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Pecan farms end gift sales

Wholesale operations expected to continue at Stahmann Farms

Thanksgiving this year will not be the same at Savonne Griffin's house.

There will be no Stahmanns pecan pies after the big meal, because the 80-yearold pecan farms are closing their retail Country and Plaza stores, as well as their mail-order and online catalog.

"My family's going to hate me because I'm not going to bring pies anymore," said Griffin, a lifelong Las Crucen who frequently shopped at Stahmanns stores.

"I would go to the Country Store on Highway 28," Griffin said. "I loved driving through trees. I'd get a big gift basket for family members. And, of course, the pies."

Stahmanns will continue to grow pecans on the farms south of Las Cruces it has owned since 1925.

Deane Stahmann first planted pecans in 1932. Now the farms produce as many as 10 million pounds of pecans a year.

That will continue.

'The wholesale sales are still going on and doing very well," said Eva Valerio, retail store manager of the Stahmanns Country Store on Highway 28 and of the store on the Mesilla Plaza.

The candy making, which has been done since 1970, and the Country Store, open since 1983, will end.

"We had been struggling for over a year," Valerio said.

"It came down to the economy," she said. "Freight charges are outrageous. People aren't ordering as much as they used to because of freight charges.

"The economy doesn't seem to be getting better," Valerio said, adding that luxuries and gifts are among the first costs people cut. "With the high-rising cost of pecans, the high-rising cost of chocolate, sugar which has almost doubled - combined with not enough people buying, you just can't continue to do business."

Stahmanns still gets tourists, but the number is way down, said Valerio, who gave guided tours of the farms, though less and less frequently the last few years.

NMSU students elect barrier-busting leader First African-American woman

wins student government post

History was made at New Mexico State University Monday, April 30, with the swearing-in of Breeana Sylvas as the new student government president.

Although the Associated Students of NMSU has had women and other African-American students elected president, Sylvas is ASNMSU's first African-American woman to win election.

She won with 60 percent of

the vote in a runoff election held in early April. An appeal dispute from her opponent, Christopher Schoonover, almost threatened another election, but departing ASNMSU President Austin Graham ruled Sylvas properly won.

Sylvas said she and her supporters worked hard to get her name and message out to students.

"We were out there every day," she said.

"I've only given four tours since January," she said. "There's just not as many people coming through."

Stahmann's products were more than just a snack, they were a way of evangelizing the Mesilla Valley to the world.

"At the (Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce) Las Cruces Day in Santa Fe, one year we took Stahmanns pecans to all the legislators as gifts," said Griffin, a chamber board member. "It's our staple. It's a unique product that everyone loves."

And the products went much farther

than Santa Fe. "I would send canned nuts and pralines to my family in Germany," Griffin said. "When my cousin was deployed to Iraq, out in the middle of nowhere, we would send him tins of pecans. We would

send care packages from home and Stahmanns was always in there."

"İ'm very sad," said Valerio, who has been with Stahmanns since 2008. Some staff members will

staff members will be reassigned within the company, but Valerio, along with several others, will be out of work.

"When the decision was made, we sat here with (current owner Sally Stahmann-Solis) and we cried and talked. Everybody here is taking it pretty hard," she said. "The public is in shock," she said. "Lots of people are saying,

'I grew up with Stahmanns. They are our history.' But without the public coming in and making purchases every once in a while, we can't keep doing business."

Valerio said Stahmanns made a point to avoid raising

prices on its candies and gifts. "We changed the tins and baskets we used to save some money there so we wouldn't have to change our prices," she said.

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"I'm really going to miss it," Griffin said. "I love Stahmanns. It's an amazing product, homegrown and home-developled."

A holiday gift-giving staple, sales of the gifts and candies made October through December the biggest selling months of the year for the stores. December sales typically outpaced January and February sales as many as sixfold, Valerio said.

May was another good month and shoppers can still contribute to that, as the stores will be open until May 31. The online and catalog stores have already closed.

"I told Sally I'll be here until the end," Valerio said. "I'll be the last person out when the doors close for good."

Thousands of historic agricultural documents are being digitized, providing a lasting record of extension service in New Mexico. Examples of these publications are currently on display in the lobby of Branson Library.

A previous exhibit on the 150th Anniversary of the Morrill Act, which established the land grant colleges, featured 16 photos of "The Mechanic Arts," an archaic term for engineering. The photos highlighted the beauty of mechanical forms frozen in time.

The New Mexico Book Co-op's list of the 100 Best New Mexico Books, celebrating New Mexico authors, publishers and subjects, was announced just in time for the Centennial.

University Archivist Martha Andrews was honored with a place on the list for her book "The Whole Damned World: New Mexico Aggies at War 1941-1945."

Centennial bookmarks are available at the Library. A video at http://lib.nmsu.edu/media/centennial/index.html features many of the library's Centennial activities.

The NMSU Library's documents and photographs play an important role in celebrating the people who built our state and informing those who envision New Mexico's future.

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

The wacky WAC

By honoring its promises, New Mexico State University athletics may end up being lost in the conference shuffles

Earlier this week, I received a formal press statement from the offices of the Western Athletic Conference. Here is what WAC Interim Commissioner Jeff Hurd had to say: The Western Athletic Conference Board of Directors is well aware of the changing

landscape in Division I athletics and has been in discussion about it for the last several weeks.

"Further, it continues to evaluate the impact upon the WAC and is closely engaged in evaluating its membership options. It will not speculate relative to those options, but it has confidence that the WAC will maintain its more than 50-year history as a preeminent Division I conference."

These comments followed the announcements and speculative reports that suggest the WAC will soon be left with only two football schools, Idaho and NMSU. Boise State left the WAC prior to this season. Hawai'i, Fresno State and Nevada announced before the 2011 season that they would be defecting to the Mountain West Conference.

Last week, the Sun Belt Conference, now headed by former WAC Commissioner Karl Benson, announced that they recruited Louisiana Tech and University of Texas at San Antonio, the latter being a school that Benson signed up last year for the new WAC starting in the fall of 2012. Now we are hearing reports that the Mountain West is exploring further expansion, and that they will soon announce the addition of two other WAC schools, Utah State and San Jose State.

All this realignment poses incredible problems for the NMSU Aggies. The challenges are two-fold.

First, NMSU, along with virtually all the other WAC-affiliated universities pledged to be united in their commitment to remain as members of the WAC. They each also agreed to pay a stiff financial penalty to the WAC, if they should choose to leave the WAC for another conference.

NMSU and Idaho appear to be the only two universities that have, at least up to this point, held true to their pledge. The other schools have run to the money, and ignored their mutual promises.

Second, the unprecedented realignment of Division-1A NCAA conferences across the country appears to be all about money. More specifically, the single most important consideration for how attractive a university is to a conference is the university's ability to generate television revenue.

Las Cruces, and thus New Mexico State University, has no revenue-generation potential from the local television market because there is no local television market.


In Las Cruces, we live in a television black hole because our television signals predominantly originate from El Paso. For years, the University of Texas-El Paso has claimed the television market out of El Paso, and the El Paso network stations have claimed, virtually exclusively, the UTEP Miners as their hometown team.

As a marketer, it would seem logical to me that because the Albuquerque media is almost totally loyal to the University of New Mexico Lobo athletic programs, the El Paso network stations would be advantaged to claim both the Aggies and the Miners as their teams. However, because of the long history of the UTEP administration's doing all within their power to prevent the Aggie athletics program from strengthening and possibly taking market share away from the Miners, the Aggies have never been able to gain a foothold in the regional media.

Wouldn't it make sense for NMSU, UTEP and UNM to all be competing in the same conference? The rivalries would be fierce. The travel costs would be nicely contained. Attendance would likely soar.

But, alas, this dream is unlikely to happen.

There are a number of future options that might work out well for the Aggies. But for now, we can only sit back and wait for the powers-that-be to work something out. And we can still show our support for our Aggie student athletes by attending the games and greeting one another on the street with a hearty, "Go Aggies!"

Is New Mexico losing its status as a presidential swing state?

State Auditor Hector Balderas is a Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by retiring Sen. Jeff Bingaman. Also in the race is U.S. Rep. Martin Hein-

rich. Balderas is trailing Heinrich in the polls and in fundraising.

Heinrich's lead probably isn't so large that Balderas has no chance of catching him. Balderas's problem is that a strong negative campaign probably is the only way of doing it.

So does Balderas unleash the negatives? It really isn't in his character. Balderas and Heinrich, another nice guy, have pledged to keep it clean, but political observers have been waiting for the dam to break.

It probably won't happen. Balderas is young and can have a bright future ahead of him. The same is true for Heinrich. Both have taken a big first step in politics. Balderas has won two statewide races for auditor and has well-established contacts in every county.

Heinrich has won two races in the first Congressional District. The second of those contests was in a year when Republicans swept to many new victories in Congress. Heinrich

also is young with a possible great future ahead of him. He also has national fundraising sources that Balderas doesn't have

So how do they handle it? If Balderas goes negative, Heinrich may have to also and the Republican senatorial candidate, presumably Heather Wilson, has a bagful of negative comments the two Democrats have left lying on the table for her.

If Balderas loses the Democratic primary anyway, he is tarnished. But if he stays positive, is a good loser and campaigns for Heinrich in the general election, he looks good to party leaders and has a leg up for a future race, likely a run for governor in 2014.

That is a very nice scenario for Democratic leaders. They would have two fresh, young faces that could be in office for a long time. Under our governmental seniority system, it helps a state to have members of Congress with time to build seniority. Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman did it for 36 and 30 years respectively.

One effort Balderas is making, as noted by Santa Fe New Mexican reporter Steve Terrell, is to emphasize that it has been a long time since New Mexico has had a Hispanic in the U.S. Senate. Sen. Joe Montoya, 36 years ago, was the last

At one time, New Mexicans thought our state needed a Spanish-American, as they were called in those days, and an Anglo in both the U.S. House and Senate. Sens. Dennis Chavez and Clinton Anderson were highly influential at getting and keeping national labs and military bases in New Mexico.

There are plenty of young Hispanic politicians, especially in our state Legislature ready to fulfill that role, but Balderas may be positioning himself well for future stardom if he plays his hand right.

New Mexico no longer is a swing state. We've said it before but it keeps popping up in the news. Barack Obama won New Mexico in 2008 by 15 points. His margin still is about the same.

He is beating presumed GOP candidate Mitt Romney 54-40 in the latest poll. If New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez is tossed in the equation as a vice-presidential running mate, the margin barely switches to 53-42.

Martinez wouldn't do Romney much good even in New Mexico.

The latest CNN poll didn't even include her. Was that because she said she definitely wouldn't consider it? If so, why are all those other candidates who have said they will refuse the nomination still in the poll?

In another listing, Martinez is listed 10th out of the 10 top contenders.

Former top George W. Bush official Condoleezza Rice now is showing up as the public favorite for vice president. But Rice is not a Romney favorite. She would steal the limelight from him.

Now, Romney has announced he is working on a Republican version of the DREAM Act. The act would allow children who came to this country illegally with their parents to become legal, but not citizens.

That still is heresy to the far right, but it is exciting other Republicans who know if they lose Hispanic voters to President Barack Obama by the 67-27 margin – with which he currently is leading in the most recent poll – they are not going to win the presidential election.

Some Hispanic organizations are saying that if it is Marco Rubio's plan or nothing, it may be difficult to turn it down. But Democrats are saying Rubio's plan will be a campaign gimmick and nothing more because it won't pass and certainly not before the November election. Democrats can stall and not let it reach a vote.

Romney doesn't seem to be as excited about Rubio as many other Republicans are. He is reported to not attach much importance to choosing a running mate from a battleground state or an important demographic. Rubio is from a battleground state and is Hispanic.

The apparent Romney attitude isn't going to help Martinez, who represents two important demographics. She is a female Hispanic. New Mexico still is considered a battleground state, but not as marginal as it used to be prior to the 2008 presidential election, which Obama won handily.

Las Cruces gives green light to red light tyranny

Recently, Albuquerque disbanded its red-light camera system. But the City of Las Cruces last week decided tyranny was in order. Those who do not pay red-light camera fines will find their water and natural gas turned off. The city claims they are forced to get rough with the citizens.

Now, my air conditioner requires water to work. They intend to turn off my air conditioning going into the summer heat season. How reasonable is that?

This action confirms that red light cameras are principally a money-maker. If the city wanted to stop a behavior, why would they also count on the money from the tickets? At some point there should be no offenders. But if you sign a contract with a firm that must be paid, you are counting on the tickets.

The city is abusing citizens one at a time because they know that if they try to abuse citizens in a group, there is too much

pushback. Individual citizens subjected to the full tyranny of the city must submit.

The City of Las Cruces has no business being involved in utilities if they can shut off the utilities for reasons outside of the delivery of service. The Public Regulation Commission needs to take all utilities away from them. The city has shown it is an unworthy steward of the public trust.

Likewise, the leadership of Las Cruces must go. They are not worthy of the trust the citizens put in them when they placed the leadership in authority. It is time for the State of New Mexico to take over the city management. Taking away the ability to cool a home in the heat of summer could lead to inadvertent citizen deaths. The citizens are being put at mortal risk by the leadership's shortsighted use of tyranny to satisfy their need for money. Hopefully, the state can restore the right of citizens to receive their life-preserving utilities.

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Guest Column Equine welfare What is humane treatment?

The issue of "humane" care and treatment of horses has become extremely volatile in New Mexico and across the nation in recent weeks.

Unfortunately, the problem isn't nearly so recent. The issue has been in the national spotlight long enough that the Government Accounting Office (GAO) has had time to do an in-depth study, identifying the problems and pointing out challenges for the U.S. Department of Agriculture as well as horse owners and lovers.

What are the options and the alternatives for unwanted and feral horses? Where does the funding come from?

The focus should be on the quality of life for horses and the assurance for a humane end of life. Reality is that regardless of their use and the emotions tied to them, horses, like all animals, have limited life spans.

New Mexico currently has only nine certified horse rescue operations. There may be others taking in unwanted horses, but only these nine are certified by the New Mexico Livestock Board, which is charged with the responsibility of humane oversight of horses and other livestock in the state.

These rescue operations are not government funded and operate largely on donations. Not only are these facilities not well distributed

around the state, but capacity is limited. The ideal capacity for the entire group of certified rescues is 257 head - those facilities are currently holding 266 horses.

Immediately, prior to a sale, Southwest Livestock Auction houses up to 300 horses. Prior to the current investigation, Southwest routinely held four sales per month.

The cost of maintaining a horse varies with the age, size and condition of the animal, but care and feeding just one emaciated horse, which is the condition most horses are in when rescued, can easily run from \$800 to \$1,000 per month, according to one rescue owner. Hay alone, which must be supplemented with grain, vitamins and minerals, as well as routine health care, presently runs at \$300 per month and up. Maintaining a healthy horse costs a minimum of \$150 per month.

Sadly, rescues are finding that when they do rehabilitate a horse, there are no permanent homes available for them. Additionally, horses that cannot be rehabilitated then must be disposed of by the rescue.

New Mexico, including tribal lands, is home to literally tens of thousands of feral or unwanted horses. Because of the drought and current economic conditions, the

problem is growing literally by the moment. Families that were once able to maintain horses for enjoyment are now having to choose between caring for their families or their animals.

A Coggins Test, which is required to transport a horse, costs \$35 per head. Farrier or horseshoing expenses can run from \$40 to \$120 per month per head for regularly maintained horses, plus mileage. Horses that have been neglected can be exponentially higher.

According to a 2005 survey by the New Mexico Horse Council, nearly 100,000 New Mexicans are involved in the equine industry. Within that group, 72 percent of New Mexico horse owners have an annual household income of \$75,000 or less. The report also states that 76 percent of these owners are 30 to 60 years of age with only 13 percent under the age of 30.

When horses can no longer be cared for, the options for disposition are limited and cost prohibitive. While landfills have the option of accepting animal carcasses, few choose to and they come with strict requirements, including an appointment to bring the carcass, a veterinary certificate indicating that the animal did not succumb to an infectious disease and payment of special charges for heavy equipment and operators. These costs can easily add up to \$300 per horse carcass. That is added to the cost of euthanasia, which if done by a licensed veterinarian, costs \$150 and up. Then the animal must be transported from its location to the landfill, which can cost from \$180 to \$220.

On-site burial requires heavy equipment and a permit from the Public Regulatory Commission, with unknown impacts to water quality

Selling unwanted or feral horses presents an entirely different set of problems. Accord-

ing to the GAO report, the price of horses has dropped dramatically since 2007 because there is little salvage value due to limited options for marketing. Many auction markets will not even accept horses and most of those who do will accept only those that are in healthy condition. The markets that do accept horses in lesser condition find that they soon are the recipients of numerous horses that are left, often in the dead of night which places a greater burden on limited livestock board resources.

Horses that go through auction markets that are not purchased as working or pleasure horses are destined for slaughter plants in Mexico. Those animals are loaded onto trailers averaging 30 head or more and trucked to the Mexico border. There they are unloaded and put on another truck to cross the international border. They are unloaded and put on yet another truck to travel up to 17 hours into the interior of Mexico for slaughter. Once the animals cross into Mexico, they are not subject to any U.S. oversight and many of these plants are not subject to inspections.

Mexico will not accept intact studs (males) or pregnant mares. Feral or unwanted studs must be castrated, which if done by a veterinarian, can cost \$300 per head. If not done by a veterinarian, there are sanitary and recovery time issues. Mares are often allowed to foal, with the offspring left behind when shipped.

Numerous unwanted horses are merely hauled to an open space - including private, federal, tribal or state lands. There they are either turned loose to fend for themselves or perhaps shot on-site. These horses create grave concern for livestock owners and managers due to the potential for disease transmission. Individual reports are that horses are routinely abandoned on tribal lands near Albuquerque leaving the tribes to deal with disposal.

Because of New Mexico's border with Mexico, the state is recipient of unwanted the number of horses in distress that New Mexico is home to.

There are numerous other facets to the current unwanted or feral horse problem that will require more in-depth consideration. Under the current drought, with little water and forage available, horses are doing an incredible amount of resource damage. Horse hooves have an entirely different impact on the ground than cloven hoofed animals, compacting the soil rather than breaking it. Horses are also in competition with other domestic livestock and wildlife for scare resources.

Since fiscal year 2006, Congress has annually prohibited the use of federal funds to inspect horses destined for food, effectively prohibiting domestic slaughter. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is responsible for overseeing the welfare of horses transported for slaughter.

In 2007, Congress directed GAO to examine horse welfare since cessation of domestic slaughter. GAO examined (1) the effect on the U.S. horse market, if any, since cessation; (2) any impact of these market changes on horse welfare and on states, local governments, tribes and animal welfare organizations; and (3) challenges, if any, to USDA's oversight of the transport and welfare of U.S. horses exported for slaughter. GAO analyzed horse price and shipping data, and interviewed officials from USDA, state and local governments, tribes, the livestock industry and animal welfare organizations, and reviewed documents they provided.

GAO found that since domestic horse slaughter ceased in 2007, the slaughter horse market has shifted to Canada and Mexico. From 2006 through 2010, U.S. horse exports for slaughter increased by 148 and 660 percent to Canada and Mexico, respectively. As a result, nearly the same number of U.S. horses were transported to Canada and Mexico for slaughter in 2010 – nearly 138,000 – as was slaughtered before domestic slaughter ceased

in the U.S.

Comprehensive, national data are lacking, but state, local government and animal welfare organizations report a rise in investigations for horse neglect and more abandoned horses since 2007.

The USDA faces three broad challenges in overseeing the welfare of horses during transport to slaughter. First, among other management challenges, the current transport regulation only applies to horses transported directly to slaughtering facilities.

A 2007 proposed rule would more broadly include horses moved first to stockyards, assembly points and feedlots before being transported to Canada and Mexico, but delays in issuing a final rule have prevented USDA from protecting horses during much of their transit to slaughtering facilities.

In addition, GAO found that many owner/ shipper certificates, which document compliance with the regulation, are being returned to USDA without key information, if they are returned at all.

Second, annual legislative prohibitions on USDA's use of federal funds for inspecting horses impede USDA's ability to improve compliance with, and enforcement of, the transport regulation.

Third, GAO analysis shows that U.S. horses intended for slaughter are now traveling significantly greater distances to reach their final destination, where they are not covered by U.S. humane slaughter protections. With cessation of domestic slaughter, USDA lacks staff and resources at the borders and foreign slaughtering facilities that it once had in domestic facilities to help identify problems with shipping paperwork or the condition of horses before they are slaughtered.







private partnership is that they can look at adjacent properties and think bigger. They can put forward a larger vision of mixeduse housing/commercial/parking development.

Garza said the city owns 18 Downtown properties.

Satellite launches needed sophisticated technology Echo I was first communications satellite

Editor's note: This is part two of a two-part story.

World War II's European front was over exactly one year to the day when, on May 8, 1946, the Navy began investigating the feasibility of satellites.

According to "Vanguard: A History," the Naval Research Laboratory studied "the possibility of launching an instrumented Earth satellite." Scientists at the time "conclude(d) reluctantly that engineering techniques were still too unsophisticated to make it practical," and 12 years would go by before the United States orbited its first artificial satellite, Explorer I.

The NRL's rocket was the High Altitude Test Vehicle (HATV). NASA described the HATV as having "eight peripheral rocket engines of 28,400 (pounds) thrust each, and a central engine of 73,000 (pounds) thrust. A secondary engine propulsion system ... of four solidpropellant rockets" would orient the craft into orbit for satellite release. While essentially a single-stage rocket, the engine clusters effectively created a multi-stage effect.

German rocket engineer Dr. Werner von Braun, after surrendering to the Allies in 1945, presented the first known "report," dated May 15, 1945, on "rocketry's future prospects," Michael J. Neufeld wrote in "Wernher von Braun."

"The von Braun paper was carried directly" to the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics, said "Between Sputnik and the Shuttle." Subsequently, Neufeld said, there were "repeated discussions of a satellite inside the American military." That fall the Navy, "spurred by the initial enthusiasm," approached the Army Air Force "to collaborate." In time, the AAF would decline.

On Oct. 2, "Between Sputnik and the

Shuttle," said, the bureau "organized a Committee for Evaluating the Feasibility of Space Rocketry," which "determined that advanced rocketry was required for a single-stage satellite rocket." Then, on May 2, 1946, Neufeld said RAND, a think tank, produced a "historic, and secret report" titled "Preliminary Design of an Experimental World-Circling Spaceship."

In December 1948, a Secretary of Defense paper referenced the Earth Satellite Vehicle Program "being carried out independently by each military service" and "assigned to the Committee on Guided Missiles for coordination," according to "Between Sputnik and the Shuttle." Resultant publicity had repercussions: "It made it known that an American satellite vehicle was being considered. To some consternation it indicated that a potential psychological weapon of launching the first Earth satellite ... had now been compromised."

... had now been compromised." Neufeld said "drastic" congressional "budget cuts of 1947-48 killed off the first wave of enthusiasm." Midway through the Korean War, in February 1952. President Harry Truman "request(ed) a survey of 'the present state of the satellite program," "Between Sputnik and the Shuttle" said. But not until after the war, "mostly due to reports of Soviet advances in rocketry and, most alarmingly, in nuclear weapons," did interest revive, Neufeld wrote.

Ironically, in February 1956, a reporter asked Truman, now a former president, "what he thought about the American Earth satellite program initiated by President Dwight Eisenhower," "Between Sputnik and the Shuttle" recorded. The year before, the White House had announced America would orbit a satellite during the International Geophysical Year (July 1957-December 1958). "Truman replied that his opinion was exactly what Admiral William D. Leahy once thought about the atomic bomb – 'a lot of hooey.'"

Technology, though, was no longer "unsophisticated," as was proven a year-and-a-half later, on Oct. 4, 1957, when the Soviets orbited Sputnik, and then Sputnik II on Nov. 3. The United States followed with Explorer I (Jan. 31,



1958), and Vanguard 1 (March 17).

On Aug. 12, 1960, NASA launched Echo I, the world's first passive communications satellite. Sky and Telescope (October 1960) reported the aluminum-coated balloon, 10stories tall, had a "reflection of 98 per cent for radio frequencies." Eisenhower pre-taped the first message bounced off the balloon soon after launch; the next day, the first two-way voice communications was relayed. Six days later, on Aug. 19, the first reported picture transmission took place.

"The world's first commercial satellite, Telstar I, made the first trans-Atlantic television transmission via satellite" after launching on July 10, 1962, according to information in the New Mexico Museum of Space History.

On Feb. 14, 1963, a rocket boosted the 86pound Syncom I into geosynchronous orbit. The satellite could handle what was, at the time, the amazing simultaneous traffic of one two-way telephone communication and 16 one-way teletype messages.

Just 11 years later, von Braun, in the September 1974 Popular Science, discussed a new "multimillion-dollar U.S. system for guiding military vessels and planes": the Naval Research Laboratory's 650-pound Timation (time navigation) IIIa, and NTS-2 (Navigation Technology Satellite).

"It is the latest in a series of experi-

ments, now directed by the Air Force for all the military services, leading up to an amazing global navigation system," von Braun wrote. "Over the next 10 years, military planners hope to establish a network of 24 satellites called the Global Positioning System.... Simultaneous ranging of at least two satellites would permit a small computer in every user's set to nail down his position instantly, anywhere on the ocean. ... With the help of three satellites he could determine his position in three dimensions, necessary for airborne users."

Von Braun pointed out that "as early as 1964 the U.S. Navy began using a system called Transit" to enable "nuclear submarines to determine their position anywhere in the seven seas with an accuracy of one tenth of a nautical mile." He declared "the four-satellite system should, if Congress votes the funds for it, be in operation by 1977. The satellites would be in 12,000-mile-high orbit. By late in this decade, a system of nine satellites would be established. Mathematical analysis shows that a user anywhere on Earth would have the three satellites needed for a fix in view 83 percent of the time. The full system, which could be in operation by 1984, would contain 24 satellites."



With Mitt Romney destined to secure the GOP nomination to run against President Barack Obama, there will likely be greater voter interest in the November general elec-

Jennifer Garcia Kozlowski, Doña Ana County Bureau of Elections supervisor, said she hopes those intending to vote in the primary election will take advantage of the opportunity to vote early. Visiting the Doña Ana County Government Center, 845 N. Motel Blvd., will help keep lines shorter, she said.

We hope voters will realize how easy it is for them come down here so they don't have to wait in line on election day," she said.

Tuesday, May 8, also is the last day to register to vote in the primary races. Early and in-person absentee voting will continue until Saturday, June 2. There will be a two-day break in voting before the actual election day Tuesday, June 5.

With the presidential race set, most candidates in contested primary races are concerned the turnout will be lethargic. But for Las Crucen Greg Sowards, who's running against for-mer U.S. Rep. Heather Wilson for the open U.S. Senate seat, he's banking on gaining momentum by election day.

While Wilson has great name recognition, her approval rating isn't high enough to win, Sowards

said. On the Democratic side, U.S. Rep. Martin Heinrich is running against State Auditor Hector Balderas and Heinrich is seen as the likely winner. Sowards said Republicans are beginning to become concerned that Wilson won't be able to defeat Heinrich.

Wilson, on the other hand, said the lack of interest in the primary contests has given strength to the more liberal forces in the Democratic Party, which is part of the reason Heinrich has the edge over Balderas, whose positions are more moderate. But, she admitted, the more conservative voices in the Republican Party are also more in force during this primary.

The past two years, Sylvas has been active in student government as a senator from the College of Business, where she is graduating with a degree in finance. Of course, she's not leaving NMSU. As she begins her term as student president, Sylvas will be starting her work for a master's degree in public administration.

Sylvas said she ran for president because she wants to support students and help the university.

"The people here at NMSU are amazing," she said. "We're community here. We're always supporting each other and challenging each other to do better."

It was this strong community of supporters who helped Sylvas win the election. Sylvas said she believes students who voted for her were supporting the strong student advocacy she has brought to different issues as student senator.

"I ran on offering real solutions," she said. "One of my main issues was parking, but I didn't promise we were going to build a new parking garage." Instead, Sylvas said there needs

Instead, Sylvas said there needs to be more frequent and targeted shuttles from the exterior parking to the inner campus. Similarly, she didn't promise to fight any tuition increase, but did vow to work to keep tuition costs affordable and will work to help students find more jobs as she has been a working student herself.

Sylvas said she believes her ethnicity and gender weren't factors that helped her win election, nor were they the driving force behind the protracted election disputes and appeals.

disputes and appeals. But Sylvas did acknowledge that it put her in a special place in NMSU history that started with Clara Belle Williams, the first African-American woman to attend NMSU – what was then the New Mexico College of Agriculture & Mechanic Arts – in 1928. Even though Williams reportedly had to first take classes sitting out in the hallway, she graduated with an English degree in 1937.

"If my election means something, it's that you can see how far we have come," Slyvas said. Las Cruces Bulletin

"I've lived here my entire life," Martin said. "It's more about what I can give back to New Mexico."

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
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



Got your hard hat?



The long rumored implosion of the Western Athletic Conference seems to be underway.

Numerous media reports indicate Utah State and San Jose State will accept invitations to join the Mountain West Conference, while Louisiana Tech and the University of Texas at San Antonio will join Conference USA. Texas State is headed to the Sun Belt Conference.

The WAC released a statement saying it would "evaluate the impact" of the "changing conference landscape."

That landscape looks like something out of a Roadrunner and Wile E. Coyote cartoon. Those buzzards circling over-head would be the MWC and C-USA.

Apparently, however, there is not enough meat on New Mexico State University's bones to attract even those vultures.

Of course, the WAC Board of Directors is unfazed by the situation, saying in a statement "(they have) confidence that the WAC will maintain its more than 50-year history as a preeminent Division I conference?

Good luck with that. NMSU Athletic Director McKinley Boston also had soothing words about the situation.

'It is so easy to look at this as the sky is falling, but in reality a lot of conversations are happening about conference af-filiation," he said. "We remain extremely optimistic and committed to the future of New Mexico State athletics."

I feel better already, don't you? Pieces of falling sky might be dangerous.

NMSU's problem has nothing to do with the quality of the athletic teams the university puts on the field. The real problem for NMSU is the lack of revenue the university can provide a conference though its TV market for football. The Aggies are in the El Paso television market, which isn't very big to begin with, and is dominated by UTEP out of Conference USA. With the WAC likely to lose its status as a Football Bowl Series conference, it

seems inevitable the Aggies will have to look for a home somewhere else. That home might be back in the Sun Belt. With former WAC Commissioner

Karl Benson running the show in the Sun Belt, an Aggie application for admis-sion may be looked at favorably. Still, there are reasons the Aggies left

the Sun Belt in the first place, such as lack of natural rivalries and travel costs.

Another option might be the Big Sky Conference, but that would require the Aggies to drop their football status to the Football Championship Series level, something that would not be popular among Aggie boosters and fans.

Independent status seems unlikely. NMSU is running out of options. Let's hope university administrators have something up their sleeves. Otherwise, look out for pieces of falling sky.

Defense shines in spring game

Aggies will welcome more players during fall semester

The New Mexico State University football team played their annual spring game Saturday, April 28, in front of about 1,000 fans scattered throughout Aggie Memorial Stadium.

The defense dominated the offense the entire game as they kept the offense from scoring a touchdown.

"The defense had a great day," junior running back Akeelie Mustafa said after the game.

The only touchdown of the day came from the defensive side of the ball, when junior linebacker Trashaun Nixon picked up a fumble and ran it back for a score.

"I feel we did good," Nixon said. "We just came out and executed. I feel we took it the extra notch.

Nixon, a junior college transfer from Venture College, also had an interception and several tackles.

Another standout on the defensive side of the ball Saturday was senior defensive lineman Donte Savage, who constantly burst through the offensive line

and gained three sacks on the day. Things seemed to have changed from last week, as the offense seemed to have the upper hand during last Saturday's practice.

"I thought after last week's scrimmage where the offense dominated, the defense took it a little personal today," coach

DeWayne Walker said. "Hopefully they can do it when it counts.

With the defensive domination on Saturday, there were still some bright spots on the offensive side of the ball. Senior wide receivers Kevan Walker and Kemonte Bateman both had big catches for the Aggie offense and Mustafa looked solid at times. Sophomore running back Brandon Betancourt also got a few carries and had one of the day's longest rushes. "We're not where we should

be," Mustafa said after the game about the offense's performance. "We killed ourselves."

Mustafa said the team still has work to do making sure there are no fumbles or dropped passes, as those were a big part of Saturday's spring game.

Mustafa played at Santa Ana College in 2010, but did not play during the 2011 season. He said he did have a scholarship to Arizona State University to play football, but it was pulled after a coaching staff change.

"I'm new to D-1 football," Mustafa said. "I've still got a lot of learning to do."

Walker said five new lineman will be joining the team before next season as well as two more running backs, and they could definitely help boost the offense before this coming season starts.

"I think that's going to stir up some competition," Walker said about the new offensive players See Aggies on page A23

Reaching new heights Keppler a favorite at state tournament

There aren't many people who can do what Andrew Keppler does.

The Oñate High School senior is a lanky teenager who goes about his business in a quiet, unassuming manner. But a closer look reveals a competitor, a technician and an athlete with an elite skill.

Keppler is ranked No. 1 in the state in the pole vault - a track and field event like no other. He cleared 14 feet, 1 inch at last week's Mirimanian Invitational at the Field of Dreams, beating his previous best mark and giving him the best vault in the state this spring.

'It's a very skilled event," Oñate track coach David Nuñez said. "It takes a combination of several things. You have to have decent approach speed and be very technical. The top part of the vault is very important. You need the strength and skill to pull through the vault. You have to be somebody that doesn't fear the vault, but respects it."

"You have to be comfortable being upside down," Keppler said.

Keppler was one of the state's top vaulters last year as a junior before breaking his ankle during a mishap in practice early in the season. He used a heavier, stiffer pole that he wasn't used to, and stalled at the top of his vault.

After surgery to put pins in his ankle, Kep-pler began rehabilitation work and was back in action last fall as a member of the OHS cross country team. This spring, he picked up his pole and went back to work. He admits that there was some apprehension at first, but it quickly melted away.

"It's not like any other event," the 6-foot-2, 148-pound Keppler said. "You don't have to be fast. It's more about technique and strength."

Speed might not be a necessary talent in the pole vault, but Keppler has it. He also competes in the 110 high hurdles for the Knights, as well as the triple jump and long jump. He currently is ranked fourth in the state in the hurdles.

But the pole vault and his outstanding aca-See Keppler on page A24

Decisions, decisions Choices you make may be your undoing

Over the weekend, a very interesting thing happened during the PGA tournament, the Zurich Classic in New Orleans.

The tournament leader heading into the final round, Jason Dufner, was tied with Ernie Els for the lead with eight holes to play. Dufner hit a ball into the lateral water hazard on hole 16 in the final round.

Maybe some of you saw it. The ball was perched in the muddy bank, partly in shallow water, but still hittable. However, a rather formidable alligator was also lurking in the water near the bank, less than 10 feet away.

CBS analyst Gary McCord, talking to the viewer audience, urged Dufner to go for broke and step in the water and hit the ball out of the muck, despite the alligator.

Dufner, not having won in 164 previous PGA tournament appearances, chose to take a penalty drop out of the hazard, played his third shot, and sank a 40-foot putt to save par. That's golf.

Ernie Els played brilliantly, shooting 67 on that final day to tie Dufner after 72 holes. They went to a playoff, and Dufner ended up winning with a birdie on the second playoff hole, making him, his coach and his fiancé exceedingly happy, since Dufner is going to be married next week to the lovely Amanda Bovd.

You may remember Dufner was the player who challenged Keegan Bradley for the PGA Championship last year, but lost. Now he has redemption.

The point of mentioning Dufner is that his decision making - correct and prudent at the time on the 69th hole of the tournament proved to be the winning choice. Competitive golf, or any golf for that matter, has a lot to do with decision making - more so in the heat of battle.

Fundamentally speaking, golf is not any different than gut-wrenching decisions in combat, in flying an airplane with passengers aboard, or with crucial business judgments with billions of dollars in retiree savings at stake. Decisions have to be made and have to be made correctly.

Over the years, John Daly made many wrong decisions about how he played golf in front of loyal fans; Tiger Woods made bad decisions in his private life; in my opinion Natalie Gulbis made a bad decision posing nearly nude for Sports Illustrated.

I could go on, but I would rather focus on the process of how we go about making decisions.

How we go about making decisions on the golf course probably is not a whole lot different from how we make decisions in our daily lives. We hold on to certain values and certain lifestyles, which drive how we think, and which drive how we decide what to do, given certain options.

Someone whose lifestyle is closely connected to alcohol and bars is more likely to drive when drinking than someone who spends more time at home reading than at the bar, for example. An individual who likes the rush of taking big risks is probably more likely to invest money in day-trading gambles as opposed to a person who wants to secure his money and forgo the risk-laden prospect of the big bucks with big returns.

Personalities have a lot to do with dayin and day-out decisions. Even down to the smallest detail.

On the golf course, the game is played in such a way that - know it or not - we are forced to make decisions at every point in our round. We decide what club to hit, what point to aim at, what line to hit our putts, even what attitude to maintain throughout the day. We think it happens by default; but truthfully it happens by conscious and less-than-conscious choices.

Sometimes we become aware of competing choices – 9 iron or 8 iron – and sometimes we go on auto-pilot and don't realize that we have several options. In the case of Dufner he realized he had a choice whether to hit the miracle shot from the hazard, with the alligator at his heels (and make highlights for the rest of the year, or his life), or to wisely take his medicine, drop out of the menace, and count on his accuracy and short game.

I often think back to the movie "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom," where Jones and his adversary finally find themselves inside the temple and come face-to-face with the millenium-aged Sir Arthur and a table filled with different chalices, all of which might be the Holy Grail and might hold the magic elixir of everlasting life.

Jones' treacherous enemy picked the most ostentatious and bejeweled challis, drank from it, and was instantly vaporized. Whereupon Sir Arthur, unmoved, uttered, "He chose poorly."

When I make the wrong choice in putting or in iron selection, I myself am known to utter, "I chose poorly." In Dufner's case, he chose wisely.

I see a lot of golfers make decisions by not thinking much at all. I also see some anal golfers spend way too long pondering, obsessing, stewing and ultimately failing to make an intelligent decision at all.

I vividly remember a corporate mentor years ago once saying to me, "You know, I'd rather be approximately right than precisely wrong."

I'll never forget that. You have to have a game plan and a basic philosophy about the game you are playing.

In my case, if I make a mistake, I would rather be a little long than a little short. A little long will still be on the green; but a little short usually means off the green and a little spot of trouble. I would rather aim for the fat of the green and be safe than go flag-hunting and wind up in the water.

My decisions are based on probabilities. If you find yourself in a precarious position without much of a shot, you need to quickly size up the situation and realize that it's most probable that you won't pull off the one-in-100 shot, but

that you will probably have a chance to save par if you lay up to a good spot.

Golf tournaments are won and lost by decision making. Zach Johnson decided to lay up on all the par fives in the 2007 Masters; he birdied 11 out of 16 of them for the week and won by two shots. He simply decided to not make any long mistakes and let his putter do the work.

Jean van de Velde teed it up on the 72nd hole of the 1999 British Open leading by three shots, but he proceeded to make a succession of bad decisions, compounded by a series of bad shots. It was a difficult-to-watch meltdown. He had the tournament in the palm of his hand, and ultimately lost in a playoff.

One of the cardinal rules they play by in the U.S. Open has to do with awkward lies of the golf ball and troublesome situations.

Intelligent competitors know very well that when bad fortune or bad play strikes they need to take their medicine and limit the damage as best they can. Sometimes it is a choice of taking a penalty drop, playing well away from a hazard, or trying to save bogey, which as U.S. Open veterans know is sometimes an acceptable score.

It seems to me staying calm and maintaining one's composure are two requirements of solid decision making on the golf course. Golfers who are confident and unflappable tend to make the best decisions under adverse circumstances.

Knowing the rules, so that you don't penalize or handicap yourself by dropping or taking relief unwisely, would be another standard for good choices.

I always coach junior golfers I work with to become more and more aware of their own tendencies as well as their internal emotions and energy level when they are in tournament competition. Lapses of awareness, consciousness and focus can quickly lead to ill-advised decisions.

You shouldn't think while making the golf swing, but you sure better think and focus without getting distracted when considering to the myriad of conditions and variables that need attending to.

That's my final decision.

2012 could be special

Aggie football looks ready to take the next step



Bigger. Deeper. Faster. Stronger. Those words have been often used to describe what people see coming into the 2012 New Mexico State football season. The recruiting efforts of head coach DeWayne Walker and his staff have provided upgrades at nearly every position.

What is missing from those descriptors is the type of team this is. Not that it won't happen, but we don't see the names of these players in the police blotters, or headlining NCAA scandals.

That comes from the top and it trickles down to every coach and player. In other words, the NM State football team is one that represents the university and the community with class, decency and humility.

When was the last time fans looked at the football program and were embarrassed by something that happened that negatively impacted the university or the community? It has not happened during Walker's tenure here at New Mexico State.

You have a football team that is getting it done in the classroom, providing community service and a source of pride for the community. Also, in case you did not notice, the team was highly competitive last year, winning four games and being within one score in the fourth quarter of an additional four games.

A few of the athletic highlights from last season included defeating the University of New Mexico for the third straight season, accomplishing that feat for the first time since the 1966, '67 and '68 seasons. The Aggies defeated the University of Minnesota, earning the program's first win over a team from the Big Ten Conference, and beat Fresno State for the first time in program history. The Aggies earned five WAC Player of the Week Awards in the fall.

Taveon Rogers was named to five different All-America teams, becoming the 12th football player in school history to garner an All-America honor. He signed a free agent contract with the Cincinnati Bengals. He led the team and the WAC in all-purpose yards and kick return average. Rogers ranked second in the nation in all-purpose yards, breaking the school record for all-purpose yards in a season, and became the school's all-time leader in kick returns and kick return yardage.

Donyae Coleman led the team and the WAC in interceptions per game and fumble recoveries. He is continuing to play football after signing a free agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals.

The 2011 academic highlights included 10 NM State players earning Academic All-WAC honors. Defensive end David Niumatalolo was named a first team Capital One Academic All-American, becoming the 11th football player in school history to garner the honor and the first since 1999.

When you combine the competitiveness of the team, the source of pride they are for the community and being able to get reserved seat season tickets for just \$45, it just might be the best deal in sports.

This year, we will be promoting NM State football with the tagline, "It is Time." And it is time. It is time for the Aggies to break the bowl drought. It is time to rock Aggie Memorial Stadium. It is time to get your friends and family together for tailgating. It is time to paint the town Crimson and White. It is time to win.

Go Aggies! It is time.

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Mak to play in NCAA regional

The NCAA Division I Women's Golf Committee has announced the teams and individuals selected to participate in the 2012 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Regionals and New Mexico State sophomore Demi Mak was selected to play at in the West Regional at the Colorado National Golf Club in Erie, Colo., May 10-12.

Mak, a first team All-WAC selection and runner up at the 2012 WAC Championship, is one of 378 participants to have been selected for regional competition. Of these players, 126 will advanced to the championship finals with eight teams and two individuals advancing from each regional.

Mak is averaging 75.13 strokes per round in 30 rounds of golf this season with her season low coming at the third round of the WAC Championship. The Hong Kong native has tallied five rounds at par

The Hong Kong native has tallied five rounds at par or better and came up with eight top 25 finishes this year, which included three top 10 finishes.

Two Aggies sign NFL contracts

Former New Mexico State safety Donyae Coleman and wide receiver and kick returner Taveon Rogers each signed a free agent contact Saturday, April 28, to continue their football careers. Coleman signed with the Arizona Cardinals, while Rogers signed with the Cincinnati Bengals.

Coleman led the Aggies in tackles with 133 in 2011, while leading the team and the league in interceptions with six. Coleman also led the league in fumble recoveries with three, while tallying seven pass break-ups and three forced fumbles. During the season, Coleman had seven double-digit tackle games, including two games with 23 tackles or more. Coleman ended his career with 232 tackles, 17 pass break-ups, six interceptions, three forced fumble and four fumble recoveries.

Rogers was the team's leading kick returner with 1,318 yards and three touchdowns. He leaves NMSU as the alltime leader in kick returns for a career (103), kick return yardage (2,728) and most kick returns for a touchdown (3). He also led the nation in all-purpose yards per game with 196.3, which leads the league. Rogers also led the Aggies in receiving in 2011 with 59 catches for 1,048 yards and nine touchdowns, averaging 17.8 yards a catch and 87.3 yards a game. Against Fresno State, Rogers recorded a school record 412 all-purpose yards. For his career, Rogers caught 77 passes for 1,326 yards and 11 touchdowns at wide receiver.





Las Cruces Bulletin Army building big solar array for missile range Field of panels on 42 acres set to generate more than 4 megawatts

White Sands Missile Range leaders broke ground to commemorate the start of a renewable-energy project at the site of the new Solar Photo Voltaic Array Project, the Army's largest solar array Thursday, April 19.

A 42-acre tract of land located about quarter mile northeast of the Las Cruces Gate next to main post will be the site where 4.115 megawatts (MW) of single-axis vertical azimuth-tracking groundmounted solar photovoltaic panels will be installed.

Garrison Commander Col. Leo Pullar thanked T.A. Ladd and the employees at DPW for the great work that they have done to make this happen.

This will be the largest PV array in the Army.

"It's a great day – exciting for us in the Army," Pullar said. "It is obvious when you live here that this is the right place for (a solar array), here in New Mexico and here at WSMR. Folks coming down the hill will get to see the work that goes on here ev-ery day and understand and see the Army's commitment to going green and to be net zero and doing what we can for the environment."

Will Irby, program man-ager with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, said the Army has put a lot of emphasis on renewable energy and reducing demand on conventional energy resources.

"We are very excited about this project," Irby said. "On behalf of the Corps of Engineers

City sets yard sale limits Ordinances restrict signs and frequency

Whether they're called yard, garage, rummage, tag sales, or by any other name, the City of Las Cruces has rules for such sales.

They are allowed to be held for no more than four days and no more than three times per calendar year at any one location.

If the sale is held at a business or other property not used mainly for residential or institutional purposes, a temporary-use permit must be obtained from the city.

The city has an ordinance that attempts to curb litter and potential traffic risks from improperly placed signs. Yard and garage sale signs are permitted only on private properties and only with the owner's permission.

It is against city ordinance to place signs on roadways, sidewalks, medians, shoulders, light poles, stop signs or on any other public property. Violations of the city's sign ordinances can result in a citation with a fine of \$500 or incarceration up to 90 days.

The Codes Enforcement office, part of the Las Cruces Police Department, also reminds residents to remove signs immediately once the sale is over.

In addition to being unsightly and a form of litter, signs that blow into roadways could become a traffic hazard for motorists. Those who leave signs posted for longer durations can be cited for littering.

I'd like to thank everybody for coming. You've put together a great team under the leadership of Brig. Gen. John Ferrari, Col. Leo Pullar, T.A. Ladd, Irene Beck and Craig Collins from DPW.

"You've got a great project here. Our partners in this, Siemens, have put together about two years worth of work to get to this point. So we are very happy to be here and break ground on this project. This will be the largest PV array in the Army. We are very excited about that."

In conjunction with the 4.115 MW project, WSMR also will install a 350-kilowatt solar PV carport at the parking lot for the Headquarters Building 100.

The estimated energy generated in year one is 9,757,130 kilowatt-hours for the 4.115 MW solar array and 602,561 kWh for the 350 kW solar carport for a grand total of 10,359,691 kWh, which is approximately 10 percent of WSMR's total annual energy consumption.

All energy generated from the project will be consumed by WSMR with none being sold to the local utility company.

Clearing of the solar farm site has begun and

solar panel construction began in April, with an estimated completion date of December 2012. The ground-mounted solar array will have a projected annual savings of \$875,989, while the solar carport is projected to save \$54,098 annually. The total cost of both projects is \$16.8 million with a cost of \$3.77 per watt.

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The solar project is being funded within an Energy Savings Performance Contract (ESPC) utilizing an Energy Services Agreement (ESA) that the Huntsville Army Corps of Engineers (COE) has awarded to Siemens on behalf of WSMR.

Under the awarded task order, Siemens will maintain and operate the equipment and will provide the energy to WSMR. This agreement is for a period of 25 years. The simple payback is 18.1 years. The energy provided will cost the same as WSMR is currently paying the local utility company which is a blended rate of \$0.08/kWh.

The Army will own the Renewable Energy Credits (RECs). They will not be sold to help finance the project, but are to be used toward meeting Federal Renewable Energy Mandates.

Honors College scholar takes research expertise to Andes Mountains

High in the Andes Mountains of Peru is a burial site containing the remains of indigenous people dating as far back as the 13th century, and New Mexico State University anthropology major Ashley Remy will soon have the opportunity to discover the secrets these graves hold.

Remy is this year's winner of the Honors College Scholarship for International Research and her \$5,000 award will allow her to study the teeth found on the remains of bodies buried in Marcajirca, north of Lima, Peru.

The funerary site has burial locations in caves, as well as in small buildings called "chullpas." As part of an ongoing bioarchaeological project at the site, Remy will examine the teeth on the remains to create a comprehensive comparison and to investigate possible changes of diet that affected overall nutrition 400 to 700 years ago.

"There has been a lack of dental examination done on these remains and I would like to contribute my knowledge of teeth to ensure that this important part of the skeleton is not understudied," Remy, a native of Albuquerque, said. "A lot can be told with teeth, such as age, sex, health, diet and tribe/class identification."

As part of her research, Remy plans on creating dental impressions using vinyl siloxane. The quick-drying material can be peeled off teeth and used to examine microwear.

"Microwear can tell a lot about mastication processes, as well as the diet and health of the individuals, especially when simply considering the overall wear of teeth," the 21-year-old Remy said.

Her goal is to take peels from 25 sets of dental remains, both males and female. She also hopes to get some dental peels of people who live in the area to see wear patterns, "especially in the mastication of cocoa leaves, which were also used in the past in the same region."

When she returns from Peru in the fall, Remy will take the dental peels she has collected and work with NMSU's Brenda Benefit, a professor of anthropology, and Peter Cooke, director of the Core University Research Resources Laboratory, to examine the peels in the university's scanning electron microscope lab.

After the examinations are concluded, Remy plans on using the data collected as part of a senior thesis. She also will contribute her findings to the director of the Marcajirca excavation, Bebel Ibarra Asencios.

Remy, who will be graduating next spring, said she hopes her research in Peru will help her get into the graduate school of her choice, as well as provide career direction.

"With this scholarship, I will gain the chance to be in the field of a bioarchaeological site and actually pursue my own research, which I find meaningful and useful in order to begin a broader understanding of what my career involves," she said.

Remy was one of several Crimson Scholars who were considered for the Honors College Scholarship this year, said Mark Andersen, associate dean and director of the Honors College's Office of National Scholarships and International Education. "It was a difficult decision, but in the end,

"It was a difficult decision, but in the end, the selection committee was bowled over by Ashley's enthusiasm for archaeology and for her proposed research in Peru," Andersen said.

This year, the application for the Honors College scholarship was conducted entirely online in order to mimic the application process for other major competitive scholarships such as Fulbright, Goldwater and Rhodes, Andersen said.

"Because of this, even applicants who do not win the Honors College scholarship are better prepared to successfully apply for these other competitive awards," Andersen said.

As she looks forward to her Peru trip, Remy is grateful for the guidance she received from the Honors College.

"It was a great learning experience to have done the application process for this scholarship," Remy said, "and every one of those finalists deserves applause for doing all of that work."

Big business on the border



No matter what business opportunity you have in mind, there's a way to make it happen in Doña Ana County.

At the Business in the Borderplex luncheon Tuesday, May 1, three speakers gave updates on development and plans at Arrowhead Business and Research Park, the West Mesa Industrial Park and the Santa Teresa Industrial Parks.

Kevin Boberg, CEO of the Arrowhead Center, Christine Logan, economic development administrator for the City of Las Cruces, and Jerry Pacheco, vice president of the Border Industrial Association, illustrated intriguing pictures of possibility.

If you have a small, start-up business, particularly one that's technology related, you could get the ball rolling in one of Arrowhead's incubator offices, with critical built-in support.

If you have a manufacturing company, there is plenty of room at the West Mesa Industrial Park in Las Cruces. Infrastructure and utilities are already in place. The city also is working on a pre-permitting process to decrease the lag time between a property sale and breaking ground on construction.

If you have a manufacturing or warehousing business, you can take advantage of the exploding Mexican maquiladora (manufacturing facility) industry by locating near the Santa Teresa Port of Entry in the southern part of the county.

Foxconn – which, with 1 million employees, may be the biggest company most people have never heard of – has a maquila a mile south of Santa Teresa in Mexico. At that facility, they are cranking out up to 55,000 Dell computers a day.

Since Foxconn moved, Pacheco said, the dollar value of the total goods going through the port has gone from \$1 billion a year to \$1.2 billion a month.

This creates a demand for enterprising businesses to locate near Santa Teresa, selling materials to Foxconn.

Pacheco described a 500-mile long "bucket" south of Santa Teresa along the Pan-American Highway that is straddled by maquiladoras. All are potential customers to businesses that could provide materials, and every inch closer to the maquiladoras shaves shipping costs. That's a huge benefit of having your company in Santa Teresa versus Saint Louis. Or even Santa Fe, for that matter.

"In cargo," Pacheco said, "pennies count."

NMSU program educates students on cooking skills

Whether it is the morning news, a travel program, a reality series, a competition or a classic cooking show, all feature chefs. No longer solely featured on

No longer solely featured on the Food Network or the Cooking Channel, Rachael Ray, Guy Fieri and Mario Batali are celebrity hosts of major network programs. Some university students have been influenced by these "foodies" and have a chance at a career as restaurant owners, chefs with major hotels or as the next Iron Chef.

New Mexico State University chef educators Maurice Zeck and John Hartley identified several students who have aspirations to continue their careers in the food business. They know how tough restaurant management is, because both worked and succeeded at high-profile establishments.

Zeck is an award-winning chef who headed restaurants in

Honolulu, Miami, New England, Scottsdale, Ariz., Taos and then at La Fonda in Santa Fe.

Hartley started out as a dishwasher at Shogun, a restaurant in Las Cruces, and then worked his way through culinary school to become the head chef at Regina's in San Francisco's Regis Hotel.

Both chefs cautioned those seeking a cooking career that it is not easy.

"Chefs typically work 12-hour days, manage hundreds of employees and need to work for at least 10 years before they can truly master their craft," Zeck said.

Despite such warnings, several students seem eager to start their cooking careers; many were influenced by chefs from television shows.

A senior from Silver City, Patrick Abalos seeks to become a pastry chef in part because "I enjoy the science of pastry cooking." He and fellow student Joe

Culinary arts are coming to DACC

Want to brush up on your culinary skills, learn to cook, help out in a restaurant or be a better chef in your own kitchen?

Like all human creations, free markets have flaws

Markets are a powerful mechanism for allocating resources to their best uses.

By harnessing the knowledge of market participants, the market capitalizes on information known by local consumers and producers about local conditions in a way that could never be understood by a central planner. Those societies that rely more on markets are generally wealthier than those that don't.

It is the very success of markets that has allowed some to forget a basic fact, which is markets can't function efficiently without substantial government intervention. People who lose sight of this often develop a sort of free-market fundamentalism, an almost religious fervor for the free market.

These free-market fundamentalists, caught up in the elegance of market capitalism, forget markets are a tool for creating human happiness, and not a goal in themselves. Often impervious to the facts about market failure, they believe wealth is created when government is forced to the side and free enterprise is let loose.

There is much truth to the free-market fundamentalist views, but the absolutism of the free marketers is not justified. Lack of competition, pollution and information imperfections, among other factors, all contribute to market failure.

Nevertheless, government action of any sort is anathema to free-market fundamentalists. They oppose even common-sense government intervention to correct obvious problems. You name it; if the government is involved, they're against it.

Environmental regulation particularly incites irrationality among free-market fundamentalists. Environmental scientists find that some market based activities harm the environment. Burning coal produces acid rain, using hair spray causes damage to the ozone and using fossil fuels causes global warming, for example. The rational among us would look at these market failures and try to develop solutions to correct them.

But free-market fundamentalists instead irrationally deny the science and attack the scientists. Since it is the scientists who are telling us unregulated markets can damage the environment, then the environmental scientists are, like communists during the cold war, a threat to the capitalist.

Environmentalists are watermelons green on the outside, red on the inside - just waiting to overthrow the United States government and enslave us all.

If I make free-market fundamentalists sound wacky, I've achieved my goal, as I think

often they are crazy. Those of us, like myself, who are strong advocates of market-based capitalism, need to recognize when markets fail and work to implement policies to correct those failures.

The market system is a human creation and, like all human creations, is imperfect. Free-market fundamentalists' opposition to all regulation undermines the system and does at least as much harm as do statist government regulators.

Gary Sandler's Real Estate Connection

While working on this week's column, I was reminded that I'm consistently sifting through far more research material than my allotted space allows me to use.

As a result, I'm always left with a pile of stories that are interesting, but not strong enough to carry the day on their own. In an effort to free up some space in my home office, I'd like to share a couple of them with you.

Here's one I found interesting. Did you know New Mexico law requires authorities to file an affidavit with the appropriate county recorder, documenting specifics about any real property on which methamphetamines have been manufactured?

The idea behind the regulation is to protect children and adults from the contamination meth labs leave behind when their occupants move to the Graybar Hotel. Properties affected by such chemical contamination fall into the "stigmatized property" category.

Did you know, according to New Mexico law (N.M. Stat. Ann. § 47-13-2), your Realtor and/or the seller of the home you're considering purchasing or leasing "shall not be liable for failure to disclose and shall not have a duty to disclose to any person" that the property was the site of a natural death, homicide, suicide, assault, sexual assault, that the home was occupied by a person with AIDS or who is HIV positive, or any other crime punishable as a felony? It's true.

Federal law is even stricter. Rather than saying Realtors and sellers have no duty to notify a prospective buyer or tenant that the current or former occupant of a property had AIDS or was HIV positive, they make it flat-out illegal to disclose such information.

Agents have to be especially careful about disclosures. How would you like it if your agent disclosed a fact about your property that didn't have to be disclosed, and the buyer, upon learning of the fact, decided to not purchase your home? Might the agent be liable to you for causing the buyer to head for the hills? Stranger things have happened.

Another interesting story has to do with the process of eminent domain.

Eminent domain is a tool that allows a city, state, county or federal government to seize your property after justly compensating you for its taking and use it for the benefit of the public. Most of us are familiar with the usual "public uses," such as parks, roads, schools and the like.

The U.S. Supreme Court has a dif-

A few years ago, the court ruled that the definition of "public use" also included the taking of property from one private citizen and giving it to another private citizen who'll develop it "for the public good" through the creation of new jobs and a higher tax base - to heck with building schools, parks or roads.

The Supreme Court also said each state could decide whether it would, in fact, limit economic development to the "traditional public use."

To make a long story short, the New Mexico legislature addressed this issue, mandating eminent domain only be used to take private property for "traditional public uses," such as schools, roads, water companies (like Moongate Water) and not for the benefit of private entities.

Finally, I've been advised that prospective homebuyers should be keenly aware when purchasing a two-story house. Especially if it's the kind where the agent tells you one story before you buy it and another story after you buy it.

That sounds like good advice to me. See you at closing.

Local water remains scarce

Higher summer temperatures won't help matters

With local reservoirs at less than 20 percent of capacity, irrigation farmers are planning for another year of pumping well water and readjusting acreage patterns. Water won't reach the Mesilla Valley until May 15, when the


Elephant Butte Irrigation District will start turning water into farm ditches, said Gary Esslinger, EBID manager-treasurer.

During normal snow runoff years, Elephant Butte Irrigation District farmers receive about 3 acre-feet, but this year the Bureau of Reclamation has allocated the EBID only enough water to deliver 6 inches to farmers.

The mountain snow pack runoff was less than 23 percent of average and the combined storage in Elephant Butte and Caballo reservoirs currently is 400,100 acre-feet, about 18 percent of the 2.23 million acre-feet of capacity.

Of this amount, 127,600 acre-feet are classed as "credit water," owned by upstream users and not available to irrigate in the Mesilla Valley, according to the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Center's Drought Watch on the Rio Grande.

"The EBID will supply surface water during the heat of the

summer, usually in June and July," he said.

We're irrigating up north in the Rincon Valley," head ditch rider Ricardo Bejarano said.

Rincon Valley farmer Dickie Ogaz said he is adjusting his crop pattern, planting more cotton and corn that require less water and cutting back on chile about 15 percent. Chile needs more water and has higher labor costs.

"You try to go for something that takes less water and less labor," Ogaz said.

The Drought Watch Climate Prediction Center threemonth forecast calls for higher than average temperatures and average chances of precipitation.

Indications are that irrigation farmers will have to pump water again this summer for their crops.

That means higher operation costs because it's expensive to lift ground water to fields and well water is of poor quality. Well water contains minerals and can stunt plant growth.

The Office of the State Engineer (OSE) is concerned about another summer of heavy pumping. Last summer, heavy



ground water pumping removed 280,000 acre-feet from the Rio Grande Basin water table, twice the amount in 2009 or 2010, according to the OSE.

Under OSE regulations, farmers in the Lower Rio Grande Basin are entitled to 4.5 acre-feet of water if they have access to EBID surface water or have wells or well rights from a neighbor, according to Bill Gomez, Diversified Farmers president.

"A farmer must use all the water provided by the EBID even though he has access to a well to provide the added water he needs to reach his 4.5 acre-feet of water," he said.

Elephant Butte storage is 372,000 acre-feet, 19 percent of capacity; and Caballo storage is 23,000 acre-feet, 10 percent of capacity.

The water level at Elephant Butte is about 75 feet below the spillway, according to Derrick O'Hara of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Oil opportunity in Alaska could cut prices at pump

If you are tired of paying twice as much as you did a few years ago to fill your gas tank, consider these facts.

Alaska is nearly four times the size of California. The Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) covers 19.6 million acres, an area the size of South Carolina. There is a tiny section on the northern coastal plain of ANWR that

is a small percentage of the total refuge area. What sort of place is this small patch of land? During the winter there is no sunlight for 56 straight days. While the area is submerged in complete darkness, it endures 70-below-zero temperatures. When the sun finally reappears, it is barely noticeable for months.

This water puddle eventually dotted area thaws during very short summers. Millions of these puddles provide breeding grounds for trillions of very large

mosquitoes. Summer occupants in the area are forced to wear the same masks of tropical mosquito netting used by the crews that dug the Panama Canal. If you dare to go outside unprotected in the summer, you are likely to inhale mosquitoes through your nose or mouth.

According to the U.S. Geological Survey and energy experts, there is enough oil in this small coastal area to replace all of the oil the U.S. imports from Saudi Arabia. Only 2,000 acres of the 19.6 million acres of ANWR is needed for production.

Sadly, the news media will never inform people that ANWR's beautiful mountains are actually far away from the barren area where oil would be produced. The untold truth is pretty simple. This tiny track of ground is one of the most forbidding places in North America. It is hard to imagine another place where oil production would have less of an effect on the environment.

The uninformed will sometimes opine about the dangers to the caribou in the area.

However, in nearby Prudhoe Bay, where oil production facilities have been for decades, the Central Arctic caribou herd has multiplied in size many times over since the facilities were built.

Advanced production techniques make it possible to drill in virtually any direction for miles. Directional drilling now leaves land tracts virtually undisturbed. Naturally, environmentalists despise the realities of new oil production technologies. Directional drilling destroys the arguments used

to deny energy production permits.

Consider the Inupiat Eskimos who live in the coastal area. They understand the wonders of modern drilling technologies. Accordingly, they overwhelmingly support oil production on their lands.

Radical environmentalists never mention the Inupiat. Instead they favor the Gwich'in. The Gwich'in nation capitol is hundreds of miles away from the coastal plain area in

question. Gwich'in tribal members are environmentalist favorites because they agree to appear in full native costume at congressional hearings in Washington, D.C. According to the Gwich'in, producing energy underneath this patch of Inupiat coastal plain, even using modern horizontal drilling techniques, is unacceptable.

The most amusing fact about the Gwich'in is they once invited oil exploration companies to look for oil on their lands. Sadly, there is no oil where they live. The good news is they have found a lucrative new industry. They play the role of noble native in exchange for appearance fees paid by radical environmentalists.

Protecting this tiny patch of ground near

the Arctic Circle from U.S. oil production is like protecting a starving person from food. This track of ANWR essentially has

This track of ANWR essentially has become the false god of radical environmentalists and their friends in Washington who oppose the production of oil anywhere.

Unfortunately, the ANWR hoax is kept alive by people who donate millions to shameless politicians.

This hoax is costing Americans hundreds of billions if not trillions of dollars and countless jobs. Only a majority of rational votes will stop this scam.

Officials seek guidelines for managing demand a result of the proposed partnership would es-

As a result of input from business and community leaders, a study currently underway is expanding to give city officials a framework for deciding when a parking garage will be needed Downtown.

Walker Parking Consultants, city officials and representatives of the Ad Hoc Committee on Downtown Revitalization agreed at a mid-April meeting that Downtown does not need a garage – yet.

The ad-hoc committee successfully advocated to add Saturday morning parking counts to the Walker study, according to committee vice chairman Mike White.

The original scope of the 2012 study called for the consultants to count cars on weekdays as they had done in 2008.

David Dollahon, the city's chief planning administrator, said Monday a change order for the study still is "in discussion."

The change order would add the monitoring of peak demand for parking Saturday mornings when the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market draws crowds Downtown.

The change order also would include "the development of a parking management plan that would include the potential triggers," Dollahon wrote in a statement.

Triggers would alert officials to when the need for a Downtown garage is imminent. The parking management plan would recommend less drastic measures for coping with peak parking demand in the short run.

All eyes on Downtown

The parking study is just one element in a flurry of activity addressing the future of Downtown.

Other activity includes:

- A Downtown design concept University of New Mexico graduate students will present Saturday, May 5.
- A proposal from a group of New Mexico and El Paso area developers to form a publicprivate partnership to develop Downtown properties, including land now owned by the city and used as public parking lots.

City Council is planning for a work session 1 p.m. Monday, May 14, to hear from the group interested in partnering with the city on future development Downtown, City Manager Robert Garza said in an interview Monday.

Garza said that any changes taking place as

sentially be parking neutral. "It could add 10 spaces or subtract 10 spaces," he said.

Councillors defer decision

City councillors meeting April 9 on the Tax Increment Development District voted not to prioritize three proposed Downtown enhance-ments: re-opening Church and Water streets to two-way traffic, creating a plaza where outdoor events could be staged and building a parking garage.

Carrie La Tour, executive director of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership, reminded the councillors that graduate students from the University of New Mexico School of Architecture and Planning are putting the finishing touches on design concepts for a civic plaza.

"The priority for us would be a plaza with a water feature and space for concerts and events. We still have the plaza as a priority, but without results from the parking study it's best (for the TIDD) to wait," La Tour said.

The students' preliminary proposal presented in March included walkways through Downtown that would connect with other neighborhoods, encouraging people to walk, rather than drive, Downtown.

The parking consultants, however, appear to be skeptical about a pe-

destrian-driven Downtown design.

Jeremiah Simpson of Walker Parking Associates told the audience at a public input, "In summer, walking for many people is limited to a couple blocks. Stacking spaces is the most convenient way to get them closest to businesses."

Garage not imminent

Dollahon and Walker associates Simpson

and Jeffrey Colvin offered assurances to a handful of citizens who turned out for the presentation and public input session.

'Structured parking is a last resort," Colvin said.

Steve Newby of the South Main Street firm Steve Newby Architects, asked: "As growth hap-

pens ... is it possible to project the point at which we are going to need a structure

Simpson said the firm has models for projecting parking demand.

Attendee Tammy Smith suggested that if a garage becomes necessary, underground would be preferable to a high-rise. She went on record opposing highrise garages for aesthetic reasons.

Simpson commented "Structured parking is expensive - \$8,000-\$16,000 per stall for above-ground construction. If you go below ground, it is quite a bit more expensive.

"You mentioned that there are a lot of steps

between now and structured parking," Newby said. "At some point, all the existing lots will have buildings on them. They will likely be three- to four-story buildings with parking at the lower levels. As lots go out of circulation, there will probably be a need for structured parking.2

Simpson said although there has been some development activity since 2008, "based on what we saw today, there is still some capacity in public parking."

Survey assesses attitudes

Data collection for the parking study also includes a survey developed by the consultants. The questionnaire asks property and business owners a series of questions, which include:

- how many off-street spaces they provide
- how they rate current Downtown parking
- where they believe there's a shortage of
- parking which parking management solutions they would endorse
- and, what their concerns are regarding future parking operations.

"The survey has been circulated to the City Council, the ad hoc committee, the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership and the Doña Ana Arts Council. We plan to distribute it to the Farmers and Crafts market vendors." Dollahon wrote.

"The ad hoc committee will review and provide feed back to the parking study. Our intent is for them to make a recommendation to the Council on the report."

Tweaking current parking

Simpson told attendees at the public input

meeting, "We are looking at existing resources where we can add 5-10-14-20 spaces. It may be as simple as re-painting the lines in parking lots to provide space for more cars."

Parking regulations also may be proposed. One parking management tool the consultants mentioned at the public input - paid parking – drew brisk disapproval from Smith.

She told consultants that because Las Cruces is not an affluent city, people would balk at paying to park.

Smith said the result would be a loss of business in the neighborhood.

The consultants assured her they will not recommend paid parking for the near term.

How much is enough?

Simpson briefly summarized the 2008 study, which projected a total Downtown parking deficit of 550 spaces, based on construction of the new city hall and federal court house, as well as several projects that have not yet materialized.

The 2008 study suggested two possible garage locations and recommended a variety of parking management strategies, including paid parking pilot projects and parking by permit in residential areas.

Colvin said it's important for the city to continue to monitor the situation.

He said the goal should be to have enough parking for an "85th to 95th percentile day."

'You don't want to build masses of parking to accommodate the 10 to 15 days a years when you are hosting special events such as festivals," he said.

Seeing a bigger picture

City Councillor Miguel Silva, who represents Downtown, said "We need to address parking on a global scale."

"Parking is at a premium with 250 ven-dors (at the Saturday Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market) and we will be adding 100 vendors when the southern portion of Main Street opens. Hopefully more businesses will open, too, and we would rather be ahead of the curve."

He added if multi-use commercial/residential buildings spring up on current city park-ing lots, there would be a net loss of parking spaces.

"There are numerous parallel components that need to occur," he said.

Planning for future development and future parking must be addressed in tandem, he said.

"It's a nice, symbiotic moment," Silva added, noting that a master plan update also is in the works

"Parking is an emotional issue," he said. "If we address it now we won't have to take aspirin later.


Gotti, originally from Albuquerque, wanted to bring nationwide shows, especially those with a tie to Hispanic culture, to cities across New Mexico.

Featured artist: Lyle West Artist uses himself as the subject 'Unsplintered' now showing at the Tombaugh Gallery

In a studio equipped with four mirrors offering different perspectives of his subject, Lyle West created nine mosaicesque pieces in an exhibit called "Unsplintered," which will be featured at the Tombaugh Gallery through June 1.

The subject, West's body, started as a self portrait exercise, but then turned into something more. West would start painting one self-portrait after another, constantly looking at his mirrors for reference.

"I've always been very quick," West said of his painting process.

Inspired by the German expressionist movement, which he said is "very gestural," he tried to follow in its school of thought, which brought about a process that slowed him down and "closer to the present moment."

One self portrait produced by West is the result of nine self-portraits being cut, torn and laid out in a process to sculpt several different facial poses morphing into one.

"I would use watercolor pencil then bleed it. I would take those nine pieces of that first portrait and lay it all out," he said.

When describing his creative process, West uses the words rip and destroy, which is hard to believe, looking at the intricate designs of his faces displayed on the large pieces. His works include close ups of his face, varying angles, from shoulder up and full-length body portraits.

"I'd start with an eye, and place the eye where it should correspond with other body parts," West said. "Eventually, what I thought was originally a shoulder piece would morph into being a piece for the head, or a toe a finger."

The three-dimensional pieces, West said, allowed him to play with what one

considers the subject versus what one considers the object. In looking at this relationship, West said it led to some sociological questions, as to who has the power – the subject or the object – as well as identity construction.

In placing himself as the subject of his artwork, West was concerned about looking at what makes up identity construction and manufactured desire, in what he described as someone morphing into something society keeps placing upon them.

"We don't register all of the advertising that we see every day," West said. "But in terms of our identity, it affects us." As West's artworks stand, they are

three-dimensional with numerous textured pieces of past portraits popping off the current portrait form.

However, West said he is hoping to expand his portraits into fourth-dimensional mobiles. West also wants to continue to push his self-portraits "further into disintegration."

"By shifting between multiple mediums I can explore fluid spaces that promote contemplation for solving problems," West said. "I find my attempts to be fully engaged in the moment reveals lucid aspects of human experience, which is where I believe empathy resides."

West, a Master of Fine Arts student and part-time drawing instructor at New Mexico State University, has taught his students to look at themselves objectively through mirrors.

One of his assignments is for students to draw themselves morphing into an animal of their choice.

"I love teaching. Only so many people are ever going to see my work in my lifetime," West said. "By teaching, I can impart my knowledge and creativity onto 20 to 40 kids a semester, exponentially sharing art with the world."

West pursued NMSU after living in Conifer, Colo., for the past 22 years. He received an associate degree in arts from Red Rocks Community College in 2006 and a Bachelor of Fine Art from Metropolitan State College of Denver in 2010.

While moving to Las Cruces has been bittersweet because West has "strong roots in Conifer," he said he couldn't have picked a better place to pursue his MFA. "NMSU and Las Cruces has been great, I've been able to learn from both the school and the community," he said.

"I could see myself staying here for another 20 years and building roots here." Tombaugh Gallery is located at 2000

When history and celebration collide Cinco de Mayo fiesta to be held in Mesilla

The United States and Mexico will be sharing a bond, the love of freedom, when Mesilla conducts its annual Cinco de Mayo fiesta.

The festival starts at 12:15 p.m. Saturday, May 5, on the plaza with live music and entertainment from Tierra del Encanto with Mariachi Alma de Jalisco.

chi Alma de Jalisco. The remainder of the afternoon program will feature Las Perlitas del Pueblo with Mariachi Aguilas, Ballet Folklorico Amanecer from Sunrise Elementary in Chaparral and Mariachi Real de Chihuahua.

At 12:15 p.m. Sunday, May 6, the festivities continue with music from Tierra del Encanto Mariachi followed by Mariachi Aguilas and Las Cruces Catholic School Colores de Cristo Ballet Folklorico.

"To commemorate Cinco de Mayo, and keeping with tradition, culture and pride, each year Mesilla hosts a weekend fiesta of music dancing, food and amusement rides," said Mesilla Mayor Nora Barraza.

In Mexico, Cinco de Mayo celebrations are a renewal of patriotism and freedom from European rule.

"The town of Mesilla observes Cinco de Mayo as a celebration of the victory of Mexico over the French army at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862," Barraza said. "Mesilla was a part of Mexico until the signing of the Gadsden Purchase in 1854."

The events leading up to the battle showed how Europeans did not understand the Mexican spirit. Mexico was in debt to England, Spain and France.

President Benito Juarez asked for an extension to stabilize the economy and pay off the debts. But France decided to invade Mexico and take over the country's economy and establish a monarchy with Habsburg Archduke Maximillian as emperor.


At that time, France was ruled by Napolean III, who landed 6,000 troops in the gulf city of Veracruz.

But the Mexican spirit prevailed, and on May 5, 1862, Gen. Ignacio Zaragoza with 4,800 troops and Zacapoaxtla Indians defeated the French. The Zacapoaxtla Indians, in their white outfits, still march in the Cinco de Mayo parade in Mexico City.

The French suffered about 1,000 casualties and the Mexicans 250. Zaragoza sent a message to Juarez: "Las armas nacionales se han cubierto de gloria." (The nation's arms have been covered with glory).

But in September Gen. Zaragoza died of typhoid, putting Jesus Gonzales-Ortega in command.

France strengthened its forces with 30,000

men under Gen. Elias Forey, who set up a siege of Puebla. After 72 days, the Mexicans were forced to surrender.

The French advanced to Mexico City where they established Maximilian as emperor and Carlotta as empress in Palacio Chapultepec, the former Spanish viceroy residence.

But the Cinco de Mayo spirit prevailed. Juarez kept rallying the Mexican with the call, they had defeated the French invaders at Puebla and if they kept fighting, they could defeat them again.

Outside developments also weakened the French position.

By 1865, with the end of the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln, who admired Juarez, issued the statement:

"A foreign monarch set up on Mexican soil in the presence of European naval and military forces would be an insult to the republican form of government, which is the most widely spread on the American continent, and would mean the beginning rather than the end of revolution in Mexico. "The sympathies of the United States would be on the side of her sister republic, for the liberation of the continent from European control has been a leading feature of American history in the past century."

By 1865, hostilities with Prussians were increasing and many French believed troops were need at home, not in Mexico. So, Napolean started withdrawing troops.

Maximilian continued to fight with the Mexican reactionary forces against Juarez. He fought in the final battle in Queretaro north of Mexico City, where he was captured with two loyal generals, Miguel Miramon and Tomas Mejia. They were executed Cerro de las Campanas.

Before execution, according to historical accounts, Maximilian said: "Mexicanos, voy a morir por una causa justa, de la independencia y libertad de Mexico. Que mi sangre selle las desgracias de mi nueva patria. Viva Mexico." (I'm going to die for a just cause, the independence and liberty of Mexico. May my blood end the misfortunes of my new country. Long live Mexico).

Larson comes to Black Box Rock 'n' roll musical 'Tick, tick ... BOOM!' in town

The No Strings Theatre Company is bringing "Tick, tick ... BOOM!" to the stage.

Written by Jonathan Larson and directed by Dale Pawley, the production runs from Friday, May 4, to Sunday, May 20, at the Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main St.

When is it time to give up on your dreams? Do you have the courage to pursue those dreams, even when those around you are telling you it's time to settle down and put them aside?

These are the questions that faced thenunknown Larson as he approached his 30th birthday, and his struggle to find the answers to those questions form the basis for "Tick, tick ... BOOM!" a rock musical based on his life.

Most people are familiar with Larson as the writer and composer of the 1996 rock opera "Rent," a sensation on Broadway that ran for more than ten years and was made into a movie in 2005.

Tragically, Larson died at age 35, a victim of an aortic dissection caused by undiagnosed Marfan syndrome, just two days before the opening night of "Rent."

"Tick, tick ... BOOM!" began as a one-man cabaret act called "Boho Days," a set of songs connected by Larson's recollections of his "extremely late 20s."

He used the performance piece to raise

money and start the word-of-mouth going for "Rent," which was in its infancy.

Five years after Larson's death, David Auburn and Stephen Oremus were contracted by Larson's family to turn "Boho Days" into a stage musical.

The characters of Michael and Susan, Jon's best friend and girlfriend, were added as characters, and the show enjoyed a short but distinguished Off-Broadway run, where it received an Outer Critics Circle Award for Outstanding Musical.

In the play, Larson challenges those expectations, but at the same time finds himself wondering if his dreams are worth risking two of the most precious relationships he has in the world.

The final song of the show hinges on a question: "Cages or wings: which do you prefer?" It's one of many questions Larson asks himself, but it's also the one he asks the audience.

"In the end," said director Dale Pawley, "everyone in the audience should leave pondering their answer."

Performances are at 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and at 2:30 p.m. Sundays, May 13 and 20. A 7 p.m. Thursday performance will be held on May 17. Tickets are \$10 for general admission, \$9 for students. Seniors over 65 and all seats on Thursday are \$7.







A sentimental and empathic French film

'My Afternoons with Margueritte' is gentle and quite surprising

I found "My Afternoons with Margueritte" a quiet, gentle little film, to be quite a surprise. Expecting a "you can do it" kind of flick

– although, I should have known better since it is from France – I found instead a quietly often humorous and emotional-forceful film that centers on two characters.

One, the aforementioned Margueritte of the title, is an elderly woman, dignified and elegant and – in real life – actually 97 years old. As played by Gisele Casadesus, who fills the role perfectly, Margueritte becomes Germain's unlikely mentor.

Germain has received a lifetime of putdowns and abuse from his mother – who is still alive, we are somewhat sad to learn, but is also not quite all there.

Germain, in his 50s now, lives on the same property with her, where he gets by doing odd jobs and selling produce from his garden at the local market. His main indulgence in life is to meet some amigos at the local pub to tip a few and listen to their advice, complaints and nonsense.

One day, per chance, he happens upon Margueritte who is sitting on a park bench, reading aloud from a novel.

Margueritte's life experience and judgement of character soon lead to her to deduce that Germain is somewhat illiterate, and seeing a diamond in the rough, she offers to read

to him, thus allowing him a slow path toward a different way of life.

Curiously, she doesn't start off with easy reads, but rather with "The Plague," by Albert Camus, the noted French philosopher. Germain becomes an apt student, and soon, with reservations, he is reading on his own.

Margueritte also seems to find a renewed purpose, and is probably the best teacher Germain could have.

The film wavers between sentimentality, comedy and empathy, but never crosses the

line into maudlin or silly.

With Germain's new found abilities, he is able to better deal with his cronies at the tavern, and bring his life out of the trench it was in, learn that he is not the dolt and loser that his cruel and weird mother has made him out to be all his life.

Margueritte, who sometimes ponders her upcoming passing, but not with terror or sadness, becomes an adjunct parental figure for Germain, but again, this is handled with such aplomb that it seems as though



they are just friends with many experiences behind them.

Much has been made by lesser reviews about the size of Gérard Depardieu, who stars as Germain, something that I found unnecessary and stupid.

I can't possibly imagine what his current girth has to do with his performance, except to add a unique quality to his character. Who cares if he likes his crepes and croissants? I saw this film last fall while in Denver for

I saw this film last fall while in Denver for the wonderful Denver Film Festival and the rest of the audience was made up of about 10 women, older than I but younger than Margueritte.

It was perfect fare for them – and me – and they hung around the lobby of the theater for some time afterward, discussing the film.

You might do that as well, no matter what your age.

Just across the bank of the Rio Grande River 'El Sicario' documents border violence

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, May 5, is "El Sicario" (2011, 80 minutes, not rated, in Spanish, with English subtitles).

The word "sicario" originated in Romangoverned Palestine, and referred to the Sicarii, a Jewish sect known for using concealed daggers to slay ruling officials. Today, however, it has evolved into a generic term for a hired killer.

This documentary from director Gianfranco Rosi visits one of the most notorious of all contemporary sicarios. Filming takes place in a low-rent motel room, situated on the border between the United States and Mexico.

A nameless hitman, based in Ciudad Juárez, candidly acknowledges his own responsibility for the execution of hundreds of individuals, as well as his immediate role in the torture and kidnapping of those victims.

At one time, he said, he was simultaneously in the upper echelons of the Chihuahua State Police and multiple Mexican drug cartels.

Now, as the cameras roll, there is a \$250,000 contract on his life and he lives from day to day as a fugitive, seated in a hotel

room, with a black mesh hood over his face. As an extended interview without cutaways or reenactments, the central account emerges solely from the harrowing, uncensored reflections of its felonious subject.

This film will screen twice, at 1 p.m. and again at 3.30 p.m. Authors Molly Molloy and Charles Bowden will attend the screenings.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society which showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West – the new West, Old West or anything in between – and "movies that missed us," notable films that never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as entertainment. At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico "connection," drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state – nearly 500 – or perhaps featuring a star/story from New Mexico talent.

Unless otherwise noted, screening time is 1:30 p.m., and admission is \$4 for everyone except film society members who are admitted for \$1.


The groups Diamond District and Trek Life will join together for introspective storytelling. Headlining this year's show is Grammy-nom-



Taos 64 times in the semester and allots \$325 in Aggie Dining Dollars. Pistol 400 gives \$400 in Aggie Dining Dollars, with no pre-alloted entrances into Taos, but Aggie Dining Dollars can be used to get into Taos.

Taos is a staple in any on-campus freshman's diet, and Miner said the meal plans are also available for faculty and non-freshmen students. While Taos is closed for the

summer, the University Club will be open to the public. The restaurant is not just for the athletes, a common misconception.

Featured artists: Mesilla Valley Chorale A 'Sentimental Journey' for the MVC

Celebrating 40 years at the Rio Grande By Christine Peterson

Mesilla Valley Chorale, a staple of the Las Cruces art scene for the past four decades, will be performing its 40th anniversary show "Sentimental Journey - 40 Great Years" at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 6, at the Rio Grande Theatre.

In the past 40 years, the choir has grown in success and has gone international. The group began when a group of friends met at Phil and Val Hosford's home to sing together.

"We had no idea it would develop into a great choir," Phil Hosford said.


The chorale started off practicing in a living room, and was soon performing in various church venues.

Group dynamics began to change when the chorale started to perform at the Rio Grande Theatre in 2006.

"In 2006, we had our 35th anniversary show," director Nancy Ritchey said. "The Rio Grande Theatre had opened barely a year before. It was very much a new venue.

"We wanted to make it a big gala event so we took a big step to start selling ads and making it into a big concert."

Ritchey added that after its first performance at the Rio Grande Theatre, the chorale



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almost doubled in size.

"We got greater visibility at the theater. All our performances give back to the community. We do a lot of fundraising for the community," Ritchey said. "The theater itself is important to young people. It gives them an opportunity to be on the stage or to see something on the stage.

"Before the theater, there wasn't a venue that could hold different performances."

The chorale, which has been through 10 directors in the past 40 years, has gained knowledgeandgrowth from all of them. "Every director

and singer added their own dedication and commitment to performing good music," Ritchey said.

Ritchey graduated from Oberlin Conservatory with a de-

gree in music, spent a year in Austria studying music and continues to teach voice and piano privately in addition to holding three MVC practices a week.

"We have a main rehearsal Monday nights from 7 to 9 p.m.," Ritchey said. "We hold separate practices for men and women on Saturdays.

Ritchey said a lot of the success the choir has comes from its accompanist Dulcie Boykin.

"Not only was she a marvelous musician, but she evoked laughter at every rehearsal," Ritchey said. "(Boykin) passed away a few years ago. She was one of the real stars that kept (MVC) going."

For the 40th anniversary show, seven of the founding members will perform. The music selection was carefully put together to honor both founding members and newer members.

Phil Hosford, who used to sing a duet from the "Music Man" with his late wife, will be singing with member Susan Ellington as a homage to the chorale's earlier years.

The anniversary concert includes music from local singer and composer Christine Sanders, who wrote "Eternal Harps," which is inspired by honoring the group's anniversary, founders and its missions to bring "beautiful music to singers and audiences of the Mesilla Vallev."

Other performances will include "Frostiana," poetry by Robert Frost set to music, sung at the chorale's very first performance in May 1972.

The chorale's older favorites, "You'd Be So Nice to Come Home To" and "Long Ago and Far Away," will also be performed.

Other genres showcased include Broadway, jazz and "lilting Scottish/Irish pieces," Ritchey said.

One of the chorale's signature songs, and what Ritchey describes as being the "truly the heart of the program," "The Music's Always There With You" will also be performed.

'We have a long history, we aren't unique but we are a group that strives to give quality

performances," Ritchev said. "We are not all professionals, we work hard to be quality."

Adding to its success story, in 2009 the choir was invited to perform in Le Mans, France. A man from Le Mans happened to be in the audience during MVC's first concert at the Rio Grande Theatre.

"After the show, he came racing down the aisle inviting us to come to France to sing at a music festival," Ritchey said.

It took the group two years to prepare to go to France, which, Ritchey said was a "great experience."

MVC then invited the choir from Le Mans to come to Las Cruces to perform, which they did in 2011.

"It was such a great experience, I don't think we could ever replicate such a great experience," Ritchey said.

After having its 40th anniversary show, MVC will be getting ready for the New Mexico Cen-tennial Choral Cel-

ebration Program being held June 16. 'The Albuquerque Civic Chorus direc-

tor was planning an all New Mexico composer program and wanted to have it somewhere within New Mexico," Ritchey said. "I embraced that and the chorale is hosting it. Singing Out and the Civic Chorus will be performing along with us."

Scoundrels of the seven seas

A swashbuckling good time for all

The creative minds behind the beloved British claymation cartoon "Wallace and Gromit," have done it again.

Claymation is a labor-intensive style of stop-motion filming. The animators make every character, prop and set from clay. They then take photographs of each fraction of a movement the character or item make.

Sometimes, a little help from computer graphics is added, but a bulk of the work is incredibly tedious and time consuming. This style of animation can take several years to complete.

"The Pirates! Band of Misfits," is an easygoing, chuckle-heavy family comedy that brings the same charm to scoundrels that Aardmans Animation's "Wallace and Gromit" lent to an over sized were-rabbit.

Pirate Captain (voiced by Hugh Grant) believes this is his year to win the coveted Pirate of the Year Award for being the best pirate on the high seas. However, Pirate Captain looks like a lame duck next to a few other pirates of tyrannical splendor.

Cutlass Liz (voiced by Salma Hayek) a rough and tough sea wench, Peg Leg Hastings (voiced by Lenny Henry) a smooth talking, booty smuggling pirate from Barbados, and Black Bellamy (voiced by Jeremy Piven) the reigning champion, are all out to claim the

title for themselves. This honor – and the fame associated with it – is worth more to these sea-faring scallywags than any amount of plunder.

With the help of his motley crew, including his beloved "parrot" Polly, Pirate Captain takes to the seas to plunder loot and secure his nomination for the award.

Soon, Pirate Captain discovers that being the best pirate doesn't come easily. He runs

into a few obstacles when the ships he selects for plunder aren't your typical gold embargos. A ship full of lepers, a ghost ship and one full of school children on a day trip mean empty coffers for the pirate, who was hoping to be the biggest, baddest scallywag who ever sailed the seas.

During their unsuccessful raids, the pirates board the ship of one Charles Darwin (voiced by my favorite "Doctor" David Tennent), who has just come back from one of his many journeys documenting the origin of species.

Darwin quickly makes the discovery that Pirate Captain's beloved Polly isn't a parrot at all, but rather the last living

dodo bird.

Darwin knows that Polly is his only chance of winning Scientist of the Year back in London, so he seeks to barter the bird away from of the sea-loving brutes.

When Pirate Captain refuses, Darwin convinces him there are riches to be had by obtaining the scientific award.

Pirate Captain sees this as an opportunity to embellish his reputation and obtain impressive piles of gold. Instead of allowing Darwin and his "manpanzee," Bobo, to take Polly to the competition, Pirate Captain decides to go himself, in a disguise of course.

The pirates head to London, where a vivacious Queen Victoria (voiced by Imelda Staunton) has outlawed pirates, threatening to behead any who step foot in London-town. This doesn't dissuade Pirate Captain, and he and his crew enter the city.

The use of claymation provides a wildly colorful and imaginative world for the characters, and the addition of 3-D technology brings the Pirate Captain into audiences' laps.

Members of Pirate Captain's crew have their one moment of glory, and the character development – squeezed occasionally into only a few minutes – is wonderfully complete and individual.

The ability of the filmmakers to create characters the audience can instantly connect to is incredibly important and the creators of "The Pirates! Band of Misfits" nailed it.

The cartoon makes a silly show of the storyline, and includes some great one-liners that appeal to an older audience. The action never misses a beat, making sure nothing feels too rushed or under-developed while maintaining an exciting pace.

Watching the meticulous clay figures glide fluidly while running or engaging in a sword fight on the screen will please parents and children alike.

The amount of work the creators have put into this film really shines through and makes it a treasure all of its own.





In a survival situation, the best course of action to take is to "act like the natives

This means that the native people and animals of an area are the best teachers on how to adapt to the environment. In order to increase your chances of survival, you must study the people of the area where you are living and working.

If you keep an open mind, you will learn to respect them, make friends and learn how to survive. Unfortunately, many people only associate the negative and less desirable elements of a society and have opinions formed by those experiences.

In a survival situation, "act like the natives" means learning the basic language fundamentals in order to communicate effectively. Learn the cultural customs, norms and courtesies in order to function in society without offending your neighbors or people you come into contact with. This will help you to get assistance from people who are critical to your survival and give you insight into potential threats.

An example is the Army sent me to Arabic language school prior to my deployments to the Middle East and East Africa. I was able to perform my job and return to the United States safely. Bottom line, learning the language and culture of that part of the world was critical to mission accomplishment.

In the United States, the threats to safety and intensity of daily life are not as stressful. If you focus on what you need to learn during education or work training, and apply those lessons, you will increase your chances of success. Your focus on "mission accomplishment" follows the same principle. If you are not native to the United States, you need to learn the language and culture.

"Act like the natives" is just as important if you are familiar with the language. In order to be successful in life and work, research and history has proven that education is one of the major components. Language skills and abilities are critical to this mission accomplishment. It is critical for you to be able to speak English and understand different cultures. The tragic statistics of people who have failed or not been given the opportunity for assimilation into the American society is one of the major debates of our time.

Understand Celebrating National Bike Month

Enthusiasts are eager to educate

May is National Bike Month and the League of American Bicyclists in Las Cruces, along with other cycling groups throughout the area, is gearing up for a month of fun and informative activites.

"Bicycles are a good form of alternative transportation," said Jean Conway a league certified instructor and local cyclist. "It helps with exercise and saves gas."

Both Conway and Tammy Schurr, also a league certified instructor, stress that motorists need to be aware that cyclists have a right to be on the road.

'Motorists need to realize that the larger the vehicle, the more responsibility they have to be cautious," Schurr said.

Cyclists also have a responsibility to be educated and act predictably when riding with traffic.

"The most common mistake cyclists make is riding against traffic," Conway said. "It's not predictable and drivers don't know how to react in that situation. It's safer to ride with traffic.'

Another "predictable" behavior cyclist's need to practice is signaling their intentions before they turn or stop.

May also marks the first anniversary of Las Cruces being named a bicycle friendly community. The city had to meet League of American Bicyclists' standards in encouragement, engineering, education, enforcement and evaluation.

Schurr, who teaches bike education and trains other adults on how to be cycle instructors for youth, said a designation such as this positively impacts the community.

"Economic development," Schurr said. "You draw more people and employers to the city. We also have a designation with Sports Illustrated as a Sports Town. Any time you have positive attention, it is positive reinforcement that we have a good community and more people and businesses will want to be a part of that."

Pablo Lopez, manager at Outdoor Adventures, said he has noticed that the community has embraced the activity.

"In the last five years, (the bicycling community) has grown - the amount of people taking it up as a means of transportation and for exercise," Lopez said.

People take up biking for various reasons. Working at a bike shop Lopez said he's observed several reasons why people take up the activity.

"The person working next to them might bike to work or for fun and it's just contagious," Lopez said. "Students find it easier to get around campus and not have to deal with parking. Some people do it for fun, which can lead to the competitive aspect of it.'

People of retirement age who have developed problems from running throughout their life find it's a good crossover sport that keeps them active with less strain, Lopez added.

Outdoor Adventures isn't only a place to purchase bicycles and bike accessories- it is also a certified repair shop for peddle bikes, not motorized or electrical bikes.

"Bicyclists need to perform regular maintenance on their bike, especially if they are

relying on it to get from point A to point B," Lopez said. "Airing up your tires is one of the best things you can do. Cleaning and lubing your chain with a toothbrush, an old shirt and lube.


It's also important to have a bike thoroughchecked out once a year, Lopez said.

"It needs to be a reliable form of transportation," Lopez said.

"If anything, people should know that anyone can ride a bike at any age and any fitness level," Lopez said. "Anyone can do it. You don't have to have the nicest equipment, you just have to peddle and you'll get everything you need out of it."



Las Cruces' play day involved collaboration from organizations around the community, including nonprofit agencies, schools and the state Department of Health. 





A proud day for St. Andrew's

Aware that his name was in the running for the colonel promotion, Ruthven said he "didn't believe in the slightest that I would get it." "I was floored, absolutely floored," Ruthven

Inside a showcase gem

Home features modern interpretations of Old World style elements

The weekend of April 27-29, Las Crucens and area visitors ventured throughout the city to view the best of what local builders had to offer during the 2012 Spring Showcase of Homes

Trekking from Picacho Hills to Dripping Springs, and everywhere in between, tour participants got an inside look at craftsmanship found in Las Cruces, such as the R. Hines Construction and Hines & Hines creation at 5678 Via Estrella.

We wanted to have something in this subdivision in the showcase of homes," said Connie Hines of Hines & Hines, who developed the La Tierra Escondida subdivision with her husband, Jerry. "We wanted people to become familiar with what we have to offer out here.

Having previously teamed up with her son, Robert Sandoval of R. Hines Construction, and his wife, Jennifer Sandoval of Property Consultants, Connie and Jerry Hines once again collaborated with the duo to construct a home that showcased the features of the area, a unique style and each of their individual talents.

"It was a joint effort," Connie Hines said. "We knew that there was so much out here to take advantage of."

When completed in early April, the 2,600-square-foot, Mission-style residence combined comfort and luxury on a 1.69-acre lot looking out to the Organ Mountains.

"It's a shocker," Jennifer Sandoval said. "It's a R. Hines Construction home on a 1.69-acre lot in a gated, estate subdivision. Plus, the view."

A steep driveway leads to the front of the home. An iron gate encloses a small courtyard, landscaped with rocks and a light sprinkling of plants to help give the future homeowner an idea of their options, Hines said.

Skipping no detail, Robert Sandoval lined the windows with brightly colored tile, adding a pop of elegance to the façade. This attention to detail continues throughout the home, from the thick arches and faux-painted nichos to the finished three-car garage, which includes a workshop area.

We gave all of the spaces attention," Hines said. "We wanted the homeowners to have a finished product."

The large wood door surrounded by glass blocks for natural light welcomes guests to the interior.

Inside, the team selected tile that emulates Saltillo tile. Hines said a benefit of this tile selection is it is durable, even in tone and is low maintenance when it comes to care.

At the center of the home is the entertainment area - the living room, kitchen and access to the covered patio.

"The living room is set up so everyone in the room can enjoy the fireplace, the view and the TV," Hines said. "It's a very functional floor plan," Jennifer Sandoval said.

"It's what people are asking for nowadays." A fireplace, lined with Talavera tile, is set in the corner.

Hines said she covered the architectural feature with a faux finish to complement the splash of color found on the floor.

"I wanted the walls to be lighter," she said. "So, I added this contrast to key areas of the home that needed more of a focal point, like the nichos and the hood in the kitchen."

A dry bar is strategically placed between the living room and the kitchen for easy access no matter which area guests are in. "It's one of the best floor plans," Hines said. "It can accom-

modate any function you choose. At the center of the open kitchen is a large island.

'I felt like it was a good way to give workspace in the kitch-

en," Hines said. "Also, I thought it would be great for entertainment. You can set it up as a buffet." Stacked, dark-stained cabinets fill the kitchen as do counter-

tops made of swirling granite. "It had the most movement and character that didn't over-

power the floor, but enhances it," Hines said.

To play up the Spanish style of the residence, Robert Sandoval selected rustic, statement-making lighting as well as large dark beams that span the kitchen ceiling and other areas of the home

Adjacent to the kitchen is the dining room. Although open to the home, the dining room is separated enough to allow for a more private setting.

"It's stepped back so you have your own space," Hines said.

"It's enlarged to accommodate big dinners, but can also be used every day. You can dress it up or dress it down."

Located down a hall lined with elongated windows peering into the front courtyard are three of the home's bedrooms as well as a full bathroom. Jennifer Sandoval said one of the bedrooms was designed to be a flexible space and can be transformed into a media room, den or office to suit the owner's needs.

The other end of the home features the master suite. Near the entrance of the room is the bathroom and finished hisand-hers closets. A glass door encloses the tiles shower, while a jetted bathtub, also encased in colorful tile, sits under glass blocks near the two sinks.

The tile work plays a big role in the home, with each bathroom featuring a different pattern and color scheme. "We had a lot of fun with the tile," Hines said. "We found so

many great patterns it was hard to choose."

The oversized bedroom features high ceilings to add to the sense of space, Hines said.

"The interior needed to feel like it opened up, like the outdoor space," she said, adding that the large room allows for any type of furnishing.

Melding the lavish interior with the outdoor environment was important to the team. Out back, they continued the living space by creating a rock and flagstone banco that surrounds a fire pit. Jennifer Sandoval said the banco was inspired by a resort the couple visited in Mexico and was designed to be inviting, casual and have an Old World feel.

The yard is landscaped with grass, shrubs, trees and flowering plantings and includes room for a pool. The rock wall surrounding the property is curved to replicate the movement found in the surrounding desert, Hines said.

"It follows that random feel found in nature," she said, adding that those who build in the subdivision are asked not to disturb the desert surrounding the building envelope. "There are nondisturbed areas around each lot. It gives everyone that space.'

"I've had a very positive response from customers who have had a system installed," he said. "It's been nice to have their electric bill be a lot less."

One customer who learned about EcoMax-AC through the 2011 Home & Garden Show was Allen Downs, a resident of the Las Cruces area. He said the cost to cool his relatively new home during the summer was too high, so he began to look for another option.

"I was going to get a swamp cooler because I couldn't find anything more economical," he said. "I saw this at the Home & Garden Show and decided to do it."

Not only did the EcoMaxAC system draw less power than his old system, the replaced fan motor also made it more efficient, Downs said.

Energy-efficient system comes with hefty tax incentives

The heat of summer is quickly coming to the Mesilla Valley, and those homeowners looking for a way to efficiently cool their homes can do so thanks to EcoMaxAC.

Founded by Rocky Bacchus in 2007, Eco-MaxAC utilizes the coldness of the Earth to cool a structure through hybrid geothermal refrigerated air conditioning.

refrigerated air conditioning. "It can be done to new homes or existing homes," Bacchus said.


Bacchus said he joined the air conditioning industry in 1976, at which time he worked with evaporative coolers. In 2005, he became an air conditioning design and sales engineer for Freus.

After learning about hybrid geothermal heating around 2007, Bacchus saw an opportunity to provide homeowners with efficient cooling that also isn't harmful to the environment, creating a "win-win situation."

Sweetening the deal are various tax incentives reducing the nearly \$21,000 price tag of the system to as low as \$1,200, Bacchus said.

"Because of the tax credits, this (type of system) made the most sense to me," he said. "The incentives the federal government is putting forward help lower the initial cost to do something more efficient. I saw this as a huge opportunity for the customers and for the environment."

Unlike a traditional refrigerated air conditioning system, which pressure heats refrigerant to nearly 200 degrees so it can be cooled with 100-degree outside air, an EcoMaxAC system only has to generate



130-degree refrigerant because it uses the coolness of the ground to cool the refrigerant. This allows an EcoMaxAC system to use 30 to 60 percent less energy than a traditional cooling system.

Even if your pantry is close to empty, there is probably some rice hiding in there. If there is no rice hiding in the pantry, then you probably just don't eat rice, or need to go to the grocery store.


If the only rice you know is the great NFL wide receiver, you should still buy a bag of the edible variety. You never know when it could come in handy - and no one said you have to eat it.

It's too late to add insurance and the full retail price for a new cell phone is outrageous. Try drying it out with rice. 





Nearly 1,500 miles from Las Cruces, Churchill Downs in Louisville, Ky., will be filled with excitement, tradition and awe-inspiring hats during the 137th Kentucky Derby Sunday, May 5.

Despite the distance, Las Crucens can join the fun in a variety of ways. The race will air on NBC at 2 p.m. if you choose to watch it from home or at your favorite establishment around town.

A short drive down Interstate 10 will take derby watchers to Sunland Park Racetrack & Casino, which will simulcast the Kentucky Derby.

Chocolate Bourbon Pecan Pie

- 6 ounces semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In a small saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup and butter or margarine. Ćook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until butter or margarine melts and sugar dissolves. Cool slightly.

In a large bowl, combine eggs, bourbon, vanilla and salt. Mix well. Slowly pour sugar mixture into egg mixture, whisking constantly. Stir in chocolate chips and pecans. Pour mixture into pie shell.

up to two weeks. To grill the tenderloin, season the meat all over with salt and a liberal amount of black pepper, actually rubbing the pepper into the meat. Using cotton butcher's twine, tie the tenderloin at 2-inch intervals to maintain the round shape and uniform thickness. Place the meat on a parchment-lined baking sheet and set aside to drymarinate at room temperature for 1 hour.

Build a hardwood charcoal fire in a barbecue pit and allow it to burn down until the coals are glowing red and covered by a layer of white ash, about 20 to 30 minutes. Place the grill rack 6 inches above the coals. Glaze the tenderloin all over with olive oil. Place the meat over the hottest part of the fire to sear it, turning often with chef's tongs (searing the meat gives it a nice caramelized brown color and seals in the juices.) Finish grilling on medium-low heat.

When the meat is done as desired, transfer to a cutting board, cover loosely with foil, and allow to rest for 10 minutes to redistribute the juices. Slice into 1/2-inch-thick slices. Serve hot with Henry Bain sauce. (Recipe adapted from www.americanprofile.com.)

Kentucky Derby history and tradition

Debuting May 17, 1875, to a crowd of about 10,000 spectators, the Kentucky Derby has become an American staple, honored the first weekend of every May with flavorful fare, fashionable hats and fast-paced horse racing.

Throughout its long history, many tradi-tions have come out of the Kentucky Derby. Roses are a big part of the derby, which is fre-quently referred to as "The Run of the Roses."

At first, roses were presented to women who attended the derby, but because the flower caused such a sensation, its role grew. In 1896, the winner of the Kentucky Derby was draped in a garland of roses. Nowadays, about 400 to 500 roses are sewn together for the garland.

Creating such a stir, Churchill Downs Presi-dent and Kentucky Derby founding father Col. Lewis Clark adopted the rose as the race's of-ficial flower in 1904.

Mitchell said she will use roses to set the tone of the party as a major part of the décor. "I'm going to decorate with roses," she said.

"They're going to be all over the place."

Entertaining your guests

With the party beginning in the evening to avoid the burning mid-day sun, Mitchell said they won't view the Kentucky Derby during the party - but that doesn't mean there won't be any betting.

One guy is having different pools," she said. During one of the activities, party guests will each draw a name of a competing horse from a jug. Mitchell will then distribute prizes based on where each horse placed.

"It's a cute thing for entertainment," she said.

Other activities that can take place during your Kentucky Derby party include horseshoes and derby-themed Twister, which requires swapping the color circles with derby ele-ments, such as past winners and jockeys. Your regular Twister mat can easily be transformed with some cutout images and tape.

If you're holding your party during the race, another way to entertain your guests is with the game "Frozen Jockey." According to www.kentuckyderby.com, to play Frozen Jockey, stick small jockey and horse figurines - like those found at your local party story for cupcakes onto ice cubes and place in the freezer.

When it comes time to play, have your guests bet on the different figurines and race the ice cubes by placing them on a flat, moveable surface. After the bets have been made, tilt the surface and watch the jockeys go. Frozen Jockey is truly a game of chance. The ice cubes will slide down the slope in whichever way.

On the menu

As synonymous with the Kentucky Derby as horses is the mint julep. A bourbon-based cocktail, the mint julep made its first appearance at the derby in 1938. Since then, the beverage has become an icon for Southern living just don't forget its frosty silver goblet.

Although the mint julep is traditionally the signature drink of the Kentucky Derby with almost 12,000 being served at Churchill Downs during the two-day period of the Ken-tucky Oaks and Kentucky Derby – after a vote from party guests, Mitchell said they will serve a different Southern beverage staple: the hurricane. A concoction typically found in New Orleans, a hurricane consists of one part dark rum, one part white rum, passion fruit syrup and lime juice server over ice.

Other festive drinks, such as the mojito and mint tea punch, will also suit the Kentucky Derby theme.

As for food, Mitchell said the party is a pot luck style, with each guest bringing a dish to share. She said she will, however, serve guests chocolate pecan pie, a traditional menu item of the Kentucky Derby.

Another common dish served during the Kentucky Derby is barbecued beef tenderloin with a Henry Bain sauce. The Henry Bain sauce - named after its inventor, a head waiter of Louisville's Pendennis Club in 1881 - is a sweet, tangy and spicy mixture.

Don't forget the fashion

While horse racing is the focus of the event, the show-stealer of Kentucky Derby is the fashion.

For men, fashion styles at the derby include seersuchers, khaki suites and eye-catching shades of vibrant pastels, including key lime and cotton-candy pink. The idea is to make yourself stand out while maintaining your stature as a gentleman.

Although the men look dapper in their finest attire, the women aren't to be upstaged just look at their hats. The tradition of wearing a hat to the Kentucky Derby began because it was believed doing so would bring good luck.

As the years progressed, the hats got bigger and more elaborate. Hats will be at the center of Mitchell's Kentucky Derby party.

"All of the women will wear hats," she said, adding that a hat contest will be held and judged by a special guest.

Typically, a Kentucky Derby hat has a widebrim style and is dressed up with feathers, flowers, bows, ribbon and other accessories to express the wearer's personality.

Avoiding bee aggression

Be on the lookout as temperatures rise

With temperatures rising quickly this spring and flowers blooming in the desert already, bees have started to become more active in Arizona.

Bee swarming usually occurs from February through May and in October. With the establishment of Africanized bees in the Southwest, bee stings must be taken seriously. The Africanized variety will respond more quickly to protect their nest. They will sting in large numbers and can chase an intruder up to quarter of a mile or more.

How can I tell if they are Africanized bees?

Although the Africanized bee is slightly smaller, it's impossible to tell the difference between a European and Africanized bee without a microscope and extensive knowledge of the species.

The real difference is in the behavior of the bee. The Africanized variety is much more defensive of their hive. Any disturbance or threat to the hive can result in a vicious attack. Once agitated, they remain at a heightened state for an hour or more and may attack any source of movement. This bee will pursue its target for more than a mile. Humans and animals alike are in mortal danger when the Africanized bee colony feels threatened.

Once Africanized bee colonies invade an area, they produce 10 times more swarms than the European variety every year - and European colonies that are kept by beekeepers are controlled so they don't swarm. Within a few years, the Africanized bee becomes the dominant strain in every area it

invades. Wild, or "feral," colonies in the Southwest are at least 98 percent Africanized.

The discovery of a bee swarm generally creates a real sense of urgency. You may become anxious about the safety of your family, pets and property, and you will have an immediate desire to eradicate the bees.

Typically, swarms are transient. They may set up temporary shelter in a tree for a few hours or even days before moving on.

Bee safety tips to keep around

Be cautious when dealing with bees and leave bees alone. If you are attacked:

Cover your face and your eyes Run immediately into a building or vehicle

- Do not swat at the bees as this will continue to agitate them
- Do not jump into a pool

Where do I look for bees?

Regularly inspect your home and yard for signs of bees. Look for open-



ings in trees, eaves, walls, barbecue grills and water meter boxes as possible nest locations. The Africanized variety tends to prefer areas at ground level the most.

Do not attempt to move bees, throw objects at the swarm or squirt with water.

If the owner/occupant wants to remove bees at a private residence or business, they should contact an exterminator – beekeepers are not interested in keeping this species.

Stay alert when horseback riding through brush or under low hanging branches where bees might nest.

The many faces of yaupon holly This evergreen is a desert jewel

This easy to grow and care for evergreen shrub, the yaupon holly, is a jewel in our desert climate.

It comes in three forms: dwarf, weeping and upright. It thrives in full sun and is moderately drought tolerant once established. It can even take the cold temperatures that Mother Nature threw at us in February 2011.

The smallest variety, often called "Stokes Dwarf," usually attains a height and width of about 2 to 3 feet. It can be kept even smaller will regular shearing, if you need to keep it in a tight spot. The leaves become more numerous and quite small when sheared. This look can take on a bonsai appearance.

The weeping form does exactly what the name implies. It grows upright from 10 to 12 feet or more in height, with a weeping habit. The width is typically 7 to 10 feet and can vary quite a bit depending upon individual pruning. This variety takes a unique form, and is usually used as a focal point.

The upright form, usually labeled as "Pride of Houston," is more versatile. It can be used as a hedge, single specimen multior single-trunked tree, or can be sheared into just about any form needed. It can grow 10 to 15 feet tall and wide or can be kept at more manageable size with regular shearing or pruning.

All forms need full to partial sun with average soil. They look their best with regular watering and feeding. Iron or a soil acidifier will help plants that don't respond to fertilizer.

Prune or shear as necessary, and don't wait until it grows "out of bounds" to shape it. Give it a "shower" once in while to help keep mites at bay, especially in our hot dry climate. This rule also goes for junipers, cypress and other trees and shrubs.

Although these plants are not the fastest growing, they do make an excellent choice for a low-maintenance, disease-free shrub or tree that stays green all year long.

Mojito

2 teaspoons sugar 6 to 8 mint leaves, plus more for garnish Club soda 1 lime, halved

2 ounces light rum

Place the sugar, the mint leaves, and a little club soda in a highball glass. Muddle well to dissolve the sugar and to release the mint flavor. Squeeze the juice from both halves of the lime into the glass. Drop one half of the lime into the glass. Add the rum. Stir well. Fill the glass with ice cubes. Old-Fashioned

1 sugar cube 2 to 3 dashes Angostura bitters 2 orange slices 3 ounces bourbon Maraschino cherry, for garnish

Place the sugar cube at the bottom of an old-fashioned glass. Saturate the cube with the bitters. Add one orange slice. Muddle these ingredients. Fill the glass with ice cubes.

Add the bourbon. Stir well. Garnish with a second orange slice and a maraschino cherry. (Recipe adapted from http:// cocktails.about.com.)

Strawberry Basil Smash Cocktail

1.5 ounces vodka 5 strawberries, leafy ends removed 5 fresh basil leaves 1 lemon, plus more for garnish Drizzle honey Club soda

In a mixing glass, thoroughly muddle strawberries with the basil. Squeeze in the juice of one lemon and a drizzle of honey. Swirl with vodka. Fill a Collins glass with ice and pour your mixture into the glass. Top it off with club soda.

Caipirinha

1 lime, quartered 2 teaspoons fine sugar 2 ounces cachaca

A muddling good time Cocktails that pop only a flick of the wrist away

"To muddle" is a term that can have several meanings, depending on the context in which it is used.

To some, muddling has a negative connotation. Those who are full of doom and gloom refer to it to mean "bring into disorder or a confusing state." When you muddle things, you basically add chaos to the mix, and who wants that?

Others, however, use muddle to infer the act of busying oneself. This use, sadly, also has negative implications, since "muddling around" usually signifies that whatever task is being completed is being done ineffectively.

There is another definition of the word muddle, however, and this one looks on the bright side of the misunderstood word. This version of muddle means to mix or stir into a drink.

Muddling usually is done in the bottom of a mixing glass, by pressing the solid ingredients you want combined before adding the liquid ingredients. This allows the ingredients to fuse better and bring their flavors to the forefront by bruising them.

Think of the sugar and mint used in a mojito, or the bitters, orange slices and sugar used in old-fashions – these ingredients are smashed together to enhance their flavors and add a "pop" to your refreshing beverage.

Other drinks that require the act of muddling are Caipirinha, Brazil's national cocktail made from cachaça – fermented sugar cane – sugar and lime; and Caipiroska, the vodka-based take on the Caipirinha, also popular in many South American countries.

Even the mint juleps you plan on serving during your Kentucky Derby party Saturday, May 5, are in need of some muddling.

But how does one muddle?

When muddling your drink ingredients, an ordinary spoon won't suffice. Also, forget the handle of your spatula.

To efficiently and effectively muddle, one must turn to the muddler.

What is it?

The muddler – a bartender's best friend, next to the bottle opener – is used to mash fruits, herbs or

spices to infuse their flavor into a cocktail. A slender pestle-shaped stick, usually measuring about 7 to 8 inches, the muddler resembles a mini baseball bat. Commonly made from wood, the muddler can also be found in plastic, silicone and stainless steel varieties.

Many modern-day muddlers feature small teeth on the bottom. They will puncture the ingredients easier, causing them to bruise and release their essential oils faster.

It is suggested to use a traditional, smoother surfaced muddler for your herb concoctions and the spiked variety for those involving fruit and other thick ingredients.

How does it work?

Don't let the name intimidate you – the muddler is easy to use and once you master the technique, you'll become the go-to mixologist of your loved ones' get togethers and parties.

First, place the fruit, herbs or spices into a tall, wide glass. This can be done directly in the drinking glass or in another container and poured to the drinking glass. If you can't decide, ask yourself if you want floating bits or mashed ingredients in your cup or not.

Add sugar to the ingredients, if creating a sweet cocktail. The sugar will act as an abrasive and will help the muddler do its job.

Grip the muddler and use the wide end to mash the ingredients into the bottom of the glass. Do this in a press-and-twist motion as you would do when using a mortar and pestle.

It's important to remember that you want the muddler to release the ingredient's juice, oils or flavors without demolishing the item. It might take a couple tries to get a handle on the correct amount of pressure.

When you're done, pour the ice and liquid ingredients into your glass, give it a quick shake and transfer into your cocktail glass. Toss the muddler in the sink and wash with warm, soapy water.

Where can it be found?

A popular drink-making accessory, the muddler can be found at just about any store that carries bar equipment. Places around town include Target and Bed, Bath & Beyond, among others.

How much does it cost?

Depending on the material and brand, a muddler can cost anywhere from less than \$10 to more than \$20. In general, a simple, wooden muddler will be less expensive than its stainless steel counterpart.

How about on Mother's Day? Treat Mom (or the moms you know) to a leisurely Sunday drive along the Organ Mountain foothills or hike the Pine Tree Trail or Baylor Pass at Aguirre Springs. Then indulge her a bit more with a sumptuous dinner at your place.

The Zucchini Vino AWE Gratin, chock-full with fresh herbs, is simply splendid. Made rich and creamy with crème fraîche, its spiciness and crunch come from chile-seasoned pecans.

Perhaps Mom would prefer lighter fare – Grilled Sake Salmon topped with Watermelon-Sesame Salsa or a Fresh 'n' Easy Herb Garden Salad. Maybe Jazzed Bowtie Pasta tossed with broccoli buds, fresh spinach, sun-dried tomatoes and serrano bits.

Each offer promises to be just as special as Mom and just as vibrant as our springtime in the desert.

Zucchini AWE Gratin

Fresh herbs are key to this dish.

1 tablespoon unsalted butter, room

temperature, plus 1 1/2 tablespoons 1 large (about 1/4 cup) shallot, finely diced Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper 2 medium cloves (about 2 teaspoons) garlic finely chonned

garlic, finely chopped 1/3 cup dry white wine, such

as Sauvignon Blanc

1/4 cup crème fraîche

6 medium zucchinis, diagonally

sliced 1/2-inch thick

- 1 tablespoon fresh thyme, chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh mint, chopped 1 tablespoon fresh flat leaf parsley, chopped
- 1 cup fresh breadcrumbs
- 1/3 cup chile-seasoned pecans,
- finely chopped
- 1/2 cup grated Gruyère

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Drizzle of extra virgin olive oil Adjust oven rack to center position and preheat the oven to 400 degrees. In a medium skillet, melt 1 tablespoon butter over medium-low heat. Add the shallot, season with salt and pepper, and cook, stirring frequently, until softened, about 2 minutes. Add the garlic, and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute longer. Add the wine, bring the mixture to a boil, and then add the crème fraîche. Stir until melted, and then remove from heat.

In a large bowl, add the zucchini, thyme, mint and parsley. Season with salt and pepper, and add the shallot and wine mixture. Toss well and place in a lightly greased 9-by-13inch rectangular baking dish. In another bowl, combine the crumbs, pecans, cheese and remaining 1 1/2 tablespoons butter with fingertips until the mixture is crumbly. Season with salt and pepper and spread evenly over the zucchini. Drizzle lightly with olive oil and cover the baking dish with foil. Place the baking dish on a baking sheet, transfer to oven, and then lower oven to 375 degrees. Bake, covered, for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Remove foil, and bake uncovered until the topping is golden brown and crisp, 5 to 10 minutes. Transfer to a cooling rack and let cool 5 minutes before serving. Makes 4 to 6 servings. (Recipe inspired by Kerry Saretsky, French Revolution Food.)

Jazzed Bowtie Pasta Salad

1 (12-ounce) package bowtie pasta 1/4 cup broccoli buds, chopped 1/2 cup fresh parsley, finely chopped 1/2 cup fresh spinach, finely chopped 1/2 cup sun-dried tomatoes, minced 1/2 cup onion, minced 1 serrano or jalapeño pepper,

stemmed, seeded and minced 1 cup Italian or Vidalia salad

dressing or to taste Prepare pasta according to package directions; drain well. In a large bowl, combine pasta and remaining ingredients; toss gently. Cover and chill tossing occasionally. Serve chilled or at room temperature. Makes 6 servings.

Marinated Sake Salmon with Watermelon-Sesame Salsa 4 salmon fillets

Marinade: 2 cups seedless puréed watermelon 3 ounces grated fresh ginger 1 cup sake 1 tablespoon soy sauce

1 tablespoon rice wine vinegar 1 teaspoon chile pepper flakes

1 teaspoon salt

In a medium-sized bowl, mix marinade ingredients together. Add salmon fillets and marinate for at least 30 minutes to meld flavors. In the meantime, prepare salsa.

Grill the salmon fillets or roast in a preheated olive oiled baking dish at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. Arrange the fillets on a bed of mixed greens, top with salsa and serve. Makes 4 servings.

Salsa:

1 cup seeded watermelon, diced 1/4 cup red onion, diced 1/2 cucumber, diced 1 tablespoon toasted dark sesame oil 1/2 cup rice wine vinegar 1 to 2 chiles de arbol, crushed (or

similar dried chile pepper)
3 to 4 leaves of fresh mint, chopped
1/4 bunch of cilantro, chopped
2 teaspoons sugar

1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil


Mix and adjust seasoning and sesame oil to taste.

Las Cruces Bulletin Take the deal before it's gone Don't wait to take advantage of solar incentives

Don't you just hate it when you learn about a great deal after it's gone?

One key solar incentive drops 20 percent on July 1. The common response I get is "Oh, yeah, the tax credits. I guess they are going away." Yet, that is not what I am speaking of. The tax credits are not changing any time soon. Purchasing a solar PV system still entitles you to a 10 percent state tax

A key solar incentive, the most misunderstood solar incentive, is about to drop. Like most people, you may not even know what it is, or that it exists at all.

The second common response I get is "Oh, yeah, you're talking about the price when you sell extra electricity to the electric company." But that's not it, either.

Unfortunately, this valuable program will be over soon. Many people living in Las Cruces who purchase their power from El Paso Electric Co. are going to miss out on a program they didn't even know existed. In fact, when people ask me why our city is not covered in solar panels, I respond, "Because despite all our efforts to get the word out, most people still

don't know or understand the Renewable Energy Certificate (REC) program and its benefits."

El Paso Electric does not advertise or promote the REC program. Yet this single program, once explained, has driven the explosion of solar PV installations across the Mesilla Valley in the past three years. New installations go live every day, but most homes in the valley have yet to add solar.

Consider a program that pays you a bonus of 10 cents for every kilowatt hour your PV system generates. The last statement confuses people. Let's state that again. If you don't have solar PV on your home, you're missing out on being paid 10 cents per kilowatt hour for every kilowatt hour generated by your PV system.

I'm not referring to the electricity you save by making it yourself. You get that, too. I'm not talking about selling excess electricity back to El Paso Electric. You can also do that.

The REC program is independent from and in addition to those. The REC program pays you for every kilowatt hour your system generates, whether you use it or not.

So here is a program that pays you for making electricity, even the electricity you use. If you wait much longer, you'll miss it. This program was put in place by the state of New Mexico to incentivize folks just like you to install solar PV systems.

There are a few more important details you should understand. First, the REC program is temporary and REC payments end Dec. 31, 2020. That's eight and a half years from now, plenty of time to help pay for your PV system. Second, REC rates are declining every six months for new applications.

The next rate drop is July 1. If you are enrolled before July 1, you lock in the 10 cents rate.

For new people entering the program after June 30, the rate drops from 10 cents to 8 cents per kilowatt hour - a 20 percent drop. All of you folks who move quickly enough to get into the program before July 1 continue to enjoy the full 10 cents through the year 2020.

If you've been thinking about solar, or if you've been worried about the investment, make the call and learn more. Whatever you do, don't put it off. Solar prices are low and incentives are still high, but only for another 58 days. After all, don't you just hate it when you learn about a great deal after it's gone?
