### **Enchilada** challenge draws grad Local eating champ is

up for TWEF contest

She won't be the largest contestant at The Whole Enchilada Fiesta's first enchilada-eating contest, but she's the bestknown competitive eater hailing from Las Cruces and will be a crowd favorite at the

main event Sunday, Sept. 25. Don't be fooled by the slight frame and build of Stephanie Torres, 25. Even though she's only 5-foot-tall and maybe 110 pounds, she can eat with the big boys – and beat them.

She's just returned from Tucson, Ariz., where she beat out nine men – including a bar bouncer and one guy who went by the name of Shamu – in an eating contest, leaving only scraps of a bun from a 7-and-a-half-pound pile of Sonoran hot dogs after 10 minutes. She took a \$500 prize for the gastronomical feat.


You could call Torres nationally ranked after finishing third - some say she should have been second - in the women's division of the Nathan's Famous Fourth of July International Hot Dog Eating Contest at Coney Island, N.Y. Even coming in third, the effort paid a sweet \$2,500. But she's back from the competitive

eating road to Las Cruces for the Fire in The Whole Enchilada Contest and is intent on taking the \$1,000 grand prize. The contest will see how many enchiladas contestants can eat in eight minutes. First, she must eat at least four pounds of enchiladas in four minutes to qualify. No problem, according to Torres.

Torres, who's originally from south-ern California, came to New Mexico State University on a full-ride cross-country scholarship. Her teammates always marveled on how much she could eat during the spaghetti parties the night before races, when runners try to "carb up." "The whole team was amazed at how

much I can eat," she said.

It wasn't until about a year ago, however, that she entered the world of competitive eating. She was visiting a friend See Enchilada on page A16

### New protocols aim to fight child abuse Officials to regularly coordinate investigations of child crimes

Doña Ana County law enforcement and government services officials – as well as several nonprofit agencies - began this week to operate under a new set of procedures when dealing with child abuse and other crimes against children.


The final version of the new protocols was announced Tuesday, Sept. 20, at the Doña Ana County Government Center and

the effort was not only touted as another significant step in reducing child abuse in the area, but that this is the first effort of its kind in New Mexico.

The main change is that all agencies that investigate or deal with child abuse problems will be operating under the same procedures and will be required to inform each other of the status of investigations, said Mickey Curtis, who heads the Children's Advocacy Center for Families & See Abuse on page A15


# Save America's Postal Service is critical to our economy – delivering

The Postal Service is critical to our economy – delivering mail, medicine, and packages on time and for a good price.

Yet plans are underway to close thousands of post offices, eliminate Saturday delivery, close mail processing facilities, cut service, and lay off 120,000 employees.

# The Postal Service is in danger of financial collapse – *but not for the reasons you might think*.

The problem is that a bill Congress passed in 2006 is pushing the Postal Service into bankruptcy. *The law imposes a burden on the USPS that no other government agency or private company bears.* It requires the Postal Service to pay a 75-year liability in just 10 years – to "pre-fund" health-care benefits for future retirees. This congressional mandate costs the



USPS more than \$5 billion a year, and it is the cause of the Postal Service's financial crisis.

Meanwhile, the USPS has overpaid billions of dollars into federal pension accounts.

### Congress created the USPS financial crisis, and Congress can fix it.

Legislation pending in the House of Representatives would prevent a collapse of the USPS – without drastic cuts in service, without massive layoffs, and without terminating collective bargaining rights for postal employees.

H.R. 1351, introduced by Rep. Stephen Lynch (D-MA), would allow the Postal Service to apply the billions of dollars in pension overpayments to meet the Postal Service's financial obligations.

### How much will this cost you, as a taxpayer? *Not a single cent!*



That's because the Postal Service doesn't run on tax dollars. It's funded solely by the sale of stamps and postage.

H.R. 1351 doesn't call for a bailout. It would allow the Postal Service to apply its excess retirement payments to meet its financial obligations.

Approximately 200 members of the House of Representatives have signed on as co-sponsors for H.R. 1351 – both Democrats and Republicans. But more support is needed.

### 100 years in Las Cruces

### New Mexico's centennial celebration has begun; our pictorial history book planned for December

Three short weeks ago, the New Mexico Centennial celebration was kicked off in Las Cruces at our city's annual downtown SalsaFest! celebration. The event commenced a 16-month statewide celebration of becoming the 47th state in the United States of America.

The Territory of New Mexico was created in 1850, and many people in the territory thought that they would soon be living in a full-fledged state. However, the road to state-hood would be longer and more arduous than most expected.

Fears that the population of the New Mexico territory included a disproportionate number of Indians, Hispanics and Catholics, the territory's bid for statehood was consistently voted down for several decades. After an uphill battle of more than 50 years to become a state, President William Taft signed an Enabling Act on June 20, 1910. The act provided for a constitutional convention to be held in order to draft a state constitution for voters to approve as a final step toward statehood. The convention was on Oct. 3, 1910, and on Jan. 21, 1911, voters approved the new constitution.

The big day for New Mexico came on Jan. 6, 1912, when, at precisely 1:35 p.m., a large contingent of New Mexico leaders gathered in Washington, D.C., to witness President Taft's signing of the documents that admitted New Mexico as the 47th state. Nine days later on Jan. 15 at the state capital in Santa Fe, William McDonald was sworn in as New Mexico's first governor.

So, here we are, nearly 100 years later, as the fourth youngest state in the nation. Our city of Las Cruces has contributed greatly to our state's success. As the state's second largest city, located at the intersection of two interstate highways, and home of Gov. Susana Martinez, our future is as bright as the 350 days of sunshine that we enjoy each year.

About a year ago, our Bulletin team discussed what we might be able to do to not only support, but also commemorate our state's 100th birthday. Our decision was to do what we do best, and create a special, high-quality publication to celebrate the role Las Cruces and Doña Ana County has played in the history of our great state.


The current working title for our book is "Las Cruces: A photographic journey." Our research team headed by Jim Hilley, Natisha Hales and Richard Coltharp, has been working with local residents and the good folks at the New Mexico State University library to collect and identify interesting photos from the past 10 decades. In fact, we are still looking for interesting photos featuring families, events, buildings and unique aspects of each decade.

Readers who have photographs they might want to share through this book can bring their photos to the Bulletin offices at 840 N. Telshor Blvd. between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Photos will not be kept at our offices. We will quickly scan the photos and immediately return them to the owner. Photo credits for photos we select will be given to individuals and organizations that attest to their ownership of publishing rights to the photos. Ideally, photos should be dated and people in the photos should be identified.

The book is being magnificently designed by our award-winning art director, Theresa Montoya Basaldua. The book will be published in a 9-by-12-inch hardcover format and will have at least 250 pages full of interesting photos, many in color, grouped by each decade. Text pages will be printed on commercial grade glossy paper. The cover will be in full color and will feature a matching dust cover. Plans are to begin accepting advance orders for this potential heirloom sometime in October. Delivery will be in early December in time for Christmas giving. The book will also be available for sale at several Las Cruces retail locations.

We are incredibly excited about this special, once-in-a-lifetime project and know that every Las Cruces resident will want to own a copy. Look for upcoming ads in the Bulletin for pricing and order information.

### Debt is result of wars

They do all of this keeping their finances in order, and providing prosperous economies.

What is missing in their policy soup? They refrain from attacking countries

that don't attack them. Our national debt has increased its largest percentage by far during our wars. It's true whether you look at WWI, Korea, Vietnam, or the Middle East (excluded is WWII, because Japan did attack us).

It doesn't matter whether the country is under Democrats or Republicans, our national debt skyrockets whenever we attack other countries.

Michael Swickard loves to hate Social Security, even though it is self-funded and always has been. It hasn't contributed to our financial

woes. There are "income transfers," to some extent, in it. So what? There have been "income transfers" in the

"private" markets also. About 50 percent of the

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### **Legislature moves slowly** Solons get the easy stuff out of the way

As we enter the third week of New Mexico's special session on redistricting, we begin to see some signs of life. Some of the easier bills are popping out into public view.

The easiest bill is the one redistricting the elected Public Education Commission. The PEC is so inconsequential, it hardly exists. Its predecessor, the elective State Board of Education, was powerful, indeed, making all the important decisions about education.

But in 2003, newly elected Gov. Bill Richardson convinced New Mexico voters that in order for him to make the bold changes that education needed, he must have the power to accomplish it.

That fall, voters gave him the power on a bipartisan vote. An advisory elective Public Education Commission was created in order to make voters happy that they still had something to vote on – even though they never had been able to name a single member of the formerly powerful board.

As evidence of the new education board's inconsequential nature, often no one ran for some of the positions on the board. Sometimes, positions would be filled by last-minute write-in candidates.

A few years later, the board was given the authority to approve or disapprove charter schools. Now, at least, the board has an official duty. One wouldn't think that would be enough for map makers to make enough changes to carve two incumbents into the same district, but it happened. The oversight now having been corrected appears to be in sufficiently good shape to move along to the governor for her signature.

But that may be the only bill to make it through the system without ending up in court. The Public Regulation Commission redistricting measure, which also survived without court attention 10 years ago, now has Democrats and Republicans battling over how to make the five districts lean either Republican or Democratic.

So we can add some more to the \$3.5 million, plus inflation, that appealing this year's redistricting plans will cost taxpayers.

It is such a silly exercise. Lawmakers know the courts are not going to make any more changes than they must in order to draw the new districts. Lawmakers certainly are capable of drawing those same lines and avoiding what I'm guessing to be \$5 million in legal fees for a judge to draw those lines.

There is no constitutional or court-ruled standard for districts to be politically balanced. The most important provision is that districts be as equally balanced in terms of population as possible. That's the one-person-one-vote rule.

The other important factor is not to dilute the voting strength of minorities. One other factor that redistricting is supposed to take into account is most communities prefer not to be split between two districts. Also, two similar communities in close proximity usually don't like to be split.

One exception is the state's Indian tribes and pueblos. In most cases, they like to be in different districts. Evidently, they feel they have influence over more members of a public body that way. Lawmakers have only until Tuesday, Sept. 27,

to finish their work. They had projected to be See **Legislature** on page A6



### **A new political viewpoint** Tea partiers are Americans who care about what the government is doing

I have a friend who is daffy about golf. He spends every waking moment playing or talking about golf. He is either heading to the golf course or just returning. Every conversation involves golf.

One day at lunch, his monologue had gotten to the third hole (drove to the green with a three iron) when I interjected if I had to go all 18 holes I wanted caddy fees. That went over his head.

With this guy, every conversation was quickly steered toward golf. Every illustration became a golf analogy, which was par for the course. He watched golf on television and, I suspect, slept on golf sheets. He was one of the few people who could listen to golf being played on the radio. But he is no more rabid about golf as some people are about politics.

To many people, there is nothing but politics. Every problem, every solution, every news story, for them, centers on politics. The yardstick they carry only measures political influence and action. For example, when someone speaks of rain or lack of rain, these people trot out the global warming political statements either to be proven or not by the evidence of rain.

For these political junkies, their world is a zero-sum world where people either win or lose, there are no ties and no real cooperation. By its very definition, running for office is either win or lose. In a political contest, the person coming in second gets absolutely no seat at the table. Only the winner gets seated. You are either with us or against us.

And then something totally unexpected happened in our country. A couple of years ago, the tea party movement came into being. It was the summer of the "Obamacare" debates. When elected representatives returned home for the summer recess, they were confronted with lots of citizens who hammered them about their support. In the middle of the reports, some reporters were looking for a way to describe all of these people who were not happy. A reference was made to the Boston Tea Party and some people said TEA stood for "Taxed Enough Already."

To be sure, there is not just one movement, rather, there are almost as many tea parties as there are people involved. This thing that rose out of the ashes of political action and a faltering economy began taking on a life of its own. At first, people wanted to label those people as working for the Republicans, but then some of the Republicans were smacked down by people who identified themselves as tea partiers.

The problem I see is that the media and politicians (perhaps together or separately) see the tea party as an extension of one or the other of the political parties, most often the Republicans. But many tea party people do not like the Republicans. And those people cannot be Democrats, so who are they?

They seem a loosely held and led group of people who are paying attention to the actions of our elected leaders. These watchers do not seem to want to be elected themselves, rather, they want a vote-by-vote look at how their representatives are functioning. They do not take these leaders as a whole and have no problem with calling out that someone is not doing the right things.

The two major parties are trying to find a way to get the tea party to function as a political organization, but in many cases, this is not possible. I suspect we will always only have two parties, but the people who identify themselves as tea partiers will act as a third force, but not dependably for either party.

through by now, but unless they went into overdrive yesterday, they are nowhere near finished.

The pace must really pick up in the next six days. Legislative leaders plan to get all redistricting bills to Gov. Susana Martinez by at least three days before the end of the session so she will have to act on them by the end of the session.

That does not seem to give time to reach agreements among Democrats, Republicans and the governor in order to avoid disagreements that will end all these redistricting bills in court.

The session can be extended to 30 days. But will lawmakers be willing to do it? And will the governor be willing to sign it?



### The scars to prove it

I never claimed to be a cowman and I've got the scars to prove it.

Frostbit fingers, baler twine blisters and an odd scrape in the side of my head where the hair won't grow back from when my good ol' horse slipped down on an ice slick on the calving lot. I went out off the front quarter, hung my left spur on the canvas medicine bag that was looped over the horn with parachute chord and lost a chunk of my ear when he drug me, unconscious, over the rusty metal feeder by the gate. My ear now looks like a chew toy.

I never claimed to be a horse shoer and I've got the scars to prove it.

A permanent stoop, calluses and a slice across the inside of my thigh. I'd driven a No. 5 city head into the second hole in the size No. 1 shoe and through the hoof wall on a skittish sorrel gelding when, just before I twisted the protruding nail, a disoriented fruit bat soared down out of the rafters and tangled in the horse's forelock. He went bumfangled and jerked his foot out of my grip between my knees.

The wound has crudely healed, my girlfriend made a pair of cut-offs from my jeans and we made a pair of coasters out of the scraps left from my shoeing chaps.

I've never claimed to be a dairyman and I've got the scars to prove it.

Narcolepsy, deafness, a Dutch accent and one thumb missing from the time I was inspecting the automatic grain feeder belt, thinking some of the buckets were loose. My coverall sleeve hung up in the teeth and began dragging me across the milking stanchions, pulling me through electrical wire, hydraulic hoses, pressure lines, heavy steel pipe and pieces of angle iron, all to a chorus of bawling, Holstein cursing, and a mass exodus of the milking parlor.

My sleeve finally fore off, taking my thumb as we were drug through the hole in the cinder block wall of the grain room. I spent half a day in the hospital and when they questioned the hired milker on duty, he'd said he'd been listening to Led Zeppelin on his iPod and hadn't heard a thing.

I've never claimed to be a small animal veterinarian and I've got the scars to prove it.

Not a decent tie to my name, at least 50 mongrel dogs named after me, and twenty parallel scars up and down my left arm that occurred when I was trying to pluck a grass awn from the ear of an unbroken barn cat.

I had gotten him into a big rubber boot to help restrain him but the sole of the boot was rotten. It tore off and the cat fell through into a small half-full molasses tub. I desperately clung to the cat's scruff to keep him out of the molasses as he mauled my arm like I was picking blackberries in a bob wire patch. The awn fell out by itself, I no longer make house calls, and the scratch wounds actually obliterated the tattoo of my ex-fiancée's name who eventually married the dentist.

Early missile design tested at White Sands

While Americans in 1954 were tooling around in futuristically designed Chryslers, the company was building the Redstone rocket that would launch the first American into space. Known as "Old Reliable" and the "Army Workhorse," the Redstone delivered perfect launch after perfect launch, because "the quality was outstanding," according to Allpar.com.

Chrysler began production of the Redstone missile in Warren, Mich., on Sept. 27, 1954. Chrysler had manufactured earlier models in 1952 and 1953, but at the Redstone Ballistic Missile Complex in Huntsville, Ala., Allpar.com said. Redstone.army.mil documents the Army first contract with the company in October 1952.

"As each contractual goal was reached, the Army reissued the contract," Allpar.com reports.

German V-2 rocket engineer Wernher von Braun developed the Redstone. He immigrated to the United States via Operation Paperclip at the end of World War II, and the Army sent him to Fort Bliss, Texas. He and his team began developing rockets, and launching V-2s, at White Sands Proving Ground. The V-2 is a direct ancestor of the Redstone, according to www.thespacereview.com.

In 1950 the Army transferred the scientists, including von Braun and Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger, to Huntsville, Ala., said earthobservatory.nasa.gov. There they worked on the ballistic rockets called Redstone, Jupiter C, Juno, and the Saturn 1B.

"It (1950) was the time when the Korean War began," Stuhlinger said in a 1997 NASA oral history. "At that time, the Army hospital in El Paso, in whose barracks we were living, wanted the barracks back for hospital purposes in expectation of war."

Stuhlinger was 32 when he arrived at Fort Bliss in 1946, through Paperclip, to work on guided missiles, he said. He had first worked on V-2 guidance at Peenemunde, the Germans' secret facility off the Baltic coast, in 1943. At Huntsville, the Army set the scientists up in a vacated World War II chemical factory. He described the facility as "a huge area because when they manufactured poison gas, they wanted to have the buildings far apart in case some leakage happens."

In a monograph dated Oct. 4, 1997, titled Sputnik 1957 – Memories of an Oldtimer, Stuhlinger wrote: "From 1950 till 1953 ... von Braun developed the Redstone rocket for the US Army. Sometime in 1952, von Braun remarked to me: "With the Redstone, we could do it.' 'Do what?' was my answer.

"The Redstone became operational on June 1, 1958, and was subsequently deployed in Europe to support NATO's shield force on what was then the front lines of the Cold War. The Redstone became the first large ballistic missile deployed overseas by the United States."

'Launch a satellite, of course!" - and then, he described how

Redstone, ignited when the rocket had reached its apex point,

Record-setting flights followed. Among them, www.redstone.army.mil listed "the first deep penetration of space" on Sept. 20, 1956. The modified Redstone, known as a Jupiter-C (or Juno 1), attained "an altitude of more than 680 miles and a range of over 3,300 miles." On Aug. 8, 1957, a Jupiter-C "nose cone was the first to be recovered from outer space."

On Jan. 31, 1958, a Jupiter-C lifted the first U.S. artificial satellite, Explorer 1, into orbit. On March 15, 1960, a Redstone that lifted off from White Sands Missile Range "lofted a 'flying TV station' for the first time."

Thespacereview.com documented "two Redstones were launched from Johnson Island in the Pacific Ocean as part of Operation Hardtack. Started in 1952 by the Atomic Energy

Commission, the purpose of Operation Hardtack was to determine the effects of high altitude nuclear detonations."


The first launch was on July 31, 1958. Code named Teak, www.thespacereview.com said the Redstone detonated a one megaton warhead (equal to one million tons of TNT) at 47.7 miles altitude, creating an 11-mile diameter fireball. "The explosion blacked out short wave radio over the Pacific for up to nine hours."

The second launch was on Aug. 11. Code named Orange, the warhead detonated at 26.7 miles.

A Redstone boosted the chimpanzee HAM on a 15-minute suborbital flight on Jan. 31, 1961, from Cape Canaveral, and then Alan Shepard on a similar flight on May 5. Gus Grissom's Mercury flight, on July 21, 1961, was the final manned Redstone mission. Three years later, on June 25, 1964, www. redstone.army.mil said the "missile was classified as obsolete."

On Oct. 30, the Redstone was "ceremonially retired," and in December the Chrysler contract "was closed out."

### Legislature 2011 House redistricting plan on path to likely passage Nuñez offering critical swing vote

A bill redrawing state House legislative districts barreled through two House committees Wednesday, Sept. 21, and headed to a vote on the floor of the House of Representatives late that night.

The sudden movement of House Bill 39 follows days of internal struggle among lawmakers to cobble together the 36 votes necessary to push the bill through the 70-member House. In the span of six hours, the plan passed the House Voters and Elections and Judiciary committees. Both votes were along

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party lines. The swift movement came after Independent Andrew Nuñez of Hatch appeared

2011 to change his mind about supporting the redistricting plan. With 36 Democrats,

33 Republicans and one Independent (Nuñez), the House had been at a stalemate all week as Nuñez and Democratic Rep. Sandra Jeff opposed all plans to redraw state House district boundaries, creating a 35-to-35

tie. That meant neither side, Democrat nor Republican, had enough votes to push any particular plan.

But Nuñez's switch appeared to give House Speaker Ben Lujan the 36 votes needed to run the legislation through the committees Wednesday, with a vote on the House floor following Wednesday night. It was unclear why Nuñez changed his mind to support the redistricting plan or what he got in return for that switch.

His support for the plan might have cleared a legislative logjam, but it didn't end the intrigue surrounding the legislation.

Jeff remained opposed to the plan Wednesday, saying all the changes requested by the Navaio Nation had not been made.

But Rep. Ray Begaye, D-Shiprock, also a Navajo lawmaker, said the changes requested didn't come from the Navajo Nation as a whole, as Jeff has said, but from a "certain select few." "It's an internal Navajo struggle," said Be-

gaye, who supports the bill. Broadly speaking, the plan House law-

makers voted on Wednesday calls for Roswell to lose a House legislative district because of population loss, which would force two Republican lawmakers - Bob Wooley and Dennis Kintigh – to run against each other in next year's GOP primary.

Southwestern New Mexico also would lose a House seat, forcing Democratic incumbent Rudolfo Martinez and Republican incumbent

Dianne Hamilton to face off in next year's election.

Two Albuquerque House districts held by Democrats also would consolidate, but Rep. Al Park is not running for re-election, meaning two incumbents would not run against each other there.

West Albuquerque and Rio Rancho, meanwhile, would gain House seats because of explosive population growth over the past decade.

All Santa Fe House districts, meanwhile, would move slightly south, but all remain generally safe, lawmakers said.

During a House Voters SESSION and Elections Committee meeting, GOP Rep. Nate Gentry of Albuquer-que asked demographer Brian Sanderoff of Research & Polling Inc. several questions about the map created to accompany the legislation, including what type of instructions Sanderoff had been given by Democrats.

At one point, House Major-

ity Leader Ken Martinez, D-Grants, jumped in to object, calling Gentry's questioning a cross examination. Speaker Lujan described Gentry's line of questioning as "accusatory."

Defending Gentry was Rep. Conrad James, R-Albuquerque, who said his colleague wasn't questioning Sanderoff's integrity, but merely was "trying to understand the political input."

Sanderoff responded to Gentry that New Mexico had experienced a dramatic shift in population over the past 10 years, with the west side of Albuquerque and Rio Rancho gaining the most population.

Later, during a meeting of the House Judi-ciary Committee, Gentry asked Sanderoff how the plan affected strong or leaning Democratic and Republican districts.

Sanderoff said the plan created 40 strong or leaning Democratic districts and 29 strong or leaning Republican districts.

"One is 50-50," Sanderoff added.

But Rep. Brian Egolf, D-Santa Fe, said after the Judiciary Committee meeting that the plan reduced safe Democratic seats from 32 to 31.

chairwoman of the school boardappointed High School Redistricting Advisory Committee, will make a presentation at the community meetings to explain the process that was used to come up with the recommendation, said Jo Galván, director of LCPS communications. Soules will also discuss the projected enrollment and demographics for each of the large high schools (Las Cruces, Mayfield, Oñate and Centennial) based on the recommended zones.

Galván said a detailed map will be available at each of the community meetings and also at www.lcps. k12.nm.us (look for High School Redistricting). In addition, a special email address, redistricting@lcps. k12.nm.us, has been set up for the public to send comments electronically.

"At this point, the boundary lines are not set in stone," Galvan said. "It's now the public's turn to review the map, give opinions and even make suggestions."

The proposed Centennial attendance zone encompasses many areas on the east side of Las Cruces. The northern boundary is along North Main Street and just south of U.S. Highway 70 (north of the High Range and Sonoma Ranch subdivisions). The western boundary runs along Solano Drive, the southern boundary is University Avenue and Geothermal Drive and the eastern boundary extends to the edge of the school district.



Youth Inc. (FYI) that provides a "safe house" for forensic interviews of children.

The guidelines also require that those working with the children take steps to assure that all children's needs are met, such as medical testing when the question of sexual assault is the concern, Curtis said.

The area has recently been seeing a decline in the number of reported child abuse cases, according to law enforcement. "In the last year we investigated over 3,200, which was a 5 percent drop from the previous year, but that's still a huge problem," Las Cruces Police Department Deputy Chief Chris Miller said.

While the problem remains a significant one with FYI conducting 50 forensic interviews in the last month, Curtis said, not all the interviews result in criminal investigations. The agency does need to communicate its findings to law enforcement, she said.

Joe Reno, an investigator who handles child abuse cases with the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Department, said the new protocols should help authorities put resources into incidents that have merit because they now allow all the agencies to share information, something that wasn't always allowed before.

Speakers at the press conference said the new protocols were the result of many meetings over many months. It was a pain-staking, open process, Reno said, but the end results are steps and procedures that addressed everything from physical abuse to truancy. Reno said he is confident the new protocols will keep law enforcement, the courts and other agencies informed of every step in the process.

The protocols have not been revised since 1998. The new communitywide approach is part of a national trend and the first of its kind in New Mexico, said La Piñon Sexual Assault Recovery Services of Southern New Mexico Executive Director Donna Richmond.

"This is a very proud day for us," she said.

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District Attorney Amy Orlando said the focus will be the protection of the child from the first onset of disclosure about abuse, while remaining flexible enough to appropriately respond to the unique circumstances of each incident.

The protocols will make sure that law enforcement, the state Children, Youth and Families Department, the courts and the nonprofit agencies all work as a team, Orlando said. As long as these cases are handled properly, Orlando said her office "can be a voice for the children so that justice is sought."

Family Court Judge Fernando Macias said the new protocols will help the courts to resolve cases in a more timely fashion.

Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima said the revised protocols is another example of local people working hard to make the community a "trailblazer" in the state.

### Pearce cuts down forest tree

Congressman Steve Pearce attended and participated in Otero County's emergency tree-cutting plan Saturday, Sept. 17. Cutting took place on one acre of the Lincoln National Forest near Cloudcroft in efforts to clean up the forest and decrease the spread of fires.

Today's events were historic for New Mexico, and for other areas whose local governments will follow suit," Pearce said. "Otero County's Emergency Plan was an effort to restore common-sense forest management to New Mexico. It was also the first time in a long while local people with local interests have demonstrated that there is a voice, other than Washington's, in forest management. The Otero County Commission has worked hard to ensure that our forests are managed more responsibly, and they deserve respect and gratitude for following through to increase public safety."

The Otero County Commission's Emergency Plan took place during Cloudcroft's annual "Lumberjack Day." Following speeches by elected officials, Pearce, acting as an agent of Ot-ero County, cut the first tree. Otero County officials, and those deputized by Otero County Sheriff Benny House, were allowed to cut trees as part of the plan to reduce fire danger.

### Housing merger in the works

An intergovernmental agreement between the city and the county should be ready for final approval by October or No-vember, David Dollahon, City of Las Cruces Neighborhood Services administrator told the City Council Monday, Sept. 19.

The agreement must be first cleared by the state Attorney General's Office, he said, before the city and county public housing authorities can become one - tentatively named the Mesilla Valley Housing Authority.

At Monday's meeting, the council approved language changes in city ordinances to prepare for the transition. If all goes according to plans, Dollahon said the change will take effect Ian. 1.

But when you are frustrated and angry, the horizon seems a long way off. In basketball, I am very optimistic



Losing 16-10 to archrival UTEP on Saturday, Sept. 17, at Aggie Memorial Stadium was tough to take for Aggie fans, but now it appears the loss cost the Aggies more than I-10 bragging rights.

New Mexico State quarterback Andrew Manley went down with an injury in the game's final minute and is lost for the season.

Coach DeWayne Walker told the media Tuesday, Sept. 20, that Manley had suffered an anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) injury.

"He's probably done," Walker said. "He has an ACL (injury), so we are probably going to not have him for the rest of the season."

Instead of Manley, the Aggies will start Matt Christian at quarterback at 2 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 24, at San Jose State University, the Aggies first WAC conference game of the season.

Fortunately for the Aggies, Christian is a seasoned veteran, having started eight games for NMSU in 2010, completing 48.1 percent of his passes for 1,372 yards. He threw eight touchdowns and only two interceptions.

While Christian may not be able to match Manley's ability to throw the ball deep, he is a better runner and scrambler. "Christian is ready to roll," Walker said. "He's

a guy that has started some games for us, and we feel like he has a strong supporting cast, so we're going to get Matt ready and move forward." Walker expressed confidence in Christian's

ability to lead the Aggies. "He brings a little more to the table," Walk-

er said. "He's a senior, he has a lot of experi-ence, he has a serious football IQ. He's mobile, he can move the pocket – the quarterback run game, he's going to be able to do some things there.

"We just need our receivers to make plays for him in the passing game and he'll add See **Christian** on page A22

### NMSU hosts Embry-Riddle, UNM

Coach Blair Quinn isn't taking any chances his soccer team will overlook Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University when they visit Aggie Memorial Stadium at 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24. His weekly schedule is always geared to focus on the next game, he said.

'We don't ever talk about Sunday until Friday is done. We have kept the exact same routine every week," Quinn said Tuesday, Sept. 20.

"On Tuesday, we don't even talk much about Friday, we talk about us," he said. "Wednesday we start

### **Bulldawgs on a roll** Three-straight wins help Las Cruces soar to the No. 2 spot in football poll

After a narrow season-opening loss, the Las Cruces Bulldawgs have come storming back and are right where they want to be.

Three straight wins – their most recent, a 40-0 demolition of Hobbs last week – have landed the Bulldawgs in the No. 2 slot in the 5A state football rankings, behind No. 1 Cleveland.

There are a lot of reasons for the success. The team is forcing turnovers and not turning the ball over, the playmakers are making plays, and the defense has been very good.

"We're improving, that's for sure," LCHS coach Jim Miller said. "We're plus-seven in turnovers. We're getting better on the offensive line and we're playing real well defensively. The goal is to be hitting on all cylinders when we get to district."

Miller said the Bulldawg defense gave up only one big play in the shutout win over Hobbs and held the Eagles to just under 100 yards of total offense. He said the team is playing well at all 11 positions defensively.

On offense, the line, which has four juniors starting among the five positions, has opened holes for running back Xavier Hall and quarterback Devin Perez. Miller said Hall already has close to 700 yards rushing in four games this season and has found the end zone "10 or 11" times.

The only negative so far for LCHS is the number of penalties committed. The Bull-dawgs had 14 last week.

We still have too many penalties," he said. "We just can't have double-digit penalties for over 100 yards. That kills drives. We have to do a better job with that."

Las Cruces will try to make it four wins in a row with a game at 1 p.m. Saturday Sept. 24, against Rio Grande at Milne Stadium in Albuquerque. The Ravens are 1-2 on the season.

Mayfield, which is coming off of an





Oñate, which played perhaps its best game of the season last week in a 45-17 loss to Rio Rancho, has a shot at its first win of the season Friday night at the Field of Dreams against 1-2 West Mesa. Kickoff is at 7 p.m.

Mesilla Valley Christian Schools, which was on an incredible roll, lost its first game of the season last week against Eunice, 48-42. The SonBlazers had won their first three games by scores of 43-6, 43-8 and 44-2. They will try to get back on track at 7 p.m. Friday at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell.

another threat in the running game," he said.

Heading into conference play, Walker said one bright side for the Aggies is the defense.

"I thought our defense played pretty well," he said. "I thought they played well enough to win.

Linebacker Alex LaVoy said a lot of hard work is paying off for the defense.

"We put a huge emphasis on defense," LaVoy said. "We work really hard in practice trying to fix a lot of mental errors, a lot of small detail stuff that we had problems with on the previous weeks.



### Golf, like football, means frustration Don't let the disappointments overwhelm you

Golf can be an awfully frustrating endeavor. Sport, in general, can be frustrating. Take football, basketball, baseball, fishing – you name it – it can be frustrating.

Lately, I've had more than my share of frustration in golf. I've heard about other golfers and listened to their frustrations, but I never actually felt their pain - until now. Golfers who have come to me for sport consultation, and young golfers I have coached, spoke to me about their frustrations, but I guess I underestimated their feelings - until now.

In the last couple of months of playing golf, with scores ranging from 76 to 90, I feel frustrated. Now, I can identify with all of you who tell me that you often come back from a round of golf feeling beat down and "frustrated." So I began to think more about the problem.

From my point of view, feeling frustrated has everything to do with our expectations. If we're expecting a good round of golf, a good shot or a good outcome and it doesn't happen, we become upset. We feel we should have done better.

It's the same in every sport. Maybe public speakers, politicians running for office, concert pianists or CEOs experience the same emotions when they realize deep-down they should have done better. Achievers always expect more. They expect to perform at their best every time, and when they don't, they're frustrated. They expect to win every time. It's a matter of unfulfilled needs because they think privately they let themselves down. It's a matter of disappointment that often turns into temporary anger.

Self-help guru Anthony Robbins has this to say: "People who fail to achieve their goals usually get stopped by frustration. They allow frustration to keep them from taking the necessary actions that would support them in achieving their desire. You get through this roadblock by plowing through frustration, taking each setback you can learn from, and pushing ahead. I doubt you'll find many successful people who have

not experienced this. All successful people learn that success is buried on the other side of frustration.

It takes discipline, and a certain measure of emotional maturity, to take a step back and look at your circumstances and disappointments objectively, and then be committed to a plan for going forward.

Sometimes frustration can become permanent. Take the 24-handicapper who gets angry when he makes a succession of bogeys and double bogeys. I don't really sympathize with him, because he's expected to make those scores. Otherwise he wouldn't have that handicap. But the 5-handicapper who makes a succession of bogeys - that's another story. Or the 10handicapper who makes a few doubles. I can understand that. It's a funny game. You can be on top of the world one day and down in the pits the next.

Just like football. Notre Dame causes me nightmares one week and lifts me on top of the world the next week. The Aggies win big one week and then have a lapse the next week. The only thing that gets me through is the logo I have on my golf balls: "It's God's will."

The operative thought here is "expectations." Once we get in touch with our expectations the better we are able to understand our emotions. Since my injury back in early February, I have gotten back to playing golf, but not the way I had been used to playing golf.

It's been an eye-opener to go through a round making more bogeys than pars. Exactly a year ago, I shot my age, which at the time was 68. It was a thrill. Now I have to take a step back and reassess.

It's not like I have to learn the game all over again. But I feel like I'm starting again from where I was in 1993 as a 10-handicapper. My expectations are such that I ought to be a 2-handicapper.

Therein lies the frustration. And there is where I feel your pain. Golf is a sport that is inherently characterized by forcing us to endure unpleasantness, discomfort and frustration, all before we finally to enjoy the thrill of victory.

Feeling frustrated can lead to anger. I see that in a lot of patients I evaluate as a clinical psychologist, who have very serious medical conditions. It doesn't matter the age, be it 45 or 85, the reaction is very much the same.

Let's take a sudden stroke. The individual was alright one moment and then debilitated the next moment; and now in a hospital bed, now not knowing if things will ever be back to

normal. It's quite a shock. One only has the experience of the baseline of what "normal" was, but now not sensing if that normal will ever be experienced again.

There is wishing, there is hoping, there is anger and there is paranoia. It's like going through the grief with the loss of a loved one. The steps are disbelief, numbress, bargaining with the Almighty, anger, depression and, finally, acceptance.

I've been through all of that – not only with my patients, but with myself. Golf is very much a mirror of life in that respect. We expect one thing, and when we fall into a different situation, either from injury or disuse or lack of practice or whatever, we lose our ability to perform as we once were used to performing. Our confidence is eroded. Disappointment starts to take over and soon our composure and self-assurance totally disappear. Inner insecurity often rears its ugly head.

Occasionally paranoia takes over, as in the case where we start blaming bad bounces, a bad golf course, bad partners, bad breaks, bad clubs, bad rules, bad teachers, bad equipment, bad conditions and bad luck. The new expectation is that we will be done in by forces that are out to get us, no matter what we do.

The first solace I can offer for overwhelming feelings of frustration is to remind you to check your attitude. As I've said before, attitude is everything. Anger is first the result of a negative attitude. We believe things ought to be one way, and they don't go that way. So we get angry. Occasionally clubs are thrown childishly in haste, but in real-

ity, we probably have misjudged the situation. Take a difficult golf shot. We can misjudge the distance, the wind, the lie, the hole location, the aiming point and a host of other factors. Then there's the nature of the swing, the club selection and the matter of luck, which have to be flawless, or else the other factors are exaggerated to the negative. It's a blessed game when all goes perfect, but it's discouraging when things go dreadfully wrong.

Over the last few months, as I have gone from a very low handicapper to a less stellar golfer, I have learned to not get angry as all the unfortunate bounces and breaks (which are undoubtedly my fault), but to accept those events as part of the progress to my game improvement. Not only that, but I have developed somewhat an improved sense of humor about the game and about life in general.

I recommend that, as a matter of fact. If you are a serious golfer - I mean an obsessed golfer - be careful of attaching your identity to your golf game. It can be overwhelmingly frustrating.

### More teams winning

Tennis, cross country find success



The past weekend was a good one for New Mexico State's tennis and cross country teams. Both hosted event and both came away with results that have their respective coaches pleased and encouraged.

The Äggie women's tennis squad dominated competition from four other schools, winning all four doubles contests and 15 of 16 singles matches on day one. The Crimson and White hosts claimed seven of the eight semifinal slots in the pair of singles main draw brackets.

Undefeated in singles play through the weekend were senior Natalia Salum, junior Ginet Pinero, sophomore Ros-Polly Nguyen and freshman Denise Van Der Ben. A total of seven Aggies finished with winning records at the invitational. Doubles play was good, too, as two Aggie tandems won with senior Manon Sylvain and Pinero crushing Northern Arizona, 8-1, while Salum and Van Der Ben edged another NAU team, 8-6, to advance. Head coach Ivan Fernandez liked this type of start for the season.

"Overall, we had a great showing in both singles and doubles,' Fernandez said. "In doubles, it was an all Aggie final and in singles we had all but one quarterfinal spot in the draws. I am very proud of how hard the team played this weekend."

The Aggie cross country teams

#### dominated their home meet, the Kachina Classic, taking top honors in both the men's 8K and women's 5K races. This comes after a second-place finish at the Lori Fitzgerald Invitational, Sept 10. The boss of the cross country

program likes what she saw. "It is always great to get a win at home," assistant coach Meaghan Harkins said. "I am really proud of the way we raced.'

The men's team finished first with a score of 26 points for the best overall finish of the season, so far beating UTEP and New Mexico. Six of the top 10 times for the men's side were posted by Aggies. Junior Jonah Ruybalid finished second overall and posted the top time for NM State, while his brother Ian finished third overall and senior Kevin Taft finished fourth overall.

The women's team finished first with a score of 33 points over UTEP, UNM and El Paso Community College. This has national implications since NM State finished two places ahead of UNM, who is currently ranked No. 2 in the nation.

It is hard to separate twins in any situation, and cross country is no exception as juniors Camille and Courtney Schultz finished side by side for the NM State best, as well as third and fourth overall. Junior Chelsa McDonnell finished eighth overall and third best for the team.

'I told both teams this would be the first true test of the season, and they passed with flying colors," Harkins said.

### **Rising to expectations** Expect big things from the New Mexico State cross country competitors this year



The Aggie cross country teams posted two big wins at the annual Kachina Classic Invitational, Sept. 17, held at the NMSU Golf Course. Both the men's and women's

teams outpaced nationally-ranked rival New Mexico as well as our I-10 rival, UTEP, for the meet championship.

Aggie siblings ruled the day with Jonah and Ian Ruybalid leading the men's team, and Camille and Courtney Schultz leading the women. Jonah finished second overall while brother Ian was third in the 8-kilometer race, and Camille placed third overall, just .03 seconds ahead of twin sister, Courtney, who took the fourth-place position in the 5-kilometer race.

The wins are hopefully signs of even better and more exciting things to come later on this season. Both teams have their eye on the WAC Championships and will look to improve upon their finishes from last year. In 2010, the men finished second while the women were third.

Like any team though, there's a lot that goes into postseason preparations, and for cross country teams in particular, much of that preparation starts over the summer months, long before organized practice begins. Summer training runs are truly the base on which a season rests,

and the quality and consistency of those runs can largely dictate how well a season will go. On average, the women's Aggie cross country team runs about 60 miles per week, with a 12-mile long run during the summer months, and the men's team averages about 80 miles per week, with a 15-mile long run. Often there is variation with this, based on an athlete's maturity and prior experience with high mileage.

It is imperative that the team trains hard on its own because a rocky summer with inadequate mileage will generally translate to exhaustion and injury or illness once the competitive season begins.

With this in mind, it is also important for cross country athletes to take great care with their bodies. Eight to 10 hours of sleep per night, a healthy diet, proper hydration and adequate stretching will not only ensure one's health, but will enable the body to make training adaptations when workouts increase in intensity.

I often tell my athletes that running in college is not simply something you do from 3-6 p.m. every day. It is a lifestyle, and the more dedicated you can be to that lifestyle, the more you will progress

in a season, in a year, and over the course of a college career. Based on our early success this season, I'm certain the Aggies worked hard this summer, and it's clear they've been 'living the life,' so to speak. With that said, I think we can expect big things in 2011.

### WAC conference adds two teams in baseball

The Western Athletic Conference announced that an invitation for affiliate membership has been issued to and accepted by CSU-Bakersfield and Dallas Baptist University to join the conference in baseball starting with the 2012-13 academic year.

The additions will give the WAC a total of 10 teams for baseball as the Roadrunners and Patriots will join Louisiana Tech, New Mexico State, Sacramento State, San Jose State, Seattle, Texas-Arlington, Texas-San Antonio and Texas State in 2013.

### Tim Madigan wins New Mexico Open

Tim Madigan, a former New Mexico State golfer from Rio Rancho, N.M., won the Santa Ana Star Casino New Mexico Open Thursday, Sept. 15, and set the new tournament record with an overall score of 190 and a total of 20-under par at the Santa Ana Golf Club on the Pueblo of Santa Ana in New Mexico. He shot a 6-underpar 64 in the final round to maintain his lead and win the tournament surpassing the record set by Brian Kortan who scored a 19-under par at the 2008 New Mexico Open tournament.

As the champion, Madigan received a \$12,500 prize from the PGA Sun Country Section and a trophy for first place. The 2011 Santa Ana Star Casino New Mexico Open was Madigan's first tournament as a professional.

### **Aggie rodeo rides to win** Team set to compete at Cochise College

The Aggie rodeo athletes gave New Mexico State University something to cheer about as their men and women's teams won their season opening rodeo Sept. 16 and 17 at Mesalands College in Tucumcari.

The men's team won with 885 points, edging out Mesalands with 880, and the women's team dominated with 475 points over New Mexico Highlands with 315.

"I'm very pleased with NMSU Rodeo's strong showing in this opener," coach Jim Dewey Brown said. "We had several returning students place well at the rodeo and some new recruits stepping up to help us in both the men's and women's team titles. I am looking forward to seeing the team in action the rest of this season."

Trenton Montero won the all-around honors with 245 points. On the way to win the honor, he took two second places in bareback riding and two seconds in bull riding. Teammate Cooper DeWitt also helped build the Aggie score as he won three first places in saddle bronc riding.

In team roping, Chase Massengill-Cort Smith and Rodee Walraven-Justin Simon swung their lariats successfully and were timed for second places.

Bo Simpson also helped the Aggie cause with a first in tie-down roping.

In women's competition, Jenna Suazo won three first places in breakaway roping. In the first go-round, she was followed by Raley Radomsky, Nicole Sweazea and Olivia Train.

Brandi Pfeifer won two firsts and a second to lead the Aggie women in goat tying.

The Aggie rodeo team will sponsor fall and spring fall rodeos in the Pete Domenici Rodeo Arena at the Southern New Mexico State Fairgrounds Oct. 28 and 29, and April 27 and 28, 2011, featuring the Grand Canyon Region rodeo athletes.

The Aggies' next competition is Sept. 23-24 at Cochise College, in Douglas, Ariz.

### **The will to win** Brennan excels at volleyball and track

No athlete has had greater dominance on the Western Athletic Conference over the last 12 months than New Mexico State University's Kelsey Brennan.

During that span, Brennan earned first team All-WAC honors in volleyball for the second time and also won the gold medal in the javelin at the Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Terrorizing opponents at the net in volleyball and on the javelin runway, Brennan's accomplishments in two seemingly unrelated sports are impressive.

However, the two achievements have one common thread – the will to win.

"Being competitive is the same in both sports," Brennan said. "I'm a competitive person who always wants to win. It doesn't matter if I'm playing volleyball or throwing in track, I want to win at everything I do."

She has done a lot of winning since arriving in Las Cruces a little more three years ago. The Aggie volleyball team is 74-35, including a WAC Championship, during Brennan's career. In track, she tossed the javelin 151 feet to claim the WAC title last spring.

Successful in both sports, Brennan appreciates the difference between the two.

"I like them equally on totally different levels," Brennan said. "I love the team sport aspect in volleyball. It is an in-your-face sport and can get personal out there across the net. Track is a lot lower key, and I don't feel any pressure. I like track because it is all up to me and all on me. I don't have to rely on teammates. If I do well it is because I performed well, and if I didn't it is only because of me."

Before she could suit up for the track team, Brennan, who is on a volleyball scholarship, needed to get the green light from head volleyball coach Mike Jordan.

"We are very supportive of other teams on campus and are fans of their programs," Jordan said. "When it comes to doing other sports, I handle it on a case-by-case basis. I'm more prone to let upperclassmen do other things. Underclassmen, a lot of times, need to be really focused on our sport during the off-season."

Once gaining approval from Jordan, Brennan started working with NMSU assistant track coach Scott Fister to hone her skills.

"I was so grateful Coach Jordan let me do track," Brennan said of the crossover. "The carryover from volleyball to track isn't as difficult as people think. The arm swing motion in volleyball is somewhat similar to the throwing motion for the javelin. I hadn't trained for throwing the javelin, but the first time I did it I threw 15 feet farther than I ever did before."

Ironically, even though Brennan had the longest javelin throw in the WAC last year, she doesn't even own the longest throw in the NMSU volleyball program. Assistant coach Tricia Wright was a two-time national champion at the University of LaVerne. Wright's longest heave was 157 feet, six feet longer than Brennan's. In such a competitive environment, surprisingly there isn't any sort of competition between them as neither one knew who had the longer throw.

"Trish is always wishing me luck when I see her in the spring before my track meets," Brennan said. "She kept tabs on the regional meet last spring and sent me a text message right after it was over. She has been very supportive, and it is fun talking to her about it because she knows a lot about it."

Halfway through her senior season of volleyball, with two more years of track eligibility, Brennan has a chance to be one of the best all-around athletes in NMSU history.

### Atomic Age's birthplace open to daylong tour

White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) will open Trinity Site to the public for an open house Saturday, Oct. 1. Trinity Site is where the world's first atomic bomb was tested at 5:29:45 a.m. Mountain War Time on July 16, 1945. There will be no charge for the Oct. 1 open house as previously announced.

The simplest way to get to Trinity Site is to enter WSMR through its Stallion Range Center gate. Stallion gate is five miles south of U.S. Highway 380. The turnoff is 12 miles east of San Antonio, N.M., and 53 miles west of Carrizozo, N.M. The Stallion gate is open during each open house from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Visitors arriving at the gate between those hours will receive handouts and be allowed to drive unescorted the 17 miles to Trinity Site. The road is paved and marked. The site closes promptly at 3:30 p.m.

The other way of attending the open house is to drive with the Alamogordo caravan. The caravan forms at the Tularosa High School football field parking lot and leaves at 8 a.m. It is a 75-mile drive to the site from Tularosa and there are no gasoline service stations on the route or at the site. The caravan is led by military police once it gets onto the missile range. It is scheduled to leave for the return trip between 12:30 and 1 p.m.



July 16, 1945, was the day the sun rose twice over southern New Mexico when the first atomic bomb was detonated in the desert southeast of Socorro, N.M. The site of the blast will be open to visitors Saturday, Oct. 1.

All adults must show a photo ID. All vehicles are subject to search and should be carrying proof of insurance and current registration papers. No weapons of any kind may be brought onto the federal property.

There are no ceremonies or speakers at the site. Food and

souvenirs are sold at the site. For more information, call the WSMR Public Affairs Office at 678-1134.

### **Spaceship factory opens in Mojave** Company to build crafts for Virgin Galactic fleet

California's Mojave Air and Space Port is now home to a 68,000-square-foot assembly plant to produce the world's first fleet of passenger-ready spaceships.

The business is called Spaceship Co., a joint venture of Mojave-based Scaled Composites and British billionaire Richard Branson's space tourism company, Virgin Galactic.

Scaled Composites is the company specializing in developing composite material aircraft, founded by Burt Rutan. Using light-butstrong material and his experience with experimental aircraft, Rutan won the first X-PRIZE challenge to fly a man into suborbital space without government support.

Branson bought the right to the technology and hired Scaled Composites to develop the prototype for his new fleet of spaceliners that will take paying customers into suborbital space.

"This is a big day for Galactic," said George Whitesides, chief executive officer of Virgin Galactic. "We're moving closer and closer to bringing paying passengers into space." According to the Los Angeles Times, the joint venture expects to begin building the spacecraft at the end of September. It showcased its new \$8-million hangar Monday, Sept. 19, to about 250 public officials and reporters, showing the factory floor where as many as 200 people are expected to assemble the spacecraft.

The company has begun posting job openings on its website for engineers and technicians, the LA Times reported.

"We're building the first-ever spaceline," Whitesides said. "We want to hire the best of the best."

"The opening of the new hangar in some ways marked a symbolic passing of the torch, with private firms increasingly stepping forward to take over the role of providing human spaceflight that had long been the domain of government space agencies," the LA Times wrote.

The new plant is 30 miles north of a plant where 1,800 workers assembled the space shuttles. The last space shuttle made its final voyage in July. The massive hangar in Palmdale, Calif., now sits empty.

### 100yearsago

#### 1911

• Cement work was almost finished at the new gymnasium at the Agricultural College, and 50 new, steel lockers, with "the latest improved model of combination locks," had arrived. Coach Arthur Badenoch had also ordered a number of new head harnesses for the football team. The heating plant for the new gym and the science hall were near completion.

• Fruit growing was a big industry for the Mesilla Valley, and the sandy loam soil was almost ideal said the Rio Grande Republican. The paper noted that many of the orchards had been claimed from mesquite bush by the fruit growers in recent years. Scott Stewart in Mesilla Park made a specialty of peaches, and J.C. Stewart's apple orchard was the biggest in the valley, with 36 acres of 2,500 apple trees. His largest yield to date had been 16,000 boxes in 1908. He was expecting to ship 30,000 to 40,000 boxes in 1911.

#### 1936

• The Mesilla Valley was expecting a bumper crop of cotton, with a harvest of at least 50,000 bales anticipated. • Brown-Forman King Whiskey, a 90-proof product of Kentucky, was advertised for 95 cents a pint.

• The "always comfortable and cool" Rio Grande Theatre was showing "Hearts Divided," with Dick Powell and Marian Davies, and "An American Wife," starring Fred Stone and Billie Burke.

• A large wolfhound that came to F.M. Haynor's home went on a mad rampage and started fighting with every dog it came in contact with. The dog was put in a pen and watched closely until he died, showing unmistakable signs of rabies. The city police were given orders to pick up all dogs running loose and destroy them if not claimed by owners within 72 hours.

• Forty-eight 1,500-watt bulbs were to be tried out at Quesenberry Field at the college, bringing night football to Las Cruces. The New Mexico A&M Aggies were to host the Panhandle Oklahoma Aggies.

• A gas station west of Las Cruces was held up by an armed robber. The manager of Whiting Brothers Service Station on U.S. Highway 70 said the robber, who got away with \$10, was wearing a red bandanna on his face and brandished a pistol.

• A Redstone missile was fired 80 miles at





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### CrimeStoppers **Thieves take** mannequin


Las Cruces Crime Stop-pers is offering a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information that leads to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for stealing a "hitter" mannequin from the New Mexico State University baseball practice field.

An Aggie baseball player noticed the mannequin was missing Friday, Sept. 16, and the theft was reported to the NMSU Police Department.

The mannequin is modeled after a baseball player holding a bat and standing at home plate. The equipment, paired with a "catcher" mannequin that was not taken, is used for pitching practice.

The hitter mannequin is black, approximately 6 feet tall and was wearing a gray New York Yankee uniform. The mannequin's stand and baseball cleats were left behind.

The hitter mannequin is valued at approximately \$4,000. However, because the pitching practice mannequins are only sold in pairs - hitter and catcher



the NMSU baseball team will be forced to replace both pieces of equipment at a cost of \$16,000.







# **Netflix**

In the early 2000s, Netflix swarmed into households like a cloud of angr bees, destroying Blockbuster and Hol-

lywood Video stores in its path. And Netflix CEO Reed Hastings just made himself the bee exterminator, killing his business and dropping Netflix shares by more than half their peak value as of Tuesday, Sept. 30.

Hastings announced a 60 percent increase in Netflix fees in the middle of July. The service used to cost \$9.99 a month for streaming and a DVD-rental plan. Now, the company is charging \$7.99 a month for streaming and \$7.99 a month for a one-time DVD rental - a 60 percent increase from \$9.99 to \$15.98. The change was abrupt and drastic,

but that's not all.

Two months after the price hike, Hastings wrote a belated apology to his customers.

"I messed up. I owe everyone an explanation," he said, adding that more changes were coming to the company.

Keep in mind Hastings was apologizing about the way he broke the news, not the news itself.

It's like a bank saying they are going to increase checking fees and then apologizing for sending it out in an email. I don't think people are too concerned about the method of delivery.

After Netflix raised its fees, the company split apart its DVD and streaming services, and the user experience will no longer be integrated in any way.

There will be no price changes – the company already did that, Hastings said.

But customers will have an additional different burden on their plates - two websites

The DVD-rental business – Qwikster, a name some people are calling "too '90s" – will operate separately from Netflix, which will still be used to provide streaming services.

So customers can expect to pay more and get less, as well as double the amount of work. Also, that dexterous feature of watching a movie on your TV and then rating the flick will no longer come in handy with DVD services, since they are no longer connected.

just a really good rationale for having this event in Las Cruces, and we hope people come out and take advantage of the opportunity."

Cundiff said the conference will consist of two events - an outdoor green business expo and the indoor panel discussions.

"There will be 20 'vendors' outside," Cundiff said. "For example, Doña Ana Community College will be there to talk about renewable energy education. We want the event to be very interactive and fun."

Cundiff said part of this problem is also in politics, and a panel, including state Sen. Steve Fischmann, also be there Sept. 30 to discuss what needs to happen.


"Public lands is an on-going issue," Cundiff said. "We want to make sure we address that,







# DeWayne Walker: Passion extends beyond football field

NMSU head coach sets positive example, works to give back

"I'm just a giver," said New Mexico State University head football coach Dewayne Walker, adding that his mother was highly influential in the development of that characteristic.

Walker was born in Los Angeles and attended John Muir High School in Pasadena, Calif., where he was later inducted into the school's hall of fame.

"Growing up, I always had a ball in my hand," he said. "A baseball, football or a basketball, I was active in athletics, and my mom pushed me to be outside. Because of that, sports became an innate skill."

After high school, Walker said he wanted to pursue a football career, so he attended and played for Pasadena City College before transferring to the University of Minnesota.

Before he finished his bachelor's degree, the cornerback was picked up by the Edmonton Eskimos, a west-division team in the Canadian Football League.

"When I was released from the camp (in Canada), I went back to California," he said. "I decided to put school on the back burner."

Walker then played for the United States

Football League Oakland Invaders in 1984 and Arizona Outlaws in 1985.

Throughout his attempts to go pro, Walker was also juggling a job with the City of Los Angeles, working as a trash collector.

"My dad worked at the city for 30 years.

Because of his reputation, I was able to work when I could and then leave for a training camp if I got recruited," Walker said.

After three years of balancing training camps and city employment, Walker said his mindset started to change.

"I come from a family of six," he said. "One of my brothers is a lawyer, a sister has her master's degree and most everyone else has a bachelor's degree. We are a well-educated family. I didn't want to give up on my dream, but I knew it was time to move on. I was still in a transition phase and I knew I needed an education, it is such a fixture of life."

Walker said after a seasonal layoff at the city, he decided he would not return.

"A co-worker told me I was worth more than the job I had," he said. "I guess I started to believe him."

Doing what he knew best, Walker turned toward football, only this time as a coach.

"I have always thought of myself as a people person," he said. "I enjoy working with kids and consider myself a giver. I was raised that way."

Walker started his coaching career in the Pop Warner league, the nation's largest and oldest youth football and youth cheerleading organization.

So Walker coached 10- and 11-year olds in the league for two seasons, first as an assistant coach and then as a head coach.

"The second year, my team went to the championship. I was hooked," he said about coaching.

Around the same time, Walker said an old coach offered him an interview for a secondary coaching position at Mount San Antonio City College.

"I had never coached college before," he said. "So, I was honest in the interview and told him about my lack of experience on the college level."

Fortunately, Walker said he got the job; however, the position was unpaid.

"We had a coach's stipend – like \$2,000 a season – and I got 10 hours a week at \$20 an hour working in the weight room," Walker said.

With a wife and child, Walker took the position and said he would figure out the rest. But 10 hours a week turned into 25 hours a week, and Walker began another balancing act, juggling work, coaching and

going back to school. "I think my time at the junior college really prepared me for the schedule as a head football coach," he said.

Walker said he balanced the three responsibilities for five years, while he finished his bachelor's degree in psychology from Regents College, taking classes through California Polytechnic State University.

"I was the defensive back coach for four years and the defensive coordinator for one year," he said. "But I thought once I have

my degree, I will get a job at a division I school, and I did."

Walker's next career moves had him relocating across the country. He coached for Utah State University; Brigham Young University; Oklahoma State University; University of California, Berkeley; the New England Patriots; University of Southern California; the New York Giants; Washington Redskins; and the University of California, Los Angeles, before he ended up in his current position, head coach at NMSU.

"The moving was hard, but to be successful

in my career, you have to be able to go where you are needed," he said.

As for switching back and forth from NFL to college, Walker said he has enjoyed both, but feels coaching college players fulfills his need to help others.

"I think a college coach can have more of an impact on the players," he said. "But there is also more stress. If a player gets arrested in the NFL, the organization handles it. But in college, it's the coach's responsibility, and a player's actions impact the whole team.

'Leadership is also more respected in college. Because of the salaries in the NFL, it takes longer to earn a player's respect."

Though many coaches have a mentor or admit to modeling their tactics after a hall-of-fame coach, Walker said he follows a different model.

'You are who you are," he said. "I have had the opportunity to learn from a lot of great coaches – Bill Belichick, Joe Gibbs, Pete Carroll, Tony Dungy, Greg Williams. I try to steal a little from all of them, but still stay true to my teaching approach."

For the dreamers of the world that look to pursue a career in football or any profession, Walker said it is

OK to be the "nerd."

"The 'cool kids' are the ones asking the 'nerds' for a job 15 years after high school," he said. "Don't give into peer pressure because you will be repaid for doing right. The discipline and structure will pay off."

Transferring this mentality to the football field, Walker said he tries to set a positive example.

"It is more than about winning, although I would like to do that, too," he said. "I tell my players, 'Don't give up, and do the right thing.' That will equal success."



# Get insight from a debt schedule Is your debt-to-income ratio in order?

The last few years have been a bumpy ride for many small businesses.

Sales may have slumped. Costs could have gone up. Small business owners have weathered this economic storm with a courageous combination of resilience, creativity, clarity and passion. Those who have been able to keep their doors open understand that important fundamentals about how to manage money in a small business are as true today as they've ever been.

Financial institutions do not want to saddle people with loan payments they cannot afford. Community-based lending organizations, such as ACCION New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado, are in the business of helping people understand their financial health and provide access to healthy business credit. That credit is a tool, and like all tools, performance must support its cost.

Lenders do not want credit to become overwhelming and prevent a small business from reaching its goals.

One tool lenders use to determine the financial health of a business is a mathematical expression called the debt-to-income ratio. Calculated by dividing total monthly debt payments by total monthly net income, the ratio is

expressed as a percentage and provides a quick indication of the ability of a small business to pay its current debts. A number that exceeds 20 percent could be a sign the business may have trouble paying off its current obligations and should not take on additional debt.

When an owner finds him or herself in this position, it's time to refocus and get a handle on both business and personal financial health.

Make a list of business debt obligations, including the current balance and the typical payment amount. At the top, record the most expensive debts or those with the highest annual percentage rates. Note whether the interest rate is fixed or variable; if variable, note the maximum amount of fluctuation allowed in the near future. If a loan is a revolving line of credit - a loan whose account balance may go up or down over a given time period with a varying payment amount - make note of the current balance and corresponding payment. An owner should make a similar list reflecting personal debt.

The resulting debt schedule is a guide to payment priorities when the small business owner is able to commit a little extra money to paying off debt. The faster debt is paid off, the less money the business spends on interest and the more that is available for operations and growth.

If current debt obligations are overwhelming and payments are at risk of being missed, begin by calling the lender. A change in terms, such as a temporary payment reduction, might be possible.

More serious problems should be discussed with a reputable credit-counseling agency. They provide advice, budgeting assistance and may be able to negotiate with lenders for modified payment terms.

The recession created an abundance of disreputable counseling agencies, and it's vital to

find one that is honest, law-abiding and trustworthy. One resource is Money Management International. For more information, visit www.crediteducation.org.

# Proposed 'fix' to in-state preference makes a bad law worse

# Why should taxpayers subsidize inefficient in-state businesses?

Locals have long complained about outof-state businesses forming shells to qualify for the 5 percent in-state preference.

Senate Bill 1, sponsored by Sen. Tim Keller (D-Bernalillo) and Rep. Larry Larrañaga (R-Bernalillo), attempts to fix this problem. But SB 1 begs the real question, which is whether in-state businesses, correctly defined or not, should receive a preference at all.

Under current law, resident businesses are given a 5 percent advantage in sealed bidding for contracts. In essence, this means an added 5 percent cost on most contracts. The premium, for example, would add \$50,000 on a \$10 million construction project. Of course, this is paid for out of the pocket of tax payers. It represents a subsidy to businesses that seems hard to justify in the current budget environment.

The in-state preference is rather weak under current law. In a practice known as brokering, a resident business that qualifies for an in-state preference can form a partnership with an out-of-state business. The partnership inherits in-state status for purposes of determining eligibility. This is true even though little or none of the actual work is performed by the in-state partner. This process, in essence, eliminates the instate preference as it provides an easy workaround for any out-of-state businesses that wants the in-state preference.

SB 1 proposes to implement a multi-step process to prevent brokering. The prospective resident business would be required to submit an affidavit from a certified public accountant attesting to the businesses eligibility. The State Taxation and Revenue Department then issues a certification to be included with any bids in which in-state preference is claimed. For local business partners with an out-of-state business, the preference would apply only to the portion of the contract performed by the in-state business. Under most circumstances, to qualify for in-state status, a company would need to employ at least five New Mexican residents, have its primary place of business in New Mexico and have paid state taxes for three years.

The in-state preference is politically popular. After all, resident businesses pay state taxes. Why should government contracts go to out-of-state businesses if in-state firms can do the work? In case of a tie, I would agree. A one-percent fudge factor in favor of in-state businesses might be justified. All else equal, let's hire in-state. But we aren't talking about a tie, but about a 5 percent premium.

In-state preference, despite its popularity, just isn't good public policy. It violates a fundamental principle of the free market that governments not play favorites. If New Mexico businesses can't compete on price with out-of-state concerns, then they shouldn't get the contract. To do otherwise is to coddle weak and inefficient companies.

In fact, the in-state premium is a form of corporate welfare – paid for out of the pockets of New Mexico citizens. We are subsidizing inefficiency; meanwhile, Governor Susana Martinez is looking for revenue to finance K-12 reform. Here is a win-win situation – eliminate the in-state preference, save revenue and help fund education.

Certainly, funding reforms that reduce our outrageous dropout rate will do more for economic development than does directing a few state projects to inefficient businesses. Let local businesses compete head to head with out-of-state concerns.

But completing the purchase still requires win-win thinking

I remember the scenario as if it were yesterday. I received a call from a frantic homeowner who needed to

sell his house – and quick. He had placed a deposit on a newly constructed home out-of-state, and would lose it to another buyer if he couldn't produce a purchase con-

tract for his house within 14 days. To add a little perspective to the story, the number of days required at the time to sell a similar Las Cruces area home was in the 150-155 day range.

Once I understood what the seller wanted to accomplish, I put together a plan to help him get the job done. In essence, the idea was to identify the highest possible price at which buyers would be still be willing to compete against one another for the property. After that, an aggressive marketing plan would be employed to alert realty agents and the public to the terrific buy that was beckoning from literally around the corner. To make a long story short, the plan worked, and the seller received three offers within 72 hours of signing the listing.

Two of the offers were close to full-price;

from buyers who submitted information regarding their loan qualifications, earnest money deposits, and proposed closing dates. The third offer was from a buyer who "really wanted the house because he has relatives living on the street," but had not yet applied for a mortgage. Additionally, his offering price was thousands of dollars below the competing offers and was supported by a very small earnest money deposit. After eliminating that particular offer, the seller negotiated with the



remaining two buyers before making an agreement with the one whose terms most closely met his needs.

After the negotiations were complete and the news of the outcome was disseminated to the non-prevailing agents, I asked the agent of the third buyer why the buyer's offer was so far below the asking price and why the buyer hadn't established his qualifications prior to making his offer. After all, there were two competing offers and the buyer truly wanted to live on that particular street. His answer: "My job is to get them a good deal." Well pardon me, but from my perspective it appears that the actual assignment was to secure the house

for the buyer so he could live near his relatives. That was the deal the buyer was looking for. How do I know? The agent told me so. Unfortunately, he forgot to include anything in the offer that might excite the seller, so the buyer's offer was immediately tossed aside.

I encountered a similar situation not long ago, when an agent brought to the table an offer on one of my vacant listings. The offer was thousands below the asking price, subject to the sale of another property, from a buyer who had not yet been qualified for a mortgage, and whose earnest money deposit was very small. In essence, the offer asked the seller to take his house off the market for a couple of months and make payments while the buyer attempted to find a buyer for his house and learn whether or not he's qualified for a loan. Needless to say, the offer was rejected. When I

Needless to say, the offer was rejected. When I asked the buyer's agent why the buyer didn't include in the offer anything positive for the seller, the response was again that the buyer's agent's job is to get the best deal for the buyer. OK, I see no problem with that. After all, that's what we agents do. But there's a catch.



What some professional and nonprofessional negotiators forget from time-to-time is that there has to be something in the offer for all parties. The term "best deal" isn't necessarily synonymous with the term "one-sided deal." One of my favorite observations is that if an agent can figure out how to give each party what they want, the parties will hurry up and sign before somebody changes their mind. The opposite of that scenario is a win-lose, wherein one party imposes their will on the other party, without the benefit of any positives for the party who is being imposed upon.


The bottom line here is that buyers and sellers are both entitled to "good deals," whatever that means to them. Good deals are far much easier to come by, however, when both parties can claim victory – no matter how small. In the book "Done Deal: Insights from Interviews with the World's Best Negotiators" by Michael Benoliel, top negotiators agree on three negotiation components:

- Negotiate from both sides of the table. To be a master negotiator, you need to come to the table with a clear understanding of not only what your objectives are, but also the other side's interests and goals.
- Map out your strategy. Before entering any negotiation, be aware of all the possibilities that exist. Examine all the options and determine which ones are most likely to help you reach your overall goal.
- Increase your negotiating power. The outcome of any negotiation will not be determined by who has the most total power, but who has the most power that is specifically relevant to the negotiation at hand.

Whether you're buying or selling, it's never too late to bone up on how to successfully negotiate. Learning how to identify what will make the other party happy can make it far easier to achieve that which will make you happy.

Follow these simple rules, and it won't be long until I ... See you at closing!

# **Dairies are turning** to imported alfalfa Producers adjusting to hay shortage

Ranchers, dairies and horse owners are adjusting management practices to deal with the hay shortage threatening food production.

Joe Gonzalez said he needs 500 tons of hay, or other forage, a day for Gonzalez Dairy, south of Las Cruces.

He has been buying his alfalfa from Colorado, Arizona and California, where they mow alfalfa almost year-round.

Gonzalez said he has contracts to supply about 5,000 more tons of hay.

"I just hope they'll have the hay stored some place safe, so I'll be able to get to it when I need it," Gonzalez said. "I've never seen it so bad."

Del Oro Dairy near Anthony, N.M., has been importing hay from Colorado and Arizona to feed its milking cows and keep up production, said Del Oro Dairy co-owner Jan Settles.

Hay of lower quality is being fed to dry or pregnant cows to hold down their weight.

"But we're concerned because we need more hay, and we've been talking to people we've dealt with

earlier to order more hay," Settles said. In the upper valley area around Hatch,

dairies have been able to obtain hay from local farmers, some with a sixth cutting. These farmers have been irrigating fields with wells.

"All of our hay has been coming from farmers around here," said Pam Hein, secretary of the Caballo Dairy near Arrey, N.M. "They all have verbal contracts with us."

Rancher Ken Treadwell, who has his head-

quarters in Luna County, said the current hay prices are "prohibitive." He said he has stockpiled hay for the winter for his yearlings that require hay in their diet for roughage.

Treadwell is grazing his older cows on older grass for roughage, but the supply is short, and he is putting out grain-based feed and molasses, which is high in protein.

Stephen Wilmeth, a rancher west of Las Cruces, is also supplementally feeding his cattle with cotton seed and soybean meal cakes.

"Or we're grazing old grass if we've got any grass," Wilmeth said. "If we don't have the grass, we sell the cattle."

The hay shortage is also hurting equine training and breeding centers. Prices are almost double what horse owners and trainers were paying last year - \$250 to \$300 a ton compared with \$150 to \$180 last year, said Josh Armstrong of Armstrong Equine Services.

New Mexico alfalfa production in 2010 was 1.1 million tons, mowed off 220,000 acres. Because of the lack of river surface water for irrigation and drought stress, the yield for this year is projected for a 25-percent reduction, according to Mark Marsalis, associate

Mexico State University.

# **L&M Radiator moves**

El Paso-based radiator company successfully relocates to Las Cruces

L&M Radiator Inc. has completed the relocation of its plant in El Paso to Las Cruces.

L&M is leasing about 52,000 square feet of manufacturing and warehouse space at 2100 S. Valley Drive, an old Coca-Cola plant. The move gives L&M twice the manufacturing space of its former facility. L&M Radiator manufactures heavy-duty radiators and heat exchangers under the brand name MESABI.

Dan Chisholm, company president, said nearly all the employees from the El Paso plant have chosen to stay with L&M in its move to Las Cruces. Even so, Chish-

olm said, L&M will need to increase its Las Cruces work force by about 30 percent from its current 138 to meet demand.

The plant is 100 percent operational and running three shifts per day, five days a week. Chisholm said people interested in applying for new positions could do so online at www.mesabi.com, or apply in person at a plant open house from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 24.

"We are pleased with our decision to relocate our Southwest plant to Las Cru-ces," Chisholm said. "The Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance has been

very helpful in helping us re-locate and expand here, and the work force has quickly learned our manufacturing processes and is highly motivated. Doña Ana Community College provided valuable training for new employees

L&M's El Paso plant was L&M's second U.S. plant when it opened in 1980 and fourth in the world. L&M also has U.S. plants in Hibbing, Minn.; Independence, Iowa; and Yankton, S.D. as well as Mexico and Australia. It is in the

process of opening a seventh plant in northern Chile that will serve L&M's markets in South America. Total L&M employment worldwide is more than 700, according to Chisholm.

Chisholm said the Las Cruces plant open house on Saturday will give Las Cruces area residents a look at what L&M makes, plus persons interested in job openings a chance to apply. L&M supervisors will be available to answer questions related to employment opportunities.

L&M Radiator is family owned and now in its third generation of management. Chisholm's grandfather co-founded L&M Radiator in 1957. It was acquired soon thereafter by Dan Chisholm's father Alex Chisholm, who remains active in the business today. The third family member is Dan Chisholm's sister Laura Chisholm Ekholm. Plant headquarters are in Hibbing on the Minnesota Mesabi Iron Range – hence the origin of its brand name.

The design concept of the MESABI radiator originated during WWII desert tank warfare when it was discovered British tanks could be disabled with a single bullet hole through the radiator. The radiator the British developed featured individual cooling tubes held in radiator headers by individual rubber seals. The seals allowed damaged tubes to be replaced in the field and often without removing the radiator from the tank. The concept virtually eliminates leaking. MESABI radiators usually do not need maintenance, other than simple cleaning, for up to 25,000 hours of equipment operation.

The L&M MESABI radiator is now used worldwide in all heavy-duty, off-road mobile and stationary equipment. Variations on the design concept include radiators, complete radiator cooling packages, oil coolers, charge air coolers and tube and shell coolers. According to Chisholm, the majority of its heat exchangers are used in mining, and oil and gas exploration and drilling.



### **NMSU** professor receives donation to preserve Apache languages

A grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) will help the Mescalero Apache Tribe and a New Mexico State University professor preserve and maintain Apache languages on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, about 100 miles northeast of Las Cruces near Ruidoso.

Rushforth, Professor Scott anthropological linguist, received a \$321,200 award from the NEH Documenting Endangered Languages Program. The funding will enable Rushforth and Ndé Bizaa, the Mescalero Apache Tribe Language Program, to develop a dictionary, grammar and multimedia archive. Ndé Bizaa staff members include Director Oliver Enjady, Caroline Blake, Ben Blake and Walter Scott, an Apache language media specialist who obtained his degree from NMSU.

Today, there are fewer than 200 fluent Apache speakers at Mescalero.

The NMSU award is among \$3.9 million in grants and fellowships from the NEH and NSF to support digital documentation work on almost 50 endangered languages.

Each day of the fair, the gates open to the public at 8 a.m. The fair closes at 10 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, midnight Friday and Saturday and 6 p.m. Sunday.

# Featured artist: Dan Davidson It's a delicate balance

# Western artist has Eastern influences <sup>By</sup> Natisha Hales

Dabbling in art as many children do, with drawing and school projects, Dan Davidson didn't realize art was something he wanted to pursue until he was in the Army in the 1960s.

Stationed at Sandia Base in Albuquerque, Davidson said it was something that came out of the blue.

"One day, I wanted to be a painter," he said. "I never thought of it as something I wanted to pursue before."

Returning to his hometown of Chicago, Davidson attended the Art Institute of Chicago for a Bachelor of Fine Arts. From there, he said he was the only student selected from his school to attend the Yale University School of Art to earn his master's degree in 1968.

It was at Yale that he took a course in Chinese art history, and he became fascinated with the Eastern principles.

"It's based on entirely different principles than Western art," Davidson said. "It was a good contrast for me."

Davidson, who had been creating art that he called "systemic abstractions" based on geometric features, found that he was limiting himself and it was too technical. In 1982, he decided to delve into the Chinese practices of art firsthand and studied in Taiwan for two years.

During that time, after the Communist Party forced Chiang Kai-shek to Taiwan, he took with him the national palace museum collection of ancient art.

"The best of the old paintings are there (in the museum collection)," Davidson said, "and I've seen them all – Cleveland, Kansas City, (Washington, D.C.)."

After returning from the East and living in different areas of the country – upstate New York and San Diego – Davidson returned to New Mexico in 2004, this time to retire. His first idea – because of his love of sailing – was to retire in the Caribbean, but he decided that he needed studio space more, so he chose Silver City, N.M.


He said he wasn't sure exactly what he wanted to do with his retirement, but painting took hold right away.

"(Paintings) just burst out of me," Davidson said.

The paintings are what he calls metapainting, which is art that looks back at art. For example, in one of his pieces, Davidson has placed himself watching Vermeer, who is in turn working on "Cleo," the famous muse of art.

There's more to what meets the eye, however. In his work, he uses principles he found in "Yi Ching," a classic book of change. He has used the book as a guide since the 1970s, but more recently found even more use for its fundamentals.

"What appealed to me initially in the 1970s is that it was the only really ancient book based on math – ying and yang, the binary system," he said. "Later, I became interested in its symbolism, and now I use it as a lens to look back over art history."

Vermeer is not the only artist on whom Davidson looks back.

His work also includes an "inside look" at Marcel Duchamp pondering the piece that would become "Fountain," in a men's restroom. If you look closely, there are other "readymades" Duchamp dubbed art placed in sets of fours in the

tiles of the restroom. For Davidson, it's not about looking at art, it's about reading, and he adds several layers for the person who chooses to read his.

"It's very boring just looking at art," he said. "You have to read it. I did abstract painting for a long time, but it just wasn't enough."

Deciding he was not one of the avantgarde artists who consider themselves at the cutting edge of art, Davidson said his position is more "post-garde" as he looks back at art history.

Currently, samples of his work are on display at Milagro Coffee Y Espresso, although they are the more abstract geometrical paintings. To see more of his metapaintings, contact Davidson at dandyartz@gmail.com.



# We can all be 'Beginners' at any age

# Secret lifestyles come out in the open

The lives we lead are basic tenants in "Beginners," a wonderfully done dramedy that features sparkling performances by Ewan McGregor and Christopher Plummer.

McGregor plays Oliver, the son of Hal (played by Plummer). The story is told in flashback, which somehow keeps on working as a tool for film directors, even though it is used quite often. We follow three different and distinct plot lines.

After the passing of Oliver's mother, and a rightful mourning period by Hal, he tells his son that he is gay, always has been and always will be.

At 75, his days as a closeted gay man go way back to the time when one didn't dare admit to such a thing – oh, the shame and horror! But Hal tells his son of the days before he met and married his wife, Oliver's

mother. Illicit meetings with men in secret places – school, clubs and wherever else love could be found, no matter how temporary.

But now that Hal is free to do as he wants, he becomes thoroughly enmeshed in his newfound freedom – attending rallies, parades and activist group meetings. He takes – and later moves



in with – a much younger lover, with the understanding that the love will not always be monogamous.

Brushed in with this are samples of Oliver's own lifestyle and failed relationships. He is haunted by a sadness that carries into his


work, and with a strong irony, he is also coincidentally designing a CD jacket for a somewhat snooty and fake-looking band called Sad. They are not pleased with his work, although the art he offers often fits their attitude and tone of their music to a T. Oliver seems only to be able to communicate Academy Award nominee Christopher Plummer and Ewan McGregor star as father and son in "Beginners."

with Arthur, a Jack Russell terrier. Arthur doesn't talk, but he certainly has wise perspectives to offer Oliver and us, via subtitles.

With more than a touch of irony, Oliver attends a Halloween party as Freud, and it's here where he meets Anna, a "patient." They begin a simple but – at least on the surface – fulfilling relationship, but one has to wonder if Oliver, in his ongoing sadness, will sabotage it.

Meanwhile, Hal is told by his doctor that he has cancer and time is short, too short, and that, of course, changes everything.

As all good stories do, "Beginners," ripe for picking clichés and ultra-happy endings, avoids both and smoothly glides through a convincing and nicely acted story. Based on his life events, director Mike Mills gives pause to each character. Are they really as likable as they seem on the outside or in public, or do the secret lives they lead or have led – Oliver's bought with sadness and Hal's 38 years of

living in the closet – take a toll on each? "Beginners" is a story about just that ... showing us that at certain times of our lives we can all, once again, become beginners.

# **Surprises at the social club** Gene Kelly directs made-in-NM film

"Beginners" begins Friday, Sept. 23, which makes it officially autumn at the Fountain

Theatre. You'll witness

105 minutes of R-rated

material.

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 1, is "Cheyenne Social Club"(1970, 100 minutes, rated PG, made in New Mexico).

James Stewart and Henry Fonda star in this Western comedy, directed by Gene Kelly – yes, that Gene Kelly.

In 1870 Texas, John O'Hanlan (Stewart), an itinerant cowboy, receives a letter notifying him that he has inherited a business establishment called the Cheyenne Social Club in Cheyenne, Wyo. (New Mexico "stars" as both Wyoming and Texas).

Stewart and Fonda (as Harley) travel to Wyoming, where they discover the business is actually a brothel, much to the chagrin of "aw-shucks" John. Aghast at the idea of running a house of ill-repute, John decides to close the Cheyenne Social Club, which makes him a pariah among the business' loyal patrons, but then he discovers he can't cash out his inheritance.

Furthermore, when the club's sunny madame, Jenny (Shirley Jones), is attacked by a client, John's sense of Texas justice kicks in and starts him down the road of developing a proprietary interest in the ladies' welfare. Unfortunately for John, his noble actions make him a target for a huge clan of no-good varmints, meaning an extended stay in Cheyenne would be hazardous to his health. "The Cheyenne Social Club" isn't a laugh-out-loud comedy so much as it's a lighthearted yarn with comic touches, but that's a good thing. The picture delivers a broad spectrum of entertainment, from action to jokes to romance.

A charming Western comedy, this amiable picture pairs two of the genre's greatest stars in a lively story that both pokes fun at their wholesome images and suits their advanced ages at the time the movie was made.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society that showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West and "movies that missed us" – films that are notable but never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as entertainment. At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico "connection," drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state (nearly 500) or perhaps featuring a star/story from New Mexico talent.



# Las Cruces tradition

It's difficult to leave Ranchway Restaurant hungry

I generally mistrust restaurants with two separate cuisines, for example, the Chinese restaurant in Carlsbad with a sign that says, "Breakfast Burritos."

Ranchway Restaurant, a Las Cruces icon for more than 50 years, however, serves two separate cuisines

A sign out front says, "Mesquite BBQ and Mexican Food," and you can smell the mesquite smoker when

Once you're inside Ranchway, and have eaten there a few times, you realize maybe barbecue and Mexican food are not so separate, especially here in the Southwest.

Art and photographs occupy the walls at Ranchway, and the atmosphere reminds you Las Cruces has reflected Mexican and cowboy culture for a long time. One black-and-white framed

photograph features a bronc-busting cowboy from the 1930s. Another shows Pancho Villa on his famous

One colorful painting portrays Mexican artist Frida Kahlo. Another is Willie Nelson on black velvet. One day, the speakers might be playing Mexican music. Another day it might be country music.

Ranchway did not always serve Mexican food. From the time it opened, around 1960 until 1974, the restaurant served only barbecue. But in '74, Elsa and Jesus "Chuy" Rodriguez took over.

"They brought the Mexican food," said Michael Rodriguez, Elsa and Chuy's grandson, and the cashier-manager.

Michael Rodriguez, now 29, was helping out the dishwashers when he

He now spends most of his time working the register and the front counter, but is also boss of the sauce. "I make the barbecue sauce," he said. "It's the same recipe since the original owners, with a few tweaks here and there."

Every order comes with chips and salsa, your choice between the hot green or medium red.

I liked both of the salsas. Michael Rodriguez warned me the green was "really hot," but I found it just right. It had a fire roasted green chile and jalapeño flavor and was served warm, a nice touch. The red one. which is actually more orange, had a decent kick, too. The red is packed with flavor, and I liked it more than



Another nice touch: they serve only a small bowl of chips and salsa. When I dine out, I keep eating chips and salsa until it's gone. If they're big bowls, I'm either too full to eat the entrée, or eat it all anyway and regret it later

On one visit to Ranchway, I ran into Las Cruces' First Lady Susan Chaparro, Chaparro, Mayor Ken Miyagishima's wife, was dining with her parents, Augustin and Socorro Chaparro.

"We've been coming here for years," Susan Chaparro said. "The caldo de res is the best in town. And you must have the flautas. People think of flautas as skinny, but here, they're huge."

Michael Rodriguez echoes the sentiment on the flautas, but adds his favorite dish is the carne adovada. "But I only get the adovada on

my birthday," he said. "We only make a limited amount each day."

So if you want the adovada, you'd better go early.

When it comes to enchiladas, I'm a red guy, with onions. But I felt in the mood for green, and was not disappointed. The green sauce was smooth and creamy and tasted like a cousin to the green salsa. The enchiladas were topped with white cheese - which I prefer - and served with beans and rice. If you have an issue with onions, beware the greens are served with onions, even if not requested.

On the return visit, I went for barbecue. I'd had the brisket plate before, and liked it, so this time I ordered the BBQ Combination Plate which adds ribs (your choice of beef or pork) and sausage to the brisket. It's served with pinto beans and a really nice potato salad.

We're all familiar with Texas toast, but this plate was served with what I'll dub New Mexico toast – a bolillo split in half, buttered and toasted.

If you have anything more ambitious than a nap planned for after

lunch, I recommend not getting the barbecue combination plate.

It's a lot of heavy food. And because it tastes so good, thanks in large part to Michael's sauce, you want to eat all of it. The pork ribs pretty much fall off the bone. The sausage is big, juicy and tasty. The brisket is still probably my favorite. It's sliced very thin and flavorful with or without the sauce.

The brisket also serves as the heart of the deshebrada burrito.

That day, I visited with Margarito Corona, who was having a deshebrada burrito. His empty plate and full mouth told me how good it was.

Corona's friend, Alberto Rodriguez (no relation to the owners) has been coming to Ranchway for about 40 years, he said. He was having a delicious-looking sopaipilla compuesta. But what's his favorite dish?

"Everything is a favorite here," he said. "I come here when I'm really hungry."







# Shut up and 'Drive'

### 'Action' film tells a story without much dialogue

What makes a good movie?

Is it a complex character – maybe a villain that you want to understand and relate to somehow? Or is it the actor who conforms to the complex character? Cinematography, maybe? A great storyline? Or perhaps it's the amazing direction that has united characters, actors and cinematography to create a film that leaves the audience wanting more.

"Drive," directed by Nicolas Winding Refn, excels in most of these qualities, plus one - music. Red Hot Chili Peppers drummer Cliff Martinez composed most of the music for the film.

Starring Ryan Gosling, who has proven he can take on any number of roles, "Drive" is so complex that we don't realized Gosling's character doesn't even have a name. They just call him

"Driver." We don't know where he comes from or what kind of life he has led, although he must be likeable, since auto shop owner Shannon (Bryan Cranston) has come to take him under his wing for the past five or six years.

What we do know about Driver is that he drives. He can do just about anything behind the wheel of a car, and he's become a great stunt driver. He's so good that Shannon is looking to get into the racing business, just because of Driver.

The movie gets off to a good start, with Driver - behind the wheel, of course - waiting for two criminals to come out with their duffle bags full of something stolen. The film is shot from Driver's perspective and how he wheels his way - and two others - out of trouble.

That's just one part of Driver's life, however. Cataloguing Driver's daily life, the film moves slowly, and the intentionally

choppy editing doesn't help it move

frame, he's working on a car. Another frame, he's sitting in his apartment. And another, he's in the elevator with a neighbor he notices, Irene (Carey Mulligan). There's not much dialogue between the pair, or in many of the scenes, really, but the story is definitely being told.

It's obvious that Driver is a quiet guy who keeps to himself. When he does speak, it's pretty surprising what comes out of his mouth. He definitely proves he's a no-nonsense kind of guy, even if he wears a satin jacket with a scorpion on the back and the collar popped up. (It seems as if the movie takes place in the present day, but the music, typography at the beginning, Driver's jacket and his car scream 1980s.)

After getting to know Irene a little better (she's married, has a kid and her husband is in prison), Driver falls for the girl and her son Benicio. They're all comfortable together, shown in one scene with Benicio and Driver sitting in Irene's living room, Benicio resting his legs on Driver's lap. Again, there's not much you can tell from the dialogue, but the

scenes sav it all.

Finding out her husband is getting out of prison, Irene and Driver put their romance on hold. Instead, Driver strikes up a friendship with Standard Gabriel and helps him try to get out of a bind – as, you guessed it, the getaway driver.

What Driver tells Standard sums up the entire character: "If I drive for you, you give me a time and a place. I give you a fiveminute window. Anything happens in that five minutes, and I'm yours no matter what. I don't sit in while you're running it down. I don't carry a gun. I drive."

You don't know where he came from before that five minutes, you don't know where he's going afterward.

Needless to say, the debt-paying heist goes awry and Driver will do anything to make sure Irene and her son stay safe. And when I say anything, I mean anything. There's no sex or drugs in "Drive" (al-

though there's a brief scene with nudity in a strip club), but there's plenty of violence. Crazy, unnecessary violence that comes out of absolutely nowhere and assaulted my ears and made my stomach turn.

"Drive" is reminiscent of the video game "Grand Theft Auto: Vice City" mixed with a dash "No Country for Old Men" and "Seven Pounds." It seemed like it was trying to do something wonderful, and while the cinematography is excellent and Gosling's acting is superb (as well as Cranston's and Albert Brooks'), it just didn't get there for me.

Those qualities usually are what it takes to make an excellent movie, but for me, a good movie also includes great character development without leaving room for too many questions. When "Drive" ended, and the credits rolled, questions were all I had.

#### 'The 39 Steps' presents unique challenge Cast of four has more than 100 roles seconds. We are so lucky to be able to watch

It was with great anticipation that I attended the opening night performance of 'The 39 Steps" at the Black Box Theatre. I couldn't imagine how this long-running parody/farce, still playing in London and New York, with productions performed all over the world would play out in Las Cruces.

Before the show, the guiding forces behind the No Strings Theatre Company, Ceil and Peter Herman, told me this play presented unique challenges on so many levels. Ceil Herman admitted it was the most difficult show she ever directed in all her years at stage direction.

Fear not, Ceil and Peter Herman. You did a terrific job, as I guessed you would. While the opening night performance was understandably choppy, the first before an audience, I am confident that with your guidance, this talented cast and crew will smooth out the rough edges very quickly.

Make your reservations early, gentle readers. As the four actors in the company, and a very busy behind-the-scenes crew settle more comfortably into their demanding roles in this arduous and often hilarious play, you will be in for quite a treat.

Peter Barlow adapted the famous 1935 Alfred Hitchcock film of the same name together with the 1915 novel by John Buchan. From the novel, only the lead character, debonair Richard Hannay, is taken, and the result is one amazing piece of theater craft. This show is a farce/parody in the truest sense of the words with the addition of enormous bits of shtick thrown in, in the most surprising places.

The play first premiered in England in 2005 with the greatest challenge being that the entire company consists of four actors playing more than 100 different parts. Crazy, you say? Yes, indeed it is.

What impressed this reviewer most is that how so complex a play could be assembled in such a short time – about one month! Some cast members must change costumes and accents in seconds. The cos-

tume design by Lana Eckman is applauded. Éckman certainly did her homework and stitching. Deborah Knapp's choreography of a '30s dance routine at the end of the first act is a hoot.

Each cast member must take a bow. Algernon D'Ammassa, whose work in BBT's "Crime and Punishment" was impressive, continues to please. His character is the "glue" that holds the story together. As Hannay, he does not have the wavy hair mentioned over and over in the script, but he does deliver his lines with alacrity, charm and wit, and a pencil-thin mustache.

A newcomer from New York City, Emily Campion makes a fine debut as the only female actor in the cast. Her English, Scottish and German accents, coupled with her alluring looks and good acting range, make her just right in her three fetching roles. Her comic timing is excellent.

And now to the "heavy lifting" parts. Two "clowns" must play close to 100 roles between both of them – some male, some female, some English, some Scottish, some German, some appearing on the stage for a fleeting few

these two performers "do their stuff," nicely assisted by a backstage crew who make magic happen on a minimalist set, enhanced with outstanding rear projections.

David Reyes, a recent transplant from Kansas City, Mo., armed with an abundance of acting experience, really outdoes himself in so many "over-the-top" roles in this show,

and he deserves special praise. I hope we see much more of him in future productions. Whether he is the villain of the play, Dr. Jordan, the wife This is the the play, Dr. Jordan, the whe of the Scottish Innkeeper or a jovial vaudeville performer, he performs each role to the hilt.

It is hard to believe that Dustin Hadfield is only a junior in high school. His maturity, stage presence and remarkable comic timing is something special to behold. How fortunate that we have more years of seeing him both at the Black Box and New Mexico State University. The mystery of the mean-

ing behind "The 39 Steps" will be for me to know and you to figure out between humor, gun shots, stage fog and guffaws as this extraordinary comedy plays out before your eyes

Bravo to all. Make your reservations now. The play may be extended, and I am hoping it will, because this is the type of show that makes experiencing live theater so important.

"The 39 Steps" kicks off the 2011-12 No Strings season and runs through Sunday, Oct. 2, at the Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main

# **Promoting Dress up for Dress the Child** diabetes awareness

As I read the September issue of Diabetes Forecast magazine, I was shocked to view the map of the U.S. and see that there were no scheduled "Step Out: Walk to Stop Diabetes" fundraisers for the state of New Mexico.

Sept. 15 through Oct. 15 is not only "Diabetes Awareness Month" but also "Hispanic Heritage Month." New Mexico is 46.3 percent Hispanic with the largest Hispanic population of any state in the U.S.

California has the second largest Hispanic population with 37.6 percent, and has 10 scheduled "stop diabetes" walks. These annual walks in 2010 raised

\$19.7 million, which fund diabetes research, prevention, education and advocacy programs.

You can sign up to walk or make a donation at www.diabetes.org/stepout. The only problem is, should you want to participate in a walk is you'd need to travel to Tucson, Ariz. – the nearest city to Las Cruces that has a scheduled walk Sunday, Oct.16.

During this 30-day period, the Ameri-can Diabetes Association (ADA) and the retailer Nordstrom (my favorite, all-time best customer service company) will team up to raise awareness, particularly among Latinos, who are nearly twice as likely as the general population to have diabetes.

Nordstrom will donate five dollars to support the ADA Latino program up to \$75,000 every time someone takes the online diabetes risk test between Sept.15 through Oct.15.

The test is available in English and Spanish. It assesses one's risk of develop-ing type 2 diabetes. To take the test, visit www.stopdiabetes.com/nordstrom.

Do you know what rock legend Bret Michaels, featured on Donald Trump's "Celebrity Apprentice," and Crystal Bowersox, the "American Idol" star have in common?

# Food safety is more important than ever

The recent outbreak of food-borne illness in New Mexico and several other states, resulting from the consumption of certain Coloradogrown cantaloupes has promted a renewed effort in practicing safe food handling techniques.

The New Mexico Department of Health has confirmed a link between a strain of the bacterium listeria and Jensen Farms cantaloupes, which led to the deaths of three people and hospitalized 10 more within the state.

Cases were reported in Bernalillo, Chaves, Otero, DeBaca, Valencia and Lea counties.

Jensen Farms, of Holly, Colo., recalled its brand of "Rocky Ford" cantaloupes Wednesday, Sept. 14 upon learning of the potential danger. What exactly is listeria? There are two forms

of the L. Monocytogenes bacterium that can contaminate foods; one that can cause a mild, non-invasive illness called listerial gastroenteritis, See Listeria on page D2

The Ben Archer health centers have marked their 40th anniversary of providing rural health services in southern New Mexico.

The health centers were named after the late Ben Archer, a merchant in Hatch, who served on the Memorial General Hospital board of directors for 25 years, serving 21 of those years as the chairman.

Archer started organizing the rural medical services when Hatch was left without the services of any physicians.

He was the first non-paid administrator, and was also trained for and was certified as an emergency medical technician who went out on ambulance calls.

"These guys that keep coming back to help aren't doing it for the pictures or the glory, they're doing it for the kids," Campbell said. "There's no reason these kids should have to go to school wearing the same clothes or dirty clothes.'

Campbell also said it is a great opportunity for the Oñate High School hospitality students participating to network with local restaurateurs and chefs.

Archer died in 2005 at the age of 98. The first Archer center opened in a former First National Bank building at the east end of Hall Street, in Hatch, across from the railway tracks.

The need for rural medical services was apparent, and the services have since been expanded to Doña Ana, Truth or Consequences, Columbus, Deming and Alamogordo.

The newest center in Radium Springs is currently serving patients as a temporary facility.

The centers provide medical, dental and behavioral care services and transportation for appointments and employment. About 35,000 people receive care at the centers every year. The centers receive about \$600,000 in state funding, and patients pay on a sliding scale, according to administrator Mary Alice Garay.

and one that can cause severe, life -threatening illnesses called invasive listeriosis.

Symptoms include fever and muscle aches along with other gastrointestinal problems. Those who are considered most at risk are the elderly, pregnant women and those with weakened immune systems.

New Mexico's fatal cases include a 93-yearold male and 63-year-old male from Bernalillo County, and a 61-year-old female from Curry County.

According to the Center for Disease Control, about 800 cases of listeria are confirmed each year in the United States, usually traced to deli and soft cheeses.

Most mild cases can be cured with an antibiotic treatment.

The most effective method of prevention is taking proper food safety sanitation steps.

The following are good rules of thumb to remember when handling produce:

Start with clean hands by washing them

with warm soap and water for 20 seconds before handling fruits and vegetables.

- Cut away any rotten or bruised areas, discarding any rotten fruit.
- All produce should be washed thoroughly before peeling or eating. In the case of the cantaloupes and other melons, even though you won't be eating the rinds, still wash with running water and a scrub brush.
- Don't give up on cantaloupes entirely. They are low in calories and very nutrient dense. They provide good sources of

vitamins C, potassium and carotene. Check the labels for where they come from before you buy, and if they aren't labeled check with the retailer.

The only Las Cruces commercial retailer to have reported any cantaloupe recalls was Wal mart on 1550 S. Valley Drive and Walmart on 571 Walton Blvd.

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

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# Make way for Paws N' Hooves van El Paso mobile vet makes Las Cruces appearance

The Paws N' Hooves mobile veterinary clinic out of El Paso made its debut appearance in New Mexico when it rolled into Las Cruces Monday, Sept. 19.

Veterinarian Amy Starr and her staff of two veterinary technicians arrived at the Spay and Neuter Action Program (SNAP) office, 2405 W. Picacho Ave., in the wee hours of the morning prepared to take on a full day scheduled with surgeries and other vet services.

"Our mission is all about client education," Starr said. The goal of these functions is to get the word out about how to take care of pets and control overpopulation.'

Starr, who is donating her time to do the surgeries, said the day was made possible due to a private donation made to SNAP by the Telluride Animal Foundation to cover operational costs.

Holding true to SNAP's mission to provide low-cost spays, neuters and vet services, surgeries were offered for \$25, microchipping for \$20 and vaccinations for \$8.

Starr began the Paws N' Hooves mobile services in 2008 after working for Fort Bliss and noticing that there was a strong need for low-cost vet services in the South Valley area.

"It was sad to me that people who weren't in the military weren't always able to do stuff to keep their pets healthy just because of money," Starr said.

After finding the fully operational van from a veterinary distributor in Colorado, Starr took out a loan to buy the van, get to business and has been cruisin' El Paso and surrounding areas ever since.

Starr and her staff set up four to five days a week at specified locations in El Paso and Canutillo to offer spays, neuters, vaccines, dental cleanings, heartworm tests, feline FeLV tests, microchipping and nail trims.

Will Las Cruces be seeing any more of Paws N' Hooves? On Monday, Sept. 26, Starr and her staff will return for an-

other day of surgeries, this time mainly focusing on cats. Starr said she hopes to get even more done that day, since

cats are smaller they will be easier and faster to do. After that, SNAP board members said since these visits have

been such a success they are working on scheduling more visits to the Mesilla Valley in the future.

Keeping up with client education efforts, Starr teaches a monthly first-aid course for pet owners to educate on first aid care for pet issues such as heat stroke, allergic reactions, fight

and vehicle wounds, broken bones, parvo and preventive care. The course is held from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. at the Mesa Vet Clinic in El Paso, 3555 N. Mesa, on the third Saturday of each month.

"Our motto is to help El Paso help our pets," Starr said. Starr is a graduate of Washington State University CVM and works in all locations and on all types of animals, but her special interests are small animal surgery and equine dentistry.

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





We should use self-talk before making the decision of what to eat and drink for dinner. This is just one simple decision that people make every single day of their life.


This process can accomplish effective decision making and downturn a possible negative decision. This results in a life-changing decision that will enhance our lives and pursuit of positive life goals.

Selecting the .23-acre lot at 4157 Calle Belleza, located off Sonoma Springs in the Sonoma Ranch neighborhood, Babbey said the property had everything the couple was looking for in a home destination.

"We didn't want any neighbors behind us," she said, adding that the land behind the property is owned by the Bureau of Land Management and should never be built on. "We also wanted a lot with a view."

Purchasing the lot in 2008, when the street was relatively empty, Babbey said it was the largest one on that side of the street and captured the sight of the Organ Mountains. The lot did provide some challenges, however.

Because the lot was angled, Babbey said they had to play with the placement of the home to make it fit in a way that captured the views and took advantage of all of the available space.

Although Babbey worked closely with a builder friend to create the home, she selected every detail, from colors to the overall style.

"I don't necessarily like Southwest, and although this home has some Southwest features in it, I wanted it make it different," she said.

Coming up to the home, guests are greeted by a circular stamped-concrete driveway, which is surrounded by rock landscaping and some native plants.

"I really wanted a circular driveway, so we had to move the home around so it would fit," said Babbey, adding that in addition to being stamped, the concrete is also colored and stained, ensuring that the high-traffic area wouldn't wear or fade away.

The front of the home, which features a tiled roof, is accented in stacked-rock detailing around the windows and front column. A small covered patio area leads to the interior of the home.

The entrance area of the four-bedroom home features a chandelier hanging from a 16-foot ceiling. As glass blocks and a plant shelf decorate the top of the area, a ceramic tile mosaic with tumbled marble enhances the floor.

Three nichos painted in a dark brown Venetian plaster line the wall of the area. The nichos feature an eyebrow arch, which Babbey said is repeated throughout the home in the halls and other architectural elements.

"My framer did a great job," she said. "Everything matches."

To the left of the entrance is the guestbedroom wing. A full bathroom resides outside of one of the three bedrooms in the area. The two other bedrooms share a Jack and Jill bathroom.



The 2,360-square-foot home has three bedrooms tucked away for privacy.

Babbey said in each of the bathrooms, the tile worker created a different design in the shower to give each space its own character.

At the center of the home is the living room. Featuring a 14-foot-high ceiling with crown molding and more Venetian plaster, the living room is brightly lit, thanks to a curved wall of windows that brings in natural light and the view.

The showpiece of the room, however, is the fireplace residing in the corner. Babbey said the design and style of the fireplace was inspired by a home she saw on Isleta Court. Covered in a dark, speckled granite, the fireplace also features tumbled marble.

The living room opens up to Babbey's favorite area – the kitchen.

"I love my kitchen," she said. "I can still be with my family when they're in the living room. I can be in here and they can be in there we're always together.'

The kitchen was designed to be convenient

and easy to work in, she said, adding that it offers the right amount of workspace. Filled with knotty pine cabinets and the same granite countertops and tumbled marble detailing found throughout the home, it is also stylish.

Beside the kitchen and attached dining room is the master suite. The large room includes a repeated round wall of windows as well as access to the covered patio. The open bathroom includes a walk-in closet as well as double sinks, a separate shower and a Jacuzzi bathtub.

Babbey said as much thought went into the home's backyard as the interior. The covered patio features a built-in bench inspired by a smaller version she saw at another home. The area also includes an area of grass along with several native plants on a drip system.

The combination area of rock and grass is not only great for the family, but also for Babbey's many turtles, she said.



## RANM executive VP has found ties to Las Cruces

While the current housing market offers a few challenges to Realtors and homeowners alike, Realtor Association of New Mexico Executive Vice President Steven Anaya is working to ensure they have a fighting chance. Born and raised in Moriarty, N.M., the northern New Mexico

native has spent his entire life in the town located outside of Albuquerque on the other side of the Sandia Mountains, other than a stint in Las Cruces to attend New Mexico State University and earn a bachelor's degree in business administration.

"I come from a family of eight children – five sisters and three brothers - and seven of us graduated from NMSU," he said. "It's our university of choice. We felt that it was a great learning institution."

In 1993, Anaya was appointed by President Bill Clinton to join the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development

program. "I always had an interest in affordable and workforce housing," he said, adding that at the time he had four years of running the state fair under his belt. "I was involved in business and government. ... I've been on the Moriarty City Council going on 20 years.'

With USDA, Anaya said he would travel around the state and work closely on various housing programs.

"I got to understand how some funding opportunities came together," he said. "We would try to partner with as many entities, and that's still important today with federal funds shrinking."

Later, Anaya became director of Fannie Mae in New Mexico. "I've always been in housing in some way," he said.

About four years ago, he left the financing company and was recruited to fill the vacant executive vice president role for RANM.

"It was a great fit because of my housing background and my knowledge of the state and the political process," he said.

Taking over when the market began to slip, Anaya said RANM membership dropped from 8,000 in 2008 to 6,000 currently - although it is still one of the largest industries in the state.

There has been a lot of change these last four years, especially with the economy," he said. "Housing is the one industry that when it's vibrant, the economy is vibrant. We have to find a way to bring back the housing industry market and make it more vibrant."

With a staff of seven, a budget of \$1.6 million and an office in Santa Fe, Anaya does "a little bit of everything" to serve the members and its 19 local boards scattered throughout the state.

He said RANM has three big areas of focus: a legal hotline; forms, which are created by a committee and placed online for all members to access; and monitoring legislation and regulations that affect real estate and homeownership for citizens.

"It's never a dull moment. ... I love working with the real estate community," he said.

In addition to interacting with residential and commercial Realtors, Anaya said he also works closely with mortgage brokers, bankers, homebuilders and developers on issues that deal with the industry. During the last 60-day session of the state Legislature, there were more than 200 issues the organization was monitoring that had some sort of impact on Realtors either directly or indirectly, such as water, septic and land use items.

"We're never short on issues," he said.

Nationally, RANM is keeping an eye on mortgage interest reduction legislation that is currently being reviewed in Congress as well as legislation to maintain seller financing, which is beneficial because it's harder for people to receive loans.

One national issue RANM opposes, however, is the proposal to increase regulation to require a 20 percent down payment to purchase a home.

'This could really put some homeowners off the market," Anaya said, adding that today, down payments are usually between 5 and 10 percent. "They wouldn't be able to reach that."

On a state level, he said there are several issues they are paying attention to, such as tax lightning for new homeowners.

There is a property tax issue," he said, explaining that with tax lightning, a new homeowner will pay more on their property tax than their neighbor who has already been there. "We're working with the Legislature to balance out the issue of equity.

An important issue they pushed last session was to allow Broker Price Opinion, which isn't allowed in New Mexico.

"We're one of the few states where a Realtor can't get compensated for Broker Price Opinion," he said. "We tried pushing it last session, and it got through one of the houses, but we ran out of time?

While legislation and regulation are key components to the job, there are other issues Anaya must pay attention to.

"I'm constantly traveling and meeting with our members," said the self-proclaimed people person. "I find out what's on their minds and what they need from the association. I make sure that we're meeting the members' needs."

Providing the members with educational opportunities – such as the 2011 Fall Conference, which was held in Las Cruces and focused on technology - Anaya said the more knowledgeable and flexible they are, the better chance they have to be successful. "Real estate is like politics," he said. "It's all local.

"One thing we've seen is that it all comes down to jobs. If a person has a job, they will potentially have the opportunity to by a house. Then what happens is community comes after housing is developed."

Also with jobs, he said, comes spending, which generates gross receipts taxes that are used for the city, allowing the entity to provide more services.

T've been very active in local and regional job development (in Estancia Valley)," he said. "If you create good jobs, other things will follow.

Anaya said Las Cruces is fortunate to have several stable employers such as White Sands Missile Range, NMSU and Doña Ana Community College.

"Obviously it's not as good as it was four to five years ago," he said, "but it's better than other parts of the state."

Spending his time sitting on several boards in the Albuquerque area to better education and workforce development, Anaya said he has great vision for RANM.

"I would like to see us do some strategic partnering with or-ganizations that have the same goal in mind," he said, adding that this includes the media and getting the word out on the benefits of homeownership.

Although he had returned north to Moriarty, where his family has lived for generations, Anaya said his passion for the City of the Crosses and his alma mater continue.

"I love the people down there, it's a great place to go to school," he said. "I kid people and say that I'm in a mixed marriage because my wife is a Lobo and I'm an Aggie?

From 2003-09, he served on the NMSU Board of Regents, which required him to journey down about once a month. His son Christopher then took over the reins and served as student regent to the university.







# **The fiery ocotillo** Birds fight for colorful plant

After rain, the upright delights known as ocotillos liven up the desert with their green leaves and reddish flowers that attract hummingbirds.

One may also notice some sporting their showy flowers with no leaves. Sometimes these plants will produce no leaves, or flowers for more than a year, and then all of a sudden they will leaf out into their full glory. **Las Cruces Bulletin** 

Plants that do that usually come from bare root origins. In other words, they were pulled out and harvested from ranches anywhere from west Texas to Arizona. This is what usually disrupts their leaf and flowering cycle.

If you are looking for a more reliable bloomer (or "leafer"), try one that has been grown in a container from a cutting or seed. They will usually be smaller in size than bare root ones, but will have a full root mass in their containers. These generally have leaves throughout the warm and hotter months of the year, but may be a bit pricier.

If you have one already planted and are having a hard time getting it to leaf out, try wetting the stocks only. Make sure it is not on a drip or irrigation system, it most likely will eventually rot. Make sure the soil is well drained and grown in an area that receives sunlight all day. If you are not sure if yours is dead or not, look up close to the stocks after it has been sprayed with water. A greenish hue on the outer bark should indicate that your plant is still alive. If it is gray and brittle then, of course, it's gone. As a rule, these low-maintenance specimens need little or no fertilizer. If you feel the need to fertilize, try using one fourth to one fifth of the recommended application rate. The ones seen in their natural habitat are just as green as can be and there has been no one adding fertilizer, other than other animals. I have just witnessed this on the way to Hatch for some green chile, (not the animals ... the plants). The ocotillos

were just simply beautiful as nature had intended. So, if you enjoy watching hummingbirds "dog fight" over the blossoms of a unique plant, the ocotillo may be just what you are looking for.

Football season is here. Sit back in your team's jersey, crack open a cold one and throw some hotdogs on a disposable grill.

Watch the game from the comfort of your own tailgating set up with no mess and no fuss. In a small, portable package you can have the heat and the great flavor of grilled food without filling up your truckbed with heavy propane tanks. Avoid having to use those clunky portable grills or unsanitary public grills at a park: the EZ Grill lets you grill outdoors anytime, anywhere.

The people at EZ Grill wanted to bring their customers environmentally responsible, economy-priced, outdoor cooking supplies. The all-natural charcoal comes pre-packed in the EZ Grill and is made from agricultural byproducts plus cornstarch with natural mineral oil that is safe for the environment and for your family.

#### What is it?

EZ Grill is a small, compact, disposable grill system that contains everything you need for a quick and easy charbroiled meal, packaged to-go.

The grill itself comes in two sizes: the regular measures 9.8-by-12.2-inches, which weighs a breezy 1.96 pounds, and the



party size is 18.9-by-12.2-inches at only 3.58 pounds.

The all-recyclable contents are wrapped in cellophane and contain everything you need to get grilling. A bottom tray, a grill stand, the grate and the EZ Grill's own blend of charcoal. It should be set up on a flat, non-flammable surface and after it is initially lit, it takes around 15 minutes for the charcoal to be ashed enough for great grill cooking.

#### How does it work?

If you need one sooner than the standard five day shipping, you can visit Lowe's Home Improvement store on North Main Street. It's a fairly new and innovative product, and it's making its way into new stores.

#### How much does it cost?

On EZ Grill's website, you can get a single, regular grill for \$9.99. The party sized grill will run you \$15.49, or you can get a combo pack, two of each sized grill for \$41.99. They also offer a wide variety of gadgets, sauces and charcoal mixers, to make your next tailgating party an unforgettable event.

#### **Moroccan Flank Steak**

- 3 to 4 pounds flank steak 1 small onion, minced
- 1/2 cup olive oil

- 1/4 cup lemon juice 4 tablespoons ginger, minced
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons flat leaf
- parsley, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced 1 tablespoon cumin
- 1 tablespoon chili powder 1 tablespoon sherry

Place flank steak in a shallow baking dish or freezer type bag. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Turn steak a few times to coat well over and place into refrigerator for 6 to 12 hours. Light the EZ Grill. Wait 15 minutes until the charcoals are beginning to ash and there is even heat. Remove steak from dish and place onto grill. Cook for 8 to 10 minutes per side. When meat reaches desired doneness, remove and allow it to sit for 5 to 7 minutes before slicing.

# Pass the beer can

### Change in temperature good for outdoor grilling

Now that desert evenings have cooled off, outdoor grilling is more bearable. No more glaring hundred-digit rays - so fire up the grill!

Grilled foods, especially those cooked in beer and spiced with our favorite hot "stuff," is a tremendous flavor booster. Recently, I had the opportunity to sample one such recipe when a friend invited me to her place for beer can chicken.

By the time I arrived, Barb had the whole chicken already dressed and propped on a beer can, and the gas grill lit. The chicken was generously rubbed with olive oil and sprinkled with salt, pepper and fresh minced thyme.

'Should I add anything else?" she asked.

I was prepared. I reached into my pocket purse and pulled out a special dry seasoning mix spirited with Hatch peppers. Although not a big fan of hot and spicy foods, Barb gave me the go ahead to add "just a bit."

The chicken was ready-to-eat in a little more than an hour – juicy, tender and deliciously moist from the steaming beer.

"This is really good, but you should have added more Hatch seasoning," Barb said. (No comment.)

#### **Smokin' Chipotle Beer Basted Chicken**

Consider topping the grilled chicken with jicama salsa (recipe included).

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 small while onion, chopped

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup ketchup
- 2 tablespoons packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons chili powder

2 chipotle peppers in adobo sauce, minced

- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon each salt and black pepper

3 bottles (12-ounces each) Pilsner beer, divided

1/2 cup tomato juice

1/4 Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon lemon juice

2 whole chickens (about 3 1/2 pounds each), cut up Heat oil in a 2-quart saucepan over medium heat. Add onion and garlic; cook until onion is tender.

Combine ketchup, brown sugar, chili powder, chipotle peppers, mustard, salt and black pepper in a medium bowl. Add 1 bottle of beer, tomato juice, Worcestershire sauce and lemon juice; whisk until well blended. Pour mixture into saucepan with onion and garlic. Simmer and cook until sauce has thickened slightly and is reduced to about 2 cups. Let cool. Refrigerate overnight.

Place chickens and remaining 2 bottles of beer in 2 large resealable food storage bags and seal. Refrigerate 8 hours or overnight.

Spray grill with nonstick cooking spray. Prepare grill for direct grilling. Remove chickens from marinade and discard marinade. Grill, turning occasionally, 25 to 30 minutes.

Remove baste from refrigerator; reserve 1 cup. Brush chicken generously with basting sauce during last 10 minutes of cooking. Internal temperature should reach 170 degrees for breast meat and 180 degrees for dark meat when tested with a meat thermometer. Serve chicken with reserved baste and jicama salsa. Top chicken with salsa or use as a topping for baked potatoes. Makes 8 servings.

#### **Barb's Beer Can Chicken**

1 4-pound whole chicken 2 tablespoons olive oil or other vegetable oil

- 1 half-full can of favorite beer, room
- temperature (Barb used Miller Lite)

CONCORD

- 1 tablespoon salt (kosher, if you have it) 2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves, chopped
- or 1 tablespoon dried thyme
- 1 tablespoon freshly ground black pepper 1 tablespoon favorite Hatch dry seasoning mix

Prepare your grill for indirect heat. If using charcoal, put the coals on one side of the grill, leaving another side free of coals. If using a gas grill, fire up only half of the burners.

Remove neck and giblets from cavity of chicken, if the chicken came with them. Rub the chicken all over with olive oil. Mix the salt, pepper, thyme and Hatch seasoning in a small bowl. Sprinkle mix over entire chicken.

Lower the chicken on to the open half-filled beer can, so the chicken is sitting upright, with the can in its cavity. Place the chicken on the cool side of the grill, using the legs and beer can as a tripod to support the chicken on the grill and keep it stable.

Cover the grill and walk away. No peeking for at least an hour. After an hour, check the chicken and refresh the coals, if needed (if you are using a charcoal grill). Keep checking the chicken every 15 minutes or so, until a meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the thigh reads 160 degrees to 165 degrees. Cooking time will vary depending on the size of your chicken, and the internal temperature of the grill. A 4-pound chicken will usually take around 1 1/2 hours. If you don't have a meat thermometer, insert a knife deeply into the thigh. If the juices run clear (not pink), the chicken is done.

Carefully transfer the chicken to a tray or pan. (Beer and can will be extremely hot.) This works well: Slide a metal spatula under the bottom of the beer can. Use tongs to hold the top of the chicken. Lift the chicken, beer can still inside, and move it to a tray. Let the chicken rest for 10 minutes. Carefully lift the chicken off of the can. If it gets stuck, lay the chicken on its side, and pull out the can with tongs. Makes 4 servings. (Recipe adapted from http://simplyrecipes.com.)

#### Jicama Salsa

This refreshing salsa, full of flavor and texture, tastes terrific on just about anything that deserves a light kick, including chilled soup.

1 small jicama (about 1 cup), peeled and diced 8 radishes, diced

- 3/4 cup cucumber, peeled and diced
- 2 1/2 tablespoons fresh lime juice 2 tablespoons sweet red onion, diced
- 3/4 teaspoon ground chiles de arbol
- 2 teaspoons fresh basil, minced
- 2/3 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon sugar

Thoroughly combine all the ingredients together in a mixing bowl. Makes about 2 cups. (Recipe adapted from "The Great Salsa Book" by Mark Miller, Ten Speed Press, 1994.)


