## Schools get poor grades

Few A's found in first report card on schools

The state released grades on all public schools and for the Las Cruces district, which showed there is plenty of room for improvement, Superintendent Stan Rounds said in a press conference Tuesday, Jan. 10.

In the coming weeks, school administrators will be "unpacking" the data to determine where the schools fell short, but Rounds said in several cases, schools barely missed advancing to the next grade by a percentage point or less.

Nevertheless, this first report card had only two schools earning A's, five schools earning B's, 10 schools getting C's, 18 schools getting D's and four schools were hit with an F.

Rounds, who is on an advisory group of superintendents to help develop the letter grading system for schools, characterized the report card as "a simulation" to work out the kinks of assigning grades to schools. Though the system looks at things such as test scores and attendance from the past two school years, he said the grading system has a strong "value-added" approach that seeks to identify whether schools are succeeding in having students gain proficiency as they advance from one school year to the next.

Rounds admitted that some of these first grades were perplexing. For example, Las Cruces and Oñate high schools earned B's, while Mayfield High School ended up with a D grade.

"That was a surprise to me," Rounds said. "In my view, Mayfield is not a D school."

Rounds said he favors the letter grade approach over the national No Child Left Behind (NCLB) rating in which schools either pass or fail if they don't meet numerous benchmarks, with higher standards set each year, which educators say dooms nearly all schools to eventual failure.

To help schools failing under NCLB, educators put a lot of emphasis on bringing up lower performing students, while the Las Cruces school system has a strong tradition of supporting high-performing students. What the new state grading system reveals, Rounds said, is the schools

## Legislators ready for next session

Increased revenues help, but thorny issues linger

More revenues than expected presents the opportunity for a productive 30-day Legislature beginning Tuesday, Jan. 17, depending on what Gov. Susana Martinez adds to the agenda along with making a budget.

Martinez and the Legislative Finance Committee have presented budgets to serve as starting points for the session. Martinez's budget totals \$5.6 billion while the LFC budget is set at \$5.7 billion.

According to Rep. Don Tripp, R-Socorro, the two budgets aren't too different, which should also

help the process.

After three years of budget cuts, both proposals call for increased spending. The governor's plan asks for \$194 million more, while the LFC is proposing \$250 million.

Members of the LFC are more optimistic about continued improved revenues from oil and natural gas taxes.

A big difference between the budgets is that Martinez is calling for \$55 million in tax breaks that would benefit small businesses, the construction and manufacturing industries and businesses that hire veterans. The breaks would come in the form of tax

## Susana Martinez makes her mark

Governor continues pursuit of reforms

*Editor's note: In this state centennial year, the Bulletin is running stories looking at the area's history from the last 100 years. This is the final story of a series on each of the four governors who have come from Las Cruces.*

Just by being sworn in, Gov. Susana Martinez had a significant place in the history books, not only as the first woman to be elected governor in New Mexico, but she is the first Hispanic woman to be governor in the

United States.

Although she described herself as an underdog when she first announced her run from the dining room of Roberto's Mexican Food restaurant, her credentials as a longtime prosecutor and district attorney in Doña Ana County gave resonance to her campaign, promising to end corruption in state government.

But, according to supporter Ceil Levatino, Martinez had more going for her than having a timely message as scandals tarnished the final years of Bill Richardson's administration.

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
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# Restoring the past at the Amador Hotel fundraiser

Supporters fill the lobby of the historic Amador Hotel Saturday, Jan. 7, for a fundraiser. The adobe hotel is being restored through donations and volunteer efforts, including the assistance of New Mexico State University students.

Estimates for the cost of restoring the hotel are between \$7 million and \$11 million. Built by Martin Amador in 1866, the hotel also has been a jail, post office, bank and offices for Doña Ana County officials. The City of Las Cruces now owns the building and is allowing the nonprofit Amador Hotel Foundation to restore and develop the building into a visitor's center and restaurant.

Jaki and I had just settled into our seats to enjoy the Dec. 28, 2011, Aggie basketball game versus the University of New Mexico. We sat proudly with our granddaughter Audrie and son Jeff who had traveled from California to join us for the holidays. Excitement was in the air as Aggie fans anticipated another victory over the Lobos.

Then I received a phone call.

It was Jaki's brother. He quietly explained that his and Jaki's mother, Viola Ballew, had passed away in Oklahoma City as she was being transported in an ambulance. I offered a brief condolence and explained that Jaki and I were at an Aggie game, but that we would leave shortly and Jaki would be able to call him back right away.

My mind raced as I contemplated how to handle the immediate situation. The answer was easy. We had to leave the game. I told Jaki we needed to leave. I simply avoided answering her questions about the reason for our departure.

As we grabbed our coats, I noted that the Aggies were already trailing the Lobos by a dozen points. A brief concern was that some of our fellow Aggie supporters would think we were leaving the game early because the Aggies were losing. On the other hand, I was comforted by the fact anyone who knows us also knows that we always stay throughout almost every Aggie game we attend, regardless of the final score.

On the short drive home, we sat quietly, and I began to review in my mind all the things with which we would have to deal, mostly in an unplanned manner. Travel plans would have to be made. It was the end of the year, our busiest time at our company because of year-end details that had to be dealt with before Jan. 1. New Year's holiday was coming up. We were in the middle of the home stretch of completing our 200-page, 2012 Southwest New Mexico Legislative Guide that had to be sent to the printer by Jan. 5. Oh, so much to do.

And there were our plans for celebrating New Mexico's centennial in Las Cruces - the parade, the parties and other events, including extensively promoting our centennial book. These are things we had planned and worked on for the past two years.

When we arrived home, I shared with Jaki that her mother had died. The news was not a great surprise. Her mom had suffered a stroke in July 2011 and had not recovered. Still, the reality of the finality of her mom's life hit hard. Jaki accepted the news stoically and immediately began focusing on preparing for her trip and the planning of her mom's funeral.

Jaki's inner strength and her ability to change her priorities helped me to make similar decisions. I advised our Bulletin team members that Jaki and I would be out of town through the first week of January, and it was up to them to complete the Legislative Guide and to represent the Bulletin at the centennial events.

Jaki and I took care of the crucial business decisions first thing the next morning. Jaki then flew to Oklahoma City to set the funeral plans. Jeff and I made the 12-hour drive by car the next day.

Viola Ballew's services were held beautifully in the new chapel of the Smith & Kernke Funeral Home, just as Vi had wanted. What was unexpected was that Jaki, who does not normally speak in public, chose to speak on behalf of her mother.

Jaki recognized the pride of her mother's life - all the grandchildren and great-grandchildren. In a very touching, heartfelt manner, Jaki described her mom as a simple, loving mother who, like many others from her era, made great sacrifices to ensure that her children had opportunities to be successful in life. She reminded us all to always show respect and appreciation to those around us, especially to those from her mom's generation.

Upon hearing Jaki's words and realizing the courage it took for her to speak at her mom's services, I was calmed from my worries about all the other things in our life, such as business deals and events that I thought were important.

And, you know what? Jaki was right. Everything in Las Cruces was handled just fine, without us.

And the sun came up and shone beautifully the next day.

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# Arizona follows different path

## New Mexico's sister state also distrusted in the east

At first glance, New Mexico and Arizona appear to be sister states. Both were claimed and explored by Spain in the 1500s. Both had equal periods of Spanish, Mexican and American rule. Both were granted U.S. statehood a month apart in 1912.

But otherwise, the differences are great. For nearly a millennium, New Mexico was peopled by peaceful Pueblo farmers. Arizona was controlled by marauding, nomadic Apaches. New Mexico was colonized in 1598. But Spain had little interest in the land that now is Arizona. It was hard to traverse because of that huge canyon blocking northern exploration and travel. It was left to the Apaches.

When Mexico gained its independence from Spain in 1821, it began allowing in non-Spanish settlers and traders. That began the Santa Fe Trail, bringing people of many cultures and ethnicities from the East and Midwest.

Most of them didn't keep moving west to Arizona where there was no protection from Apaches. Arizona's early migration came from the Southern states looking for farmland. But the farther west they got, the more arid the land became.

Interest in Arizona didn't start until the United States decided it wanted California. Thus, in 1846, Gen. Kearny's California Column claimed Santa Fe, stayed for a while to establish

a government and then continued down the Rio Grande and through southern Arizona to California.

New Mexico came close to gaining statehood in 1849, but the compromise of 1850, heavily influenced by the slavery issue, made us a territory. It took Arizona another 13 years just to become a territory. It petitioned the U.S. government five times.

After the formation of the Confederacy, Arizona petitioned twice and finally was accepted as a Confederate territory after the Confederacy invaded New Mexico and claimed both states. That caught Washington's attention, which made Arizona a U.S. territory in 1863 after turning back the Confederates at Glorieta.

Tucson fully expected to become the territorial capital, but because of its Confederate leanings, Prescott was the first capital. Soon, Tucson grabbed it away. Prescott got it back and it eventually ended up in Phoenix.

Santa Fe has been New Mexico's capital for more than 400 years.

Between 1875 and 1910, New Mexico and Arizona tried many times to gain statehood from Congress, but they never worked together. Several times, one house of Congress or the

### Freeze not a total surprise

The effects of sustained near-zero weather should not have been a surprise for El Paso Electric Co.

In late December 1989, central Texas had three days of freezing temperatures, dropping as low as minus 1 degrees at the Dallas-Fort Worth airport. The ERCOT grid almost went completely down, for reasons virtually identical to what happened in February 2011. The Texas PUC report is available for anyone to read on my MediaFire site [www.mediafire.com/?enld0ye803a23](http://www.mediafire.com/?enld0ye803a23), along with the Black & Veatch report for EPE.

Unlike a power loss during hot temperatures, people and communities had pipes burst due to the freezing temperatures and loss of flow. In addition, those people with forced air central heating couldn't use it because there was no power for the fan.

When someone builds in Doña Ana County, they are required to plan for a possible 100-year rainstorm. EPE didn't even look back 22 years to see the effect of poor planning for cold weather.

As a retired naval nuclear power officer whose last shipboard duty was as the senior electrical officer onboard the USS Nimitz (CVN-68), I would have been figuratively keel-hauled if I had dropped the load like EPE did.

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# New Mexico history full of characters

## Not a lot of conversation when Baldy Russell dropped by for vittles

The centennial celebration has me thinking about "unusual" New Mexico historical characters.

When talking the past, most people only remember Billy the Kid. Tourists come to see what is left of him. Not much. The tombstone tourists see in Fort Sumner is really a

monument to the local chamber of commerce, since all that is under it is dirt. His grave, along with the others at the federal cemetery, washed away in the flood of 1915. The army moved the comingled bones to Santa Fe.

It does not hurt anything to have tourists come to New Mexico and stand before the Fort Sumner tombstone – they bring money.

To many of us locals, Billy the Kid is not interesting. The legend of Billy was fabricated in book form in the 1920s by Walter Noble Burns 40 years after Billy's death. There

is little interesting about the real Billy, who only killed several unarmed people and was not missed until the legend began.

Contrast that with real New Mexico historical characters.

Many outlaws made it through their wild years and then became somewhat model citizens. They became the fabric of our state in that they upheld the law and worked hard. One such person lived many years ago 20 miles south of Carrizozo. The name he went by was Baldy Russell. The name, "Russell" was assumed while the name "Baldy" was applied.

His real name was Jim Mitchell. He was wanted in Texas. In New Mexico, Baldy wasn't bothered by lawmen. There were many men in Western history known as Lefty or Slim or Baldy. These men had a history elsewhere, but they were model citizens in New Mexico.

Baldy was noted for being extremely quiet. Old timers tell of the time he rode into a Bar W cow camp at dinner time. At mealtime everyone within riding distance was welcome to eat at the chuck wagon of any cow camp kitchen.

Baldy rode into camp without speaking. He nodded to men he knew, but for reasons of his own, he didn't feel like talking. He got himself a plate of food and squatted down by himself.

The cowboys knew that if Baldy wanted solitude, it was best to leave him alone. He was a "tough hombre" and best handled with care. That is the way it was done 100 years ago. Maybe today someone would have walked over and made a nuisance of himself, but not then.

Baldy got himself a second cup of coffee,

which he drank while rolling a Bull Durham cigarette. He handed the cup back to the cook with a nod to the men sitting there, which meant that anyone near his ranch at supper time was welcome to share dinner with him, and then ambled over to get his horse.

On the way out of camp he saw a horse he had once owned. He walked over to the horse, patted it and to the horse spoke the only words he spoke that evening. He said, "Hi, Fella."

Now that's the silent type.

Another story about Baldy involves him and Jim Gilliland, a man who, while not an outlaw, was thought by some citizens of this area as having some of the same attributes.

At first, they were friendly neighbors.

Jim Gilliland and Baldy Russell got along fine. But then one thing led to another and they became suspicious of each other for possibly stealing the other's cattle. Each one thought they had lost cattle.

This built up to the point where one day Jim rode up on Baldy unexpectedly and they both immediately drew their six-shooters and kept each other covered.

Neither had made up his mind that shooting was called for in this

matter, but both had pulled their pistols. They stood staring at each other for a little while.

Finally Baldy said, "Well, one of us either ought to smile or pull the trigger."


He meant someone had to either shoot or admit he was just fooling when he drew his pistol.

The Bureau of Land Management is proposing to increase visitor fees at local sites including the Dripping Springs Natural Area and Aguirre Spring Campground in the Organ Mountains and the Three Rivers Petroglyph Site, near Tularosa, N.M.

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

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# Boushey flies with JATO

## Goddard disciple advances jet propulsion

*Editor's note: This is part one of a two-part story.*

Air Force Brig. Gen. Homer Boushey was "an early advocate of space exploration," his obituary on the website [www.sfgate.com](http://www.sfgate.com) stated.

"It has been said that 'he who controls the moon controls the earth,'" said Boushey, deputy director of USAF Research and Development, declared to the Washington D.C. Aero Club in January 1958. "Our planners must carefully evaluate this statement for, if true – and I, for one, think it is – then the U.S. must control the moon."

U.S. News and World Report published his remarks in the Feb. 7, 1958, issue, including Boushey pointing out the "dire consequences should the Soviet Union seize control of the moon," said [www.beyondapollo.blogspot.com](http://www.beyondapollo.blogspot.com). He wasn't exactly politically correct, considering that a year earlier, on Jan. 14, 1957, "the United States proposed before the United Nations Assembly that study be initiated toward international agreements assuring the use of outer space for peaceful purposes only," said [www.nasa.gov](http://www.nasa.gov).

Boushey's audience was no doubt aware that on Oct. 4, 1957, four months before his speech, the Soviet Union had put Sputnik I into orbit. They repeated the feat on Nov. 3, launching the dog Laika aboard Sputnik II. Conversely, America's Vanguard satellite boosters exploded at launch.

Boushey was born in San Francisco in 1909. The Depression "interrupted" his education at Stanford University, an obituary at [www.almanacnews.com](http://www.almanacnews.com) stated. Boushey

would eventually earn an engineering degree, but in 1932 he enrolled in flight school at San Antonio. His biography at [www.af.mil](http://www.af.mil) said he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Corps reserve. In 1934 he was stationed with the 8th Pursuit Group, Langley Field, Va., when "President Franklin Roosevelt canceled airline postal contracts," [www.almanacnews.com](http://www.almanacnews.com) said. Boushey was "ordered to 'fly the mail,'" and did so "in an open-cockpit biplane between Cleveland and Newark."

Boushey's real interest was rocketry. He'd read Dr. Robert Goddard's "A Method of Reaching Extreme Altitudes," [www.almanacnews.com](http://www.almanacnews.com) said.

His "Army superiors," though, didn't share his interest. George Pendle, in "Strange Angel," wrote they "ordered him to forget rocketry." But Boushey wouldn't, and on June 17, 1940, he pitched an idea to Goddard.





"I am taking the liberty of writing you, in the hope that you may be interested in an invention of mine, whereby the efficiency of a rocket, or more specifically a rocket-propeller combination, is increased at relatively slow speeds through air," Boushey said in the

letter, reprinted in "The Papers of Robert H. Goddard Volume III: 1938-1945." "You might be interested in using, adapting or developing my invention."

Goddard and Boushey began regular correspondence, also included in the book. Boushey "traveled often to Roswell," [www.almanacnews.com](http://www.almanacnews.com) said. Goddard would be godfather to one of Boushey's daughters, and Boushey would be one of the last to visit Goddard before his death in 1945.

"Boushey was not the first of the professor's would-be disciples, but to Goddard he was the most appealing," Milton Lehman said in "Robert H. Goddard: Pioneer of Space Research." "The lieutenant's mild manner masked a zealot. He was an accomplished flier, a student of aeronautical science, a hopeful inventor and a private reader of ... space-fiction magazines."

Goddard responded to Boushey on June 22, 1940, inviting him to dinner while cautioning: "I do not know how much help I can be, beyond some theoretical considerations, as rocket propellers are new territory to all of us. In any case, it would be pleasant to talk with someone who is interested in rocket developments."

Conversation at their first meeting ranged from Goddard's progress on liquid fuel, to interplanetary flight, Lehman said Boushey later recalled.

On July 27, 1940, Goddard referenced Boushey and "auxiliary takeoff devices" in a letter to Brig. Gen. George Brett, a pilot, commander, and veteran of World Wars I and II.

Then, on Oct. 7, Boushey informed Goddard he had "been assigned to Wright Field" as "Project Engineer immediately in charge of the Jet Propulsion Project." Goddard had begun developing proposals, which the Army Air Corps apparently didn't initially accept because, on Oct. 19, Boushey stated Goddard had "failed to present (his) case in a favorable light." Boushey did suggest resubmitting "an entirely different type of presentation" that addressed fuel consumption, thrust and horsepower. Goddard provided answers on Oct. 24, with the caveat it was "a favor to you personally" and not "considered in any way as a 'proposal.'" Goddard then stressed he was "quite satisfied to continue the present high-altitude work" for which the Guggenheim Foundation had granted him \$100,000.

At Wright, Lehman said Boushey "submitted a glowing report ... on Goddard's rocket," which Goddard had named Nell, and "recommended its modification for jet-assisted take-offs," commonly called JATO.

Goddard's diary entries of July 11 and 17, 1941, record Boushey witnessed static rocket engine firings those days in Roswell.

"You have no idea how Nell thrilled me," Boushey wrote from El Paso, later on July 17. "I'm very eager to put her to work now."

On Aug. 12, Goddard wrote Boushey of the proposals he was preparing for, or submitting to, the various military branches, the very day Boushey became the first American to fly with a JATO. In 1941, Boushey was a graduate student under Theodore von Kármán at the Guggenheim Aeronautical Laboratory at the California Institute of Technology (GALCIT), said "Universal Man."

Von Kármán oversaw the group developing the fuel, which included college dropout Jack Parsons, 26; high school dropout Ed Forman; and Cal Tech grad student Frank Malina. Because of their penchant for explosives, they'd earned the moniker "The Suicide Squad." Pendle said the fuel, known as GALCIT 27 for "the twenty-seventh unique fuel Parsons had created," was nicknamed by one engineer "the goop." The fuel would be inserted in a rocket motor "one foot long, three inches in diameter, and made of one-inch-thick steel." The "three pounds of propellant (would be) compressed under 1,800 pounds of pressure."

Levatino recalled traveling with Martinez to a July 4 event in Las Vegas, N.M., during the campaign. She said Martinez was embraced “like a rock star.” People swarmed her, with many asking for her autograph and to have their picture taken with her. Levatino recalled a number of women telling Martinez in Spanish that they had always voted Democrat before, but would vote for her – a Republican.

“That’s when I knew she was going to win,” Levatino said. “She is so charismatic. She just draws people to her.”

Sworn into office January 2011, Martinez began her

administration by issuing a series of executive orders promising government transparency and belt-tightening as the state faced a \$250 million shortfall.

That first year in office was nearly “nonstop,” Martinez said, as she set up a new, leaner administration, completed her first 60-day legislative session with a balanced budget and called a special session to work on redistricting.

“Nonstop because it truly is,” Martinez said. “About 99 percent of time, it is seven days a week and about 12- to 15-hour days, but it’s very challenging and exciting at the same time.”

In that first regular session, Martinez said she was able to balance the budget without raising taxes.

can’t ignore those students in the middle.

That’s why the letter grade system gives a better picture than the rigid pass/fail approach in NCLB, he said.

“I want to say there’s no excuses here – grades are grades,” Rounds said.

Once the criteria and data used for giving the grades are made available, Rounds said the focus will be to improve the grades as schools prepare for spring testing. “Now is the time to get into the academic learning piece of this,” he said.

Rounds said he welcomed the new state grading system as a wake-up call for parents, educators and the community to help all students do better at their schools.

Statewide, 73 schools received A’s, 191 B’s, 266 C’s, 208 schools D’s and 89 F’s. Rounds acknowledged the percentages of Las Cruces district schools were less than the state averages for the passing grades, even though the district overall has a better attendance rate than the state average.

“My message is don’t get discouraged,” Rounds said. “We are so close to meeting the statistical average.”

The new grading system proves the state’s schools are much better than how NCLB makes them look, said Gov. Susana Martinez. Eighty-seven percent of the state’s schools are deemed as failing under NCLB, the Associated Press reports. That means 715 schools failed and only 113 passed under NCLB. Of the schools getting a C or better, 79 percent of those were considered failing under NCLB last

year, according to the AP.

“Thanks to our straightforward, new A-F grading system, parents, teachers and community leaders have a much clearer understanding of where our schools are succeeding and where we need to focus our efforts and our resources to improve,” Martinez said.

The governor is asking the federal

government to allow New Mexico schools to operate under the new letter grade system and not follow the NCLB model.

deductions or exemptions.

Martinez proposes lifting the gross receipts taxes on 40,000 small businesses – defined as those with a tax liability of less than \$200 a month. The governor also wants to remove the tax from some transactions involving construction and manufacturing companies to lessen what's called tax pyramiding. Businesses complain they sometimes pay a tax on a tax when they buy some services that are then incorporated into a final product.

Martinez also proposed a tax credit for companies that hire veterans returning from military deployments, and exempting 25 percent of a veteran's pension from state income taxes.

She also is proposing a credit for research-and-development businesses.

During a recent visit to Mesquite, LFC Chairman Sen. John Arthur Smith, D-Deming, said he believed in using much of the extra money to help out the state's higher education system because they were hit hardest in the recent budget reductions.

With the debate about social promotion expanding to putting more focus on improving teaching in the first years of school rather than just for more intensive work in the third grade, Smith said the LFC is calling for \$23 million to be added for early childhood education.

Martinez is expected to push hard for her education reforms in the upcoming session.

"Sometimes New Mexico is the land of mañana," Martinez has been frequently quoted. "We can't afford to wait any longer unless we

want to continue being 49th in education."

Smith said he is very concerned about the long-term solvency of not only the retirement fund for educators, as well as for all state employees. But Smith said he believes a plan can be passed this session without forcing teachers to pay more for their retirement, though they may have to retire later than they expected. That's better than cutting back benefits, he said.

News of the improved state revenues can be played to help the economy, Smith said.

"We're trying to get an attitude going out there that it is getting a little bit better," he said.

Smith said he personally believes the state should look at raising its low gas tax because roads are more costly than when the 17 cent tax was set many years ago. But he admits in

an election year, it is unlikely that will happen, despite the great need in the state for road improvements.

Both budgets propose about the same increases in spending on education – both public schools and higher education – and on Medicaid, which is seeing about a \$45 million increase.

Martinez is also asking the Legislature to provide more than \$2 million to buy replacement vehicles for law enforcement officers.

According to the Associated Press, Martinez said she wants to continue the moratorium on buying new government vehicles – except to meet critical public safety or health needs. The governor's budget also proposes a supplemental allocation of nearly \$588,000 to cover fuel costs this year for the Department of Public Safety.

## Cote announces run

### Former state rep seeks to take back seat

Nate Cote has announced his candidacy to be the Democratic candidate for state representative in District 53, which is currently represented by Republican Rick Little of Chaparral.

Although redistricting isn't final, District 53 is expected to include precincts in both Doña Ana and Otero counties. In his announcement, Cote said he has a detailed knowledge of the issues and welfare of residents in both counties and in New Mexico.

Cote has served previously served in the Legislature representing District 53, but was defeated by Little during the 2010 election. He has previously served on several legislative committees with an interest in education, veterans' issues, economic development, infrastructure projects, and transportation.

Cote has been a small business owner. He served more than 30 years as a federal manager specializing in human resources management and with Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University as an academic director. He currently is an adjunct instructor for both Park University and Doña Ana Community College. Cote is presently involved in many community activities and programs. He has received many awards and other recognition for his public and community service.

Cote has graduate degrees in public policy, human relations and human resources management in addition to a doctorate degree in education. He has previously served on a number of boards to include Saint John's Catholic School in Florida, the Opportunity Center in Alamogordo and the Humane Society of Southern New Mexico.

Cote said he feels that District 53 is currently poorly represented and that he can do

a better job by the voters returning him to the Legislature. Cote said he has some unfinished work to accomplish, matters that would benefit southern New Mexico.

Cote said he "has been very concerned with the current incumbent's lack of diligence with actively representing his constituents and believes that a state representative has the ability to resolve many constituent issues both locally and with various state agencies."

Cote, both as a legislator who sponsored the first Union Pacific railroad bill for jobs in Doña Ana County, and as an active community member, said he has been working with local leaders to create jobs. Cote said he has promoted ethics training for public officials and addressed military and veteran's issues in the Legislature. Cote said he has organized and implemented community safety programs and worked to improve infrastructure in the district.

State legislators need to responsibly represent their constituents, be fiscally responsible, and ensure public policy is indeed in the best interest of the public, Cote said.

A Navy veteran, Cote is an avid hiker, community leader and volunteer and strongly supports senior programs and working with veterans, programs to address anti-obesity programs for the youth, the continuation of early childhood education programs, more involvement in outdoor recreation and believes in being involved with programs that assure the proper treatment of animals.

He and his wife Monique live near Organ and their daughter Michelle, a physician's assistant, resides in Phoenix.

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# Krahling to run for new position

## Redistricting puts official into new county district

Doña Ana County Commissioner Scott Krahling has announced he is running in the election for District 5 on the county commission.

Krahling has served for the last three years representing District 4, but mandatory redistricting implemented earlier this year moved his residence into District 5.

"I supported the redistricting plan knowing that it would make any re-election bid more challenging, but it was the right map to ensure the commission districts aligned best to the county's changing needs and population shifts," Krahling said. "I've decided to seek the District 5 seat because there's more

that I can do for the county, and I invite the voters of District 5 to look at my record of leadership and hard work. I want to earn their votes and continue the work that needs to be done."

Krahling lists among his accomplishments negotiating a substantial completion ordinance between the county and the Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico. The substantial completion ordinance prevents homes from being built on lots that do not have adequate infrastructure. The BIA-SNM publicly supported the proposal.

"There is so much divisiveness in politics today. However, locally, if we put the right people in the room together, we consistently accomplish good things," Krahling said.

In addition, Krahling said that starting a new storm water control plan for the East Mesa, getting the county started on a strategic plan and starting mandatory annual ethics training for all commissioners and county staff are all projects he worked with county staff to implement and sustain.

"Many of these projects are not complete, and I feel like we need commissioners who are ready to put in the hard work needed to get them done," he said.

### Fraud suspects

Las Cruces Crime Stoppers is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information that leads to the arrests of three women who have used duplicate vehicle titles and false information to secure fraudulent loans.

Arrest warrants have been issued for Karen Joanna Carter, 20, and Krystle L. Bueno, 19, who are charged with felony counts of fraud and conspiracy. Las Cruces Police and New Mexico State Police are investigating multiple reports of the women using duplicate vehicle titles and false information to secure title loans from finance companies in Las Cruces, El Paso and surrounding communities.

Carter and Bueno are believed to be working with a third woman, 19-year-old Janet Lara, to obtain thousands of dollars in fraudulent loans from the finance companies.

Investigators have determined the vehicle titles the trio used as collateral are duplicate titles, and they have used fake Social Security numbers and false contact information to obtain the loans.




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
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## We've lost something

This year, New Mexico is celebrating its centennial as a state. It's a great time to take a look back at what has transpired over the course of 100 years.

A century ago, New Mexico College of Agriculture & Mechanic Arts had sports teams, including football. They played games against teams from high schools, teams from Fort Bliss, teams from schools such as Arizona Teacher's College, the New Mexico School of Mines and, of course, that university up in Albuquerque.

In those days, there wasn't a lot of money involved. There were no conferences, no academic scholarships, no academic compliance officers and no entertainment sports networks.

The sons of local ranchers, farmers and businessmen made up the teams. They came from far-away places, with weird sounding names such as Deming and Portales.

It was all about college kids having some fun when they weren't hitting the books. It was also a way to help the kids develop leadership skills and stay in good shape. Colleges would select men of high character to guide the young men and women (yes, there were women's teams in some sports) through their college years both on and off the playing field.

It was a lot of fun, and the locals would flock to games to watch the Ag College teams play. Often, Las Cruces businesses would shut down so everybody could turn out to the games.

When fans arrived at the game to watch from some rickety wooden bleachers, I'm not sure they even had to pay a nickel. They certainly had no opportunity to buy 44-ounce soft drinks, tortilla chips smothered in some cheese-like substance or hot dogs on the high side of \$5.

It must have been terrible.

Yet, for some reason, the local fans still showed up because the games were the biggest event in town.

Some time over the years, colleges began to form things called conferences. In 1931, the Aggies were charter members in the Border Conference. They still played many of the same teams they played before because the conference – hold on to your seats, this is a hokey idea – was regional. The original Border Conference comprised of teams in Arizona, New Mexico and Texas.

Of course, when you have conferences, you have administrators and support staff and people sitting around thinking about how to justify their salaries.

It must have been around then that the money involved started to become more and more important.

In 1962, the Border Conference split up when some schools decided there were greener pastures elsewhere, think greenbacks.

On Monday, Jan. 9, they played

## Idaho employs offense similar to USU Aggies

When the Aggies host the University of Idaho at 7 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 14, it will be like déjà vu all over again.

The Vandals play a very similar offense to the one used by Utah State, which the Aggies hosted Thursday, Jan. 12. It should come as no surprise that coach Don Verlin of Idaho would employ the same offense as Stew Morrill of the Utags – he was an assistant coach for Morrill for 15 years, both at Utah State and at Colorado State.

New Mexico State coach Marvin Menzies said playing two teams with similar offenses back-to-back should be an advantage for the Aggies.

"The good thing about playing Idaho right after Utah State is the system," Menzies said. "With Don (Verlin) being one of Stew (Morrill's) protégés, that helps us in the turnaround and the scouting."

Menzies said it is a difficult system to defend.

"That system is just a very efficient system," he said. "It is very productive when the players 'get it,' just because of the variety of screening and offensive action it presents challenges."

"It's difficult to guard them for any amount of time, especially when you have guys that can shoot the ball. You can't zone

them because they can step out and shoot it."

Idaho shoots the ball well, and as of Wednesday, Jan. 11, was leading the Western Athletic Conference in field-goal percentage at .48.5 percent – including 40.6 percent from beyond the arc.

Menzies said the Vandals are a good example of the parity in the conference this year.

"Idaho is another team that can beat you on any given night and you have to come out and be ready to play your 'A' game," Menzies said. "You have teams that are not on the radar that have a lot of talent."

The WAC race, Menzies said is "going to be a war every night."

As of Jan. 11, the Vandals had an 8-8 overall record and 1-1 WAC record after splitting their first two conference games at home. Idaho fell to Nevada, 73-55, Jan. 5, but then defeated Fresno State, 63-59, Jan. 7. The Vandals traveled to Louisiana Tech Jan. 12.

Idaho has a balanced offense with sophomore guard Stephen Madison posting a team-high 12.6 points per game. Senior guard Deremy Geiger contributes 12.3 points per game, while junior center Kyle Barone adds 11.9 points and 7.6 rebounds per game.

The Aggies have a 19-3 advantage in the series with the Vandals. NMSU has an 11-0 record in the

Coaches William Benjamin and Mike Smith have watched countless high school basketball games together at the Las Cruces High School gym. Only this time, they won't be side-by-side.

Smith, who coached the Bulldawgs for 12 years, returns to LCHS at 4:30 p.m. Saturday with his Hobbs Eagles. They'll face a Bulldawgs team that is coached by Benjamin, who was Smith's assistant during those 12 years.

"This should be fun and exciting for both of us," Benjamin said.

Smith resigned in 2009 at LCHS

"Hobbs basketball means a lot to a lot of people. Hobbs is different than any other place in the state. There are people here who have had reserved seats for 30 or 40 years. They used to watch me and my brothers play."

Returning home, Smith has worked hard to reinstate many of the traditions that helped make Hobbs special. The biggest, he said, is making the full-court press a priority again.

# NMSU hopes to stay on serve

## Men's tennis team looks strong despite graduation of top players

The New Mexico State men's tennis team is ranked at No. 54 in the first 2012 season rankings released by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) this week.

Last season, the Aggies finished the year at No. 50 in the ITA rankings after advancing to the 2011 Western Athletic Conference (WAC) Championship. Departed senior Arthur Surreaux represented the Aggies in the NCAA Singles Championships last spring and finished the season ranked at No. 85 nationally in singles. Surreaux and fellow departed senior Jim Brouleau completed the year at No. 89 as a tandem in the final ITA doubles rankings.


The 2012 Aggies look to maintain that success this season. Coach Carlos Vargas says it will be difficult to replace his top players from a year ago, but believes the talent is there for another successful season.

"We had really good results last year," Vargas said. "I think our pre-season ranking is based a lot on what we did last season. Each year the team starts over with a new lineup and outlook."

"It will be tough after losing our top three guys from last season, but I think we have the talent to maintain a ranking. Our guys have to step up their play to preserve that ranking."

Vargas has put together a challenging schedule for the Aggies starting with four of the first five matches against 2012 ranked teams. After their season opener against No. 73 Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in Las Cruces on Jan. 19, the Aggies play their first road matches the following week at No. 5 Baylor, an NCAA Quarter finalist last season.

As a result of their top-50 ranking last season, the Aggies will participate in the 2012 ITA Kickoff Weekend on Jan. 28-29 against three other top-50 squads from a year ago.

NMSU will travel to Waco, Texas, to battle the fifth-ranked Bears on day one of the two-day event. BU finished sixth overall in the final 2011 team rankings. On day two, the Aggies will face either No. 39 Rice or No. 44 Florida State.

"I think the Kick Off Weekend at Baylor will be a wake-up call for our guys," Vargas said. "We will be playing a top-five team from a year ago, so it will be a great experience for our team and good to play out there against that level of competition."

"Our schedule is tough this season, we play 10 matches against ranked teams so every win we achieve is significant."

Senior Matej Stakne will lead the Aggies this spring after an impressive fall season. He is currently ranked No. 15 in the ITA Mountain Regional rankings released earlier this week. Stakne finished the fall slate at 7-3.

Despite nursing an off-season

wrist injury, Stakne reached the Aggie Invitational singles semifinals to begin the year. The Aggie senior captain concluded the season by reaching the singles round of 16 at the ITA Mountain Regional after knocking off a ranked opponent in the third round.

Stakne partnered with junior Luis Ramirez to claim the Aggie Invitational doubles crown last fall. The pair advanced to the doubles round of 16 at the ITA Mountain Regional before bowing out to the No. 5 seeded team in extra games.

"I think Matej's ranking could even be a little higher because he was not 100 percent last fall," added Vargas. "He will be back at full strength to open the season."

The No. 54 Aggies open the season at home against the No. 73 Islanders of Texas A&M-Corpus Christi at 2 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 16, at the NMSU Tennis Center.

something called the BCS Championship. Millions of dollars were involved. It is hard to be sure, but I think the game they played was still called football, but the resemblance to old-time college sports ends there.

You used to be able to watch the bowl games on broadcast TV, which is free, but now cable network ESPN has the rights through 2014. Their contract for the Orange, Sugar and Fiesta bowls – the BCS Championship Series – is reportedly worth \$125 million a year.

## Oh, the memories

Award-winning broadcaster looks back at some great Aggie moments

On Jan. 14, I will broadcast my 1,000th Aggie men's basketball game.

There have been more than a few games that stick in my memory and I will share them with you.

The obvious ones are the wins over Indiana State and Larry Bird in 1978 and UNLV in 1990, but those aren't the ones I want share with you.

In 1977, the Aggies traveled to Peoria, Ill., to play Bradley. We arrived in the middle of a blizzard, and our hotel didn't have enough rooms for us. I slept in the staff changing room; in between visits from the staff on their smoke break who were unaware that the room was occupied. The game saw the Aggies fall behind by 28 at the start. They rallied to win by nine in what was the greatest come-from-behind win at the time.

The title game in the Big West Tournament in 1992 is another. I had been to the NCAA postseason with New Mexico State three times before, but NM State earned the dance ticket by winning the tournament over Pacific. This would lead to the Sweet 16 and sprang from another come-from-behind win over Fresno State in the first round of the Big West

tourney. The game ended in a weird way with players from both teams rolling around on the court trying to get control of the ball as time ran out.

My favorite game is the victory in the 1999 Big West Tournament. The Aggies played Boise State in Reno, Nev., and had been clobbered badly by the Broncos in the two regular season meetings.

NM State was led by Billy Keyes, Aaron Brodt, Daveeno Hines and Brad Bestor on the court and Lou Henson from the bench. The Boise State fans that I spoke to in Reno, were haughty and mocking of the Aggies' changes of winning. Beating a team three times is tough as Boise State and its fans discovered.

Bestor got into a groove in the second half and hit three after three to keep NM State in the game. The title was an entry into the NCAA's region in New Orleans and my introduction to Cajun food.

Thomas Wyatt's last second shot versus UC Santa Barbara in 1995, the come from behind win at UTEP in 1999 when Mikko Noopila hit free throws in the final seconds, and the WAC Tournament games held in the Pan American Center are on the first page of my memory book.

I cherish the opportunities that I have had and enjoyed all 1,000 games I have announced, even the ones that didn't end in victory. Thank you, Aggies, for listening.

## Those dreaded mental errors

### Learn to avoid these common mistakes

I recently ran across notes I had made for a seminar I did several years ago for the Sun Country Section (New Mexico and El Paso) of the PGA.

The PGA section, then ran by John Speary and now by Matt Williams, asked me to do something on “the mental game” since I was an emerging, and nearby, sport psychologist.

For the presentation, I chose to focus on the five most common mental errors nearly all golfers make, at one time or another. I think the concepts, principles and ideas I shared with those golf professionals that day are every bit as relevant today, now 13 years later. I hope you agree.

The first of the “five errors” is failing to play within your capabilities. It’s really important that you understand your own game. Many times folks will be matched or paired with someone they don’t know, and they try to outdo him, not being aware that they are even attempting to compete or impress the other golfer.

It takes total concentration, along with full awareness to focus entirely on your own game, to the point of almost not paying attention to anything else. The task at hand, to become totally self-absorbed in what you alone are doing, amounts almost in a version of autism.

Ben Hogan, Mo Norman and Tiger Woods are among a few famous golfers who have demonstrated various versions of that behavior. There are athletes in other sports as well who have demonstrated that gift for shutting out all distractions around them, to the point

that they seem to be in a trance.

Some would say that profound level of focus constitutes “the zone.” I emphasize that playing within yourself – while totally absorbed is something that is associated with superiority and winning – is not a mental disorder, unless it is taken too far. Playing within your capabilities means knowing exactly how far you hit each club, comprehending your tendencies under pressure and using flawless course management.

Secondly, I have noticed golfers frequently succumbing to fear and anxiety. As you might expect, anxiety – call it nervous tension if you will – is associated with a mental state in which you worry more about the outcome and the consequences of your play, and less about the real actions you are about to engage in.

Your mind is cluttered with the apprehension and impatience about that which is about to happen, causing tension, agitation, restlessness and keeping you from performing as you normally would, under normal (unconfused) circumstances.

The antidote for anxiety is, of course, to develop and stick to a solid and unflinching pre-shot routine, which will put you in a state of tranquility, sparing you from the tension that you may be unaware of.

It has been my observation that high-handicappers spend – no, waste – too many strokes around the green. Most of the strokes in the game of golf happen somewhere near

or around the green.

In a way, it’s a little like hockey: The team with the puck must execute long passes, but they score goals close to the net.

Think about it. You drive the ball and then hit an approach shot, which will end up near the green. Then a pitch or a chip or two, or a bunker shot or two, and then two putts, and presto more strokes around the green. We have to practice chipping and putting almost endlessly to become proficient.

Why do I call this a mental mistake? Because almost no weekend golfers appreciate the need for short game learning and practice.

The secret is to triple your short game preparation. To score the way we expect to on the golf course, we need to learn to correct poor chipping and putting technique. Golf teachers will assure you that you absolutely must keep your hands ahead of the clubhead for chipping, and it’s critical to keep

your head still as you are putting by listening (not watching) for the ball to fall into the hole.

The mental aspect also comes in with using your imagination around the green. Try chipping with a hybrid, or using a putting grip on a six iron. Try putting out of a bunker if you struggle with sand shots. Or learn a flop shot for short up-hillers to a tight pin. These are creative and inventive methods that could save you a whole lot of strokes.

Nearly all golfers suffer from inattention to fundamentals at one time or another. No matter how good you are – in any sport – success demands continual attention to fundamentals. It’s blocking and tackling in football; passing and rebounding in hoops; bunting and base running in baseball.

In golf, we need frequent reminders about grip, posture, stance, ball position and tempo.

It generally takes an instructor to point out lapses in fundamentals. Most beginners are reluctant to take lessons. Why?

“Too expensive,” I hear all too often. But the truth is that golf, played as a grossly clumsy and inept fool, is probably an expensive waste of time. Moreover, most

high-handicappers are prone to buy expensive new clubs before they take lessons and learn a shank-proof swing.

My advice is to improve your game before you improve your clubs.

For me, the business of fundamentals includes becoming a student of the game. What I mean by that is knowing some of the history of the game, speaking the language, understanding some of the nuances of shotmaking, recognizing proper golf etiquette and appreciating just how much dedication and practice are required to acquire genuine mastery of this great game.

A student of the game has a genuine grasp of the rules of golf, which include situations such as knowing where and how to take a proper drop from an immovable obstruction; or knowing the five options available to you after hitting your ball into a water hazard. If you are not a member of the USGA, I urge you to spend \$20 and join; they send you a rule book with your membership.

When I presented my theories to my PGA workshop listeners, what really got their attention was my final typical mental mistake: Giving in to negative thinking and brain lapses.

The most usual mistake is failing to choose confidence, while hoping for some magical good fortune or luck to happen instead of aggressively making it happen.

Typical negative attitudes in golf run like a tape recording from a therapy session with a chronic schizophrenic. It’s indecision, mindless actions, poor judgment, compulsive behavior despite past outcomes, ignorance of available options and brain-dead lapses.

What we need to do as golfers is to visualize the target, take dead aim and let it go. We can’t be concerned about making an embarrassing error or losing instead of winning. When we concentrate all our attention on the real-time task at hand – namely making a good swing – our desired outcome becomes more certain.

What we must realize is that thinking about the end results we wish and hope for causes a counter-productive consequence in most cases. We tend to create our greatest opportunity for the most probable outcome by concentrating on the only task that immediately matters – this swing of the club.

Acquiring that particular discipline, my friends, virtually makes the emotional reactions to doubt and fear disappear.

### 100 years ago

#### 1912

• The Agriculture College's demonstration train arrived in Santa Fe, and with continuous "tooting of the horn," quickly attracted a crowd of several hundred people. The crowds listened to the "interesting and informative" talks of J.D. Tinsley of the Santa Fe Railway and professors W. E. Garrison, Luther Foster and Fabian Garcia of the Ag College.

• The Las Cruces Citizen reported that floods were predicted along the Rio Grande in the spring. The newspaper said it "did not share the fears," but advised readers to "take down as much crop as you can, keep turkeys at close range and make the chickens roost high." The Citizen added that maybe "the building of a few canoes or mud scows would be in order."

### 75 years ago

#### 1937

• Mayor Sam Klein announced that contractors had been granted a 30-day extension for starting work on the new Doña Ana County Courthouse. The contractors were given till March 11 and the project must be completed by Jan. 11, 1938, Klein said. The delay was granted because architects had not yet completed plans and specifications for the building.

• A dog belonging to George Gilmer, who lived two miles north of Las Cruces, was killed by the Doña Ana County Health Department after it developed rabies while under observation. The unfortunate dog was bitten by a mad dog in Anthony two months earlier. In response to the rabies outbreak, the Biological Survey had a team of hunters working east of Las Cruces killing coyotes. They reported finding many of the animals "badly bitten," and said because coyotes never bite each other, the wounds must have been inflicted by wild dogs, many of which they found and killed in the area.

### 50 years ago

#### 1962

• The school board accepted bids for new portable classrooms for Mesilla Elementary and a new boiler for Court Junior High School. The boiler at Court had ceased operating on Dec. 31, and the school had been using a temporary boiler since then.

• 1961 was a banner year for farmers in New Mexico according to the New Mexico Farm & Livestock Reporting Service. Farmers set new highs for the production of grain, wheat, barley and sorghum. Cotton production was estimated at 300,000 bales. The pecan crop, however, was sharply down at 3.7 million pounds, much less than the 8 million pounds of pecans harvested a year earlier.

• A road weary Aggie basketball team returned to Las Cruces to face Arizona and Arizona State. The Aggies had dropped road games at Memphis State, Eastern Kentucky and Western Kentucky.

### 25 years ago

#### 1987

• A Mexican elder tree planted at Munson Senior Center a week earlier in commemoration of New Mexico's 75th anniversary as a state was stolen from the facility. The city parks department was trying to find a suitable replacement tree. "Nothing can truly fix the anguish felt by our seniors who saw the tree as a symbol of the birth of a state - a time in their childhood that they remember," Munson Director Patsy Yates said.

• Major work began on a portion of U.S. Highway 70 between Interstate 25 and

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## Funding STEM fields

In New Mexico, 80 percent of eighth-grade students are considered non-proficient in math, according to the National Assessment of Educational Progress.

That means four out of every five students are falling behind. Out of the 20 percent of "proficient" eighth-graders, 40 percent are white, 12 percent are Hispanic and 13 percent are black.

The U.S. Department of Education-Hispanic Serving Institutions Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics program is looking to change these statistics by awarding eight New Mexico colleges a total of \$5 million to increase enrollment and graduation rates in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

With kids failing at the eighth-grade level and only 55 percent of New Mexico ninth-graders graduating in four years, I think it is important to also address the concerns before they get to college.

Local organizations, such as The Bridge of Southern New Mexico, are trying to make this happen, and I thank them.

Children should be excited to learn, and I think it's beneficial to add mentors and programs that make STEM fields more appealing.

New Mexico State University-Alamogordo is one of the eight schools to receive a grant. The school got \$869,092.

Other schools to receive financing were Eastern New Mexico University, \$615,226; Mesalands Community College, \$777,154; New Mexico Institute of Mining & Technology, \$869,556; New Mexico Highlands University, \$274,439; University of New Mexico Valencia Campus, \$717,605; University of New Mexico, \$358,758; and University of New Mexico-Taos, \$548,186.

"Many of the best jobs of the future will be in the areas of math and science. To ensure that New Mexico's workforce is prepared for the future, we'll need to put a greater emphasis on math and science education, and that's exactly what this grant funding will allow us to do," U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman said.

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# Economic impact report

## NMSU releases out-of-state statistics, a tool for more funding

For the first time in eight years, New Mexico State University has released an economic impact report, detailing the university's contributions brought in from out of the state.

NMSU President Barbara Couture said the research will be a tool used in Santa Fe during the legislative session to advocate for more funding.

"Universities bring value to a society," Couture said. "A research university, such as NMSU, brings new knowledge and changes our views of society and enhances quality of life."

The study was conducted by NMSU's economic development hub, Arrowhead Center.

Data for the economic impact report was collected in a calendar year – 2010 – instead of a fiscal year.

Jim Peach, an NMSU economics professor and lead economist for the report, said the decision to collect information throughout a calendar year added validity to the report.

"It wasn't easy and took work from a lot of people, but we were committed to making this report as accurate as possible," Peach said. "We used the calendar year because economic models are done that way."

"If someone asked me to defend this report, yes, I can defend this report any day. We took a very conservative approach."

In summary, the report determined NMSU generated 9,558 part- and full-time jobs throughout all 33 counties in New Mexico in 2010. The 2010 gross domestic product (GDP) was \$902.4 million.

"Remember, that is money coming from

outside of New Mexico," Couture said.

The disposable personal income was \$731.5 million, and state tax revenue was \$65.8 million.

The estimated impacts reflect only the contributions to the state economy associated with out-of-state funding, which is estimated to be

37.7 percent of total NMSU funding.

"We wanted to use out-of-state numbers because if I spent money at an NMSU football game – which I do because I have season tickets – the net effect for New Mexico would be zero," Peach said.

# Looking for a buyer and home

## Las Cruces Country Club searching for new digs

Las Cruces Country Club (LCCC), a long-time neighbor to U.S. Highway 70 and Las Cruces establishment for more than 80 years, completely closed its doors Dec. 31, 2011, to make way for what it hopes can be a revival.

Like a phoenix from the ashes, the golf home for many in the community is poised for rebirth.

In 2005, an agreement was reached between LCCC members and late developer Philip Philippou to complete an exchange of deeds. For the property and water rights of the existing 110-acre LCCC, the membership was to receive a new, 200-acre course built on the East Mesa.

"We were outgrowing the old Las Cruces site," said LCCC board member Robert Caldwell. "So we came to an agreement that would trade the existing country club land and water rights for a new location with full amenities, a new club house."

As negotiations moved along, the economy began to take a sharp decline. Costs were rising and real estate plummeted, halting the construction on the new course, which still lacked the amenities that were to be built.

NMSU students from outside of New Mexico also have a significant impact on the state's economy, spending almost \$90 million in 2010, which resulted in 773 full- or part-time jobs, \$30.5 million more in personal income, almost \$26 million more in disposable personal income, \$45.3 million added to the GDP and 18 new residents.

NMSU's greatest contribution to the economy, according to the study, came from its alumni who chose to remain in the state. As of December 2010, there were 49,269 NMSU alumni living in the state. Economic data has consistently shown that, in general, college graduates across the nation earn and spend more than those who have less education. New Mexico is no exception.

Thanks to increased earnings and spending of Aggie alumni, the NMSU study found that in 2010 the state's economy generated 4,402 full- or part-time jobs, \$659

million in personal income, \$598 million in disposable income, \$696 million in GDP and 937 new residents.

"The job creation findings are very significant," Peach said. "That number really matters. We are down 44,000 jobs since 2008. It will take a few years at minimum to get back to that number in 2008."

Despite a down economy, NMSU has kept its research and development a top priority.

"We want research and economic development to go hand-in-hand," Couture said. "We are looking for ways our research can be an economic driver in the community."

"The study validates our long-standing belief that NMSU is a major economic engine for this state. After all, our reach is felt throughout the state and across many industries."

"There is not a success study today without some kind of world-class education behind it," Peach said.

In 2009, Philippou sold his companies to Sierra Norte Land Holdings, another company who was supposed to assume any existing contracts. This included the golf course being built on the East Mesa.

"Because of the state of the economy, they were unable to complete the agreement as we'd made it," Caldwell said. "We had negotiations to revise the agreement, to make it work for all of us. When it didn't, the country club members wanted answers."

Sierra Norte sued LCCC in August 2011, to end the contract and the exchange that was never going to happen. Though the suit, and the eventual counter suit were dropped, LCCC ended up with a few problems due to the uncompleted agreement.

"It hurt the club financially," Caldwell said. "We lowered our maintenance after the agreement to prepare for a move. It was unlikely that once the exchange happened the land was going to remain a golf course. Any repairs that were made, were only done in order to keep the course playable until the end of the year."

Despite the condition of the existing land, the LCCC remained asset rich. The land the course was located on, was excellent land for development, in the heart of the district, surrounded by two major arterial highways, close to neighborhoods and convenient for shopping. Water rights, obtained years before, were

also part of the property's value, a coveted resource for any interested buyer in the high desert.

In November 2011, trying to move past the failed deal, members of the LCCC voted to close down the course, sell partial water rights and entered into an agreement with Sonoma Ranch Golf Course to allow members play time. Members were given the option to switch their membership to Sonoma Ranch, but many declined.

"It's about more than the space to play, it's about the people you've been playing with," Caldwell said. "We're talking about people here, not dirt. The real value is the people who have put their blood, sweat and money into the country club."

Caldwell said LCCC hopes to find an interested party, and to part with their considerable existing assets, land and partial water rights in order to find a new home.

"As a nonprofit, everything we do has to be voted on by the membership," Caldwell said. "The funds from the move and sale aren't going into anyone's pocket. They are going to be used to find or build LCCC a new home."

"We are willing to entertain any and all proposals to negotiate with interested developers."

The most important thing, according to Caldwell is that the members of LCCC are able to find a place to call their own.

"LCCC has always been a family," he said. "It doesn't matter where home is as long as you're together enjoying what you do."

# When should you take Social Security?

The answer is different for each individual

If you're of a certain age, the new year means you're that much closer to a day you may have anticipated with a combination of humor and resignation – specifically, the day you're eligible for Social Security.

Just because you can take Social Security, it doesn't mean you must take it. So, should you?

Before we get to that question, let's review the basic rules governing Social Security payments. You can typically start collecting benefits at age 62, but you'll get only about 75 percent of what you'd receive if you waited until your "full" retirement age, which varies according to your birth year, but is most likely 66. You'll get even bigger monthly checks if you delay collecting them until you're past 66, and you'll "max out" on your payments once you reach 70.

So, the question boils down to this: Should you start collecting Social Security early – thereby receiving smaller, but more numerous, checks – or later, when your checks will be bigger but fewer?

If you really need the money once you reach 62, you've already got your answer. If you could potentially afford to wait, we recommend you view your decision through a "LENS":

**L: Your projected lifespan.** You can't see into the future, but given your family history and general health, you can make an educated guess about your projected longevity. If you're fairly confident that, once you reach 66, you've still got another two or more decades in front of you, you may want to consider delaying taking Social Security past age 62.

**E: Your employment status.** If you're under full retirement age – between 62 and 66 – then for every two dollars you earn over \$14,640 (in 2012), you'll lose \$1 in Social Security benefits. In the months before you reach your

full retirement age, for every \$3 you earn over \$38,880 (again, for 2012), you'll lose \$1 in benefits. But starting in the month you reach your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without losing any benefits.

**N: Your need, including your other sources of retirement income.** If you have a pension, or you've built substantial resources in your IRA, your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, and you can support your income needs with modest withdrawals from these accounts, you might decide it's worthwhile to delay taking Social Security to maximize your benefits. Remember that regardless of your Social Security decision, you typically would have to pay a 10 percent early withdrawal penalty if you started taking withdrawals from these accounts before you reach age 59-and-a-half.

**S: Your spouse/marital status.** If you're single, you basically just need to think of yourself when making this decision. But it's a different story if you're married. If you die first, your spouse can keep receiving his or her own Social Security benefit or receive yours – whichever is larger. Consequently, you and your spouse will want to coordinate when you take Social Security benefits so that you can maximize the benefit for the spouse likeliest to live longer.

The choice of when to start taking Social Security can affect your lifestyle throughout your retirement years – so weigh all the factors and make the choice that's right for you.

## What gets measured, gets done

### Research a key tool to move education forward, link data

Bridging the workforce

“What gets measured gets done,” is a pretty common phrase in the business world.

It rightly states that if you have an expectation and a sense of being accountable for a goal or outcome, the odds are pretty good that you’ll see progress made toward accomplishing that goal.

Measurement is key to understanding what works and what doesn’t; what can be called success and what needs to be redirected or scrapped all together. Depending on the kind of measurement, you may even be able to understand why something works or not and apply that understanding to expand the scope and scale of success.

When it comes to education, measurement is key to helping a struggling student know where to concentrate his or her efforts. It’s the information on which parents can determine how to help their children. Teachers rely on measurement to know where their students need instruction, corporately and individually. And for our state, it’s absolutely critical to helping us dig our way out of the bottom of a host of categories in which education in New Mexico scores consistently low. The typical barrier to good quality measurement is money, as it is an expensive proposition to measure consistently and well over short or long periods of time.

Across the country, there is a great clamor for connected, reliable data in education and beyond – we need to know what happens to students who graduate high school, enter college and then, ultimately, the workforce. We should have a way to carefully and confidentially track student outcomes and identify trends related to preparing students for college and careers. A group called the Data Quality Campaign has developed a list of 10 essential elements and 10 state actions to help guide state policymakers to effectively cultivate and use effective data to help increase student achievement.

New Mexico has completed all ten of the organization’s suggested elements, all of which relate to data collection.

However, the state has completed only three of the 10 actions suggested for analyzing and using the data. The actions still to be done include:

- Linking data systems
- Creating stable, sustained support
- Implementing systems to provide timely access to information
- Creating progress reports using individual student data to improve student performance
- Promoting educator professional development and credentialing
- Promoting strategies to raise awareness of available data
- Developing a P-20/workforce research agenda

This last action is one upon which The Bridge of Southern New Mexico is focused. We have some very powerful educational research assets in our state already. How can we connect them as a network that can assist the state in not just gathering data, but understanding it and then acting on it?

A significant portion of The Bridge’s recently announced grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation will go toward building this network. The New Mexico State University College of Education’s Center for Research and Outreach and the University of New Mexico Center for Education Policy Research combined with the Arrowhead Center could easily become a powerful collection of tools to be used by the private sector, government entities, and even philanthropic groups to quantify and qualify the success of specific education reforms and initiatives, as well as their long-term impact on the state’s future workforce and economic development.

Higher Education Department Secretary Jose Garcia recently commissioned a study to project the workforce needs of New Mexico’s future business and industry. He can translate that data into the number of students needed with specific types of degrees and work with the community colleges and universities to train students in those relevant career fields today. It will be important for the state to track completion rates, accreditations given and degrees awarded to make sure we’re meeting those goals.

Public Education Secretary Hanna Skandera recently announced financial rewards that schools will receive for improved performance, based on the A-F school grading scale. Understanding what those schools did to improve will be incredibly powerful in helping other schools apply those lessons and propel even more schools (and more importantly, students) forward. Using this research network, focus groups can be conducted within successful schools to learn from those gains and replicate success broadly through the state.

In the private sector, a business lives and dies by measurable outcomes – income, expenses, return on investment, debt, assets and a host of other categories for measuring success or failure. When we are able to effectively measure what takes place in our schools, higher education institutions and follow that into the workforce, we will have the ability to propel our state from the bottom to the top of the nation in preparing well educated students who go on to become well prepared employees and employers who build a strong economy for New Mexico for many years to come.

## Yesterday, today and tomorrow

Have you ever ridden an amusement park ride you thought would never end?

Well, get a grip on your lap bar ladies and gentlemen; it appears this thrill ride is far from over. While some of the hardest hit U.S. markets are showing signs of price stabilization and some increases in sales activity, the majority of the nation's housing markets, including Las Cruces, have yet to see the light at the end of the tunnel.

### Yesterday

For decades, Las Cruces real estate values increased at a predictable rate of around three to four percent annually. Then came 2004, when the average price of the new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums

sold in that year jumped 17.2 percent over the previous year's average. Average values increased another 18.7 percent in 2005, followed by smaller increases in 2006 and 2007, the year in which our values peaked. The tide then turned and values began to decline. Home prices slid around 2 percent in 2008, and declined by another 12.3 percent in 2009. Values remained relatively steady in 2010 thanks to the first-time homebuyer credit, but fell another 6.0 percent in 2011.

### Today

2011 produced the lowest number of completed sales since 1997, when a total of 1,059 transactions were closed. As of Jan. 9, just 134 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums were categorized as pending sales, according to the Las Cruces Association of Realtors. Pending sales are those in which the contract has been signed but the transaction has yet to close. Pending sales are also the best indicators of future closings, which

typically take place 30-to-60 days after the contract is signed.

Today's 134 pending sales represent a 7-unit, or five percent, decline from the 141 sales listed as pending just one year ago. If the numbers are true to form, the number of closed sales in February and March will fall below the number of sales closed during the same period in 2011.

### Tomorrow

Three of the nation's most prestigious media outlets have predicted that home values will continue to fall through 2012. A recent article posted on the Forbes.com website carried the headline: "Don't Expect A Housing Market Recovery Until 2014," citing the estimated two-year supply of distressed homes in the foreclosure pipeline as a major factor behind their prediction. A December article published in the Wall Street Journal points to inaction by the government as another issue holding back the recovery of the housing sector, which they say "may" find a floor in 2012.

Closer to home, housingpredictor.com projects that in spite of a projected slowing of price declines going forward, values in Las Cruces will fall another 3.8 percent between now and the end of the year. The site also predicted that values will fall 4.3 percent in Santa Fe and 5 percent in Albuquerque before 2012 comes to an end.

Well, there you have it. It appears our thrill ride will have to make a few more revolutions before it finally grinds to a halt. On the flip side, low prices and historically low mortgage rates make now a great time to get in on the ground floor – literally.

## How does Las Cruces do?

### LFC, governor release a budget proposal for the 2012 legislative session

The New Mexico 2012 legislature session is scheduled to begin Tuesday, Jan. 17. That means it's time to play "compare the budgets."

It's the game I play in this column each year, in which I analyze the economic impact of proposed budgets on the Las Cruces economy. As always, there are two versions to compare – those proposed by Gov. Susana Martinez and by the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). The rules of the game are that we only consider the economic impact on Las Cruces. No other factor is of concern, at least not in this week's column.

The two big items for Las Cruces are kindergarten through 12th grade and New Mexico State University. As it turns out, k-12 funding differs little between the two budgets. Martinez would increase public education support by 2.8 percent while the LFC would increase funding by 3 percent. The governor's proposal included \$17 million for an early reading initiative. The LFC early reading funding increase is only \$7.5 million.

The slight difference between the two proposals is unlikely to have a noticeable effect on the Las Cruces economy, although since the LFC allocates more to k-12 it gives it a slight edge in our game.

Where Martinez and the LFC really differ is on higher education. She allocates only 1.9 percent in additional funds for NMSU while the LFC would increase NMSU by 5.5 percent.

Of course, for Las Cruces what counts is not funding for NMSU overall but funding for the Las Cruces and Doña Ana campuses. Unfortunately, neither the governor nor the LFC give details on how funds would be allocated among campuses. But

if we assume the Las Cruces and Doña Ana campuses do about average for the system, if the LFC's budget is adopted rather than the governor's, it would translate into about a 1 percent increase in local growth. That's a big deal.

Overall, the governor's budget would increase state spending by 3.3 percent compared to 4.6 percent for the LFC – the governor would use \$55 million to cut taxes and to provide incentives to hire veterans. Included is a proposal to eliminate gross receipts tax for small businesses that pay less than \$200 a month. Affected would be kitchen table businesses, which are often run part-time, where the only employee is usually the owner.

Collecting gross receipts tax is often burdensome for these businesses, which are often too small to have a bookkeeper, so it makes sense to eliminate taxes on these businesses on an efficiency basis. But the governor's claim that this would create jobs is a bit of a stretch – \$200 per month doesn't go very far when it comes time to hire someone.

One suspects the governor's proposed tax cuts would benefit Las Cruces approximately proportionately to the rest of the state, but the cuts would be funded partly from the budget for higher education, which does disproportionately affects Las Cruces. Thus, the net benefit of the tax cuts would be negative.

The LFC budget – with higher education funding – wins the game. Las Cruces would fair best under the LFC proposal. Of course, it's not an either or choice. The actual budget will depend on negotiations over the course of the session.

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# In Good Company: *Green Works*

## An efficient community organization

Downtown gets a new partner in GreenWorks

When Douglas Campion decided to create a new nonprofit in the area, he wanted it to give back to Las Cruces and the surrounding community in a variety of ways.

A former housing director for the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, Campion said he had firsthand experience working with the federal weatherization program and understood the importance of energy efficiency to the area. This encouraged him to form GreenWorks in September 2010.

"Myself and a staff of six full-time employees work to administer energy-efficient programs," Campion said. "We just finished two years of contracts with El Paso Electric Co. We (retrofitted) 255 households in 2010 and 1,101 in 2011 in southern New Mexico and El Paso."

Described as a "community organization," GreenWorks serves mostly Doña Ana County. Campion said the largest part of their work comes from residential clients affiliated with some sort of home-improvement program.

Doing everything from replacing light bulbs and appliances, to adding insulation and water-saving fixtures, Campion said his team is focused on doing what they can to improve the energy efficiency of a home, according to the program the homeowner belongs to.

"Two big things came about with

GreenWorks," he said. "First, nothing embodies the triple bottom line – people, environment and creating jobs – more than energy efficiency. Second, it's a chance to work on creating a new industry and make sure it really provides benefits to the workers.

"It's a really unique place to be in. Green building, retrofits and energy efficiency – this is all relatively new, and we have a chance to make it a better industry."

Not just working with income-qualified programs in New Mexico and El Paso, including Clovis and Carlsbad, GreenWorks has also conducted energy-efficient alterations to commercial structures.

In the summer of 2011, the GreenWorks team ventured to Truth or Consequences to retrofit 33 commercial units, which included everything from hotels and a community center to offices and a bar.

"We really had a great time 'greening' their Main Street," Campion said.

"We've been so busy doing units that we haven't been able to be out in the community. In 2012, we're going to do more community education."

While GreenWorks was busy retrofitting various units throughout the area, Campion said the need of an office space arose.

"I wanted to be Downtown and be a part of the revitalization," Campion said. "I've always believed that a downtown is the heart of a city, no matter how dead it is at 5 o'clock."

Deciding that GreenWorks would be a great addition to the efforts already being made in the area, Campion said the nonprofit took over the building at 125 Main St., a 8,000-square-foot space, last year and created the Community Enterprise Center, which is dedicated to entrepreneurship, education and events.

"I said, 'Let's have a larger impact on what we're doing,'" he said. "I wanted to create a collaborative space with other nonprofit and community organizations."

The GreenWorks building provides affordable rental space for any organization – for profit or nonprofit – that betters the



community. This includes numerous desks and office spaces, a conference room, a stage and classrooms.

"It's an inexpensive place to rent out if someone needs a meeting place or office space," Campion said. "The only criteria is they have to be good for the community."

Campion said in addition to GreenWorks, the structure will be home to the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce and the University of New Mexico emerging infections program, which conducts research.

"Just through word of mouth, the response has been crazy," Campion said, adding that in 2012, the classroom will be rented out to parenting, CPR and yoga classes.

Dedicated to energy efficiency, Campion said the GreenWorks building will be updated and retrofitted – a process the community will be invited to see first hand.

"It will be a living laboratory for green construction and retrofits," he said. "We're going to take the community on this journey with us over the next five years. Every time we upgrade something, we're going to hold classes on it."

Along with the retrofit classes, which will begin in February, Campion said they will open a business incubator in late January.

Senior graphic design students at New Mexico State University created the branding of the incubator, named Pivot.

"A student came up with the name," Campion said. "It represents changing the way people think."

Eager to make several changes to Las Cruces and the surrounding area, Campion said he wants to continue to grow partnerships with the green chamber and the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership as well as further GreenWorks' energy efficient mission.

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

# Progress in Columbus

## Groundwork has been laid at Sapphire Energy

Sapphire Energy is constructing an integrated algal bio-refinery (IABR) to produce green crude oil on a site near Columbus, N.M., in Luna County, the first commercial facility in the country, according to a company newsletter.

Sapphire, which is headquartered in San Diego, also operates a 22-acre test and development facility in Las Cruces' West Mesa Industrial Park.

Sapphire has scheduled a multi-year project to produce green crude. The first production phase will start this summer. By 2014, the company expects the Columbus IABR facility to produce 100 barrels, or 1 million gallons of fuel a year, according to Sapphire.

The Columbus IABR facility is expected to provide 700 jobs during construction and 30 permanent jobs for continued operations.

Sapphire has designed raceway ponds at Columbus to grow algae that will cover 100 to 300 acres. In the energy business, the operation is termed "farming under water."

Government agencies believe Sapphire is on the right track to grow and harvest algae and produce green crude. The U.S. Department of Energy has awarded the company a \$50 million grant and the U.S. Department of Agriculture has guaranteed a \$54.5 million

loan, according to Sapphire.

Most people consider green mass seen on ponds "green gunk." But Sapphire is developing that green gunk, or algae, into a renewable and sustainable transportation fuel that will help reduce the nation's dependence on foreign petroleum.

"All of us on the research and development side are rooting for Sapphire to have tremendous success at its commercial demonstration facility at Columbus," said Pete Lammers, New Mexico State University biochemistry professor.

Algae is a micro-organism that combines sunlight and carbon dioxide from the air as sources of energy to produce green crude oil. Scientists report algae can produce 10 times or more energy per acre than other bio-fuels crops.

Algae doesn't compete with food crops. Land at the Columbus site is marginal for crops, and the water is brackish and not suitable for irrigation.

The algal green crude is termed "drop-in" fuel in the industry.

The Sapphire newsletter reported, "Sapphire Energy has cultivated algae that creates renewable crude oil that can be processed in existing refineries into jet fuel, diesel and gasoline. These drop-in replacement fuels are molecularly identical to petroleum-based fuels and are compatible with existing infrastructure and engines."

# Established costume shop up for sale

## The Gen owner Rivera liquidates inventory, preps for new owner

After more than 23 years of business, The Gen could potentially be closing its doors forever.

The clothing shop started as The General Store by Bonnie Hilton, selling a little bit of everything, said Triny Rivera, current owner of The Gen.

"She sold mostly antiques," Rivera said. "But when her son, Wayne Hilton, got into local theater, he started introducing his costumes to the store."

Bonnie Hilton passed on the business to Wayne Hilton and he passed it onto other owners until Rivera took over seven years ago.

"People are telling me, 'You can't close, this is a Las Cruces institution,'" she said. "I hope someone buys the business and keeps the costume shop going."

The 4,000-square-foot building is jam-packed with clothing and accessories from every decade for rent or to purchase.

"We carry costumes and we carry real clothing from the era – real costumes," she said. "A lot of people love The Gen because they don't have to buy something and wear it once. They have the option of renting."

To build up her collection – which as of October 2011 consisted of more than 6,600 articles of clothing alone – Rivera said she frequents garage sales and estate sales.

"Sometimes I will come to work and there will just be a big box of donated items on the doorstep," she said.

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



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# A last hurrah

## Preston art center closing in February

Will it be a bittersweet ending for the staff at Preston Contemporary Art Center when they finally close the doors of the center?

With the opening reception of its final exhibition, "The Last Picture Show," it sure won't seem like it, said Bonnie Schranz, communications coordinator for the art center.

"(When organizing 'The Last Picture Show'), we thought this would be a great way to have less of a somber ending and more of a happy ending," she said. "We have had the pleasure to know so many incredible artists, so many incredible people of the Las Cruces community, it's a way to bring them together in a final night of celebration."

After nearly four years of serving the local arts community, the Preston will close its doors to the public Friday, Feb. 17.

"Regionally, we sold exceptionally well, but it's just not enough to sustain a facility and building this size," PCAC Director Paul Schranz said.

When the art center opened in 2008, it was considered the first of its kind in the area and brought the works of nationally and internationally known artists to Mesilla, and shows that one would find in New York and Los Angeles, Paul Schranz said.

"What we did here with the gallery was introduce a different level of art," he said. "These are New York shows in the middle of the desert, and without this place, it never would have happened."

As director, Paul Schranz also introduced artists' dialogues to the community, giving the opportunity for artists exhibiting their work at the Preston to answer questions about their work and talk with other artists.

"In maybe 99 percent of the shows all of the artists were here (for the opening)," Bonnie Schranz said. "On the following day, we found that many of the artists would stay over, so we asked them to do a conversation with the community. They were always great - we had art lovers, artists and students who could ask the artists any question. The artists were delighted."

Paul Schranz also introduced Mesilla Digital Imaging Workshops to the area, and although the venue will be closing, his workshops will live on at Doña Ana Community College.

"We had close to 2,000 people take workshops in four years from all over the country," he said. "A year ago, we negotiated with DACC to start offering credit, and then we started getting students. They've allowed me to teach full-time classes for DACC, and we moved the workshop and the format over there."

Paul Schranz will begin teaching classes during the spring semester, and the first of eight workshops in the spring will begin Jan. 23.

"DACC has been amazingly cooperative to do this," he said. "Our sponsors - Canon, Adobe, Moab Papers - all went with me to the community college."

As Preston Contemporary Art Center hosted high-quality shows and workshops in Mesilla, the gallery was well received by people throughout the region, Bonnie Schranz said.

"We just have had such a rich experience of being here," she said.

In a way of thanking the region, "The Last Picture Show" includes 70 works of 64 artists throughout the region, including Mesilla, Las Cruces, Alamogordo, El Paso and Silver City.

All of the submission fees, totaling nearly \$2,500, were

donated to La Casa domestic violence shelter.

"I think (the reason for selecting La Casa) is best explained by an artist," Bonnie Schranz said. "When I told her, tears literally came to her eyes and she said, 'The people who go there have walked away from everything. They have nothing, and they so need support.' That absolutely says it."

In addition to supporting local nonprofits, the Preston Contemporary Art Center has served as a venue for other events, not necessarily related to arts. On its last day of being open, Saturday, Feb. 18, the center will host a wedding.

"We've had just about every other kind of event," Bonnie Schranz said. "We even had a proposal here. We've had receptions for lots of different groups, visits from students groups from the little kids all the way up to college kids, women's club meetings, you name it. We've seen a lot of interesting groups."

When it comes to art, however, Paul Schranz said he's seen a significant improvement in the community over the years Preston Contemporary Art Center has been open.

"A couple of years ago, we had a regional juried show, and there were some good pieces," he said, "but it is nowhere near the caliber of this show. This is a rock-solid show; I don't care if it's regional or not, my feeling about it is the regional artists have stepped it up. I'm very proud of the community."

"To me, this validates what we tried to do here. There's stuff in here that's just remarkable. It's top-quality work done by regional artists."

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
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# Blasts from the past ensure a bright future

A great concert can take you outside your day-to-day routine.

A Le Chat Lunatique concert can transport you to another place and time.

What place and time?

Well, the time is a little easier to pin down than the place. Listening to their music puts you sometime between 1934 and 1953.

Regarding place, your first impression, guided by their French name, is you've been

taken to a café in Paris. The 1930s and '40s "hot jazz" pioneers guitarist Django Reinhardt and violinist Stephane Grappelli, who played Paris and elsewhere in Europe, indeed come through the instruments of Le Chat

Lunatique when they're on stage.

Hot jazz is so foreign to the modern music listener that it alone guarantees a fresh experience. Le Chat Lunatique, which prefers to call its music "filthy, mangy jazz."

The Albuquerque-based foursome hits Las Cruces Saturday, Jan. 14, with a 7 p.m. concert at the Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St.

The group consists of Muni Kulasinghe, violin; John Sandlin, guitar and lap steel guitar; Jared Putnam, bass; and Fernando Garavito, drums. All four sing, and the combinations are relentlessly

delightful.

The Rio Grande is a perfect venue for this group. Just like the band itself, it revives a time gone by. Even their clothes and facial hair fit the stage at the Rio Grande. You'll

hear impressively musical instrumentals, and creative, poetic and hilarious lyrics. And, of course, you'll hear hot jazz.

However, this quartet is too restless to stick purely to just one style.

Garavito, from Colombia, brings a whole life of Latin rhythm to his percussion. Bassist Putnam has a resume that includes both death metal and Western swing.

And to throw everyone in the audience off, they'll do something like break out into

the theme song of Spider-Man.

The band's name, French for "crazy cat," is fitting for many reasons, including that it ends in que, just like these words that all apply, more or less, to the group: unique, baroque, antique, burlesque, picturesque, mystique, risqué and Albuquerque.

opens "To the Moon: Snoopy Soars with NASA" Saturday, Jan. 14. Just before the first man landed on the moon, Charlie Brown and Snoopy soared through space with NASA's Apollo 10 mission in May 1969. "To the Moon: Snoopy Soars with NASA" examines the history of Apollo 10 and the "Peanuts" characters' role in that flight.

As the end of the 1960s approached, America and the rest of the world waited with great anticipation to see if NASA could achieve President Kennedy's May 1961 challenge; to put a man on the moon by the end of the decade. Consequently, it was a very great honor when the crew of Apollo 10 chose to nickname their command and lunar modules Charlie Brown and Snoopy. The flight of Apollo 10 in May 1969 was the "dress rehearsal" for the lunar landing that was scheduled for July 1969. Astronauts Thomas Stafford and Eugene Cernan piloted "Snoopy" within 50,000 feet of the lunar surface as they scouted the landing area for Apollo 11 while John Young

orbited the moon in the command module "Charlie Brown."

In "To the Moon: Snoopy Soars with NASA," visitors will see Snoopy's trip to the moon in the March 1969 "Peanuts" strip series, learn about the NASA's Silver Snoopy Award program, and view a Silver Snoopy pin that was flown to the moon. The exhibit also contains a children's creative play space where children can dress up like an astronaut and have their photograph taken in a life-size Apollo 10 astronaut suit standee.

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# AtTheMovies

## A single painting comes to life

Film follows peasants' in medieval work

"The Mill and the Cross," starring a recently revived Rutger Hauer, brings a single painting to life.

The work in question is titled "The Procession to Calvary" (I've also seen it called "The Way to Calvary") and was done by Dutch artist Pieter Bruegel in 1564.

Bruegel, who died before the age of 50, is often noted for his works that include scenes of peasant life, landscapes and slightly ironic, paintings such as "Calvary," which seems to be a very devout work. He also is noted for his impressions of the "other" direction, hellish scenes, such as "Massacre of the Innocents."

It is said that one of his major influences was Jheronimus Bosch, another Dutch painter of note and the creator of the famous and somewhat surreal painting, "Garden of Earthly Delights."



Rutger Hauer stars as medieval Dutch artist Pieter Bruegel, in "The Mill and the Cross," now playing at the Fountain Theatre.

The film itself, sometimes a bit hard to interpret for those of us who aren't up on the work of such fine masters, essentially covers Hauer as Bruegel explaining in detail the work to a patron of the arts played by Michael York.


The painting is dissected into small scenes, many mostly silent, and follows some of the peasant's actions as they follow Jesus' trip to what will be his final resting place, at times comparing them with the plight of the ultimate holy

man. It was during this time the Spanish had invaded Holland, creating havoc and suffering.

Although somewhat inexplicable, the windmill that occupies a rocky promontory in the painting is said to compare Holland to Palestine. Hence, a message delivered to those who are paying attention. I missed that myself.

Directed by Loch Majewski of Poland – who uses excellent computer graphics, green screen, live action and even a copy of the painting to make his story – we are witness to number of individual dramas, some of which might not be easy to watch by the weak of heart. It was a time of violence and piety and as explained by the film and Bruegel's painting, life was not an easy occupation.

Hauer, whose career really took off in the

'80s when he played a number of tough-guy characters, does a fine job here as the painter and clearly shows his range, since his other latest film was the violent tongue-in-cheek work, "Hobo with a Shotgun."

"The Mill and the Cross" is a very unique picture. It covers a lot of ground in its 90 minutes, and as I read somewhere it is actually an art history lesson disguised as a movie.

## 'Broadway Rocks' the Las Cruces Symphony

Venue change impacted talented performance

My wife and I have been subscribers to the Las Cruces Symphony and enthusiastic and satisfied LCSA supporters for more than a decade.

We attend each season's six "classic" series concerts faithfully and sing the praises of the Las Cruces Symphony to family and friends around the country, as well as to anyone we meet who is considering relocating to this fine community. In our opinion, the Las Cruces Symphony is one of the brightest jewels in our community's cultural crown.

Over the years, we have heard enthusiastic reports of the annual Las Cruces Symphony "Pops" concerts, which began about five or six years ago and were presented in the regular symphony venue, the Atkinson Recital Hall with its excellent sight lines and acoustics on the New Mexico State University campus.

In past years, these concerts were comprised of the music of Broadway in addition to themed concerts built around the music of noted performers such as ABBA, the Beach Boys, Frank Sinatra and the Beatles. Performances always sold out quickly.

With this in mind, I must present this "mixed" review of this year's Pops concert, "Broadway Rocks!" held Jan. 7-8.

This year, in an effort to grow the audience, and to create the feel of the Boston Pops, where the floor of Boston's famous Symphony Hall is reconfigured from auditorium seating to banquet/café seating, the Las Cruces Symphony "Pops" concert was moved to the Las Cruces Convention Center,

a multi-purpose venue constructed for conventions, trade shows and large gatherings as opposed to a dedicated, musical performance space.

Clearly this move had trade-offs, and, in the end, was a learning experience for Maestro Lonnie Klein, his musicians and administrative and technical staff, the Las Cruces Symphony Chorus, as well as the Las Cruces concert-going audience who needs to realize they are attending a performance as opposed to a private party or nightclub.

Hopefully, we can all learn from the technical shortcomings of this year's event and make next year's "Pops" concert even better.

First, let us focus on the positive elements. The program itself was varied and exciting, although I might quibble about the inclusion of a couple of the less popular pieces. In the two solo orchestral selections, the overture to "Broadway Rocks," as well as the overture from "Jesus Christ Superstar" the symphony under Maestro Klein's direction, sounded vibrant and exciting. As accompaniment to the three soloists, they were appropriately muted to give the singers' voices the opportunity to shine.

The soloists sang some of their numbers better than others. "This is the Moment" from "Jeckyll and Hyde," sung by Rob Evan who has performed the lead role in many settings, was special. The two most famous songs in "Wicked" – "For Good" and "Defying Gravity" – sung by Christiane Noll and Capathia Jenkins, showed off the range and emotion of these ladies quite well. Evan and Noll also hit home runs with their selections from "Phantom of the Opera." Another terrific highlight was the encore from "Hair,"

which was not only a surprise, but brought the audience to its feet.

That being said, I am compelled to point out the distractions that made the evening less than perfect. From our vantage point in the rear and side of the hall, we could hardly see the stage. The risers in the front of the hall were too low to provide those of us in the rear with a clear view.

The light bar containing specialized spotlights that revolved around the room and stage was hung too high to be effective. Alas, the colored gel lights hit the ceiling beams of the hall as opposed to the stage. Three large permanent chandeliers were lit throughout the concert, and the effect of any spotlight on Maestro Klein or the performers was mitigated. Bright lights also bordered the entire room, making it difficult to focus on the activity on stage. If there was a dimming system to soften the feel of the room, none was evident.

The sound dynamics of the concert were uneven. Friends seated in the front of the hall were able to see the performers and musicians well enough, but told us they had difficulty hearing them. For those of us in the back or the hall, the music was piped through the room's speakers and was not mixed as well as it could. It ranged in volume from loud to louder.

The symphony chorus, under the capable and enthusiastic direction of Diane Schutz, sang their hearts out, but without sufficient amplification, could hardly be heard as they provided vocal richness to the "Circle of Life" ensemble from "The Lion King." Only during the encore from "Hair," when they circulated around the room, did we have a sense of their joy and talent. I hope they are used in more concerts.

Food and drinks were available for purchase throughout the concert. The servers, trying to be unobtrusive, still circulated around the room, blocking views, taking orders, serving food and collecting payments while singers and musicians were performing. A better plan might have been to have patrons order drinks and food only before the concert and during intermission. Perhaps the symphony folks were heeding the words of Evan at the start of the show who joked, "The more you drink, the better we'll sound!"

In addition, a photographer roamed the room taking flash photos and chatting with friends in the audience who asked him to take their photos while the concert was in progress. Our friends in the front of the hall told us that during the concert this same photographer stood in front of them, blocking their view until asking him to move.

Audience members chatted with each other throughout the concert, some even stopping those leaving to go to the restrooms while the concert was in progress to engage them in conversation. For those of us who came to hear and enjoy the music, we were impeded by some audience members who should have known better.

I own a sermon collection titled "From Storms We Grow." Hopefully the Las Cruces Symphony will learn from the glitches ("storms") in this year's "Pops" concert and will tweak a good idea and make it grow better in years to come.

# Seeing all sides of Monroe

## Film gives insight to icon's tragic beauty

A dreary Sunday in the Mesilla Valley, rain clouds hung in the sky and what better time to grab some girlfriends for an afternoon at the movies.

While the theater was full of action-packed thrillers and side-splitting comedies, we chose a more subdued flick about one of the world's most glamorous, and sadly tragic movie stars, Marilyn Monroe.

"My Week with Marilyn" tells the true story about the making of "The Prince and the Showgirl," a 1950s movie starring Sir Laurence Olivier and Monroe, and how third assistant director Colin Clark fell in love with the American beauty.

The film opens on Colin (Eddie Redmayne) eagerly trying to find a job with Olivier's production studio, despite the disapproval of his high-class and well-to-do parents. Finally getting the approval from Olivier (Kenneth Branagh), Colin is put to work on the set.

From the beginning, Monroe (Michelle Williams) is deemed as difficult. First, she refused to venture to England without her new husband, playwright Arthur Miller (Dougray Scott), then she insists on having her acting coach Paula Strasberg (Zoe Wanamaker) on set with her at all times.

Even with these demands met, she is still constantly late to the set, sitting in her dressing room crippled with insecurities as the cast and crew wait her arrival.

Forgetting her lines and shaken with self-doubt, Monroe isn't easy to work with – made even worse by Olivier's sour attitude toward the star. Despite these troubles, when she gets it right, the entire set and film shines with her beauty and charm.

In "My Week with Marilyn," the audience is privy to the circus that is Marilyn Monroe. No matter if it is landing at the airport or visiting a boarding school for boys, she draws crowds of people clamoring to see her – and boy does she play for them with winks and kisses. There is no doubt this woman knows how to lure people in and keep them enchanted.

On the flip side, there is a sad and desperate Monroe. The complete opposite of her public image of sex appeal and glamour, she is

constantly seeking approval and becomes depressed with the slightest criticism. A lost soul looking for someone to love her and pledged with fears of abandonment, Monroe's issues are made apparent and are amplified by her handlers' insistence on keeping her doped up on a variety of pills.

When Miller leaves England because he no longer wants to "save" his new wife, Monroe latches on to Colin. Engulfed in her beauty and mystification, Colin believes she needs him and he can save her, despite his many warnings that she will break his heart from those around her.

Colin sees the playful, joyful side of Marilyn, as well as her depressive side. Captivated, he is distraught when the actress does, in fact, drop him.

"My Week with Marilyn," although slow at times, was an entertaining extravaganza. Redmayne plays the naïve and brilliant Colin perfectly, oozing enough boyish charm to make you believe the glamour queen would indeed be drawn to his kind nature.

Branagh is also wonderful as Olivier. An actor trying to be a movie star, Olivier is the only one who doesn't want to pander to Monroe. Branagh brings the legion's hope and disappointments with of the film to life.

Although a small part, Judi Dench is magnificent as Dame Sybil Thorndike. An experienced actress, Thorndike sees the pain in Monroe and does what she can to lift her up and give

her reassurance. I loved her kind nature and sympathy – traits that others should possess.

The star of the film, of course, was Williams. When I first heard she was going to play Monroe, I couldn't see it. I kept thinking, "Really? The girl from 'Dawson's Creek' is going to try to fill such big shoes?"

Oh, was I wrong. Williams made the movie. She embodied the beauty. From her well-known curves and bobbed platinum hair to her breathy voice and sultry persona, she was Monroe to the T. She even mastered Monroe's charisma – whenever she was on the screen, I couldn't take my eyes off her – as well as her tragedy.

True insight into one of the most famous movie stars ever, "My Week with Marilyn" was a joy to watch, and I see Oscar gold in Williams' future for this film, and probably many others.

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## A Great Day for Day's

### Hamburger joint has stood the test of time

Keeping the look of an old-fashioned burger joint, Day's Hamburgers, 295 N. Main St., is a jewel of Downtown Las Cruces.

Downtown Las Cruces had a Main Street that was truly the heart of town. With retail outlets, government offices, diners and cafés, the area a one-stop shop for Las Cruces.

Decades later, in the 1970s, the now cursed words of "urban renewal" were uttered and the City of Las Cruces was sold on closing Main Street to vehicular traffic to instead have a pedestrian mall sure to revive the area with greenery.

It has only been several years since the community has decided to "undo" urban renewal by reopening Main Street to vehicular traffic.

Whether Main Street was opened, closed or in between, there was Day's Hamburgers.

It may not have been in its current location, 295 N. Main St., since it first opened in 1932, but the business has essentially stayed the same.

Its unique location at Main Street and Las Cruces Avenue has weathered the test of time and is sometimes forgotten. You should never forget Day's.

To me, it doesn't matter the location; Day's is a destination. Even if I had to follow the yellow brick road of the Downtown Mall or avoid construction directly in front of the business (which I have done), I would still make it there. If I want a Great Day hamburger, I'm going to get a Great Day hamburger. And

I know many Las Cruces share the same sentiment.

Why?

As my husband Brandon put it during his first time eating there this week, "This is really like a homemade burger."

I couldn't agree more.

Each Great Day burger, the signature item, is grilled to order - single, double or triple patty with your choice of cheese, green chile, lettuce, mayo, mustard, lettuce and onions. Having bacon on your burger is not an option, but bacon is available in the breakfast burritos.

The green chile at Day's comes with the perfect combination of flavor and bite, making Day's a formidable contender in the competition for the world's best green chile cheeseburger.

The look of Day's is similar to that of a small diner - without the counter - in the 1950s and keeps that old-fashioned diner feel, even in its operation.

When it's your turn to order at the window, you select your items from the taped menu that sits on the counter in front of you. The person taking your order writes it down on a grill slip and clips it on a line hanging above the grill (which lies just beyond the counter). But,

thankfully, the place is fully updated to take credit cards, and it's clean. Super clean. There's no smell of charred meat, and that, to me, is high on my list of priorities.

There are no combo meals either, and although it's a burger joint, it doesn't necessarily qualify as fast food. There's definitely no drive-thru window, nor should there ever be.

Despite no combo, we were able to order a Great Day with chile and cheese, a Double Day with cheese, two orders of fries and two fountain drinks for under \$20.

Equally as important as having a great burger is great fries to go with it. And Day's has, hands down, the best fries in Las Cruces - in my opinion, of course. When I dip Day's french fries in my pepper-covered ketchup, it's pure heaven.

While the signature burger may be Day's claim to fame, the restaurant offers breakfast items and others in addition to hamburgers and fries. I have yet to wander off the Great Day path, but that doesn't mean others shouldn't do it.

No, it shouldn't be complicated to create a delicious hamburger, but it's not easy either. Open since 1932, Day's Hamburgers has it down to a science.

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
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## This is not a resolution

## Imaging center advances care

### Radiology receives gold standard certifications

The Imaging Center of Las Cruces Radiology has come a long way since it first opened 24 years ago in a small office on Triviz Drive with only one MRI machine and a few employees.

Over the years, a bigger need became apparent in the community for up-to-date technology in digital imaging services, and the imaging center developed accordingly to meet that demand.

Moving to its current location on Roadrunner Parkway in 2005 to a 10,000-square-foot patient care center, the imaging center now offers state-of-the-art imaging technology for MRIs, CTs, nuclear medicine, digital mammography, ultrasounds, bone density, fluoroscopy, X-rays and lab draws.

Now, the imaging center has something to be even more proud of, because in December 2011, it achieved three accreditations from the American College of Radiology (ACR) for superior imaging in MRIs, Nuclear Medicine and CTs, in addition to the center's previous accreditation in mammography.

## More and more reasons to ride

### Local group teaches safety and confidence

Cyclists in Las Cruces will tell you there is no reason not to ride a bike in a city with nearly year-round temperate weather.

In fact, there are many reasons to jump on the two-wheeled bandwagon – a continuing rise in gas prices, good exercise and having a positive environmental impact – the list goes on.

Several bike enthusiasts in Las Cruces are determined to create a bike-friendly city by educating bicyclists and motorists alike how to be safe when in the presence of one another.

This group of League Cycling Instructors (LCIs), known as the Southern New Mexico Bicycling Educators are certified by the League of American Bicyclists, and hold education courses and seminars within the city. The group also works with the city to advocate for safer cycling.

Classes are designed for different age levels and are offered locally through elementary schools, at the New Mexico State University campus and different venues and events around the city of Las Cruces, such as Earth Day.

"Cyclists are vehicles and have a right to the roadway, and

the motorists need to understand that," said LCI George Pearson.

Likewise, Pearson said, cyclists need to know how to follow traffic laws the same as vehicles.

The curriculum of the courses instruct not only safety, but also how to gain confidence and get over the fear of riding a bicycle alongside motorists.

According to LCI Jean Conway, fear is a big reason why a lot of people still choose not to ride their bikes at all.

"A lot of people are still afraid of being hit, but that's a false perception because statistics show you're more likely to get injured while driving a vehicle than while on a bicycle," Conway said.

Pearson agreed that in his 10 years of commuting to work and school on a bicycle, he almost got in twice as many accidents while driving his car during the few days of recent snowy weather.

LCI Cindy Robbins, who works in the Foundation at NMSU, said she sees a high density of people riding bikes on campus, but not enough who pay attention to basic safety rules.

"I just want to pass out helmets all the time," Robbins said. "People are educating their brains but not protecting them."

#### Rules of the road-tips to ride safely

- The same laws that apply to motorists apply to bicyclists
- Obey all traffic control devices
- Use hand signals to indicate stops and turns
- Always wear a helmet, no matter how short the trip
- Ride on the right
- Always ride in the same direction as traffic
- Use the furthest right lane that heads to your destination
- Slower moving bicyclists and motorists stay to the right
- Ride predictably
- Ride in a straight line
- Don't swerve in the road or between parked cars
- Check for traffic before entering street or intersection
- Anticipate hazards and adjust your position accordingly
- Be visible
- Wear brightly colored clothing that provides contrast
- Use a white front light in low light conditions
- Use a red rear light in low light conditions
- Use a reflector or reflective tape on clothing at anytime
- Announce yourself by making eye contact with motorists

The League of American Bicyclists ranks New Mexico 44th in the nation of bicycle friendly states. Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Las Cruces are listed as Bicycle Friendly communities, but only Albuquerque has two bike-friendly businesses, and there are no bike-friendly

universities, according to the website.

Robbins and Conway, who both work for NMSU, said they are working with the university to pay more attention to biking as an alternative mode of transportation as the university expands and parking becomes more difficult.

"It's only 3 miles from campus to Downtown, which may seem far to someone who's not used to it," Pearson said.

The layout of Las Cruces' streets being primarily flat, with most roads being wide enough for both bikers and motorists, only adds to the appeal, he said.

said accreditation from the ACR is the "gold standard" of accreditations, and represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety.

"It presents the opportunity for us to show to the community we are committed to providing the best care possible, in an efficient manner," Gomez said.

Not an easy task, according to Gomez, who said the process takes at least six months of preparation and test submissions for the ACR to evaluate and award an accreditation status.

Despite the hard work and technical aspects of achieving the accreditation, radiology director Martin Alvarez recognizes the center's No. 1 priority is to serve the patient.

"We want to make sure the patients come in and understand they are being taken care of," Alvarez said. "We all understand that when patients come in they are scared, so we try to be as welcoming as possible."

Alvarez, a Mayfield High School graduate who received his degree in radiology from the Doña Ana Community College, has been with the imaging center since 1989 and understands the level of care Las Cruces residents have grown to expect.

"We want people to know they can receive the same quality of care they can if they went to a bigger city," Alvarez said. "We were actually the first center in the southwest region to bring in digital mammography."

They couldn't do it without the full support of all the team members, including full-time Registered Nurse Carla Daamen, doctors Rama Devasthali, Puneet Ghei and Eduardo Martinez.

Gomez said all staff members of the imaging center are either registered or registry eligible technologists.

"We have a lot of serious and terminally ill people come in, and we want them to receive the TLC they deserve," Gomez said.

The Las Cruces Imaging Center is currently the only ACR accredited CT and nuclear medicine facility in the region.

# Texas transplant leads small groups

## Pastor Scott Rodgers focuses on discipleship at Calvary, community

Since venturing to the Mesilla Valley eight months ago, Pastor Scott Rodgers has been busy making a new home for his family as well as grow the Calvary Small Groups program.

Originally from San Angelo, Texas, Rodgers said his father was a pastor, and he grew up moving around because of his ministry.

"When I was 17 or 18, all of those big questions of what to do with my life started coming up," said Rodgers, adding he resisted his father's line of work for a long time. "When I would think of all of the different things I got excited about and would want to do, I felt like there was a road block with each of them.

"In prayer one night, I felt God tell me to become a pastor. ... I decided I had to do what he wanted and I could no longer resist it."

He attended Angelo State University before receiving seminary training at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Ministering all over Texas, Rodgers said after establishing a Calvary Baptist church in east Texas, he felt God was ready for him to do something different.

"I felt like I needed to serve in the way God gifted me to," he said, explaining that his talents lie in discipleship and developing leaders.

First looking for positions in Texas then the surrounding states, Rodgers said he still doesn't know how Calvary Baptist Church of Las Cruces received his information.

"I got a call from them," he said. "I waited and told my wife I felt like I needed to call them back."

Rodgers was offered a position as the pastor of community groups with the Calvary Small Groups, a program that had been without a leader for about a year.

"Part of the Calvary ministries is getting everyone in the church into small groups," Rodgers said. "It's been shown that one of the best ways to build relationships and spirituality is through smaller groups of people, about six to 12 people."

Although an opportunity to grow a program and minister to leaders, there was one

thing that made Rodgers and his wife Pam hesitate – their unfamiliarity with Las Cruces.

Rodgers said they were expecting a flat, dry desert with little to no natural beauty, but when they drove in for the first time, they were pleasantly surprised.

"When we came here we just fell in love," he said, adding that they were thrilled about the mountains and valley landscape. "This is the first time I've lived outside of Texas."

Rodgers said the couple also had concerns about how their five children would react to the move.

"We were trying to figure out their needs and expectations," he said, adding that they were worried the kids – ranging from ages 6 to 15 – wouldn't like to be taken out of their humid, pine tree-filled environment. "They saw it and said they loved the rocks in the yards. ... They saw beauty in the things we saw beauty in."

As pastor of community groups, Rodgers said he works with the leaders of the 23 small groups the church has to further their mission of reach, care and grow.

"And it's caring for them and filling a pastoral role," he said. "I'm here to help them and be a resource."

Rodgers said the groups are categorized in four clusters: college age, young parents, senior adult and cross-generational, the largest group.

"We want to make sure we have room for people in the church and the people of Las Cruces," Rodgers said. "Our mission is to see a healthy Calvary small group in each Las Cruces neighborhood."

While most of the small groups' presence has been internal at the church, Rodgers said by the end of the year, they will create the first community small groups, reaching out to Las Cruces. Each year, more groups will be introduced until there is one in each neighborhood.

To join a community small group, Rodgers said, members don't have to be a congregant of Calvary Baptist Church.

"The idea is for the groups to be a front door to the church," he said.

Although there is a lot to be accomplished, Rodgers said he has received positive feedback from congregants.

"Calvary is one of the healthiest churches I have been a part of," he said. "Having five kids, we wanted them to be a part of a healthy church. That's what attracted us to Calvary."

# Common back condition can be devastating

## MountainView offers new treatment

For most people, walking from the parking lot to the storefront is not a big task, but it's an ordeal for patients who have lumbar spinal stenosis (LSS).

This incapacitating condition, which is caused by an abnormal narrowing of the spine, can make every small step a big pain.

Now, MountainView Regional Medical Center is offering a new procedure called Minimally Invasive Lumbar Decompression.

Dr. Lisa Lichota, D.O., a Board Certified Pain Management physician, performed the first mild procedure at MountainView Regional.

The procedure is typically performed under a mild local anesthetic with light sedation.

Using an image-guided probe the size of a pen, Lichota is able to locate and remove small portions of tissue and bone that pinch the spinal cord and cause pain.

"Traditional back surgery can involve a three- to four-hour procedure with a lot of blood loss," Lichota said. "This procedure takes about an hour, requires no sutures and patients can often be released from the hospital the very same day."

Lichota said the mild procedure may

be appropriate for people who have not responded to non-surgical treatment or who have underlying medical conditions that put them at risk for open surgery.

For local resident Diana Hockert, the procedure paid off.

"It did absolutely everything the doctor said it would do," she said. "It really worked, and I feel fantastic."

Hockert was one of the first patients to receive the mild surgery at MountainView Regional and said she felt almost instantaneous relief.

LSS is a narrowing of the lower spinal canal that puts pressure on the spinal cord and nerves and can cause pain.

"It most often results from normal wear-and-tear on the spine as we age," Lichota said. "It usually shows up first in people over 50, and the likelihood increases as we age."

In some cases, arthritis, inherited conditions, injury or other medical conditions may cause spinal stenosis.

Lower back pain is the most common symptom of LSS. Other symptoms can include leg pain, pain or cramping in the legs – particularly when standing for long periods of time or when walking – numbness, weakness or a tingling sensation in the legs or feet.

Problems controlling bladder or bowels may be a symptom of more serious types of spinal stenosis.

After a medical history and physical exam, diagnosis of spinal stenosis may include X-rays, MRI, CT, bone scan or myelogram – a test in which doctors inject liquid dye into the spinal column.

Once diagnosed, physicians will most often prescribe nonsurgical treatments, including

medication, to reduce swelling or relieve pain, rest or physical therapy to increase flexibility and stabilize the spine. Surgery may be considered after analyzing the success of nonsurgical treatments, the extent of pain and the patient's preference and overall medical condition.

Most severe cases of LSS usually require surgery, which provides a more permanent solution to treating LSS. The goal of most surgery is decompression – a procedure to relieve pressure on the spinal cord and nerves by widening the spinal canal. Traditional surgical options often include a large incision, a lengthier hospital stay and longer recovery times.

Newer surgical options such as this mild procedure offer a less invasive alternative for appropriate patients. Performed with the guidance of X-ray, it allows the surgeon to operate with a very small incision about the diameter of a pencil, using special devices to remove small pieces of bone and tissue causing the pressure on the nerves.

Operation and recovery times are generally much shorter than with more invasive procedures. Many patients report immediate relief, and

most go home the same day – ready within a few days to begin physical therapy.

LSS does not go away on its own. Left untreated, pain and discomfort may increase over time and it may become increasingly difficult to enjoy activities that require mobility, including walking short distances. Individuals who experience LSS symptoms should discuss the symptoms and treatment options with their physician.

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# Capturing the valley view

Organ mountains, unique landscape lead a West Coast couple to Mesilla

The desert climate, scenic landscape and rich culture of the Mesilla Valley has attracted many to the area, including Gary and Tricia Evans.

Living in Southern California, the couple decided to move to New Mexico in the 1990s. After discovering that Santa Fe and Albuquerque didn't have what they were looking for, a friend suggested they visit Las Cruces.

"We came here and liked what we saw," Gary Evans said.

The couple visited the City of the Crosses periodically during the next six months to get a feel for the area in each season. Deciding this was the place for them, they began looking for a piece of property in the valley, and found just the place at 2780 Buena Tierra.

Just an empty piece of land at the time, the property featured 5 acres and one of the best views of the Organ Mountains, the Evans said.

"This was one of the first homes to be built on this street," Gary Evans said.

The couple selected Michael Floyd as the builder of their Southwest-inspired, 2,700-square-foot home.

"We liked that Southwest, pueblo style," Gary Evans said. "We looked at books and got an idea of what we wanted. We wanted a classy Southwest home, not something that looked stamped out or over the top. I like to call it Southwest with style."

"Also, we were very used to having tile because there are a lot of Spanish-style homes in California, so we combined the two styles," Tricia Evans said.

As Floyd built their home in 1996, the couple simultaneously planted a large number of pecan trees on the property,

making them "pecan people."

"All of the properties our Realtor took us to had pecan trees on them," Gary Evans said. "So we decided to plant some."

As guests approach the Mesilla home, a wooden fence encloses a large yard and a gravel driveway leads to the side of the home.

"The house is placed on the lot in a way that all of the windows look out to the mountains," said Gary Evans, adding the front doesn't face the street.

A short walk to the front of the home leads to a courtyard. A willow tree drapes the area as tile accents the porch roofs and turquoise lines the windows and doorframes.

Inside, the home is filled with rough-sod cedar corbels, beams and vigas as well as nichos, arches, bancos and a neutral color scheme.

"Everyone who comes in say they feel very at home," Gary Evans said. "It's warm and inviting. I think that's because everything is so open."

The center of the home is the living room. The large space, which features numerous windows to capture the view, is divided into two seating areas that allow for various activities to take place, whether it's watching TV in the built-in entertainment center or enjoying the kiva-style fireplace.

The living room leads into the kitchen, brightly lit with natural light from the various windows and skylight. The couple included open cabinets to give the area a sense of space.

"The kitchen leads to this eating area, which is connected to this work area," Gary Evans said.

"I just love my kitchen," Tricia Evans said.

Between the breakfast nook and the hall from the entrance is the library area, one of Gary Evans' favorite features. Containing built-in adjustable shelves with over and under lighting, he said it's just the place to enjoy a book. It also leads to the dining room.

Beside the library is a guest bedroom. Featuring access to a private patio, Gary Evans said the room was designed to be a mini master suite with its very own full bathroom.

"It's great for guests," he said. "They can come and go as they please."


The other side of the home features the last three bedrooms, including the master suite.

The master suite features two closets as well as access to the patio through French doors.

"All of the bedrooms but one have access to a patio," Gary Evans said.

The bathroom includes a shower set behind a glass door. It also includes a large soaking tub engulfed in white tile.

Outside, Gary Evans said the property features a well and Elephant Butte Irrigation District water for irrigating the 165 pecan trees on the property. This past season, he said he netted

\$14,000 from the trees.

In addition to the money-making pecan trees, the property features rock landscaping mixed with native plants, such as ocotillo and cacti.

The backyard features a large fenced-in area of grass.

"This is a great space for dogs," Gary Evans said. "We also have natural arroyos to help with drainage. The system drains off the house into these arroyos, then into the yard."

The grassy yard and breathtaking view can be admired from the couple's tile-lined patio, covered in stained cedar planks.

# Citizens Bank donates Armijo House

## Bank continues local legacy with donation to chamber

When Citizens Bank acquired the Armijo House in 1997 from its holding company, Amador Bancshares Inc., some officials had visions of a chamber of commerce occupying the historic space.

This vision is finally coming to fruition with the bank donating the house owned by merchant Nestor Armijo in the 1800s to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce last year.

"I had a conversation with Mr. (Jim) Ikard in the late 1990s about the Armijo House being the location of the chamber," said Citizens Bank Chairman of the Board Tom Hutchinson, adding that documentation shows such talks taking place in the 1970s as well. "This idea has been explored quite a few years."

Hutchinson said the bank purchased the property from Loretto Centre LTD, which also owned the bank's main office on South Main Street. After taking it over, Citizens Bank leased out the space to a variety of businesses, including a law firm and real estate business, and made minor changes to update the structure.

"We didn't want to turn it into a bank," Hutchinson said. "We didn't want to house another financial institution since we had this one only 100 feet away."

Despite the structure's ideal location at the intersection of Lohman Avenue and Main Street and its rich history, the Armijo House has sat vacant the last three years.

"We did traditional upkeep," said Hutchinson, adding that



Citizens Bank donated the Armijo House to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce in November 2011. A \$2.3 million capital campaign is taking place to fund the restoration of the building, the addition of another structure and the creation of an endowment.

the residence was deteriorating faster than they could keep up. "It's harder to preserve a building when no one is in it. It deteriorates more and we knew we had to get someone in there to keep it alive."

It began to fall further into despair, and while some speculated that it would be torn down, Hutchinson said that was never an option.

"It was time to start accelerating our decision with the chamber or another nonprofit," Hutchinson said. "You know, these things just take time."

As with most business endeavors, "timing is everything," Hutchinson said. Thanks to the right leadership at the bank and chamber as well as support from the community, Citizens Bank donated the facility in November 2011, and it officially was taken over by the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce in late December 2011.

"The chamber doesn't have a lot of money, so it seemed like the right thing to do," Hutchinson said of the donation. "It was our civic contribution; it wasn't a hard decision."

"You've got – on this board and with senior managers and employees – about six former chamber chairs and board members. We understand and appreciate what the chamber has done."

Furthering the history and relationship of Citizens Bank and the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, Hutchinson said the bank has also donated \$50,000 to the Armijo House restoration project.

"It just makes a lot of sense for our community," he said. "This is a building that is worth going to longer lengths to preserve. Just look at the family who owned it and their involvement in



commerce. Couple that with the location and neat architectural features and details and it's a formula for success. It's a great story.

"What better place to welcome people to the area than a building that is so important to our history? It's a community landmark."

Hutchinson said Citizens Bank will continue to be involved with the Armijo House, adding that some members are on the chamber's Heritage Foundation and Building and Grounds Committee.

"We want to see good things happen," Hutchinson said. "We have a tremendous vested interest in this. We hope that it follows through with plans. We want it to continue to be a landmark in the community. And we're excited for the chamber to be our neighbor."

# Forget a gray winter

Purple leaf plum is a great way to add color

The purple leaf plum is one of the first trees to bloom in early or pre-spring. It is also one of the last to lose its leaves during late fall or even early winter.

Now, when I say bloom, I mean it really blooms. It gets covered with thousands of small light pink flowers. From a distance, it resembles a pink feather duster sticking out of the ground. This is its brilliant spring show.

As if almost instantaneously, dark purple leaves emerge just after the flower petals drop. These leaves will keep their dark color throughout the remainder of the summer and fall seasons.

This ornamental tree generally attains a height of about 20 feet tall and about 15 feet wide, depending on how it gets pruned. It can, and usually does, produce some or a lot of fruit, depending upon the variety and its location to other plum trees.

The purple leaf plum is susceptible to shot hole fungus or coryneum blight, which makes small tiny holes develop on the leaves. This ailment is very common and not fatal to the tree. It is best to prevent this with a spray containing chlorothalonil in late fall when leaves drop and early spring before it leafs out.

Do not re-use the leaves as compost on any member of the prunus family, such as apricot, cherry or laurels, as you may run the risk of spreading this disease.

This purple beauty is also susceptible to borers, which will make tiny holes in the main

trunk and lower limbs of the tree. This too can be prevented using a systemic insecticide containing imidacloprid, which will generally last up to one year after application. It prevents array of other leaf chewing insects that feed off of just about any ornamental tree or shrub as well.

Aside from the drawbacks listed above, this small ornamental tree can give a beautiful vibrant contrast of color to an all-green landscape. Its ultimate size gives just enough shade to “cool down” a hot wall or window with out over powering the size of a small lot. The dense foliage it produces can block out an unwanted view or even reduce some outside noise pollution.

If you are searching for just that “right-sized” tree, the purple leaf plum will make a great addition to just about any Southwest landscape situation. So go green with this long-season purple gem.

# Keep out curly tail arachnids

Scorpions play hide-and-seek during the coldest winter nights

Everyone loves a little game of hide-and-seek, and sadly, those scary curly-tailed scorpions enjoy playing this game, too.

It always seems like scorpions are one of the first critters that come out to visit once the temperatures begin to warm up, but where do they hibernate all winter long? Once the scorpions are inside your homes, they hide and will take up harborage in a small void, crack or crevice, even inside shoes or between linen. In fact, it's true they can vacation there for several months, which is exactly why you should make sure you take the proper measures for keeping scorpions out of the home to begin with. It really only takes one simple practice: seal.

Most must be reminded to seal the home at the base of the structure, door thresholds and around all pipe and utility entry points. That's because this is where scorpions would find easy access into the structure. The better the scorpion proofing of the home, the better control of the problem.

It is not always possible to completely seal up a home, but any measure taken can reduce the access and the number of scorpions. Also, when a home is sealed it allows for a professional pest management company to focus its efforts on other areas such as hard to seal places like garage doors

and provided a proactive barrier outside – where scorpions come from.

By investing a little time in “sealing the deal,” you will greatly reduce your chances of experiencing a scorpion infestation once the weather begins to warm up in the springtime.

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
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# Looking for a new roof?

## Even this 'forgotten' detail is going green

Near-hurricane-force winds tortured roofs all over New Mexico and the greater Southwest early last month – including hundreds of homes in our county. Thousands of homeowners in the region (like my wife and I) now find themselves with insurance check in hand, trying to determine how best to protect their home and get the most out of their pending roof investment.

The roof of the home is one part of the structure, typically ignored until there is a problem. Even in new construction, and especially with so many low slope or “flat”-roof style homes built in our area, the type of roofing installed receives little attention from most homeowners and buyers – out of sight out of mind? Just like a strong foundation, a durable and low-maintenance roof system protects all the stuff we can see and care about inside.

So, a good roof is important. When we get serious about selecting a roof and begin to “Google” all of the modern residential roof options, we see a staggering number of choices. Just like most homeowners, affordability and durability will be key in our selection. Green home certification programs, including the National Association of Home Builders Green, LEED for Homes and Energy Star for Homes provide additional best practice considerations in roof selection that can help narrow the search.

Durable, affordable, sustainable and energy-efficient home design (also known as green home design) offers valuable insight for making a roof “green.”

A key best practice for any roof installation, regardless of the actual roofing material surface, is a well thought out and correctly installed underlayment and flashing system.

Underlayment material beneath a roof system serves as a second line of defense to prevent leakage. It is typically a heavy, Fiberglass reinforced asphalt paper product overlapped

to move moisture to the edge of a roof below the protective surface. Flashing is galvanized sheet metal strips or rubberized membrane installed at deck penetrations, valleys, against roof to wall transitions or at other points where the plane of a roof deck has changes in angle or elevation.

When a roof leaks, it leads to expensive damage to the interior finishes and potentially to our personal belongings. Moisture in attic insulation and interior wall areas will also lead to mold growth and can impact your family's health.

Talk to your potential roofing contractors about how the roof will be prepared for your new roof covering. Be sure that a thorough inspection of the flashing and roof system underlayment is part of the re-roof quote and scope of work. Ask the contractor to detail costs and methods to resolve issues that may be discovered during the re-roof process – like points where water collects or stands, deteriorated boots at drain waste vents or gapped attic vent and chimney step flashing.

A reputable roofing contractor should be able to provide detail specification drawings to demonstrate proper installation techniques for flashing and underlayment installation. Homeowners should use these drawings during the installation to make sure the actual installation matches the specs provided. After walking over a thousand roofs in Las Cruces, I know that often we do not do a great job of installing flashing and underlayment (yes – it does eventually rain here).

Once the basics are covered, what's next? If you look up “green roofing” on the web you will find exotic and futuristic architectural wonders with orchards, gardens and salt grass meadows installed on the tops of urban high-rise buildings. In parts of the world where real estate is scarce and population is dense, these engineered roof systems help to insulate structures, manage storm water runoff, deflect heat island temperature increases and provide aesthetically important urban greenescapes.

These systems require a large upfront investment and a significant commitment by the owner or property manager to insure they per-

form as designed. This complex type of green roof is beyond the reach of most homeowners.

Fortunately, there are many more basic green roof options. Roof system manufacturers have embraced the public demand for products that last longer, require less maintenance and reduce utility costs. Many of these same products have been recognized by organizations such as Energy Star, LEED and NAHB Green for also reducing environmental impact through increased recycled content or their ability to be recycled after use.

Vinyl membrane roofing was first installed on large commercial structures and has now found its way in to the residential market, especially on our pueblo style, low slope roof homes. This material is typically white and reflects a large percent of the sun's heat energy from the roof surface so is prized in hot and desert climates. The main types used are Ethylene Propylene Diene Monomer (EPDM), Poly-Vinyl Chloride (PVC) and another known as Thermal Poly-Olefin (TPO). These materials are very long lasting and UV resistant. They are installed with heat-welded seams that resist separation and when installed by a quality contractor they can be expected to last for 20 to 30 years with very little maintenance.

A low-slope roofing solution used frequently to extend the life of existing roofs is elastomeric reflective roof coating. Like the vinyl roof, heat buildup at the deck and attic space is reduced by the light reflective color. Unlike other replacement roof systems, the old roof cap sheet and system does not need to be removed before the product is applied. The performance of these coating formulations has improved greatly in recent years.

I have been impressed by installations of this product on many homes in Las Cruces. The price for application of this coating system is typically less than overall roof system replacement. These coating systems, when applied by a qualified contractor are often warranted for five to 10 years or longer. Service for these coated roofs is simple, when an area needs attention it just needs to be cleaned and to have additional coating applied. Sins of previous roofing mistakes can be remediated by use of these coatings since they provide a continuous seal at the roof surface.

Our home is a traditional pitched roof design. The sealed membranes and coatings above can be installed on this type of roof

but the stark visual impact may bring your neighbors out with pitchforks. Metal roofing is one of the most durable and attractive choices for homes with sloped roof designs. Galvanized or coated steel and copper standing seam metal roofing or other designs that clip in place with weather protected fasteners have no visible penetrations. This means they are essentially maintenance free for the 30 to 50 year life of the roof.

When considering a metal roof note the type of fasteners used to secure the roof to the deck. I see homeowner installed R-Panel type roofing (especially re-roofs) where the exposed screw fasteners have failed gaskets (leaks) or where mineral coated shingles left in place beneath the metal have caused corrosion of the metal roof. A good or a green roof starts with the quality of the installation. Nearly all metal roofing is made from recycled material and all metal roofing can be recycled at the end of its service life.

What about good old-fashioned asphalt shingles? Progress marches on here as well. Most traditional three-tab asphalt shingles now come with a 15 to 20 year manufacturer's warranty. Heat build up on shingle roofs can deteriorate the plywood roof deck and increase attic temperatures and your summer cooling bills.

Special “cool roof” mineral coatings are available on most manufacturers shingles. These tend to be the lighter colored selections but they don't have to be the lovely “shasta white.” Varying colors are available meeting Energy Star Cool Roof criteria and range from reds and tans to grays and blues. Layered or “architectural style” asphalt shingles simulate the look of wood shake shingles. These offer even longer warranties, up to 30 years and come in wind resistant designs that manufacturers claim can resist 130 mph wind.

A green roof is one that fits your budget, helps to reduce utility costs, will be easy to maintain, won't scare your neighbors and is easy on natural resources. Take time to decide what green roof best fits your needs.

## Soup perfect for winter

Stay warm with a heaping helping of Southwest recipes

Winter – it's all about hearty, comfort food. And the best soothers are soup, especially on chilly nights in front of a roaring fire.

Some of my favorite Southwestern recipes are charged with veggies and legumes. Add hot pods to the mix and chilehead devotees get an additional fix.

I share two flavorsome soup recipes from two of my favorite cookbook authors – Barbara Pool Fenzl and Wolfgang Puck. Fenzl's Southwestern Vegetable Soup is charged with amber beer and three varieties of chile – jalapeño, green and ancho – and Puck's Tortilla Soup is simply corny.

I share one of my own that takes only minutes to prepare, White Turkey Cannelloni Chili with Verde Salsa. It's tasty, nutritious and easy on the pocketbook. It can also be simmered all day in a slow cooker. Soup's on!

### White Turkey Cannelloni Chili with Verde Salsa

Garnish with a dollop of Jalapeño Cream (recipe below) and toasted garlic bread.

#### Olive oil

- 1 small white onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 pound chicken breast, cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1 (32-ounce) carton chicken broth
- 2 (15-ounce) cans cannelloni beans, undrained
- 1 (8-ounce) jar verde salsa
- 4 to 6 medium-hot green chiles, roasted, stemmed and peeled
- 1 (10-ounce) package frozen corn kernels
- Pinch of cinnamon and cumin

In a large skillet, sauté onion, garlic and chicken in olive oil and set aside. Put chicken broth, cannelloni beans, salsa, chiles and corn kernels in a crock pot. Add sautéed mixture. Stir. Simmer for 8 hours on low setting. Enjoy! Makes 8 servings.

### Southwestern Vegetable Soup

- 2 large ripe tomatoes, halved horizontally
- 5 cups vegetable stock
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 cups white onions (about 2 large), diced
- 1 jalapeño chile, stemmed, seeded and finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup amber beer, such as Dos Equis
- 5 long green chiles, roasted, peeled, seeded and diced
- 2 cups Idaho potato (about 1 large), peeled and diced
- 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lime juice
- 1 tablespoon Achiote Paste (see recipe below)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1/2 cup cilantro, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup crumbled tangy white cheese, such as cotija or queso fresco

Preheat a broiler. Arrange the tomato halves, cut side down, on a baking sheet. Broil until the skins are charred, about 5 minutes. Transfer the tomatoes to a nonreactive saucepan, add the stock and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to low and simmer for 20 minutes. Strain the mixture into a large bowl, pressing on the solids with a rubber spatula to extract all the juices.

In a large nonreactive saucepan, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the onions, jalapeño and garlic. Cook, stirring occasionally until the onions are softened, about 5 minutes. Add the beer, raise the heat to high and bring to a boil; boil for 3 minutes. Add the strained stock, roasted chiles, potato, lime juice, achiote paste and sugar. Reduce the heat to medium; simmer until the potatoes are tender, about 20 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Stir in the chopped cilantro. Ladle the soup into shallow bowls and sprinkle with cheese. Makes 6 servings.

### Achiote Paste

This paste keeps up to 1 week in the refrigerator. It can be used on grilled meats and in soups and stews as a delicious seasoning.

#### 3 achiote chiles

- 1 clove garlic
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin seeds, toasted and crushed
- 1 teaspoon achiote (annatto) seeds
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup freshly squeezed orange juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Toast the ancho chiles in a heavy skillet over medium-high heat until oil is released and they smell toasted, 2 to 3 minutes. Cool slightly, stem seed and tear into strips. Place the strips in a blender with the remaining ingredients; purée until smooth. Cover and refrigerate for at least 24 hours, allowing flavors to blend. Makes about 1 cup. (Recipe is inspired by Barbara Pool Fenzl, author "Savor the Southwest," Bay Books, 1999.)

### Tortilla Soup

This recipe kicks with corn. Fresh kernels and the cobs themselves are steeped in the base providing the best corny flavor in Southwest! Before serving, add a dollop of Jalapeño Cream for added pizzazz.

#### Base:

- 2 ears fresh corn, shucked
- 4 or 5 large garlic cloves, peeled
- 1 small onion, peeled, trimmed and quartered
- 1 small jalapeño chile, stemmed and seeded
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 corn tortillas, cut into 1-inch squares
- 2 large ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded (see below) and coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 8 cups chicken stock heated
- Kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper

#### Garnish:

- 2 corn tortillas
- 1 ripe avocado
- 1 large chicken breast, cooked, skinned and boned
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup fresh cilantro leaves, chopped
- Jalapeño Cream (recipe below)

Using a large, sharp knife, carefully cut the

kernels of the corncobs. Set the kernels aside and reserve the cobs.

Put the corn kernels, garlic, onion and jalapeño in a food processor fitted with the metal blade. Pulse the machine until the mixture is coarsely chopped. Set aside.

To make the soup, in a large soup pot, heat the oil over low heat. Add the squares of tortilla and cook until they are slightly dark in color and a little crisp, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in the chopped corn mixture and sauté just until the vegetables are coated with the oil, about 1 minute. Do not let them brown.

Add the tomatoes, tomato paste and cumin and continue to cook, stirring occasionally, until the mixture is very aromatic, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile, in a separate saucepan, heat the broth. Slowly pour the stock into the vegetable mixture add the corncobs, and simmer over low heat until the soup is reduced by one-third, 15 to 20 minutes.

Remove and discard the corncobs. In a blender or food processor, purée the soup in batches until smooth, taking care to avoid splatters. At this point, if you'd like a finer consistency, you can pass the soup through a fine strainer. Return the soup to a clean pot and season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 6

to 8 servings.

To prepare the garish, preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Cut the tortillas into thin strips and arrange on a small baking sheet. Bake until the strips are crisp, 10 to 15 minutes. Peel and dice the avocado. Cut the chicken crosswise into thin strips. To serve, add the chicken and avocado to the soup and rewarm over low heat. Ladle the soup into 6 to 8 warmed soup bowls and garnish with the baked tortilla strips, Cheddar cheese and chopped cilantro. Serve immediately.

#### Jalapeño Cream:

- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
  - 1/4 cups sour cream
  - 1 jalapeño chile, stemmed, cored, seeded and minced
  - Salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste
- Mix ingredients in a bowl. (Recipes inspired by Wolfgang Puck, author of "Live Love Eat! The Best of Wolfgang Puck," Random House, 2002.)

# Garden program holds graduation

## 20 more volunteers join the team of horticulture experts

Master Gardeners filled the Trails West Senior Community Club House Saturday, Jan. 7, to welcome 20 more graduates to the extended network of volunteers.

Started in 2001 by the New Mexico State University Doña Ana County Extension Office, the Master Gardeners Program currently has about 78 master gardeners who reside in the county as well as the surrounding area, such as Deming, Columbus and Silver City.

"A Master Gardener is a volunteer giving back to the community by providing information to the public on horticulture-related questions," said Jeff Anderson, an Extension Agriculture agent.

To become a Master Gardener, Anderson said an individual must complete 14 six-hour classes that take place in Doña Ana County from August to December.

"It's not just taking the classes," Anderson said. "To be a Master Gardener, it takes a special person who wants to volunteer and give back to their community in the form of agricultural knowledge."

"There is no age requirement, but they need to be people who are serious volunteers."

Once Master Gardeners, they will be put to work serving the community in various ways.

One of the most popular services is the Master Gardener Hotline. Anderson said community members with horticulture-related questions can call the hotline – 525-6649 – from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday through Friday to speak with an expert.

Master Gardeners also provide their expertise and help during various community events, such as the upcoming Chile Conference, Feb. 6, and Pecan Growers Conference, March 4-6.

During the Chile Conference, Anderson said the Master Gardeners will hold a salsa contest. They will also man the Food Fantasy contest during the pecan conference.

The Master Gardeners Program also conducts educational classes for the public. Anderson said such a class will take place on apples and pears in April.

"We also have a number of highly skilled Master Gardeners who reach out to the schools and community gardens to provide good information," he said.

One such volunteer is Darrol Shillingburg. After 30 years of gardening as a hobby, Shillingburg joined the Master Gardeners seven years ago.

"I thought it was a good place to do service," he said, adding that he was looking for volunteer work after retiring.

Shillingburg said he has worked with Las Cruces Public Schools to set up school gardens in elementary, middle and high schools around town. Currently working as an adviser with seven schools, Shillingburg said he does site assessments, which include soil tests.

"I look at what they want to accomplish with their program and help them with what I think will work," he said. "It varies from garden to garden. No two are alike."

In addition, Shillingburg has worked with various community gardens and is currently assisting the city with the creation of its second community garden to be located at Gomez Park.

"It's a very different setup. It will have in-ground garden beds," he said, adding that at first, the garden will include about 15 beds. "Half of the beds have been spoken for and will be managed by community organizations (such as Oasis and Master Gardeners). This will put down a foundation of knowledge and help teach the rest of the community through demonstration beds."

Groundwork is currently being conducted and the community garden is expected to be open by March. Anderson said this is just one of the many ways Master Gardeners can stay involved.

"The Master Gardeners a wonderful program and a wonderful opportunity for people, especially those who are retired," Anderson said. "It gives them a focus and allows them to mingle with people who share similar interests. It keeps us all young and active."

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
