Elections start to take shape

Democrats attempt to head off in-fighting By Todd G. Dickson

Delegates at the state Democratic Party's convention picked a Las Cruces woman to go up against Republican incumbent U.S. Rep. Steve Pearce to avoid a battle in the primary election June 5.

As a Democratic challenger to the Second Congressional District, 88 percent of the delegates chose Evelyn Madrid Erhard, a retired higher education communications and writing teacher from Las Cruces, over Frank McKinnon of Roswell.

McKinnon initially conceded to the in-party action, but, according to his Facebook posts, he began a petitioning drive to get put on the ballot.

For districted races around the state, candidates must turn in their petitions and nomination paperwork to the Secretary of State's Office in Santa Fe by 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 20.

When Madrid announced her candidacy in November 2011, she said the focus of her campaign would be job creation, strengthening public education, and affordable health care.

Erhard has taught communication, composition and critical thinking to students at Doña Ana Community College and New Mexico State University.

Meanwhile, more candidate an-nouncements have made for state races in southern New Mexico and in Doña Ana County positions up for election.

County clerk

Dolores Connor, former Las Cruces city councillor, announced she is running for Doña Ana County clerk, a position currently held by the Democratic incumbent Lynn Ellins.

Connor gave up her seat on the City Council last year in a failed attempt to unseat Mayor Ken Miyagishima. After the loss, Connor said she began thinking about running for county clerk because the voter turnout was low in that city race, despite spirited campaigning by her and another challenger.

If elected, Connor said she would focus on improving voter turnout. In her See **Candidates** on page A11

Kids get spring break activities

Warm temps opens up outdoors

Just because kids have a week off, they and their parents don't have to endure spring break at home.

The City of Las Cruces and community groups are providing a variety of day activities during the break from Monday, March 19, to Friday, March 23.

As it has in past years, the city's after-school program is providing a "Leap into Spring" camp throughout spring break. Every day, the camp will give kids things to do that are active and often outdoors, said Marcel Nicolitz, program coordinator.

"This is a time for the kids to shake off the icicles and get out

of the heavy coats they've been wearing," Nicolitz said.

Meerscheidt Recreation Center at 1600 E. Hadley Ave. will be the location or starting point for the camp, which costs \$60 per child in grades kindergarten through fifth. The fee cannot be pro-rated, Nicolitz said, meaning it's \$60 whether a child goes to the camp all five days or just one day. The camps start at 8 a.m. and winds down at 4:30 p.m.

Nicolitz said the city is offering the camp because it's difficult for working parents to take a whole week off to care for their children over the break.

Superintendent wants time for finding best student fit

The opening of a new high school is causing some delay in approving transferring students, but Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Stan Rounds told the school board Tuesday, March 13, the extra time will be worth it.

already enrolled in Centennial School, which will High open its doors in August. Administrators had been aiming to start classes with about 1,200 students - mostly freshmen and sophomores. Rounds said more than 200

students so far have put in transfer requests. The district has announced students have until April 16 to put in for a transfer.

The superintendent is making the final decision on transfer approvals, and he admitted the later-than-normal final decision will make final high school staffing and scheduling fast-andfurious at the close of a school year.

But Rounds said it is more important to make sure the opening of a fourth comprehensive high school in the district helps all secondary students in the district.



Friday, March 16, 2012 **C4CR, Pink cancer events** raise close to \$1 million Funds go to two research endowments

In 2011, the collective efforts of Cowboys for Cancer Research (C4CR) and New Mexico State University Aggies Are Tough Enough to Wear Pink (TETWP) generated a combined total of \$954,945 in cash and in-kind contributions, according to both organizations.

After operational expenses are paid, all of the cash raised by both groups is invested in the Alma Cohorn Memorial/Cowboys for Cancer Research Endowment at the University of New Mexico Cancer and Research Center and the Cowboys for Cancer Research Endowed Fund at NMSU.

"As a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit corporation, Cowboys for Cancer Research is required to follow standard accounting practices and file a return with the IRS just like everyone else," said C4CR President Kevin Davis. "Because the TETWP committee contributes their annual fundraising efforts to our organization, the totals are combined and reported together. The work we do, however, is much more than an accounting function. It's a true partnership and all of the money raised stays here in New Mexico funding important cancer research at New Mexico State and UNM."

- TETWP cash \$395,910.16 TETWP in-kind \$168,046.04 Total: \$563,956.20

- Combined Total \$954,546.65

"Since 2005, our partnership with Cowboys for Cancer Research has represented a perfect working relationship between two groups of committed community volunteers," said TETWP co-chair and NMSU regent Laura Conniff. "We reach out, for the most part, to different constituencies. We host our own unique events. But at the end of the day, we are proud to have the money we raise be invested in the Cowboys for Cancer Research endowments here at New Mexico State and the UNM Cancer Center."

WAC Champions

Aggies win the WAC tournament, gain national respect and punch their ticket to the Big Dance

Last weekend, the 2011-12 edition of the New Mexico State University Aggie men's basketball team won an automatic berth in the NCAA tournament as they dominated their three opponents at the Western Athletic Conference tournament in Las Vegas, Nev. What a terrific season this has been.

As I write this column, the Aggies have 26 wins and only nine losses. They won nine of their final 10 games, losing only in the final seconds to regular season WAC champion Nevada in Reno. In five years, Coach Menzies' teams have won 102 games.

This year's Aggie team will hold a special place in NMSU basketball history. Three players, Wendell McKines, Hernst Laroche and Hamidu Rahman each joined the exclusive 1,000-point club this year, the only time three Aggies achieved the 1,000 point level in the same season. McKines also pulled down more than 1,000 rebounds, joining Sam Lacey as the only Aggies to score 1,000 points and garner 1,000 rebounds.

McKines led the WAC both in scoring and rebounding with 18.8 points and 10.8 rebounds per game. McKines' statistics rank him nationally at 27th in scoring and 7th in rebounding. Rahman was second in the league in field goal accuracy as he converted on 60.3 percent of his field goal attempts. The Aggies also had the conference's top two leaders in the defensive steals category. Laroche was first with 1.8 steals per game while freshman Daniel Mullings averaged 1.7 thefts per game. Mullings also was the first Aggie since William Benjamin in 1990 to score a rare triple-double. At home against Hawai'i, Feb. 23, he had 28 points, 12 rebounds and 10 assists.

As a team, the Aggies were prolific, averaging 78.5 points per game. On average, they outscored their opponents by more than 10 points per game. Fifth-year head coach Marvin Menzies has traveled the world to assemble one of the tallest and most athletic teams in the NCAA. In 2012 the Aggies took full advantage of their height as they outrebounded their opponents by nearly nine rebounds per game.

At the 2012 WAC tournament, Laroche, McKines and Tyrone Watson were named to the all-tournament team. McKines was named the Most Valuable Player.

The highlight of the home season was the 115-73 drubbing of Hawai'i. The downside of the impressive win was that only 5,223 fans were on hand in the Pan American Center to witness this powerful athletic performance. In fact, the Aggies drew an average of only 5,572 attendees per game during this season, a number that ranked fourth among the eight WAC teams. Utah State led the WAC in home attendance at 9,916. Fresno State and Hawai'i outpaced NMSU with averages of 6,521 and 6,088 respectively.

The Aggies used to always lead their league in attendance and reportedly often played to sold-out crowds. The cheering and incessant noise would be disruptive to unwary opponents, earning our fans the nickname "Panamaniacs." Now, with a half-full Pan Am Center, no longer do other teams fear coming to Las Cruces. Hopefully, this will change next year, as local residents and students recognize the incredible talent the Aggies are bringing to the court.

Another factor potential fans should consider is not only are the Menzies players terrific athletes, they are also good students and excellent citizens. Each young man volunteers dozens of hours of community service over the course of the year. Fifteen years ago, it was not unusual for NMSU basketball players to drop out of school as soon as they had used all their eligibility. Today, the situation is much different. All our Aggies work hard in the classroom and make their grades or they don't play.

My hat is off to Menzies and his staff for bringing not only athleticism and spirited play to our university, but also for his genuine concern for the young men under his watch. It is fun to watch the Aggies stifle opposing teams with their tenacious defense, run the floor aggressively and delight the crowds with spectacular passing and dunks. It is just as impressive to know that each of these student athletes will be graduating -

in fact, Laroche already has - as they prepare for the next step in their lives. Congratulations, Coach Menzies, on a highly entertaining and successful year and for helping to develop the talent and character of the young men you bring to Las Cruces.

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Liability misfire a threat to spaceport

Other states vie for a piece of space industry



The New Mexico Legislature's failure, once again, to expand liability protection for the space industry may send our \$200 million spaceport investment down the drain. Trial lawyers were again the major culprit.

The spaceport's major competitors, Florida, Texas, Virginia and Colorado, already have passed the necessary legislation. New Mexico passed limited legislation in 2010, holding harmless spaceflight operators from lawsuits in case of accidents.

But Virgin Galactic passengers already sign waivers. The main problem is the suppliers and contractors, such as manufacturers of space vehicles. This puts New Mexico at a disadvantage. Christine Anderson, executive director of the Spaceport Authority, thinks contractors and manufacturers will avoid doing business here.

Yes, spaceflight is dangerous, but the people willing to shell out \$200,000 for a ticket have already thought of that. They are adventurers who get a thrill from a little danger.

But how little danger is enough? Federal authorities haven't come up with a standard yet. The numbers for the space shuttle program were high: two catastrophes out of 134 flights. Domestic jet flight deaths are more like one in 30 million.

We won't get that safe, but the industry will go slowly. An accident early in the program would be very hard on business.

Speed was important when the \$10 million Ansari X Prize competition was underway to see who could make two trips to the edge of space in less than a week.

That was eight years ago. Timetables at that point talked about getting passengers into space in just a few years. But the risks allowable for test pilots and paying passengers are considerably different.

Richard Branson, owner of Virgin Galactic, now says he wants to take his children on the first flight. That flight doesn't appear to be very close. Safety is now the big consideration. But

Safety is now the big consideration. But accidents are bound to happen. If they do, lawyers will be looking for clients. The industry is skittish. New Mexico's space competitors are looking to ease those fears and attract business.

It is unfortunate that New Mexico's two most promising industries have been undercut by state government actions. Last year, a cap was placed on movie industry expense rebates.

You may have noticed that this year's Academy Awards were considerably less exciting than the previous several years. Not much happened last year.

Expanded liability protection for the space industry appears to be a major issue for future legislatures and for this year's elections. Voting records on the issue are being tallied and both sides may weigh in.

Meanwhile, not only are other states getting into spaceport building, the number of space companies keeps growing. Virgin Galactic made a big splash, signing on with Scaled Composites soon after it won the X Prize.

But already in the game or joining soon after were Blue Origin, financed by Amazon

founder Jeff Bezos; Armadillo Aerospace, owned by computer-game developer John Cormack; Space X, owned by Leon Musk, creator of PayPal; a company created by Budget Suites owner Robert Bigelow and UP Aerospace, a Colorado company that is Spaceport America's second tenant.

All of these companies, and more, are well along in various specialties. Those specialties include two companies that are building passenger rocket ships. One is building rockets to carry cargo and crew to the space station.

Óne has already successfully recovered a spacecraft from earth orbit. One has already launched two inflatable space habitats into orbit. These are the precursors to possible research labs or factories that could make products under weightless conditions.

If any of this surprises you, it's likely because little of it is happening in New Mexico. We do have stiff competition to being America's spaceport. We have some advantages, such as isolation and location next to a missile range that already has unlimited air space.

Another advantage is the federal decision to concentrate its efforts outside earth orbit and let private enterprise take care of all the nearby stuff. Not everyone agrees with that decision, but many scientists have long said they can do better with unmanned probes.

are good people not realizing the harm they cause. Namely, we no longer treat young students just entering our schools humanely. Specifically, kindergarten students are treated inappropriately for their age.

We must band together to restore the humanity to kindergarten. It will take our voices and feet. First, it takes seeing the problem. The Swickard Axiom: Never use a political solution for a non-political problem, especially in education. In the past 25 years, political leaders have completely over-

In the past 25 years, political leaders have completely overpowered educational leaders. Politicians contend educators are not rigorous enough. Education must be as tough as Marine basic training. School is not supposed to be fun and it is not. This is counter to my rules of education and counter to all published research.

Politicians demand dramatically more paperwork, which turns teachers into record clerks and takes time from teaching. School administration, in the last 25 years, is perhaps five times bigger without increasing student success. But then, they decided to destroy kindergarten.

In the past 10 years, educational leaders have destroyed a cherished institution, kindergarten. Translated, the name kindergarten means the children's garden, a place where they can grow. Kindergarten was one of the few things that public schools did well. No longer is this true, since the garden has been made toxic by people who lack the understanding of children and how they mature.

When kindergarten was introduced into the public schools, the core outcome for students was to transition from home individual learning to group learning. As my quote says, students must enjoy the passage of time. It does not have to be a carnival but what students do must engage their curiosity and they must enjoy the process. Further, it has to be brain appropriate and herein is the problem with schools today.

Kindergarten was best when it was only half a day. Allday kindergarten is too much for students at that age. Brain research indicates how much to teach to young children.



Technically, the issue involves data consolidation, the longterm memory of learned skills and data that comes with sleep. The data to be converted is temporarily stored in the emotional area of the brain's limbic system and then transferred to long-term memories in sleep. Older students can handle more data to be stored and transferred, while at age five, it is a small amount.

Also there is the issue of brain development. Young minds are not mature minds. The leader of education in the world, Finland, starts its students at age seven to ensure adequate development of the frontal lobe of the brain where the formal operations of the mind are conducted.

In short, trying to teach information that requires formal logic is impossible until the student's brain is ready. Herein is the problem. Kindergarten was once a place where children came and worked on gross and fine motor skills, one-step memory data such as colors, numbers and the alphabet, sang songs, danced, played games that stimulated their brains and went home saying, "I sure do love school."

It was half of a day, which matched the brain transfer storage ability and formal development ability. Alas, political needs required kindergarten to be changed to all day so more teachers could be hired. Leaders reasoned incorrectly that starting earlier would give the students an advantage. It does not, as Finland understands. "How the Brain Learns," by David Sousa, focuses on what educators need to know about brain development.

Teachers who see this harm done to young students have been hushed by their political leaders. Therefore, we citizens must band together to rescue kindergarten students from the inappropriate demands made upon them for political reasons. Let me break down our challenge. No. 1 - Approximately 45 percent of our population doesn't vote. I suggest an equal number don't care where their FF and S comes from. I would also posit that another 10 percent of the urban population has enough scientific and biological knowledge to

offer an informed opinion about modern FF and S techniques and understand the why's. Maybe another 5 percent are also in-

formed and still do not approve of modern agricultural, timber or mining methods. If they are "true Luddites" they make an effort to live off-the-grid, eat "organic" food and bicycle wherever they go. They are usually either well-to-do or homeless.

Say 5 percent are direct descendants of farmers, miners and lumberjacks, or they are immigrants that are predisposed to trust the producers of the world. The recent New Mexico Legislative Session ended on a high note for the residents of Doña Ana County with the funding of many crucial requests through the Capital Outlay Bill that was signed by Gov. Susana Martinez. Among those important items was the approval of \$845,000 for Phase II of the Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority's (MVRDA) new Consolidated 9-1-1 Center facility project.

The current MVRDA building is aging, outgrown and will not be capable of keeping

pace with the needs of the growing population in Doña Ana County. This capital outlay will allow the county to move forward with site analysis, selection and construction blueprints. A new facility will be a great benefit to public safety in Doña Ana County and the region as a whole.

What is often forgotten is that a strong public safety system, including 9-1-1 and dispatch, are vital components to regional growth, community development and quality of life. Realtors, tourism bureaus, and chambers of commerce will often quote crime statistics, fire department ratings and access to health care when attracting newcomers and businesses to the community and region. The first vital link to those public safety compo-nents is a strong and efficient 9-1-1 system. If the call isn't received, the first responders can't respond. As I like to say, "It all begins with 9-1-1... Saving lives together.'

MVRDA answers 9-1-1 and dispatches law enforcement, fire, and EMS responders in all of Doña Ana County, including the cities of Las Cruces, Sunland Park, Anthony, the Town of Mesilla and the Village of Hatch. In 2011 MVRDA answered 366,075 telephone calls and dispatched first responders to 335,916 incidents.

Ogas hospitalized

Bob Ogas, retired longtime Mayfield High School, remains at the University of New Mexico hospital for the second week due to an unknown brain ailment.

Dave Thompson, retired school administrator and friend, said Thursday, March 15, that he, his wife and some friends will be visiting Ogas this weekend to take a family car to Ogas' wife, Olivia, who has been in Albuquerque since he was brought to the UNM hospital suffering from a suspected stroke.

Thompson said doctors haven't been able to determine exactly what happened to Ogas, who is in his early 70s. A surgery was performed on Ogas to remove blood from the brain, Thompson said.

Ogas no longer needs help breathing, so his condition may be improving, but it is still very serious, Thompson said.

Another Mayfield icon – football coach Jim Bradley – also remains in the hospital, but is now out of intensive care at MountainView Regional Medical Center. Bradley, 79, suffered a stroke last month not long after being struck by a heart attack.





Science fiction author also an inventor and visionary

New Mexico Museum of Celebrating the Spirit of Exploration!

Not long after the United States launched the Explorer I satellite in 1958, Sir Arthur C. Clarke was visiting his "close friend," Wernher von Braun,

in Huntsville, Erik Bergaust wrote in "Wernher von Braun" (National Space Institute/1976). The two men went off to buy ice for their drinks.

'Clarke had never seen a coinoperated ice-dispensing machine before, and watched with interest as von Braun slipped a quarter into the slot," Bergaust said. "Out came a huge plastic-covered iceberg, which they put in the trunk of the car. There was a clank from the machine – and out came another iceberg. Something had gone wrong, but who were they to argue?

While loading the second bag, two more fell from the machine. Frustrated, von Braun "kicked the deranged robot in the guts" and out popped his quarter, Bergaust said. 'That was the moment,' Clarke reminisced, 'that I decided he was, indeed, a man who had power over machines.'

Clarke, who died on March 19, 2008, was a prolific author and scientist who, in his 1945 article "Extra-terrestrial Relays," introduced the communications satellite. His idea, an undated paper in the New Mexico Museum of Space History Archives explained, was to place three satellites in a stationary orbit "120-degrees apart" to " 'observe' one-third of the most populated area of the planet. All three satellites together, which Clarke described as a 'chain of space stations,' (sic) could thus simultaneously 'see' the entire Earth, mak-ing global communication possible." Eighteen years passed before America, in 1963, launched the first such satellite "in a geostationary orbit, Syncom 2," the website nmspacemu-seum.org said. "Today, the geostationary orbit 26,000 miles above the Earth is named the Clarke Orbit by the International Astronomical Union.'

Clarke was born on Dec. 16, 1917, in England to a "farm-ing family" along the sea coast, clarkefoundation.org said. When his father died, Clarke could not afford an advanced education, so in 1936 he moved to London "and pursued his early interest in space sciences by joining the British Inter-



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planetary Society." Three years later, World War II erupted and he joined the Royal Air Force, working with radar "during its experimental trials." Clarke left the RAF in 1946, and was awarded a Fellowship at King's College, London, where he obtained first class honors in Physics and Mathematics in 1948.

In 1946, Clarke sold his first science fiction story, "The Rescue Party," which Astounding Science Fiction published in the May issue. The plot concerned extra-terrestrials arriving "to rescue a fraction of (Earth's) population" because the sun was about to go nova, the story's introduction explained.

Subsequent non-fiction books he published over the next five years included "Interplanetary Flight: An Introduction to Astronautics," "The Sands of Mars"; and, in 1951, "The Exploration of Space." **Rescue Party**

foundation.org said. "From these communications, a new branch of meteorology was born, and Dr. Wexler became the driving force in using rockets and satellites for

meteorological research and operations.' Clarke's 1948 story "The Sentinel," written for a BBC competition and which won nothing, eventually became the seed for "2001: A Space Odyssey." According to imdb.com, filmmaker Stanley Kubrick "approached (Clarke) by saying that he wanted to make 'the proverbial good science-fiction movie.' Clarke suggested that his story 'The Sentinel' about finding an alien artifact on the Moon, would provide a suitable premise." Several sources cited that, beginning in 1964, Clarke simultaneously wrote the novel and co-wrote, with Kubrick, the screenplay.

"2001 was the first science-fiction film to elaborately portray the epic of space travel," said the book "2001: Building for Space Travel." The "realistic approach to visualizing space travel as an everyday occurrence" allegedly so impressed von Braun that he encouraged NASA's Skylab engineers "to see the film." The Pan Am spaceliner depicted caught on with the

public, and "Pan Am began collecting names for a waiting list for a future commercial flight to the Moon; by July 1969, the list included more than 25,000 people."



New Mexico Museum of Space History archives Arthur C. Clarke was a prolific author and scientist and is credited with conceiving of the geostationary orbit.

After 1956, Clarke called Sri Lanka home. He reveled in exploring the inner world, diving along the coast, as much as he enjoyed imagining life outside of Earth.

"As far as space flight is concerned, it's gone far beyond anything I ever expected to see in my lifetime," Clarke said in a 1993 interview posted on wired.com. "I was sure we'd go into space; sure we'd go to the Moon and planets; but I didn't really believe I'd live to see it."

During the Apollo 12 and 15 missions, CBS hired Clarke to assist with coverage, working "alongside Walter Cronkite and Wally Schirra," clarkefoundation.com said, I've

While he is often characterized as a futurist, Clarke insisted he'd "never predicted the future. Or hardly ever," he said. "I extrapolate." He then pointed out: "Look, I've written six stories about the end of the Earth; they can't all be true!"

In his early 70s, post-polio syndrome put Clarke in a wheelchair. In a Jan. 1, 1989, letter, Clarke said doctors first misdiagnosed his PPS as Lou Gehrig's disease.

'My (total) paralysis in 1962 had been attributed to a spinal injury," Clarke said. "So instead of having already used up most of an ALS victim's 2-5 years of survival, I've a pretty good chance of seeing 2001, even if from a wheel chair (which, I have discovered, is the secret ingredient required for painless transmit through today's over-crowded airports.)'

Doctors know little about the "debilitating" PPS, wired. com said; because, "as (Clarke) dryly points out - few polio survivors have lived long enough to contract it.'

career as a businesswoman, community volunteer and elected official, Connor said she has exhibited a level of professionalism and dedication that she will bring to the County Clerk office.

"I am looking forward to using my experience and work ethic to bring a new level of transparent and open processes to Doña Ana County elections," Connor said in her announcement.

County Commission

Kent Evans, former County Commission chairman who represented District 4 for eight years, has announced his candidacy for the District 5 position on the commission. During that time, Evans said he advocated for improving the county's mental health and medical service. As a retired human resources manager, Evans said he helped usher in professionalism to county government and said he is running again to continue that process.

"Once you've been on the County Commission for eight years, I would have to say that you now understand how the county works and all the people involved," Evans said.

Evans has been a strong supporter for creating a Crisis Triage Center near the Doña Ana County Detention Center not only during his time on the commission, but also after as a citizen, urging local and state officials to improve the process for law enforcement's handling of people with mental illness. Along with health care, other major concerns for Evans include infrastructure in the county, such as roads and water, and policies for development.

Senate District 37

Republican Cathey Alberson, a native New Mexican, is running for the state Senate District 37, which is currently held by Democrat Steve Fischmann who is not seeking re-election.

Alberson has a bachelor's degree in finance from New Mexico State University and works at a local CPA firm and bank. She has been active in the Junior League and the Republican Party of Doña Ana County, as well as a tennis coach for young people.

As a mother of five, Alberson said she is passionate to see families represented and supported in the Legislature and that small businesses need a supportive voice in Santa Fe.

According to the Republican Party announcement for Alberson, she "is resolute about leaving a legacy of ethical standards in business and life, while teaching young people how to be involved and responsible for their state."

Senate District 38

State Sen. Mary Kay Papen, D-Las Cruces, announced she will seek re-election to her District 38 position.

Papen serves on the Senate Finance Committee, the interim Legislative Finance Committee, the Water and Natural Resources Committee, chairs the Behavioral Health sub-committee and is vice chair of the New Mexico Finance Authority Oversight Committee.

"I look forward to continuing the work I have started in improving mental health services, supporting agriculture and encouraging economic development in southern New Mexico," Papen said in her announcement. "I am pleased with the progress we have made, but there is still much to do."

As a state senator, Papen has championed legislation, including Mental Health Insurance Benefits, Katie's Law, Affordable Housing Reform, and others dealing with water, economic development and education.

Papen said she is proud of the work she has done to help

bring state funds for infrastructure in the colonias. She has supported quality-of-life initiatives in Las Cruces, such as carrying the tax increment development district legislation for Downtown, supporting the regional aquatic center and helping NMSU fund many projects.

Papen also has volunteered to sit on boards for the La Casa Domestic Violence Shelter, St. Luke's Health Clinic, the First Step Clinic for Prenatal and Pediatric Care, the Las Cruces Symphony and the Border Book Festival.

"My mother used to tell me we had to pay for our space in this world," she said. "Volunteering my time serving District 38 has been the best way to give back to the community I love."

House District 36

Phillip Archuleta of Las Cruces, active in Latino issues in Doña Ana County, is running for the House District 36 seat currently held by the Legislature's only independent, Andy Nuñez of Hatch.

"I have been a public servant for over 30 years," Archuleta said in his announcement. "I have also served in various civic organizations that promote education, health care, housing and economic opportunities for all New Mexicans. Most of all, I have been a loyal Democrat and have never compromised my values or integrity to my constituents as a public servant or civic leader."

Nuñez was originally elected as a Democrat, but broke with the party in a fight over House leadership and other issues, such as legislation to stop the practice of allowing regular driver's licenses for non-citizens in the country unlawfully.

Archuleta said the House needs someone to fight for people's rights and core democratic values.

"I will not represent out-of-state special interest groups that have ultimate issues, which spread hate, xenophobia and create dissension in our state on issues that have nothing to do with the economy," Archuleta said. "We have spent too much time on rhetorical issues that have done little to assist working class New Mexicans on the true issues and concern that need to be addressed."

Other issues of concern to Archuleta is water rights, the environment, labor law, health care and education.

"Our children are becoming bankrupt after they graduate from college due to high-interest student loans," Archuleta said. "We need to stop predator lending practices in this state. We need to keep our children in our state and not force them to leave out of state to find employment that pays prevailing wages. We need to fight for all New Mexicans to obtain affordable housing and stop financial institutions from red-lining and discriminatory practices."

House District 52

Andrew Moralez announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for House District 52, which is currently held by Rep. Joseph Cervantes who is vacating the position to run for the state Senate.

In his announcement, Moralez said he fully understands the economic issues specific to the area from his service as executive director of the New Mexico Border Authority and his brief sting as Sunland Park city manager. Growing up in Anthony, N.M., Moralez said he worked as

Growing up in Anthony, N.M., Moralez said he worked as dishwasher, cook and server at a local restaurant through high school and college. After graduating from Gadsden High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in marketing from NMSU.

Moralez said he has been involved with the Democratic Party for more than 13 years. Moralez has been a single father to his 14-year-old daughter, Eileen, since she was 2.

In his announcement, Moralez said he "has a burning desire to improve the social and economic conditions of southern New Mexico and the entire state."

"This is indeed a balancing act," Rounds said. "We want to make sure Centennial is populated by a great group of students."

The district also has to make sure the other high schools are left with outstanding student bodies, he said.

Rounds said the main consideration is making sure decisions such as program offerings and staff hires are based on student needs.

After the April 16 deadline to apply for a transfer, he said "there will be a push" to get all the staff and programs in place for Centennial, as well as Las Cruces High School, Mayfield and Oñate high schools.

All student and staffing decisions should be completed by the first week of May, Rounds said. There will be more work on the class schedules during the summer, he said, which is later than normal. In past years, he said returning high schools usually had a good idea of what their class schedule would like before taking the summer break.

Rounds said he was successful in getting the New Mexico Activities Association to grant a waiver for Centennial to allow student athletes to participate in team sports. The NMAA has a rule that would keep a transferring student from competing their first year at a new school.

The NMAA will be monitoring every step

of the process, Rounds said, to make sure the district isn't using the new high school boundaries to overbuild athletic programs. The good news of the waiver, he said, is it will allow more high school athletes than ever before able to compete in varsity athletics.

Budget update

By the end of spring break, Rounds said the district should get a better sense of its funding for the next school year. State officials will be meeting with district superintendents to set the dollar amount given to the funding formula for schools.

The budget passed by the Legislature ought to result in a more than 2 percent increase in funding, Rounds said, but there are program efforts that could affect it. Also, since LCPS was already absorbing an employee contribution increase to the state retirement fund, that could bring the increase under 2 percent locally, he said.

There was language tied to a variety of programs that was vetoed by Gov. Susana Martinez, but not the money allocated to those programs, such as K-3 Plus, which is an early education effort that supports reading proficiency by the third grade. The governor took similar language veto action for parts of the budget related to charter schools and buying new instructional material. Since in these cases the allocations weren't vetoed, it is unclear if these will affect the individual school district budgets, he said.

A12 | News Las Cruc Animal advocacy group bemoans cat lab deaths USDA inspection report cited

A group called Stop Animal Exploitation NOW! (SAEN) is calling for a federal investigation of a private Las Cruces lab that experienced the death of cats used in testing.

SAEN points to a December 2011 inspection report by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) that told of 10 cats dying of heat prostration at Southwest Biolabs because of a mechanical failure. SAEN, a National Research Watchdog Organization, has filed an official complaint with the USDA insisting on a full investigation of the incident and a severe fine.

"Negligence at this lab literally cooked 10 cats to death," said SAEN Executive Director Michael Budkie, A.H.T. "This facility should face the maximum penalty allowable under the law."




with white stripes.

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



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Centennial Spotlight

'Sacrificial lambs' Death of Hank Gathers made Loyola Marymount the sentimental favorite

Everyone was

rooting for Loyola.

It didn't matter

March 16, 1990 – 22 years ago today – New Mexico State University played in one of the most memorable games in NCAA tournament history

The Aggies finished on the short end of a 111-92 score, but this was the rare game about more than just winning and losing.

Their opponents were the ultra-up-tempo Lions of Loyola (Calif.) Marymount University, led by the nation's leading scorer at 35.3 points per game, Bo Kimble.

Loyola's headlines that week, however, were decidedly downbeat. Their other star player, Hank Gathers, had died of heart failure the week before during a

game in the West Coast Conference tournament.

Gathers, who grew up with Kimble in Philadelphia, led the nation in both scoring and rebounding in the 1988-89 season, and was considered a serious NBA prospect.

The news of Gathers' death sent a shock wave through the college basketball world. Loyola Marymount even considered dropping out of the NCAA tournament, despite being ranked No. 21 in the nation, and leading the country in scoring with 122 points

per game, still the best ever.

The Aggies, then in the Big West Conference, were no slouch either. They entered the tournament 26-4, ranked No. 24 in the nation, with a signature victory over UNLV, the eventual tournament champ.

The Neil McCarthy-coached Aggies were seeded No. 6 in the West Regional. Despite their success during the season, the Lions were seeded No. 11. Without Gathers, the selection committed reasoned, LMU would be literally and figuratively without its heart.

LMU still had Kimble, however, and head coach Paul Westhead, whose fascinating career was recently chronicled in an ESPN documentary, "The Guru of Go." The events surrounding Gathers, and this game in particular, figure prominently in the film.

Despite NMSU's seeding advantage, Aggie fans felt the stars were aligning against them when it was announced where the game would be played - in LMU's Southern California backyard, the Long Beach Arena. The arena was the scene where, just a week before, the Aggies had lost to Long Beach State in the Big West tournament.

Good vibes for the Aggies? Zero. Of course, having gained the sympathy of the entire nation, LMU probably would have had a home-court-like advantage no matter where the game was played. With the possible exception of the Pan American Center.

Still, at halftime, the game in Long Beach was all tied: NMSU 46, LMU 46.

More LMU stars, however, were waiting to align in the second half. One big one in particular.

The shot

Like Wilt Chamberlain before him and Shaquille O'Neal after him, Gathers was a multi-talented big man who absolutely could not shoot a free throw. His desperation reached such a point the right-handed Gathers started shooting his free throws left-handed.

After Gathers died, his lifelong friend Kimble wanted to pay tribute in a way more meaningful than just writing No. 44 on his shoe.

"I'm gonna shoot my first free-throw left handed," Kimble said prior to the tournament. "And it's because Hank Gathers tried so hard to improve on his left hand. It's in remembrance of Hank.'

> In the first half, however, Kimble was cold, shooting 6 of 17 from the field. Every fan in the arena was anticipating his first free throw, but it looked like he might not even get to the line. The second half was a

different story. Kimble hit his first

four shots to lead LMU on an 18-4 run to open the second half. With 14:46 left, and LMU leading the Aggies 64-50, Kimble missed his fifth shot, but was fouled in the act.

He strode to the foul line and everyone knew



William Benjamin, now the Las Cruces High basketball coach, was an NMSU sophomore, one of 12 Aggies who took the court that day. Benjamin had a good game. In 20 minutes, he had 12 points, five rebounds and three assists.

"It was a tough situation," said Benjamin, a native of Southern California. "We had just lost in the second round (of the Big West tournament) and still got an at-large bid, which shows how good our team was."

Benjamin remembers vividly the moment Kimble went to the line, and the hush that fell over the arena. The shot floated in the air, and on its descent, hit nothing but net.

"It got very loud, real quick," Benjamin said. "It was an emotional time. No one knew about New Mexico State, and everyone was rooting for Loyola. It didn't matter who they played; they were going to win."

After Kimble's free throw, the outcome was inevitable. LMU outscored NMSU just 46-42 down the stretch, but Kimble finished with a Gathers-esque 18 rebounds and 45 points, tied for the 11th highest single game scoring by an individual in the 72-year history of the tournament. The emotion and adrenaline in the building was inescapable, and Loyola was more than just a sentimental favorite.

"They were a good team," Benjamin said. "They had very good shooters, very good guards, and just went up and down, up and down the floor. It was really historic. This team beat Michigan the next game by 30-some points. This team went to the Elite Eight.

"For us in the second half, everything fell apart. Our style of play, the emotion, everything.'

Benjamin has seen the "Guru of Go" and, rather than get depressed, he felt happiness.

'It just brought back good memories," Benjamin said. "It was a great experience, just the fact we were able to get a bid. I have nothing but good memories of my New Mexico State experience. I got to play in packed arenas and was fortunate enough and blessed to play

against good teams and have success."

The fan

This was the first NMSU Aggie game I ever attended. I was living in Arkansas at the time, with no clue I would one day be a Las Crucen. Friends and I bought tickets months in advance, with no clue what eight teams would wind up in Long Beach. We picked the location because we knew people there.

That we got to see this historic game was pure luck. But it felt like destiny.

The Gathers death was a huge national story, and dominated the sports airwaves for weeks. Benjamin was right; it was historic and everyone there felt like part of history.

When Kimble got fouled, all 11,200 fans in the arena instinctively rose to their feet, in quiet anticipation of the shot. I think everyone in the building, even the most die-hard Aggie fan, was praying the shot would go in. Though the ball was only in the air a second or two, it seemed an eternity, floating in slow motion.

When it finally dropped through, there was a silent delay, like when a toddler hits his head on a table corner.

A second later, the place erupted, as Benjamin said, "very loud, real quick."


I've been to hundreds of college basketball games in my life, and never witnessed a moment approaching that one.

The most amazing full game I've ever seen was two days later, when LMU defeated the defending champion Michigan Wolverines 149-115. The point total remains the highest in tournament history. They also had the most three-pointers – 21 – in tournament history. You would think a blowout like that would be boring, but the relentless running, and the raining of threes, fueled by LMU's emotion, was simply stunning.

In the first game, like most everyone in the arena, I was rooting for Loyola, but I felt a connection to the Aggies, and two years later would see them again in Tempe, Ariz., as they won their first two NCAA tourney games en route to the 1992 Sweet 16.

Another Aggie fan was born.

On Saturday, March 13, at the Western Athletic Conference Tournament, the New Mexico State Aggies captured the tournament crown and the automatic bid to the NCAA College Basketball Tournament with a 82-57 win over upstart Louisiana Tech.

To nobody's surprise, Wendell McKines was named tournament MVP.

But the icing on the cake; the cherry on top; the pièce de résistance (that's French by the way - how apropos!), was the selection of Tyrone Watson of Hamilton, Ontario, to the all-tournament team.

It was a nice surprise to see Watson, who is not known for grabbing headlines, get some recognition at the tournament.

Watson normally plays in the unheralded role of the "glue guy." His job is to play tough defense, grab a few rebounds and do all the little things that usually don't get noticed.

However, when you shoot 14 for 24 from the field in a three game tournament format, sometimes you turn heads. Add in four assists and seven rebounds in the tournament final and you just might get noticed.

"I was really happy for Ty," coach Marvin Menzies said. "That was his breakout performance in terms of getting some individual accolades, he's always been my glue guy and for Tyrone to get a little individual recognition on a big stage is a long time coming.

"Hah!" exclaimed senior redshirt forward, team philosopher and Las Cruces Bulletin sports page WAC Senior Player of the Year McKines.

"I am proud, just proud. Watching his development and watching how he plays with a purpose and a passion. I'm just proud," McKines said.

'That's big," Watson's fellow Canadian Hernst Laroche said. "I've seen Watson since he came here, now he has more skills, he can do it all. I'm proud of him, it's a pleasure to play with him."

'He's done a great job of pecking away at it and earning it the right way by just bringing it every day," Menzies said. "It feels good, I was really happy that he was able to receive that award

At first, Menzies said he didn't know if Watson was surprised.

"Maybe a little bit, you know just because that's not his thing. He's the glue guy, the team guy, he's not the man out front and so when he had a chance to walk up and get that ... Now that I think about it – yeah – now I remember looking at his face. It was a pretty special moment for him.

"Now I just hope that he doesn't get the big head," Menzies said.

Then the Aggies dropped four of their next five games including a loss at arch rival University of Texas at El Paso. In El Paso, guard Christian Kabongo made obscene gestures to the crowd and was suspended. Kabongo later left the team.

Fans began to grumble.

On Dec. 28, the Lobos strode into the Pan American Center and whipped the Aggies by 20 points.


Fans grumbled a little louder.

Even after the Aggies went on a six-game winning streak, back-to-back losses to Nevada in Las Čruces and at Hawai'i gave Aggie fans a queasy "here we go again" feeling.

It was open season on No. 1 seeds, especially in the boys' bracket. None of the top seeds in the six divisions won the state title.


"Tularosa was a good team," Adler said. "I was scared of them all year. I really thought it would come down to them and us.'


Tularosa shot 68 percent from the field in the championship game, while MVCS shot 28 percent.

The New Mexico State baseball team took its record to 12-8 after defeating I-25 rival University of New Mexico 6-2 at Isotopes Park, Tuesday, March 13, in Albuquerque.

Senior right hand pitcher Casey Collins earned his second win of the year and Scott Coffman tallied the save to tie Orlando Griego for the all-time Aggie career record with 17.

Senior right fielder Bryan Karraker helped close out the game with an outstanding diving catch to rob the Lobo hitter of extra bases. Collins and Coffman led the Aggies to their second win over the Lobos this season. NMSU is now 5-2 over its Rio Grande rival since 2010.

The Aggies took a 3-1 lead in the second inning and never trailed again. It was 3-2 for the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh before the Aggies picked up two runs in the eighth on a Tanner Rust double to right field. Junior Kyle Phillips picked up his 14th RBI of the year after going 3-of-4 at the plate while scoring twice.

Collins now has 12 strikeouts in 27.1 innings


of work this season after holding UNM to only two runs in seven innings on the mound.

The New Mexico State equestrian team fell to Fresno State Saturday morning at the equestrian center, 9-7. The Aggies fell to 8-7 on the season, while Fresno State improved to 8-7 as well.

Fisher on watch list

New Mexico State junior catcher Zac Fisher was recently named to the 2012 Johnny Bench Award Watch List, which is presented by baseballsavings.com.

Fisher, who is hitting .339 (20-of-59) through 15 games in 2012, is the first Aggie catcher since Jeffrey Farnham to be named to the watch list. Farnham was a semifinalist in the 2009 season. Fisher is one of two WAC catchers to be named to the watch list along with



Nevada junior Carlos Escobar.

Fisher was named to the 2012 National Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) and the College Sports Madness Baseball Preseason All-American Teams after a stellar sophomore season.

He was a 2011 second team All-WAC selection as a designated hitter and an American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) All-Midwest Region selection after leading the team with a .398 batting average and 68 hits. His batting average ranked 20th in the nation and his 71 RBI ranked 76th nationally.

Bryan Karraker is WAC hitter of the week

New Mexico State outfielder Brvan Karraker has been named the Verizon Western Athletic Conference Baseball Hitter of the Week for the week of March 5-11. This is his second WAC hitter of the week honor.

Karraker, a senior from Phoenix (Pinnacle HS), hit .450 (9-of-20) as New Mexico State defeated in-state rival New Mexico and split a four-game series with 2011 NCAA Tournament participant Kent State.

"It's a nice honor and I am happy with the way our team has been battling to get some wins this past week," Karraker said.

Karraker posted nine hits, three walks and was hit by a pitch three times for a .577 onbase percentage. He had a stellar performance against the Lobos, going 2-for-3 at the plate with three RBI to boost NMSU to a 16-12 win. 



Senior standout averages double-double for Aggies

New Mexico State redshirt senior forward Wendell McKines was named to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) All-District Six team, the organization announced.

This is McKines' second all-district honor. He was also named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) All-District VIII team. McKines earned WAC Tournament MVP honors and first team All-WAC accolades this season. He leads the Aggies and WAC in both scoring and rebounding with 18.8 points and 10.8 rebounds per game. McKines has posted 20 double-doubles this year, which ranks fourth in the nation.

This season, he became the second player in school history to record 1,000-career points and 1,000-career rebounds. He was the second active player in the NCAA (T.J. Robinson, Long Beach State) and 12th player in WAC history to achieve the feat. McKines was named the MVP of the 2012 Western Athletic Conference tournament March 10, in Las Vegas, Nev.


Swimmer in championships

swimmer Aliena Schmidtke is competing at the NCAA Championships, Thursday, March 15 through Saturday, March 17 in Auburn, Ala.

Can old dogs learn new tricks?

Research in neuroscience says yes



The more we learn about the human brain, the more amazing it is.

New research in neuropsychology is telling us that, as we get older, our brains can actually get better, instead of the other way around. Now, please understand that I'm somewhat of a clinical specialist in gero-psychology, seeing lots of Alzheimer's patients in medical settings; so my previous statement is good news. The phenomenon is called "brain plasticity," and as golfers, we should be informed, and yes excited, about it.

To keep things simple (in a realm which is truly not simple) let me pique your interest with some truths about the brain and how it works.

Our brains may be the most adaptable organ we have. While it was once thought that our brain just gradually deteriorated as we aged – from about age 50 on – neuroscience is demonstrating that the aging brain can change and actually improve. It means that learning new ideas, skills, attitudes and behaviors is possible. But learning requires memory, suggesting that brain training and brain experiencing are probably worthwhile, even while we advance in age and our bodies stiffen.

Let's take the average 65-year-old golfer. He's been playing about the same game, on the same golf course, with the same group, using the same swing, getting the same results, for about the last 20 years now. Time, and habit, along with Arthur(itis) have beaten him into submission, so he tends to accept golf stagnation.

One of the things we know about the aging brain is that if you keep doing the same thing, over and over again, especially when you're older, you end up making your brain more rigid. Do you want a cemented brain? Basically that's what happens with individuals who have Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (OCD), where the mind-driven behavior becomes stereotyped and automatic, mostly beyond the individual's control. It's nowhersville as a golfer.

Fundamentally, what I'm saying is that if you want to improve your golf game as a senior you can't rely on only upgrading your physical skills, you have to change your brain. Here's what you need to know to do

exactly that. First of all, brain plasticity requires motivation. You have to be willing to change and be in a mood to learn new stuff. In golf that translates to taking lessons and trying things out of your comfort

zone. It may also mean getting into a more golf-like routine of practicing and maybe even working out. Secondly, we can

only change things we're aware of, and things we're paying attention to. I'd like you to note that high self-awareness is one of the key requirements of

mental toughness. It's also a critical element in high emotional IQ – the very thing that helps us to succeed in social and business settings. Like executives, public servants and professionals, golfers need a lot of feedback – both positive and critical – from observers and themselves.

When you heighten your self-awareness, you increase your chances of understanding what went wrong, and then correcting it. Again, we have the ability to change. Feedback for golfers unquestionably involves regular lessons from a golf teacher; otherwise you're flying blind.

Thirdly, challenging ourselves with new tasks and games turns on the brain plasticity switches. Be willing to play new golf courses, perhaps even with different companions. Also be open to upgrading your equipment and taking advantage of new technology. We absolutely have to step out of our comfort zone once in a while if we are to grow and improve, regardless of our age. Some of the excuses I hear for not doing anything different are lame. I hear, "If it ain't broke don't fix it." My belief is if you're not the best you can possibly be, then it is "broke" and maybe you can do better. But that's just me – a self-avowed livelong overachiever.

Another really lame one is, "If I get better my handicap will go down." I guess my editorials are no comfort to sandbaggers. I'm interested in golfers who consider themselves students of the game and who want to reach their full potential. Staying entrenched in old habits may be reassuring to many people, but it's a stagnant, no-growth behavior.

Research is telling us that learning new skills and behaviors is the very best way to slow mental aging. Can an old dog learn new tricks? You bet.

The bad news is that intensive learning, in many cases, is harder when we get older. And as we get older we tend to resist things that are harder. That's why the vast majority of older folks don't really exercise. No, cleaning the garage or strolling through Walmart aren't sufficient exercise. Trying to learn a

new language, for example, is much easier at age 6 rather than at age 60, mainly because humans have a hard-wired "language learning device" that acts much like a brain sponge in children. Still, throughout our lifespan, challenging ourselves with new and difficult tasks turns on the brain's plasticity switches. Doing the same old thing over and over turns off those switches.

So I'm suggesting that your brain is inviting you to be young again. The bottom line for you and me as senior golfers who want to get better is skill acquisition.

If you are not happy with your current game, change it. Revamp your swing. Develop

new shots. Hit the ball farther.

Skill building would certainly extend to learning new mental toughness techniques, such as acute visualization. We can go a long way by promoting positive brain change (no, it's not too late) through harnessing our potential for brain plasticity. Be open-minded. Try different problem-solving approaches. In golf that means different shots and creative strategies. And mostly don't get stuck in old habits.

Here are some resources for you. The first is "The Brain That Changes Itself: Stories of Personal Triumph from the Frontiers of Brain Science" by Norman Doidge. Publishers Weekly said this about Doidge's book: "... evidence is turning up to show that the brain can rewire itself ... (and) can be strengthened just like a weak muscle ... (it's) about some of the least understood marvels of the brain." A reviewer notes, "buy this book and your brain will thank you."

Next consider author Sharon Begley's "Train Your Mind, Change Your Brain: How a New Science Reveals Our Extraordinary Potential to Transform Ourselves." Dense with research findings on human potential, this fusion of psychological, spiritual and neuroscientific approaches to growth represents an overview of how people can become more intellectually open and more skilled at what they most like to do.

Lastly, I recommend a DVD, "The Brain Fitness Program," done in 2007 for PBS Television. If you're looking for inspiration to change your old habits and start rewiring your brain, regardless of age, this video will do that. Books and videos are all available through Amazon and Barnes & Noble Booksellers.

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

Symposium to examine quality-of-life questions March 25-26 event to meet at two venues

The eighth annual J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium promises another opportunity for members of New Mexico State University and surrounding communities to address issues important to this region.

This year, the two-day event aims to engage community members in establishing a shared understanding of what "quality of life" means.

"Quality of Life as Social Justice" runs from 12:30 to 5 p.m. Sunday, March 25, at the Court Youth Center, 402 W. Court Ave., and continues from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday, March 26, at the Corbett Center Student Union on the NMSU main campus.

"With more than 25 percent of Doña Ana County residents living below the poverty level, and nearly 20 percent living in the colonias, quality-of-life issues are intrinsically linked to social justice in our region," said symposium co-chair and Doña Ana County Commissioner Billy Garrett. "We are inviting members of our community to work together to explore what 'quality of life' means in southern New Mexico, and how we can build on that understanding to provide more opportunities for all community members."

Symposium participants will discuss quality of life issues in some of the most critical segments of the community: education, housing and community development, work and economic activity, family and community life, public safety and recreation and cultural activity.

Day one of the conference will focus on local problems and economic hardships using statistics and mapping.

On the second day, organizers plan to identify strategies for the challenges. These strategies are designed to promote resilience and address vulnerabilities. This will include an examination of ways in which NMSU faculty, students and staff can collaborate with each other and with the community to improve the quality of life of citizens of this region.

Organizers also aim to strengthen information sharing among community members and community agencies to improve access to services and resources.

"It is the perfect expression of the landgrant mission of the university and of the interests of many at NMSU in partnering for social change," said Lisa Bond-Maupin, the associate dean for planning and academic resources in the College of Arts and Sciences.

The symposium devotes each year to an issue of concern to the state and region. The overarching goal of the symposium is to increase the relevance of NMSU in the larger community and the state by providing opportunities to share information, learn from one another and develop strategies.

She has announced that New Mexico organizations have stepped up to partner with the state's Children, Youth, and Families Department (CYFD) and the Summer Food Service Program.





Truck Farm moves Downtown

Business specializes in 'playing with food' By Alta LeCompte

Jim Hawman, who built a thriving food processing business in Las Cruces by defying his mother's wishes, is about to take his company Downtown.

The Truck Farm store, which Hawman opened in 1998, will shut down at 940 N. Valley Road in late March or early April and immediately reopen at 645 S. Alameda Blvd.

"The building is in the heart of Downtown, where my heart is," Hawman said during an informal tour of the cavernous new space.

Hawman and his staff are transforming the space into a showroom, offices, warehouse facilities and kitchens where products will be developed and produced.

"When I was about 4 or 5 years old, my one favorite thing in the whole world was disobeying my mother. My mother told me not to play with my food. So I play with my food," he said as he pointed out a gleaming steel kettle in the corner of one of the new kitchens.

The company's kitchens have become his playground.

Buying into downtown

Hawman served for eight years on the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership board and was a member of a committee appointed by the mayor to work on revitalization. He cares deeply about the heart of the city and deliberately chose to relocate there.

Space and financial considerations also were key drivers in his choice of a new location. The move works financially because The

Truck Farm has an opportunity to purchase the building, he said.

Space will more than double, expanding from 4,100 square feet to 9,600, he said.

And there's plenty of room to grow.

Hawman noted the block building constructed in the late 1930s or early '40s to house International Harvester was built so solidly that a second and even a third story could be added.

"Back in the '30s they over-engineered almost everything," he said.

The South Alameda structure is more than a solid building with a lot of potential. It is a piece of city history set in concrete. Pointing to the north wall, Hawman commented: "The last remnant of old Main Street is just on the other side of the wall."

Building on confidence

The Truck Farm produces and distributes a full line of more than 60 food products, most of them containing chile. It also produces several lines for other companies.

Hawman's son and colleague, Justin, said the business has evolved "incredibly" with gross sales now 17 times the first year's sales 14 years ago.

The company's impressive growth, however, doesn't surprise Hawman, the founder.

"I had no idea it would not (grow into something big)," he said. "I never approach anything I do with a negative mindset. If you spend time worrying, you will never see a positive outcome. I believe every day is in some way a good day, even the day my wife died."

Hawman's late wife and lifelong business partner, Cleda, died Aug. 4, 2011 – a day when a double rainbow shone above the Organ Mountains.

From the early days of planting chiles and moving hay on their farm, the couple worked side by side, doing whatever needed to be done.

"She was my partner in everything, in life," he said tearfully.

Growing a team

At the close of a recent business day, Hawman and Billie Cheryl Cooper were packing their tools at the old location and taking off to tackle the evening's work – stuccoing walls at the new location.

"My son is the I.T. guy – he owns part of the business with me," Hawman said. "Everyone does whatever needs to be done. Just because I own the business doesn't mean I'm exempt from cleaning the toilets, mopping the floors and washing the dishes."

He said his employees are his most valuable asset.

Hawman, however, sets the pace. "This is my retirement," he said. "I have a goal: Not working more than 12 hours a day.

He plows his money as well as his time into The Truck Farm.

"Over 15 years, we've written ourselves a total of one check

worth \$500. Anything else goes back into the business. "It's just like raising kids. If they're not your No. 1 priority, they're not going to turn out as well as you would like.'

Kicking it up

Besito Caliente, a blackberry-based product that began as a grilling sauce, launched the company's venture into gourmet products.

"The chile in it is habanero, but really the taste is a matter of how you use it. Yes, it's a spice. But it's not any hotter than cinnamon," he said.

Sales of the award-winning Besito Caliente "simply exploded." It currently is shipped as far as Germany.

Hawman grows the berries on a farm nestled against the West Mesa "where rattlesnakes like to curl up inside the bushes."

Blackberries currently are his biggest crop.

He bought the farm in 1984 because he likes to make things grow.

At first, he planted chiles and garlic.

Meanwhile, he continued working as a Sara Lee Corp. production manager, mostly in Las Cruces, until 1998. His final corporate assignment was to open a L'Eggs plant in Juarez.

International business travel exposed him to "foods most Americans wouldn't touch," he said.

His fascination with food, combined with his lingering delight in defying his mother, quite naturally led Hawman to develop a retirement business that would exploit the virtues of crops grown on his and other local farms.

Going gourmet with chiles

Signature products include Besito Caliente and the more recently introduced Cherry A'More.

Hawman approaches product development and marketing in the same democratic fashion he applies to personnel management.

"The public who uses our products, names our products," he said. Besito Caliente got its name from a customer at the Las Cruces Farmers and Crafts Market about eight years ago.

Cherry A'More shares a similar history. Hawman and staff developed seven different iterations of the cherry-based sauce with a chipotle kick. They took it to the farmers market, where the customers spoke.

The flavors combined for the final version were "not necessarily the ones I would have chosen," Hawman said.

Investing in downtown

The move to Alameda Boulevard is a kind of homecoming for Hawman, who was raised in Las Cruces' Chiva Town "where the goats roamed.

Las Cruces has given him a big thumbs-up for bringing his business into the heart of town.

He said customers and acquaintances tell him the new site will offer the company improved visibility and will attract new customers.

Hawman is optimistic that the neighborhood, too, will thrive.

For the area to evolve, decision makers must address critical issues such as parking, he added.

"This part of town is going to grow, gradually at first and then acceleratingly. It will never be what it once was. Anybody who wants it that way is going to be disappointed. Prior to urban renewal, you could drive down Main Street. There were theaters all over Downtown. It was the vibrant heart of the city."

He paused and considered the past and what is yet to emerge

"It will probably evolve into something better than it would have become had there never been urban renewal."

Although he no longer has an official voice on boards and committees, Hawman expects to help shape the future of downtown.

"Just because I've stopped serving on the Partnership does not mean I've stopped being involved," he said. "I've spent a long time building relationships that are still there. ... An individual can target specific concerns and have a one-on-one conversation that's meaningful."

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the assurance that money, or the distributable income, is coming each year.

City can help by moratorium on impact fees



State of the Economy

The job numbers are good news about the state of the U.S. labor markets.

The economy added 227,000 new jobs in February. Taking into account December and February gives an average of 245,000 new jobs over the past three months.

The one industry that is not seeing a recovery and, indeed, remains mired in recession is construction. Nationally, construction employment is off 28 percent, but here in New Mexico, construction employment has performed even worse, off a whopping 36 percent.

We don't have construction employment numbers for Las Cruces, but every indication is the construction industry is having the same problems we see statewide. Total value of Las Cruces building permits declined 18 percent between 2010 and 2011, for example. Housing prices are down 14.5 percent from their peak.

The construction downturn is bad news for contractors and developers, but the group that is really hurt is construction workers. The failure of the construction industry to recover is particularly bad news for unskilled workers, for whom construction has been a source of entry-level jobs, especially for males.

Of course, these tend to be less educated males, precisely the group that has fallen

most behind in the information-intense economy of the 21st century.

What can the City of Las Cruces do to help with this situation? Unfortunately, not a lot as much of the problem involves national trends. But the city can nibble at the edges. One thing would be to declare a moratorium on impact fees. This is a policy that has been adopted in Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

Certainly, the move advocated by some to increase impact fees is wrongheaded.

Impact fees are meant to discourage urban sprawl by encouraging contractors to infill - that is, build in areas where existing infrastructure can be utilized. Certainly this is a worthwhile goal. Under normal circumstances, if new subdivisions are imposing higher costs on the city either directly, through hookup costs or, indirectly, through sprawl, then new construction should pay for those costs.

But we aren't experiencing normal circumstances. Rather, we are in the worst real estate market in our lifetimes. Because of construction's special role as an entry level career for precisely those most adversely affected by the current recession, the city needs policies that promote construction rather than stand in the way of recovery.

The importance of small business to our economy is an oft-repeated refrain of academics, politicians and the man on the street especially during an election year.

If conventional wisdom holds true, the national economy will recover as small-business owners hire new workers and invest in capital improvements.

Recent survey results from the Wells Fargo/Gallup Business Index suggest this is already beginning to occur. The Business Index is a quarterly, nationwide survey of 600 smallbusiness owners. It asks small-business owners about their "current and future perceptions of their

business financial situation." For the purposes of the survey, a "small-business" is defined as having \$20 million or less in revenue.

The latest survey, conducted for the first quarter of 2012, recorded four-year highs in small-business owner optimism in two important categories; capital spending and

hiring. Fortunately, some Las Cruces smallbusiness owners are just as optimistic about their long-term business goals.

During the past 12 months, 24 percent of small businesses increased their capital spending, the highest level since April 2008, the survey said. Moreover, 28 percent of small-business owners plan to increase capital spending in the next 12 months, and 22 percent of small-business owners expect to in-

crease the total number of jobs at their companies. These sentiments were

echoed by three Las Cruces business owners. Harry Stryker, owner

of Stryker's Shooting World, said he plans to add an indoor shooting range to his store this year and double the size of his staff by hiring six to eight more workers.

Peter Akel, partner at The Design Center, a home design store, said he is making "significant investments" in new product

lines and displays this year.

Melissa Ames, owner of the dog grooming company Central Bark LLC., said she plans to add another person to her staff this year and to expand services.

Nationally, small-business owners were also optimistic about the future availability of business credit, according to the survey.

All forms of excellence require patience

Twenty-seven percent of small-business owners said they think business credit "will be somewhat or very easy to get" over the next 12 months. This is the highest percentage of business owners to feel this way since April 2009, the study said. A quarter of smallbusiness owners said credit was "somewhat or very easy" to obtain over the past year.

On this issue, Las Cruces business owners did not agree with their national counterparts. Stryker, Akel and Ames all described area banks as being very conservative in their lending and credit requirements for smallbusiness loans. However, Strvker added, venture and private capital sources are becoming more available.

While these indicators are good signs of economic recovery, the survey cautioned that the investment and hiring expectations may not be realized. In particular, increasing gas prices could hurt consumer spending while simultaneously increasing operating costs for small-business owners. This economic and financial double-whammy could bring a small-business owner's plans to a quick halt.

The survey also said small-business owners' current level of optimism still remains far lower than their perceptions prior to 2008.

Even though the opinion of three business owners is not a scientific sample, it is comforting to hear local businesspeople speak optimistically about the economy again.

However, if the characterization of the local business lending market as "tight" and "conservative" is true, then many local small-business owners may have to put their expansion plans on hold. The availability of business credit can often mean the difference between success and failure, especially during a small-business' first five years of operation, when revenues are often their most volatile and unpredictable.

The economy will not fully recover on optimism alone, but we have to start somewhere.

recover. If a person owned those shares and lost his or her patience after any one of these seemingly serious setbacks, they might have abandoned Berkshire Hathaway in hopes of greener pastures.

History is replete with examples of why excellence requires a certain temperament and patience.

Great scientific discoveries required patience. They were accomplished only over long periods of time. The most amazing geological wonders of the world were created over time. The greatest college basketball program ever, was developed over time. And yes, shareholders of great businesses tend to be well rewarded, but only over time.

The findings of Sir Issac Newton (Universal Law of Gravity), Daniel Bernoulli (Law of Hydrodynamic Pressure), Michael Faraday (Law of Electromagnetic Induction), Rudolph Clausius (Law of Thermodynamics) and Albert Einstein (Theory of Special Relativity), stand out as watershed achievements in scientific history. These five scientific discoveries came as a result of patient observations and diligent, painstaking efforts over time.

There are common threads running through science that can be cross-applied to business and economics. For example, as pertinent geological aspects of the earth's surface have changed over time, many animal and plant species have either gradually evolved or become extinct.

The effects of "economic forces" also act gradually on businesses and industries in a similar fashion. The extinction or prosperity of any given industry or business is often the result of adapting to or failing to adapt to gradual changes in economic pressures over relatively long periods of time.

Much of the activities of the financial media industry have more to do with its own commercial survival than transmitting essential and fundamental truths about longrange economic forces. The most notable bad side-effect of the financial news media's selfserving survival instincts is the cultivation of short-term securities, trading mentalities and relative impatience in the minds of its viewers.

A moment of reflection suggests the greatest entrepreneurs and investors of the last 300 years were patient individuals. There were no high-frequency traders in their ranks.

Great business people like the Rothschilds, Andrew Carnegie, John D. Rockefeller and J.P. Morgan knew that excellence required patience. Peter Lynch, Warren Buffett and Charles Munger are three of the most noteworthy modern investment practitioners.

In examining their careers, it is noteworthy that without exception, each saw - or still sees - the task of deploying capital intelligently as much more of a marathon than a sprint.

With March Madness in the air, the record of John Wooden, the phenomenal college basketball coach at UCLA, is worthy of review. In 1960-61, Coach Wooden's team had a winning season, but failed to make the post-season tournament again.

Just prior to his teams dominating college basketball as none have done before or since, Wooden had missed the playoffs for five consecutive seasons. UCLA was patient with Wooden and subsequently rewarded. We recall an observation made by Wooden in his book, "A Lifetime of Observations and Reflections On and Off the Court."

"Most of us are impatient. As we get older, we think we know more and things should happen faster. But patience is a virtue in preparing for any task of significance. It takes time to create excellence. If it could be done more quickly, more people would do it. All forms of excellence require patience," Wooden wrote.

The evidence that patience is required for investment excellence is also quite compelling. Consider the record of Warren Buffett's

March messages from the 'Wizard of Westwood' phenomenally successful Berkshire Hathaway: During the market downturn of 1973-74, Berkshire shares fell 56 percent from their

- high. During the 1987 market downturn, Berkshire shares plunged 25 percent from their high.
- During the 1990-91 sell-off, Berkshire shares fell 49 percent from their high.
- Between 1998 and 2000, Berkshire stock dropped 49 percent from its high.
- From September of 2008 to 2009, Berkshire stock dropped more than 50 percent from its high.

After each of these declines, it took what might have seemed like an eternity for Berk-

For new director, it's easy being green

In just a few minutes, with the help of her KitchenAid mixer, she'll take heavy cream, powdered sugar and organic almond extract, and create a bowl of fluffy deliciousness.

Hamblen hopes to bring this same effort, attention to detail and focus on quality to her new job as executive director of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce.

"When I decided to take the position, I knew one key would be to develop and work at nurturing relationships with local businesses," Hamblen said. "We'll look at the triple bottom line – people, profit, planet – and see how we

Originally from El Paso, Hamblen earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Texas-El Paso, and in 1995 earned her master's in communication studies from NMSU.

Currently, Hamblen is closing in on another master's degree at NMSU, this one in public administration.

"This is the perfect degree to set me up with the nuts and bolts for the green chamber," said Hamblen, who begins her new job April 9. "Combined with what I've done previously

hundreds of art lovers from in and out of the state to demonstrate their work.

Another event this weekend, March 17-18, is Cowboy Days at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road.

"Like many museums, we have several large-scale events we hope not only bring the local community but bring people from out of town, even out of state that help local economy," said Mark Santiago, director of the NMFRHM. "If they come to Cowboy Days, they may get a hotel, go out to dinner and maybe have breakfast the next morning."

They'll also likely get gas and do some shopping. That creates economic impact. Cowboy Days is the largest of the museum's many annual events, typically drawing around 5,000 visitors over two days.

"They're bringing a lot of customers, patrons and vendors from El Paso and outside the region. There's not another event like that in the area."

Allen plans to expand the facility and host more customer events. There are plans for expansion of the outdoor patio area. Allen is also planning to create the "The Barrel Room," a private and secluded area ideal for small parties and business events.

The winery plans to work with local res-

taurants to provide catering for these events, Hilton said.

"We are creating our own wine culture where people stay and relax," Hilton said.

"We open the doors for people to experience and learn about wine in an unpretentious environment," Allen said. "You don't have to know anything about wine to come here.'

Are you prepared for long-term care costs? Costs for loved ones can be overwhelming

Doña Ana County residents enjoy wide open spaces

Other metro areas don't have the same luxury

Most locals are surprised to learn that Doña Ana County and Los Angeles County are roughly the same size – each measuring about 4,000 square miles in area. Locals are even more surprised to learn how lucky they are to have so much room to roam in comparison to their Southern California neighbors.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's latest estimates, Doña Ana County measures 3,807 square miles and has a population of just over 206,000 residents. That equates to about 46 people for each square mile of area. In comparison, Los Angeles County, with a population of almost 10 million residents, stuffs more than 2,300 people into each of its 4,061 square miles.

While that sounds like a heck of a lot of people crowded in to a relatively small space, L.A. County residents have a fair amount of elbow room when compared with the residents of New York County, New York, where the occupancy ratio is a stunning 69,467 residents per square mile. Closer to home, Bernalillo County's (Albuquerque area) ratio is about 477 residents per square mile.

Owner occupants make up approximately 67.5 percent of the 78,644 housing units in Doña Ana County, according to the Census Bureau. In Albuquerque, about 63.5 percent of the population own their own home. Just under half of L.A. County residents own the home they live in, while just one in five N.Y. County residents hold deeds to the properties they occupy.

New York County residents brought home the most bacon, posting a median income of nearly \$65,000 per household. The median is where half earned more and half earned less. The median income for L.A. County households was \$55,452. Bernalillo County households earned approximately \$47,000 during 2009, while Doña Ana County's median household income was a little more than \$36,000.

Since the 2000 census, Doña Ana County's population increased by 18 percent. During the same period, the number of Bernalillo County residents grew by almost 16 percent. Population increases in New York and Los Angeles counties grew at a much slower pace, increasing by 3.2 and 3.5 percent respectively.

Last year, United Van Lines' annual migration study ranked New Mexico as the No. 8 state for inbound relocations. Relocations have been relatively flat for the past two years, according to the study, but are expected to rise as the economy recovers.

As more people begin moving around the country and to New Mexico, it's a foregone conclusion that it will be just a matter of time until I...

Farmers preparing for another dry season

Lack of water altering some planting decisions

Although local irrigation farmers don't have definite figures to work with regarding their 2012 water supply, many are preparing their fields.

The outlook for the water supply is so low, that the Elephant Butte Irrigation District and the El Paso Water Conservation District are planning to release water together in mid-May or later to continue delivering water until June "or when the water runs out," EPWCD manager Jesus "Chuy" Reyes said.

"A lot will depend on how much water we have in April," Reyes said. "We made an agreement with EBID for a joint venture this year. A lot of farmers are preparing fields. As an irrigation district, we're preparing the system by working on canals, gates and turnouts."

The runoff from the mountain snow pack for the Rio Grande Basin usually starts in March and continues until July. The Natural Resources Conservation Service's SNOTEL (Snow Telemetry) field monitors report that the snow pack is 84 percent of average, about the same as last month's recording, reported Wayne Sleep, hydrology technician.

The forecast for the flow at San Marcial above Elephant Butte Reservoir is 400,000 acre-feet compared with the average of 573,000 acre-feet. The water outlook puts the irrigation farm-

ers in a difficult management position because they need to know how much water is in storage before they start crop field preparation.

Farmers are monitoring the Elephant Butte Reservoir storage to learn how much water might be available.

The storage at Elephant Butte is 367,100 acre-feet, compared with the average for this time of year of 1.3 million acre-feet, Sleep said.

The South Pacific La Niña weather center, which pushes precipitation to the north, is weakening but its influence is expected to continue into the summer.

Discussions with cotton farmers indicate that planting will be down about 20 percent because of the anticipated water shortage, according to Alberto Pando, Mesa Farmers Coop Gin manager. "They're thinking of using more of the water they'll be getting this summer for alfalfa, silage and pecans," he said.

Mesa Farmer Co-op near Vado is the only cotton gin in the area.

Farmers usually start planting cotton in April. Last year, co-op farmers planted 19,000 acres of cotton, and the gin turned out 52,960 bales, a record.

Although the irrigation water outlook is not good, many farmers are sticking with chile, which is grown with contracts with processors.

Biad Chili Products in Mesilla Park has signed contracts with growers for more than 2,000 acres, mostly paprika and mild green chile.

Growers have prepared ground for planting more than 2,000 acres of red chile and 100 for green, a slight increase from last year, Chris Biad reported.

"We sell green chile directly to customers, and the business has been growing through the years," Biad said. "We sell the red chile to spice companies throughout the United States."

Dino Cervantes of Cervantes Enterprises said he has watered about half his chile acreage. He did not release figures, but said he is planning to grow about the same acreage as last year, depending on availability of water. Cervantes grows jalapeños, paprika and red

chile near Vado.

Dickie Ogaz in the Hatch Valley reported that he is holding his chile planting – green and red – to about 100 acres.

"We cut down on cotton and alfalfa and left some land idle so we have enough water for chile," Ogaz said.

The interest in chile state-wide was shown in the 2011 National Agriculture Service Statistic production figures; 9,500 harvested acres and 101,600 tons, up 16 percent.

The Elephant Butte Irrigation District hasn't announced its 2012 allotment, and hydrologist consultant J. Phillip King said he is preparing a report to present to the board to help determine the allotment.

^{*}It looks like another tough year," was King's outlook. "But we'll get through it the best we can."

Last year, the district allocation was 4 inches, the lowest in 50 years, but farmers got through the season by pumping well water. The district also received permission to distribute water in ditches for farmers who did not own wells.







Giddy up Las Cruces Cowboy Days are finally here

Yeehaw! Cowboy Days, an annual tribute to New Mexico's ranching heritage, returns to the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road.

From 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on St. Patrick's Day, Saturday, March 17, and Sunday, March 18, the museum will pay tribute to New Mexico's ranching history.

"Cowboy Days is a celebration of ranching, farming and agriculture in our area," said Craig Massey, the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum communication manager. "2012 is our 13th year of holding this celebration."

The festival will have a centennial flavor this year as New Mexico celebrates 100 years as a state. "Time Travel to 1912: A New Mexico Statehood Celebration," a living history performance held from 1 to 3 p.m. each day allows visitors to interact with characters from that era as they celebrate statehood, debate issues of the day, deliver soapbox speeches, play games and introduce guests to life in 1912.

"We have a cast of incredible actors who really get into the characters they're playing," Massey said. "We're really proud of all the interactive events we've added throughout the years so guests can be a part of activities."

Scheduled this year is a centennial scavenger hunt, with finishers eligible for prizes. Items and people from the past must be discovered to complete the adventure through New Mexico's rich history.

"It's a great event with local ties," Massey

said. "It's a chance to bring the whole family to see things you can't see anywhere else."

Junior cowpoke training is returning for the second year and children who complete a series of educational activities and games are eligible for an award certificate.

Pony rides, featuring the museum's new ponies, will be offered, and there will also be horseback rides in the pasture and stagecoach rides around the parking lot.

On Sunday, Pat Howard and his working dogs will hold a herding demonstration.

Live music will be ongoing at three different venues, and performers including Hot Lead, Eddie Harrison, Chris Freeh, Kenny Arroyos, James Michael, Yolanda Martinez, Skunk Valley, Jim Jones and Randy Granger will be among the entertainers.

Local authors from the Western Writers of America will hold readings in the museum's theater. Join cowboy poet Bob Neely and author Slim Randles for a side-splitting good time.

'There's something for everyone," Massey said. "The museum has tried to keep the event fun, educational and affordable for the whole family.

The popular gunfight reenactments will take place twice a day Saturday and Sunday. There also will be an old-fashioned medicine show as well as a 19th century fashion show.

Painter Linda Hagen's show, "The World Around Us: The Artwork of Linda Hagen," will be on display in the museum during the festivities. Her works feature the Southwestern landscapes and her love of horses and all things Western.

"Cowboy Days is a wonderful event that brings together all the aspects of New Mexico's ranching culture," Hagen said. "I'll be bringing some very local pieces with me, in addition to the current show to capture that sense of community."

A variety of arts and crafts vendors will have booths throughout the museum campus, and are joined by a variety of food and snack vendors.

During Cowboy Days, the museum will also host a plant and tree sale at its greenhouse. Tickets to the event are required to attend the sale. Admission is \$4 per person. Children 4 and under are admitted free.

"People just walk past the most amazing things," said Linda Hagen, an artist who lives in Mesilla Park. "There's so much beauty here in the Mesilla Valley, and I paint to show people what they aren't noticing."

Hagen, who works mostly in oils, focuses her art on the landscape of the high desert. Her works have been shown in many galleries around Las Cruces and earned her second place in "Color Las Cruces," a friendly competition among local artists to paint a local scene.

Her affection for the Southwest was always deep although she lived in Cincinnati, and owned Challenger Press, a printing company.

"I had always planned to pack up my horse, my trailer and head out West," Hagen said. "And finally, in 2004, I did just that."

Although Hagen was ready to make the trip with her beloved horse G.H. Zon, who she'd had for 19 years, Zon passed away of equine encephalitis shortly before Hagen moved.

"He up and died on me when I was ready to take him and ride around the West as I'd always dreamed of," Hagen said. "But I came without him, and now find he sneaks his way into my paintings from time to time."

Zon is the reason Hagen signs all of her paintings "G.H. Zon" instead of using her own name.

"He was my inspiration," Hagen said. "I would ride him though the forests of Ohio, but I knew we belonged out West."

After moving to Las Cruces, Hagen was determined to turn her love of art into a profession. With no formal art training, she relied on friends and artists in the community for guidance, tips and tricks along the way.

She hit another bump in the road when a year into her new life she found herself air lifted to El Paso with a shattered elbow and fractured skull.

"I got caught between two horses, one kicked and I went flying," Hagen said. "My whole life I'd been around horses and never had more than a few bumps and bruises until New Mexico."

Hagen's frightening ordeal provided her with other challenges after recovering from her wounds. Left-handed, Hagen's left elbow had been shattered, and the nerve damaged.

"It was hard just to hold the paint brush," Hagen said. "Quite the start to my adventure of being an artist.

"I suppose I could have tried holding it between my teeth," she added jokingly. With practice and time, Hagen was

able to retrain her hand, and has since been filling the walls of local galleries with her landscapes and memories of G.H. Zon.

Her paintings are currently being featured at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road. Her show, "The World Around Us: The Artwork of Linda Hagen," opened in the museum's arts corridor on Dec. 16,

The grass is always greener A humorous take on the search for a new life

Since Ceil and Peter Herman opened the doors of the Black Box Theatre more than 10 years ago, I have reviewed and enjoyed many No Strings Theatre Company productions.

In that decade, never have I heard such frequent laughter and chuckling throughout any production than at the Friday, March 9, opening night performance of "Becky's New Car," a delightful, yet thought-provoking, production that will run through March 25. Some of the loudest guffaws were coming from this usually reserved, silent and overly critical theater reviewer.

"Becky's New Car" is a difficult show to categorize. While there is humor laced throughout its two acts, there are other, more serious, aspects of the production, which add texture, depth and a strong moral subtext to our theater-going experience.

For instance, there is a fair share of "preachy" explanations of human behavior given to Chris, the title character's son who is a graduate psychology student. There are discussions by Becky and other characters about death, infidelity, midlife change, the current economic downturn and the human condition in general. When artfully stitched together by award-winning playwright Steven Dietz, the result is a remarkable evening of theater. "Becky's New Car" has been performed frequently by regional theater companies across the country since its 2008 premiere at Seattle's Actors Conservatory Theatre. Dietz was commissioned to write the play by Seattle arts supporter Charles Staadecker as a gift to his wife Benita.

Dietz seems to enjoy "breaking the fourth wall." He has created chatty dialogue that permit his characters to interact with members of the audience throughout the play. These are the moments that generate the most laughter.

Thanks in great part to Ceil Herman's skilled direction and staging, coupled with well crafted performances by a fine ensemble cast, there is so much to commend. So, make reservations immediately to see this production. You won't be sorry.

From the get-go, Kathleen Murphy – a perfectly cast Becky – adeptly engages the audience by welcoming us into her cluttered home as she cleans up the place. Needing help with her housekeeping, she hands an audience member in the front row a roll of toilet paper attached to a cleaning brush and asks her to leave it in the bathroom. She offers another a can of Sprite.

Swamped with take-home work from the office, she asks another audience member to do some collating and stapling for her. She takes a poll of audience members to help her make an important decision, and later, she brings up a few audience members to help her change clothes in preparation for a dinner party. At one point, her frustrated husband Joe offers a beer to an audience member.

Murphy steps into her Black Box debut with ease, having broken through that fourth wall for years as Sister Mary Amnesia in all of the "Nunsense" musicals produced by the Las Cruces Community Theatre. One marvels at how easy she makes this role appear, and yet, upon reflection, we recognize and appreciate her skill, talent and comic timing all the more.

Near the play's start, Becky shares words of wisdom imparted to her by a friend who recently died.

"When a woman says she wants new shoes, what she really wants is a new job," she said. "When she says she wants a new house, what she really wants is a new husband. And when she says she wants a new car, what she really wants is a new life."

It is clear that Becky badly wants a "new car." Boredom and frustration have entered her 28-year marriage to her amiable roofer husband, Joe, played with warmth and compassion by Jeff Peckham.

She has a good relationship with her "deadbeat" perpetual psychology student son, Chris, played easily by Donny Prosise, and her job as a title supervisor at a car dealership, while burdensome, is tolerable.

One evening, while staying late at work, she encounters an eccentric



widowed millionaire, Walter, played elegantly by Gerald Kumpf, who thinks she is also widowed. Becky doesn't bother to correct Walter.

All too easily she becomes an adulteress. Albeit likable, she enmeshes herself in a web of lies. Because we have been allowed into her thought process, her actions somehow become less savory than they are.

The play's resolution, perhaps a bit too simplistic, leaves us, Becky, Joe and the other members of the ensemble sadder, and a touch wiser.

In the end, we walk away from the show recognizing that in order to move forward, we must maintain our "cars" and our psyches and keep on traveling down the unknown road to – what Becky calls in the last word of the play – "heaven."

Technical aspects of the production, designed by Peter Herman, are up to usual Black Box fine standards. The dangers of psychoanalysis

'A Dangerous Method' is a dark look at the musings of Freud Review by Jeff Berg For the Las Cruces Bulletin

A battle of the minds ensues in this intense and dark look at Sigmund Freud, Carl Jung and a woman who became part of their lives.

Great performances by Viggo Mortenson as Freud and Michael Fassbender as Jung help subdue the sometimes over-the-top performance by an often hysterical Keira Knightley.

The story is based on fact, they say, and takes place during a time when psychoanalysis was just finding some real believers, thanks to the likes of Jung, Freud, and Sabina Spielrein (Knightley).

The opening scene offers clarity on where we are going, as a calm and introspective Jung is walking in a garden with Spielrein, who is recalling times of her childhood with great candor and a wailing and gnashing of teeth. This clinic might be her last chance to regain some semblance of sanity.

Father was not kind, we learn, and this has branded her forever in many different ways. Through the power of conversation

and open dialogue, Jung, using a number of Freud's methods, is able to being to reach into the soul of this desperate woman, one who certainly deserves better than what has happened to her so far. Physical abuse has led to what might be considered by some unusual sexual needs that remain part of her psyche.

He is moderately successful, and over time, her outbursts and incredible fear and loathing begins to lead to a more introspective person, one who

eventually becomes a colleague of the two noted therapists.

During this time frame, the very early 1900s, both men were really on to something in terms of help for those in emotional and psychological stress. Although now ridiculed

Things change dramatically when Jung, sometime after Speilrein returns to some sense of normalcy, acts on his loving feelings for her, even though he clearly is still much attached to his own wife. Freud, who has become Speilrein's therapist, takes advantage of this unethical situation to raise his own status, so to speak. those in emotional

Speilrein, doing her own research, becomes too emotionally and physically involved with Jung, which may have led to the dismissal of her own research, which at

times during the film clearly trumps that of the two men. The director of this film is David Cronen-

berg, whose previous works tend toward the macabre and the gory in such films as "The Fly," "Crash" and "A History of Violence,"



turns off the blood spigots here and concentrates solely on the characters and their attempts to capture our interest and imaginations. He largely succeeds, although some scenes, especially those in the boudoir, seem forced and slightly staged. Although that could have been true in real life as well.

"A Dangerous Method" is a very interesting and often cerebral film, and its blending of fact and possible fiction makes it watchable in many ways.

Restoration leads to music The Muddy Hands bring

The Muddy Hands bring the blues to Las Cruces

"We had such a great time, we decided to make something of it,"said John Hyndman, part of the four man blues group, The Muddy Hands Blues Band.

The then-unnamed band expanded to include four members, all with a love and passion for music – especially the blues.

"Bill Godby and I got together for a jam session to have some fun," Hyndman said.

Hyndman plucks the upright bass, Godby rocks the guitar, Royce Bandle beats the drums and Ben Altamirano blows the harp and lending lead vocals to the band's classic sound.

"Mostly just playing for enjoyment, we were approached to do a fundraiser for the restoration of St. Phillip's Chapel in May 2011," Hyndman said. "It was from the people working on the restoration of the adobe chapel – those with their hands stuck in the mud – that we got our name from."

Thanks to the benefit concert, and the group's love of music, The Muddy Hands Blues Band was born.

"The name also suggests a tie to the sound of 'Muddy Waters,' whom we love to draw inspiration from," Hyndman said. "When we all got together, all of us were a part of different bands.

"But we all shared a love of blues, and that really worked for the type of music we were trying to play."

The Muddy Hands Blues Band is a quartet of seasoned musicians with years of bandstand

experience. "Our true love is the blues," Hyndman said of his band mates.

Bandle, a Las Cruces native, was the drummer for The Alligators, – one of the most popular local bands of the late 1950s.

Royce has a long musical career, most of it spent on the road playing rock 'n' roll, soul, jazz, country and blues across the country from his musical base in California.

Altamirano of Silver City has musical experience that includes rock 'n' roll, blues and Latin styles. He was a mainstay of Blues Deluxe, one of the area's top blues bands for many years.

Godby was born and raised in Flint, Mich. He played rock and blues with many bands in Michigan, California and Hawaii, and rapidly established himself as a go-to guitarist for the community since moving to Las Cruces.

Hyndman has played music in Las Cruces for 30 years. His bass and vocals have been featured in a number of local groups, including dance orchestras, jazz bands, country and bluegrass bands.

On Friday, April 27, they are scheduled to play on the outdoor patio at St. Clair Winery & Bistro, 1720 Avenida de Mesilla.

Quickly gaining notice, The Muddy Hands Blues Band was selected as the opening act at the 2012 Silver City Blues Festival, Saturday, May 26.

They also have been booked to perform at Music in the Park June 24 and the Mesilla Valley Blues Society concert, July 15.

"Blues is the foundation of all great American music," Hyndman said. "From rock to jazz, most musicians have played blues at some point in their careers."

Hyndman said blues appeals to all audiences because of its diversity and classic sounds.

The band's songlist includes a mixture of classic Chicago blues, Texas shuffle and Memphis blues. They try to keep the set list as diverse as the group's members, Hyndman said.

"We want to keep our shows interesting for listeners," Hyndman said. "No one wants to hear the same song all night long."

A hometown diner with an interesting name has been cooking up the plumpest half-pound Angus burgers and local Mexican favorites since opening its doors

"We use all American products and as much produce grown locally as we can get our hands on," said Brady Reno, who is a member of the family that owns Doña Ana's newest hamburger joint, The Cow Palace Café.

Once home to Alejandro's Mexican Food, the new diner, now owned by Russell Tharp and Brady's husband, Wesley, gets its quirky name from Cliff, N.M., where the

Reno said her family enjoyed the original so much that when they set out to open their own diner, they could think of nothing that paid tribute to their roots better than "The Cow Palace Café."

They are constantly updating their menu on their quest for local ingredients, supporting the region's farmers and agricultural industry. In addition to their mammoth burgers, they offer burritos, enchiladas, tostadas and everything else you'd expect from a joint in Doña Ana.

"We have free coffee in the mornings, for people to come in and enjoy the company of their neighbors," Reno said. "We'll also have our beer and wine license

It was the farthest north I'd journeyed in New Mexico to date. Considering it was only five minutes away, I'd hardly call it a trek, but it turned out to be a grand adventure. I did some sweet-talking to get my partner to take an early lunch, and we went on a pilgrimage to the palace. We discovered a redsided structure with wide windows and metal sheeting for sides - it resembled a place where cows might stop in for a grass patty. Charmed by its farm-like exterior, we rushed inside to face the ultimate question: Green or red? Oh, New Mexico, never have I had such difficulty with choosing something as simple as a color.

Generally, I head for the green, but feeling bold, I asked what the cashier recommended. Good thing I did.

"Normally, I'd say green, hands down," she told us. "But today, you've gotta try the red."

How could I argue with that? Two burritos smothered in red sauce, and 10 minutes later, I had to loosen a notch on my belt. Holy cow. Did I just eat all of

that? It was impossible to put the fork down, even when my mouth was burning with the delightful heat of

the red chile sauce. The food was fantastic, and the side of jalapeño poppers we ordered were crispy on the outside and molten-Cheddar lava within.

The Cow Palace Café is most definitely my new favorite place to go and worship the amazing culinary contributions of the bovine. I'll be back, and this time I'll be conquering one of those half-pound burgers.

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Falling down the rabbit hole ACT presents 'Alice in Wonderland'

The "Alice in Wonderland" production put on by A Children's Theatre of Mesilla Valley, is deemed to be extra-magical, according to one of the world's most-known abstract painters.

"Alice in Wonderland," or "Mendoza's Wonderland" as artist George Mendoza likes to jokingly refer to it, is a collaboration between ACT and Mendoza.

Mendoza is a legally blind local artist whose paintings have been made into fabrics. He has 10 different worldwide clothing lines, and his clothing was worn by Glenn Close in the television series "Damages." He was contacted by ACT director Kelly King to help work with the design and fabrics on the set.

"I was very humbled and honored by the invitation," Mendoza said.

The children worked with Mendoza to reproduce two of his paintings, "The Wise Tree" and "Far Away Eyes" as backdrops for their play.

Mendoza said he brought in posters for the kids to see how the original paintings look. "I guided them with the outlines of the

tree and the eyes, helped them with the colors ... but they really filled in the blanks," Mendoza said.

His paintings are inspired by his blind-

ness. He described his blindness as not being completely dark, but a blindness of color that leaves him looking at "dazzling colors that don't belong ... it's as if you are looking through a kaleidoscope."

Mendoza's fabrics will also be on stage as the cast of "Alice" will be adorned in his clothing. The pool of tears will be made of his fabric using his design "Colors of the Wind."

King asserted that the production is "very close to the book." She said that "Alice" was picked because it is a "great story."

"We always try to make it (the play) literature-based," King said.

Since ACT also performs for school audiences, King likes to make sure that there are lessons that can be taught.

"The teachers can take the lesson back to the classroom and the kids in (the play) get a lot out of learning character development," King said.

ACT has sold out two of its "Alice" performances to public school crowds. Performances still open to the public will be 7 p.m. March 16, and 1 p.m. March 17, at the Rio Grande Theater. Tickets are \$6.

King said that ACT's next play will be "Letters from the Orphan Train." ACT is looking for actors for the production. For more information, call 571-1413.





Reviving the 'Princess of Mars' saga 'John Carter' is the foundation of today's science fiction

With the deep pockets of Disney, a mother company to many other media outlets, I expected a swarm of advertising for its newest flick, "John Carter."

Normally, we are bombarded with 30-second television previews months before the release, see life-sized cut-outs in cinema lobbies and popcorn bags plastered with the stars of the upcoming film. Strategies like these are vital to making people aware of the upcoming films, and ultimately ensure opening weekend makes as much money as possible. When Disney spends

\$250 million dollars to create a 3-D sciencefiction saga based on the works of Edgar Rice Burroughs – you might know him as the man who penned "Tarzan: King of the Apes," – you expect some fireworks. Instead, "John Carter"

HUMP DAY

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was ushered into the box office through the anonymous back door. The first preview I saw – I see a movie in the theater every week

RIGOLETTO

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- was only a week prior to "John Carter's" release.

It was Disney's marketing that performed a disservice to the movie. They wrongly assumed audiences were so familiar with the "John Carter" brand that simply seeing the movie's title would excite them. I'd never heard of the series or the characters, and I barely recognized the cast.

Thankfully, www.newyorktimes.com had a lovely article on the film, and the book series. It revealed, "John Carter" was "based on a novel, 'Princess of Mars,' which is 100 years old and was already a little dated when it came out. Burroughs, better known for his 'Tarzan' saga, published it in monthly installments in a magazine, in February 1912. It was the first thing he ever wrote."

This series is considered by many literary critics to be the predecessor to films such as "Star Wars" and, most recently, James Cameron's "Avatar." The stories are incredibly similar and the science-fiction aspects of the tales strangely consistent.

John Carter (Taylor Kitsch) is a southern gentleman and a Civil War veteran who is looking to make himself filthy rich, searching for a gold mine in the Arizona Territory. He is an accomplished Calvary man, and has given up fighting for others after his wife and child were killed while he was away from home.

In a twist of fate, Carter is transported to what could have been the New Mexico desert, but we discover is actually Mars, or "Barsoom" to the natives. The indigenous people, called Tharks - Apache-like in their dress and culture - are 12 feet tall, green-skinned aliens with tusks and four arms.

Thanks to the gravity change, Carter has amazing physical abilities, which include being able to jump ridiculous distances. He is taken hostage by the

Tharks, where the tribe's Jeddack

Grade

(Mark Strong) – martian for "king" – notices Carter's impressive combat skills.

Carter refuses to fight for anyone - as he had back on Earth - but after some pretty neat airship battles, he saves a red-skinned woman from certain death. Dejah Thoris (Lynn Collins) turns out to be the princess of Helium – one of the major civilizations of Barsoom. She is trying to escape a bitter marriage to her villainous rival, Sab Than (Dominic West).

Carter saves the day, but refuses to save Dejah's city from Sab Than's clutches. He is set on finding a way back to Earth and back to his cave of gold.

He eventually has a change of heart, and an epic battle ensues to save Barsoom from the meddling Therns, omnipotent priests who have a heavy hand in the destruction of the planet.

If it all sounds very confusing, it is, but only for the first 30 minutes. With unfamiliar names of people, places and entire civilizations, it's easy to be overwhelmed with the very concept of science-fiction.

The writers of "John Carter" do a pretty good job of catching the audience up to speed, and at the end of the 139 minute film, I felt as though I understood the basic who, what, when and where of the film.

When the credits rolled and the lights came up, I had to pause to really understand what I had just seen. "John Carter" was ultimately a love story with a science-fiction twist, not unlike many I had seen before.

I enjoyed the film, but thought it was a little long. The center of the storyline sagged and the blossoming romance dragged out one scene too many. I'm glad I didn't spring for the 3-D version, as the film translated just fine without glasses and the ticket surcharge.

It was a nice film, and obvious in its close relationships to other sagas of the genre, but from Disney, I was expecting to be blown away.

I know some people will be offended by a real world or survivalist opinion. In reality, all we need to do is think out of the box.

Most Americans carelessly throw away used equipment and items. This throw away consumerism has reaped a hefty cost to our community and American society. This instant gratification mind set can result in excessive spending and waste.

Any serious student of history and societies can tell you that continuing the same behavior and actions and expecting different results is the definition of insanity. Large segments of American society have lost the ability and desire to improvise.

The dictionary definition of improvise is, "to make, provide or arrange from whatever materials are readily available: We improvised a dinner from yesterday's leftovers.

Improvising is the art of making the wrong tool do the right job. This ability to improvise has proven to be the name of the game in survival.

In a survival situation, a person needs to be able to use field-expedient means in order to survive. A person in need of shelter must utilize structures or materials in the area to provide protection from the weather. Depending on the environment – arctic, desert, jungle – a person may have to construct a shelter from natural materials. A person may have to convert a deserted vehicle or building into a temporary home.

During numerous survival training exercises, I have turned drifted snow into a snow cave, tunneled into sand dunes for temporary shelter, used fallen trees as an overnight tent. Think out Tips for the Bataan march

Overcoming the physical challenges to honor the fallen, survivors

With 25 percent of participants expected to become casualties of the rough terrain and harsh elements during the 23rd annual Bataan Memorial Death March, it's important to be well prepared.

Military personnel and civilians from around the world will participate in the march Sunday, March 25, at White Sands Missile Range.

Nearly 6,400 took part in the march last year, and with more expected this year, there are sure to be a few first-timers.

Some might view the physical challenge as nothing more than a marathon, in reality, it's far from it.

"What's different about the march is the terrain, wind and all the different elements," said Steve Zagar, chief of Family and Moral Welfare and Research, who directs the march. "This is a combination of pavement, packed dirt roads and loose sand. The sand doesn't make it any easier."

Preparations for the march should begin weeks in advance. According to the Bataan march website, participants should begin a progressive schedule, working up to 26.2 miles. Training on various terrains will also help.

The website warns that walking

5 to 6 miles a day does not offer enough conditioning to prepare for the march. It is recommended to gradually work up to walking at least 15 miles a day. Wear the shoes, equipment and weight you intend to during the march.

Categories were created to increase participation, allowing some participants to approach the challenge with a competitive spirit. The categories are broken up by age and the amount of weight carried through the entire course. Individuals registered in higher weight categories are encouraged to add weight to their packs with dried rice or beans. Packs are weighed at the end of the race.

"I think it's mostly competition among certain groups or teams,' Zagar said. "Most participants are there to pay tribute to the Bataan survivors and men and women in the armed forces."

Other advance preparations include avoiding alcohol for 48 hours prior to the march, and caffeinated beverages 24 hours before participating.

Drink water the morning of the march.

The website provides information on the importance of to drinking both water and sports drinks during the march. Both do their part to keep the body hydrat-See Bataan on page D2

During the march

- Carry a list of medical conditions and medication allergies in a zip-lock bag pinned to equipment or clothing in case of an emergency.
- Bring a small flashlight for the early morning and late evening hours to help deter wildlife.
- Stop at every water point for water and sports drinks to prevent dehydration and muscle cramps.
- Keep feet dry by applying deodorant to the soles of the feet, applying foot powder, or carrying an extra pair of socks.
- Carry pre-cut moleskin in case "hot spots" develop. If blisters do occur, get them treated at a medical aid tent as soon as possible.
- If participants come across a "disabled marcher," take note of the location and report it at the next water spot.
- Wear a hat that provides shade to the neck and head, similar to a "boonie" hat.
- Bring sunscreen and re-apply frequently.
- Wear sunglasses.
- Be respectful of wildlife.
- Because the march takes place at the missile range, do not pick up or kick anything along the route. Report anything suspicious to missile range officials.

LCFD receives grant worth thousands

Avon aids clinic in promoting breast health

La Clinica de Familia has received a \$60,000 grant to support breast education and outreach in Doña Ana County.

This is the 12th year the clinic has received the grant, which, in previous years, has ranged in amount from \$55,000 to \$65,000.

"We apply every year, and have received the national award for the past 12 years," said Gloria Castro, breast and cervical cancer coordinator at La Clinica.

The Avon Foundation funds the grant in order to expand the Avon Breast Cancer Project. The purpose of the project is to increase the number of women who have annual check ups and early detection of abnormalities through education and outreach.

Castro said that the clinic provides these opportunities to women throughout the county because of barriers such as cost and location.



"The places our unit travels are rural," Castro said. "Women in these areas don't have these types of services within their reach."

The Avon grant provides funding solely for breast health education and outreach, such as how to give a selfbreast examine, the importance of an annual Pap smear and mammogram, finding affordable services and more.

LCDF has a separate grant that supports their medical services, which includes a unit that travels to

rural areas to provide women with free mammograms.

"We go to different facilities in the county - Las Cruces, Chaparral, Sunland Park, San Miguel, Anthonywhere we provide services and breast health education and outreach," Castro said.

By providing LCDF with the grant, the Avon project is specifically targeting women over the age of 40. With breast cancer listed as the most common form of cancer in women in the U.S. and leading cause of death in women between the ages of 40 and 55, Avon and LCDF stress the importance of early detection through clinical and self breast exams, mammograms and education.

ed, but sports drinks also aid in preventing over hydration from drinking too much water and replenish the body's electrolytes.

Individuals traveling alone should make arrangements prior to the march for their vehicles, in case they are medically evacuated.

Footwear should have a minimum of 100 miles of previous wear to avoid developing "hot spots' or blisters.

One of the Zagar's top recommendations is to layer clothing and bring an extra pair of socks.

"Temperatures are cool at the beginning of the march," Zagar said. "As temperatures rise and the march progresses, you're going to want to start shedding layers."

On the day of the march, Zagar stresses the importance of arriving early to the missile range. "Be at the site by 4:30 a.m. because of high traf-

fic," Zagar said. There are two courses, the blue course, 14.2

miles, and the green course, 26.2 miles. Both will have similar challenges and participants should prepare accordingly.

Courses are closed by 8 p.m. and a meal is provided upon completion.

Participants are encouraged to camp at Vol-

unteer Park overnight or stay at a nearby hotel in Alamogordo or Las Cruces to avoid driving longdistances.

Zagar said this helps prevent hazardous driving conditions due to fatigue, aggravation of injuries, and muscle cramps that can occur while driving. He then made one final recommendation.

"Bring a camera and take pictures along the route," Zagar said. "It really is an extraordinary event.'

The recommendations are based on information provided by the Bataan Medical Team, past participants and other experts. All information is available at bataanmarch.com.

A fairytale evening with a great purpose

It's like something out of a fairytale – masks, gowns, dining and dancing – only this ball is so much more than a night out, it's a way to bring awareness to a cause that affects one out of 110 individuals.


The Hearts for Autism Fund at the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico will host the third annual Mariposa MASCquerade Ball, from 5:30 to 11 p.m. Saturday, March 31, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road. Arabian Nights is the theme of the evening.

"This is a big event that brings awareness, but it's also an evening of celebration," said Katrina Hille, clinical director of Mariposa Autism Service Center and Hearts for Autism Fund board member. "It allows for more conversation on a topic that might seem scary to some people." The ball will benefit children with Autism Spectrum Disorders, a term that encompasses high-functioning autistic disorders, such as Asperger's syndrome, to lower functioning autistic disorders or pervasive developmental disorders.

Tickets are \$60 per person or \$600 for a table of 10. The event will kick off at 5:30 p.m. with a cocktail hour. At 6:45 p.m. dinner will be served, followed by dancing from 8 to 11 p.m. There will also be a silent auction and cash bar.

There is no dress code, but in the past attendees have come in semi-formal attire or worn full-on gowns and tuxes. People can bring their own masks, but they will be provided free of charge.

Last year's celebration, raised \$64,000 through ticket sales, a silent auction and private donations. The large amount was due in part to a sizable donation from Albertson's. Abel Covarrubias, board chair for the Hearts

of Autism Fund said this year's goal is to raise \$15,000 to \$18,000.

"All the money raised will stay in Las Cruces and is dedicated to training families and community partners about autism and treatment strategies," Covarrubias said.

Trainings are open to everyone. Families with autistic children or family members are encouraged to attend.

"We have people coming from Alamogordo, Silver City, El Paso and all over southern New Mexico to the trainings," Covarrubias said.

The majority of the speakers and experts who present at the training are from out of state, and offer insight into new methods and a variety of treatments. For more information on the trainings, visit heartsforautismlc.com

The money raised will also support Camp New Amigos. In its third year, the camp allows autistic children and young adults from 6 to 18 years old, to have a typical camp experience. "We run two parallel camps, one for younger kids and the other for the older kids," said Kathleen Cronin, a professor who specializes in special education and communication disorders and runs the camp at New Mexico State University.

The camp will be held this summer from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday, June 4 to Friday, June 8, at NMSU. Activities include swimming, rockwall climbing, archery, kayaking, a BBQ night for the families and more.

"Kids with autism really don't initiate conversations or immediately engage in activities with others," Cronin said. "The camp and their peers help them develop their social skills."







Easy living in Mesilla

Home incorporates rustic styling with passive solar design

Although Ben and Karen Archuleta purchased the 3 1/3acre parcel at 2869 Calle del Sur in 1982, creating their dream 3,500-square-foot, contemporary Southwestern abode was a process that extended several years.

The first step took place the following year, when Ben Archuleta planted about 130 pecan trees on a portion of the property.

"When I purchased the property in 1982, it was a cotton field," he said, adding that he also purchased the 4 1/4-acre parcel behind the property and later converted it into a residence for his mother.

"I'm a native of Mesilla and I wanted that country setting, something quiet and secluded."

Wanting to build the home himself, Archuleta took a course through Doña Ana Community College on how to construct adobe homes. In 1985, the construction process officially began.

The Archuletas chose to set the home away from the road, allowing for more privacy and creating a "feeling of getting away."

"The great thing is the front of the home faces away from the road," Karen Archuleta said. "That makes it feel very secluded and comfortable."

Hiring a licensed plumber and electrician to properly install those systems, Ben Archuleta built the rest himself, with help from family and friends. When construction was completed seven months later, he had a 1,000-square-foot, passive solar adobe home.

To be passive solar – which doesn't require any sort of machinery unlike active solar, which uses solar panels or photovoltaic systems – the home was placed on the lot in a way to collect, store and distribute the sun's heat in the winter and reject the heat in the summer.

Also wanting to create as much mass as possible, which helps with regulating the home's internal temperature, Ben Archuleta laid the adobe bricks in such a way that the walls measured 16 inches thick.

"Laying it this way used more adobe, but you get more mass," he said.

When interest rates dropped in the late 1980s, the Archuletas decided to take out a loan and add 2,500 square feet to their home sweet home.

"I like the richness of the home and its feeling of casual

living," Karen Archuleta said.

Taking the narrow dirt drive to the front of the residence, guests are greeted with a large, solid mahogany carved door, Ben Archuleta purchased in Juarez. Inside, he created a grand open space with the living room, kitchen and game room connected to each other.

"It's a very open concept, and I like that," Karen Archuleta said. "We've had a wedding here. We were able to set up a fivepiece band in the kitchen."

Ben Archuleta said the adobe walls are coated with fiber gypsum, except the areas that receive moisture, such as the bathrooms and kitchen, in which he used non-fiber gypsum plaster.

Wanting the home to have a casual, rustic feel, Ben Archuleta installed pine vigas and tongue-and-groove paneling on the ceilings as well as other wood detailing throughout the home.

"All of the wood work came from a mill in Sacramento, N.M., in the Weed-Mayhill area," he said, adding that the corbels over the doorframes, windows and arches are doubled to be sturdier.

Beyond the living room is a game room area, which is where the home originally began before the expansion. The room has a wood-burning stove that was the only thing used to heat the house when it measured 1,000 square feet, Ben Archuleta said.

A bar can be found in the room. Ben Archuleta said his brother-in-law built it using leftover wood from the renovation project.

While a hallway beside the game room leads to two bedrooms and a bathroom, a door in the area encloses a unique room with a round wall, an element Ben Archuleta said Pat Taylor helped him create.

Originally a living room, it recently was changed into another bedroom for guests. Thanks to its circular windows, Ben Archuleta said it's a great space to see how thick the walls are.

Back at the living room, a wooden staircase – also created with the help of Taylor – leads to the master bedroom. Using 2-by-6 frame construction, the room occupies about 800 square feet, Ben Archuleta said. In addition to its own bathroom, the space includes a stained-glass decorated door to a private balcony that over looks the front of the residence.

Adjacent to the home is a large four-car garage with an attached one-bedroom apartment. The apartment was built from cinder blocks filled with bead insulation. To also help the energy efficiency of the building, 4-inch ridged insulation was



placed on the roof.

Constructing an unusual Southwest-inspired home, the Archuletas said one of their favorite things about the residence is its location.

"It's a great home for a family," Ben Archuleta said. "It's a relaxed getaway. You don't have neighbors on top of each other, but you're still close to amenities, like schools and shopping. It's the best of both worlds."

"It's a fantastic area for kids," Karen Archuleta said. "There is room for them to run around, and we have a three-fourths basketball court."

Ben Archuleta said the property is zoned RA, which allows for agriculture, whether it be crops or livestock. He said the property includes a domestic water well for the home as well as an irrigation water well.

Exploring the local vegetation Group is dedicated to state's native plants flower lovers. They want to go out and look at

With a mission to educate the public about native plants, foster preservation of natural habitats, support botanical research and encourage the appreciation of native plants, the Native Plant Society of New Mexico, Las Cruces Chapter, has provided the community with the tools and knowledge needed to appreciate the state's unique vegetation.

Founded in 1978, the Native Plant Society of New Mexico has eight chapters – four in the northern portion of the state and four in the southern region. It was started in Las Cruces by avid horticulturists eager to showcase the beauty of local plants.

"There was probably concern about protecting our native plant species," said Native Plant Society of New Mexico Las Cruces Chapter President Carolyn Gressitt. "Some people are bird lovers, while some people are wild

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them together."

John Freyermuth, member secretary for the local chapter, said because of New Mexico's diverse habitats, the state has a high number of native plant species.

"New Mexico is third or fourth in the nation with the most native plant species," he said, adding that California is No. 1, with Texas coming in second. "New Mexico and Arizona are close in number of plant species.

"People from the East come and think it's just desert. Well, we have more species of plants than they do."

To help educate those interested, the chapter holds meetings the second Wednesday of just about every month at the Good Samaritan Society-Las Cruces Village. These meetings include various speakers, such as botany students from New Mexico State University.

Gressitt said the group also holds monthly field trips.

"They're open to the public and very often last into the afternoon," she said, adding that they usually take place in Doña Ana County, with some excursions taking members to other parts of the state, such as Carlsbad Caverns.

"We usually go once or twice a year to the Gila or Sacramento mountains in the summer," said Freyermuth, adding they attend the annual meeting for all chapters in the state.

The Las Cruces chapter also takes an annual trip to White Sands Missile Range, during which the land manager leads the group on a tour of the area.

"It's a fabulous opportunity," Gressitt said. "The missile range is almost like a reserve for plants.

Freyermuth said during these various trips and outings participants are encouraged to admire the plants - not dig them up.

In addition to its social and educational events, the Native Plant Society of New Mexico, Las Cruces Chapter, does various volunteer work, from helping the Audubon Society plant trees and survey plants at Broad Canyon Ranch to assisting the Bureau of Land Management making plant lists for inventory.

"We also donate to local organizations," Gressitt said.

The chapter makes donations to the Asombro Institute for Science Education and to the herbariums - where botanists collect and store samples of plants - at NMSU.

(The money we give to the herbariums) allows them to hire students to mount the pressed plant species," Gressitt said.

With 70 to 80 members in the local chapter and about 750 members throughout the state, Gressitt said members come from a mix of backgrounds.

'Geologists like to come on our trips as well as people who don't know anything about plants," she said.

"Newcomers especially want to know what it looks like out there," Freyermuth said.

To become a member, Gressitt said people must join the state organization. Memberships range from \$15 to \$1,000.

There are no fees to come to our meetings or field trips," Gressitt said. "We do encourage people to join because the only money we have to function comes in as a rebate from the state organization based on the membership we bring in."

Freyermuth said there are benefits for those who become members, such as discounts on native gardening books, plant lists and field guides and the Native Plant Society of New Mexico newsletter.



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Featured kitchen gadget: Whiskey rocks

Have your drink on the rocks – literally

Whiskey stones keep beverage cold without diluting it ^{By Beth Sitzler}

Mark Twain, Raymond Chandler, Winston Churchill, Clark Gable and Kid Rock are all notable men who have contributed to culture as we know it – and all infamous whiskey lovers.

Famous for uttering the words, "Whiskey is for drinking; water is for fighting over," Twain and his counterparts aren't the only ones who have sipped on a glass of the amber beverage.

While there are a bevy of whiskey options available, true connoisseurs prefer their whiskey served by itself, chilled in a glass.

There are two categories of people who enjoy their whiskey straight – those who like ice in their glass to water down the beverage and those who want their whiskey chilled, but without dilution.

For those not interested in watering down their drinks, there is another way to keep your glass chilled, thanks to whiskey stones.

What is it?

Created from all-natural soapstone, whiskey stones – also known as whiskey rocks – are the perfect way to keep your drink cold without the hazard of watering it down with melted ice.

Soapstone is a nonporous rock and as such it won't affect the flavor or odor of your drink. Also, it is a softer stone than other nonporous rocks, such as granite, so it won't scratch or damage your glassware.

It's important to note that whiskey stones aren't a replacement for ice in all beverages. The rocks should only be used to chill spirits – not your tea, soft drink or wine.

How does it work?

Whiskey stones can be used in your single malt just like ice cubes. Simply place them in the freezer in the accompanying muslin bag until they reach your desired coldness and toss them in your drink. It is commonly suggested to wait two days before using them.

While most sets come with nine whiskey stones, you don't have to use them all to chill your drink. Usually three will get the job done. Pour your spirit of choice over the stones and let the beverage sit for about five minutes before enjoying.

In the drink, the soapstone will retain the colder temperature for hours – longer than ice, in fact – thanks to talc, a primary component of soapstone. Although the stones won't make your drink "ice cold," it will chill it, which is important when drinking whiskey – the flavors "tighten up" when too cold.

When you're done with the whiskey stones, rinse them off, let them dry and put them back in their muslin bag and the freezer for another day and another drink.

Where can it be found?

Sets of whiskey stones can be purchased at specialty stores around town, including Bed, Bath & Beyond. They also can be bought online at websites such as www.thinkgeek.com and www.uncommongoods.com.

How much does it cost?

Whiskey stones range in price from \$10 to \$35.

Helpful hints:

- Use caution when setting the whiskey stones into a glass container, because they can crack or chip the glass.
- Use a glass with a wider base to help prevent the cubes from stacking. When stacked, they run the risk of causing a splash when they shift.

Details

Types of whiskey

- **Single malt:** A malted barley whiskey from one distillery
- **Single grain:** A grain whiskey from one distillery, but not necessarily from a single type of grain.
- **Blended malt:** A malt created by mixing single malt whiskies from several distilleries.
- **Blended grain:** A whiskey created by mixing grain whiskies from more than one distillery.
- Blended scotch whiskey: A mixture of malt and grain whiskies, usually from multiple distilleries.

Whether it's the keys that unlock the secrets of the universe, your love's heart or even the front door, those tiny metal objects sure can be useful.

The problem is, however, when you forget what that use is. Take a look at the bundle of keys you carry every day and try to remember what each is used for. Chances are, there will be one or two you can't remember.

Even if your lack of memory is frustrating, those keys can still be useful, so keep them handy, just in case.

1. Create a decorative vase: Creating an eye-catching centerpiece or decorative display is easy when you have some keys, knickknacks and a little imagination. Select a vase, mason jar or other clear container. Fill the vessel, or vessels, with old keys, marbles, polished rocks and even a candle. You can also skip the candle and insert fake flowers or greenery into the vase.

2. Do your own wall art: Interior design stores throughout town carry a wide variety of ornate art hangings to decorate the empty walls of your home. Reconstructing after a disaster

World Building Systems designs houses that can withstand Mother Nature By Beth Sitzler

After a natural disaster, it can be hard for a community to rebuild. To help with the process, a new Las Cruces-based company aims to cut down on rebuilding time as well as provide 'Mother Nature resistant buildings.

World Building Systems is the brainchild of Jeffrey Schoner, who said he got the idea for the company living in Hattiesburg, Miss., after Hurricane Katrina hit.

"We determined that a community has a hard time building after a disaster," he said, adding that because insurance premiums are so high, it can be difficult to rebuild traditional structures

Coming up with an idea to design a building system that is easily created, environmentally friendly and able to withstand disasters, Schoner set out to build a team of experts to help this idea come into fruition. Using a headhunter, he assembled a nine-person team that includes a builder, architect, financial advisor and an insurance/recovery expert, among others.

"We were able to find all of the skill sets needed, and they all are actually ex-military, like me," said Schoner, a Vietnam veteran.

The way the system works, Schoner said, is the home site is modified to include a steel docking system with a steel frame and stability webbing. Fiber cement boards are affixed to the steel frame. An 8-inch polystyrene core is placed at the center. As the walls go up, rebar, structural steel cables and cement

are used to secure the building. When the home is completed, the owners will have a building that can withstand a tornado, earthquake or hurricane, Schoner said.

"We want to maximize the flexibility of the structure, that way damage due to a change in air pressure doesn't occur. There might be cracks, but the house doesn't come down," he said. "We've created this webbing that will stop things from coming through.

The walls will be pieced together to create a new home or structure, and can be modified to fit any style - including having a brick façade.

"It's an architecturally flexible product," Schoner said. "The corner systems measure 1/2 inch to 4 inches wide. The houses can be any size, style or color. We can replicate anything that has been built. Also, we can go up four stories without any additional structural steel."

Schoner said they have partnered with several companies, including Whirlpool, Armstrong and Kohler, to make it so the houses are "turnkey," meaning that everything needed to finish a home is included.

"Everything is made in the U.S.A., down to the wires and harness," he said.

Schoner said the system has passed the Miami-Dade County Impact Test,

during which a 2-by-4 is fired at the wall. "If the impression is less than 1 inch, it passes," he said. "Building inspectors on the Gulf Coast have seen this product and have approved it."

At the encouragement of a friend, Schoner and his wife relocated to the Mesilla Valley four years ago, where he has been working to raise funds and perfect the building system.




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


Having built various parts of a home, Schoner said the team worked to modify the product to remove any skill required to build the structures, explaining that in a disaster, time is of the ssence and getting people back into a home is crucial.

"Neighbors can help neighbors rebuild," he said.

Schoner said a crew of four can assemble a home in about five days, with each additional floor adding a day to that timeline. More than just a disaster relief

"Our whole emphasis is to create thousands of jobs for returning veterans," he said. "We want to utilize their existing training as a unit so they can go in and put these structures up." Schoner said he has plans to have

ghanistan, Schoner said.

his employee team be comprised of 95 percent returning veterans.

"My personal goal is in the next five years to find jobs for military veterans," he said. "This, in return, will help impact other jobs.'

When everything is up and running, Schoner said he will give 50 percent of the company to the employees, with the other 50 percent going to a global veterans fund.

"We will utilize that trust to fund wounded warrior housing, known as Wounded Warrior Village," he said.

The idea behind these villages, Schoner said, is to provide support for 1,000 to 1,500 veterans and their families, which will include housing, rehabilitation and community recreational centers and other services needed to maximize life recovery, such as job

training and equestrian therapy facilities. He said he plans to build 15 of these villages in the country. Schoner said they are in the process of filing for 501(c)3 and

are about to launch a website - http://investinavet.org - for the program.

"When you go to war, you don't leave your buddies behind on the battlefield," he said. "We want to make sure that we don't leave behind our veterans on the battlefield of life."


Having already spent \$4 million "to get to this point," Schoner said the company is currently raising \$600,000 from investors to build four prototypes.

"As soon as that is set in place, 90 percent of the money will be set aside to build the product," he said. "We intend to hire 900 people out of the gate. I would like to do it in this region.

(For the rest of the capital) I'd like to reach out to the community and the military community here in the area. "I want to stress that this is a huge opportunity for this com-

munity. ... It will have a tremendous economic impact."

In addition to the potential economic impact, Schoner said he wants to build the first Wounded Warrior Village in the area.

The wonders of fish

Although healthy, this food doesn't have to be boring

Fish is chock full with all things good for us: protein, vitamins, minerals and omega 3 fatty acids. But sadly, few Americans incorporate it into diets on a regular basis.

In an article that appeared in the Chicago Sun-Times (Dec. 20, 2011), the U.S. Department of Agriculture Dietary Guidelines recommend 8 ounces of fish per week, but the average American eats only a mere 3 1/2 ounces. Also, when they do eat it, it's often of the fast food, deep-fried variety, which obviously cancels its healthful benefits.

If cooked in a wholesome manner, just two seafood meal servings per week offer the following advantages:

- Reduces the risk of dying from a heart attack by about 30 percent.
- Protects against heart arrhythmias, lowers triglycerides and blood pressure.
- Eases inflammation and keeps blood vessels healthy.
- In addition, eating fish may:
- Prevent cancer and help protect skin from sun damage.
- Keep brains healthy.
- Ease the pain of arthritis.

Healthy ways to cook and enjoy fish include baking, grilling, shallow frying, sautéing, poaching and steaming. (And yes, fish can be breaded, but keep the coating light and the pan oil level low.) Recipes need not be boring. Experiment with seasonings – you're not limited to salt, pepper and lemon. A simple dose of chile pepper, as an example, elevates ho-hum tasting fish into sassy sea-lebrities.

Lightly Fried Spicy Fish Tacos

2 pounds firm-fleshed white fish steaks such as red snapper, cut into 4 to 6 pieces Salt and pepper to taste 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Pinch ground allspice Flour 4 tablespoons vegetable oil

Tortillas Garnish: Sliced avocado, grated

beets and sliced green onion Season the fish steaks with salt, pepper,

cayenne pepper and ground allspice. Coat fish lightly with flour, shaking to remove excess. Heat the oil in a skillet and sauté the fish

until lightly browned on both sides. Top each warmed tortilla with fish and

garnish with avocado slices, grated beets and sliced green onion. Makes 4 servings.

Any flavor and size tortillas can be used. I like small corn tortillas best.

Taco Tilapia with Zesty Avocado

1 pound tilapia fish 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin 1/4 teaspoon chili powder 1 tablespoon olive oil Juice of 2 limes, divided 1 small avocado, diced Salt and pepper 2 tablespoons onion, chopped 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped 1 small serrano pepper, stemmed, seeded and minced Salt and pepper to taste

Garnish: 1 cup lettuce, shredded 8 corn tortillas

Place the fish on a plate and sprinkle with the cumin, salt, pepper and chili powder. Drizzle with olive oil and the juice of 1 lime. Preheat a skillet over medium-high heat. Add the fish and cook until golden on the outside. Remove from the skillet and transfer to a plate.

Combine the avocado, juice of 1 lime, onion, cilantro, minced serrano, salt and pepper and set aside.

Heat the tortillas in an ungreased nonstick pan and wrap the tortillas in a clean towel to keep them warm.

To assemble the tacos, place an equal amount of the tilapia in each tortilla, along with a heaping spoonful of the avocado mixture and top with shredded lettuce. Serve with favorite salsa on the side. Makes 4 servings.

Marinated Tandoori-Style Fish Fillets

2 pounds favorite white fish fillets cut into 2- to 3-inch pieces 1 tablespoon fresh ginger, chopped 4 cloves garlic

1/3 cup vinegar

Salt and pepper to taste 1 tablespoon ground coriander seeds 1 tablespoon ground cumin seeds 1 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper 1/2 cup vegetable oil

Blend together ginger, garlic, vinegar, salt, coriander, cumin, cayenne, salt, pepper and oil in a blender to form a fine paste. Add paste to a medium-sized bowl. Add fish pieces. Gently fold fish into paste and marinate in refrigerator for 4 hours to meld flavors.

Pre-heat oven to broil. Line a broiler tray with foil (for easy cleanup). Top tray with broiler rack and add marinated fish pieces. Broil about 8 to 10 minutes on each side but watch carefully. Oven temperatures vary. Broiling time varies depending on the thickness of fish. Serve immediately with your favorite chutney.

Grilled Sweet Heat Salmon

2 pounds salmon fillets with or without skin 1/4 cup soy sauce

1 tablespoon chili sauce

- 1 tablespoon fresh ginger, minced 2 cloves fresh garlic, minced
- Juice of 1 lime
- Zest of 1 lime

1 tablespoon brown sugar Garnish: 3 green onions, chopped

Heat an outdoor grill to high heat. In a bowl, mix together soy sauce, chili sauce, ginger, garlic, lime juice, lime zest and brown sugar. Put salmon on a large sheet of aluminum foil. Pour sauce over salmon.

Fold aluminum foil over salmon and grill for about 25 minutes. Salmon is done when it flakes with a fork. (If there is any remaining sauce on the aluminum foil, pour it over the fillets at serving time.) Sprinkle with chopped green onions. Makes 4 servings.



Pasta with Peppery Fish 12 ounces favorite pasta

(try tri-colored spirals)
1 pound mild white fish such as cod, tilapia and pollock
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons chile flavored olive oil
1 tablespoon red pepper flakes
1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder


Garnish: Grated Parmesan cheese

Cook the pasta in boiling, salted water until done al dente. Meanwhile, put the butter and olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. When the butter begins to melt, add the minced onion and the red pepper flakes and stir into the butter and oil. Add the fish to the pan and sprinkle with cayenne pepper, black pepper and garlic powder; turn the heat up to medium-high. Cook the fish until it flakes easily, turning occasionally.

When the fish is cooked, remove the pan from the heat and use a knife or a fork to break the fish up into bite size pieces.

When the pasta has cooked to al dente, drain and return it to the pot. Add skillet contents and toss gently. Serve pasta mixture in a large bowl with grated Parmesan on the side. Makes 4 servings.

Las Cruces Bulletin Moving is now made simple Things to do before your belongings arrive

I don't think I've ever described moving as "fun," but maybe with a few pointers on things to do beforehand, you'll be ready when your furniture arrives. The right preparation can save time and effort in setting up your new address.

All the steps of moving can consume you for a long time: selling the old home, planning the move, cleaning and packing, physically moving and even more cleaning at the new location. Years ago, my husband teased me about having moved three times within one year; all within the same city. It's a long story, but I used to tease him that when it was time to clean, it was time to move.

When you move, you have a lot of decisions to make: where do you put the spices, where does the good china go, where will you keep the cleaning supplies? If you're moving into a new home, you may not have a lot to do except to move your furniture and personal things. If you're moving into an existing home, there may be a lot to be done at the new location. Before you move in, here are a few things to do to save

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time, effort and money. Choose the new-house projects that are your highest priority.

First, if there's carpet in the home that should be replaced, do you change it now or later? If your budget won't allow re-carpeting the entire house, then change one floor, or one room. If you have the budget to do it all, do it now. It's much easier to change before the furniture is in place. This applies to any flooring surface - tile, laminate, wood or carpet. Do yourself a big favor and make the decision to change these surfaces before you move in, if at all possible.

Painting - whether you do it yourself or hire someone to do it – it is easier to paint an empty room. It goes so much faster. There's no need to move furniture, take down your drapery, take the pictures or mirrors off the wall or clean out your closets. It should all be done before you move the first piece of furniture in the room.

Allow several days to repaint before the movers show up, especially if you're doing the work yourself. This type of work always takes longer than you think. Or, hire a crew of professional painters to come in and get it all over with within a day or two. Painting every part of your house before you move in is a great timesaver. You won't be sorry.

It's a wonderful luxury to be able to install crown mold-

ing around the whole house, all at once. Be sure you prime and pre-paint your wood molding strips before installation. Just before painting the interior walls, you may also need to do a small bit of touchup to the joints and the nail holes. It's a lot easier painting it down on the ground that it is going up and down a ladder for days, painting three coats of paint on molding near the ceiling.

I recently added foam crown molding 18 feet high to an existing home. Ceilings were more than 15 feet high and no moldings were in this existing home. It was all painted and plastered down on the floor (outside of the house) and installed with no mess. It can be done with some pre-planning.

Whether your move is across town or across the country, I hope you find some of these tips to make it a more pleasant experience.

Next, consider closet systems. If there's just a single rod hanging up in your new (or existing) home, now is the time to consider a closet system. Just imagine if you wait until later when you will have to take everything out, pile your clothes in a stack on your bed or floor, live out of suitcases and just be totally disorganized.

You can easily go online and have one of the closet companies design a closet to fit your needs, free of charge. If you're a do-it-yourselfer, just remember it will take you longer to install the first one if you've never done it before. Being efficient and storing twice as much in your existing closet will make a new home more livable and enjoyable.

Consider the need for electrical upgrades. If you're going to change vanity light fixtures, fans, ceiling fixtures or outdoor lighting, the time to do it is before you move in. If you need additional outlets, or movement of where outlets are located, it will be easier to do with no furniture in place. When you're paying an electrician by the hour, it will also be less expensive.

Finally, consider garage storage. If you have sturdy freestanding shelving from a previous home, arrange to have it loaded on your truck last, then unloaded first at the new house. All those boxes marked for storage can be placed easily and quickly into your waiting shelves. If you are going to build them in or install a workbench, it's easier to do it before the garage is stacked to the ceiling.

Whether your move is across town or across the country, I hope you find some of these tips to make it a more pleasant experience. I guess it goes without saying to get rid of everything you have not used or worn in the past two years before you take it with you.

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
