Field testing earns praise

NIE saves billions, improves warfare

How does deploying thousands of soldiers to the desert lands of White Sands Missile Range save the military billions of dollars?

When those soldiers let top Pentagon officials know what high-dollar technology works and doesn't in the field before there are large procurements that may end up being of little use in the hills of Afghanistan or the deserts of the Middle East. That's the value of the Network Integration Evaluation exercise now being held at WSMR in conjunction with Fort Bliss.

According to Lt. Gen. Bill Phillips, military deputy to the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Acquisition, Logistics and Technology, who visited the WSMR as the field exercises started earlier this month, previous NIEs have saved the military more than \$6 billion.

For the second time this calendar year, the range is hosting 5,000 soldiers, support staff and civilian contractors testing a variety of systems – primarily wireless communication and reconnaissance technology – in the field.

The Department of Defense has announced the death of a soldier from Las Cruces.

Staff Sgt. Israel P. Nuañes, 38, died Saturday, May 12, in Afghanistan, of wounds sustained from an improvised explosive device.

Nuañes was assigned to 741st Ordnance Company, Fort Bliss, Texas, part of the 84th Ordnance Battalion, 71st Ordnance Group.

Congressman Steve Pearce sent his sympathies the family. "We will never forget the sacrifice he made to defend our nation and preserve our freedoms," Pearce said.

Ogas bounces back from serious illness

Baseball tournament named for Mayfield High educator

Ask Bob Ogas and the 71-yearold will tell you he's a firm believer in the power of prayer.

In late February, Ogas was stricken with what doctor's believe to have been a hemorrhagic stroke. By March, the robust retired educator and coach was in an intensive care unit in Albuquerque with many fearing the worst.

So many people have had their lives somehow touched by the former Mayfield High School principal and coach, the prayers and offers of support came pouring in as Ogas lay in a highly sedated state with brain scans and a multitude of tests not giving doctors a clear diagnosis, other than knowing there was severe bleeding in the brain.

Even as he was been taken off the medical plane for transport to the University of New Mexico Neuroscience Center, one of the nurses who was a former student recognized him. That happened again when he transferred to a rehabilitation hospital.



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Downtown group touts partnership

Council hears proposal for revitalization effort

Las Cruces City Council, at a work session on Monday, May 14, introduced to the community the private portion of a private-public partnership forming to redevelop Downtown.

Las Crucen Bob Pofahl of cbiholdings led the sessions, which consisted of both live and pre-recorded mini-presentations by members of the team, including consultants Susan Henderson, design director of PlaceMakers in Albuquerque, and California urbanist and plaza specialist Stefanos Polyziodes.

A key element of the project would be a plaza that reflects the spirit of historic plazas of New Mexico and serves as the hub for a vibrant commercial, cultural and residential Downtown community.

City Manager Robert Garza said the next step will be for staff to prepare a resolution that would specify option-to-lease terms for property acquisition and deleniate the responsibili-

ties of the partnership team and the city.

In order for mixed-use development to occur, the city will need to adopt what Henderson called form-based zoning for the district.

She said current, traditional zoning forbids mixing residential and commercial functions. Form-based zoning, on the other hand, regulates the physical characteristics of buildings rather than uses.

Henderson said following the meeting that revamping the zoning code and addressing the location and design

of the plaza – the proposed centerpiece of Downtown – likely would be simultaneous first steps taken to move the project forward.

In the presentations, she and other speakers stressed the importance of a transparent process that incorporates community

Pofahl said the team of investors, developers and consultants will listen to the community, create a strategic plan, work with the city and the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership, provide project management and market Downtown.

The speakers showed pictures of transformations in places such as San Marcos, Texas; Petaluma, Calif.; Taos, N.M.; and

They also presented drawings of how Downtown could be transformed into what they envision as an economically and socially viable mixed-use commercial and residential community that reflects the history of Las Cruces.

Although some members of council asked challenging follow-up questions, the council was, for the most part, enthusiastic about the project.

We're putting together a dream team," said Mayor Ken Miyagishima, one of the city officials who reacted favorably to the presentation.

Helping kids graduate

Community efforts making a significant difference



You are in ninth grade.

Your father is nowhere to be found, but your mother has two young daughters, a full-time job and two part-time jobs. Rent is a monthly battle, so you took a job at a fast food restaurant to help out.

You are too young to drive, so a friend takes you to work. Except that his car is constantly breaking down and you've been late to work two of your last three shifts. Your boss said if you're late again, you could lose your job.

You try to help out and baby sit your younger sisters, but there are some skills you just don't have. There are kids at school who are constantly harassing you, but you also have good friends.

Your mom has been sick all week and you've made dinner for her and yourself and your sisters, but there's really not that much food to go around.

If you were able to work more than 15 hours a week, you might be able to help out more.

And, by the way, you've got an English paper to write.

This is an extreme example, but there are students in Doña Ana County who face these situations and worse. It's enough to make a kid want to drop out, and many do. Ninth grade is the year they're most likely to do it.

Others come from comparatively cushy situations, but still drop out. In 2010-11, 468 high school students dropped out.

Why?

One student said it was to go to work. Three said they were pregnant and unable to return. Four cited child care problems.

The overwhelming majority, however – 202 gave no reason at all. Ninety-eight more were simply no-shows.

In Doña Ana County, students are failing to show up in alarming numbers and a lack of success is naturally following.

A few years ago, some astute adults took notice and started to do something about it. Now there are dozens of people passionately dedicated to improving the situation, attacking the problem from many different angles.

Cohort graduation rates, meaning the percentage of students who enter high school in ninth grade and successfully graduate with their class as seniors, were hovering between 50 and 60 percent in Las Cruces Public Schools as recently as 2008. That rate is now in the mid-70s.

How is it happening?

There are alternative and charter schools

for students who just don't fit – socially or academically – in the traditional comprehensive high schools.

There is the Arrowhead Park Early College High School, which, two years into its existence has still not seen a single dropout.

There is the Graduation Reality And Dualrole Skills (GRADS) program that works with young parents and features classes to help them improve parenting skills and deal with the accompanying stressors. Las Cruces and Oñate high schools even have their own day care programs.

To continue the momentum, LCPS is implementing two new programs.

In each of the comprehensive high schools, one assistant principal will be designated to focus on ninth-grade transition.

"Research shows it's tough to make that eighth- to ninth-grade transition," said Steven Sanchez, LCPS associate superintendent. "But if they can get through to 10th grade, they tend to stay."

These assistant principals will be tasked with keeping eyes on conflicts and focusing on communication.

A second program is geared toward math. Each of the comprehensive high schools will be hiring designated math teachers to work with cohorts of students in algebra and geometry. Having one teacher work with at-risk math students will lend continuity and understanding and enable, in many cases, students to complete all three classes in the space of two years.

A burgeoning community-based program working on the issue is the Bridge, which, through public and private partnerships, has created a three-way communication between our secondary schools, our colleges (Doña Ana Community College and New Mexico State University) and the business community.

Bottom line, if our children aren't educated successfully, they can't strive for more, and if they can't achieve more, our local businesses suffer because they can't hire skilled people.

'We have a truly amazing collaborative community," said Tracey Bryan, executive director of the Bridge. "In 2007, as a county, our dropout rate was 46 percent. In 2011, it

Bryan believes it is critical for all of us to find ways to be around these young people and help them see a positive vision for the future.

"We all have a role in mentoring young people," Bryan said.
"Our job is getting them through the short-

term crisis to see the bigger picture," Bryan

So, to the high school graduates of 2012, congratulations. A job well done.

And to the potential high school graduates of 2016, we've got our eyes on you.



Gary Johnson faces huge challenges as party's nominee

We can figure Johnson will not have to be listening to his party establishment telling him what he has to say. He won't have high-paid advisers walking back statements or explaining what Johnson really meant.

The libertarian philosophy is a consistent one and Johnson always has been in step with the philosophy. Essentially, people and businesses should have the liberty to do what they want as long as it doesn't hurt others. And if they mess up their lives while doing their thing, they have a personal responsibility to fix the problem. Government isn't going to

It's really very simple. It involves a lot of tolerance of people's differences and a lot of toughness about personal consequences. It means being fiscally conservative and socially liberal. Maybe that doesn't seem to fit, but if

Libertarians had a vote for every time I have heard people describe their personal philosophy that way, they would be a large and powerful party.

Libertarians have mastered one part of our political system quite well. They usually qualify their presidential candidate on all 50 state ballots.

But, they're not good at raising money. Unlike Democrats and Republicans, they have little influence to sell. I realize that is not why people donate to candidates, but it does seem to help. Obtaining federal election funds would be a huge help and that could happen soon.

If Johnson were able to score 5 percent of the vote in November, it would help the party tremendously and make the 2016 picture much rosier. But 1.1 percent is the best a Libertarian presidential candidate has ever been able to

The only other time Libertarians ran an experienced politician for office, it was U.S. Rep. Bob Barr. He only garnered 0.4 percent

of the nationwide vote. But Barr was controversial and abrasive. Johnson is a much nicer guy. He treats his opponents with respect and does not run negative campaigns.

The challenge for Johnson now is to hit 15 percent in some national polls. His big hurdle there is to be included in the polls. Last year, Johnson scored 2 percent in some national Republican polls, which should have been enough to get him on stage, but then the polls quit listing him.

Johnson must somehow crack the mainstream media, left and right, in

order to get into the debates. Both sides seem to be afraid of him. That includes the major polling firms. Johnson can make the presidential race much more interesting if he is given

the opportunity.
Occasionally, third party candidates do break through. Ross Perot did it in 1992 with 16 percent of the vote. And most notably, Teddy Roosevelt, running on the Bull Moose Party ticket in 1912, finished second with 27 percent of the vote, beating Republican incumbent William Howard Taft. Democrat Woodrow Wilson won that race.

In polls that do include Johnson, he currently is running between 6 and 9 percent. If he can get some decent news coverage, that figure could go up. He is now handling questions very deftly and makes for a good interview.

How is Johnson doing in his home state? Last fall, he finished first among Republican candidates with 23 percent of the vote. He hopes to take New Mexico again in November. It will be difficult. By then supporters of the two major party candidates will have become so polarized, they won't want to risk throwing their vote to a third party candidate.

For now, Johnson is visiting state conventions and town halls preaching a message of minimum government and maximum freedom. His attitude about winning it all still is high. He said he and his fiancé are looking forward to a White House wedding.

In a wilderness of political wilderness designations

Today's wilderness movement seeks to exclude humans

Years ago, "wilderness" meant a place where man had not set foot.

Now, after decades of wilderness legislation, no one can define wilderness. It means whatever politicians mean it to mean.

The intense politics around wilderness designations make winners and losers. The winners are the political operatives and lawyers who make their money in courts. The losers are the American public. It is a giant scam.

Take the wilderness problems of Tombstone, Ariz. Their water plant was built before any wilderness designation and served the town well. Last year, a flood damaged the water pipes, which the town wanted to repair. They were told the land now was wilderness and they could not repair their water

How can wilderness mean iron water pipes, roads and water collection areas? It can because the wilderness advocates and the thousands of lawyers who make millions of dollars advocating an odd sort of wilderness designation say that it is.

That got me thinking: We need new terminology to understand American wilderness issues. At opposite ends of a continuum are the concepts, nature and urban. Nature-centric are areas with attributes of nature as opposed to urban-centric with attributes of the urban environment. Compare the wilds of Alaska with New York City.

Where we have problems is when the two intertwine, either just a little or a lot. Some places in America are nature-centric with some urban intrusion. That is where we have the political rub. No matter what anyone says, there are very little virgin



nature landscapes and all of them are in Alaska.

Other places have mostly nature-centric landscapes, but there is always a little urbanization that creeps into nature. So it is the degree of blend that matters, eh?

Speaking of creeps, politicians have perverted the language of wilderness such that wilderness can be a place where planes fly over, there are one hundred years of roads and if you are standing in a high place you can see Walmart trucks on the freeway, but it is a wilderness. It is really nature-centric with urban intrusions?

The question that we have spent almost 50 years on is the purpose of our naturecentric lands. Years ago the idea was to have areas of our country where people could get a good nature-centric experience and then return to their urban-centric

homes. We have lots of forests and mountains that are naturecentric. Then someone decided the deal was to exclude Americans and make areas where essentially no Americans can go.

This is the wilderness movement today. It takes land with roads and houses and cattle operations and attempts to clear the humans from the landscape by making it almost or entirely impossible for Americans to enjoy those nature-centric areas. It is done all in the name of "wilderness preservation."

To be blunt: There are no "wilderness" areas in New Mexico. All the areas have had roads; all have planes flying over, and all have lots of human pressure on them. They

are nature-centric with some urban-centric intrusion. Not wilderness. There has not been wilderness in New Mexico for hundreds of years.

Even Alaska, as remote as it is has planes flying over and into the wilderness areas such as the Brooks Range of moun-

tains. It is the most like the wilderness stories of America in the early 1900s. But remember, even then there were lots of Native Americans already on the land. We have to go back 20,000 years or more to get land not trampled by humans.

So for those trying to curb the urban intrusion, is there some way to do so without scamming people into calling some place wilderness when it obviously is not? The limits of urban intrusion can be managed as long as it does not exclude Americans full access to the land.

There are plenty of nature-centric places in New Mexico to preserve, but not to exclude human entry. When entry must be by foot, it excludes the majority

of Americans. Quit paying millions of dollars to environmental lawyers to exclude Americans from their own land. Preserve the nature-centric areas of New Mexico for all Americans but make sure all Americans can enjoy those areas.


And, are Republicans really conducting a "war on women" because we don't think it is necessary to pay for birth control?

NMSU gives eclipse tips

Southwest offers stunning view of solar phenomena

The first "ring of fire" solar eclipse visible in the United States in 18 years will just miss Las Cruces, but a partial or crescent shaped solar eclipse will be visible across all of the Western U.S. New Mexico State University's Department of Astronomy, along with the Astronomical Society of Las Cruces and the Las Cruces Natural History Museum, invite the public to join them in watching this stunning event at Mesilla Valley Mall from 6 to 8 p.m. Sunday, May 20.

"The sun is a constant in our lives, especially in the Southwest, so it is amazing to see something as dramatic as a solar eclipse happen," said Jillian Bornak, a graduate research assistant in astronomy. "The moon's shadow is small, so it takes the perfect alignment of the Earth, moon and sun for the moon's shadow to fall on the Earth. The next time this arrangement will allow the moon's shadow to cross New Mexico won't be until 2023."

The moon's orbit is slightly oval-shaped, so the distance between the moon and the Earth varies. This determines what kind of eclipse we see. On May 20, the moon will be farther from the Earth, so it will appear smaller than the sun, creating what is called an annular (or ring-shaped), solar eclipse from Texas to Oregon for the first time in 18 years.

The path of the moon's shadow across the Earth will start in southern China, cross the Pacific Ocean near Alaska, race across California, and finish in northern New Mexico and west Texas. A NASA map shows the "ring of fire" eclipse should be visible in a strip of New Mexico from just north of Santa Fe to just south of Roswell. People in the southern part of the state will only catch the outer part of the moon's shadow, so Las Cruces will see only a partial solar eclipse.

The eclipse will take four hours to complete. However, for New Mexico residents, the eclipse will only last two hours before it

is interrupted by sunset. Starting around 6 p.m. on Sunday, the moon will begin to cover the sun. At 7:30 p.m., the moon will block most of the sun and the eclipse will be at its deepest. This will last about four minutes. Then, the moon will slowly uncover the sun. The show will be over at 8 p.m. when the sun sets

Even though the moon will block 90 percent of the sun's light, it is still unsafe to stare directly at the sun and could cause lifelong damage to eyes. NMSU astronomers caution that regular sunglasses do not provide adequate protection to look safely at the sun

If you are unable to attend NMSU's free viewing at the mall, there are still easy ways to safely view the eclipse on May 20. Graduate students will be handing out special sunsafe solar glasses at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market on Saturday, May 19.

A "pinhole camera" is also a safe way to watch the eclipse. You can make one with two pieces of paper or cardboard. Poke a small hole in one piece of paper, hold it up to the sun, and let the light from the pinhole shine on the other piece of paper. This projects the image of the sun like a small television

The pinhole can be any shape. Simply hold the two sheets far enough away from each other that the image of the hole is circular. Do not look at the Sun through the pinhole.

Astronomy graduate students and museum staff will have solar telescopes set up in the southwest parking lot of Mesilla Valley Mall. There will be activities and free handouts at the event. Solar eclipse glasses will be on sale at the event for \$1 each or four for \$3.

Scholarship honors alumna Fund aims to aid engineering students

Friends of Leticia Segovia, a former New Mexico State University student, have established a scholarship honoring her memory after she died last year from cancer.

Segovia was born in Torrance, Calif., and graduated from Las Cruces High School in 1984. She began her studies at NMSU before moving to Albuquerque. In 1989 she earned her bachelor of science in civil engineering from the University of New Mexico. Five years later, she graduated from California State University Long Beach with a master's degree in civil engineering.

It was no surprise to anyone that Segovia chose to study engineering, as she was raised in a family of engineers. Her father, brother, and sister all graduated from NMSU with a bachelor's in civil engineering/civil engineering technology.

ing technology.

The Leticia (Tish) Segovia Memorial Scholarship is intended to support undergraduate civil engineering students at NMSU with the hope of encouraging female Hispanic graduates from the three Las Cruces high schools to pursue engineering as a career.

Lisa Somoza Robles, Julie Ludwig McAfee, Holly Chalekian Warburton and Kathy Kersting were friends of Segovia since high school, and said they believe this scholarship would be the best way to honor her memory because of her dedication to her studies.

"Given Tish's focus on education in so many ways, (we) felt a scholarship in a field in which she excelled would be a great way to promote engineering as a career, especially for women," Kersting said. "This scholarship aims to keep her memory alive, while, most importantly, helping a student achieve his or her engineering degree."

Robles remembered Segovia as an avid reader, often reading more than two books a week.

"I don't ever remember her without a book in her hand," Warburton said. "She was a voracious reader and always encouraged us to read."

Asked what advice Segovia would have given students vying for the scholarship, McAfee said she would have encouraged them to find a balance in life and to do things they enjoy.


"I think she would acknowledge that while the curriculum will be tough at times, students should not give up," Kersting said. "They need to work hard and persevere in order to achieve their engineering degree that will help ensure that they have a successful future."

In addition to being a professional engineer who worked for the Doña Ana County Flood Commission the last nine years of her life, Segovia dedicated much of her time to community service efforts. She volunteered as a member of the Junior League of Las Cruces, Zia Middle School Parent Teacher Organization, Las Cruces High School Booster Club, the Whole Enchilada Fiesta committee and as a religious education teacher at Saint Albert's Parish.

She also donated books for the Junior League's annual book drive. In honor of her dedication to donating books to children in the community, a reading room at the First Step (Healthcare) Center was named in her honor in April 2011.

Soviet space disasters

Gagarin, Komarov medals left on moon

The Lost Cosmonaut debate purports Yuri Gagarin was not the first person in space.

On May 19, 1961, according to the website forteantimes.com, two brothers in Turin, Italy, intercepted a radio signal from a female cosmonaut named "Ludmilla." The 2008 story quoted her alleged transmission: "Talk to me! I am hot! I am hot!" Fortean Times stated "the desperation in the woman's voice was clear." She reported she could "see a flame!" and asked, "Am I going to crash?" Shortly after the "signal went dead."

Fortean Times described the brothers, aged 20 and 23, as "ingenious" and "radio-mad." In 1957, they first "hacked into both Russia's and NASA's space programmes (sic) so effectively that the Russians, it seems, may have wanted them dead."

The incident is one of numerous horrific Cold War-era Soviet conspiracies. Included among them is the death of Valentin Bondarenko, 24, a documented incident that occurred two months before the unconfirmed Lost Cosmonaut. On March 23, 1961, Bondarenko was participating in an isolation exercise, locked in a chamber and breathing a high oxygen content. At some point he inadvertently "tossed ... cotton dipped in alcohol" onto "a hot plate," and an inferno erupted, Michael Cassutt wrote in "Who's Who In Space: The First 25 Years."

"The body was totally denuded of skin, the head of hair; there were no eyes in the face," Dr. Vladimir Golyakhovsky wrote in "Russian Doctor." "But the patient was alive."

Bondarenko died the next day.

"The entire incident, including the young cosmonaut's death and subsequent burial, was suppressed by Soviet officials and not revealed until a quarter of a century later," said "Spaceflight: A Historical Encyclopedia Vol. 2."

On Oct. 24, 1960, as many as 300 engineers,

scientists and military members are believed to have died when an R-7 rocket and ballistic missile exploded at the Baikonur Cosmodrome at Tyuratum, Kazakhstan. Confirmed dead was Mitrofan Nedelin, the Soviet chief marshal of artillery.

Known as the Nedelin Disaster, as well as the Tyuratum Slaughter, the R-7 had already suffered earlier "launch failures," Harry Stine, the New Mexico Museum of Space History's first curator, wrote in "ICBM: The Making of the Weapon That Changed the World."

The R-7, which launched Sputnik and Soviet manned missions, used a volatile hypergolic fuel made up of the liquid fuel and oxidizer that, when combined, instantaneously ignites.

Countdown began on Oct. 23, but at liftoff the rocket failed. Crews remained in the blockhouse. Nedelin, however, feared Premier Nikita Khruschchev's "wrath," Buzz Aldrin and Malcolm McConnell wrote in "Men From Earth." So, around midnight, Stine said Nedelin ordered an inspection.

"Normally," said "Almanac of Soviet Manned Space Flight," "the rocket would be drained of propellants before repairs could begin."

During the hazardous assessment one engineer, Mikhail Yangel, "had a sudden urge for a cigarette," said "The Space Program Quiz & Fact Book." Since safety rules prohibited smoking, "Yangel climbed down into a blockhouse." Stine said as Yangel lit up, "the R-7 blew up" – coincidentally – vaporizing the victims. The explosion illuminated the sky in a 62-mile circumference. That Yangel was in the blockhouse saved his life, and in 1966 he became head of the Russian space program after Sergei Korolev died during a botched surgery.

The Soviets were extremely secretive regarding Korolev and his role, simply referring to him "as being the 'Chief Designer Of Rocket-Cosmic Systems'" said "The Soviet Manned Space Program." Numerous sources cited he was responsible for designing the R-7 ICBM, the Sputniks, and the Vostoks and Voskhods that launched cosmonauts and the first multiple-man crews.

After Leonid Brezhnev replaced Khruschchev in an October 1964 coup, "Spaceflight: A


"Komarov, is about to, literally, crash full speed into Earth, his body turning molten on impact," said npr.org. "As he heads to his doom, U.S. listening posts in Turkey hear him crying in rage, 'cursing the people who had put him inside a botched spaceship."

Shayler said an investigation revealed the

chutes were incorrectly packed.

During a visit to the Soviet Union, NASA astronaut Frank Borman met the widows of Komarov and Gagarin (who died in a 1968 plane crash). The book "Soviet Rocketry" tells how the women gave their husbands' medals to Borman who, "in turn, passed (them) on to the Apollo 11 crew, who left them on the moon."


since the late 1930s when, "at the height of Stalin's purges," he was imprisoned in "concentration camps in Siberia," said russianspaceweb.com. He toiled "in a scientific labor camp, where they designed aircraft and weapons in support of the Allied war effort to defeat Nazi Germany," "The Handy Space Answer Book" documented. The relentless pace of the space race eroded his wellbeing even more. Aldrin and McConnell said Koroley, on Jan. 14, 1966, underwent what was at first believed to be minor abdominal surgery.

Petrovsky, personally operated on Korolev, even
though he had not practiced surgery for several
years. The surgical team discovered a malignant

A gruesome "tragedy that the Soviets did not try to hide" occurred on April 23, 1967, when Col. Vladimir Komarov launched aboard Soyuz 1, said "Spaceflight: A Historical Encyclopedia." Before the mission, technicians were forced to correct 203 faults in the craft, leading Komarov to express "a sense of foreboding," David Shayler wrote in "Disasters and Accidents in Manned Space Flight." His

Drought declared

Gov. Susana Martinez has issued a formal drought declaration for the entire state.

According to State Engineer Scott Verhines, 90 percent of New Mexico faced severe drought conditions at some point during the past year, with the remaining areas facing moderate drought. The 2011 water year was also the second driest on record.

"Drought conditions can create serious problems for many New Mexico communities, farms, ranches and open spaces," Martinez said. "Fire danger is high, water reservoirs run low and, in some cases, we've seen towns like Las Vegas take dramatic steps to reduce basic water consumption in their residents' homes and businesses.

"In addition to the work we're doing at the state level to assist communities facing serious drought conditions, I'm hopeful this declaration will assist them in securing any available federal funding as well."

The drought declaration will also convene the New Mexico Drought Task Force, led by the state engineer, to examine ways the state can prepare for and mitigate problems caused by persistent drought conditions.

Sunland Park actions questioned by auditor

State Auditor Hector Balderas announced findings of a special audit of the City of Sunland Park Monday, May 14, that found constitutional violations and numerous statutory and regulatory violations in its fiscal affairs.

The findings also revealed possible criminal violations related to the fraudulent misappropriation of public money.

Balderas recommended that the secretary of the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) suspend officials of city management identified by the findings. He also recommended further investigation.

"I'm deeply troubled by the severity of the audit's findings, and I strongly recommend that the secretary of Finance and Administration take aggressive action to restore the confidence of the city's citizens in its financial operations," Balderas said.

The 80-page special audit report contains 27 separate findings relating to the city's disbursements from the Border Crossing Fund, procurement, budget, adjustments to utility accounts, capital assets, cash and investments, travel and per diem, the Fire Protection Fund and compliance with the Open Meetings Act.

The special audit confirmed the fraudulent misappropriation of public funds from the city's Border Crossing Fund by former Mayor Pro Tem Daniel Salinas.

The audit's findings show the city expended \$42,161.35 from the restricted Border Crossing Fund as a result of fraudulent invoices submitted by EnviroSystems Management Consultants Inc. (EMC) and the Diaz Consulting Firm. Balderas said the money was used to pay for prostitutes for Salinas and the city's former public information officer, Arturo Alba, during a trip to Mexico.

The funds also were used to pay the costs of a campaign video for Salinas and to pay a private investigator who filmed a video used to extort Salinas' mayoral opponent.

The city violated the state procurement code by hiring Frank Coppler as city attorney without a competitive sealed bid process, the audit found. The city has paid Coppler \$481,378 in legal fees.

The city violated the procurement code in its award of a \$2.4 million contract to EMC without a sealed bid process, according to Balderas. Once again, the money used was from the Border Crossing Fund.

The city violated state law in fiscal year 2010 by exceeding its approved budgeted expenditures for the Joint Utility Fund in the amount

of \$769,882.

Balderas said former City Manager Jaime Aguilera and Salinas illegallly reduced customers' utility billings. One bill was reduced from \$767 to \$195.80. Auditors found no evidence that the city manager reduced the bills based on criteria approved by the City Council. In July 2010, the City Council also forgave approximately \$200,000 in utility bills for residential customers in violation of the Anti-Donation Clause and state law.

Balderas said he will refer the findings of the special audit to the appropriate oversight and law enforcement agencies, including the governor, DFA, the Third Judicial District Attorney, the State Police, the Tax Fraud Investigations

Division of the Taxation and Revenue Department, the Attorney General, the FBI, the U.S. Attorney for the District of New Mexico and the Legislative Finance Committee.

Balderas said he will work with the governor and DFA to secure forensic auditing services as part of the ongoing efforts to aggressively audit the city's finances and its officials.

Balderas commended Sunland Park Mayor Pro Tem Isabel Santos for helping expedite the public release of the special audit.

"I appreciate the mayor pro-tem's commitment to transparency," Balderas said. "Embracing the special audit's recommendations is a positive step forward in improving the city's financial situation."

With each NIE, the massive operation gets more complex to create real-world conditions and situations, Army officials said. The current exercise being referred to as NIE 12.2 has a detailed scenario and many miles to cover.

The NIE scenario has a "foreign government" unit pinned down by a cabal of terrorists, insurgents and criminals in the San Andres Mountains near the northwest border of White Sands National Monument. Troops have "deployed" from Fort Bliss onto the missile range to travel to the conflict area and return.

WSMR Commander Brig. Gen. John Ferarri said NIE 12.2 will focus on testing the systems as the troops travel over the long distances and rough terrain that make up much of the range. The range's 3,000 square miles can quickly become 5,000 square miles with the cooperation of local ranchers and the Lincoln National Forest – where some of the last NIE exercises were held to approximate the elevation, terrain and foliage of Afghanistan.

With the range's controls on air space and sparse population, WSMR provides the ideal location for the field testing, Ferarri said. Add WSMR's technologically skilled work force, and there's no better place for the NIE. "When you take all of those factors into account, the NIE can go nowhere else," he said.

Ten weeks of planning have led to the six weeks of NIE field exercises, during which more than 30 systems and other products get taken out and pushed to their limits.

One of those systems is the General Dynamics-developed JTRS HMS Manpack and Rifleman Radios and the Warfighter Information Network-Tactical (WIN-T) network, which provides high-speed communications for ground forces.

At the main command center on the range, Col. Dave Miller said there is more to the NIE than saving money and putting workable technology in the hands of soldiers. It's the military's attempt to give those soldiers the same access to modern technology their potential enemies posses. Large acquisitions were made in slow, 10-year cycles before, he said. Under NIE, new systems can be developed within two years – with a stronger focus on making them more flexible for updating than replacement, he said.

Critical is the soldier feedback on how the system or technology works – or doesn't work – in a battlefield setting, Col. Mike Harris said. Soldiers can show developers in the field any difficulties they are having and even offer suggestions for improvements, he said.

The main backbone for communications is a secured wireless communication system that can send data and images along with the more traditional radio communications, said Col Dan Panell. An Internet model that is proving useful are "chatrooms" in which updates and observations are made much like text messaging, he said. That is easier and more reliable to track than multiple radio communications, he said. Along with tracking devices on all the vehicles and soldiers, command has nearly real-time "situational awareness" of operations, he said.

The new systems also have been responsive to soldier feedback, Panell said. There is more redundancy of systems – less of what Panell calls "the Death Star Syndrome," in which everything may rely on one key piece of equipment, but there could still be some consolidation of the large master computer screens in the field commands, he said.

she was able to master English, which led her to getting a teaching degree at the University of New Mexico. She eventually was an administrator of Albuquerque Public Schools programs for students needing help with their English.

By the time the new school opens in August, Porter said the goal is to start with about 200 students between the ages of 14 and 18. There will be seven bilingually certified teachers in core content areas – science, social studies, English, math, English as a Second Language, special education and physical education.

Porter is currently interviewing interested teachers.

School hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday for the high-schoolers, Porter said. The school – located in the former Las Cruces Furniture building on the south end of Downtown Main Street that is now being re-opened - will be open until 10 p.m. to offer night classes for adults seeking to learn English or to finish their education if language was the primary barrier.

Porter said some people believe there will be a charge for the adult classes, which isn't the case. Funded by the state Public Education Department, the school's adult classes are offered at no charge, she said.

The school's instruction will have a strong English immersion approach, said local governance board President Ben Dominguez.

New to New Mexico

The New America School was founded in Colorado in 2004 with two campuses in Denver. Now there are four campuses in Colorado and the Las Cruces school will be the second campus in New Mexico.

The target population for New America Schools is new immigrant students not enrolled, and English language learners who are not succeeding in traditional high schools. Porter said the school is not exclusively for learning English and those who meet the requirements can earn their diploma.


"I've already heard from some parents who are attracted to the smaller class," Porter said.

The school will feature a "Newcomer Center," in which students spend four hours as day in intensive English instruction.

The school's instruction follows New Mexico state standards, Porter said, and has a strong focus on "scaffolded" learning, in which teachers build on concepts to reinforce them in several different ways, according to the New America School website.

Porter spent the past academic year working at the New America charter school in Albuquerque. There she saw whole families taking English classes – the children in the daytime, the parents at night classes. One young man who was only a few credits short of graduating got his high school diploma through the New America School, which he attended without telling anybody else in his family until he completed school, she said.

"I could see just how powerful the school can be," she said.

"At first, he couldn't walk, he couldn't talk," said his wife, Olivia Ogas.

"It was the weirdest feeling I've ever had – not just weird, but frustrating," Bob Ogas said.

Ogas is very active in the Las Cruces Breakfast Optimist and RodRunners clubs. His friends rallied to put on the annual Wheels of Dreams car show and he also has been a key organizer of summer all-star baseball tournament in Las Cruces, which has now been renamed Bob Ogas North/South All-Start Baseball Classic.

Now back home and attending regular therapy to continue regaining his walking and talking abilities, Ogas said he feels odd about the honor, noting that he has always had many people putting on the all-star event.

Ogas said the idea for the tournament came out of conversations with Al Sutton, a high school baseball coach out Alamogordo in the early 1970s. The only way the state's coach association would agree to sanctioning an all-star baseball tournament was if it wouldn't cost the organization anything, Ogas said.

That's when he pulled in the sponsorship of the local Optimist Club and the north-south games have become a summer staple, often visited by coaches from junior colleges looking for talented players. Similar all-star tournaments have since sprung up around the state for different sports using the Las Cruces

Ogas is just starting to get caught up on thanking all those

who sent their wishes and prayers.
"I didn't know I had that many friends," he said.
In 2005, Ogas retired a Mayfield High School's principal following a battle of wills with then Superintendent Louis Martinez in which his supporters sported "Viva Ogas" bumper stickers that can still be found on cars in Las Cruces. He had been Mayfield's principal since 1991, its assistant principal since 1985 and was a longtime business teacher and coach at the high school.

Ogas is originally from Silver City, where he met and married his wife of 50 years. Happy to be home, Ogas said he also beginning to attend meeting of the clubs, but he not yet up to organizing events. In addition to physical therapy, Ogas also has therapy to hone his cognitive thinking skills, which he jokes was probably lacking even before the stroke.

If the affable Ogas is once again cracking jokes, then that's a good a sign as any that he's on the mend.




"I am proud of our graduate students for taking on the project," he said. "This project

Aggies are still in WAC hunt

NMSU needs to sweep SJSU, get help from Hawai'i

New Mexico State University Baseball Coach Rocky Ward doesn't believe his baseball team is in a slump, despite the fact the Aggies had only won two of their last 10 games (as of Thurssday, May 17).

"We played Baylor at Baylor," he said. "We played poorly at home against Texas Tech and we played one of the most difficult teams in the country to play on the road at Hawai'i'

Ward has a point. Baylor is rated no lower than seventh in any current baseball poll, and Hawai'i is halfway across the Pacific Ocean and has a 24-11 record at home.

The coach is willing to admit that the Aggies have not been playing their best baseball lately.

"Through the stretch, we haven't played great baseball," he said. "Traditionally, we struggled in Hawai'i – as most teams do – and traditionally we have struggled against Fresno.


"I was disappointed in our effort (against Fresno State) even though we did win a great baseball game in the doubleheader Saturday, a 12-inning, 2-1 game in which we played outstanding baseball. We just didn't play well enough in the other two."

Only a few weeks ago New Mexico State (32-20, 8-7 Western Athletic Conference) was rated in the top-25 for four weeks in a row and at one time posted a 14-game winning streak. The Aggies seemed to be destined for a NCAA at-large bid even if they failed to win the Western Athletic Conference Tournament May 23-27 in Mesa, Ariz.

Ward said the Aggies RPI rating is still good enough for an at-large bid, but the Aggies need to finish well in league play to solidify their chances at a bid.

"Our RPI is very high, so we can qualify for the tournament through our RPI but that is not the only criteria they use," he said. "One of the criteria they use is how you finish in the league.

The 2011-12 school year has ended for the city's high school sports teams, and while there may not have been as many state champions as in years past, there was a lot to like about the accomplishments this year.

"It was another good year," said Las Cruces Public Schools Athletics Director Ernest Viramontes. "Everybody went to the state tournaments in the majority of sports. And it's exciting starting a new high school."

Centennial High School will open its doors and begin competition at the Class 4A level in August, but the school has already begun hiring coaches.

Head coaches hired so far this spring include Al Rosen for volleyball, Aaron Ocampo for football, Steve Heredia for boys basketball, Lori Selby for girls basketball, Mike Montoya for cross country, Daniel Loya for boys soccer and Oscar Mendoza for girls

The school year began with Mesilla Valley Christian

Schools winning the state championship in football for the first time in the young program's history. After winning the Class A title, head coach Charles Gleghorn took the head coaching job at Hobbs and was replaced this spring by former Mayfield head coach Mike

Mayfield and Las Cruces High once again qualified for the state football playoffs. Mayfield came close to yet another state championship, but fell to Cleveland, 42-28, in the title game.


The city's first state champions didn't come until February when Las Cruces High School wrestler Gabriel Castillo won it all in the 152-pound division. Castillo defeated Jimmy Quintela of Carlsbad 13-7 in the championship match and had a 42-4 record as a senior.

second in the league, if we sweep San Jose we will finish first or second and that's the first hurdle."

"We are still in a position where we can win the league," Ward said. "We have lost control of our own destiny. We have to beat San Jose (21-25, 5-10 WAC) three times at San Jose, and Hawai'i (28-22, 8-7 WAC) would have to beat Nevada (30-21, 10-5 WAC) two out of three."

The Aggies' coach said strange endings are normal in the WAC.

"It seems like every year in this league these crazy scenarios happen," he said. "What you think midway through the season is going to happen gets thrown up in the air.

"Five of the seven teams have led the league at one point in time."

Ward said not to count out his baseball team.

"We are not playing terrible baseball," he said. "We have kind of run in to circumstances and the key will be what we do when we go on the road this weekend and see if we can get going."

Ward said the Aggies lost starting shortstop Zach Voight celebrating the walk off home against Fresno State.

"We didn't have him available the next day," Ward said. "We packed it up some and will be without him for another week to 10 days. Hopefully, we will have him back in time for the conference tournament."

Ward said the team remains "cautiously optimistic."

Making too many annoying waggles?

Ease up on your friends by adopting a steady 10-second, pre-shot routine

Question. I was watching the Players Championship as they were showing the leader, Kevin Na, on the tee, not once or twice, but several times, going through a pre-shot routine that was truly annoying to watch.

He would take the club back part way, reset, and do it again a few more times. Then he would get set like he planned to hit the ball, and then he would wave the club sideways, like a baseball pre-swing, and then start over again. When he hit the shot it was almost always striped down the middle.

I noticed the golf media has made an issue of this, and I was wondering what you thought about this situation.

Dr. Golf: I too was taken aback by Kevin Na's double-clutching on the tee.

I hadn't seen that since Sergio Garcia did his 30 to 40 re-grips with his irons a few years ago. Sergio stood over the ball milking his grips like he was in a barn with a cow. But he overcame that problem and now has a relatively normal routine.

Na isn't a Charles Barkley, who takes ridiculous in golf to a new level; but for a tour pro to have that much trouble getting set it was tough to watch. In the case of Na, I don't know. Na came on the tour when he was 17 - a virtual child golf prodigy. He's a really good player, and has won once on tour, last year in La Vegas, Nev.

We probably would never hear about this if it weren't for Na's stellar play for 54 holes of the Players Championship. He has been doing some version of double-clutching for a while.

He's the same fellow who hit four balls

out of bounds at the 2011 Valero Texas Open and took a 16 on one hole. Fortunately, he is the type of person who puts things in some perspective, and was able to make that performance into a matter of humor. He's not like John Daly, who does that crazy stuff as a matter or routine.

Now Na is sort of under the microscope because millions of viewers saw his behavior and now he is the butt of a lot of jokes.

Na, who was the 54-hole leader, closed in the final round of the Players with a 76, putting him in a tie for 7th. I think he became overly self-conscious, and was not focusing on what he needed to do on the golf course. Plus there were hecklers abounding in the gallery that upset him. One guy bellowed out that he had \$2,000 riding on Na and "you better not start choking." Another fool outside the ropes shouted "pull the trigger," as Na went through his machinations.

That's not the kind of thing that we like to see in the world of golf, but it's getting worse. The Masters seems to be the only venue that won't tolerate that kind of unsportsmanlike behavior in the gallery. At Augusta they would have ushered that rude patron to the gates and probably roughed him up in the process.

I'm not sure where spectator golf is headed but I feel confident in one thing: gone are the days where you could hear a pin drop as a tour player was about to hit his shot. Many fans come to watch golf, have a good time and are overserved in the process. The golfers are going to be forced to speed up their reactions so that they don't provide an opportunity for the patrons to call out unnerving chatter. As for Kevin Na and his mental problems, he was forthcoming to the press corps after Saturday's round, saying that he just couldn't "pull the trigger" with everything that was riding on

PGA Tour golfers regard the Players

Championship as their "fifth major;" and maybe it will turn into that in a few years, which would foul up historical statistics. Na said he was on the clock for his slow play and apologized for his countless waggles.

Still, he was the third round leader by one shot. But he folded on Sunday, finishing 5 strokes behind winner Matt Kuchar.

"I deserve it," said Na in the press room after the day was done. "I do need to work on my pre-shot routine. I do need to play faster. But the average golfer has no clue how much pressure we're playing under and how tough it is and how much of a fight it is mentally.

"I honestly think with all that going on, I did pretty well fighting. I had a good fight. I hung in there, so you know what, I just take the positive from it."

Na is a fine player and good for the tour. If I were his teacher I would get him to the range and bring a stopwatch. I would tell him that it doesn't matter

what pre-shot rehearsal he makes as long it is not more than 10 seconds before he makes his actual swing. Ten seconds; that's all.

What about you and I? Let's you and I build a routine that takes only 10 seconds, from the time we address the ball. If we have an impossible time making that a habit then it's time to get help.

When asked what the solution to Na's problems is, one sports shrink at the Players Championship remarked, "He needs an

Question. My son is a decent golfer and I hope he gets better.

He just turned 15 and hits the ball farther than any other kid I've seen in town. He hasn't had much in the way of golf instruction or coaching but he has great potential. Yet, one thing bothers me. He has an awful temper and complains on every shot - even good shots. He sometimes throws clubs, and he has broken a couple during tournaments. Any suggestions?

Ted G. Las Cruces

Dr. Golf. Temper tantrums are a common problem for young players.

I think kids today are coddled far too much and not disciplined properly in general, but that's my bias as a member of an older generation.

Unfortunately, most adults are reluctant to address bad behavior straight on and provide punishment. When your son breaks his golf clubs who pays for the repair or replacement? If you do you're making a mistake. That simply reinforces bad behavior.

A sports counselor or coach should sit down with the boy and provide some detailed

lessons on exactly what negative behavior will not be tolerated on the golf course. These days, officials at junior tournaments are empowered to issue penalties for unsportsmanlike behavior.

And another thing – many young golfers, especially boys, have an unrealistic expectation about how they should be playing and about their performance from shot to shot. I believe the root problem is deep insecurity.

Golf teacher Butch Harmon (Tiger's old swing coach) tells the


story about Butch breaking his driver as a teenager in a competition. He came home and told his father, Claude Harmon (1948 Masters Champion) about what he had done and his

Claude then said to him, "I can understand it if you were any good; you're not any good. Arnold Palmer is good; you're not any good."

It was tough love, but Butch never forgot the lesson. High school and college golfers are not good enough to get so mad that they have tantrums and throw clubs.

Trio earns WAC track titles

Aldredge, Brennan and Meade score victories

The New Mexico State University track and field team concluded the Western Athletic Conference Outdoor Championships with a sixth place finish and three individual titles.

'We had some people step up a little bit, had some break downs, but that's a part of competition," track and field coach Orin Richburg said.

NMSU claimed first overall in the 400-meter, the javelin throw and the heptathlon.

Junior LaSasha Aldredge placed first overall in the 400 with a time of 53.41, almost a full second ahead of the second-place finish. Aldredge's time in the event shattered the previous all-time school record, which she set earlier in the season.

Senior Kelsey Brennan placed first overall in the javelin throw with a mark of 45.76 meters. This was the second consecutive year Brennan won the javelin title.

Sophomore Zoe Meade won the heptathlon on the last event, finishing with a total score of 5,109 points. Meade's finish in the event is a new school record. Meade also competed in the long jump, finishing fifth overall and notching a mark of 5.75 meters, which gives her second team all-conference honors for the event.

Aldredge, Brennan and Meade each earned first team all-conference honors for their firstplace finishes in their respective events.

Sophomore Alishia Perkins placed third overall in the 200 with a time of 24.07, earning first team all-conference honors. Perkins' finish in the event improved upon her career record, which stands at third all-time for NMSU.

Senior Melanie Clay finished third overall in the 800 with a time of 2:12.46, earning first team all-conference honors. Clay improved upon her career record and her school record, which still stands at fourth all-time in the NMSU record books.

Freshman Diana Hawk placed fifth overall in the 1,500 with a time of 4:44.60. Her finish earned her second team all-conference honors in the event.

Senior Madelyn Stoltze finished second overall in the 10,000 with a time of 36:31.23, earning first team all-conference honors. Stoltze's time in the event is both a career-best and improves upon her school record that sits at fifth all-time for NMSU.

Senior India Cleveland placed second overall in the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 1:01.02, earning first team all-conference honors.

Freshman Caroline Lewiecki finished sixth overall in the 3,000-meter steeplechase with a time of 11:19.67, which earned her second team all-conference honors. Her finish in the event moved her up to fourth all-time in the NMSU record books.

Freshman Mareka Clark finished sixth overall in the triple jump with a mark of 11.89 meters, giving her second team all-conference honors.

NMSU finished third overall in the 4-by-100 relay with a time of 46.35. Perkins, Aldredge and freshmen Jenna Banegas and Kendra Walker participated in the event for NMSU. NMSU finished second overall in the 4-by-400 relay with a time of 3:42.29, which is now a new all-time school record for the Aggies. Meade, Cleveland, Clay and Aldredge competed in the event for the Aggies. All Aggies who participated in the two relay events received first team all-conference honors.

UCLA and LSU tied for first in the tournament and will move on to the NCAA Championships along with Pepperdine, Colorado, Baylor, Stanford, North Carolina Oklahoma, which finished third through eighth respectively. Individuals advancing from the regional are Texas Tech's Kimberly Kaufman and Gabriella Dominguez. Dominguez won a one-hole playoff with UC Davis' Amy Simaton.

Three regional tournaments were conducted May 10-12 to determine the championships field. Regional tournaments are considered preliminary rounds of NCAA championships competition, and all national championships policies apply. A total of 378 participants were selected for regional competition. Of these players, 126 advance to the championships finals. Eight teams and two individuals advance from each regional.

4-seed if Hawai'i wins two against Nevada (Hawai'i owns head-tohead with Aggies) If the Aggies go 1-2 at San Jose State: 3-seed if Nevada sweeps Hawaiʻi and Louisiana Tech wins series at

Fresno State or Fresno State wins series but does not sweep.

4-seed if Nevada sweeps Hawai'i and

4-seed if Nevada sweeps Hawai'i and Fresno State sweeps Louisiana Tech (Fresno State owns head-to-head with Aggies)

4-seed if Nevada wins two against Hawai'i and Louisiana Tech wins series or Fresno State wins series but does not sweep. (Hawai'i owns head-to-head with Aggies)

5-seed if Nevada wins two against Hawai'i and Fresno State sweeps Louisiana Tech. (UH, Fresno State, NM State all finish 9-9, Aggies 1-5 against teams tied, UH 5-1: 3-seed, FS 4-2: 4-seed)

If the Aggies go 0-3 at San Jose State: 5-seed if Nevada sweeps Hawai'i and Louisiana Tech wins its series but does not sweep (Fresno State is

out).

6-seed if Nevada sweeps Hawai'i and Fresno State wins series versus Louisiana Tech (LA Tech is out) Fresno State, Louisiana Tech and

Fresno State, Louisiana Tech and San Jose State are the only teams who could finish seventh and not qualify for the tournament.

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NMSU makes future plans

Library, athletic upgrades requested

New Mexico State University regents approved its Capital Outlay Plan for 2013-14 at its meeting Friday, May 11.

The request authorizes \$23.046 million in requested planning, renovation and construction projects.

If approved through the Higher Education Department, the request will be presented to the next Legislature.

NMSU is using a new capital outlay process, which was developed to make the process more transparent.

Each NMSU campus has projects listed for the 2013-14 Capital Outlay Request.

The NMSU Alamogordo request includes \$200,000 for Planning for Phase 2 of the Southern New Mexico Advanced Technology Education Center and \$3.1 million for infrastructure upgrades and replacements.

The NMSU Carlsbad request contains \$200,000 for planning for a Child Development Education Center and \$2.48 million for infrastructure upgrades and replacement.

Doña Ana Community College's request is for \$2.25 million for upgrades and replacements including security and lock upgrades, finish upgrades, carpet replacement, site utilities, roads and parking lots.

The NMSU Grants campus request is for \$1.98 million for infrastructure upgrades and replacements, along with \$50,000 for programming and planning for a Child Development Education Center replacement.

The capital outlay request for the Las Cruces campus includes \$500,000 for planning for the Arts Complex Phase 2, \$100,000 for Library Complex (Branson/Zuhl) space analysis and \$12.1 million for infrastructure upgrades and

An additional request of \$6 million was made for Aggie Memorial Stadium improvements, including \$2.5 million for a stadium press box upgrade and \$3.5 million for concession and bathroom renovations

Other requests for athletics facilities are included in a prioritized list of projects needed to improve gender equity, facility life and other improvements totaling \$1.6 million. These include improvements for the women's swim team, soccer stadium, field house, Coca-Cola Weight Training Facility, baseball and softball fields, stadium and Pan American Center.

Regents accept budget

New fractional grading method OK'd

At a regular meeting Friday, May 11, the New Mexico State University regents approved an operating budget for fiscal year 2012-13.

The approved budget for all campuses is about \$677 million, with operating funds of \$605 million and capital outlay (plant funds) of about \$72 million.

This truly demonstrates a very high level of the institutional commitment to instruction and academic support," said Regent Javier Gonzalez. "When you look at those budget numbers year after year and the fact of all the challenges we've had over the last three years or longer, that the president has continued to focus budget priorities in these areas. I think it should be a strong message to the university community that Dr. (Barbara) Couture and her executive management team are really prioritizing limited dollars in that area.

The regents also approved a grading policy to allow NMSU faculty the option of using a fractional grading scale, which provides for plus and minus grades between C-plus and A-minus. The new grading scale for both undergraduate and graduate students would be implemented starting with summer 2013 catalogs and will affect only GPA calculation for grades assigned after its implementation date; courses taken before its implementation would remain unaffected.

"The new grading scale does not take effect overnight," said executive vice president and provost Wendy Wilkins. "It will be implemented in the summer of 2013. I want to reassure that all faculty members are not required to use plus and minus grades. Faculty members decide on their own what scale they choose to use. This simply gives faculty members the option."

In other business, the regents approved the university's Building the Vision academic strategic plan.

Regent Laura Conniff was honored as part of her last meeting serving on NMSU's Board of Regents. Conniff departed from the board effective Tuesday, May 15. Conniff served more than 10 years on the board, three terms as the chair, two terms as vice president and three terms as secretary and treasurer.

"It's been great to have the opportunity to work with all of you across this institution and outside this institution," Conniff said. "Thank you all for your commitment to New Mexico State University and its students.'

After the meeting, Conniff, a Realtor who graduated with honors from NMSU with a degree in business administration, was honored as she planted a tree in the Regents Grove at NMSU.

The regents awarded a Regents Medal to Charley Johnson, a recently retired engineering professor and former NFL quarterback. Since its inception 40 years ago, there have been only seven individuals bestowed with this honor by the NMSU regents. Johnson graduated from NMSU in 1961, earning his masters and Ph.D. in chemical engineering while playing professional football as a starting quarterback for the St. Louis Cardinals.

After a professional football career spanning 15 years and starting his own business, Johnson's love for NMSU brought him back to the university as a professor of chemical engineering in 2000.

The regents recognized outgoing Associated Students of NMSU President Austin Graham and outgoing Faculty Senate Chair Stuart Munson-McGee.

The regents also presented the Above & Beyond Award to Robert Peterson, director of planned giving in the NMSU Foundation.

The Above & Beyond Award recognizes full-time employees who go the extra distance in service to any and all aspects of the NMSU system. Individuals are recognized for performance that goes "above and beyond" their regular responsibilities and for demonstrating a positive attitude that inspires others.

Peterson was honored for his efforts in managing the estate of the late Norma Jean Fisher, who named the NMSU Foundation as the executor for her estate.

The regents also honored Calvin Bailey, retired ranch foreman of the Chihuahuan Desert Rangeland Research Center, for his four decades of service.

their dependents can pick up their pass at the entrance kiosk at White Sands National Monument starting at 7 a.m. Saturday.

The military pass will be available every day thereafter during operational hours. The passes are only available at the entrance kiosk and not at the White Sands visitor center or administration building.



SpaceX rocket poised for first trip to space station

Falcon to lift off Saturday

The private spaceflight company SpaceX is preparing to launch a robotic capsule to the International Space Station Saturday, May 19.

SpaceX is slated to launch its Dragon capsule to the space station atop the company's own Falcon 9 rocket from the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station in Florida.

The test flight was originally scheduled to occur on April 30, but has been delayed several times to complete final checks of the spacecraft's flight software.

The Dragon launch will now occur shortly after three new crew members arrive at the orbiting complex.

The test flight of the unmanned Dragon capsule is designed to assess the spacecraft's ability to carry cargo to the orbiting outpost.

If successful, it will mark the first time a privately built spaceship has docked with the \$100 billion space station.

The upcoming Dragon flight is designed to test the spacecraft's ability to ferry supplies to and from the station.

Eventually, the company intends to use a version of Dragon to carry up to seven passengers to low-Earth

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Martin desired to fill CSU chancellor post

Decision pending waiting period

Former New Mexico State University President and Louisiana State University Chancellor Michael Martin was named

the lone finalist to become chief executive of the Colorado State University system.

CSU's governing board is expected to offer Martin the job Thursday, May 24, after a two-week waiting period required under Colorado law.

Martin came to LSU in 2008 from NMSU. He praised LSU as "a great place to work" and said he will not make a final decision about CSU without a firm job offer.

As the only finalist for the CSU position, Martin is expected fill the position, leaving Interim LSU System President William Jenkins, who has been on the job for two weeks after the ouster of John Lombardi, either to name an interim chancellor or perhaps take on both jobs, something he has done earlier in his long association with LSU.

"I'm getting toward the end of my career, so maybe one more adventure is good," Martin, 65, is quoted as saying by www. nola.com. "The ball is in someone else's court, and when it's in my court I'll decide how to play it."

When asked about a possible start date in Colorado, Martin said, "maybe the fall."

Martin's association with Lombardi was one of the reasons Martin said he left NMSU for the No. 2 position at LSU. Martin had worked previously under him when Lombardi was president of the University of Florida.

Martin was a finalist for the CSU job in 2003 but was not selected. This time, the system's Board of Governors tapped a former board member and LSU graduate, Pat McConathy, to run the search.

The governing board's chairman said in a written statement: "In Dr. Martin the board has identified a visionary and proven


leader," www.nola.com reported. He added that "the CSU System and broader state of Colorado will greatly benefit from Dr. Martin's strong track record."

The LSU System Board of Supervisors called Jenkins, a former main campus chancellor and system president, out of retirement in late April after firing Lombardi, who had held the post since 2007.

who had held the post since 2007.

Lombardi had fired then-Chancellor
Sean O'Keefe shortly after his arrival and
recommended Martin as his replacement.

There has been considerable turnover of the LSU System board since both Lombardi's and Martin's hires, with Gov. Bobby Jindal's appointees now effectively controlling the board, www.nola.com reports.





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
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Memorial fund created for Washington family

Entrepreneur's death leaves many shaken

The city of Las Cruces has found itself without the bright smile always offered by local businessman La Var Washington.

Washington, who celebrated his 32nd birthday Sunday, May 13, died Monday, May 14, after a weekend of friends, family and a haunting note posted on Facebook.

'Sometimes things become too much and others never understand the reasonings behind the choices we make," Washington wrote. "All I have ever wanted in life was to be the perfect dad and walk a life my family would be proud of ... (my children) are my world and don't ever let anyone tell you

different. Daddy loves you." Washington, a native Las Crucen, attended Oñate High School and was known for his

kindness, respect and grin. An outpouring of support has echoed heavily on Washington's Facebook page, which includes posts of memories and condolences from his

more than 1,300 friends. Washington was the owner of Chicago Southwest, a gourmet hotdog and hamburger restaurant, which opened its third and largest location at 1300 University Ave., in April. He made plans to create a community lounge where stu-

dents could gather together. "We are fortunate to be getting such a large, wonderful space," Washington said

shortly before the grand opening. "We're planning to create a student lounge, complete with Wi-Fi, flat screens and couches.

"I want people to know we're here to take care of them."

"La Var was the kind of guy who would walk you to your car," said friend and local DJ Tommy Black. "He treated everyone as though they were family."

Black, who first met Washington 15 years ago, said the duo quickly became friends.

Both from humble beginnings, they were

successful in their chosen fields.

I remember sitting on the porch with La Var, right after we'd both been recognized by the people of the city as the 'Best of Las Cruces," Black said. "We looked at each other, and La Var said 'I'm proud of you brother, I love

you.'
"Our dreams were just starting to become a reality, and he was the kind of guy you were able to share those with.

Black last spoke with Washington after a night DJing at Hurricane Alley. He said he brought a few friends to Chicago Southwest for the food and Washington's company.

"We joked around, laughed and spoke about celebrating his birthday the next day," Black said. "I didn't

know it would be the last time I would see him. "When I got the call the next day, I couldn't believe it, wouldn't believe that my happy-go-

lucky friend was gone. During his final days, Washington revealed that he was bearing a tremendous burden.

"For a long time I have carried the weight of the world on my shoulders and held in so much pain and hurt," he wrote. "Today I let it all go and give it to God.

"Please know I have truly loved each of you in your own way (and) I need my kids and grandma to be taken care of no matter what."

Washington is survived by his wife, four young children and his grandmother.

A memorial fund to help the family with funeral arrangements has been opened at Wells Fargo Bank, under the name "La Var Terrell Washington Memorial Fund," account number 9817525968.

His family has asked that community members give only what they can, and every penny is greatly appreciated.

Erik Leroy Ness

Erik Lerov Ness, 57, a long time native New Mexico newsman, passed away on May 12, 2012.

He was born and raised in Alamogordo, New Mexico during the height of the Space Race. Both parents, Carl and Marie Ness were involved in that endeavor. He graduated from Alamogordo High School in 1972, learning from teachers who inspired him to be a writer. His memory of seeing

the Wonderful World of Disney in color on television also sparked an acute interest in radio and television broadcasting. He attended the University of New Mexico until his brains grew in, and he was lured by the smell of alfalfa and a really good journalism department to New Mexico State University.

At NMSU he was part of their legendary film program under the direction of Dr. Orville Wanzer, and produced a long series of black and white and color films. While attending NMSU, he worked as operations manager for radio station KGRT and was one of the founders of campus radio station, KNMS, "Ozone Ranger Radio." He also served as a news stringer for Albuquerque news stations, KOB, KOAT, and KGGM and was a southern New Mexico correspondent for 50,000 watt KKOB radio. Outside of journalism Erik worked on over 100 political campaigns including the position of press secretary for attorney general of New Mexico.

After graduating from NMSU he worked as news director for KDQQ and KKOB radio as news reporter and anchorman. In 1981 he went to work for New Mexico Farm Bureau as their director of communications and media relations, where he was twice recognized as the nation's most effective agriculture public relations spokesman

as well as the recipient of numerous national awards for broadcast commentary, broadcast features, and broadcast news productions. In addition, he received many awards for his print writing skills and unusual "wordsmithing". He also worked for the American



Farm Bureau Federation as a national broadcast commentator on the groundbreaking radio show "Insight!". Many of Erik's commentaries were used by Paul Harvey on his ABC broadcast. He served as president of New Mexico Press Club and the Advertising Federation of Southern New Mexico. He also served as a board member of Cowboys for Cancer Research. He retired from the New

Mexico Farm Bureau in 2010, but continued to write columns for the National Farm Bureau in addition to media consulting for the Elephant Butte Irrigation District.


Erik was an award winning song writer, music producer and recording artist. He worked with many of the nation's leading songwriters and bands in the Southwest and Nashville. He's the winner of the American Collegiate Talent Search (ACTS) which was judged by singer/songwriter Michael Martin Murphy. At that time he and Murphy became close friends, collaborators, conspirators, calculators in the world of cowboy and country music. He was able to travel with Murphy all over the country and experience all sides of music and show business world. Erik and Murphy just finished their latest song together, "Law and Order on the Border." Most of Erik's recording was done at the legendary studio, Goldust, in Las Cruces, New Mexico under the tutelage of recording engineer and producer, Emmett Brooks.

Remembering Erik Ness

A man of many talents, media, friends

As far as I'm concerned, Las Cruces became a slightly less interesting place Saturday, May 12, when Erik Ness died, as he was one of the most truly unique people to have emerged from this area.

There was always more to Ness than it appeared. It was too easy to just think of Ness as just the spokesman for the New Mexico Farm & Livestock Bureau if you didn't know he was also an accomplished songwriter who could count performers like Michael Martin Murphy, as friends.

Or, if you knew that, you may not know that he was also an accomplished broadcaster and filmmaker. He took great pride that a documentary he made on the wilderness debate in southern New Mexico was not only featured in the White Sands International Film Festival, but also won an award. He also made a film about the gray wolf program.

Even in all these roles, there was more at play. For example, in his role as director of communications and media relations, Ness was politically astute. If there was legislation or policy that Ness felt hurt the state's farmers and ranchers, a pointed but very entertaining quote from Ness would find its way into reports that usually succeeded in shaping the trajectory of that particular issue.

I've often described Ness as "right of Rush Limbaugh, but one of the funniest people I know." He was so enjoyable to be around, I once conjectured to him that maybe his beliefs were influenced by his paycheck.

He adamently refuted this, saying his beliefs stemmed from the strength and character of the state's farmers and ranchers.

But that was only fair, as Ness often - in jest

- referred to me as being part of the "liberal media" for reporting the other side of these issues.

It was Ness, however, who nominated me to be president of the Southern New Mexico Press Club, a now defunct group of journalists, public relations officers, community members and elected officials. It was during this time that I got to know Ness well, though I'm sure we had first met as journalism students at New Mexico State University.

It was during that time that we were talking about some ridiculous thing going on in the community, and I coined the phrase, "That so chez Cruces." That struck him as so funny he used it up until his dying days.

What was it about Ness and the French language? Our agriculture reporter Marvin Tessneer noted that whenever he called Ness at the Farm Bureau, Ness would answer the phone by saying, "Laissez les bon temps roulez."

In a heartfelt remembrance by senior Santa Fe New Mexican reporter Steve Terrell described Ness as a "cowboy bon vivant." Ness would have liked seeing that in print.

That's what was so remarkable about Ness. Despite this era of divisive politics, Ness' beliefs didn't stop him from making friends with nearly everyone he met. There is no one I would rather share a frosty beverage – or two - with at a bar than Ness. He was always full of stories and tales, such as his adventures in hunting and the back roads of New Mexico.

If you hadn't had the chance to share such an evening with Ness, but knew him in one of his roles, I'd suggest you go to the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road, at 1:30 p.m. Friday, May 18. At that celebration of his life, you're going to hear a lot of stories – some of them true.

That was the day I used the last bit of Hatch green chile from the bags I bought last summer.

Tuesday, May 8, however, was a much darker day for many Doña Ana County

That was the day the hail came and hammered the fields of the Hatch Valley,

causing damage to not only chile, but also onions, pecans and alfalfa.

The hail was fickle, devastating crops for many farmers, doing a lot of damage to others and leaving others relatively unscathed.

For those hit hard, they are moving into survival mode.

Farmers were already facing tough times the past few years. The drought has forced most of them to pump groundwater, which caused expenses to soar.

And now this.

The damage to Scott Adams' onions means he'll have to harvest them now, before they've reached jumbo size. He'll sell them as mediums, meaning his prof-

its will decrease in size, too.
Willie Villegas, aka Chili Willie, faces
the decision of "discing under" his damaged chile fields. About half of his 35
acres are in serious trouble. There may be a way to put some spray on the crops to save some, maybe not.

"It's a toss-up whether you spend more money to save it, and risk losing it anyway or just go ahead and lose it Villegas said.

So, with the Hatch farmers losing, on average, half their crops, logic dictates they'll have to charge twice as much, or more, for a bag of chile to keep from losing their burlap.

There is still plenty of unharmed

chile in Doña Ana, Las Cruces, Deming and other areas of southern New Mexico. Villegas said it's possible he might do some wheeling and dealing with other farmers to make up the difference. Farmers tend to help each other out.

We have to keep up our faith and our will to go on," he said.

Farmers assess damage

Financial losses could hit millions

By Marvin Tessneer

Hatch Valley farmers are looking over fields of flattened onion tops and damaged chile plants that were left from the Tuesday, May 8, hailstorm, but they have not been able to enter soggy fields to determine the economic loss.

And the storm was erratic. Farmers reported the storm traveled through fields in strips, some in chile and onions and others in cotton or pecans.

Some guys were hit more than others, some guys didn't get hit at all," said Willie Villegas of Chili Willie's in Hatch.

"We didn't get hurt on any of the chile on our farms," said Nick Carson of Rio Valley Chile, who has farms southwest of Hatch. "Uvas got hit pretty bad. Some areas of Salem got hammered; they lost chile and onions."

The onions were two weeks from harvest. Jerry Franzoy, of Chile River in Salem, said he would have to wait a few more days before he tours his fields and learn how much the hail had damaged his chile.

"Chile is like tomato plants," Franzoy said.
"You can kind of beat them up a little, but they

can come back and produce more fruit."

Indications are that the valley received 3 inches of rain, and the fields are still too muddy to let farmers in to assess hail damage. A preliminary survey indicates the hail damage to the Hatch Valley could be as high as \$25 million, Franzoy said.

Since the summer of 2011, Cash Mobs have organized in cities from Samia, Ontario, to San Antonio, Texas.

to go on

When I say that, I mean, are we willing to put our money where we usually put our chile?

Here's a promise I made to Willie: If he charges as much as \$50 a bag for 40 pounds of chile, I'll pay it.

Now, I've never paid even half that for my annual bag(s) of chile.

Here's my reasoning for paying more this year: There is no green chile like Doña Ana County green chile and Hatch green chile is the best of the best.

Fifty dollars for a 40-pound bag equates to \$1.25 per pound.

Think of how many other foods are more than \$1.25 a pound. Have you priced a can of mediocre Folger's coffee lately? Have you tried those Anaheim chiles they sell in the grocery stores once the local chile season is over? They don't taste half as good as Hatch chiles and they cost probably \$1.85 a pound.

Last year's 40-pound bag lasted me almost nine months. Even if I pay \$50 for it, it's still less than \$6 a month for one of the greatest pleasures a New Mexican can have. And it's healthy to boot.

More important, paying extra for this one year could make the difference whether or not some of these farmers are able to sell it again next year.

Our southern New Mexico chile already faces an uphill battle. There is chile now in Arizona, California and Mexico.

Some of our local grocers will sell Mexican chile, and you'll be able to get it for

closer to the usual \$20 a bag. If you buy it, you're potentially hurting our local farmers.

"Ones that know Hatch chile will pay what they need to get it," Villegas said.

And though he says that, in his heart, he knows consumers are as fickle as the hail when it comes to their pocketbooks. So, I doubt Willie will end up selling his chile for \$50 a bag.

If the bags are \$50, however, or \$40 or \$35, I hope you'll join me in shelling out the green to ensure you're getting the real deal, and helping our local farming businesses at the same time.

"Onions got hit pretty hard," Franzoy said. "We'll have to wait to see if the bulbs will heal after the hail bruised them."

The onion tops were flattened, exposing the bulbs to battering from hail.

Significant damage to onions could have a big economic impact on the state's annual agricultural picture.

Dry onion production is one of New Mexico's major agricultural crops. In 2011, the state had 590,000 acres in dry onions, mostly yellow granos, that yielded an average an average of 920 50-pound sacks and brought revenues of \$213 million. The state ranked 11th in the nation in acreage, eighth in value and ninth in production.

The figures were compiled by Chris Cramer, a professor of horticulture with New Mexico State University Experiment Station.

"During June and July, we supply 50 percent of the dry onions in the country," Cramer said.

Carson said this year red onions are most in demand and were expected to fetch the highest prices. That could change based on the damage.

"We had 12 acres of red onions at Rincon," Carson said. "They got hammered pretty good.

"But I told my wife, 'Let's not panic.' Some

of that could come back. But there will be a setback."

The season cycles make it too late to replant chile, said Stephanie Walker, NMSU Extension vegetable specialist.

"Summer high temperatures could harm the young plants," she said. "And the chile pods might be caught in an early frost before they mature adequately."

The hailstorm also caught the area pecan orchards at the wrong time, knocking small nuts from the trees.

Scott Adams, who farms in Hatch, said an early survey showed about 50 percent of the pecans, which were just forming, were knocked off.

Damage to the pecans could also have a huge economic impact; New Mexico ranked second only to Georgia last year among U.S. pecan-producing states, generating more than \$186 million in revenues.

Adams also had some onion transplants with six to eight leaves that were shredded by the hail.

"But they're coming back with some new growth," Adams said said.

He also plans to cut about 250 acres of oats.

"We're going to try to cut and bale it for the dairies," Adams said May 15, a week after the storm. "But we can't get into the fields. We need to let the ground dry out first."

Adams also saw an impact to his alfalfa fields.

Doña County Extension horticulturist Jeffrey Anderson had a unique look at the storm.

"I was on my way to Albuquerque to attend a meeting, and I was driving through the storm," Anderson said. "Between Rincon and Hatch it looked like the mountains were covered with snow. But it was hail, about two inches.

"Some of the cotton fields were destroyed. Most of the chile plants were stripped of leaves. But a lot of the alfalfa was in bales from the first cutting. Farmers are going to have to wait three weeks to a month the learn the outcome from damage."

Going viral

The event will roughly follow rules set by an early Cash Mob blog set up Mob Rules for followers to adopt. These include a commitment by "mobbers" to spend \$20 at the happening and celebrate at a mob gathering at a local bar after the event.

Saturday's After Mob, another vehicle for supporting local business, will be held at High Desert Brewery.

Lacy said people are invited to bring three friends or meet three new ones at her Cash Mob, spend \$20, collect free samples and take advantage of the specials on items such as pet food bowls and pet toys. There will be goody bags for new customers, she said.

To add to the festivity, the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce is supplying a banner. Balloons and a tent out front will beckon drop-ins.

Serving business and consumers

Hamblen called Cash Mobs "a great way to showcase local businesses."

The events have multiple purposes, including creating a vehicle for business owners to support and meet one another.

"The purpose of the Green Chamber is to provide services to local businesses committed to our Triple Bottom Line (people, planet, profit). A Cash Mob falls into that category," Hamblen said.

She said she provided some tech support for Jackye Meinecke of Enchanted Gardens, who in April staged Las Cruces' first Cash Mob.

Growing the 'mo'

The greater goal is to get more locally owned businesses to grow the momentum by hosting their own Cash Mobs.

"My take on it them is that they're not about competition, they're about serving the customer. And ultimately that's the purpose of our businesses," Hamblen said.

She said she's in the process of talking with other Green Chamber members to see how Cash Mob can best help them.

"It's hard for business owners to take the time out to do something like this unless they can see the benefits," Hamblen said.

"Lacy and Meinecke have been great at working out the kinks in doing a Cash Mob. They're willing to take a risk so that in the future businesses that participate won't have to."

From the business perspective, Cash Mob brings new customers in and cultivates relationships, Hamblen said.

Celebrating local business

Lacy said she's excited about the Cash Mob concept because it promotes small business "without costing an arm and a leg."

"Hopefully what happens is a chain," she said.

"It's not an advertising gimmick," Meinecke said. "It's supposed to be a social statement. More than money, for the small business it's the fact that people care if you make it or not."

She said her goal is for Las Cruces to do a Cash Mob every month of the year (except July and August).

Cash Mobs are effective because people want to support local businesses but don't always know how do so, Meinecke said. A Cash Mob gives people something specific they can do – showing up at a particular time and place. In the process, they build community.

"Look at your circle of friends and see what businesses you care about," Meinecke said. "Do one for your friends."

Fitting together pieces of the 'puzzle'

Rock walls withstand economic storm

With deep enough pockets and well-constructed business connections, a contractor can survive building rock walls in Las Cruces during a punishing economy.

Joe Garcia of E & R Contractors is proving it can be done.

Each morning, in crews of four or five, his 16 carefully chosen employees head out

across the valley to work in subdivisions that are under construction.

One recent workday, Garcia visited job sites in the Dos Lados subdivision off Rinconada Boulevard on the East Mesa to tell his story.

Demand for rock walls never completely went away during the lingering recession, he said, nd he was positioned to take advantage of the work that was available.

"In Las Cruces, we love our rock walls," Garcia said.

In Kansas, the grass of one yard flows into the grass of the next. There is no separation,

"They must love to mow their neighbors' lawns," he said with a wry

Las Crucens crave privacy

In Las Cruces on the other hand, "we want our own space," he said.

Aside from all the practical reasons for building a rock wall, such as holding up an embankment or creating permanent fencing that can't be destroyed by anything short of a flood, Las Crucens crave privacy and rock walls provide it, he said.

Garcia had deep enough pockets to ride out

"People look for people who can give them credit. People who can, are surviving," he

Big enough to hang in

Being big enough to be bonded, extend credit, have a skilled and reliable work force and a designer are some of the elements that enabled Garcia to make the connections need-

ed to stay busy.

For the past three years, he has built the walls for Summit Realty of Las Cruces, which is marketing 100 of the 220 lots in Dos Lados subdivision. Summit, in turn, works with Hunt Developers of Texas, which owns the land.

E & R also is building the walls in the Greyfox gated community on North Valley

"It took me a while to get in with Summit," he said. He eventually had his shot, in part because he had enough workers to handle multiple jobs at the same time.

Now, the company is large Owner, E&R Contractors enough to buy rocks in bulk for a price break and pick them up at a supplier in El Paso with a company semi.

"We even sell rocks to our competitors," Garcia said.

Nimble enough to respond

Garcia began working for his dad's E & R Roofing in 1985 while still attending Picacho Elementary School.

"He had me drive around digging ditches, moving rocks with a Bobcat and then scheduling jobs,"Garcia said. "I learned in the field."

He graduated from Mayfield High School

and studied architectural drafting at Doña Ana Community College, which he described as a small but very important part of learning the business.

'It was a little bit at school, the rest out here," he said, gesturing around the bare, beige landscape dotted with framed houses and rock walls finished and still in progress.

He worked in roofing with his father for 20 years before starting his own company in

When things got slow, he and his crews were diversified enough to take on roofing and other construction projects.

"I had a lot of places to grab onto," Garcia

Grateful for his success, Garcia encourages less fortunate contractors to "hang in" as the market starts to rebound.

He also volunteers with Mesilla Valley Habitat for Humanity and Tierra del Sol Housing

A rock wall for the ages

The one with the skill to create a beautiful, durable rock wall is the one those in the building trades call a maestro.

'They're the bosses," Garcia said.

The maestro who pulls the performance together for E & R is Rudolfo Chavez, who has built walls for many years. When Garcia hires a new man, he sends him to Chavez.

"He motivates, he places everybody along the wall where they're supposed to be," Garcia said. "I pay him, he pays them."

Most of all, the maestro shows the newer workers how to choose each rock that makes up the masterpiece.

"It's like a puzzle," Garcia said. "You've got to find the right rock to fill the space. You have to know how to balance a rock so it won't fall over and you have to learn how to use a sledge hammer to make a rock fit.

"You can't cheat on a puzzle."

Mountains of rocks

Retaining walls have to be almost as wide at

the footing as they are tall – of solid rock and concrete with extra rebar supports and deeper foundations than garden walls to withstand the pressure.

Each wall is designed by engineer Jay Miller to meet code and withstand the elements.

Garcia said his crew places 48 tons of rocks each day. Each week, they use 50 tons of concrete, just for the footings.

For the part of the wall that is seen above ground, they mix 70 94-pound sacks of Portland cement with 48 tons of sand.

Community says goodbye to philanthropic champion

Gregory set an example of estate planning

In life, Richard "Rich" Gregory made an impact that expanded estate planning throughout the state. In death, he left a legacy that will never be forgotten.

Gregory, 67, passed away May 4.

He served his country honorably in the U.S. Air Force before moving to Portales in 1971, where he attended Eastern New Mexico University and met his wife, Nancy. After receiving an MBA at Eastern, Gregory attended law school at the University of New Mexico, and then became a certified public accountant and attorney. He practiced law for more than 30 years, and taught accounting at New Mexico State University.

As a member of the community, Rich spent much of his time encouraging philanthropy and estate planning. The Gregorys worked with the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico from the start by encouraging businessmen and women, nonprofits, estate planners and community members to look to the CFSNM as a charitable service.

Throughout the years, Rich was instrumental in taking the CFSNM to the next level, establishing endowments and educating on philanthropy and education.

"Rich was a true advocate for the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico," said Diana Seward, a friend of the Gregorys for 25 years and a member of the CFSNM board of directors. "When I think of all the things Rich did to impact the community, I don't even know where to start."

It didn't take long for Rich to see the importance of an institute that would increase estate planning education within New Mexico, so in 1992, Rich became the driving force behind the Estate Planning Institute hosted by the CFSNM. The institute provides a resource for attorneys, accountants, bankers, investment advisors, estate planners, tax practitioners and financial planners with topics such as business succession, tax planning, family considerations and charitable gifts.

Putting Europe in perspective Morgan losses bring to light Cultures complicate common currency problems of 'too big to fail'

What are the implications of all the economic trouble in Europe? What do these problems mean for the U.S. economy? Before these questions can be answered we must first understand what is going on in Europe.

The European Union was formed based on the false premise that a bunch of loosely affiliated countries could share a common currency without also sharing strict controls on how much each country borrowed.

Unfortunately for the E.U., when it comes to financial responsibility and work ethic, culturally speaking, European nations span the spectrum.

At one end of the spectrum is Greece. Greece is a nation that believes most citizens should be government workers, and all government workers should be able to retire on the taxpayer dole at an early age after producing practically nothing.

Culturally speaking, Spain, Italy, Portugal and France are not far behind the Greeks in terms of embracing the fantasy that if you simply heavily tax the few citizens who actually accomplish something with economic value, you can re-distribute what they earn to those who produce nothing and everyone will live happily ever after.

At the other end of the spectrum lies Germany and most of the Scandinavian nations. In these nations, it is work ethic – rather than a religious-like belief in government that is the more dominant philosophy.

At their core, German and Nordic cultures value hard work and self-reliance. In general, they are far less inclined to look to others to provide them with the comforts of life.

Putting the cultural differences within the European Union in American terms is simple. The Germans are the so-called 1 percent and the Greeks are the occupiers. Every week the Germans go to work and the Greeks go to protests.

Italy, Spain, Portugal, and France are much more sympathetic to the laziness of the Greeks than toward cultures that embrace a solid work ethic like Germany.

One of the biggest lies coming out of Europe this month is the explanation that France had tried "austerity" and it didn't work. France didn't try anything. There was no reduction in size of government whatsoever under President Nicolas Sarkozy.

Much like George W. Bush, Sarkozy merely allowed government to get bigger, but not quite as quickly as it might have, had it been under opposition control. This week, when the French discarded Sarkozy, they demonstrated their disdain for work ethic and their hope that the Germans will continue to work harder and share more of what they earn with the rest of Europe, so the French can continue to take long summer vacations.

Accordingly, Europe can be expected to continue its slow and torturous economic death spiral.

What are the implications for America? America has already caught the European contagion. Fifty percent of all Americans live in households that pay no income taxes. And apparently in political terms, the idea of asking those paying nothing to support a government that purportedly does so much for all of us is akin to asking people to take a rental car to the car wash.

Economic history doesn't care what economically illiterate politicians say. Any geographic area where a huge portion of the population is allowed to live comfortably while doing nothing is economically doomed.

Living standards for those who do work will gradually slip farther and farther.

In America, those who don't work or pay income taxes will continue to be encouraged by some politicians to blame those who do work and pay taxes for not paying their fair share. It's a shame.

Volcker Rule attempts to limit banks' risk taking

The announcement by JP Morgan of a \$2 billion trading loss has brought to the fore once again the issue of financial regulatory reform and especially the Volcker Rule.

The Volcker Rule, named after former Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker, prohibits speculative trading by banks on their own account, although speculative trading for clients would be allowed.

JP Morgan, along with several other major banks and Wall Street firms, has been a major critic of the Volcker Rule, arguing that it would limit U.S. competiveness, forcing U.S. firms to re-locate operations overseas.

Yeah, well, don't let the screen door hit you on the way out.

There will always be jurisdictions that refuse to impose reasonable rules and the United States can't be held hostage to these. Indeed, the \$2 billion JP Morgan loss was incurred in its London operations; perhaps stricter London regulations could have been prevented the loss.

Of course, if the JP Morgan loss were strictly a private concern, then whether Morgan gains or loses on a transaction would be of no concern. But JP Morgan, like other large U.S. banks, is the beneficiary of the too-big-to-fail doctrine, under which the U.S. government provides a financial safety net.

The Volcker Rule is an attempt to re-impose restrictions on activities of U.S. banks so as to limit the risk to the federal government of a costly bailout.

Prior to 1999, the Glass-Steagall Act prevented the kind of shenanigans that got JP Morgan into trouble.

Passed in 1933, in the wake of the financial crisis that initiated the Great Depression, the Glass-Steagall Act limited any one firm from simultaneously being a commercial bank, an

investment bank and an insurance company. In particular, commercial banks were prohibited from underwriting, dealing in or trading securities and issuing insurance.

The Volcker Rule is an attempt to re-impose some aspects of Glass-Steagall to avoid a repeat of the egregious risk taking by banks that is partially responsible for the events of 2008, the consequences of which we still suffer.

In conception, the Volcker Rule is relatively simple. It would allow banks to trade for clients; it would allow banks to trade to create a hedge against positions the bank takes on behalf of clients; but it would prohibit banks from trading on their own account to generate a profit directly from trading, either directly or indirectly via a hedge fund or equity firm.

OK, simple enough, but putting the Volcker Rule in operation has been a mess. The current proposed rule, set to go into effect July 21, runs on page after page. Some provisions contradict others, and the cost of compliance is said to be disproportional to the benefit.

Then we have the JP Morgan loss and one sees the value of the Volcker Rule. JP Morgan is a strong bank. It is expected to earn \$8 billion from operations aside from its London loss, so will likely be profitable this quarter. But what if another bank had incurred the same loss?

Regulations, like the Volcker Rule, are about getting the incentives right so that markets can operate efficiently. Like it or not, we have a de facto too-big-to-fail safety net under our largest financial services firms, which means that we are subsidizing risk taking.

Heads you make a profit; tails you're toobig-to-fail so we have to bail you out.

The Volcker Rule tries to mitigate this. The alternative isn't very pleasant: TARP II anyone?

Veteran friendly

Tax reform legislation designed to spur hiring of military veterans went into effect Wednesday, May 16.

House Bill 10, sponsored by Rep. Terry Mc-Millan (R-Las Cruces), was passed earlier this year with unanimous support in both chambers of the legislature. The legislation will provide a tax credit of up to \$1,000 to businesses each time they hire a veteran who has recently been discharged from the military.

The men and women of our military make tremendous sacrifices to protect our safety and freedom," said Gov. Susana Martinez. "It is unacceptable that those heroes might find themselves unemployed after their term of duty concludes.

'This tax credit will help to ensure that our veterans do not end up in the unemployment line and I hope that all New Mexico businesses strongly consider taking advantage of this important legislation. It is my hope that we are sending a loud and clear message to our armed service members that we are grateful for what they do and we are proud to welcome them back home."

'This tax credit makes it easier for our returning heroes to get to work after they have fulfilled their commitment to the armed forces," said Department of Veterans Services Secretary Tim Hale. "Our military members risk their lives and put all other commitments on hold to serve their country. This is an important gesture that shows our gratitude for their hard work and sacrifice, and recognizes the valuable skills they bring to the workplace."

The purpose of the veteran employment

tax credit is to encourage the full-time employment of qualified military veterans within two years of discharge from the armed services. The credit is available for any entity with a New Mexico income tax liability.







Wine Festival to kick off the summer right

In 1992, a fledgling New Mexico wine industry was looking for a way to showcase and celebrate their talents.

A small group of winery owners from around the state came together to create and host a festival during Memorial Day weekend, originally called the "New Mexico – Texas Chile War & Wine Festival."

Eventually, with the creation of the New Mexico Wine Growers Association the festival expanded. Now, housed at the Southern New Mexico State Fairgrounds just outside of Las Cruces, the festival features wine from all four corners of the state and has become a regional

'The Southern New Mexico Wine Festival has become a kick-off event for the summer," said Dawn Starostka of Helping Hands Event Planning, who is helping to organize this year's festival. "It's a really great way for people to try regional wines and find out what they like."

The festival, celebrating its 20th anniversary, will be held from noon to 6 p.m. Saturday, May 26, through Monday, May 28. The fairgrounds are located 11 miles west of Las Cruces, on Interstate 10. The festival will include live music and food vendors as well as a wide selection of tasting from wineries around New Mexico.

The University of Wine has returned this year to provide free classes and talks to help guests understand and appreciate the process of wine making. New Mexican experts and winemakers will speak about producing specific types of wine, as well as the reasons behind pairing certain wines with different types of cuisine. The classes will be held throughout the weekend. To see a schedule of events, visit www.snmwinefestival.com.

This year, 17 New Mexican wineries will attend the festival to showcase their unique flavors. A new winery, La Esperanza, will also be in attendance for sampling and sale of their first bottled crop.

"We're really excited to have La Esperanza join us this year," Starostka said. "They were on hand last year to get a feel for the festival, and this year they're setting up their own tent."

"I like to think we're a wine boutique," said David Gurule who owns La Esperanza. "We've only bottled around 500 cases this year, but there's really something special about our product."

Wineries will offer tastings, including samoles of sweeter, lighter chilled wines to the fullbodied, robust dark reds. Wine is available to purchase by the bottle or case for guests to take

In addition to the wine, live music will help attendees celebrate the long weekend. Saturday will features the Cadillac Kings and the band Fire & Ice, On Sunday, Ryan Beaver and John Arthur Martinez will take the stage. The festival will wrap up Monday with performances by Kung Fu Treachery as well as the blues-guitar master Guitar Slim. A full entertainment schedule is available online.

Admission to the festival is \$15 for adults over the age of 21, and includes a souvenir glass. Entrance is free for those under 21, but they must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. On Monday, May 28, all military members will receive a discount of \$3 on admission.

Hagen had suggested to Oscar Ibave, the owner of Paisano Café, 1720 Calle de Mercado, that he allow artists to display their artwork in the establishment. Zawacki was one of first artists to team up with Hagen to display in the new venue.

Both artists quickly filled the walls of the café with their paintings, inviting several other Plein Air painters to display

"The owner, Oscar Ibave, was incredibly welcoming and open to the idea," Zawacki said.

Zawacki has several works on display

using oils and pastels. She also has dabbled in watercolor, though she considers it an outlier.

'I used to work only in pastels. I liked the connection I made with the canvas," Zawacki said. "When I use brushes, I feel a disconnect between my hand and the paper, but with pastels there's more control, it's more comparable to drawing.'

"With pastels to get the colors you want, you have to layer the shades, play with it a little."

Zawacki has since branched out to oils, because she said the color possibilities are endless.

"I love that you can create a multitude of colors on a palate with oil, and they dry so slowly, there's no rush to get it right," Zawacki said. "It's made oil very enjoyable."

Zawacki said her next series will be inspired by the cultures of New Mexico.

"I envision some tall, vertical canvas with mariachi players, Latin dancers," she said. "Las Cruces has really inspired me with the depth and vibrancy of its culture. I want to be able to echo that on canvas."

Zawacki said she still enjoys graphic design, especially being able to take a written idea and turn it into something visual. She continues to paint because she considers

"Once you do a painting, the inspiration, the idea is there forever," Zawacki said. "Completing a painting is like having a piece of yourself in existence as long as there is someone to appreciate the artwork.

"Whatever feeling or thoughts went into the painting while you were creating it stay there, captured forever."

Zawacki is currently displaying her work at the Mesilla Valley Fine Arts Gallery, and is one of the upcoming featured artists for the month of July.



Dancing with the master stars

World famous dancers come to Las Cruces

Master teachers will be pirouetting into the Las Cruces School of Dance and Music.

Bill Hastings and Jennifer Boren are two dance teachers that studio owner Monique Foster will bring into her studio for weeklong workshops in June and July.

World-renowned teacher Bill Hastings will lead two classes in a weeklong workshop incorporating theater dance and modern dance. Hastings has danced in Broadway productions, in more than 40 musicals and worked under Bob Fosse, choreographer of "Cabaret" and "Chicago."

Hastings is co-founder of The Dance Connection and has taught at numerous institutions including the American Ballet Theatre-Studio Company, Steps 74 and Broadway Dance Center.

"Hastings is so impressive. He was one of my teachers, and Bob Fosse's dance captain," Foster said. "He's the best first generation person to learn Bob Fosse's dances from."

Bringing a master teacher New Yorker into her studio is just another aspect of the state of the art studio that Foster runs.

The recently opened studio has three full time dance instructors that teach jazz, modern dance, tap dance, ballet and hip hop in three dance rooms.

Across from the dance floors is the music section, where four teachers teach every aspect of music possible including choir and drums.

Foster, also the owner of the Alamogordo Academy of Ballet, is planning on having a yoga room, massage room and a coffee bar for parents who wait while their kids are in class.

While July will bring Hastings, June will feature a workshop lead by Jennifer Boren. Boren, the principal of both Ballet Repertory Theatre and New Mexico Ballet Company is a dancer who has performed in more than 70 ballets.

Boren has toured in the "Superstars of Russian Ballet" in Taiwan, danced with Tulsa Ballet Theatre and toured Europe in the Weinner Ballet Theatre's "Swan Lake."

"I would love to be able to bring more master teachers to the studio," Foster said.

She studied under Hastings while living in New York. She called Hastings asking if he'd be able to teach a workshop at the studio, while he has many tours and workshops going on this summer including one in Italy, Foster nabbed him on one of the few weeks he was free.

"I'd really love to start doing more workshops in the summer," Foster said. "So if this really takes off, which I'm thinking it should because they are both great master teachers, I'll look into bringing more people in."

Dancing with these master teacher stars would be exciting for anyone who spends a majority of their time in leotards, but space is very limited.

"I'd advise people to call as soon as possible to reserve their spot," Foster said. "I only have 40 spots for each, and they'll fill up fast."

Hastings' workshop will be July 9-13. Advanced beginning ages 11 and up will be from 3 to 4:30 p.m. and intermediate and advanced will be from 5 to 7 p.m.

Boren's ballet technique and pas de deux workshop will be June 18 to 22. Advanced beginning ages 9 and up from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Intermediate and advanced from 5 to 6:30 p.m. and pas de deux from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

the center, began to explore ways of fundraising to help with much needed repairs.

"We decided to hold a filming of 'The Adventures of Priscilla: Queen of the Desert," Young said. "Many haven't had the opportunity to see the film, which has a heavy message on diversity, unity and self-acceptance."

Young's stage persona, Bobcat, will take the stage with Las Cruces drag diva Ivonna Bump, and the multi-talented El Paso sensation Jordan Matthews.

"There will be an intermission during the film," Young said. "During that time, we'll have a little performance, a silent auction, door prizes and a costume contest."

Young encourages all attendees to dress up, though it doesn't have to be in drag.

"We just want people to have fun with it, dress like a super hero or as Elvis," Young said. "We're just out to have a blast and raise some money to help a cornerstone of the community."



The lost orphans of the United Kingdom

'Oranges and Sunshine' is a tale of illegal child trafficking

Promised oranges and sunshine when they are taken from dreary homes and orphanages in the UK, thousands of children, at least 7,000, were illegally and heartlessly shipped to Australia and other sunny climes (well, Canada being an exception) from the 1940s all the way until the early 1970s.

Many of the children were given training and ended up as servants and such for others, while many others were sent to Catholic religious orders, where the unimaginable happened, much like you've heard about in news reports in the states in recent years.

This was nothing like the often successful "Orphan Trains" that took place in the U.S. for nearly 100 years, helping to bring foster care to many children from around the country.

And it is never fully explained as to why some knotty-headed bureaucrat(s) thought this up; it is still an amazing story of mistreatment, especially when many of the children actually had at least one living parent, although the parents were often in need of social services themselves.

Here is one possible reason that appeared in the Los Angeles Times where the writer interviewed Margaret Humphreys, who first broke the scandal to the public.

Q: I was reading that one of the reasons too was economics. It was cheaper to take care of these children in Australia than England.

A: There was an economic argument to it. It was a push and a pull. The push came from Britain. The pull came from Australia. The country asked for 50,000 white children, only white, to populate Australia.

Bureaucrats would add to the horror by telling the children that they really were orphans, when many times they were not.

As I watched this film, I wondered, how does one think this and similarly idiotic things up and why? I have no answers of course, but who approves these ridiculous and harmful things? I can't even gather a guess.

In the film, Humphreys is well portrayed by English actress Emily Watson. She comes across the program by accident when one of her clients who is now an adult attending an adoptee support group is reunited with her brother.

Assisted by another former client of the program, Len, with whom she bonds in a strong friendship, Humphreys sets out to unravel the entire mess, coming across any number of alarming stories and tales of sadness along the way. Len's story is typical,

and later in the film the two travel back to Australia to confront the creepy, stoic and silent Catholic priests who made his childhood a living hell.

Complications arise for Humphreys, due to her dedication to her work, as she almost loses her own home life when her job goes from mission to obsession, as she ironically allows her own family to become motherless, so to speak.

Humphreys works to reunite the children (mostly adults now) with their missing parents, usually mothers and, of course, the government program is a failure, much like similar efforts to place American Indian children in Anglo homes to acclimate them to "our society" back in the early part of the 20th century.

Humphreys does not come off as some kind of super hero in this film. Rather she is a woman working hard to right a wrong, and she continues to do so to this day, traveling from the UK to Australia several times a year as she tries to reunite the lost.


"Oranges and Sunshine" is an interesting and at times an appalling

film, showing yet another way that the human race is clearly not the most intelligent life form in the universe.





A taste of Thailand

Lemongrass offers fine dining atmosphere

Located just a hop, skip and a jump from the New Mexico State University Campus, Lemongrass has offered up traditional Thai cuisine for 14 years.

Owner Kimberly Ming and her husband first opened a Chinese-style restaurant after Ming finished a culinary program in Scottsdale, Ariz.

After the death of her husband, Ming was forced to close their restaurant, and in 1998 - when her children were older – she opened Lemongrass.

This time, she offered Thai cuisine instead of Chinese because of the lack of a Thai restaurant in Las Cruces at the time.

The new space, located at 2540 El Paseo Road, offered a larger kitchen and dining area, which was converted from existing office buildings. The dining room is spacious and open, lined with windows that allow natural light to fill the space.

A photo of Ming and her husband is one of the many cultural touches added to the décor. Folding screens depicting famous scenes out of Thai history help the space to feel warm.

The menu is full of traditional Thai fare, and includes a few dishes with a local twist to satisfy diners. Among them are green chile egg rolls, which seek to blend the two culinary cultures.

At Lemongrass, each of the dishes is created from scratch, and Ming arrives each morning to make the sauces and blends of spices that will be added to dishes throughout the day, giving each selection a robust and authentic flavor.

"It's very important to us that everything be made fresh," said Chantil Robinson, who works at Lemongrass while attending NMSU as a psychology student. "The cooks and Kimberly take pride in what they're creating, it's a part of their culture, their traditions.

The lunchtime menu offers trimmed down options for those looking for a quick bite. Easy to order combos include a choice of several traditional entrees, noodle dishes and include a side of rice and fried crab rangoon. The dishes are carefully marked with the level of spiciness, but the heat can be increased for any dish with an addition of Thai chile.

The crab rangoon was one of the best I've tasted in the Southwest, nothing imitation about the filling. The outside was crisp and light, and the fillings had a distinct blend of flavors and spices that set it apart from the usual creamy mush.

The rich sauce provided was the perfect accent to the crab, and went very well to heighten the flavors rather than to hide them.

Because mangos are currently in season, I found it impossible to pass up the mango sticky rice, which is not always available to customers. Sliced mangos surrounded a small pile of rice, drizzled with a cream sauce.

The fruit was soft and melted on the palette. When combined with the sweet rice, the dessert was a knockout. I've never seen nor had anything resembling it before, and I was glad to have made room for it.

Lemongrass offers traditional favorites, including pad Thai and an extensive collection of curries and soups. The atmosphere allows for a more formal meal, and is a great place for business luncheons or a dinner date.








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

Singing Out battles bullying with song

Las Cruces has a close, blossoming community of artists, musicians and performers.

New Mexico's first and only Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Allies chorus, Singing Out, has become a prominent addition to the community.

Founded and directed by Ruth Ann Hanlin a year ago, the chorus has expanded from just a few members, to more than 50.

Hanlin, a graduate from Oberlin Conservatory of Music, has directed choruses wherever she has lived. For years, Hanlin had been concerned about the devastating effects bullying has on the lives of LGBT individuals.

"I want our impact to be significant, bold and immediate," Hanlin said. "I want people to know right off the bat that we have a fantastic LGBTA community right here made up of not only the people of our gay community, but also of their allies, all of whom are talented and eager to get the message out."

Choir members range from young adults to retirees, and is a non-audition chorus that welcomes anyone who wishes to sing out and share a love of music.

"Our mission has become to battle bullying through positive, uplifting song," said Vanessa Dabovich, a member of the choir. "There was a need in the arts community for a group that used music as a form of support."

The choir recently held its spring concert, which included musical selections suiting all audiences with something for everyone.

"Our theme was 'Quite Enough Love' and the selections really focused on the message that we are all different, but that we're all one community," Dabovich said. "We chose some of the more emotional pieces to remind people to embrace unity, that segregating any group is hurtful to society.

"We want to entertain and inspire."

The spring concert, held Friday and Saturday, May 11-12, had an audience of more than 250 each night.

"We're all just here together to share our music. It's been a great experience for me, and it has fulfilled a big void in my life for giving me comradery of singing in a group like this," said John Sandstrom, a member of the choir.

"Ruth Ann is a fabulous conductor with so much energy. She goes out of her way to make those who aren't confident and comfortable feel so."

Singing Out is set to perform June 16 alongside the Mesilla Valley Chorale and several other choirs from Albuquerque as a benefit for the Rio Grande Theatre.

Every once in a great while, a documentary makes its way to a wide release across theaters that would usually only show the biggest box-office hits.

Many of these films, which excel at film festivals, obtain incredible praise from critics

and are usually forgotten about in the mainstream entertainment sector. Much of this is because documentaries often tell the tales we don't care to hear.

Many of us, myself included, take time in the dark theater to laugh, cry and scream about things we know are created for us on a Hollywood sound stage. We are able to react so jarringly because we know once the lights come back up, we are free to resume our own lives, separate from the troubles on the screen.

With many documentaries, including Lee Hirsch's "Bully," it's almost impossible to walk away unchanged.

Bullying is a serious problem in classrooms throughout the nation, and it's just now being publicly recognized as one. However, it is also a layered issue that can't simply be summed up by watching the suffering of a few children and the gross negligence of school administrators.

The movie opens with a heartbreaking scene of David Long telling how his son Tyler committed suicide at the age of 17 because of

bullying occurring at his high school.

It's a powerful opening, and it lets the audience know the stakes and urgency of the film's subject. The film introduces us to Alex, a 12-year-old boy in Sioux City, Iowa,

who could be the poster child for what a bullied kid looks like. He's sweet, but scrawny, nerdy looking and socially awkward.

Hirsch takes an unflinching look at how Alex is mistreated, and these scenes take bullying out of the abstract. We also see how an administrator at Alex's school is completely useless at stopping the bullying, if she manages to recognize it all.

Some have claimed that "Bully" shows us the worst-case scenarios of what bullying can look

like when taken too far, but I argue that every case of bullying begins small and quickly escalates.

While on screen, the acts of violence, assault and mental abuse may appear at first harmless childs play, but for those locked into the vicious cycle, its very apparent there is more to it.



Alex Libby, a 12-year-old from Sioux City, lowa, must face mental and physical abuse by his classmates each day he attends school. His story is one of several that bring attention to the severe consequences to childhood bullying.

Alex, who has some mental deficiencies due to his very premature birth, does not understand that the malicious acts of his classmates are damaging and not a part of "messing around."

I believe the point at which he realizes this himself is when he finally tells his mother that being stabbed, strangled and hit no longer bothers him because he's "not sure he feels anything anymore."

For many of us, including myself, Alex's struggle is one that mirrored our own schoolage experiences, some more closely than others. The cruelty of children to those they perceive as different in any way is a national tragedy. No child is born knowing how to hate, and the fault lies squarely on the shoulders of the adults in that child's life.

As a nation that has, and continues to, discriminate daily based on race, gender, political affiliation, religion, sexual orientation and economic class, it's no wonder our children berate and belittle the school communities around them. Hate is a learned behavior our nation seems set on teaching.

For Hirsch, the challenge was to tackle the overall concept of what creates an atmosphere that breeds bullying, as well as the consequences of such. In my opinion, he bit off more than he could chew.

That being said, I understand why several groups fought so hard to make this film rated PG-13, instead of the original R. This is something each child in America should watch, as important as any lesson in history or biology, "Bully" is a lesson in humanity.

Hirsch's only real argument is how bullying isn't being treated as a serious issue. Parents don't see it, and administrators don't know how to deal with it. Some of the documentary's most powerful scenes involve the aforementioned school administrator whose ineptitude and ignorance is darkly comic.

At one point, she notices two kids fighting on the playground, and she tries to make them shake hands as if that will make everything all right. One student refuses, and after letting the other kid go, she chastises him for his refusal. He tries to explain that he's being relentlessly bullied by the other kid, but she thinks he's being equally mean because he wouldn't shake the bully's hand.

It's infuriating to watch, and we all know this isn't an isolated incident. Administrators and teachers aren't doing anything, and in some cases, they actually make lives worse.

If we could all just stop hating each other for being "different" I believe we could finally start to see just how alike and fragile we really are.

Within a week, I traveled to northern New Mexico to run the river, enjoying the scenery, connecting to the environment and building relationships with new friends. Indeed, the Rio Grande does have whitewater.

I love the desert I now call home. I am inspired by the amazing whitewater, scenic rivers and abundant lakes that reside in this state. I am very appreciative of the water that flows through the valley giving life to the plants and animals that call this landscape home. The river provides an escape from the desert heat and is a great place for my family and I to bond.

In celebration of our beautiful rivers, and to raise awareness of the issues impacting our local water resources, the Southwest Environmental Center's 15th annual Raft the Rio will be held June 9, beginning at La Llorona Park, at the Picacho bridge, and ending at Calle del Norte Bridge, the Mesilla bridge. Wounded warriors honored

Dinner held for injured soldiers

Matt Zajac is currently a mechanical engineering student at New Mexico State University, but

not long ago, he was a soldier fighting in Iraq.

Joining the Army seemed somewhat of an automatic response for Zajac, whose grandfathers and older brother had all been in the military.

Before Zajac decided to pursue his bachelor's degree, he enlisted in the Army in 2005. Two years later, he was sent to Baghdad.

While in Baghdad, Zajac's unit was sent on a raid at night. Zajac was driving the Humvee with four other soldiers when it hit an improvised explosive device.

"There was only so much I could do," Zajac said. "I tried to maneuver around it, and ended up taking most of the blast myself, everybody else had minor concussions, minor shrapnel."

After the blast, Zajac was loaded into a truck and taken to a combat support hospital, where he immediately underwent surgery for his injuries. He lost both legs - the right above the knee, and the left below – had burns on his back and "messed up" his right

Zajac was placed in a medically induced coma and flown to Germany and then to Brooke Army Medical Center in Fort Sam Houston.

"And then it was about another year, year and a half worth of surgeries," Zajac said. "I think I had a little over two dozen."

Because of the injuries he sustained, Zajac was able to retire from the Army. He received a purple heart, an army commendation medal and other awards for his service.

Zajac was fitted with prosthetics for his legs, but is still getting used to them.

"I still haven't completely gotten it down yet," Zajac said. "I have two legs that walk completely now, since 2009, but it took a while before I was walking around.'

Even though Zajac's path didn't take him where he thought it would, he was able to see a future beyond his injuries.

"I figured I would probably go to college at some point, but had planned on staying in the Army even if I did," Zajac said.

Although Zajac has worked hard to maintain a positive outlook on his future, he said he isn't sure what to tell people when they ask him for advice on how to cope

Las Cruces resident Bill Wallace saw this, and decided to make a change. He was diagnosed with Parkinson's, and in 2009, founded the Parkinson's Disease Support Group of Southern New Mexico.

The purpose of the group was for Parkinson's patients to get together and discuss what they were going through and share advice on how they were coping with different situations as a result of the disease.

In 2009, when Wallace founded the group, there were six members.

Since then, the number of members has grown significantly, to almost 30.

"Bill is our hero, our mentor," said Eric Hanssen, who was diagnosed a few years ago.

Parkinson's explained



to learn that not all Parkinson's patients are afflicted with tremors.

The disease is caused by a loss of dopamine. Without dopamine, nerve cells are not able to properly send messages, which leads to a loss of muscle function.

The tremor that is commonly associated with Parkinson's is one of four primary symptoms that occur. The others are rigidity, slowness and loss of balance.

'There is medication that one can take to replace the dopamine in the brain," Hanssen said. "It works fairly effectively, but, of course. has some side effects, such as involuntary movement."

Daily life with Parkinson's

Jon Roberts, a member of the Las Cruces support group, was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2003 while living in Nevada.

He began to suspect something was wrong when he noticed he had begun walking with a slight shuffle and he couldn't get his hand

After being diagnosed, he said he started

taking medication, including Carbidopa.

"It relieved some of the symptoms," he said. "My left hand became more flexible, and my shuffle went away."

Last July, Roberts moved to Las Cruces, and quickly discovered the support group.

"I found that to be very uplifting," he said. 'I get positive vibes from other people, and it's lifted my spirits.'

Roberts was unable to attend the group's most recent meeting Tuesday, May 15, because he was undergoing deep brain stimulation

'An electrode the size of angel hair pasta is inserted into my brain," Roberts said, the day before the surgery. "It blocks most of the Parkinson's symptoms so I can have normal motor skills.

"There are very good statistics on people who have had the surgery. I talked to several, and they all said, 'I wish I had done it

Reality vs. misconceptions

Despite the heightened awareness of

Parkinson's disease in recent years, there are still misunderstandings about people who are

You can't die of Parkinson's," Roberts said. "It gets worse, but by itself, Parkinson's is a non-fatal disease.'

Although there is not yet a cure for Parkinson's, symptoms can be alleviated with different medications.

Sometimes, however, a medication's side effects can also be negative.

"No symptoms are alike," Roberts said. 'Sometimes the side effects are greater than the benefit.

He advised others to be calm when dealing with Parkinson's patients.

"Don't freak out," he said." We can do most tasks; we just might be a lot slower about getting things done."

Support in the community

Despite the growing number of members at the meetings, Wallace said he would like to see even more people attend the support

"We'd like to see more participation," he said. "Parkinson's patients don't feel comfortable getting out and talking about

It can be comforting to be able to talk to other people who are in a similar situation, he said.

Hanssen recalled learning about the group in a newspaper a few years ago.

"When I saw Bill Wallace, and that he was shaking, I felt like, 'OK, I'm not alone.' Meeting him gave me a good feeling. He's a real nice guy," Hanssen said.

"At the meetings, we typically have a speaker educating our members on how to effectively deal with Parkinson's. We also have an open discussion, in which our members can share their difficulties, and maybe someone has a suggestion."

Guest speakers at the May 15 meeting were Natascha Preiss, a Pilates instructor, and Ryan Bemis, a local acupuncturist.

"I don't know if I have the absolute correct answer," Zajac said. "Just focus on continuing with life, improving one day at a time. Focus on the future. Make goals, and try to achieve them."

Not long after Zajac returned to Las Cruces in 2010, he joined the Mason's Jornada Lodge No. 70 with help from H.F. "Junior"

"He doesn't feel sorry for himself," Adams said.

"I have my bad days sometimes, just like everyone else," Zajac said.

Adams has been inspired by Zajac's ability to continue to look beyond his past and work hard to achieve success as an engineer. So much so, Zajac will be the guest of honor at the Wounded Warrior dinner sponsored by the Masons to honor soldiers wounded in combat.

"It's a dinner to honor what they've done for us in Vietnam, Korea, Íraq and Afghanistan," Adams said.

Background on autism and resources

An article published by the Mayo Clinic in May 2010, cites the history of autism diagnosis.

In 1943, Dr. Leo Kanner of the Johns Hopkins Hospital defined "early infantile" autism when the study of a group of 11 children revealed dissociative like tendencies and repetitive behaviors and language usage, similar to adults who were labeled as "autistic."

German scientist Dr. Hans Asperger described a milder form of the disorder, "Asperger syndrome."

These disorders, along with several others, are the autism spectrum disorders (ASD). All are characterized by varying degrees of impairment in communication skills, social interactions and restricted, repetitive and stereotyped patterns of behavior.

At its most basic, the word "autism" describes characteristics of being by oneself. Parents have described children as being locked inside or alone in their own world.

But what is autism? According to information provided by the University of New Mexico Center for Development and Disability and the Southwest Autism Network, autism is a very complex disability that, in most cases, appears in the first three years. Autism is the result of a neurological disorder that affects the brain function in areas of normal developments, including social interaction and communication skills.

A person diagnosed with autism may have difficulties in communication, often unable or unwilling to initiate conversations or even having the capability of speech.

Individuals may display repetitive movements, such as rocking or hand motions. Worldview may be a very strict personal perception and may seem cold or unfeeling. Sensitivities make it difficult to focus and can be frustrating to the point of aggressive behavior. Often, the lack of an appearance of autism results in social stigma and childhood bullying of people "who don't act normal."

Pediatricians, day care providers, teachers and parents may dismiss early signs of ASD

believing that the child will catch up with the other kids. Early childhood intervention programs help to ensure the earlier the diagnosis, the sooner a child can get help. But because no one develops the same as the next person, how do they know?

The Mayo Clinic article helps answer this question. Children with ASD do not follow the typical patterns of child development. Clues may exist from birth, but often, the later problems in communication and social skills can go unnoticed. Some children begin right on track. Differences in the way they react to people and other unusual behaviors are more noticeable as their peers begin to out distance them. Changes can be sudden, social and language skills lost one day to the next.

There are several resources for individuals diagnosed with ASD and their families. Tresco Inc. is one of the organizations in Las Cruces that supports "people with differing abilities to reach their potential and realize their dreams."

Tresco provides numerous opportunities for learning, gaining independence and living meaningful lives. Many adult services are provided. Tresco TOTS provides early childhood intervention programs and supports. The family support program provides life skills coaching for participants with traumatic brain injuries and respite. Tresco's recreational respite program offers recreation and socialization to children who have been diagnosed with an ASD and provides respite for parents.

People diagnosed with an ASD also; ride bikes, write, perform or enjoy music, get jobs, graduate, love their favorite foods, have conversations, participate in their community, bring joy to their families and friends and are valuable members of society. Early diagnosis and education are the keys to supporting people with autism to live content and independent

Autism does not go away, but there are supports and programs for people of all ages, their families and friends. Journeys for and with our children enrich our lives.





Four cases of Pertussis reported in NM infants

Vaccinations vital in preventing illness

The New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) reports, that within the past month, four infants in New Mexico have been hospitalized with confirmed pertussis (whooping cough).

The infants, each under 4 months of age, are from Doña Ana, Sandoval and Valencia counties.

There have been no pertussis-related infant deaths in New Mexico since 2005.

"In order to protect New Mexico's infants, all prenatal care providers need to assure that pregnant women have received a Tdap vaccine," said Cabinet Secretary for the New Mexico Department of Health, Dr. Catherine Torres.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) now recommend that pregnant women who have not previously received a Tdap vaccine get one on or after 20 weeks of pregnancy. If for some reason the vaccine is not given during pregnancy, it should be given immediately after delivery; and all of an infant's caregivers, including parents, siblings, grandparents and others around the baby, need to make sure they are up-to-date on their pertussis vaccination.

"In order to prevent infections in newborns, we must first prevent the infection in mothers and the infant's caregivers," Torres said.

In all four of the households, not all of the caregivers had received Tdap vaccine, putting the infants at risk. According to Dr. Torres, infants have the highest mortality from pertussis and are also at risk for extended hospitalization. Infants commonly get pertussis from an infected family member or other caregiver. Infants can't begin receiving pertussis vaccine until two months of age and are not considered minimally protected until they have received the third dose of pertussis vaccine at six months.

Therefore, the best way to protect infants from pertussis is to make certain that everyone caring for or spending time with a newborn is up-to-date on pertussis vaccine.

Pertussis is a serious, highly contagious bacterial respiratory infection. In older children and adults, the early symptoms of pertussis consist of runny nose and mild cough with little or no fever, which after several days develops into a severe cough. Coughing spasms and vomiting after coughing are common.

Sometimes people with pertussis will produce a "whoop" sound while trying to catch their breath following a coughing fit. Infants, however, may only present with gagging, gasping, abnormal breathing and little or no cough. Infants are at high risk of hospitalization, complications and death.

Tdap is a pertussis vaccine for adolescents

and adults that was licensed in 2005 in the United States. Recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) state that all adolescents and adults should receive one dose of Tdap.

In July 2011, CDC issued recommendations to vaccinate pregnant women who have not previously had Tdap with the vaccine after the 20th week of pregnancy. In February 2012, CDC issued additional recommendations that all adults over the age of 65 receive a dose of Tdap. The CDC also recommends that all health care personnel, regardless of age, receive a dose of Tdap as soon as feasible if they have not previously received Tdap and regardless of the time since last tetanus or diphtheria containing vaccine.

Details

The New Mexico Department of Health recommends that all New Mexicans receive the following pertussis vaccines:

- A primary series of childhood pertussis vaccine, called DTaP, at 2, 4, 6 and 15-18 months of age.
- A booster dose of DTaP prior to school entry at 4 to 6 years of age.
- A booster dose of Tdap at entry to middle school.
- A Tdap booster as a teen or adult if one was not given at entry to middle school.
- For pregnant women, a Tdap after the 20th week of pregnancy if the woman has not received one in the past.
- A Tdap booster for anyone who is caring for or spending time with an infant and has not received one in the past, including people over age 65.
- A Tdap booster for all healthcare personnel who have not received or are unsure if they have previously received a dose of Tdap as soon as feasible.

"Doña Ana County Health and Human Services stepped up a long time ago," Ruiz said. "We work with them to find services and needs in the county to create programs to target the issue."

Programs created throughout the county that have contributed to this decline are service learning programs, comprehensive sex education in schools and confidential clinical services.

"Our teen birth rates are continuing to

decline," Ruiz said. "A lot of credit goes to the young people."

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation has recognized the state's struggle with reducing teen pregnancy by bestowing a \$150,000 grant to the coalition. The money will help provide further assistance to vulnerable counties. Will Doña Ana County see further assistance as a result?

"Absolutely, because Doña Ana County is one of Kellogg's targeted communities," Ruiz said.

The grant will be used to provide further technical assistance, teen pregnancy prevention training and sustain current projects and collaborations between state agencies, local governments and community organizations.

The coalition was approached by Kellogg regarding the grant, and did not have to

go through a selection process to receive the funding. The foundation has been providing funding to the state since the 1940s.

"We are incredibly grateful for the generous grant from the Kellogg Foundation," Ruiz said. "Most importantly, it helps our organization get the word out and, hopefully, help to further decrease teen pregnancy in New Mexico."

Risk factors for teen pregnancy are poverty, students who don't apply themselves academically and teens who come from families that aren't functioning well.

The programs targeted to area teens are active at Las Cruces, Gadsden, Chaparral and Oñate high schools. The sex education classes offered at these high schools, as well as the other programs, are designed to be culturally appropriate and community based to cater to the needs and diversity of different communities throughout the state.

It wasn't that long ago that New Mexico had

the highest teen pregnancy in the nation, with Doña Ana County taking the top spot in the state for teen pregnancies. Now, the coalition praises the county for taking active measures to address the issue.

"Doña Ana County is a shining example of when local government steps up," Ruiz said. "We know when young people delay and postpone parenting until they are older, the overall outcome is better when they wait until they are in a loving relationship, and have stable, well-paying jobs."

The NMTPC has been providing services and support to communities for more than 23 years, directed specifically at lowering teen pregnancy rates, addressing the negative outcomes of teen pregnancy and working to improve outcomes for teen parents.

boys and girls from Las Cruces participated for the first time in a league of this kind.


In all, more than six high school institutions were represented. The focus of the league is to provide additional recreational opportunities for teens who want to compete in an environment that is fun and fundamental all in one.

2011 shelter report shows need for change

A breakdown from the director

In the past four years, the ASCMV has made steady progress saving as many lives as possible, while reaching out to the public by offering affordable spay/neuters, rabies vaccinations and micro-chipping. In 2011, there were some improvements, but unfortunately, the ASCMV plateaued in some areas.

In 2011, 1,950 affordable sterilizations were performed, in addition to all the services that are performed in house – all adopted animals are also altered. The ASCMV is hoping to increase those numbers even more in 2012.

There are four ways an animal has a final outcome:

Adoptions

The adoption numbers were down by about 75 animals to 2,507 in 2011, despite all of our adoption promotions. Numbers are projected to increase in 2012.

Return to owners

The return to owners numbers in 2011 was 1,866, which is down by about 100 animals. The ASCMV strongly encourages people to always look at the shelter if their pet goes missing. Do not assume that the pet was stolen.

At the shelter, animals brought in are euthanized on a regular basis if they are not claimed or adopted. Not only should owners have their animals micro-chipped, but ensure that their information is current. Remember include an alternate number and ensure that that number is also current.

Transfers

Transfers are animals that are moved to reputable rescues. These organizations take ownership of the animals and are responsible for their care until they are adopted – those numbers have remained steady for the past several years, nearing 800, but this year the number was only 738 due to fires in northern New Mexico.

The fires caused many transports to be cancelled because shelters were busy assisting those areas. Unfortunately, Doña Ana County only has two specific breed rescues, Bassett/Beagle and Boxers. Not all-breed rescues are located in the county, which means we are competing with all of New Mexico and other states to get our animals into regional and out-of-state rescues.

We are attempting to focus more on rescues this year as it will help to alleviate the financial burden on our community.


Euthanasia

Unfortunately, euthanasia plays a part in controlling the animal population.

This past year it actually went up by about 100 animals. In 2011, 8,455 animals had to be killed for one of many different reasons. That is, 57 percent of all the animals that came into the shelter, 44 percent of the dogs and 81 percent of the cats, were killed. The bottom line is way too many animals end up at the shelter with a 14,746 intake in 2011.

The community must find a way to address the intake in Doña Ana County, which in turn will allow many animals to live out their natural lives instead of being killed.

Support after suicide

Program, groups help ease the pain of loss

Support groups for adult family members and friends who have lost loved ones to suicide have begun in Las Cruces

These support groups are for those who have been confronted with the loss of someone they care about to suicide. Those who have left us are our wives, husbands, partners, mothers, fathers, children, grandchildren, grandparents, uncles, aunts, friends and coworkers.

The loss, at times, feels incomprehensible, the grief almost unbearable. Yet we wake up every morning, take care of those who have been left behind, go to work and often reflect on the "what ifs."

We want to understand why our loved ones chose suicide, what was going on in their minds and hearts and what or if we could have done something to prevent it. There are a lot of questions, but few answers. We will never really know.

By attending these support groups, talking to those who care about us

and seeking professional help, friends and family members can embark on a healing path and a long journey toward better understanding and inner peace.

Individuals who have experienced the trauma and impact of losing a loved one to suicide facilitate the support groups. These facilitators walk along with other group participants and are there to support one another while embarking on their own unique healing journey for inner peace, understanding and comfort.

The facilitators and group members are not people with magical powers who can fix all that is going on in each of our lives. They are people who are there to support one another in the healing process.

The support groups are aimed to help those in attendance to learn, share, engage, question, reflect, support and rejoice in each other's experiences.

The groups are based on a recognition that we are not alone; that there is a place such as the support group to talk about our loved ones and address the shame, guilt, hurt, anger, fear and anxiety that is felt; that it is time for rigorous honesty, respect and

generosity, a time for openness to face our own vulnerabilities, a willingness to ask for help and lean on others, to start challenging our own assumptions, beliefs, interactions, relationships; and to listen and trust one another without judgment.

The support group process is based on simple truths. Our healing will not happen overnight; our ability to trust ourselves and others and rely on our own abilities and that of others will not happen quickly. Our sense of connection with everything and everyone around us will take time and re-learning to do the things that were joyful once will happen little by little.

The support group experience what connects us with others in similar circumstances has the potential to give us a chance to learn, reflect and aspire to become more whole persons despite the difficult experience of suicide of our loved ones.

The support groups will be held every other week in an open-ended format so new participants can join at any time. For more information, contact 635-6265 or phdsatya@aol.com.

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

Work to be done to achieve no-kill status

Nearly 5,000 cats are killed every year

Are you okay killing nearly 5,000 cats a year?

This question is central to successfully achieving a true no-kill community.

For as many years as you can go back in our local history, cats and dogs have been systematically collected as if they were living garbage. On any day around noon, if you are at the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley, you will see a truck loaded with black plastic bags pull out of the parking lot: destination, the city dump. Those bags are filled with the bodies of the night's kill mostly dogs and cats – that just a few hours earlier, were alive.

To stop the unnecessary slaughter of these pets, we must answer the question posed at the beginning of this article with a resounding "no." Such killings must be deemed an outrage. A full commitment needs to be made to end euthanization as a tool for managing our pet population.

The no-kill equation is a set of programs

that have proven effective in drastically reducing the euthanization of shelter animals. Trap, neuter and return is one program aimed directly at saving the lives of free roaming cats or feral cats.

The approach is often misunderstood by the public and its opponents. This lack of understanding can conjure up images of free roaming cats voraciously killing birds and other wildlife, when in reality, humans are the biggest threat to these populations due to urban sprawl, overuse of pesticides and other man-made factors.

In fact, TNR is a full management plan in which cats living a free-roaming lifestyle are humanely trapped, evaluated, vaccinated and sterilized by veterinarians. Kittens and tame cats are then adopted into good homes. Healthy adult cats too wild to be adopted are returned to their familiar habitat under the lifelong care of volunteers.

We have a powerful example of this approach at New Mexico State University where a feral cat program has been operating for 10 years, successfully and dramatically reducing the main campus cat population by 66 percent.

Every effort should be made to incorporate TNR at a community wide level by changing

Michelle Corella is the director of the Feral Cat Management Program at New Mexico State University. Corella is part of the Community Coalition for Pets and People and is currently the director of a project called the Doña Ana Big Kitty Fix.

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

Scenic surroundings draw homeowners

Sitting high in Picacho Hills, home captures area's beauty

There are many elements that draw a person to a neighborhood, from quiet surroundings to access to everyday amenities.

For Stan and Jeanne Hanssen, what drew them to Butterfield Ridge was the view.

In the 1990s, while the couple was living on Vista del Villa, they received a phone call from developer John Moscato of Bright View Land Company inviting them to see the latest project he was working on in the Picacho Hills neighborhood.

"My husband just fell in love with it," Jeanne Hanssen said. "We walked out on the lot and he said, 'I would love to live up here."

Purchasing the 2.01-acre lot at 6635 Butterfield Ridge, the couple hired builder Mike Saxton and Ron Nims of Studio D Architects to design and construct their dream home in 1997.

"Mike Saxton is a wonderful builder," Hanssen said. "He was great fun to work with.'

When completed, the couple had a 3,489-square-foot home designed around their wants and needs that featured an elegant Southwest feel.

'It's tasteful, not overstated," said Realtor Dan Kubiak of Keller Williams Realty.

"I've always liked the Southwest style," said Hanssen, adding that the couple had never lived in a similar home. "I just like

The half-circle, brick driveway descends downward to the entrance of the home. Flagstone leads to the large front door as a bevy of native plants, including yucca, cacti and ocotillo, cover the property.

From the front patio is a view of Picacho Peak, one of the many scenic attractions of the gated community.

Beyond the 8-foot, solid pecan door is the entryway. Featur-

ing a sloped, all-glass Kalwall Skylight, the area is brightly lit. The shining light highlights the many architectural details, including nichos, vigas and pre-sealed Saltillo tile from San Antonio.

Kubiak said because of the large walls and extraordinary amount of light found throughout the residence, the home is perfect for displaying art.

To the right of the entrance is a long banco set under several windows overlooking the front of the property. At the end of the banco is a guest room.

Windows of varying sizes line the walls of the bedroom as a pecan wood entertainment area occupies a recessed feature. The room includes its own bathroom. Adorned in an earth-tone palette of cream, tan and sage green, the bathroom includes high countertops, a bathtub and a shower enclosed in glass blocks for privacy.

"It's a true guest retreat," Kubiak said.

At the center of the home is the living-dining room. Designed as one large, open space, the area includes 18-foot ceilings decorated in large vigas from Ruidoso and planks laid in a tongue-and-groove pattern.

The back wall consists of large windows that begin at the floor to bring in the breathtaking view of the Organ Mountains, the exact view the Hanssens fell in love with. A kivainspired fireplace is found in the corner of the spacious room.

A butler's pantry leads into the kitchen. The Hanssens selected a soft, soothing color scheme for the kitchen. The area includes light tan Corian countertops that match the pecan cabinets.

Playful Portuguese tile was used to accent the hood and large island in the kitchen. Hanssen said the tile reminded them of their home in Portugal.

A breakfast nook set against a rounded wall of windows completes the kitchen area as a hallway with a barrel ceiling leads to rest of the home.

An office, which can be used as a bedroom, is located near the master suite. The master bedroom features built-in shelving scattered throughout. The large space showcases a seating area looking out to the covered patio.

"There are pocket doors covering the sliding glass door," Hanssen said. "We saw this in Telluride, and I thought, 'If we build our own house, I'm going to have that.'

Another feature the Hanssens chose to better fit their needs is a light switch to the kitchen, which is convenient for navigating throughout the home at night.

The master bathroom includes touches of blue tile, an element Stan Hanssen wanted. Beside the double sink and vanity area is the master closet. Two sets of shutter doors enclose the large, finished walk-in closet.

Outside, a wrap-around patio overlooks the view, which includes the valley and city lights. The patio is divided into several seating areas for privacy, such as a dining area near the tile-drenched, built-in barbecue and a seating area beside the

The couple continued the same natural landscaping found in the front of the home.

'We wanted that natural feel," Hanssen said. "It's very low maintenance.

In addition to the home, there is an additional 2-acre lot beside the residence that can be purchased with the property, if

New uses for old tubes

Give new life to that leftover cardboard roll

Toilet paper is a necessity of life. It is something that graces nearly all grocery lists.

Paper towels are also important. It is hard to walk in a home and not see a roll of paper towels sitting in the kitchen.

As useful as these products are, their uses can go beyond the kitchen and bathroom after you get down to the cardboard tube inside. Next time you run out of one of these products, stop before you decide to toss away the cardboard tube.

According to Kimberly Clark, one of the biggest paper product companies, about 17 billion toilet paper tubes are produced each year and can possibly create 160 million pounds of trash. Let's try to curb that number. There is something you can do with your cardboard tube.

1. Store plastic bags: Paper or plastic? Unless you have one of those recyclable grocery bags, you will probably choose plastic. When you get home and unload all of the groceries, you might decide to keep the plastic bags. The problem is finding a place to keep them. You could buy a fancy plastic bag holder or you can save a cardboard tube. Scrunch the plastic bag and stuff it in the tube. You may be surprised at how many you could fit in there.

2. Make decorations: It's time to set up for your child's birthday party, but you forgot to buy decorations to hang. If you have some left over cardboard tubes, you can get creative and save some cash. It's time to pull out your paints and use the cardboard tubes as a canvas. Unravel the tubes and hang them from your ceiling to have original decorations.

3. Store important papers: If you keep important documents stacked on your desk, you run the risk of losing them or even spilling coffee on them. If you have some paper towel tubes around, you have document paper protectors. Roll up your documents and put them inside the tube. Write what the document is on the tube so you can easily find it.

4. Make a rain stick: When you think cardboard tubes, music is not usually the first thing that comes to mind – maybe not yet anyway. Get a tube and fill it about halfway with beads. Grab duct tape and close off the two ends. Why not take out the paints again and decorate your rain stick, too. When you're done, you have a rain stick. Turn it upside down and listen to the sound it makes.

5. Store Christmas lights: It only happens once a year, but when it does it can be quite irritating. The Christmas tree is up and it's time to put the lights on it. You pull the lights out of the box to find a tangled mess and your spirits slightly drop. Don't get discouraged and go to the store to buy one of the trees with the lights already on it. You can make it through one more untangling. When you put up the lights next time, grab a few cardboard tubes and wrap the lights around the outside before you store them away for next year.

6. Vacuum cleaner extension: It's time to vacuum and there are some spaces you can't quite reach even with the vacuum hose. You look for the extension on the back of the vacuum only to remember you lost it years ago. There is no need to buy a new vacuum hose extension. If you have some cardboard tubes available, then you have a vacuum cleaner extension. Put the tube on the vacuum hose and



you should be golden.

7. Toy binoculars: What kid would not love to go on a safari? Toilet paper tubes will not get you to Africa, but they can make good pretend binoculars. Get two rolls and glue them together. You don't need to paint them, but you can if you want. Give them to your kid and let them go on a safari around the house for

8. Make a decorative lamp: There are some pretty cool looking lamps available for purchase. However, buying a brand new decorative lamp might cost a lot. Why not just make your own? Grab a paper towel tube and decorate it

however you would like. Cut holes all over the tube and stick a flashlight inside of it.


9. Make a penholder for your refrigerator: Everyone in a household pays a visit to the refrigerator every day. This is why it is a common place for people to leave notes and important papers hanging from a magnet. Why not just keep your pens there, too, in case you are searching through the refrigerator and suddenly realize you need to write something down. Decorate a toilet paper tube and glue a magnet to it. Put tape on one end to create a bottom and stick it to your refrigerator. Fill the tube with all of your pens, pencils and markers.

Cardboard tube art




Flatten your cardboard rolls, whether they're paper towel or toilet paper rolls.



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Want a touch of salt?

Salt block is a unique way to cook, serve meals

Since debuting on Food Network in January 2005, "Iron Chef America" has opened the country's eyes to competitive cooking.

While many choose to cook because they need to eat, these highly trained chefs do it because it's their passion and calling. The unique nature of the show – pitting chef against chef by creating an assortment of dishes all of which include one specific ingredient - has made it a hit among the masses.

Not only has the show opened our eyes to unique combinations of edible delights grilled watermelon with prawns, anyone? – it has also enlightened us to the unusual array of cooking gadgets available. How many people knew about the blast chiller before "Iron Chef America" and how many had to have one after seeing it on TV?

Another interesting cooking utensil used by the iron chefs is the salt block.

What is it?

The salt block is exactly that - a block of salt, which can be used for plating, sautéing, grilling, chilling, curing, baking and salting.

Created from slabs of Pakistani Pink Himalayan salt, the product was originally mined in 16th century. The slab was hand cut by masons and formed into different cookware, such as plates and bowls.

Nowadays, the salt block can be used in the kitchen in a variety of ways. It can be used to serve appetizers or entrées.

When heated, it can be used to sauté fish, meats and vegetables. It also can be used to fry an egg, with or without butter. Even larger salt blocks can be heated and used to bake bread, pizza and savory pastries.

When chilled, it is a great serving medium for ice creams and sorbets.

Because salt melts at about 1,473 degrees, the blocks can be safely heated or chilled to extreme temperatures – 0 to 700 degrees.

Not only is it functional, the salt block is an



interesting serving platter, thanks to its vibrant hues of pink and red.

How does it work?

While the idea of cooking or serving your food on a salty plate might sound potentially disastrous, the salt block isn't like ground or naturally evaporated salt crystals, which can be easily absorbed.

Salt blocks and plates aren't porous, therefore the surface area that touches your food is minimal and will impart a moderate amount of saltiness.

It's important to remember that moist foods will absorb more of the cookware's saltiness, while dry foods will not.

The salt block has several cooking applications since it can be chilled, heated or left at room temperature. If you're using it chilled or at room temperature, simply plate the food on the block and serve.

If you're heating the block, however, there are steps that must be followed.

Before heating, make sure the block is completely dry. If it is wet, let it dry 24 hours before heating. It is also recommended to allow the block 30 to 45 minutes to be heated to the desired temperature. This isn't a process you want to rush. Dramatic changes in temperature can cause your salt block to break.

It is recommended to heat your salt block on a burner or grill, not in the oven. There are cookware-grade salt blocks available, however, that can be heated in the oven without break-

Remember that after heating your salt blocks several times, cracks and fissures are common. Also, prolonged contact with moisture will dissolve more of the salt block's surface, causing irregularities or pitting.

When freezing, just place the salt block in the freezer for two hours and it will be ready for ice cream, fish, meats, cheese and other

To clean your salt block, wash it with warm water and a soft brush. There is no need for detergents. Dry it with a paper towel before setting it on a drying rack. This process will remove a thin layer of the salt, making it ready to be used again.

Where can it be found?

The salt block can be found at specialty stores and online at websites such as www. atthemeadow.com.


How much does it cost?

Depending on its size, the salt block can cost between \$13 and \$60.

Saving the area's past

Nonprofit focuses on benefits of preservation

Established before New Mexico was even a state, Las Cruces and the Mesilla Valley are full of rich history — history Mesilla Valley Preservation Inc. is working to save.

The nonprofit began in 2009 after a group of community members interested in preserving the area's heritage saw an opportunity to raise awareness and contribute their talents to the cause

"We noticed a lack of productive conversations around historic preservation," said MVP President Eric Liefeld. "We saw an opportunity to have at least a conversation about it."

With a mission to preserve the architectural legacy of the Mesilla Valley, the adopted motto of MVP is "Preserving the future of our past," Liefeld said.

"Preservation is ongoing, it's part of our culture," he said.

A small organization, MVP has 12 board members, all of whom bring their own unique perspectives and talents to the mix.

"They're beyond people who care about preservation," Liefeld said. "Each have key expertise in key areas. When you're working in preservation, you need to know history, architecture, engineering and sometimes even politics."

gineering and sometimes even politics."
On the political side, the board includes state Sen. Mary Kay Papen, City Councillor Greg Smith, County Commissioner Billy Garrett and former legislator J. Paul Taylor, all of whom have worked on or had an appreciation for historic buildings.

"(Taylor), for me, has been an enormous inspiration," said Liefeld, adding that the area icon plans to turn his home into a historic landmark. "He's been an influence to a lot of us."

While educators – such as Sonya Cooper, associate dean of the College of Engineering at New Mexico State University, and Jon Hunner in the NMSU History Department – and contractors – including adobe expert Greg Henry – also fill the board, other members bring knowledge from areas that may not be associated with preservation.

"Dr. David Rockstraw is a chemical engineering professor (at NMSU) and he bought a historic home in Mesilla," Liefeld said. "There are a lot of issues we deal with that are chemical issues, like chemical treatments."

The group is volunteering its expertise and knowledge to various preservation projects throughout the area, including the restoration of the Amador Hotel and Phillips Chapel.

"Because of our depth, we can step in and help folks if they want that depth," said Liefeld, adding that MVP members have volunteered their weekends to work on projects, such as hammering nails and making adobe bricks.

"A big part is we try to encourage adaptive reuse. Take a historic structure and repurpose it sensibly. People need to remain open to new uses."

An example of this is the Nestor Armijo House, located on Main Street. The structure was originally the home of a wealthy local merchant and was later revamped for a bank. Now, it is under renovations to become the future home of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

"With the chamber there, it's going to give people a reason to slow down and go inside," Liefeld said.

In addition to reaching out to property owners, MVP also provides the community with public education opportunities, one such

being its annual Casas de Antaño, a historic home tour that takes place in February. This year, the second annual tour attracted about 550 participants – an increase from the 400 the previous year.

"There seems to be an appreciation and appetite for things like this," said Liefeld, adding that the tour is a way to applaud those who have saved historic buildings while educating the community on what the area has to offer.

"Most people have that one house they have looked at for years and have always wanted to go inside and learn more," Smith said. "This is an opportunity to do that."

Smith said MVP doesn't just focus on adobe buildings, but all forms of construction that have come to the Mesilla Valley. By doing so, the group is discovering just what makes the region unique.

region unique.

"We want to recognize that these buildings are important for a reason," Liefeld said. "We're not saying that every single old building needs to be saved, but we need to look at each of them carefully."

"We hope people will pause before they tear down an old building," Smith said. "Sometimes, when you pause and examine the building, you find out interesting things about it."

Not only does saving historic buildings add to a community's culture and character, it can also impact its economy, Smith said, adding that it is important to look past the initial costs of preserving a structure and consider its long-term benefits.

"Where would Mesilla be without its plaza and its church?" he asked. "It would be a very different community. Where would La Posta be in a community without that? There are longterm benefits that need to be considered."

"The economics of each situation comes into play," Liefeld said. "You can't apply one set of assumptions and rules to all."

As MVP continues to grow and further its reach in the community, members will look at different entities to team up with, such as NMSU and area builders.

"We see ourselves as connectors," Liefeld said. "We can help connect people to resources."

Protecting your pet from pests

If you can't avoid a tick, remove it properly



There is no doubt the increasingly warmer temperatures that have been bestowed upon us as spring and summer arrive equates to an increase of insects that can have adverse health effects on pets.

With the chances of ticks and fleas latching onto pets rising as the temperature does, pet owners need to be aware of the different things they can do to prevent them.

It's also important to prevent your pets from bringing ticks and fleas into your home where they can cause harm to you and your family.

Killing the tick myth

For some reason, many people think the best way to remove ticks is by lighting a match and burning the little pest off. Please, don't do this.

When you burn a tick off, you kill it and therefore kill the tick's ability to open its mouth to let go of your pet, making it more likely to transmit any disease it may be carrying.

Similar to the heat technique, using petroleum jelly and nail polish are also not good options and could potentially hurt your pet.

Make your yard less tick friendly

For most pets, the backyard is their sanctuary. It's where they spend most of their time, making the job of keep-

ing the area pest-free very important. Removing leaf litter, clearing tall

grasses and mowing the lawn frequently are a few other examples of what you can do to make your backyard a safer environment for your furry creatures.

A pet owner's responsibility is to ensure the happiness and health of their pets. Make sure you do this by taking the necessary precautions in order to keep them safe, happy and healthy.

Quick tick removal tips

- Inspect your pets from head to toe after outdoor playtime sessions, especially if you live in rural areas (or go to a dog park) where they may be running around in brush and foliage (or where lots of other dogs are around).
- When taking your pets for a walk, stay in the middle of the trail to avoid shrubs or tall grassy areas that are often high-risk zones.
- Utilize a good "vet approved" tick preventative treatment.
- Ask your veterinarian to check for ticks at each exam.
- If a tick is found on your pet, remove it immediately with tweezers to get as close to the skin as possible. Make sure to pull upward in a steady motion until it lets go. If you jerk or twist the tweezers when pulling it out, part of it may remain in the animal's skin.
- Once the tick is removed, drop it in a bottle filled with rubbing alcohol to kill it. Another option is to place the tick on a piece of tape and flush it down the toilet.



As the temperatures get warmer, ticks and other pests will become more active, putting your beloved pets at risk.

 Most importantly, don't forget to wash your hands after removing the tick.

During the economic downturn, many in the housing and building industries felt the pains of readjusting to the new market, keeping their businesses afloat and dealing with the rules and regulations that af-

fect the industry.

Representatives of the New Mexico Home Builders Association (NMHBA) spoke to a group of builders about the association's impact on their business during a luncheon held at the Las Cruces Home Builders Association Thursday, May 10.

"The main focus of the NMHBA is lobbying and dealing with the rules and regulations that affect your industry," said Jack Milarch with the state association.

During the 30-day 2012 legislative session, Milarch said several issues were brought up that impact builders, such as gross receipt tax (GRT) pyramiding on construction.

"We did some good things on this one," he said, adding that Gov. Susana Martinez gave them her backing.

GRT pyramiding is when a product or service is taxed multiple times. Currently, there are

non-taxable transactions put in place on building materials. While GRT haven't been eliminated entirely, certain services have been added to non-taxable transactions, Milarch said.

"If you have a service that meets all of the standards, it could be deducted," he said. "We're still working on the rules and regulations that tell you exactly what can be deducted.

"It has to be a specific construction project, not overhead.

"This could be really good for you."

Milarch also spoke on the effect the economic downturn is having on those in the building community and offered a strong piece of advice.

"We have a lot of contractors going into other things and areas with their business," he said. "Some things they're doing, however,

aren't covered by their license and they can get fines or lose their license.

"Take a look at what your license covers."

Pat Casey, who represents residential building on the state's Construction Industry Committee, said licenses aren't the only things builders should double check. He said that although the city hasn't adopt the state's 2009 building code, local builders can still lose their license with the state if they aren't meeting those standards.

"The city and City Council said they would adopt the code in July 2012," he said. "It's important to build to the state's minimum code."

Michael Richards, current NMBHA president, said all builders should join the association because it's "a connection for you on the legislative and regulation side."

"It can be very beneficial," he said.

Richards said 10 years ago, the political environment was different with many politicians getting elected because of their "anti-growth" stance, which was blamed on the "greedy builders."

"It's been an uphill battle," he said. "But we have a different role now. Now we're appreciated for providing jobs and a tax base to a community. Because of that value, we're able to be at the table now."

Bulk bin bargains

How to make cents of buying in bulk

Does the phrase "buying in bulk" make you think of club stores, duffel-bag-sized packages of potato chips and 5-gallon jars of mayo? Think again.

Buying in bulk isn't just for big families or those with a lot of storage space. It's for anyone who wants to save money.

What's the secret? "Bulk" refers to how the store offers the product, not how much you have to buy. You can purchase a pinch or a pound – however much you need – and save yourself money while reducing packaging waste

The idea that you have to buy large quantities is one of the misperceptions about buying bulk. Ellen Bouchard, bulk manager at Frontier Natural Products Co-op, describes and dispels the following common bulk-food myths and provides shopping tips for consumers.

Myth No. 1: You must buy in large quantities to buy bulk.

In fact, bulk offers an easy and economical way to expand your food horizons by letting you try small amounts of unfamiliar products. You can buy just a pinch of the exotic spice or a cup of the unfamiliar grain called for in a recipe. Or you might purchase small quantities of a number of spices and seasonings or spice blends, such as garam masala, to experiment with a new ethnic cuisine.

If you think you might like to try something new, buying in bulk enables you to purchase a small quantity without worrying about wasting money.

Myth No. 2: It's wasteful to buy in bulk.

Quite the opposite, because you can buy just the amount you need. Keep in mind that prices for bulk products are considerably lower than the packaged versions, and the full amount of your purchase goes toward the product, not packaging or advertising.

In addition, manufacturing that package wastes energy and resources. So when you buy in bulk and reuse storage containers, it's a positive contribution to the planet's health.

Myth No. 3: It's hard to know what's in those bins and if it's fresh.

Bulk foods are often of higher quality, fresher and more natural than packaged products. They're also more likely to be locally produced.

Good labeling practices by retailers will

- When filling your containers, use the scoops or the dispensers provided. Take your time and be neat, but if you spill something, there's no need to panic. Just ask a staff person for help in cleaning it up.
- Most stores will have you write down the item number and price of the item (from the bin) before you take your selection to the register.

Myth No. 4: The bulk selection is limited.

Another misconception. Some products you'll likely find in the bulk aisle: beans, flours, grains, nuts, seeds, cereals, herbs and spices, pastas, teas, coffees and household and toiletry items such as laundry detergent and soaps.

Myth No. 5: Bulk products are low quality. Bulk products are most often of equal or higher quality than their packaged counterparts. Many exotic and gourmet items are available only in bulk, as are some Fair Trade Certified and certified organic products. For example, do you know how many types of cinnamon exist? In some bulk spice aisles, you can find multiple varieties of cinnamon, ranging from traditional Korintje (3 percent oil) to premium Vietnamese (5 percent oil) to Ceylon cinnamon from Sri Lanka.

Tri-tip is great for your summertime cookouts

Once upon a time, in the early 1950s (or so the story goes), a butcher of a Safeway store in Santa Maria, Calif., sliced off the tough piece of muscle from the corner of the bottom

Later, he would cut the piece into cubes for a slow-cooking stew or ground it into hamburger.

On a whim, a fellow butcher decided to season the two-pound hunk with salt, pepper and garlic and cook it whole on a spit over hot coals. He was chided for his efforts: No way could this tough piece of meat be tenderized enough to be chewable. But lo and behold, after nearly an hour of rotation, the triangular-shaped cut was not only tender, but also flavorful from its excellent marbling. (A perk was that it was much less expensive than

Recipe inventor Bob Schutz dubbed the cut of meat as tri-tip. Initially, tri-tip roast or steak was only available in the Golden State, but over the years, its popularity grew and it is now available in most grocery stores and

Tri-tip tastes especially yummy marinated in a favorite sauce and then grilled. Serve with corn on the cob and a chilled fruit salad.

Hot 'Shots' of **Tequila Marinade**

3 to 4 pounds beef tri-tip with most fat trimmed off (a little on the bottom side is good)

3 tablespoons tequila

2 tablespoons sesame oil

2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon black pepper

1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon habanero powder (or substitute cayenne)

Mix all ingredients in a small bowl and place in a large zip-top bag with tri-tip. Marinate at least two hours before desired grilling

Pre-heat gas grill to 400 degrees. Place meat on grill topside down for 3 to 4 minutes for nice grill marks. Flip over and reduce heat slightly and close lid. Cook for 20 to 25 minutes or until meat thermometer inserted in center reads 135 to 140 degrees for medium. Slice thin against the grain. Makes 6 to 8 servings. Asian-Style Oven Baked Tri-Tips

1/4 cup hoisin sauce 2 teaspoons ginger, minced 3 cloves garlic, minced 2 tablespoons rice vinegar 2 tablespoons soy sauce Heaping 1/4 teaspoon freshly



ground black pepper 1 (2-pound) tri-tip roast 1 tablespoon olive oil

Stir together hoisin, ginger, garlic, vinegar, soy sauce and pepper until well blended. Rub marinade all over roast, coating it well. Place in a glass baking dish, cover and allow to marinate in the refrigerator at least 8 hours, but preferably overnight.

Remove tri-tip from the refrigerator and let it sit at room temperature for 30 minutes. Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Blot roast dry with paper towels to remove some of the excess marinade.

Heat olive oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Sear roast for about 2 minutes per side or until nicely browned. Transfer roast to a small roasting pan or baking dish and place in the oven. Cook until it reaches an internal temperature of 125 degrees for medium rare, about 20 to 22 minutes.

Remove roast from the oven and cover loosely with foil. Let rest for 15 minutes before carving. Slice across the grain and serve.

New Mexico Red Marinade

2 pounds tri-tip steak

3 to 4 tablespoons Montreal steak seasoning

2 tablespoons fresh squeezed lime juice

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

1 teaspoon garlic, minced

1 tablespoon of medium-hot New Mexico red chile powder (or to taste)

2 tablespoons olive oil

Trim any visible fat on outside of tri-tip pieces, and cut into serving size pieces, if desired. Rub all sides of steak pieces with Montreal steak seasoning. Put steak into large plastic zipper bag or plastic container with tight-fitting lid and add lime juice, Worcestershire sauce, balsamic vinegar, garlic, red chile powder and olive oil. Seal bag or plastic container and turn over a few times to mix marinade ingredients.

Let steak marinate in refrigerator 8 to 24

refrigerator, drain marinade and let meat come to room temperature, about 20 minutes. Preheat gas or charcoal grill to high. When steak is room temperature and grill is hot, put steak on grill, cover and cook until desired doneness, turning once. Tastes best medium rare (145 degrees, about 8 minutes).

Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Tri-Tip for Two Fiesta Marinade

2 tri-tip steaks

1 tablespoon ancho chile powder

1/2 cup lime juice

1/2 cup cilantro, chopped

1 tablespoon Mexican oregano

1 tablespoon ground cumin

2 serrano chiles, seeded and sliced very thin

1/2 cup olive oil

1/3 cup soy sauce

1/3 cup gold tequila, good quality

1/4 cup fresh garlic, finely chopped 2 teaspoons lime zest, green part only

2 tablespoons coarsely

ground black pepper


1 tablespoon kosher or sea salt

Combine all ingredients and marinate the tri-tips 4 to 8 hours. Reserve leftover marinade for basting tri-tips on the grill.

Place the tri-tips in the center of the grate on a hot grill. Cover. Check tri-tip every 20 minutes or so and baste with the reserved

Using a thermometer cook tri-tips to an internal temperate of 135 degrees for rare. (More than 145 degrees, tri-tips become tough.) When done, remove from grill and allow to rest for 20 minutes before slicing against the grain.

Hop on the sage coach

Drought-tolerant plant comes in array of colors

Nothing brings diverse beauty to our desert landscape like a true sage plant. There are several species, such as Salvia greggii, Salvia leucantha and Salvia nemerosa, to name a few.

This group brings an array of colors from which to choose. Colors range from deep red to pink, orange to coral, deep blue to light purple and any other color in between.

Most plants in the salvia family do best in full sun to very light shade. Most are hardy in southern New Mexico and east Texas. They are drought tolerant once established and can bloom all season long.

They all prefer fast draining soil and most thrive with just a little fertilizer. You can shear the spent blossoms once or twice a year to help keep new blooms forthcoming. If you have trouble getting them to bloom, an application of a high phosphorous fertilizer should do the trick.

After a hard freeze in late January or after, you can cut these (the perennial ones) all the way back to a few inches above the soil line. This will help rejuvenate the plant and keep the shrub

from getting woody. This action will allow for fresh new growth in the spring.

Inspect your plants regularly for insects such as spider mites and/or spittle bug. The spittle bug looks like the name implies. It produces a frothy liquid substance that shields the plant from the sun and beneficial predators. In very light infestations, a strong stream of water may be enough to keep this insect at bay

If you find the water does not work, try using a botanical or organic insect spray before resorting to harsher chemicals. The reason for this is these flowering gems attract hummingbirds, butterflies and bees, so we do not want to injure these very beneficial creatures. Most plants in the salvia family do best in full sun to very light shade.

Incorporating one or more of these aromatic plants into your landscape will be sure to bring you several years of a spectacular spring and summer show with its flowers and nature's colorful creatures that come to visit it as well.
