months.

If bonsai is your thing, this plant is a great choice. Whether you are placing it in a Bosai pot or in the ground, its gnarly bark on the main trunk and lower limbs make this a perfect specimen. Selectively pruning the bottom and shearing the top it the easiest way to begin the bonsai process on this gem. It will only look better as each year and season passes on this plant.

Avoid high nitrogen fertilizers as this will lead to excessive lush growth, thus minimizing the bonsai look. Try to use natural or slow release fertilizers for this task.

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# Planting seed for volunteering

## NMSU alumni, faculty help La Semilla Food Center

Two years ago this month, the nonprofit La Semilla Food Center was founded by former New Mexico State University alumni Aaron Sharratt and Rebecca Wiggins-Reinhard and Cristina Dominguez-Eshelman, former coordinator of NMSU's Frontier Interdisciplinary Experiences program.

La Semilla is an outgrowth of the trio's efforts with the Colonias Development Council, where they worked with youth and their families in Vado, Anthony and Chaparral to build community gardens, construct greenhouses and create youth development and educational projects.

"Over the years, we saw the impact that our projects were having, as well as the need that existed in terms of an entity that just focused on food issues and really addressed hunger and poverty," said Sharratt, co-director of La Semilla, who earned his master's degree in anthropology at NMSU. "Our mission

is to create a really vibrant and local food system in the Paso del Norte region, and to do that we know it's a very long-term goal considering that most of our production in this region is exported to other places.

"As a region we don't feed ourselves, so trying to get to where we can feed ourselves, where people are involved in growing, where we have thriving local economies – we know that food and agricultural production is a very important element of that."

La Semilla is receiving funds and other help from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the Paso del Norte Health Foundation, the New Mexico Community Foundation and the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, among others. Local small businesses also are assisting La Semilla.

"The approach we take to food system development is very comprehensive," Sharratt said. "It involves a number of very

different projects and programs that we are developing, but also a number of different collaborations and partnerships. We work in the school settings in Anthony and Las Cruces, where we are working to develop school gardens."

The school gardens are located at Loma Linda Elementary School in Anthony, N.M., and Sierra Middle School in Las Cruces. La Semilla's Kristina St. Cyr coordinates the Sierra Middle School garden and works closely with teachers and student

"I try to integrate food education, nutrition, food systems into their curriculum. I work with students inside and outside in the garden. We do a lot of hands-on fun activities in the garden, but we also try to make it so it is integrated into the actual curriculum," St. Cyr said. "Once everything started growing, we taught them how to continue to take care of their plants and how to weed the plot. They would continually come out to take data and they would water it and make sure everything was doing OK."

Melly Locke, a seventh-grade science teacher at Sierra Middle School, has found La Semilla's help in teaching her students invaluable, even if she did have to show some of the youngsters in her charge how to use shovels and hoes.

"I am a believer in having kids actually be hands-on with

their science experiments," Locke said. "They can talk about experimentation, they can talk about growing a plant, but when they actually do it, they have a much better feel for what they can learn and they have an opportunity to learn in a real-life situation."

In keeping with La Semilla's mission, the school gardens expose the youngsters to the process of how food gets from the fields to the grocery store and, finally, to their plates. The gardens also teach the students that healthy food can be affordable and accessible.

It's a lesson seventh-grade Sierra Middle School student, Selena Rossi, already is incorporating into her life.

"It's actually because of this experience that I have been inspired to start my own garden," she said. "So far it's been coming along really well."

La Semilla also is working to show families that cooking at home and making healthy choices benefit the entire family.

"There's such a connection we have with food that goes beyond subsistence," said Wiggins-Reinhard, a co-director of La Semilla who earned her master's degree in political science from NMSU. "It's tied to our personal identity. It's tied to our culture, our families. We build memories around holiday meals, picking peaches right off the tree in summertime. So food is

important to our lives in many ways. La Semilla, for me, is really an opportunity to work with youth to help them become advocates for change in their communities."

Sharratt said he hopes the next major engine for change at La Semilla is a multi-acre tract of land near Anthony that has been donated to the organization. The plan is to create a youth and community farm on the spot.

"We are working to create a kind of food hub, in a way a microcosm of what a localized food system would look like, connecting production with consumers and community members," he said.

Dominguez-Eshelman said La Semilla is working with community leaders to make the farm not only a place where youngsters will learn how to grow their own food, but also how to market their produce directly to the community. Eventually, La Semilla would like the 14-acre farmland two miles north of Anthony to become a community-gathering place.

"We'll grow on part of it with our youth and other people will have the opportunity to grow there as well," Dominguez-Eshelman said. "Long term we're hoping to have a community center where we can produce value-added products and also offer different workshops, so that this community space would be a place where we could discuss food systems issues and other issues facing the community."

Sharratt credits NMSU and its faculty for helping to nurture La Semilla and its mission. Last year, La Semilla worked out of office space in Studio G inside the Entrepreneurship Institute at the Arrowhead Center. But La Semilla's connections to NMSU run deeper.

Constance Falk, professor of agricultural economics and agricultural business in the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, has been involved with La Semilla since its inception and currently sits on the board of directors. She said it has been rewarding to see a nonprofit such as La Semilla grow from the ground up and hopes other NMSU faculty members and students take time to learn about and help the organization.

"To the extent that we can work with community groups to solve real problems, I think that only brings to the classroom and brings to our research something that is exciting and relevant and hopefully has an impact on improving the lives of everyone here," Falk said, "New Mexico State University, being a land-grant university, that is our mission: to serve the needs of the rural population and agricultural producers — that's our mandate from the beginning. The work of La Semilla embodies that tradition, that goal and that mission."

M. Lois Stanford, associate professor of anthropology, supervised Sharratt's field research in Mexico and is heartened by the fact that her former student remained in Las Cruces and has committed himself to helping the regional community.

"What I think La Semilla has really demonstrated is the important contribution our students can make to the community and their ability to really come up with innovative and creative projects," said Stanford, who also sits on La Semilla's board of directors. "As faculty on the board, we are really advising and are there to provide support. But the energy and the drive and the vision for La Semilla come from these ex-students. We've prepared them. We've trained them academically. It's exciting to see what our former students can do in the community with those skills."

For his part, Sharratt is grateful to NMSU for the education he received and the helping hands that have been offered.

"My experience at NMSU really prepared me in every way," he said. "A number of faculty members have been involved at various stages and really stepped up and helped in any way they could."

# A dinner pancake

## Breakfast staple turns savory with chile

Recently, I hankered for pancakes – not for breakfast, but for dinner.

I needed a quick fix. Actually two: pancakes and chile. I thumbed through my cookbook hoard but was unable to find a recipe that was taste bud appealing. But after conducting a Google search pairing "pancakes with chiles," "pancakes with green chile peppers" and "pancakes with chili," a few recipes (but not many), populated the screen.

The first one caught my attention, "green chili pepper pancakes (gochujeon)." Gochujeon, I learned, is the Korean version of pancakes and rather than served at breakfast, it's a lunchtime side dish specialty served at room temperature with steamed rice. Similar to a frittata, it's prepared with fish sauce, a condiment used liberally in Thai cooking, about as liberally as we use salt and pepper.

I think you'll find this pancake tasty. I served it with a salad tossed with mandarin oranges and Vidalia onion dressing – a perfect match. Consider trying the other peppered pancake recipes (such as enchilada) shared in this week's column. Plenty of punch!

#### Gochujeon

1 cup fresh green chile pepper, stemmed, seeded and chopped (I used a mix of Anaheim and serrano.)

2 tablespoons onion, chopped

1/2 cup water

1/2 cup flour

1 tablespoon fish sauce (When purchasing fish sauce, look for authentic – "Made in Thailand or Vietnam." Most authentic fish sauce lists chile and lime juice in their ingredients.)

1 tablespoon vegetable oil or olive oil
Place chile and onion into a bowl. Add

Place chile and onion into a bowl. Ac water, flour and fish sauce. Mix well.

Heat up a non-stick pan and oil, just enough to coat the bottom of the pan. Add the mixture to the heated pan and spread thinly. Sizzle until the bottom of the pancake turns golden brown and crispy. Turn it over with spatula or flip it and cook until the flip side turns golden brown and crispy. Transfer pancake to a cutting board and allow to cool. Using a knife cut the frittata into bite-size pieces and serve with steaming-hot rice. Makes 1 to 2 servings.

### **Red-Hot Parsnip Cakes**

2 pounds parsnips, peeled 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup onion, chopped 1/4 cup all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon red chile powder 1 egg, lightly beaten 1 tablespoon chives, minced

Place parsnips in a large saucepan and cover with water; add salt. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat; cover and cook for 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Drain and place parsnips in a large bowl; mash. Stir in the onion, flour, red chile powder, egg and chives.

Drop batter by 1/4 cupfuls onto a well-greased hot griddle. Flatten with a spatula. Fry until golden brown, turn and cook until second side is lightly browned. Drain on paper towels. Makes 4 servings.

#### Poached Eggs Over Potato-Green Pepper Pancakes

1/2 cup safflower, canola, peanut, or other high-heat oil

1 large russet potato, peeled and shredded 1/2 Anaheim or poblano pepper,

stemmed, seeded and shredded 1 large shallot, peeled and shredded 2 tablespoons flour

1 teaspoon salt

2 eggs

Set a saucepan 1/2 filled with salted water on to boil. Heat oil in a large (preferably nonstick) skillet over medium-high. While the oil heats, stir together the potatoes, green pepper, shallot, flour, and salt. When the oil is hot, drop 2 or 3 large spoonfuls of the potato mixture into the oil. Use a spatula to flatten and spread the potatoes a bit, into pancake shapes. Fry until golden brown, then turn pancakes over and brown on the other side. Drain on paper towels. Fry remaining pancakes; drain. Place one or two pancakes on each plate. Cover with tin foil to keep warm.

Reduce heat in frying pan to a simmer. Crack each egg into the water and simmer for three minutes or until desired doneness. Using a slotted spoon, scoop each egg out of the water, allowing water to drain. Place one egg on top of each pancake. Add salt and pepper to taste, if desired. Serve immediately. Makes 2 servings. # Jalapeño Potato Pancakes

1 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup potatoes, mashed

1 cup raw potato, finely grated

1 jalapeño pepper, stemmed, seeded and minced

2 eggs, well beaten

1/3 cup milk 1 tablespoon butter

Sift baking powder and salt into a bowl. When well mixed, blend in mashed cooked potatoes. Pat grated raw potatoes in a paper towel to remove excess moisture. Add potatoes to the bowl along with 2 eggs and just enough milk to make a thick batter.

In a skillet, melt butter. Drop batter by tablespoons into pan. Press down to flatten. Cook pancakes 4 minutes on each side or until golden. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

# Sweet Heat Potato Pancakes

1 cup sifted flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 2 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon



Try a stack of peppered pancakes for dinner.

1/2 teaspoon cayenne powder Pinch ground cloves 2/3 cup cooked, mashed sweet potatoes 2 tablespoon butter, melted 1 egg, beaten

1 1/4 cups milk
In a large bowl, combine flour, baking powder, sugar and spices. In a separate bowl, whisk together remaining ingredients until smooth. Add potato mixture to flour mixture and mix until blended.

Spray a griddle with non-stick spray (or brush with vegetable oil).

Drop 2 large tablespoons (for each pancake) onto sizzling hot griddle. Lower heat and cook until bottom of pancake is nicely browned and tiny bubbles form along top edges; flip with spatula. Brown other side. Serving suggestion: Serve with melted butter and favorite syrup or strawberry sauce and whipped cream. Makes 4 servings.

#### **Corn Enchilada Pancakes**

1 (8.5 ounce) box cornbread mix 1 jalapeño, stemmed, seeded and minced 1 eσσ

1 to 1 1/2 cup milk

Mix according to package directions but add enough milk to make a pancake batter consistency. Cook as you would pancakes. Keep warm.

Topping suggestions: Heated verde or rojo sauce topped with a dollop of sour cream and a cilantro sprig.

What this means for Las Cruces is that we can compete on a national level and win," he said.


